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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6 hour has come. It's clear we have  
7 established a quorum. I'd ask all  
8 visitors and guests to please reside  
9 behind the rail. Thank you.

10 To give our invocation this  
11 morning, the Chair recognizes the  
12 Reverend Robert Paul, Pastor of the Piney  
13 Grove Baptist Church. He is here today  
14 as the guest of Councilwoman Bass.

15 Will all guests and visitors  
16 and members please rise.

17 (Members and guests rise.)

18 REVEREND PAUL: Shall we pray.

19 Eternal and Gracious Father, we  
20 come now in the mighty name of Jesus.

22 thank you, God, for our illustrious Mayor

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you again, Pastor.

8 The next order of business is  
9 the approval of the Journal of the  
10 meeting of Thursday, January 24th, 2013.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
12 Greenlee.

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
14 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
15 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,  
16 January 24th, 2013 be approved.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It  
19 has been moved and properly seconded that  
20 the Journal of the meeting of Thursday,  
21 January 24th be approved.

22 All those in favor say aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Those opposed?

2           (No response.)

3           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4 ayes have it. The Journal is approved.

5           The next order of business is  
6 requests for leaves of absence.

7           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
8 Jones.

9           COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
10 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
11 majority, there are no requests for  
12 leaves of absence today.

13          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
14 Chair thanks the gentleman.

15          The Chair now recognizes  
16 Councilman O'Neill for request for leaves  
17 of absence.

18          COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: On behalf  
19 of the republicans, there are no requests  
20 for leave of absence.

21          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22 Thank you, sir.

23          The Chair will dispense with  
24 the regular order of business to welcome  
25 and thank all of the individuals who

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2 chose to come down to City Council today.  
3 We hope that your experience today will  
4 be a pleasurable one so you feel like  
5 coming back again. So I want to thank  
6 all of you. We really look forward to  
7 enjoying the wonderful experience of  
8 having our citizens watch us in action  
9 today. So thank you all so very much.

10                   At this time, the Chair  
11 recognizes Councilman Kenney, who will  
12 present a resolution honoring the  
13 outstanding lifetime musical achievements  
14 of Peter Nero. Would Mr. Nero and those  
15 accompanying him please join the  
16 Councilman at the podium.

17                   And the Councilman is joined by  
18 Councilman Squilla and Councilwoman Bass  
19 and Councilwoman Brown.

20                   COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,  
21 Mr. President. This is a resolution  
22 honoring the outstanding lifetime musical  
23 achievements of Peter Nero, and  
24 recognizing his innumerable contributions  
25 to arts and culture in Philadelphia as an

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2   award-winning pianist and the founding  
3   conductor and Artistic Director of the  
4   world renowned Peter Nero and the Philly  
5   POPS Orchestra.

6           Whereas, born in Brooklyn, New  
7   York, Peter Nero began his formal  
8   training at age seven. By the time he  
9   was 14, he was accepted to New York  
10   City's prestigious High School of Music  
11   and Art and won a scholarship to the  
12   Juilliard School of Music;

13           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And  
14   whereas, Mr. Nero's early career included  
15   appearances on many national variety and  
16   talk shows including 11 great appearances  
17   on The Ed Sullivan Show and numerous  
18   appearances on The Tonight Show Starring  
19   Johnny Carson; and

20           Whereas, Mr. Nero recorded his  
21   first album in 1961 and won a Grammy  
22   Award that year for "Best New Artist."  
23   Since then, he has received another  
24   Grammy, garnered 10 additional  
25   nominations, and released 68 albums; and

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2                       Whereas, recognized as one of  
3 America's premier pops orchestras, Peter  
4 Nero and the Philly POPS was founded in  
5 1979 under his musical leadership. They  
6 are now recognized as the official pops  
7 orchestra of the Commonwealth of  
8 Pennsylvania and have remained a vital  
9 part of Philadelphia's cultural pulse;  
10 and

11                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,  
12 Mr. Nero's long list of honors include:  
13 the American Federation of Musicians'  
14 Lifetime Achievement Award; the Abraham  
15 Lincoln Foundation of the Union League of  
16 Philadelphia's Lincoln Award; the Mario  
17 Lanza Award, in recognition for  
18 outstanding achievements in the field of  
19 music; six honorary doctorates; the  
20 prestigious International Society of  
21 Performing Arts Presenters Award for  
22 Excellence in the Arts; being named on  
23 the Philadelphia and Miami historic walks  
24 of fame; and the Pennsylvania  
25 Distinguished Arts Award; and

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2                       Whereas, Peter Nero's  
3   enthusiastic and seemingly endless  
4   talents have gained him invitations to  
5   perform during numerous  
6   nationally-televised concerts and with  
7   symphonies from around the globe. He has  
8   collaborated with musicians and  
9   celebrities of every stripe, and his  
10  successful "The Summer of '42" became a  
11  million-selling single album; and

12                    COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,  
13  Mr. Nero and his eponymous orchestra  
14  continue to elicit international  
15  attention while strengthening  
16  Philadelphia's cultural significance  
17  domestically and abroad. In addition to  
18  critical acclaim, their standards of  
19  excellence enrich the lives of  
20  Philadelphians through: an active role  
21  in our City's Fourth of July celebrations  
22  for over 25 years; its establishment as a  
23  resident company of The Kimmel Center for  
24  Performing Arts; and frequent  
25  performances as the Philadelphia -- and

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2 frequent performances at other  
3 Philadelphia landmarks such as the  
4 National Constitution Center and  
5 Independence Hall; and

6           Whereas, Mr. Nero is an active  
7 supporter of many important causes,  
8 including the funding of school music  
9 programs, funding for the building of new  
10 arts centers across the country, as well  
11 as research for cancer, dystonia, and  
12 autism; now, therefore, be it

13           Resolved, by the Council of the  
14 City of Philadelphia, that Council does  
15 hereby recognize, honor, and thank Peter  
16 Nero for his lifetime of contributions to  
17 musical excellence and his commitment to  
18 preserving Philadelphia as a national  
19 focal point for arts and culture. We  
20 wish him and the Philly POPS continued  
21 success.

22           Further resolved, that an  
23 engrossed copy of this resolution be  
24 presented to Artistic Director Peter Nero  
25 as evidence of the sincere sentiments of

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2 this legislative body.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
5 Chair recognizes Mr. Nero for remarks.  
6 Thank you, sir.

7 MR. NERO: Thank you,  
8 Councilpersons. Thank you, Councilman  
9 Kenney. Did I really do all of those  
10 things? No wonder I'm so tired.

11 Actually, I did all that in  
12 less time than it took for the completion  
13 of the Blue Route. I learned that when I  
14 got here, that that was the local joke.  
15 That was 1979.

16 Actually, I'm really energized  
17 and flattered and appreciative, and I  
18 thank you, Councilman Kenney and the rest  
19 of the members of the Council, for  
20 bestowing this honor on me.

21 After traveling the country on  
22 tour since 1961, which included  
23 Philadelphia by the way, the opportunity  
24 arose for another orchestra in this great  
25 city, and since Boston had the Boston

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2 Pops, why not Philadelphia and the  
3 Philadelphia Pops, in this case the  
4 Philly Pops. Moe Septee, the founder,  
5 had a vision that he was able to bring to  
6 fruition. I got the call in 1979 to be  
7 the music director and have been here  
8 ever since. Made Philly my home in 1988,  
9 leaving California to make Philly home  
10 base. On one of my concerts when I was  
11 Pops' music director of the Tulsa  
12 Philharmonic, I had the great trumpet  
13 player "Dizzy" Gillespie as guest artist.  
14 On a rehearsal break we got into a rap  
15 about where we lived. I told him I had  
16 just moved from California to Philly. He  
17 took a step back and stared at me. He  
18 said, You moved to Philly? I moved to  
19 California from Philly.

20                   Now, I had been told by the  
21 natives here that Philly being in the  
22 shadow of New York City was a constant  
23 irritant to the locals, and it manifested  
24 itself in a civic inferiority complex.  
25 Well, it didn't take long for this city

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2   to embrace us, and a renaissance began  
3   here, not necessarily coincidental but it  
4   did, with new highly rated restaurants,  
5   renovations of historic edifices,  
6   expansion of the waterfront, a new  
7   convention center and new hotels. I  
8   found a strong sense of community here  
9   that I had never felt in other mega  
10  cities. People would stop me on the  
11  street, and it wasn't for an autograph or  
12  for any semblance of celebrity. They  
13  wanted to tell me how much they enjoyed  
14  the concerts and actually thanked me for  
15  what really amounted to me just doing my  
16  job. Sometimes I had to wonder if I was  
17  getting paid or doing a benefit.  
18  Granted, it takes 24/7 to make each  
19  series and concert better than the last  
20  one.

21                   So I thank you, Councilman  
22  Kenney and other members of the Council,  
23  for this honor and hope I can live up to  
24  the expectations of this citation.

25                   (Applause.)

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2 COUNCILMAN KENNEY:

3 Mr. President, if I may, we're going to  
4 do a little something different while we  
5 take the official photograph. We will be  
6 playing his Grammy Award -- Mr. Nero's  
7 Grammy Award-winning music "Mountain  
8 Greenery." So we'll have a little  
9 interlude while we take our picture.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Council will be at ease.

12 (Council at ease.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you so much. Councilman, I think  
15 you started something. I anticipate  
16 getting additional requests for music  
17 during the presentations.

18 Before we call for our next  
19 presentation, I would like to acknowledge  
20 and welcome a good friend of ours, State  
21 Senator Anthony Williams, who is joining  
22 us today.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: At  
25 this time, the Chair recognizes

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2 Councilwoman Brown, who will present a  
3 resolution recognizing the 30th  
4 Anniversary of Disadvantaged Business  
5 Enterprise, also known as DBE, Programs  
6 in the City of Philadelphia. Would  
7 Angela Dowd-Burton and those accompanying  
8 her please join the Councilwoman at the  
9 podium.

10 And I see we also have  
11 Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilman Goode,  
12 Councilwoman Tasco, and Councilman  
13 Johnson joining us and also Councilwoman  
14 Bass.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN:  
16 Mr. President, before we move to the  
17 formal remarks and presentation of this  
18 extremely important milestone in leveling  
19 the playing field, we need to be mindful  
20 that this morning we stand here on the  
21 shoulders of champion, former  
22 Congressman, Councilman, activist Lucien  
23 Blackwell.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
25 you. Thank you.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: We stand  
4 on the shoulder of one of his partners,  
5 the father of State Senator Anthony Hardy  
6 Williams, Senator Hardy Williams.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: So us  
9 newbies need to be forever mindful that  
10 there were people on the front line,  
11 carrying the baton, getting the marathon  
12 done to level the playing field for  
13 women, minorities, and those that are  
14 disabled.

15 I'm going to ask Councilman  
16 Goode and Councilwoman Blackwell to offer  
17 remarks first also before we move to the  
18 formal proceeding.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
20 you very much. Good morning.

21 (Good morning.)

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: As  
23 always, I thank God for each day and each  
24 privilege of service as we try to perform  
25 our duties, and it is an honor for me.

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2   As you remember, last week we mentioned  
3   it was the 10th anniversary last Thursday  
4   of Lucien's passing, and I'm honored that  
5   we get a chance to mention him again  
6   today.

7           Yes, it was he given the  
8   information by John Macklin when he  
9   introduced the legislation that  
10  minorities were getting less than  
11  one-tenth of one percent of all contracts  
12  let in the City of Philadelphia, and that  
13  started it. And even though we're not  
14  where we could be and should be, we're  
15  not where we were.

16           So we thank God for his  
17  service. We thank God that we realize  
18  that we have to champion the causes of  
19  all people who live, work, and visit our  
20  city. And, again, thank you very much.

21           (Applause.)

22           COUNCILMAN JONES: My colleague  
23  is a bit modest about his father's  
24  accomplishment, but we would be remiss  
25  without stating, memorializing, and

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2   documenting that a courageous Mayor by  
3   the name of W. Wilson Goode took this  
4   cause upon his shoulders and moved this  
5   important public policy issue to its  
6   forefront, and \$583 million under his  
7   watch later, minorities and females made  
8   progress in this town.

9           (Applause.)

10           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: A huge  
11   thank you as well to every person on this  
12   stage who played some role in this thread  
13   of trying to level the playing field.

14           Recognizing the 30th  
15   Anniversary of Disadvantaged Business  
16   Enterprise Programs in the City of  
17   Philadelphia.

18           COUNCILMAN GOODE: Whereas, in  
19   1980, a small group of Philadelphia  
20   business people formed the BrainTrust,  
21   selected Beverly Harper as President, and  
22   set as its goal the passage of  
23   legislation in Philadelphia that would  
24   guarantee minorities and women a share of  
25   City contracts; and

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2                       Whereas, Dr. Edward Robinson,  
3 working under then Managing Director  
4 Wilson Goode, produced documentation that  
5 minorities and women were being awarded  
6 less than one percent of City contracts;  
7 and

8                       COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

9           Whereas, City Councilman Lucien E.  
10 Blackwell introduced legislation that  
11 amended Chapter 17-500 of The  
12 Philadelphia Code, thanks to the work of  
13 John Macklin who gave us the information,  
14 and Council overrode a mayoral veto by a  
15 vote of 16:0, and the Administration  
16 promulgated regulations and guidelines;  
17 and

18                       Whereas, the Minority Business  
19 Enterprise Council (MBEC) was in service  
20 from 1982 to 1989 to ensure that  
21 minority, women and disabled owned  
22 enterprises are afforded equal access and  
23 opportunity to compete for and secure  
24 contracts within the City of  
25 Philadelphia; and

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2                   COUNCILMAN JONES:  Whereas, the  
3 first MBEC Council consisted of  
4 Dr. Lorraine Brown, Barbara Daniel Cox,  
5 Kemel Dawkins, Angela Dowd-Burton, John  
6 Smith, Geri Swift and Joe Young; and

7                   Whereas, past Executive  
8 Directors of the Office of the Minority  
9 Business Enterprise Council and Office of  
10 Economic Opportunity (OEO) are Melvin  
11 LeGrande, Al Childs, Curtis Jones, Jr.,  
12 Marla Hamilton, James Roundtree, Mike  
13 Williams, Carolyn Nichols, Michael Bell,  
14 Curtis Gregory and the current director,  
15 Angela Dowd-Burton; and

16                   Whereas, in 1990 until 2003  
17 MBEC existed under several executive  
18 orders; and

19                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON:  Whereas,  
20 in 2008, the Office of Economic  
21 Opportunity was created through executive  
22 order and the legal/legislative framework  
23 established Section 6-109 of the Charter  
24 in Chapters 17-1500 and 17-1600 of the  
25 City Code; and

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2                       Whereas, Mayor Michael A.  
3 Nutter signed Executive Order 3-12 in  
4 September 2012, regarding  
5 Anti-Discrimination related to DBE's  
6 participating in City contracts; and

7                       COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Whereas,  
8 Michael A. Nutter -- I'm sorry. Whereas,  
9 the Office of Economic Opportunity seeks  
10 to promote economic development through  
11 its certification program, contract  
12 review and monitoring activities, and  
13 ongoing interaction with other City  
14 departments, quasi-public agencies and  
15 the local marketplace; and

16                      Whereas, the Office of Economic  
17 Opportunity works with the Philadelphia  
18 business community to build internal and  
19 external alliances with minority business  
20 enterprises, women business enterprises,  
21 disadvantaged business enterprises and  
22 disabled business enterprises; and

23                      COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,  
24 over the past five years, more than one  
25 billion dollars has been awarded to

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2   minority, women and disadvantaged  
3   business enterprises, due in no small  
4   part to the efforts of the Office of  
5   Economic Opportunity; and

6           Whereas, Philadelphia has  
7   benefited tremendously from the  
8   incalculable efforts of legislative and  
9   executive action over the last 30 years  
10   which has encouraged increased DBE  
11   participation in City contracts; now,  
12   therefore, be it resolved

13           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: By the  
14   Council of the City of Philadelphia that  
15   we hereby recognize on this day the 30th  
16   Anniversary of Disadvantaged Business  
17   Enterprise Programs in the City of  
18   Philadelphia, the legislation that  
19   created it, the many minority business  
20   people who worked tirelessly to make it  
21   happen as a reality in our city.

22           Further resolved, that an  
23   engrossed copy of this resolution be  
24   presented to the representatives from the  
25   Office of Equal Opportunity as evidence

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2 of the sincere sentiments of this  
3 legislative body.

4 Let's congratulate every single  
5 person on this stage.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Ms. Angela Dowd-Burton.

9 MS. DOWD-BURTON: Thank you so  
10 much. I have to tell you, we did serious  
11 business in the sandbox 30 years ago,  
12 because we were all about five or so.

13 So good morning, President  
14 Clarke, Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,  
15 members of City Council, elected  
16 officials, City administrators, former  
17 MBEC legacy leaders, I'll call you,  
18 friends, and guests. It is an honor to  
19 accept this resolution on behalf of those  
20 who served MBEC and OEO over 30 years  
21 ago.

22 Thirty years ago, City Council  
23 built an intersection between public  
24 policy and the business imperative. They  
25 knew that when businesses rise, employees

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2   thrive and families flourish. When  
3   businesses rise, our youth find hope in  
4   the role models of their communities and  
5   seek education to pursue attainable  
6   dreams. When disadvantaged businesses  
7   rise, our region prospers.

8           To the ancestors recognized in  
9   this resolution, we thank you for your  
10 vision.

11           To the legislators that guide  
12 the spirit of economic inclusion today,  
13 we thank you for your focus and your  
14 tenacity.

15           To Mayor Michael Nutter, his  
16 Economic Opportunity cabinet, leadership  
17 team, and City employees who engage in  
18 our mission every day, we appreciate your  
19 dedication and your commitment.

20           And to our alliance partners,  
21 many who serve on the OEO Advisory Board,  
22 the Mayor's Advisory Commission on  
23 Construction Industry Diversity, and the  
24 Economic Opportunity Review Committee, we  
25 are grateful for your investment in the

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2    vision of OEO and your assistance in  
3    adding to the transparency of City  
4    government.

5           Today the OEO staff, the OEO  
6    officers and colleagues within City  
7    government, and our predecessors can be  
8    proud of this milestone and celebrate the  
9    achievements thus far. Today we  
10   collectively reaffirm our commitment to  
11   building businesses and putting people to  
12   work.

13           Time will not allow me to  
14    acknowledge all of you for the  
15    contributions you've made to the success  
16    of the MBEC and OEO. However, I would  
17    like to publicly thank members of the OEO  
18    team, and they're somewhere around here.  
19    Where are they? They're all behind me in  
20    here, cloaked in the spirit of economic  
21    opportunity.

22           I want to thank them publicly  
23    for their dedication to our effort and  
24    the recent transformation of this  
25    organization. The Commerce Department is

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2   a great fit for OEO, thanks to Alan  
3   Greenberger, Kevin Dow, and the Commerce  
4   team and their staff.

5           I would also like to mention  
6   just two people who have made OEO their  
7   life's work. Michelle Flamer, our  
8   attorney, has provided us with invaluable  
9   legal guidance and helped us navigate  
10  over the past few decades. And Julie  
11  Simmons, a specialist on the OEO staff,  
12  has provided continuity to this  
13  organization over the last 30 years.

14           When small businesses rise, we  
15  are uplifted, invigorated, and inspired.  
16  And with the help of this august body,  
17  they will continue to rise and one day  
18  reach that pinnacle where business  
19  relationships will be driven by  
20  innovation, collaboration, and a  
21  competitive spirit far beyond the  
22  intersection of public policy and the  
23  business imperative.

24           Thank you very much.

25           (Applause.)

12 it's been 30 years since an extraordinary  
13 group of minority business people came

15 Pace, who is here today, Wayne Levy,  
16 Doris Burrell, Walt Hutchins, Dan  
17 Winoker, and many others. Many of us are  
18 still in business. I've been in business  
19 in Philadelphia for 43 years.

20 (Applause.)

21 MS. HARPER: I can't say enough  
22 about the work that Councilman Lu  
23 Blackwell, the role that he played in  
24 making this legislation a success.

2 MS. HARPER: In the early days,  
3 almost every city that tried this kind of  
4 legislation was challenged. We had so  
5 many challenges, and the amazing thing  
6 was that this city, this Council, and the  
7 Administration met every challenge. If  
8 part of the legislation was knocked down,  
9 they went around it and put something  
10 else in place. Atlanta used to be the  
11 gold standard for this kind of  
12 legislation and making sure that the  
13 playing field was somewhat level for  
14 minority and women-owned businesses.  
15 Philadelphia has the longest-running  
16 track record in this, and we continue to  
17 go strong today and continue this effort  
18 to help minority firms, because we employ  
19 people, we pay taxes, and we're in  
20 Philadelphia. It's gratifying to know  
21 that you remember the history and that  
22 you honor it.

23 I'd like now to introduce State  
24 Senator Anthony Hardy Williams to make a  
25 few remarks. I've known him and his

3 (Applause.)

4 MS. HARPER: Great supporter.

5 Thank you very much.

6 SENATOR WILLIAMS: I want to  
7 thank the President for allowing me to

10 opportunity to express what I saw as a  
11 child, and, that is, not politicians,  
12 because frankly there were not a lot of  
13 African American or Latino or frankly  
14 Asian politicians at that time. There  
15 were people who were huddled in  
16 communities across the City of  
17 Philadelphia who felt it most appropriate  
18 and fair that all Philadelphians should  
19 have an opportunity to participate in the  
20 economic climate and activity of the City  
21 of Philadelphia.

22 Certainly while I'm proud of my  
23 father, Bill Gray, there's a whole  
24 legacy, Wilson Goode, there's a whole  
25 generation that participated. Lucien

2   Blackwell singularly designed, fought,  
3   struggled -- and, by the way, Council did  
4   not look like it looks today -- and  
5   struggled with Council with its  
6   conscience and drove them to the point of  
7   when they signed a document that frankly  
8   many in the public didn't understand at  
9   that time.

10                   The older I get -- I'm 55 years  
11   old -- the more history is no longer  
12   distant memories, but frankly a blueprint  
13   for the activities that provide a course  
14   of action. And I will tell you for as  
15   far as you've come, for every time an  
16   unfortunate set of circumstances where a  
17   young boy is shot down in the City of  
18   Philadelphia because he may be doing  
19   something that he doesn't know anything  
20   else, a young girl decides to make an  
21   inappropriate decision about her life or  
22   an ex-offender comes home, they look to  
23   one body; that is, government, maybe  
24   fairly or unfairly. But they look to the  
25   body government to define how the course

2   of their life can change to become  
3   better.

4                   This piece of legislation has  
5   done multiple levels of good for  
6   generations of people that have gone in  
7   the past, but frankly for generations who

10  the benefit of his good and blessings  
11  through the work that he has done on this  
12  earth.

16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Good  
17 morning. It is only fitting after that  
18 last presentation around how we celebrate  
19 milestones that we continue with this  
20 particular recognition. Many folks don't  
21 realize how long Latinos, Puerto Ricans  
22 have been in Philadelphia.

23 On this particular occasion, we  
24 want to pay tribute to an important part  
25 of documenting our history so that we can

20  especially highlight the artistic work of  
21  my good friend David Cruz as part of  
22  this.

23           Whereas, Al Dia was founded in  
24  1992 by Hernan Guaracoa, a journalist who  
25  was told he was overqualified to work in

3           Whereas, Hernan and his wife,  
4 Elizabeth, started Al Dia in their second  
5 floor apartment in the Olney

9 uncommon level of professionalism and  
10 deep commitment to the principles of  
11 journalism; and

12           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
13 Al Dia quickly grew in popularity,  
14 establishing itself as the most trusted  
15 source of news in the Latino community.  
16 By 2000, the growing paper moved its  
17 offices to Center City; and

18           Whereas, Al Dia has grown from  
19 humble beginnings into a premier news  
20 organization, recognized nationally for  
21 its coverage of Latino issues, and  
22 distinguished locally by its success in  
23 expanding the political discourse to  
24 include issues of importance in  
25 Philadelphia's Latino community; and

2                       Whereas, Hernan's contributions  
3 have been recognized by his peers and he  
4 has served as the former president of the  
5 National Association of Hispanic

9 coverage of immigration reform issues,  
10 with exceptional coverage of events of  
11 national importance such as those in  
12 Shenandoah and Hazleton, PA, and mass  
13 immigration demonstrations in  
14 Philadelphia; and

15                      Whereas, on August 8th of 2011,  
16 Al Dia was one of only five  
17 Spanish-language newspapers invited to  
18 the White House to interview President  
19 Barack Obama; and

20                      Whereas, Al Dia has created the  
21 national Felix Varela award, known as  
22 "The Spanish Pulitzer Prize," to  
23 recognize and support exceptional  
24 Spanish-language journalism; and

25                      COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, Al Dia

4                       Whereas, Al Dia provides the  
5           Latino community with coverage of both

9                       Whereas, Al Dia has published  
10          its first book, "200 Years of Latino  
11          History in Philadelphia"; and

12                      Whereas, this 229-page book is  
13          divided into four sections: "Our Shared  
14          History," "Putting Down Roots: 1940 to  
15          1980," "Eye on the Community: 1980 to  
16          1992," and "Al Dia: 20 Years, 1992 to  
17          Present"; and

18                      COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, the  
19          first section chronicles the arrival of  
20          the first Latino settlers to  
21          Philadelphia, including Felix Varela, a  
22          Cuban priest and journalist who came to  
23          Philadelphia in 1824 and founded the El  
24          Habanero newspaper; and

25                      Whereas, "Putting Down Roots"

3 who came over in major waves of

7 Community" depicts the photography of

9 he captures images that chronicle the  
10 diverse aspects and events that make up  
11 Philadelphia's Latino life in the 1980s  
12 and 1990s; and

13           COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,  
14 Al Dia captures the defining images --  
15 that "Al Dia: 20 Years" captures the  
16 defining images of the coverage of 20  
17 years of the Latino community; and

18           The 20th anniversary of Al Dia  
19 and the publication of this historic book  
20 were celebrated in the ceremony gala at  
21 the Constitution Center last November.

22           Be it resolved, that the  
23 Council of Philadelphia recognizes the  
24 incredible achievements of Al Dia  
25 newspaper and its founder, Hernan

24   have been simple over the past 20 years.

25           For those who don't know much

10   to be my home in North Philadelphia, a  
11   newsletter that evolved to be, through  
12   many efforts, the publication that you

14                 So I'd like to recognize the  
15   people that are here standing with me who  
16   are part of our staff or part of the  
17   staff that put together that book, which  
18   was a true labor of love, where we  
19   attempted to put together in the covers  
20   of -- hard cover of a book like this the  
21   work that we did for 20 years. But  
22   beyond that, to record the history of the  
23   Latino community that have been part of  
24   the City of Philadelphia for the past 200  
25   years. We found the photo albums of the

10  book for each one of you. I encourage  
11  you to take a look at that and find the  
12  very beginning of this experience,  
13  started the very birth of the republic in  
14  1780 when we had the first Latino who  
15  came to Philadelphia and was part of the  
16  life in the City for a couple of years.  
17  And we have other name that you will find  
18  in the book who attempted to put together  
19  basically the reality that have been in  
20  the shadows in this city. Now it turns  
21  out we have a media, and the work is  
22  largely undone, Maria. I think we have  
23  just begun to show, and this book is  
24  simply a modest punctuation to  
25  enlightenment on Latino issues. Where

3       question mark in the City and in the  
4       country and our immigration reform is  
5       been discussed, I think it's for all of

10      to continue in the work that we need to

12                   I just want to say thank you so  
13      much for the support we have received so  
14      far. And keep in mind that we are a

17      corporate-owned media. We're media that  
18      was born in the neighborhood. It's a  
19      truly grassroots media that attempts to  
20      say what their distinct goal is what the  
21      Latino experience is in the City and what  
22      are the Latino perspective on the issues

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
25 Those opposed?

2           (No response.)

3           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

5           CHIEF CLERK: There are no  
6 other resolutions on the Final Passage  
7 Calendar, Mr. President.

8           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you so much.

10           Are there any speeches on the  
11 part of the minority?

12           (No response.)

13           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Are  
14 there any speeches on the part of the  
15 majority?

16           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
17 Jones.

18           COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you so  
19 much, Mr. President. Most of us watched  
20 in horror the news when the five-year-old  
21 young lady Nailla Robinson was abducted.  
22 We also sat riveted in terror when we  
23 watched the young lady that was thrown  
24 from the platform at 8th and Race.

25           What these two seemingly

2       unrelated incidences have in common, what  
3       was the common denominator? Surveillance  
4       cameras. Fortunately we were able to  
5       apprehend one and are still on the trail  
6       of the other perpetrator. But I want to  
7       make that common denominator note,  
8       because you took a delegation of  
9       Councilmembers down to Baltimore a couple  
10      of weeks ago to look into how we can use  
11      those technological tools to help law  
12      enforcement, to help police work, to not  
13      circumvent what good citizen and good  
14      police work should do, but to aid it in  
15      its swift delivery.

16                Your leadership, along with  
17      Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman Bass,  
18      myself, and more recently intriguing  
19      conversations by the freshman Councilman  
20      Johnson on public-private partnerships  
21      with cameras is encouraging in that  
22      effort. I applaud you for having  
23      hearings that will discuss how we roll  
24      out a comprehensive strategy to use that.

25                What we learned in Baltimore

1           1/31/13 - STATED - SPEECHES

2       was that through the use of cameras,  
3       through networking, through Department of  
4       Defense, Department of Transportation  
5       cameras, they were able to reduce crime  
6       in Baltimore by 25 percent. And one of  
7       the key ways they did that was eyes on  
8       criminal activity, communications to law  
9       enforcement who had boots on the ground.  
10      And that was a critical component of  
11      their success.

12                 Working with partnerships is  
13      fine. Having stagnant cameras is not as  
14      good as having good police work using  
15      technology in a well-thought-out manner.

16                 So I look forward to working  
17      with you and our colleagues in Council to  
18      help the Administration, to assist the  
19      Administration, to work along with the  
20      Administration to use this tool to deal  
21      with Philadelphia's problem. So, again,  
22      thank you for your leadership in taking  
23      us down there, and I look forward to the  
24      results of that endeavor.

25                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2       Thank you, Councilman. It was a very  
3       productive road trip, and thank you all  
4       for coming along and providing  
5       much-needed input. We look forward to  
6       continuing such road trips to ensure that  
7       we can enhance the City of Philadelphia  
8       at its lowest possible cost.

9           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
10       Johnson.

11           COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
12       Mr. President. I want to commend and I  
13       look forward to the hearing that  
14       was introduced, resolution introduced for  
15       a hearing on the issue of gun violence in  
16       the City of Philadelphia by Councilman  
17       Kenney, and really -- although we are a  
18       local government and we can't have so  
19       much impact on state-related laws  
20       relating to gun violence in the City of  
21       Philadelphia, I still think it's  
22       important to make sure that rather it's  
23       the Administration or us as a body really  
24       take a hard look at what we're doing in  
25       the City of Philadelphia as it relates to

2   preventing gun violence and also making  
3   sure when acts of gun violence takes  
4   place, we are addressing it  
5   appropriately.

6           Last night when I was on one of  
7   my favorite apps, which is the CNN app, I  
8   know it noted that Philadelphia is in the  
9   top three of African American young men  
10  being murdered by homicide, and the  
11  number one tool in their homicide is a  
12  gun.

13           And so I'm looking forward to  
14  that discussion to make sure that we keep  
15  this issue on the forefront, we keep it  
16  on the burner as it relates to making  
17  sure we keep our young people safe, but  
18  also giving young men other options  
19  regarding picking up a gun. And I think  
20  that's a real conversation that needs to  
21  take place, but I'm also interested in  
22  looking at when we do -- when the  
23  Philadelphia Police Department  
24  confiscates a gun in a homicide, in a  
25  shooting, what happens after those guns

2       go into the department? Do they do the  
3       CSI work and kind of trace where the gun  
4       come from, or it's just a homicide and  
5       it's a shooting and then nothing happens?  
6       So I'm looking forward to actually see  
7       what's the followup with these guns,  
8       because I think the assault weapons ban,  
9       I understand that policy, but the  
10      majority of homicides that take place in  
11      the City of Philadelphia and the majority  
12      of shootings that take place in the City  
13      of Philadelphia are by handguns. And so  
14      my biggest concern is choking that  
15      pipeline of illegal guns that come  
16      through neighborhoods throughout the City  
17      of Philadelphia.

18                 And so I wanted to acknowledge  
19      that hearing that will be taking place  
20      and look forward to that discussion.

21                 Thank you, Mr. President.

22                 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23      Thank you, Councilman, and thank you for  
24      those very, very creative ideas that you  
25      gave to us a couple of days ago during

2   our discussion about ensuring public  
3   safety measures across the City of  
4   Philadelphia, and we look forward to  
5   adopting that and implementing that in  
6   the City of Philadelphia.

7           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
8   Kenney.

9           COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,  
10   Mr. President. I just wanted to say a  
11   few words relative to Councilman  
12   Johnson's comments. First of all, I want  
13   to thank you and thank Councilman Jones  
14   and Councilman Johnson for all the work  
15   you've been doing over the years relative  
16   to gun safety, gun violence, crime, and  
17   gun control, and I admire all that you've  
18   done. One of the things that I would  
19   like to accomplish in this resolution is  
20   that while we wait for the national  
21   debate on gun control, assault weapons,  
22   multi-clip magazines, and background  
23   checks and the like and mental health  
24   issues, is that while we're waiting for  
25   that and while we're urging it and while

2       we support it, we still have resources  
3       here that the District Attorney employs  
4       and that the Police Commissioner employs  
5       and that the mental health community  
6       employs. And while we're waiting for the  
7       changes, I think going into our budget  
8       cycle, I think we need to examine what's  
9       successful, things like GunStat, the 2.0  
10      program. Those kinds of issues may need  
11      to be bulked up a bit while we wait for  
12      national assistance or state -- I doubt  
13      state assistance, but we'll always hold  
14      out some hope for that.

15                So that's where I want to  
16      concentrate on that particular hearing as  
17      to what our law enforcement, mental  
18      health folks need to do a better job  
19      within the confines of the existing laws  
20      that we have to live with. So I  
21      appreciate your help with that.

22                Thank you, Mr. President.

23                COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24      Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for  
25      your continued good work.
