3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Let
6 me apologize for the late start this
7 morning. We had business that we had to
8 discuss prior to the caucus, so I want to
9 apologize for that. So we'll try to move
10 the session as expeditiously as possible
11 so we can get you out of here on time.

12 At this time, I'd like to ask
13 all the members to take their seats and
14 any guests or visitors please retire
15 behind the rail. I want to thank you so
16 much for your cooperation.

17 To give our invocation this
18 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor
19 Joseph Genito of St. Rita's Parish. He
20 is here today as the guest of Councilman
21 Kenyatta Johnson. And I saw our good
22 friend Ron Donatucci here also that made
23 sure that the Pastor was here.

14 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
15 you, Mr. President. I move that the

7 The next order of business is
8 the request for leave of absence, and the
9 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. On behalf of the
12 democrats, there are no requests for
13 leaves of absence today.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you, Councilman.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 O'Neill.

18 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. On behalf of the
20 republicans, there are no requests for
21 leave of absence.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 At this time, I'd like to
25 dispense with the regular order of

2 business and I want to again apologize
3 for our late start, but I really would
4 like to thank you for coming down today
5 to witness your government in action. We
6 really appreciate you taking time out of
7 your day to come down and enjoy the day
8 with us. We hope that your stay today is
9 a pleasurable one, so much so that you
10 come back again. Again, thank you so
11 much.

12 At this time, the Chair
13 recognizes Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez,
14 who will present a resolution recognizing
15 and honoring the life of Roberto
16 Clemente, my personal hero, and his
17 family on the occasion of the publishing
18 of "Clemente: The True Legacy of an
19 Undying Hero." Would Mr. Roberto
20 Clemente, Jr. and those accompanying him
21 please join the Councilwoman at the
22 podium.

23 And we have Councilman Greenlee
24 also joining.

25 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank

2 you, Mr. President. When I asked
3 Councilman Greenlee to join me, it was
4 based on the notion that he was the
5 biggest Clemente fan, Council President,
6 so...

7 I also want to recognize
8 Clemente, Jr., who is here. He is joined
9 by his daughter and Mr. Trujillo, who is
10 the owner of Supremo Markets -- Council
11 President, there's one in your
12 district -- Supremo Supermarkets, who
13 introduced me to the family and is
14 helping with this launch and bringing
15 attention to this very important book
16 that documents the experience -- and
17 Roberto, Jr. will speak to that -- the
18 experience of a very unique family and of
19 a very unique human being. We should all
20 aspire to be Roberto Clemente and to have
21 the type of legacy that he has.

22 He was not only an amazing
23 baseball player, but he was an amazing
24 human being, and all of us who work in
25 public service want to have a legacy.

2 His is one that through this book and
3 through this process his family has
4 memorialized forever for generations to
5 come.

6 I am one of the first
7 graduating members of Roberto Clemente
8 School. We renamed our school -- at that
9 time it was Pennsylvania Advancement
10 Middle School, and so I was one of the
11 8th graders who petitioned the School
12 District to change its name. That school
13 is now in my district and I'm a proud
14 graduate of that.

15 So with that, I ask Councilman
16 Greenlee to join me in recognizing and
17 honoring the life of Roberto Clemente and
18 his family on the occasion of the
19 publishing of "Clemente: The True Legacy
20 of an Undying Hero."

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
22 Roberto Clemente was born in Carolina,
23 Puerto Rico and at the age of seventeen
24 began his career in professional baseball
25 with the -- oh, boy -- Cangrejeros de

2 Santurce in 1952, followed by his time
3 with the Montreal Royals, the Triple A
4 team of the Brooklyn Dodgers, where he
5 played until he was drafted by the
6 Pittsburgh Pirates for the 1955 season;
7 and

8 Whereas, from 1955 until 1972,
9 Roberto Clemente played for the
10 Pittsburgh Pirates as a right fielder,
11 and over that eighteen season career he
12 was a National League Most Valuable
13 Player, a twelve time Major League
14 Baseball All-Star, four time National
15 League Batting Champion, a winner of the
16 Babe Ruth Award, a twelve time Gold Glove
17 Award honoree, a two time World Series
18 champion, and in 1971 the World Series
19 Most Valuable Player; and

20 Through his success, Roberto
21 Clemente paved the way for future Latino
22 Major League Baseball players, being the
23 first Latino to win a World Series as a
24 starter, to win an MVP award, and to be
25 named the World Series MVP; and

2 Whereas, in 1973, Roberto
3 Clemente was posthumously inducted into
4 the National Baseball Hall of Fame, being
5 the first Latino American to receive that
6 honor and one of two players, along with
7 Lou Gehrig, for whom the mandatory
8 five-year waiting period for entrance
9 into the Hall of Fame was waived; and

10 Whereas, not only was Robert
11 Clemente a successful professional
12 athlete, he also was dedicated to serving
13 others, and his charity work took him to
14 both Puerto Rico and throughout Latin
15 America, and in 1971 when while traveling
16 to Managua, Nicaragua to provide relief
17 to earthquake victims, Roberto Clemente
18 tragically died when the plane he was
19 traveling in crashed into the ocean off
20 the coast of Puerto Rico; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
22 the legacy of Roberto Clemente is
23 recognized and lives on here in
24 Philadelphia through the Roberto Clemente
25 Park and Playground at 18th and Mount

2 Vernon, the Roberto Clemente Promise
3 Academy, and the statue of Mr. Clemente
4 located at the school whose inscription
5 memorializes his powerful words: Quiero
6 que me recuerden como uno que dio todo lo
7 que tenia para dar. I want to be
8 remembered as someone who gave all that
9 he had to give; and

10 Whereas, to honor his life,
11 "Clemente: The True Legacy of an Undying
12 Hero" was written by Vera, Roberto, Jr.,
13 Ricky Clemente, along with CBS sports
14 writer Mike Freeman, who work to preserve
15 the memory of their husband and father in
16 the hope that his life can inspire the
17 hope and charity that Roberto Clemente
18 embodied; and

19 Whereas, the Clemente family,
20 like their husband and father, are also
21 dedicated to service, and to continue
22 that tradition founded the Roberto
23 Clemente Foundation to serve as a bridge
24 for youth to become responsible members
25 of their communities through sports,

2 education, and community service;

3 therefore be it

4 Resolved, that the Council of

5 the City of Philadelphia hereby

6 recognizes and honors the life of Roberto

7 Clemente for his illustrious career which

8 broke down barriers for Puerto Ricans and

9 Latinos in baseball, and for his

10 dedication to public service and critical

11 volunteer work. We also honor the

12 Clemente family for carrying on in his

13 footsteps of their husband and father by

14 continuing his dedication to charity and

15 his work to provide strong Latino role

16 models through their book "Clemente: The

17 True Legacy of an Undying Hero." We

18 thank the entire Clemente family for

19 their service, and we look forward to

20 their continued dedication to sports,

21 youth, and the Latino community for years

22 to come.

23 Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

4 MR. CLEMENTE: Thank you. On
5 behalf of the Clemente family, we want to
6 thank all of you. And one of the things
7 that my father lived by was if you have
8 an opportunity to make a difference and
9 you don't, you're wasting your time on
10 earth. And I believe that the way that
11 he passed solidified him as a true human
12 being, and after 40 years of his death,
13 we still are very proud of the true
14 fingerprint that he left on the game of
15 baseball but, most importantly, in our
16 society.

17 Thank you very much.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Council will be at ease.

21 (Council at ease.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you.

24 At this time, the Chair
25 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who

5 those accompanying him please join the

7 And joining Councilwoman
8 Blackwell, we also have Councilman Kenney
9 and Councilman Jones and Councilwoman
10 Reynolds Brown.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
12 Resolution recognizing the tireless
13 dedicated efforts of The Workshop School
14 in celebrating its official opening as a
15 four-year School District of Philadelphia
16 public high school.

17 Whereas, original founders of
18 the program Michael Clapper, C. Aiden
19 Downey, Simon Hauger, and Matthew Riggan
20 were teachers and colleagues at West
21 Philadelphia High School where they
22 became friends and formulated the ideas
23 for the program; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
25 years later, after a successful two-year

2 pilot program at the Philadelphia Navy
3 Yard, The Workshop School officially
4 opened its doors as a full four-year
5 School District of Philadelphia public
6 school on September 9th, 2013; and

7 Whereas, The Workshop School is
8 now located in the heart of the 3rd
9 Councilmanic District - 221 South Hanson
10 Street; and

11 Whereas, while the current
12 enrollment at the school is in the double
13 digits, at its peak, The Workshop School
14 plans to eventually enroll 500 students
15 in its high-caliber program;

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, of
17 the 28 students that graduated from the
18 school this past year, 96 percent were
19 accepted to college and 74 percent
20 matriculated. The curriculum trusts
21 students to make decisions, wanting
22 students to explain, justify as many of
23 those decisions as possible, which
24 reinforces the notion that there may not
25 be one right answer and to make the most

2 out of failure - failure being a
3 necessary part of innovation and
4 problem-solving; and

5 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Whereas,
6 co-founder and current principal of The
7 Workshop School, Mr. Simon Hauger, while
8 stressing the importance of content,
9 recognizes the broader goal of education.
10 When you think about the skills you use
11 every day, I doubt that you call on
12 Algebra 2 skills very often. Why can't
13 school be more about figuring out what
14 you're interested in and passionate about
15 and developing that skill set? You need
16 to read, write, and do math and know
17 something about thinking as scientists
18 and as social scientists. But how do you
19 translate that into a meaningful
20 experience for kids; and

21 Whereas, the opening of a
22 high-performing high school in West
23 Philadelphia is a significant step
24 forward to bettering the overall
25 educational outcomes of the City of

2 Philadelphia entirely; now therefore, be
3 it

4 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

5 Resolved, that the Philadelphia City
6 Council recognizes the tireless dedicated
7 efforts of The Workshop School and
8 celebrates its official opening as a
9 School District of Philadelphia public
10 high school. And we are proud this was
11 certainly agreed to and signed by the
12 President and all members of City
13 Council.

14 Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Mr. Hauger for remarks.

18 MR. HAUGER: Thank you very
19 much, Councilwoman Blackwell. We really
20 appreciate the continued support that
21 we've gotten from the City Council and
22 the leadership in Philadelphia to help
23 bring this dream into reality.

24 As most of us know, people
25 learn differently, and so often schools

6 Philadelphia.

7 So thank you for recognizing us

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you so much.

15 At this time, the Chair

16 recognizes Councilman Oh.

17 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
18 much, Mr. President. I'd like to
19 introduce to you and my colleagues and
20 everyone here a special guest today
21 joining us is Alex Lipton, Director of
22 Governmental Affairs and Press for the
23 Consulate General of Israel to the
24 Mid-Atlantic region, which is located
25 here in Philadelphia.

13 Folks, can I ask you all to
14 keep your voices down a little bit,
15 please. Thank you.

16 The Chair recognizes
17 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. It gives me great
20 pleasure this morning to first commend
21 and say thank you to the Greater
22 Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, as they
23 heard the appeal made by the Forum for
24 Executive Women, the Urban League of
25 Philadelphia, and read the Women on

2 Boards bill and that they have now not
3 only considered and recruited but hired a
4 credentialed, seasoned professional to
5 serve as their new executive there in the
6 executive suite. This woman comes
7 serving as senior advisor for a private
8 equity firm. She was a high-ranking
9 executive at an international energy
10 company and earlier in her career served
11 as Vice President for Duke Energy
12 Corporation. She's Harvard Business
13 School, Yale University trained. So
14 there's no question about her
15 credentials.

16 Now in her new position as an
17 executive with the Greater Philadelphia
18 Chamber of Commerce, she will oversee all
19 of the Chamber's advocacy activities at
20 the federal, state, regional, and city
21 level. So it's my wonderful pleasure to
22 present to some and introduce to others
23 Lisa Crutchfield, the Greater
24 Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce's new
25 hired executive.

10 certain or all City offices, departments,
11 boards and commissions to the Director of
12 Finance - Fringe Benefits; and

13 An ordinance authorizing
14 transfers in appropriations for Fiscal
15 Year 2013 within the General Fund from
16 certain or all City offices, departments,
17 boards and commissions to certain or all
18 City offices, departments, boards and
19 commissions; and

20 An ordinance authorizing the
21 Commissioner of Public Property to
22 execute and enter into a declaration of
23 rights, easements, covenants, and
24 restrictions to govern the relationship
25 among that certain parcel of land,

2 together with the improvements thereon,
3 commonly known as JFK Plaza located at

9 Arch Streets; and certain parcels of land
10 around and beneath Love Park Parking

16 simple title to a certain parcel of land,
17 together with the improvements located

13 meetings, the \$200,000 foundation
14 funding, the lack of African Americans
15 involved in any leadership position as we
16 embark on a land grab.

17 Most of the vacant land is
18 located in the areas where African
19 Americans were sold raggedy properties,
20 also where white flight happened
21 overnight in some cases, where families
22 were redlined, and where government
23 policies, NTI, added to the vacant land
24 bank from 40, 50 years before.

25 There are several areas of

2 concern: white supremacy, institutional
3 racism, ignorance, and greed. This land
4 bank will be another layer of bureaucracy
5 deciding who gets to develop, who gets
6 vacant land. If this process so far is
7 any indication of the future, we have
8 major problems.

9 African Americans lose in the
10 implementation of these policies. This
11 land banking alone, with the RCO fiasco,
12 land will move without input from
13 homeowners and residents. As public
14 documents will prove, land banking has
15 been ongoing for decades. This is
16 something different. If PHA is not
17 brought to the table, being the
18 gentrification agency with many
19 unmaintained parcels, we will continue
20 this illusion of eliminating blight.

21 The Sheriff Department -- and
22 I'm going to readdress this in the
23 future -- is selling tax lien properties
24 without proper notification. They tape
25 the notification on the stakeholder's

2 door.

3 We must work to abate the ills
4 that cause people to abandon properties.
5 Little focus is on that area as we grab
6 land in neighborhoods where social ills
7 are out of control.

8 We must have inclusion of
9 homeowners in this process who reside in
10 these communities and who are vested for
11 the long haul. Having institutional
12 knowledge to avoid some of the nonsense
13 that has been ongoing would also be of
14 value.

15 You deposit land in the bank,
16 but I ask the question, who can make a
17 withdrawal? That is the big question.
18 Over a decade or more I have been
19 observing this process, and as the
20 documents that I put before you today
21 will prove, African Americans lose.
22 There's a gentleman, a very worldwide
23 artist, who is being asked to move out of
24 his property and make way for some
25 development.

2 Whenever African Americans are
3 involved in this process, it appears that
4 there's no way they can be included in
5 the development or that their input is
6 accepted. I'm sure we'll be talking
7 about these things as time comes, but I
8 appreciate your time and attention.

9 Thank you very much.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 MS. ROBINSON: And I will put
13 this in a public record.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Okay. We'll make sure it's included.

16 MS. ROBINSON: Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Mark Austerberry,
20 commenting on 130770.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 morning.

24 MR. AUSTERBERRY: Good morning.

25 My name is Mark Austerberry and I'm the

2 Executive Director of the Philadelphia
3 County Medical Society, better known as
4 PCMS. PCMS is a professional membership
5 organization of physicians who live or
6 work in Philadelphia and represent about
7 the interest of 4,500 physicians and
8 their patients. Bill No. 130770 would
9 create additional zoning barriers for new
10 and expanding medical practices in
11 Northeast Philadelphia, because as we
12 understand it, there is a feeling that
13 the situation would create new medical
14 establishments that might cause hardships
15 in some neighborhoods.

16 The proposed legislation would
17 make it more difficult and expensive for
18 small medical practices to be built or
19 expand in Northeast Philadelphia, but
20 Northeast Philadelphia needs more
21 doctors, not less. Health Center 10, the
22 only City health clinic in Northeast
23 Philadelphia, is by far the busiest in
24 the City, while waiting lists of about
25 eight months. Two of every five

2 Northeast Philadelphia residents either
3 lack health insurance or are enrolled in
4 Medicare and about 72,000 have chronic
5 illnesses. Many would call this
6 situation a public health crisis.

7 Equitable access to healthcare
8 is a critical issue for the City, but
9 this legislation could convince
10 physicians such as small and solo
11 practitioners from locating in the
12 Northeast and instead choose Philadelphia
13 neighborhoods or outside the City
14 altogether.

15 Certain areas of Philadelphia
16 have a difficult time attracting and
17 retaining physicians, especially primary
18 care physicians, because of the City's
19 high liability insurance, high taxes,
20 high number of Medicaid and Medicare
21 patients. We appreciate City Council's
22 desire to ensure that certain medical
23 facilities do not disrupt the
24 neighborhood, but as many pediatricians
25 would say, please do not throw the baby

2 out with the bath water.

3 We have never heard of anyone
4 who didn't want a family physician
5 nearby. There must be another way to
6 ensure that Northeast Philadelphia can
7 get the access to medical care that they
8 need while addressing your concerns about
9 certain facilities. The members of the
10 Philadelphia County Medical Society ask
11 that the support please be considered --
12 consider amending or holding Bill No.
13 130770 to address our concerns, and we
14 thank you for your consideration.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you for your testimony.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Robert Taylor,
18 commenting on 130584.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 afternoon.

22 MR. TAYLOR: Good afternoon.
23 Good afternoon, Mr. President and members
24 of Council, ladies and gentlemen. I'm
25 Robert Taylor, President of Transport

2 Workers Union Local 700, a member of the
3 PA Council, and executive Board member of
4 TWU, also a co-host at WPEB 88.1 FM, the
5 Jasper Jones Show.

6 I'm commenting today on
7 Ordinance 130584, regulation of
8 individual conduct. I oppose this
9 ordinance. Liberty should be the main
10 goal. This ordinance brings into
11 question invasions of privacy as to how
12 it's going to be enforced. Also, the PA
13 Constitution, Section 21, the right to
14 keep and bear arms, is supreme law.

15 There are already too many laws
16 and regulations for most people to keep
17 up with. Quote, Cody Wilson, the
18 inventor of the 3D printable gun, called
19 his invention "The Liberator" after the
20 World War II clan to drop single-shot
21 pistols by that name over Occupy Europe.
22 The idea back then was to make sure that
23 the Germans feared anyone that they were
24 lording over might be armed, Reason
25 Magazine.

2 Well, tyrants should fear the
3 people. We should live in rightful
4 liberty. Rightful liberty is
5 unobstructed action according to our will
6 within the limits drawn around us by
7 equal rights of others, Thomas Jefferson.

8 More guns, less crime.

9 God save Philadelphia, and
10 thank you very much.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you so much for your testimony.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Patricia Lowe.

14 (No response.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Patricia Lowe.

16 (No response.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Jihad Ali,

18 commenting on 130686 and 130156.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MR. ALI: Good morning, Mr.

21 President and distinguished members of
22 this Council. I'm here to talk about
23 Bill 130686 first.

24 I'm really here just to say

25 thank you to this Council for --

2 especially to the Finance Committee,
3 Mr. Green, who chaired that committee
4 that day, Blondell, Councilman Goode,
5 Councilman Jones, Councilwoman Blackwell,
6 Councilwoman Tasco, and Councilman
7 Greenlee. You all did a fantastic job
8 that day, because you listened to me, a
9 citizen.

10 This policy that you put in
11 place gives citizens the right to come
12 down to the public hearings to make our
13 points. And I came to a public hearing.
14 I'm not restricted by time, and I made my
15 point. My point I made first to
16 Councilman Goode, who opposed that bill,
17 and my point was simply the removal of
18 some words, five words, which was "upon
19 the request of OEO," because the game
20 that was being played on minorities in
21 this city was if we didn't have the
22 reports, we couldn't really see what was
23 going on.

24 Councilman Jones often says if
25 you can track something, you can correct

2 it. Well, the game was, they would hold
3 the reports until the request of OEO. So
4 through Councilman Goode's, one of his
5 other committees, we got -- he got
6 Ms. Burton to admit, well, there's no
7 transparency, because they're not
8 comfortable with citizens such as myself
9 to come down and request information. So
10 because you listened, we removed that.
11 Because you are our elected officials.
12 We're citizens on this side of this bar.
13 We put our trust in you and the decisions
14 you make.

15 But the thing that you always
16 say is about transparency. It's
17 transparency for you, our elected
18 officials, and it should be transparency
19 for us as citizens to be able to see
20 things. Well, the game they played was,
21 it's transparency by their definition.
22 So I thank you for changing that language
23 to make transparency real.

24 In regards to 130156, we should
25 learn from what just happened on the

2 other OEO legislation, and, that is, that
3 Council, our elected officials, have to
4 have a say in everything, because on this
5 side, there's people that's not elected
6 by anybody. On your side, you're elected
7 by the people to do the people's
8 business. The people on this side,
9 whether it's the land bank, developers,
10 period, they want to take your power from
11 you. We need you to have your power,
12 because we need to make sure that we all
13 rise up. I don't want nobody be down. I
14 don't want the Jews, I don't want the
15 Hispanics, nobody. I want us all to rise
16 together, and we need leadership to make
17 that happen. So I thank you for that,
18 and thank you for everything you've done
19 for us.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you for your testimony.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Rick Sauer,

23 commenting on 130156.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

2 afternoon.

3 MR. SAUER: Good afternoon,
4 Council President Clarke and other
5 members of City Council. My name is Rick
6 Sauer and I'm with the Philadelphia
7 Association of Community Development
8 Corporations, which is also a member of
9 the Philadelphia Land Bank Alliance.

10 We are encouraged by the strong
11 support of City Council and the Nutter
12 Administration for the creation of a land
13 bank to reform our city's broken vacant
14 property system. Members of the Land
15 Bank Alliance, which includes a number of
16 both non-profit and for-profit
17 organizations, are strongly behind
18 passage of an effective land bank
19 ordinance that is transparent,
20 accountable, predictable, efficient,
21 equitable, and has strong community
22 involvement, with appropriate amendments,
23 which we have proposed to Councilmembers.

24 We believe that it's essential
25 to pass this bill before Council's winter

2 recess. So we hope to move forward -- to
3 be able to move forward with addressing
4 this urgent challenge and ensure that the
5 land bank is adequately funded as part of
6 the City's FY15 budget.

7 This is an opportunity for the
8 City Council and the Administration to
9 create a smart, effective land bank and
10 Council approval process for the
11 disposition of properties, and we look
12 forward to working with you to amend Bill
13 No. 130156 and make sure that's finalized
14 by your next session on December 5th so
15 that we can get final approval on
16 December 12th.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you for your testimony.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Amy Laura Cahn,
21 commenting on 130156.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 afternoon.

25 MS. CAHN: Good afternoon.

2 Thank you to the Council President.

3 Thank you, members of Council, for this
4 opportunity to speak with you. I'm
5 speaking today on Bill 130156. My name
6 is Amy Laura Cahn and I'm a staff
7 attorney with the Public Interest Law
8 Center of Philadelphia. PILCOP, or the
9 Law Center, is a member of both the
10 Citywide Land Bank Alliance and the
11 Campaign to Take Back Vacant Land. We
12 have been very proud to work with such
13 broad-based efforts that represent such a
14 diverse constituency of Philadelphians.

15 We believe in this land bank.
16 We've been saying over and over these
17 words: equitable, transparent,
18 predictable, accountable, efficient, and
19 they start to feel like they don't have
20 meaning any longer, but they do. This
21 land bank has the potential to move us
22 forward in the areas of community
23 economic development, environmental
24 justice, food justice, disability rights,
25 access to affordable visitability

2 housing, accessible housing, but we need
3 to get it done. It will require work by
4 all of us, and we are all committed
5 throughout Philadelphia, but we need the
6 bill passed. We ask that you pass this
7 bill before winter recess so that we can
8 start getting this work done.

9 Thanks so much for the
10 opportunity to speak.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you for your testimony.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Clarc King,
14 commenting on 120118.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 afternoon.

18 MR. KING: Good afternoon,
19 Mr. President and members of the City
20 Council. Thank you. I am here to
21 address the Resolution 120118. I ask are
22 we past the feasibility study stage?

23 Philadelphia Gas Works is the
24 source of Philadelphia's strength and
25 should not be sold. Its management

2 conducts for the best interest of the
3 population. PGW is a great economic
4 platform whose true and real potential
5 has not been realized. PGW can bring the
6 City into the hydrogen economy and on
7 into the effusion economy.

8 The private-sector offensive of
9 demanding privatization of City
10 properties must stop. How can political
11 leadership consider selling PGW to the
12 private sector, the source of so much
13 tragedy and a national economy collapse
14 indicted for rigging energy prices? The
15 private-sector system of debt through
16 rigged machinations, interest rates, and
17 credit swaps is driving the proposed sale
18 of PGW.

19 Philadelphia has a great
20 future, about to take the step to become
21 a super city. PGW is crucial to that
22 great endeavor. The formation of credit
23 financing and funding for PGW's
24 modernization and expansion can be done
25 within the City's organization.

2 Philadelphia has its own redevelopment
3 corporation and can organize the public
4 bank. The Pennsylvania Energy Fund, a
5 \$650 million fund, may serve as a
6 resource.

7 We are on the anniversary of
8 the assassination of President John F.
9 Kennedy. We all remember the Cuban
10 missile crisis where the President's
11 excellent state craft saved the nation
12 and humanity from thermonuclear
13 annihilation. We should know that NASA
14 is the core, the origin, of the United
15 States strength. We forget or we don't
16 know that Kennedy traveled the nation
17 promoting the redevelopment of North
18 America as proposed in a NAWAPA plan. We
19 don't know that President Kennedy
20 constantly battled with Wall Street, the
21 monetary financial system of usury and
22 speculation. President Kennedy attempted
23 a new relationship between the executive
24 and the Federal Reserve system.

25 Political leadership never

2 confronted the fascist forces behind the
3 assassination of John F. Kennedy, Robert
4 F. Kennedy, Martin Luther King, Malcolm
5 X, and many other political persons.

6 The debt system of coercion and
7 assassination must be terminated.

8 Everyone in the political system, no
9 matter their position, must work for the
10 reinstatement of the Glass-Steagall
11 standard in U.S. banking. We must all
12 work for the redevelopment of
13 Philadelphia and the redevelopment of the
14 United States through the American
15 national system of political economy. I
16 believe we all have the ability to do
17 that.

18 Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you for your testimony.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Henry Nicholas,
22 commenting on Councilman Kenney's
23 resolution authorizing the Committee on
24 Labor and Civil Service to hold public
25 hearings to examine the negotiations

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MR. NICHOLAS: Thank you so
6 very much and thank you, my President,
7 President Council No. 5, what I consider
8 as the capital district.

9 I rise to take a special
10 privilege because I believe that justice
11 was not done. For the last eight weeks,
12 I've tried to get a copy of the Corizon
13 prison's contract, and my members -- I
14 represent the healthcare professionals
15 who work at the prison, all of them. And
16 after eight weeks begging, I'm pained
17 that I was told to get that information
18 by seeking it from the special
19 information from the government.

20 The prisons -- everybody here
21 voted on the contract. Couldn't find the
22 yeas and nays because they voted yea and
23 nay. There was not a roll call vote.
24 But everybody here is responsible for the
25 contract, and we, the taxpayers, believe

2 that we were entitled to a copy of that
3 contract. Not receiving one, you left us
4 no alternative other than to take the
5 action that we will boldly take, and our
6 members, the healthcare professionals,
7 are voting as we speak, and for the first
8 time in history, there will be a strike
9 at the Philadelphia Prison by the
10 healthcare workers who work there, and no
11 injunction will prevent us from doing
12 what you have forced us to do.

13 I want to thank 1199's secret
14 weapon, the introducer of this change,
15 brother from the electric workers. They
16 thought he was the only labor leader in
17 Council, but we've always had a secret
18 weapon working on behalf of workers and
19 have always been there, and I want to
20 thank him for bringing this to the
21 Council.

22 But I'm here to say that
23 somebody here should act before we do,
24 because there will be a strike at the
25 prison by the healthcare professionals.

1 11/21/13 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Yesterday, 176 have already voted, and
3 I'm predicting that by the close of the
4 day on Saturday, they will all be
5 finished and they will have authorized
6 the strike unanimously, and we will carry
7 it out at all costs. But those of you
8 who are responsible for this contract
9 must take responsibility for it. If not,
10 we will have to.

11 Thank you so very much for
12 permitting us to tell you to help us to
13 avoid this catastrophe.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Nicholas.

16 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
17 other speakers on the public comment

10 talking to my nephew in the car and he
11 talked about how there were instructions
12 for creating a gun with a 3D printer that
13 he learned about online. And so in the
14 midst of our conversation, at first I
15 really didn't take him seriously, and so
16 when I went home after our vacation, I
17 went online on YouTube and saw several
18 different disturbing video clips that
19 showed how individuals can create a gun
20 using a 3D printer, and the first thing
21 came to my mind is, one, acts of
22 terrorism and, two, just growing up in
23 South Philadelphia knowing about the gang
24 culture in the '70s, using this type of
25 technology to create guns such as a zip

2 gun. And some people know what zip guns
3 are depending on what generation you're
4 from. So I want to thank my colleagues
5 and specifically also -- thank all of my
6 colleagues for voting today to pass my 3D
7 printer bill and also specifically
8 Councilman Curtis Jones' staff for
9 helping me put together an outstanding
10 hearing on this issue.

11 The bill will put Philadelphia
12 on the forefront in addressing the threat
13 posed by firearms manufactured by 3D
14 printers. This bill will prohibit the
15 manufacture of firearms using 3D
16 dimensional printers. Recently,
17 individuals have released via the
18 Internet instructions regarding how to
19 manufacture a working firearm using a
20 three-dimensional printer. Currently,
21 federal and state laws do not prohibit
22 making a gun for personal use, so a
23 person could make one of these guns
24 without violating any laws. This
25 legislation will prohibit individuals,

2 other than licensed gun manufacturers,
3 from manufacturing firearms using
4 three-dimensional parts.

5 I don't know of any cases in
6 Philadelphia where an individual has
7 manufactured a gun using a 3D printer,
8 but there have been several cases
9 throughout the country. I want to be
10 proactive on this issue and make sure
11 that Philadelphia is on the forefront of
12 preventing all forms of gun violence.

13 I don't believe there is a
14 state preemption to this issue. The
15 state preemption provision only regulates
16 ownership, possession, transfer or
17 transportation of guns and ammunition.
18 This bill really goes to the manufacture
19 of firearms, which is not ownership,
20 possession, transfer or transportation.

21 As technology progresses, 3D
22 printers will become more advanced, less
23 expensive, and more commonplace. As more
24 people own these printers and
25 instructions for the manufacture of guns

2 are readily available, we are looking at
3 a recipe for disaster. In fact, just
4 this month it was reported that a firearm
5 was able to make a metal gun with a 3D
6 printer. And during our hearing, there
7 was an interview which an individual
8 expressed that with the 3D gun that was
9 actually manufactured, an individual was
10 able to get off 22 shots using this type
11 of technology.

12 So my goal was not to restrict
13 the use of 3D printers. I believe that a
14 vast majority of people will use these 3D
15 printers for worthy causes, whether it's
16 for technology, science or art, but we
17 must act now to address this particular
18 use of a 3D printer, which is to prevent
19 the use of creating a firearm that can be
20 used in an act of crime.

21 I want to again thank all my
22 colleagues for voting yes on this bill.

23 Thank you very much.

25 Thank you, Councilman.

3 Jones.

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. Last budget session
6 Councilman Green said that budgeting was
7 choosing between competing ideas for good
8 with limited resources. Today I'd like
9 to thank you for your leadership in
10 showing me that sometimes when there's
11 conflict, there's an opportunity for
12 great compromise.

13 I want to particularly point
14 out in this process one of the most
15 stalwart advocates for consumers that use
16 natural gas, my colleague, the Chairwoman
17 of the Gas Commission, Councilwoman
18 Tasco. And I want to also acknowledge
19 the Ambassador of the Year, Councilwoman
20 Sanchez, who helped make your prediction
21 true.

22 I want to cite a couple of
23 facts. According to the Energy
24 Conservation Association, 60,000
25 Philadelphians will be shut off from one

2 or more utilities sometime this year,
3 60,000 Philadelphians. On average,
4 Philadelphians pay \$3,200 annually in
5 utility bills. For people of low and
6 moderate-income, particularly low income,
7 that represents one-third of their entire
8 budget.

9 With food stamps being cut,
10 when increasing AVI for many, with
11 healthcare going up, with gas going up,
12 with car fare going up, with the cost of
13 living going up, tuitions for schools
14 going up, having bailed out many
15 industries, we feel as though it is time
16 to help the middle class, poorer classes,
17 needier folk in the City of Philadelphia.
18 Any relief, any relief that we can offer
19 them is a hand up.

20 CDBG allocations this year is
21 expected to be \$50 million, \$50 million.
22 That's down from 1995 when we got \$79
23 million. Don't talk about inflation.
24 But that massive a cut for low and
25 moderate-income people.

2 When we look outside at
3 worthwhile projects, right outside our
4 door we're putting 60 million into a
5 plaza. Across the street we've
6 considered \$33 million, Councilman Goode,
7 in a TIF for a hotel. Our entire budget
8 for low and moderate-income people is \$50
9 million.

10 So out of this conflict over
11 the Gas Works has come great compromise
12 and a commitment from Councilwoman Tasco
13 and Councilwoman Sanchez to finally
14 review the budget coming up in this
15 spring to find every possible avenue to
16 assist people, citizens of Philadelphia,
17 that have yet to be bailed out. We're
18 going to do that in an earnest way,
19 starting early during the summer, and I
20 am truly pleased to call them my
21 colleagues today because of that
22 commitment to the neediest of us.

23 Thank you, Mr. President.

25 Thank you, Councilman.

2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Henon.

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. I'd like to take a moment
6 to officially inform this body and
7 recognize the passing of the wide-ranging
8 and much-needed transportation funding
9 bill that was officially passed out of
10 the House for concurrence today from the
11 state, this Commonwealth, \$23 billion of
12 transportation funding over ten years to
13 our roads and bridges and mass transit,
14 approximately 5 billion for public
15 transportation, which is the artery vein
16 so people can move around our city and
17 region safely, 69 percent of which that
18 \$5 billion over ten years is directly to
19 SEPTA.

20 So it has been much needed, and
21 creating 60,000 jobs, Council President,
22 and saving approximately 20,000 jobs, as
23 per the Commonwealth, PennDOT.

24 I have had the fortunate invite
25 to have been a part of some of these

2 Commonwealth negotiations on behalf of
3 labor, spearheaded by John Dougherty, Pat
4 Gillespie, and Ryan Boyer making
5 progressive, bold moves for the labor
6 movement to set aside some philosophical
7 differences and sanctities of the way we
8 do business in the Commonwealth to moving
9 forward a discussion, which was not being
10 taken place in the Commonwealth, which
11 was used as political statesmanship and
12 maneuvering for politics, has come to
13 fruition for the State of Pennsylvania.

14 So I get the chance in my other
15 hat to be part of some of these
16 conversations, and I want to acknowledge
17 their outstanding leadership, because
18 that's what we needed to have this
19 transportation bill passed in the
20 Commonwealth. We needed leaders, and it
21 started right here in the City of
22 Philadelphia with the Philadelphia
23 building trades and to bring a discussion
24 further to the Speaker of the House.
25 Speaker of the House was eventually

2 engaged in this conversation and has
3 shown his outstanding leadership as well
4 in his delegation, which is kind of
5 sensitive. And most important around
6 here is our Philadelphia delegation, and
7 I'm proud of each and every member of our
8 Philadelphia delegation. None of these
9 votes that have been taken over the last
10 two dates have been easy. They are
11 tough, tough votes that shows true, true
12 leadership from the Speaker of the House,
13 from the labor community, which
14 represents the entire State of
15 Pennsylvania, and our Philadelphia
16 delegation. Everybody voted for -- made
17 a tough vote in the Philadelphia
18 delegation for the common good of the
19 public interest and safety of not just
20 Philadelphia but the Commonwealth, except
21 one member of our Philadelphia delegation
22 that did not vote for it. But everybody
23 did an outstanding job.

24 Council President, our
25 relationship, your relationship with our

2 Philly delegation and the Commonwealth
3 has been not only new but from what I've
4 heard and from our conversation has been
5 inviting and has really made a difference
6 in this transportation.

7 So I want to thank you and
8 encourage as we move forward with that
9 kind of funding to Philadelphia and its
10 region. Maybe now we can expand our
11 subways to the Navy Yard and fix some of
12 its mass transit.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Up
14 to the Northeast.

15 COUNCILMAN HENON: Well, the
16 Northeast, you know, it's halfway there
17 now anyway, you know, but extending the
18 subway to the Navy Yard. That is going
19 to have direct impact and fiscal impact
20 on jobs and creating jobs and expanding
21 our tax base. It also sends a message to
22 businesses. We can move people around.
23 As you come to the City of Philadelphia,
24 you can move people around safely and not
25 have to worry about our roads and bridges

2 and our infrastructure.

3 Our Majority Leader points it
4 out often, almost every other session.
5 He talks about Pennsylvania being number
6 one in deficiencies on our roads and our
7 bridges here in the State of
8 Pennsylvania. So being able to take care
9 of our home here in Philadelphia, in our
10 region, I encourage and hope we continue
11 to have our relationship with our Philly
12 delegation and the state.

13 This is truly a bipartisan --
14 and I'm telling you, I threw out
15 republican names and Speaker of the House
16 again I commend, our labor community I
17 commend. It wouldn't have happened if we
18 didn't take these bold steps, and I
19 encourage you as Council President to
20 continue the relationships with our state
21 delegation and our Speaker of the House
22 and, listen, I got to throw our Governor
23 a bone. The Governor got involved here,
24 and it was -- people made decisions,
25 putting politics aside, going into an

2 election year. But we have \$23 billion
3 over ten years to help keep the
4 Commonwealth safe and revitalize some of
5 our economy here in the City of
6 Philadelphia and our region.

7 So thank you, Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Yeah, Councilman. I want to say good job
10 on that, and the continued relationship
11 that has been established by all of us
12 with the Philly delegation is really
13 paying dividends, and I want to thank you
14 for your continued efforts as it relates
15 to that delegation.

16 And Councilman Jones, Tasco,
17 and Quinones-Sanchez, I want to thank you
18 all for working together to come up with
19 what will be a much better product coming
20 down the line, which we can export some
21 of that down to Washington to show people
22 how we can actually work together and get
23 some really good things done.

24 We're not finished, by the way.
25 I know I usually wait until the end, but

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. I echo the admiration
5 shown to Jones, Tasco, and
6 Quinones-Sanchez and the collegial manner
7 which they approached this very, very
8 important issue.

9 I rise to remind members that
10 the winter season is generally a very
11 difficult time to collect blood, and
12 though it's late, I'm hopeful that we can
13 steal 30 minutes out of our day before 4
14 o'clock to give blood, as every two
15 seconds in the United States someone
16 needs blood; most importantly, children.

17 So with that, I remind my
18 colleagues and all members of guests,
19 anyone who has 30 minutes out of the rest
20 of their life until 4 o'clock to give
21 blood and report to Room 246 any time
22 between now and 4 o'clock this afternoon.

23 Thank you, Mr. President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Councilwoman.

4 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Yes. I'd
5 just like to say thank you, Councilman
6 Jones, for those comments and just
7 reinforce the fact that there's always a
8 way to compromise, and you can agree to
9 disagree and then you can find a way to
10 compromise. And I think it's going to
11 work out fine.

12 But I didn't put my light on
13 for that. I want you to recognize
14 Councilwoman Sanchez's birthday is today.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
16 right. Happy birthday, Councilwoman.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes. Very
21 quickly. I got so excited in the
22 platitudes that I forgot to make the
23 announcement. I want to especially thank
24 the Administration and Mayor Michael
25 Nutter. The compromise resulted in

2 fruit. The fruit is that PHDC and the
3 Basic Systems Repair Program this fiscal
4 year will receive an additional \$1
5 million for basic system repair. In
6 addition, 250,000 will go to Energy Sense
7 program, which will do things like
8 winterize and allow many needy people to
9 get new heaters.

10 So this is a step in the right
11 direction. Our commitment over the
12 summer is to figure out how this can be
13 sustainable, and it is just -- it's
14 encouraging, and you're right, Washington
15 needs to take a page out of our book on
16 how to conflict resolve and produce good
17 work.

18 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman. And, again, good
21 job.

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Brown. Am I recognizing you
24 for a motion to adjourn or did you
25 have --

3 the hour, Mr. President.

4 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I'm
5 sorry. My light went off.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
7 sorry. The Chair recognizes Councilwoman
8 Sanchez.

9 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
10 you. It is not as fun anymore because
11 there's some younger members in Council
12 here. I used to be the youngest one. So
13 I don't want to remember those days.

14 I would be remiss to recognize
15 also Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown
16 in helping me work with the
17 Administration on the agreement that led
18 to more people receiving the resources
19 that we all know we desperately need. So
20 I want to thank both Councilman Jones and
21 Councilwoman Tasco for letting me get in
22 the middle of a good discussion.

23 Councilwoman Tasco said
24 something that was very important, which
25 is how do we agree to disagree and then

2 find a compromise, and I appreciate those
3 words.

4 And I would be remiss to not
5 mention that President Clarke and I will
6 continue to work on what is going to be
7 historic legislation on this land bank,
8 Councilman Henon for his leadership in
9 the committee, and the Council
10 President's continuing commitment to get
11 this done by the end of the year. And I
12 will use those wise words of we have to
13 agree to disagree and then find a
14 compromise, and look forward to working
15 with all of you to get there.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilwoman.

19 And that concludes the speeches
20 on behalf of the minority and majority,
21 and with that, I recognize Councilwoman
22 Brown for a motion to adjourn.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Councilwoman, hold on one second. Before

2 I say that, we do have a Committee of the
3 Whole scheduled for 12 o'clock. We
4 obviously have missed that deadline. So
5 I would ask that at least nine members
6 not necessarily stay around -- Councilman

8 kind of like hang around and knock this
9 right out?

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Not
12 a lot of people testifying and all that?

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: No.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
15 can adjourn and then we can just go right
16 into the Committee of the Whole?

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes,
18 Mr. President. Efficient use of time.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
20 right. Thank you.

21 Councilwoman Brown, could you
22 just give us a motion to adjourn.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Sure. I
24 move that Council stand adjourned until
25 Thursday, December 5th, 2013 at 10:00
