20 Good morning, ladies and gentlemen. I'm
21 Robert Taylor of the Transport Workers
22 Union, Local 700, and WPEB 88.1 co-host
23 on the Jasper Jones Show. I am
24 commenting on Resolution 160157,
25 expressing Council's support for an

1 3/3/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 amendment to the Pennsylvania
3 Constitution that would authorize
4 different real estate tax rates in Cities
5 and School Districts and conveying
6 Council's opposition to a provision that
7 would mandate a reduction in other
8 business or wage taxes.

9 I do not support this
10 resolution. The resolution actually
11 reveals that taxes are too high and that
12 City Council would do well by the
13 citizens to not seek this amendment. The
14 citizens are taxed enough with AVI and
15 other ceaseless tax increases in recent
16 years. There's no good reason that the
17 people should be taxed out of their
18 homes, businesses, and jobs.

19 Quote, "When men are oppressed
20 more by taxes than by enemies, taxes are
21 unconstitutional," Thomas Paine, Rights
22 of Man.

23 The School District is out of
24 control and needs to learn how to live in
25 its 2 billion dollar 5 hundred million

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1 3/3/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 dollar to 3 billion dollar annual budget.
3 In fact, the School District should
4 submit a complete audit which, according
5 to the Weekly Press' 9/18/13 paper, state
6 auditors have warned of accounting
7 problems at the Philadelphia School
8 District since 1987. It states, quote,
9 "A district's failure to accurately
10 maintain and report its membership and
11 attendance records data calls into
12 question the legitimacy and
13 appropriateness of the bulk of the state
14 taxpayer funding." Meanwhile our
15 children don't have sufficient school
16 nurses, books, pencils, toilet paper year
17 after year. This must end.

18 Councilmembers took an oath to
19 the Constitution for the Commonwealth of
20 Pennsylvania and to the people or the
21 citizens therein. It is time that the
22 citizens get a break. They have suffered
23 enough at the hands of the so-called
24 stakeholders that aren't even mentioned
25 in the Constitution at all. Instead of

2 countless new taxes, why not uphold the
3 inherent rights of mankind.

4 God bless Philadelphia, and as
5 Joe Donatell often says, let's get to
6 work.

7 Thank you for your time.

10 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
11 other speakers on the public comment

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

15 That concludes our public
16 comment session. We will now consider
17 the bills and resolutions on the Second
18 Reading and Final Passage Calendar.

19 Mr. Decker, please read the
20 title of 160154.

21 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
22 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
23 Property to execute and deliver to the
24 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority,
25 without consideration, deeds conveying

2 conditional fee simple title to certain
3 City-owned lots or pieces of ground with

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Greenlee.

11 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
12 you, Mr. President. I move the adoption
13 of the resolution.

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
16 been moved and properly seconded.

17 All those in favor say aye.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 ayes have it and Resolution 160154 has
24 been adopted.

25 Mr. Decker, 160164.

2 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
3 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
4 Property to execute and deliver to the
5 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority,
6 without consideration, deeds conveying
7 conditional fee simple title to certain
8 City-owned lots or pieces of ground with
9 the buildings and improvements thereon,
10 situate in the Eleventh Ward of the City
11 of Philadelphia.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.
14 Councilwoman, I think you wanted to make
15 reference to a member that I neglected to
16 mention from our labor force. Can you do
17 that first for me, please.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Sure. I
19 certainly want to recognize Fred Wright
20 from DC47 is here.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Fred
22 Wright, how are you, sir? Sitting in the
23 corner over there. We didn't see you.
24 Sorry.

25 And please make a motion on the

2 resolution.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Absolutely.

4 Move for the adoption of the resolution.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

7 been moved and properly seconded.

8 All those in favor say aye.

9 (Aye.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

14 ayes have it, and Resolution 160164 is

15 adopted.

16 Mr. Decker, do you have any

17 additional resolutions?

18 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

19 Recognizing and Supporting Women and

20 Girls throughout the World on the

21 Occasion of International Women's Day on

22 Tuesday, March 8, 2016, introduced by

23 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

25 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds

2 Brown.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. I move for the adoption.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
7 been moved and properly seconded.

8 All those in favor?

9 (Aye.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 eyes have it, and that resolution is
15 adopted.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
17 Congratulating and Honoring the
18 Pennsylvania Chapter of the National
19 Coalition of 100 Black Women on the 30th
20 Anniversary of the Madam CJ Walker Awards
21 Luncheon, introduced by Councilwoman
22 Parker.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

2 you, Mr. President. I move for the
3 adoption of the resolution and just
4 needed to note that it's co-sponsored by
5 all of the women of City Council.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Thank you, Councilwoman.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
10 been moved and properly seconded.

11 All those in favor?

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Those opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 ayes have it, and that resolution is
18 adopted.

19 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
20 authorizing Council's Committee on Public
21 Health and Human Services to hold
22 hearings to address the alarmingly high
23 rate of HIV cases projected by the
24 Centers for Disease Control at a time
25 when preventative measures are well

2 developed and not accessed by the most
3 vulnerable populations, particularly in
4 the African-American community,
5 introduced by Councilwoman Bass.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass for a
8 motion.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. I move for a motion.

11 (Duly seconded.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
13 been moved and properly seconded.

14 All those in favor?

15 (Aye.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Those opposed?

18 (No response.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 ayes have it, and that resolution is
21 adopted.

22 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
23 other resolutions on the Final Passage
24 Calendar, Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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1 3/3/16 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS

2 Thank you very much.

3 That concludes our Calendar.

4 The time has come for us to
5 consider the Mayor's presentation of his
6 annual budget message.

7 The Philadelphia Home Rule
8 Charter states that the Mayor shall
9 submit to Council, no later than 90 days
10 before the end of the fiscal year, his
11 Operating Budget message and Proposed
12 Operating Budget ordinance for the
13 ensuing fiscal year. At the same time,
14 the Mayor shall submit to Council the
15 Recommended Capital Program and Capital
16 Budget as received from the City Planning
17 Commission, to the extent approved by the
18 Mayor.

19 I now appoint the following
20 committee to escort the Mayor into
21 Council Chambers: Councilman Henon,
22 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, Councilman
23 Greenlee, Councilman O'Neill, and
24 Councilman Oh.

25 (Pause.)

2 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS:

3 Mr. President, the Mayor has arrived.

4 (Standing ovation.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Ladies and gentlemen, I am pleased to

7 introduce the Mayor of the City of

8 Philadelphia, Mayor James F. Kenney.

9 (Applause.)

10 MAYOR KENNEY: First of all, I

11 want to say it is certainly humbling, a

12 wonderful experience to be back in this

13 Chamber that I spent such a long time in

14 as Mayor.

15 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Welcome

16 back.

17 MAYOR KENNEY: Thank you.

18 I want to thank the Council

19 President and all my colleagues in

20 Council for welcoming me to speak today.

21 It feels really good to be home.

22 I've spent just about half my

23 life in this Chamber. I started in 1992

24 under then-Council President Street,

25 right over there, and I've since had the

2 privilege to work with two more great
3 Council Presidents - Anna C. Verna and
4 now Council President Clarke.

5 I've also had the distinct
6 pleasure over the years to getting to
7 learn a lot from all of you. Through the
8 work we've done together, you have helped
9 shaped me, and I believe you will see
10 that impact reflected in our first budget
11 together.

12 In this budget, we continue to
13 try to protect the rights of our most
14 vulnerable.

15 Councilman Greenlee has been a
16 consistent advocate for the rights of
17 Philadelphians, both through paid sick
18 leave and battling wage theft. I am
19 proud that this budget proposes an
20 additional position to assist with the
21 enforcement of these very important laws.

22 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez
23 has also been a critical partner in
24 advancing the rights of our city's
25 undocumented. Over the next year, I look

2 forward to working with her and the rest
3 of the City Council to develop a plan for
4 a municipal ID.

5 Councilmembers O'Neill and
6 Henon have also gone to bat many times to
7 get our firefighters the life-saving
8 tools that they need. This year, thanks
9 in no small part to their efforts, I'm
10 excited to announce that our six-year
11 plan will provide over \$80 million for
12 the replacement of old, malfunctioning
13 vehicles and desperately needed facility
14 improvements, like roof replacements.

15 Our police officers will also
16 be getting more resources to protect and
17 serve the citizens of Philadelphia under
18 this budget proposal.

19 In addition to repairing
20 infrastructure in our police district
21 stations, this budget equips our police
22 force with body-worn cameras. As
23 Councilman Jones pointed out passionately
24 during hearings last year, body-worn
25 cameras have been extremely successful in

2 reducing the use of force and reducing
3 the police abuse allegations all across
4 the country.

5 I am confident that the
6 expansion of the body-worn cameras, in
7 consultation with our local FOP in
8 Philadelphia, will further the admirable
9 community policing efforts led by our
10 great Commissioner, Richard Ross.

11 This budget also increases
12 community safety by dedicating resources
13 to preventing traffic-related fatalities.
14 As Councilwoman Bass has consistently
15 pointed out, it is unacceptable that we
16 treat these deaths as a fact of life in
17 Philadelphia.

18 Working with key stakeholders,
19 our new Office of Complete Streets and
20 the Managing Director's Office will
21 identify changes that we can make,
22 whether it be better lining or signage or
23 a change in traffic flow, to protect that
24 child walking to school and the cyclists
25 just trying to get to work.

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1 3/3/16 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS

2 The Streets Department and L&I
3 will also work to advance our vision zero
4 goals by enhancing their "Right of Way"
5 activities.

6 The recent explosion of
7 development has significantly increased
8 sidewalk and street closures. This
9 budget would allow us to ensure safe
10 travel around those closures and to
11 better enforce penalties against those
12 that are illegal, raising revenue for the
13 City and preventing these dangerous
14 encroachments in the first place.

15 This budget would also continue
16 City Council's efforts to ensure that the
17 22nd and Market collapse will never
18 happen again.

19 Today we are proposing funding
20 for additional Code Enforcement Unit and
21 for two additional L&I district offices.
22 These offices would be strategically
23 located in areas of the City that are
24 experiencing the most construction
25 activity, so that we are increasing

2 oversight of these construction projects
3 and allowing businesses to get permits
4 more efficiently.

5 This budget also supports small
6 businesses and commercial corridors by
7 expanding the Community Life Improvement
8 Program all across the City.

9 As many of you already know,
10 CLIP manages graffiti, vacant lot
11 clean-ups, and other instances of blight
12 that can make the difference between a
13 community on the rise and one mired in
14 crime.

15 (Applause.)

16 MAYOR KENNEY: This investment
17 will specifically increase vacant lot and
18 exterior property abatements by 5,000
19 over the next year.

20 CLIP also serves as a critical
21 workforce development tool, allowing
22 folks who have gone astray to pay back
23 their debt to the community while gaining
24 professional experience and skills.

25 Additionally, this investment

1 3/3/16 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS
2 would bring in \$100,000 in new revenue
3 for the City through the collection
4 activities of CLIP employees.

5 As Councilmembers Parker and
6 Squilla have been saying for a long time,
7 CLIP has a pretty incredible return on
8 investment for both the City and our
9 neighborhoods.

10 Thanks to the efforts of
11 Councilmembers Henon and Taubenberger,
12 this budget also supports our small
13 businesses by establishing a line item
14 for the Storefront Improvement Program,
15 which will help fund approximately 100
16 upgrades this year.

17 Research shows that facade
18 improvements lead to additional foot
19 traffic, increased revenue, and the
20 creation of new jobs.

21 But our commercial corridors
22 almost lost this successful longstanding
23 program after a change in federal
24 regulations. While Councilmember Henon
25 successfully fought last year for a

2 temporary funding measure, the City's
3 commitment to our commercial corridors
4 should never be in doubt, which is why we
5 are so proud to introduce a stable
6 funding source in this new budget.

7 In addition to growing local
8 businesses, we will also continue to
9 expand Philadelphia's international
10 profile. I want to thank Councilman Oh
11 in particular for all of his work in
12 promoting Philadelphia globally. We will
13 soon be hiring a Director of
14 International Investment, whose job will
15 be built on the Councilman's efforts,
16 increasing export activity and attracting
17 new businesses to locate here in
18 Philadelphia.

19 This budget also proposes
20 several measures in line with
21 Councilmembers Squilla and Domb's laser
22 focus on decreasing tax delinquency. I'm
23 proud to say that we already expect to
24 collect \$69 million more in additional
25 delinquent tax revenue over the next five

2 years.

3 And to help address this
4 problem further, we're proposing to
5 increase the number of taxpayer service
6 representatives and to add technical
7 programming to Revenue's IT system.

8 The budget also addresses
9 systemic issues in the City's Mail Room,
10 which, as Controller Butkovitz recently
11 brought to light, have wasted taxpayers'
12 dollars and delayed critical
13 communications to Philadelphians on
14 everything from subpoenas to water bills.
15 While the backlog of the Mail Room has
16 been eliminated, funding will be
17 allocated to consult with industry
18 experts and to hire additional staff so
19 this issue does not reoccur.

20 These programs are important,
21 but by themselves do not change the
22 status quo.

23 I've been listening to budget
24 addresses in this Chamber for over two
25 decades. And while we've had great

2 mayors who have done many important
3 things, the core challenge facing our
4 city has not changed, and that's just
5 unacceptable.

6 While over the past five years
7 City funding for our schools has gone up
8 nearly \$400 million annually, funding
9 cuts from Harrisburg continue to deprive
10 our children of the education they
11 deserve.

12 Councilmembers Gym and
13 Blackwell's recent hearings on the state
14 of our schools have unearthed some
15 shocking and troubling statistics.

16 Nearly 80 percent of all
17 Philadelphia schools, including charters,
18 are in Pennsylvania's lowest performance
19 tiers. And currently 46 percent of our
20 kids enter kindergarten unprepared.

21 Our failure to properly educate
22 our children has reverberated throughout
23 our economy. Two-thirds of
24 Philadelphians currently looking for work
25 test at the 4th to 8th grade level in

1 3/3/16 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS
2 reading, writing, and math, leaving them
3 largely unable to secure
4 family-sustaining jobs.

5 And that's just people who
6 haven't given up the job search
7 altogether.

8 Philadelphia has the second
9 highest percentage of work-age residents
10 who are out of the labor force. Only
11 Detroit has a higher percentage.

12 A report that just came out
13 Tuesday also found that nearly half of
14 Philadelphians live in what are
15 classified as distressed zip codes. In
16 these zip codes, there is high poverty,
17 few people with high school degrees, and
18 marginal, if any, increase in businesses
19 in recent years.

20 If we ever want the Mayor's
21 budget address to be about something
22 other than our failing school system and
23 its repercussions, then we need to
24 implement serious, radical, and ambitious
25 policies.

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1 3/3/16 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS

2 So this year, I'm proposing
3 five interlinking programs that together
4 will create the real change
5 Philadelphians want and deserve.

6 The first is pre-K.

7 (Applause.)

8 MAYOR KENNEY: Through an
9 investment of \$256 million in combination
10 with state and federal funding, we could
11 have 25,000 quality pre-K seats in
12 Philadelphia over the next five years.

13 (Applause.)

14 MAYOR KENNEY: Councilwoman
15 Reynolds Brown was among the first to
16 educate me on the importance of
17 affordable, quality pre-K, especially for
18 our low-income communities. Because most
19 of a child's brain development occurs in
20 the first five years of life, quality
21 early education gives our most vulnerable
22 children the tools to compete with their
23 wealthier peers.

24 In fact, a range of studies
25 show that children who participate in

1 3/3/16 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS
2 quality pre-K are far likely to succeed
3 than those who don't.

4 A study by the William Penn
5 Foundation found that the percentage of
6 4-year-olds with strong academic and
7 social skills more than tripled after
8 participating in the state's pre-K
9 program.

10 A Chicago-based study found
11 that children who participated in
12 high-quality pre-school were 20 percent
13 less likely to be arrested for a felony
14 or incarcerated as young adults than
15 those who did not attend.

16 By age 30, individuals served
17 by a North Carolina early learning
18 program were four times more likely to
19 graduate college and 42 percent more
20 likely to be consistently employed.

21 In addition to improving our
22 School District's academic outcomes,
23 quality pre-K also has positive fiscal
24 benefits for our entire school system by
25 reducing the need for special education

2 services.

3 (Applause.)

4 MAYOR KENNEY: The School

5 District currently spends an average of

6 \$23,000 for one child to receive special

7 education services for just one year.

8 According to the City's Pre-K Commission,

9 Philadelphia could save approximately

10 \$5.6 million per grade cohort if all

11 children were enrolled in quality pre-K.

12 (Applause.)

13 MAYOR KENNEY: There are also

14 very real economic benefits for both

15 small businesses and overall job

16 creation. A report frequently cited by

17 the Economy League found that for every

18 \$1 spent on pre-K, at least \$1.79 is

19 generated in local spending. That same

20 study also found that for every 20 jobs

21 created in the Pennsylvania early

22 education industry, five unrelated jobs

23 were also created outside of that sector.

24 (Applause.)

25 MAYOR KENNEY: Pre-K is also

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1 3/3/16 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS
2 essential for stabilizing our existing
3 workforce. If working parents do not
4 have reliable child care, then they can't
5 be reliable employees.

6 (Applause.)

7 MAYOR KENNEY: And if they
8 can't be reliable employees, then they
9 can't properly care for their children.

10 The second policy we're
11 proposing to bring real change to
12 Philadelphia is the creation of 25
13 community schools.

14 (Applause.)

15 MAYOR KENNEY: And I want to
16 thank the Council President for his
17 leadership on this issue and for working
18 with me to advance this initiative.

19 As many of you are already
20 aware, community schools are public
21 schools, where a dedicated coordinator
22 directly integrates largely already
23 existing social services into that school
24 so children can access them easily.

25 In many cases, these services

1 3/3/16 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS
2 are also available to the larger
3 community, making the school a hub of the
4 neighborhood. This helps increase
5 parental engagement and community
6 investment in the success of the school.

7 The services provided in each
8 school will vary based on the needs of
9 that community, but the idea is the same.
10 If we can address the things happening
11 outside the classroom that keep our
12 students from learning, whether that be
13 poverty or hunger or healthcare, then we
14 can improve the lives and futures of our
15 kids.

16 (Applause.)

17 MAYOR KENNEY: The
18 effectiveness of the community school
19 strategy, particularly in low-income,
20 low-performing districts, can be seen all
21 over the country.

22 There is a community high
23 school in one of Los Angeles' highest
24 need neighborhoods where 99 percent of
25 the students graduate and go on to

2 college.

3 And Cincinnati closed its
4 racial and socioeconomic achievement gap
5 by 10 percent thanks to the community
6 school model.

7 The third policy that will make
8 a real difference for both our education
9 system and our neighborhoods is a \$350
10 million investment in our community
11 infrastructure.

12 (Applause.)

13 MAYOR KENNEY: There is not a
14 Councilmember in this room who hasn't
15 seen firsthand the devastating impacts of
16 underinvestment in parks, rec centers,
17 and libraries.

18 On Monday --

19 (Applause.)

20 MAYOR KENNEY: On Monday, I was
21 at Vare Recreation Center with Councilman
22 Johnson, listening to parents who had
23 lost their children to gun violence, and
24 I couldn't help but think if we had the
25 resources to actually make Vare a center

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1 3/3/16 - STATED - BUDGET ADDRESS
2 of the community, then these parents
3 wouldn't even be here. They'd be in the
4 other room watching their kids playing
5 basketball.

6 And the facts back that up.
7 Study after study shows that we can
8 improve the public safety of our
9 neighborhoods, expand educational
10 opportunities for our children, and
11 create jobs, all by just investing in our
12 existing parks, libraries, and recreation
13 centers.

14 (Applause.)

15 MAYOR KENNEY: The Department
16 of Parks and Recreation, including the
17 Free Library, are the largest provider of
18 after-school programs in the City. And
19 according to the National Center for
20 Educational Statistics, students who do
21 extracurricular activities are more
22 likely to have a higher attendance rate
23 and GPA than those who don't.

24 Investments in parks have also
25 been shown to reduce crime. When the

2 City and the Fairmount Park Conservancy
3 invested \$5 million in Hunting Park,
4 crime went down --

5 (Applause.)

6 MAYOR KENNEY: -- crime went
7 down 89 percent within a half mile radius
8 of the park over the next three years.

9 These investments also help
10 create jobs and find employment.

11 A third of the visits our
12 libraries see each year are
13 Philadelphians seeking assistance in the
14 job application process. Additionally,
15 fixing these facilities and parks will
16 create hundreds of construction jobs for
17 working families, and the improved
18 infrastructure may also support
19 additional programming jobs for people in
20 the community.

21 Investing in community
22 infrastructure also builds on the Council
23 President's proposal to spend \$150
24 million on increasing energy efficiency
25 in City-owned buildings. As the Council

2 President has rightly pointed out,
3 investments in energy efficiency create
4 middle-class jobs and help the City save
5 money that can be reinvested in other
6 critical initiatives, like education and
7 public safety.

8 (Applause.)

9 MAYOR KENNEY: So as our fourth
10 policy initiative, I am proposing issuing
11 a \$100 million bond to make
12 energy-efficient infrastructure
13 improvements to branch libraries, police
14 stations, firehouses, and other City
15 properties.

16 (Applause.)

17 MAYOR KENNEY: The fifth and
18 final policy I'm proposing is an
19 additional \$26 million investment in our
20 pension fund over the next five years.
21 Currently, our pension fund, as you all
22 know, is less than 50 percent funded.

23 Over the next five years, we
24 will spend \$3.4 billion trying to address
25 that deficit. That's nearly the cost of

2 our current annual budget. And as a
3 result, we'll have significantly less to
4 spend on other programs Philadelphians
5 need and want.

6 Now, I won't pretend that this
7 \$26 million investment will solve all our
8 pension fund's underlying problems.
9 Councilman Derek Green and I have talked
10 about this at length, and I know that we
11 still must commit ourselves to working
12 with all of our unions.

13 The first test of that will
14 come this June, and we are committed to
15 negotiating a fair and equitable contract
16 with District Council 33.

17 (Applause.)

18 MAYOR KENNEY: But making this
19 \$26 million investment is still an
20 important indication to the credit
21 agencies, our lenders and, most
22 importantly, to the City workforce that
23 the Mayor and City Council are committed
24 to addressing this serious problem.

25 I am proposing to pay for this

2 pension investment as well as for quality
3 pre-K, community schools, and investments
4 in community infrastructure and energy
5 efficiency by levying a 3 cent tax on
6 sugary drink distributors.

7 (Applause.)

8 MAYOR KENNEY: And as some of
9 you may have already heard, big soda
10 isn't thrilled about that at all.

11 Now, I don't have anything
12 against our city's large distributors or
13 even the big soda companies. I think
14 they're good people. We just disagree on
15 this issue.

16 See, the problem is that big
17 soda charges our citizens, small
18 businesses and distributors, much, much
19 more than it costs for them to make the
20 soda in the first place. And then they
21 use some of those profits to fund
22 lobbyists, who come here and say that the
23 tax on sugary drinks will cost jobs and
24 devastate small businesses. And they're
25 pretty persuasive. So persuasive they

2 even got me to believe them four years
3 ago.

4 And I'll tell you the line that
5 really got me four years ago was the
6 claim that this tax would hurt low-income
7 minority communities. And that's really
8 a concerning claim for me. But the truth
9 is that soda companies are the ones
10 actually targeting their advertising at
11 low-income minority communities in the
12 first place.

13 (Applause.)

14 MAYOR KENNEY: A 2009 study
15 found that lower income African Americans
16 and Latino neighborhoods have far more
17 outdoor ads for sugary drinks than higher
18 income neighborhoods or white low-income
19 neighborhoods.

20 Researchers at Yale also found
21 that African American youth see 80 to 90
22 percent more ads for sugary drinks than
23 their white counterparts.

24 The other concerning claim
25 about this tax is that it will cause an

2 employment crisis, but we know that's
3 false because we just went through that a
4 number of years ago when we passed the
5 liquor tax.

6 Employment did not slow down
7 after the liquor tax was instated. In
8 fact, Philadelphia's restaurant and bar
9 scene has grown by leaps and bounds.

10 Now, the two largest unionized
11 beverage truck driver employers in
12 Philadelphia are Pepsi and Coke. So it's
13 easy to think that when the demand
14 decreases for Pepsi and Coke, those
15 drivers may be out of a job, but Pepsi
16 and Coke drivers deliver all the products
17 under the Pepsi and Coke label, which
18 includes not only sugary drinks but also
19 bottled water and the dozens of other
20 products they have created that would be
21 exempt from these taxes.

22 This tax also won't hurt the
23 restaurant industry because restaurants
24 are already trending away from their
25 reliance on soda profits.

2 I have a large restaurateur in
3 the City who called me yesterday to talk
4 about this issue and told me he gives the
5 soda away.

6 Applebee's was the first family
7 dining restaurant chain to remove soda
8 from its children's menus, joining fast
9 food chains Burger King, McDonald's,
10 Wendy's, and Dairy Queen.

11 And furthermore, this tax won't
12 wipe out small businesses. Small
13 grocers, bodegas, convenience stores are
14 already stocking and selling non-sugary
15 beverages. And they are doing that
16 because customers' preferences are
17 already changing, even without a tax.

18 During the last two decades,
19 U.S. full-calorie soda sales have dropped
20 by over 25 percent, while sales of
21 bottled water, which both Pepsi and Coke
22 also sell, have shot through the roof.

23 Just in Philadelphia, between
24 2007 and 2013, daily soda intake dropped
25 by 16 percent.

2 Additionally, the programs this
3 tax will fund, like pre-K and investments
4 in parks, libraries, and rec centers,
5 will actually help small business. Child
6 care and early learning professionals
7 generally spend most of their earnings
8 locally. As I mentioned earlier, for
9 every \$1 invested in pre-K in
10 Pennsylvania, a total of \$1.79 is
11 generated in total spending within the
12 state.

13 Furthermore, most child care
14 centers are small, minority, women-owned
15 businesses, and this investment will go a
16 long way towards helping them grow and
17 expand.

18 (Applause.)

19 MAYOR KENNEY: The budget I'm
20 proposing today also contains other
21 policies to help small business. In
22 addition to the Storefront Improvement
23 Program I spoke about earlier, I am also
24 proposing a reduction of the Business
25 Income and Receipts Tax to 6.15 percent

2 and including an exemption of \$100,000.

3 During that same time, we also
4 plan to reduce the wage tax to 3.33
5 percent for non-residents and 3.73
6 percent for residents, bringing that tax
7 to its lowest rate since 1975.

8 (Applause.)

9 MAYOR KENNEY: But none of that
10 can happen, not the stimulus, not the
11 reduction in taxes, not the pre-K, not
12 the community schools, not desperately
13 needed investments in parks, rec centers,
14 and libraries, if we don't pass this tax.
15 There is simply nowhere else to find the
16 revenue.

17 We all know we can't raise
18 property taxes again, God forbid. Who
19 will want to go through that one more
20 time? We've already raised them four
21 times in the last five years.

22 And it's simply not fair to ask
23 our homeowners or any other
24 Philadelphian, for that matter, to pay
25 more while large soda companies and

2 wealthy distributors are making
3 incredible profit margins.

4 (Applause.)

5 MAYOR KENNEY: We also know we
6 can't find this money in the budget.

7 While we've combed this budget for
8 savings and even recovered additional
9 tax-delinquent revenue, our budget is so
10 tight due to the cuts made during the
11 recession and the size of our pension
12 obligations, the money just isn't there.

13 PILOTs, while still worth
14 exploring, are also not going to get us
15 the recurring revenue we need to fund
16 such large-scale programs.

17 Even in Boston where PILOTs are
18 very, very successful, the city receives
19 just half of what we need to operate
20 pre-K on an annual basis.

21 But the most persuasive
22 argument of all for the tax is that
23 Philadelphians elected us to implement
24 the very programs this revenue will fund.

25 Last --

3 MAYOR KENNEY: Is that my
4 mother up there?

5 Last year was the education
6 election. The voters approved a Pre-K
7 Commission with an 80 percent mandate,
8 dramatically outperforming --

9 (Applause.)

10 MAYOR KENNEY: -- dramatically
11 outperforming any other ballot measure.

12 And at forum after forum after
13 forum after forum, we listened to
14 Philadelphians beg for safe community
15 spaces, family-sustaining jobs, and
16 quality neighborhood schools.

17 We can give our citizens all of
18 those things with just one tax. And I
19 know that one tax can make some very
20 wealthy and very powerful people very,
21 very upset, but I've seen this Council
22 take on special interests before, and I
23 know together we can do it again.

24 I just want to give you a
25 personal story of something that's

2 happened in the last couple months that
3 just has impacted me to a great point.

4 I was recently visiting a
5 quality pre-K in Mantua and was sitting
6 in one of those little chairs that the
7 little kids sit in, hoping that it
8 wouldn't break. And two little
9 4-year-old boys came over to me,
10 unafraid, bright smiles, engaged,
11 articulate, happy. And we chatted a
12 little bit about how was school and how
13 do you like your teachers, and they liked
14 everything. And they were taking in all
15 the press and they were sponging
16 everything in. So much they were taking
17 in that one little boy reached up and
18 grabbed my nose and said, Man, you got a
19 big nose.

20 I said, Very observant. I
21 appreciate that.

22 Now let me go to two days
23 later. Two days later, I attended a
24 visit -- I had a visit at the Pennypack
25 School. Pennypack School is a high

2 school in the prison, where young men who
3 have been charged with serious crimes are
4 being held for trial. But they have to
5 go to high school.

6 And I walked to the classroom,
7 and there were four young men in prison
8 garb reading Macbeth, reading the parts
9 of Macbeth out loud to each other.

10 I walked into another classroom
11 and there were three kids, three young
12 men standing there, very proud, to
13 explain to me what a parabola is. They
14 had model of one. And by the time they
15 got done explaining it to me, I still
16 didn't understand what it was, but I knew
17 that they understood what it was.

18 And after that, before I left,
19 I sat in a group, a circle, with those
20 young men and we talked about their life,
21 their future, their situation. And we
22 were just chatting. It's hard to talk
23 when you're in that circumstance. And
24 the young man said to me, Mayor, may I
25 say something?

2 I said, Absolutely.

3 He said, This is the best
4 school I've ever attended.

5 The best school he ever
6 attended in jail.

7 It is our responsibility to
8 those two 4-year-old little boys and to
9 every 4-year-old little boy and girl in
10 this city to not let them go on the road
11 to Pennypack, but get them on the road to
12 Penn.

13 (Standing ovation.)

14 MAYOR KENNEY: Thank you all.
15 Let's get to work.

16 (Applause.)

17 (Pause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Folks, if you want to leave, you got to
20 leave quietly, because we still have to
21 wrap up the Council session. I'm just
22 trying to let people get out. So if
23 you're going to leave, please leave very
24 quietly so we can conclude the Council
25 session. Thank you very much for your

2 cooperation.

3 Right now are there any
4 speeches on the part of the minority?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Any
7 speeches on the part of the majority?

8 There being no -- the Chair
9 recognizes Councilman Jones.

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: I just want
11 to say after that presentation, I have
12 nothing else to say.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
14 right. Okay.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
17 sure the Mayor would be glad to hear
18 that.

19 That concludes the speeches.

20 I will now recognize
21 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for a motion
22 to adjourn.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
25 adjourned until Thursday, March 10th,
