6 society.

4 grow in goodness and wisdom. Let us always
5 cherish our freedom and know the essence of
6 our common human form.

7 Grant that we as citizens understand
8 better our brothers and sisters in the
9 neighborhoods and around the world, and
10 reject unsuitable racism for human society
11 of brotherhood and peace.

12 Bless us as citizens to live up to the
13 noble name of the City, the City of
14 Brotherly Love and Sisterly Affection.
15 Bless us in this City of neighborhoods to
16 return the neighbor back to the hood.

17 Bless us to establish our City as a city
18 of safety and security for all the citizens.
19 Bless our City workers, both those in
20 uniform and those out of uniform. Bless our
21 schools and our homes.

22 Bless us that all citizens and
23 government together, those of great means
24 and small means, to appreciate more our City

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1 and our common life together.

2 Bless the parents. Bless our troubled
3 youth. Bless our schools, our burdened
4 neighborhoods to never be without hope or
5 directions. Bless us as neighbors to keep
6 to the best of our ways. Bless us to
7 cherish more the pride of industry and
8 self-reliance.

9 Bless the efforts of this Council and
10 all other efforts as we move forward for
11 more opportunity, more jobs, more human life
12 in this great City for all of us.

13 Bless marriage and family life here and
14 throughout the world. Bless us to
15 understand the great time in which we live,
16 the time of the human being.

17 Increase for the Council President and
18 for every member of this Council and for the
19 leaders of this City the essence of the
20 human spirit, the essence of the intellect
21 of statesmen so that they may build a better
22 world for us all.

23 Amen.

24 With that, I now close. Thank you very

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1 much.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you so
3 much, Imam, for those inspiring words.

4 Council be at ease.

5 (Council at ease.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
7 very much. Thank you. Quiet please.

8 Thank you all very much.

9 The next order of business is the
10 approval of the Journal of the meeting on
11 Thursday, January 21, 2016. And the Chair
12 recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I move that the Journal of
15 the meeting of Thursday, January 21, 2016 be
16 approved.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
19 It has been moved and properly seconded that
20 the Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
21 January 21, 2016 stand approved.

22 All those in favor say aye.

23 (Ayes.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those

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1 opposed?

2 (No response.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.

4 And the Journal is approved.

5 Next order of business is request for
6 leaves of absence. And the Chair recognizes
7 Councilman Henon.

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
9 Mr. President.

10 On behalf of the majority, there are no
11 request for leaves of absence.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair thanks
13 the gentleman.

14 Chair recognizes, Councilman O'Neill.

15 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
16 Mr. President. On behalf of the
17 republicans, there are no requests for leave
18 of absences.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair, thanks
20 the gentlemen.

21 At this time, I would like to dispense
22 with the regular order of business. And I
23 would like to thank everyone who has come
24 down and taken time out of your busy day to

1 come down and witness your government in
2 action. We really appreciate the fact that
3 you come to see democracy in action. We
4 hope you actually enjoy yourself so much
5 that you come back again. So again, thank
6 you all for coming down.

7 At this time, the Chair recognizes
8 Councilman Squilla who will present a
9 resolution on my behalf recognizing Patrick
10 Cain, Sr. Would Patrick Cain, Sr. and those
11 accompanying him please come up to the
12 podium.

13 (Councilmembers and guests approach the
14 podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And joining
16 Councilman Squilla, we have Councilwoman
17 Quinones-Sanchez and Councilman Greenlee.

18 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Good morning,
19 everyone. And this resolution is important,
20 honoring the partnerships that we have with
21 communities and what they mean to the growth
22 of our City and the effort and the
23 volunteerism that goes a long way to making
24 our City such a great place. And today we

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1 are honoring and recognizing and
2 congratulating Patrick Cain, Sr. for over 40
3 years of service to the Fishtown Athletic
4 Club and the Greater Fishtown and Riverward
5 community.

6 Whereas, Patrick Cain, Sr., Pat, as the
7 in-house director of the Fishtown Athletic
8 Club located in the Shissler Recreation
9 Center at 1800 Blair Street. Since the
10 club's inception, it has organized children
11 in the Fishtown neighborhood to compete in
12 baseball, basketball, softball and soccer
13 leagues currently serving kids ages from 3
14 to 17.

15 Whereas, Pat is also known for running
16 "We Care Soccer Camp," a week long camp that
17 takes place every summer where children gaes
18 3 to 11 can learn different soccer skills.
19 The campers play on "Stan the Cut Man
20 Field," a 2800-square-foot artificial turf
21 field named in memory of Stanley Maleski --
22 Maliszewski. Sorry about that, Stanley --
23 the Fishtown firefighter who helped start
24 the camp with Pat; and

1 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Whereas,
2 Pat, our neighborhood hero, led the
3 initiative to create a complex discovering a
4 way to fund the project by selling
5 personalized bricks to residents that line
6 the outside of the field; and

7 Whereas, the project also includes a new
8 dog park and a passive park area which will
9 provide residents with benches, trees,
10 walking paths for the community to enjoy;
11 and

12 Whereas, beginning in 1994, the camp
13 encouraged kids in the Riverwards to play to
14 their fullest potential. Each camper
15 receives a free breakfast and lunch daily
16 along with a T-shirt, soccer ball and a bag
17 that are either donated or bought from the
18 funds raised by the community; and

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas, besides
20 soccer, Pat teaches the attendees of the
21 camp life skills and the importance of
22 giving back to your community. Once a child
23 turns 12, they are eligible to come back and
24 help coach the younger campers for the next

1 few years; and

2 Whereas, "We Care Soccer Camp" is a
3 legacy that Pat is passing down to younger
4 generations of Fishtowners and Riverward
5 residents.

6 Now therefore be it resolved, by the
7 Council of the City of Philadelphia, that we
8 hereby honor, recognize and congratulate
9 Patrick Cain, Sr. for over 40 years of
10 service to the Fishtown Athletic Club and
11 the Greater Fishtown and Riverward
12 communities.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
15 recognizes Mr. Cain for remarks.

16 MR. CAIN: I thank you for this award
17 today because this is something. What I do
18 is for the kids in the community. I've been
19 doing it since back in 1963 over at Hancock
20 Playground started, so I thank everybody.

21 I thank the Councilman and everybody
22 here today. And these are all the people --
23 are my family and things. And I thank you.
24 Thank you.

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1 (Applause.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Council be at
3 ease.

4 (Council at ease.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you so
6 much.

7 The next order of business is
8 community -- oh, before I say that, I would
9 like to ask if anyone has a cell phone or
10 any type of electronic device that makes
11 noise, I ask that you please turn it, I
12 guess, on Airplane Mode or whatever that is.
13 Bottom line, please turn it off so it
14 doesn't ring while we're in the Council
15 Session. Thank you so such.

16 At this time, the Chair requests that
17 the Sergeant-of-Arms delivers the messages
18 from the Mayor to the Chief Clerk.

19 Mr. Decker, would you please read those
20 messages from the Mayor.

21 CHIEF CLERK: To the President and
22 Members of the Council of the City of
23 Philadelphia, I am transmitting for the
24 consideration of your honorable body a

1 resolution authorizing the Philadelphia
2 Redevelopment Authority to dispose of
3 certain properties located in the 2nd
4 Councilmanic District that will be
5 transferred by the City to the Authority by
6 conveyance of such properties to the
7 Philadelphia Land Bank in accordance and
8 terms of Chapter 16-700 of the Philadelphia
9 Code, all under certain terms and
10 conditions.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
12 Mr. Decker.

13 Do you have any additional
14 communications?

15 CHIEF CLERK: I have none,
16 Mr. President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
18 sir. The next order of business, is the
19 introduction of bills and resolutions.

20 And the Chair recognizes Councilwoman
21 Reynolds Brown.

22 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Good
23 morning, Mr. President. I offer one
24 resolution this morning co-sponsored by

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1 Councilwoman Gym.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
3 Councilwoman.

4 CHIEF CLERK: A privilege resolution
5 authorizing the Committee on Education to
6 conduct public hearings to examine the
7 Philadelphia School Reform Commission's
8 approval process as it pertains to the
9 composition, qualifications and diversity of
10 a charter school applicant's board of
11 trustees.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That will be
13 on next week's final passage calendar.

14 And the Chair recognizes Councilwoman
15 Blackwell.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. Today I introduce one
18 resolution that is co-sponsored
19 non-privileged by Helen Gym, Kenyatta
20 Johnson, Derek Green, Allan Domb, Cindy
21 Bass, Blondie Reynolds -- Blondell Reynolds
22 Brown, sorry, and then signed by the other
23 Members of Council.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,

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1 Councilwoman.

2 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution
3 authorizing the joint City Council
4 Committees on Education and Housing
5 Neighborhood Development and the Homeless to
6 hold public hearings to examine the
7 feasibility of having a pilot program in
8 Philadelphia to feed needy children when
9 schools are closed due to emergencies.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That will be
11 on this week's Final Passage Calendar.

12 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. On your behalf, I offer
15 three bills and two resolutions.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
17 Councilman.

18 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance authorizing
19 Roland Kaasis to install, own and maintain
20 an open-air sidewalk cafe at 1204 Frankford
21 Avenue; and

22 An ordinance amending Chapter 9-1100 of
23 The Philadelphia Code, entitled "Fair
24 Practices Ordinance: Protections against

1 Unlawful Discrimination," by adding a
2 section prohibiting employers from obtaining
3 or using credit-related information
4 regarding employees and job applicants in
5 certain circumstances; and

6 An ordinance amending Title 14 of The
7 Philadelphia Code entitled, "Zoning and
8 Planning," by adding a new subsection
9 entitled, "Rittenhouse Square Residential
10 Area and making related changes."

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those bills
12 will be referred to the appropriate
13 committee.

14 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
15 resolution recognizing and declaring
16 February 9, 2016 as "Connections for
17 Cardiovascular Health Awareness Day,"
18 encouraging citizens to promote
19 cardiovascular health.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will
21 be on this week's Final Passage Calendar.

22 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged
23 resolution authorizing the Commissioner of
24 Public Property to execute and deliver to

1 the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority
2 without consideration, deeds conveying
3 conditional fee simple title to certain
4 City-owned lot or pieces of ground with the
5 building and improvements thereon, situated
6 in the 37th and 43rd Wards of the City of
7 Philadelphia.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will
9 be on next week's Final Passage Calendar.

10 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you, Council
12 President. I have two bills on your behalf.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
14 Councilman.

15 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance amending
16 Title 22 of The Philadelphia Code entitled,
17 "Public Employees Retirement Code," by
18 amending Section 22-301 entitled, "Service
19 Retirement Benefits," and Section 22-401
20 entitled, "Service-Connected Disability
21 Retirement Benefits," to add new subsections
22 requiring a specified minimum monthly
23 benefit amount for certain retired Police
24 employee members.

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1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That bill
2 will be referred to the appropriate
3 committee.

4 CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance amending
5 Title 4 of The Philadelphia Code entitled,
6 "The Philadelphia Building Construction and
7 Occupancy Code," by amending Subcode A (The
8 Philadelphia Administrative Code) providing
9 for the posting and public notice of the
10 demolition of structures and making related
11 changes.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That bill
13 will also be referred to the appropriate
14 committee.

15 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Good morning,
17 Mr. President. No bills or resolutions
18 today.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
20 Councilman.

21 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good morning,
23 Council President. I have two privileged
24 resolutions and three non-privileged

1 resolutions. And the three non-privileged
2 resolutions are signed by all Members of
3 Council.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
5 Councilman.

6 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: You're welcome.

7 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution
8 authorizing the Philadelphia City Council
9 Committee on Education and the Philadelphia
10 City Council Committee on Children and Youth
11 to hold joint hearings examining recent
12 instances of school bus lateness in the
13 School District of Philadelphia and the
14 detrimental effects school bus lateness has
15 on students.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's
17 Final Passage Calendar.

18 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
19 resolution authorizing the Philadelphia
20 Council Committee on Public Safety to hold
21 hearings regarding the establishment of a
22 comprehensive strategy for reducing
23 eliminating youth gun violence.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Also, in this

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1 week's Final Passage Calendar.

2 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged
3 resolution calling on the United States
4 Department of Justice to conduct a complete
5 and thorough investigation of the water
6 supply disaster in Flint, Michigan that may
7 have exposed 99,763 people to lead
8 poisoning.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That will be
10 on next week's Final Passage Calendar.

11 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged
12 resolution authorizing the Philadelphia
13 Redevelopment Authority to dispose of
14 certain properties located in the 2nd
15 Councilmanic District that will be
16 transferred by the City to the Authority by
17 conveyance of such properties and to the
18 Philadelphia Land Bank in accordance with
19 terms of Chapter 16-700 of The Philadelphia
20 Code.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That will be
22 on next week's Final Passage Calendar.

23 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged
24 resolution authorizing the Commissioner of

1 Public Property to execute and deliver to
2 the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority,
3 without consideration, deeds conveying
4 conditional fee simple title to certain
5 City-owned lot or pieces of ground with the
6 building and improvements thereon, located
7 in the Thirty-sixth Ward of the City of
8 Philadelphia.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will
10 also be in next week's Final Passage
11 Calendar.

12 Chair recognizes Councilwoman
13 Quinones-Sanchez.

14 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Thank
15 you, Council President. I have a
16 resolution -- privileged resolution
17 co-sponsored by Councilman Gym, Blackwell
18 and Bass.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
20 Councilwoman.

21 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged
22 resolution urging the President of the
23 United States to establish a comprehensive
24 national policy regarding our undocumented

1 immigrants that seeks to preserve and
2 protect families that have fled to this
3 country from situations of widespread
4 violence and depravation. And to also
5 prevent future deportation raids that tear
6 apart our communities.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That will be
8 on next week's Final Passage Calendar.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

10 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you, Council
11 President. I have one privileged resolution
12 co-sponsored by Councilmembers Gym, Domb,
13 Jones, Johnson and Brown.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
15 Councilman.

16 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution
17 honoring, recognizing and celebrating the
18 30th Black Engineers of the Year awards STEM
19 Conference.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That will be
21 on this week's Final Passage Calendar.

22 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. I have no bills or

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1 resolutions for introduction today.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
3 Councilwoman.

4 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

5 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I offer one privileged
7 resolution co-sponsored by you and all
8 Members of Council. And I would like to
9 request the opportunity to speak on this
10 resolution prior to the motion for adoption.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
12 Councilman.

13 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution
14 recognizing January 29, 2016 as "Earned
15 Income Tax Credit, EITC Awareness Day," in
16 Philadelphia.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
18 recognizes Councilman Domb.

19 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Speak now?

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes, please.

21 COUNCILMAN DOMB: I would like to take a
22 moment to thank my colleagues and encourage
23 their support as together we must continue
24 to work to raise awareness for the earned

1 income tax credit. Also want to acknowledge
2 the City's Revenue Department, Urban Affairs
3 Coalition, Campaign for Working Families for
4 all their efforts involving the earned
5 income tax credit. It's commonly held
6 position that the best way to lift the
7 working poor out of poverty is the expansion
8 of the earned income tax credit.

9 Philadelphia's poverty rate stands
10 around 26 percent. And it's been stubbornly
11 above 20 percent for decades. Philadelphia
12 has the highest poverty rate of any major
13 city in America, and that is just
14 unacceptable for us. We must work together
15 as a body and with the Administration and
16 with our external partners to address this
17 very important issue. And what we as a
18 government, especially at the local level
19 and as fellow citizens can do today is
20 better promote this incentive to our
21 neighbors.

22 Here are the facts. 40,000 eligible
23 Philadelphians do not apply, and that leaves
24 approximately \$100 million on the table in

1 Washington, DC. Average refunds, 2,400.
2 The maximum refund is 6,000. You can also
3 file back three years. This is real money.
4 The deadline to file this year is April 18,
5 2016. It's the serious money that people
6 are owed. It's never received for the
7 simple reason that it just never applied.

8 This money could help many families and
9 could go towards stimulating Philadelphia's
10 overall economy. I've heard from citizens
11 and experts that some barriers have caused a
12 lack of participation. And we will work
13 with all stakeholders to address them. We
14 must raise awareness, discredit
15 misinformation, increase access to resources
16 and expand and diversity communication in
17 marketing.

18 To learn more about resources available,
19 please contact the City's Revenue Department
20 or my council office or any council office.
21 And lastly, I want to remind our business
22 community of its existing obligation to
23 inform all employees of the earned income
24 tax credit. Let's work together.

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1 And with that said, Mr. President, I
2 move for the adoption of the resolution.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Councilman,
5 that's -- thank you. That's actually going
6 to be on -- little later on in the agenda.
7 We will make your motion at the time.

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Okay.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: But that will
10 be on this week's Final Passage Calendar. I
11 will call you for a motion. Thank you,
12 Councilman. Very, very important issue.
13 Leaving a lot of money on the table.

14 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

15 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Good morning, Council
16 President and colleagues. I'd like to
17 introduce one non-privileged resolution and
18 one privileged resolution. I request to
19 speak briefly on the non-privileged
20 resolution.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
22 Councilwoman.

23 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution
24 proclaiming, recognizing, honoring and

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1 observing February 1 through 5, 2016 as
2 "National School Counseling Week" in the
3 City of Philadelphia.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That will be
5 on this week's Final Passage Calendar.

6 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
7 resolution authorizing the Committee on
8 Children and Youth and the Committee on
9 Public Health and Human Services to conduct
10 hearings concerning best practices followed
11 by the Philadelphia Water Department as well
12 as additional measures to prevent lead
13 exposure due to household water service
14 lines.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
16 That will be on this week's Final Passage.

17 Councilwoman, you wanted to speak --

18 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Just at the top of
19 the vote.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

21 Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Taubenberger.

23 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank you,
24 Council President and colleagues. I have no

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1 bills or resolutions today. Thank you.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
3 Councilman.

4 Chair recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

5 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I have no bills or
7 resolutions.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
9 Councilman.

10 Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. No bills or resolutions
13 today.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
15 Councilman.

16 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. No bills or resolutions
19 today.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
21 Councilwoman.

22 And Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

23 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you, Council
24 President. I offer one non-privileged

1 resolution co-sponsored by Councilman Derek
2 Green, Councilwoman Cindy Bass and
3 Councilman Mark Squilla.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
5 Councilman.

6 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged
7 resolution urging the Pennsylvania General
8 Assembly to legislate a state local
9 preference for contracting processes
10 involving entities using state and local
11 government funds.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will
13 be on next week's Final Passage Calendar.

14 That concludes our Introduction of Bills
15 and Resolutions. There are no reports from
16 committee today. So before considering the
17 resolutions that we have for today, we will
18 consider public comment as follows.

19 If there is anyone -- sorry. Pages are
20 sticking together. We will now consider the
21 Calendar. The next order of business is the
22 consideration of the Calendar.

23 There being no bills on the First
24 Reading Calendar, Chair recognizes

1 Councilman Henon for the purpose of calling
2 on bills on the Second Reading and Final
3 Passage Calendar.

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. The following resolutions
6 are being called up from the Second Reading
7 and Final Passage Calendars today. Bill Nos
8 160034, 160039, 160043, 160048, 160050 and
9 160058. All other resolutions are being
10 held.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
12 very much, Councilman. Now before
13 considering the bills and resolutions that
14 we have on our Final Passage Calendar today,
15 we will have our public comment section.

16 Public comment section will go as
17 follows:

18 If we have a bill or resolution on the
19 calendar today that you are prepared to
20 speak on, if you have not already done so, I
21 would ask that you sign at the table to my
22 left. When your name is called, you will go
23 to the podium in the middle of the Council
24 session.

1 There is a device on that podium. There
2 is a light. When the light turns green, it
3 will be your time to speak. When the light
4 turns yellow, you will have 30 seconds to
5 conclude your remarks. And when the light
6 turns red, we'd ask that you please adhere
7 to the guidelines and conclude your remarks.
8 You will be given three minutes to testify.

9 Mr. Decker, would you please call the
10 first name.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Sharmain Matlock-Turner
12 commenting on Councilman Domb's EITC Day
13 resolution.

14 (Approaches podium.)

15 MS. MATLOCK-TURNER: Thank you very
16 much.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning.

18 MS. MATLOCK-TURNER: Good morning,
19 everyone. My name is Sharmain
20 Matlock-Turner. I'm the President and CEO
21 of the Urban Affairs Coalition. And I'm
22 here to thank Council, Council President
23 Clarke and certainly Councilman Domb and all
24 the Members of Council who are recognizing

1 tomorrow as National Earned Income Tax
2 Credit Day. This is vital work that's being
3 done in our City. And we have a campaign to
4 help us get to making sure that we find
5 those 40,000 families that have not yet
6 filed for the earned income tax credit.

7 For those of you who may remember, we
8 came here in '03 to begin to kick off this
9 campaign. At that point, we had about 200
10 volunteers. And we were able to bring back
11 \$10 billion to the City of Philadelphia. I
12 am proud to say that last year we filed over
13 24,643 returns. And with the help of 528
14 IRS trained volunteers, we brought back more
15 than \$34 million to hard working
16 Philadelphians. And for these almost 25,000
17 Philadelphians, it meant that they had no
18 fees for having their taxes filed. They
19 paid no check cashing fees. It put food on
20 the table, gas for people to go to work,
21 cash spent with local businesses, a savings
22 bond, maybe a first bank account, less debt,
23 more savings and money to go to college.

24 This is a real important program. It is

1 considered one of the most important
2 antipoverty efforts in our country.

3 Again, I want to thank Council very much
4 for supporting this. I want to thank Mary
5 Arthur, her team at Campaign for Working
6 Families which is one of the wonderful
7 programs, one of the 60 programs of the
8 Urban Affairs Coalition for making this a
9 central part of the work here in
10 Philadelphia.

11 Ending poverty matters. Getting money
12 to low income, hard working families is
13 critical if we're ultimately going to help
14 people move out of poverty.

15 Thank you so much for giving me an
16 opportunity to talk about this wonderful
17 effort. And tell others. Please tell those
18 40,000 people, come and get your money. It
19 matters.

20 Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
23 Thank you for your testimony, and thank you
24 for your continued good work.

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1 CHIEF CLERK: Mary Arthur commenting on
2 Councilman Domb's EITC Day resolution.

3 (Approaches podium.)

4 MS. ARTHUR: Good morning, everyone.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning.

6 MS. ARTHUR: I'd first like to thank
7 Councilman Domb for moving this mission
8 forward, President Darrell Clarke and all of
9 City Council. My name is Mary Arthur. I'm
10 the Executive Director of the Campaign for
11 Working Families.

12 We are the largest vital provider in the
13 City of Philadelphia as well as the State.
14 We are also the most successful. Last year
15 we provided services to over 25,000
16 families. We brought back over \$35 million
17 in refunds. The goal of the campaign is to
18 push this mission forward, but it's
19 teamwork.

20 We are very happy that the Revenue
21 Department has become a partner of ours. We
22 have partners for the past 13 years. We
23 look at the IRS for all of our tax law
24 compliance, training and certifications.

1 All tax preparers that work at any of our
2 sites and volunteers must be IRS certified.

3 So I get a little passionate, and I hope
4 you will forgive me for this. This is a
5 very serious issue. Partnerships are so
6 important to the work that we do. Funding
7 is paramount because we can't do it. It is
8 free. It is a free service to the taxpayers
9 and the residents of the City of
10 Philadelphia. It is not a free service.

11 So, we have to continue to look for the
12 funding to be able to provide the service.

13 Last year there was over a 188,000
14 families in Philadelphia that had their
15 taxes prepared. The majority of them of
16 course paid. That's \$600, \$700 that is
17 going to a paid pre-payer. We need to make
18 sure that they can keep their tax credits,
19 all their credits, in their pocket. I know
20 what I can do with \$600/\$700. And I'm sure
21 there are families out there that can pay
22 rent, buy food, electric.

23 But I also want to talk about teamwork.
24 It is a partnership with long standing

1 partners, United Way, Greater Philadelphia
2 and Southern New Jersey have been a partner
3 of ours for the past 13 years. Three years
4 ago, we were on the brink of dissolving and
5 they came to the table to help us. And from
6 that year to now, that year we did 12,000
7 returns. This year, last year, we were at
8 25.

9 This year our goal is to reach over
10 30,000 families in the City of Philadelphia.
11 And we hope that everyone in here will pass
12 the word to help us move this mission
13 forward.

14 We know that there's another reception
15 tomorrow in the Mayor's office, but we have
16 also prepared a signature event for the City
17 of Philadelphia. And each year we hope to
18 grow it. We train over 700 volunteers.
19 This Saturday, we are hoping to provide
20 service to over 300 families at the Free
21 Library of Philadelphia. This is in
22 partnership with the United Way of
23 Philadelphia.

24 But all of our dollars are leveraged.

1 So, we need help from all the funders. We
2 need help from City government. We need
3 help from marketing -- the marketing
4 community because we don't have the dollars
5 to put the commercials out there, but our
6 services are valuable. Our services are
7 free. Our services are accurate. Everybody
8 that does a tax return or assists the client
9 is certified through the IRS.

10 So, I'm greatly appreciative of this
11 opportunity. And I hope that collectively
12 we can push this forward and get the other
13 40,000 families into one of our tax sites.
14 Right now we have 17 running. We started
15 Monday. We are all over the City.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ma'am, that's
17 a very important issue.

18 MS. ARTHUR: I got you. So, thank you.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Wrap it up.
20 Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Councilwoman,
23 you want to make a motion for the
24 suspension?

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1 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Thank
2 you, Council President.

3 We have been activists today. I'm going
4 to ask my ICE resolution be a suspension of
5 rules so that it can be heard today as a
6 Final Passage.

7 (Duly seconded.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
9 moved and properly seconded that the
10 resolution have a suspension of the rules to
11 allow reading today. And that would allow
12 public comment today.

13 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Yes.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
15 moved and properly seconded.

16 All those in favor?

17 (Ayes.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
19 opposed?

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
22 That will be on today's Final Passage
23 Calendar.

24 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Thank

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1 you, Council President.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You're
3 welcome.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danitel commenting on
5 160034.

6 (Approaches podium.)

7 MR. DANITEL: Back here again.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning.

9 MR. DANITEL: Morning. Haven't heard
10 anything from anybody hear.

11 At this time, I am without my house at
12 1038 West Wyoming due to the egregious
13 actions and inactions by this legislative
14 body. I quote George Mason, delegate to the
15 Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia.

16 Can anyone be above the law? Truer
17 words were never spoken by a founding father
18 in the sacred cradle of liberty. He and the
19 other founding fathers were concerned about
20 the potential abuse of power in governments
21 that made sacrifices as they passed laws.

22 Every person who having knowledge may --
23 will always conspire to be done, mentions
24 sections above this title, are about to be

1 commend or having the power to prevent or
2 aid or purveying the commission of the same
3 neglects and abuses to do so. If the
4 wrongful act should be committed, shall be
5 liable to the party injured, me, or his
6 legal representative if real reasonable
7 diligence could have presented this act.
8 This is 42 USC 1986.

9 I read from an article Melissa Drebin
10 Philadelphia.com. The site where sinking
11 homes in Logan had language for over a
12 decade. A field of unfulfilled dreams,
13 developers envisioned improbable laws,
14 residences have pictured supermarket and
15 local Councilwoman Marianne Tasco has
16 fantasized about a string of pearly high end
17 designer outlets.

18 As in the words of Eleanore Roosevelt
19 1941, I am one of the free and incomparable
20 people of the United States of America.
21 Even though my enemies are not foreign but
22 domestic. These articles of previous
23 submissions require immediate defunding and
24 investigation of the Philadelphia

1 Redevelopment Authority, or before more
2 laws, as in the above previously mentioned
3 or violated by you, the agents and agencies
4 of the government and now duly notified on
5 December 3, 2015.

6 You are in this member of the people's
7 opinion accessories after the fact. You've
8 taken an oath to obey, support and defend
9 the Constitution laws. Now let's get to
10 work.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you for
12 your testimony, sir.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Maria Turcios commenting
14 on Councilwoman Sanchez' ICE resolution
15 introduced today and on today's Final
16 Passage Calendar.

17 (Approaches podium with Translator.)

18 MS. TURCIOS: (Starts reading other
19 language.)

20 TRANSLATOR: Good morning. My name is
21 Maria Turcios. I'm a community organizer at
22 New Sanctuary Movement of Philadelphia.
23 We're very happy to work with you all in
24 introducing a resolution against the

1 deportation raids showing that you all don't
2 support these unjust laws created by
3 politicians who are only pushing their own
4 interests and ruining the dignity of others'
5 lives.

6 MS. TURCIOS: (Continues reading.)

7 TRANSLATOR: We also have 275 clergy
8 that are supporting us in the fight against
9 the deportations. And we know that this
10 shows that Philadelphia is a city that does
11 not welcome deportation raids.

12 MS. TURCIOS: (Continues reading.)

13 TRANSLATOR: I am Honduran. And I have
14 lived here for 22 years, and that's why I
15 know the persecution and violence that
16 people are fleeing in Central America. Just
17 three years ago, my nephew was killed. And
18 that's how I know what's affecting refugee
19 families today.

20 MS. TURCIOS: (Continues reading and
21 crying.)

22 TRANSLATOR: That's why we're here today
23 to say no to the deportation raids because
24 have come fleeing from violence and

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1 persecution and seeking more safety for
2 their families. And we have come to work
3 hard.

4 MS. TURCIOS: (Continues reading.)

5 TRANSLATOR: So thank you so much.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you for
7 your testimony.

8 CHIEF CLERK: There are no other
9 speakers on the Public Comment list,
10 Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
12 very much, Mr. Decker.

13 We will now consider the resolutions and
14 on the Second Reading and Final Passage
15 Calendar.

16 Mr. Decker, I would ask you to read the
17 title of 160034.

18 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution authorizing
19 the Commissioner of Public Property to
20 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
21 Redevelopment Authority, without
22 consideration, deeds conveying conditional
23 fee simple title to certain City-owned lot
24 or piece of ground with the building and

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1 improvements thereon, situated in the
2 Thirty-second Ward of the City of
3 Philadelphia.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
5 recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

6 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you,
7 Mr. President. I move the adoption of the
8 resolution.

9 (Duly seconded.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
11 moved and properly seconded.

12 All those in favor say aye.

13 (Ayes.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
15 opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.

18 In it Resolution 160034 is adopted.

19 Mr. Decker, 160039.

20 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution authorizing
21 the appointment of a Chief Ethics Officer
22 for the Council of the City of Philadelphia.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
24 recognizes Councilman Henon.

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1 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
2 Mr. President. I move for the adoption of
3 the resolution.

4 (Duly seconded.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
6 moved and properly seconded.

7 All those in favor?

8 (Ayes.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
10 opposed?

11 (No response.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.

13 And Resolution 160039 is adopted.

14 Mr. Decker, 160043.

15 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution authorizing
16 the Commissioner of Public Property to
17 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
18 Redevelopment Authority, without
19 consideration, deeds conveying conditional
20 fee simple title to certain City-owned lots
21 or pieces of ground with the buildings and
22 improvements thereon, situated in the
23 Thirty-first Ward of the City of
24 Philadelphia.

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1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
2 recognizes Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

3 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Can I
4 speak on it before we --

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Pardon me?

6 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Can I
7 speak on this -- oh, no. The other
8 resolution.

9 I move for the adoption.

10 (Duly seconded.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
12 moved and properly second.

13 All those in favor?

14 (Ayes.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
16 opposed?

17 (No response.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
19 And Resolution 160043 is adopted.

20 Mr. Decker, 160048.

21 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution authorizing
22 the creation of a "Special Committee on
23 Student Loan Debt" to evaluate the impacts
24 of student loan debt upon individual

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1 borrowers and the subsequent effect on the
2 City of Philadelphia.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And the Chair
4 recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I move for the adoption of
7 the resolution.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
10 moved and properly seconded.

11 All those in favor?

12 (Ayes.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
14 opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
17 And Resolution 160048 is adopted.

18 Mr. Decker, 160050.

19 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution authorizing
20 the Commissioner of Public Property to
21 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
22 Redevelopment Authority, without
23 consideration, deeds conveying conditional
24 fee simple title to certain City-owned lots

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1 or pieces of ground with the buildings and
2 improvements thereon, situated in the
3 Thirty-first Ward of the City of
4 Philadelphia.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The Chair
6 recognizes Councilman Squilla.

7 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. I move for the adoption of
9 the resolution.

10 (Duly seconded.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
12 moved and properly second.

13 All those in favor?

14 (Ayes.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
16 opposed?

17 (No response.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
19 And Resolution 160050 is adopted.

20 Mr. Decker, 160058.

21 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution respectfully
22 requesting the Prime Minister of Israel, the
23 Honorable Benjamin Netanyahu, to maintain
24 and support the foreign ministry of Israel's

1 diplomatic mission in the United States by
2 retaining The Consulate General of Israel to
3 the Mid-Atlantic region in Philadelphia.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
5 recognizes Councilman Oh.

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you, Council
7 President. Could I be heard on this
8 briefly?

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Absolutely.

10 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very much.

11 First, I'd like to recognize that
12 joining us today is Michael Alexander, the
13 Director of Governmental Affairs and Press
14 for The Consulate General of Israel to the
15 Mid-Atlantic region, which is located here
16 in Philadelphia.

17 Would you rise, sir.

18 (Mr. Alexander stands.)

19 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very much.

20 Thank you for being here.

21 Philadelphia has but three consulates
22 located in our City. We have honorary
23 consulates, but we only have three official
24 consulates that function. And one of them,

1 the Israeli Consulate, has been a very
2 important part of the relationship between
3 the City of Philadelphia and the Nation of
4 Israel.

5 Philadelphia has the second largest
6 Jewish population on the east coast. The
7 fifth largest in the United States. And in
8 2011, the total impact of Israel on the
9 greater Philadelphia region's economy was
10 about \$1.6 billion. And that included a
11 minimum of 714 million in economic
12 activities generated by Israeli firms.

13 We would really urge the Prime Minister
14 to not close the Consulate of Israel here in
15 Philadelphia. I think the population that
16 it serves, the citizens it serves and the
17 Philadelphians in this region and in the
18 Mid-Atlantic region is very large and has
19 been a great benefit to us and to Israel.

20 And with that, I appreciate the
21 consideration. And I thank our members for
22 being so engaged in economic activities and
23 cultural exchange. And at this time, I
24 would ask that a -- that the motion -- the

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1 resolution be adopted so that we can send an
2 official message to the Prime Minister.

3 (Duly seconded.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

5 It's been moved and properly seconded.

6 All those in favor?

7 (Ayes.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those

9 opposed?

10 (No response.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.

12 And Resolution 160058 is adopted.

13 Mr. Decker, do you have any additional
14 resolutions?

15 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution authorizing
16 the Committee on Education to conduct public
17 hearings to examine the Philadelphia School
18 Reform Commission's approval process as it
19 pertains to the composition, qualification
20 and diversity of a charter school
21 applicant's board of trustee as introduced
22 by Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
24 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

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1 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Thank you,
2 Mr. President. I move for the adoption.

3 (Duly seconded.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
5 moved and properly seconded.

6 All those in favor?

7 (Ayes.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
9 opposed?

10 (No response.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
12 And that resolution is adopted.

13 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution authorizing
14 the joint City Council Committees on
15 Education and Housing Neighborhood
16 Development and the Homeless to hold public
17 hearings to examine the feasibility of
18 having a pilot program in Philadelphia to
19 feed needy children when schools are closed
20 due to emergencies, introduced by
21 Councilwoman Blackwell.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
23 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,

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1 Mr. President. I move for the adoption.

2 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
4 moved and properly seconded.

5 All those in favor?

6 (Ayes.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
8 opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.

11 And that resolution is adopted.

12 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution recognizing
13 and declaring February 9, 2016 as
14 "Connections for Cardiovascular Health
15 Awareness Day," encouraging citizens to
16 promote cardiovascular health, introduced by
17 Councilman Greenlee on behalf of Council
18 President Clarke.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
20 recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. I move the adoption of the
23 resolution.

24 (Duly seconded.)

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1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
2 moved and properly seconded.

3 All those in favor?

4 (Ayes.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
6 opposed?

7 (No response.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
9 And that resolution is adopted.

10 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution authorizing
11 the Philadelphia City Council Committee on
12 Education and the Philadelphia City Council
13 Committee on Children and Youth to hold
14 joint hearings examining recent instances of
15 school bus lateness in the School District
16 of Philadelphia and the detrimental effect
17 the school bus lateness has on students,
18 introduced by Councilman Johnson.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
20 recognizes Councilman Johnson.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council President,
22 I move for the adoption of the resolution.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been

1 move and properly seconded.

2 All those in favor?

3 (Ayes.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
5 opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
8 And the resolution is adopted.

9 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
10 authorizing the Philadelphia City Council
11 Committee on Public Safety to hold hearings
12 regarding the establishment of a
13 comprehensive strategy for reducing and
14 eliminating youth gun violence, introduced
15 by Councilman Johnson.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair, again,
17 recognizes Councilman Johnson.

18 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you, Council
19 President. I just want to make a brief
20 statement regarding the resolution.

21 You know, each day when I watch the news
22 after I arrive home and tuck my son in bed,
23 there is always an incidence of some
24 African-American youth shot down here in the

1 streets in the City of Philadelphia. And
2 so, this has always been an issue that's
3 near and dear to my heart. But I also
4 believe as a City, as a council body, that
5 we can make this a greater priority as
6 relates to the issue of youth gun violence.

7 During the last year, during the prior
8 administration, we have seen a significant
9 spike in the increases of youth gun violence
10 throughout the City. And so, these hearings
11 will allow us to look at a comprehensive
12 strategy on -- specific on the issue of
13 prevention but also finding innovative ways
14 such as initiative that you kicked off
15 yesterday that provide young men who are
16 returning home from prison an opportunity to
17 pick up a shovel and focus on the issue of
18 blight as opposed to picking up a gun.

19 And so, I ask for the support of all my
20 colleagues. And hopefully, each of us who
21 are individual Councilmembers will make a
22 priority on the issue of youth gun violence
23 in their own respective districts. And so,
24 this will be a collaborative effort with the

1 body as a whole to look at how can we really
2 have a significant impact on the issue of
3 youth gun violence here in the City of
4 Philadelphia.

5 I move for the adoption of the
6 resolution, Council President.

7 (Duly seconded.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
9 It's been moved and properly seconded.

10 All those in favor?

11 (Ayes.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
13 opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The ayes have
16 it. And the resolution is enthusiastically
17 adopted.

18 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution urging
19 the President of the United States to
20 establish a comprehensive national policy
21 regarding our undocumented immigrants that
22 seeks to preserve and protect families that
23 have fled to this country from situations of
24 widespread violence and depravation, and to

1 also prevent future deportation raids that
2 tear apart our communities, introduce by
3 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
5 recognizes, Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

6 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Thank
7 you, Council President. I will also briefly
8 speak on this before I ask for a motion.

9 Fear. Fear is -- does not lead us to a
10 public -- to public safety, and it will not
11 protect our City and it will not protect our
12 county.

13 Fear. Fear is what thousands of
14 families who live in their native countries
15 under extreme violence feel every single
16 day. Fear is what the refugees, many who
17 risk their lives, many who die on that
18 pathway seek an asylum into the United
19 States.

20 I want to thank the Council who has
21 consistently been a voice in calling to the
22 national attention the need for
23 comprehensive immigration reform. We want
24 to recognize the historic coalition of

1 hundreds of clergy who have lent their
2 voices to the need for Obama's
3 administration and the Homeland Department
4 to stop what we know to be inhumane ICE
5 raids throughout the country. We want to
6 join the 20 senators who this week called on
7 the President to use his executive authority
8 to stop this, Senators Booker and Menendez
9 from across New Jersey lending their voice
10 to this.

11 And finally, we want to thank Mayor
12 Kenney who, in one of his first acts as
13 mayor, reaffirmed the position of
14 Philadelphia being a Sanctuary City. A city
15 where police, stakeholders and government
16 believe it is our human obligation to
17 protect refugees and people who feel fear
18 for those lives.

19 So, I want to thank Councilwoman Gym for
20 lending her voice in support for the work
21 that we continue to do in this Council;
22 councilwoman Blackwell, who has been
23 consistent supporter; Councilwoman Bass and
24 all of City Council. And I call on the

1 adoption of this resolution.

2 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

4 Before we take that vote, chair recognizes
5 Councilman O'Neill.

6 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
7 Mr. President.

8 I've worked with the national cities for
9 years on comprehensive immigration reform.
10 And I know it's a very difficult. It's
11 emotional. Needs balance. There is not a
12 right side on one end, right side on the
13 other. It's somewhere -- somewhere in the
14 middle.

15 As I was looking at this resolution
16 today and deciding whether to sign it or
17 vote for it -- and/or vote for it, you know,
18 I got down to the last part. It says
19 "prevent future deportation raids," that
20 last part of the paragraph.

21 And I don't go as far as the Mayor. We
22 didn't vote on Sanctuary City in this City
23 Council. I would have voted no if it went
24 so far as it does that it protects people on

1 terror watch lists, Homeland Security. And
2 the White House wants to work with us to
3 remove from our community.

4 And I will not be voting for this
5 because I just think it goes too far when it
6 predetermines that all deportation raids are
7 bad. Because if there is a terrorist raid
8 or a raid involving terrorists, I want to
9 make sure that I voted that that was okay.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
12 Councilman.

13 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

14 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you very much,
15 Mr. President.

16 I understand and thank Councilwoman
17 Sanchez. And I think one of the most
18 honorable parts of being part of the City
19 Council body is the opportunity to weigh in
20 on issues that not only have local
21 importance but national importance, as well.

22 The crisis around the Central American
23 refugees is a crisis that's been recognized
24 by human rights agencies as being one of

1 global proportions, and it's one of the
2 biggest migration movements we have seen in
3 the western hemisphere in a long period of
4 time.

5 The biggest concern that I have,
6 obviously, is that there are thousands of
7 unaccompanied minors. A report in this
8 week's Washington Post demonstrated that the
9 U.S. is completely incapable of handling
10 this in terms of its traditional
11 immigration, deportation and incarceration
12 tactics. And as a result, many of these
13 young people may be turned over to
14 traffickers, to slavers in the United States
15 of America on our watch.

16 I think that this statement and the
17 establishment and clarification of what it
18 means to be a Sanctuary City is not about
19 knee-jerk responses. It's not about taking
20 massive worldwide situations and condemning
21 people to a criminal and incarcerating and
22 deporting them without any means or any
23 responsible amount of thinking to a major
24 crisis. This is not going to end. This is

1 going to continue.

2 And I think that what Council is trying
3 to do today is send a clear message to DC,
4 which has failed time and time again, to
5 establish responsible immigration reform.
6 That we are here to protect our citizens.
7 We are here especially to protect our
8 children. We are going to have a voice, and
9 that this is a City where it matters.

10 We deal with the failures of DC. We
11 deal with the failures of Harrisburg. We're
12 trying to find smart solutions. And this is
13 a letter and a message to DC that we are
14 paying attention and we care about our
15 people.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
18 Councilwoman.

19 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,
21 Mr. President.

22 As many of you know, we have thousands
23 and thousands 30 to 50,000 African and
24 Caribbean immigrants here. I think the

1 majority of the City live in my area. And
2 we, after some -- over ten years ago we
3 established a Mayor's Commission on African
4 and Caribbean Immigr -- African and
5 Caribbean Immigrant Affairs. And some 18 or
6 19 years ago now, we established Echos of
7 Africa. So we hear these and are aware of
8 so many sad stories.

9 We represent 35 countries already. And
10 I will tell you without fear of
11 contradiction that this is very, very
12 important legislation. That we all should
13 support it. And that we are always
14 supportive of those things that deal with
15 safety and quality of life for everybody.

16 This is, after all, American. We have
17 the lady who stands in the harbor welcoming
18 people here. So, we are happy to support
19 this legislation. And hope that everyone
20 else will, as well.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
23 Councilwoman.

24 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

1 COUNCILMAN JONES: Mr. President, a
2 great president said, "We have nothing to
3 fear but fear itself." That's changed since
4 9/11 of course. But what we can not do,
5 what we will not do is change our quality of
6 life. And the words that ring out on the
7 Statue of Liberty, which is "bring me your
8 tired, your poor; your huddled masses
9 yearning to be free."

10 The minute that we put up a sign that
11 says no one else is allowed, we are closing
12 our doors, they win. And we have to do what
13 we have to do to secure our borders. We
14 have to do what we have to do to keep the
15 homeland secure, but we cannot change our
16 way of life. We cannot change our
17 principles of wanting people who are fleeing
18 oppression from coming here.

19 So today, I support this legislation and
20 stand by that credo that we established
21 early in this country's life.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
24 Councilman.

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1 There has been a motion and a second.

2 All in favor of that motion, please say
3 aye.

4 (Ayes.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
6 opposed?

7 (One opposed.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it,
9 then the resolution is adopted.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution honoring,
12 recognizing and celebrating the 30th Black
13 Engineers of the Year Awards STEM
14 Conference, introduced by Councilman Green.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
16 recognizes Councilman Green.

17 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you, Council
18 President. I move for the adoption of the
19 resolution.

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
22 moved and properly second.

23 All those in favors?

24 (Ayes.)

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1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
2 opposed?

3 (No response.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: They ayes
5 have it, and that resolution is adopted.

6 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
7 recognizing January 29, 2016 as Earned
8 Income Tax Credit, EITC Awareness Day, in
9 Philadelphia, introduced by Councilman Domb.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
11 recognizes Councilman Domb.

12 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Mr. President, I move
13 for the adoption of the resolution.

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
16 moved and properly seconded.

17 All those in favor?

18 (Ayes.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
20 opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
23 And that resolution is adopted.

24 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution

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1 proclaiming, recognizing, honoring and
2 observing February 1 through 5, 2016 as
3 National School Counseling Week in the City
4 of Philadelphia, introduced by Councilwoman
5 Gym.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
7 recognizes Councilman Gym.

8 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. This resolution was
10 sponsored by Councilwoman Reynolds Brown and
11 Councilman Green. And I move for its
12 adoption.

13 (Duly seconded.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
15 moved and properly seconded.

16 All those in favor?

17 (Ayes.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
19 opposed?

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
22 And the resolution is adopted.

23 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
24 authorizing the Committee on Children and

1 Youth and the Committee on Public Health and
2 Human Services to conduct hearings
3 concerning the best practices followed by
4 the Philadelphia Water Department as well as
5 additional measures to prevent lead exposure
6 due to household water service lines,
7 introduced by Councilwoman Gym.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair again
9 recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

10 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you very much,
11 Mr. President.

12 This resolution was sponsored by
13 Councilmembers Blackwell, Quinones-Sanchez
14 Reynolds Brown and Green. And permission to
15 make a few remarks.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Please do.

17 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you. I want to
18 explain and assure to my colleagues the
19 importance of having this res -- having some
20 level of hearings at this time. I want to
21 assure my colleagues first and foremost that
22 this hearing will be done in partnership
23 with the Water Department whom we have been
24 in dialogue with already over the text of

1 the resolution.

2 But there is no question right now that
3 the urgency and the national attention that
4 has driven to the state of water and lead in
5 our City and in cities across the nation is
6 something that is capturing the national
7 dialogue, and is very much a part of it.

8 I want to thank all my colleagues who
9 have been working diligently on this issue
10 for decades. And a special shout out to my
11 colleague Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds
12 Brown who has been a true champion on this
13 issue. I also want to thank Councilman
14 Johnson's clear and beautifully written
15 resolution on the human rights abuses in
16 Flint, Michigan.

17 It is important for us to work very
18 closely with the Water Department to bring
19 clarity to this issue about what is
20 happening in our City, that they are
21 following best practices, that this is not
22 Flint. But that we have a lot of
23 information that we need to bring to the
24 public, primarily to our families who don't

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1 often get it through traditional channels
2 and means. We have a responsibility to
3 reach out to our immigrant families. And
4 this hearing should be able to do that.

5 So, I ask my colleagues for the adoption
6 of this resolution.

7 (Duly seconded.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
9 moved and properly seconded.

10 All those in favor?

11 (Ayes.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
13 opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The ayes have
16 it. And that resolution is adopted.

17 CHIEF CLERK: There are no other
18 resolutions on the Final Passage Calendar,
19 Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
21 very much, Mr. Decker. That concludes our
22 calendar.

23 Are there any speeches on the part of
24 the minority?

1 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

2 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very much,
3 Council President.

4 I just wanted to thank all the Members
5 of City Council for signing a letter that we
6 will be sending to SEPTA regarding the issue
7 that arose last week, which is a matter of
8 whether or not local hiring preferences will
9 be included in RFPs. And in particular, to
10 support jobs and vendors and commerce here
11 in Philadelphia and Philadelphia -- I'm
12 sorry, here in Philadelphia and in
13 Pennsylvania. At stake are 350 jobs
14 directly; and indirectly, 5,000 jobs.

15 I just wanted to share with the public
16 some of the demographics of this company
17 which we know. And we don't know about the
18 other companies that are involved. But we
19 know that currently Hyundai Rotem has a
20 demographic that 37.7 percent of its
21 workforce is Caucasian; 23.4 percent is
22 African-American; 14.3 percent is Hispanic;
23 and 14.3 percent is Asian. That's in 2016.

24 In 2012, 38.9 percent were Caucasian;

1 24.2 percent were African-American;
2 13.2 percent were Hispanic; and 15.3 percent
3 were Asian American.

4 The numbers have been pretty consistent
5 in terms of the percentages of hirees with
6 family sustaining wages. What is different
7 is at the high point, there were 350 workers
8 working directly for Hyundai Rotem, and
9 today there are 77. It is critical if this
10 company is going to survive here in
11 Philadelphia and we are going to manufacture
12 high speed trains at a time where revenues
13 appear to be coming into our City and other
14 cities for infrastructure, transportation
15 infrastructure, that we ensure that if there
16 is a legal way to provide a hiring
17 preference to the RFP, that that be done.

18 One of the critical issues that arises
19 is the extent to which advocacy for local
20 hiring preferences will be pursued. They do
21 it in New York. They are doing it in
22 California. And so, combined with the
23 resolution that calls upon our state to
24 establish a statewide manufacturing

1 preference, these issues should help our
2 state and our population to have employment
3 and the revenues we need to support our
4 schools, our local government and our
5 communities.

6 So, I thank everyone here. And I would
7 like to say that this body, this Council
8 body has been a champion of jobs and
9 employment for all demographics in and
10 around Philadelphia. And I'm very proud of
11 that.

12 Thank you very much.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
14 Councilman.

15 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds
16 Brown.

17 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Remarks
18 from the majority?

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Absolutely.

20 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Okay.
21 Thank you, Mr. President.

22 At this moment, I would like to offer my
23 remarks, focus my thoughts and lend my voice
24 of support also to the citizens and more

1 important the children of Flint, Michigan.

2 Here is why. As has already been
3 alluded in December -- forgive me, in
4 November, the citizens filed a class action
5 lawsuit against their governor, city state
6 governments for the highly toxic levels of
7 lead found in Flint's water supply that has
8 been poisoning those residents for over two
9 years. As Chair of City Council's Committee
10 on the Environment and Sustainability, I pay
11 close attention to this issue. And I joined
12 the Environmental Protection Agency, Clean
13 Water Action, the American Civil Liberties
14 Union, the National Resource Defense Council
15 and so many other social and environmental
16 organizations across the country in
17 demanding justice and swift action from the
18 Governor first and then to the government to
19 address this Katrina-type disaster we
20 witness every day in Flint, Michigan.

21 Here is the background. Like many
22 municipalities facing extreme budget
23 constraints, the City of Flint changed its
24 water source from like Huron to the Flint

1 River as a temporary cost cutting measure.
2 Bad judgment. The acidity of the water from
3 the Flint River corroded pipes allowing
4 dangerous levels of lead to leak into the
5 water supply. Tap water turned to a strange
6 color, and tests showed lead levels rose ten
7 times higher than years before.

8 The short term and long term health
9 ramifications of this gross negligence are
10 staggering at best and criminal at worst.
11 One local hospital, a woman by the way,
12 found that the percentage of Flint children
13 with elevated lead levels doubled leading to
14 health effects such as skin lesions, hair
15 loss, vision loss, memory loss, depression
16 and anxiety. Even more tragic are the long
17 term affects of lead poisoning which damages
18 and affects fertility, our kidney, the
19 nervous system, the cardiovascular system
20 and circulation, for sure a child's
21 behavior, digestion, their bones, muscles
22 are only a part of the list.

23 Colleagues, you may recall as has been
24 shared that in year 2010, I worked closely

1 with Shelly Yanoff, took great guidance from
2 Councilwoman Maria Quinones-Sanchez and
3 Councilwoman Tasco, and we tackled the issue
4 of lead in apartment dwellings here in our
5 City. You may recall our biggest opponent
6 at that time in this legislative journey was
7 HAPCO. But for over a year, the leadership
8 and membership of HAPCO and myself sat down
9 and figured out painstakingly how we can
10 tackle this important, ugly health issue.

11 I was proud to work with Homeowners
12 Association of Philadelphia on Bill No.
13 10011-A, a lead paint disclosure ordinance
14 that is now law. In fact, if you are an
15 apartment -- someone seeking an apartment,
16 it is now standard protocol, what we called
17 standard operating procedure for potential
18 renters to get a lead disclosure brochure.

19 The process was long, sometimes
20 unfriendly. However, after layered acts of
21 diplomacy, tweaking the bill to the best we
22 could, we drafted and won a win-win outcome.
23 Why? Because everyone in that dialogue
24 fully recognized what mattered most. The

1 number one priority was the health and
2 safety of our fellow citizens, our families
3 and our children. In children the effects
4 are so much worse. It affects the nervous
5 system, impairs the growth and development,
6 cognitive development forever, behavior,
7 hearing, sight, mobility and their digestive
8 system. The lives of those children are
9 changed forever.

10 The sadness of this frightening reality
11 is that the potential health consequences of
12 this disaster for many of those children
13 will be realized decades from now. The
14 government of Flint, Michigan failed its
15 citizens. It is imperative that residents
16 get justice for the government's wrong
17 doing. Current investigations by the United
18 States Attorney's Office and the American
19 Civil Liberty Union in Michigan are a step
20 in the right direction.

21 The most ugly aspects of this debacle
22 that turns my gut is that the victims of
23 this tragedy are primarily minority and
24 primarily low-income citizens. I question

1 what the action may have been if the
2 citizens had not been majority minority or
3 majority low-income citizens.

4 In closing, I salute and stand with my
5 colleagues Councilman Johnson who eloquently
6 shared with us how important it is to call
7 on the United States Department of Justice
8 to conduct a complete and thorough
9 investigation of the water supply. And I
10 stand with Councilwoman Gym as we put this
11 issue back on the radar screen with the
12 Water Department and work in a collaborative
13 fashion with the Administration. This
14 Katrina deja vu reads like the script of a
15 fictional movie. But the reality is that
16 it's a real life circumstance for an
17 American city.

18 Thank you, Mr. President.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
21 Councilwoman.

22 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

23 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you, Council
24 President. I just want to thank my

1 colleague Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds
2 Brown and Councilwoman Helen Gym for
3 speaking on this issue. And the
4 presentation and the remarks were so
5 eloquently said by Councilwoman Brown, that
6 I'm going to refrain from my remarks. But
7 only mention that the actions that have
8 taken place in Flint, Michigan is absolutely
9 criminal.

10 You know, Dr. King once said what
11 effects one directly, impacts all
12 indirectly. And it's just shameful that us
13 living in a country as great as America,
14 that something like this can happen and
15 there is -- there isn't any major outrage,
16 major outrage on the national level, to be
17 quite frank with you.

18 After you do the research on what's
19 taking place in Flint, Michigan and it
20 clearly shows that those government
21 officials, whether it's covering up emails,
22 had an opportunity to address this issue on
23 the front end and they didn't. And so for
24 me, that's criminal. And the sad part about

1 this is that in the long term, those young
2 people who are impacted, they don't get a
3 second chance. There is no coming back from
4 that. And so you know, hopefully on a
5 national level, there will be some type of
6 legal action that does take place and they
7 take heed that the City of Philadelphia, a
8 City of Brotherly Love and Sisterly
9 Affection in the cradle of liberty for all
10 of our cities are paying attention. And so,
11 I want to state that for the record.

12 This evening at St. Patrick's Church
13 located at 242 South 20th Street, I will be
14 hosting a public safety meeting regarding
15 the Four Alarm Fire that took place at 2122
16 Locust Street. So, we will have the current
17 Fire Commissioner Richard Sawyer who is
18 going to be there, Judge Renee Cardwell
19 Hughes from the American Red Cross, Senator
20 Larry Farnese will be in attendance as well
21 as the Office of Emergency Management and
22 the Captain for the Ninth Police District to
23 find out ways on how we can support the
24 residents who suffered a fire that displaced

1 them from their living condition. And so,
2 that's going to be this evening at 7:00 p.m.
3 Again, at St. Patrick's Church.

4 Also today, most of you -- any who know
5 my platform, my agenda know that I am strong
6 on addressing the issue of affordable and
7 workforce housing throughout my Second
8 Councilmanic District, but specifically in
9 the area of Point Breeze. Point Breeze is
10 on the come up and very changing community
11 right now. But I always try to address the
12 level of balance as we look at the issue of
13 development and gentrification.

14 And so today, I have moved a total of
15 139 properties into the Land Bank to focus
16 on the issue of affordable workforce
17 housing, more green space in the
18 neighborhood, making sure that long term
19 residents have an option of staying in their
20 homes. But even new residents, because
21 every new resident doesn't have a fat
22 checkbook or pocketbook. You have some new
23 residents who want to move in and purchase
24 affordable and workforce housing. So, we

1 will continue adding more properties to the
2 Land Bank.

3 Again, I thank you Council President,
4 and I thank the author and the champion of
5 the Land Bank Councilwoman Sanchez for
6 bringing the Land Bank to the City of
7 Philadelphia. Because it definitely helps
8 us as we look at a balanced approach to
9 development throughout our district.

10 And I always say for the record for
11 those who are blogging and for those who
12 will actually review my statements on
13 development, yes, I am for development; but
14 I am for smart development. And for me that
15 that's affordable workforce, senior housing.
16 And we support market raiders. We just want
17 to make sure in certain parts of my district
18 that are gentrified, there is a balance
19 approach to development. And everyone has a
20 chance to live in the neighborhood
21 regardless of their check and/or pocketbook.

22 Thank you, Council President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
24 Councilman. Very important issue.

1 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

2 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you very much,
3 Mr. Council President.

4 I just want to reiterate how grateful I
5 am to be part of this body that upholds so
6 strongly a vision of human rights and equity
7 for all people. Just want to say that last
8 night members of our Children and Youth
9 Committee joined by the Council President,
10 specifically also as well Councilman Domb,
11 Kenyatta Johnson, myself went out and
12 representatives from Maria Quinones-Sanchez'
13 office and Blondell Reynolds Brown and all
14 members of our Children Youth Committee went
15 out with -- to be part of the youth count,
16 which was a specific effort to track by
17 count a quarterly count of the City's
18 homeless population.

19 Our task was to bring our children and
20 youth committee members together to
21 specifically look at the situation around
22 homeless youth. I think a lot of us have a
23 lot to learn about the situation, and the
24 issue we're trying to track it. We will

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1 take it very seriously. I just wanted to
2 extend my gratitude to the Members of
3 Council who are taking -- and the Members of
4 the Committee who are taking this issue very
5 seriously. And I hope to have more
6 information on that in the future.

7 Thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
9 Councilwoman.

10 There being no additional speeches, the
11 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown
12 for a motion to adjourn.

13 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
15 adjourned until Thursday, February 4, 2016
16 at 10:00 a.m.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
19 It's been moved and properly seconded that
20 the Council stand adjourned until Thursday,
21 February 4, 2016 at 10 a.m.

22 All those in favor, say aye.

23 (Ayes.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those

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1 opposed?

2 (No response.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.

4 Thank you all very much.

5 (Stated Meeting adjourned at 12:02 p.m.)
