7 The next order of business is

10 The Chair recognizes Councilman

11 Greenlee.

12 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

13 you, Mr. President. I move that the

14 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,

15 January 23rd, 2014 be approved.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you. It has been moved and

19 properly seconded that the Journal of

20 January 23rd, 2014 stand approved.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 ayes have it, and the Journal shall be
4 approved.

5 The next order of business is
6 requests for leaves of absence, and the
7 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. On behalf of the
10 majority, there are no requests for
11 leaves of absence today.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair thanks the gentleman.

14 The Chair now recognizes
15 Councilman O'Neill.

16 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. On behalf of the
18 republicans, there are no requests for
19 leave of absence.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you so much, sir.

22 At this time, I would like to
23 dispense with the regular order of
24 business and I would like to welcome and
25 thank everyone who has come down today in

3 appreciate the fact that you've come down

5 hope that your stay here today is an
6 enjoyable one, so much so that you come
7 back again. So, again, thank you very
8 much for your presence.

9 At this time, the Chair
10 recognizes Councilman Kenyatta Johnson,
11 who will present a resolution recognizing
12 Francesca Ruscio. Would Ms. Ruscio and
13 those accompanying her please join the
14 Councilman at the podium.

15 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
16 morning, everyone.

17 (Good morning.)

18 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
19 morning, everyone.

20 (Good morning.)

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: During
22 last year I had an opportunity to
23 participate with my fellow South
24 Philadelphian colleague Mark Squilla in
25 the annual Columbus Day Parade, and while

2 we were marching down the streets of
3 South Philadelphia, I had an opportunity
4 to meet a very fine young lady
5 representing the City of Philadelphia as
6 Miss Philadelphia, Ms. Francesca Ruscio.
7 And so today I am pleased and honored to
8 stand with my colleagues to present a
9 citation on behalf of the members of City
10 Council and the City of Philadelphia
11 honoring Miss Francesca Ruscio.

12 And the citation reads:
13 Whereas, on March the 2nd, 2013,
14 Francesca Ruscio was crowned Miss
15 Philadelphia 2013; and

16 Whereas, Francesca Ruscio, a
17 native of Bucks County and a graduate of
18 Central Bucks High School East, has
19 advocated for a number of worthy causes
20 in the Philadelphia area; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
22 Ms. Ruscio serves as a city
23 representative for the Miss America
24 Organization, champions polycystic
25 ovarian syndrome awareness, and serves as

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2 a local ambassador for the Children's
3 Miracle Network; and

4 Whereas, Ms. Ruscio has further
5 demonstrated her commitment to giving
6 back to those in her community who have
7 made the ultimate sacrifice by raising
8 over \$22,000 for the Wounded Warrior
9 Project and the Miss Philadelphia
10 Scholarship Organization; and

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
12 an avid golfer and PIAA state champion,
13 Francesca Ruscio organized and hosted the
14 First Annual Miss Philadelphia Golf
15 Classic;

16 Whereas, Ms. Ruscio's strong
17 sense of community and leadership
18 motivated her to complete over 360 hours
19 of community service; and

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
21 Francesca Ruscio was also dedicated to
22 her education, receiving a \$10,000
23 scholarship to Temple University to
24 pursue a degree in Communications, with
25 the ultimate goal of becoming a broadcast

2 meteorologist; and

3 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Whereas,
4 the City of Philadelphia should recognize
5 young people like Francesca Ruscio who
6 lead by example and demonstrate that hard
7 work and determination can make anything
8 possible; now therefore

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: I like
10 that crown too. It's pretty sharp. I
11 just wanted to let you know that.

12 Heavy is the head that wear the
13 crown, right, Mr. President?

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 That's an understatement, sir.

16 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Therefore
17 resolved, by the Council of the City of
18 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor,
19 recognize, and commend Ms. Francesca
20 Ruscio for her extraordinary leadership,
21 service, and activism as Miss
22 Philadelphia 2013.

23 Further resolved, that an
24 engrossed copy of this resolution be
25 presented to Ms. Ruscio as evidence of

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2 the sincere sentiments of this
3 legislative body.

4 On behalf of the members of
5 City Council, we just want to say
6 continue the great work and continue to
7 keep representing the City of
8 Philadelphia. Thank you very much.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 Chair recognizes Ms. Ruscio for remarks.

12 MS. RUSCIO: Well, I'm a person
13 of many words and I'm quite speechless
14 right now, and I'm starting to gain the
15 feeling back in my feet due to how cold
16 it is outside.

17 But it is such a huge honor to
18 be here, and I have two more months of
19 being your representative as Miss
20 Philadelphia 2013, and it's been a
21 wonderful year, and I truly find endless
22 joy in putting others before myself and
23 just coming together with wonderful
24 people such as yourselves who really
25 represent the City. It's amazing.

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2 So thank you so much, and we're
3 going to welcome our new Miss
4 Philadelphia 2014 with love, kindness,
5 and humility. So with Philly love, I'm
6 signing off.

7 Thank you so much.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Council will be at ease.

11 (Council at ease.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, and congratulations.

14 At this time, the Chair
15 recognizes Councilwoman Brown, who will
16 present a resolution honoring the African
17 American Children's Book Project. Would
18 Vanesse Lloyd Sgambati and those
19 accompanying her please join the
20 Councilwoman at the podium.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
22 Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 You're welcome.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: The

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2 African American Children's Book Project
3 and book experience is one of my favorite
4 activities of the year, in that it
5 symbolizes everything that I love, books
6 and reading, children and books, and
7 reading and children. And I think Maya
8 Angelou captures the value of reading the
9 best when I read through a number of
10 quotes, if you would. Maya Angelou said,
11 Any book that helps a child to form a
12 habit of reading, to make reading one of
13 his or her deep and continuing needs,
14 it's good for them.

15 And so with that, it's a
16 wonderful pleasure to bring to you once
17 again Vanesse Lloyd Sgambati honoring the
18 African American Children's Book Project
19 on the occasion of the 22nd Annual
20 African American Children's Book Fair.

21 Whereas, in 1926, noted
22 historian Carter G. Woodson and the
23 Association for the Study of Negro Life
24 and History announced the second week of
25 February to be Negro History Week; and

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2 Whereas, the second week in
3 February was chosen because of the
4 birthdays of both President Abraham
5 Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. Little
6 known history fact.

7 Whereas, the first Black
8 History Month celebration occurred at
9 Kent State in February 1970, and in 1976,
10 the federal government acknowledged the
11 expansion of Black History Week to Black
12 History Month; and

13 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Whereas,
14 during early American history, African
15 Americans were not allowed to learn to
16 read and have books; and

17 Whereas, the importance of book
18 fairs cannot be understated. For
19 twenty-two years, the African American
20 Children's Book Fair has enhanced
21 multi-culturalism in our City utilizing
22 the joy of reading as a tool;

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
24 Vanesse Lloyd Sgambati created the book
25 fair because she believes books open up a

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2 world of opportunity for children, and
3 after twenty-two years, the African
4 American Children's Book Fair is one of
5 the oldest, largest single day events for
6 children's books in the country; and

7 Whereas, one of the most
8 important reasons to encourage reading in
9 our children is a study shows that the
10 more our youth read, the more likely they
11 are to make positive lifestyle decisions
12 as they grow older; and

13 Whereas, strictly judging by
14 the attendance, the fair is a tremendous
15 success, as well over 4,500 people
16 attended the fair in past years; and

17 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
18 rich or poor, no one leaves empty-handed,
19 as the books themselves are priced at a
20 level where they are more affordable, and
21 posters, bookmarkers, and raffle books
22 are distributed free of charge to
23 attendees; and

24 Whereas, one of the esteemed
25 attendees will be Philadelphia born and

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2 educated Dr. Marion Lane. Dr. Lane is a
3 retired public school educator. She is
4 the author of several books, including
5 Patriots of African Descent in the
6 Revolutionary War: Part 1, which is a
7 fictional account, as told by a family
8 historian to his great-grandson about
9 their family's service as African
10 Americans during the Revolutionary War;
11 and

12 Whereas, another esteemed
13 attendee will be Kathleen M. Wainwright.
14 Kathleen Wainwright is a dedicated
15 teacher in the School District of
16 Philadelphia and a graduate of Temple
17 University and West Chester University.
18 She is the author of Summer in the City;

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
20 whereas, an additional attendee of the
21 book fair will be Nancy Devard, who is a
22 Philadelphia born and educated
23 award-winning American Library
24 Association Coretta Scott King winning
25 author who has authored several books,

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2 including, quote, "The Secret Olivia Told
3 Me," end of quote; and

4 Whereas, the fair is also lucky
5 to host terrific sponsors and partners,
6 including NBC 10 Philadelphia Reading
7 Circle, the PECO Literary Salon,
8 McDonald's, Health Partners Plan, Health
9 Partners Foundation, Comcast Educators,
10 and Parents Book Giveaway Program, all
11 who have been instrumental in keeping the
12 literary flames ablaze for our children
13 in the City of Philadelphia through
14 tireless contributions to the African
15 American Children's Book Project; and

16 Whereas, the 22nd Annual
17 African American Book Fair will be held
18 free of charge on Saturday, February 1st
19 from one to three p.m. at the gymnasium
20 of the Community College of Philadelphia
21 located at 17th and Spring Garden
22 Streets; now, therefore

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Be it
24 resolved, by the Council of the City of
25 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor the

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2 African American Children's Book Project
3 on the occasion of the 22nd Annual
4 African American Children's Book Fair.

5 Further resolved, that an
6 engrossed copy of this resolution be
7 presented to Vanesse Lloyd Sgambati,
8 founder of the African American
9 Children's Book Project, and all of those
10 who work with her for their hard work and
11 efforts in promoting children's literacy,
12 as evidence of the sincere sentiments of
13 this legislative body.

14 Introduced by myself and
15 Councilman Kenyatta Johnson, Councilman
16 Jones, and Councilwoman Blackwell and
17 supported, of course, by all members of
18 Philadelphia City Council. We salute
19 Vanesse Lloyd Sgambati for this truly
20 extraordinary experience for children
21 across the City. If you've never been
22 there, you're missing out. It's a
23 wonderful treat. Let's congratulate this
24 effort.

25 (Appause.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair recognizes Ms. Sgambati for
4 remarks.

5 MS. SGAMBATI: Thank you,
6 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown,
7 members of Council, especially those who
8 are present. I have a connection with
9 everybody up on this stage that goes
10 beyond their political duties. Curtis
11 Jones is my Councilperson. Give it up to
12 him. Jannie Blackwell is a dear friend,
13 and Kenyatta Johnson, I can't express my
14 appreciation, who came on board as a
15 sponsor to help us defray some of our
16 costs, and I truly appreciate him and his
17 team, Tiphonie White and Chris Sample, to
18 help us continue our mission.

19 I am not going to hog the mic,
20 because that is my style now, but I want
21 to give these three people behind me who
22 are local Philadelphia authors who have
23 gotten a lot of -- and illustrator who
24 have gotten a lot of attention with their
25 book on the national level.

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2 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds
3 Brown said you must come out. We give
4 away a thousand books, a thousand brand
5 new books of our guests, authors, and
6 illustrators, promotional materials. We
7 give away books to educators to leave
8 that room with books to use in their
9 classroom. Our mission is about getting
10 people to read, but it's also encouraging
11 people to enjoy reading and taking books
12 into their home, because a book does open
13 up a world of opportunities. And, once
14 again, I see Melanie Lassiter here. She
15 came to me three years ago and enabled us
16 to have the PECO Literary Salon this
17 year, which we'll have a cartoonist,
18 we'll give away books, and someone who
19 wrote a book on crocheting, who will
20 instruct the children on crocheting, and
21 they get a book. And I can't express my
22 great appreciation to people like her,
23 Lynette Brown-Sow, people like Comcast,
24 who are all a part of making this a
25 special, special day.

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2 Thank you. And I pass the mic
3 to Nancy Devard and Kathleen Wainwright,
4 who is an educator, who brought her
5 students.

6 MS. DEVARD: Hello. Good
7 morning. I want to say thank you to
8 Councilwoman Brown and Councilwoman
9 Blackwell, Councilperson Jones,
10 Councilman Jones, and Kenyatta Johnson.
11 Thank you very much, and all of the other
12 members of City Council for sponsoring
13 this fair.

14 As an illustrator, I generally
15 don't have the opportunity to make a
16 location specific. Usually if I'm
17 illustrating something, I have to make a
18 city general. I'm lucky that I was able
19 to work with Kathleen and make this book
20 specifically about Philadelphia and in
21 particular West Philadelphia. So the
22 perspective of the book is about a bunch
23 of children in West Philadelphia who are
24 just having a wonderful summertime in the
25 City, and I'm so thankful for Kathleen

2 for picking me and allowing me to do this
3 book for her.

4 Thank you very much.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you.

8 MS. WAINWRIGHT: Good morning,
9 everyone. I would like to thank
10 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for inviting
11 me to be here today and everyone else on
12 the Council as well. I am Kathleen
13 Wainwright and a proud teacher in the
14 School District of Philadelphia. I am
15 here with three of my students from
16 Overbrook Educational Center. They were
17 with me here today. Because I wrote this
18 book, I am a super hero in the classroom.

19 I am just honored to have an
20 opportunity to share my story, not with
21 just my students but with all of the
22 students in Philadelphia and really
23 across the world. We've had book sales
24 all over. So I am loving this experience
25 and the journey that this book has taken

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2 me on. I have a new book coming out
3 later this spring, and I am honored to be
4 able to participate in the African
5 American Children's Book Fair. In the
6 past, I have gone to buy books, and now I
7 get to share my story with the people who
8 attend.

9 So thank you, and have a good
10 day.

11 (Applause.)

12 DR. LANE: I would like to
13 thank the Council for this honor and in
14 particular Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds
15 Brown and Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell.
16 They have been very supportive of my
17 mission of informing children that
18 one-tenth of Washington's Army was
19 composed of men of color. And my book
20 fortunately was -- a grant was given by
21 the Daughters of the American Revolution,
22 which was matched by my sorority by
23 \$10,000, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, to
24 place the book in all of the school
25 libraries in the Philadelphia area. That

7 DR. LANE: The name of the book
8 is Patriots of African Descent in the
9 Revolutionary War. Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you.

13 MS. SGAMBATI: And you all have
14 a copy of the book on your desk.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you.

17 Council will be at ease.

20 Thank you very much. The next order of

7 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. Fires at large vacant
9 buildings are killers in more ways than
10 one. Not only do these blazes cause more
11 firefighter injuries than any other
12 property classification, they also damage
13 nearby homes and businesses and destroy
14 the fabric of the community.

15 Whether the buildings are
16 abandoned or vacant, more than 70 percent
17 of fires occurring in them are incendiary
18 and suspicious. They're targets for
19 kids, vandals, drug users, and the
20 homeless. Abandoned large buildings put
21 firefighters at extra risk. Stripped of
22 wiring, pipes and other components for
23 scrap, they often contain open shafts or
24 pits, becoming mantraps, allowing fires
25 to spread rapidly.

2 On April 9th, 2012 at 3:13

3 a.m., a fire broke out in an abandoned

4 six-story hosiery warehouse at York and

5 Jasper Streets. The warehouse covered

6 more than half a block. The Philadelphia

7 Fire Department pulled five alarms, and

8 the fire was placed under control after a

9 little more than two hours. Twenty-nine

10 minutes after the fire started, four

11 firefighters battling an extension of

12 flames into an adjoining furniture

13 business became trapped in a collapse.

14 Lieutenant Robert Neary, 60, and

15 Firefighter Daniel Sweeney, age 25, both

16 of the Fire Department's Ladder 10

17 station, died when a wall collapsed and

18 buried them. The two other firefighters

19 survived, but were injured. Lieutenant

20 Neary's wife, Diane, is here today.

21 Firefighter Dan Sweeney's mom, Miriam,

22 and dad, Captain Dave Sweeney, are here.

23 Also President of Local 22, Joe Schulle,

24 is here and has participated and reviewed

25 this draft.

2 Each year an average of 100
3 firefighters die in the line of duty. To
4 address this problem, the National
5 Institute of Occupational Safety and
6 Health, NIOSH, started the Firefighters
7 Fatality Investigation and Prevention
8 Program. NIOSH conducts independent
9 investigations of firefighter
10 line-of-duty deaths and issues
11 substantive reports with recommendations.

12 The recently released NIOSH
13 report found eight contributing factors
14 to the deaths of Lieutenant Neary and
15 Firefighter Sweeney. One, multi-alarm
16 fire in a vacant, abandoned structure;
17 two, dilapidated building; three, high
18 winds; four, collapsed zone maintenance;
19 five, fire ground communications; six,
20 personal accountability; seven, training
21 on fire ground operations; and finally,
22 eight, situational awareness.

23 Today I introduced an ordinance
24 that will take steps to reduce
25 firefighter, other first responder, and

2 community risks, but presented by items
3 one and two. I seek to amend the
4 Philadelphia Fire Code by providing
5 requirements to create a vacant property
6 task force charged with compiling an
7 inventory and database of such
8 properties. It calls for an inspection
9 team with specific responsibilities when
10 evaluating abandoned and vacant
11 buildings, structures, and premises.

12 Sadly, I talked with the
13 Administration on numerous occasions over
14 the last year and a half about the
15 troubling fact pattern surrounding the
16 April 2012 fire. I attempted to engage
17 them in a collaborative effort to learn
18 more from that tragedy and make
19 substantive change to save lives and
20 protect our communities. Unfortunately,
21 that request was not responded to.

22 The District Attorney's Office
23 currently has a grand jury looking into
24 this matter, and we are all anxious to
25 hear the findings. I'm confident their

2 presentment will be absolutely scathing.
3 I am certain it will be full of
4 meaningful recommendations and challenge
5 us to be better, and I am also certain
6 the Administration missed an opportunity

3 (Duly seconded.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you. It has been moved and

6 properly seconded that the rules of

7 Council be suspended this day so as to

8 permit first reading at our next session

9 of Council.

10 All those in favor say aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Those opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

16 ayes have it. These bills will be placed

17 on our First Reading Calendar for today.

18 The Chair now recognizes

19 Councilman Goode for a report from the

20 Committee on Commerce and Economic

21 Development.

22 COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,

23 Mr. President. The Committee on Commerce

24 Economic Development reports two bills

25 with a favorable recommendation.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you, Councilman.

4 Mr. Decker, please read that
5 report.

6 CHIEF CLERK: The Committee on
7 Commerce and Economic Development, to
8 which was referred Bill No. 130744,
9 entitled "An ordinance amending Chapter
10 17-1300 of The Philadelphia Code,
11 entitled 'Philadelphia 21st Century
12 Minimum Wage and Benefits Standard,' by
13 further providing with respect to the
14 granting and revocation of waivers of the
15 requirements of the Chapter"; and

16 Bill No. 130853, entitled "An
17 ordinance amending Chapter 19-2600 of The
18 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Business
19 Income and Receipts Taxes,' by revising
20 the number of businesses that may obtain
21 a credit against business income and
22 receipts taxes upon contributing to
23 certain nonprofit intermediaries engaged
24 in neighborhood economic development
25 activities within the City of

2 Philadelphia," respectfully reports it
3 has considered the same and returns the
4 attached bills to Council with a
5 favorable recommendation.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you.

8 The Chair again recognizes
9 Councilman Goode.

10 COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. I move the rules of
12 Council be suspended so as to permit
13 first reading this day of Bills No.
14 130744 and 130853.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you. It has been moved and
18 properly seconded that the rules of
19 Council be suspended this day so as to
20 permit first reading of Bills No. 130744
21 and 130853.

22 All those in favor say aye.

23 (Aye.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Those opposed?

2 (No response.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 ayes have it, and those bills will be
5 placed on our First Reading Calendar
6 today.

7 The next order of business is
8 the consideration of the Calendar. I
9 note that the bills just reported from
10 committee with suspension of the rules
11 have been deemed to have had a first
12 reading. These bills will be placed on
13 our Second and Final Passage Calendar at
14 our next session of Council.

15 As there are no additional
16 bills on our First Reading Calendar
17 today, the Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Goode at this time for a motion regarding
19 Bill No. 130744.

20 COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. I move the rules of
22 Council be suspended so as to permit an
23 amendment to be offered to Bill No.
24 130744 at this time.

25 (Duly seconded.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you. All those in favor signify by
4 saying aye.

5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Those opposed?

8 (No response.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And,
10 again, the Chair recognizes Councilman
11 Goode.

12 COUNCILMAN GOODE: Thank you,
13 Mr. President. I would like to offer an
14 amendment to Bill No. 130744. A copy of
15 the amendment has been circulated to all
16 members of Council. I move for the
17 adoption of the amendment.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. All those in favor of the
21 motion will signify by saying aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 ayes have it, and Bill No. 130744 has
4 been amended, and Bill No. 130744 will be
5 placed on our Final Passage Calendar for
6 the next session of Council.

7 The Chair now recognizes
8 Councilman Jones for the purpose of
9 calling up bills and resolutions on our
10 Final Passage Calendar today.

11 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. The following resolutions
13 and bills are being called up from Second
14 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
15 today: Nos. 140021, 140023, 140029,
16 130958, 130715-A, 130701-AA, and all
17 other resolutions and bills are being
18 held, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you, sir.

21 Before considering these bills
22 and resolutions on the Final Passage
23 Calendar, we will have our public comment
24 session. The public comment session will
25 go as follows:

1 1/30/14 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 If you are interested in
3 speaking on a bill or resolution that's
4 on the Final Passage Calendar today, you
5 must register at the table to my left.
6 If you've already done so, there will be
7 a podium in the middle of the Council.
8 It has a device on it. That device has a
9 light. That light will turn green when
10 it is your time to speak. It will turn
11 yellow when you have 30 seconds to
12 conclude your remarks, and when it turns
13 red, I'd ask that you please conclude
14 your remarks and adhere to the guidelines
15 that we have established.

16 At this time, I would ask
17 Mr. Decker to please read the name of the
18 first individual who is interested in
19 testifying today.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Thomas McGahan
21 III, commenting on 140021.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
24 morning.

25 MR. MCGAHAN: Good morning. My

2 name is Thomas McGahan and I've been a
3 maintenance mechanic for the Philadelphia
4 School District and a member of SEIU 32BJ
5 District 1201 for the last 19 years, and
6 I live in Wissinoming.

7 I urge City Council to reject
8 the dangerous handy-work legislation that
9 the out-of-state special interest groups
10 are pushing in Harrisburg. As a
11 maintenance mechanic, we are responsible
12 for the heating, cooling, electrical, and
13 plumbing systems of the School District
14 buildings. Every day we consistently and
15 reliably maintain the buildings to keep
16 our children safe.

17 Being a part of the union gives
18 me the voice for the students. My union
19 gives me the protection to speak out to
20 make sure the jobs are done right for the
21 safety of the kids. Keeping our school
22 buildings safe is important to me, for I
23 am a parent of two of the students.

24 My union helps me keep
25 Philadelphia students safe. I'm proud to

2 pay my dues. I get a say on how my dues
3 are spent, and I am in fact a member of
4 the advisory board of my union, and I
5 choose to give to the union's political
6 clubs to help us have a voice.

7 I am outraged that such useless
8 bills are being pushed by parts of a
9 manufactured crisis by out-of-state
10 concerns. There is no public outcry that
11 prompts these bills. This legislation is
12 not designed to protect union members.
13 This legislation is designed to protect
14 corporate special interests like the Koch
15 brothers. The main motive of these
16 attacks are the Commonwealth Foundation
17 and the Koch brothers founded ALEC.
18 These are two extreme right-wing groups
19 with dangerous agendas.

20 We have seen the story before.
21 These groups are the strong supporters of
22 Governor Corbett. They are the same
23 groups that fund the efforts to privatize
24 Social Security and Medicare and
25 oppose -- or support the elimination of a

2 minimum wage.

3 Philadelphia families have been
4 struggling to make ends meet in the worst
5 economy since the Great Depression.

6 Under Governor Corbett, Pennsylvania is
7 47th in job creation, but in Harrisburg,
8 the state legislation is following the
9 lead of shady interest groups who want to
10 destroy unions instead of working
11 together to have our economy get back on
12 the right track.

13 As a union member, School
14 District employee, taxpayer, and parent,
15 I urge Council to take a stand against
16 destructive legislation which will make
17 it harder for us to keep our schools
18 safe.

19 I would also like to thank
20 Councilman Kenney for taking the lead on
21 this resolution and to my Councilman,
22 Henon, and the other co-sponsors,
23 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, Councilwoman
24 Blackwell, Councilman Greenlee, and
25 Councilman Squilla, and thank all the

2 Council for standing with the thousands
3 of maintenance workers, nurses, teachers,
4 and public safety workers whose rights
5 are under attack.

6 Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

9 (Applause.)

10 CHIEF CLERK: Christopher
11 Wight, commenting on 140021.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
14 morning.

15 MR. WIGHT: Good morning,
16 Mr. President, Councilwoman
17 Quinones-Sanchez, Councilwoman Blackwell,
18 and all the co-sponsors of this bill.
19 Before I go on, I want to honor a great
20 statesman from the State of New York, my
21 grandfather, Charles Wight. He would
22 have been outraged with this bill, and in
23 his spirit, so am I.

24 Every one of us owes a debt of
25 gratitude to every municipal employee,

2 especially those who put their lives on a
3 daily basis at risk for our protection.

4 Nothing can bring back a
5 fireman who has given his life for this
6 city. Nothing can bring back a member of
7 law enforcement who has died in the line
8 of duty, and these special interest
9 groups want nothing more than to take the
10 power away from organized people.
11 Organized people is what organized labor
12 always has been.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Judith Robinson,
18 commenting on 130958.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning.

22 MS. ROBINSON: Good morning.

23 Greetings to all. If I could sing, I
24 would be singing "no more backwards
25 thinking, time for thinking ahead"

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2 regarding Resolution 130958.

3 Whenever I go down to PHA Board
4 meetings, I ask about two areas of my
5 concern, the 5H program, which is a
6 program that was supposedly set up for
7 long-term tenants in scattered sites to
8 be able to purchase properties that they
9 reside in. This hasn't been a very
10 effective program unfortunately. And in
11 addition, I ask about the pre-apprentice
12 program, which has been in place by
13 now -- these tenants who approve through
14 this program should be journeymen and
15 women, because the tenants is what PHA is
16 really all about. That's what brings
17 these millions of dollars into our city.

18 But I want to be clear. PHA is
19 the gentrifying agency, moving mostly
20 black women and children out of the City
21 to areas like Pottstown, Phoenixville,
22 and other parts unknown. Our area in
23 North Philadelphia has the Bloomberg
24 Project, which is going to be imploded.
25 Two of our area schools were able to be

2 shut down because tenants were moved out
3 of this area, the Reynolds School and the
4 Vaux School, which are now proposed to be
5 adaptive reuse for housing.

6 So I'm asking you all as
7 leaders, focus your attention on the
8 tenants. Focus on the reason why this
9 money comes. Help those folks who live
10 in long-term and scattered sites buy
11 houses before you do a bundle sale to
12 developers, which gave you less money
13 than when you did them individually.

14 Focus on those youth who are
15 most likely to be in poverty through this
16 pre-apprentice program. Help them get
17 uplifted out of the muck and the mire.
18 This is a great opportunity that you all
19 have to do that. This is an opportunity
20 without any fanfare where you can help a
21 substantial amount of, just so happened
22 to be, African Americans, women, and
23 mostly children who have resided in PHA
24 for a very long time. Use your power,
25 please.

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2 Thank you very much.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you for your testimony.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Joseph Schulle,

7 commenting on 140021.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning.

11 MR. SCHULLE: Good morning. I
12 don't have anything prepared, but I know
13 my brothers in organized labor are here
14 speaking against House Bill 1507, and I
15 wanted to spend a quick moment
16 reiterating their concerns.

17 This is a transparent and
18 blatant attack against public organized
19 union labor across the state, and this is
20 the first step. They're going to come
21 after the public unions and they're going
22 to come after the private-sector unions,
23 and they're going to come after us. So
24 they excluded the cops and firefighters
25 this time around, but this is only the

2 first step for these guys, and they're
3 coming for us. They don't want the
4 democratic party to have a word and they
5 don't want organized labor to have a
6 word. It's absolutely unconscionable
7 that they're doing this. As I said, it's
8 an egregious attack on organized labor.

9 On 1210 every three seconds you
10 hear this commercial on 1210 right now,
11 and it's a complete falsification of
12 what's going on. They're saying it's a
13 payroll protection act.

14 Pennsylvania is a hard-money
15 state. Our union dues cannot go to
16 support a political candidate. They
17 cannot go to support a political
18 candidate. So that's nonsense.

19 They're saying state and local
20 money is being spent to deduct union
21 dues. It doesn't cost the state or local
22 government any significant amount of
23 money, and it's negotiated. Your taxes
24 are deducted from your payroll.
25 Charities are deducted from your payroll,

2 garnishments, child support. All these
3 things are already deducted from your
4 payroll. The idea that they're hiding
5 behind this is a defense for this
6 ridiculous bill. Council has to stand up
7 and say no way.

8 Thank you very much.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, sir.

12 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
13 other speakers on the public comment
14 list, Mr. President.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

17 We will now consider the
18 resolutions and bills on the Final
19 Passage Calendar.

20 Mr. Decker, would you please
21 read the title of 140021.

22 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
23 urging the members of the Pennsylvania
24 General Assembly to oppose all efforts by
25 anonymously funded groups to attack the

2 collective bargaining rights of public
3 sector union workers through House Bill
4 1507 and Senate Bill 1034.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 Chair recognizes Councilman Kenney.

7 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. I move the adoption of
9 the resolution and would like to speak
10 briefly.

11 (Duly seconded.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
13 been moved and properly seconded.

14 I would ask that the Councilman
15 speak now.

16 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. Whether you're pro-union,
18 anti-union or you're ambivalent and don't
19 have an opinion, this bill should worry
20 you. Just like voter ID, when a certain
21 segment of our country cannot win with
22 the merits of their argument, they try to
23 change the rules. Voter ID is a perfect
24 example of that. Let's stop people from
25 voting because we can't convince them of

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2 our opinion, so we'll take away their
3 franchise.

4 The Koch brothers, Koch
5 brothers, however you pronounce their
6 name, and the Commonwealth Foundation,
7 who they're funding, doesn't have to
8 disclose who is giving the money. We
9 understand there may be as much as \$12
10 million in this effort to have these two
11 bills passed. They don't have to
12 disclose. We as elected officials, PACs,
13 and other organizations that are active
14 politically -- as a matter of fact,
15 tomorrow we'll be filing our disclosure
16 forms. The Commonwealth Foundation
17 doesn't have to disclose anything. The
18 Koch brothers/Koch brothers don't have to
19 disclose anything.

20 They can't win on the merits of
21 their argument, so let's diminish the
22 ability for the other side to get their
23 message out. And this is what these
24 bills are about. As Joe Schulle from
25 Local 22 so eloquently stated, it's not a

2 burden on the Commonwealth or any other
3 government to take deductions out of
4 people's payroll checks. It's done by
5 computer. It's done automatically.

6 Individuals who -- when the dues are not
7 permitted to be taken out, those unions
8 still have to represent those people
9 individually that refuse to pay the dues,
10 and they have to go around
11 administratively and chase them. This is
12 the most streamlined, effective way of
13 getting the dues money into the union.
14 And as Joe said also, it's a hard-money
15 state. So this crap about it being used
16 for politics is just that, crap.

17 They want to change the rules
18 because they can't win their argument,
19 and this state, despite the fact we have
20 a republican governor and a republican
21 House and Senate, tends nationally to
22 trend on blue's side, and that drives
23 some people crazy. If their arguments
24 made sense, they could convince people
25 regularly to vote for their views, but

2 they can't, so they try to change the
3 rules. And I think these two bills are
4 really, really a terrible message to the
5 rest of the Commonwealth that somehow
6 when we can't win, we're going to check
7 for your ID so you can't vote and we're
8 going to take your dues money away so you
9 can't have a message or a voice. And I
10 urge my colleagues to support these.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you.

14 The Chair recognizes --

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
19 Council President. And I too just want
20 to echo some of the sentiments that our
21 speakers had here today in the public
22 comment as well as Councilman Kenney in
23 his brief comments. I mean, this is an
24 outright assault on the basic principles
25 of working families in the Commonwealth

2 of Pennsylvania.

3 When certain groups, interest
4 groups, add political process when they
5 don't get their way and they go home, or
6 it's my party and I'll cry if I want to,
7 they take it to the court, and they're
8 going to continue to take it to the court
9 like with this paycheck protection.

10 This is a voluntary system.
11 This is collective bargaining. And if
12 somebody does not volunteer to pay union
13 dues, they still get represented, because
14 it's about the workers. This is about
15 workers' rights. This is about human
16 rights. And the rights are being taken
17 away and litigated in court to keep us on
18 our toes so a certain group of America
19 can have their political way, and we're
20 not going to stand for it, especially in
21 this economy. This is about the workers,
22 this is about their families, and this is
23 about the future and the sanctity of
24 collective bargaining agreements. We
25 don't get what we want, we take it to

2 court. We can't allow that anymore.

3 So I urge this Council and I
4 urge the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to
5 overwhelmingly shoot it down for the
6 members that elect them and the members
7 that they serve in their respective
8 districts.

9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 The resolution has been moved
14 and properly seconded.

15 All in favor?

16 (Aye.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Those opposed?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 ayes have it, and Resolution 140021 will
22 be adopted.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Mr. Decker, 140023.

14 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
15 you, Mr. President. I move the adoption
16 of the resolution.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you. It has been moved and
20 properly seconded.

21 All those in favor?

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

5 Mr. Decker, 140029.

6 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

9 Israeli academic institutions and urging
10 the Department of Education, the State
11 System of Higher Education, and all
12 colleges and universities in Pennsylvania
13 to reject the academic boycott.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Johnson.

18 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
20 of the resolution.

21 (Duly seconded.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
23 been moved and properly seconded.

24 All those in favor?

25 (Aye.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Those opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

6 ayes have it, and Resolution 140029 is

8 Mr. Decker, 130958.

9 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

10 approving the appointment of Asia Coney

11 as a member of the Board of Commissioners

12 of the Philadelphia Housing Authority.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

14 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

16 you, Mr. President. I move for the

17 adoption of the resolution.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

20 been moved and properly seconded.

21 All those in favor?

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 ayes have it, and Resolution 130958 is
4 adopted.

5 Mr. Decker, 130715-A. And let
6 me note that this particular resolution
7 requires a two-thirds vote.

8 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
9 proposing an amendment to the "resign to
10 run" provision of the Philadelphia Home
11 Rule Charter so that City elected
12 officials may become candidates for
13 nomination or election to public office
14 without first resigning from their City
15 office.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Oh.

20 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
22 of the resolution.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We

25 COUNCILMAN JONES:

2 Mr. President, I'd like to speak briefly
3 on this matter.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Please do.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: We're
7 trying -- this is the last day of
8 January, but I think it's still
9 significant enough of an issue to ask
10 that January be Poverty Awareness Month.
11 A startling statistic I read, that 85
12 people, 85 individuals have the combined
13 wealth of 3.5 billion of the world's
14 poorest people, 85 individuals. And I'm
15 not an Occupy Philadelphia kind of guy,
16 but it is startling to me that 85
17 individuals can own that much wealth.

18 In the City of Philadelphia, 26
19 percent of adults live below the poverty
20 guidelines. Thirty-nine percent of all
21 children in Philadelphia live below the
22 poverty guidelines.

23 This week, in the same week,
24 President Obama not calling for 9.99,
25 like Herman Cain, called for 10.10 in a

2 living wage for contract workers for the
3 federal government. In the same week,
4 Wilson Goode, Jr. held hearings to look
5 at our practices to establish a living
6 wage of people that contract with the
7 City of Philadelphia, and I was
8 astonished, astonished, astonished to see
9 how many waivers were given to allow
10 people to earn less than what they
11 should.

12 According to the Bureau of
13 Vital Statistics, the working poor are
14 persons who spend at least 27 weeks in
15 the labor force working or looking for
16 work, but whose incomes fall below the
17 official poverty level.

18 Today I introduced this
19 resolution to bring awareness, and one of
20 the things that ironically we need to be
21 aware of is our municipal workforce. In
22 May last year, Temple University did a
23 study on City workers, and they are twice
24 as likely today as they were five years
25 ago to have incomes that fall below the

2 poverty guidelines for families of four

3 when wages are not adjusted annually.

4 That means the mean salary of 7,500

5 members of AFSCME District Council 33

6 earn less than \$35,000 a year, as workers

7 of the municipal workforce of 33 and 47

8 are required to live in the City where

9 everything is going up around them. Gas,

10 food, housing all have gone up, but yet

11 they have not gotten a raise.

12 Yesterday on one of the coldest

13 days of the year -- it was 2 degrees

14 Celsius -- a major water main broke three

15 blocks from my house. I got texts all

16 over the place about it. Councilman,

17 what you going to do about that? You

18 know how it goes. I can't fix -- I

19 couldn't weld a pipe if my life depended

20 on it, but when I got to the scene,

21 members of District Council 33 were on

22 the scene in frigid weather handling

23 their business, and I could only feel

24 compelled to say what I'm saying today

25 because of it. They're a valued asset.

2 We had the largest snowfall in
3 decades, and we fielded maybe 50 or so
4 calls on streets, and every one of those
5 times -- and the Administration gets
6 credit too, but the people that were out
7 there shoveling those snows and keeping
8 the City of Philadelphia from being
9 Atlanta were members of the municipal
10 union.

11 So it's Poverty Awareness
12 Month, but I want to make it a point to
13 say thank you to our municipal workforce,
14 and we need to thank them not only with
15 our words but with our deeds by making
16 sure that they get a fair living wage.

17 Thank you, Mr. President.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman. I know I'm not
21 supposed to say that, but also a good
22 contract.

23 It's been moved and properly
24 seconded.

25 All those in favor?

21 The Chair recognizes
22 Councilwoman Tasco.

23 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. Mr. President, Reverend
25 Samuel Kyles when speaking on the

2 assassination of Dr. King said, and I
3 quote, "You can kill the dreamer, but you
4 cannot kill the dream," end of quote.

5 Some ten years ago in this very
6 state, a dynamic leader had a dream to
7 fill a void in the communities across
8 this city and state that were healthy
9 food deserts. The facts were grim, with
10 statistics showing a 52 percent higher
11 prevalence for obesity in neighborhoods
12 where convenience stores and fast food
13 restaurants were the only food options as
14 a staggering 23.5 million Americans were
15 without access to supermarkets.

16 Equipped with the facts, a
17 fearless leader created the Fresh Food
18 Initiative to bring healthy and fresh
19 food options to communities that were
20 underserved. That dream, birthed in a
21 small office on bustling Ogontz Avenue,
22 has reached an even greater potential
23 than I believe many of us could have ever
24 imagined. Yesterday Congress produced a
25 bipartisan agreement on a five-year farm

2 bill investing \$125 million in fresh food
3 initiatives in underserved markets as a
4 result of the Fresh Food Initiative.
5 After two years of wrangling, the U.S.
6 House of Representatives passed the farm
7 bill, and the Senate is expected to pass
8 the \$500 billion deal possibly as early
9 as next week.

10 What started out as a dream to
11 tackle obesity, diabetes, and other
12 health-related illnesses by providing
13 people with healthy options and access
14 thrust Philadelphia in the national
15 spotlight some years ago when Mrs. Obama
16 visited our city, took an interest in the
17 initiative, and kicked off her nationally
18 renowned campaign Let's Move.

19 On today I'd like to
20 congratulate my dear friend, State
21 Representative Dwight Evans, for daring
22 to dream, for being a champion for the
23 least of these, for realizing the
24 economic health and social impact on
25 entire communities when people have

2 options. Thank you, Dwight Evans, for
3 your steadfast leadership for having the
4 courage to see this initiative all the
5 way through after helping American
6 families to bring home the bacon.

7 Thank you very much, and we're
8 very proud of our leader who has done an
9 awful lot of work in this state for
10 families and being very thoughtful and
11 creative in coming up with the Fresh Food
12 Initiative.

13 Thank you very much.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilwoman. I concur.

16 The Chair recognizes
17 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: The hour
19 is not yet, Mr. President. I thought we
20 were --

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Are
22 you just calling for an adjournment?
23 Okay.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Green.

2 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. Electronic cigarettes are
4 safer. Electronic cigarettes have fewer
5 toxic effects. Electronic cigarettes are
6 somewhat healthier, safer, and somewhat
7 healthier with fewer toxic effects than
8 cigarettes.

9 That's a pretty low bar to
10 clear, don't you think, especially
11 considering these claims are being made
12 about a product that has not been
13 sufficiently studied and that is not
14 meaningfully regulated, especially
15 considering these medical claims are
16 being made by an industry that engaged in
17 the largest, longest, and most expensive
18 public health deceit in American history.

19 If we learned anything from the
20 decades-long campaign to reduce cigarette
21 use, it is that we must address the
22 potential public health emergency early
23 on. And why is e-cig use a potential
24 public health emergency? Because early
25 studies show alarming trends in e-cig

2 use. Shockingly, the Center for Disease
3 Control found a doubling of e-cigarette
4 use among children and a doubling of use
5 among adults in just the past few years.

6 Additionally, let's remember
7 the changing messages crafted by
8 cigarette manufacturers over the past 60
9 years. First cigarettes were marketed as
10 healthy, with print advertisements
11 depicting doctors endorsing Lucky
12 Strikes. Next, following release of a
13 series of reports by the Surgeon General
14 advocating a smoke-free lifestyle,
15 tobacco companies contended that the
16 science around cigarette use was
17 inconclusive.

18 And, finally, once everyone
19 realized smoking was a public health
20 crisis, tobacco lobbyists shifted course
21 and argued loudly for smokers' individual
22 rights.

23 From where we sit today, think
24 about how absurd it would be for
25 cigarettes to be marketed as healthy or

2 how ridiculous it would be to contend
3 that research demonstrating the negative
4 effects is inconclusive. This is exactly
5 where we are with e-cigarettes, and today
6 many of the same people that wailed about
7 the end of the freedom that
8 Philadelphia's endorsed smoking ban would
9 wreak are the same folks who are up in
10 arms about the ability to use the drug
11 delivery system of their choice wherever
12 and whenever they want, as if smoking
13 were a right, like voting.

14 We have the benefit of history
15 to inform our treatment of electronic
16 cigarettes. It's clear what we have to
17 do.

18 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 There being no other speeches
22 by the minority or majority, the Chair
23 now recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds
24 Brown.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
