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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 We've established a quorum. I'd ask all
7 guests and visitors to please retire
8 behind the rail. If the members will
9 take their seat, we will get started.

10 To give our invocation this
11 morning, the Chair recognizes the
12 Reverend Dwayne Royster, Senior Pastor of
13 Living Water United Church of Christ. He
14 is here today as the guest of Councilman
15 Wilson Goode.

16 I would ask all guests and
17 visitors and members to please rise.

18 (Members and guests rise.)

19 REVEREND ROYSTER: Thank you,
20 Councilman Clarke, Councilman Goode for
21 the invitation. I'll be praying out of
22 the Christian tradition this morning, but
23 would invite all those of different
24 faiths to pray along according to your
25 faith tradition as we ask God's blessing

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2 on this august body this day.

3 Let us pray.

4 Eternal God, we ask your
5 blessing on this session of City Council
6 and for each of its members.

7 As these City Councilmembers
8 gather today, they will make decisions
9 that impact upon the lives of the 1.6
10 million citizens of Philadelphia. These
11 citizens of this city come from all walks
12 of life, including different ethnicities,
13 socioeconomic levels, various
14 generations. Some come from the north,
15 from the south, from the west, from the
16 southwest, from the northwest, and the
17 northeast. They come from neighborhoods
18 like Kingsessing and Kensington and
19 Fishtown and Oxford Circle and Mount Airy
20 and different parts of the City. Each of
21 these communities has an expectation that
22 their voices are heard and their concerns
23 are addressed.

24 This day I pray that every vote
25 that is cast is reflective of the

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2 question that the prophet Micah posed,
3 What does the Lord require? That you do
4 justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with
5 your God.

6 I pray that every vote cast is
7 is not made for the sake of political
8 expediency, but is measured with justice
9 and mercy. For those issues that ignite
10 great passion and debate, we pray that
11 the words and actions of our leaders
12 would be seasoned with grace and your
13 love.

14 Help our City Council to
15 remember the poor, like subcontracted
16 airport workers like Onetha McKnight, who
17 has testified before this Council, who
18 helped create record profits for big
19 airlines like U.S. Airways, but who get
20 paid so little they must rely on food
21 stamps and Medicaid to survive, who
22 although working full time have no
23 benefits and are paid less than minimum
24 wage.

25 Help Council to remember the

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2 hungry who desire knowledge and thirst
3 for education like Simeon and Skylar, but
4 are unable to have a quality education
5 because their schools have no nurse, no
6 counselor, and often no paper.

7 Help the Council to remember
8 the marginalized who, based on their age
9 or gender or race or physical capability,
10 have not been able to find justice in
11 this city.

12 Help the Council remember those
13 living in fear who are afraid that they
14 or a family member could be deported at
15 any time because they are an undocumented
16 citizen.

17 Help the Council to remember
18 the sick, do not have paid sick days to
19 take off from work and care for
20 themselves and their families when they
21 are ill, and the afflicted like the many
22 returning citizens who desire to work and
23 find opportunity in the City.

24 We pray that the decisions of
25 this City Council may bring peace,

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2 opportunity, and prosperity to the
3 various conditions of its most fragile
4 citizens. We are reminded by your word,
5 to whom much is given, much is required.

6 Oh divine one that has the
7 ability to heal that which has been
8 divided, we would ask that your presence
9 would govern the work of this body today.
10 Lead those who have been called into this
11 session to legislate this city. May
12 these, your daughters and sons, have the
13 courage to fight for those whose names
14 will never be heard in these Chambers.
15 May this Council be guided by you this
16 day and forever more.

17 In the holy name of your son
18 Jesus, we pray.

19 Amen.

20 (Amen.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you so much, Pastor.

23 Council will be at ease.

24 (Council at ease.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you. Thank you so much.

3 The next order of business is
4 the approval of the Journal of the
5 meeting of Thursday, March 13th, 2014.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Greenlee.

8 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
9 you, Mr. President. I move that the
10 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, March
11 13th, 2014 be approved.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
14 has been moved and properly seconded that
15 the Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
16 March 13th, 2014 stand approved.

17 All those in favor?

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
20 those in favor?

21 (Aye.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you. Those opposed?

24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

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2 ayes have it, and the Journal is
3 approved.

4 The next order of business is
5 requests for leaves of absence, and the
6 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: Good
8 morning, Mr. President. On behalf of the
9 majority, a leave of absence request has
10 been made by Councilmember Maria
11 Quinones-Sanchez.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you. Leave shall be granted.

14 And the Chair recognizes
15 Councilman O'Neill.

16 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. On behalf of the
18 republicans, there are no requests for
19 leave of absence.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you so much, Councilman.

22 At this time, I would like to
23 dispense with the regular order of
24 business and I would like to welcome and
25 thank everyone who has come down here

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2 today to witness your government in
3 action. We hope you really enjoy it.
4 I'm not sure what's on the agenda
5 totally, but I think that it would be a
6 learning experience for you. So, again,
7 thank you for being here. We hope that
8 your stay is a pleasurable one, so much
9 so that you would like to come back.
10 Again, thank you.

11 At this time, the Chair
12 recognizes Councilman Kenyatta Johnson,
13 who will present a resolution proclaiming
14 March, 2014 as American Red Cross Month
15 in Philadelphia. Would Judge Renee
16 Cardwell Hughes and those accompanying
17 her please join the Councilman at the
18 podium.

19 And we also have joining the
20 Councilman, Councilman Greenlee,
21 Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilwoman
22 Reynolds Brown, and Councilwoman Tasco
23 and Councilwoman Bass and Councilman
24 Jones.

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

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2 Mr. President.

3 In life, we are often faced
4 with tragedies that result in some cases
5 the loss of life and some cases
6 situations that will shake the foundation
7 and the very core of your being, and
8 during those situations and during those
9 times, you may be in a predicament where
10 you're looking for support, you're
11 looking for help, you're looking for a
12 shoulder to cry on but, more importantly,
13 you're looking for the resources to help
14 you rebuild your life. And at this
15 particular time, I want to honor an
16 organization that have always been there
17 for the people of the City of
18 Philadelphia, but also throughout this
19 country for those in the times of need
20 and times of despair.

21 And so I want to stand with my
22 colleagues in supporting the American Red
23 Cross for the work that they have done,
24 and just over this last month, having an
25 opportunity to witness their work with

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2 the situation that came close to home
3 with one of my close friends, and it just
4 made me have more of appreciation for the
5 work that they do.

6 Imagine being in a situation
7 where your whole house burns down and you
8 lose loved ones and you have no
9 resources, don't know where to go. This
10 is the organization that steps up to the
11 plate. Our police officers have a part
12 to play. Our firefighters have a part to
13 play, but this organization also has a
14 critical part to play in supporting
15 individuals when they are most in need.

16 So the proclamation reads:
17 Proclaiming March, 2014 as American Red
18 Cross Month in the City of Philadelphia.

19 Whereas, the American Red Cross
20 is a humanitarian organization led by
21 dedicated volunteers, led by dedicated
22 volunteers, that prevents and alleviates
23 human suffering by harnessing the power
24 of volunteers and the generosity of
25 donors; and

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
3 compassion, courage, character, and civic
4 duty are inherent in the Red Cross
5 mission to prevent and relieve human
6 suffering, and the City of Philadelphia
7 shares these grand ideals; and

8 Whereas, the Red Cross is
9 chartered and authorized by Congress to
10 act in times of need, provide a
11 compassionate assistance to people
12 afflicted with personal, local and
13 national disasters; and

14 Whereas, the American Red Cross
15 Pennsylvania Chapter is the leading
16 volunteer agency with extraordinary
17 leadership meeting the needs of thousands
18 of families throughout the greater
19 Philadelphia region affected by 736
20 disasters last year, 493 in Philadelphia
21 alone;

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
23 before I read my part, I must say that in
24 West Philadelphia, we fought for and have
25 opened the only Red Cross House building

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2 in the country. So we're very, very
3 proud of that fact, back in 1993.

4 And whereas, on Monday, July
5 29th, the American Red Cross Southeastern
6 Pennsylvania Chapter opened a reception
7 center for more than 12 hours to assist
8 dozens of people following an explosion
9 and business collapse in South
10 Philadelphia; and

11 Whereas, the American Red Cross
12 Southeastern Pennsylvania Chapter
13 responded to a record setting number of
14 disasters in the months of November,
15 December, and January; and

16 Whereas, the American Red Cross
17 Southeastern Pennsylvania Chapter
18 supported 14 National Disaster Operations
19 from the deadly tornadoes in Oklahoma to
20 flooding in New York, and even the
21 bombing at the Boston Marathon, 23
22 Southeastern Pennsylvania workers served
23 a total of 35 deployments; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
25 the American Red Cross Southeastern

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2 Pennsylvania Chapter and the City of
3 Philadelphia formed an exciting
4 partnership to train citizens to become
5 providers of Mental Health First Aid,
6 with the goal of having more than 360
7 people trained by June 30th; and

8 Whereas, the American Red Cross
9 Southeastern Pennsylvania Chapter
10 provided the greater Philadelphia region
11 with vital information to help residents
12 prepare for a massive ice storm and power
13 outage; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Whereas,
15 the American Red Cross Southeastern
16 Pennsylvania Chapter provides a worldwide
17 emergency communication link and other
18 casework services to members of the
19 United States Armed Forces and their
20 families in the greater Philadelphia
21 region, 24 hours a day, every day of the
22 year - a total of 1,900 times last year;
23 and

24 Whereas, in the Southeastern
25 Pennsylvania region, the American Red

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2 Cross trained and certified more than
3 50,000 people in vital, lifesaving
4 skills, including CPR, AED, first aid,
5 water safety and HIV/AIDS prevention, as
6 well as disaster preparedness skills; and

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
8 the American Red Cross Southeastern
9 Pennsylvania Chapter fulfilled its
10 commitment to spotlighting National
11 Preparedness Month by providing emergency
12 preparedness outreach and education
13 programs free of charge to millions of
14 Southeastern Pennsylvania residents and
15 businesses; and

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, the
17 American Red Cross Southeastern
18 Pennsylvania Chapter operates 21 Red
19 Cross Clubs in the region, and trained
20 nearly 50,000 youth in Red Cross
21 Training, including HIV Prevention,
22 Disaster Preparedness, First Aid and CPR,
23 and International Humanitarian Law; now,
24 therefore

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Resolved,

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2 by the Council of the City of
3 Philadelphia, in special recognition of
4 the humanitarian efforts of the American
5 Red Cross, its staff and volunteers, we,
6 the members of City Council of
7 Philadelphia, do hereby proclaim March,
8 2014 as Red Cross Month in the City of
9 Philadelphia.

10 Further resolved, that an
11 engrossed copy of this resolution be
12 presented to the American Red Cross of
13 Southeastern Pennsylvania Chapter as
14 evidence of the sincere sentiments of
15 this legislative body.

16 And at this particular time, I
17 would like to present the citation to the
18 Honorable Renee Cardwell Hughes.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 Chair recognizes Ms. Hughes for remarks.

22 JUDGE HUGHES: Thank you so
23 much, Mr. President. Councilman Johnson,
24 Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilwoman
25 Tasco, Bass, everyone, yes, Curtis,

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2 Councilman Jones -- look, the problem is,
3 I get so choked up when I come down here,
4 because these are all my friends and
5 these are people who from the moment that
6 I personally moved to Philadelphia in
7 1985, these people, whether on the stage
8 or not, have helped me always make a
9 difference in Philadelphia. And I love
10 the reception that you have given the men
11 and women who stand here with me, because
12 it's the men and women who stand here
13 that make up the Red Cross. People talk
14 about the power of the Red Cross brand.
15 The Red Cross brand breaks down to one
16 very simple thing, these amazing men and
17 women.

18 (Applause.)

19 JUDGE HUGHES: Yes. These men
20 and women love our community, and they
21 volunteer literally every single day.
22 Every single day on average it's
23 somewhere between three and five
24 disasters in every 24-hour cycle. So
25 every single day these men and women

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2 leave the comfort and security of their
3 homes to go help our community. It is
4 incredible what they do to ensure that
5 Philadelphia is the very best place in
6 the world and that our region is strong
7 and secure.

8 And so I thank you on behalf of
9 them for recognizing all of their work.
10 It means so much. But I also want to
11 thank you for something extra. Council
12 always does its homework, so it's like
13 really impressive to hear you guys read
14 our stats, but some of the things that
15 I'm not certain you even think about,
16 every time we recognize a need in the
17 community, you step up to help us. We
18 have what only exists in our city,
19 Philadelphia, a program called Respect,
20 and Respect is a partnership between
21 Council and the City and the Philadelphia
22 Corporation on Aging to ensure that our
23 seniors are safe during times of
24 disaster. That's a partnership that when
25 we approached you guys and recognized

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2 this need, you jumped right on it. So
3 just like our mental health first aid,
4 just like our Red Cross House, every time
5 we recognize a need, you always stand
6 with us and support us and make it
7 happen.

8 I am eternally grateful for
9 your vision, for your leadership, and for
10 your dedication to our community. And I
11 am particularly grateful to these very
12 brave men and women who sacrifice their
13 time for our community.

14 Thank you for honoring March as
15 Red Cross Month, and I just look forward
16 to many more years of working with you to
17 make Philadelphia and the Southeast
18 Pennsylvania region the best place in the
19 country, without question.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Council will be at ease.

23 (Council at ease.)

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
25 everyone.

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2 At this time, the Chair
3 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,
4 who will present a resolution proclaiming
5 that the City of Philadelphia recognizes
6 the benefits of a diet high in fruit and
7 vegetables, and urges residents to
8 participate in Meatless Mondays. Would
9 Ms. Rachel Atkinson and those
10 accompanying her come to the podium.
11 Correction, also Councilman Kenney.

12 Also joining us is Councilwoman
13 Bass and Councilman Johnson.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: I think I
15 would be remiss not to acknowledge and
16 salute former colleague Councilman Bill
17 Green, who brought this important issue
18 to our attention and passed the baton
19 after his departure.

20 So this morning we are
21 delighted to celebrate and lift up the
22 benefits of a diet high in fruits and
23 vegetables, and urges Philadelphians to
24 participate in what we now know as
25 Meatless Mondays, all designed to improve

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2 our health and decrease our carbon
3 footprint.

4 Whereas, in 2008, Mayor Michael
5 Nutter pledged to make Philadelphia the
6 Greenest City in Philadelphia; and

7 Whereas, in 2010, following the
8 creation of the Greenworks program, the
9 United States Chamber of Commerce
10 Business Civic Leadership Center and the
11 Siemens Corporation presented
12 Philadelphia with the Siemens
13 Sustainability Community Award for a
14 Large Community; and

15 Whereas, according to the
16 United Nations, quote, "livestock are one
17 of the most significant contributors to
18 today's most serious environmental
19 problems," end quote, and the livestock
20 sector is responsible for about 18
21 percent of greenhouse gas emissions
22 worldwide; and

23 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Whereas,
24 more than 1.7 billion animals are used in
25 livestock production worldwide, and the

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2 production of livestock occupies
3 one-third of the world's arable land;

4 Whereas, a plant-based diet has
5 been demonstrated to use fewer resources
6 and cause less pollution than meat-based
7 diet; and

8 Whereas, according to the
9 United States Department of Agriculture,
10 Americans consume 195 pounds of meat a
11 year -- I didn't realize that -- which is
12 60 pounds of meat more than they consumed
13 in the 1950s;

14 Whereas, more than two-thirds
15 of American adults and nearly one-third
16 of American children and teens are
17 overweight and obese;

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And
19 whereas, of the ten largest cities in the
20 United States, Philadelphia has the
21 highest rates of obesity and diabetes;
22 and

23 Whereas, according to the
24 Philadelphia Department of Health, in
25 2008, 64 percent of Philadelphia's adults

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2 and 57 percent of Philadelphia's children
3 between the ages of 6 and 11 were
4 overweight or obese, and nearly 70
5 percent of children in North Philadelphia
6 were overweight or obese; and

7 Whereas, health disparities
8 exist, and African-Americans and
9 Hispanics are at higher rates, risk
10 rates, of diseases linked to poor diets;
11 and

12 Whereas, the American Dietetic
13 Association recognizes that a vegetarian
14 diet decreases the risk for a variety of
15 health issues including heart disease,
16 high blood pressure, diabetes, obesity,
17 and various cancers; and

18 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Being a
19 vegetarian, I strongly support this
20 resolution.

21 Whereas, Meatless Monday, which
22 was founded in 2003 and is a non-profit
23 initiative associated with the Johns
24 Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public
25 Health, encourages people to try food

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2 alternatives, such as tofu, other than
3 meat at least once a week.

4 It's not bad at all. And I
5 don't eat chicken.

6 Whereas, Meatless Monday is
7 supported by the Humane League, the Clean
8 Air Council, and the Johns Hopkins
9 Bloomberg School of Public Health; and

10 Whereas, the Baltimore City
11 Public School District; the Los Angeles
12 Unified School District; Miami-Dade
13 County School District; the City of Los
14 Angeles; the District of Columbia;
15 Montgomery County, Maryland; Villanova
16 University; Yale University; and Temple
17 University, and other school districts,
18 universities, cities, and counties have
19 adopted a Meatless Monday policy; now,
20 therefore, be it

21 Resolved, by the Council of the
22 City of Philadelphia, that the City of
23 Philadelphia recognizes the benefits of a
24 diet high in fruits and vegetables and
25 urges residents to participate in

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2 Meatless Mondays.

3 Further resolved, that an
4 engrossed copy of this resolution be
5 presented to representatives of the
6 Humane League as evidence of the sincere
7 sentiments of this legislative body.

8 (Appause.)

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: The Chair
10 recognizes Mrs. Atkinson for remarks.

11 MS. ATKINSON: Yes. So thank
12 you so much. So why Meatless Mondays?
13 Well, Meatless Mondays is not only good
14 for our health, extremely good for our
15 health, but it's also good for the
16 environment and something that this Mayor
17 has put forward as a priority. And so
18 with the help of City Council, we have
19 been able to bring this campaign to
20 various sectors. We've been able to
21 bring this campaign to restaurants. So
22 we have worked with many restaurants to
23 promote Meatless Mondays and have them
24 promote Meatless Mondays to their
25 patrons.

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2 We have had success in the
3 School District. We bring dozens of
4 letters to the School District Reform
5 Committee every School District meeting,
6 and we have gathered thousands of
7 signatures throughout the school system,
8 including Edison, Frankford, South
9 Philly, and many, many more.

10 We have worked to distribute
11 recipes to communities all over
12 Philadelphia so that it's accessible to
13 the entire community. And we're working
14 with the School District, the Division of
15 Dining Services to implement Meatless
16 Mondays in their cafeterias. That way,
17 our students will start their week in a
18 healthy fashion.

19 And so with all of these
20 signatures and letters, we're going to
21 the School Board tonight for their School
22 Reform Commission meeting, and we're
23 beyond thrilled. We're beyond thrilled
24 that this initiative has taken off the
25 ground and that more and more businesses

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2 in Philadelphia and residents in
3 Philadelphia have enacted it, enacted it
4 in their own lives as well as policies.

5 And so part of the platform
6 that City Council has given us is the
7 ability to make lasting connections with
8 restaurants and with school districts and
9 with businesses, and one of those
10 businesses, which is here today, is Real
11 Food Works, and someone is going to
12 briefly talk about Real Food Works and
13 the benefits of a plant-based diet.

14 MS. SMITH: Thank you. I'm
15 Mary Smith. I work for Real Food Works,
16 which is a Philadelphia start-up company.
17 We are very pleased to have received
18 backing from Startup PHL. We are a
19 healthy meal delivery service. We work
20 with a group of restaurants, and we ship
21 nationally. And what we're so pleased
22 about is that it is helping
23 Philadelphia's economy, because we're
24 working with those restaurants, but we
25 are working on everyone's health

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2 nationally.

3 Our founder, Lucinda Duncalfe,
4 would have loved to have been here today.
5 She is incredibly passionate about our
6 health, our environment, the vibrancy of
7 this city. And we are pleased that the
8 Clean Air Council, Johns Hopkins School
9 of Public Health, and a growing number of
10 school districts have adopted Meatless
11 Monday as a way of supporting health and
12 sustainability nationwide.

13 Meatless Monday has proven to
14 be the easiest way to teach people about
15 eliminating a little bit of meat from
16 their diet. I mean, we all could go one
17 day, couldn't we?

18 Real Food Works takes that one
19 step farther. We make it easy by saying,
20 If not meat, then what? So we prepare
21 health-promoting delicious plant-based
22 meals and deliver them to people's
23 doorsteps, and the health benefits?
24 Well, you can imagine - decreased
25 obesity, lower occurrences of cancer,

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2 diabetes, acid reflux, arthritis, the
3 list goes on and on. And the pluses?
4 Well, how about longevity, focus, energy,
5 and what we all would like, better sleep.
6 And in terms of the environment, the
7 benefits are enormous.

8 So thank you, City Council, for
9 being so forward-thinking and adopting
10 this important resolution and supporting
11 Real Food Works and Startup PHL. And we
12 are very hopeful that the Philadelphia
13 School District will join in and
14 institute Meatless Monday.

15 Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

18 Council will be at ease.

19 (Council at ease.)

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: The next
21 order of business is communications. The
22 Chair requests that the Sergeant-At-Arms
23 deliver the messages from the Mayor to
24 the Chief Clerk.

25 CHIEF CLERK: There are no

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.
4 Seeing no messages, the next order of
5 business is introduction of bills and
6 resolutions.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman
8 Kenney.

9 COUNCILMAN KENNEY: Thank you,
10 Mr. Chairman. I offer three privileged
11 resolutions.

12 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged
13 resolution authorizing the Committee on
14 Education to hold public hearings to
15 examine the possibility of the

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

16 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged
17 resolution authorizing City Council's
18 Committee on Global Opportunities and the
19 Creative/Innovative Economy to hold
20 public hearings on the state of the
21 growing technology and innovation
22 community in Philadelphia and the impact
23 on the local economy.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: That
25 resolution will be on today's Final

3 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
4 resolution authorizing Council's
5 Committee on Global Opportunities and the
6 Creative/Innovative Economy and Committee

9 feasibility of developing a diplomatic
10 area in the City devoted to the promotion
11 of foreign trade and investment.

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: That
13 resolution will also be on today's Final

15 Are there any other bills and
16 resolutions?

17 CHIEF CLERK: No, Mr. Chairman.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 At this time, we'll have
22 reports from committee, and the Chair

17 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Public
18 Places-Prohibited Conduct,' by adding a
19 new Section to prohibit the use of
20 Electronic Smoking Devices in public
21 places and in the workplace"; and

22 Bill No. 140096, entitled "An
23 ordinance amending Chapter 9-600 of The
24 Philadelphia Code, entitled 'Service and
25 Other Businesses,' by clarifying

2 penalties for violations of Section
3 9-622, entitled 'Cigarettes and Tobacco
4 Products,' and by adding a new section to
5 prohibit the sales of electronic smoking
6 devices and unapproved nicotine delivery

9 reports it has considered the same and
10 returns the attached bills to Council
11 with a favorable recommendation.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you.

14 And the Chair again recognizes
15 Councilwoman Tasco.

16 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: I move
17 that the rules of Council be suspended so
18 as to permit first reading today of Bills
19 No. 140095 and 140096.

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you. It has been moved and

4 (Aye.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Those opposed?

7 (No response.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

10 placed on our First Reading Calendar
11 today.

12 We will now have consideration
13 of the Calendar. The next order of
14 business is consideration. I note that
15 the bills just reported from committee
16 have been deemed to have had a first
17 reading and they will be placed on the
18 Second Reading and Final Passage Calendar
19 for our next session of Council.

20 As there are no additional
21 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
22 Chair now recognizes Councilman Jones for
23 the purpose of calling up bills and

19 left. If you've already done so, your

20 name will be called.

21 These are the guidelines

22 associated with the public comment: In

23 the middle of the Council, you will see a

24 table. It has a device on it. There's a

25 light. When that light turns green, it

12 CHIEF CLERK: Elowyn Corby,
13 commenting on 140188.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning.

17 MS. CORBY: Good morning, and
18 thank you for giving me the opportunity
19 to speak with you today. My name is
20 Elowyn Corby and I'm the Global Warming
21 and Clean Energy Associate of Penn
22 Environment. We're a statewide
23 citizen-based environmental group.

24 First, I want to thank
25 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for her

2 leadership in helping to create a vision
3 of Philadelphia as a solar leader.
4 Imagine walking around your neighborhood
5 and seeing solar panels on the roofs of
6 buildings, homes, and offices. Imagine
7 clean energy powering our community and
8 creating clean jobs here at home. That's
9 what this resolution is about.

10 Philadelphia is the fifth
11 largest city in the United States, and we
12 receive over 200 days of sun each year.
13 Unfortunately, these resources have been
14 vastly underutilized, and the City is
15 still reliant on burning fossil fuels for
16 our energy. This contributes to global
17 warming, harms our health, and pollutes
18 our air and water.

19 The good news is that
20 Philadelphians are ready to change this,
21 and now is the moment. Nationally, over
22 the last 18 months, more solar has been
23 added -- solar capacity has been added
24 than in the past 30 years combined. We
25 have the technology and the public will,

2 and that's why the goal of 20,000 solar
3 roofs within Philadelphia is both
4 achievable and ambitious.

5 Last week when this resolution
6 was introduced, I asked our members
7 within the City of Philadelphia to add
8 their names to a petition in support of
9 20,000 solar roofs by 2025, and one week
10 later I'm honored to show over 850
11 signatures from Philadelphians who are
12 standing behind this goal. We are ready
13 to unite our community behind the vision
14 for a cleaner future.

15 I urge City Council to pass
16 this resolution making Philadelphia a
17 solar leader.

18 Thank you, and I look forward
19 to working closely with all of you to
20 implement policies that will allow
21 Philadelphia to both meet and exceed this
22 goal.

23 Thank you.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you for your testimony.

1 3/20/14 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 CHIEF CLERK: Brandon Evans,
3 commenting on 130908-A.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MR. EVANS: Good afternoon.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 afternoon.

8 MR. EVANS: I'm Brandon Evans.

9 I'm from Unite Here, the hospitality
10 workers union.

11 We would encourage Council to
12 pass the zoning bill.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you so much for your testimony.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Matt Walker,
17 commenting on 140188.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
20 morning.

21 MR. WALKER: Good morning. My
22 name is Matt Walker and I'm the Community
23 Outreach Director with Clean Air Council.

24 For more than 40 years, the
25 Council has fought to improve air quality

2 across the region. The Council's mission
3 is to protect everyone's right to breathe
4 clean air. The Clean Air Council thanks
5 all Philadelphia City Councilmembers that
6 support the vision for solar energy in
7 the City laid out in Resolution 140188.

8 Clean Air Council has been a
9 leader in promoting renewable energy in
10 Pennsylvania since the Council formed
11 Community Energy Incorporated, which
12 brought the first commercial wind farm to
13 Pennsylvania in 1998. Since then, the
14 Council spurred growth in solar energy by
15 signing up customers to purchase 100
16 percent Pennsylvania-produced solar
17 energy. The Council continues to promote
18 renewable energy policies at the local,
19 state, and federal level. Supporting
20 renewable clean energy is crucial in the
21 City where one in four children is
22 diagnosed with asthma and 80 people die
23 every summer from ozone pollution created
24 by electric generation and exacerbated by
25 extreme heat from climate change.

1 3/20/14 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Philadelphia continues to break
3 a number of weather records, including
4 five precipitation and temperature
5 records last summer. Philadelphia's
6 low-income populations feel these weather
7 extremes and the health impacts from air
8 pollution the most, but they could also
9 reap the positive health effects of using
10 more cleaner sources of energy that
11 displace dirtier fossil fuels.

12 If City Council votes to help
13 bring solar energy to Philadelphia, they
14 would spur local well-paying and safe
15 jobs for Philadelphians that cannot be
16 outsourced. Relying on large single
17 sources of power like coal and natural
18 gas fire power plants has created a
19 centralized electric grid, add risks to
20 disasters and potential terrorist
21 attacks. The Federal Energy Regulatory
22 Commission wrote in an internal memo that
23 if a terrorist were to destroy nine
24 interconnection substations and a
25 transformer manufacturer, then the entire

2 United States grid would be down for at
3 least 18 months. A more distributed
4 system, such as one using solar panels,
5 is much more resilient.

6 While a general commitment to
7 solar energy for Philadelphia is a great
8 start, Clean Air Council urges
9 Philadelphia City Council to take more
10 ambitious steps to promote renewable
11 energy and energy efficiency. Clean Air
12 Council urges City Council to view this
13 resolution as only the beginning of
14 Philadelphia's efforts to promote
15 renewable energy. This is going to take
16 real commitment and long-term investment.

17 Despite languishing state
18 policies, Philadelphia can promote solar
19 energy right now. The Council recommends
20 the following policies which would reduce
21 air pollution and protect public health
22 while promoting job growth: implement
23 feed-in tariffs or power purchase
24 agreements to help spur the growth of
25 local renewable energy; develop a

2 property assessed clean energy mechanism;
3 create additional tax abatement policies
4 for new or renovated buildings; increase
5 local solar rebates; purchase additional
6 Pennsylvania-made renewable energy to
7 cover the amount of energy used in the

9 The Council will follow up with
10 members of City Council on these
11 recommendations to ensure that
12 Philadelphia develops a comprehensive
13 package that will demonstrate
14 Philadelphia's commitment to becoming the
15 most sustainable city in the country.

16 I urge City Council to pass
17 Resolution 140188.

18 Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you for your testimony.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Clarc King,
22 commenting on 140188.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

1 3/20/14 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MR. KING: Good morning,
3 Mr. President of the City Council. Thank
4 you. Thank you, Councilmembers. I am
5 here to address Resolution 140188. I am
6 concerned about City Council's adherence
7 to the green ideology. Right now we have
8 100 million Americans living on some sort
9 of federal assisted aid. That is a
10 national security crisis. All economies
11 require that constant increase in energy
12 flux density capacity, producing energy
13 inexpensively.

14 It is my understanding that
15 Philadelphia gets about 90 days of full
16 sun. The science, conclusions, and
17 reasoning in the promotion of solar
18 energy require greater investigation and
19 understanding.

20 Philadelphia has PGW as an
21 energy platform that must expand its
22 operation into science-driven projects,
23 the science of gas, energy generation,
24 the science of water, the hidden elements
25 for energy in sea water. Philadelphia

1 3/20/14 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 can look to the science projects
3 sponsored by the U.S. Department of
4 Energy in the hopes of gaining
5 energy-related contracts, helping to
6 modernize Philadelphia's economy.

7 Thanks so much.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you very much for your testimony.

10 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
11 other speakers on the public comment
12 list, Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Mr. Decker.

15 That concludes our public
16 comment session, and we will now continue
17 with our Calendar.

18 Mr. Decker, can you please read
19 the title of 140183.

20 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

13 Ms. Audrey Johnson Thornton on behalf of
14 the American Women's Heritage Society for
15 her tireless efforts to restore the
16 Historic Belmont Mansion and Underground
17 Railroad Museum located in the Fourth
18 Council District in Philadelphia and
19 proclaiming the banquet facility as the
20 Cornelia Wells Banquet Hall and
21 Conference Center, introduced by
22 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown on behalf of
23 Councilman Jones.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair again recognizes Councilwoman

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes. I

5 (Duly seconded.)

11 Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

17 authorizing City Council's Committee on

18 Global Opportunities and the

19 Creative/Innovative Economy to hold

20 public hearings on the state of the

21 growing technology and innovation

22 community in Philadelphia and the impact

23 on the local economy, introduced by

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 the ayes have it, and that resolution is
16 adopted.

17 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
18 authorizing Council's Committee on Global
19 Opportunities and the Creative/Innovative
20 Economy and Committee on Public Property
21 and Public Works to hold joint hearings
22 to investigate the feasibility of
23 developing a diplomatic area in the City
24 devoted to the promotion of foreign trade
25 and investment, introduced by Councilman

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 Chair again recognizes Councilman Oh.

5 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
7 of the resolution.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
10 been moved and properly seconded.

11 All those in favor?

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
17 resolution is adopted.

18 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
19 other resolutions on the Final Passage
20 Calendar, Mr. President.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 that concludes our Calendar.

24 At this time, are there any
25 speeches on the part of the minority?

4 there any speeches on the part of the
5 majority?

6 I recognize Councilman Jones.

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. Today I introduced a
9 resolution co-sponsored by Councilwoman
10 Brown and signed by every member of this
11 body honoring Ronald P. Jones, the SEPTA
12 officer for his service and bravery in
13 apprehending a violent assailant in the
14 Fairmount Train Station last week. I
15 also introduced a similar resolution
16 honoring a private citizen named Tameka
17 Bates who defended a mother and child on
18 that same subway by the same gentleman
19 threatening to kill passengers for her
20 brave and courageous stance to protect
21 that other rider.

22 I rise today to cite the fact
23 that in 2012 the American public
24 transportation association named SEPTA,
25 the best large transit system in America,

2 even exceeding Denver, who has long been
3 touted as such, beyond getting thousands
4 of riders, commuters from Point A to
5 Point B in the region, we depend on the
6 drivers, the rail operators of the
7 Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation
8 Authority for our wealth and our economy.

9 Our transit system has
10 increased ridership to record levels.
11 Gas has gone up to \$3.61, and transit
12 offers a viable alternative to many
13 people going to work. In FY12, ridership
14 and revenues increased by 1.7 percent due
15 to the increase of people taking
16 advantage of our system. This is due to
17 a healthy relationship between management
18 and labor.

19 We went through a bad winter
20 that threatened retail's bottom line. A
21 potential SEPTA strike would impact us to
22 the tune, according to Econsult, of about
23 \$50 million. That's the impact in the
24 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

25 State Representative Harper

2 introduced House Bill 2109 which calls
3 for mass transit workers to not be able
4 to strike, to not be able to have a work
5 stoppage. Now, whether you support that
6 or not, if you're saying that you support
7 that, we have to have ongoing dialogue,
8 ongoing resolution, and even arbitration.
9 And we've asked members in Council, and
10 thus far we have a vast majority of them
11 willing to sign on and call for SEPTA and
12 TWU to enter into an arbitration to avoid
13 a work stoppage. Now, according to the
14 TWU membership, they'd be willing to do
15 that. We're calling on SEPTA management
16 to also do that.

17 There are 5,348 members that
18 are a part of that local, and many of
19 them are our neighbors, friends, and even
20 in the case of Councilwoman Bass, a
21 sister, and they do the work that we
22 cannot do. They face sometimes grateful
23 ridership and sometimes not so grateful
24 ridership. They face physical threats
25 and abuse. They face people spitting on

2 them and taking advantage of the fact
3 that they are not allowed to strike them,
4 curse them back. The least we can do is
5 get them, like we've done in these
6 Chambers for other members of labor
7 unions, fight for them to have a fair
8 contract and a living wage.

9 What we're doing here and what
10 we've continued to do under your
11 leadership, Mr. President, is fight for
12 the maintenance of the middle class.
13 Whether we are lowering taxes, whether
14 we're raising the minimum wage,
15 Councilman Goode, or whether we're trying
16 to get sick leave passed, whether we're
17 fighting for firemen to get their fair
18 due or municipal workers like 47 and 33,
19 this continues that tradition of
20 maintaining Philadelphia's middle class.

21 Thank you, Mr. President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Mr. Leader.

24 The Chair recognizes

25 Councilwoman Tasco.

2 COUNCILWOMAN TASCO: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. I want to just briefly
4 comment on the incident with the officer
5 from SEPTA, and I want to be very --
6 people not to misinterpret my comments or
7 misunderstand what I'm going to say.

8 I am glad that he is safe. He
9 exercised -- you know, he fought
10 valiantly and certainly did not use his
11 gun, but what the other side of this is
12 that the gentleman who attacked him has
13 mental illness. He's mentally ill. He's
14 bipolar. I'm not saying that's an excuse
15 for him to attack anyone, but our system
16 does not allow or provide for us to place
17 those people in a safe place. They
18 themselves have to admit themselves in a
19 safe place. The laws were changed many
20 years ago. You couldn't commit
21 individuals that might have mental
22 illness into a confinement.

23 We have to look at that,
24 because there are many, many people
25 walking the streets today who have mental

2 illness, and we've got to change the
3 system so that they don't hurt themselves
4 nor do they hurt other people.

5 I have friends with bipolar
6 children. I have a cousin that's
7 bipolar. They may not be to the degree
8 of this gentleman, but we have to deal
9 with the whole issue of mental health and
10 mental illness, and we will be looking at
11 that.

12 I'm glad the officer was not
13 hurt. I thank those people who came to
14 his aid, and certainly a person like the
15 gentleman who made the attack, they're
16 really very, very strong and hard to deal
17 with at that point when they are in that
18 state. So I want to -- I just want to
19 offer that comment about what's happening
20 with our folks who are suffering from
21 mental illness, and many of them are on
22 the street and are homeless.

23 The last thing I'd like to say
24 is that I will remind my colleagues we do
25 have a Finance Committee meeting at 1

2 o'clock today.

3 Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilwoman.

6 The Chair recognizes

7 Councilwoman Bass.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. I just wanted to mention
10 a couple things. Number one, I wanted to
11 echo Councilwoman Tasco and Councilman
12 Jones in that we do have a significant
13 mental health issue here in the City of
14 Philadelphia that at some point we have
15 to figure out how to get ahead of it in a
16 much more aggressive way than we have
17 done, because obviously we don't want to
18 see people get hurt and we need to do
19 something about this sooner rather than
20 later.

21 But over to SEPTA and their
22 contract negotiations, whether it was
23 this particular incident or many of the
24 other incidents. As the Councilman had
25 noted, I have a sister who works for

2 SEPTA for many, many years, and I have
3 spoken about this before, because I don't
4 think that people realize the level of
5 assaults or attacks or threats that
6 drivers and operators face on a regular
7 basis.

8 So I just really wanted to lend
9 my voice to advocate that we not have a
10 strike, that we work together. I'm sure
11 that City Council and the Administration
12 and whoever it takes will be willing to
13 come to the table to make sure that we
14 can avert a strike, because \$50 million
15 in an impact would be devastating to our
16 city right now. We really just can't
17 afford it.

18 SEPTA does a great job. There
19 are a lot of things that we do right, and
20 SEPTA is one of them, and I think that we
21 need to acknowledge that and make sure
22 that we don't have a strike in the coming
23 months.

24 So I just wanted to join my
25 colleague Councilman Jones and thank him
