19                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20                  Thank you very much.

21                  The next order of business is  
22                  the approval of the Journal of the

24                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
25                  Greenlee.

8           Thank you. It has been moved and

14                          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15          Those opposed?

16                          (No response.)

17                          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
18          eyes have it, and the Journal is

20                          The next order of business is  
21          requests for leaves of absence, and the  
22          Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

23                          COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.  
24          Good morning, Mr. President. There are

4           Thank you. The Chair thanks the  
5           gentleman, and the Chair now recognizes  
6           Councilman O'Neill.

7                   COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
8           Mr. President. On behalf of the  
9           republicans, there are no requests for  
10          leave of absence.

11                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12          Thank you so much.

13                  At this time, I would like to  
14          dispense with the regular order of  
15          business and I want to thank everyone who  
16          has come down here today. You are always  
17          welcome to our Chambers to see your  
18          government in action. We hope that your  
19          stay here today is a pleasurable one, so  
20          much so that you come back again. Again,  
21          thank you for coming down to witness your  
22          government in action.

23                  At this time, I would like to  
24          recognize Councilman Kenney.

25                  COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,

2           Mr. President. As we all know, Monday is  
3           Saint Patrick's Day and Sunday is the  
4           Saint Patrick's Day Parade, I think the  
5           244th, the oldest in the nation. And I  
6           love American-Irish culture and the  
7           American version of the Saint Patrick's  
8           Day celebration, but often the silly hats  
9           and the green beer and some of the acting  
10          up gets out of hand, and we're known for  
11          that more than anything else. But I've  
12          tried over the years to bring into the  
13          Council around this time a bit of Irish  
14          culture, true Irish culture, and we've  
15          had folks in here that danced and musical  
16          selections and we've had an Irish tenor.  
17          And today we are honored to have Clare  
18          O'Malley, who is a Dublin-born actor, a  
19          South Philly resident, lives on Passyunk  
20          Avenue in the hip part of South Philly.  
21          She's appeared at the Arden Theatre and  
22          many of the other theatres around  
23          Philadelphia, and she is going to grace  
24          us today with a wee bit of Irish song and  
25          some poetry, which the Irish are most

2           known for. They're poets and they're  
3           writers.

4                        So we'd like to welcome her and  
5           ask her to go to the podium.

6                        (Applause.)

7                        MS. O'MALLEY: Hello everybody.  
8           My name is Clare O'Malley. Thank you to  
9           Councilman Jim Kenney and Arden for  
10          having me here. It's a pleasure to be  
11          here to celebrate Saint Patrick's Day  
12          with you all, or as we say in Ireland, La  
13          Fheile Padraig.

14                        So as Jim said, I was actually  
15          born and raised in County Dublin, Ireland  
16          in a town called Booterstown, and I moved  
17          to America to study at the University of  
18          the Arts on Broad Street. And I'm  
19          currently an actor here and working at  
20          Philadelphia Theatre Company at the  
21          moment.

22                        So today I'm going to share  
23          with you two poems from the legendary  
24          W.B. Yeats and one of my personal  
25          favorite Irish songs called My Lagan

3                               This first poem is called The  
4                   Lake Isle of Innisfree.

5                               I will arise and go now, and go  
6                   to Innisfree, and a small cabin build  
7                   there, of clay and wattles made; nine  
8                   bean-rows will I have there, a hive for  
9                   the honeybee; and live alone in the  
10                  bee-loud glade.

11                              And I shall have some peace  
12                  there, for peace comes dropping slow,  
13                  dropping from the veils of the morning to  
14                  where the cricket sings; there midnight's  
15                  all a glimmer, and noon a purple glow,  
16                  and evening full of the linnet's wings.

17                              I will arise and go now, for  
18                  always night and day I hear lake water  
19                  lapping with low sounds by the shore;  
20                  while I stand on the roadway, or on the  
21                  pavements gray, I hear it in the deep  
22                  heart's core.

23                              And this next one is called  
24                  When You Are Old.

25                              When you are old and gray and

2           full of sleep, and nodding by the fire,  
3           take down this book, and slowly read, and  
4           dream of the soft look your eyes had  
5           once, and of their shadows deep.

6                   How many loved your moments of  
7           glad grace, and loved your beauty with  
8           love false or true, but one man loved the  
9           pilgrim soul in you, and loved the  
10          sorrows of your changing face.

11                   And bending down beside the  
12          glowing bars, murmur, a little sadly, how  
13          love fled and paced upon the mountains  
14          overhead and hid his face amid a crowd of  
15          stars.

16                   And this is My Lagan Love.

17                   (Ms. O'Malley singing.)

18                   (Applause.)

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20          Thank you very much. Very inspirational.  
21          I noticed when you referenced the when  
22          you're getting old, there were a number  
23          of people in the audience that were  
24          actually shaking their head. I think I  
25          nodded my head a couple of times myself.

19                   And we have Councilman Kenney,  
20 Councilwoman Tasco, Councilman O'Neill,  
21 and Councilman O'Brien.

22                   COUNCILMAN KENNEY: O'Tasco.

23                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Councilwoman O'Tasco. I'm sorry. And  
25 Councilman O'Brien.

2                   COUNCILMAN HENON:   Cead mile

5                   So today we are here to honor  
6                   The Saint Patrick's Day Observance  
7                   Committee, which I am a member of, for  
8                   their hard work, more than mine,  
9                   organizing the Saint Patrick's Day Parade  
10                  and all the other events that they're  
11                  organizing surrounding the Irish  
12                  community throughout the year, and to  
13                  acknowledge the Philadelphia Irish and  
14                  Irish at heart for their passion and the  
15                  Irish arts and culture throughout the  
16                  year.

17                  I also want to thank BOMA,  
18                  Jerry Sweeney, PECO, DRPA, all the Irish  
19                  organizations and leaders that stand with  
20                  me here today and our own City leaders,  
21                  especially Parks and Recs, for making the  
22                  City shine with green this weekend.

23                  I wish you all a happy and  
24                  healthy Saint Patrick's Day weekend.   I  
25                  look forward to working with you in the

3                   Trina cheile a thogtar na

6                   With that, today we are  
7           honoring The Saint Patrick's Day  
8           Observance Association for their efforts  
9           in organizing the 244th Annual Saint  
10          Patrick's Day Parade.

11                   Whereas

12                   COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: The first  
13          documented Saint Patrick's Day Parade in  
14          Philadelphia was held in 1771, five years  
15          before the Declaration of Independence  
16          was signed. This year's parade, taking  
17          place on March 16th, 2014, will mark over  
18          240 continuous years of festivities; and

19                   Whereas, over the years, these  
20          celebrations have reflected the times  
21          with several themes emerging; religious,  
22          patriotism, honoring military service,  
23          the remembrance of the political  
24          struggles in Ireland and also the  
25          celebration of Irish culture; and

2                   COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Whereas,  
3                   the theme of the 2014 parade is Saint  
4                   Patrick, Bless the Contributions of Irish  
5                   Americans to Our Nation. Philadelphia  
6                   has had a strong Irish presence since the  
7                   founding of our city. The Irish were  
8                   instrumental in the building of many of  
9                   our churches, schools, libraries and  
10                  other institutions that Philadelphians  
11                  now consider some of our most cherished  
12                  and historic treasures; and

13                  COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Whereas,  
14                  the Saint Patrick's Day Parade -- and  
15                  please all within the sound of my voice,  
16                  it's not Paddy and it's not Patty. It's  
17                  Saint Patrick -- is a longstanding event  
18                  of great civic pride. It has over 20,000  
19                  participants and more than 150 groups are  
20                  a represented, including marching bands,  
21                  dance groups, youth clubs and Irish  
22                  associations, making it the largest  
23                  annual parade in Philadelphia; and

24                  Whereas, the Grand Marshal of  
25                  this year's event is Jim Murray, former

2           general manager of the Philadelphia  
3           Eagles. Jim is the founder and driving  
4           force behind several charitable groups,  
5           including the Ronald McDonald House and  
6           The Eagles Fly for Leukemia;

7                        COUNCILMAN O'BRIEN: And  
8           whereas, The Saint Patrick's Day  
9           Observance Association was incorporated  
10          as a non-profit organization in 1952 and  
11          is charged with the monumental task of  
12          organizing and hosting the parade each  
13          year. The association is led by their  
14          President, Robert Gessler, 1st Vice  
15          President Chris Phillips, 2nd Vice  
16          President Mary Frances Fogg, Treasurer  
17          Harry Marnie, Secretary John Stevenson  
18          and Parade Director Michael Bradley; now  
19          therefore

20                       COUNCILMAN HENON: Resolved, by  
21          the Council of the City of Philadelphia,  
22          that we hereby honor and congratulate The  
23          Saint Patrick's Day Observance  
24          Association for their efforts in  
25          organizing the 244th Saint Patrick's Day

2           Parade.

3                         Resolved further, that an  
4           engrossed copy of this resolution will be  
5           presented to the Board of Directors of  
6           The Saint Patrick's Day Observation  
7           Association, further evidencing the

9           of this legislative body.

10                        Congratulations.

11                        (Applause.)

12                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
13           Chair recognizes Mr. Gessler for remarks.

14                        MR. GESSLER: Thank you,  
15           President Clarke. Thank you all the  
16           members of Council. Thank you, Bobby  
17           Henon, one of our Board members, for  
18           sponsoring this resolution, his staff for  
19           working so hard. Our liaison was Mary  
20           Frances Fogg, our 2nd Vice President.

21                        There's some other Board  
22           members here I also -- Billy Ivers, Joe  
23           Fox, Michael Driscoll, John Stevenson,  
24           Judge Bradley, Tommy Keenan, and Walt  
25           Garvin. If you can please recognize them

4                       MR. GESSLER: The parade  
5           doesn't happen without a lot of hard work  
6           from a lot of people, and we are blessed  
7           by the member groups that participate,

9           apologies, I think Philadelphia's best  
10          parade.

11                      We invite everyone down here to  
12          come down on Sunday, noon, on the  
13          Parkway, enjoy the parade. It's a great  
14          day for families. It's a great day for  
15          Irish. It's a great day for  
16          Philadelphia, plain and simple. So  
17          you're all welcome. Just thank you all.  
18          The only Irish I know is slán, which is  
19          thank you, but have a great day and Happy  
20          Saint Patrick's Day to everyone.

21                      (Applause.)

25                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2           Thank you so much.

3                       Before we have our next  
4           presentation, I would like to recognize  
5           Councilwoman Tasco.

6                       COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you,  
7           Mr. President. I'd like to recognize 40  
8           students from the Olney Charter High  
9           School's Pledge and Trojan program.  
10          They're here today to observe City  
11          Council. Their leader is a Shirley R.  
12          Outlaw, Senior Seminar Instructor, 12th  
13          Grade Trojan Sponsor.

14                      Similar to other ASPIRA  
15          schools, Olney Charter acknowledges  
16          students who show respect, leadership,  
17          and serious demeanor by providing those  
18          students with additional privileges and  
19          status in a program with three levels,  
20          Pledge, Trojan, and Executive.

21                      Let's welcome the best and the  
22          brightest of Olney Charter, which is in  
23          the 9th Councilmanic District.

24                      (Applause.)

25                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2           Welcome. Thank you so much for coming  
3           down today.

4                        At this time, the Chair  
5           recognizes Councilwoman Sanchez, who will  
6           present a resolution on our behalf  
7           recognizing the partnership between the  
8           Salvation Army and Walmart to support a  
9           peer mentoring program in North  
10          Philadelphia. Would Major Robert Dixon  
11          and those accompanying him please join  
12          the Councilwoman at the podium.

13                      And we also have Councilman  
14          Bill Greenlee joining the Councilwoman.

15                      COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Good  
16          morning. On behalf of Council President,  
17          Councilman Greenlee here joining me at  
18          the podium, it is my honor to recognize  
19          the Salvation Army. All of us know our  
20          dear Reverend Bonnie Camarda. I think  
21          she is the 18th member of Council some  
22          days, Council President.

23                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24          That's right.

25                      COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: And the

2           Major and everyone that joins us this  
3           morning.

4                     A resolution recognizing and  
5           honoring the partnership between the  
6           Salvation Army and Walmart Foundation to  
7           support a peer mentoring program in North  
8           Philadelphia.

9                     Whereas, the Salvation Army of  
10          Greater Philadelphia's Peer Mentoring  
11          Program was established in 2013 with the  
12          support of the Walmart Foundation to help  
13          break the cycle of poverty, violence, and  
14          hunger in the City; and

15                    Whereas, that support allowed  
16          the Salvation Army to create a program  
17          based on previously successful models to  
18          provide far-reaching access for City  
19          residents in need of social services in  
20          several neighborhood community centers  
21          throughout North Philadelphia, and by  
22          offering these services in both English  
23          and Spanish in order to serve the  
24          Hispanic community; and

25                    COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:   Whereas,

2           the partnership between the Salvation  
3           Army and Walmart in Philadelphia has a  
4           long history, allowing the two to address  
5           important and critical issues by  
6           empowering those facing hardship and  
7           providing support in the move towards  
8           independence through counseling,  
9           training, and referrals; and

10                       Whereas, the Salvation Army of  
11           Greater Philadelphia is a faith-based,  
12           comprehensive human service organization  
13           whose programs help individuals, families  
14           and whole communities lead healthier,  
15           safer and more productive lives; and

16                       Whereas, since 1879, the  
17           Salvation Army has had a record of  
18           success stemming from its holistic  
19           approach to providing for the physical,  
20           emotional, economic, and spiritual needs  
21           of the individuals; and

22                       Whereas, the Salvation Army  
23           operates out of 16 community centers and  
24           residential facilities throughout the  
25           Philadelphia region, offering shelter,

2           hot meals, counseling, developmental  
3           disabilities programs, early childhood  
4           development programs, recreational  
5           opportunities, music programs,  
6           after-school arts and educational  
7           programs, job training activities for  
8           older adults, spiritual development, and  
9           drug rehabilitation programs -- and other  
10          than that, they don't do anything -- and

11                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,  
12          the Walmart Foundation is committed to  
13          improving the lives through its  
14          philanthropic efforts by addressing the  
15          needs of the communities it serves and  
16          making an impact in its core areas of  
17          giving such as Hunger Relief and  
18          Nutrition, Sustainability, Workforce  
19          Opportunity, and the Women's Economic  
20          Empowerment, including a \$2 billion  
21          commitment through year 2015 to lead the  
22          fight against hunger in the United  
23          States; and

24                   Whereas, this month the Walmart  
25          Foundation has renewed its dedication to

3           Program by generously donating \$50,000 to  
4           the Salvation Army of Greater  
5           Philadelphia, bringing its contribution

9           healing and self-reliance; therefore, be

11                         Resolved, by the Council of the  
12          City of Philadelphia, we hereby recognize

16          Philadelphia. We look forward to the  
17          positive impact this program will  
18          continue to have in the community it  
19          serves, and thank both the Salvation Army

23                         Further resolved, that an

8                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And  
9           the Chair recognizes Major Robert Dixon  
10          for remarks.

11                    MAJOR DIXON:   We are grateful  
12          for this opportunity to accept this  
13          honor.  I want to thank the Councilwoman,  
14          also the City Council for all that you  
15          are doing to partner with the Salvation  
16          Army.

17                    Our theme is that we do the  
18          most good, and through Walmart and other  
19          partnerships that we have, we are able to  
20          do that on a daily basis.

21                    I just want to take this  
22          opportunity to introduce my team, if you  
23          will, who support me wholeheartedly in  
24          what we do in the City of Philadelphia.  
25          Of course, the Reverend Bonnie Camarda,

2           who is really my right-hand person. And  
3           when you see her here, I send her, so  
4           that she will be aware of what's going on  
5           in the City. And, of course, Carol  
6           Walter, we thank you. And, of course,  
7           Walmart.

8                         And this is Sherita Mouvon, who  
9           is responsible for the Peer Mentor  
10          Program at 1340 Brown Street where she  
11          works with those women and children who  
12          need direction in their life and helps  
13          them to stand up.

14                        And, of course, Sandy Sheller.  
15          And this young woman here is the brain  
16          from all of this, because she knows  
17          people, and because we know her, we get  
18          to know people too. And so Sandy has  
19          really opened that door for us, and we do  
20          appreciate all you've done. Would you  
21          like to just say a word or two.

22                        MS. SHELLER: Well, I just am  
23          so appreciative that you're celebrating  
24          two great organizations today. And for  
25          me it's all about trying to make the

2           world a better place and Philadelphia a  
3           better place and to be the voice for  
4           those that don't have a voice often. So  
5           thank Council and I thank everyone here  
6           for all of that.

7                     Thank you.

8                     MAJOR DIXON: And then moving  
9           right on down the line, this is Susan  
10          Brotherton.

11                    Now, some of us have positions,  
12          but we also have people who make us look  
13          good. And so Susan makes me look good,  
14          because she's responsible for the social  
15          service ministries in Philadelphia. And  
16          so once we find out who we're partnering  
17          with and once we get everything together,  
18          I send her out to make sure it all works  
19          good. And so I want to just introduce  
20          Susan Brotherton, who is the Director of  
21          Philadelphia Social Service Ministries,  
22          and she does a lot of things to help us.

23                    Tell us just some of the things  
24          that we do to do the most good in the  
25          City.

2                   MS. BROTHERTON: We provide  
3 emergency housing for families who find  
4 themselves immediately homeless, to  
5 provide some transitional housing. We  
6 provide families with permanent supported  
7 housing where no matter what happens to  
8 them in their lives, we continue to  
9 support. We also have housing for  
10 seniors. And then located around the  
11 City we provide social services in groups  
12 to continue to support everyone in the

6           Council President and  
7 colleagues, today I'm offering a bill  
8 that would amend the current Longtime  
9 Owner-Occupant tax relief program to  
10 extend this necessary relief and protect  
11 LOOP-approved homeowners. This bill is a  
12 direct response to a great deal of  
13 concern of constituents throughout the  
14 2nd Councilmanic District. They are  
15 thankful to have been accepted into the  
16 LOOP program. However, they are  
17 concerned that after ten years, they may  
18 be forced to leave their property whether  
19 they want to or not.

20           Under the current LOOP program,  
21 people who meet the qualifying criterias,  
22 meeting the income guidelines as well as  
23 living in their properties for ten years,  
24 are qualified to participate in the LOOP  
25 program. Under the amendment I am

2           proposing today, it will replace the  
3           ten-year exemption with an exemption  
4           through the sale or transfer of the  
5           individual's properties. There are a  
6           number of reasons for this bill.

7                           (Applause.)

8                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Tax policy  
9           should not drastically alter the  
10          demographics of a neighborhood overnight.  
11          Under the current program, it is likely a  
12          mass flight from certain neighborhoods  
13          will occur as the people who receive LOOP  
14          leave when it ends. But tying LOOP to  
15          the sale or transfer of their home rather  
16          to some arbitrary date, it helps to  
17          prevent these longstanding community  
18          members from uprooting and leaving their  
19          neighborhoods.

20                           We do not want to force people  
21          into delinquency. If we're concerned  
22          about people's ability to pay a tax bill  
23          on a property value that has tripled,  
24          there is equal, if not greater, concern  
25          about their ability to do so when it

2           could be five or six times higher in  
3           developing communities in ten years. We  
4           should not be pushing people who have  
5           been a member of their community for ten  
6           years or more away, whether it's today or  
7           within another ten years. Extending LOOP  
8           to the sale or transfer shows that we are  
9           looking to keep neighborhoods strong and  
10          protect long-term investments in our  
11          communities. We cannot disregard the  
12          neighbors who have helped an area grow.  
13          That is the idea behind LOOP. However,  
14          the arbitrary ten-year timeline only puts  
15          off their problem temporarily. By  
16          changing LOOP to continue the protection  
17          until the time of sale, transfer or lack  
18          of residency, it properly follows through  
19          on the originally intended goal.

20                   I'm hopeful that my colleagues  
21          will support this bill, and I want to  
22          thank you, Council President, for the  
23          opportunity to speak on this measure.  
24          Thank you very much.

21          consideration of the Calendar, and the  
22          next order of business is the  
23          consideration. I note that the bill just  
24          reported from committee with suspension  
25          of the rules has been deemed to have had

2           a first reading. This bill will be  
3           placed on our Second and Final Passage  
4           Calendar at our next session of Council.

5                       As there are no additional  
6           bills on the First Reading Calendar, the  
7           Chair now recognizes Councilman Jones for  
8           the purpose of calling up bills and  
9           resolutions on the Final Passage  
10          Calendar.

11                      COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
12          Mr. President. I move that the rules of  
13          Council be suspended to permit the use of  
14          a Consent Agenda to consider the  
15          following resolutions on the Final  
16          Passage Calendar: Resolutions No.  
17          140110, 140150, 140156, 140157, 140158,  
18          140160, 140151, 140152, 140153, 140154,  
19          140155, and 140162.

20                               (Duly seconded.)

21                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22          Thank you. It has been moved and  
23          properly seconded that the rules of  
24          Council be suspended to permit the use of  
25          a Consent Agenda to consider the

2           resolutions just read by Councilman  
3           Jones.

4                     All those in favor say aye.  
5                     (Aye.)

6                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7           Those opposed?

8                     (No response.)

9                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
10           eyes have it and the motion carries, and  
11           we will consider the Resolution Consent  
12           Agenda shortly.

13                    The Chair now recognizes  
14           Councilman Jones for the purpose of  
15           calling up bills and resolutions on the  
16           regular Second and Final Passage  
17           Calendar.

18                    COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you  
19           again, Mr. President. In addition to the  
20           resolutions being considered on the  
21           Consent Agenda, the following resolutions  
22           and bills are being called up for Second  
23           Reading and Final Passage Calendar today:  
24           Nos. 140161, 130161, 130901, 130902,  
25           140054, 140003, 140010, 140017, 140079,

1           3/13/14 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           140002, 140100, and all other bills and  
3           resolutions are being held.

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5           Thank you very much, Councilman.

6                   Before considering these bills  
7           and resolutions on the Final Passage  
8           Calendar, we will have public comment.  
9           Public comment will go as follows:

10                   If you are interested in  
11           testifying on a bill or resolution, it  
12           must be on the Final Passage Calendar.  
13           We ask that you sign up at the table to  
14           my left, if you have not already done so.

15                   Your public comment will be  
16           restricted to three minutes, because we  
17           want to make sure that everybody has an  
18           opportunity. You will go to the podium  
19           in the middle of the Council Chambers.  
20           There's a device on that podium. When  
21           the light turns green, it is your time to  
22           speak. When it turns yellow, you have 30  
23           seconds to conclude your remarks, and  
24           when it turns red, we ask that you please  
25           conclude your remarks and adhere to the

2           guidelines that have been established.

3                   I want to thank you very much  
4           for your cooperation, and at this time, I  
5           ask Mr. Decker to please read the name of  
6           the first individual who is interested in  
7           testifying today.

8                   CHIEF CLERK: Ann Dixon.

9                   (No response.)

10                  CHIEF CLERK: Ann Dixon,  
11           commenting on 140079.

12                  (Witness approached podium.)

13                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
14           morning.

15                  MS. DIXON: I know that our  
16           city desperately needs money for public  
17           schools, libraries and other things.  
18           Selling PGW would bring in a bundle. The  
19           Philadelphia Inquirer reports that PGW  
20           workers will be offered employment by UIL  
21           Holding Corporation and total employment  
22           would not fall below 1,350 people for  
23           three years. Residential rates will also  
24           be locked in for three years. There will  
25           be the, quote, capacity to transform PGW

2           into a larger player in a regional energy  
3           network increasingly interconnected to  
4           production from the booming Marcellus  
5           Shale gas formation. This is from March  
6           4th Inquirer.

7                     Well, this sounds great. Why  
8           don't we sell PGW? Because selling is a  
9           dangerous short-term fix. Our utilities  
10          provide a steady revenue stream to the  
11          City that we need to keep. Private  
12          companies are in the business of making  
13          money and getting the most profit with  
14          the fewest amount of workers. Of course  
15          rates will increase after being locked in  
16          for three years.

17                    California's electric industry  
18          was de-regulated the beginning of this  
19          century. Prices were supposed to be  
20          cheaper, but instead they soared. There  
21          was also a power shortage, quote, a  
22          shortage that has proved highly  
23          profitable to power companies and raised  
24          suspicions of market manipulation, end  
25          quote. That's from Paul Krugman's

2           article in The Times, The New York Times.

3                   Even if the windfall from the  
4           sale goes toward something worthwhile  
5           like public school funding, where will  
6           future funding come from? We will soon  
7           be back facing the same funding crisis.

8                   International Energy Agency  
9           Chief Maria van der Hoeven reported in  
10          the Christian Science Monitor at the end  
11          of February that the U.S.'s shale gas and  
12          oil boom will be over in ten years. Ten  
13          years in the history of Philadelphia is  
14          the blink of an eye. Why would we want  
15          to organize around something that will  
16          only last that long?

17                   City Council has passed  
18          numerous resolutions protecting City  
19          residents from the dangers of fracking.  
20          Most recently, the City has vowed to join  
21          other groups in a lawsuit if our Delaware  
22          River Watershed is fracked. This is  
23          where we get our drinking water that  
24          would become polluted if fracking happens  
25          there.

2                   After doing this great work, it  
3 makes no sense for the City to turn  
4 around and support fracking-related  
5 infrastructure and activities.  
6 Nationwide, at least 5,098 individuals or  
7 families have been harmed by fracking.  
8 Many have severe illnesses and hardships.  
9 We should not be doing anything to  
10 perpetuate this dangerous business.

11                   You can find that list of 5,098  
12 and growing if you Google "List of the  
13 Harmed."

14                   Thank you.

15                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16                   Thank you.

17                   (Applause.)

18                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I  
19 just want to say before we call the next  
20 name, for the record there is not a bill  
21 or a resolution that references the sale  
22 of PGW on the Final Passage Calendar.  
23 The bill that the individuals have  
24 indicated that they want to testify on is  
25 a transfer ordinance for the existing

2           company. It has no relationship. But  
3           because there are only four people, we're  
4           going to give a little latitude today.  
5           But I just want for the record, there is  
6           actually nothing to testify as it relates  
7           to the transfer. But we only have three  
8           more, and I'm hoping this doesn't create  
9           an onslaught of people to testify on that  
10          bill that's not on the Final Passage  
11          Calendar. So we're going to give a  
12          little latitude today.

13                         Thank you for your cooperation.

14                         And there probably won't be a  
15          bill or resolution in the foreseeable  
16          future, for some time.

17                         (Applause.)

18                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
19          let me clarify to the press, because I  
20          know they will interpret to say that  
21          there will never be a conversation or a  
22          public hearing. I said as the clapping  
23          began for "the foreseeable future." That  
24          means that we haven't even received a  
25          bill yet. So there's a process. I just

2           want to make sure. People say,  
3           Councilman Clarke said he's never going  
4           to introduce the bill.

5                     All right. Thank you. Thank  
6           you.

7                     Mr. Decker, please call the  
8           next name.

9                     CHIEF CLERK: Rabbi Mordechar  
10          Liebling, commenting on 140079.

11                    (Witness approached podium.)

12                    RABBI LIEBLING: Good morning.

13                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
14          morning, Rabbi.

15                    RABBI LIEBLING: I'd like to  
16          thank the Council for your latitude this  
17          morning. I know that the bill is  
18          addressing a transfer of funds from PGW  
19          to the Water Department, and it's exactly  
20          that kind of thing that we need to  
21          maintain. PGW has been a longtime source  
22          of revenue for the City. It is kind of  
23          foolish to sell a long-term source of  
24          revenue for short-term gains.

25                    (Appause.)

2                   RABBI LIEBLING: I come this  
3 morning as a member of the clergy,  
4 because we understand that the purpose of  
5 government is to protect the poor and the  
6 weak. That's always been the purpose of  
7 government. People come together to form  
8 governments to make sure that the strong  
9 cannot oppress the weak. Hopefully  
10 that's the function of religion as well.

11                   Now, here if we sell PGW to a  
12 powerful corporation, we are going to  
13 give up the protection of the weak and  
14 give power to the strong. And we know  
15 that if we sell this public utility, the  
16 rates will rise. They are only buying  
17 this to make money. If they couldn't  
18 make money, they wouldn't buy it, right?

19                   The only way --

20                   (Applause.)

21                   RABBI LIEBLING: The only way  
22 they're going to make money is by raising  
23 rates. Okay? That means we're going to  
24 be transferring money out of the pockets  
25 of poor and working Philadelphians to a

2           rich corporation that's headquartered in  
3           Connecticut. Now, why would we take  
4           money out of Philadelphia and send it out  
5           of state to people who already have a lot  
6           of money? It doesn't seem to make a lot  
7           of sense to me.

8                           (Applause.)

9           RABBI LIEBLING: So it seems  
10          that City Council needs to do its duty  
11          and protect the people of Philadelphia  
12          from another rapacious corporation that's  
13          trying to take our money.

14                          Thank you.

15                          (Applause.)

16          CHIEF CLERK: Lisa Hastings,  
17          commenting on 140079.

18                          (Witness approached podium.)

19          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20          Ms. Hastings, if you could, at a minimum,  
21          figure out a way to segue into the PGW  
22          conversation. I liked the way the Rabbi  
23          did it. He talked about the transfer and  
24          the Water Department. So at a minimum,  
25          you can at least talk about that part of

2           it at the beginning of your speech.

3                   MS. HASTINGS: Thank you for  
4           your latitude. And also we are talking  
5           about -- this looks very, very broad --  
6           about the transfer of assets, transfers  
7           of appropriations and assets. So I think  
8           that it really is reasonable to talk  
9           about the huge transfer of the assets of  
10          PGW to a private entity.

11                   One thing that bothers me a lot  
12          is the possible, and hopefully we won't  
13          have the sale, of PGW shows that some  
14          Philadelphia officials are willing to  
15          turn the City into a business entity  
16          that's separate from its citizens and  
17          their collective interests.

18                   The decisions are based on  
19          short-term financial gain for the  
20          separate City entity. The City is not a  
21          stock in its collection of citizens and  
22          their assets, and I urge the City Council  
23          to continue to represent the short-term  
24          and long-term public interest of the  
25          Philadelphia citizens and to reject the

2           sale of PGW. The arguments why we should  
3           trade a valuable asset and give away  
4           public control for a one-time payment are  
5           simply Wall Street talking points, not  
6           the truth.

7                     Thank you.

8                     (Applause.)

9                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10           Thank you.

11                     CHIEF CLERK: Jihad Ali,  
12           commenting on 130901 and 130902.

13                     (Witness approached podium.)

14                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
15           morning, sir.

16                     MR. ALI: Good morning,  
17           President Clarke and the other honorable  
18           members of City Council. I'm Jihad Ali.  
19           I'm here to talk about Bill 130901 and  
20           130902. My particular concern is about  
21           diversity.

22                     I support this bill, but I'm  
23           here really to tell you a story. Now,  
24           this Council when the issue of diversity  
25           comes up, every one of you, the

2           Councilmembers, have always been  
3           supporters of diversity. I don't want to  
4           signal you all out, other than to say you  
5           all have supported this issue. There's  
6           always been good leadership. We use that  
7           often to talk about this issue in this  
8           Council about diversity. There's always  
9           good leadership here.

10                         But I wanted to tell you a  
11           story that really underlines that  
12           example. This week there was a hearing.  
13           It must have been a follow-up hearing  
14           where they brought in the executives to  
15           speak before Public Property with  
16           Councilman Bobby Henon, and that was  
17           right here in the people's chambers. And  
18           they brought in about maybe ten  
19           executives from the organization that's  
20           going to buy the parking garage. I  
21           believe it was InterPark. And during the  
22           course of the questioning, it just so  
23           happened it was advertised, but I was the  
24           only citizen who came and sat right along  
25           this bench.

2                   The executives all sat around  
3                   and they talked about the points of the  
4                   purchase. And then it was a question and  
5                   answer period where the distinguished  
6                   Chairman, Mr. Henon, acknowledged my  
7                   question. And Councilman Greenlee knew  
8                   what I was going to say, and he talked  
9                   about Economic Opportunity Plans. And  
10                  through the good leadership of this  
11                  Council, they already had two plans.

12                  But I wanted -- it was just  
13                  apparent a question for me to ask. It  
14                  must have been ten white men and three  
15                  white women of the upper management. So  
16                  I had to ask the question, can you tell  
17                  me about diversity on your upper level of  
18                  management in this corporation. The  
19                  Chairman, he seemed to be shocked. He  
20                  said, That's a technical question. And  
21                  to the credit of Bobby Henon, Councilman  
22                  Greenlee, and Councilman Oh, they didn't  
23                  say a word. They let that hang out there  
24                  for three seconds, which probably to him  
25                  was an eternity, and then they allowed me

2           to ask a second question. Well, Mr.  
3           Chairman, let me make it plain. How many  
4           black men, black women, Latino men,  
5           Latino women, Asian men, Asian women do  
6           you have on the upper levels of your  
7           corporation. So, once again, they didn't  
8           say a word. And as a citizen, that's  
9           important, because they didn't diminish  
10          my question. They allowed me to ask the  
11          question, and they gave me my respect as  
12          a citizen. And that's all we want.

13                        So I salute you. I salute  
14          Bobby Henon, Councilman Greenlee,  
15          Councilman Oh, and all of you for that  
16          issue of diversity for giving me the  
17          respect as a citizen to address my  
18          concerns.

19                        Thank you.

20                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21          Thank you.

22                        (Applause.)

23                        CHIEF CLERK: Coryn Wolk,  
24          commenting on 140079.

25                        (Witness approached podium.)

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning, and, again, we seek segue  
4 testimony. Thank you.

5                   MS. WOLK: Thank you for the  
6 opportunity to speak. My name is Coryn  
7 Wolk and I'm with Protecting Our Waters  
8 of Philadelphia.

9                   Like our Water Department, a  
10 public PGW provides a steady reliable  
11 transfer of funds to our city's needs.  
12 In PGW's case, it's \$18 million a year.

13                   Mayor Nutter and the proponents  
14 of this deal are bragging about the \$1.86  
15 billion in the terms of the deal, but  
16 these companies aren't stupid. If the  
17 entity you're bargaining with gives you  
18 everything you want and more, you're  
19 probably overlooking something major.  
20 And that, among other things, is LNG  
21 exports. This has been talked about and  
22 hinted at in some of the press coverage,  
23 but the City hasn't come out and said  
24 that this was a major motivation for the  
25 deal.

2                   However, PGW currently owns LNG  
3 facilities along the waterfront, and  
4 former Pennsylvania DEP Secretary Michael  
5 Krancer has said that this deal would  
6 allow Philadelphia to become the new  
7 Houston.

8                   LNG exports mean more fracking  
9 in Western Pennsylvania and elsewhere for  
10 natural gas, meaning more air and water  
11 pollution and methane escaping to  
12 contribute to climate change, more  
13 pipelines costing the State and the City  
14 when we can't even maintain the  
15 infrastructure that we already have.

16                   We already know that this deal  
17 will cut good jobs and aid to the City's  
18 most vulnerable citizens. We know that  
19 it will allow UIL to raise prices at will  
20 after 2017. LNG exports guarantee higher  
21 gas prices for Philadelphians and people  
22 across the country.

23                   Mayor Nutter says that he wants  
24 Philadelphia to become the greenest city  
25 in America. More fracking and fossil

2           fuel exports and emulating Houston is  
3           moving in the opposite direction. Let's  
4           move forward, not backward. Let's keep  
5           PGW public.

6                           (Applause.)

7                           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
8           Thank you.

9                           CHIEF CLERK: Daisy Cruz,  
10          commenting on 140110.

11                           (Witness approached podium.)

12                           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
13          morning.

14                           MS. CRUZ: Good morning,  
15          members of City Council. I thank you for  
16          this opportunity for letting me read my  
17          short statement here. My name is Daisy  
18          Cruz and I'm the Director of the  
19          Mid-Atlantic District of SEIU 32BJ.

20                           32BJ is supportive of expanding  
21          the Living Wage and Benefits Review  
22          Committee. We think that this is an  
23          important step, along with enforcing  
24          current laws on the 21st century wages  
25          and benefits towards alleviating poverty

2           in our neighborhoods. The City should  
3           not be in the business of subsidizing  
4           poverty wage jobs or employers who do  
5           business with the City of Philadelphia.

6                    Although the airport receives  
7           significant taxpayer support, nearly  
8           2,000 low-wage workers at the airport are  
9           not benefiting from the existing minimum  
10          wage standard due to the City's  
11          interpretation that the law does not  
12          apply to subcontractors.

13                   We appreciate that City Council  
14          has given Philadelphia voters a chance  
15          this May to apply the City's minimum wage  
16          law to those who need it the most. The  
17          minimum wage ballot initiative, along  
18          with expanding the Living Wage and  
19          Benefits Review Committee, are important  
20          steps towards lifting thousands of  
21          service workers out of poverty.

22                   We would like to thank Council  
23          and their leadership in this fight and  
24          look forward to continued partnership to  
25          lift more Philadelphians out of poverty.

3                   (Applause.)

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5                   Thank you.

6                   CHIEF CLERK:   Bishop Dwayne

7                   Royster.

8                   (Witness approached podium.)

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   Good  
10                  morning.

11                  BISHOP ROYSTER:   Good morning,  
12                  Mr. President, members of Council.  I'm  
13                  Bishop Dwayne Royster, Executive Director  
14                  of POWER, an interfaith movement here in  
15                  the City of Philadelphia, and the Senior  
16                  Pastor of the Living Water United Church  
17                  of Christ over in the Oxford Circle  
18                  section of Philadelphia.

19                  I stand today with my friend  
20                  and colleague Daisy Cruz to urge the  
21                  passing of Bill No. 140110, the extending  
22                  of the Living Wage and Benefit Review  
23                  Committee.  I believe that it's an  
24                  important time in the life of the City of  
25                  Philadelphia that we begin to look

2           seriously at the low wages that many of  
3           our workers are paid in this city who  
4           work full time and continue to live in  
5           the depths of poverty. We must begin to  
6           push back against low-wage work. We must  
7           begin to work -- we must work very  
8           diligently to prevent poverty from  
9           continuing in the City as it pushes  
10          towards 30 percent.

11                        We believe out of our faith  
12          traditions of POWER, of our 40  
13          congregations, our 40,000 members of  
14          Christian, Muslim, Jewish tradition and  
15          non-theist traditions across the City  
16          that it is imperative that we not just  
17          have a trickle down, but we have a  
18          lifting up, and part of the way we do  
19          that is to make sure that our employers  
20          across the City are paying wages that are  
21          commensurate with the jobs that people  
22          have, that they have the benefits that  
23          are necessary for them to be able to live  
24          appropriately, and that it gives an  
25          opportunity for our city to thrive in

2           every neighborhood, not just a select  
3           few.

4                        So we thank Council for all the  
5           work that they are doing to push against  
6           poverty in the City, and we look forward  
7           to being a part of that process to  
8           continue that with you as we make  
9           Philadelphia the great city that we know  
10          it can be.

11                       Thank you very much.

12                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13          Thank you, sir.

14                       (Applause.)

15                       CHIEF CLERK: Jill Stokes,

16          commenting on 140079.

17                       (Witness approached podium.)

18                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
19          morning.

20                       MS. STOKES: Good morning.

21          Like our Water Department, PGW represents  
22          an essential transfer of \$18 million  
23          every year to the City. We've seen that  
24          privatization of a municipally owned  
25          entity almost always accompanies an

2           increase in sales. When they sold their  
3           water utility in West Chester and Media,  
4           rates doubled for consumers, and in  
5           Bristol, Pennsylvania, they tripled.

6                     The sale stipulates that rates  
7           cannot increase for three years, but  
8           after that, we know exactly what UIL is  
9           going to do. They're going to want a  
10          return on their investment, and they  
11          wouldn't be paying so much if they knew  
12          they couldn't make it back.

13                    On top of that, we'll have to  
14          pay more. Philadelphians are going to  
15          lose a crucial voice if the entity is  
16          sold. We'll be giving up the ability to  
17          determine what the infrastructure looks  
18          like in our own city, but we will have to  
19          deal with the decisions made by UIL  
20          Holding Corp. Please vote against the  
21          sale.

22                             Thank you.

23                             COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24          Thank you.

25                             (Applause.)

2                   CHIEF CLERK: There are no  
3 other speakers on the public comment  
4 list, Mr. President.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
6 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker. That  
7 concludes our public comment.

8                   At this time, we will move to  
9 our Calendar, and I would ask Mr. Decker  
10 to read the titles of all the resolutions  
11 on the Consent Agenda. After each title  
12 is read, any member may object to the  
13 inclusion of the resolution on the  
14 Consent Agenda. Upon such an objection  
15 and without debate, the resolution will  
16 be immediately removed from the Consent  
17 Agenda Calendar and placed on today's  
18 regular Final Passage Calendar.

19                   Mr. Decker will now the read  
20 titles of the resolutions on the Consent  
21 Agenda.

22                   CHIEF CLERK: Resolution No.  
23 140110, entitled "A resolution amending  
24 Resolution No. 110807 (adopted November  
25 17, 2011), which provided for the

14          poverty in the City of Philadelphia"; and  
15                        Resolution No. 140156, entitled  
16          "A resolution honoring The Saint  
17          Patrick's Day Observance Association for  
18          their efforts in organizing the 244th  
19          Annual Saint Patrick's Day Parade"; and  
20                        Resolution No. 140157, entitled

2           services bill I introduced last week.

3                   Philadelphia has a rich  
4           immigration history, and our immigrant  
5           community continues to thrive today.  
6           Many people in Philadelphia require  
7           assistance with immigration matters, and  
8           they place a tremendous amount of trust  
9           in immigration assistance service  
10          providers. These providers have a duty  
11          and responsibility to properly and  
12          legally serve their clients.

13                   The work of immigration  
14          assistance providers can literally affect  
15          every facet of their client's life. The  
16          ability to live and work within the  
17          United States and to establish and  
18          maintain stable families and business  
19          relationships of many people with  
20          immigrant matters hinges on the work of  
21          such providers.

22                   Given the size of  
23          Philadelphia's immigrant community,  
24          immigration assistance service providers  
25          have a significant impact on the social,

2           cultural, and economic life of the City.  
3           Currently in Philadelphia we have no  
4           regulation of the practice of immigration  
5           assistance services. I believe this  
6           leaves people who require assistance with  
7           immigration matters vulnerable to  
8           exploitation, fraud, financial ruin,  
9           family upheaval due to the unscrupulous  
10          business practices of some of these  
11          providers.

12                   And make no mistake, those  
13          knowingly and intentionally preying upon  
14          and deceiving our immigrant population  
15          are committing a fraud. People who  
16          require assistance with immigration  
17          matters deserve to know the exact scope  
18          of work to be performed by a service  
19          provider. There needs to be built in  
20          assurances that they are getting proper  
21          assistance and have some recourse should  
22          they be wronged by an assistance  
23          provider, because the consequences can be  
24          steep and life-altering.

25                   Last week, I introduced a bill

2                   that will create licensing standards for  
3                   those providing immigration services.  
4                   The intent of my legislation is to give  
5                   immigrants and persons who require  
6                   assistance with immigration matters  
7                   clarity about how immigration services  
8                   should be handled from an ethical, fair,  
9                   and honest business practices and  
10                  preserve public confidence.

11                  Earlier this week, the Public  
12                  Safety Committee held a hearing on this  
13                  issue, which is also commonly referred to  
14                  as notario fraud. At our hearing we had  
15                  several courageous and brave victims  
16                  testify about the devastating impact of  
17                  this fraud. We also had a variety of  
18                  stakeholders, including the Federal Trade  
19                  Commission, the District Attorney's  
20                  Office, and the Police Department,  
21                  testify and amplify how this fraud is  
22                  perpetrated upon victims and present  
23                  solutions to stop it.

24                  I believe the thoughtful and  
25                  appropriate legislation I introduced

2           presents an opportunity to stop the  
3           exploitation and the fraud in our  
4           immigrant community. This legislation is  
5           a step in the right direction, and I look  
6           forward to the ensuing dialogue and the

12          rates among children ages two to five.  
13          This represents the first broad decrease  
14          in this epidemic since the publication of  
15          the 2004 National Institutes of Health  
16          comprehensive report on obesity wherein  
17          it stated that obesity among young people  
18          of color was at a crisis.

19                   According to the Center for  
20          Disease Control, about 8 percent of our  
21          young people were obese in 2012. That  
22          figure is down from 14 percent in 2004.  
23          When young people are overweight or  
24          obese, the fact is that they are five  
25          times as likely to be overweight or obese

2                   as adults.

3                   According to the lead  
4                   researcher, quote, This is the first time  
5                   we have seen any indication of any  
6                   significant decrease in any age group.

7                   This data is even more exciting  
8                   when coupled with a 2013 report from the  
9                   Robert Wood Johnson Foundation wherein it  
10                  stated Philadelphia reported a  
11                  significant reduction in the rate of  
12                  obesity amongst school children,  
13                  particularly among teens and young people  
14                  of color. Rates of obesity for children  
15                  K through 12 decreased by 4.7 percent.

16                  So kudos to Dr. Donald Schwarz  
17                  and our Health Department for their  
18                  concentration in this area. I keenly  
19                  remember sitting in this Chamber during  
20                  the Street Administration when  
21                  Philadelphia was named, and I quote, not  
22                  by us but by others, "the fattest city in  
23                  America," end quote. As elected  
24                  officials, some of us did complain and  
25                  others of us got to work. My office

2           worked with The Food Trust and called for  
3           hearings on what we now know as food  
4           deserts. It was Representative Dwight  
5           Evans' vision as the then Chair of the  
6           House Appropriation Committee that led to  
7           new financing methods for supermarkets in  
8           certain neighborhoods, attracting grocers  
9           like Jeff Brown of Brown's Shop Rite.  
10          Together, Representative Evans and Jeff  
11          Brown have literally changed the  
12          landscape of many of our neighborhoods,  
13          creating jobs, offering fresh food at an  
14          affordable cost, and teaching a new  
15          generation of Philadelphians how to shop  
16          and eat healthier.

17                   In 2004, City Council passed a  
18          resolution introduced by my office to ban  
19          all sodas and sugar-sweetened drinks from  
20          the public school vending machines. We  
21          met with Coca-Cola and others. We worked  
22          with then Chairman James Nevels and SRC  
23          member Sandra Dungee Glenn, who saw the  
24          smartness in that resolution. They later  
25          decided to remove sodas from schools K

2                   through 8.

3                   The SRC then acted to take deep  
4                   fryers out of Philadelphia schools and  
5                   make the switch to 1 percent skim milk.  
6                   And then later Paul Vallas and his Chief  
7                   of Staff, Natalie Paquin, now CEO of Girl  
8                   Scouts, led the charge to expand  
9                   organized sports to middle school grades  
10                  and thus expanded sports programs in high  
11                  schools, proving the point without  
12                  funding for athletics programs, we  
13                  continue to rob our students of many,  
14                  many valuable healthy benefits.

15                  And then later in 2010, my  
16                  office introduced the menu labeling  
17                  legislation, which took us two years to  
18                  get done, seeking nine votes, but at the  
19                  end of the day, we got 12 votes, and as a  
20                  result, we're now teaching a new  
21                  generation of parents and young people  
22                  that knowledge is power and life really  
23                  is all about choices, including  
24                  nutritional choices. We may not always  
25                  pick the healthiest choice, but menu

2           labeling gives us the power to make  
3           healthier choices.

4                   So I thank my colleagues who  
5           supported me, and I thank those who came  
6           later and said, Blondell, that was not  
7           such a bad idea.

8                   We must also salute what I call  
9           corporate citizens like McDonald's, who  
10          saw the need, listened to parents, and  
11          have added healthier food options to  
12          their menu. In 2004, McDonald's began  
13          offering apples as a Happy Meal option.  
14          In 2012, McDonald's began including  
15          apples in all future Happy Meals. So now  
16          we will have a new generation of young  
17          people that know that a Happy Meal can  
18          include tasteful fresh fruit.

19                   And how can we have a  
20          conversation about winning the war on  
21          childhood obesity without mentioning  
22          First Lady Michelle Obama? Her program,  
23          Let's Move, is changing how young people  
24          and adults view food, fitness, and  
25          healthy living, and she's achieving great

2           results, as was reported two weeks ago  
3           around the country. Her mission has  
4           created an entirely new dialogue between  
5           parents and children, and the results  
6           from Let's Move we'll see years to come.

7                   Just as a generation of 1980s  
8           babies grew up with Nancy Reagan's Just  
9           Say No, Michelle Obama's Let's Move  
10          campaign is having the same effect. Some  
11          might call this a cultural flash point  
12          that moves far beyond the walls of the  
13          White House. Michelle Obama is making  
14          the notion of healthier eating and  
15          exercise the expectation and not the  
16          exception to the rule. So now I imagine  
17          eight years from now when we look to see  
18          the impact the Let's Move will have on  
19          future generations, including young  
20          people who fill these seats.

21                   The point, progress has been  
22          achieved, albeit incremental, through the  
23          work of many stakeholders over this last  
24          decade, and I'm energized by the fact  
25          that when we do sort of stick to our guns

2                   on issues that matter, we can make a  
3                   difference, if not for us, for the little  
4                   people that are coming behind us.

5                   So there's a lot more work to  
6                   be done in this area, and so I say stay  
7                   tuned as we continue the mission of  
8                   working to build healthier children and  
9                   young people, Mr. President.

10                  I thank you very, very much.

11                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12                  Thank you, Councilwoman.

13                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
14                  Johnson.

15                  COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
16                  Mr. President.

17                  COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: It's  
18                  Johnson, sir, Mr. Majority Leader.

19                  Thank you, Council President.

20                  In January, specifically on January the  
21                  26th, the Washington, DC-based Violence  
22                  Policy Center released a study that  
23                  listed the City of Philadelphia -- that  
24                  listed the State of Pennsylvania ranking  
25                  fourth as it relates to homicides amongst

2           African Americans, specifically African  
3           American young men. And there's a quiet  
4           understanding in the African American  
5           community that when the weather breaks,  
6           people don't know how to act, and that we  
7           have seen on the television over the past  
8           several days, we have seen an increase in  
9           gun violence throughout the City of  
10          Philadelphia.

11                   To date, there have been 52  
12          homicides. Fifty-two of those homicides  
13          were by handguns, which means 94 percent  
14          of the gun violence taking place in the  
15          City of Philadelphia -- 94 percent of the  
16          violence taking place in the City of  
17          Philadelphia are by firearms.

18                   And so I just want to always  
19          make sure that as we go about addressing  
20          the various issues in the City of  
21          Philadelphia, we also pay attention to  
22          the issue of African American  
23          black-on-black youth gun violence. And  
24          so in the spirit of Falaka Fattah who  
25          during her movement No Gang War in '64 --

2           '74 and produced young leaders such as my  
3           Majority Leader, Councilman Curtis Jones,  
4           I will always remain on the issue of  
5           addressing the issue of youth gun  
6           violence amongst African American young  
7           men.

8                   We do have a neighborhood task  
9           force on youth gun violence that I  
10          implemented, kicking the year off and --  
11          kicking this year off in January. We  
12          have had several meetings with community  
13          members. This evening we will be having  
14          a youth think tank spearheaded primarily  
15          by young people to talk about what they  
16          believe are the issues and concerns and  
17          how they can address the issue of youth  
18          gun violence and us as adults can be  
19          supportive of them. This event will take  
20          place at Vare Rec Center from 6 o'clock,  
21          and we encourage individuals who are  
22          hearing this announcement to come out to  
23          participate. And I think collectively as  
24          a Council body and as a city and our  
25          individual districts as well as the

2                   members who are at-large members continue  
3                   to step up and play a role as we try to  
4                   save our young people from killing one  
5                   another.

6                   Thank you, Council President.

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8                   Thank you, Councilman Johnson. Thank you  
9                   for your continued good work on this very  
10                  crucial issue.

11                  The Chair recognizes  
12                  Councilwoman Tasco.

13                  COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you,  
14                  Mr. President. I just want to announce  
15                  that this evening from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00  
16                  p.m. there will be a town meeting  
17                  sponsored by my State Representative,  
18                  Cherelle Parker, at Saint Peter's  
19                  Lutheran Church at 74th and Briar Road.  
20                  There will be representatives from  
21                  various City and State agencies to  
22                  provide information to those who attend.  
23                  We welcome all.

24                  Thank you.

25                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2           Thank you, Councilwoman.

3                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
4           Jones.

5                   COUNCILMAN JONES:   The other J.

6                   I rise today to not talk about  
7           my own work, but I want to talk about one  
8           of my colleague's work, and I was glad  
9           that he didn't talk about it. I want to  
10          rise to talk about Councilman Johnson's  
11          hearings on CSX yesterday. And sometimes  
12          as a Councilperson you really wish you  
13          could forget what you learned, because  
14          you don't sleep well at night because of  
15          what you now know and that burden of  
16          knowledge.

17                   Yesterday I sat very long hours  
18          with Councilman Greenlee and other  
19          Councilpeople as we learned about some of  
20          the dangers that every day as we sleep  
21          ride through our communities, through our  
22          city and we don't know much about it.

23                   Unfortunately, the buck stopped  
24          in Councilman Johnson's district when a  
25          train derailment happened. But the good

2           news is that Councilman Johnson jumped  
3           right on it and called the giants of the  
4           industry to task and made them come all  
5           the way from, I think, Florida to come  
6           and address some of the safety concerns.  
7           And what we learned was, Mr. President,  
8           that there are at least 25 nasty  
9           chemicals that ride through our cities  
10          and our neighborhoods every day and night  
11          that we don't know much about, that our  
12          administrators of the Streets Department  
13          really don't know when they're there,  
14          when they leave.

15                   We found out that we have  
16          different definitions of "dangerous."  
17          There's one definition of dangerous that  
18          if a train can go through our community  
19          and not spill a drop, okay, it's not  
20          dangerous. But if a chunk of concrete or  
21          a piece of metal falls on the streets  
22          below, oh, well, that's your problem.  
23          And we have different definitions of  
24          "dangerous" when it comes to that.

25                   We found out that we have

2           different definitions of "training."  
3           They boasted that they have trained our  
4           first responders on how to deal with  
5           these kinds of potential catastrophes,  
6           but when we dug down into the issue --  
7           thank you, Councilman Johnson, again --  
8           we discovered that all they were going to  
9           train our first responders on was how not  
10          to open their boxcars. Not how to deal  
11          with the spills of what comes out of  
12          them. We don't have to look far but to  
13          Jersey to see how that kind of apathy can  
14          cause a community a catastrophe.

15                   Councilman Johnson over and  
16          over and over again yesterday said, We  
17          just ducked a bullet, averted a  
18          catastrophe, but we're going to learn  
19          from it and do better and do better.

20                   And so I just want to say a  
21          good piece of work, Councilman, and thank  
22          you for allowing us to be a part of it.

23                   (Applause.)

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25          Thank you, Councilman.

2                   I want to say, Councilman  
3                   Johnson actually called me late last  
4                   night, and I was a little concerned that  
5                   the hearing, because they were really  
6                   getting into all aspects of the issue,  
7                   that he would actually impede our ability  
8                   to have the Council session today.  
9                   That's how late he was here. But he  
10                  called me last night, told me, We're  
11                  done, we're okay for Thursday.

12                  But I, like Councilman Jones,  
13                  want to say thank you so much, because I  
14                  know throughout all of our districts, we  
15                  have this continuing challenge with  
16                  respect to potential for hazardous  
17                  effects. So thank you and continue the  
18                  good work, sir.

19                  I'd like to recognize  
20                  Councilwoman Bass.

21                  COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
22                  Mr. President. I do want to -- I was in  
23                  the hearing yesterday for part of it and  
24                  I did hear some of the questions that  
25                  were asked, and I have to say I was

2           shocked and surprised as well and very  
3           much troubled by the information that we  
4           received yesterday, because it really did  
5           show that there's a huge gaping hole and  
6           no one, it seemed, was willing to step up  
7           and fill that hole in terms of  
8           responsibility for what happens if you're  
9           walking under a bridge and something  
10          falls down on you or the spikes that  
11          Councilman Jones brought that came from a  
12          railroad track that they just assumed  
13          some kids had thrown overboard but -- had  
14          thrown over the bridge, but as if that  
15          was the only way that they could have  
16          gotten there, even though there was a lot  
17          of debris and issues with the bridge  
18          itself.

19                   So I too want to congratulate  
20          my colleague on his fantastic work for  
21          yesterday.

22                   But I actually wanted to  
23          mention an event that we'll be hosting  
24          this evening, myself and Council  
25          President Clarke. We'll be having a

2           Health Insurance Marketplace enrollment  
3           information event this evening in  
4           partnership with Temple University  
5           Health. It's going to be held this  
6           evening at 6:00 p.m. at the Student  
7           Faculty Center for Temple University,  
8           3340 North Broad Street. That's Broad  
9           and Ontario. And we want folks to come  
10          out, find out what information is  
11          available to help you become enrolled,  
12          what Obamacare means to you, and how we  
13          can be helpful to you.

14                    Thank you, Mr. President.

15                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16           Thank you, Councilwoman.

17                    And the Chair recognizes  
18           Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

19                    COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
20           you, Mr. President. I too want to  
21           congratulate Councilman Kenyatta Johnson  
22           and add that I know you and I share many  
23           of -- not their active tracks, but their  
24           inactive tracks, and what those inactive  
25           tracks have created in terms of blight

2                   and dangerous situations in my district.  
3                   The 1st Congressional District, which is  
4                   one of the poorest, we have over 200  
5                   people living in a dormant CSX track. It  
6                   is a situation that many do not want to  
7                   recognize, because then they have to deal  
8                   with it.

9                   I know DA Seth Williams and  
10                  others have joined me. We've gone down  
11                  there, and we see children and families  
12                  who have made this place their home. And  
13                  as we talk about this in their active  
14                  tracks, we also have to hold them  
15                  responsible for their inactive tracks and  
16                  whether we end up in the long term  
17                  filling them or what we do is important,  
18                  because we spend quite a bit of our City  
19                  resources cleaning, constantly cleaning,  
20                  these tracks. And while they have in  
21                  some cases put some fencing around it,  
22                  one of the recent murders in the City of  
23                  Philadelphia was in one of these tracks  
24                  where there were body parts that were  
25                  found, and it's a quite dangerous

2                   situation.

3                   So I'm glad you brought this  
4                   up. It is a very complex issue, and want  
5                   to remind you that those dormant tracks  
6                   that may never be used again continue to  
7                   be areas of blight and crime in  
8                   neighborhoods in North Philadelphia.

9                   So thank you.

10                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11                  Thank you, Councilwoman.

12                  The Chair recognizes  
13                  Councilwoman Blackwell.

14                  COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
15                  you, Mr. President. Yesterday not only  
16                  did we learn that that track, thanks to  
17                  Councilman Kenyatta Johnson's leadership,  
18                  is not treated, we had -- I want to thank  
19                  members of the community in addition who  
20                  came out, people from South Philly,  
21                  Southwest Philly, various groups who  
22                  talked about the fact that for nearly 20  
23                  years, no one had cleaned under the  
24                  bridge, had cleaned the bridge that  
25                  children walk across. They didn't shovel

2                   snow, that nothing happens, you know. It  
3                   seemed to me to be a 22nd and Market  
4                   Street about to happen.

5                   So it's unbelievable that in  
6                   this day and time we can live with these  
7                   horrendous conditions right under our  
8                   noses. So, again, I commend the  
9                   leadership and all the community people  
10                  who came and testified and certainly,  
11                  along with everyone else here, pledge my  
12                  commitment to make a difference.

13                  Thank you.

14                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15                  Thank you, Councilwoman.

16                  And the Chair recognizes  
17                  Councilman Johnson.

18                  COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council  
19                  President and colleagues, I just want to  
20                  say for the record that Councilman Jones  
21                  and myself came to an agreement that we  
22                  recess the hearing so we can continue  
23                  addressing this issue, and yesterday was  
24                  only the beginning.

25                  Thank you very much.

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3                   Thank you, sir.

4                   And that concludes the remarks,  
5                   and with that, I call on Councilwoman  
6                   Brown for a motion to adjourn.

7                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
8                   Mr. President. I move that City Council  
9                   stand adjourned until Thursday, March  
10                  20th, 2014 at 10:00 a.m.

11                  (Duly seconded.)

12                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It  
13                  has been moved and properly seconded that  
14                  Council stand adjourned until Thursday,  
15                  March 20th, 2014, 10:00 a.m.

19                  Those opposed?

20                  (No response.)

21                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
