3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
6 good to be back.

7 It appears we have established  
8 a quorum. I'd ask all Councilmembers to  
9 please take their seats and ask the  
10 guests and visitors to please retire  
11 behind the rail.

12 To give our invocation this  
13 morning, the Chair recognizes the Iman  
14 Yusef of Masjid Taaha. He is here today  
15 as the guest of Councilwoman Sanchez.

16 I would ask all guests and  
17 visitors and members to please rise.

18 (Members and guests rise.)

19 IMAN YUSEF: In the name of  
20 Allah, the extremely compassionate and  
21 the extremely merciful, all the praise

10           Council will be at ease.

11           (Council at ease.)

12           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you so much.

14           The next order of business is  
15 the approval of the Journal of the  
16 meeting of Thursday, December 13, 2012.

17           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
18 Greenlee.

19           COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
20 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
21 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,  
22 December 13th, 2012 be approved.

23           (Duly seconded.)

24           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It  
25 has been moved and properly seconded that

4                   All those in favor indicate by  
5           saying aye.

6                   (Aye.)

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Those opposed?

9                   (No response.)

10                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   The  
11           eyes have it.

12                  The next order of business is  
13           requests for leaves of absence.

14                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
15           Jones.

16                  COUNCILMAN JONES:   Thank you,  
17           Mr. President.   On behalf of the  
18           majority, there are no requests for  
19           leaves of absence today.

20                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21           Thank you.

22                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
23           O'Neill.

24                  COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:

25           Mr. President, thank you.   On behalf of

1           1/24/13 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS

2           the republicans, there are no requests  
3           for leave of absence.

4                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5           Thank you so much.

6                    At this point, I would like to  
7           recognize Councilman O'Brien.

8                    COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,  
9           Mr. President. I have official business  
10          outside of Council. I would like to be  
11          recorded as having voted yes on all bills  
12          and resolutions.

13                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14          Thank you. Leave shall be granted.

15          Thank you, Councilman.

16                    At this time, I would like to  
17          dispense with the regular order of  
18          business to welcome and thank all guests  
19          and visitors here today. We hope that  
20          your experience today is a pleasurable  
21          one, so much so that you come back. So  
22          thank you so much for being here today.

23                    At this time, I would like to  
24          recognize Councilwoman Blackwell, who  
25          will present a resolution honoring the

2           Fraternal Order of Police Lodge 5. Would  
3           John McNesby and those accompanying him  
4           please join the Councilwoman at the  
5           podium.

6                       We have Councilman Kenney and  
7           Councilman Jones joining the  
8           Councilwoman.

9                       COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
10          you, Mr. President.

11                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
12          You're welcome.

13                      COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: May I  
14          add -- and I don't usually speak before  
15          resolutions. I try to include the  
16          information therein -- that for  
17          approximately 15 years, as you all know,  
18          we give annual holiday parties for the  
19          homeless, and we're up to -- this year we  
20          hosted nearly 6,000 people, and every  
21          year the FOP -- they volunteered our  
22          first or second year, and every year they  
23          help us. They organize our lines, keep  
24          things in place, make sure the bike line  
25          is honored and all of those things, and

2           they always do it and always say they  
3           don't want thank you's. Some people have  
4           retired who work for the FOP who have  
5           done this. And all we do is call Brother  
6           McNesby and send him a letter, this is  
7           the time and the date, and they organize  
8           and they take over. That's a lot of  
9           people, and we're grateful for our entire  
10          Police Department and all that they do  
11          for us. Thank you all.

12                         Resolution honoring,  
13          recognizing and commending the Fraternal  
14          Order of Police Lodge No. 5 for their  
15          never ending service of families of  
16          fallen police officers.

17                         Whereas, the Fraternal Order of  
18          Police has over 14,500 members of active  
19          and retired Police Officers and Sheriffs;  
20          and

21                         Whereas, the FOP was first  
22          chartered in 1939 to serve its members  
23          and their families and in time became the  
24          bargaining agent for the Philadelphia  
25          Police Department and the Sheriff's

2           Office; and

3                       COUNCILMAN KENNEY:   Whereas,  
4           since 1828, more than 260 officers have  
5           given their lives in the line of duty;

6                       Whereas, beginning in 1997, the  
7           FOP began the "Survivors Tribute  
8           Luncheon" for the surviving family  
9           members of police officers killed in the  
10          line of duty, bringing all the families  
11          together once a year to honor their  
12          sacrifice to the citizens of  
13          Philadelphia. Bonds are forged at these  
14          events and last a lifetime; and

15                      Whereas, the FOP Lodge 5 makes  
16          sure these families and lost loved ones  
17          are never forgotten during the holiday  
18          season;

19                      COUNCILMAN JONES:   Whereas, the  
20          FOP Lodge No. 5 delivers food and other  
21          essentials to families who have lost  
22          loved ones in the line of duty several  
23          times a year;

24                      Whereas, it is important that  
25          all remember those who are killed in the

2           line of duty each year and those who  
3           protect and serve our communities; and

4                       Whereas, police officers are  
5           among the first responders that will do  
6           anything, including laying down their  
7           lives for us, to protect us and keep  
8           those of us from harm and safe;

9                       Whereas, police officers  
10          unselfishly put their uniforms on every  
11          day never knowing what they may meet; and  
12          now therefore, be it

13                      COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:  
14          Resolved, that the Council of the City of  
15          Philadelphia hereby honors, recognizes  
16          and commends the Fraternal Order of  
17          Police Lodge No. 5 for their never ending  
18          service to the families of fallen police  
19          officers.

20                      Let me note that this is a  
21          certification that this is a true and  
22          correct copy of the original resolution  
23          adopted by the Council of the City of  
24          Philadelphia on the 15th day of November,  
25          and it was certainly signed and supported

2           and endorsed by every member of Council.

3                        Before the President calls on  
4           Mr. McNesby, let me also note Broderick  
5           Mason, whom we all know, who is on the  
6           Mayor's detail, but we know about his and  
7           his family's commitment and that he's a  
8           family of a fallen officer, and certainly  
9           the First Deputy Commissioner Ross, who  
10          is here with us and whom I've seen more  
11          days than I've not during these last few  
12          weeks.

13                        Thank you. Thank you.

14                        (Applause.)

15                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
16          Chair recognizes Mr. McNesby for remarks.

17                        MR. McNESBY: Thank you.  
18          Council President Clarke, I'd like to  
19          thank you for having us here today,  
20          Councilwoman Blackwell, Kenney, and Jones  
21          and the rest of the members of Council.  
22          You know, there's times when we disagree,  
23          but there's times -- and it's not a  
24          matter of if it's going to happen, it's  
25          when it's going to happen again, and

2           we've lost too many police officers in  
3           the City of Philadelphia. And each time  
4           I'm proud to say that I live here in the  
5           City of Philadelphia and have an  
6           administration, from the Mayor on down to  
7           Council, that stands behind the officers  
8           in the City of Philadelphia.

9                        We have many of our uniform  
10          highway patrol here today. I'd like to  
11          also recognize the family of  
12          unfortunately our last two officers who  
13          were killed in the line of duty, the  
14          family of Brian Lorenzo, who is here,  
15          Mrs. Lorenzo and her two children, and  
16          Mrs. Walker, who lost her son, Moses, to  
17          a violent tragedy over the summer.

18                       I'm proud to accept this on  
19          behalf of the 14,500 members of our  
20          Philadelphia Police Department, and we  
21          look forward to servicing the citizens  
22          here in the City of Philadelphia. And,  
23          again, I can't thank you enough, not only  
24          Council, the community, and the Mayor on  
25          down, for the support that the

2 Philadelphia Police Department receives  
3 every day.

4           Thank you.

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you.

7           (Applause.)

8           MR. McNESBY: I'd like to ask  
9 real quick, Broderick Mason.

10           (Standing ovation.)

11           MR. MASON: Good morning to  
12 all. First I'd like to say thank you to  
13 City Council, City Council President, and  
14 all of the other City Council members  
15 that are seated. I'm a survivor. My  
16 brother was killed in 1981 in the line of  
17 duty, but it only seems like yesterday.  
18 So each time that this happens, it opens  
19 up that wound that will never be closed.

20           So to Mrs. Lorenzo and  
21 Mrs. Walker, I want to let you know that  
22 we're all in this thing together.

23           We want to thank you, City  
24 Council, for what you did. We appreciate  
25 it, and we're going to continue to serve

2           and protect.

3                    God bless you all.

4                    (Appause.)

5                    DEPUTY COMMISSIONER ROSS: Good  
6           morning, Council President, Councilwoman  
7           Blackwell, and other members of Council.  
8           We just want to thank you as well for the  
9           proclamation. The Fraternal Order of  
10          Police is certainly deserving of this. I  
11          can tell you we don't always agree, and  
12          that's natural, but John McNesby and his  
13          team certainly work tirelessly for its  
14          members, and they do a very effective job  
15          at doing so. But, most importantly, I  
16          want to thank you because, as Broderick  
17          kind of mentioned, this proclamation  
18          really kind of speaks to the fact that we  
19          want to remember our fallen heroes, which  
20          is most important, as well as their  
21          families, which is even more important.

22                    So I thank you all for that,  
23           and I can't thank you enough for all that  
24           you do for this city.

25                    Thank you.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4           Thank you.

5                   Council will be at ease.

6                   (Council at ease.)

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Thank you so much.

9                   At this time, I would like to  
10           recognize Councilman Jones, who will  
11           present a resolution honoring the United  
12           Age Group Track Coaches Association and  
13           Director Ron Jackson. Would those  
14           accompanying him please join the  
15           Councilman at the podium.

16                   We have Councilman Green,  
17           Councilman Kenney also joining Councilman  
18           Jones and Councilwoman Bass.

19                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Now,  
20           Mrs. Jackson, we're going to wait for you  
21           until you come up. Come on, be with your  
22           husband. We already know the wind  
23           beneath his wings is you.

24                   What I will start by saying is,  
25           to watch close to a thousand inner city

2 participants engage in an activity  
3 without a curse word, or maybe under  
4 their breath, but out loud, not a fist  
5 fight, not an act of violence is a  
6 beautiful sight to behold in these times.

7           Each week during the summer,  
8 during indoor, during the cross country  
9 season, I watch these individuals give  
10 their time, their talent, and I know  
11 their treasury to that activity.

12           During the Penn Relays, we get  
13 to showcase our stuff, and the only time  
14 that I'm not so much in favor of the  
15 Jamaicans is on three days of the year.  
16 And I admit it openly. I'm a fierce  
17 American patron of the track and field  
18 art.

19           But the individuals behind me  
20 raise athletes to create positive adults  
21 and citizens. I've watched them do it.  
22 One of them is on the stage right here.  
23 She didn't know I was going to point her  
24 out, but you know her as Morgan Cephas.  
25 I know her as national champion of the

2 4-by-8.

3 Is that right?

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: They go on  
6 to do remarkable things.

7 So I'm so very proud to present  
8 this today. I remember as an assistant  
9 to the assistant to the assistant to one  
10 of these track coaches, my actual job was  
11 to find the money to buy the uniforms. I  
12 knew what they were doing, Coach Daryl.  
13 I just want you to know I knew that.

14 But I'll never forget coming  
15 from New Orleans, and we had a van. You  
16 haven't lived until you've driven over a  
17 thousand miles with a bunch of kids. By  
18 the time you get back to see the  
19 Delaware, you are happy. But I'll never  
20 forget one that lived in North  
21 Philadelphia that had confessed that she  
22 had never, until she got involved in  
23 track and field, been outside of a ten  
24 square block radius in North  
25 Philadelphia. You were there when she

2           admitted that. And the most remarkable  
3           thing -- I think it was my shift of  
4           driving the van. I almost had an  
5           accident because she related geography  
6           having crossed the Mississippi saying how  
7           similar the Delaware was, having never  
8           left their neighborhood, having  
9           experienced things like room service.  
10          And we had to check that up a couple of  
11          times, didn't we?

12                        So what they do on a daily  
13          basis, on a yearly basis is nothing short  
14          of phenomenal. Not a curse word, not a  
15          fight, and often without recognition of  
16          the press. We're going to change that.  
17          Because if it were a flash mob, everybody  
18          would be out there, but because they're  
19          flashing through breaking times that are  
20          nationally recognized, we don't get any  
21          publicity. We're going to change that  
22          this summer.

23                        So without further adieu,  
24          honoring and celebrating the United Age  
25          Group Track Club Association and its

2           Director Ron Jackson for 35 years of  
3           commitment in developing today's athletes  
4           into tomorrow's leaders by timelessly  
5           working to provide quality, organized  
6           Track and Field programs for  
7           Philadelphia's youth.

8                    COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the  
9           United Age Group Track Coaches  
10          Association was founded in 1977. Their  
11          mission is to develop young athletes  
12          through the sport of track and field.  
13          Each year the sponsors -- each year the  
14          sponsors hold several Indoor and Outdoor  
15          Track and Field Meets that are designed  
16          to promote its objectives; and

17                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
18          athletics help youth develop important  
19          values such as teamwork, skill building  
20          and physical conditioning. Sports also  
21          have strong influences on inclusion and  
22          community building, character-building,  
23          delinquency and community safety; and

24                   COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Whereas,  
25          for 40 years, Ron Jackson, UAGTCA

1           1/24/13 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS  
2           Director, has dedicated his spirit of  
3           volunteerism to coaching youth in the  
4           sports of baseball, girls basketball,  
5           football and track and field. In  
6           addition to working with the development  
7           of the athletes, Mr. Jackson provides  
8           financial assistance to those parents who  
9           are not in the position to bear the costs  
10          required to participate in the sport. To  
11          ensure that no athlete was left behind,  
12          Mr. Jackson has purchased uniforms,  
13          spikes, dinners, and travel tickets to be  
14          sure that every member of his team is  
15          able to compete;

16                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And  
17          whereas, Ron Jackson has received  
18          numerous awards, including: United  
19          States of America Track and Field  
20          National Youth Chairman's Award for  
21          outstanding contribution to Youth Track  
22          and Field and Cross Country and the  
23          Mid-Atlantic United States of America  
24          Track and Field Lifetime Achievement  
25          Award, in recognition of his lifetime

2           pursuit and achievement of excellence in  
3           the sport of Track and Field; now  
4           therefore

5                        COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

6           Resolved, by the Council of the City of  
7           Philadelphia, that we hereby honor and  
8           recognize the United Age Group Track  
9           Coaches Association on their 35 years of  
10          commitment to developing today's athlete  
11          into tomorrow's leaders by tirelessly  
12          working to provide quality, organized  
13          track and field programs for Philadelphia  
14          youth.

15                        (Applause.)

16                        COUNCILMAN JONES:   You know  
17          what?

18                        Further resolved that an  
19          engrossed copy of this resolution be  
20          presented to Ron Jackson, Director of the  
21          United Age Group Track Coaches  
22          Association, as evidence of our sincere  
23          admiration of this legislative body.

24                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25          Thank you.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4 Chair recognizes Mr. Murphy for remarks.

5                   MR. MURPHY: Council President,  
6 distinguished members of City Council, on  
7 behalf of our founder, George Anderson,  
8 our Director, Mr. Ron Jackson, our  
9 Executive Committee, our member  
10 organizations, we are very pleased and  
11 honored to be here this morning. To be  
12 recognized by a distinguished body such  
13 as the City Council of Philadelphia is  
14 indeed an honor.

15                   We'd like to give a special  
16 thank you to Councilman Curtis Jones, who  
17 is a lifetime friend and supporter of our  
18 organization. Councilman Jones' daughter  
19 ran and participated in our program, and  
20 now his grandchildren participate in our  
21 program.

22                   The UAG was founded in 1976  
23 with the sole purpose of developing the  
24 youth of our city through the sport of  
25 track and field. We believe that track

2           teaches life skills and characteristics  
3           that these young people can take into  
4           other aspects of their life.

5                     Over the years, we've had  
6           hundreds of kids come through our  
7           program, go to college, graduate, and now  
8           are happy, healthy, productive citizens.  
9           As was mentioned, Ms. Morgan Cephas  
10          behind us, who I had the privilege of  
11          coaching during her teen years.

12                    The UAG sponsors a series of  
13          indoor meets in the winter and outdoor  
14          meets in the summertime. We average over  
15          a thousand athletes a year, and as  
16          Councilman Jones said, in our 36 years of  
17          existence, we have never experienced one  
18          day of violence, and we are very proud of  
19          that aspect.

20                    We would like to invite City  
21          Council --

22                    (Applause.)

23                    MR. MURPHY: Many of the  
24          athletes from our programs are from  
25          single-parent households with limited

2           resources. Participation in our program  
3           enables them to travel to areas outside  
4           the City of Philadelphia, visit various  
5           college campuses, and interact with  
6           children throughout the country.

7                     We invite City Council and  
8           everyone present to visit our website at  
9           uagtca.org where you can check out our  
10          schedule, and if there's any time that  
11          you have free time in your busy  
12          schedules, we'd like to invite you out to  
13          our competitions to check it out. We're  
14          sure the athletes would be excited to  
15          have you there.

16                    In closing, I'd like to say  
17          that the UAGTCA is more than willing to  
18          work with City Council, Philadelphia  
19          School Board, the Department of  
20          Recreation in any of our endeavors that  
21          are aimed at the development of the  
22          children of the City of Philadelphia.

23                    Again, we thank you. We're  
24          honored to be here today, and have a  
25          blessed day.

3           Thank you.

4           (Applause.)

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: At

6           this time, the Chair would like to

7           recognize Mr. Jackson for remarks.

8           MR. JACKSON: Actually, I can't

9           really say a whole lot more than what

10          Daryl has already said. I just remember

11          back in 1977 when we started, one of the

12          prime reasons that we got our

13          organization together is because the

14          gangs in the City had taken control.

15          They were in control. No one was

16          stepping forward to solve the problem.

17          We realized that the reason that no one

18          stepped forward to solve the problem was

19          that no one felt they could have an

20          impact on solving the problem.

21          We came together as a group,

22          realizing that probably our kids had

23          better learn to run fast just to stay

24          alive. We actually only hoped for the

25          most part that our kids would make it to

1           1/24/13 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS  
2           the next Olympiad. We had no idea that  
3           we would coach probably over ten  
4           Olympians during that period of time,  
5           countless collegiates. And one of the  
6           things that we're most proud of is that  
7           our kids recognize that they can see from  
8           the bottom to the top in their chosen  
9           sport. They realize that they can run  
10          off the playground to Kensington,  
11          Germantown, South Philadelphia straight  
12          to the finish line in Madrid or London or  
13          any of the other Olympic games. It's  
14          something they shoot for, something they  
15          make and achieve, because it's up to  
16          them. They don't have to rely on anyone  
17          else other than themselves in order to  
18          achieve their goals.

19                   I really want to thank you for  
20                   the resolution today. And one of the  
21                   things that was said earlier, you have to  
22                   realize that we were built on one  
23                   premise, that we would actually carry our  
24                   own lunch, and we still believe in that  
25                   philosophy. We don't believe in going

2           out and trying to beg our way to the top.  
3           We rely on ourselves to achieve the goals  
4           that we've set forth.

5                        But, again, thank you for the  
6           resolution, and I know that our members  
7           are quite proud of the fact that you've  
8           taken this time to honor us. Thank you  
9           very much.

10                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
11           Thank you.

13                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
14           Council will be at ease.

15                        (Council at ease.)

16                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17           Thank you.

18                        At this time, the Chair  
19           recognizes Councilman Greenlee, who will  
20           present a resolution honoring PathWays  
21           PA. Would Carol Goertzel and those  
22           accompanying her please join the  
23           Councilman at the podium.

24                        And joining the Councilman we  
25           have Councilman Goode and Councilwoman

3                     Proceed, Councilman.

4                     COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
5           you, Mr. President. It's always a  
6           pleasure to recognize an organization for  
7           their good work they do. This is a  
8           resolution honoring PathWays PA as the  
9           winner of the Greater Philadelphia

11          Award as the non-profit of the year.

12                    Whereas, this year marks the  
13          30th Annual Excellence Awards celebrated  
14          by the Greater Philadelphia Chamber of  
15          Commerce, which acknowledges the  
16          accomplishments of small businesses and  
17          the contributions they make to our  
18          regional economy. Nominated by their  
19          peers throughout our 11-county region,  
20          the awards are presented in 10  
21          categories; and

22                    Whereas, nominees of the award  
23          must be headquartered in the Chamber's  
24          11-county Greater Philadelphia area and  
25          have between one and 100 employees. The

2           nominees must be owned and independently  
3           operated and also have four full years of  
4           revenue and if picked as a finalist must  
5           be able to provide percentages of gross  
6           revenue growth over the past 3 years.

9           strong community involvement; and

10                   COUNCILMAN GOODE: Whereas, the  
11           nominees for the non-profit of the year  
12           must be a 501(c)(3) and demonstrate  
13           outstanding contributions to the  
14           community. The nominee must show  
15           benefits of service and how they set the  
16           organization apart, including the  
17           quantitative results of their  
18           initiatives; and

19                   Whereas, the Chamber created  
20           the Small Business Excellence Awards in  
21           1982 which were later renamed the  
22           Excellence Awards Honoring the Region's  
23           Small Businesses in order to showcase  
24           their achievement and impact of small  
25           businesses in our region. Each year,

2           businesses with fewer than 100 employees  
3           are recognized for their creativity,  
4           vitality, stability and relevance.  
5           Equally important in selecting the  
6           winners are civic involvement and

10          years, the scope of the Excellence Awards  
11          has grown with the help of the Small  
12          Business Board. The Small Business Board  
13          has created new initiatives and  
14          categories, increased involvement in the

16          criteria for measuring and defining  
17          excellence; and

18                       Whereas, PathWays PA was  
19           founded in 1978 as the Women's  
20           Association for Women's Alternatives and  
21           has served as one of Pennsylvania's first  
22           residential programs to keep low-income,  
23           vulnerable women together with their  
24           children. PathWays PA has grown to  
25           become one of the Greater Philadelphia

3           residential and community-based services  
4           for women, children and families. Each  
5           year over 64,000 women, children and  
6           families benefit from their full

11          the path to self-sufficiency; and

12                    COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Whereas,  
13          PathWays PA provides programs committed  
14          to the development of client  
15          self-sufficiency which leads to the  
16          fulfillment of their mission to help  
17          women, teens, children and families  
18          achieve economic independence and family  
19          well-being; and

20                   Whereas, PathWays PA is  
21          accredited by the National Council on  
22          Accreditation and is a member in good  
23          standing of both the Child Welfare League  
24          of America and the Pennsylvania Council  
25          of Children, Youth and Family Services.

3           Pennsylvania, they have received numerous  
4           awards. These include Oprah Winfrey's

17          independence and self-sufficiency,  
18          PathWays PA was awarded the Greater  
19          Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce's Annual  
20          Excellence Award as the non-profit of the  
21          year; now therefore

22                       COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Resolved,  
23          that the Council of the City of  
24          Philadelphia recognizes and commends  
25          PathWays PA as the winner of the Greater

5                   Further resolved, that an

10                   Congratulations, everyone, and  
11 thank you for all you do.

12                   (Applause.)

13                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
14 Chair recognizes Ms. Goertzel for  
15 remarks.

16                   MS. GOERTZEL: Thank you. I'm  
17 just going to say a few words because the  
18 words can't really speak for our  
19 appreciation of the City Council and of  
20 the City of Philadelphia.

21                   We thank you so much for the  
22 opportunity to be before you today. On  
23 behalf of all of us at PathWays PA, this  
24 citation means more to us than any award  
25 or citation that we've received because

6                         We especially want to thank

12          people who really support what workers  
13          and residents in the City need.

14                        I would also like to thank the  
15          Greater Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce  
16          for selecting PathWays PA as their 2013  
17          non-profit of the year. The award and  
18          today's citation are a perfect start for  
19          us of 2013, which is our 35th year of  
20          operation, and we have helped well over  
21          75,000 women, children, teens, and  
22          families throughout our years of service.

23                        Much has changed since we began  
24          in 1978 as the Women's Association for  
25          Women's Alternatives, and when we changed

2           our name to PathWays PA, we realized that  
3           we were not an association and the  
4           alternative was an alternative to  
5           poverty, and that really is our mission.  
6           So we took on the name of PathWays PA,  
7           because what our mission is is to create

9           teens, and families to move forward  
10          economically and move forward without  
11          violence and to move forward in terms of  
12          family well-being for every member of  
13          their family, whomever that might be.

14                 We started with the residential  
15          center, as mentioned, in Delaware County,  
16          which serves many Philadelphia families  
17          as they struggle and succeed in staying  
18          together so everybody can feel loved,  
19          wanted, and move forward educationally.

20                 The range of issues that we  
21          cover are adult literacy. We are working  
22          with the library in the Northwest, as  
23          well as in the Center City and West  
24          Philly offices. We do financial  
25          literacy, really helping people move

2           forward, deal with their credit issues  
3           and know, because we know what you need  
4           in order to move forward. We developed  
5           the self-sufficiency standard for  
6           Pennsylvania and specifically for  
7           Philadelphia because we know that people  
8           don't have enough money because they  
9           don't have enough money. And we work on  
10          the policy issues that help families stay  
11          stable, healthy, and move forward.

12                        While we've seen many changes,  
13          our mission stays the same. And families  
14          come to us to build paths out of poverty  
15          and to build paths toward success. They  
16          come as teen moms who are trying to do it  
17          differently for their children than their  
18          families were able to do for them. We  
19          work with people who lived with abuse and  
20          neglect and have more inner strength than  
21          any of us might have, and we look for  
22          that strength and we promote it. We help  
23          people develop the jobs. We're a  
24          facilitator for themselves that will help  
25          them support their families, learn how to

2           manage the money that they do have, learn  
3           how to earn more money, and learn how to  
4           get a job that will help them sustain  
5           their families.

6                       Throughout our 35th anniversary  
7           year, we'll be holding events focused on

9           the theme of this year for us is "Writing  
10          the Path." Our wonderful staff, our  
11          Board members here with us today, and our  
12          clients across the region and those with  
13          whom we work in Philadelphia are really  
14          the people that allow us to be here, and  
15          we're so honored to be honored both by  
16          the Chamber of Commerce and mostly by  
17          City Council.

18                      Everything we do is cost free,  
19          and we reach out during these difficult  
20          times as far as we can. And one of the  
21          things we're doing -- we always try to do  
22          new things to fill in the gaps that we  
23          see -- is for our free tax service, which  
24          will be at Suburban Station for the first  
25          time, and our opening is tomorrow at 2:30

20                   MS. GEMMELL: Thank you,  
21           Council President and City Council,  
22           Councilman Jones, ladies and gentlemen.  
23           Thank you so much, Councilwoman  
24           Blackwell, for introducing the moratorium  
25           on school closings. PCAPS --

2                   (Applause.)

3           MS. GEMMELL: Just to back up,  
4 my name is Anne Gemmell. I'm the  
5 Political Director at Fight for Philly.  
6 Fight for Philly is an active supporter  
7 of the PCAPS Coalition, and we stand with  
8 the many, many, many community folks,  
9 parents, teachers, students who think  
10 that this plan is not a good idea, not  
11 well evaluated and, as Council President  
12 himself said, was created by bean  
13 counters. We believe that fervently, and  
14 we're happy to see this moratorium put  
15 into place.

16                   That being said, we don't  
17 believe that the plan will cost -- we  
18 don't believe that the plan will save  
19 money in the long run. In Washington, DC  
20 when Michelle Rhee also tried to  
21 implement a massive butchering of school  
22 closings, it ended up costing three times  
23 what she said it was going to save all  
24 along. So we don't believe it's going to  
25 save money. That's the first thing.

2           But, more importantly, we don't  
3 think and don't believe from all the  
4 community meetings that we've heard and  
5 all the people that we've organized, we  
6 don't believe for a second that it is  
7 fair that all these communities, our most  
8 vulnerable communities, are going to be  
9 plunged into chaos for less than one  
10 percent savings. That is absurd. And  
11 we're so happy that Councilpeople are  
12 willing to go out publicly and take a  
13 stand against this very ill-conceived  
14 plan.

15           That being said, we are in a  
16 crisis. We have a state budget crisis,  
17 and that is where this crisis -- the road  
18 of this crisis leads to Harrisburg.  
19 There's no doubt about it. And this  
20 Coalition will be just as organized. We  
21 will be just as organized. We will be  
22 just as fired up in Harrisburg, when  
23 Corbett comes to Philadelphia. When  
24 there's a bus trip to Harrisburg, we will  
25 be ready to fight, and we are looking for

2 you to lead the way. We are looking for  
3 you.

4 (Applause.)

5 MS. GEMMELL: Just a reminder,  
6 since 2010, a funding formula implemented  
7 by Governor Rendell, which was fair and  
8 rational and served the poorest children  
9 in the state very well, was totally wiped  
10 off the books, almost eviscerated by this  
11 republican government in Harrisburg.

12 This needs to come back on the table, and  
13 we need City leaders like the leaders in  
14 Philadelphia, Reading, Allentown,  
15 Pittsburgh, all the community --

16 (Applause.)

17 MS. GEMMELL: We need all of  
18 those folks to come together, all the  
19 people that care about this issue, care  
20 about public education as the bedrock of  
21 our democracy, and we cannot stand by.

22 A billion dollars has been cut.  
23 We want to look to restore some of that,  
24 and we're hoping to get your back when  
25 that time comes in a very difficult, what

2 promises to be contentious, state budget  
3 fight. We'll be there.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you  
6 for your comment.

10 commenting on 120340-AAA.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

13 MR. PALMER: Good morning,  
14 everyone. Good morning, Council. My  
15 name is Hanif Palmer. I'm here to say  
16 that I am a parent of children in the  
17 Philadelphia public school. Closing  
18 these schools is really going to hinder  
19 these children all the way across the  
20 City, the safety, the commute,  
21 everything. We really need to bring  
22 everything back to the table and really  
23 sit down and take a look at what's really  
24 at stake, which is the education and the  
25 safety of these children in Philadelphia.

5 for your comments.

6 Will the Clerk please read the

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 MS. SAITTA: Hi. I want to  
12 thank Council and Councilman Greenlee for  
13 introducing the paid sick day bill again.

14 (Applause.)

15 MS. SAITTA: My name is Che  
16 Saitta and I'm currently with Fight for  
17 Philly, but before I got a job with Fight  
18 for Philly, I was a restaurant worker. I  
19 was working three different restaurant  
20 jobs, and I could tell you as a  
21 restaurant worker, I've seen people cut  
22 their fingers, cough, be actually quite  
23 sick, still with stitches that they went  
24 to the hospital the night before, working  
25 on the line, cutting people's food and

2           serving it to them. And right now with  
3           this flu epidemic that everyone has been  
4           hearing about, it's impossible to believe  
5           that your food has not been touched by  
6           somebody who has the flu. You're kidding  
7           yourselves if you believe your food has  
8           not been touched by a sick person.

9                     Restaurants claim they cannot  
10          afford this, but I don't know about you,  
11          but everywhere I walk there's a new  
12          restaurant opening. There's new  
13          restaurants opening left and right and  
14          expanding and asking to be expanded. And  
15          right now -- I recently graduated from  
16          Temple University, and I want to say 90  
17          percent of my friends are currently  
18          working restaurant jobs. These are  
19          really the only jobs that they can  
20          afford. And as -- I know the opposition  
21          usually says the reason why they will not  
22          support this bill is for economic  
23          reasons, it's not the right time, it's  
24          bad economic policy. Well, as a worker  
25          in this city, I believe this is good for

2           the economy. What this will do is create  
3           good jobs that young people like me will  
4           want to stay and work at. If the jobs  
5           that are being offered in Philly are,  
6           pardon me, but crappy with no sick leave,

9           Help create better jobs for the youth of  
10          Philadelphia and stand with the people.  
11          And don't be persuaded by the lobbyists  
12          of Comcast and by the lobbyists of Dunkin  
13          Donuts and by the lobbyists of Walmart.  
14          Stand with the people who really need  
15          this.

16                        And I would like to thank  
17          Greenlee again for supporting this bill,  
18          and I would also like to thank my  
19          Councilman Clarke for supporting this  
20          bill. We appreciate it.

8 MS. SNYDER: Hi. I want to  
9 thank Council and particularly Blondell  
10 Reynolds Brown for starting to pay  
11 attention to non-profit property taxes.

12 (Applause.)

13 MS. SNYDER: I'm Gwen Snyder.  
14 I'm the Executive Director of  
15 Philadelphia Jobs with Justice. We're a  
16 coalition of over 40 faith, community,  
17 labor, and student groups. Our  
18 constituents are students, teachers,  
19 librarians, and our neighbors, workers  
20 and the communities that they serve.

21 Our schools are shutting down  
22 because we don't have enough money, and  
23 at the same time, we are watching  
24 non-profits who own office space rented  
25 out to private practice or universities

2           that have a Hilton and don't pay taxes.

3                   After April 2012, we had the  
4           opportunity to start working on enforcing  
5           the Pike County decision, implement good  
6           neighbors policy, and make sure that our  
7           neighbors, our non-profits, are paying  
8           their fair share. At Jobs with Justice,  
9           we are a non-profit. We're not looking  
10          to target or attack other non-profits.  
11          Many of our members are non-profits, but  
12          if you're operating a business on  
13          non-profit land, it's still a business  
14          and it should still be paying taxes  
15          regardless of who owns it.

16                   (Applause.)

17                   MS. SNYDER: In December, we  
18          delivered a letter signed by 15 different  
19          leaders from different organizations, the  
20          presidents of both AFSCME District  
21          Councils, the President of the  
22          Firefighters Union Local 22, as well as  
23          clergy, student groups, community groups.

24                   We need to implement good  
25          neighbors policy. It's the first step

2           towards non-profits paying their fair  
3           share towards sewers, towards  
4           firefighters, towards our library. Mayor  
5           Nutter has not responded to our letter.  
6           We need him to act and be a leader for

9                           MS. SNYDER: We need a response  
10           on enforcement of the good neighbors  
11           policy, and we're excited this dialogue  
12           is about to begin.

13                          Again, Councilwoman Reynolds  
14           Brown, thank you so much for introducing  
15           this. I look forward to these  
16           conversations and having better  
17           neighbors.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

12 The ayes are 17; the nays are  
13 zero. All members present having voted  
14 in the affirmative, the bill passes.

15 Mr. Decker, will you please  
16 call up 120917.

17 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance  
18 amending Title 14 of The Philadelphia  
19 Code, entitled "Zoning and Planning," by  
20 revising certain provisions relating to  
21 allowed uses and dimensional standards in  
22 commercial districts.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
24 Chair recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

25 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,

1 1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Mr. President. I offer one amendment,  
3 and that amendment has been circulated to  
4 all Councilmembers.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. Do you want to make a motion  
7 on the amendment.

8 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: I move the  
9 adoption.

10 (Duly seconded.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
12 amendment has been moved and properly  
13 seconded.

14 All those in favor?

15 (Aye.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Those opposed?

18 (No response.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
20 ayes have it. The bill is amended.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: For  
23 the record, that bill will be placed on  
24 Final Passage for next Council session.

25 Council will now reconsider the

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           vote by which Bill No. 120889 was passed.

3                     Mr. Decker, will you please  
4           read the title of the bill.

5                     CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance  
6           amending Title 14 of The Philadelphia  
7           Code, entitled "Zoning and Planning," by  
8           defining Registered Community  
9           Organizations, the requirements for their  
10          establishment, and the parameters and  
11          expectations of notification.

12                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This  
13          bill having been read on two different  
14          days was duly approved by City Council on  
15          December 13th, 2012 and was returned to  
16          the Council by the Mayor as disapproved  
17          at today's session of Council. The  
18          question is shall the Bill No. 120889  
19          pass notwithstanding the Mayor's  
20          disapproval.

21                    Please note that a vote of aye  
22          is a vote to override the Mayor's veto  
23          and a vote of nay is a vote to sustain  
24          the Mayor's veto.

25                    Mr. Decker --

2 COUNCILMAN GREEN:

3 Mr. President?

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
5 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

6 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
7 Mr. President. I just want to say I  
8 served on the Zoning Code Commission for  
9 three years. A lot of thought and effort  
10 and compromise was spent during those  
11 three years on coming up with the proper  
12 balance between creating registered  
13 community organizations, the kind of  
14 notice that was going to have to be given  
15 by the organizations and by developers,  
16 and this bill creates notice requirements  
17 that are almost impossible to legally  
18 comply with. They will hold up projects  
19 in the courts for years because someone  
20 on the block can simply say, I didn't get  
21 a notice from. And this is required from  
22 both the RCO and the developer to every  
23 person on a block. This is going to  
24 create legal roadblocks to development  
25 and job creation, which is the exact

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           opposite purpose of passing the Zoning  
3           Code. This has not been tried. So I  
4           think we need to give the current method  
5           that was passed by this Council through a  
6           great series of compromises with the  
7           Administration, with the Zoning Code  
8           members, et cetera, a chance to succeed  
9           before we start changing it, especially  
10          for extremely burdensome changes that are  
11          notice requirements that will keep  
12          projects in court for years.

13                 There are many other problems  
14          with this, multiple meetings with  
15          developers instead of one meeting that  
16          has to be organized, and the requirements  
17          to be a registered RCO are so weak that a  
18          group could register 50 and a developer  
19          would be required to have 50 meetings  
20          before they could put a bill before --  
21          before they could get the zoning change  
22          or get their hearing before the ZBA.  
23          This is a big mistake, and I urge my  
24          colleagues to vote no.

25                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Thank you, Councilman.

3 The Chair recognizes

4 Councilwoman Blackwell.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
6 you, Mr. President. Let me say and many  
7 of you will remember that at the request  
8 of the Chairman of the Committee, he said  
9 go out and try to work it out, and we did  
10 that. Some of the language that is now  
11 being criticized in the Mayor's veto was  
12 the language that his people wrote.

13 We agree and we're always  
14 happy -- I believe in compromising, and  
15 we're happy to continue to work with the  
16 Administration. But those issues that my  
17 colleague just spoke about are all the  
18 issues that we talked about in my office  
19 many times and the issues that we came up  
20 with a compromise, and they agreed to the  
21 compromise and agreed to the bill.

22 So I hope my colleagues will --  
23 now they want to start all over as if we  
24 had never had the meetings, we never had  
25 the compromise. And we worked very, very

2 hard. I believe in the art of compromise  
3 and that it takes all of us to try to do  
4 the right thing and serve our city.

5 So I hope my colleagues will  
6 take that into consideration. And we  
7 told the Mayor as recently as this  
8 morning when he said he had a problem  
9 with it for some -- even after all of  
10 this, we said we're still happy to work  
11 with them. We're happy to work with  
12 anybody who has ideas.

13 We understand changing the  
14 Zoning Code -- and this is just one of  
15 the early bills, so there will be many  
16 issues that we may consider, because  
17 after we had the hearings -- I went to  
18 every hearing in my district on the  
19 Zoning Code. We knew what we agreed to,  
20 but then they went and told some offices,  
21 changed it, did not talk to people, and  
22 that is why we have these issues that we  
23 have to deal with up front.

24 But it is our responsibility to  
25 do so. We're happy to do that. We're

2           happy to still continue to work with the  
3           Mayor and his Administration, but I ask  
4           my colleagues if they will continue to  
5           support the right of communities to know  
6           when there is zoning in their area. I  
7           ask them to continue to support this  
8           legislation and support the override.

9                     Thank you, Mr. President.

10                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you, Councilwoman.

12                    (Appause.)

13                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
14           Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

15                    COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
16           you, Mr. President. Just very quickly.  
17           I just have to endorse particularly the  
18           beginning of what Councilwoman Blackwell  
19           said. As Chair of the Rules Committee,  
20           that day it was a very contentious  
21           hearing on a number of issues. I asked,  
22           as Councilwoman Blackwell said, for both  
23           parties to go talk about it a little bit,  
24           because it didn't sound from the public  
25           statements that were being made that they

2           were that far apart. They came back and  
3           as usual in compromise, not everybody was  
4           happy. That's what a compromise is. But  
5           it seems to me, best that I remember --  
6           maybe my memory is getting bad -- that  
7           they agreed, both sides agreed, to this  
8           bill and the wording of this bill. And  
9           now they come back at the end and  
10          basically say, Well, we don't agree with  
11          everything in it. Well, again, that's  
12          what I think a compromise is.

13                 So I certainly will be voting  
14          to override, because I think in fairness,  
15          I think Councilwoman Blackwell tried to  
16          work out to the best of her ability and I  
17          think everybody tried to work out the  
18          best middle ground we could find, and  
19          that's what we do a lot of times in this  
20          place. So I will be supporting the  
21          override.

22                 Thank you, Mr. President.

23                 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24          Thank you, Councilman.

25                 The Chair recognizes Councilman

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           Green.

3                   COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
4           Mr. President. I just want to say that I  
5           respect both of my colleagues, understand  
6           their point of view, but a compromise  
7           does not mean -- because the  
8           Administration may have agreed or may not  
9           have agreed with what is in this bill is  
10          not really relevant to the substance of  
11          the bill, and I am telling this Council  
12          that projects that you want to get done  
13          will be held up for years because of the  
14          burdensome, expensive nature of these  
15          requirements and we will all rue the day  
16          that this veto was overridden.

17                   Thank you.

18                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19          Thank you, Councilman.

20                   The Chair again recognizes  
21          Councilwoman Blackwell.

22                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
23          you, Mr. President. That's absolutely  
24          not true, period.

25                   (Applause.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Finished, Councilwoman? Thank you.

4 Mr. Decker, are you prepared to  
5 call the roll? Again, a vote of aye is  
6 to override the Mayor's veto and a vote  
7 of nay is to sustain to the Mayor's veto.

8 Mr. Decker, please call the  
9 roll.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Aye.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Aye.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

5 CHIEF CLERK: The ayes are 13;  
6 the nays are three.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
9 Mayor's veto is overridden. Thirteen to  
10 3, the Mayor's veto is overridden.  
11 Two-thirds majority of all members of  
12 Council have voted in the affirmative,  
13 the Mayor's veto is overridden. I'll say  
14 it again for the record.

15 That completes our Calendar for  
16 today. I'm sorry. You have resolutions.  
17 Mr. Decker, do you have any additional  
18 resolutions?

19 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
20 authorizing the Committee on Rules to  
21 hold public hearings to examine the  
22 City's intent to contract with Corizon  
23 Health, Inc. to provide healthcare  
24 services to inmates in the Philadelphia  
25 Prison System, introduced by Councilman

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4 Chair recognizes Councilman Kenney.

5 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,  
6 Mr. President. I move the adoption of  
7 the resolution.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
10 been moved and properly seconded.

11 All those in favor?

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
17 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

18 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution  
19 calling on the City Council of  
20 Philadelphia Committee on Education and  
21 all of City Council to recognize and  
22 support President Barack Obama's plan,  
23 Now is the Time, which aims to ensure the  
24 safety of our children and our  
25 communities by reducing gun violence,

2 introduced by Councilwoman Blackwell.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
6 you, Mr. President. I move for the  
7 adoption of the resolution.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It  
10 has been moved and properly seconded.

11 All those in favor?

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
17 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

18 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution  
19 calling on the City Council of  
20 Philadelphia to support, advocate, and  
21 recommend a moratorium (suspension --

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: -- (suspension of  
24 action) for the School District of  
25 Philadelphia's Facilities Master Plan

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2       recommendations concerning grade changes,  
3       school closures, program co-locations,  
4       and program mergers/relocations,  
5       introduced by Councilwoman Blackwell.

6           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
7       Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

8           COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
9       you, Mr. President. I move for the  
10      adoption of the resolution.

11                   (Duly seconded.)

12           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
13      been moved and properly seconded.

14                   All those in favor?

15                   (Aye.)

16           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17      Those opposed?

18           COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: No. I'd  
19      like to speak on that. I have my light  
20      on.

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm  
22      sorry. Councilwoman Sanchez.

23           COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Is it  
24      appropriate to speak or do you want to  
25      continue?

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3       Yeah, Councilwoman, because I missed the  
4       light.

5                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I agree  
6       that there are many unanswered questions  
7       regarding Dr. Hite and the SRC's plans.  
8       We asked the SRC and Dr. Hite to make  
9       very tough decisions. This year alone  
10      they borrowed \$300 million to pay the  
11      bills. I am prepared to discuss  
12      additional funding in a responsible way  
13      and then ask for a moratorium. We cannot  
14      act like Congress and say that we are  
15      going to kick the bucket and not deal  
16      with our fiscal cliff.

17                  Dr. Hite and the SRC have  
18      responded -- have to respond to every  
19      single issue and legitimate questions  
20      that our parents have put forth to them.  
21      How were the decisions made, do they make  
22      sense, what is the public safety plan.  
23      But let's remember over 100,000 kids get  
24      on some sort of public transportation  
25      because their parents are making a choice

2           about where they go to school.

3                     Meetings are being held,  
4           continue to be held, and I continue to  
5           encourage parents and the students to  
6           come forth and speak about the impact of  
7           any decision on their school. I have  
8           personally visited most of my schools and  
9           will continue to visit the schools that  
10          are being closed and the receiving  
11          schools, and I continue to talk with  
12          staff, parents, and students.

13                    My problem with this resolution  
14          and the way that it's crafted is that it  
15          says a moratorium that to me equals a  
16          zero-sum game, and that to me right now  
17          is irresponsible. We are all right that  
18          all roads lead to Harrisburg and the  
19          funding cuts that we've experienced. I  
20          am the most passionate supporter of  
21          public education. My son attends public  
22          schools. But we cannot tell the District  
23          to right-size itself and at the same time  
24          not give it money and at the same time  
25          interfere in every single decision.

1                   1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2                   I am prepared to shape some of  
3 these discussions and I want to continue  
4 the dialogue, but it is irresponsible  
5 without additional money to tell the  
6 School District they cannot do anything.  
7 I think the conversation should continue  
8 to happen, and I think what this Council  
9 should be asking Dr. Hite and the SRC is  
10 to answer the questions, the legitimate  
11 questions, students and parents have put  
12 forward around public safety. But I  
13 cannot vote, because of the crafting of  
14 the wording of this resolution, for it.  
15 I think that unlike Congress, we don't  
16 have the luxury of time and we have to  
17 make tough decisions, and I'm willing to  
18 work towards them.

19                   Thank you.

20                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21                   Thank you.

22                   (Audience members yelling "save  
23 our schools.")

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We  
25 have some additional speeches. Hold up

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           for a second.

3                     The Chair recognizes Councilman  
4           Jones.

5                     COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
6           Mr. President. I know half as much as my  
7           colleagues on Education such as  
8           Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilwoman  
9           Sanchez, Councilwoman Brown. They've  
10          spent a considerable amount of time on  
11          the Education Committee delving into  
12          this. But what I do know is that we  
13          cannot make whole decisions on half  
14          information. And there are so many  
15          questions that have come out, and I've  
16          taken the time to talk to my colleagues,  
17          talk to Dr. Hite, talk to members of the  
18          SRC, talk to educators, talk to parents,  
19          talk to students, all of whom are going  
20          to be impacted by this.

21                    This decision is probably the  
22          most important decision we will make for  
23          the next ten years when it comes to the  
24          future of this city, not just our kids,  
25          but this city.

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           So I applaud Councilwoman  
3 Blackwell for pushing the pause button so  
4 that we don't --

5           (Applause.)

6           COUNCILMAN JONES: -- that we  
7 don't make whole decisions on half  
8 information.

9           I mentioned in this Chamber  
10 about a guy named Ray-Ray. Well, I met  
11 him on the school yard of Beeber Junior  
12 High School in on overcrowded situation  
13 that caused all kinds of public safety  
14 issues. When it comes to our kids, we  
15 can ill-afford for kids who really, some  
16 of whom, some of whom, don't want to go  
17 to school anyway, for them to have to  
18 take a march into danger without us as  
19 adults, as us as elected officials, as us  
20 as parents weighing in on this to make  
21 sure every aspect of their safety, their  
22 transportation is dealt with before we  
23 send them into a situation.

24           (Applause.)

25           COUNCILMAN JONES: And, again,

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           I kept an open mind about this. I  
3           respect, I respect Councilwoman Sanchez's  
4           point of view, having run a school,  
5           having dealt with kids. But having  
6           listened to the parents of Gompers,  
7           having listened to the parents of  
8           Lamberton, having been a parent in those  
9           schools, we cannot, as a famous  
10          Councilperson said, act in haste and  
11          repent in your leisure.

12                        I'm going to go for the  
13          resolution to hold it.

14                        Thank you, Mr. President.

15                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16          Thank you, Councilman.

17                        The Chair recognizes Councilman  
18          Goode.

19                        COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,  
20          Mr. President. I will be brief. For  
21          clarity of the record, this Council did  
22          not ask Dr. Hite or the School Reform  
23          Commission to come up with a plan.  
24          Governor Corbett asked the School Reform  
25          Commission to come up with a plan.

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           Governor Corbett asked for a plan because  
3           he has deliberately underfunded the  
4           schools. That's what put us in this  
5           situation. So this Council has had to  
6           ask residential taxpayers and other  
7           taxpayers to look at local revenue for  
8           schools. The state still hasn't stood  
9           up.

10                         And so this is not our plan.  
11           We do not have control of the situation.  
12           This is about the time we begin to talk  
13           about local control. So not only are we  
14           calling for a moratorium, but we're  
15           calling for local control again.

16                         (Applause.)

17                         COUNCILMAN GOODE: That's what  
18           the majority of this Council is saying  
19           and that's what the citizens are saying  
20           and that's what the taxpayers are saying.

21                         Thank you, Mr. President.

22                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23           Thank you, Councilman.

24                         (Applause.)

25                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

1 1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
4 you, Mr. President. I thank my  
5 colleagues for their remarks on this  
6 issue, and we note, sure, there are many  
7 issues. We have schools in Councilman  
8 Johnson's area in Southwest where they  
9 want to relocate young people to  
10 University City. What sense does that  
11 make? We have one school in my area, we  
12 built brand new housing, PHA, Mantua  
13 Square, the school to service them right  
14 across the street, McMichael School, they  
15 want to close. We're talking about not  
16 only turf areas, not only transportation,  
17 we're talking about a plan that should be  
18 thought out with the community involved  
19 in those discussions, not being told  
20 afterwards and saying that's community  
21 inclusion.

22 Certainly --

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

25 Certainly no one is saying that a

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           moratorium means it has to be forever,  
3           and no one is saying -- we carefully  
4           crafted this resolution. We were careful  
5           about how we worded moratorium, and  
6           certainly we were careful about many  
7           issues dealing with closing, like time.

8                         We've learned that -- studies  
9           show that if there's a notice for schools  
10          to close, that year the scores go down.  
11          When they move to the next school, the  
12          first year of the new school scores go  
13          down. The second year the scores go back  
14          to where they were before changes occur.

15                        So we believe and we were very  
16          careful, because we did not even say that  
17          all 37 schools wouldn't close. I've been  
18          to many, many meetings and have many,  
19          many discussions on this. In Southwest  
20          they have 23 organizations in the area  
21          who have come together on this. And what  
22          all groups are saying in every meeting  
23          I've been to, they're not saying that  
24          some schools shouldn't close, but not 37  
25          schools should close.

1 1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: I

4 think that the students -- it's ironic  
5 that in all the meetings, the largest  
6 group of people who protest are students,  
7 which is very, very sad. Second is  
8 parents and third are teachers. Teachers  
9 have even come forward and stood up for  
10 their schools, their students, and their  
11 environment.

12 So we're not saying we're not  
13 willing to talk about it. We're saying  
14 we need inclusion on major decisions like  
15 this. So let's hold up. Let's try to  
16 get it right so that the majority of our  
17 citizens, students, parents, teachers,  
18 community members are satisfied, so we  
19 can have a plan that makes sense, not a  
20 plan that doesn't.

21 Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilwoman.

25 The Chair recognizes

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           Councilwoman Bass.

3                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
4           Mr. President. I'm going to be brief  
5           because I know a lot of what I wanted to  
6           cover has already been covered. But I  
7           just really want to echo what  
8           Councilwoman Blackwell just said. Let's  
9           do it right. Let's get it right the  
10          first time, because I believe that if we  
11          don't make sure that we are doing things  
12          in a manner that makes sense, next year  
13          come January of 2014 will we be here  
14          asking the exact same questions and  
15          trying to figure out which young people  
16          should now go to a different school?  
17          There are turf battles. There are  
18          various issues.

19                   You know, in my district I know  
20          that there are a number of issues that  
21          I'm greatly concerned about. I think we  
22          need to be much more thoughtful about the  
23          distance that we're asking some of our  
24          young people to go, particularly  
25          elementary school students.

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           I want to just take a second  
3           and recognize that Jerry Jordan is here  
4           from the PFT and that he --

5           (Applause.)

6           COUNCILWOMAN BASS: -- actually  
7           was in the, I think it was, the  
8           Philadelphia Tribune where he actually  
9           walked the distance from one of the  
10          closed schools to two of the schools that  
11          those students would then be transferred  
12          to and the distance and the time, and  
13          we're talking about elementary school  
14          students. I know in my district the idea  
15          of closing the Peirce School at 23rd and  
16          Cambria and then having those students  
17          walk to Rhoads at 29th and Clearfield is  
18          quite a distance. And so we've all seen  
19          very small, very young children walking  
20          to school in the mornings by themselves,  
21          and it makes me want to cringe when I see  
22          a young person, their backpack is  
23          sometimes bigger than they are, walking  
24          themselves quite a distance to school.  
25          It's very troubling. I think we need to

2           think about that. I think we need to  
3           think about some of the turf battles,  
4           which are real, which should not be --

5                         (Applause.)

6                         COUNCILWOMAN BASS: -- which  
7           should not be minimized. And I don't  
8           think any one of us thinks that we want  
9           to keep all of these schools open. Some  
10          of these schools will have to close.  
11          It's just a fact. But let's just slow  
12          down for one moment, take our time and do  
13          it right the first time so that we're not  
14          at this place again in the future.

15                        Thank you, Mr. President.

16                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17          Thank you, Councilwoman.

18                        (Applause.)

19                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
20          Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

21                        COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
22          Mr. President. I feel like at the  
23          entrance to Council today there must have  
24          been a reality distortion field and we've  
25          all walked through it to be in this

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           Chamber today. I just -- I cannot  
3           understand how we are forgetting the fact  
4           that there are 70,000 empty seats in the  
5           Philadelphia public schools. To create a  
6           moratorium for another year will cost the  
7           School District \$25 million that they do  
8           not have and we have not provided.

9                           (Audience members yelling.)

10                          COUNCILMAN GREEN: I'll wait,  
11           Mr. President.

12                          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
13           Please. Please let the Councilmember  
14           speak, please.

15                          COUNCILMAN GREEN: The fact of  
16           the matter is, there are not additional  
17           resources. The School District has to  
18           make tough decisions, and last year at  
19           this time, the Public School Notebook  
20           published a list of many of these same  
21           schools that were potential for closing.  
22           This body, as part of our negotiations  
23           with the School District in the context  
24           of providing additional resources, asked  
25           the District not to act last year on

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           school closings in the context of having  
3           to raise taxes and do all the other  
4           things that we had to do. And so there  
5           has been a one-year moratorium, and now  
6           is the time for the District to act.

7                     Thank you, Mr. President.

8                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Thank you.

10                    (Audience member yelling.)

11                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ron,  
12           Ron, Ron. Hey, Ron. Ron, come on.

13                    Councilwoman Tasco.

14                    COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Yes. I  
15           will be very brief. Councilman Green  
16           talked about last year we asked the  
17           School District for a moratorium. I  
18           believe about two years ago there were  
19           rumblings about closing schools and we  
20           asked at that time what schools would be  
21           closed. And then, of course, through all  
22           the upheaval around the Superintendent  
23           and the change, everything was put on  
24           hold and we heard nothing else. And then  
25           when Dr. Hite came in, I mean, certainly

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           he walked into a hornet's nest, not of  
3           his making, but we get this study of  
4           these schools. And so we in the  
5           Northwest in my area are asking how did  
6           you make the decision, how did you come  
7           to the determination which schools would  
8           be closed. So we're asking for the data.

9                     We attended the community  
10          meetings, and we want to know who did the  
11          study, how did they determine which  
12          schools should be closed. And our  
13          parents and students have been very vocal  
14          about their school. And certainly we are  
15          not losing a lot of schools in my  
16          district. However, we're getting  
17          children from schools from Pulaski Avenue  
18          coming up to Cheltenham. So how do you  
19          come to a decision to take 5th graders,  
20          4th graders and transport them to  
21          Sedgwick, Thouron Avenue. It just  
22          doesn't make sense.

23                     So I think that we -- and we  
24          are working with Enon and Reverend Waller  
25          in our community to look at the data to

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           see how they came to the determination of  
3           which schools to close. And I think --  
4           there's a March deadline, and what these  
5           parents are saying, that's not a lot of  
6           time to get all of this together. So I  
7           think that -- I don't know what the  
8           timeline is, but certainly we can't get  
9           it all done by March.

10                   Thank you.

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12           Thank you.

13                   (Applause.)

14                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15           Thank you, Councilwoman.

16                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
17           Jones.

18                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Again,  
19           Mr. President, I recognize the sincere  
20           comments of my colleagues who have spent  
21           a lot of time on this issue, care greatly  
22           about the future of our young people. I  
23           do not doubt their motivation is not one  
24           that -- and I want to say that for the  
25           record. However, the reality check is

2           something that we've also heard in these  
3           Chambers. The reality is if an urban  
4           young man -- I remember this from Wilson  
5           Goode, Councilman Goode's inquiries --  
6           does not read up to standard by the 4th  
7           grade, we know how many prison cells to  
8           build by the time they're 18. We know.  
9           We know that violence -- the bean  
10          counters of the world can draw maps, but  
11          if you don't know the difference between  
12          Parkside and Parkway and you don't know  
13          crossing those two can cause public  
14          safety, you are putting our children in  
15          danger. And I'm saying to you that these  
16          things can be dealt with, but I need to  
17          hear how they're dealt with. It's like  
18          build it, they shall come. But don't say  
19          go and we'll figure it out. You're not  
20          going to do that to our kids.

21                    So I would urge us to move  
22                    cautiously. The realities of the budget  
23                    are true. I'm a person who in this  
24                    Chamber, Mr. Chairman, along with you,  
25                    stood up for increased revenues for the

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           School District, not afraid to do it,  
3           because our kids mean that much to me.  
4           But I also know they will not be the  
5           victim of poor planning by other  
6           Administrations. It's just not going to  
7           happen.

8                           (Appause.)

9                           COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
10           Mr. President.

11                          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
12           Thank you.

13                          The Chair again recognizes  
14           Councilwoman Blackwell.

15                          COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
16           you, Mr. President. I too want to thank  
17           Jerry Jordan for his leadership, all the  
18           PCAP groups, all of them, from Philly  
19           Fight, Anne Gemmell to SEIU, to everyone  
20           who has been involved, and certainly we  
21           want to reiterate that on February 12th,  
22           Lincoln Day, we will have hearings in  
23           here at 11 o'clock dealing with this  
24           issue, school closures, and we hope that  
25           all those who can and who have an opinion

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           will come forward so that we may have a  
3           full airing of this whole school closure  
4           and all that that involves.

5                     Thank you.

6                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7           Thank you, Councilwoman.

8                     The Chair recognizes  
9           Councilwoman Sanchez.

10                    COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Again, I  
11           want to reiterate the fact that we all  
12           agree that we want to be responsible,  
13           that they need to be thoughtful, that  
14           there are questions that are unanswered,  
15           that there is going to have to be an  
16           investment by the City around public  
17           safety around these issues. What I  
18           cannot say is an absolute no.

19                    Every one of my colleagues has  
20           mentioned the fact that they know that  
21           some schools will have to close, and I  
22           agree, we need to shape the criteria by  
23           which that happens, but I don't want to  
24           give anybody the false impression. When  
25           you say moratorium, you say totally stop,

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           and we need to move some tough decisions  
3           so that we can go back to basics, which  
4           is what Mr. Jordan talks about every  
5           single time he testifies here. We need  
6           nurses, we need gyms, we need a healthy  
7           lunch, we need reading specialists, we  
8           need all of those things. And if we're  
9           going to be able to go to provide those  
10          back-to-basics in all those schools, the  
11          conversation is how do we create the  
12          highest number of high achievement seats  
13          all over the district, in every  
14          neighborhood, in every part of the City.  
15          We cannot get there if every single time  
16          we need to make tough decisions we say  
17          no.

18                   I agree, we need to pause.  
19          Every one of the folks involved need to  
20          sit down and we need to look at every  
21          single decision. I do not agree with all  
22          the 37 closures. I will not pretend to  
23          know the ones that are not in my  
24          district, but what I do know is that this  
25          is an opportunity. This is the perfect

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           storm for us to deal with the full  
3           funding of public education. We need to  
4           go to Harrisburg, but then we also need  
5           to have a reality check that this Council  
6           has done heavy lifting. And I have  
7           prodded and probed all of my Council  
8           colleagues every single budget season to  
9           try to get as much money for public  
10          education as I possibly can, but we need  
11          to be responsible.

12                   And so I think all of the  
13          parents have legitimate concerns and I  
14          think all of us in Council who have a  
15          voice in this Council should provide some  
16          leadership and shape this, but we can't  
17          tell the District, no, don't do nothing.  
18          We need to shape how that happens.

19                   So I just think that we agree  
20          on too many things for us to make this  
21          important debate contentious, because we  
22          all agree on the same things. High  
23          quality education, high quality slots,  
24          and choices for children everywhere. So  
25          let's keep our eyes on that point of

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           agreement as we continue to talk about  
3           this. As Councilwoman Blackwell says,  
4           Dr. Hite will be in here for hearings.  
5           We will have an opportunity during the  
6           budget discussion. No final decision  
7           will be made. And the SRC can have a  
8           March deadline. No final decision can be  
9           made until we make a budget decision, and  
10          that is going to help determine what  
11          stays open and what stays closed.

12                         Thank you.

13                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14           Thank you, Councilwoman.

15                         The Chair recognizes

16           Councilwoman Brown.

17                         COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
18           Mr. President. This important debate and  
19           the remarks shared and perspectives  
20           shared by colleagues was triggered by the  
21           resolution introduced by Councilwoman  
22           Blackwell, and I too read it very, very,  
23           very carefully and was initially quite --  
24           wanted to push the pause button on  
25           moratorium. In further speaking with

2           Councilwoman Blackwell, we all agree and  
3           it says in here that we do not oppose the  
4           closing of some schools.

5                        So though moratorium literally  
6           suggests stop action, I would submit that  
7           we need to use whatever time this  
8           designated period means and continue the  
9           important debate, continue to listen to  
10          the issues raised at these community  
11          meetings, which are exceedingly  
12          important, and keep in mind two things.  
13          We've raised taxes consecutively for the  
14          last three years, and that's a problem.  
15          Councilman Goode has made it clear that  
16          the inaction, non-action, and some would  
17          say benign action in Harrisburg has  
18          forced us to do that. The other fact is  
19          there's 70,000 fewer seats in our  
20          Philadelphia public schools.

21                       So given those facts and given  
22          the healthy, heated debate that is going  
23          on in the trench level with our schools  
24          and parents who care, I would ask that we  
25          use this period, working with the School

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           District, in figuring out what that  
3           ultimate number should be.

4                       So in talking with Councilwoman  
5           Blackwell, I feel better now about  
6           supporting the resolution, because,  
7           again, on the other -- I was on the other  
8           side.

9                       (Applause.)

10                      COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: As long as  
11           we understand that the debate for  
12           conversation, the discussion, the  
13           listening to be responsible does not end,  
14           or else we will end up back here next  
15           year debating the same issues again,  
16           Mr. President.

17                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
18           Thank you, Councilwoman.

19                      The Chair recognizes Councilman  
20           Goode -- I'm sorry; Councilman Green.

21                      COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
22           Mr. President. I want to echo the words  
23           of my colleague Maria Quinones-Sanchez  
24           who spoke passionately about what the  
25           dollars that would be saved from closing

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           some schools would be used for. Maybe  
3           art instruction, maybe music instruction,  
4           other things like that. They are  
5           projected to save \$25 million a year.

6                     But this problem, this entire  
7           issue, is created by a simple thing. It  
8           is created because when the School Reform  
9           Commission was created, they decided to  
10          make Philadelphia one of the nation's  
11          experiments in charter schools. State  
12          law allows charters to open. Ten years  
13          ago, the Philadelphia public school  
14          students were about 200,000 in  
15          Philadelphia public schools. Today it's  
16          about 145, with 55,000 in charter  
17          schools, and in ten years it will be  
18          closer to 100,000 in charter schools and  
19          100,000 in our public schools. In that  
20          context, the School Reform Commission,  
21          not just this year but every year, has a  
22          plan that they have stated publicly to  
23          close down schools and bad seats for the  
24          forecoming foreseeable future, and that  
25          will be true as long as state law allows

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           charter schools. And there are many  
3           great charter schools and I support them,  
4           but that will be true as long as that is  
5           the case.

6                     And so this is something that  
7           we will be discussing every year, and I  
8           think it's time for us to understand that  
9           it is time for the School District to  
10          start acting to right-size itself given  
11          the realities that it will continue to  
12          lose students to charters for the  
13          foreseeable future.

14                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15          Thank you, Councilman.

16                    The Chair recognizes Councilman  
17          Goode.

18                    COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,  
19          Mr. President. Every year we end up in  
20          the same trap. We are not deciding today  
21          how many schools should close or which  
22          schools should close. That decision is  
23          not up to us. That decision is up to the  
24          School Reform Commission, which is  
25          controlled by Governor Corbett.

1                   1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2                   We should be reminded of two  
3 things, as I do have a very good memory.  
4 One, at the beginning of Governor  
5 Corbett's administration, he appointed  
6 the Education Secretary, who stated very  
7 quickly money doesn't matter, one of the  
8 most ridiculous statements that could be  
9 made. There are people at the School  
10 District who came in here last year who  
11 said if you don't give us X amount of  
12 money, the schools won't even open in  
13 September.

14                   So it's time to stop playing  
15 games. Point the finger where it should  
16 be pointed. It should be pointed at  
17 Governor Corbett and his School Reform  
18 Commission.

19                   (Applause.)

20                   COUNCILMAN GOODE: This whole  
21 issue of being able to negotiate with the  
22 School Reform Commission, the whole issue  
23 of working with the School Reform  
24 Commission, the whole issue of them  
25 supposedly listening to us all, aside

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           from just coming here for their money, is  
3           a joke. I mean, so this is what we have  
4           to do. You have to take a stand at some  
5           point and say we want local control; yes,  
6           we stand for a moratorium; and realize  
7           that it's a symbolic stance. We're not  
8           passing a law here today. We're passing  
9           a resolution that simply says this is the  
10          intent of Council. This is the intent of  
11          Council because you left us out of the  
12          decision of how many schools and which  
13          schools, and we should not be left out of  
14          that decision.

15                    Thank you, Mr. President.

16                    (Appause.)

17                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18           Thank you, Councilman.

19                    The Chair recognizes

20           Councilwoman Bass.

21                    COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
22           Mr. President. I just want to echo  
23           Councilman Goode here, because one of the  
24           things that I think we really need to  
25           focus on a little bit more is that this

1           1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           is a financial decision, and we get it.  
3           We understand, and we want to be  
4           responsible.

5                     And so in making a financial  
6           decision, we want to also underscore  
7           that -- I feel like we're getting  
8           somewhat of a sales pitch. The parents  
9           and the students are getting this pitch  
10          from the District that this is in your  
11          best interest. And so my question then  
12          is, if this is in the best interest of  
13          parents and students across Philadelphia,  
14          then what sort of baseline increase and  
15          results are we going to see? Is there  
16          some sort of guarantee? What kind of  
17          scores, test scores, are we going to see  
18          in terms of increases? What kind of new  
19          services are we going to see? I don't  
20          believe that that's been laid out, but  
21          there is this continuous pitch that this  
22          is in your best interest, and I don't  
23          believe anyone is buying that.

24                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25          Thank you, Councilwoman.

1 1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
6 you, Mr. President. The last thing I'll  
7 say on the issue is, I hope that citizens  
8 around the City will not buy into when  
9 all else fails, then let's fight one  
10 another. Let's have charter schools  
11 fight traditional public schools and then  
12 we can talk about renaissance academies  
13 and promise academies. Let's not get  
14 into that fight and have students and  
15 schools fighting one another.

16 We didn't create this model.  
17 They created it at the state level. So  
18 let's keep that in mind, that we all have  
19 an interest, that we want to survive. I  
20 associate myself with Councilman Goode's  
21 comments and hope that we can move  
22 forward together. Let's take the high  
23 road.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you.

1 1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I  
4 think we left it off in the middle of the  
5 vote, but why don't we start by reading  
6 the resolution and then call for the  
7 vote.

8 Mr. Decker, read it one more  
9 time.

10 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
11 calling on the City Council of  
12 Philadelphia to support, advocate, and  
13 recommend a moratorium (suspension of  
14 action) for the School District of  
15 Philadelphia's Facilities Master Plan  
16 recommendations concerning grade changes,  
17 school closures, program co-locations,  
18 and program mergers/relocations.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
20 recognize Councilwoman Blackwell for a  
21 motion.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
23 you, Mr. President. I move for the  
24 adoption of the resolution.

25 (Duly seconded.)

1 1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It  
3 has been moved and properly seconded.

4 All those in favor?

5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Those opposed?

8 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: No.

9 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Nay.

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Roll call.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Is  
12 there a call for a roll call?

13 Roll call, Mr. Decker.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman  
15 Bass.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Aye.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman  
18 Blackwell.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Aye.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Goode.

21 COUNCILMAN GOODE: Aye.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Green.

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: No.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman  
25 Greenlee.

1                   1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Aye.  
3                   CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Henon.  
4                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Aye.  
5                   CHIEF CLERK: Councilman  
6                   Johnson.  
7                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Aye.  
8                   CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones.  
9                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Aye.  
10                  CHIEF CLERK: Councilman  
11                  Kenney.  
12                  (No response.)  
13                  CHIEF CLERK: Councilman  
14                  O'Brien is voting aye.  
15                  Councilman O'Neill.  
16                  COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Aye.  
17                  CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Oh.  
18                  COUNCILMAN OH: Aye.  
19                  CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman  
20                  Quinones-Sanchez.  
21                  COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: No.  
22                  CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman  
23                  Reynolds Brown.  
24                  COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Aye.  
25                  CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

2 Squilla.

3 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Aye.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

5 Tasco.

6 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Aye.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
12 ayes are 14; the nays are two. The  
13 resolution passes.

14 CHIEF CLERK: And a  
15 resolution --

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold  
17 on. Hold on.

18 Mr. Decker.

19 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution  
20 recognizing January as "National Human  
21 Trafficking Awareness Month" in  
22 Philadelphia, introduced by Councilwoman  
23 Reynolds Brown.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
25 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Brown for a

1 1/24/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 motion.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,

9                   Over the past few years, I have  
10                  identified and proposed over \$350 million  
11                  in spending reductions in connection with  
12                  not being willing to vote for various  
13                  real estate tax increases. I thought I  
14                  had to pay for those decisions. I think  
15                  that when we're talking about asking  
16                  people to spend money or forcing them to  
17                  spend money they're not planning to  
18                  spend, you have to be able to come up  
19                  with cuts or with revenue measures to do  
20                  that. And so we are going to have, I  
21                  think, a very difficult spring.

22                  The one thing that I'm pleased  
23                  to report is that the AVI debate is over.  
24                  I keep reading and hearing in different  
25                  places that we have to set a millage

2           rate, that we have to have a discussion  
3           about AVI, what's the rate going to be.  
4           The rate is 1.44 percent, if the  
5           Administration's estimates that they came  
6           out with last week are true. AVI passed  
7           last year. It goes into effect  
8           automatically this year -- or next year  
9           by action that we took last year.

10                    So unless there are 12 votes to  
11           change the rate from something other than  
12           1.44, either by lowering the homestead  
13           exemption to a lower number -- by the  
14           way, 15,000 I think is 1.39. No  
15           homestead exemption is 1.3. We need --  
16           as long as the Administration -- and the  
17           Mayor has already said he's not going to  
18           raise real estate taxes this year. So we  
19           have 1.44 or less, unless there are 12  
20           votes to make that kind of change. So I  
21           don't know why we're spending a lot of  
22           time handwringing about what the AVI rate  
23           is. It's the law, and all we're going to  
24           be able to do without 12 votes and only  
25           with the Mayor's support is lower it.
