2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 We're going to start now. We have
7 established a quorum. I'd ask that all
8 guests and visitors please retire behind
9 the rail. If the members will take their
10 seat, we'll get it rolling. Thank you.

11 To give our invocation this
12 morning, the Chair recognizes Bishop
13 Keith W. Reed of Sharon Baptist Church.
14 He is here today as the guest of
15 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell.

16 I would ask all guests and
17 visitors and members to please rise.

18 (Members and guests rise.)

19 BISHOP REED: Let us pray.

20 Gracious God, our father, we
21 come this morning to thank you for this
22 privilege and this opportunity to call on
23 your name.

24 We also thank you for giving us
25 the opportunity to live, move, and have

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2 our being, for this is a day that you've
3 made. You've allowed us to be in it.

4 Father, you told us to come
5 boldly to the throne of grace, that we
6 might find grace and mercy to help us in
7 the time of need. So we need your grace.
8 We need your mercy.

9 And I pray for those that are
10 in this Chamber this morning. I thank
11 you for each and every one of them that
12 are here and that has been elected here,
13 for they are in positions of authority
14 that you have created.

16 crown each and every one of them with
17 wisdom, insight, discernment to represent
18 the concerns of your people so that they
19 may be concerned about who they represent

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2 We pray for our school systems.

3 We pray for the decisions they have to
4 make about that, that you would give them
5 insight and foresight.

6 The many concerns that will lay
7 before them, guide them, Lord. Please
8 direct them to do that which is right for
9 your glory and our good.

10 We ask it in the name that's
11 above every name.

12 Amen.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you so much, Pastor, for those
16 inspiring words. We really appreciate
17 it.

18 Council will be at ease.

19 (Council at ease.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you so much. The next order of
22 business is the approval of the Journal
23 of the meeting of Monday, January the
24 4th, 2016, and the Chair recognizes
25 Councilman Greenlee.

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2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
3 you, Mr. President. I move that the
4 Journal of the meeting of Monday, January
5 4th, 2016 be approved.

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Thank you. It has been moved and
9 properly seconded that the Journal of the
10 meeting of Monday, January 4th, 2016
11 stand approved.

12 All those in favor say aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Those opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 ayes have it, and the Journal is
19 approved.

20 The next order of business is
21 requests for leave of absence, and the
22 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. On behalf of the
25 majority, there are no requests for leave

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2 of absence today.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 Chair thanks the gentleman.

5 The Chair now recognizes
6 Councilman O'Neill.

7 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. On behalf of the
9 republicans, there are no requests for
10 leave of absence.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair thanks the gentleman.

13 At this time, I would like to
14 dispense with the regular order of
15 business and I would like to welcome and
16 thank everyone who has come down and
17 taken time out of their busy day to see
18 their government in action. We really
19 appreciate the fact that you've come
20 down, and we actually hope you enjoy
21 yourself so much that you come back
22 again. So, again, thank you.

23 At this time, the Chair
24 recognizes Councilwoman Sanchez, who will
25 present a resolution on my behalf

6 podium.

7 (Applause.)

8 (Councilmembers and guests
9 approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
11 joining Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez, we
12 have Councilwoman Parker.

13 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Good
14 morning.

15 (Good morning.)

16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: It is a
17 pleasure on behalf of Council President
18 Clarke to present this today. Council
19 President and I agree on many issues
20 regarding housing, but next to housing
21 and the need for housing in the City of
22 Philadelphia, when you talk to the
23 Council President, he'll talk about jobs,
24 jobs, and jobs. And recognizing
25 Community College of Philadelphia in

2 particular is very important, because
3 that should be the place where we develop
4 our young college students who can
5 transition into four-year institutions.
6 It is the place where people get
7 retrained. It is the place that we
8 expect to help us as we build this pre-K
9 model in the City that we're going to be
10 adopting. It is the place people should
11 be able to come and prepare the returning
12 citizens and others. And for me,
13 Community College of Philadelphia is
14 hugely important as we really try to
15 combat our poverty and prepare folks to
16 become self-sufficient.

17 It is a pleasure always to work
18 with Lynette Brown-Sow, who is a staple
19 here and is a guiding force at Community
20 College, and to welcome Dr. Generals.
21 Although he's been here for quite a
22 while, I'm not sure he's come before
23 Council before in this way. To welcome
24 Dr. Generals, who from day one understood
25 the value of the diversity and the issues

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2 that are impacting the Community College
3 community.

4 So with that, honoring,
5 recognizing and celebrating the 50th
6 Anniversary of Community College of
7 Philadelphia.

8 Whereas, for 50 years Community
9 College of Philadelphia has been
10 contributing towards the betterment of
11 citizens throughout this City by
12 providing exceptional educational
13 opportunities to its residents; and

14 Whereas, on September 23rd,
15 1965, Community College of Philadelphia
16 first opened its doors to 1,200 students.
17 Since then, it has graduated 54,000
18 students, many of whom would not have
19 been given the opportunity to acquire a
20 higher education degree or certificate;

21 Whereas, today, it serves more
22 than 30,000 students each year at its
23 Main Campus and three Regional Centers
24 and offers more than 70 associate's
25 degree, academic certificate programs;

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2 Whereas, this year, alumni are
3 reaching milestones in the City of
4 Philadelphia and across the world
5 including: the White House Social
6 Secretary Deesha Dyer; Hayward L. Bell,
7 Chief Diversity Officer for Raytheon
8 Company; Dr. Kathleen Heatherington,
9 President of Howard Community College;
10 Luis Torrado, owner of Torrado
11 Construction Company; and Fire
12 Commissioner Derrick Sawyer; and

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And
14 whereas, innovative projects and centers
15 of excellence, such as the Center for
16 Science and Engineering Education, the
17 Center for Male Engagement, the Fox
18 Rothschild Center for Law and Society,
19 the Center for International
20 Understanding and the Reentry Support
21 Project enhance and deepen the learning
22 experience while accessing and
23 strengthening community bonds;

24 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
25 Further resolved, that an engrossed copy

2 of this resolution be presented to
3 Dr. Donald Generals, President of the
4 Community College of Philadelphia, and
5 other members of the staff, faculty, and
6 board of this great institution.

7 Further resolved, that this
8 resolution is a true and correct copy of
9 the original resolution, adopted by the
10 Council of the City of Philadelphia on
11 the 19th day of November 2015, and it's
12 co-sponsored by all members of City
13 Council.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
16 the Chair recognizes Dr. Generals for
17 remarks.

18 DR. GENERALS: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. Thank you, members of
20 City Council. I'm honored to be here on
21 behalf of Community College of
22 Philadelphia and receive as well as
23 celebrate this recognition with regards
24 to our first 50 years.

25 I'd like to recognize the

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2 individuals behind me. They all
3 represent different sectors within the
4 college. We have faculty. We have
5 students, the most important sector. We
6 have administrators and staff. So it is
7 a group effort.

8 And I also want to recognize
9 and acknowledge the thousands of
10 individuals who came before us. We stand
11 on the shoulders of those who believed in
12 the concept of a community college as a
13 transformative institution. So many of
14 you, many of your relatives, many of the
15 people who are in the City of
16 Philadelphia long before I arrived a year
17 and a half ago, which from what I
18 understand by Philadelphia standards is
19 really nothing, those are individuals who
20 understood the importance of a community
21 college, and so they need to be
22 acknowledged and recognized as well.

23 We consider the next 50 years
24 CCP 2.0. We've had, as Councilwoman
25 acknowledged, over 50, actually closer to

2 70,000 students who have graduated.
3 We've had over 600,000 citizens come
4 through the doors. We like to tout the
5 many legendary graduates, as were
6 acknowledged in the resolution, and we
7 think they are important and symbols of
8 the greatness that can be achieved as a
9 result of this education.

10 But I'd like to also recognize
11 and acknowledge the many individuals who
12 are teachers, who are administrators, who
13 work in the Fire Department and the
14 Police Department and may not have the
15 legendary names that some of the
16 individuals who were recognized in the
17 resolution, and they're good citizens,
18 they're out in the community, they're
19 coaching baseball teams, football teams,
20 and these are individuals that we have
21 developed and we have demonstrated
22 through their efforts how we can
23 transform the efforts that need to be
24 transformed in the City.

25 So CCP 2.0, we'll continue what

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2 we do. We do transform lives. We will
3 expand our course offerings to further
4 align ourselves not only with the
5 four-year institutions but especially
6 with the career and technical needs of
7 the City. We think that's an integral
8 part of what we do. I'd like to say that
9 we blend education. So we train, but we
10 also continue to enlighten our citizens
11 and help them to understand how important
12 it is for them not only to acquire really
13 good saleable skills but to also be good
14 citizens in the City of Philadelphia.

15 We are working very closely and
16 very intimately with the public school
17 systems. We think we cannot do our jobs
18 unless we are able to partner with the
19 school systems through our dual
20 enrollment programs and through our
21 special programs, working on an early
22 college program with the public school
23 system. So we believe in the idea that
24 students don't have to wait until they're
25 18 years old to go to college. They can

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2 actually start going to college when
3 they're 15, 16. That's what's happening
4 around the country and that's what we're
5 hoping to do here.

6 I could go on and on and on. A
7 lot was said in the resolution. I'm
8 really grateful for this recognition, and
9 I do speak on behalf of the many
10 individuals who come before us as well as
11 those who work with me on a daily basis.
12 So thank you and have a good season.

13 (Applause.)

19 Thank you very much. At this time, the
20 Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla, who
21 will present a citation recognizing WHY
22 as they present the final season of
23 Downton Abbey. Would Mr. Marrazzo and
24 those accompanying him please join the
25 Councilman at the podium.

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2 (Councilmembers and guests
3 approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
5 joining Councilman Squilla, we have
6 Councilwoman Bass.

7 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Good
8 morning, everyone. This is a great
9 occasion to honor WHY Y and what they do
10 for us, not only here in Philadelphia but
11 for the entire region.

12 The Council of the City of
13 Philadelphia is pleased and proud to join
14 WHY Y as they honor and recognize their
15 final season of Downton Abbey.

16 Whereas, WHY Y has been Greater
17 Philadelphia's leading public media
18 provider, serving Southeastern
19 Pennsylvania, Southern New Jersey and all
20 of Delaware for 60 years. WHY Y takes
21 pride in bringing audiences news when
22 they need it, entertainment when they
23 want it, and education when it counts on
24 television, radio, the web, and in the
25 community. WHY Y TV is the primary PBS

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2 station in the Delaware Valley. WHY Y FM
3 90.9 is the leading public radio station
4 in the region;

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And
6 whereas, Downton Abbey is one of the most
7 watched series ever on WHY Y. Since its
8 debut on PBS in 2011, Downton Abbey has
9 been a runaway hit with fans, enjoyed by
10 people of all ages and demographics.

11 Downton Abbey is now in its sixth and
12 final season, with 59 Emmy nominations,
13 more than any other non-U.S. show in Emmy
14 history. Downton Abbey is one of the
15 most honored series on television; and

16 Whereas, Downton Abbey has won
17 12 Emmy's, 3 Golden Globes, 3 Screen
18 Actor Guild Awards, a Producer's Guild
19 Award, and 3 BAFTAs, as well as a 2015
20 BAFTA Special Award in recognition of the
21 series' outstanding global success.

22 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Therefore,
23 by virtue of this citation, the Council
24 of the City of Philadelphia does hereby
25 join WHY Y to honor and recognize their

2 final season of Downton Abbey. We
3 commend all involved in this momentous
4 occasion, extend sincere respect and
5 admiration from this legislative body.

6 Congratulations.

11 MR. MARRAZZO: Mr. President,
12 ladies and gentlemen of City Council and
13 if I may, Mr. President, also recognize
14 our good friend, the legendary Kenny
15 Gamble and other viewers and listeners of
16 WHYY. We are always honored to represent
17 the more than 7 million people that WHYY
18 reaches every 30 days here in the
19 Delaware Valley. And as the good
20 Councilman suggested, in this very
21 complicated media landscape, there ought
22 to be one media outlet that you can go to
23 for trusted news and information, one
24 place where you can have creative
25 expression with the tuning of a dial and

11 Chamber, it's a particular pleasure to be
12 able to say in a rich diverse community
13 like the City of Philadelphia, there
14 ought to be one thing we all have in
15 common, and that is WHYY.

11 this resolution. And after I prayed on
12 it, I found it.

13 There are 200,000 Muslims in
14 and around the City of Philadelphia.
15 There are over 65 mosques in the City of
16 Philadelphia. Muslim children from K to
17 12 represent approximately 20 percent of
18 the student body.

19 Yet the most compelling reason
20 why we open and introduce this
21 legislation came from a student. I
22 believe she went to Central High School.
23 And she was asked how she felt by the
24 fact that her religious observance, her
25 two holidays that are significant to her

3 and the word that rung in my ear and
4 tattooed on my heart was the word
5 "marginalized," marginalized. And I
6 thought about it and I thought about it,

9 the department store at Wanamaker's with
10 my mother, who was a taxpayer, who was a
11 government worker, who was a solid
12 citizen even with being my mother. She
13 would walk into that store, and
14 immediately her demeanor changed. Her
15 demeanor changed towards me. She would
16 clutch me and my brother close, and it
17 was almost as if she was apologizing for
18 spending her money in that store.

19 As a young person, that was the
20 first time ever I felt marginalized. And
21 I swore after hearing that young lady's
22 voice, that none of our children, none of
23 them, of any race, creed, color or
24 religion, should ever feel marginalized
25 again.

2 I have my grandchildren there,
3 right there. She just waved. Not you,
4 Councilman. And I would do everything
5 legal in my power as a Councilperson to
6 make sure they never ever felt that
7 feeling.

8 We are teachers, auditors,

10 persons, men and women, artists, and many
11 of them have come down here today, and
12 I'd like them to stand and be recognized
13 and, as importantly, be welcomed to the
14 City of Philadelphia in City Hall.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: So I was
17 asked by a good-hearted person, a
18 well-meaning person, they said, Well,
19 Councilman, shouldn't you wait to
20 introduce this with all that's going on
21 in the world. Jason Dawkins is a State
22 Representative, and he heard some of
23 these conversations. Shouldn't you wait
24 because of the international friction
25 between religions and governments? And

3 even here in the City of Brotherly Love?
4 And I said to myself and I thought on it

10 boogeymen, because we come in different
11 shapes, sizes, colors, heights, some of
12 them are republicans, but what is most
13 important is that they are citizens and
14 they are taxpayers and that this city was
15 founded on religious tolerance. William
16 Penn came here fleeing religious
17 persecution and established a beachhead
18 of freedom. I think this resolution
19 speaks to that.

20 We always don't get it right
21 here in this country, but we keep coming
22 back at it until we do. And for those
23 reasons, I submit this resolution today,

18 Thank you very much.

19 That completes our Calendar for

21 Are there any speeches on the

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman

24 Oh.

25 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very

2 much, Council President. I just wanted
3 to notify my Council colleagues and the
4 public that yesterday we had a press
5 conference at Hyundai Rotem in South
6 Philadelphia. Hyundai Rotem is a train
7 manufacturer that was established in our
8 city 12 years ago. Councilman Curtis
9 Jones had a role in that, and he was
10 there yesterday, as was Councilman Mark
11 Squilla, the District Councilman, and
12 Councilman at-large Al Taubenberger.

13 I want to thank Governor Ed
14 Rendell, who is the Co-Chair of
15 Rebuilding America's Future, and
16 Congressman Chaka Fattah for coming to
17 the press conference, because what is at
18 stake are between 250 and 300 good-paying
19 union jobs, and these jobs are
20 family-sustaining jobs in manufacturing.
21 They are very good jobs, especially for
22 those who don't have a college degree.
23 And 20 percent of that workforce are
24 returning citizens or ex-offenders. This
25 is a place where people can get a brand

2 new start. That's the great thing about
3 manufacturing. I'll point out that
4 Councilman Bobby Henon has a
5 Manufacturer's Task Force, and he has
6 been a champion of that issue.

7 However, what is at stake is
8 from 350 employees, the facility now has
9 only 70 employees, but that facility at
10 its height of 350 employees supports
11 5,000 other workers in small businesses
12 supporting the transportation industry.
13 Philadelphia is proud and fortunate to
14 have an international high speed train
15 manufacturing company. What we have done
16 is, we have passed a resolution on June
17 18th of last year, this Council body,
18 recommending to SEPTA that they implement
19 local hiring preferences, allowed by the
20 federal government, in its RFP. It is
21 important for our city because our city
22 not only needs the employment and the
23 branding and the global competitiveness
24 that this train manufacturer brings, but
25 it is also a city unfortunately that has

2 high taxes and great needs.

3 The last contract that they
4 filled distributed \$180 million to
5 vendors in and around Philadelphia -
6 salaries, wage tax, sales tax, real
7 estate tax, money for our schools as
8 well.

9 I would like to urge SEPTA to
10 implement local hiring preferences, as
11 allowed by the federal government. To
12 date, I'm only aware that Los Angeles
13 County Transportation Authority has
14 implemented these hiring preferences.

15 An RFP for 55 cars worth \$140
16 million is outstanding, and SEPTA will
17 make its choice one way or the other.
18 However, if we had implemented; that is,
19 SEPTA, implemented local hiring
20 preferences, it would certainly give an
21 edge, an important and necessary edge, to
22 the Philadelphia-based train
23 manufacturer, because if that train
24 manufacturer closes, it would be, I
25 think, disastrous for our city and I

2 think it would be a huge embarrassment
3 for the world to know that our train
4 manufacturer closed because we went to
5 another state to purchase our trains.

6 So I'm going to ask my Council
7 colleagues to sign the letter Councilman
8 Squilla and I have talked about to SEPTA
9 to urge them to implement local hiring
10 preferences.

11 Thank you very much.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Councilman, question. Is it too late to
17 have that language included in the RFP?

18 COUNCILMAN OH: It is too late.

19 That is the first phase of the RFP.

20 There are some other phases coming, but I
21 will say that I'm disappointed that we as
22 a body, when that law came out, when that
23 opportunity came out on March 6th, 2015,
24 we learned about it, we introduced it, we
25 passed it, this body did, to help our

2 city, our workers, our schools, our
3 economy, and to my knowledge, it has not
4 been made part of the largest portion of
5 this contract.

6 There are other portions
7 coming, but I will say that that \$30
8 million investment is at risk and, quite
9 frankly, they now have three other
10 facilities in the United States. They
11 opened here in the City of Philadelphia,
12 and if they close, that would be a big
13 problem I think for us.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Right. All right, Councilman. Thank
16 you. We will certainly follow up on
17 that.

18 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair recognizes Councilwoman
21 Quinones-Sanchez.

22 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
23 you, Mr. President. This morning I feel
24 encouraged. I feel encouraged with the
25 spirit in which our new freshmen have

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2 come into this Council. I want to
3 welcome them all, particularly my mate
4 here next door. He is the second Green
5 to sit in that seat, although I will warn
6 the press that he will not be as
7 entertaining as the last Green, although
8 he will be very thoughtful.

9 But it is really important that
10 some of the thoughtful legislation that
11 was introduced this morning was done so
12 in a collaborative spirit, whether we're
13 talking about education and Councilwoman
14 Gym and Blackwell getting on that very
15 quickly, to the other member of the Tasco
16 Council caucus, Councilwoman Parker,
17 working with Blondell on the Rule for Two
18 for the jobs. I appreciate Councilman
19 Oh's interest in the heroin addiction,
20 and I know this is something he
21 reintroduced from last year. Councilman
22 Domb in the summer hit the ground running
23 and has visited my district and has seen
24 firsthand the impact of what this
25 national heroin addiction is doing to

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2 neighborhoods like the ones I serve.

3 And I particularly want to
4 thank Councilman Jones for his courage
5 and the recognition of the growing and
6 the significant value that the Muslim
7 community brings to the City of
8 Philadelphia. I have a very important
9 mosque in my district whose members are
10 the business owners and have done
11 tremendous things in the community, and
12 that recognition is long due, and I
13 welcome that conversation about how do we
14 ensure that we are being open to the
15 diversity and recognizing people's space
16 and personal religion and culture. And I
17 look forward to working with my new
18 colleagues.

19 I'm reminded that Harrisburg
20 still has not acted. I'm very concerned
21 around the situation with our schools, as
22 has been highlighted by Councilman Green
23 around the tragedy that happened, and the
24 fact that despite the 400 million plus
25 dollars that this legislative body has

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2 brought to the table over the last four
3 years, it is not enough. And I hope that
4 we continue to be very laser focused on
5 the need so that no one puts their lives
6 in danger, as was the case of this
7 courageous building engineer. And that I
8 remind us that a few years ago when we
9 talked about school closures, we talked
10 about really, really bad buildings, many
11 buildings built in the 1900's. Just this
12 holiday season, I went to Sheppard
13 Elementary School where the 25th Police
14 District celebrated with us, second
15 holiday event, and we were in a small
16 room that serves as the gym, the
17 lunchroom, the library, the auditorium in
18 a building that was built in 1908 and
19 requires millions of dollars in
20 renovations, and that due to these
21 funding challenges, we keep putting folks
22 in harm's way, and I think we need to be
23 more deliberate about making sure that
24 our kids are not only in physically safe
25 buildings, but that we're able to meet

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2 basic needs, let alone the academic
3 opportunities that they all deserve.

4 So I'm encouraged.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilwoman. And so am I.

8 The Chair recognizes Councilman
9 Green.

10 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. I really thought this was
12 going to be my first and possibly last
13 Council session as a member, because I
14 knew I was going to win the Powerball.

15 But I just really want to say
16 briefly I'm very humbled to be even able
17 to sit in this seat, because there's been
18 a lot of people that's been able to help
19 me get here, from my former boss and
20 mentor, Councilwoman Tasco, and a number
21 of people that have helped support me.
22 But District Council President Pete
23 Matthews often says that the City works
24 because we do. And City Council works
25 because the staff does. And I really

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2 just want to thank the staff for all
3 their years of work, for those who have
4 helped me in this transition, because
5 they really work very hard for the City
6 of Philadelphia and do a tremendous job
7 for the City and often not appreciated
8 and sometimes underpaid, but they do a
9 great job. So thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: As a
14 former staffer, I concur.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Second.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Right.

18 The Chair recognizes

19 Councilwoman Gym.

20 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you so
21 much, Mr. President. I just want to add
22 my voice to the mix about how proud I am
23 to be a part of this body. I want to
24 reinforce what Councilwoman Sanchez said
25 about the collaborative spirit that has

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2 certainly welcomed me from all quarters
3 of Council, and I'm incredibly grateful
4 for that. And in particular, I think
5 that as we embark on this new legislative
6 session and we witness sort of the
7 partisan bickering and division that
8 exists in our state and national
9 politics, it's really amazing and
10 important for me to be part of a body
11 that works together to support our city,
12 where we set and come together to make
13 sure that we work for the good of the
14 constituents that we serve. And we do
15 face a lot of challenges ahead, not the
16 least of which is the School District,
17 and that we have a Harrisburg that is
18 seven, eight months into not passing a
19 budget and we may have a Governor who
20 might have to look at an extended budget
21 to make up for this.

22 But nonetheless, as we rustle
23 through some of these more difficult
24 circumstances, I just want to emphasize
25 that despite all those difficulties,

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2 right now it is my belief that City
3 Council is the most effective elected
4 body in this state. It's sure not
5 Harrisburg. And that's why I ran for
6 City Council. That's why I'm looking
7 forward to being together with all of my
8 colleagues and looking forward to
9 modeling what it looks like when we, the
10 electeds, are held accountable to the
11 public we serve.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilwoman.

15 The Chair recognizes

16 Councilwoman Blackwell.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
18 you. We've heard some of our new members
19 speak, and we certainly look forward to
20 working with them, and as one of the
21 oldest -- in experience -- people and
22 member of this body, we say, all of us
23 who are here, look forward to the entire
24 body working well together to improve the
25 lives of all in our city.

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2 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilwoman.

5 The Chair recognizes

6 Councilwoman Parker.

7 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

8 you, Mr. President. You know, I had not

9 prepared to make any comments today, but

10 when I hear about the opinions being

11 expressed about a body in which I just

12 happen to spend ten years serving in and

13 unfortunately during the midst of this

14 transition did not have the opportunity

15 to actually transition right, because up

16 until January the 3rd at 11:59 p.m., I

17 was still a member of the Pennsylvania

18 House of Representatives and recently

19 resigned as Chair of the Philadelphia

20 Delegation. But I wanted to be very

21 clear in sending a message to members of

22 the Philadelphia Delegation and

23 republican members on the other side of

24 the aisle, along with the Democratic

25 Caucus, that while local governments

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2 across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
3 and school districts across the
4 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania are
5 suffering as a result of the inaction of
6 Harrisburg, I want to be very clear that
7 our goal is to see them come together and
8 to work together. And because I was a
9 part of that body, I never want those
10 members who represent Philadelphia to
11 think that we don't believe they're
12 working. We happen to have one who was
13 here a little earlier, Representative
14 Dawkins. We know they are working hard
15 to achieve much-needed bipartisan
16 compromise. And I will tell you from my
17 days of sitting there that the way to
18 achieve compromise is to not sort of
19 constantly point fingers to identify what
20 is sort of always wrong but try to find a
21 way to bring both sides to the middle.

22 In addition to that, I have to
23 give a shout-out to Masjidullah, who is
24 here, who is one of the largest mosques
25 in the City of Philadelphia, and it

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2 happens to be in the heart of the 9th
3 Councilmanic District. So, Councilman
4 Jones, thank you so very much for your
5 leadership. And again to my colleagues
6 in Harrisburg on both sides of the aisle,
7 specifically to the republicans, we want
8 you to come together and work together to
9 get something accomplished.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilwoman.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
15 the Chair again recognizes Councilman Oh.

16 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
17 much, Council President. I rethought my
18 answer and I wanted to be a little more
19 clear about the answer.

20 The RFP is out and is due back
21 in February, the end of February. It may
22 be possible legally to discontinue the
23 RFP, because no favoritism has been
24 shown, and reissue the RFP with a local
25 hiring and investment preference. LA

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2 opens it up. Anyone can bid on it, but
3 what they require is that you show
4 voluntarily, if you want, that you have a
5 program of employing persons who need
6 work, local persons within the geographic
7 area, and that you're going to put in a
8 certain amount of investment dollars into
9 the infrastructure, the company, whatnot,
10 of Los Angeles County. That could be
11 added and the RFP could be reissued. And
12 while they did that, they sought the
13 approval of the U.S. Department of
14 Transportation. So they were successful
15 that way.

16 And so to speak more exactly, I
17 believe while it may not happen, that it
18 is possible, it is possible that the RFP
19 could be reissued.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Okay. Thank you, Councilman. Thank you
23 for that clarity.

24 There being no additional
25 speeches, the Chair recognizes
