17 much that you decide to come back. So,
18 again, I want to thank you. It's a
19 pleasure to have you here, and come
20 again. Thank you.

21 At this time, the Chair
22 recognizes Councilwoman Sanchez, who will
23 present a resolution recognizing The
24 Philadelphia Latino Pageant on the
25 occasion of its 10th Anniversary. Would

5 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Good
6 morning.

7 (Good morning.)

8 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I'm
9 honored today to recognize The
10 Philadelphia Latino Pageant on its 10th
11 Anniversary. The Latino Pageant is not
12 just a pageant. It is a group of
13 volunteers, parents, and community
14 members who have come together to provide
15 a very unique experience for the young
16 and the not so young in a process that is
17 so critical as we debate this whole
18 education situation in this city. It is
19 about giving young people hope,
20 aspirations, confidence in a setting that
21 is safe and nurturing for all of them.

22 I congratulate the volunteers
23 who meet at one of our recreation
24 centers, at Ramonita Rivera Center,
25 weekly as they select these young people.

2 But it's not just a pageant where
3 everyone is a winner. It is a pageant
4 that also provides them with an
5 opportunity to travel to Puerto Rico,
6 where these young people serve as
7 ambassadors to Philadelphia. They
8 travel. They get well received all over
9 Puerto Rico, Philadelphia, and the
10 region.

11 And what's most important about
12 this is that part of the requirement is
13 not just academic success, but it's
14 hundreds of hours and volunteer work in
15 the community, whether it's the Susan G.
16 Komen or the cleanups in the community.
17 Enid Colon and her group do a tremendous
18 job at instilling community pride and
19 values in all of the participants.

20 And so with that, it is my
21 honor to present this recognition.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
23 founded in 2003 by Ms. Enid Colon, The
24 Philadelphia Latino Pageants is a youth
25 program that began as community dance

3 of the largest programs for Latino youth
4 in the City of Philadelphia; and

5 Whereas, Enid Colon is a native
6 of Puerto Rico, who has always been
7 devoted to supporting and working for her
8 community. Enid came to Philadelphia in
9 2002, where she began teaching dance
10 classes free of charge to youth in her
11 community, which became so popular and
12 well known, that she formally founded The
13 Philadelphia Latino Pageants:
14 Miss Latina and Mr. Latino; and

15 Whereas, The Philadelphia
16 Latino Pageants have always maintained
17 themselves as icons for community service
18 and academic excellence, and would
19 provide youth in the Latino community
20 with a positive outlet for creative
21 expression and demonstration of their
22 talents; and

23 Whereas, The Philadelphia
24 Latino Pageants continue to attract youth
25 from around the Delaware Valley Area, and

3 support the large number of young people
4 who are involved in the program; and

5 Whereas, at this year's
6 celebration, The Philadelphia Latino
7 Pageants will include National Costumes,
8 an Evening Wear Competition, and a Final
9 Coronation, and has drawn prestigious
10 guests including the Honorable Mayor Jose
11 Guillermo Rodriguez of Mayaguez, Puerto
12 Rico; and

13 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
14 The Philadelphia Latino Pageant
15 celebrated its 10th Anniversary on
16 Saturday, April 5th, 2013 with the
17 selection of Miss Latina and Mr. Latino.
18 Now, therefore be it

19 Resolved, that the Council of
20 the City of Philadelphia, hereby
21 recognizes and honors The Philadelphia
22 Latino Pageant for its contribution to
23 the arts and culture and our youth in the
24 Latino community. We offer you our
25 sincerest congratulations on this

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair recognizes Ms. Colon for remarks.

14 MS. COLON: Good morning. I
15 would like to thank every one of you guys
16 for having us here today. It means the
17 world to us that City Council is
18 recognizing our job. We do it out of the
19 bottom of our hearts, and it's been a
20 very hard way, because we're working with
21 mostly low-income families that don't
22 have opportunities like traveling to
23 Puerto Rico and encountering their roots.

24 Our program is more like an
25 educational program. It's not about

3 knowing that with the crown comes
4 responsibility and that they all have to
5 have a community service project to do
6 during their year of reign. Most of
7 these participants stayed with us since
8 the beginning. We have Mrs. Nancy Watts
9 that has been with us since 2003, and
10 year after year they come out, they
11 support the new ones coming in. They
12 help them in their community services
13 projects, and they stay focused on doing
14 good and serving our community, which is
15 what's really important.

16 I want to take this time to
17 thank our Councilwoman, Maria Quinones.
18 She has been our godmother. She has been
19 so great to us. None of the stuff that
20 we do would have been possible without
21 the collaboration of sponsors and people
22 like Maria that do care about the young
23 in the community and help us out with
24 different aspects of not only
25 economically but helping us get to know

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: We are
4 joined today by Ms. Jones, Regina Jones,
5 who is an assistant at Ad Prima Charter
6 School; the parents, Carmella and Richard
7 McDowell; by Mrs. Brown, who is also with
8 the parents; Waadeah Floyd, who all of
9 you know. She's my Executive Assistant,
10 a Board member at Ad Prima, and President
11 of Parents Association. We acknowledge
12 that their principal is out sick and
13 would be here today, and I'd like to
14 acknowledge her because she came out of
15 retirement to be the principal at Ad
16 Prima. Her name is Patricia
17 Brooks-Bantom, and she happens to be my
18 sister.

19 Resolution calling on the City
20 Council of Philadelphia -- oh, I forgot.
21 Not only did I not mention, I've got to
22 mention Ravin and I have to mention her
23 brother, and his name is Ramine. So, you
24 know, we've got to acknowledge both
25 members of this wonderful family.

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2 Resolution calling on the City
3 Council of Philadelphia to recognize
4 nine-year-old Ravin McDowell for her
5 humility and unselfish nature as she
6 exemplifies and demonstrates the

12 where she succeeds well in her studies;

17 Wright's Taekwondo School in West
18 Philadelphia; and

19 Whereas, for her most recent
20 birthday, Ravin put forth the idea
21 instead of receiving gifts, she would
22 collect them and give them to others; and

23 Whereas, Ravin bequeathed her
24 gifts to the caregivers of babies born to
25 incarcerated mothers; and

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2 Whereas, Ravin's humility and
3 unselfishness inspired her family,
4 friends, and peers and neighbors to
5 assist with her mission; and

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, as
7 a result of Ravin's efforts, a
8 significant amount of items were gathered
9 and given to multiple organizations who
10 assist those in need;

11 Whereas, Ravin believes it's up
12 to all of us to give to others that may
13 need things; and

14 Whereas, Ravin has made her
15 entire family proud of her and inspired
16 her neighborhood; and

17 Whereas, Ravin's actions
18 demonstrate how small hearts can have
19 huge impacts; now therefore, be it

20 Resolved, that the City of
21 Philadelphia City Council, to recognize
22 nine-year-old Ravin McDowell for her
23 humanity and unselfish nature as she
24 exemplifies and demonstrates the

18 Prima ran with it. My jobs ran with it,
19 and we were just excited how it just
20 overwhelmingly moved people's hearts and
21 everyone wanted to participate in such a,
22 we thought, was a small event to turn
23 into such a big prestigious award for
24 her.

25 So we're pretty thankful. I'm

9 Also an ordinance authorizing
10 the revision of lines and grades on a
11 portion on City Plan No. 319 by striking
12 from the City Plan and vacating the
13 legally open portion of Pennway Street
14 from Rhawn Street to a point
15 approximately five-hundred fifty feet
16 southwestwardly therefrom; and

17 An ordinance amending Section
18 9-212 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled
19 "Newsstands," including by revising the
20 requirements relating to license
21 issuance; location of newsstands; design

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 ayes have it. That resolution is
24 adopted.

25 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you.

18 The Chair now recognizes
19 Councilman Henon for a motion that

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: So moved,
23 Mr. President.

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It

3 All those in favor signify by

5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 ayes have it. A majority of all members
11 having voted in the affirmative, the
12 motion carries and the vote by which Bill
13 No. 120775-A was passed has been
14 reconsidered.

15 The Chair again recognizes
16 Councilman Henon.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. I offer an amendment to
19 Bill No. 120775-A. A copy of the
20 amendment has been circulated to all
21 members of Council, and I move the
22 adoption of the amendment.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you. It has been moved and

4 All those in favor say aye.

5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Those opposed?

8 (No response.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 ayes have it. This bill will be placed
11 on the Final Passage Calendar for our
12 next session of Council.

13 Now we get the speeches on the
14 part of the minority.

15 The Chair recognizes Councilman
16 O'Brien.

17 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. Two weeks ago I
19 introduced a resolution about focused
20 deterrence. Just in the last 14 days,
21 there had been over 1,300 violent crimes
22 reported to the Philadelphia Police
23 Department. This includes nine
24 homicides, 130 gun robberies, and 95
25 aggravated assaults with a gun. Since

2 the new year, we've had 85 families lose
3 a loved one to violence.

4 The good news is that our
5 violent crime numbers are trending in the
6 right direction compared to this time
7 last year, but I think we can do better
8 and I think the focused deterrence
9 strategy can help us do better.

10 Thank you, Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 The Chair now recognizes
14 Councilwoman Tasco.

15 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you,
16 Mr. President. I'd just like to make
17 two -- I have a comment and then I have
18 comments about something else.

19 I'd like to just first thank
20 the residents of the 9th District who
21 live in the 10th and 50th Wards for
22 coming out last night to Reformation
23 Church to meet our new police captain of
24 the 14th District. We had over 500
25 people, and it was well -- he handled it

2 very well, let the voters know, the
3 residents know, that he had worked in
4 that area before and really had his
5 finger on the pulse of what was happening
6 in the community. Out of the 500 people
7 who came, only eight people had
8 questions. So we are doing a pretty good
9 job up there in the 14th Police District.
10 So I want to thank my colleagues, State
11 Representative Cherelle Parker and State
12 Representative Dwight Evans. We all
13 participated in that town meeting.

14 Slick, misleading, dishonest
15 are just a few words that I would like to
16 use to describe a recent letter that I,
17 members of Council, and the media
18 received on Tuesday from a Harrisburg
19 lobbying firm on behalf of the
20 Pennsylvania Consumer Credit Association.
21 The letter states that this organization
22 supports my resolution opposing new
23 efforts in Harrisburg to legalize
24 predatory small-dollar lending, commonly
25 known as payday lending in Pennsylvania.

2 However, the letter then tries to assert
3 that I support short-term lending reform
4 in Harrisburg. Nothing could be further
5 from the truth.

6 To my fellow Councilmembers,
7 the Pennsylvania General Assembly, the
8 media and, most importantly, the
9 Pennsylvania Consumer Credit Association,
10 I am strongly opposed to the legalization
11 of predatory payday lending in
12 Pennsylvania. No matter what you call
13 it, short-term lending, small-dollar
14 lending or micro credit, it is all
15 predatory payday lending that causes
16 financial harm to borrowers, leading to
17 overdrafts on bank accounts, defaults on
18 other bills, and even bankruptcy, and
19 these loans negatively impact
20 Philadelphia and the Commonwealth by
21 draining nearly \$1 billion a year in
22 economic activity and increasing usage of
23 food assistance benefits and charitable
24 relief services.

25 To my colleagues in Harrisburg,

2 don't be fooled into co-sponsoring or
3 supporting legislation that calls for
4 short-term lending reform or micro credit
5 modernization. If you support these
6 efforts, you will be opposing your
7 constituents and the over 90
8 organizations from across Pennsylvania
9 that oppose the legalization of payday
10 lending in Pennsylvania. Don't be fooled
11 by the slick, misleading, and dishonest
12 efforts of predatory payday lenders.

13 Thank you very much.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilwoman.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Jones.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. Very quickly, two
20 announcements. One, we are co-partnering
21 with 6ABC at 4100 City Avenue to talk
22 about the often confused, very much
23 maligned AVI process as it relates to
24 small businesses. So all are welcome to
25 attend, particularly those in the small

2 business and commercial property owners,
3 but anyone with a question is welcome to
4 come out.

5 And the second announcement is
6 that along with Councilwoman Blackwell
7 and District Attorney Seth Williams, we
8 will be doing a walk tomorrow starting at
9 52nd and Girard at 6:00 p.m. over to --
10 from the 3rd District to the 4th District
11 along Lansdowne Avenue to look at and
12 talk to individuals who are dealing
13 directly on boots on the ground with
14 crime issues, and we encourage all of you
15 to come out, particularly my at-large
16 colleagues, to join us in that walk and
17 hear it firsthand from the people.

18 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Greenlee.

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
24 you, Mr. President. Just a very quick
25 announcement. Right after Council, there

2 will be a demonstration by Philadelphia
3 Fight of the pop-up mobile computer lab
4 units, which can be used by constituents
5 and community groups all over the City.
6 I think it's valuable information for all
7 of us. Council and staff are invited.
8 And if the issue itself doesn't get you,
9 there's a lunch by DiBruno Brothers being
10 provided, so please try to attend.

11 Thank you, Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 The Chair recognizes
15 Councilwoman Sanchez.

16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
17 you, Mr. President. I'm very encouraged
18 by the student-led demonstrations that
19 are taking place throughout the City as
20 we debate the funding for schools and our
21 system this year. My very own son,
22 Tomasito, who attends Central High
23 School, every single day asks me what
24 we're doing. And sometimes we are not
25 good at telling the story.

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2 Colleagues, let us not waste
3 this opportunity to educate folks on the
4 hard work and the heavy lifting that this
5 Council has done year after year after
6 year. We've demonstrated our commitment
7 to public education, and I encourage the
8 young people and the parents to become
9 informed of what has happened in the last
10 few years.

11 Last week I participated with
12 my Council colleague David Oh on a panel
13 to talk about taxes, led by Temple
14 University and the Pew's Foundation.
15 There's wide agreement that it is
16 important that AVI happen and that this
17 shift that will happen as a result of it,
18 this historic shift of the burden being
19 placed on our residents versus
20 commercial, what it means for the future
21 of this city as we debate tax policies.

22 Councilman Goode often reminds
23 us of the millions of dollars in business
24 tax reductions that we've provided to the
25 City's businesses and our unwavering

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2 commitment to provide businesses a better
3 competitive environment.

4 As we discuss and some of us
5 will say debate the issues of the
6 resources, whether it's advertising as
7 you've proposed, Mr. President, liquor by
8 the drink, the cigarette tax or U&O, let
9 no one be confused, as my Council
10 colleague Blondell Reynolds Brown
11 outlined and articulated last week, let
12 there be no confusion about our
13 commitment to public education, but this
14 one is going to be about a shared
15 sacrifice. The state has to do its part
16 as the City has always done, and there
17 will be a need to have a discussion with
18 our unions. I welcome this debate. I
19 think we should all encourage our parents
20 and our students to be part of this
21 process as we debate long term what we do
22 about public education.

23 My colleague Councilman Oh asks
24 for accountability. I think it is all of
25 our responsibilities to ask for

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2 accountability for everyone that is at
3 the table.

4 I look forward to your
5 leadership, and be rest assured that I
6 believe this Council will do what it has
7 done in at least the six years that I've
8 been here, is figure out a win-win for
9 everyone. Our kids will not be
10 sacrificed in that process.

11 Thank you very much,
12 Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you, Councilwoman.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you so much.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Blackwell.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
21 you, Mr. President.

22 I was listening to the radio
23 this morning and heard the news
24 announcement talking about the
25 Controller's report saying that

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2 minorities and the poor are unduly
3 singled out in this whole AVI issue. It
4 also talked about the fact that the
5 Controller ask that we hold up doing any
6 actions. And I started to, before that,
7 to do a resolution today, but opted in
8 the spirit of unity not to do that. But
9 this is a very tough issue. Certainly we
10 know our schools need more, but we know
11 people can't afford more taxes. So
12 obviously those are two opposite ends of
13 the spectrum.

14 But we say that this is a very
15 tough issue, one that concerns us
16 greatly. There's not one single way to
17 solve it. And so I applaud my colleagues
18 who realize this is a tough issue and we
19 can't go blindly into it one way or the
20 other, but we have to work hard to get
21 past all of this somehow before our
22 budget season ends.

23 Thank you, Mr. President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Councilwoman.

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2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Green.

4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. I think it's useful in
6 the context of discussing education and
7 the School District and the School Reform
8 Commission that we take a second and
9 remember how we got here.

10 For the five years I've been in
11 Council, I've questioned the expenditures
12 and priorities of the School District.
13 Let's not forget that five years ago,
14 four years ago, the budget of the School
15 District was over \$3 billion. They were
16 getting \$400 million a year in federal
17 funding and they had 300 million a year
18 in funding that came from Governor
19 Rendell every single year. We're now
20 looking at actual revenue of 2.3 billion
21 versus budgets that used to be over \$3
22 billion just a short time ago. That
23 money and those resources, which was said
24 here in this body and questions were
25 asked of the SRC and of the former

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2 Superintendent about the squandering of
3 that money. Over a billion dollars was
4 wasted on programs that are not
5 sustainable, that were identified as not
6 sustainable without future federal and
7 state funding at the time, and that money
8 is now gone forever.

9 So it is irresponsible and
10 profligate spending by the SRC and the
11 Superintendents during my tenure in City
12 Council that has gotten us where we are.
13 It is not City Council -- and, of course,
14 it is the decision by Governor Corbett
15 and the State Legislature to cut state
16 funding. But we knew the federal funding
17 was going to be cut and we didn't plan
18 for it. We spent it. We didn't save it.

19 So I think it's important to
20 remember that the issue is far more
21 complicated than throwing more money at
22 the School District. The question is, as
23 I asked in my most recent paper on the
24 School District, is the District too big
25 to succeed. No strategic plan has been

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2 introduced that inspires anything more
3 than a vision of the SRC with their
4 fingers in the dike. It proposes
5 marginal and incremental change and not
6 transformative change, continuing to
7 condemn tens of thousands of students
8 every year to proficiency below 40
9 percent. Many will end up in our penal
10 system. No case has been made that
11 outcomes will be significantly better or
12 worse with or without the \$60 million
13 requested from the City. The problem is
14 that the School District requires 120
15 million more from the state, which they
16 won't get, and 100 million more in
17 concessions from the unions, which has
18 been budgeted for years and never been
19 achieved. The SRC spent 300 million more
20 than they took in last year, and we are
21 on track to do it again. They
22 requested -- their budget is 2.6 and
23 their revenue is 2.3.

24 It is irresponsible -- it was
25 irresponsible last year, and it's not

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2 sustainable. But the SRC, current and
3 former, put us here by presenting
4 unrealistic and Pollyanna budgets that
5 are not achievable. They are still doing
6 so.

7 When they present a realistic
8 budget that balances income and
9 expenditures, then I think we should talk
10 about trying to help them, because then
11 we'll understand where the \$60 million
12 will go and what impact it will have.

13 Thank you, Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilman.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Johnson.

18 (Audience member talking out.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Ma'am, ma'am, we had public comment time.

21 I ask you to please...

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

23 Mr. President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, sir.

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2 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: I'm an
3 advocate to figure out a way we support
4 our students in the Philadelphia public
5 school system, no matter what it takes to
6 get there. So I'll state that for the
7 record. Because as we debate in here, as
8 Councilmembers and those on the State
9 Legislature decide to participate or not
10 participate, the reality is we have a lot
11 of young people that live in urban
12 poverty areas throughout the City of
13 Philadelphia who will be significantly
14 impacted based upon the decisions that we
15 make, rather you agree with it or not.
16 So I'm a strong advocate of making sure
17 that however we go about it, we find a
18 way to support our young people. And we
19 can debate for days how we got here, but
20 the reality is we got to all be on the
21 same page and supporting our young people
22 moving forward, because ultimately
23 they're the ones who are going to get
24 caught up in the cross hairs. And I say
25 that sincerely, because a lot of us

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2 either -- some of us have kids in the
3 public school system, but the reality is
4 a lot of us don't. In an ideal world, I
5 would introduce a bill, if I could --
6 somebody told me it would be illegal for
7 me to do it -- to make sure that every
8 elected official had children and
9 teachers in the public school system, and
10 then I will want to see what type of
11 debate we will have.

12 But nevertheless, I'm an
13 advocate for trying to figure out a way,
14 however we get there, to support our
15 young people in our public schools.

16 I hosted last night an AVI
17 meeting for the sake of making sure I
18 inform my constituents on the relief
19 measures that have been introduced as it
20 relates to AVI and answer some of their
21 questions to the best of my ability, and
22 I still want to make sure that -- as a
23 Council body, obviously we did a report
24 that shows that some of us will be
25 getting a decrease and a few of us will

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2 be significantly impacted, but when we
3 all became Councilpeople, we didn't only
4 take an oath for our district, we took an
5 oath for the residents of the City of
6 Philadelphia. And so for everyone to
7 keep that in mind as we address this
8 issue of AVI, that, yes, some of our
9 residents will have a significantly
10 grave, negative impact as it relates to
11 AVI and to keep that out in the forefront
12 as we go and debate this process.

13 We're at competing interests on
14 what's accurate, what's inaccurate. I
15 don't have any faith in the system just
16 based upon how there's a lack in
17 transparency in the Administration
18 actually staying out on the front line.
19 I'm a Councilperson defending a policy
20 that's not even mine, but I don't have a
21 problem going out there and letting the
22 constituents know where I stand on the
23 issue.

24 I met a young lady last night
25 who lives in a low-income affordable

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2 housing unit, and under the affordable
3 housing unit, you can't sell your home
4 over a certain period of time. And the
5 home that she has has been significantly
6 assessed at a higher value that she won't
7 be able to pay when that time limit is
8 up. So her time limit, within the next
9 two years, she will have the option to
10 either pay down on a new property tax
11 assessment or sell her home. And she
12 pretty much basically responded and said
13 that, You basically encouraged me to move
14 into these neighborhoods as a first-time
15 home buyer and now I'm being kicked out.
16 That's like a realistic situation that
17 we're dealing with, not numbers, not
18 semantics back and forth debating, but
19 real people that we're dealing with.

20 And so I just wanted to put a
21 human face on these issues that we're
22 dealing with, and also the lack of
23 respect that I was told last night on how
24 OPA responds to constituents regarding
25 the first-level review, not when they

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2 called the office, when they were
3 actually hosting the workshop meetings in
4 my district. And I wish they would have
5 brought that to my attention prior to us
6 coming down here having these budget
7 hearings so I could address it
8 straight -- address it at that particular
9 time.

10 And so I just wanted to put
11 that issue out there. I will
12 aggressively and continue to advocate in
13 trying to figure out how we best protect
14 those citizens, but I'm also calling on
15 all our colleagues who participate in
16 this body to make sure that people as a
17 whole have faith in this body to be
18 supportive overall of those individuals
19 who will be significantly impacted if we
20 move forward with AVI.

21 Thank you very much, Council
22 President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 The Chair recognizes

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2 Councilwoman Tasco.

3 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you.

4 I'll be brief, Mr. President. Sort of
5 piggybacking a little bit on Councilman
6 Green.

7 Having been here for a number
8 of years and every year having to address
9 the issues of the School District, not
10 enough money for this, particularly we
11 had the whole issue with books, it seems
12 that we find a Band-Aid, we put a
13 Band-Aid on the problem. And what we'll
14 do this year we'll do, but in the interim
15 between now and the next budget, what is
16 the action plan. And what we need to do
17 is figure out what the action plan will
18 be, working with the SRC and the School
19 District and our state legislators to
20 come up with some plan for how we're
21 going to have some dedicated funding for
22 the School District and not every year
23 have to fight for whether we're going to
24 do liquor by the drink or raise someone's
25 taxes. Last year we were in a mess. We

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2 raised taxes. Here we are this year
3 we're in a mess. We're going to look at
4 liquor by the drink.

5 We need to stop and figure out
6 in the interim how we're going to address
7 the issue of the School District, and I
8 think that the Council should take a lead
9 on that and that we call everybody to the
10 table, not next year in May when we're
11 doing the budget, but beginning the
12 moment we complete this budget cycle.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilwoman.

16 That concludes our speeches.

17 The Chair now recognizes Councilwoman
18 Brown for a motion to adjourn.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN:

20 Mr. President, I wish I could say that
21 that does conclude our speeches, but I
22 cannot, and there are not -- I mean, arts
23 and culture, advocacy for women, people
24 of color, doing better for the small
25 business community rank high on my list,

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2 but nothing ranks higher for me than this
3 issue around every child getting a fair
4 shot. And the beauty about this process
5 is that we work in a legislative body
6 where we can agree without being
7 disagreeable. So I would be remiss not
8 to go on the record and offer a friendly
9 rebuttal to my friend Councilman Bill
10 Green.

11 Now, I live and work in a world
12 or at least I learned very early on -- I
13 was a graduate in graduate school -- and
14 I read this book Move Ahead With
15 Possibility Thinking, and I've approached
16 most of what I do with that mindset. So
17 I'm going to bore a few and shed the
18 light on a few others about why it
19 behooves us to move ahead with this
20 debate and be what I call a possibility
21 thinker.

22 Reverend Robert Schuller wrote,
23 and I quote, "Possibility thinkers
24 resemble the hummingbird that look for
25 and find honey often in the most

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2 unlikely, unthinkable places.

3 Possibility thinkers perceptively probe
4 every problem and proposal and
5 opportunity to discover the positive
6 aspects present in almost every human
7 situation.

8 "Impossibility thinkers make
9 sweeping passes over a proposed idea,
10 scanning it with a negative eye, looking
11 for what might be the distasteful
12 aspects. Impossibility thinkers look for
13 reasons why something won't work instead
14 of visualizing ways in which it could
15 work. So they are inclined to say not
16 possible, maybe, no to a proposal, never
17 giving the idea a fair hearing."

18 Now, we can't dispute what we
19 know about the School District in years
20 past, but at the end of the day, we have
21 a duty to figure it out. And so this is
22 why we need to figure it out.

23 Young people are going to carry
24 on what we've started. They're going to
25 sit where we're sitting and, when we are

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2 gone, attend to those things we thought
3 were important. We may adopt all the
4 policies we please, but how they will be
5 carried out will depend on them.

6 They're going to move in and
7 take your seat, my seat, Councilman
8 Jones' seat, Councilman Kenney's seat,
9 Jannie's seat. They're going to move in
10 and control the cities, the states, and
11 the nation. They're going to move in and
12 take over our churches, our schools, our
13 universities, and our corporations. All
14 of our books are going to be judged,
15 praised or condemned by them.

16 So ultimately what we do for
17 them now drives to set the stage about
18 what they're going to do for us later.
19 So I am of the view that we need to
20 figure it out. And so just as I've
21 extended an invitation to the Governor to
22 come down here and shadow schools in our
23 district, I'm going to offer a friendly
24 invitation to my colleague Councilman
25 Green.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Join us in
4 a school to shadow a student that does
5 not have arts and sports and counselors.
6 I mean, there are young people across
7 this city who are desperate to have a
8 half hour for a high school counselor so
9 they can figure out what they're going to
10 do about the college education, the
11 college application process. It is
12 intimidating. And we have young people
13 who will never, ever get a fair sit-down
14 with a high school counselor, because
15 they got 500 kids on their caseload.

16 We need to figure it out.

17 And so I'm offering everybody
18 in here as I transition and get off my
19 soapbox --

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Councilwoman, I'm actually -- because you
22 initiated this speech prior to your call
23 for a motion, I'm going to have to pull
24 back that motion, because we do have a
25 rebuttal to your speech. So we'll come

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2 back to you for --

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: It's
4 healthy debate. It's all good.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: It's
8 healthy debate.

9 And so I would like to invite
10 members to join the young people in your
11 councilmanic district at the Strawberry
12 Mansion High School Youth Court to
13 observe young people in action doing good
14 things. Councilman Jones is sponsoring
15 this. He's inviting members to join him
16 and others 10:00 a.m. He's providing
17 transportation at the Mayor's entrance,
18 so that we can be reminded that when we
19 give young people the tools that they
20 need, they actually do better.

21 I rest my case, Mr. President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you, Councilwoman. I'll come back
24 to you later.

25 (Applause.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. My mother-in-law, who
6 passed away some years ago, was a very
7 big fan of Reverend Schuller, and he had
8 a booklet or pamphlet that he sent out.
9 I don't remember whether it was monthly
10 or weekly. And she sent it to me and my
11 wife, and we would read it on a regular
12 basis. And when the Councilwoman was
13 speaking, one of those things that I read
14 probably 10 or 15 years ago popped into
15 my mind, and that was a pastor whose
16 church had burned down wrote Reverend
17 Schuller and asked him what to do. They
18 only had a little bit of insurance money,
19 and his flock was struggling at the time
20 and they had so much to rebuild, so much
21 to do, you know, and he was really sort
22 of asking do I build small or what do I
23 do? Do I build within my means? What do
24 I do? And Reverend Schuller actually
25 responded build bigger, build bigger.

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2 And what that pastor did was build a
3 church that ended up being one of the
4 mega churches somewhere in Texas and he
5 did it -- he was able to do that because
6 he was starting from scratch. And the
7 question I asked when I speak -- when I
8 was speaking, what I'm trying to say is,
9 the School District is burning down. It
10 has been for three years. For three
11 years, as Councilwoman Tasco said, we've
12 patched it with Band-Aids, and every
13 single year we say, And next year we're
14 going to not at budget time but in
15 between, we're going to address this,
16 we're going to have hearings, we're going
17 to understand, we're going to create a
18 go-forward plan. And that has not
19 happened in the three years we've done
20 that, where we've had to provide stop-gap
21 and emergency funding.

22 The question I'm really asking
23 is -- and I was corrected on my
24 characterization of the funding. The
25 funding that we appropriated was as part

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2 of the normal budget process, of course,
3 but it was not ever what the School
4 District was asking for, and it didn't
5 ever solve the problem. Every single
6 year the School District had to make
7 sacrifices. It didn't do long-term
8 planning. It still isn't.

9 The point I'm making is, is
10 the -- the School District is in a
11 precarious situation and it is not clear
12 to me that \$60 million from us, when \$300
13 million is required, is going to solve
14 the problems that everybody is trying to
15 address, that it's going to put children
16 in a better situation than they'd
17 otherwise be in. We need a realistic
18 plan from the School District, and the
19 question they really have to answer for
20 us is, is the current system too big to
21 succeed and do we need to start over and
22 build bigger with something
23 transformative. That's the debate we
24 need to have, because what we have
25 doesn't work and we'll be back here every

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2 single year if we have the same SRC, the
3 same School District, and the same
4 inability of this body to influence
5 anything but the dollars they get.

6 Thank you, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilman.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Oh.

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. I appreciate and want to
13 thank all of my colleagues for their
14 passionate concern, and I think with the
15 diversity of efforts that we're making,
16 I'm hopeful that we will be able to do
17 our part.

18 I would also like to thank
19 Councilwoman Blackwell for her leadership
20 on the Education Committee and just point
21 out to those listening that her committee
22 will have hearings, one on world-class
23 education that will be done jointly with
24 my committee, Global Opportunities; her
25 own hearing on the question of whether we

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2 should look at how the governance of the
3 School Board runs, basically the question
4 of whether we should have elected School
5 Boards; and, finally, she has been kind
6 enough to allow me to introduce a hearing
7 on governance and accountability.

8 So our City Council is, through
9 our Education Committee, tackling these
10 tough issues. I'm happy to say that
11 we'll have members from -- we'll have a
12 speaker from Finland who wrote a book
13 recently, what Finland has to offer the
14 world in education. We've met with the
15 Swiss Ambassador on vocational education.
16 We've spoken to different education
17 systems, from South Korea to other parts
18 in the U.S.

19 While that will not resolve the
20 issue by the time we do the budget this
21 year, but we are, I believe, as a body,
22 this body, taking up the call and
23 responsibility of not only debating the
24 issues, but taking affirmative and
25 positive action. I certainly hope that

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2 will encourage our state and other
3 friends to join with us, the SRC, in
4 doing their part, because we only at the
5 end of the day have a small piece of this
6 pie. But I believe that we are doing our
7 part, and I hope that they will join with
8 us and do their part.

9 Thank you very much.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Councilman.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Jones.

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. I was here in these
16 Chambers many years ago when we were
17 looking at the stimulus money for the
18 School District, and it is true that
19 Councilman Green pointed out the error in
20 the ways of anticipating a forever
21 funding from the federal government and
22 warned in these Chambers with a clarion
23 voice about getting hooked on an appetite
24 of federal spending. He was right about
25 that, and we should have probably been a

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2 little more frugal, looked at alternative
3 funding, held the Governor's feet to the
4 fire. All of those things are true. But
5 I will not sit by and let this Chamber,
6 this Administration, the Governor punish
7 the youth for that. They weren't in
8 charge. They couldn't do a budget. They
9 can't do any of that.

10 So recently I was at the
11 protest, but that day I was at Dorothy
12 Speight's conference on violence and
13 Mothers in Charge, national organization,
14 and the theme of the conference was what
15 is the cost of violence. And one of the
16 things that I took from it and when we
17 start to look at what is the cost of
18 education, all of those mothers, all of
19 those victims, all of the perpetrators,
20 particularly the perpetrators, had one
21 thing in common: Lack of education.
22 Lack of education.

23 Councilman Goode always points
24 out the correlation between if you cannot
25 read by the third grade, particularly

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2 minorities, you know how many jail cells
3 to build by the time they are 18.

4 In the cost of crime, either we
5 pay it now or we will pay for it later.
6 Because out of the 25 cent bullet that
7 leaves the \$250 illegal gun, when the
8 \$36,000-a-year-to-start officer pulls up
9 in the \$20,000 car with the \$5,000 amount
10 of gas per year that goes into it, that
11 young person winds up in front of a
12 \$55,000 public defender, another \$55,000
13 district attorney, an \$80,000 bail
14 commissioner, before a \$150,000 judge,
15 who deals with a \$30,000 clerk, who is
16 escorted through the cells by a \$40,000
17 sheriff, with another \$35,000 prison
18 guard, and every time there's a hearing
19 that is postponed, it is approximately
20 \$600 out of the taxpayers' pockets.

21 The cost of a semester at
22 Community is approximately \$11,000. The
23 cost to incarcerate per year is \$34,000.
24 Pay it now or we'll pay for it later.

25 Thank you.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you, Councilman.

4 The Chair recognizes

5 Councilwoman Brown again.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes,

7 Mr. President. So it's true we can pay

8 for it -- we can choose to pay for it now

9 or we can opt to pay for it later, but at

10 end of the day, we're paying.

11 Dr. Hite is trying to save a

12 system from collapse. So I would submit,

13 never having managed anything remotely

14 that large, is that he's been consumed

15 with being in the weeds. It's difficult

16 to be in the weeds and have the time to

17 manage a long-term vision in the way that

18 Councilman Green has observed.

19 So I certainly agree with the

20 spirit of Councilman Green's comments.

21 Where I disagree is that at the end of

22 the day, a portion of this duty does rest

23 with us.

24 So Councilwoman Sanchez reminds

25 us all the time in meetings, why does it

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2 have to be an "or." Why can't it be an
3 "and." And that's where I will leave my
4 comments, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you.

7 At this time, I see no other
8 requests for speeches, so I will briefly
9 not break the rules, but bend the rules a
10 little bit. With respect to this whole
11 issue generally as it relates to AVI and
12 this very, very critical issue relating
13 to the School District, I just want to
14 say a couple of things, that with respect
15 to leadership -- and I've said -- now
16 that Councilman DiCicco and former
17 Council President Street has left, I can
18 say this, that this is the best group of
19 Councilmembers I've ever worked with.
20 They'll probably hear about it on TV, but
21 the reality is, it is. And with respect
22 to leadership, this group of people have
23 shown leadership in a clearcut way. We
24 may not necessarily all agree on any
25 particular issue, but as a sum total,

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2 this has been a great group that has
3 always shown leadership and, when called,
4 has always stepped to the plate. Some
5 very difficult times. And I fully
6 anticipate, because we have a history of
7 stepping to the plate, not just a history
8 of talking about the issue. So I think
9 at the appropriate time in the
10 appropriate way, this Council will step
11 to the plate and do what needs to be
12 done. But I got to tell you in a very
13 public way that this whole notion that
14 this Council continues to have to do it
15 alone, I mean, that's getting stale.
16 It's getting real old.

17 So we're going to look -- I
18 understand there was a press conference
19 today by some friends of ours that
20 discussed -- I don't know what they
21 talked about because it was held at the
22 time that we had to be in this room.
23 Pretty much consistently every Thursday
24 we're here, you know. But at the end of
25 the day, I think that this group, as I

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2 said, is the best group I've ever worked
3 with. We'll do what we need to do, but
4 we don't -- I don't think it's
5 appropriate for us to continue to have to
6 do it alone.

7 So I will get back on the rules
8 and call for a motion to adjourn from
9 Councilwoman Brown.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Agreed,
11 Mr. President. I thank you,
12 Mr. President, and I move that Council
13 stand adjourned until Thursday May 16th,
14 2013 at 10:00 a.m.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 (Brief pause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
18 just want to make sure we clean this up.

19 The Chair recognizes
20 Councilwoman Brown for a motion to
21 adjourn.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
24 adjourned until Thursday, May 16th, 2013
25 at 10:00 a.m.

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2 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
4 has been moved and properly seconded.

5 All those in favor?

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
8 those opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 ayes have it. Council shall stand
12 adjourned until Thursday, May 16th, 2013.

13 Thank you all very much.

14 (Stated Meeting adjourned at
15 12:25 p.m.)
