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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Quite a stir here this morning, for
7 obvious reasons.

8 It appears that the quorum is
9 established, so I would ask all members
10 to please take their seats. I'd ask all
11 guests and visitors to please retire
12 behind the rail. Thank you very much.

13 To give our invocation this
14 morning, the Chair recognizes the Pastor
15 Steve Eichner of Bethel Church. He is
16 here today as the guest of Councilman
17 David Oh.

18 I would ask all guests and
19 visitors to please rise.

20 (Guests and visitors rise.)

21 PASTOR EICHNER: Let us pray.

22 Dear God, I want to thank you
23 for each leader standing in this room
24 today, and I thank you for giving them
25 the gift of leadership.

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2 We live in a pivotal time when
3 our people hunger for wise and purposeful
4 leadership. Father God, I pray that you
5 would give the Mayor and each leader here
6 wisdom to lead skillfully. Give them
7 insight and clarity.

8 They're often faced with
9 complex and perplexing decisions that
10 they are called to make and there's often
11 no easy answer. Be with them as they
12 wrestle through their options. God, I
13 pray that you would give them wisdom.

14 Also help them to skillfully
15 work together in unity for the common
16 good of the people of our city in spite
17 of passionately differing views at times.
18 May their passion continue to inspire
19 excellence and creativity. May the
20 greater love for our people and our city
21 outweigh our personal preferences.

22 And, God, please give them
23 courage and endurance along the way.
24 They live in the public spotlight, which
25 often is challenging and hard, so give

5 And, Lord, I pray that you
6 would bless their relationships with
7 their families. May each one of their

11 I thank you for the great honor
12 that they have to serve this incredible
13 city that you've blessed us all with.

14 In Jesus' name, amen.

15 (Amen.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you so much, Pastor, for those
18 inspiring words.

19 Council shall be at ease.

20 (Council at ease.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you again, Pastor.

23 The next order of business is
24 the approval of the Journal of the
25 meeting of Thursday, October 3rd, 2013.

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2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Greenlee.

4 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
5 you, Mr. President. I move that the
6 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
7 October 3rd, 2013 be approved.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
10 has been moved and properly seconded that
11 the Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
12 October 3rd, 2013 stand approved.

13 All those in favor say aye.

14 (Aye.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Those opposed?

17 (No response.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 ayes have it, and that Journal is
20 approved.

21 The next order of business is
22 requests for leaves of absence.

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 Jones.

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

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2 Mr. President. On behalf of the
3 majority, there are no requests for
4 leaves of absence today.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 Chair thanks the gentleman.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman
8 O'Neill.

9 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. On behalf of the
11 republicans, there are no requests for
12 leave of absence.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you so much.

15 At this time, I would like to
16 dispense with the regular order of
17 business to welcome and thank everyone
18 here today. We really appreciate the
19 fact that you took time out of your day
20 to come down and witness your government
21 in action. We genuinely hope you enjoy
22 yourself, so much that you come back
23 again.

24 We'd like to at this time --
25 I'd like to welcome a good friend of

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2 ours, State Representative Vanessa Brown
3 Lowery.

4 (Appause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: She
6 always fights the good fight for us up in
7 Harrisburg, and Lord knows that is a
8 pretty challenging job. So we really
9 appreciate what you've done for us up
10 there. Thank you. And a little later on
11 we'll introduce our other special guest.

12 At this time, the Chair
13 recognizes Councilman Kenyatta Johnson,
14 who will present a citation recognizing
15 Reverend Al Sharpton for his outstanding
16 leadership in the area of civil and human
17 rights. Would Reverend Sharpton and
18 those accompanying him please join the
19 Councilman at the podium.

20 (Appause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
22 joining Councilman Johnson, we have
23 Councilwoman Tasco, Councilwoman Bass,
24 Councilman Goode, Councilwoman Blackwell,
25 and Councilman Jones.

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2 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
6 morning, everyone.

7 (Good morning.)

8 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Today I am
9 truly honored and privileged to have the
10 opportunity to stand with my colleagues
11 and also on behalf of the host, Council
12 President Darrell Clarke, and the members
13 of City Council in honoring a key leader
14 of the civil rights movement and an
15 advocate for justice and equality for all
16 people, both nationally and
17 internationally. He has been a
18 consistent voice of justice for the
19 voiceless, a political leader who have
20 paved the way for the inclusion of
21 African American in politics. And I know
22 if it was not for the work that he have
23 done in the early '60s, I would not be
24 standing here as an elected official and
25 also the first African American

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2 representing the 2nd Councilmanic
3 District.

4 He speaks truth to power,
5 giving conservative talk show hosts like
6 Rush Limbaugh and David Beck [sic] hell,
7 and he has no problem telling it like it
8 is. If it was not for his recent
9 involvement in the Trayvon Martin murder
10 case, the life of Trayvon would be
11 another African American young male
12 murdered in America.

13 He has continued the legacy of
14 the civil rights movement, recently
15 organizing the 50th anniversary march on
16 Washington with his outstanding
17 organization, the National Action
18 Network.

19 And so I want to encourage
20 everyone who is here today listening to
21 this citation as we honor one of our
22 great giant leaders, not only in the
23 African American community but a leader
24 for all people, to participate in his
25 book signing at the Free Library today at

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2 12 o'clock, rightfully titled "The
3 Rejected Stone." So if you're an
4 advocate and you believe in advocating on
5 behalf of the voiceless, you will
6 recognize that a title such as "The
7 Rejected Stone" is the title that you
8 will wear as a badge of honor.

9 So at this time, with my
10 colleagues, I would like to read this
11 citation to our good friend and leader,
12 the Reverend Dr. Al Sharpton.

13 It's okay to clap.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: The
16 Council of the City of Philadelphia is
17 pleased and proud to recognize the
18 Dr. Reverend Al Sharpton for his
19 outstanding leadership in the areas of
20 civil and human rights.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, Al
23 Sharpton was born October 3rd, 1954 in
24 Brooklyn, New York. He began his
25 ministry at the tender age of four,

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2 preaching his first sermon at Washington
3 Temple Church of God and Christ in
4 Brooklyn. Just five years later,
5 legendary bishop F.D. Washington licensed
6 Al Sharpton, his protege, to be a
7 Pentecostal minister; and

8 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Whereas,
9 the Reverend Sharpton's civil rights
10 career began almost as early as his
11 ministry. At age thirteen, the Reverend
12 Jesse Jackson and William Jones appointed
13 the Reverend Sharpton youth director of
14 New York's SCLC Operation Breadbasket, an
15 organization founded by Dr. Martin Luther
16 King, Jr. in 1971; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
18 early in his career, the Reverend
19 Sharpton set out to stoke the fire of the
20 civil rights movement as "the voice of
21 the downtrodden," leading marches and
22 rallies to call the public and the
23 media's attention to racial injustice.
24 He has been at the vanguard of issues
25 promoting equal standards and decency and

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2 has challenged the American political
3 establishment to include all people
4 regardless of race, gender, socioeconomic
5 status or belief; and

6 COUNCILMAN GOODE: Whereas, the
7 Reverend Al Sharpton is the founder and
8 President of the National Action Network,
9 a non-profit civil rights organization
10 headquartered in Harlem, New York, with
11 over sixty chapters nationwide including
12 a Washington, DC Bureau and regional
13 offices from coast to coast; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
15 Whereas, the Reverend Dr. Al Sharpton has
16 been praised by President Barack Obama as
17 the voice of the voiceless and he has
18 served as one of the nation's most
19 renowned civil rights leaders in our
20 history so that a March 2013 Zogby poll
21 said that one out of every four African
22 Americans admit that Reverend Al Sharpton
23 speaks most for them;

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
25 on October 8th, 2013 the Reverend Al

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2 Sharpton has released his book; The
3 Rejected Stone: Al Sharpton and the Path
4 to American Leadership. It intimately
5 discusses his personal evolution from
6 street activist, pulpit provocateur and
7 civil rights leader, to the larger than
8 life man he is today. The chosen title
9 of his book was inspired by a passage of
10 scripture which refers to a stone which
11 was rejected by builders that, in the
12 end, became the chief cornerstone. To
13 the Reverend Dr. Al Sharpton that message
14 sums up his life's journey and that of so
15 many of African Americans; and

16 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Therefore,
17 by virtue of this citation, the Council
18 of the City of Philadelphia does hereby
19 honor and recognize the Reverend Dr. Al
20 Sharpton for his outstanding leadership
21 in the area of civil and human rights.
22 We greatly appreciate for all he has done
23 and we extend to him the sincere respect
24 and admiration of this legislative body.

25 On behalf of the members of

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2 City Council, the City of Philadelphia,
3 we want to say we thank you and we
4 appreciate you for all the work that you
5 have done on behalf of the African
6 American community and humanity at-large.
7 We'd like to present this citation to
8 you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 Chair recognizes Reverend Sharpton for
12 remarks. Reverend.

13 REVEREND SHARPTON: Thank you
14 very much. Let me say that it is a very,
15 very moving experience to have this
16 happen, particularly in Philadelphia.
17 I've been coming to Philadelphia since my
18 pre-teen years for many reasons, but
19 never honored like this. And certainly
20 we don't always have to agree, but we can
21 operate without being disagreeable, and
22 to know that your work has caught the
23 attention of those that have been elected
24 and trusted by the people of this city is
25 more than I could express in words.

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2 I was raised by a single
3 mother, whose best friend lives in
4 Philadelphia, and I wish that they were
5 alive to see this, because it is because
6 of people who never made a newspaper,
7 never was on television but believed in
8 their children and raised their children
9 to have a better life, that's who I fight
10 for every day, the forgotten, the
11 marginalized, the rejected, because if we
12 can understand in our society no one
13 ought to be rejected. Everyone should
14 have equal rights to vote, to jobs, and
15 to the American way of life, and that's
16 what the fight is all about.

17 So I'm honored to have this. I
18 thank you, Kenyatta. I thank all of the
19 members of the Council that made this
20 possible. I thank the President of
21 Council. And I'm here because of my
22 deep, deep appreciation for that, and I'm
23 also here because I wanted to see a
24 government that was open and working
25 today.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Council will be at ease.

5 (Council at ease.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you.

8 At this time, the Chair

9 recognizes Councilman Dennis O'Brien, who
10 will present a resolution recognizing and
11 celebrating the accomplishments of

12 Special Olympics Pennsylvania. Would
13 Mr. Matt Aaron and those accompanying him
14 please join the Councilman at the podium.

15 And joining Councilman O'Brien,
16 we have Councilman Greenlee, Councilman
17 Johnson, Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez,
18 and Councilwoman Bass and also
19 Councilman -- oh, no.

20 Please proceed, Councilman.

21 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. It is only fitting today
23 as we celebrate the accomplishments of
24 Special Olympics of Pennsylvania and the
25 significant difference this organization

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2 has made in so many lives that we also
3 introduce legislation to end the use of
4 the "R" word in The Philadelphia Code.

5 Respectful and inclusive
6 language is essential to the movement for
7 the dignity and humanity of people with
8 intellectual disabilities. However, much
9 of society does not recognize the
10 hurtful, marginalizing, dehumanizing, and
11 exclusive effects of the word "retard" or
12 "retarded."

13 In our ongoing effort to create
14 communities of respect, where all people
15 are valued, it is important to change the
16 language of our laws at all levels of
17 government. Language affects attitudes.
18 Attitudes affect change.

19 This inclusive language
20 legislation brings Philadelphia in line
21 with federal and state governments by
22 removing the words "mental retardation"
23 from The Philadelphia Code and replacing
24 it with "intellectual disabilities." It
25 celebrates the gifts and uniqueness of

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2 individuals living with intellectual
3 disabilities. This was manifested in the
4 first-ever Unified Soccer elective
5 course, a partnership between the School
6 District of Philadelphia and Special
7 Olympics of Pennsylvania, individuals
8 with and without intellectual
9 disabilities playing together and
10 experiencing success. It is this
11 genuine, authentic sharing of core values
12 and empathy-building that will change
13 attitudes and effect permanent change.

14 Now I would like, with my
15 colleagues, to read the following
16 resolution: Recognizing and celebrating
17 the accomplishments of Special Olympics
18 Pennsylvania and the significant
19 difference the organization has made in
20 the lives of thousands of athletes with
21 intellectual disabilities by giving them
22 an opportunity to express joy and to
23 experience success through athletic
24 training and competition.

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,

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2 Eunice Kennedy Shriver believed that
3 people with intellectual disabilities
4 were far more capable in sports and
5 physical activities than many experts
6 thought. Eunice and husband, Sargent
7 Shriver, started up a day camp in their
8 background that eventually turned into
9 the Special Olympics, a global movement
10 that today serves more than 4 million
11 athletes with intellectual disabilities
12 in more than 170 countries; and

13 Whereas, the mission of the
14 Special Olympics is to provide year-round
15 sports training and athletic competition
16 in a variety of Olympic-type sports for
17 children and adults with intellectual
18 disabilities, giving them continuing
19 opportunities to develop physical
20 fitness, demonstrate courage, experience
21 joy and participate in a sharing of
22 gifts, skills and friendships with their
23 families, other Special Olympics athletes
24 and the community;

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,

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2 Special Olympics Pennsylvania became an
3 official chapter in May of 1970 and
4 hosted their first competition with 135
5 athletes. Today, Special Olympics
6 Pennsylvania trains more than 20,000
7 athletes who participate in 22
8 Olympic-type sports at more than 260
9 local, sectional, and state level
10 competitions and is at work in every
11 county in Pennsylvania; and

12 Whereas, Special Olympics
13 Unified Sports is an inclusive sports
14 program that combines an approximately
15 equal number of Special Olympics athletes
16 and partners without intellectual
17 disabilities on teams for training and
18 competition. The Unified Sports program
19 promotes health, wellness, and social
20 inclusion. Athletes and partners
21 experience a sense of belonging, develop
22 mutually rewarding relationships, are
23 recognized as contributors, and are
24 received with acceptance and respect; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,

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2 Special Olympics Project UNIFY

3 incorporates Unified Sports along with

4 education programs, leadership

5 opportunities, and advocacy components

6 designed to empower youth as agents of

7 change in their schools and communities -

8 fostering respect and dignity for people

9 with intellectual disabilities. Project

10 UNIFY helps school districts fulfill

11 social inclusion, anti-bullying and

12 school climate goals;

13 Whereas, in just four years,

14 Project UNIFY has engaged over 500,000

15 youth in 2,100 elementary, middle and

16 high schools across 42 states. Here in

17 Pennsylvania, the School District of

18 Philadelphia has been leading the way.

19 The Project UNIFY program in the School

20 District of Philadelphia has engaged

21 thousands of youth in more than 25

22 schools;

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,

24 last year, the first-ever Unified Soccer

25 elective course was offered in 10 high

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2 schools. The course, developed in
3 partnership between the School District
4 of Philadelphia and Special Olympics
5 Pennsylvania, included curriculum with
6 youth leadership components,
7 anti-bullying elements and soccer
8 training and competition; and

9 Whereas, a culminating citywide
10 championship game brought together
11 athletes, fans, administrators, and
12 dignitaries for an exciting morning of
13 competition. Project UNIFY will grow to
14 include 38 schools in Philadelphia during
15 the 2013-14 academic year and also expand
16 to include schools in both Northampton
17 and Adams Counties. Through a new
18 partnership with the Pennsylvania
19 Interscholastic Athletic Association,
20 Special Olympics PA plans to build on the
21 success in Philadelphia and expand
22 Unified Sports to schools statewide;
23 therefore

24 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Resolved,
25 by the Council of the City of

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2 Philadelphia, that we hereby recognize
3 Special Olympics Pennsylvania and the
4 Special Olympics Unified Sports program
5 in bringing together individuals with and
6 without intellectual disabilities on
7 teams together for training and
8 competition and allowing all involved to
9 experience a sense of acceptance and
10 respect.

11 And now I would like to ask
12 Matt Aaron, President and CEO of Special
13 Olympics Pennsylvania, to accept this
14 resolution on behalf of City Council.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Mr. Aaron.

18 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: I would
19 like to introduce before Matt makes his
20 remarks not only Matt Aaron, who is the
21 President and CEO of Special Olympics,
22 but Tony Gillespie, who is the Chairman
23 of the Board; Lisa Barber, a Philly
24 athlete; Margaret Barber, Lisa's mom;
25 Eddie Glover, a Philadelphia athlete; and

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2 Eric Cushing, Vice President of Marketing
3 and Development.

4 It is my pleasure now to
5 introduce Matt Aaron.

6 (Applause.)

7 MR. AARON: Good morning.
8 Councilman O'Brien, thank you for your
9 leadership. President Clarke, members of
10 Council, thank you for this opportunity,
11 this recognition, and thank you for your
12 leadership in introducing this
13 groundbreaking legislation here this
14 morning.

15 I think the theme for today's
16 meeting seems to be leadership. Leaders
17 come in all shapes and sizes. So
18 Councilman O'Brien introduced the members
19 of our delegation, but I'd like to share
20 with you a little bit about how they're
21 each leaders in their own right.

22 Tony Gillespie is the Chairman
23 of our Board of Directors. He is also
24 the parent of one of our athletes in
25 Montgomery County. He has been leading

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2 our organization statewide for the last
3 two years.

4 Eddie Glover, who was
5 introduced, has been competing in Special
6 Olympics now for 30 years. For 20 of
7 those years, he has also served as a
8 staff member with Special Olympics
9 Pennsylvania. He has competed in two
10 world games. He's competed in national
11 games. He continues to compete today.

12 Lisa Barber --

13 (Applause.)

14 MR. AARON: And you'll notice
15 that Eddie is wearing a couple of medals.
16 He couldn't bring them all with him today
17 or he wouldn't be able to walk.

18 Lisa Barber serves as an
19 athlete in Philadelphia. She is also a
20 leader in our Philadelphia program,
21 serving on the management team, guiding
22 and directing our program here in
23 Philadelphia. So Lisa, as one of our
24 athletes, is also a leader amongst her
25 peers, and in fact this morning just

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2 shared with me that she is now taking on
3 a role where she is coordinating the
4 leadership activities of all of our
5 athletes as they go out in the community
6 and speak to other organizations on
7 behalf of Special Olympics.

8 So we're so proud standing here
9 before all of you, the leaders of our
10 city, this morning that we were able to
11 bring and introduce some of our own
12 leaders.

13 (Applause.)

14 MR. AARON: I know that many of
15 you were able to join us for the soccer
16 championship, the Unified championship
17 that was mentioned this morning. So
18 you've had the opportunity, several of
19 you on Council, to witness what we call
20 the magic of Special Olympics firsthand,
21 and you've seen what happened in those 25
22 schools with those ten high schools in
23 that league, but we have a lot more work
24 to do. And I believe that this work is
25 important. It's transformative. And

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2 there are many, many aspects to what we
3 do, but I'll share just one this morning.

4 A quote from the Superintendent of public
5 education for the State of Arizona shared
6 in a recent national meeting that it's
7 not just enough to be against bullying,
8 you have to be for something. And what
9 he said was your program, talking about
10 Special Olympics Unified Sports, your
11 program is one of those examples.

12 So we are using what is
13 happening here in the City of
14 Philadelphia. We're using that Unified
15 Soccer League and that program in 25
16 schools here in the School District of
17 Philadelphia as the beacon and the model
18 for what we hope to do statewide.

19 So we're very, very pleased at
20 what we've done. We're pleased of the
21 progress we've made. We're thankful for
22 the support that many of you have given
23 us, but we also realize that there's a
24 lot more work to do. Despite all the
25 good things that are happening, we're

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2 currently only reaching about 1 percent
3 of the eligible population here in the
4 City. So while we're very thankful and
5 we're celebrating today, we also hope
6 that we can count on your continued
7 leadership and support to help us reach
8 that other 99 percent.

9 Thank you very much.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you.

13 Council will be at ease.

14 (Council at ease.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Before we move ahead with our
17 next presentation, I would just like to
18 have one request, that if anyone has a
19 device, electronic, phone, beeper, pager,
20 whatever it may be, I'd ask you to please
21 turn it on silent or, better yet, turn it
22 off. Thank you. I know beeper, I'm
23 dating myself. I understand.

24 Believe it or not, Councilman,
25 I actually saw a beeper last week. Thank

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2 you.

3 At this time, the Chair
4 recognizes Councilwoman Marian Tasco, who
5 will present a resolution declaring
6 October as "Domestic Violence Awareness
7 Month." Would Ms. Jeanine Lisitski and
8 those accompanying her please join the
9 Councilwoman at the podium.

10 And joining Councilwoman Tasco,
11 we have Councilman Greenlee and
12 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

13 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Good
14 morning. We are pleased to again
15 recognize Women Against Abuse for the
16 wonderful work they do providing services
17 to women and families throughout the
18 City, and we recognize them each year
19 because each year they continue to do a
20 fine job and we appreciate your work in
21 the community. Thank you.

22 This is a resolution declaring
23 October as "Domestic Violence Awareness
24 Month."

25 Whereas, "Domestic Violence

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2 Awareness Month" is being sponsored
3 locally by Women Against Abuse and,
4 through their sponsorship, they are
5 encouraging everyone to help to increase
6 the awareness of domestic violence in our
7 homes and communities and decrease its
8 negative impact on Philadelphia; and

9 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
10 in 2010, the Philadelphia Police
11 Department responded to more than 115,000
12 domestic abuse calls, and domestic
13 violence is not just a local problem but
14 a national issue where more than three
15 women a day are murdered by their
16 husbands or boyfriends in the United
17 States, and the Center for Disease
18 Control and Prevention found that women
19 experience two million injuries from
20 intimate partner violence each year; and

21 Whereas, founded in 1976, the
22 mission of Women Against Abuse is to
23 provide quality and compassionate
24 services in a manner that fosters
25 self-respect and independence in persons

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2 who have been victimized by domestic
3 violence; and

4 Whereas, Women Against Abuse
5 has grown to become one of the largest
6 domestic violence programs in the United
7 States, created the nation's first legal
8 center devoted to victims of domestic
9 violence, founded the only emergency
10 shelter in the City exclusively for women
11 and children, and there's going to be one
12 more; and

13 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
14 Women Against Abuse provides education
15 and training to the community about
16 domestic violence issues and resources
17 and has partnered with the City of
18 Philadelphia, the Lutheran Settlement
19 House, Women in Transition, and Congreso
20 de Latino Unidos to operate the
21 Philadelphia Domestic Violence Hotline
22 and, in 2011, over 9,000 calls were
23 answered through that Hotline; and

24 Whereas, to support victims of
25 domestic violence, Women Against Abuse

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2 also operates a 12-unit transitional
3 housing program called Sojourner House,
4 which enables victims to take the crucial
5 first steps to reclaim their lives and
6 move forward toward a brighter future;
7 and

8 Whereas, to support its mission
9 and work, Women Against Abuse will hold
10 its 6th Annual iPledge Press Campaign as
11 a social awareness initiative to promote
12 knowledge about domestic violence and to
13 build community support so that all
14 Philadelphians will stand against
15 violence; now, therefore

16 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Resolved,
17 that the Council of the City of
18 Philadelphia declares and recognizes
19 October as "Domestic Violence Awareness
20 Month."

21 Further resolved, that an
22 engrossed copy of this resolution be
23 presented to representatives of Women
24 Against Abuse as a sincere expression of
25 Council's gratitude, appreciation, and

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2 commendation for raising the public
3 awareness regarding domestic violence.

4 This was introduced by Tasco,
5 Brown, Greenlee, and supported by all
6 members of City Council. Thank you so
7 much for the wonderful work you do.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 Chair recognizes Ms. Lisitski for
11 remarks.

12 MS. LISITSKI: Thank you,
13 Councilmembers Tasco, Greenlee, Reynolds
14 Brown, and all of the members of City
15 Council. I must say that we share this
16 resolution with the Philadelphia Domestic
17 Violence Collaborative, which includes
18 Congreso, Women in Transition, and
19 Lutheran Settlement House. We work hand
20 in hand with them, and together we form a
21 comprehensive array of services here in
22 Philadelphia.

23 I also want to thank
24 Representative Vanessa Lowery Brown for
25 her support, for being here today, and

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2 for all she does at the state level.

3 As you know, Women Against
4 Abuse operates the only emergency shelter
5 in the City for abused women and their
6 children, and we serve approximately
7 15,000 people a year through all of our
8 services, which not only includes
9 emergency residential but permanent
10 supported housing, legal aid, hotline
11 counseling, and education and advocacy.
12 And we are so grateful to be standing
13 here again this year to receive the
14 support of City Council.

15 It is, as you know, a community
16 effort to raise awareness that family
17 violence is a foundational issue for all
18 of us to grapple with if we want to have
19 a community that's healthy, that's safe,
20 and that's productive. So we applaud
21 your steadfast leadership, and we want to
22 recognize again our members of the
23 Philadelphia Domestic Violence
24 Collaborative that are here today. We
25 have Julie Avalos from Congreso; Vashti

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2 Bledsoe, Lutheran Settlement House; and
3 Roberta Hacker, Women in Transition here
4 and others from the staffs of the
5 organizations. We thank each of them for
6 all that they do to help create safety
7 and freedom for survivors.

8 Each year I come here and I
9 deliver some bad news about the
10 overwhelming need for safe shelter in our
11 community, and it's true Philadelphia has
12 only 100 beds for survivors, much less
13 than any other city our size, and with
14 the issues of poverty that we see in our
15 community, it's so much needed. And
16 unfortunately I'm standing here again to
17 tell you that that number rose again in
18 Fiscal Year '13. We denied 9,000
19 requests for safe shelter.

20 But I also have something
21 incredible to share that all of you --
22 most of you know. We will soon have
23 significantly more capacity to address
24 this need. We're in the process of
25 developing Philadelphia's second 100-bed

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2 safe haven for survivors. Not only will
3 we have more safe haven beds but we were
4 also able to establish a domestic
5 violence specialist within central intake
6 of the City's family shelter unit. And
7 additionally, the Philadelphia Domestic
8 Violence Collaborative now has resources
9 and supports to place families in
10 temporary emergency beds when our safe
11 haven is full. This work allows us to
12 better serve male and LGBTQ victims of
13 abuse and gives us additional capacity to
14 better serve the needs of Latina
15 survivors.

16 The new shelter and services
17 comes at a time of significant momentum
18 towards change and how our city responds
19 to domestic violence. One of these
20 important changes is our partnership with
21 the City health and human service
22 agencies, and our work together is to
23 create a truly coordinated community
24 response to domestic violence.

25 To this end, we are meeting

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2 with Deputy Mayor Don Schwarz of Health
3 and Opportunity and the Commissioners of
4 the Department of Human Services, the
5 Department of Behavioral Health, the
6 Office of Supportive Housing, and the
7 Health Department. We're working to make
8 changes in how the City's system screen
9 for and intervene into domestic violence.

10 So this being said, we've made
11 much progress, but there's still much to
12 be done. There's major gaps in our
13 ability to serve victims who need legal
14 representation in child custody cases.
15 And we know that children are often used
16 as weapons to trap victims in abusive
17 relationships. We know that the work
18 that we do in schools to teach students
19 about healthy relationships, how to
20 recognize abuse and where to go to get
21 help is so impactful, but we can only
22 reach a small percentage of students.

23 We envision a community where
24 violence in our homes and violence in our
25 streets is not the norm but the

2 exception, and we know that together we
3 can get there.

4 So I thank all of you for
5 standing with us each year. And to learn
6 more about what can be done, we hope
7 you'll join us in the Caucus Room later
8 today. We're going to be talking about
9 some of our innovative progress and other
10 ways that we can move forward. And I
11 also want to invite you to join us for
12 the Walk to End Domestic Violence, which
13 is hosted by Senator LeAnna Washington.
14 This walk raises funds for the
15 Philadelphia Domestic Violence Hotline,
16 and it will take place Saturday, October
17 26th at 9:30 on West River Drive. So we
18 sure hope to see you there, and bring as
19 many people as you can.

20 Thank you again for your
21 commitment to ending violence in our
22 homes and in our community.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Council will be at ease.

17 And joining Councilman Henon,
18 we have Councilwoman Tasco and also
19 Councilwoman Blackwell.

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Good
21 morning. First I'd like to thank CASA
22 Philadelphia Executive Director Wendy
23 Graham and everyone from their
24 organization who has joined me and us
25 here today. The work that they do is

2 critically important. On any given day,
3 more than 4,000 Philadelphia children are
4 in foster care. The public face of
5 foster care is often viewed as a last
6 resort. CASA steps and works towards
7 building personal relationships with
8 these children and families, establishing
9 a positive, stable environment. They
10 also have an outstanding working
11 relationship with Family Court,
12 Administrative Judge Kevin Dougherty, and
13 all the judges in the court system.

14 We talk a lot about setting up
15 a good example for our kids, and this is
16 no different. As victims of abuse and
17 neglect, these kids all need support that
18 they can get, and CASA is there for them.
19 I stand here today, along with my
20 colleagues, to say that we stand with
21 CASA and recognize them for their
22 efforts.

23 Honoring the Court Appointed
24 Special Advocates (CASA) of the County of
25 Philadelphia.

3 more than 4,100 of Philadelphia's abused
4 and neglected children are living in the
5 foster care system, often separated from
6 their siblings and spending much of their

11 the system designed to care for them
12 fails to adequately provide for their
13 future and is overburdened with too many
14 children. A typical worker carries
15 between 30 and 50 cases, and the
16 attorneys who represent the children
17 handle upwards of 300 cases at a time;

19 Whereas, children in the foster
20 care system have the same needs as all
21 other children: security, stability,
22 support, compassion, and a healthy
23 environment in which to learn and thrive;
24 and

25 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

3 Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) of

10 community volunteers work through the
11 Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA)
12 of Philadelphia County. They help ensure
13 that children in the foster care system,
14 facing some of the most difficult
15 circumstances, have an independent voice
16 advocating for their needs; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And
18 whereas, on October the 13th, CASA of
19 Philadelphia County will host the CASA
20 Superhero 5K Walk at the Philadelphia Zoo
21 to raise awareness about the needs of
22 abused and neglected children in the
23 foster care system and the role that CASA
24 plays in advocating for these young
25 people. CASA requests that all

18 advocacy and support. And the impact
19 cannot be overstated. These are
20 literally superheroes, and we hope that
21 you guys can dust off your superhero
22 capes -- we know everyone has one in the
23 back of their closet -- join us at the
24 Zoo on Sunday. I think Councilman
25 Greenlee is a secret superhero. Maybe

24 authorizing the feasibility of

25 transferring ownership of Philadelphia

2 Gas Works to a private entity should not
3 go forward. Newspaper accounts tell us
4 that J.P. Morgan and other Wall Street
5 entities buy and horde steel, copper,
6 aluminum, other commodities to create
7 shortages and price hikes. They buy
8 energy-generation facilities and sell
9 energy at 80 times the going rate.

10 The monetary financial system
11 that can only generate the population's
12 economy collapse is going after public
13 assets, public schools, and public
14 utilities with stolen money.

15 Private-sector finance terms
16 demand austerity that can only cause a
17 depression, depressing wages, purging
18 jobs, resulting in price declines,
19 declining and falling revenues for the
20 City and State. The creation of a
21 Philadelphia public bank is necessary.
22 We reference the Dodd-Frank Act, mindful
23 that an insolvency crisis can trigger the
24 bailout process -- or pardon me; bail-in
25 process.

2 We are informed that the
3 Philadelphia public bank is a matter of
4 the City's security. The sequester, the
5 irrational or reckless expansion of
6 perpetual war, the crisis of the
7 impending default, the hovering attack on

9 are all driven by the demands of the Wall
10 Street fed unrelenting unemployment,
11 unlimited bailout system. A national
12 security crisis exists.

13 Political leadership at every
14 level must work for the stabilization of
15 the United States. Demand the
16 reinstatement of Glass-Steagall standard
17 in U.S. banking. Reorganize the fed into
18 the U.S. national bank credit system.
19 Enact the Wall Street sales tax.
20 Activate full employment through the
21 funding of the redevelopment of North
22 America. Stop perpetual war already in
23 World War III mode. No other options
24 exist, and time is wasting.

25 On Saturday, October 12th, a

22 I'm commenting on Ordinance
23 130564, permit parking districts. I do
24 not support these districts. In the past
25 I have spoke about the constantly

4 burden to the poor, among others, in the
5 community. There is little transparency

7 Then I was told that, Well,

11 rates from \$35 to \$50 to \$75 to a hundred
12 dollars and on and on. And I guess soon
13 it will expand to infinity and beyond.
14 Enough is enough.

15 Resolution 120118, Philadelphia
16 Gas Works, I too have concerns about the
17 Gas Works being put into private hands.
18 I'm worried about the protections that
19 will exist for the poor. Heating is not
20 an option for the poor in winter. Will
21 constitutional requirements be put ahead
22 of profits if it changes to private
23 hands?

24 Ordinance 130251, I am in favor
25 of an independent rate-making body for

3 see the results of what they do by doing
4 it themselves, and I welcome to have an

9 up to 40th and Walnut to pay the electric
10 bill. They say electric bill. Now look
11 on it, it's about seven entries.
12 Distribution, rate this. You know, it's
13 crazy, and I know these rates will be
14 passed on. Gas company don't care. They
15 just passing on like every other bill.

16 I'm worried about the
17 privatization thing with the gas. I
18 share the past two gentlemen's
19 sentiments. I'm also a resident in
20 Germantown and I watched Germantown High
21 be sold to Camelot. I watched my old
22 alma mater, West Philadelphia High, be
23 sold. I watched the School Board
24 building on the Parkway be sold.

25 Now, I'm not a real estate

2 person, but I would suggest that a lot of
3 these buildings are just under a billion
4 dollars. My question, where does the
5 money go? And if I as a taxpayer been
6 help maintaining, servicing, and
7 purchasing everything that school needs

9 years, do we have any input on where the
10 money goes? It seem like enough of that
11 money would be here to bail out the
12 entire school system. So where is the
13 money? We need to have a third party.

14 I need a contract as a City
15 worker, and I'm still on my lunch hour, I
16 might add. I need City Council to back
17 us up like you want me to back y'all up
18 every time it's election time. You know,
19 we have a lot of juice here. The Tea
20 Party has changed the paradigm of the

10 for the hearing. We also assembled an
11 impressive roster of local, state,
12 national expert witnesses who were
13 knowledgeable and respected within the
14 indigent defense community for our
15 hearing. Not one of the ten experts
16 endorsed the for-profit model the
17 Administration seeks to impose, without
18 Council input.

19 Attorney Jeffrey Lindy, who is
20 a former federal prosecutor and now
21 practices federal criminal defense and is
22 involved in safeguarding federal indigent
23 defense, said the following on Monday:
24 Good people can make bad decisions, and
25 this is one of those bad decisions. The

2 private-sector model cannot work as an
3 indigent defense system. You simply
4 cannot have a private PD's office.

5 The Chancellor of the
6 Philadelphia Bar Association, Attorney
7 Kathleen Wilkinson, said, Adequate
8 representation can't be provided for
9 22,000 Philly cases for \$10 million.
10 That would be \$450 per case.

11 Attorney Mark Houldin from the
12 National Legal Aid and Defender
13 Association offered the following: Fixed
14 contracts and low rates of reimbursement
15 have tempted other jurisdictions in the
16 past, with the seeming process of keeping
17 costs low while providing the illusion of
18 Sixth Amendment protections. However,
19 experience has proven repeatedly that
20 attempting to find a quick and cheap fix
21 for such a vital constitutional right not
22 only undercuts the Sixth Amendment but
23 will produce rippling effects that
24 threaten the integrity of the justice
25 system.

2 Houldin further added in his
3 Monday testimony, There are ways to
4 improve public defense and, as a result,
5 the criminal justice system in a manner
6 that benefits all involved. Such
7 improvements will require a concerted
8 effort, thoughtful consideration, and an

10 solutions.

11 It is our sincere hope that the
12 City of Philadelphia, the birthplace of
13 liberty, will embrace this mission to
14 ensuring the City has a comprehensive
15 system for all citizens to realize the
16 promise of equal justice.

17 The criticisms of this plan do
18 not start and end with our expert
19 witnesses that testified in this very
20 room earlier this very week. Let's look
21 at some of the independent press
22 headlines from the past few days and
23 weeks. From the front page of the Legal
24 Intelligencer on September 17th:
25 Questions Over Philadelphia Conflict

2 Counsel. The Philadelphia City Paper,
3 October 3rd: Privatizing Legal
4 Representation for Poor Defendants May
5 Set a Dangerous Precedent. Tony Graham's
6 front-page story on October 7th of the
7 Philadelphia Inquirer: City Legal Aid
8 Proposal Faces List of Objections. And
9 yesterday's Philadelphia Inquirer:
10 Everyone Loses in City Defense Plan.

11 There is only one witness on
12 Monday and only one voice in this entire
13 conversation that believes this is a good
14 idea, the Administration. We were told
15 they are not wedded to a particular model
16 of representation, except for
17 good-quality representation. They said
18 they're not aware of any hybrid model or
19 for-profit entity in the country that is
20 used for indigent defense, and they
21 offered up a truckload of non-answers.
22 Let me reemphasize that. Non-answers
23 when asked about specifics, and used the
24 shield of a closed, sensitive, ongoing
25 contract negotiation as a rationale for

2 not answering important policy questions
3 that they termed unfounded.

4 The details were few, the
5 contradictions were many, and we were
6 told we'll know everything once a
7 contract was executed.

8 But let's shift gears for a
9 minute. Beginning in the autumn of 2014,
10 Philadelphia will join other leading
11 cities, including Washington, Boston,
12 Chicago, Montreal, London, and Paris, in
13 deploying a bike-sharing system. Now,
14 just bear with me for a minute. This
15 Administration will spend \$3 million
16 towards this effort. The Administration,
17 as a portion of the City's website,
18 dedicated to bike sharing, there you can
19 find all sorts of information about this
20 system. You can even download this
21 detailed 78-page strategic plan, 78
22 pages, and we have it. The plan shows
23 that they have studied peer cities from
24 across the nation to emulate best
25 practices. You'll be happy to know the

2 average winter temperature in Miami Beach
3 is 69 degrees. Yes, this illustrates the
4 level of detail shared with everyone.

5 The Administration is also very
6 inclusive in the planning, as they are
7 soliciting input from all corners to make
8 Philadelphia bike-sharing a resounding
9 success. It's exciting stuff. And no
10 one enjoys a bike ride more than me, but
11 it has my head spinning. How can we have
12 an open, inclusive, deliberative process
13 for bicycles but a closed, insulated, and
14 wrongheaded process for indigent defense?

15 They are choosing to use a
16 model that has never been implemented
17 anywhere. They are choosing a model in
18 which the legal community has loudly
19 protested against it. The Administration
20 is choosing to take complete ownership of
21 an indigent defense model that is
22 destined to fail and cost our most
23 vulnerable on many levels. And in the
24 end, we will all pay, because our justice
25 system will be compromised and we will

2 all suffer that consequence.

3 This isn't about being against
4 something. This is about being for
5 something. I am for transparency,
6 inclusiveness and, most importantly,
7 justice. I respectfully ask the
8 Administration to scrap this plan, give
9 us whatever due diligence they've done,
10 and let's start over.

11 Thank you, Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

17 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
18 much, Mr. President. I'd like to speak
19 on behalf of an individual, and I'd ask
20 my colleagues for a little bit of
21 indulgence. I have passed out flyers for
22 a fundraiser for Jon Cavaiani. Jon is a
23 recipient of the Congressional Medal of
24 Honor. He has been to Philadelphia many
25 times to support veterans and other

2 charitable events.

3 Unfortunately, Jon was
4 diagnosed with a life-threatening blood
5 disease, and so all across the nation
6 various veterans groups and concerned
7 citizens have begun to raise funds to
8 help ease the financial burden that his
9 family faces. And in two weeks, on
10 Friday, October 25th, 6:00 to 9:00 p.m.,
11 at Paddy Whacks, 150 South Street in
12 Philadelphia, we're going to hold a
13 fundraiser for him, and everyone is
14 invited. You don't have to be a veteran
15 or anyone like that. Just a concerned
16 citizen. Please come by. It's only \$35,
17 beer, wine, food, and we'll have auction
18 items and other things.

19 I'd simply like to add that the
20 Congressional Medal of Honor is our
21 nation's highest military award. It is
22 usually given posthumously. In this
23 case, Jon had spent two days with
24 overwhelming forces. He cleared, almost
25 single-handedly, an entire platoon while

2 remaining behind, was wounded numerous
3 times, remained behind, was ultimately
4 captured, and spent two years as a POW in
5 Vietnam. I think he deserves our
6 support, the support of Philadelphians,
7 and I would ask people to come by. It
8 will be a fun time, a good time, and a
9 worthy cause.

10 Thank you very much,
11 Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Johnson.

16 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. First and foremost, I am
18 saddened to hear that we lost an icon and
19 a giant in the City of Philadelphia,
20 primarily in the healthcare field, but
21 also just a public servant as it relates
22 to making sure that the African American
23 community have a voice in the news and
24 entertainment industry, and that's the
25 loss of South Philadelphia native, which

2 I'd like to claim, Dr. Walter Lomax. And
3 just this past weekend, Councilwoman
4 Tasco, Blondell Reynolds Brown, Cindy
5 Bass, and myself were out at the family's
6 house just having a good time. And so is
7 it okay if we take a moment of silence?

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

9 I only hesitate -- well, whatever. It
10 was -- okay. Yeah, we can do that.
11 Actually it was not public yet, so we're
12 purposely not referencing it, but it's
13 out there now.

14 Could I ask the members to
15 please have a moment of silence, please.

16 (Moment of silence.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: He
18 will be missed by a number of people,
19 including his family here and the WURD
20 family. Thank you, Councilman.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: You're
22 welcome.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

25 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,

2 Mr. President. Just a short note to
3 invite all my colleagues, tomorrow there
4 will be a proclamation for the Columbus
5 Day Parade here in the Chambers at noon,
6 followed by a nice Italian lunch right
7 across the street -- right across the
8 hall in 401 over in the Caucus Room. So
9 all are invited.

10 Also, the parade is Sunday down
11 at South Broad Street, ends at Marconi
12 Plaza at Broad and Oregon. So all are
13 welcome to invite. A great festival
14 afterwards for a great time. And just as
15 a tradition, Sean has some cannolis for
16 afterwards. So all the members who want
17 a cannoli before they go back to their
18 office, we'll have them here to hand out.
19 Take them with you back to your offices.

20 Thank you very much.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman.

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 Jones.

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

2 Mr. President. I want to applaud my
3 colleague Councilwoman Sanchez for
4 introducing the resolution to look at
5 poverty and particularly among the
6 workforce of the City of Philadelphia. I
7 want to applaud her on that, but I rise
8 today to talk about the rising concern
9 that another segment of poor people, a
10 different shade of poor, if you would,
11 faces, and that's our seniors.

12 With the Congress playing a
13 dangerous game of chicken and looking
14 into the abyss of fiscal stopping of our
15 government, Social Security and Medicaid
16 are in fact in danger. The fact is that
17 according to the Inquirer's reports,
18 there's a new category called deep
19 poverty, deep poverty, and among senior
20 citizens, it has significantly grown.

21 According to a report, deep
22 poverty for all people over 65 years of
23 age rose by 11 percent between 2011 and
24 2012. Deep poverty is defined by a
25 single person earning \$7,500 or less --

2 excuse me; \$5,700 or less annually.

3 Also, the Philadelphia
4 Corporation for Aging suggests that there
5 are 14,500 people living in deep poverty
6 that are seniors in our city. Many poor
7 seniors are still reeling by the cuts at
8 the state level and difficulties at the
9 state level to even receive food stamps
10 now.

11 So as our people are beginning
12 to age into that baby-boom generation,
13 one of the hidden dangers there is that
14 many, many Philadelphians, many people in
15 our country have never held a steady job
16 and won't even be eligible for Social
17 Security. Yes, there's SSI, and that is
18 for people who have declared themselves
19 unemployable or disabled, but for many
20 people who don't fall into that category,
21 there is a safety net gap that we need to
22 pay attention to.

23 By 2015, over one-third,
24 one-third of the City's population will
25 be over the age of 65, and as we look at

2 Councilwoman Sanchez's legislation and as
3 we work with the Administration to do the
4 anatomy of poverty in the City of
5 Philadelphia, we need to remember: As
6 they were, we once were. As they are, we
7 once were. As they are, we may well be.
8 And we need to look out for our most
9 vulnerable in the City of Philadelphia.

10 Thank you, Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 As I was just conferring with
14 Mr. Fichandler, you referenced the fact
15 that seniors have such challenging times
16 from a financial perspective. I was just
17 trying to get a sense of the deadline for
18 the Senior Citizens Tax Freeze program.
19 I believe it's at the end of the month,
20 Councilman.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: October
22 15th.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So
24 we want to make sure that the word gets
25 out, because that is a program that can

2 be extremely beneficial to senior
3 citizens. So thank you for bringing that
4 to our attention.

5 The Chair recognizes
6 Councilwoman Tasco.

7 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Yes,
8 Mr. President. Briefly I'd just like to
9 remind my colleagues and their staff that
10 the Women Against Abuse will be in the
11 Caucus Room to have a briefing on the
12 latest -- bring them up to date on what's
13 going on in that community, and they have
14 some very interesting information to
15 share. So we invite them to please show
16 up.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you, Councilwoman.

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 O'Brien.

21 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN:
22 Mr. President, I would just like to rise
23 and acknowledge the substantive error
24 that was committed by me a few minutes
25 ago. In my enthusiasm, I erroneously

2 recognized Mr. Troy Graham from the

3 Philadelphia Inquirer as Tony Graham.

4 Although I accept full responsibility for

5 that error, I will acknowledge that I

6 recently had retina surgery and I'm

7 recovering for that, so I had difficulty

8 reading the printed material before me.

9 So, again, I much apologize for that

10 error.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman. That's really

13 refreshing to see a politician

14 acknowledging a mistake. Really

15 refreshing.

16 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: It's a

17 possibility.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Really refreshing. Only in the City

20 Council of Philadelphia would something

21 like that happen.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman

23 O'Neill.

24 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,

25 Mr. President. Many times we've had

2 birthdays mentioned from the Chair, and I
3 know you mentioned Councilman Squilla's
4 in caucus, but rarely have I ever seen
5 someone give us gifts. And you don't get
6 better than a cannoli from South Philly.

7 So I really want to thank you
8 on behalf of everybody, Councilman
9 Squilla.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, sir.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Johnson.

14 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yes.

15 Thank you. Today, Council President, I
16 offered a bill that focused on giving the
17 CLIP program the opportunity to clip
18 locks of certain blighted lots throughout
19 my district that serves as an eyesore,
20 and we've been getting calls regarding
21 how slum landowners use lots to serve as
22 dumping landfills, which serves as not
23 only an eyesore but in some cases a
24 quality of life issue. And so there's a
25 total of more than 3,200 of these

2 fenced-in lots throughout the City of
3 Philadelphia. And so I look forward to
4 the discussion and an action plan
5 regarding how do we clean up the
6 abandoned lots, primarily in the 2nd
7 Councilmanic District, and working with
8 the CLIP program to begin looking at how
9 do we address the issue of blight
10 throughout the 2nd Councilmanic District.
11 And I look forward to the hearing next
12 week to hear the progress with the land
13 bank bill, because that goes a long way
14 in addressing some of these issues and
15 how we can get these blighted lots as
16 well as properties -- how can we get them
17 cleaned up and how can we also get them
18 developed so they can be on the actual
19 road that can provide more revenue for
20 our city. But that was an issue that's
21 very dear to me just growing up in the
22 heart of South Philadelphia and having to
23 deal with the issue of abandoned lots.

24 And so I just wanted to make
25 that announcement, but, more importantly,

2 yesterday in the Philadelphia Metro, Pew
3 Charitable Trust released a report
4 talking about more than 48 percent of
5 respondents say they've never even heard
6 of AVI, which we debated over the last
7 two years very aggressively. And I know
8 for a fact when people get their tax
9 bills in February, they're going to
10 start -- they're going to be calling us
11 looking for some level of reprieve.

12 So I always want to stay on the
13 case on those key issues that can get
14 people a level of property tax relief
15 such as the gentrification relief,
16 calling on our members in Harrisburg to
17 give us the tools to go after slum
18 landowners who own properties and we're
19 not able to tax them on those properties
20 if those properties are delinquent, and
21 give us the means testing ability to
22 provide gentrification relief.

23 So I want to make sure we keep
24 that issue out there on the forefront
25 and, more importantly, those who we work

2 with in Harrisburg support us in
3 partnership, because they also represent
4 these individuals who will be
5 significantly impacted. So it's not only
6 a City Council lift, but it's also a
7 State Assembly lift as well.

8 On Friday at Myers Rec Center
9 we will be doing our annual fall job fair
10 starting at 10 o'clock. It will go from
11 10:00 to 3:00. And so we're just asking
12 for individuals who are looking for
13 employment to come out, participate, come
14 dressed for success, and bring a can-do
15 attitude.

16 Thank you very much, Council
17 President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 There being no other speeches,
21 I would like to recognize Councilwoman
22 Brown for a motion to adjourn.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Certainly,
24 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
25 adjourned until Thursday, October the

2 17th, 2013 at 10:00 a.m.

3 (Duly seconded.)
