15                   The Chair again recognizes

17                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

13          The next order of business is  
14     consideration of the Calendar.  I note

20          As there are no additional  
21     bills on the First Reading Calendar, the  
22     Chair recognizes Councilman Jones for the

25          COUNCILMAN JONES:  Thank you,

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 The next order of business is  
16 public comment. Before considering these  
17 bills and resolutions, I would like to at  
18 this time explain the rules relating to  
19 public comment.

20 There will be a device in the  
21 middle of the room very shortly at the  
22 podium. That device when it turns green,  
23 you will be given three minutes to speak.

24           MR. WONDERLING: Thank you. My

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

7                   MR. WONDERLING: Again, thank

9    of Council. We appreciate the  
10   opportunity to address this bill before  
11   you today. First, we want to thank you,  
12   Council President, for the strong working  
13   relationship we have with you and  
14   individual members of this legislative  
15   body.

16                   We also want to applaud the  
17   prime sponsor of this bill for his  
18   well-intentioned and productive dialogue  
19   with us. In fact, we are pleased to  
20   support the prime sponsor on a bill  
21   recently signed by the Mayor to improve  
22   the fiscal health of this city. But we  
23   stand here today on behalf of the Greater  
24   Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce and  
25   countless small businesses in this city

3    legislation. We ask for this no vote for  
4    one simple reason: This bill, as

11           (No response.)

12           CHIEF CLERK: Michael Harris.

13           (No response.)

14           CHIEF CLERK: Joe Jowett.

15           (No response.)

16           CHIEF CLERK: Joe Jowett.

17           (No response.)

18           CHIEF CLERK: Steve Bradley.

19           (No response.)

20           CHIEF CLERK: Steve Bradley.

21           (No response.)

22           CHIEF CLERK: Vincent Fragle.

23           (Applause.)

24           CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on

25    130004.

2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 MR. FRAGLE: Good morning.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
5 morning, sir.

6 MR. FRAGLE: City Council, my  
7 name is Vince Fragle. I'm Business Agent  
8 for District Council 33, Local 1927, and  
9 I'm here today to tell you that every  
10 City worker and any worker that works in  
11 the City deserves to have sick days.

12 But I'm a little mixed up.  
13 You're here to pass a bill to give  
14 private-sector sick days and you're not  
15 fighting for us. The Mayor right now is  
16 trying to push through a contract that  
17 says that when one of my members is out  
18 with a stomach virus on Tuesday and  
19 Wednesday, and on Friday night when it  
20 snows 12 inches of snow, they got to come  
21 in as essential workers on Saturday and  
22 Sunday and not get paid overtime because  
23 they were out sick during the week.

24 (Applause.)

25 MR. FRAGLE: Now, I want to

2     know -- you know what's going on. The 17  
3     people in City Council know what's going  
4     on. Now, I'm asking you to pass this  
5     bill today because the private sector  
6     needs it, but I'm asking you to get your  
7     head out of the sand and take care of  
8     District Council 33's people.

9           (Applause.)

10           MR. FRAGLE: That's what needs  
11     to be done today. I'm telling you, City  
12     Council, don't do anything else. Get  
13     this Mayor to get to the table and give  
14     us a contract.

15           (Applause.)

16           MR. FRAGLE: You know the  
17     story. My friend Pete Matthews has been  
18     here telling it 500 times to this city.  
19     You know the story. We save the City  
20     money. I look out this damn window, I  
21     see where the Mayor wasted \$2 billion --

22           (Applause.)

23           MR. FRAGLE: -- on capital  
24     funding projects that we didn't need. He  
25     closed five ice skating rinks and built

2 one for \$60 million. Did any of you guys  
3 buy a pair of ice skates yet? I know  
4 you're going to be skating on it.

5 What are you's going to do?  
6 Are you going to get your head out of the  
7 sand and help us or are you just going to  
8 smile and shake our hand and give us the  
9 bullshit you've been doing?

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

13 Mr. Decker, please call the  
14 next name.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Chloe Bruten.

16 (No response.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Chloe Bruten,  
18 commenting on 130004.

19 (Applause.)

20 MS. BRUTEN: Good morning.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
22 morning.

23 MS. BRUTEN: My name is Chloe  
24 Bruten. I am 21 years old and have  
25 worked in the restaurant industry for

2   four years. I'm here today with the  
3   Restaurant Opportunities Center to speak  
4   in favor of earned sick days.

5           My mother, a single parent of  
6   two children, has worked in the  
7   restaurant industry for 23 years and has  
8   never had a paid sick day. As a child of  
9   a career worker, when my mother was sick  
10   and could not take a day off to take care  
11   of me because she did not have a sick  
12   day. One time I was so sick, my friend  
13   had to come and check on me and make sure  
14   I was okay, because we could not afford  
15   to have my mother stay home.

16           My mother loved me and wanted  
17   to be able to take care of me when I was  
18   sick, but did not have that option. I  
19   wish she did.

20           All workers deserve to stay  
21   home when they are sick or have to take  
22   care of a sick child. I know what it is  
23   like to have a mother without having  
24   earned sick days, and I know many people  
25   in this room, including Councilwoman

2 Bass, know what it is like as well. That  
3 is why I'm so glad she is a co-sponsor  
4 and a supporter of this bill.

5 I am not only speaking in favor  
6 of my mother, but for all mothers,  
7 especially single mothers.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Darren McKoy,  
13 commenting on 130004.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 MR. MCKOY: Good morning.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
17 morning, sir.

18 MR. MCKOY: My name is Darren  
19 McKoy and I live in the West Philadelphia  
20 area. I am a member of 32BJ SEIU. For  
21 the last six years, I have been a cleaner  
22 for the School District. Thankfully I  
23 have earned sick days through my job and  
24 my union. I am here today speaking out  
25 for the 41 percent of Philadelphia

2 workers who currently don't have earned  
3 sick days.

4           As a maintenance worker at Ben  
5 Franklin High School, I come into contact  
6 with a lot of kids. I know how important  
7 it is to stay healthy and take a sick day  
8 when they need to. Without sick days, I  
9 would still have to go to work. If I did  
10 not have sick days, instead of being out  
11 for a couple of days for a minor cold, I  
12 would have to let it get worse and  
13 eventually be out for a couple weeks  
14 more.

15           When I get sick, I take a day  
16 off, get to the doctor, get the medicine  
17 I need, and move on. That's the way it  
18 should be for everyone.

19           I am speaking out today not  
20 only as a 32BJ member but as a parent. I  
21 have a four-year-old daughter and a  
22 16-year-old son who are both in school.

23           Passing the earned sick days  
24 bill would not only help workers but  
25 would help parents whose children come in

2 contact with countless workers every day,  
3 whether it's in school, on the train or  
4 at fast food restaurants. This is a  
5 public health issue that should be a  
6 priority for every parent in the City.

7 I urge City Council to support  
8 the earned sick days bill, and I'd like  
9 to thank my Councilman, Curtis Jones,  
10 Jr., as well as Council Bill Greenlee for  
11 their leadership on this bill.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 CHIEF CLERK: Michael Cockrell.

17 (No response.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Michael Cockrell.

19 (No response.)

20 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: He's  
21 here. I'll get him. He's not in here.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Cheryl Jackson.

23 (No response.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: Cheryl Jackson.

25 (No response.)

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Tracy Gibson.

3 (No response.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: Brother Tracy

5 Gibson, commenting on 130004.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MR. GIBSON: Yes. Good

8 morning.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

10 morning.

11 MR. GIBSON: Hello, Council

12 President. My name is Brother Tracy

13 Gibson. I represent Brother Tracy Gibson

14 and Associates Incorporated, which is a

15 public relations and marketing firm,

16 which is a new breed of company in the

17 City and in this country that is for

18 union rights, and we want to make sure

19 that everybody gets paid, not just the

20 rich. And I'm also a representative of

21 the Black Millionaires Network.

22 I want to tell you that I am

23 for sick leave, but I did not -- because

24 of the haphazard way in which our

25 government is run, I was not able to read

2       the bill, so I could not tell you if I'm

3       for or against the bill at this point.

4       But I will tell you this, that we need to

5       be more supportive of our unions. We

6       need to make sure they get decent living

7       wages, because people -- when families

8       are paid properly, they are able to pay

9       their taxes. They are able to pay for

10      their houses. They are able to pay for

11      their children to get through school

12      properly. This is what we need to be

13      doing to support our families and our --

14      not only black families but all families

15      in the City.

16                    So I am for the bill, but I

17      don't -- I haven't read it properly

18      because of the haphazard way in which our

19      government is run.

20                    That's all I have to say.

21      Brother Tracy Gibson and Associates.

22                    (Applause.)

23                    CHIEF CLERK: Michael Cockrell,

24      commenting on 130004.

25                    (Witness approached podium.)

2                   MR. COCKRELL: Good morning,  
3 everybody.

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
5 morning.

6                   MR. COCKRELL: My name is  
7 Michael Cockrell. I've been a cook in  
8 the restaurant industry for 13 years.  
9 I'm here with the Restaurant  
10 Opportunities Center to speak in favor of  
11 earned sick days.

12                   Sick days are a benefit that  
13 will have helped me many times during my  
14 career by allowing me to take care of  
15 myself and my 17-year-old son without  
16 risking my job. I took -- I'm sorry. I  
17 took -- at my last job I was slicing  
18 tomatoes and I cut myself. I was  
19 bleeding badly. I left the station,  
20 washed it out, and wrapped it up and  
21 waited about 20 minutes for the bleeding  
22 to stop. I took the wrap off and I was  
23 scared to find out that it had not  
24 stopped. It was still bleeding so bad, I  
25 couldn't even put a Band-Aid on it.

2           I showed the kitchen manager,  
3 and he told me that it was too busy to  
4 let me go. If I would have left, I could  
5 have been fired. I had to keep cooking  
6 and washing dishes for three hours in  
7 that condition. Finally, after work, I  
8 went to the emergency room and got some  
9 stitches.

10           Another instance, last year I  
11 had to take my son to the emergency room  
12 because he had severe -- had a severe  
13 asthma attack. I called the restaurant  
14 24 hours before my shift and told them  
15 that I couldn't make it until he got out  
16 of the hospital. When I returned, the  
17 kitchen manager gave me a hard time and  
18 threatened to write me up, which could  
19 have resulted in my termination.

20           Everyone gets sick. The earned  
21 sick leave bill will prevent workers from  
22 being disciplined for being sick.  
23 Restaurant workers work hard. This bill  
24 would allow us to earn sick time so that  
25 we can take care of ourselves and our

2 families.

3 Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Marvin Robinson,  
8 commenting on 130004.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MR. ROBINSON: Hi. Thank you.

11 First of all, I want to say good morning,  
12 President --

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
14 morning.

15 MR. ROBINSON: -- the rest of  
16 the Council. Most of y'all knows me.  
17 Y'all know me very well. And we've been  
18 fighting about this bill for about two,  
19 three years. President Clarke, Darrell  
20 Clarke, is the one that sponsored the  
21 bill to City Council. Greenlee took it  
22 up.

23 Now, if y'all really want to do  
24 something right for us, the people, pass  
25 the bill. Y'all did it once. The Mayor

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2 vetoed it. Show the Mayor that we are  
3 the people. Stand with us.

4 (Applause.)

5 MR. ROBINSON: Stand with us.

6 Y'all did it before. Do it again.

7 Because this is important. I ain't even  
8 got a job, but when my daughter goes to  
9 the next job or when my grand-kids,  
10 whenever she have some, they can get  
11 earned sick pay without being sick. I  
12 mean, we talking about future, future.  
13 We're not talking about us no more. We  
14 talking about our generation to come.

15 And this is an outstanding  
16 bill. It's a win situation for all. And  
17 one thing I want to say before I leave  
18 this mic, if the Mayor have a problem  
19 with corporates having a problem with  
20 earned paid sick day, tell the damn  
21 corporates to get out of our city,  
22 because this is our city, we run it, and  
23 what we want is what we expect to get.

24 Thank you very much.

25 (Applause.)

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you.

4                   CHIEF CLERK: Tyrone Ferguson,  
5 commenting on 130004.

6                   (Witness approached podium.)

7                   MR. FERGUSON: Hello. Good  
8 morning, everyone, and thank you for  
9 allowing me to be here. My name is  
10 Tyrone Ferguson and I'm a former homeless  
11 individual. I'm a former alcoholic. I'm  
12 a former dropout. I stand here today to  
13 ask for your permission to speak and be  
14 the voice of the voiceless.

15                   My mother passed two years ago  
16 as I stood here before and gave  
17 testimony. I have an 81-year-old father  
18 who's disabled. As you can see, myself,  
19 I am disabled. Most of you can look  
20 towards your left and look towards your  
21 right. I have osteoarthritis. I have  
22 diabetes. And I still stand here as an  
23 individual for the voice of the  
24 voiceless.

25                   Many people today, seven out of

1           3/14/13 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2       ten people today who are workers, they  
3       are mothers who have children. They need  
4       their sick pay. Even the CDC says that  
5       when you are sick, stay home. When you  
6       are sick, keep your children home.

7           Seven out of ten workers today,  
8       68 percent report that they have gone to  
9       work with the stomach virus, with the  
10      flu. This is an epidemic. Even today  
11      there's a disease called septic where  
12      they have no known cure. As you as a  
13      worker, if you as a worker, would you  
14      allow your children, would you go to work  
15      sick knowing that you may contaminate  
16      other individuals?

17           We need to speak out here for  
18      the women, the mothers who have children,  
19      who wants to take a day off and cannot  
20      take a day off.

21           You know that person who was a  
22      former alcoholic? Today I have a  
23      Master's degree in business education.

24           (Applause.)

25           MR. FERGUSON: I am free from

1 3/14/13 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 drugs and I'm able to get back out there  
3 to go to work, even though that I am  
4 disabled, even though that I cannot see  
5 to my left and to my right due to  
6 osteoarthritis.

7 Those of you who are in the  
8 power, you have the power to pass this  
9 bill, and I ask each and every one of  
10 you, be careful of the people that you  
11 take advantage of going up because these  
12 are the same individuals that you will  
13 see coming down.

14 (Applause.)

15 MR. FERGUSON: I speak on  
16 behalf of the disabled veterans. I speak  
17 on behalf of the women, even the men.  
18 Forty-three percent of men are working  
19 today without sick pay. They deserve it.

20 Sick pay reduces turnover. It  
21 increases the productivity, and it  
22 reduces the spread of contamination.  
23 Fifty-three percent of working mothers  
24 and 40 percent of working fathers don't  
25 have paid sick day to care for their

2    children. That is a catastrophe in  
3    itself.

4           I thank you for allowing me to  
5    be here. Two years ago I spoke, and  
6    after I finished, I almost passed out.  
7    Who is going to here revive me if I was  
8    to pass out here today?

9           I thank you for allowing me to  
10   be here. Have a great day. May God  
11   bless you all.

12                    (Appause.)

13                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14    Thank you, sir.

15                    CHIEF CLERK: Garth Weldon,  
16    commenting on 130004.

17                    (Witness approached podium.)

18                    MR. WELDON: Good morning.

19    Thank you for having me. I want to speak  
20    a little bit from the standpoint of  
21    operating a business in the City.

22                    I opened a business in  
23    Philadelphia 15 years ago. It's not a  
24    chain restaurant, which might be able to  
25    afford this benefit, but I do keep 55

2   people employed and have kept them  
3   employed. In the beginning of the  
4   recession, I asked all of my managers,  
5   myself included, to take a reduction to  
6   get through the recession. They did.  
7   They all stayed with me, and we were able  
8   to restore that recently. But the  
9   economy has not turned around yet.

10                 My customers ask me, How is  
11   business? And I tell them the same  
12   thing: The volume is up a little bit,  
13   but the margins are gone. And they all  
14   say, That's true with me too. I'm a  
15   jeweler. I'm a banker. I'm a lawyer.  
16   They say, That's true in my business as  
17   well. The margins have disappeared.

18                 In fine dining, the margin  
19   traditionally was 4 percent or four cents  
20   on the dollar. That's gone. In the  
21   summertime, I ask my vendors to just hang  
22   in there with me. And so what happens  
23   traditionally, you pay your vendors on  
24   the 15th of the following month, your  
25   suppliers. You can't pay them in the

2       summer in Philadelphia. So they wait 60  
3       days, in some cases 90 days, and then you  
4       hope to catch up in the fall and get  
5       people current again. This is the  
6       reality of business right now. There may  
7       be a time to provide this benefit, but  
8       not in this economy.

9                        In this economy, business is  
10       about survival. So as far as costs, this  
11       is what's eating up the margins.  
12       Anything relating to energy, produce,  
13       seafood, my main product -- and then I  
14       can't stop serving it, because it's  
15       called The Prime Rib -- is a piece of  
16       18-pound prime rib that cost me \$75 for  
17       years.

18                       (Audience members booing.)

19                       MR. WELDON: In the last 18  
20       months --

21                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold  
22       it, sir.

23                       Folks, folks, folks, hold on.  
24       Time out. Folks --

25                       MR. WELDON: I just want to

4 Everybody has their opinion. Please  
5 respect the speaker. We'll vote today on

9 tell you the facts of business.

10 So this same product today, I'm  
11 paying \$162. So my product cost has  
12 doubled, but I can't double my menu  
13 prices, so we take the hit on the  
14 margins. This is white-knuckle time in  
15 business, not paid-sick-leave time.

16 Thank you.

23 MS. CICOSKI: Hi. My name is

10   different areas of management, and I do  
11   not oppose the idea of full-time  
12   employees having paid sick days.  
13   However, in the way that this bill is

19           MR. CICOSKI: No, I do not. I  
20   am a full-time employee and I am doing my  
21   dues. In the business that I am in and  
22   the business that we're all in, I believe  
23   that you have to put your time in. And I  
24   understand about single parents, and I  
25   feel for you. However, you know, I've

3       matters, and this is the industry that I  
4       want to be in. And the people that are

11           MS. CICOSKI: I just believe  
12       that this is trying to control the way  
13       that businesses are trying to run their  
14       own individual business.

15           From the ground up from small  
16       businesses, the way that it is with the  
17       way that money comes in -- and I  
18       understand where people were saying to  
19       change a menu, but the way that money  
20       comes in, it doesn't always go out. And  
21       so when people call out, the amount of  
22       extra time and the extra expense that  
23       would have to be undertaken to correct  
24       things lays on other people, and then  
25       that increases their hours and then

2       there's overtime. We encounter problems  
3       every day, and with this bill with being  
4       able to call out in certain ways, I just

20                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
21 Mr. President.

22                   One year ago, March 7th, 2012,  
23 I introduced a resolution calling for  
24 hearings on the level of female  
25 participation or the lack thereof on

2       executive boards in the City. Today, we  
3       come full circle as I introduce the  
4       official report, Women on Corporate  
5       Boards: We Can Do Better. The report is  
6       a result of a year-long process.

7           The notion that women should be  
8       treated equal to our male counterparts  
9       remains a dream deferred, equal pay for  
10      equal opportunity for advancement. As  
11      our kids might say, Hello, it's 2013,  
12      what is the problem?

13           This report details the  
14      problems. The findings include, but are  
15      not limited to, in 2013, 11 percent of  
16      board seats in the top 100 public  
17      companies in the region are occupied by  
18      women. Women of color, women who look  
19      like me, less than 1 percent board seats  
20      in the region. I repeat, women of color  
21      occupy less than 1 percent of board seats  
22      in the region.

23           Forty-one percent of the boards  
24      in Philadelphia have no women, zero  
25      women, sitting on the boards. In 1976,

2       women occupied 5 percent of Fortune 500  
3       board seats. Thirty-five years later in  
4       2011, the number has grown to 16 percent.  
5       If we continue to grow at the same pace,  
6       we will reach gender equality when my

8                       We recognize still that if  
9       you're not at the table, you're on the  
10      menu.

11                      Mr. President, I can assure you  
12      that as we put together this report, we  
13      did not have to ask for binders of women.  
14      I've had the privilege to collaborate in  
15      person with a number of women,  
16      intelligent, confident, driven, diverse  
17      women, who care about this issue. We  
18      came together to ask tough questions and  
19      develop strategies, many of whom are in  
20      this room, who gave their talent, their  
21      intellect, and their work ethic, and on  
22      behalf of my office, I thank every single  
23      one of you.

24                      Throughout the process, we  
25      worked together. We held private

2 meetings to gather feedback and  
3 brainstorm. Together, we followed  
4 through with a call for a public hearing  
5 in City Council last fall. Together, we  
6 heard from a full range of panelists

10 Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, the  
11 Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, and the  
12 African American Chamber of Commerce.  
13 And we were delighted that our hearing

16           We analyzed the data, looked at  
17 best practices in other municipalities,  
18 and now have a set of recommendations  
19 that we will be presenting today.

12 you, Mr. President. I know there's a lot  
13 of people here that are waiting for the  
14 next act in this room, but I ask them to  
15 bear with me for just a couple minutes.

16          In just a few minutes we'll be  
17 voting yes or no on earned paid sick  
18 leave, but I believe we'll be saying a  
19 lot more than simply yes or no. Will we  
20 say yes that a key aspect of this bill is  
21 about health, the health of the workers,  
22 the health of their families, the health  
23 of their co-workers and the health of the  
24 general public?

25          Or will we say no, like the

2       Nutter Administration has said no? And  
3       they're getting pretty good at saying no.  
4       They even refused to allow the Health  
5       Commissioner to testify before the Health  
6       Committee of this Council. So much for  
7       transparency and open government.

8           So apparently the  
9       Administration does not think health is  
10      an issue, which is ironic given in other  
11      settings they talk a whole lot about  
12      health. I guess health is only an issue  
13      when they want it to be. Something like  
14      binding arbitration is only an issue when  
15      they want it to be.

16           (Applause.)

17           COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Will we  
18      say yes that it's only fair that  
19      lower-wage workers, many of whom lack  
20      proper healthcare, should be shown the  
21      same respect as those in higher-paying  
22      jobs, that when it comes to one's health,  
23      it shouldn't matter if you come to work  
24      in a suit or a server's uniform?

25           Or do we say no, that basically

2   people should just be happy to have a job  
3   no matter what kind it is?

4           Will we say yes that, as  
5   Councilman Goode has said, earned sick  
6   leave is not an either/or, it can be good  
7   and has proven to be good for workers and  
8   businesses, that a healthy workforce will  
9   be more productive and beneficial for  
10   everyone, including financially for  
11   everyone, as it has been proven and as  
12   other cities have shown? When an  
13   employee is respected -- and I think a  
14   lot of people want to talk about respect  
15   in here -- when an employee is respected,  
16   they give respect back.

17           (Applause.)

18           COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Or will  
19   we say no, that despite evidence to the  
20   contrary, workers will abuse the law and  
21   take time off frivolously, even though  
22   that hasn't happened in other cities and  
23   studies show the average worker takes  
24   much less time than is allotted? Is  
25   somebody trying to say that workers in

2 Philadelphia are less honest than other  
3 cities?

4           Do we say yes, that we  
5 recognize that these are difficult times  
6 for businesses and that we have offered  
7 after many, many, many meetings with  
8 business groups and individuals, we've  
9 added 23 changes to this bill?

10 Councilwoman Sanchez said it well at the  
11 end of the last hearing. Council has and  
12 will continue to work with the business  
13 community to reasonably address their  
14 needs.

15           Or do we say no, no matter what  
16 we do to accommodate businesses, we will  
17 listen to those who dismiss all dialogue  
18 and offer amendments -- and/or offer  
19 amendments that make this bill  
20 meaningless? We haven't come this long  
21 to do that. Some of those opponents  
22 provide way more sick time than we ask  
23 for in this bill, like Comcast, and yet  
24 they use the argument that earned sick  
25 leave gives the wrong perception about

2   the City to businesses and prospective  
3   businesses.

4           So I must comment on this  
5   perception issue. First, as was said at  
6   the hearing, people don't perceive to be  
7   sick. They're sick. And if I'm someone,  
8   Mr. President, who is thinking about  
9   opening a business in this city, I don't  
10   believe sick leave would be my major  
11   concern, especially since it's worked  
12   elsewhere with little or no negative  
13   impact. What would concern me is what I  
14   saw and heard at the hearing we had last  
15   week. The Commerce Director of the City,  
16   the Chamber of Commerce, and other  
17   business leaders talking about how bad  
18   this city is, and that if they were in  
19   the suburbs, they would use this bill as  
20   a reason for business to move to the  
21   suburbs. They are the people supposed to  
22   be cheerleading for us and they're  
23   talking about what's bad about this city.

24           And in many cases, the business  
25   owners that testified badmouthed workers.

2    I think the ultimate -- you came in,  
3    Mr. President, and asked a question from  
4    a restaurant owner about why he thinks  
5    lower-wage workers will more abuse sick  
6    leave than higher-income people, and that  
7    gentleman said he knows his workers will  
8    call in sick to go to the Phillies game  
9    or call in with a hangover after getting  
10   drunk. A great business leader there,  
11   right?

12                   And they say we're giving a bad  
13   perception, the supporters of this bill  
14   are giving a bad perception? I think  
15   they need to look in the mirror.

16                   Finally, do we say yes, that  
17   earned sick leave is simply the right  
18   thing to do, and in the end, that really  
19   should be the deciding factor? Or do we  
20   say no, that while it may be the right  
21   thing, it's not the right time, which  
22   then I must ask this question, and I  
23   think a lot of City workers are asking  
24   the question about how long. Well, my  
25   question is, how many of the 180,000

2 workers in this city who do not get paid  
3 sick time will force themselves to work  
4 or not get paid before somebody decides  
5 the time is right?

6           Well, I believe the obvious  
7 answer to this Council and the City is an  
8 overwhelming yes. Yes, health is of  
9 paramount issue. Yes, earned sick leave  
10 is fair. Yes, business and workers can  
11 benefit. Yes, it can work here as it has  
12 in other cities. And, yes, earned sick  
13 leave is the right thing to do.

14           (Applause.)

16 Mr. President, yes, as Dr. King so  
17 famously said, it is always the right  
18 time to do the right thing.

3       thank the leadership of Bill Greenlee and  
4       all the other Councilmembers, Councilman  
5       Jones, for their leadership in really  
6       trying to improve the City and help  
7       people. I will disagree, and I'm going  
8       to state why.

9           Our city, more than anything,  
10       needs jobs. Yes, good-paying jobs. We  
11       need family-sustaining jobs, but right  
12       now we just need jobs. A lot of people  
13       don't have jobs, and we are losing jobs,  
14       even low-skill jobs.

15           Our population right now is  
16       challenged, as our city is, to grow, and  
17       if we look at the 350,000 manufacturing  
18       jobs that our city had in 1960 and look  
19       over the 30-year period that we lost  
20       300,000 of those jobs, in 1970 our city  
21       had 766,000 jobs. By 2010, we had lost a  
22       lot of jobs and only had 542.

23           According to Econsult and other  
24       economic forecasters, if we don't do  
25       something to turn around the City,

1           3/14/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2     including ensure that our workers are  
3     paid and we have great services in the  
4     City, we're going to lose 75,000 jobs by  
5     2021.

6                   What I believe we have to do at  
7     this time -- and timing is important --  
8     is to ensure that people choose  
9     Philadelphia to stay and start their  
10    businesses, to come to start their  
11    businesses. The issue is not that  
12    businesses are going to close over the  
13    sick day bill. The issue, in my mind, is  
14    that we are going to over time lose a  
15    certain number of businesses that fail or  
16    move out. We have to have more  
17    businesses that open and succeed than  
18    fail. If people decide not to make  
19    Philadelphia a place to start their  
20    businesses, we will lose jobs.

21                   The 75,000 jobs that we're  
22    going to lose, I am going to guess, are  
23    not for people with Ph.D.'s, Master's  
24    degrees, and high skills. It's going to  
25    be for people who have low wages, who

2    have low literacy, who have no prior job  
3    experience, and may have a criminal  
4    record. More than anything, I believe we  
5    need to create and establish good jobs  
6    for people in our neighborhoods. And so  
7    I will be voting no.

8           Thank you very much.

9           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
10   Thank you.

11           (Audience members booing.)

12           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
13   Chair recognizes Councilman Goode.

14           COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,  
15   Mr. President. As many of you know, I'm  
16   a founding Board member of Local  
17   Progress, the national municipal policy  
18   network. Last spring, about a dozen City  
19   Councilmembers and allies, including  
20   those from SEIU and AFSCME from around  
21   the country, met in DC to discuss  
22   progressive issues. Several months  
23   later, in November, several dozen of us,  
24   City Councilmembers and allies from  
25   across the country, convened a founding

2 conference to discuss economic justice  
3 issues like paid sick leave. In fact, I  
4 moderated that discussion.

5           We then formed Local Progress.  
6 The Chair of Local Progress is Nick  
7 Licata, the City Councilman who was the  
8 primary sponsor of paid sick leave in  
9 Seattle. The Program Chair of Local  
10 Progress is Brad Lander, a co-sponsor of  
11 paid sick leave in New York, where a  
12 majority of City Councilmembers support  
13 it. One of our newest Board members is  
14 John Avalos, a City Councilmember from  
15 San Francisco, where paid sick leave has  
16 been successfully implemented.

17           Needless to say, the Local  
18 Progress Board supports paid sick leave.  
19 More importantly, Local Progress now  
20 boasts a membership of over 200 local  
21 elected officials from across the  
22 country, and we continue to grow.

23           But some want you to believe  
24 that paid sick leave is an issue limited  
25 to Philadelphia and a few other cities.

2       They're wrong. Some want you to believe  
3       that we should wait for the state and/or  
4       federal legislatures to pass paid sick  
5       leave. They must be kidding.

6           That's why we call our group  
7       Local Progress, because we know that too  
8       many state and federal officials around  
9       this country are the enemies of  
10      working-class men and women. In many  
11      places, progressives are simply  
12      outnumbered. Here in Philadelphia we  
13      should not be. So we fight our battles  
14      on every level of government as we start  
15      close to home, where we hope to build  
16      multiple local victories together. We  
17      start locally in places where elected  
18      representatives are supposed to  
19      understand working-class values and  
20      working-class issues. This is where we  
21      start to build national movements,  
22      locally.

23           So today is when we allow other  
24      cities to see where Philadelphia stands  
25      in terms of working-class people. It's

2     time to stand tall, and it's not time to  
3     come up short. Progressives from around  
4     the country are watching this vote.  
5     Don't talk the talk unless you're willing  
6     to walk the walk.

7                   (Applause.)

8           COUNCILMAN GOODE: Don't say  
9     that you're for working-class people, but  
10    you're afraid to offend the business  
11    community. This vote counts for the  
12    people who need it the most. Most  
13    importantly, they're watching you right  
14    now.

15                   (Applause.)

16           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17    Thank you, Councilman.

18           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
19    Green.

20           COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
21    Mr. President. The City of Philadelphia  
22    has an unemployment rate of 10.6 percent,  
23    higher than any city just mentioned. It  
24    has one of the highest unemployment rates  
25    of any major city in the country. It has

2       one of the highest business tax rates of  
3       any city in the country, and one of only  
4       five cities that has a net income tax on  
5       businesses.

6           Philadelphia is doing  
7       everything it possibly can to prevent,  
8       when you combine all our policies, to  
9       prevent businesses from moving into the  
10      City and creating jobs. I am concerned  
11      about the health of the job market in  
12      creating jobs for those who most need it  
13      in this city, and so I will be voting no.

14           Thank you, Mr. President, and I  
15      urge my colleagues to do the same.

16           (Audience members booing.)

17           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18      Thank you, Councilman.

19           The Chair recognizes  
20      Councilwoman Bass.

21           COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
22      Mr. President. I believe that to  
23      everything, there is a season and a time  
24      for every purpose. Today this body faces  
25      a difficult decision. If the lobby from

2       each side is to be believed, today's vote  
3       on the paid sick leave bill pits the  
4       health of our citizens against the  
5       economic viability of their employment.  
6       This is a false choice.

7           When Councilman Greenlee  
8       approached me last year about sponsoring  
9       the paid sick leave bill, I agreed  
10      because I strongly believe in the  
11      principles behind the bill. To my  
12      frustration and disappointment, the bill  
13      went nowhere at that time.

14           Then came last year's budget.  
15      As we grappled with many issues facing  
16      our city, including the funding of our  
17      schools, the need for additional revenue  
18      was critical. Suggestions that were not  
19      even open for consideration in March were  
20      certainly options in late June, and as a  
21      result, increases in property taxes and  
22      the use and occupancy tax, or U&O tax,  
23      was implemented.

24           When the conversation with the  
25      sponsor was revisited this year, I

2       immediately told the sponsor that I  
3       thought this could be problematic for  
4       several reasons. Number one, less than  
5       six months before, we increased the U&O  
6       tax on businesses. Number two, now as a  
7       result of AVI, we are discussing new  
8       property assessments and the resulting  
9       tax bills. Many of the small businesses  
10      on my commercial corridors are seeing  
11      increases, some of which are quite  
12      significant. And, number three, along  
13      with those new assessments and bills,  
14      businesses in special service districts  
15      pay even more.

16                 We must consider legislation  
17      and examine all of its moving parts  
18      within the legislative and political  
19      context in which it fits. We must  
20      consider the global impact of all  
21      factors, and such consideration is  
22      particularly important now on the eve of  
23      another budget season.

24                 As I mentioned, I strongly  
25      believe in the goals of this bill. Our

1           3/14/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2    citizens should be able to take sick  
3    leave without fear of not being able to  
4    pay their rent or buy their groceries or  
5    being terminated from their employment.  
6    But I also believe, and I have to say,  
7    that I think that this bill is poorly  
8    timed.

9           I believe we can have paid sick  
10   leave. I believe that this bill can  
11   happen, but as I started out saying, I  
12   believe that to everything, there is a  
13   season and a time to every purpose, and  
14   this bill's poor timing is of great  
15   concern.

16           Thank you, Mr. President.

17           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18    Thank you.

19           (Audience members yelling.)

20           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold  
21    on, guys.

22           The Chair recognizes  
23    Councilwoman Sanchez.

24           COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
25    you, Mr. President. Just like AVI, this

1           3/14/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2    is about fairness.  Fairness happens in  
3    many different ways.  Just in a couple of  
4    minutes, the Mayor will come before us  
5    and present a budget and a five-year  
6    plan.  In that budget, there is \$90  
7    million in business tax cuts that my  
8    colleague Councilman Green and I  
9    instituted, business cuts to make the  
10   City more friendly to business.  The  
11   Mayor will also talk about his reductions  
12   on wage, which is something else that the  
13   business community has asked for.

14                 This should not be about  
15   short-term losers.  In fact, the AVI  
16   debate will demonstrate how businesses,  
17   particularly large businesses, will get  
18   millions in reductions while we ask our  
19   residents to pay millions more, all to  
20   get fairness.

21                 So this is not about short-term  
22   losers.  This is about the long game, and  
23   the long game for Philadelphia means that  
24   the 180,000 low-wage workers deserve  
25   their sick leave, and that's why I'm

2       voting for it.

3                   (Appause.)

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5       Thank you, Councilwoman.

6                   The Chair recognizes Councilman

7       Goode.

8                   COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,

9       Mr. President. I'll be brief. The

10      economic arguments against this bill

11      presented by Councilman Green and

12      Councilman Oh are simply false. They're

13      false because even as they cite reports

14      and studies and economists, they talk

15      about the job loss that is projected to

16      happen. Nowhere in any of those studies

17      and analysis does it talk about earned

18      sick leave. What it talks about in those

19      studies and analysis is the business tax

20      structure as a reason for why people are

21      leaving. There are other reasons why

22      businesses and people left the City.

23      None of it had to do with earned sick

24      leave. So those economic arguments are

25      false.

2                   Furthermore, as disclosed in  
3 the hearing, the Commerce Department and  
4 members of the Chamber of Commerce who  
5 served on the Jobs Commission never  
6 brought this issue to the Jobs  
7 Commission. When they raised it even  
8 slightly, the question is, how do you  
9 know? The answer was, we don't really  
10 know what's going to lose jobs. We're  
11 just saying that we are afraid that we  
12 might lose jobs.

13                   So how do you examine whether  
14 you might lose jobs or not? You look at  
15 San Francisco, you look at Washington,  
16 DC, you look at the state of Connecticut,  
17 you look at places where it's been  
18 implemented and see what has happened  
19 there. Otherwise, you're talking about  
20 economic philosophy, which if you want to  
21 be a conservative, be a conservative, but  
22 if you say you're progressive, if you say  
23 you're for working-class people, then  
24 vote for working-class people.

25                   (Applause.)

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you, Councilman.

4                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
5 Greenlee.

6                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
7 you, Mr. President. I don't want to go  
8 back and forth on this, but I have to  
9 respond to a couple things, and  
10 Councilman Goode I think touched on a  
11 couple of them, so I'll try to be real  
12 brief.

13                   I think Councilwoman Bass is  
14 right. It shouldn't have to be a choice.  
15 And it doesn't have to be a choice. It  
16 doesn't -- we shouldn't have to choose  
17 between jobs and giving fair benefits.  
18 What we're saying, and we think the other  
19 cities have shown, that you can do both,  
20 and in the end, it actually is good for  
21 businesses, if they would just take the  
22 time to look at the research and come in  
23 with some kind of open eye.

24                   And I also will say one thing  
25 also about timing, and I think somebody

2       else -- another member might want to talk  
3       about it too, that it said that this  
4       isn't the right time. Well, I would tend  
5       to agree. We should have done it a heck  
6       of a long time ago.

7           (Applause.)

8           COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: And,  
9       frankly, I held this bill up out of  
10      respect for the six new members, because  
11      there was a whole lot going on last year.  
12      I wanted to get the information out. I  
13      didn't want to push too much on them, and  
14      now I'm hearing we should have done it  
15      earlier. Well, you know, you can't  
16      please everybody.

17           But, again, I think if you look  
18      at the facts, if you look at other  
19      cities -- and I refuse to say what other  
20      people seem to want to say, that we can't  
21      do what other cities can do. We're as  
22      good as these other cities.

23           (Applause.)

24           COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: We don't  
25      have anything to apologize for. Why do

1           3/14/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2       we have to keep apologizing? Why does  
3       the Commerce Director have to keep  
4       apologizing and the Chamber have to  
5       apologize? I'm not apologizing to  
6       anybody. I'm proud of this city.

7                        (Applause.)

8                        COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: And I'm  
9       proud of the workers in this city,  
10      whether they're unionized or not, because  
11      they're good people and they work hard  
12      and they deserve the right benefits. And  
13      it's time --

14                       (Applause.)

15                       COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: And it's  
16      time to do the right thing.

17                       Thank you, Mr. President.

18                       (Applause.)

19                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20      Thank you.

21                       The Chair recognizes Councilman  
22      Jones.

23                       COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
24      Mr. President. I'll be brief. I really  
25      didn't want to speak on this bill, but I

2       will. You got to know that I have Henry  
3       Nicholas sitting right behind me,  
4       President of 1199C.

5                       (Applause.)

6                       COUNCILMAN JONES: There is  
7       nobody in this room can accuse me of not  
8       being friendly to business. I have  
9       been -- I've funded more businesses in  
10      the City of Philadelphia than most.  
11      However, throughout the history of this  
12      nation, those that are of a fearful heart  
13      would have stopped us from ever passing a  
14      minimum wage law, they would have fought  
15      against child labor in the workplace,  
16      we'd have never had Social Security, we'd  
17      have never had job security for the armed  
18      forces. Those who go away and come back  
19      fighting for our freedoms would have  
20      never had their jobs secured.

21                      We cannot be afraid of pushing  
22      the needle in the right direction for  
23      humanity. We will be judged, we will be  
24      judged, we will be judged not by what we  
25      do for the strongest of us but what we do

2       for the weakest of us.

3                   (Applause.)

4                   COUNCILMAN JONES:   And I know  
5       this labors hard on my colleagues,  
6       because they're good people, but at the  
7       end of the day, we better do the right  
8       thing.

9                   Thank you, Mr. President.

10                   (Applause.)

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
12       Thank you, Councilman.

13                   The Chair recognizes  
14       Councilwoman Tasco.

15                   COUNCILWOMAN TASCO:   I will be  
16       very, very brief.   I've been here a long  
17       time, and we've passed legislation in  
18       this Chamber addressing many, many  
19       community issues in this city.   I  
20       remember when we did the liquor by the  
21       drink, everybody was going to Montgomery  
22       County, Bucks County, Delaware County to  
23       drink.   Haven't heard any more about it.  
24       They didn't go to drink.   They still  
25       drinking in Philadelphia.

2                   When we did the smoking bill,  
3 everybody was going to go to Montgomery  
4 County, Delaware County so they can smoke  
5 in the restaurants. They didn't go.  
6 Matter of fact, the restaurants in those  
7 counties, most of them passed an  
8 anti-smoking bill.

9                   So, you know, every time we  
10 have to deal with something that seems to  
11 pit one group against the other, it's  
12 doom and gloom and the City is going to  
13 die. We have a wonderful city. All we  
14 have to do is work together, bringing all  
15 forces together so that we make this city  
16 a great city where people want to come,  
17 do business and work, and we do have a  
18 lot to offer, including good people who  
19 want to work and have a sick leave bill.

20                   Thank you.

21                   (Applause.)

22                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilwoman.

24                   The Chair recognizes Councilman

25 Oh.

1           3/14/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
3 much, Mr. President.

4           (Audience members booing.)

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Come  
6 on, guys. Guys, come on.

7           Councilman, go ahead.

8           COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
9 much. We are all going to vote our  
10 conscience. The issue is going to be  
11 whether or not we are going to create  
12 more jobs, we're going to lose more jobs,  
13 and ultimately perhaps we don't know the  
14 answer to that.

15          (Audience members booing.)

16          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold  
17 on. Folks, time out. Everybody deserves  
18 the right to have a different opinion.  
19 So I just ask you let him respect the  
20 statements and then we're going to have a  
21 vote up or down. Folks.

22          Councilman, please.

23          COUNCILMAN OH: We have had  
24 witnesses come forward and those  
25 witnesses have testified. The witnesses

2 who testify as employees talk about the  
3 need for sick paid days, and they testify  
4 honestly. We have employers who testify  
5 and they testify that with the sick pay  
6 bill now that it will jeopardize  
7 employment and the future of jobs in the  
8 City. They are supported by the  
9 declining number of jobs in this city for  
10 low-wage jobs for people with less  
11 capabilities, and we need to have those  
12 jobs. So with that, I will be voting no.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you.

16 (Audience members booing.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Excuse me. The Chair recognizes  
19 Councilman Green.

20 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
21 Mr. President. The City of San Francisco  
22 has an unemployment rate three or four  
23 points lower than ours. Their median  
24 income is \$73,000 a year. Our median  
25 income is \$37,000 a year. We are not

1           3/14/13 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2       comparable to San Francisco. They are  
3       growing their job base every year. We  
4       are shrinking our job base by four or  
5       five thousand people every year. The  
6       same can be said of states like  
7       Connecticut in terms of similar  
8       comparisons.

9           The point here, Mr. President,  
10       is very simple. If we want to help our  
11       unemployed, the 10.6 percent of people  
12       who are registered as unemployed, or the  
13       over 20 percent of people who are under  
14       and unemployed, then we need to create a  
15       regulatory environment that is good for  
16       business. I will be voting no on this  
17       bill and I ask my colleagues to do the  
18       same.

19           Thank you.

20           (Audience members yelling.)

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22       Okay. There are no other speeches at  
23       this time.

24           Mr. Decker, I'm going to start  
25       over. Please read the title of the bill.

2 CHIEF CLERK: Bill No. 130004,  
3 entitled "An ordinance enacting a new  
4 Chapter 9-3300, entitled 'Promoting  
5 Healthy Families and Workplaces,' to

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
9 Thank you.

10 This bill having been read on  
11 two separate days, the question is shall  
12 the bill pass finally.

13 Mr. Decker, please call the  
14 roll.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman  
16 Bass.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Aye.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman  
19 Blackwell.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Aye.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Goode.

22 COUNCILMAN GOODE: Aye.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Green.

24 COUNCILMAN GREEN: No.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

2 Greenlee.

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Aye.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Henon.

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Aye.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

7 Johnson.

8 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Aye.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones.

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Aye.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

12 Kenney.

13 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: No.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

15 O'Brien.

16 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: No.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

18 O'Neill.

19 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: No.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Oh.

21 COUNCILMAN OH: No.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

23 Quinones-Sanchez.

24 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Aye.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

2 Reynolds Brown.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Aye.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

5 Squilla.

6 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: No.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

8 Tasco.

9 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Aye.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Council President

11 Clarke.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

15 ayes are 11; the nays are six. This

16 bill --

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Folks, hold on. Hold on. Folks, hold

20 on. I have to make it official. Hold

21 on.

22 A majority of all members

23 having voted in the affirmative, the bill

24 passes.

25 (Applause.)

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3       Mr. Decker -- folks, we have some more  
4       business.

5                   Mr. Decker, do you have any  
6       additional resolutions?

7                   CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
8       calling for the City Council Committee on  
9       Public Property to hold hearings  
10      exploring the economic benefits of the  
11      City selling or more fully capitalizing  
12      certain municipal assets including  
13      selling surplus property and aggressively  
14      capitalizing revenue-generating  
15      facilities, introduced by Councilman  
16      Henon and Council President Clarke.

17                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18      Thank you.

19                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
20      Henon for a motion.

21                   COUNCILMAN HENON: I move for  
22      the adoption of the resolution.

23                   (Duly seconded.)

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
25      been moved and properly seconded.

1           3/14/13 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           All those in favor?

3           (Aye.)

4           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6           (No response.)

7           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
8 ayes have it. That resolution is  
9 adopted.

10           CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution  
11 Recognizing and Congratulating the 2013  
12 Next Generation of Leaders: Rising  
13 Stars, introduced by Councilwoman  
14 Reynolds Brown.

15           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
16 Mr. President. I move for the --

17           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
18 Chair recognizes --

19           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: I thank  
20 you. I move for the adoption.

21           (Duly seconded.)

22           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
23 been moved and properly seconded.

24           All those in favor?

25           (Aye.)

2           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Those opposed?

4           (No response.)

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6 ayes have it. The resolution is adopted.

7           CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution  
8 honoring and recognizing Philadelphia's  
9 self-made Light Heavyweight Boxing  
10 Champion Bernard Hopkins, also known as  
11 "The Executioner," for establishing a new  
12 world record by winning the International  
13 Boxing Federation Light Heavyweight  
14 Championship title and for being an  
15 exemplary role model by overcoming  
16 numerous barriers to achieve success and  
17 for demonstrating to all Philadelphians  
18 the remarkable benefits of physical  
19 fitness and a healthy lifestyle,  
20 introduced by Councilman Jones.

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
