8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. On behalf of the
10 majority, there are no requests for
11 leaves of absence today.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 The Chair now recognizes
15 Councilman O'Neill.

16 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:
17 Mr. President, on behalf of the
18 republicans, there are no requests for
19 leave of absence.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 Chair thanks the Councilman.

22 At this time, I would like to
23 dispense with the regular order of
24 business and I would like to welcome and
25 thank all of our visitors day. We really

4 in action. We hope that you genuinely
5 enjoy yourself, and we'd like to see you
6 come back again. So, again, thank you
7 very much for your attendance.

8 At this time, I would like to
9 recognize Councilman Kenyatta Johnson,
10 who will present a resolution honoring
11 and recognizing and commending WURD Radio
12 for its ten years of service as "The
13 Voice of the Community." Would
14 Ms. Stephanie Renee and those
15 accompanying her please join the
16 Councilman at the podium.

17 And joining Councilman Johnson
18 we have Councilwoman Tasco, Councilwoman
19 Blackwell, and Councilman Jones and
20 Councilwoman Bass, and we also have
21 Councilwoman Brown.

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
23 morning, everyone.

24 (Good morning.)

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Today I'm

2 truly honored and privileged to stand
3 with my colleagues and honor an
4 organization that serves as the voice of
5 the African American community.

6 WURD, for the last ten years,
7 has provided a venue and a voice for the
8 African American community to talk about
9 all issues that relates to improving the
10 quality of our lives. Either focusing on
11 the issue of politics, focusing on the
12 issue of health, focusing on the issue of
13 small business development, this radio
14 station has challenged elected officials,
15 it has challenged community leaders to
16 always step to the plate and make sure
17 that as we lead, as we advocate, and as
18 we move forward on issues pertinent
19 primarily to the City of Philadelphia,
20 that they will always serve as the voice
21 on all issues affecting not only the
22 African American community but the City
23 of Philadelphia as a whole. And I want
24 to specifically thank the Lomax family
25 for putting up their personal wealth, for

2 taking the risk and investing in a radio
3 station to make sure that the African
4 American community will have a voice.

5 And so at this time, along with
6 my colleagues, the resolution reads:

7 Honoring, recognizing and commending WURD
8 Radio for its ten years of service as
9 "The Voice of the African American
10 Community."

11 Whereas, WURD Radio is the only
12 African American-owned and operated radio
13 station in the Commonwealth of
14 Pennsylvania. Celebrating ten years as
15 "The Voice of the African American
16 Community," WURD serves as the heartbeat
17 of the urban market, providing
18 information and solutions that educate,
19 uplift and inspire the heart and soul of
20 Philadelphia;

21 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Whereas,
22 900AM WURD offers a unique two-way talk
23 format that is widely recognized as the
24 pulse of the African American community
25 locally, regionally, and nationally.

2 WURD has helped shape every major event
3 in the region, from mayoral races to
4 presidential elections, from the street
5 corner to the corner suite, WURD has
6 tackled the hard issues as an
7 influential, respected and powerful voice
8 in the marketplace; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
10 WURD has one of the most popular morning
11 show programs, "Wake Up With WURD,"
12 hosted by Stephanie Renee and a team of
13 co-hosts as the only show in the market
14 that boasts the Mayor, School
15 Superintendent, District Attorney and
16 Executive Director of the Philadelphia
17 Housing Authority as regular monthly
18 guests. WURD also features regular
19 issue-driven conversations with U.S.
20 Congressman Robert Brady and U.S. Senator
21 Robert Casey. In addition, WURD is the
22 exclusive broadcaster of Philadelphia
23 City Council's weekly proceedings;

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
25 additionally, WURD relaunched its website

2 with a heightened emphasis on dynamic
3 content and social media and debuted a
4 customized WURD application for mobile
5 devices so listeners can take WURD
6 anywhere; and

7 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
8 Whereas, beyond the airwaves, WURD has an
9 award-winning symposium series WURD
10 Speaks. This event gathers local,
11 national and international experts to --

12 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: -- share
13 insights on issues ranging from health
14 care, education, entertainment and
15 economic development to arts and culture
16 and civic engagement; and

17 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
18 by spreading its voice on air, online and
19 in the community, WURD has attracted
20 creative partnerships with blue chip
21 clients such as Universal Companies,
22 PECO, Keystone Mercy Health Plan, United
23 Health, Peirce College, Wells Fargo, and
24 PNC Bank. Leading organizations like the
25 Philadelphia Theatre Company, Art

2 Sanctuary, the Kimmel Center, the
3 University of Pennsylvania and WHYH have
4 also established strategic partnerships
5 with WURD on several groundbreaking
6 initiatives; and

7 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
8 WURD has become a gathering point for the
9 diverse voices that exist in the Delaware
10 Valley; now therefore

11 Resolved, by the Council of the
12 City of Philadelphia, that we hereby
13 honor, recognize, commend WURD Radio for
14 its ten years of service as "The Voice of
15 the African American Community."

16 Further resolved, that an
17 engrossed copy of this resolution be
18 presented to WURD Radio as evidence of
19 the sincere sentiments of this
20 legislative body. And at this time, with
21 my colleagues, I would like to present
22 this citation to Ms. Stephanie Renee on
23 behalf of the members of City Council.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

3 And let the record reflect that
4 Councilman Greenlee also joined the
5 podium.

6 MS. RENEE: Thank you,
7 Councilman Johnson and all of our elected
8 officials assembled. It is with great
9 honor that I stand before you today as
10 the Program Director of WURD to accept
11 this proclamation and to echo the words
12 of our President and General Manager Sara
13 Lomax-Reese, who couldn't be here today,
14 about the idea that talk radio is the
15 original social media, the idea that we
16 open up our airwaves to hear from the
17 public, to offer subjects where we can
18 engage with one another, hopefully
19 educate one another about what's
20 happening in our world, and inspire one
21 another to action to help right the
22 wrongs and to make sure that we are
23 keeping everyone abreast of those things
24 that are most important in our lives, and
25 we all, the entire team at WURD, take

3 we hope that in our continued presence
4 here in Council Chambers that broadcast
5 to our listeners and let everyone know
6 about the inner workings of what happens

10 and to keep those issues front and
11 foremost in our minds and engage everyone
12 in that process.

13 So we thank you for this
14 recognition today and look forward to
15 another ten years and beyond in engaging
16 in that process with the City of
17 Philadelphia.

20 Thank you.

21 Council will be at ease.

22 (Council at ease.)

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: At this
24 time, the Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Bobby Henon, who will present a

5 Accompanying him, Councilwoman
6 Sanchez, Councilman Oh, and someone needs
7 to take my reading space.

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
9 Majority Leader and members. We are
10 joined here with several friends of our
11 Chambers; more specifically, Bill Hunt
12 from AugustaWestland; John Grady, PIDC;
13 Henry Moore from Citizens Bank, along
14 with others from other organizations that
15 are trying to revitalize the
16 manufacturing sector here in the City of
17 Philadelphia.

18 Today we recognize National
19 Manufacturing Day, which is being
20 celebrated nationally. It's a nationwide
21 recognition of manufacturing. Over the
22 next course -- over the course of the
23 next two days, manufacturers like Tom
24 Keogh from Yards, Evan Malone from
25 NextFab, and our local roasters and

2 coffee equipment manufacturers like Green
3 Street and D&L, who are opening up their
4 doors for tours and listening tours, who
5 provided some of their coffee. So I
6 encourage you take some samples with you
7 when you leave these Chambers, stop by
8 and say hello.

9 Finally, as you know, this year
10 we launched a task force that's putting
11 together some recommendations on how we
12 can make Philadelphia a better place for
13 manufacturing. It is my goal and it is
14 our goal up here and it should be our
15 goal as the City of Philadelphia, which
16 it is, that we present a resolution that
17 we have already implemented, the report
18 and recommendations, that we have
19 established an Office of Policy
20 Manufacturing and Innovation here in the
21 City to bring local, state, federal
22 resources to help support and promote our
23 local manufacturing sector.

24 So today we have a resolution
25 that is honoring the National

3 Whereas, the City of
4 Philadelphia region is home to more than
5 23,000 direct manufacturing jobs in
6 fields which includes aerospace, baking,
7 brewery, energy, food processing, health
8 care, packing, printing, technology and
9 many other areas;

10 COUNCILMAN OH: Philadelphia's
11 manufacturing companies add to the
12 vitality and prosperity of our community
13 by providing above average wages,
14 creating family sustainability.
15 Manufacturing makes a significant
16 contribution to the local, state and
17 national economy; and

18 Whereas, Philadelphia and the
19 region helps to support an estimated 17.2
20 million jobs in the United States - about
21 one in six private-sector jobs. Nearly
22 12 million Americans (or 9 percent of the
23 workforce) are employed directly in
24 manufacturing; and

25 Whereas, the Mayor's

2 Manufacturing Matters Task Force works to
3 develop a strategy to promote and grow
4 this important sector of the economy.

5 Manufacturers in the Philadelphia region
6 and nation are the most productive in the
7 world, far surpassing the worker
8 productivity of any other major
9 manufacturing economy, leading to higher
10 wages and living standards; and

11 Whereas, Friday, October 4th,
12 2013 marks the 2nd anniversary of
13 National Manufacturing Day in the United
14 States of America. Groups both locally
15 and nationally will sponsor projects and
16 programs designed to create greater
17 awareness and consciousness of the
18 manufacturing sector, including factory
19 tours, networking events and educational
20 presentations; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
22 manufacturing events to highlight the
23 sector in the City and our five county
24 region will culminate with the National
25 Manufacturing Day, with planned

2 observances in hundreds of cities and
3 towns around the nation; and

4 Whereas, we in Philadelphia, a
5 world class city and the historical heart
6 of the United States, have a great
7 opportunity to focus the minds of our
8 citizens on this resurgence of the
9 manufacturing sector with the recognition
10 and the celebration of National
11 Manufacturing Day; and

12 Whereas, due to the ongoing
13 work of the Mayor's Manufacturing Task
14 Force, manufacturers will begin to
15 address the skilled labor shortages they
16 face, connect with future generations,
17 take charge of the public image of
18 manufacturing and ensure the ongoing
19 prosperity of the industry as a whole;
20 now therefore

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Resolved, by
22 the City Council of Philadelphia, that we
23 hereby recognize National Manufacturing
24 Day, Friday, October 4th, 2013.

25 Resolved further, that an

2 engrossed copy of this resolution be
3 presented to the representatives of the
4 Mayor's Manufacturing Task Force in
5 recognizing National Manufacturing Day.

6 And I also want to end and
7 encourage please take a look at some of
8 the literature that is spread around
9 through the Chambers today. We have a
10 lot of very good innovating and
11 encouraging and exciting events over the
12 next two days. We'd love to see you all.

13 Thank you all. Congratulations
14 to the industry.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: The Chair
17 recognizes Mr. Hunt for remarks.

18 MR. HUNT: Members of City
19 Council, Councilman Bobby Henon, fellow
20 Philadelphians, I want to thank you for
21 inviting me here in recognition of
22 National Manufacturing Day. My name is
23 Bill Hunt and I am the CEO of
24 AgustaWestland Philadelphia.

25 While our helicopters don't fly

2 under the radar, in the past years the
3 presence of our company may have. You
4 may be surprised to hear that we are a
5 commercial helicopter manufacturer here
6 in the City and have been in operation
7 for over 30 years. We operate on a
8 275,000 foot campus at Northeast Airport,
9 where we employ 560 people in production,
10 engineering, customer support, and
11 training roles. Last year, we delivered
12 over 50 helicopters, and our customers in
13 the region include Maryland State Police,
14 New Jersey State Police, and numerous
15 helicopter EMS operators, including one
16 that services Hahnemann Hospital right
17 here in the City.

18 At AgustaWestland, we are so
19 proud to be manufacturing here in the
20 City that our technicians wear uniforms
21 with pictures of our aircraft that say
22 "Made with Pride in Philadelphia."

23 In my role as CEO and as the
24 Co-Chair of Mayor Nutter's Manufacturing
25 Task Force, I have made it a priority to

2 help to grow the manufacturing industry
3 in the Philadelphia region by working
4 hand in hand with fellow business leaders
5 and policymakers to ensure that
6 Philadelphia can enhance its position as
7 being manufacturing friendly.

8 Critical to a successful
9 manufacturing operation are an available
10 and trained workforce, established and
11 reliable infrastructure, and partners in
12 government that have an understanding of
13 the value that manufacturing jobs bring
14 to our people and to our city. All of
15 you in this room are our partners and
16 play a key role in allowing the residents
17 of Philadelphia to thrive and our economy
18 to advance.

19 Industrial businesses as a
20 whole account for one in every five jobs
21 in the Philadelphia region and 1.3
22 billion in wages annually, but as
23 discussed in recent Manufacturing Task
24 Force meetings, advanced manufacturing,
25 including the work of AgustaWestland in

2 the design and assembly of
3 next-generation helicopters, is where the
4 City must catch up to ensure that jobs
5 stay within the City.

6 While our helicopters come from
7 Philadelphia, all of our people do not.
8 In order to fully staff our company with
9 the best technicians, engineers,
10 production managers, and support staff,
11 we regularly expand our recruiting
12 efforts outside the City. If the City of
13 Philadelphia remains serious about
14 growing its manufacturing base and
15 becoming a region that industrial
16 corporations and manufacturers see as a
17 boon for their business, we, industry,
18 must partner together with policymakers
19 and educators to ensure that we are
20 developing a workforce that is fully
21 trained and prepared the meats of
22 industry, and that bureaucracy does not
23 get in the way of doing business here in
24 the City.

25 I urge my fellow business

2 leaders and our elected officials to take
3 the lead in manufacturing Philadelphia's
4 future and prioritizing the needs to
5 adequately educate our children, attract
6 new business, and give our residents a
7 quality of life that exceeds that of a
8 decent wage. Manufacturing jobs do just
9 that. We must partner in teaching the
10 lesson that manufacturing is good for the
11 City and good for the citizens of
12 Philadelphia.

13 I thank you all for your time.
14 I look forward to your future support of
15 the manufacturing industry here in the
16 City of Philadelphia.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Council will
19 be at ease.

20 (Council at ease.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you so much.

23 At this time, the Chair
24 recognizes Councilman Kenyatta Johnson,
25 who will present a resolution honoring,

4 world without breast cancer a reality
5 throughout the Philadelphia tri-state
6 area. Would Carlos Hernandez and those
7 accompanying him please join the
8 Councilman at the podium.

9 And we also have Councilwoman
10 Brown, Councilwoman Blackwell, and
11 Councilwoman Tasco joining the
12 Councilman, and Councilwoman Sanchez and
13 Councilwoman Bass.

14 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
15 morning again.

16 (Good morning.)

17 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
18 morning.

19 (Good morning.)

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: That's
21 much better.

22 During this past summer, my
23 wife and I had an opportunity to
24 participate in the Walk for the Cure
25 event down on the Parkway, and during

2 this walk, I had an opportunity to
3 witness the advocacy, the passion of
4 those who are survivors of breast cancer,
5 those who advocate for family members who
6 have gone and passed away from breast
7 cancer. And so today real men wear pink
8 in honoring and in memory of those who
9 have passed away but, more importantly,
10 the survivors and those who continue to
11 go out and advocate and raise funds for
12 the Susan G. Komen Foundation.

13 And so today I'm truly honored
14 and privileged to support an organization
15 whose sole focus is to find a cure so
16 that all women -- and if they are in the
17 position where they happen to develop the
18 cancer gene, that there will be a cure.

19 And on a personal note, just
20 having family members that have gone
21 through it kind of really brought the
22 situation home to me, and so I definitely
23 want to step up to the plate and be an
24 advocate and support this cause.

25 And the resolution reads:

2 Recognizing and commending Susan G. Komen
3 Philadelphia for striving to make a world
4 without breast cancer a reality
5 throughout the Philadelphia tri-state
6 area.

7 Whereas, Susan G. Komen
8 Philadelphia is a local chapter of the
9 Susan G. Komen for the Cure, the world's
10 largest breast cancer organization, which
11 was founded in 1982 on the promise of
12 Nancy G. Brinker to her dying sister Suzy
13 and since 1982 has played a critical role
14 in every major advance in the fight
15 against breast cancer; and

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
17 Susan G. Komen Philadelphia is part of
18 Susan G. Komen for the Cure, the world's
19 largest grassroots network of breast
20 cancer survivors and activists fighting
21 to save lives, empower people, ensure
22 quality for all, and energize science to
23 find cures; and

24 Whereas, Susan G. Komen
25 Philadelphia services 15 counties in the

2 tri-state area, which encompasses
3 hundreds of thousands of men, women, and
4 children in the Komen community; and

5 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

6 Whereas, for over 30 years, Komen has
7 provided funding for basic clinical and
8 transitional breast cancer research as
9 well as innovative projects in the areas
10 of breast health education, breast cancer
11 screening, and treatment; and

12 Whereas, the Komen Philadelphia
13 Race for the Cure has generated \$51
14 million in grants for life-saving
15 programs in the tri-state area and funded
16 approximately 135,000 free mammograms for
17 local women in need while contributing
18 \$21 million to breast cancer research;
19 and

20 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
21 the Komen Philadelphia Race for the Cure
22 keeps the funding in the tri-state area.
23 The majority (75 percent) of the funds
24 from the race are used to advance the
25 Komen Philadelphia affiliate programs in

2 Philadelphia and the 14 surrounding
3 counties; and

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
5 Komen for the Cure states that its aim is
6 to "reduce the burden of breast cancer on
7 a global level." Today, Susan G. Komen
8 for the Cure is active in ending breast
9 cancer throughout the world by investing
10 \$790 million in breast cancer research
11 and 1.5 billion in community outreach
12 programs over the last 30 years; now,
13 therefore be it

22 qualified electors of the City of
23 Philadelphia of an amendment to The
24 Philadelphia Home Rule Charter to permit
25 City elected officials to become

4 from their City office, under certain
5 terms and conditions.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
7 bill will be referred to committee.

11 provision of the Philadelphia Home Rule
12 Charter so that City elected officials
13 may become candidates for nomination or
14 election to public office without first
15 resigning from their City office.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
17 that resolution will go to committee.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Oh.

20 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
21 much, Mr. President. Sixty-one years is
22 a long time, and in 1952, our city was in
23 a different place in the state, in this
24 region, and in the world. We were an
25 entity unto ourselves with over two

2 million residents and over 400,000
3 workers in the manufacturing field. As
4 we address this issue today and National
5 Manufacturing Week, we now have about
6 25,000 manufacturing employees.

7 Things have changed. Yet our
8 city is the most important city in
9 Pennsylvania when it comes to economic
10 development, growth through our airports,
11 our ports, our universities. Our School
12 District is larger than the next ten
13 school districts combined in size. We
14 have great things that we offer this
15 Commonwealth, and we also bear a lot of
16 the brunts of many of the problems that
17 are unique to Philadelphia and unlike
18 those of any other county.

19 Our city is a county, just one
20 of 67, and many people joke about how
21 we're hated by the rest of the
22 Commonwealth. I think that the "resign
23 to run" law that was put in place in 1952
24 has had the unintended consequence of
25 limiting the voice and the strength of

2 Philadelphia in influencing the direction
3 of our state.

4 In today's economy where cities
5 around the world are leading their
6 nation's economic growth and relevance,
7 our city is limited. We have great
8 representation in the federal and state
9 areas, but City officials are uniquely
10 and solely responsible for municipal
11 matters and representing the citizens and
12 the businesses of Philadelphia.

13 By introducing this bill, I
14 hope that we will bring in front of the
15 voters the opportunity to see that their
16 City-elected officials can better
17 represent them with greater strength on
18 all the matters that we are intimately
19 familiar with and that, yes, we need more
20 political power and more political say in
21 ensuring that Philadelphia's perspectives
22 are shared with the Commonwealth, not
23 only to be known for the bad things that
24 we have in our city but all the great
25 things that we have in our city that

2 benefit our entire state and that we need
3 to develop in further to ensure that the
4 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania moves
5 forward in a global economy.

6 With this, I submit this bill
7 that has been worked carefully and has

10 Committee.

3 destabilization of the City and its
4 priorities, the protection of the
5 population, caused by the money cartels
6 and the international energy cartels.

7 The destabilization offensive
8 taking place in our Congress and federal
9 administration shows us the deeper crisis
10 caused by the Wall Street and fed
11 unrelenting unemployment, unlimited
12 bailout system. The United States is in
13 submission to globalization. The
14 stabilization of the United States is the
15 only imperative, the only power on earth
16 that can save and elevate humanity.
17 Political leadership at every level must
18 work for this goal and restore the
19 American system of political economy.

20 The immediate implementation of
21 the Glass-Steagall standard in U.S.
22 banking is crucial to the national
23 stabilization and the formation of the
24 new economy. In Philadelphia, political
25 leadership must create an economy policy

20 fracking is going on, we're right
21 downstream. Our fish, our water, our
22 marine life, our recreation will be
23 severely damaged. I mean, it's no joke
24 when people set a fire to their spigot
25 and the depletion -- and the last time I

2 talked to their representatives, they
3 have not did an impact study for five,
4 ten, 50, 100 or 500 years of extracting
5 precious minerals and not knowing what
6 chemicals they're using. I would suggest

10 that a lot of this money can go to our
11 school system. We have plenty of money.
12 It's just how it's spent.

13 Last year I want to say as a
14 City employee without a contract in six
15 years, we're hustling backwards as our

17 needs to find a way to back up municipal
18 workers in 47 and 33, and I promise you,
19 we will not have a short memory come
20 election time this time around. We need
21 your support, as we support you when you
22 come bidding for votes.

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 ayes have it, and that resolution is also
4 adopted.

5 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
6 honoring Philadelphia Police Officers
7 John Callahan and John Pasquarello for
8 their heroic acts in saving the life of
9 9 year old Tommy Ramos, introduced by
10 Councilman Henon.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
15 of the resolution.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
18 been moved and properly seconded.

19 All those in favor?

12 matriculating high school students within
13 the School District of Philadelphia, who
14 are faced with School Counselor to
15 student ratios that far exceed
16 recommendations, are paired with college
17 access and preparatory programs,
18 introduced by Councilwoman Reynolds
19 Brown.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Brown.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. I move for the adoption.

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

11 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
12 other resolutions on the Final Passage
13 Calendar, Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

16 Are there any speeches on the
17 part of the minority?

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 O'Brien.

20 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. Thank you for affording
22 me this opportunity to address Council
23 about yesterday's unfair and unjust
24 demotion of 14 of our firefighters.
25 Fairness strips out bias. Fairness

2 removes feelings and extracts personal
3 interests. Fairness is sound, untainted
4 judgment.

5 Justice gives individuals their
6 due. Justice respects process. Justice
7 meets the highest ethical threshold.

8 The City Civil Service system
9 for hiring and promotion is built upon
10 principles of fairness and justice that
11 we can all accept as reasonable and
12 unbiased standards for determining what
13 people deserve. The City Charter
14 requires the Civil Service system for
15 hiring and promotion and spells out
16 mandatory requirements. I draw your
17 attention to some of the requirements to
18 the City Charter and regulations related
19 to the City's Civil Service system.

20 Vacancies are to be filled by
21 promotion. The Administration retains
22 considerable managerial discretion. The
23 Administration sets qualifications for
24 supervisory positions. The
25 Administration establishes the

2 examinations, sets the passing scores.

3 In other words, the Administration sets

4 the bar. Nobody can tell the

5 Administration how high or low to set

6 that bar.

7 The Administration determines

8 whether vacancies exist in the first

9 place. The Administration is not

10 required to replace every supervisor who

11 leaves City employment or is promoted.

12 The Administration decides how many

13 supervisors they need.

14 And, finally, the

15 Administration sets the bar for

16 promotions, develops and administers the

17 tests, and sets the passing score.

18 In the firefighter demotion

19 instance before us now, the

20 Administration determined that vacancies

21 existed and admitted that they intended

22 to fill the Fire Lieutenant and Fire

23 Captain vacancies. The problem in this

24 case is that the Administration tried to

25 do an end run around the Civil Service

1 10/3/13 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 system. They attempted to fill
3 promotional vacancies with people who
4 weren't on the promotional list. That's
5 the practical effect of letting a list
6 expire with vacancies on the books.

7 The exact same thing has
8 happened with the demotions of the
9 firefighters who were promoted per the
10 court order in May. The Administration
11 has ignored Civil Service rules on
12 demotion and/or rejection during
13 probation. This is yet another end run
14 around the Civil Service system. These
15 types of Civil Service end runs undermine
16 the entire Civil Service process and take
17 us back to the pre-Charter days of
18 patronage and cronyism.

19 Our firefighters play by the
20 rules. I repeat, our firefighters play
21 by the rules. The Administration should
22 also play by the rules. The rules here
23 are the City Charter and regulations.
24 The rules here are the City Charter and
25 regulations. Those rules require that

2 undisputed vacancies be filled from a
3 promotional list and that demotions take
4 place according to the process required
5 by the Civil Service regulations. The
6 Civil Service method for filling
7 vacancies is the legally required method.
8 The Civil Service method for filling
9 vacancies is also the fairest method.

10 The violation committed by the
11 City is precisely the sort of ill that
12 Civil Service rules were intended to
13 address. The model is simple and
14 straightforward. The City establishes
15 the qualifications and develops the test.
16 The firefighter takes the test, and if
17 they pass, they are ranked on a list. If
18 a vacancy opens when the firefighter's
19 number comes up, they will be considered
20 for promotion on merit regardless of
21 race, creed, gender, political party or
22 any other improper factor. To break from
23 this model is simply an end around,
24 straight back to the future, and we are
25 all worse off for it.

2 The firefighters demoted
3 yesterday deserve fairness. The
4 firefighters demoted yesterday deserve
5 justice.

6 Thank you, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you so much, Councilman.

9 The Chair recognizes
10 Councilwoman Blackwell.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
12 you, Mr. President. And certainly I
13 agree with the comments made by
14 Councilman O'Brien.

15 Today I rise to note that as
16 Chair of the City Council's Committee on
17 Education and one who represents West and
18 Southwest Philadelphia, I visited a dozen
19 schools already this school year, two
20 twice. I've also spoken to many
21 principals, who come up to me and ask me
22 where we are and how I feel about the
23 whole school situation. I had a
24 principal come over to me from the
25 Northeast who said he can't serve as

2 principal. He has to open the front door
3 and monitor lunchrooms.

4 So, you know, we're really
5 concerned about where we are. I remember
6 years ago as Chair of this Committee we
7 introduced a resolution calling on
8 schools to be stable before mid November,
9 but here we're finding ourselves in the
10 same boat again. We don't know when
11 schools will be stable. Principals are
12 coming to me saying they're going to lose
13 a teacher or they may lose two teachers.
14 So as bad as they are, they're in a
15 position where it could get worse.

16 So we're calling on all those
17 concerned who help make these decisions,
18 the School District, the Mayor, and the
19 Governor, to help us resolve the issue of
20 disposal of our schools. We're there.
21 I'm tired of meeting with people who are
22 asking me for the schools that are
23 closed, and we hear, Well, we can't do
24 anything because we can't get past this
25 loggerjam where we are in this issue.

2 Certainly we call on all
3 concerned, again, to help us resolve this
4 issue so that we can serve our most
5 valuable commodity, our children.

6 Thank you, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilwoman.

9 The Chair recognizes --

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. First and foremost, I
15 want to echo the sentiments of my
16 colleague Councilman Denny O'Brien as it
17 relates to making sure that our
18 firefighters receive justice as it
19 relates to them being promoted and so
20 forth. And so I definitely want to
21 follow up on his comments as well as
22 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell as it
23 relates to making sure that we find a
24 solution to address the issue of public
25 education here in the City of

2 Philadelphia as we come to an end of our
3 Council year. And so hopefully as we
4 move forward down the line -- and,
5 Council President, thank you for your
6 efforts as well, but I think we're all
7 under the gun, particularly in our
8 districts, to find a solution to this
9 issue, because I deal with it on a daily
10 basis as it relates to either me walking
11 around the neighborhood, going to the
12 corner store or doing the work that I'm
13 doing as it relates to visiting several
14 schools during back-to-school evenings.

15 So I definitely want to follow
16 up, and I stand here supporting those
17 efforts to see how we can come to a
18 resolve in dealing with this issue. The
19 same way we deal with other issues in
20 this Chamber aggressively, hopefully we
21 will continue to be as aggressive as it
22 relates to the children in the City.

23 On Monday, my colleague, my
24 former employee I like to say sometimes,
25 Councilman Curtis Jones, and myself will

2 be thinking globally but acting locally,
3 and we will be hosting a young lady by
4 the name of Dalia Ziada, who is Executive
5 Director of the Ibn Khaldoun Center for
6 Development in Cairo. We will be
7 partnering with the American Jewish
8 community here in this Chamber Monday at
9 4 o'clock, and the title of the lecture
10 series will be "Human Rights, Women's
11 Rights, and Egypt's Struggle for
12 Freedom," which will be a very
13 interesting and eye-opening lecture as it
14 relates to the Arab Spring that has taken
15 place in Egypt, and also the focus is on
16 women's rights in that part of the world.

17 And so I'm looking forward to
18 partnering with Councilman Jones on this
19 presentation but, more importantly, the
20 context and the dialogue regarding
21 women's rights in Egypt. So I just
22 wanted to make that announcement.

23 Thank you, Council President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for
