10	Whereas, two short years later,	
11	Paul met and married the love of his	
12	life, Rosemary. Together they have two	
13	children, Deirdre and Brendan, and five

15	Whereas, Paul was an active	
16	member of Teamsters Local 115 for 32	
17	years, rising through the ranks and	
18	becoming shop steward until his	
19	retirement in 2011; and	
20	COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,	
21	Paul's love of Gaelic football has never	
22	waned. Paul is a founding member of the	
23	Shamrocks football team and has been an	
24	active member in the GAA since he arrived	
25	in Philadelphia. He also owns the

So the news that it was almost 18 a failed cause, but there said, before 19 20 the day -- 15 of them were executed within a week. There said, before the 21 day, at least their somber face will 22 awake the nation of Ireland, which it 23 did, and a few years after that, we won 2.4 25 independence for 26 of the 32 counties.

This morning we're doing a 3 resolution recognizing and honoring the 4 5 outstanding contributions and achievements of Julian Abele, an accomplished architect and Philadelphia resident. 8 9 Whereas, Julian Francis Abele, the first African-American graduate of 10 11 the University of Pennsylvania's Architecture Program, received scant 12 recognition during his lifetime despite 13 14 his significant and many professional contributions; and 15 16 Whereas, although Fiske 17 Kimball, noted architectural historian and director of the Philadelphia Museum 18 of Art, acknowledged that Abele was one 19 20 of the most sensitive designers anywhere in America in 1942, Abele remained 21 virtually unknown outside of 22 23 Philadelphia's architectural community until the '70s and '80s; and 2.4 25 Whereas, born in Philadelphia

Page 20 1 3/10/16 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS 2. in 1881, Abele lived most of his life in the City, residing at 1515 Christian 3 Street for several decades of his adult 4 5 life; and COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: 6 7 Whereas, an accomplished student, Abele graduated from the Philadelphia Museum 8 9 and School of Industrial Art in 1898 and entered into the prestigious Architecture 10 11 Program at the University of Pennsylvania 12 that very same year, where he won several impressive awards and served as the 13 14 president of the University's 15 Architectural Society during his senior 16 year; and Whereas, after graduating from 17 18 Penn in 1902, Abele augmented his education by studying architectural 19 20 design at the Pennsylvania Academy of the 21 Fine Arts while working evenings for the noted Philadelphia architect Louis C. 22 23 Hickman; Whereas, Abele spent the next 2.4 25 five years studying design in Paris and

3	University Chapel, as well as many other	
4	buildings on the campus; and	
5	Whereas, in 1942, Abele was	
6	elected to the American Institute of

9	in his private life, Abele was a quiet,	
10	serious man, yet brilliant and witty, who	
11	appreciated all things French, enjoying	
12	fine wine, classical music and opera and	
13	who engaged in water color painting,	
14	sketching, jewelry and furniture making;	
15	and	
16	Whereas, he married Marguerite	
17	Bulle, a French woman, and had two	
18	children, a son and a daughter, but after	
19	several years the couple parted although	
20	they never divorced; and	
21	Whereas, today, we appreciate	
22	Abele as one of the early 20th Century's	
23	most adept designers of revival	
24	buildings, who rejuvenated many	
25	long-dormant styles as vital, modern
