14 Thank you so much.

15 The next order of business is

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
21 you, Mr. President. I move that the

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

12 The next order of business is
13 requests for leaves of absence.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Jones.

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. On behalf of the
18 majority, there are no requests for
19 leaves of absence today.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 O'Neill.

24 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
25 Mr. President. On behalf of the

2 republicans, a leave of absence is
3 requested for Councilman Dennis O'Brien.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, sir. Leave shall be granted.

6 At this time, I'd like to
7 dispense with the regular order of
8 business to welcome and thank all of the
9 guests and visitors who have come down
10 today. We hope your stay is a
11 pleasurable one. We hope you enjoy
12 yourself so much that you please come
13 back again. So, again, thank you. We
14 look forward to your continued interest
15 in this Council. Thank you so much.

16 At this time, I'd like to
17 recognize Councilwoman Blackwell, who
18 will present a resolution recognizing the
19 family of Nelson Mandela Myers and
20 Nai'lla Robinson. Would Imam Asim
21 Abdu-Rashid and Nelson Mandela Myers and
22 those accompanying them please join the
23 Councilwoman at the podium.

24 And joining the Councilwoman is
25 Councilman Jones and Councilman Johnson,

2 and we also have a guest and visitor,
3 Superintendent Chitwood, from our
4 neighboring township, and one of our
5 great leaders from the House of
6 Representatives, Ron Waters, our good
7 friend. Thank you.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
9 you, Mr. President. Today we have two
10 resolutions that we will read, one after
11 the other.

12 Thank you, everyone. Our first
13 honor, City Council, City of Philadelphia
14 citation recognizing the family of
15 Nai'lla Robinson.

16 The Council of the City of
17 Philadelphia respectfully recognizes the
18 family of Nai'lla Robinson for their
19 courage while enduring the hardship that
20 befell her during this time.

21 The Council also recognizes the
22 State House and the State Senate's
23 efforts in investigating the potential
24 misuse of religion to commit crimes,
25 particularly in the case of Nai'lla

2 Robinson, who was abducted from her
3 Bryant School classroom.

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, the
5 Pennsylvania State Police issued an Amber
6 Child Abduction Alert for the
7 Pennsylvania Police Department,
8 Philadelphia County on Monday, January
9 14th, 2013 when 5 year old Nai'lla
10 Robinson was found missing from Bryant
11 School when her day care provider arrived
12 to pick her up;

13 The State Police's Amber Alert
14 for Nai'lla stated that Nai'lla was taken
15 from Bryant Elementary School at 8:50
16 a.m. by a woman wearing a traditional
17 Muslim burqa naqib, which is a face
18 cover, and black gloves; and

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
20 Nai'lla had been dropped off for her
21 kindergarten only five minutes earlier by
22 her mother;

23 Surveillance footage shows the
24 girl walking through hallways with the
25 unknown woman, who has not been found;

2 We recognize the potential
3 misuse of religion in this particular
4 circumstance; and

5 Whereas, many African American
6 leaders from Philadelphia partnered to
7 offer a cash award finding Nai'lla that
8 surpassed \$105,000;

9 This extraordinary response
10 from citizens of Philadelphia began when
11 two dozen African American men combined
12 their resources to offer \$10,000;

13 This brought the total reward
14 to \$30,000 when Mayor Michael Nutter and
15 the Fraternal Order of Police also
16 offered \$10,000; and

17 Whereas, these partners came
18 from...

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And
20 whereas, these partners came from all
21 sectors of Philadelphia including the
22 clergy, community organizers, education,
23 law, business and elected officials;

24 Nai'lla's abduction resulted in
25 an outpouring of support and prayers from

2 the public, including celebrities such as
3 NBA superstar Kobe Bryant and former
4 Xscape singer Tameka Harris; and

5 Whereas, a man named Nelson
6 Mandela Myers walking down the street on
7 Tuesday, January 15th, 2013 around 4:40
8 a.m. heard cries from help and found
9 Nai'lla Robinson underneath a jungle gym
10 clad only in a t-shirt;

11 She was taken to the Children's
12 Hospital of Philadelphia, where she was
13 evaluated for hypothermia and reunited
14 with her mother;

15 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Therefore,
16 by virtue of this citation, the Council
17 of the City of Philadelphia does hereby
18 respectfully recognize the family of
19 Nai'lla Robinson for their courage while
20 enduring hardship that has befallen
21 Nai'lla during this time.

22 The City Council also
23 recognizes the State House and State
24 Senate's efforts in investigating the
25 potential misuse of religion to commit

2 crimes, particularly in the case of
3 little Robinson, who was abducted from
4 her Bryant School classroom.

5 We in this Council sincerely
6 offer our strength and endurance during
7 this time of need.

8 Sponsored by Council Lady
9 Jannie Blackwell and supported by all
10 members of the Philadelphia City Council.

11 (Appause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: At
13 this time, the Chair recognizes the Imam
14 Asim Abdu-Rashid.

15 IMAM ABDU-RASHID: On behalf of
16 the family, I would like to thank
17 everybody for their love and prayers. We
18 really believe that it was through prayer
19 that Nai'lla was returned to us alive.
20 So we want to thank everybody for that.

21 We want to thank Councilwoman
22 Jannie Blackwell for this resolution
23 introducing this law that would bring
24 about some stability to the fact that
25 people would dress up in any religious

2 garb and portray people of religion and
3 then commit crimes against the public.
4 So we want to thank everybody for that.

5 God bless.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Our
8 second resolution, recognizing Mr. Nelson
9 Mandela Myers for his acts of kindness
10 and community involvement.

11 Whereas, on Tuesday, January
12 15th, 2013, at approximately 4:40 a.m.,
13 Nelson Mandela Myers was walking on 69th
14 Street and discovered a child under the
15 sliding board in the playground clothed
16 only in a wet oversized t-shirt crying
17 for help; and

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, the
19 child found crying was identified as
20 five-year-old Nai'lla Robinson, who was
21 under the Pennsylvania State Amber
22 Abduction Alert after being taken from
23 the Bryant Elementary School classroom by
24 an unidentified woman on Monday, January
25 15th, 2013; and

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2 Whereas, with arms
3 outstretched, Nelson scooped up the
4 little girl up in his arms, wrapped her
5 in his arms and immediately called 911;
6 and

7 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
8 Nai'lla was immediately transported to
9 Children's Hospital of Philadelphia where
10 she was evaluated, treated and reunited
11 with her mother; and

12 Whereas, Nelson Mandela Myers
13 responded quickly with the utmost care
14 and concern for the little girl he
15 discovered shivering and frightened that
16 Tuesday morning; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, as
18 a direct result of Nelson Mandela Myers'
19 involvement, five-year-old Nai'lla
20 Robinson is alive and safe again; and

21 Whereas, the recognition of
22 "Good Samaritans" should not go
23 unnoticed; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
25 through your actions, we know you

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2 recognize the intrinsic equality, dignity
3 and worth of every person; and

4 Whereas, Nai'lla's abduction
5 resulted in an outpouring of support and
6 prayers from the entire Philadelphia
7 community, including celebrities
8 homegrown such as NBA superstar Kobe
9 Bryant and former Xscape singer Tameka
10 Harris; therefore

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

12 Resolved, that the City Council of
13 Philadelphia, hereby recognizes
14 Mr. Nelson Mandela Myers for his acts of
15 kindness and community involvement.

16 Further resolved, that an
17 engrossed copy of this resolution be
18 presented to Mr. Nelson Mandela Myers as
19 evidence of the sincere sentiments and
20 respect of this legislative body. And
21 we're proud that this was agreed to by
22 each and every member of City Council.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Before we call on Mr. Myers for remarks,

2 Chief Chitwood and State Representative
3 Myers would like to say a couple of
4 words -- I'm sorry; Waters. I'm sorry.
5 I don't know where that came from.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: This
7 is the first person I called when I heard
8 about it, my friend, Chief Chitwood,
9 Superintendent Chitwood.

10 SUPERINTENDENT CHITWOOD: Thank
11 you. You know, in my years of policing,
12 you meet a lot of people, good, bad,
13 indifferent, and I've had the opportunity
14 to get to know Mr. Myers and his family,
15 a gentle, decent, kind human being that
16 got involved. He didn't walk the other
17 way. He didn't ignore what he heard. At
18 first he thought it was a kitten, and he
19 stopped. He had his earphones on. He
20 stopped and he went over, and he saw the
21 child. And when I talked to him that day
22 and he started telling me the story about
23 how he reached out and grabbed the baby
24 and held her close and wrapped her, I
25 mean, I had a tear. I had a tear in my

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2 eye listening him tell that story and
3 then talk about his children.

4 So I want to thank him and I
5 want to thank Council and I want to thank
6 the entire community for coming together
7 today to recognize this issue and
8 certainly the law enforcement community
9 who gets involved.

10 So thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Chief.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Let me
15 acknowledge some of our police officers
16 with whom we work daily and who are here,
17 and they're standing in the back, but
18 certainly there's our Captain in the
19 18th, there's our Police Community
20 Relations Officer -- would you like to
21 say something -- and we want to thank
22 them. We call them each and every day on
23 various issues, and they're always here
24 for us. We thank them for being here as
25 well.

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2 Representative Waters.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Representative Waters.

5 REPRESENTATIVE WATERS: Thank
6 you, Council President, and thank you,
7 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell, for this
8 resolution and the support you have given
9 to this cause. I'm sure I speak for the
10 family when I say that we all appreciate
11 what's going on here in Council today,
12 what's been going on in the law
13 enforcement community.

14 We're trying to find out who
15 the perpetrators of this crime is. And
16 as the resolution indicates, on the State
17 House I'm working with the legal team
18 right now to find out what can we do
19 legally to add punishment on to someone
20 who commits a crime dressed in religious
21 attire to go out there and do Satan's
22 work.

23 So we want to -- we know that
24 there's an Amber Alert, but we might need
25 to do a Nai'lla Alert to make sure that

2 we have in law a punishment for people
3 impersonating, like they have a law for
4 impersonating a law enforcement officer,
5 well religious garb is sacred to the
6 people of that faith. So we believe that
7 they should be punished. So I'm working
8 on that in Harrisburg.

9 But I just want to thank
10 Councilwoman Blackwell and all the
11 Councilmembers who are here today and who
12 have supported this effort. We're going
13 to get this done, and also in the Senate,
14 because it does have to pass through two
15 chambers in order for it to go to the
16 Governor's desk for his signature.

17 Thank you so much.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you. And I now would like to ask
21 Mr. Myers to please say a couple of
22 words.

23 MR. MYERS: I would just like
24 to say thank you and really appreciate
25 what you guys did. And like as that day,

2 I just wanted to say, you know, I'm just
3 doing what a good man is supposed to do.

4 That's it, and thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Council will be at ease.

10 (Council at ease.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you.

13 At this time, the Chair
14 recognizes Councilman Johnson, who will
15 present a resolution recognizing
16 CeaseFirePA. Would Shira Goodman and
17 those accompanying her please join the
18 Councilman at the podium.

19 And joining Councilman Johnson
20 we have Councilwoman Bass and Councilman
21 Jones and Councilwoman Brown and
22 Councilman Squilla and Councilman Henon.

23 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
24 Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 You're welcome, sir.

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: On
4 December 12th of 2012, less than two
5 weeks before Christmas, as a city, as a
6 state, as a country, we all watched the
7 news in horror as a gunman killed 26
8 people, 20 first graders and six
9 educators, inside Sandy Hook Elementary
10 School in Newtown, Connecticut in a
11 matter of minutes.

12 A little over a month later, on
13 January the 29th, thugs fired into a
14 crowd of young people taking cover from
15 rain in a Chicago park and killed Hadiya
16 Pendleton, a 15-year-old honor student
17 and majorette who had performed during an
18 inaugural event for President Obama just
19 eight days before.

20 In the City of Philadelphia, in
21 2012, there were more than a thousand
22 shootings and more than 300 murders as a
23 result of the senseless acts of gun
24 violence that not only plagues the City
25 of Philadelphia but also in cities

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2 throughout America.

3 Gun violence is a major problem
4 here in this city and across America, and
5 that's why today I want to honor an
6 organization that stands on the front
7 line in addressing the issue of gun
8 violence, not only from a public policy
9 standpoint focusing on legislation such
10 as the report of lost and stolen guns,
11 closing the Florida Loophole, but even
12 from a grassroots perspective, joining
13 with community leaders and going to court
14 and making sure our judges do not give
15 out lenient sentences to those who do not
16 have our community's or our city's best
17 interest at heart. And so today I thank
18 my colleagues for joining me in
19 recognizing CeaseFirePA.

20 And the citation reads:
21 Honoring, recognizing, commending
22 CeaseFirePA for its extraordinary service
23 and dedication to reducing gun violence
24 by educating and mobilizing people across
25 Pennsylvania.

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2 Whereas, CeaseFirePA is a
3 coalition of nearly 50,000
4 Pennsylvanians, including citizens,
5 public officials, faith leaders, and
6 police, united in their stand against gun
7 violence; and

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
9 CeaseFire was founded in 2002 and has
10 established itself as a primary gun
11 violence prevention network and a vocal
12 presence in the public policy discussions
13 about public safety and violence
14 prevention in communities across
15 Pennsylvania; and

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
17 CeaseFirePA's mission is to minimize gun
18 violence by educating citizens of
19 Pennsylvania to take action in favor of
20 commonsense reforms to protect
21 communities and to crack down on
22 individuals who traffic guns illegally;
23 and

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, in
25 2008, CeaseFirePA worked with state

2 legislators to achieve the first vote on
3 a gun violence issue in more than 10
4 years, which jump-started the issue in
5 Pennsylvania; and

6 Whereas, in 2009 and 2010,
7 CeaseFirePA developed a credible voice
8 and established local footholds with
9 municipal action and committees across
10 Pennsylvania; and

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
12 CeaseFirePA believes that in order to
13 reserve the perception that illegal gun
14 possession is not a serious offense,
15 judges need to begin treating it as
16 gravely as they would a violent act; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
18 CeaseFire Pennsylvania's strong advocacy
19 and firm belief that gun violence is
20 preventable, not inevitable, will
21 continue to be a driving force for change
22 throughout the Commonwealth; now
23 therefore

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Resolved,
25 by the Council of the City of

1 2/14/13 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor,
3 recognize, and commend CeaseFirePA for
4 its extraordinary service and dedication
5 to reducing gun violence by educating and
6 mobilizing people across Pennsylvania.

7 Further resolved, that an
8 engrossed copy of this resolution be
9 presented to CeaseFirePA as evidence of
10 the sincere sentiments of this
11 legislative body.

12 And at this time, I would like
13 to present this citation to CeaseFire
14 Pennsylvania. Thank you for your hard
15 work.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 Chair recognizes Ms. Goodman for remarks.

19 MS. SHIRA: Thank you,
20 President Clarke, and thank you to
21 Councilman Kenyatta Johnson and all the
22 Councilmembers for this terrific honor
23 today.

24 Philadelphia has been our great
25 partner in fighting gun violence, taking

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2 the lead in the state leading 49 other
3 towns and municipalities in declaring
4 that we want the power to protect our
5 people by passing lost and stolen
6 requirements. And we will continue to
7 fight for you to be able to enforce that
8 or to get a statewide requirement that
9 requires citizens all across the state to
10 report if their guns are lost or stolen.
11 We will continue to work with you to
12 bring citizens into our court to make
13 clear to the judges that when somebody
14 brings an illegal gun into our
15 communities, even if they don't fire it,
16 it is a crime of violence that endangers
17 all of us and is deserving of serious
18 consequences.

19 We are working for commonsense
20 gun reforms. We are not trying to take
21 people's rights away. And you have been
22 a strong partner with us before Sandy
23 Hook. We will continue to work since
24 Sandy Hook. Luckily, we have many more
25 partners now, and we are going to keep

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2 moving forward. And I'm just pleased to
3 share with you that we have had two
4 terrific successes just in the most
5 recent weeks with Attorney General Kane
6 closing the Florida Loophole and
7 restoring power to our local police to
8 decide who will have the power to carry a
9 concealed weapon in Pennsylvania, and
10 that the State Police have shared more
11 than 600,000 missing mental health
12 records with the national database. That
13 keeps Pennsylvanians safer. It keeps
14 Philadelphians safer. It keeps Americans
15 safer. And we will keep working with all
16 of you to do that.

17 Thank you so much for this
18 honor.

19 (Applause.)

16 an ordinance authorizing Beacon on East
17 Girard doing business as Kraftwork to
18 construct, own and maintain an open-air
19 sidewalk cafe at 541 East Girard Avenue,
20 all under certain terms and conditions.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you. These messages will be

24 Do you have any other
25 communications, Mr. Decker?

5 Thank you so much.

6 The next order of business is
7 the introduction of bills and
8 resolutions.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Kenney.

11 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. I have no bills or
13 resolutions today.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you, Councilman.

16 The Chair recognizes
17 Councilwoman Blackwell.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
19 you, Mr. President. Today I introduce

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 resolution authorizing the Council

10 Protection and Affordable Care Act.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Councilwoman.

13 COUNCILWOMAN TASCOS: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. Quote, "The expansion
15 will recapture \$13 billion in federal tax
16 dollars over the next seven years, money
17 that would otherwise go to other states.
18 The expansion will create a greater
19 safety net for the poor and the mentally
20 ill and ensure a healthier revenue stream
21 to hospitals, which have their
22 reimbursements cut for uncompensated care
23 under the Affordable Care Act."

24 Quote, "The Affordable Care Act
25 makes sense for the physical and

2 financial health of the state, and the
3 expansion will create more access to
4 primary care providers, reduce the burden
5 on hospitals and small businesses, and
6 save precious tax dollars," end of
7 quotes.

8 In reading these two
9 statements, one would assume that these
10 quotes came from governors that supported
11 President Obama last fall, governors that
12 would have served as excellent surrogates
13 during the presidential reelection
14 campaign, because they could have
15 promoted the benefits of the Affordable
16 Care Act, also known as Obama Care.

17 However, this assumption would
18 be wrong. These quotes came from
19 republican governors John Kasich of Ohio
20 and Rick Snyder of Michigan, truly
21 conservative governors that supported
22 Mitt Romney and controversial bills that
23 promoted right-to-work initiatives that
24 will reduce membership in organized labor
25 in their states. Yet, these governors,

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2 as well as the republican governors of
3 Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico, and North
4 Dakota, have decided to expand Medicaid
5 in their states so that millions of their
6 uninsured constituents can receive health
7 insurance under the Affordable Care Act,
8 and nationwide a total of 21 states have
9 moved forward with the implementation of
10 Obama Care.

11 In contrast to his fellow
12 members of the Republican Governors
13 Association, Governor Corbett, in his
14 February 5th budget address as well as in
15 a letter to Health and Human Services
16 Secretary Kathleen Sebelius, stated that
17 he could not recommend expanding Medicaid
18 in Pennsylvania under the Affordable Care
19 Act due to its cost and lack of
20 flexibility. However, the Urban
21 Institute, a non-partisan economic and
22 social policy research organization, has
23 estimated that Medicaid expansion would
24 bring an estimated \$38 billion in
25 additional federal dollars to

2 Pennsylvania between 2014 and 2022.

3 Additionally, they also
4 estimate that Pennsylvania's spending on
5 Medicaid between these years would grow
6 only 1.4 percent over what the state will
7 spend without expansion. One's state
8 savings on uncompensated care for
9 hospitals are factored in.

10 Pennsylvania would also have an
11 additional \$300 million per year in
12 spending on existing programs, such as
13 state-funded health coverage for
14 individuals with behavioral health
15 problems and other disabilities.

16 Accordingly, Medicaid expansion
17 will save Pennsylvania money through a
18 combination of state savings and new
19 revenues, creating tens of thousands of
20 new jobs statewide and growing the state
21 and local economies, which, considering
22 that Pennsylvania's unemployment rate is
23 higher than the national average, this
24 economic growth is needed for
25 Pennsylvania's fiscal recovery.

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2 This economic growth is also
3 needed for Philadelphia's fiscal recovery
4 as well as its global reputation for a
5 region for excellence in healthcare. The
6 City is uniquely positioned to benefit
7 from the economic growth created by the
8 expansion of Medicaid under the
9 Affordable Care Act.

10 From this perspective, it is
11 important for Council to hold hearings
12 regarding the impact of the
13 Commonwealth's failure to expand Medicaid
14 under the Affordable Care Act.

15 Further, and considering that
16 Pennsylvania could expand Medicaid as
17 early as January 1, 2014, it is also
18 important to analyze the financial impact
19 of Governor Corbett's decision as we
20 deliberate the City's Fiscal Year 2014
21 Operating Budget and Five Year Plan.

22 In order to have a fair and
23 balanced decision regarding this issue,
24 we will invite representatives from the
25 federal Department of Health and Human

2 Services as well as from Governor
3 Corbett's Administration. Consequently,
4 we hope to answer the question of whether
5 the Affordable Care Act is too costly for
6 Pennsylvania or a significant economic
7 benefit that we must adopt.

9 ask my colleagues to support this
10 resolution.

13 for a better future for my family and for
14 my kids. Unfortunately I was not
15 counting on the obstacles I was going to
16 find and the immigrant laws that exist in
17 this country. And I think that it's not
18 right that after all the obstacles and
19 after all the dangerous journey that we
20 do, we are facing danger of deportation.

21 It's really hard for me, and
22 now I remember when my kids cry and told
23 me not to come, not to leave them back.
24 Especially my mother telling me not to
25 go, not to risk my life going there and

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2 staying there, but it was really hard.

3 And now what I would like to
4 ask is to please help us with immigration
5 reform that will allow us to have a
6 better future. I am fine if there are
7 documents that I need to provide and
8 proof that I need to provide, because I
9 think it's good to have a just
10 immigration reform.

11 I think that if we have
12 immigration reform, we would be able to
13 grow more and also contribute to this
14 country more. Working and paying taxes,
15 we will be able to grow this city more.

16 THE INTERPRETER: And I'm
17 sorry. Personally and from the
18 organization, we would like to thank
19 Councilman Kenney and Councilwoman
20 Quinones for introducing this resolution.

21 Thank you very much.

22 MR. FLORES (through
23 interpreter): Thank you.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Gracias. Thank you.

6 MS. KIERNAN: Good morning,
7 Councilmembers. My name is Mia Lia
8 Kiernan. I'm a community organizer and
9 co-founder of One Love Movement. We were
10 born out of a detention and deportation
11 crisis in the Cambodian American
12 community here in Philadelphia two and a
13 half years ago. Thank you for having us
14 here today to testify about the
15 importance of the Philadelphia City
16 Council resolution on comprehensive
17 immigration reform.

18 We first must thank you for
19 seizing this crucial moment in political
20 history to have the voices of
21 Philadelphia heard in the national
22 immigration debate. We thank you for
23 your commitment to building strong
24 relationships with community organizing
25 groups, community activists, leaders, and

2 advocates and allowing us to help shape
3 the language of this document in
4 partnership with you, our elected
5 officials. We thank you for having the
6 courage and integrity to lead our stance
7 on CIR with the concerns and analysis we
8 have on the ground here in Philly. Your
9 leadership makes us proud and gives
10 strength to our hearts in the face of
11 oppressive immigration and deportation
12 systems that test them every day.

13 We all know there's a national
14 effort to pass CIR this year. This is
15 why we're here in City Council today, for
16 Philadelphia to have a voice in that
17 initiative but also for Philadelphia to
18 empower ourselves in national efforts
19 that often loses the voices from the
20 grounds. Now is the time to be clear
21 about what CIR means for us.

22 As the national effort says, it
23 is fighting for the best and the
24 brightest. We say that's not enough.
25 The reality is that our schools are

2 struggling to stay open, our dropout
3 rates are high and real, our teachers are
4 overworked and underpaid and, therefore,
5 legalization should be extended to young
6 people who strive in our broken education
7 system for GEDs, vocational training, and
8 alternative education too.

9 As the national effort says it
10 is fighting to keep families together, we
11 say that needs to be defined in a way
12 that includes all of our families
13 regardless of immigration status, family
14 structure, sexual orientation, gender
15 identity or marital status.

16 As the national effort says it
17 is fighting for enforcement and
18 deportation of, quote/unquote, criminal
19 aliens, we say that is a blanket term
20 used to describe our young people who
21 have become part of not just the
22 school-to-prison pipeline but a
23 school-to-deportation pipeline. We
24 believe in second chances and redemption
25 in Philadelphia.

2 As the national effort says it
3 is fighting for swifter legalization of
4 agricultural workers, we say we know
5 deeply our country's history of
6 exportation and division of workers, and
7 any new worker visa program must
8 guarantee with it fundamental rights and
9 fairness to all workers.

10 We have begun our job today by
11 challenging the national effort to see us
12 here on the ground and challenging
13 lawmakers to take our analysis into deep
14 consideration. We have challenged them
15 to acknowledge the root causes of our
16 forced migration, such as conditions
17 created by destructive U.S. foreign
18 policies that have led to genocide,
19 economic and human, and conditions of
20 war, conflict, and economic devastation
21 to entire nations.

22 With that, we also want to let
23 you know that your courageous stance has
24 empowered other cities to step out of the
25 mainstream line of immigration reform as

2 well. Through One Love's national
3 network of allies and community groups,
4 this resolution was sent to the San
5 Francisco Board of Supervisors, who were
6 so inspired by the language of this
7 document that they wish to adopt it as
8 representative of their city's stance on
9 CIR after we do so here today.

10 So thank you all very much, and
11 happy Valentine's Day.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 MS. JIMENEZ: Good morning. My
21 name is Tamara Jimenez. I'm an
22 undocumented youth. I was lucky I got
23 granted deferred action, but my mother
24 and my step-dad, they don't have nothing
25 at all. So I'm here on their behalf,

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2 because everyone talks about how it's
3 their parents' fault when they bring
4 their children to this country. And I
5 say that every parent will do anything
6 for their kids to put food into their
7 mouth, to give them a birthday, a
8 Christmas present.

9 And everyone talks about how we
10 are here to take jobs. My mother and my
11 step-dad, they own a business. We are
12 contributing to the economy in this city
13 and in this State of Pennsylvania, and
14 it's just not fair that they don't have
15 anything to hold on to feel secure,
16 because with a blink of an eye, anything
17 can change and all the hard work that
18 they have done is going to collapse.

19 So I think this immigration
20 reform shouldn't be just about selecting
21 people what's right for this country, but
22 for those who also are contributing to
23 this country, like my mother and my
24 step-dad.

25 Thank you.

3 1840s on through the 1880s, '90s, where
4 no Irish need apply for a job because
5 they were discriminated against, where
6 nativist Know-Nothings attempted to burn
7 down two churches right here in
8 Philadelphia in the 200 block of Queen
9 and on the North 4th Street and were
10 fought off and not accomplished their
11 goal.

12 When Italians came to this
13 country at the turn of the century, there
14 was an ethnic slur that I learned growing
15 up in South Philadelphia which I was not
16 allowed to use, of course, because my
17 parents wouldn't let me, but it was a
18 slur called WOP, which we've heard more
19 than we need to hear in our lifetime, and
20 that slur meant without papers. So
21 undocumented immigrants are nothing new.

22 When the Jews in Europe were
23 fleeing the scourge of Nazism, they came
24 to the United States. When Haitians were
25 starving to death in their own country,

2 they put their own children and
3 themselves on a raft and set off the
4 beach not knowing where they'd land but
5 looking for Florida.

6 Every group of people that have
7 come here, Cambodians who were fleeing
8 Khmer Rouge and the killing fields of Pol
9 Pot, the Vietnamese who came here because
10 of war and destitution, all came to the
11 United States, because that's where you
12 go. That's what we stand for. That's
13 where we are.

14 People know that they're going
15 to have a chance here, and I think this
16 is the first time in the last five, six,
17 seven years in the United States Congress
18 where there's some bipartisan work going
19 on together, which is amazing, and it's
20 around this issue. And I urge those
21 sensible people in Washington, those
22 people who don't want to build a wall or
23 hire every charter bus in the country to
24 take people back where they're not going
25 will get together, get this done, and

2 make our country proud of our history
3 once again.

25 from time to time removed from the list

3 people have protection orders. There are
4 a whole plethora of things that may
5 change the status of a parent or a
6 guardian, but we need to update those
7 policies and procedures in light of all
8 that is going on in this Chamber today

11 school system to kind of assure with law
12 enforcement and with the School Board,
13 SRC to assure parents when they drop
14 those precious babies off, they're
15 dropping them off to a safe haven.

3 I recognize that officials on
4 the local and state level have worked
5 diligently and continue to work
6 diligently on relief measures to protect
7 those most vulnerable Philadelphians.

8 Throughout the budget process,
9 I will pay special attention to those in
10 certain parts of my district, which is
11 the 2nd Councilmanic District, who could
12 see the largest jumps in their property
13 taxes. I firmly believe that residents
14 and properties that have been
15 under-assessed for years need to pay
16 their fair share, but I will also act as
17 an advocate for these residents to ensure
18 that we aren't taxing them out of their
19 homes.

20 Many average Philadelphians
21 cannot afford to pay a tax bill that is
22 four, five or even six times larger than
23 their last bill. And so I've been
24 working with my staff and Council
25 technical staff to comb through the

3 throughout the 2nd Councilmanic District
4 to fully understand the impact of this
5 new system and how it would have an
6 impact on all the residents in the 2nd

10 a look at this process. We have been
11 getting bits and pieces of information,
12 some from the City Controller's Office.
13 I will be briefed, with other
14 Councilmembers, by the Administration,
15 but it's something to really pay close
16 attention to as we go through this
17 process, because we also don't want to
18 have a system where there are winners and
19 losers based upon a system that has been
20 broken which is now currently being
21 corrected.

3 the good news is, this city has grown.
4 It has grown because of new immigrants.
5 It has grown because of values, and many
6 of the neighborhoods throughout the City

10 Johnson that this Council is tasked with
11 the duty of figuring out how it protects
12 folks as it introduces and hopefully
13 accepts a system that is fair. And that
14 is what AVI is about. It is about
15 fairness. And the system has been so
16 broken that how you get to fairness
17 sometimes may be a tough pill to swallow.

18 But we have worked too hard and
19 far too long, and I trust that with your
20 leadership and the amount of talent that
21 is in this Council that we're going to
22 get this done. And in the words of
23 President Obama in his speech, imperfect
24 sometimes, but it is and should move the
25 needle forward.

3 together with our state delegation, who
4 is doing their part to give us the tools,
5 and let everything be on the table as we
6 try to protect as many people as

11 as this discussion moves forward, whether
12 it's our BIRT tax, our business privilege
13 tax, our U&O tax, that we get to a system
14 that is fair, that is equitable and
15 reflects the growth and the potential of

18 forward to working through that in the
19 upcoming months.
