2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We  
6 have established a quorum. I'd ask all  
7 guests and visitors to please take their  
8 seat behind the rail and members to take  
9 their seats. Thank you very much.

10 To give our invocation this  
11 morning, the Chair recognizes the  
12 Reverend Arlington Medley, Pastor of  
13 Victory Community Church. He is here  
14 today as the guest of Councilman Wilson  
15 Goode.

16 I would ask all members and  
17 guests to please rise.

18 (Members and guests rise.)

19 REVEREND MEDLEY: Good morning.

20 (Good morning.)

21 REVEREND MEDLEY: There is a  
22 word from Scripture that I think provides  
23 an adequate preface to this wonderful  
24 gathering in time of sharing and hard  
25 work, but first, it goes along with the

2   illustration that I think many people  
3   have heard that is apt and also goes this  
4   morning.

5           There was a young man who was  
6   trying to get a job as a signalman at an  
7   old railroad, and as he had finally went  
8   through a whole process, his final,  
9   final, final task was to pass with the  
10   inspector. He went up to the signal box,  
11   and the inspector was there with his arms  
12   folded, with a look that said he did not  
13   want this young man to get the job.

14           He began to ask the young man  
15   questions. He said, What would you do if  
16   you saw that there were two trains that  
17   were running on the same track about to  
18   crash into each other?

19           He said, I would use the lever  
20   and change one train to the other track.

21           He said, What if you found that  
22   the lever was broken?

23           He said, I would run down and  
24   use the manual lever.

25           He said, What if lightning had

3           He said, I'd come back to the  
4       signal box and I'd call the other signal

6           He said, What if the phone was  
7       busy and you couldn't get through?

8           He said, I would use my cell

10          He said, What if your cell  
11       phone couldn't reach the signal box?

12          He said, Then I'd get my Uncle  
13       Leo.

14          He said, Why would you get your  
15       Uncle Leo?

16          He says, Because Uncle Leo has  
17       never seen a train crash before.

18          Some people believe that there  
19       are situations where there's no way out,  
20       where there are things that are going to  
21       happen and we can't do anything about it.  
22       But this morning there is a voice that  
23       comes to us from Scripture that says  
24       there is no temptation taken you, no  
25       situation, no challenge that has taken

2   but is common to man, which means  
3   everybody is going through something, but  
4   God is faithful, who will not allow you  
5   to be tempted above that which you are  
6   able, meaning he won't put more on you  
7   than you can handle, but with the

10  with every challenge, there still is a  
11  real solution.

12           Let's bow and look to the Lord.

13           Dearest God, we thank you again  
14  for life. We thank you again for health.  
15  We thank you again that you are here with  
16  us, that in every situation, wherever two  
17  or three have gathered, you promised to  
18  be right there through your son.

19           So, Lord, may we come to know  
20  the grace which is always sufficient.  
21  May we come to know your strength which  
22  is made perfect in our weakness. May we  
23  come to know that you are always God by  
24  yourself, and one plus God is always a  
25  majority.

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

9 requests for leaves of absence.

10                  The Chair recognizes Councilman

11 Jones.

12                  COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

13 Mr. President. There are no requests for

14 leaves of absence on the part of the

15 democrats.

16                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman.

18                  The Chair now recognizes

19 Councilman O'Neill.

20                  COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,

21 Mr. President. On behalf of the

22 republicans, there are no requests for

23 leave of absence.

24                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you so much, Councilman.

2                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
3 Kenney.

4                   COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,  
5 Mr. President. Again, thank you very  
6 much for your accommodation of our paying  
7 homage to our Irish culture here. We  
8 were supposed to do everything next week  
9 at the 14th, but the Mayor's budget  
10 message has knocked that off, so I  
11 appreciate your accommodation again in  
12 allowing us to provide a little bit -- or  
13 a lot of Irish culture in music today.

14                   We have friends of ours from  
15 New Jersey who have come here to perform  
16 for us. It's Haley, Dylan, and Newt  
17 Richardson. Haley is 10 years old and  
18 she's a four-time Mid-Atlantic Regional  
19 Irish Fiddle Champion, and in August, she  
20 tied for first at the All Ireland  
21 Competition in Cavan, Ireland in under 12  
22 solo fiddle.

23                   Her brother Dylan is 15. He  
24 plays guitar and has competed in Ireland,  
25 and her brother Newt is playing bodhran

2    and beatbox. He's 17. And they would  
3    like to do a little performance for us at  
4    your -- if you would so allow.

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6    Thank you.

7           COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,  
8    Mr. President.

9           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Let  
10   me recognize the audience first.

11           First of all, I just want to  
12   thank everyone for coming here today. We  
13   hope that your stay here today and the  
14   experience that you have is a pleasurable  
15   one, and we hope that you come back again  
16   as a result of that.

17           Councilman, would you like to  
18   do that now?

19           COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Yes,  
20   Mr. President. Thank you.

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And,  
22   Councilman, I understood early on in my  
23   tenure that it is my job to accommodate  
24   my members.

25           COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you

2       very much. You do it well, sir. Thank  
3       you.

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5       Thank you.

6                   (Musical performance.)

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8       Thank you. That was awesome.

9                   At this time, the Chair  
10       recognizes Councilman Henon, who will  
11       present a resolution honoring the 10th  
12       Anniversary of The Irish Memorial. Would  
13       Kathleen Sullivan and those accompanying  
14       her please join the Councilman at the  
15       podium.

16                   And joining Councilman Henon we  
17       have Councilman O'Brien and I believe  
18       Councilman Kenney also and also  
19       Councilman Squilla.

20                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Well, good  
21       morning, everybody. And that was a  
22       beautiful presentation. It kind of  
23       absolutely makes you proud of the  
24       children and the folks involved at an  
25       early age into our heritage and culture.

2           So today we honor the 10-year  
3           Anniversary of The Irish Memorial.

4           The Irish Memorial tells us a  
5           story about our history. It tells us a  
6           story about the Irish people in  
7           Philadelphia and beyond. Our story is  
8           one of struggle and one of struggles that  
9           came with challenges. It is a story of  
10          an immigrant community that arrived here  
11          under dire circumstances. The great  
12          hunger in Ireland was real. Our family  
13          members had to flee their homes to  
14          survive.

15          The Irish Memorial is important  
16          because it encourages us to remember  
17          those who did not make it. Over one  
18          million people didn't survive. And for  
19          those who did make it, they arrived with  
20          nothing, and yet they worked hard to  
21          raise their families, and yet they  
22          established communities and churches  
23          right here in Philadelphia in the Irish  
24          community, which they built.

25          The Irish Memorial is about

2    keeping our story alive so that we could  
3    tell our story to our grandchildren and  
4    of all the generations to come. A lot of  
5    people came together to make this  
6    Memorial a reality, and many more  
7    continue to work hard to keep our story  
8    alive. People like Jim Coyne, who  
9    shepherded this project for two decades,  
10   all of the original Board members, and  
11   for those Memorial Angels, as they are so  
12   called -- and there are many, such as  
13   John Dougherty, Terri O'Connell, Tom  
14   O'Malley, Bob Gessler, and our own Mary  
15   Frances Fogg, and the current Board  
16   members and the current President,  
17   Kathleen Sullivan.

18                 For those who haven't heard the  
19    story yet and haven't seen the Memorial  
20    yet, it's at 2nd and Chestnut, and I  
21    encourage you to visit and to remember  
22    the story and the struggle of the Irish  
23    community.

24                 The 10-year Anniversary of The  
25    Irish Memorial.

2           Whereas, a thirteen year  
3 campaign was launched in 1990 to promote,  
4 fund and construct The Irish Memorial to  
5 the victims and survivors of one of the  
6 most catastrophic events in the world's  
7 history. The project was completed and  
8 dedicated on October 25th, 2003; and

9           COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,  
10 The Irish Memorial is inspired by more  
11 than 44 million Americans who claim Irish  
12 heritage. The Memorial is made possible  
13 by the dedicated group of individuals and  
14 organizations from the public and private  
15 sector; and

16           Whereas, The Irish Memorial is  
17 also dedicated in the memory of more than  
18 one million men, women and children who  
19 perished during the year 1845 to 1850 and  
20 to the memory of millions of Irish  
21 immigrants who found the freedom, liberty  
22 and prosperity here in the United States  
23 that was denied to their ancestors in  
24 Ireland; and

25           COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Whereas,

2   the monument itself includes 35  
3   life-sized figures. The bronze work  
4   measures a spectacular 30 feet long and  
5   12 feet wide and 12 feet high. The  
6   Memorial depicts not only the cruel  
7   starvation which claimed one million  
8   Irish lives in five years but also the  
9   harrowing journey to America taken by a  
10   million more, and the indomitable spirit  
11   of those who arrived safely and resolved  
12   to face the challenges of life in the new  
13   world;

14               Whereas, standing prominently  
15   at Front and Chestnut Streets in  
16   Philadelphia, The Irish Memorial adds to  
17   the cultural and historical richness of  
18   Philadelphia's Historic District because  
19   of its proximity to nearby Independence  
20   National Historic Park and Penn's  
21   Landing;

22               COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Whereas,  
23   though it has special meaning for  
24   millions of Americans of Irish descent,  
25   it touches everyone who approaches it

2    regardless of their ancestry. Besides  
3    presenting an important chapter in  
4    history in a moving and effective way,  
5    the Memorial is a significant addition to  
6    Philadelphia's great collection of public  
7    art and one of the few pieces created by  
8    a major female artist. It serves as both  
9    a national attraction and a place for  
10   peaceful contemplation; now therefore

11                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Resolved, by  
12   the body of the City Council of  
13   Philadelphia, that we hereby honor and  
14   recognize the 10th Anniversary of The  
15   Irish Memorial.

16                   Resolved further, that an  
17   engrossed copy of this resolution be  
18   presented to The Irish Memorial Board of  
19   Directors as further evidence of the  
20   sincere respect and admiration of this  
21   legislative body.

22                   Congratulations.

23                   (Applause.)

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
25   Chair recognizes Ms. Sullivan for

2    remarks.

3                   MS. SULLIVAN: Thank you first  
4    to President Clarke for inviting us here  
5    today, and thank you all for listening to  
6    a short story of the Irish history. I'd  
7    also like to thank Councilman O'Brien,  
8    Squilla, Councilman Kenney and also  
9    Councilman Henon for introducing this,  
10   and a special thanks also to Mary Frances  
11   Fogg for getting the wheels started.

12                   There were a lot of people that  
13   were thanked today. I'd also like to do  
14   a special recognition to Bob Gessler, who  
15   is the President of the St. Patrick's Day  
16   Parade, which is this Saturday, March  
17   10th -- Sunday. Sorry. I would have  
18   showed up a day early. Maybe I planned  
19   it that way.

20                   And also I'd like to thank Joe  
21   March, who is our former Managing  
22   Director, who helped us navigate the  
23   waters on the whole construction and land  
24   in getting the dedication of The Irish  
25   Memorial.

2                   I'd also like to introduce Jim  
3 Coyne -- well, first of all, The Irish  
4 Memorial dedication is the 10th  
5 Anniversary, and that will take place on  
6 March 17th, the actual date -- in fact, I  
7 understand we moved the parade so we  
8 could have the 10th Anniversary there at  
9 Front and Chestnut. So if any of you  
10 haven't seen it, you don't have to be  
11 Irish. It's a beautiful work of public  
12 art, which we dedicated back to the City  
13 and we maintain -- we dedicated it back,  
14 but didn't put the burden on the City to  
15 maintain it. So we have fundraisers and  
16 there's a lot that goes into that,  
17 lighting, landscaping, cleaning, waxing.  
18 So it's a continuous journey, I guess, to  
19 try to get this maintained.

20                   So please visit it. It  
21 resonates with not only Irish people but  
22 all immigrant populations. So you don't  
23 have -- if you can't make it on the 17th,  
24 try to get down there any day of the year  
25 at Front and Chestnut.

2           I don't want to go on and on,  
3 President Clarke, but if you would just  
4 indulge us, I would like to introduce the  
5 gentleman who was responsible for getting  
6 this whole project started, our  
7 statesman, our historian, our former  
8 President, Jim Coyne.

9           Thank you.

10          (Applause.)

11          MR. COYNE: I would just like  
12 to thank everybody for the proclamation  
13 and all of the descriptive stories that  
14 were told about it. There was one point,  
15 however, that is a major point and the  
16 main reason why we started this Memorial  
17 in the first place, and that's to dispel  
18 the myth of a potato famine. There was  
19 no famine in Ireland. Only one crop  
20 failed, and that was the potato crop.  
21 Ireland's governors or rulers were  
22 exporting food while over a million  
23 people starved to death.

24          So don't let anybody ever tell  
25 you that there's a potato famine. The

2 potato crop failed. The people starved  
3 because the people that were governing  
4 Ireland exported food and let the people  
5 starve.

6           Thanks very much.

12           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you.

14           At this time, the Chair  
15 recognizes Councilwoman Brown, who will  
16 present a resolution celebrating 10 years  
17 of United Way's Initiative. Would  
18 Ms. Jill Michael and those accompanying  
19 her please join the Councilwoman at the  
20 podium.

21           And joining Councilwoman Brown  
22 is Councilwoman Tasco, Councilwoman  
23 Sanchez, Councilwoman Bass.

24           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
25 Mr. President.

2           On the occasion of the  
3           celebration of Women's History Month, we  
4           also get a chance this morning to  
5           celebrate ten years of United Way's  
6           Women's Initiative by recognizing women  
7           leaders in both philanthropy and  
8           volunteerism.

9           Whereas, United Way of Greater  
10          Philadelphia and Southern New Jersey in  
11          Southeastern Pennsylvania is celebrating  
12          the 10th Anniversary of the Women's  
13          Initiative affinity group;

14          COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And  
15          whereas, Molly D. Shepard, President and  
16          CEO of the Leaders Edge/Leaders by  
17          Design, founded the Women's Initiative in  
18          2003; and

19          Whereas, the Women's Initiative  
20          has raised more than \$3 million to  
21          support its signature program, Girls  
22          Today, Leaders Tomorrow, a program that  
23          helps at-risk girls learn how to build  
24          and maintain healthy relationships and  
25          develop enhanced leadership skills; and

2                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,  
3 the work of Girls Today, Leaders Tomorrow  
4 has been supported by a number of local  
5 agencies that share United Way's  
6 commitment to improving the lives of  
7 children, including Big Brothers and Big  
8 Sisters of Philadelphia; Boys and Girls  
9 Club of Philadelphia; Congreso; Discovery  
10 Charter School; Education Works; Excell  
11 Community Development Corporation;  
12 Foundation for Pottstown Education; Girl  
13 Scouts of Eastern Pennsylvania; Girls  
14 Incorporated of Greater Philadelphia and  
15 Southern New Jersey; Healthy Communities  
16 Initiative, Inc.; Philadelphia Anti-Drug/  
17 Anti-Violence Network; Philadelphia  
18 Department of Human Services - Girls  
19 Track; and the Philadelphia Prevention  
20 Partnership; Public Health Management

23 Communities of Southeast Philadelphia;  
24 and the YWCA Tri-County Areas; and

25                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,

3     professional women opportunities to  
4     volunteer with agencies that work with  
5     at-risk girls to develop core values  
6     supporting their future success; and

7           Whereas, women engaged with the

9     to the Women's Initiative Next  
10    Generation, are extended the opportunity  
11    to build their network with women who are  
12    committed to creating lasting change for  
13    individuals and families; and

14           COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Whereas,  
15    the Women's Initiative celebrates a  
16    decade of creating exponential impact in  
17    the lives of those most in need, carrying  
18    out the vision of harnessing the caring  
19    power of women, increasing the impact of  
20    women donors and growing the number of  
21    women volunteers; and

22           Whereas, the 2013 Women's  
23    Initiative Gala will take place on  
24    Wednesday, March 13th at the Crystal Tea  
25    Room, Tierney President and CEO Mary

2       Stengel Austen will receive the 2013  
3       Women's Initiative Award and Presenting  
4       Sponsor Independence Blue Cross will be

8       the mission so clearly defined a decade  
9       ago remains - to mobilize the power of  
10      women to give, advocate and volunteer in  
11      support of at-risk women and girls; now  
12      therefore be it

13           Resolved, by the City Council  
14      of Philadelphia, that we hereby recognize  
15      and celebrate 10 years of United Way's  
16      Women Initiative by recognizing women  
17      leaders in philanthropy and volunteerism.

18           Further resolved, that an  
19      engrossed copy of this resolution be  
20      presented to its President and leader  
21      Jill Michael and CEO and Amy Frazier,  
22      Nancy Threlfall, chair and vice chair,  
23      respectively, of the Women's Initiative  
24      for their commitment, untiring efforts to  
25      improve the quality of life for at-risk

13   Chair recognizes Ms. Michael for remarks.

14           MS. MICHAEL: Well, thank you  
15   very much, and thank you to all the  
16   fabulous Councilwomen who are celebrating  
17   this with us today, and thank you to  
18   Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown, who  
19   has not only been a past recipient of  
20   this award but a phenomenal champion for  
21   women and girls all across this region.

22           For ten years, this dynamic  
23   group of leaders has mobilized the power  
24   of women to give, advocate, and volunteer  
25   in support of at-risk women and girls.

2    So far, this Women's Initiative has  
3    raised over \$3 million to support its  
4    signature program, Girls Today, Leaders  
5    Tomorrow, which helps young girls develop

10   annual gala, but we're charging forward  
11   toward the future to take the Girls  
12   Today, Leaders Tomorrow program even

17   and career ready is critical to the  
18   success of not only those girls but of  
19   our communities as a whole.

20           Through Girls Today, Leaders  
21   Tomorrow, we help hundreds of girls from  
22   low-performing schools all across the  
23   region to achieve their dreams by  
24   wrapping services around them to help  
25   them prepare for, attain, and flourish

4                   CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged  
5 resolution urging Governor Corbett and  
6 the Pennsylvania General Assembly to  
7 re-start the adultBasic program for  
8 uninsured Pennsylvanians.

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
10 Thank you.

11                   The Chair recognizes  
12 Councilwoman Tasco.

13                   COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you,  
14 Mr. President.

15                   Another week in Council and now  
16 we have another major decision that  
17 Governor Corbett must make regarding  
18 healthcare that will impact thousands of  
19 Pennsylvanians and residents of our city.

20                   Recently, I called on Governor  
21 Corbett, along with the support of this  
22 Council, to expand Medicare in  
23 Pennsylvania under the federal Affordable  
24 Care Act, also known as Obama Care. In  
25 addition, the Public Health and Human

2    Services Committee will hold hearings on  
3    Friday, March 22nd at 10:00 a.m. to  
4    discuss the impact of the Governor's  
5    failure to adopt the Affordable Care Act.  
6    Now through this resolution I am  
7    introducing today, I urge the Governor  
8    and the General Assembly to re-start  
9    adultBasic in Pennsylvania.

10                   Created in 2002, the adultBasic  
11    program was created to provide healthcare  
12    for lower-income Pennsylvanians who did  
13    not receive health insurance from their  
14    employers and earned too much money to  
15    qualify for Medicaid and were too young  
16    to receive Medicare.

17                   AdultBasic, which covered major  
18    surgery but not dental costs or  
19    prescriptions, was so popular that by the  
20    late -- by late 2010, it covered 42,625  
21    Pennsylvanians and had a waiting list  
22    exceeding 400,000.

23                   Governor Rendell expanded  
24    adultBasic by negotiating voluntary  
25    payments from Blue Cross insurers, but

2     the Corbett Administration ended  
3     adultBasic because they decided it was  
4     too expensive.

5           A major source of funding for  
6     adultBasic was the Pennsylvania Tobacco  
7     Settlement Act, and recent legislation  
8     was passed that allowed these funds to be  
9     diverted away from this vital program.  
10    In response, attorneys William Caroselli  
11    and David Senoff filed a lawsuit on  
12    behalf of 100 former adultBasic  
13    recipients. They argued that this new  
14    legislation violated the Tobacco  
15    Settlement Act and the Pennsylvania  
16    Constitution, and that under the Act,  
17    tobacco settlement money was to be used  
18    to make Pennsylvanians healthier and  
19    provide for the health of future  
20    generations of Pennsylvanians, and the  
21    Act specified that 30 percent of the  
22    proceeds would be shared between  
23    adultBasic and Medicaid for workers with  
24    disabilities.

25           The Commonwealth Court agreed,

1           3/7/13 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS  
2   and in his March 4th majority opinion,  
3   President Judge Dan Pellegrini ruled that  
4   the Corbett Administration, starting in  
5   Fiscal Year 2013-14, must allocate 30  
6   percent of the settlement funds to  
7   adultBasic or a similar program, as well  
8   as to the Medical Assistance for Workers  
9   with Disabilities Program.

10                   This legal history now brings  
11   us to a decision that the Governor must  
12   make. Does he simply just want to  
13   re-start adultBasic or does he take a  
14   bolder step and follow the path of fellow  
15   republican governors and expand Medicaid  
16   under the Affordable Care Act in a way  
17   that includes former adultBasic  
18   recipients.

19                   With this decision, we can only  
20   hope that the Governor does not move in  
21   haste and thereby causing many  
22   Pennsylvanians to repent in leisure by  
23   not having healthcare.

24                   I request the suspension of the  
25   rules so that this resolution may be

11      beautification hearing that we hosted  
12      inside the community, and so I wanted to  
13      commend you for your effort in making  
14      sure we utilize the City's vacant land  
15      and vacant properties to become  
16      productive uses of parcels.

17                   The bill today that I  
18      introduced on your behalf will  
19      incentivize residents with moderate  
20      income to acquire and build homes on  
21      vacant City-owned properties. This  
22      legislation will have a positive impact  
23      on parts of my district, like Point  
24      Breeze and Southwest Philadelphia, that  
25      suffer from a high level of vacant and

2 blighted properties.

3           Instead of selling a vacant  
4 lot, the City or PRA can take out a  
5 mortgage and then forgive the mortgage  
6 with no interest if the purchaser, one,  
7 uses the property as his or her principal  
8 residence for five years; two, gets a  
9 construction permit in six months and  
10 moves in within two years. If the  
11 purchaser doesn't apply, the City and PRA  
12 can take back the property or demand the  
13 payment of the mortgage with interest.

14           And so, again, as we talk about  
15 development throughout the 2nd  
16 Councilmanic District, I just want to  
17 thank you for your progressive leadership  
18 in stepping out and introducing this  
19 package of bills and tell you to keep up  
20 the good work.

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman. That bill will be

24 And I just want to say in response to the  
25 Councilman, I think it's very important

16 Court, a decision favoring the  
17 Firefighters has been rendered, and that  
18 too has been appealed to the Commonwealth  
19 Court.

20                   In the interim, I believe that  
21 it is uncontroverted that there is a  
22 certain amount of this money that is owed  
23 immediately to the Firefighters. That is  
24 \$66 million. The Administration states  
25 that their number is \$200 million. What

2   my resolution is calling on the Mayor and  
3   his Administration to do is to take the  
4   uncontroverted amount of the money, \$66  
5   million, pay that immediately and then  
6   take at least 50 percent of the

8   million, take half of that, which is \$67  
9   million, and over a prorated period of  
10   four years begin to pay that money into a  
11   separate and distinct fund so that  
12   \$16,750,000 are placed in a separate fund  
13   each year while this matter is appealed  
14   in court so that the Firefighters, number  
15   one, have the money that's owed to them  
16   immediately and that money is being set  
17   aside.

18                   My concern, as I believe it is  
19   all of our concerns here in Council, is  
20   that should a court order that this money  
21   be paid in one lump sum, we will not be  
22   able to pay that funds without either  
23   trying to borrow that money, cut services  
24   or raise taxes. And I think it is also  
25   not a good idea to try to use that money,

2           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Those opposed?

4           COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: No.

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

7           CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution  
8 honoring and celebrating the Southeastern  
9 Pennsylvania Transportation Authority for  
10 its leadership and advancement of public  
11 transportation and recognizing its  
12 numerous initiatives to improve public  
13 safety for SEPTA passengers and all  
14 Philadelphians, introduced by Councilman  
15 Jones.

16           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

18           COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
19 Mr. President. I move for its adoption.

20           (Duly seconded.)

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It  
22 has been moved and properly seconded.

23           All those in favor?

24           (Aye.)

25           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2   Those opposed?

3           (No response.)

4           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   The  
5   eyes have it.   The resolution is adopted.

6           CHIEF CLERK:   There are no  
7   other resolutions on the Final Passage  
8   Calendar, Mr. President.

9           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
10   Thank you so much.

11           That concludes our Calendar for  
12   today.

13           Are there any speeches on the  
14   part of the minority?

15           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
16   Oh.

17           COUNCILMAN OH:   Thank you very  
18   much, Mr. President.

19           I distributed on everybody's  
20   desk here in Council and let everybody  
21   know that this year on March the 22nd,  
22   Friday, we have our Fourth Annual 82nd  
23   Airborne Philadelphia Chapter  
24   All-American Dinner and Awards Ceremony,  
25   and of particular interest to this body

2    is that one of our two All-American Award  
3    recipients for service to veterans is  
4    President of City Council, Darrell  
5    Clarke. And it's a prestigious award.  
6    Your modesty speaks volumes, but the  
7    veterans community has really been very  
8    excited by all the activities that you  
9    have sponsored in the veterans community.  
10   So we certainly welcome everyone to come  
11   out to that event.

12            Thank you very much.

13            COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14   Thank you, sir. And we must give kudos  
15   to our two staff people, Wanda and Joyce.  
16   They've done a yeoman's job and they've  
17   really been doing good work. And,  
18   Councilman, thank you again for your  
19   continued good work for the veterans and  
20   all members of Council. Thank you.

21            The Chair now recognizes  
22   Councilman Jones.

23            COUNCILMAN JONES: I'd like to  
24   yield to Councilwoman Tasco and then be  
25   recognized afterwards.

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
3 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Tasco.

4                   COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you.  
5 Thank you, Councilman Jones. You're so  
6 quick.

7                   After reading the Sunday  
8 Inquirer, I proceeded with my morning  
9 household chores when it struck me that  
10 this cannot be business as usual. Two  
11 front page articles scream for attention  
12 from all people of color in Philadelphia  
13 and African Americans in particular. The  
14 story about OARC and Daniel Devers'  
15 excellent rebuttal to Philadelphia  
16 Magazine's latest and continued assault  
17 on black Philadelphia calls for, to  
18 paraphrase Dr. Martin Luther King, the  
19 fierce urgency of now.

20                   I have had the occasion over  
21 the past year to speak to two business  
22 people who have come to do work in  
23 Philadelphia. One hailed from the South  
24 and the other from the Big Apple. Both  
25 are unknown to each other, but what they

2    have in common is an observation that  
3    there is very little wealth in black  
4    Philadelphia.

5           I'm going to make a quote.

6    "Them that's got shall get. Them that's  
7    not shall lose. So the Bible said and it  
8    still is news. Momma may have, Papa may  
9    have, but God bless the child that's got  
10   his own. That's got his own," end of  
11   quote.

12           Which brings me back to  
13   Sunday's article on Ogontz Avenue  
14   Revitalization Corporation, or OARC, in  
15   which the Inquirer wrote a story about  
16   alleged misuse of state funds. If you  
17   look beyond the deliberately misleading  
18   headlines and the numerous inferences and  
19   innuendos, there is not much there in  
20   their story.

21           They reduced 30 years of Dwight  
22   Evans' hard work to revitalize this  
23   formerly blighted community to a headline  
24   of indictments. Quote, "The Northwest  
25   Philadelphia non-profit founded by State

2   Rep Dwight Evans misspent or mismanaged  
3   portions of state grants worth \$12  
4   million since 2006, violating fed rules  
5   and made questionable real estate  
6   purchases with taxpayer funds, according  
7   to a state investigation," end of quote.

8           For the record, State  
9   Representative Evans founded OARC 30  
10   years ago with a mission to revitalize an  
11   impoverished, blighted neighborhood.  
12   Beginning as a young legislator, he  
13   worked tirelessly over the past 30 years  
14   to turn around this formerly economically  
15   distressed, crime-infested, and blighted  
16   neighborhood into a vibrant community  
17   with bustling commercial corridors,  
18   improved housing stock, educational  
19   options, training programs, and business  
20   and neighborhood attraction programs.

21           If he were a white legislator  
22   and this was a white neighborhood, the  
23   Inquirer's headline would read, Committed  
24   State Legislator Turns Neighborhood  
25   Around After 30 Years of Hard Work.

2                   Dwight Evans worked his way up  
3 to the Chairmanship of the Appropriations  
4 Committee of the Pennsylvania House of  
5 Representatives through hard work and  
6 perseverance. In the 20 years he held  
7 this position, he was arguably one of the  
8 most powerful state legislators in the  
9 Commonwealth, respected by both sides of  
10 the aisle for deliberative leadership and  
11 bringing home the bacon to his members  
12 and their constituents, all members.  
13 Philadelphia as a whole did well under  
14 Representative Evans, who held the top  
15 appropriations leadership position  
16 through both democratic and republican  
17 administrations in Harrisburg.

18                   Moreover, Philadelphians,  
19 black, white, Latino, Asian, and others  
20 residing in neighborhoods across this  
21 city, are still today benefiting from the  
22 appropriation decisions made by  
23 Representative Evans. There would be no  
24 Convention Center or its expansion  
25 without Dwight. There would be no urban

2    supermarkets in Philadelphia or in  
3    various urban areas across this country  
4    without Dwight. There would be no  
5    Barnes, Jewish Museum or Please Touch  
6    Museum without Dwight. There would be no  
7    Avenue of the Arts North without Dwight.  
8    And we would not have had many of the new  
9    recreation centers, playgrounds, health  
10   center expansions, and arts and cultural  
11   facilities without Dwight Evans.

12                 The former Appropriations  
13   Chairman has bumped heads with many over  
14   the years, and at the core of these  
15   battles is his dogged determination to  
16   improve the lives of the disadvantaged  
17   and the underserved through public policy  
18   and fair access to government resources,  
19   resources that heretofore had been denied  
20   to minority communities through public  
21   policy decisions that encourage  
22   redlining, gerrymandering, and a denial  
23   of adequate funding for local schools.

24                 Representative Evans learned  
25   the rules of the game over a 30-year

2    period while serving in the Pennsylvania  
3    House of Representatives. He learned  
4    that holding the purse can affect public  
5    policy decisions. Businessmen, labor,  
6    community groups, members of civic  
7    groups, and a variety of stakeholders  
8    lined his Capital office waiting room  
9    daily for a chance to speak with him to  
10   advance their interest in the state  
11   budget. However, a confluence of  
12   shortsightedness, petty jealousies and  
13   animus led to his tumble from the top  
14   perch of Appropriations Chair.

15            Money you got, lots of friends  
16    crowding around your door. When you're  
17    gone, spending ends. They don't come no  
18    more. So when two total strangers to the  
19    City ask, Why is there so little black  
20    wealth in Philadelphia, the answer lies  
21    between apathy and petty jealousy,  
22    corporate greed and the political  
23    benefactors, liberals who are comfortable  
24    with blacks on their backs than in the  
25    boardroom, and a press that exploits and

2   sensationalizes the misfortune of the  
3   black community on one hand and the  
4   demonizing of those who dare to craft  
5   solutions.

6           There is a saying in the black  
7   community that whenever we learn the  
8   rules of the game, the game changes.  
9   Representative Evans learned the rules of  
10   the game in Harrisburg, and he was a very  
11   effective steward of our resources.

12           There is a notion that the  
13   African American community is not  
14   entitled to participate in decisions of  
15   allocating revenue and government  
16   resources, we need to somehow be closely  
17   monitored and that government in our  
18   hands is suddenly more corrupt. The  
19   press perpetuates this myth by  
20   sensationalizing leaked allegations. We  
21   all know that the press gives some  
22   political leaders the presumption of  
23   innocence and requires a higher bar of  
24   evidence before printing allegations of  
25   alleged improprieties. If this story was

2    about former Governor Rendell, the  
3    Inquirer may have investigated the  
4    motives of a republican administration  
5    leaking stories about an audit, which the  
6    administration refuses to share with the  
7    organization named in the report.

8           They may have questioned the  
9    aim of the audit is to correct  
10   deficiencies or bring down the legacy of  
11   a more popular predecessor or an attempt  
12   by Corbett to win reelection in 2015.  
13   They may also ask why couldn't the  
14   Corbett Administration want to share the  
15   audit and work to correct irregularities.  
16   If there is a real smoke and gun, where  
17   are the charges? Or is it the true aim  
18   to kill off these effective organizations  
19   by rumors, allegations, and legal fees,  
20   death by a thousand cuts.

21           Years from now, long after  
22   these organizations are gone, we'll learn  
23   that their demise was part of an  
24   organized strategy to weaken the  
25   political and social safety net in

2 Philadelphia's African American  
3 community, much like the national attack  
4 on ACORN.

5           This month's Philadelphia  
6 Magazine front cover story, Being White  
7 in Philadelphia, is just another example  
8 of the ongoing attack on black  
9 Philadelphia. Considering the recent  
10 census, African Americans can hold  
11 political power for years to come, but if  
12 they remain economically disadvantaged,  
13 they will never be full partners or  
14 independent.

15           Rich relations give crust of  
16 bread and such. You can help yourself,  
17 but don't take too much. God bless the  
18 child who's got his own.

19           Thank you very much.

20           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you.

22           (Applause.)

23           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you so much, Councilwoman.

25           The Chair recognizes Councilman

2 Johnson.

3           COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: I'm going  
4 to defer to Majority Leader. Is that  
5 okay? And I'll come after him, because  
6 he deferred to the gentle lady from the  
7 Northwest.

8           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Okay.

10          The Chair recognizes Councilman  
11 Jones.

12          COUNCILMAN JONES: Civility in  
13 Council. Civility.

14          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 That's what I'm talking about.

16          The Chair recognizes Councilman  
17 Jones.

18          COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
19 Mr. President.

20          With the exception of maybe  
21 gambling in the other Administration,  
22 with the exception of maybe AVI in  
23 today's sessions, the consolidation of  
24 schools probably is the most polarizing  
25 and galvanizing issue we are going to

2     face. Polarizing in the sense that  
3     there's a compelling interest that says  
4     300 million deficit requires some action,  
5     polarizing in the sense that that action  
6     should not be on the backs of young  
7     people, but galvanizing in the sense that  
8     parents and advocates for education have  
9     come out like never before in recent  
10    history.

11                 I appreciate the outreach of  
12    over 40 community meetings and thousands  
13    of parents and community leaders to deal  
14    with the issue of 37 closings, now down  
15    to 27 considered closings or mergers. As  
16    Chair of Public Safety Committee for this  
17    body, I still remain concerned, however,  
18    about children and their transition from  
19    closed schools to merged schools to their  
20    new location of education.

21                 I have written the SRC and  
22    Dr. Hite about my specific concerns, and  
23    they range from the distance, the great  
24    distance, some young people will have to  
25    travel from their closed school to their

2   new education home. And that path we've  
3   done overlays of crime statistics in  
4   those areas, and we are fearful about the  
5   fact that some mothers have to choose  
6   between safely delivering their children  
7   to school versus being on time to work.

8           We are concerned about mixing  
9   of ages and younger kids being bullied or  
10  victimized by older kids and the creation  
11  of fire walls to maintain their safety so  
12  that there are different exit and arrival  
13  times, that there are different floors  
14  used for different grades to give them a  
15  safe passage through school.

16           We're also concerned about how  
17  transportation will be used to get young  
18  people to and from their homes and  
19  schools.

20           We are looking at these  
21  closures and the rapid reuse of these  
22  facilities, that we don't want them to be  
23  idle, vacant for decades within the  
24  communities that they are housed.

25           We are looking to make sure

2    that we don't make full decisions on half  
3    information. We want to know these  
4    safety concerns before we are comfortable  
5    with sending our babies, our babies into  
6    these institutions.

7           I also challenge the parents  
8    and advocates in this regard: We said it  
9    was galvanizing and that they've come out  
10   in force and have changed the direction  
11   of some of the consolidations, but we  
12   need to see this effort continue beyond  
13   the crisis, beyond the decisions made  
14   this evening, that they come out whether  
15   their schools remain open or whether  
16   they're diverted to other areas, to stay  
17   involved in the education process, to  
18   become and remain critical stakeholders  
19   in their children's future so that we are  
20   just as excited about the end product as  
21   we are about the process. And the end  
22   product is creating viable citizens that  
23   can take advantage of work and  
24   professional opportunities upon their  
25   graduation.

2           So let's stay tuned tonight.  
3 We'll be testifying, along with other  
4 members of this body and elected  
5 officials, to see what the final decision  
6 of the SRC will be. But, again, this is  
7 not the end of the process. This should  
8 be a continuation and a new beginning for  
9 us all.

10           Thank you, Mr. President.

11           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13           The Chair recognizes  
14 Councilwoman Blackwell.

15           COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
16 you, Mr. President.

17           We will be there this afternoon  
18 after Council when the vote takes place,  
19 many of us who have been fighting with  
20 regard to the moratorium and with regard  
21 to the school closings.

22           I also want to remind my  
23 colleagues that immediately following  
24 Council, we will have our University of  
25 Pennsylvania public safety presentation.

2   Many of you will recall that Maureen Rush  
3   gave such an excellent presentation when  
4   we talked about this issue, that we asked  
5   her to come back and give a presentation  
6   to us.

7           So we hope you can just spend a  
8   little time with us in the Caucus Room.  
9   Lunch will be served by Penn, and  
10  hopefully we'll -- I'm sure that we'll  
11  gain a lot more information.

12           Thank you.

13           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14   Thank you, Councilwoman.

15           The Chair recognizes  
16   Councilwoman Bass.

17           COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
18   Mr. President.

19           Just a couple things. I wanted  
20   to start by thanking Councilwoman Tasco  
21   for her comments. And as someone who  
22   represents a large portion of Northwest  
23   Philadelphia, along with her, you know,  
24   the proof is in the pudding, as they say.  
25   The work speaks for itself that's been

2   done in the Northwest.

3           And so I just really wanted to  
4   take a moment and thank her for her  
5   comments and also to think about the  
6   connotation that there may be some level  
7   of consideration of race when this  
8   article was written is deeply troubling  
9   to me, but that's not the only thing  
10   that's happened lately with a major  
11   publication here in the City regarding  
12   race. And there's a publication that I  
13   won't even mention by name that has a  
14   title across the headlines that says  
15   something to the effect of, A  
16   Conversation About Race, when there is no  
17   one on your editorial board who is  
18   African American. So it doesn't make a  
19   difference if you're talking about race  
20   if you're not talking to different  
21   people. You need to be able to dialogue  
22   and have conversation with different  
23   people to be able to have an effective  
24   conversation about race and what  
25   separates us and what can bring us

2   together.

3           So that's just one thing I  
4   wanted to mention, but it wasn't actually  
5   what I wanted to talk about. I wanted to  
6   take a moment to talk about and draw your  
7   attention to community input and talk  
8   about investment in two different areas.

9   On December 13th, 2012, the School  
10   District announced its reorganization  
11   plan that called for the closing of 37  
12   schools. The decision regarding each of  
13   those schools was made without community  
14   input. It was shocking to many of us  
15   that these decisions were made without  
16   having any, let alone many, meetings with  
17   community members. Therefore, on January  
18   24th, 2013, this body adopted a  
19   resolution, introduced by Councilwoman  
20   Blackwell, calling for a moratorium on  
21   the School District's closings.

22           Then on February 19th, 2013,  
23   less than ten weeks after releasing its  
24   reorganization plan, the School District  
25   issued an amended Facilities Master Plan,

2    reducing the total number of school  
3    closings from 37 to 29. The School  
4    District's press release announcing the  
5    revised closing list was titled, and I  
6    quote, "School District of Philadelphia  
7    Amends Facilities Master Plan  
8    Recommendations as a Result of Community  
9    Feedback."

10                   In just nine weeks, the School  
11    District held 21 meetings, met with over  
12    5,000 citizens, and revised its plan. If  
13    the first plan had thoughtfully included  
14    any community input whatsoever, there  
15    might not have been need for a rushed  
16    amended plan.

17                   The School District's failure  
18    to seek community input in the first  
19    instance and its subsequent rushed  
20    process, which finally allowed for  
21    community participation, only adds to  
22    this body's January 24th action calling  
23    for a moratorium.

24                   And so I will be there this  
25    evening. I want to invite all of my

2   colleagues to be there as well, because  
3   this is something that, as Councilman  
4   Jones just mentioned, that I don't think  
5   we can just allow to sit back and allow  
6   to happen and not raise our voices.

7           So thank you, Mr. President.

8           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9   Thank you, Councilwoman.

10           The Chair recognizes  
11   Councilwoman Sanchez.

12           COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
13   you, Mr. President.

14           There's so much to talk about.  
15   I do want to add to Councilwoman Tasco's  
16   words. As someone who built a charter  
17   school with the support of Representative  
18   Dwight Evans and having known him for 20  
19   years, there is few, few major  
20   developments in my community, in  
21   particular in the Latino sections of my  
22   district, where his handprint has not  
23   been on there. You and I both are  
24   investing in Hunting Park. It is through  
25   Dwight's support that over a million

2       dollars was allocated to that plan.

3           He has supported the Latino  
4       community, not because we could vote for  
5       him, not because he could gain from it  
6       politically, but it was the right thing  
7       to do around supporting impoverished  
8       communities.

9           So I want to thank him for his  
10       service. And I think his legacy will be  
11       felt throughout my community. There are  
12       people in my community who had no idea  
13       his involvement and the level of  
14       involvement in the projects in my  
15       community. So I thank him. I consider  
16       him a friend, and I thank him on behalf  
17       of all of the constituents in my district  
18       who reap the benefits of his allocation  
19       and of his leadership.

20           I do want to add to my Council  
21       colleague Councilman Jones around the  
22       beginning of the conversation. I too  
23       will join as -- we might have a quorum  
24       over at the SRC this evening. I too am  
25       going to be attending today's session at

1           3/7/13 - STATED - SPEECHES  
2     the SRC, and I think it is important that  
3     we continue to infuse ourselves in this  
4     conversation with the SRC and the  
5     community.

6           I still believe the School  
7     District has to do a better job at  
8     articulating how these closures  
9     contribute to high-performing slots for  
10    children throughout the City. I still  
11    think there's a lot of questions that  
12    need to be answered. So we'll continue  
13    to ask those questions, and when they  
14    don't have the answer, we will provide  
15    the answer, and I think we need to  
16    continue to do that.

17           I strongly urge the SRC that  
18    after today, that the panel that reviews  
19    any future closures be done with members  
20    of the community. If we've learned  
21    anything from this, a school closure  
22    decision should be a no-brainer. They  
23    should be able to put that through a  
24    panel that says, Absolutely, that school  
25    needs to be closed, and this is the

2 things that we need to take into  
3 consideration when we close it. And I  
4 strongly encourage the SRC to do that.  
5 They cannot make those decisions in  
6 isolation. They have to make decisions.  
7 They cannot make them in isolation. And  
8 even if the communities will always  
9 disagree, there has to be some  
10 consideration of their roles as  
11 stakeholders in this process.

12           But which leads me to my final  
13 comment and some of the discussions we're  
14 having today in your introduction of some  
15 bills. We have to get to the revenue  
16 side of what we're talking about. And so  
17 we as a Council have to continue to look  
18 at ways that the Administration could  
19 create and streamline our processes so  
20 that we can bring new revenue, so that we  
21 further expand our tax base.

22           And so I want to end with that,  
23 that we are -- we have to -- and we have  
24 in the past, but this year more than ever  
25 with AVI and everything else, we have to

2       find the revenues so that the discussion  
3       is not about what we disagree, but what  
4       we agree that we wholeheartedly have to  
5       support.

6           So I want to thank you for your  
7       leadership in that and look forward to  
8       working towards that end.

9           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10       Thank you, Councilwoman.

11           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
12       Johnson.

13           COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
14       Mr. President.

15           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16       You're welcome, sir.

17           COUNCILMAN JOHNSON:

18       Mr. President and colleagues, over the  
19       last year, we have worked on the  
20       initiative known as AVI, and I want to  
21       thank my colleague from South  
22       Philadelphia, Mark Squilla, for stepping  
23       up to the plate and taking the lead in  
24       making sure that we approach this process  
25       thoroughly and cautiously. And I

2 recognize with the release of the new  
3 property tax assessments, that many of my  
4 constituents are feeling the shock of  
5 their property taxes possibly going up.  
6 I have seen firsthand a large number of  
7 seemingly inaccurate assessments, and I  
8 expect a very large number of residents  
9 will need to file for the first-level  
10 review to correct their assessments.  
11 Many of these homeowners are just  
12 beginning to realize that their  
13 assessments are inaccurate.

14           The March 31st deadline to file  
15 a first-level review does not give  
16 homeowners a sufficient amount of time to  
17 evaluate the assessment and submit that  
18 information to the City. We need to  
19 extend this deadline. Accordingly, I am  
20 respectfully requesting that the  
21 Administration extend the deadline for  
22 the filing of the first-level review for  
23 at least 45 days to allow all residents  
24 to take advantage of this protective  
25 measure.

2                   This morning I hand-delivered a  
3 letter to the Mayor's Office asking that  
4 he allow for a 45-day extension of the  
5 deadline. I hope that the Administration  
6 will understand that; therefore, allow  
7 residents more time to vet this process  
8 as we look at and move forward the Actual  
9 Value Initiative.

10                   Thank you, Mr. President.

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you so much, Councilman.

13                   That concludes our speeches for  
14 the minority and majority. At this time,  
15 I would like to recognize Councilwoman
