21 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
22 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
23 republicans, there are no requests for

3                     At this time, I would like to  
4           dispense with the regular order of  
5           business and I would like to welcome all  
6           guests and visitors here today. We  
7           really appreciate you taking time out of  
8           your day to come down and see your

10          stay here today is a pleasurable one, so  
11          much so that you come back again. And,  
12          again, thank you so much for your coming.

13                     At this time, the Chair  
14          recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell for the  
15          purpose of welcoming a special guest  
16          joining us in the Chambers this morning.

17                     The Chair recognizes  
18          Councilwoman Blackwell.

19                     COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
20          you, Mr. President. We are very proud to  
21          have a delegation from Douala, Cameroon  
22          visiting Philadelphia. We would like to  
23          ask them to stand as we try to introduce  
24          some of them.

25                     Certainly so that Council

2 notes, the Republic of Cameroon is the

3 only African country that has a sister

4 city relationship with Philadelphia.

5 We're involved with them through a member

6 of the Mayor's Commission on African and

7 Caribbean Affairs, Kahiga Tiagha, and

8 this delegation is led by Mr. Felix

9 Tokam, President and CEO of Eximco LLC.

10 We also have with us this morning Akoa

11 Phillippe Camille, who is the General

12 Manager of FEICOM. We have Owono Owono

13 Etienne, Director of Collected

14 Territories; Bate Azuk, a senior

15 government official from the Ministry of

16 the Economy, Planning and Regional

17 Development; Andze Emile, President of

18 the United Councils of the City of

19 Cameroon; Samuel Fountong, one of the

20 collaborators in FEICOM; Jerome Manda,

21 consultant; August Eric Djodom; and Felix

22 Tokam, again, Team Leader.

23           The citation for His

24 Excellency, Akoa, General Manager of the

25 Council's Support Team for Mutual

2 Assistance, has been certainly passed on  
3 to the group and he will be presented  
4 with this later on, but we certainly --  
5 we're proud to present this citation to  
6 His Excellency, Phillippe Camille Akoa,

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Councilwoman.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Welcome. Welcome. Thank you so much and  
15 welcome today. Thank you.

16 At this time, the Chair  
17 recognizes Councilwoman Brown, who will  
18 present a resolution recognizing October  
19 as Parent and Family Appreciation Month.  
20 Would Ms. Quibila Divine and those  
21 accompanying her please join the  
22 Councilwoman at the podium.

23 And joining Councilwoman Brown,  
24 we have Councilman Bill Greenlee and also  
25 joining Councilwoman Brown is

3                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
4           Mr. President.

5                   Recognizing leadership at the  
6           School District matters. Recognizing  
7           young people who are doing well there  
8           matters, but also recognizing parents and  
9           caregivers who have the responsibility  
10          for ensuring that our children arrive  
11          ready for school matters as well. And  
12          there's a lot of research that says when  
13          parents are actively engaged in the  
14          academic lives of their children, all the  
15          research says that they do better. So it  
16          is with great pleasure that we recognize  
17          this month October as Parent and Family  
18          Appreciation Month.

19                   Whereas, according to the  
20          National Committee for Citizens in  
21          Education, students with families who are  
22          involved in their school have fewer  
23          behavioral problems and better academic  
24          performance, and are more likely to  
25          complete secondary school than students

2 whose families are not involved in their  
3 daily academic lives; and

4 Whereas, research continues to  
5 show that parents get involved in their  
6 children's education for a variety of  
7 reasons, but they do so especially when  
8 schools reach out to them and invite --  
9 the operative word is "invite" -- their  
10 participation; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

12 Whereas, parents are the first and most  
13 influential teachers of their children  
14 and most often have high hopes and dreams  
15 for their children's future; and

16 Whereas, the most accurate  
17 predictor of student achievement in  
18 school is the extent to which their  
19 families are able to create a home  
20 environment that encourages learning and  
21 advocates for their children's  
22 achievement in both school and community;  
23 and

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
25 the importance of parent and family

2           engagement in education requires not only  
3           recognition, but a firm commitment to the  
4           School District of Philadelphia, its  
5           students and families; and

6                       Whereas, Parent Power, The  
7           Educational Advocates Reaching Today's  
8           Hardworking Students, Incorporated, the  
9           Philadelphia branch of the National  
10          Association for the Advancement of  
11          Colored People, and the Women's Christian  
12          Alliance has scheduled a month of  
13          activities to show appreciation for  
14          parents and their contributions as  
15          members of school-based and District  
16          teams; now, therefore, be it

17                      COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Resolved,  
18          by the City Council of Philadelphia, that  
19          we hereby recognize October 2013 as  
20          Parent and Family Appreciation Month in  
21          Philadelphia.

22                      Further resolved, that an  
23          engrossed copy of this resolution be  
24          presented to Parent Power, The  
25          Educational Advocates Reaching Today's

8     Blackwell, Greenlee, and Blondell  
9     Reynolds Brown and supported by all  
10    members of the Philadelphia City Council.  
11                     Congratulations.

12                     (Applause.)

13                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
14    Chair recognizes Ms. Divine for remarks.

15                     MS. DIVINE: Thank you so much.  
16    I'd like to send my appreciation to  
17    President Darrell Clarke, Education Chair  
18    Jannie Blackwell, Councilwoman Blondell  
19    Reynolds Brown and her staff, Katherine  
20    Gilmore, and my Councilwoman, Cindy Bass,  
21    and Councilman Greenlee, as well as the  
22    rest of you who work so tirelessly on  
23    behalf of the community members which you  
24    represent.

25                     I'd also like to recognize

9                    Parent Appreciation Month  
10   allows those of us who are usually busy  
11   being education chairs, task force  
12   members, committee men and women, and  
13   ward leaders to recognize the  
14   contributions of men and women who are  
15   our constituents, our neighbors, our  
16   families, and our friends who serve as  
17   equal partners with teachers, principals,  
18   and District administrators to reinforce  
19   learning in their homes and, when  
20   necessary, hold public and elected  
21   officials accountable.

22                   It is with great pride that I  
23   stand here with a sampling of parents,  
24   family, and community members to accept  
25   this proclamation. They represent many

15                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16       Thank you.

17                   At this time, the Chair  
18       recognizes Councilman Greenlee, who will  
19       present a resolution on my behalf  
20       honoring and recognizing the 30th  
21       anniversary of Glenwood Acres. Would  
22       Ms. Darlene Marcus and those accompanying  
23       her please join the Councilman at the  
24       podium.

25                   And joining Councilman

2 Greenlee, we have Councilwoman Brown,  
3 Councilwoman Blackwell, and Councilwoman  
4 Bass, who I believe used to be a resident  
5 of that particular community.

6 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
7 you, Mr. President. It's always a  
8 pleasure to honor groups that do such  
9 great work in the community for so long.  
10 Thus, this is a resolution honoring and  
11 recognizing the 30th anniversary of  
12 Glenwood Green Acres at 1801 West  
13 Glenwood Avenue.

14 Whereas, urban agriculture has  
15 deep roots here in Philadelphia, long  
16 before the recent national renaissance;  
17 and

18 Whereas, municipal support for  
19 farming dates back to the Vacant Lot  
20 Cultivation Association in the late 19th  
21 century; and

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,  
23 regarded as one of Philadelphia's largest  
24 and most dynamic community gardens,  
25 Glenwood Green Acres can be found on the

2   1800 block of Glenwood Avenue in North  
3   Philadelphia; and

4           Whereas, the garden encompasses  
5   the entire 3.67 acre parcel and today  
6   there are almost 90 active gardening  
7   plots; and

8           Whereas, the idea for Glenwood  
9   Green Acres was first conceived in 1983  
10   by James Taylor, an African American who  
11   resided directly across from West  
12   Glenwood Avenue from the garden, after a  
13   fire caused a former whiskey factory to  
14   be demolished along the street.

15   Mr. Taylor moved onto the 1800 block of  
16   West Glenwood Avenue in 1954; and

17           COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

18   Whereas, Mr. Taylor and other African  
19   American men of southern heritage  
20   initially brought with them knowledge of  
21   plantation techniques and traditional  
22   crops, such as collared greens, peanuts,  
23   okra, mustard greens, corn, tobacco and  
24   cotton.

25           Making you hungry, huh.

2                   And whereas, in 1997, the  
3 Neighborhood Gardens Trust, an affiliate  
4 of the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society  
5 whose mission is to acquire and preserve  
6 community gardens and shared open space  
7 in order to enhance the quality of life  
8 in Philadelphia neighborhoods, purchased  
9 the property through the City's Sheriff  
10 Sale, as a permanent open space; and

11                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
12 more recently, gardeners from communities  
13 all over the City, from Philadelphia to  
14 Mount Airy, have planted in the Glenwood  
15 soil. There are now more women and more  
16 young people involved and a more diverse,  
17 diverse group of nationalities  
18 represented, including gardeners from the  
19 Caribbean and South America; and

20                   Whereas, Glenwood Green Acres  
21 acts as a monument, memorializing its  
22 eighteenth-century agricultural condition  
23 before industry came and went, celebrates  
24 the southern heritage of those who began  
25 the garden, and serves as a vehicle to

2   pass on an agricultural tradition unknown  
3   to today's urban youth; now therefore

4           COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:   Be it  
5   resolved, that the Council of the City of  
6   Philadelphia, hereby recognizes honors  
7   and celebrates the 30th anniversary of  
8   Glenwood Green Acres.

9           Further resolved, that an  
10   engrossed copy of this resolution be  
11   presented to the farmers of Glenwood  
12   Green Acres as evidence of the sincere  
13   sentiments of this legislative body.

14           This resolution is sponsored by  
15   Council President Clarke and is supported  
16   by all members of City Council.

17           Thank you for all you do.

18           (Applause.)

19           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   The  
20   Chair recognizes Ms. Marcus for remarks.

21           MS. MARCUS:   Thank you.   I'd  
22   like to thank you on behalf of all the  
23   gardeners at Glenwood.   It's a shame that  
24   Mr. Taylor is no longer with us, because  
25   he would have loved this.   He loved

2   gardening. That was one of his passions,  
3   and along with his southern skills, we  
4   have been able to keep up the garden for  
5   all these years. As you said, we have  
6   many people from many nationalities and  
7   all different types of skills going on,  
8   and we just love it. It's not only  
9   gardeners; it's a meeting place for us as  
10  well as a recreational area.

11           UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Good  
12  morning. Glenwood has served as a  
13  recreation center, a therapy for all of  
14  us senior citizens, and it is an open  
15  space, a green space. Our motto is to  
16  keep it clean and open. It has enhanced  
17  the neighborhood, and the gardeners love  
18  to come in. They produce and plant and  
19  learn how nutritious fresh vegetables are  
20  to our existence, and we thank you.

21           (Applause.)

16               An ordinance authorizing Likmos  
17      trading as Dmitri's to construct, own and  
18      maintain an open-air sidewalk cafe at 944  
19      North 2nd Street; and

20               An ordinance authorizing Global  
21      Crepes & Local Shakes to construct, own  
22      and maintain an open-air sidewalk cafe at  
23      1309 South 9th Street; and

24               An ordinance authorizing Green  
25      Eggs Cafe to construct, own and maintain

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilman.

16 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged

17 resolution authorizing the Committee on

18 Labor and Civil Service to hold public

19 hearings to examine the mistreatment of

20 workers by LP Group 2 under contracts

21 awarded through the Neighborhood

22 Transformation Initiative after the

23 workers in question have now been subject

24 to 18 hours of hearings before the Board

25 of Labor Standards while the City of

2 Philadelphia has stated that they have  
3 money available to pay the workers.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That

19 specifically amending Section  
20 14-506(2)(c) entitled "Sunset Provision"  
21 to extend the stated expiration date  
22 until December 31, 2016.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That  
24 bill will be referred to committee.

25 CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance

1       10/24/13 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS  
2       amending Title 14 of The Philadelphia  
3       Code, entitled "Zoning and Planning," by  
4       making technical and clarifying changes.

5                COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That  
6       bill will also be referred to committee.

7                CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance  
8       authorizing Chestlen Development, owner  
9       and developer of 1441 Chestnut Street to  
10      construct, own and maintain various  
11      encroachments to be installed in  
12      conjunction with a mixed-use development.

13               COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That  
14      bill will be referred to the appropriate  
15      committee.

16               CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged  
17      resolution honoring and recognizing the

14                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
15           morning, sir.

16                    MR. KING: Thank you,  
17           Mr. President, and thank you,  
18           Councilmembers. I am here to address  
19           Resolution 120118 authorizing the  
20           feasibility of transferring the ownership  
21           or operation of Philadelphia Gas Works to  
22           a private entity.

23                    The demand to sell public  
24           assets, property, public schools, and  
25           public utilities is unthinkable, in that

2           it will further the degradation of the  
3           population's standard of living, of which  
4           the City is dedicated to uphold.

5                       The sale of PGW to the very  
6           forces that have caused the City's fiscal  
7           crisis furthers the inherently criminal  
8           activities operating from the Wall Street  
9           organization.

10                      In Detroit, Barclays Bank, a  
11           British international banker speculator  
12           organization, has been awarded management  
13           of Detroit's assets in its bankruptcy  
14           resolution process by the financial power  
15           of Wall Street. How does this happen to  
16           the arsenal of democracy? Is there a  
17           court in the land that can find for the  
18           people? Is there an institution in U.S.  
19           officialism that can discern fraud, a  
20           financial warfare offensive conducted  
21           against the people?

22                      It is a national security  
23           crisis, as a Detroit model spreads across  
24           the nation attacking every state, city,  
25           and town across the nation with fed and

2           court collaboration. We must apprehend  
3           the reality. Sequester enforces us --  
4           pardon me; informs us a national economy  
5           and population contraction policy has  
6           been ordered. Our most lavishly  
7           credentialed political and financier  
8           authorities have bought into the global  
9           radical population reduction policy while  
10          doing anything to save the present  
11          monetary financial unlimited bailout  
12          system, actually stating that some lives  
13          are not worthy of life, justifying the  
14          attack on Social Security, Medicare, and  
15          Medicaid.

16                        We do not know the implications  
17          of the chaos operation emanating from the  
18          federal administration and the Congress.  
19          The poor and the working must be  
20          protected. The demands of the physical  
21          economy depend upon them. Be on guard  
22          for the triggers of depression.

23                        Across Europe the situation is  
24          much worse, reflecting the general health  
25          of the transatlantic financial system.

2 In Ireland, the people faced with brutal  
3 budget cuts enforced by the central  
4 banker authorities shout, "Gas us, it's  
5 cheaper." Can cities across the United  
6 States go the same way?

7 Philadelphia has the capacity  
8 of being a super city. The creation of  
9 the Philadelphia public bank can  
10 stabilize the City and facilitate its  
11 economic policy, starting with the  
12 redevelopment of Philadelphia.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your remarks, sir.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Allan Domb,  
17 commenting on 130531-A.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
20 morning, sir.

21 MR. DOMB: Good morning. The  
22 Greater Philadelphia Association of  
23 Realtors supports Bill 130531. It has to  
24 do with tax lien sales. Twenty-eight  
25 states across the country currently do

2 tax lien sales. There was a bill in the  
3 State of Pennsylvania in the 1920s  
4 authorizing tax lien sales.

5 We have about \$1.6 billion of  
6 delinquent taxes in the City of  
7 Philadelphia spread over 16 different  
8 taxes. Over 500 million are delinquent  
9 real estate taxes; 370 million are  
10 delinquent utility liens, water, sewer,  
11 and gas, totalling \$870 million.

12 Tax lien sales could help  
13 collect a lot of that money. And, by the  
14 way, in the 28 other states, less than 1  
15 percent of all tax lien sales end up in  
16 foreclosure. Over 50 percent of the tax  
17 lien sales are purchased by mortgage  
18 companies protecting their interest.  
19 This is an easy way for Philadelphia to  
20 collect a lot of money. And we're not  
21 looking at the individual putting people  
22 out on the street, but if you look at the  
23 statistics, 40 percent of our real estate  
24 delinquencies are investors who don't  
25 live in Philadelphia, and that's not

2           right. Why should Philadelphians who pay  
3           their taxes -- 85 to 87 percent of us pay  
4           our real estate taxes, and 13 to 15  
5           percent do not. That's not fair.

6                        So we believe this bill  
7           Councilman Green has put forth should be  
8           supported, and we think it's great for  
9           the City and a great way to collect money  
10          at a time when we really need it.

11                       Thank you.

12                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13          Thank you so much for your testimony.

24                   CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

6           Philadelphia City Council recognizes the

9           understanding of United States history.

10                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
11           Chair recognizes Councilman Kenney.

12                   COUNCILMAN KENNEY: I move the  
13           adoption of the resolution and I'd like  
14           to speak briefly on it, Mr. President.

15                   (Duly seconded.)

16                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

10      Arawak Indians in the Caribbean, the  
11      Creeks, the Seminoles, the Cherokees,  
12      blacks, African slaves, those women who  
13      were denied the right to vote up until  
14      the 19th century.

15                   I think it is very important  
16      that in addition to the Ben Franklins and  
17      George Washingtons and the Thomas  
18      Jeffersons of the world, of the country  
19      that we know and hear about and read  
20      about and allow different cultures of our  
21      own children to understand their  
22      contributions to this country, the  
23      struggles and the oppression and the  
24      things that their folks have gone  
25      through.

2           I'd just like to read a quote  
3           from Mr. Zinn relative to his own book.  
4           He says, "My history describes the  
5           inspiring struggle of those who have  
6           fought slavery and racism (Frederick

8           Lou Hamer, Bob Moses), of the labor  
9           organizers who have led strikes for the  
10          rights of working people (Big Bill  
11          Haywood, Mother Jones, Cesar Chavez), and  
12          others who have protested war and  
13          militarism (Eugene Debs, Hellen Keller,  
14          the Reverend Daniel Berrigan, Cindy  
15          Sheehan). My hero is not Theodore  
16          Roosevelt, who loved war and  
17          congratulated a general after a massacre  
18          of Filipino villagers at the turn of the  
19          century, but Mark Twain, who denounced  
20          the massacre and satirized imperialism.

21                 "I want young people to  
22                 understand that ours is a beautiful  
23                 country, but it has been taken over by  
24                 men who have no respect for human rights  
25                 or constitutional liberties. Our people

2           are basically decent and caring, and our  
3           highest ideals are expressed in the  
4           Declaration of Independence, which says  
5           that all of us have an equal right to

9           against corporate robber barons and war  
10          makers, to make those ideals a reality -  
11          and all of us, of whatever age, can find

15          in high school generally -- and I think  
16          this is where this book belongs -- to  
17          understand that there is another history  
18          of the United States, another history of

21          removed from our consciousness and needs  
22          to be put back, and I think this book is

9           in a lien sale from selling that lien or  
10          from foreclosing on that property for two  
11          years. And this is significant because  
12          under current law the City is required to  
13          foreclose within one year if people have  
14          not entered a payment agreement. So this  
15          gives, at only a 5 percent penalty rate,  
16          homeowners the opportunity to have two  
17          years to pay off the lienholder, which  
18          should be of great benefit to them.

19                        There are also other  
20          protections in this bill. There won't be  
21          a lien sale of any lien that is less than  
22          \$1,000. Additionally, legal fees are  
23          capped at \$200 an hour, which is not the  
24          case with respect to foreclosures, which  
25          can cost \$8,000, \$10,000 in legal fees

2           and other fees associated therewith that  
3           the property owner would have to pay to  
4           prevent their house from going into  
5           foreclosure. And additionally there is a  
6           maximum amount that can be charged in  
7           connection with the foreclosure or

9           which are protections that do not exist  
10          in current law with respect to  
11          foreclosures or any other way the City  
12          has to gather money from taxpayers who  
13          owe it that money.

23           COUNCILMAN GREEN: But we must

19          COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

21          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22       You're welcome.

23          COUNCILMAN JONES: I'm going to

24       say a name in this Chamber that probably

25       99 percent of the people won't even

2       remember. This gentleman's name is  
3       Lannert Roberts. He was the first  
4       African American real estate broker in  
5       the City of Philadelphia.

6           I bring his name up because he  
7       was named by JET Magazine as "The  
8       Blockbuster," and what he would do is  
9       take couples, sometimes minorities,  
10      sometimes Caucasian couples, and show  
11      where racial discrimination played a part  
12      in housing.

13           He also took me under his wing  
14      and talked about real estate in a  
15      historic perspective and talked about the  
16      fact that early on, the concept of  
17      redlining came from a standard where the  
18      federal government surveyed 239 cities to  
19      create a code by which realtors,  
20      participants, insurance brokers could  
21      understand what type of neighborhood it  
22      was. So they went from a scale of one to  
23      five and then put colors on them. The  
24      most dangerous ones, the most undesirable  
25      ones were called redlined neighborhoods.

2           Synonymous to that, most of them on many  
3           occasions happen to be African American.

4                    The federal government followed  
5           with FHA in 1934 and they created  
6           companion insurance to go with these  
7           respective neighborhoods, and what  
8           happened was in redlined neighborhoods,  
9           insurance was always higher, cost of  
10          housing always higher, and this was a  
11          part of -- unfortunate part of our  
12          history as a nation but our history in  
13          the City of Philadelphia.

14                   Fast forward to current date,  
15          you would think that all of these things  
16          were something to be Googled as a part of  
17          our past, but recently a study was  
18          released by the Department of Housing and  
19          Urban Development dealing with 2012  
20          citing discrimination in the City of  
21          Philadelphia higher than the national  
22          average.

23                   Now, name calling and N words  
24          are no longer used, but subtle codes,  
25          subtle descriptions are even used to this

2       day. And what the study showed, some of  
3       the highlights, were that African  
4       Americans were 17.7 percent higher to be  
5       shown fewer options of housing in  
6       particular neighborhoods. This was true  
7       for Asians as well, that they were shown  
8       18.8 percent times higher to be shown  
9       various housing in different  
10      neighborhoods fewer times than their  
11      counterparts, whether it was rental or  
12      for ownership.

13                 These limited options cost us.  
14      They're not just keeping the  
15      neighborhood, you know, ethnic, but it  
16      cost the individuals who are not shown  
17      those options.

18                 The study goes on to show that  
19      in those redlined neighborhoods,  
20      insurance is higher, education options  
21      are more limited, access to  
22      transportation limited, access to job  
23      opportunities limited.

24                 So a single decision of where  
25      you live impacts us in so many different

2           ways, so many different times. Someone  
3           once said the most expensive thing in  
4           America is being poor, because you will  
5           pay far more for where you live than you  
6           would if you lived in a zip code that was  
7           favored.

8                         So the Committee on Public  
9           Safety, along with the Committee on  
10          Housing and Neighborhood Development and  
11          the Homelessness chaired by my colleague  
12          Jannie Blackwell, will hold a hearing to  
13          review these findings to see where we  
14          really are. And, sadly, the fight is not  
15          over. And a great man once said that  
16          those who cannot remember the past will  
17          be condemned to repeat it. And we intend  
18          to take a hard look at what's going on  
19          and make hard decisions as a result. AVI  
20          makes a decision. We pass bills that  
21          affect housing today, but we must keep  
22          our eye on the prize to make sure we are  
23          not taking giant steps forward and taking  
24          cultural steps backward.

25                         Thank you, Mr. President.

4           The Chair recognizes

5           Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

6           COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
7           you, Mr. President. I wanted to publicly  
8           thank Pedro Ramos who this week resigned  
9           from the SRC, and I want to thank him  
10          because many times we've seen him in this  
11          Chamber and in the various meetings in  
12          our district, and he served as a  
13          volunteer during a very turbulent time at  
14          the School District. He is my personal  
15          friend. His children and mine went to  
16          school together, and he has been a public  
17          education parent and advocate, and I want  
18          to thank him for his service. And then  
19          remind us that not only is his seat  
20          vacant, but Commissioner Dworetzky's seat  
21          ends at the end of the year, which allows  
22          us an opportunity to put two new people  
23          on the SRC. And we need to be vigilant  
24          about what Governor Corbett does with  
25          these positions and the people that he

2       puts forth at the SRC given our  
3       challenges.

4           Councilwoman Blackwell today  
5       passed a resolution on the nursing  
6       situation at the District. I want to  
7       remind folks, I put on folks' desks today  
8       the Public Interest Law Center filed an  
9       official complaint at the state level  
10      Board of Education this week on Tuesday,  
11      and I want my colleagues to read this and  
12      remind them of the dire situation that  
13      exists in our schools every single day.

14           In a public letter to Dr. Hite,  
15      Parents United put forward some points  
16      about the \$45 million that recently was  
17      released by Corbett for reasons unknown,  
18      although we hope that some of the public  
19      advocacy that's going on with Phil Cobb,  
20      Councilman Green and I have joined the  
21      parents in asking for official complaints  
22      to be filed at the state, which by law  
23      must be investigated.

24           But Parents United put forth a  
25      request about what happens to this 45

2 million, and I share some of their  
3 priorities, and as we last week passed  
4 our 50 million, I think it's important  
5 that the priorities by which this newly  
6 allocated money gets applied to the  
7 District is important to all of us. And  
8 I want to share in what they've called  
9 on, which is the restoration of guidance  
10 counselors to last year's level. All of  
11 us have heard the stories. It is  
12 unacceptable to have 16 roving  
13 counselors. Those of you who went to our  
14 briefing recently heard firsthand from  
15 the frustration of counselors and their  
16 numbers, which in some cases one to every  
17 1,500 schools, with less than 600  
18 students not having a counselor, and that  
19 is unacceptable.

20                   As the School District  
21 levels -- Councilwoman Blackwell also  
22 mentioned this last week -- there's a  
23 concern that staffing is going to be  
24 moved around the City. We want to make  
25 sure that some of this 45 million and the

2       next 50 that we hope to get to them real  
3       soon, that if we all publicly agree that  
4       the staffing levels are unacceptable,  
5       that we not just do a traditional  
6       leveling, but that we try to keep those  
7       staffing positions particularly around  
8       public safety in the schools.

9           The no splitting of grades,  
10       this just goes against every good best  
11       practice in education, and one of the  
12       goals should be to have no split grades.  
13       As someone who attended a school where  
14       this happened years ago, I can tell you  
15       my 7th and 8th grade years were very  
16       similar because we had split grades. And  
17       that is unacceptable and should be a  
18       priority that we work towards.

19           Obviously hiring more teachers,  
20       and while there's some legal issues  
21       around class size, we have all agreed  
22       that class size is a major issue in  
23       effective education, and so that should  
24       be also a priority. And obviously this  
25       nursing situation and medical safety of

2           students should be a non-negotiable.

3                        So I want to remind our folks  
4           that there's still a lot of work to be  
5           done and we still have a responsibility  
6           to help shape the -- work with the  
7           District in shaping how this money gets  
8           allocated and prioritized in the  
9           District.

10                      Thank you, Mr. President.

11                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12           Thank you, Councilwoman.

13                      There being no other speeches  
14           on behalf of the minority or the  
15           majority, the Chair recognizes  
16           Councilwoman Brown for a motion to  
17           adjourn.

18                      COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
19           Mr. President. I would like to offer two  
20           announcements and then move to  
21           adjournment. One, as a friendly reminder  
22           in response to Councilwoman  
23           Quinones-Sanchez's concerns about  
24           counselors, now going through the  
25           enormity of the college admissions

9       pre-college form activities happening  
10      around the City, including one being  
11      offered by the Mayor's Office.

12                 Two weeks ago, I introduced a  
13      resolution for us to sit down and look at  
14      the scarcity of counselors and how the  
15      lack of them is going to contribute to  
16      the diminished number of young people who  
17      end up not applying for college for  
18      September '14.

19                 So I would ask members of the  
20      Education Committee to look forward to  
21      that hearing, because we do need to look  
22      at that in a more definitive way.

23                 Secondly, the National  
24      Prescription Drug Take-Back Day is this  
25      Saturday. It's called the National

2       Prescription Drug Take-Back Day, and I  
3       mention that because a young man dear to  
4       a number of us in here overdosed on  
5       prescription drugs that were not his and  
6       he didn't know that they were even  
7       prescription drugs, and it just  
8       heightened our awareness of that. So if  
9       you know of young people in particular,  
10      they're encouraged to turn in unused or  
11      expired medication for safe disposal and  
12      welcomed to call a number on the website,  
13      on the Drug Enforcement Agency website.  
14      So, again, the reminder is that this  
15      Saturday is National Prescription Drug  
16      Take-Back Day.

17                   Lastly, I invite my colleagues  
18      to join us for one hour as the Chair of  
19      the Transportation Committee, Councilman  
20      Kenyatta Johnson, and Majority Leader  
21      Jones and I are hosting an hour session  
22      for the Philadelphia OIC to look at the  
23      celebration of the upcoming 50th  
24      Anniversary of the founding of OIC by  
25      Philadelphia's dearly beloved Leon H.
