9 to order.

10 To give our invocation this

12 David Vidal of St. Veronica Catholic

24 MR. LAFFERTY: Good morning.

25 I'd like to thank Council President

3 and as well as City Council for allowing
4 me to be here today. Also I'd like to
5 thank my family, friends, supporters, and
6 colleagues in Sharon Hill. Without them,

9 When I decided to get involved
10 at a young age, I did it because I have a
11 deep desire to serve my community and I
12 wanted to give back to the people that
13 have given me so much in my life. And
14 when I heard about that I was receiving
15 this honor, I was a bit reserved, because
16 I didn't see it as an extraordinary thing
17 until I began to speak to others and came
18 to realize the significance, and the
19 significance is, the reality is that our
20 generation, my generation, will one day
21 have to take over and lead our
22 communities, and the important thing to
23 remember is that we need to work to the
24 best of our abilities to provide a
25 better, brighter future for ourselves and

9 Councilman, you want to -- the Chair
10 recognizes Councilman Jones.

11 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. I'm offering these
13 resolutions on behalf of Councilman
14 Johnson who is supporting the Repair
15 America Movement. He can't be with us
16 today because at this very moment he is
17 meeting with Vice President Biden and
18 Secretary of Transportation Fox to
19 discuss this issue. Councilman Johnson,
20 as you know, has been working tirelessly
21 to highlight the importance of addressing
22 our aging infrastructure, especially in
23 the wake of the derailment that we had a
24 couple of weeks ago. And as Chair of
25 Public Safety, I will be working with

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

3 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,

9 All those in favor?

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Those opposed?

13 (No response.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
15 resolution is adopted.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
17 authorizing Council's Committee on Public
18 Safety to investigate and hold public
19 hearings reviewing the Philadelphia Fire
20 Department's use of post incident
21 critiques after major incidents and the
22 impact they have upon the training and
23 preparedness of firefighters and other

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 Chair recognizes Councilman O'Brien.

5 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I move for the adoption

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
10 been moved and properly seconded.

11 All those in favor?

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 eyes have it, and that resolution is
18 adopted.

19 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
20 proclaiming February 2014 as "American
21 Heart Month" and proclaiming February 7,
22 2014 as "Wear Red Day in the City of
23 Philadelphia," introduced by Councilman
24 Jones.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
17 authorizing Council's Joint Committee on
18 Public Safety and Public Health and Human
19 Services to hold hearings to examine
20 Philadelphia's black homicide
21 victimization rate, introduced by
22 Councilman Jones on behalf of Councilman
23 Johnson.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

2 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you
3 again, Mr. President. I move for the
4 adoption.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
7 been moved and properly seconded.

8 All those in favor?

9 (Aye.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 ayes have it, and that resolution is
15 adopted.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
17 recognizing and congratulating Comcast
18 Corporation on their \$1.2 billion
19 investment to build the Comcast
20 Innovation and Technology Center to
21 further solidify their commitment to the
22 City of Philadelphia, introduced by
23 Councilman Oh.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

4 of the resolution.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
7 been moved and properly seconded.

8 All those in favor?

9 (Aye.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 ayes have it, and that resolution is also
15 adopted.

16 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
17 other resolutions on the Final Passage
18 Calendar, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

21 Are there any speeches on the
22 part of the minority?

23 And the Chair recognizes
24 Councilman O'Brien.

25 COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: Thank you,

2 Mr. President. Last week I introduced
3 legislation to create a Vacant Property
4 Task Force charged with compiling an
5 inventory and database of such
6 properties. It also calls for an
7 inspection team with specific
8 responsibilities to mark and make secure
9 large abandoned structures.

10 The District Attorney released
11 his grand jury report earlier this week
12 and it made several references to my
13 legislation in its recommendations. This
14 makes me all the more confident that my
15 legislation is appropriate and needed to
16 increase safety in our neighborhoods and
17 reduce the risk presented to our
18 firefighters and our first responders. I
19 look forward to working with all the
20 stakeholders in Council to make this bill
21 the best it can be and have it enacted
22 into law.

23 Continuing on my focus on the
24 Fire Department, today I introduced a
25 resolution calling for public hearings to

2 review the Fire Department's use of post
3 incident critiques after major incidents.
4 I believe we need to look at the impact
5 they can have upon the training and
6 preparedness of firefighters and other
7 first responder personnel of the Fire
8 Department. I believe the Fire
9 Department has a duty to its members and
10 the community to systemically evaluate
11 major incidents and communicate the
12 findings to all relevant emergency
13 personnel through a post incident
14 critique.

15 A critique is a fact-finding
16 exercise to collect information that
17 forms a picture of the major incident and
18 how personnel responded from both the
19 tactical and operational standpoint. The
20 lessons learned from the experience are
21 then constructively -- they're used
22 constructively to correct deficiencies,
23 highlight good practices, and influence
24 training and education.

25 Philadelphia recorded an

1 2/6/14 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 all-time low of fire-related deaths in
3 2013, and the annual number of fires in
4 the City continues to decline. However,
5 the reduction of fires subsequently leads
6 to less actual firefighting experience
7 for firefighters.

8 The Fire Department is in the
9 midst of a senior personnel transition
10 due to a high amount of retirements. As
11 staff leaves the department, they take
12 their command and operation experience.
13 The post incident critique can help fill
14 that experience void by conducting
15 routine after-action reviews, document
16 problems encountered, and successful
17 actions taken. Critiques allow for
18 training and learning opportunities to
19 improve plans, procedures, and outcomes
20 based upon real experiences in
21 Philadelphia.

22 I believe it is crucial to the
23 safety and protection of the citizens of
24 Philadelphia to have firefighters, whose
25 job often requires them to lay down their

2 lives for others, to be trained in the
3 most effective firefighting methods and
4 protocols.

5 Thank you, Mr. President.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you very much, Councilman.

8 The Chair recognizes Councilman
9 Oh.

10 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
11 much, Mr. President. I'd like to
12 recognize that our Council acts as a
13 body, and part of that is the discussion
14 that we have and the interfacing that we
15 do, sometimes agreeing, sometimes
16 disagreeing, but at the end, making
17 votes, hard choices, and coming up with
18 solutions.

19 One of the biggest issues on
20 all of our minds has been the well-being
21 of our residents and citizens in terms of
22 jobs and wages and how we're going to
23 deal with this economic struggle that we
24 have, and many Councilpeople here have
25 offered solutions. Piggybacking off of

2 many of the discussion, I introduced a
3 bill today to reduce wage taxes, wage and
4 net profit taxes, on residents of
5 Philadelphia by \$100 million over the
6 next ten years, \$50 million immediately,
7 followed by \$50 million over the next ten
8 years, and I believe that this can be
9 done without increasing any other taxes.

10 My bill reduces wage tax for
11 employees and net profit tax for
12 individuals that will see the rate go
13 from 3.92 percent in 2014 to 2.09 percent
14 in 2025. With the median household
15 income in Philadelphia being \$34,207, the
16 annual wage in PICA tax being paid is
17 \$1,340.

18 The reductions that I'm
19 advocating, along with the conclusion or
20 the end of the PICA tax in 2023, will
21 result in a savings to the average family
22 of \$626 per year every year after this
23 ten-year period is over. But for an
24 employer of 500 workers, that is an
25 immediate savings at that point in time

2 of \$318,000.

3 When more Philadelphians have
4 disposable income in their pockets, they
5 will spend more money at local stores and
6 businesses. In addition, employers will
7 have a greater opportunity to retain both
8 high-quality talent and every other
9 worker who lives in Philadelphia. This
10 is the most practical way to drive our
11 economy and benefit our residents and do
12 so in a way that does not increase other
13 taxes.

14 Experts agree that
15 Philadelphia's tax system is too complex
16 and too business unfriendly at this time,
17 especially for the residents who live and
18 work in our city. In 2003 and 2009, Tax
19 Reform Commissions were established and
20 provided a series of recommendations to
21 simplify our tax system, but these
22 recommendations have not been
23 implemented. Of these recommendations in
24 both reports, there was a need to reduce
25 the personal wage and net profit tax on

2 businesses. In recent hearings on making
3 Philadelphia a more globally competitive
4 city, Professor Robert Inman of the
5 Wharton School at University of
6 Pennsylvania stated that even a slight
7 reduction of wage tax could result in
8 adding roughly 5,000 jobs to this city
9 every year.

10 When we take a look at the
11 reduction of \$5 million in wage taxes
12 every year for ten years for the 50
13 million to add to the other 50 million,
14 the creation, even at the average
15 household income of \$34,000, is roughly
16 \$4.1 million. So we can afford to do
17 this.

18 There are additional benefits
19 that doesn't include sales tax and rents
20 and other type of things. Business
21 owners and economic experts have
22 consistently testified that
23 Philadelphia's wage tax is so detrimental
24 and that by reducing it, we would
25 actually add jobs, grow the economy.

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2 After studying this issue, I
3 believe that this solution of reducing
4 these taxes in particular is the solution
5 that our city needs to address the issue
6 identified to us by Econsult and others
7 that by 2021, this city will see the loss
8 of 75,000 jobs if we don't make a change.

9 So with this, I hope that this
10 reflects the discussions that we have all
11 had, and I look forward to hearing from
12 all of my colleagues as we continue under
13 your leadership, Mr. President, to try to
14 address the critical needs of our city.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Jones -- I'm sorry. Councilman Greenlee
20 is next.

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
22 you, Mr. President. This past Tuesday,
23 the Law and Government Committee had
24 hearings on the issue of indigent
25 defense, and while I certainly want to

2 recognize Councilman O'Brien and his
3 staff's hard work on this important
4 issue, that's not really what I wanted to
5 talk about. But when the Administration
6 testified, Mr. Resnick in this case gave
7 the Administration's testimony against
8 those bills, and they certainly had the
9 right to their opinion, but for some
10 reason sprinkled throughout the whole
11 testimony was their opposition to what
12 they called our "political interference"
13 in this issue. So I guess as elected
14 officials, we're not allowed to try to be
15 involved in something that's very
16 important to citizens of the City of
17 Philadelphia. And where Mr. Resnick said
18 that he was not the one that actually
19 wrote those words, couldn't remember who
20 did, he also seemed kind of surprised
21 that we were offended by those remarks.
22 Well, whatever mystery man or woman wrote
23 those words, it's hard to believe they
24 did not understand the negative
25 connotations that was in that.

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2 And I say that just because
3 over these past years under your
4 leadership, Mr. President, we have
5 certainly worked together, and one of the
6 reasons we've worked together is the
7 respect we've shown to each other, even
8 when we all always didn't agree with each
9 other.

10 We got some tough things coming
11 up this spring besides the budget, which
12 is also difficult. We got a lot of
13 issues. And all I would say to the
14 Administration is, we respect their
15 position and the hard work that they have
16 to do, and I hope they remember one
17 thing, respect goes both ways.

18 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 The Chair recognizes

22 Councilwoman Bass.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. On any given day there is
25 no shortage of things to be outraged

2 about, but in light of the recent snow, I
3 was preparing to take the train into town
4 and wondered if I should carry my
5 pocketbook. In light of the recent
6 shootings around purse snatchings, I
7 thought maybe I shouldn't, but quickly
8 decided that I would.

9 I wanted to say something to
10 the, quote/unquote, "men" who felt that
11 taking something, anything from any other
12 person was acceptable, but since they
13 haven't turned themselves in, I'll speak
14 to them in their absence.

15 So you must feel like a big man
16 sticking a gun in a girl's face, which is
17 terrorizing and traumatic in itself, but
18 you didn't stop there, because being the
19 little boy that you are, you pulled the
20 trigger.

21 In three acts around purse
22 snatchings, two women were killed and one
23 man was shot and injured coming to the
24 aid of his girlfriend. Two men have been
25 apprehended, but the rest of you are

2 still at large, lurking and stalking
3 women, your prey. Cowardly is the word
4 that describes you.

5 What kind of person are you?

6 If you stuck a gun in a woman's face and
7 pulled the trigger, how many other women
8 have you terrorized before this point?

9 If you've done this, I'm sure you've
10 likely put your hands on a woman before.

11 Who are you and what are you?

12 Certainly not a man at all. A coward, a
13 weakling, a punk, gutless, without a
14 backbone, less than scum. There are
15 other words that could be used to
16 describe you, but I won't darken this
17 Chamber by saying them.

18 But, again, I ask, who are you
19 and what are you? How could you be a man
20 born of a woman? Where did you come
21 from? And I have my thoughts on that
22 matter as well. Maybe you were afraid.
23 I guess you thought without a gun these
24 girls would have put it on you and given
25 you the behind kicking you deserved and

2 then some.

3 You'll get what you deserve,
4 I'm sure of that, and I ask you, was it
5 worth it? Was it worth a life? Likely
6 you got a couple of dollars, maybe a cell
7 phone, maybe some makeup. It wasn't
8 worth it. It never is, and you will pay.
9 Our police will find you, our District
10 Attorney will prosecute you, and all the
11 lives will be changed forever because of
12 your actions.

13 Thank you, Mr. President.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilwoman. The Chair
17 agrees.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Blackwell.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
21 you. Thank you, Mr. President. I almost
22 hate to speak after those remarks. Thank
23 you very much.

24 I wanted to announce two
25 things. One, tonight -- and we're

2 dealing now with the closing of
3 schools -- we're having a meeting at Lea
4 Elementary School, where I worked in my
5 first life as a school teacher.
6 Registration 5:30 and meeting that starts
7 at 6:00 with regard to Wilson Elementary
8 School.

9 But I specifically wanted all
10 of my colleagues to know and remind you
11 that tomorrow at 10 o'clock in the Caucus
12 Room, State Senator Vincent Hughes will
13 provide a briefing on the state of
14 affairs of school funding and what's
15 going on at the state level. So I hope
16 all those who can will come and join us
17 tomorrow in the Caucus Room at 10:00.

18 Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilwoman.

21 The Chair recognizes
22 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

23 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
24 you, Council President. I want to thank
25 you and Councilman Kenney, Oh, and

1 2/6/14 - STATED - SPEECHES
2 Squilla and others who joined Asian
3 Americans United and the Asian American
4 Advancing Justice in releasing a new
5 study called The State of Asian Americans
6 in Philadelphia. I want to recognize
7 their achievements in the fact that the
8 Asian American community has grown.
9 There are over 106,000 in the City of
10 Philadelphia. They've grown 43 percent
11 in 2000, 32 percent in 2010, first even
12 to Latinos who have had about a 40
13 percent growth, while the rest of the
14 population has grown about 1 percent.

15 This community has become an
16 important fabric of the City of
17 Philadelphia. They represent over 8,500
18 businesses. They directly employ over
19 12,000 people, and commerce is estimated
20 at anywhere between 250 million and
21 above.

22 In registration, we've seen a
23 tremendous increase. Some of us would
24 like to think the participation in the
25 election of our colleague Councilman Oh

2 had a lot to do with that. Registration
3 has increased 23 percent and turnout by
4 35 percent.

5 These reports are important
6 because it speaks to a community that is
7 growing and is important to the City of
8 Philadelphia, but it also highlights
9 their challenges, which are now part of
10 the challenges that the City overall
11 faces. Eighty-four percent of their
12 children tend to attend public schools.
13 Forty-eight percent of Vietnamese and 52
14 percent of Cambodian adults don't have a
15 high school diploma. Twenty-six percent
16 of the community lives in poverty, and 47
17 percent are low income.

18 This is Philadelphia's reality.
19 Their growth has been important to the
20 City. Their challenges are a reflection
21 of the overall challenges that the City
22 of Philadelphia faces. I continue to be
23 committed to ensure that we work for all
24 of the City and particularly these
25 communities who many times feel

2 underrepresented. In terms of language
3 access, 47 percent of their community
4 does not speak English, and I challenge
5 all of us to continue to figure out how
6 we are more inclusive of this growing and
7 important demographic.

8 Thank you, Council President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilwoman.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman
12 Jones.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I applaud all of my
15 colleagues today on thoughtful public
16 policy issues. To listen to them let's
17 the world know that they are thoughtful
18 on different varying points of view.
19 Particularly Councilman Oh talked about
20 his ordinance for wage tax reductions,
21 but I am reminded, Mr. President, that
22 we've delayed the poverty wage tax cut
23 for a number of years in light of dismal
24 budget projections, and as we work our
25 way out of a five- to seven-year

2 recession, depends on who is counting,
3 that we should not forget the poor.

4 What I am discovering is a
5 series of cascade failures, cuts for
6 necessary programs like SNAP, aka food
7 stamps. We have not passed the
8 unemployment extension bill, which
9 continues to bring Pennsylvania and
10 Philadelphia families to the brink of
11 their own fiscal cliff.

12 I also raise the issue and join
13 voices like Councilwoman Blackwell to
14 talk about the poor in the City of
15 Philadelphia, but I'm noticing that
16 poverty has many faces, as spoken to by
17 Councilwoman Sanchez. It's not those
18 people anymore. It's all of us and more
19 of us every day.

20 We've talked about City workers
21 even not getting raises and becoming a
22 part of a potentially poor class of
23 people that are working poor. We talked
24 about senior citizens that retired in the
25 fourth quarter of their life, only to

2 find out they have to make a choice
3 between heating their home and eating or
4 medicating their illnesses.

5 In today's Daily News, it's
6 called upon the face of poverty has
7 changed that has included people from
8 Cambodia, Vietnam, China, and their
9 poverty rate exceeds the City's poverty
10 rate.

11 It is troubling to me that the
12 impact of poverty is hitting more and
13 more people.

14 Yesterday the U.S. Senate voted
15 to approve a new five-year farm bill,
16 which will pass and probably be passed in
17 the House of Representatives, but what we
18 don't understand or have not taken to
19 account is that it has traumatic impact
20 on Philadelphians. We're talking about a
21 heat and eat program that used to exist.
22 What it meant, Mr. President, was that if
23 you qualified for LIHEAP, you could
24 qualify for food stamps, and if you
25 qualified for food stamps, you could get

2 energy assistance through LIHEAP.

3 Enemies of the poor have
4 separated that out so that you're no
5 longer eligible for both, and they're
6 beginning to take out again and again
7 underpinnings that give a safety net for
8 our most vulnerable. Eleven thousand
9 nine hundred and ten people are on
10 unemployment.

11 So this vote today in the
12 Senate -- in the U.S. is critical. They
13 have not had an unemployment benefit
14 since Christmas. Ironic, isn't it? On
15 average, \$314 a week are given to people
16 on unemployment. That means a cumulative
17 effect of \$2,198 in cuts. And those cuts
18 don't stop at the individuals that didn't
19 receive unemployment, because they are
20 consumers. Their disposable income is
21 small. They go to the corner store.
22 They spend money on gas bills. They buy
23 food in local establishments.

24 And so as we look at this in
25 the chambers of the Senate, that we need

2 to keep in mind that this is impacting
3 people right here in our city.

4 I look forward to working with
5 the Mayor's Office of Community and
6 Economic Opportunity to have what is an
7 anti-poverty summit scheduled for this
8 September. We will not look at, in
9 earnest, wage cuts in good times if we
10 can't look at anti-poverty impacts in bad
11 times for all citizens of Philadelphia.

12 So, yes, I want more jobs, but
13 I don't want the negative impacts when
14 people are pushed to the brink of poverty
15 and even, in some cases, starvation and
16 homelessness. This is a city of all of
17 our people and we're going to look out
18 for them all.

19 Thank you, Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilman.

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Blackwell again.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
25 you, Mr. President. I mentioned Senator

2 Hughes tomorrow and a meeting with Dr.
3 Hite present tonight at Lea School, but I
4 neglected to mention there will also be a
5 meeting tonight at 6 o'clock, same time,
6 at the Hardy Williams School at 54th and
7 Arlington, the old Shaw. So you get two
8 for the price of one.

9 Thank you, Mr. President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Councilwoman.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Oh.

14 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. I forgot to say
16 something, but I just want to first say I
17 thank Councilwoman Sanchez. Before I got
18 elected, I was setting up meetings with
19 her, taking my Asian American businesses,
20 and we had so many times we went over to
21 Councilwoman Sanchez, who was the acting
22 Asian American Councilwoman. So thank
23 you very much, Maria.

24 And I wanted to just say best
25 wishes to Councilman Bill Green, also

2 Farah Jimenez. Councilman Green is now
3 the SRC Chair. And I especially want to
4 say -- and many people, myself included,
5 are happy about that, but I wanted to say
6 to some people who may not find that like
7 the best thing in the world at this point
8 in time, we got to get rid of this Philly
9 shrug thing. Let's go into this with
10 full faith and full support for our new
11 SRC Chairman. Let's back him up. Let's
12 believe that he is going to do a great
13 job for our schools, because we need it,
14 and let's support him.

15 I believe in Bill. Bill's a
16 work in progress, like all of us are, but
17 he needs our help. He needs our help.
18 And he certainly has mine and I am happy
19 to see him.

20 I don't know who would take
21 this job. He is taking this job and it's
22 a tough, tough job, so important, so
23 critical for our city.

24 It's a wonderful thing that
25 you're doing this. You're in our

2 prayers. I certainly wish you the best.

3 I think I speak for everybody on Council.

4 Thank you, Bill.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, sir.

8 With that, the Chair recognizes
9 Councilwoman Brown for a motion to
10 adjourn.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. Councilman Oh has opened
13 up the door here and I would be remiss
14 not to formally state on the record how
15 much I agree with what Councilman Oh has
16 said with regards to our departing
17 colleague Councilman Green and will
18 acknowledge that even in our times of
19 agreeing to disagree on public policy,
20 that has never affected, if you will, our
21 ability to enjoy each other's company
22 offline.

23 So I will say, as I stated
24 earlier, that I've worked with both
25 Councilman Bill Green and Farah Jimenez

2 on various public policy matters and have
3 found them to be passionate, which should
4 really be in capital letters, bold
5 lettering, underscored, exclamation
6 points, quite passionate in his stated
7 position and doggedly determined to push
8 the needle.

9 So my greatest hope is to think
10 that we will continue to work
11 strategically with the new Chair of the
12 SRC Commission, looking at both
13 traditional and, more importantly,
14 non-traditional funding streams that
15 bring new, recurring, sustainable dollars
16 to the School District of Philadelphia
17 coupled with a fair funding formula that
18 provides for quality education for all
19 the students irrespective of where they
20 sit, public, private or charter.
21 Irrespective of where they sit, they all
22 deserve a quality education.

23 And with that, I congratulate
24 also Councilman Bill Green.

25 With that, Mr. President --

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Councilwoman, hold on one second.

4 Councilman Jones.

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: For the
6 record, you're not -- this isn't your
7 last session, is it?

8 COUNCILMAN GREEN: No.

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: Okay. All
10 right. I just wanted -- because I had a
11 long one for you, but I'll save it for
12 next week.

13 Thank you, Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Councilman, I doubt that the Councilman
16 would have been as quiet as he is today
17 if this is his last. There's no way that
18 would have happened.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: That's for
20 sure.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Councilwoman Blackwell, before
23 Councilwoman Brown calls for a motion to
24 adjourn, did you --

25 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Yes.

2 I wanted to say that as Chair of the
3 Education Committee, we're expecting
4 great things from one of our colleagues
5 and great access. And also as all of you
6 know, People's Emergency Center is in my
7 district and we spoke at a dedication

10 to at least express our views, and
11 certainly we look forward to reaching out
12 to them.

13 And on another matter, we
14 certainly want to thank our labor in the
15 City, District Council 33, the Water
16 Department, and 98, for what they've done
17 to try to help us in this storm and all
18 those related issues.

19 Thank you again, Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilwoman.

22 And Councilwoman Brown, we'll
23 now have a motion to adjourn.
