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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
6 right. I like that.

7 We have established a quorum.
8 I'd ask all guests and visitors to please
9 retire behind the rail, and members have
10 already taken their seat, so we're going
11 to start.

12 To give our invocation this
13 morning, the Chair recognizes the
14 Reverend William E. Grogan of All Saints
15 Roman Catholic Church. He is here today
16 as the guest of Councilman Bobby Henon.

17 I would ask all guests and
18 visitors and members to please rise.

19 (Members and guests rise.)

19 sadnesses of your family. Give us the
20 mind and the heart of a grateful servant
21 so that we can trust that your mercy and
22 your abounding kindness will be made
23 manifest in our work this day.

25 served us, especially those who have laid

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 The next order of business is
10 the approval of the Journal of the
11 meeting of Thursday, May 16, 2013.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Greenlee.

14 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
15 you, Mr. President. I move that the
16 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, May
17 16, 2013 be approved.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
20 has been moved and properly seconded that
21 the Journal of May 16, 2013 stand
22 approved.

7 The next order of business is
8 requests for leaves of absence, and the

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. On behalf of the
12 majority, we have one request for leave
13 of absence from Councilwoman Tasco.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Leave shall be granted.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 O'Neill.

18 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. On behalf of the
20 republicans, there are no requests for
21 leave of absence.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you so much.

24 At this time, I would like to
25 dispense with the regular order of

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2 business. I would like to welcome and
3 thank all of our guests and visitors for
4 coming here today. We hope that your
5 experience here today is a pleasurable
6 one that will cause you to want to come
7 back. So, again, thank you for being
8 here. I know some of you all here will
9 be back without a doubt.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you so much.

13 At this time, the Chair
14 recognizes Councilman Johnson, who will
15 present a resolution honoring Bob
16 Pantano. Would Mr. Pantano and those
17 accompanying him please join the
18 Councilman at the podium.

19 And we also have Councilman
20 Kenney joining the Councilman and
21 Councilman Squilla and Councilman Henon.

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
23 morning.

24 (Good morning.)

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good

3 (Good morning.)

4 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Today I am
5 truly honored and privileged to have this
6 opportunity to acknowledge the hard work
7 of a South Philadelphia icon in the music
8 and entertainment industry. I am also
9 proud to be supported by my South
10 Philadelphia colleagues Councilman Mark
11 Squilla and Councilman Jim Kenney, but
12 also my Northeast Councilman, Councilman
13 Bobby Henon, who are also big supporters
14 of Mr. Bob Pantano.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Many of
17 you may or may not know that South
18 Philadelphia is home to some of the
19 greatest icons in the entertainment
20 industry, and Mr. Bob Pantano have been
21 providing oldies but goodies music. And
22 I got an old soul as a freshman
23 Councilman, so when you're talking about
24 Marvin Gaye, Randella -- what's the other
25 young lady's name -- Martha Wells -- Mary

2 Wells. Martha and the Vandellas, thank
3 you. Martha Reeves. Okay. Me and my
4 mom used to clean on Sundays and she
5 would be having the oldies on.

6 But to the point, beyond the
7 entertainment industry, I've also had a
8 chance to work with Mr. Pantano in a
9 variety of different charitable events.
10 He's also a strong supporter of the
11 annual MLK celebration down at the
12 Landreth building in South Philadelphia.
13 So I'm truly honored to recognize him for
14 some of the great work that he have done.
15 But I also want to acknowledge his wife,
16 Ms. Debbie Pantano, who has also been an
17 ambassador working with him, supporting
18 him --

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: -- on the
21 radio station, and also Mr. Tony Harris,
22 who is Bob's executive producer, make
23 sure that when Bob brings the oldies and
24 goodies to us on OGL 98, he makes sure
25 that he has a solid and smooth

2 presentation in terms of his radio
3 program. And so I just want to
4 acknowledge all the staff that are also
5 here from WOGL.

6 So at this time, the citation
7 reads: Honoring, recognizing and
8 commending Mr. Bob Pantano for his
9 contributions on the radio, television,
10 area concerts and his music, creativity,
11 charity and community service.

12 Whereas, a South Philadelphia
13 native, Mr. Bob Pantano began spinning
14 records at the hops in the late 1960s and
15 in the 1970s at nightclubs. In 1971, he
16 began his professional radio career at
17 WCAM in Camden, New Jersey. In 1977, he
18 pioneered the live-radio broadcast,
19 Saturday Night Dance Party, which has
20 entertained Philadelphia audiences with
21 its upbeat music; and

22 Whereas, Mr. Pantano continues
23 to entertain and engaging crowds year
24 after year, building a captive and loyal
25 audience. During the past thirty-six

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2 years, his Live Radio Dance Party has
3 been broadcast from various hotels,
4 nightclubs, and casinos. Hundreds of
5 thousands of Delaware Valley residents
6 have met, danced and fallen in love to
7 his unique special mix of music; and

8 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Whereas,
9 Mr. Pantano hosts the Vendemmia Festival
10 in South Philadelphia along with his
11 well-known Sounds of Philly Show which
12 features some of the best local and
13 national recording artists. Furthermore,
14 Mr. Pantano hosted shows at Wachovia
15 Center, Trump Plaza, Wildwood Convention
16 Center, Penn's Landing, summer concerts
17 in the Philadelphia and South Jersey
18 parks, Resorts Casino Hotel, Atlantic
19 City Hilton Casino Hotel, and corporate
20 functions and charitable events; and

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
22 Mr. Pantano is on the board of directors
23 of Variety - The Children's Charity,
24 helping children with disabilities. He's
25 an honorary Deputy Police Commissioner

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2 and the MC of the Hero Plaque Program in
3 Philadelphia, which commemorates the
4 heroism of Philadelphia police officers,
5 who gave their lives fighting in the line
6 of duty. Mr. Pantano was also the MC for
7 the annual Hero Thrill Show benefiting
8 the families of our fallen heroes, both
9 with the Police and the Fire families;
10 and

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
12 Mr. Pantano is involved with Church of
13 Holy Family, Washington Township, New
14 Jersey, where he hosts the annual
15 Primavera Festival, the taste of South
16 Philly at The Simone Auto Museum for
17 Saints John Neumann & Maria Goretti
18 Catholic High School, plus numerous other
19 charitable events. Mr. Pantano's other
20 endeavors include playing a crucial role
21 in the promotion and success of the Frank
22 Sinatra mural on the Avenue of the Arts
23 in Philadelphia; and

24 Whereas, in 2007, Mr. Pantano
25 was inducted into Temple University

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2 School of Communications and the Theatre
3 Hall of Fame and received a sidewalk
4 plaque on the Wildwood Avenue of the
5 Avenue of the Stars. In 2008,
6 Mr. Pantano was inducted into the
7 Broadcast Pioneer Hall of Fame; now
8 therefore

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Resolved,
10 that the Council of the City of
11 Philadelphia, hereby honors, recognizes
12 and commends Mr. Bob Pantano for his
13 commitment and dedication to the
14 community through his music, creativity,
15 charity and community service.

16 Further resolved, that an
17 engrossed copy of this resolution be
18 presented to Mr. Bob Pantano as evidence
19 of the sincere sentiments of this
20 legislative body.

21 And at this time, I would like
22 to present this citation to you and
23 congratulate you for your hard works and
24 effort.

25 (Applause.)

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2 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Now,
3 before --

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 Chair -- oh, I'm sorry.

6 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: -- we
7 allow you to speak, Mr. President, if
8 it's okay, we have a small -- that's your
9 job -- a small introduction, if that's
10 okay, Council President, before you
11 acknowledge.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
13 not aware. What are you attempting to
14 do, sir?

15 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Go ahead,
16 Pete.

17 MR. SERRATONE: Hit it, John.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Oh,
19 yes. Please.

20 (Music playing.)

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON:
22 Congratulations.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair recognizes Mr. Pantano for remarks.

25 MR. PANTANO: I'm overwhelmed

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2 by this. Mr. President, members of
3 Council, my friends at Council here,
4 everybody in the Chambers, distinguished
5 guests, thank you, thank you, thank you.
6 This is a great day for me, and we've
7 been doing this show for 36 years, since
8 1977. Of course a little time before
9 that in my other lifetime in Camden.

10 But I'm a kid from South
11 Philly, grew up 7th and Federal, took the
12 SEPTA buses, SEPTA trolleys and wireless
13 trolleys to Neumann at 27th and Mifflin,
14 hopped on the subway to Temple
15 University, proud to be in the Hall of
16 Fame there.

17 So I was just a kid in South
18 Philly that wanted to be in music. There
19 were so many great, great guys to follow
20 in their footsteps from South
21 Philadelphia, so many great DJ's in
22 Philadelphia. And all I am doing is
23 carrying on the tradition that we
24 started, keeping the sounds alive from
25 the Cameo-Parkway days with Chubby

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2 Checker and Dee Dee Sharp, the Philly
3 Sound with Gamble and Huff, and the disco
4 sounds. So it's great music to work
5 with, and we're so happy that people
6 still enjoy all this great music. And I
7 work at a great radio station, 98.1 WOGL.
8 Would you please recognize them.

9 (Applause.)

10 MR. PANTANO: We have our
11 General Manager and Vice President, Jim
12 Loftus; our Program Director, Anne Gress.
13 We have our General Sales Manager, Dave
14 Scopinich, Mark Terruso. The WOGL family
15 is here. They give me the opportunity to
16 play what I like, do my thing, and it's
17 just great being able to keep the sounds
18 going week after week. And the other
19 things that's important to me is the
20 charity work. I want to thank Mr. Jim
21 Binns, James Binns, who started the Hero
22 Plaque Program. Jimmy.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. PANTANO: He brought me on
25 board with the Hero Thrill Show, with the

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2 police and firemen plaque ceremonies, and
3 it's an honor to do that, because they
4 need us. The families need us of our
5 fallen heroes, the children. It's all
6 about setting them in school. As
7 Councilman Kenyatta Johnson said, we do
8 the fundraisers in South Philly at
9 Neumann Goretti, at Vendemmia to do
10 something good for the citizens of
11 Philadelphia, get the kids a quality
12 education like I did and give them an
13 opportunity. Everybody deserves an
14 opportunity, and that's what it's all
15 about.

16 WOGI opens their doors once a
17 year two days, they turn the radio
18 station over to Children's Hospital, and
19 we raise millions of dollars each year,
20 and it's a wonderful thing. I think
21 we're the only radio station that does
22 something like this. So they should be
23 commended, and I'm proud to work on such
24 a great radio station.

25 This gentleman here, Pat Delsi,

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2 started my career, gave me a shot in 1972
3 on WCAM in Camden on the 18th floor of
4 City Hall. Thank you, Pat. It's been a
5 great ride.

6 (Applause.)

7 MR. PANTANO: I got my fellow
8 DJ's here; Pete Serratore, my new PR
9 person, thank you so much; Joe Callari,
10 Nick Teti, Tony Q, Nicky G. I don't want
11 to miss anybody. Of course my long-time
12 producer, Tony Harris. It's been a great
13 ride, Ton.

14 MR. HARRIS: If I had to spend
15 36 years with somebody, I'm glad it was
16 you. I mean, really like -- it's a
17 marriage between he and I. Every
18 Saturday night we still have a lot of
19 fun, and I think that's the secret of it.
20 So ladies and gentlemen, thank you for
21 listening, because without you, we
22 wouldn't be standing here.

23 Thank you very much.

24 MR. PANTANO: We actually
25 brought this show back at the Ripley

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2 Music Hall at 6th and South. We were
3 working for Stephen Starr, who is an
4 entrepreneur now in the restaurant
5 business in Philadelphia, and one of our
6 account executives went to him and said,
7 Why don't we do a radio show. Well, are
8 you crazy? A DJ going to fill my place?
9 Well, the first night we did the show
10 back in 1982, there were lines around the
11 block and 1,000 people showed up to the
12 Ripley Music Hall. We worked for the
13 Blatsteins in Northeast Philly. So we've
14 been up in your district, Bobby. I think
15 I've worked everywhere in Philadelphia,
16 from the Airport to the Great Northeast
17 to West Oak Lane to Juniata, North
18 Philly, West Philly.

19 I also want to -- I have my
20 family, my in-laws here, my mother and
21 father-in-law, Sal Massara and Jean
22 Massara. Sal was a captain in the Fire
23 Department. Thank you for your service.
24 Captain Massara.

25 (Applause.)

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2 MR. PANTANO: And we have Cecil
3 Parker here recording all this, who sings
4 our closing song, "I think I'll Tell
5 Her," keeps the sound of Philly alive.
6 And I brought in the great lead singer of
7 the Drifters, who sings "Up On the Roof"
8 and "Under the Boardwalk," Mr. Rick
9 Sheppard and his lovely wife.

10 (Applause.)

11 MR. PANTANO: Thank you, Pete
12 and Jane, Councilman Kenyatta Johnson.
13 One beautiful guy. Nice to see you at
14 our events. He came out. In fact, all
15 the Councilmen come out to see our great
16 events.

17 Support the charities. Let's
18 do good things for the citizens of
19 Philadelphia, and that's what it's all
20 about, and I'm proud to be a
21 Philadelphian.

22 Thank you so much.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. PANTANO: We love
25 Philadelphia.

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2 One other thing. You're going
3 to like this one. I want to thank John
4 Dougherty. I am a card-carrying member
5 of Local 98, Electricians Union,
6 communications.

7 Go unions.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you.

11 Council will be at ease.

12 (Council at ease.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you. At this time, the Chair
15 recognizes Councilwoman Brown, who will
16 present a resolution recognizing the
17 Project on the Status of Girls and Young
18 Women in Philadelphia. Would Maxine and
19 Clarice Bailey please join the
20 Councilwoman at the podium and those
21 accompanying those individuals, please
22 come also. Thank you.

23 And joining the Councilwoman,
24 we have Councilwoman Sanchez and
25 Councilwoman Bass and Councilwoman

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2 Blackwell.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
4 Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 You're welcome.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: We have a
8 number of organizations this morning that
9 come together to look at and examine what
10 is the status of women and girls in
11 Philadelphia, and let me assure you,
12 Mr. President, that only two of this
13 enormous coalition will be speaking on
14 behalf of the group. But I would be
15 remiss not to acknowledge Girls Justice
16 League; Women's Way; Girls Inc.;
17 Advancing Girls; the Pennsylvania Council
18 of Children, Youth and Family Services;
19 Pathway Services; Children's Hospital of
20 Philadelphia; Temple University Youth
21 Service Incorporated; the Identity
22 Project; and ArtWell. Together, this
23 coalition of women organizations have
24 come together to recognize the Project on
25 the Status of Girls and Young Women in

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2 Philadelphia.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

4 Whereas, a broad based coalition of
5 organizations is commissioning a
6 comprehensive look at the state of girls
7 and young women ages twenty-four and
8 under in the City of Philadelphia; and

9 Whereas, the project will
10 include quantitative and qualitative
11 research with support from the Institute
12 for Women's Policy Research for the
13 purposes of providing centralized,
14 reliable baseline data on the
15 socioeconomic status, educational
16 opportunity, crime and personal safety
17 and health and well-being of
18 Philadelphia's girls and young women; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
20 the quantitative component will also
21 establish the basis for a coordinated,
22 data driven program and funding
23 priorities that supports girls and young
24 women, that creates a platform for
25 advocacy and community dialogues on

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2 issues affecting girls and young women,
3 and serve as a catalyst for creating
4 policy agenda to better support the needs
5 and interests of young girls and young
6 women;

7 Whereas, the qualitative
8 research will ensure that the voices of
9 young girls and women are firmly embedded
10 in the project by allowing girls and
11 young women to serve as researchers,
12 documentarians, advocates and
13 co-facilitators of the community
14 conversations through electronic surveys,
15 focus groups and multi-medium reflection
16 of the lives of girls and young women in
17 response to all the data collected; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
19 the findings from the research will be
20 used as the centerpiece for public
21 hearings within each Council district to
22 consider the implications of the project
23 for creating stronger programs, policies,
24 practices and funding policies that lead
25 to girls and young women's successful

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2 transition to adulthood; and

3 Whereas, public policy making,
4 resource allocation and coordinated
5 service delivery, and educational systems
6 would be well served to have up-to-date
7 data that reflects the current status as
8 well as the hopes and dreams of girls and
9 young women; and

10 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
11 this City Council resolution responds to
12 the needs of girls and young women
13 throughout the City of Philadelphia by
14 supporting public hearings and an
15 assessment of the data currently
16 collected by its public agencies and
17 service providers; now, therefore, be it

18 Resolved, by the Council of the
19 City of Philadelphia, that we hereby
20 recognize this important initiative on
21 the status of girls and young women in
22 Philadelphia.

23 Further resolved, that an
24 engrossed copy of this resolution be
25 presented to the Coalition on the Status

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2 of Girls and Young Women in Philadelphia
3 as evidence of the sincere sentiments of
4 this legislative body. Introduced by
5 Blondell Reynolds Brown and supported by
6 all the members of the Philadelphia City
7 Council.

8 Time is overdue when we need to
9 stand up and speak up for girls.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you.

13 The Chair recognizes Maxine and
14 Clarice Bailey for remarks.

15 (Two individuals speaking at
16 once.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
18 just following the script.

19 MS. HANSLEY: Good morning. My
20 name is Shakira Hansley, and on behalf of
21 all the girls and young women in
22 Philadelphia under the age of 24, I would
23 like to thank you, Councilwoman Blondell
24 Reynolds Brown, as well as your staff for
25 your ongoing support of all girls and

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2 young women.

3 We would also like to express
4 our gratitude for the City Council
5 recognizing the need and support of all
6 girls and young women in Philadelphia by
7 authorizing public hearings when we can
8 make our face and voice heard.

9 Thank you to the Girls Justice
10 League and the Coalition on the Status of
11 Girls and Young Women in Philadelphia,
12 for you have and we know you will
13 continue to tirelessly work to help us
14 and support us as we are researchers,
15 documentators, advocates, and
16 co-facilitators to ensure that the data
17 collected truly expresses our current
18 situation and what we need to be great.

19 I was born and raised in
20 Philadelphia. After being abandoned at
21 birth by my biological mother, I was
22 placed in foster care. However, I was
23 adopted at 15 months by a loving and
24 caring single mother. She instilled in
25 me values and morals that are still

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2 within me today, and even as a teenager,
3 when everything she said to me went in
4 one ear and straight out the other, she
5 placed me in teen mentoring groups that
6 were filled of other successful young
7 women who helped me to know that it is a
8 cool thing to be educated and a positive
9 contributing member of society.

10 Of course, I went on to high
11 school, graduated, went to college, and
12 I'm working on my first career. However,
13 when I turn on the TV, when I talk to
14 another girl in school or when I even
15 read the statistics, the horrible reality
16 hits me that being a successful
17 24-year-old woman in Philadelphia today
18 makes me the minority. It is because of
19 this that I stand here today, and my
20 desire to advocate for girls will
21 continue.

22 All of these women standing
23 behind me today will not stop our efforts
24 until the success of the minority becomes
25 the success of the majority.

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2 The passage of this resolution
3 today is what was needed as a vehicle to
4 alert the public, but to also help
5 organizations representing girls empower
6 us to live prosperous lives. These women
7 and girls that you are empowering today
8 will be the force in Philadelphia that
9 will help us with forward mobility.

10 On behalf of the Girls Justice
11 League and the Coalition, I would like to
12 thank you, but I also want to ensure you
13 that your vote will not be in vain.

14 Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 MS. MAKOWSKI: Thank you,
17 Shakira.

18 I got to tell you, I was
19 worried that there was not going to be a
20 step up and I was going to need a bench.

21 My name is Erica Makowski and
22 I'm a social worker with Youth Service
23 Incorporated and a Board member for the
24 Girls Justice League. First, I want to
25 thank the City Council for passing the

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2 resolution in support of the status
3 report project on girls and young women
4 in the City and a special thank you to
5 Councilwoman Brown for supporting this as
6 well as Katherine Gilmore, her aide, and
7 understanding and acknowledging the
8 importance of this for our girls and
9 young women in the City.

10 I am so proud and tremendously
11 honored to be a part of this coalition of
12 amazing, amazing women from the City
13 supporting this project. I have
14 actually, opposite of Shakira, have only
15 lived here in the City for two years, and
16 I have seen it and met it through the
17 eyes of a social worker. I have seen the
18 beauty and the uniqueness of this amazing
19 city as well as the need, and for me, the
20 most beautiful, unique, and needed part
21 of this city are the young girls and the
22 young women of it.

23 I have been blessed to hear the
24 stories, the dreams, the hopes of these
25 girls as well as their goals and

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2 expectations they have for themselves,
3 but somehow it seems along the way some
4 of those dreams gave way to a reality
5 that they just weren't expecting nor
6 hoping for and some, as we all know,
7 worse than others. It also feels like
8 somewhere the community support stopped
9 listening and providing a space for those
10 girls' voices, and to be honest, maybe
11 there was no space in the first place.

12 So this is the reason why these
13 women and myself are standing before you
14 all today. We want to support the girls
15 and young women of this city claim their
16 space. We want the community to support
17 what they say and change what we need to
18 in order for their voices to be heard and
19 their goals to be reached. These are my
20 goals. These are the goals of the
21 Coalition.

22 So I am excited and grateful to
23 be here in this room at this time,
24 because it feels like the City of
25 Philadelphia is also saying we support

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2 our girls and young women claim their
3 space.

4 Thank you so much.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you.

8 Council shall be at ease.

9 (Council at ease.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you so much. At this time, the
12 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Brown, who

15 Hepatitis Awareness Month in
16 Philadelphia. Would Dr. Stacy Trooksin,
17 Ivory Allison, and those accompanying
18 them please join the Councilwoman at the
19 podium.

20 And also joining Councilwoman
21 Brown, we have Councilwoman Sanchez and
22 Councilwoman Bass.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. On behalf of Council
25 colleague Councilwoman Marian B. Tasco,

6 recognizing May as Hepatitis Awareness

8 Whereas, Hepatitis is a medical
9 condition defined by the inflammation of
10 the liver and characterized by the
11 presence of inflammatory cells in the
12 tissue of the organ and the condition can
13 be self-limiting or can progress to
14 fibrosis and cirrhosis; and

15 Whereas, the American Liver
16 Foundation was created in 1976 with a
17 mission to facilitate, advocate, and
18 promote education, support, and research
19 for the prevention, treatment, and cure
20 of liver disease and conditions like
21 Hepatitis, and liver disease is the tenth
22 leading cause of death in the United
23 States, taking approximately 27,000
24 American lives each year; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, a

2 group of viruses known as the Hepatitis
3 A, B, and C viruses cause most cases of
4 Hepatitis worldwide, but Hepatitis can
5 also be caused by toxic substances,
6 certain infections, and autoimmune

8 Whereas, any Hepatitis virus
9 presents a serious medical concern and
10 the Philadelphia metropolitan area has a
11 high prevalence for individuals living
12 with the Hepatitis C infection and over
13 40,000 Philadelphians are living with
14 Hepatitis C, which can cause liver cancer
15 and death; and

16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
17 the Hepatitis C Allies of Philadelphia
18 (HepCap) is positioning Philadelphia as a
19 national leader in the fight against
20 Hepatitis C by mobilizing local
21 stakeholders to raise the public profile
22 of this virus as an urgent health
23 priority, identifying gaps in local
24 Hepatitis C services, and to develop
25 collaborative and innovative projects to

2 improve access to Hepatitis prevention,
3 testing, and treatment services; now,
4 therefore it be

5 Resolved, by the Council of the

10 resolution be presented to
11 representatives of the American Liver

17 supported by all the members of City
18 Council.

24 MS. ALLISON: Hello. Good
25 morning. My name is Ivory Allison, the

4 here in Philadelphia, and I just would
5 like to thank Councilwoman Tasco, who is
6 not here, Councilwoman Brown and every

8 resolution.

9 Liver disease and Hepatitis is
10 rising. It's increasing, and
11 Dr. Trooksin will give you a little
12 information about that, but I just want
13 everyone to know liver disease and
14 Hepatitis, you hear about it and you
15 always think negatively. Maybe you think
16 about alcohol or drug uses. And we want
17 to let people know that that's not true.
18 You can get Hepatitis from going to the
19 nail salon, going to the hairdresser, the
20 barber shop. You can also get it from
21 getting a tattoo, getting your ears
22 pierced. It's rampant and it's huge and
23 it's increasing in Philadelphia, and we
24 want people to know that.

25 We have plenty of programs,

2 events so that people can know how can
3 you get it. We have free educational
4 programming. We can go into schools,
5 come to your company and inform you of
6 what's going on.

7 Thirty million Americans have
8 liver disease and about four to five
9 million have Hepatitis C. And Dr. Stacy
10 Trooksins, who is a member of our Medical
11 Advisory Committee and the Co-Chair of
12 HepCap, will tell you a little bit more
13 about Hepatitis C.

14 Thank you.

15 DR. TROOKSIN: Good morning.
16 Thank you to members of Council for
17 passing this resolution. My name is
18 Stacy Trooksins. I'm an infectious
19 disease physician at Drexel University
20 College of Medicine. I'm a public health
21 researcher, and I'm the proud community
22 co-chair of the grassroots organization
23 called HepCap, Hepatitis C Allies of
24 Philadelphia. But today I'm here as a
25 concerned citizen about my city.

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2 Hepatitis C is the most common
3 blood-born infection in the United
4 States. It is five times more common
5 than HIV, yet has a fraction of the
6 funding. Hepatitis C is often called the
7 silent killer, where infected individuals
8 are asymptomatic for as long as two
9 decades before showing signs of liver
10 disease associated with cirrhosis or
11 liver cancer. Fifty to 75 percent of
12 individuals infected are unaware that
13 they're infected.

14 The vast majority of these
15 individuals are baby boomers. The
16 Centers for Disease Control and
17 Prevention recognize the urgency of
18 increasing the number of baby boomers
19 aware of their Hepatitis C status by
20 recommending that all individuals born
21 between 1945 and 1965 be tested once in
22 their lifetime. The reason to test is
23 simple: Hepatitis C can be cured.
24 Knowing your status allows individuals to
25 get into care so they can learn how to

2 keep their liver healthy and obtain the
3 medication they need to be cured of
4 infection.

5 Philadelphia is uniquely
6 positioned to become a leader in the
7 fight against Hepatitis C. We have five
8 major academic centers with liver
9 transplant programs. We have physicians,
10 community-based organizations, and
11 talented staff at the Department of
12 Public Health that are passionate about
13 this cause and are ready to serve. We
14 have HepCap to harness all of this energy
15 into action but, most importantly, we
16 have 40,000 individuals already diagnosed
17 with Hepatitis C in Philadelphia and
18 many, many more unaware of their
19 diagnoses.

20 Our citizens deserve to know
21 their Hepatitis C status. We can do
22 better, and the CDC says we should do
23 better. If we don't, Philadelphia's baby
24 boomers will eventually learn of their
25 HCV diagnoses, but unfortunately, it will

2 be because they have developed symptoms,
3 like accumulation of fluid in the
4 abdomen, confusion, jaundice, and
5 varices, which can result in internal
6 bleeding.

7 Not only will this result in
8 preventable deaths, but it will result in
9 millions and millions of healthcare
10 dollars needlessly spent on managing
11 end-stage liver disease, liver cancer,
12 and for a few of the lucky ones liver
13 transplant.

14 We have a cure for Hepatitis C,
15 and now there are over 90 drugs in
16 development that will make the treatments
17 that we have shorter in duration, easier
18 to tolerate, and more efficacious.

19 I invite you all to become a
20 champion in this effort. Support this
21 mission and join HepCap. Members of
22 Council, you will find information in
23 your folders about how your districts are
24 affected by Hepatitis C. You will also
25 find some red and yellow ribbons that you

3 You'll find information about HepCap,

24 again, Mr. President. In addition to the

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Before considering these resolutions and
16 bills, we will now consider public
17 comment. The public comment will go as
18 follows:

19 You will be given three minutes
20 to speak on a bill or resolution that is
21 on the Final Passage Calendar. If you
22 are interested in speaking, we ask that
23 you please sign up to the table to my
24 left.

25 You will speak at the podium in

12 Mr. Decker, please call the

13 name of the first individual.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Brendan Lynch,

15 commenting on 130244.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

18 morning, sir.

19 MR. LYNCH: Good morning,

20 President Clarke and members of Council.

21 Thank you for the opportunity to address

22 you today. My name is Brendan Lynch.

23 I'm an attorney with Community Legal

24 Services of Philadelphia. As you know,

25 we represent low-income Philadelphians in

2 a variety of civil legal matters.

3 I'm technically addressing Bill
4 130244, an ordinance which authorizes
5 transfers in appropriations from the
6 General Fund. The main point I want to
7 make today is that Council has the
8 opportunity when considering
9 appropriations to appropriate a small
10 amount that we believe will pay big
11 dividends. There's a huge problem in the
12 City of Philadelphia of people with
13 criminal record being denied employment.
14 As you may know, the Attorney General's
15 Reentry Council has estimated that as
16 many as one in three Americans have a
17 criminal record. The number in Philly
18 may be even higher.

19 Over 90 percent of employers
20 now do criminal background checks. Just
21 this past week, I've been assisting one
22 of your constituents, a Philadelphia
23 resident, who is desperately trying to
24 find work, who has applied to multiple
25 people and has been told by multiple

2 employers in the healthcare field in the
3 Philly region, You are qualified to work
4 here, but we can't hire you until you
5 clean your record. And this is a woman
6 who has never been convicted of any
7 charges, and she is being denied
8 employment. She's not paying wage tax.
9 She's not paying other taxes. We'd like
10 to help her do that.

11 I'm sure you all remember the
12 incident last week where 3,000 people
13 showed up at a job fair because they're
14 desperate to find work, and the reason
15 they're so anxious for City help is that
16 they're being turned away due to their
17 criminal records.

18 Fortunately, many criminal
19 records can be expunged. Arrest records
20 can be expunged. Summary offenses can
21 often be expunged, and the General
22 Assembly in Harrisburg is considering
23 legislation that might expand the number
24 of offenses that can be taken off of
25 somebody's record to include certain

2 misdemeanors, and this can be a
3 life-changing thing for the people
4 involved.

5 We are, therefore, urging City
6 Council to fund our office to do
7 expungement cases. We do them regularly.
8 We do them successfully, and we don't
9 charge the approximately thousand
10 dollars, which is the going rate for the
11 private bar, but we can only do that if
12 we have the staff to do it. And without
13 getting into our financial picture, times
14 are really tough and we need to be able
15 to fund the work that we do.

16 We are asking Council to fund
17 us to the tune of approximately a hundred
18 thousand dollars. We believe based on
19 data provided by the Economy League,
20 solid numbers, people who have looked at
21 the actual economic benefits of
22 expungement, that a small investment
23 could generate up to \$6 million in tax
24 revenue and savings. That's both wage
25 taxes, that's reduced spending on people

2 who have no alternative but to return to
3 a life of crime. And we think that a \$60
4 return for each dollar invested would be
5 an excellent investment of taxpayer
6 dollars, and we ask City Council to
7 consider that strongly.

8 Thank you very much.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you for your testimony.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Gina Apuzzo,
13 commenting on 130225.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 MS. APUZZO: Good morning. I
16 have a copy of my statement if Council
17 would like a copy.

18 My name is Gina Apuzzo. I'm a
19 resident of Philadelphia and I work as a
20 dance educator in the City. I volunteer
21 in a financial accountability group
22 called PhARE, Philadelphians Allied for a
23 Responsible Economy. In November of
24 2011, myself and 13 others staged a
25 citizens foreclosure at the Wells Fargo

2 on 17th and Market. We foreclosed on
3 Wells Fargo because of their racist
4 predatory lending, tax dodging, illegal
5 foreclosure practices, and duping the
6 City into swap deals that hemorrhaged
7 millions of dollars from our already
8 suffering School District. But the
9 people of Philadelphia believed we had a
10 right to be there that day to demand that
11 Wells Fargo stop hurting our City. In
12 February of this year, we were found not
13 guilty of the charges resulting from our
14 citizens foreclosure by a jury of our
15 peers.

16 (Applause.)

17 MS. APUZZO: And to me that
18 means the people of Philadelphia have
19 found Wells Fargo guilty of their
20 abominable banking practices.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. APUZZO: I ask Council to
23 vote no on Bill 130225. Because of the
24 swaps that involved Wells Fargo, we are
25 currently bleeding 12 percent of our

2 school's budget in interest payments

3 alone, which amounts to \$280 million.

4 That's \$280 million going into the

5 pockets of Wells Fargo CEOs while we are

6 in a \$304 million school deficit and

7 closing 23 public schools this year. We

8 need to put Wells Fargo into a

9 month-to-month contract while we push for

10 alternatives. We must demand Wells --

11 (Applause.)

12 MS. APUZZO: We must demand

13 Wells Fargo waive service fees on the

14 school debt or refund swaps cancellation

15 fees. Wells Fargo needs to help mitigate

16 our school's crisis instead of profiting

17 from it.

18 You must delay renewing the

19 City's payroll services contract with

20 Wells Fargo.

21 Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: Kelly Andrews,

24 commenting on 130057.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

2 MS. ANDREWS: Mr. President,
3 members of the Council, my name is Kelly
4 Andrews. I live in Fishtown, 610 Gaul
5 Street, and I am a health initiatives
6 representative for the American Cancer
7 Society here in the City.

8 Today I'm speaking on behalf of
9 the American Cancer Society Cancer Action
10 Network, also known as ACS CAN. ACS CAN
11 is the advocacy affiliate of the American
12 Cancer Society. With me is Diane
13 Phillips, Senior Director for Policy at
14 ACS CAN.

15 We appreciate the actions taken
16 by City Councilman William Greenlee and
17 the Committee on Public Health and Human
18 Services in proposing Bill 130057. At
19 this time, we are asking you to consider
20 tabling the bill for further
21 consideration.

22 Regulating indoor tanning beds
23 is an important health and safety issue.
24 However, we cannot support the bill as
25 currently drafted because it does not

2 fully protect minors under the age of 18
3 by preventing indoor tanning bed use.

4 Parental consent is not an effective or
5 reliable barrier to indoor tanning.

6 Parents who do not understand the serious
7 risk posed by indoor tanning beds and who
8 allow their teens to use them will
9 unknowingly put their children in harm's
10 way.

11 The science is clear. Tanning
12 bed use is a risk factor for skin cancer,
13 including deadly melanoma, a type of skin
14 cancer than can be fatal.

15 The International Agency for
16 Research on Cancer has classified indoor
17 tanning beds as Group 1, the highest
18 level of cancer risk. Minors under age
19 18 are especially at risk for the damage
20 associated with overexposure to
21 ultraviolet radiation, such as that found
22 in tanning beds, because their skin cells
23 are dividing and changing more rapidly
24 than those of adults.

25 In fact, six different national

2 and international organizations,
3 including the World Health Organization
4 and the National Toxicology Program of
5 the U.S. Department of Health and Human
6 Services, have all issued reports on the
7 adverse health effects associated with
8 the use of indoor tanning facilities and
9 have recommended that minors under the
10 age of 18 not use them.

11 We are all aware of the "tan
12 mom" incident took place in New Jersey
13 last year, but I have another story.
14 Last month, our staff met with
15 Pennsylvania parents who have in the past
16 year lost their beautiful 28-year-old
17 daughter to melanoma. Jen had started
18 using tanning beds in high school. With
19 deep regret, her father acknowledged, We
20 did not think using a tanning bed was a
21 good idea, but we did not think that it
22 could kill her. You can help
23 Philadelphia parents and protect our
24 young people by passing a stronger bill.

25 May is the month for high

2 school proms. Young people are getting
3 ready for the big event by getting the
4 right clothes and, unfortunately for
5 many, getting a tan. They and their
6 parents remain unaware that the incidence
7 of melanoma is increasing rapidly and
8 adult -- in children and adults.
9 Melanoma is now the second most common
10 form of cancer for individuals age 15 to
11 29.

12 In Philadelphia, minors cannot
13 purchase tobacco products or alcohol. We
14 are asking for consistent health policy.
15 The only way to fully protect teens is to
16 prevent minors from using tanning beds
17 altogether. We hope you will considering
18 strengthening this important bill, and
19 please vote to table Bill 130057 for
20 further consideration.

21 Thank you for the opportunity
22 to speak today, and we would be happy to
23 answer any questions.

24 (Applause.)

25 CHIEF CLERK: Tiffany Green,

2 commenting on 130395.

3 MS. GREEN: That's the first
4 bill.

5 Good morning, everyone. We
6 came here to ask Council to table this
7 bill. This is about a housing project,
8 affordable housing project, that
9 Councilman Johnson promised for his
10 community. However, there has been no
11 notification. We had -- we met with the
12 Chief of Staff. He said that they were
13 going to do housing for already
14 established housing and rehab. What has
15 happened is -- then we didn't hear any
16 more about it. Then we were personally
17 called to come down here and support
18 Councilman Johnson and his office
19 regarding the affordable housing project,
20 because when the developers were
21 attacking the office and saying about his
22 project was going to stop them from
23 building in the community. So we did.
24 So then after that, then we didn't hear
25 anything more. Then all the sudden, we

2 heard on WURD that a \$2.2 million bill
3 was being read and passed, and we heard
4 Councilman Clarke addressing anybody down
5 here to testify, and no one came down to
6 testify. Why? Because nobody knew about
7 it. There was no e-mails that went out.
8 Nothing went out regarding the project.
9 And now the project is being moved
10 forward.

11 We're hearing that now -- and
12 then what happened was -- I'm getting
13 ahead of myself. Then what happened was
14 when we came down and testified, we were
15 testifying to rehabs. Now we find out
16 there's a bunch of lots going on, and the
17 lots are going to turn into these large
18 three-story houses in our area that the
19 community does not want.

20 We're saying by you passing
21 this bill, you give by-right privileges
22 to the City to come down and build what
23 they want.

24 These are the houses that were
25 built by our first NSP money. These were

2 supposed to have been affordable housing
3 for people in the community. They turn
4 out to be three-story houses, decks,
5 garages, and 30 of these houses were
6 built in the Point Breeze area. And then
7 on top of that, these houses do not look
8 like affordable housing for people in our
9 community who can afford. They do not
10 look like it.

11 (Applause.)

12 MS. GREEN: And we're saying --
13 we're asking you to table this. We want
14 you to take a look at these houses,
15 because these houses are not -- I don't
16 think President Obama meant this when he
17 put out money for NSP to build houses
18 like this for our community.

19 (Applause.)

20 MS. GREEN: And then on top of
21 that, you sit up here. You don't want to
22 give District 33 any kind of raises or
23 anything, but yet you want to build
24 houses that are going 300 and --
25 \$300,000.

2 We're asking you to table this
3 bill and have community meetings --

4 (Applause.)

5 MS. GREEN: -- have community
6 meetings regarding this bill and go
7 through proper procedure for us.
8 Otherwise, you get by-right policy to the
9 City, and we'll be back with those -- and
10 those particular houses went for
11 \$178,000, and they're still sitting empty
12 one year later. They're still sitting
13 empty right there at 20th and Dickinson.
14 So do we want those houses? No, we
15 don't. If you look at underneath, we
16 want the other houses that they built up
17 in Cecil B. Moore, \$63,000. They get a
18 ten-year tax abatement --

19 (Microphone cut off.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you for your testimony.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Theresa
23 McCormick, commenting on 130395.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MS. McCORMICK: My name is

2 Theresa McCormick and I'm from the Point
3 Breeze area.

4 We have serious concerns. We
5 don't -- we are not just giving you talk.
6 Here are our ten concerns:

7 One, Councilman Johnson, you
8 supported Ori Feibush with 13 luxury
9 apartments at Point Breeze and Titan
10 Street. Two hundred residents came out
11 and told you no, but you gave him a
12 support letter anyway. Okay?

13 Concern No. 2, Councilman
14 Johnson, you signed off on 30 City-owned
15 lots which was used with the NSP money.
16 Again, who was using that again? Ori
17 Feibush. This was March of 2012.

18 Concern No. 3, you refused to
19 discuss the three-story concerns that the
20 community have, but you gave Korman
21 Suites their project in Eastwick.

22 Concern No. 4, Councilman
23 Johnson, you gave a support letter again
24 to Ori Feibush for a whole block at 20th
25 and Federal, which is being built at this

2 time. But in the media, you made a stink
3 that the two of you were fighting and had
4 us to come down to support you against
5 Ori, but in fact you deceived the
6 community because you gave him that
7 support letter.

8 (Audience members yelling.)

9 MS. McCORMICK: Concern No. 5,
10 his office gave a support letter to a
11 known market-rate developer named John
12 Longacre. His staff promised to hold a
13 zoning meeting regarding the recent
14 zoning project, but it never took place,
15 but you gave a support letter to the ZBA.
16 Longtime community residents called
17 Concerns Citizens of Point Breeze tell us
18 that the information about the zoning was
19 never given to us. John Longacre is a
20 person who has come into our community to
21 change the name from Point Breeze to
22 Newbold, but, again, in the Business
23 Journal of 2007, John Longacre states
24 that he is an urban gentrifier.

25 Concern No. 6, Councilman

2 Johnson, you put in a \$2 million bond for
3 this housing project, no notification.
4 Your office says that there's three
5 levels of this housing. You have not met
6 with the community of what the project is
7 all about. We found out about it on
8 WURD. And the Council has also
9 questioned why the community is not down
10 here to testify. Because we were not
11 notified.

12 Concern No. 7, no community
13 meeting or notification for zoning
14 reclassification for St. Agnes Hospital
15 from a CMX-3, which allows housing, but
16 people don't know that that has to do
17 with condos.

18 Concern No. 8, no community
19 meeting or notification for Point Breeze
20 for the new housing project --

21 (Microphone cut off.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Ma'am.

24 (Ms. McCormick still speaking.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Ma'am.

3 (Ms. McCormick still speaking.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Ma'am, ma'am, ma'am, one second. First,
6 your time is up, but, second, you're not
7 talking about a bill that's on the
8 Calendar.

9 MS. McCORMICK: Our concerns
10 has to do with the housing bill, and
11 because we're concerned about the housing
12 bill is because of the things that has
13 happened.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
15 right.

16 MS McCORMICK: Why should we --
17 if you let me finish, which I only
18 have two --

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Ma'am, your time is up. Ma'am, your time
21 is up.

22 MS. McCORMICK: Councilman.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Ma'am.

25 MS. McCORMICK: Two minutes.

3 Ma'am, your time is up.

4 MS. McCORMICK: Give me two
5 minutes.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 (Ms. McCormick still talking.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
10 get your point, ma'am. We get your
11 point.

12 (Ms. McCormick still talking.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Ma'am, ma'am, ma'am, your time is up. I
15 didn't ask you anything. Time is up.

16 (Applause.)

17 (Ms. McCormick still talking.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
19 didn't ask you a question, ma'am. Your
20 time is up, please. We let you come
21 down. You've been at a number of
22 hearings. Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Levy.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Before we proceed, I want to recognize
3 Councilman Johnson.

4 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. I just wanted to note
6 just for the record, because I don't mind
7 agreeing to disagree with folks, but
8 about 95 percent of the information put
9 forth publicly -- and I don't have a
10 problem following up with the two
11 individuals -- totally inaccurate.
12 Public record can be researched on any of
13 those positions. I've engaged in several
14 different groups in my neighborhood
15 regarding any projects that we're doing.
16 However, in cases where we agree to
17 disagree, folks decide to take a
18 position, rather it be publicly, from
19 their own perspective, because you're not
20 doing it according to their agenda, how
21 they want things to be done. And that's
22 the neighborhood that I lived in all my
23 life. Anyone that knows me in the
24 neighborhood know that I stand firmly on
25 what I'm advocating for, the actual place

2 my family and I still reside. But
3 nevertheless, it will be addressed.

4 Thank you very much,
5 Mr. Council President, for your time.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman.

8 (Audience members yelling.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Excuse me. Excuse me. All right.
11 Folks, you have an opportunity. If you
12 want to testify, come down and sign up.
13 You can testify at the mic, please. So
14 please no hollering from the rafters.
15 Thank you.

16 Yes, sir.

17 MR. LEVY: Thank you very much,
18 Mr. President and Councilmembers. My
19 name is Joseph Levy. I am representing
20 the American Sun Tanning Association. I
21 am Executive Director of International
22 Smart Tan Network, the educational
23 institute for professional tanning
24 facilities all across the United States.

25 I'll be concise and appreciate

2 the opportunity. We support legislation
3 that constructively bolstered the
4 standards that professional tanning
5 salons already have in place, informed
6 parental consent before a minor uses a
7 tanning facility. So we'd like to
8 congratulate Councilman Greenlee for
9 pursuing this approach, educating parents
10 and children that there are risks to
11 overexposure while acknowledging that
12 many in the healthcare field and many
13 parents support the concept of getting a
14 base tan in a moderate and responsible
15 fashion.

16 We have one minor objection, a
17 very easy fix that we'd like to suggest
18 to this bill. While the legislation
19 promotes education for both parents and
20 teenagers, it perhaps unintentionally
21 treats parents like teenagers. It
22 requires a parent to accompany a teenager
23 on every single tanning salon session as
24 opposed to signing an informed consent
25 form on the initial session that

2 acknowledges that there are dangers of
3 overexposure and that the parent allows
4 the child to use the tanning facility.
5 We would support that approach fully.

6 With me are Valerie Lavinia
7 from Hollywood Tans, owns several
8 facilities here in Philadelphia, and
9 Carol Statts, who is a mother of three
10 sons who all use tanning units, who would
11 be inconvenienced by that standard, who
12 doesn't have the time to accompany them
13 on every single session, but has worked
14 with her sons and her family to
15 understand that there are risks to
16 overexposure. She teaches them sunburn
17 prevention.

18 There are many other parents
19 and Valerie has collected letters from
20 many of the parents, from Anne Marie
21 Parker, who has a teenager that she
22 teaches to make these intelligent
23 decisions; from Darlene Horne, who is a
24 16-year-old who has eczema, who tans
25 after school a couple of times a week to

2 treat her eczema as a low cost way to do
3 this, lower cost than going through the
4 healthcare system, but she cannot attend
5 the sessions with her because she's at
6 work; from Grace Lazia, who is a teenager
7 who says this is an extreme
8 inconvenience.

9 So this change that we would
10 suggest protects the spirit of Councilman
11 Greenlee's bill without driving business
12 outside of Philadelphia, which this bill
13 would do if in fact you required parents
14 to attend every single session, because
15 they would be able to tan in salons
16 outside of the City limits. And it
17 respects the ability of your citizens to
18 make informed choices for their families.

19 So we would support that minor
20 change. We encourage you -- and we spoke
21 with Councilman Greenlee about that. We
22 encourage you to understand the whole
23 facts about this.

24 Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you for your testimony.

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:

4 Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Councilman.

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Very
8 quickly.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Councilman Greenlee.

11 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
12 you. Just very quickly, I think you
13 heard both sides of this argument. I
14 just want to -- as in much legislation,
15 we try to find a middle ground. American
16 Cancer Society, even though they never
17 spoke to me, wanted teens banned totally.
18 The gentleman that just spoke wants a
19 parent just to sign once. We think this
20 is a good middle ground, the parent
21 accompanies the child to each session so
22 he or she can see the effects each time.

23 Melanoma is a very serious
24 disease, often caused by these tanning
25 beds. So I think we've reached a middle

2 ground on this bill.

3 Thank you, Mr. President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilman.

6 Mr. Decker.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Clarc King,

8 commenting on 120118.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

11 morning.

12 MR. KING: Thank you, President

13 of the Council. Thank you, members of

14 the Council. I come once again to

15 protest the sale of Philadelphia Gas

16 Works to a private entity.

17 I don't see the benefit to the

18 population generally. PGW undergirds the

19 City's economy, and the sale will

20 probably threaten the survival actually

21 of the citizenry.

22 Philadelphia must disentangle

23 itself from too-big-to-fail management,

24 and I reference the Dodd-Frank Act.

25 Public sector finance of government has

2 become warfare conducted by other means,
3 forcing the shutdown of schools, the
4 sell-off of property and assets, and the
5 purging of its workers.

6 I ask once again that the City
7 consider the public bank of Philadelphia.
8 It must become a reality.

9 I'd like to thank the City
10 Council members, the President of the
11 Council in advance to vote no on 13022
12 [sic] and move Wells Fargo to a
13 month-to-month status while the City
14 pursues the creation of the public bank
15 of Philadelphia.

16 Drexel University is hosting
17 the public bank of Philadelphia
18 organization tonight, and I ask that the
19 members attend.

20 Thank you very much.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you for your testimony.

23 (Applause.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: Kenneth Walker.

25 Kenneth Walker, commenting on 130428.

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2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 MR. WALKER: Good afternoon.

4 Pastor Kenneth Walker, the First Born
5 Church.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 afternoon.

8 MR. WALKER: We honor you. We
9 thank Council President and Councilman
10 Jones for enabling us to finally get to
11 the place where we can be relocated at
12 51st and Merion Street. The First Born
13 Church was uprooted, moved, promised at
14 the Parkside. We were there since 2000,
15 and after 2008 we lost our church under
16 eminent domain actually. And I just want
17 to say that -- thank Councilman Jones for
18 his response to us and helping us to be
19 relocated.

20 I just want to say that it
21 would be really nice if we could all --
22 during these kind of processes under
23 eminent domain, sometimes we have to move
24 out of the district. And so there's no
25 soon to be no collaboration with the

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2 other districts when you move or to get a
3 property or something to be relocated.

4 And so we need that help.

5 I sponsor a prayer for a better
6 Philadelphia every Saturday morning from
7 6:00 to 6:30 a.m. for one half an hour.
8 We pray for a better Philadelphia. And I
9 believe that it would be easier for the
10 churches -- it's a difficult thing for
11 church and state to be able to work
12 together. I don't know why, but we're
13 just saying people vote, and so we need
14 that kind of understanding.

15 We would have to move. We did
16 not want to move from 52nd and Jefferson
17 Street. We had a nice place. It was a
18 wonderful location, but we gave it up for
19 the mall, and it took so long for us to
20 even get to this place in relocation. We
21 going to yet need your support as we go
22 through to finishing this process,
23 because to build we still going to need
24 some more support. And we appreciate all
25 your support. It's been a long journey

2 trying to get back to church as we knew
3 it. So please.

4 Thank you so very much. Help
5 us in the future that we can do the work
6 that God called us to do as a church and
7 as a neighborhood and as a people.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Pastor.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Sylana

13 Christopher, commenting on 130225.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MS. CHRISTOPHER: Good morning,
18 President Clarke and City Council
19 audience. My name is Sylana Christopher.
20 I am a Fight for Philly member and a
21 parent of three.

22 (Applause.)

23 MS. CHRISTOPHER: I'm here
24 today to ask City Council why are you
25 guys so quick to award a City contract to

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2 Wells Fargo? Council has spent months
3 working on AVI and weeks trying to find
4 enough money for our schools, but it has
5 spent almost no time in consideration
6 giving lucrative City contract to a bank
7 that has directly harmed our city.

8 Wells Fargo is getting a free
9 pass, just like many other big businesses
10 and big banks in Philadelphia, but Wells
11 Fargo --

12 (Applause.)

13 MS. CHRISTOPHER: But Wells
14 Fargo should be paying its fair share as
15 well.

16 Why are we granting a contract
17 to a bank that engaged in risky swap
18 deals with the City and schools, costing
19 millions of dollars that could be funding
20 teachers and supplies? I worry that City
21 Council's commitment is to getting money
22 from regular people as myself, but not
23 enough to make sure that huge profitable
24 banks pay their fair share.

25 Wells Fargo --

2 (Applause.)

3 MS. CHRISTOPHER: Wells Fargo
4 has taken money from our schools and our
5 children. We are their executive -- why
6 are their executives not here today?
7 They should be arguing their case if they
8 want the City's business, and they should
9 be repaying money that they've taken.
10 Wells Fargo's contract should be
11 continued on good behavior and fair
12 dealings. There's no reason for the City
13 to be frantically looking for money while
14 it gives the banks big pass.

15 So today I rely on City Council
16 to do what is right and help the City of
17 Philadelphia.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you.

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Goode.

23 COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. I'm actually growing
25 tired of fake activism. I'm actually

2 growing tired of people who don't realize
3 what hard work has been done over several
4 years. We're not even here today
5 debating about Wells Fargo. The bill is
6 not coming up for a vote. It is an
7 Administration bill because the
8 Administration selected Wells Fargo.
9 When there's an Administration bill that
10 comes before Council to be introduced, it
11 comes through the Council President. The
12 Council President's Office asked me to
13 introduce the bill to make sure that the
14 work that's been done into this process
15 in terms of fair lending, community
16 reinvestment went through the right
17 process. And so essentially I have not
18 just for the last year but the last
19 several years, maybe a decade or more,
20 established model legislation nationally
21 to look at certain issues.

22 So I don't disagree with the
23 issue of whether Wells Fargo and other
24 big banks have done some bad things. I
25 was against big banks before it was

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2 popular to be against big banks. The
3 truth of the matter is, I can still be
4 against big banks. What I'm actually
5 dealing with today is the fact that if we
6 don't want to do business with Wells
7 Fargo, then we can consider Councilman
8 Kenney's bill to just take them off the
9 list. I've actually taken banks off the
10 list several times.

11 When I first came to Council,
12 there were 30 depositories. I whittled
13 it down to eight depositories because of
14 the things that people weren't doing. I
15 consistently take people off the list
16 every year. If we want to take them off
17 the list, we can do it.

18 Secondly, this issue came up
19 last year, and I voted against Wells
20 Fargo. And last year I oversaw the
21 process that the City Treasurer's Office
22 went through to make sure there was a
23 fair process, to make sure that people
24 actually looked at the lending disparity
25 studies that were done, to make sure that

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2 community reinvestment goals were set, to
3 make sure that fair lending plans were
4 done to address lending disparities that
5 existed within those studies, and to make
6 sure that everything was done fair and
7 square.

8 I don't care who won or who
9 lost, and there's no voting on it today.
10 If someone is sincere about their
11 activism, then what they're looking for
12 is, one, just to remove Wells Fargo as a
13 bank, period, and we'll vote on that,
14 and/or if you care about swaps, then put
15 that in the criteria for how we select
16 our payroll depositories. But to just do
17 something for the sake of activism to
18 draw attention to an issue that's not
19 even necessarily a real issue related to
20 the City itself. When the issue of swaps
21 came up originally, I brought the issue
22 of swaps, because I was working with a
23 Councilman out of Los Angeles, Councilman
24 Alarcon. At that point, SEIU was working
25 on the issues of swaps. Councilman

2 Alarcon amended his legislation modeled
3 after my legislation to take into
4 consideration swaps.

5 So then we examined the swap
6 issue here. We found that it didn't
7 really apply to the City. It applied
8 more to the School District and the
9 Delaware River Port Authority and some
10 other entities.

11 There have been no swap deals
12 done under the Nutter Administration,
13 period. This is an old issue. And I'll
14 be more blunt since someone tried to boo
15 when I said fake activism. I was
16 actually told by some of the organizers
17 around this issue that when it was pushed
18 last year, it was pushed to help
19 President Obama. That's why I didn't
20 speak about it being a fake issue. But I
21 am not going to jeopardize the work that
22 I've done and had people play around this
23 issue of responsible banking. It's a
24 real issue that we will deal with in
25 several different ways. If you want to

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2 add the criteria related to swaps, then
3 let's do that. If you want to go after
4 specific banks, let's do that. But let's
5 protect a system and protect a process
6 that's been set up over years where what
7 we've seen is there are times when --
8 and, in fact, in testimony on this bill,
9 we had someone testify that other banks
10 should be used because they didn't do
11 swaps. One of the banks they cited that
12 should be used was TD Bank. TD Bank only
13 gave 4.3 percent of its home mortgages to
14 African Americans. Did the activists
15 know that? No. So let's just call it
16 what it is. People are using an issue to
17 be against big banks in general, but if
18 you want to hold big banks accountable,
19 do the homework to find out how to do it.
20 Let's amend our laws to say let's take
21 swaps into consideration. And if you
22 take swaps into consideration, then let's
23 have a fair competition, and that's that.

24 I don't really care at the end
25 of the day whether it's Wells Fargo or

2 which bank it is. We're not voting on
3 this bill today. We probably won't vote
4 on this bill at least until the end of
5 the session. You can come here every
6 week and say it shouldn't be Wells Fargo.
7 At the end of the day, I might agree with
8 you, but the question is the same as I
9 asked at the hearing, who should it be?

10 Thank you, Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

5 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
6 amending Chapter 19-200 of The

9 authorizing the City Treasurer to deposit
10 funds in Bank of New York Mellon.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Councilman Kenney.

13 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. First of all, I'd like to
15 say that in the length of time that I've
16 sat here, I must say that I've greatly
17 admired Councilman Goode's efforts in
18 basically throttling Wells Fargo for so
19 many years to make them into an
20 institution that takes into consideration
21 how they lend, where they lend, who they
22 lend to. There's been a number of
23 efforts that he put forward, resolutions
24 and bills, and I think I can easily say
25 that I've supported a hundred percent of

2 Councilman Goode's legislation since he's
3 been here and I've had a chance to vote.
4 So I have sat in admiration of his
5 doggedness in dealing with institutions
6 that do not show compassion,
7 understanding, and fairness to people in
8 our community.

9 I'm going to ask you if you
10 would, and I've asked you in advance, to
11 hold this bill, because I think part of
12 this whole overall discussion is what our
13 relationship is with our banking
14 institutions. At one point in time when
15 Wachovia was close to going insolvent, we
16 had 90 percent of our deposits in that
17 bank. God knows what would have happened
18 if they had gone under with that amount
19 of money of City taxpayers' dollars in
20 that bank.

21 There's about \$200 million --
22 not to pick on Wells Fargo, but there's
23 about \$220 million in deposits at that
24 bank as we speak, and there are other
25 banking institutions that obviously hold

2 large sums of our money.

3 I watch television at times and
4 I see advertisements for commercial banks
5 that talk about customer service, and
6 customer service is their prime approach
7 in trying to get people to put their
8 money in their bank, and we are a big
9 customer for a lot of banks, Wells Fargo
10 included, and we may be some of those
11 bank's biggest customers. There seems to
12 be no leverage unless Councilman Goode
13 has done the things in the past to
14 leverage change in behavior. And I've
15 turned to Councilman Goode this morning
16 and talked about New York Mellon, and he
17 is my community banking expert, that they
18 did not get a very good rating in New
19 York. Why we're sending Philadelphia
20 dollars to a New York-based bank without
21 a really full explanation. Now, I'm not
22 on the Finance Committee. I did not
23 participate in the hearing, but I don't
24 think there was a large discussion or a
25 wide-ranging discussion on why the

2 Administration or the Treasurer needs to
3 have this bank as a depository.

4 There was a time in our city
5 when banks were headquartered here in
6 Philadelphia. Their national
7 headquarters were here. There was a lot
8 of gravitas and a lot more involvement
9 with local banks that were headquartered
10 nationally here. We've lost that because
11 of the economy and ways things have
12 changed over the years. So a lot of
13 these banks are headquartered in other
14 parts of the country, and even though
15 they're a local presence, they are
16 involved in community activities and they
17 have changed their ways with community
18 lending. I think we don't utilize the
19 opportunity to leverage behavior better
20 than we do.

21 There's a lot of things that
22 went on during the course of that fiscal
23 crisis we just faced in this country. A
24 lot of people lost a lot of money. A lot
25 of taxpayers' money was used to make

2 banks whole again. People's 401k's
3 weren't made whole again. People's
4 mortgages weren't made whole again.
5 People lost their houses. And no one
6 went to jail. No one was investigated or
7 indicted. All these large banks all
8 got -- all their CEOs got all their
9 bonuses like it never -- they never
10 skipped a beat. And we can't turn the
11 clock back, but I say in going forward,
12 we need better standards that we have to
13 employ to spread our money around to the
14 institutions that do the right thing.
15 And as I think about that, I'm thinking
16 about the School District. I mean, we
17 are scrambling, literally scrambling, to
18 find money for our schools. And we need
19 to do that, and I understand that.
20 Harrisburg has pretty much walked away.
21 The feds have stopped giving. And we're
22 still stuck with having to deal with what
23 we have to deal with. They could play a
24 role in this. They could play a role in
25 providing at least some time, if not some

2 money, to back off some of these debt
3 service payments and swap deal exit
4 payments and all the other things that we
5 have to do.

6 So, again, based on what
7 Councilman Goode has said relative to his
8 relationship with Wells Fargo and what
9 he's been able to make them do, the right
10 thing, I think going forward, the Mayor
11 and this body needs to fairly vet what
12 these banks are about, what their
13 activities were during the course of the
14 fiscal crisis and make good banking
15 decisions as a big customer that we are.

16 So thank you for agreeing to
17 hold this bill today, Mr. President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 The Chair recognizes Councilman
21 Goode.

22 COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. I agree totally that we
24 need to have a discussion about how we
25 measure banks, and we need to take that

2 seriously. I'm going to continue to be
3 blunt, not just as I was earlier in this
4 meeting but as I was at the Finance
5 Committee hearing.

6 The City of Philadelphia
7 releases an annual lending disparity
8 study every year that's about this thick.
9 I read it cover to cover. New York also
10 releases a disparity study that's not
11 quite as thick.

12 As I became a part of this
13 national organization looking at
14 municipal policy, I became a part of it
15 because I was asked to be a keynote
16 speaker at a responsible banking
17 conference in New York. There's actually
18 a report that came out about how to do
19 local responsible banking ordinances. I
20 will provide that to each member of
21 Council as soon as I leave here
22 electronically.

23 In terms of whether we should
24 take this seriously, we should and we
25 have, and I thank Councilman Kenney for

2 voting for actually every piece of
3 responsible banking legislation that I've
4 offered. To know how seriously we have
5 taken it, this report will show you how
6 we measure up to other cities. We are
7 considered the leader.

8 Since my legislation back in
9 around 2001, 2002, several cities have
10 embarked upon this, particularly after
11 the convening conference we had. I've
12 advised San Francisco. I've advised San
13 Diego. I've advised Los Angeles.

14 There's nothing wrong with the
15 laws that we have on the books now, and
16 so the banks that have come before us
17 have gone through a rigorous process. If
18 we want to add to that process, I'm fair
19 game to that. This bill in particular I
20 wouldn't say let's just hold it. Why?
21 Because it's irrelevant. For anyone who
22 actually understands a portion of the
23 City Charter with regard to our authority
24 and the City Treasurer's authority, our
25 authority is simply to authorize and

2 establish criteria. The City Treasurer's
3 authority is to decide where the money
4 goes. We can at any time decide to do
5 whatever we want in terms of deciding who
6 should be a City depository. We can
7 authorize people. We can revoke their
8 authorization. We can set standards for
9 it, which I've done time and time and
10 time again. But this is not an issue to
11 just discuss. We should hold this bill
12 today and then if Fight for Philly, Anne
13 Gemmell, Jim Kenney or anyone else wants
14 to actually examine this issue and take
15 it seriously, then let's legislate on it
16 and not just talk about it.

17 Thank you, Mr. President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 The Chair recognizes Councilman
21 Green.

22 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. I too want to commend
24 Councilman Goode and note that during the
25 hearing in the Finance Committee, which I

2 chair, on this bill that Councilman Goode
3 specifically asked Bank of New York
4 Mellon if they were going to comply with
5 the laws that he has put in place, noted
6 why they were not currently a depository,
7 and received an affirmative response from
8 them that they intend to do so.

9 I have no objection holding
10 this bill for two weeks. However, I want
11 to be clear that the City Treasurer made
12 clear to the Finance Committee, which as
13 Councilman Kenney notes he is not on,
14 that the leverage was applied to the Bank
15 of New York Mellon in terms of providing
16 the City a direct economic benefit worth
17 millions of dollars in connection with
18 commercial loans and other things we are
19 going to get as a benefit or as part of
20 making this bank a City depository, and
21 that has been a strategy that our City
22 Treasurer has followed with commercial
23 banks and investment banks with which
24 they are choosing to do business, saving
25 us millions of dollars, leveraging our

2 depository and other relationships with
3 those banks.

4 So it is in fact being done.
5 We are leveraging these relationships
6 and, as a consequence, saving millions of
7 dollars of taxpayers' money every single
8 year through the great work of our City
9 Treasurer in this regard.

10 Thank you, Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Jones.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes,
16 Mr. President. Very briefly. One good
17 thing about your presidency and
18 administration is that you pick chairmen
19 on their area of interest but also their
20 area of expertise as well as their area
21 of effort, and I don't think anyone has
22 given more expertise, effort, and concern
23 to the issue of banking other than
24 Councilman Goode.

25 And I think it's important to

1 5/23/13 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 note that this bill was submitted by
3 myself on your behalf, and at least two
4 sets of eyes read it, and then after they
5 read it, checked back with the expert in
6 this body on responsible banking and gave
7 us a thumb's up and comfort zone.

8 So I echo Councilman Kenney's
9 seal of approval, if you would, on this
10 particular matter, and I'm ready to hold
11 it, ready to move it. It's the will of
12 the body, but I do know that this body
13 takes banking and responsible banking and
14 responsible lending and responsible
15 inclusion in contracts very seriously,
16 and I would defer to my colleague in his
17 area of expertise.

18 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Goode.

23 COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. I'll be really brief. I
25 want to thank Councilman Green for

2 reminding me something I forgot that
3 happened at the hearing. Essentially I
4 did remind Bank of New York that they
5 were removed from the list, and they said
6 they knew that they fell out of
7 compliance, but they didn't know they
8 were removed from the list. And I said,
9 Yeah, you were removed from the list
10 because I took you off the list. And
11 then I asked him, Do you want to play by
12 the rules now?

13 They said, Yes.

14 I said, And if not, I'll take
15 you off the list again.

16 So in terms of how seriously we
17 take that, those people who were at the
18 Finance Committee hearing know it. Those
19 people who have been here for several
20 years know it. If we want to get more
21 serious about it, then let's get more
22 serious about it. And so if we want to
23 hold this bill, fine, but this bill is
24 actually not serious enough to hold. So
25 we can move forward or hold it. It makes

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman.

5 There are no other conversation
6 on this particular bill, as a person who
7 likes to keep their word, I was asked

10 held and it will be on the Final Passage
11 Calendar at our next session of Council.

12 ultimately there's an undisputed amount
13 of money of \$66 million that we have
14 authorized to be paid to them. And I

17 have championed the causes of our
18 firefighters and in particular, Council
19 President, your efforts on behalf of all
20 our City workers is really to be
21 commended. Of course, we have our role,
22 the Administration has its role, but I
23 think that we have stepped up and done
24 something that is in the best interest of
25 our city.

14 Next week at Yesha Fellowship Hall in
15 South Philadelphia, May 28th at 2:00
16 p.m., State Representative Jordan Harris
17 will be hosting a public hearing for
18 House Bill 908 and House Bill 909, which
19 propose amending legislation regarding
20 the process of the expungement of certain
21 crimes. And so he have introduced
22 legislation to amend our state penal
23 code, and he will be hosting a hearing
24 along with State Senator Shirley Kitchen
25 at Yesha Ministry Halls, and the hearing

3 on expunging certain crimes.

4 Oftentimes individuals go and
5 apply for a position. You don't have to
6 just only have a felony, but various
7 misdemeanors or any time you're actually

9 bill will explore the possibility of
10 expunging certain crimes of individuals'
11 criminal records. So we want all
12 individuals to come out who is interested
13 in that area. That's May 28th at 2:00
14 p.m. at Yesha Fellowship Hall.

15 Last, but not least, as always,
16 yesterday myself, Councilman Mark
17 Squilla, and Councilwoman Jannie
18 Blackwell, we attended a press conference
19 held by the Crosstown Coalition of
20 Taxpayers. The Coalition released its
21 report compiled by industry experts using
22 the available assessment data that we
23 recently requested from the
24 Administration regarding AVI. The report
25 found that the rate of error is far

2 beyond industry standards, something many
3 residents have expected since February.

4 I want to commend Councilman
5 Mark Squilla for arranging and requesting
6 that OPA actually sit down with the
7 Crosstown Coalition so they can compare
8 data and actually really defend if their
9 formula is accurate and the numbers
10 according to their formula are accurate
11 as we move forward with AVI. At least
12 sitting down with the Crosstown Coalition
13 and comparing both sets of numbers will
14 give the public more confidence in this
15 process. And, again, my public position
16 has always been I think the numbers are
17 still flawed just personally myself just
18 based upon the inaccuracy that we
19 received early on, but I do want to thank
20 Councilman Mark Squilla for stepping up
21 to the plate, reaching out to OPA, and
22 requesting a meeting with the Crosstown
23 Coalition and OPA regarding AVI and its
24 formula.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman.

5 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: And also
6 if everyone can have a great Memorial Day
7 weekend with their families and just have
8 an opportunity to enjoy themselves.
9 Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, sir.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Henon.

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
15 Council President. Today I introduced a
16 bill that exempts manufacturers from the
17 use and occupancy tax entirely. As I've
18 said before, and I'll say it again, I'm
19 committed to ensuring that Philadelphia
20 becomes a major national and
21 international center for manufacturing.

22 I know that there are many
23 different budgetary interests and needs
24 out there, but I believe in
25 Philadelphia's ability as a manufacturing

2 hub can make Philadelphia stronger. I'm
3 not certain what the outcome of these
4 conversations will be, and I hope by
5 introducing this exemption, we can have a
6 thoughtful dialogue. As always, I
7 welcome feedback from this body, any
8 suggestions, and look forward to the
9 conversations that lie ahead of us.

10 In addition, I want to draw
11 attention to the bill that we, you,
12 Council President, Councilman Oh, and
13 myself, introduced today that will give
14 this Council the authority to hire an
15 audit to audit OPA and will give us the
16 access of the data and information about
17 OPA's process, like the methodology, the
18 work product and/or their lack of.

19 So moving forward with
20 transparency and objectivity, to post
21 annual assessments publicly, I'm pretty
22 excited about that. I'm excited about
23 the prospect of finally having some
24 answers from OPA, and I commend you for
25 your leadership on this issue.

2 That's all I have. Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman.

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman
6 O'Brien.

7 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. Last week, 317 violent
9 crimes were reported to the Philadelphia
10 Police Department. That number includes
11 two homicides, 64 gun robberies, and 42
12 aggravated assaults with a gun.

13 Since the start of 2013, 92
14 families lost a loved one due to violence
15 in our city. This violence also deeply
16 wounds our entire community.

17 Unfortunately, the community's
18 relationship with law enforcement has
19 been historically stressed, strained, and
20 fractured in many neighborhoods for a
21 multitude of reasons. Honestly, I think
22 more work needs to be done to repair
23 those relationships in an honest and open
24 fashion. Misconceptions and preconceived
25 ideas need to be cleared out.

2 The notion that some
3 neighborhoods do not care is simply
4 false. The good people in our
5 neighborhoods far outnumber the
6 troublemakers. That isn't a perception.
7 The data tells us this is fact. The data
8 tells us that a very small number of
9 individuals are causing the majority of
10 gun violence in our city.

11 The focused deterrence strategy
12 is built upon three pillars: social
13 services, community voices, and law
14 enforcement. Each performs its own
15 integrated function for the success of
16 the strategy.

17 Today, I wanted to specifically
18 talk about the community or moral voices
19 component of that strategy. The focused
20 deterrence strategy identifies, engages,
21 and uses community figures willing to
22 articulate key community standards to
23 members of targeted groups at a call-in.
24 Those standards are, the violence is
25 wrong. There is no excuse for committing

2 violence. You're doing enormous damage
3 to yourself, your family, and your
4 community. You're better than this. We
5 care about you. We need you, and we want
6 to help you.

7 We're challenging the street
8 code. It's not okay to go to prison.
9 It's not okay to die. It's not okay to
10 hurt someone, and your group will not
11 have your back. The voices are community
12 elders, family members, mothers of
13 murdered children, mothers whose sons
14 have gone to prison, old head
15 ex-offenders, and faith leaders. These
16 strong critical voices combined to
17 articulate community standards and morals
18 to undercut the street code. The
19 community has simply decided enough. The
20 community has decided the violence must
21 stop.

22 I hear their collective moral
23 voice and I want to amplify it. I
24 believe the effective and proven focused
25 deterrence strategy can help them deliver

2 their message and reduce gun violence in
3 our city.

4 Thank you, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilman.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman
8 Green.

9 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. I just want to briefly
11 commend Councilmember Greenlee on the
12 bill that passed today, 130057, with
13 respect to the regulation of tanning
14 facilities. Recently my family has
15 experienced a number of people who had
16 some serious operations due to melanoma.
17 I myself have an appointment with a
18 dermatologist this evening on this very
19 topic. And I also want to note the
20 presence of my former Director of
21 Constituent Services, Marita Crawford,
22 who is here today, who when she was on
23 the State Board of Cosmetology as
24 Governor Rendell's appointee tried to
25 have just such a law passed at the state

2 level, and once again Philadelphia is
3 going to have to lead to get the state to
4 pay attention to this very important
5 issue.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman.

8 The Chair recognizes
9 Councilwoman Brown.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. You may recall as a
12 result of the AVI hearings and, more
13 importantly, the AVI public testimony
14 that we were -- it was affirmed that the
15 lack of awareness of the rollout of AVI
16 was not where it should be, and
17 vulnerable populations, particularly
18 seniors and hard to reach populations
19 that include those who don't speak
20 English, revealed to us that we needed to
21 do more as a body.

22 I introduced a resolution
23 calling for hearings on that topic asking
24 members of the Administration to come
25 back before us and tell us how we need to

2 do it better before the imposed
3 deadlines. In lieu of those hearings,
4 Councilwoman Tasco and Councilmember
5 Maria Quinones-Sanchez and I opted to
6 have a briefing with the Administration
7 that was led by Anna Wallace Adams, Chief
8 of Staff for the Office of Finance.

9 Subsequent to that briefing,
10 members were provided a menu of options
11 that we have to layer how we get to these
12 hard-to-reach populations. So I want to
13 offer a friendly reminder to my
14 colleagues that the Office of Finance,
15 specifically Anna Wallace Adams, need to
16 hear back from everyone by May 31st so
17 that she can hear from you how your
18 particular allocation will be spent. We
19 want to do better in reaching those
20 populations, and now the Administration
21 wants to help. So we need to do our part
22 and tell them how we want to do that. As
23 of yesterday, she's anxiously waiting to
24 hear from all of us. So if we could
25 please act on that and do all that we can

2 to better reach seniors, hard-to-reach
3 populations, and the vulnerable citizens
4 across the City around the protections
5 for AVI.

6 Thank you, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilwoman. And with that,
9 I call on you again for a motion to
10 adjourn.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Surely. I
12 move that Council stand adjourned until
13 Thursday, June 6th, 2013 at 10:00 a.m.

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
16 has been moved and properly seconded that
17 Council stand adjourned until Thursday,
18 June 6th, 2013.

19 All those in favor?

20 (Aye.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Those opposed?

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 ayes have it. Council shall stand
