21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
22 you, Mr. President. I move that the

10 Those opposed?

11 (No response.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 ayes have it, and the Journal is
14 approved.

15 The next order of business is
16 requests for leaves of absence, and the
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. On behalf of the
20 majority, a leave of absence is requested
21 for Councilwoman Maria Quinones-Sanchez.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilman. Leave shall be
24 granted.

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

3 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. On behalf of the
5 republicans, there are no requests for
6 leave of absence.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Thank you, Councilman.

9 At this time, I would like to
10 dispense with the regular order of
11 business and I would like to thank and
12 welcome everyone who has come down and
13 taken time out of their busy day. We
14 hope that your stay here today is a
15 pleasurable one, so much so that you come
16 back again. So, again, thank you for
17 your attendance.

18 At this time, the Chair
19 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,
20 who will present a resolution honoring
21 Philadelphia's Non-Profit Women Leaders.
22 Would Judge Renee Cardwell Hughes and
23 those accompanying her please join the
24 Councilwoman at the podium.

25 (Councilmembers and guests

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

4 joining the Councilwoman, we have

5 Councilwoman Gym, Councilwoman Parker,

6 Councilman Jones, and Councilwoman Bass.

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,

8 Mr. President.

9 Each year my office searches to

10 figure out how we can continue to keep

11 the celebration of Women's History Month

12 fresh and inspiring, and last month I was

13 deeply inspired by Councilman Jones'

14 recognition of African American

15 physicians and dentists and thought, wow,

16 what can my office do to make the

17 celebration of Women's History Month

18 special.

19 So what I know has never been

20 done is the lifting up of the non-profit

21 community as a whole, but specifically of

22 women who are running non-profits across

23 the City every single day and night

24 trying to make our city better.

25 While I started my career in

2 the classroom, I spent about 10, 15 years
3 in the non-profit community writing
4 proposals and funding proposals and
5 writing youth programs and the like, and
6 what we need to know is that the
7 non-profit sector is a major economic
8 force right here in Pennsylvania, and
9 women are doing their part every single
10 day to make a difference.

11 So this morning on the occasion
12 of Women's History Month, we are in
13 praise of dynamic women, in my own view,
14 very, very good people who give of
15 themselves, share their insights, give
16 guidance, and make our hearts so very
17 grateful.

18 Honoring Philadelphia's
19 Non-Profit Women Leaders in recognition
20 of Women's History Month.

21 Whereas, non-profits are an
22 economic engine for the Philadelphia
23 local and regional economy; and

24 Whereas, non-profits' vast
25 economic contributions are evident in the

2 United States' GDP. According to The
3 Independent Sector, non-profits account
4 for 5.5 percent of the GDP, the
5 equivalent of \$805 billion. The impact
6 of non-profit organizations is
7 indisputably far-reaching and vital to
8 the United States economy and well-being;
9 and

10 Whereas, Judge Renee Cardwell
11 Hughes, if she would step forward,
12 currently serves as the CEO of the
13 American Red Cross of Southeastern
14 Pennsylvania. According to the -- prior
15 to becoming the CEO, Judge Hughes served
16 as a trial judge in the Court of Common
17 Pleas, the First Judicial District of
18 Pennsylvania, which encompasses the City
19 of Philadelphia, as well as the Trial
20 Division of the court, since her
21 appointment to the bench in 1995 by
22 Governor Tom Ridge. Prior to that, she
23 was elected to serve a full ten-year
24 beginning January 1996 and reelected in
25 2005 to a second term. Every single day

2 she's lifting up citizens when their
3 homes get burnt out, when the City goes
4 into an emergency crisis. The American
5 Red Cross under this woman's leadership
6 is there to make a difference.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And
9 whereas, Sharmain Matlock-Turner is the
10 President and CEO of the Urban Affairs
11 Coalition. Having been at the helm of
12 UAC since March of 1999, Matlock-Turner
13 has been a tireless advocate for families
14 and communities across the Greater
15 Philadelphia region. In addition to her
16 community development and economic
17 justice work, Matlock-Turner is committed
18 to improving the lives of Philadelphia's
19 children. Nearly twenty years ago, she
20 founded West Oak Lane Charter School.
21 Though she specializes in the separate
22 but intersecting fields, Matlock-Turner
23 continues to serve her community by
24 sitting on the boards of various
25 non-profits and other institutions; and

2 Whereas, Reverend Dr. Lorina
3 Marshall-Blake is the President of the
4 Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority Incorporated's
5 Omega Omega Chapter in Philadelphia. She
6 is Vice President of Community Affairs
7 for the Independence Blue Cross and also
8 President of the Independence Blue Cross
9 Foundation. Her responsibility is to
10 ensure that decision-makers, at the
11 highest levels, have a clear
12 understanding of Blue Cross's goals and
13 objectives and its commitment to
14 subscribers, impacting over 3 million
15 subscribers in the multi-billion dollar
16 health insurance industry as a whole; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,
18 Catzie Vilayphonh is the Creative
19 Director of Laos in the House. Catzie is
20 also an award-winning spoken word poet
21 and writer. As one-half of the group
22 Yellow Rage, she became one of the first
23 Asian American females to appear on HBO's
24 Def Poetry Jam. Now Vilayphonh has
25 thrown herself into Laos in the House,

2 her multimedia project to spotlight a
3 Southeast Asian community with a lower
4 profile than the better-known refugees of
5 Vietnam and Cambodia; and

6 Whereas, Maxine C. Harvey is
7 the President of the Philadelphia Alumni
8 Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority
9 Incorporated. Since its founding in
10 1913, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority has
11 clearly distinguished itself as a public
12 service organization that boldly
13 confronts the challenges of African
14 Americans and hence, all Americans. The
15 chapter's commitment to the sorority's
16 Five-Point Programmatic Thrust continues
17 to be focused on addressing the needs of
18 the underserved; and

19 COUNCILMAN JONES: As an
20 enlightened male member of Council,
21 Valerie Villines is the President of the
22 Philadelphia Graduate Chapter of Zeta Phi
23 Beta Sorority Incorporated, Beta Delta
24 Zeta Chapter. Beta Delta Zeta Chapter is
25 the first graduate chapter of the Zeta in

2 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the
3 home chapter of the Zeta Founder Arizona
4 Cleaver Stemmons. Zeta Phi Beta Sorority
5 Incorporated was founded January 16th,
6 1920 at Howard University, Washington,
7 DC. Since its inception, the
8 organization has been innovative in that
9 it has been chronicling the number of
10 firsts. It was the first chapter in
11 Africa, the first to form an auxiliary
12 chapter, and the first to be
13 constitutionally bound to the fraternity
14 Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity Incorporated.
15 Zeta Phi Beta has chapters in hundreds of
16 places worldwide membership and,
17 therefore

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

19 Reverend Bonnie Camarda has served as
20 Director of Partnerships for The
21 Salvation Army of Greater Philadelphia
22 since 1999. Born in Havana, Cuba but
23 having made Philadelphia her home,
24 Reverend Camarda has been an instrumental
25 leader in the interfaith movement in the

2 region. Outside of her own personal
3 ministry, Reverend Camarda leads various
4 efforts around the City against violence
5 and organizes workshops around HIV/AIDS
6 prevention. She is a passionate advocate
7 and believes the opportunity should be
8 accessible to everyone. She's also on
9 the board of PHA; and

10 Whereas, Evelyn Marcha-Hidalgo,
11 CEO/Executive Director of Intercultural
12 Family Services, Inc., began her work
13 with the agency in 1981. Since that
14 time, under Ms. Marcha-Hidalgo's
15 leadership, Intercultural has evolved
16 into a family-focused, multicultural, and
17 multi-purpose agency that provides a
18 variety of public health and human
19 services to first-generation Americans
20 and life-long Philadelphians alike.

21 She's in my district too.

22 Ms. Marcha-Hidalgo's areas of
23 expertise include financial management,
24 program development and design, and
25 cultural competency training; and

2 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,

3 Laura Wentz is the President of the
4 Philadelphia Chapter of the Coalition of
5 Labor Union Women (CLUW). The Coalition
6 of Labor Union Women is America's only
7 national organization for union women.

8 The primary mission of CLUW is to unify
9 all union women in a viable organization
10 to determine our common problems and
11 concerns and to develop action programs
12 within the framework of our unions to
13 deal effectively with our objectives; and

14 Whereas, Jeannine L. Lisitski
15 has been the Executive Director of Women
16 Against Abuse since 2009. Women Against
17 Abuse is the leading domestic violence
18 advocate and service provider in
19 Philadelphia and the largest in
20 Pennsylvania. Women Against Abuse has a
21 two-pronged mission of providing
22 life-saving services to people
23 experiencing domestic violence while
24 leading the struggle to end domestic
25 violence. Ms. Lisitski has worked for

2 more than 22 years in the public benefit
3 sector, focusing on issues of poverty,
4 violence and homelessness; and

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: I just want
6 you to know I'm not the only enlightened
7 male in here.

8 Whereas, Terri Matthews founded
9 a charitable resource called Jaden's
10 Voice, Incorporated where she has held
11 the position of CEO since inception. To
12 date, Ms. Matthews has personally
13 injected her own resources to establish
14 Jaden's Voice and to provide services and
15 equipment to families in need. Her
16 enthusiasm for autism advocacy led her to
17 her election as President of Early
18 Intervention Services for the State of
19 Pennsylvania; and now, therefore, be it

20 Resolved, by the Council of the
21 City of Philadelphia, and enlightened
22 males, that the Council does hereby honor
23 Philadelphia's Non-Profit Women Leaders
24 in recognition of Women's History Month.

25 (Applause.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair recognizes Judge Hughes for
4 remarks.

5 JUDGE HUGHES: Council
6 President, thank you so much, and to all
7 of Council, thank you for recognizing the
8 not-for-profit leadership in our
9 community.

10 I am particularly humbled to be
11 standing up here with so many spectacular
12 women, many of whom I work with and have
13 worked with throughout my career.

14 I consider Philadelphia to be
15 the best city in the world, and I know
16 people would debate.

17 (Applause.)

18 JUDGE HUGHES: They want to
19 talk about London. They want to talk
20 about Paris. No. Let's talk about the
21 real deal.

22 This Council saw fit to
23 recognize women, who constitute 47
24 percent of our workforce. The
25 not-for-profit sector, as Councilwoman

2 Blondell Reynolds Brown has shared with
3 you, has an extraordinary impact on the
4 economic viability of our country. Women
5 lead differently. We are inclusive. We
6 are holistic. We are collaborative. We
7 get it done.

8 (Applause.)

9 JUDGE HUGHES: And we get it
10 done earning 79 cents for every dollar
11 y'all pay a man. It is really important
12 that you own that fact. I am confident
13 that no one out here with regard to
14 gender thinks it appropriate for your
15 child to earn less than the person
16 sitting next to them doing the very same
17 work. So it is critical that you
18 understand and that this Council take
19 lead on ensuring that women will be paid
20 equally for the work that they do.

21 It is also important to
22 recognize that while you see
23 extraordinary leadership here in front of
24 you, only 4.6 percent of the 500 biggest
25 companies in America are led by women.

2 Of the Fortune 500, only 20 companies are
3 led by women. We have a long way to go,
4 America, a long way to go, despite the
5 fact that women are more likely to
6 graduate from college than men.

7 So we come to the table well
8 educated. We come to the table
9 energetic. We come to the table
10 committed to the community and the
11 betterment of the community. So I call
12 on all of you to do what we do, respect
13 talent and let cream rise to the top.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Thank you so much. And with
17 that, Council will be at ease.

18 Hold on. Council will not be
19 at ease. I'm told we have one more
20 speaker. I'm sorry.

21 MS. MATTHEWS: So first I want
22 to give honor to God for an opportunity
23 to stand before all of you. Thank you
24 for the Council men and women that are
25 here today. And after following this

2 beautiful lady behind me, I mean cream
3 rises to the top.

4 Let me explain something to
5 you. The City of Philadelphia is in dire
6 need. These non-profit organizations
7 cannot do it without talent. We are
8 talented leaders, but we need talent and
9 we need support. We don't need words.
10 We don't need cameras and opportunities
11 to be in media. We need people to get
12 behind us, support us with their actions,
13 with their money, with their time, and
14 open up doors that we need in order to
15 service the many people in Philadelphia
16 that need our help. We do this with no
17 reason to take a paycheck home. This is
18 a mutual benefit to support our community
19 to take us to the next level.

20 I cannot thank Councilwoman
21 Blondell enough for the opportunity to
22 stand before these other women and to
23 highlight what it is that we do. We're
24 on assignment. So you're seeing us
25 because part of our assignment is to be

2 seen, but there are many non-profits that
3 are doing things, feeding the homeless,
4 sleeping under bridges, taking blankets
5 to people that I work with day in and day
6 out that don't get this type of
7 recognition and they don't get seen.
8 Please understand that we cannot do it
9 alone and we need all of you. And it's
10 great to be recognized, but recognize us
11 with your money.

12 Thank you.

13 (Appause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
15 Council will now be at ease.

16 (Council at ease.)

19 Council President. Today I offer two
20 bills, one resolution, and two
21 resolutions and one bill on your behalf.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
25 authorizing the transfer in

1 3/31/16 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 appropriations for Fiscal Year 2017
3 within the General Fund, from the
4 Department of Prisons to the Mayor -
5 Office of Housing and Community
6 Development, to support landscaping and
7 lot-cleaning jobs in the Philadelphia
8 Re-Entry Employment Program for Returning
9 Citizens.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
11 will be referred to committee.

12 CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance
13 amending Section 19-1806 of The
14 Philadelphia Code, entitled
15 "Authorization of Realty Use and
16 Occupancy Tax," by adding an exclusion
17 from the tax for certain new businesses.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
19 will also be referred to committee.

20 CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance
21 amending Section 9-3908 of The
22 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Notification
23 of License Obligation," by adding a
24 requirement for the City to provide an
25 explanation of the license requirements

2 for vacant properties.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
4 will be referred to committee.

5 CHIEF CLERK: And a
6 non-privileged resolution calling on the
7 General Assembly of the Commonwealth of
8 Pennsylvania to oppose House Bill 1800 of
9 the 2015-2016 Session, currently before
10 the Committee on Labor and Industry,
11 which amends the "Workers' Compensation
12 Act" and creates unnecessary changes to a
13 successful system.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
15 that will be on next week's Final Passage
16 Calendar.

17 CHIEF CLERK: And a
18 non-privileged resolution appointing
19 Rasheia Johnson to the Board of Directors
20 of the Philadelphia Municipal Authority.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
22 that will be referred to committee.

23 CHIEF CLERK: And a
24 non-privileged resolution appointing
25 Councilmember Derek Green to the

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
4 will be on next week's Final Passage

6 And the Chair recognizes

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. One non-privileged
10 resolution, which I'd like to speak to.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Councilman, at the time of the vote?

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: No; now,
14 because I want to defer it until next
15 week.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
17 sorry. Okay.

18 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged
19 resolution calling on the Sheriff's
20 Department and Mortgage Foreclosure
21 Diversion Court to impose a Moratorium on
22 all residential mortgage foreclosure
23 sales and related Ejectment actions
24 resulting from residential mortgage
25 foreclosures in Philadelphia.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
5 Mr. President and colleagues. I
6 submitted this with a delay of a week so
7 that I have an opportunity to meet with
8 stakeholders that are involved with the
9 Sheriff Sale process in the City of
10 Philadelphia, which includes the Sheriff,
11 the courts, and relevant support agencies
12 that are involved in the continuum of
13 property seizure. The reason that's
14 important to me is because we held a
15 hearing which chronicled some of the
16 issues related to what we have in the
17 City of Philadelphia.

18 Now, I respect the right of
19 property owners to maintain their
20 property and collect their debts. I
21 remember this body, working with
22 Councilwoman Tasco, where we had
23 moratoriums in the past, which resulted
24 in the creation of the Mortgage Diversion
25 Program, which is a national model, which

2 has saved thousands of homes. However,
3 everything can be improved. Everything
4 must be checked, and all things can be
5 moved into a positive future.

6 For some people, the time clock
7 is the urgency of now, because people are
8 actually losing their homes. Future
9 residents that are to go through this
10 system should have an improved system.
11 Enough issues were raised by way of who
12 does service, whether it should be the
13 service of the Sheriff's Department or a
14 private law firm. Enough issues have
15 been raised by way of technical
16 assistance of being able to have people
17 fill out in common language how to save
18 their homes. And some of those questions
19 have resonated to the point where we sent
20 out the recommendations for improvement.
21 I want to remind Councilmembers to take a
22 look at those recommendations as we
23 approach the budget process so that we
24 can help put money where our mouth is.

25 Thank you, Mr. President.

8 here specifically on the issue of youth
9 gun violence here in the City of
10 Philadelphia. We started at 10:00 in the
11 morning and we ended roughly close to
12 7:00 p.m. in the evening, and all of this
13 was to begin to look at comprehensively
14 the issue of youth gun violence here in
15 the City of Philadelphia, how we can do a
16 better job in collaborating and
17 partnering with those who are on the
18 ground addressing the issue but, most
19 importantly, as a city and the City
20 agencies that work under us can do a
21 better job collaborating and working
22 together.

23 One thing that really stuck out
24 during the hearing was oftentimes we talk
25 about preventing the shootings that are

2 taking place, but the hearing also gave
3 us an opportunity to look at the victims,
4 the people on the other side who have to
5 deal with the grief, people who have to
6 deal with trying to put their lives back
7 together when we deal with the shootings

9 So this will give us an opportunity to
10 look at the other side of the coin, how
11 are we supporting our victims and making
12 sure that they're made whole or at least
13 to the best of our ability to assist them
14 in helping them put their lives back
15 together.

16 And so I just want to thank all
17 the members of Council for signing on
18 board, being supportive of this
19 particular resolution, and thank
20 Councilman Curtis Jones and members of
21 the Public Safety Committee for working
22 with me on this issue.

23 Thank you very much, Council
24 President.

15 you, Council President and colleagues. I
16 have no bills or resolutions today.

23 similar to the Residential Mortgage

25 the rising level of residential tax

10 non-privileged resolution authorizing the
11 commissioner of Public Property to
12 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
13 Redevelopment Authority, without

17 the buildings and improvements thereon,
18 situate in the Fifty-Ninth Ward of the
19 City of Philadelphia.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 wanted to mention, number one, I wanted
5 to thank my colleague Councilman Curtis

8 Philadelphia, which, as we know, the rate
9 has been really astounding. And if
10 you're one of the people who has lost
11 your home through the mortgage
12 foreclosure process and the programs that
13 we have in place have not been helpful to
14 you, you recognize that there are still
15 opportunities to close loopholes. And so
16 what we hope to do, Councilman Jones and
17 myself working together on this, what we
18 hope to do is to address a remaining
19 loophole, which is tax foreclosures,
20 which affect so many of our citizens who
21 don't have an option. So if there's no
22 mortgage on your property, you really
23 don't have the opportunity to participate
24 in the programs that exist today in
25 Philadelphia. So we think that this is

3 close that loophole, and look forward to
4 having further dialogue about it.

5 Thank you.

11 much. I offer two privileged resolutions

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
23 will be on this week's Final Passage
24 Calendar.

25 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged

7 COUNCIL President CLARKE: The
8 ayes have it, and these bills will be
9 placed on our First Reading Calendar for
10 today.

11 That concludes our reports from
12 committee, and the next order of business
13 is the consideration of the Calendar. I
14 note that the bills just read with
15 suspension of the rules have been deemed
16 to have had a first reading. They will
17 be on our Second Reading and Final
18 Passage Calendar at our next session of
19 Council.

20 As there are no additional
21 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
22 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for the
23 purpose of calling up bills and

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Okay. So I
21 want to strike that from the Second
22 Reading and Final Passage on today's
23 Calendar.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you. Good morning.

10 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.
11 Council evidently doesn't take my claims
12 and allegations seriously, because they
13 continue to deal with the Redevelopment
14 Authority without investigating them.

15 At this time, I am without my
16 home at 1038 West Wyoming due to the
17 egregious actions and inactions of this
18 legislative body. How many decades does
19 it take for a speedy trial?

20 In 1991, I purchased my home,
21 as later referred to in an article that
22 even the federal government is suffering
23 buyers. Then it came 18 years of waiting
24 for the City to act while it received
25 funds.

2 I read several articles and
3 communications from HUD, though, where it
4 says receiving up to 40 million or more
5 extra money per year for over a decade.
6 The newspaper reports that only 32 to 34
7 million was spent on Logan. I guess
8 that's where the extra funds for the
9 10/15 article that quotes Abernathy from
10 the RDA that upwards of 100 million
11 taxpayer dollars may be given to a
12 developer to build a mall on my home that
13 was taken from me without payment for me.
14 Oh, I've got to clarify that. They
15 offered me a hundred dollars. It was a
16 three-apartment, two-storefront building
17 that I bought as a shell for 6,000 and I
18 improved to code.

19 It's ridiculously outrageous
20 that the amount of a hundred dollars was
21 only offered by the RDA. I was required
22 to pay for and get reimbursed for 18
23 years of interest, expenses, taxes, water
24 bills, and replacement housing. I
25 received nothing. Federal officials said

2 that they've given the state plenty of
3 funds to solve this matter.

4 If we, the people, have to
5 solve this problem ourselves, why did we
6 hire you, agents and agencies designed
7 solely to serve the people and conduct
8 our business? You agents and agencies
9 are bound by oath to obey and defend the
10 Constitution and laws. Like in Flint,
11 Michigan, the government stalls while the
12 people suffer. Government cannot create
13 people. People create government to
14 serve them. Government has no rights,
15 just judiciary duties.

16 Paul Robeson has quoted "the
17 answer to injustice is not to silence the
18 critic, but to end the injustice." Can a
19 firefighter choose not to fight a fire?

20 Why is Council not
21 investigating the Redevelopment
22 Authority? Does Council not care about
23 the people? De-fund and investigate the
24 Redevelopment Authority now.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 3/31/16 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Thank you.

3 (Appause.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
5 other speakers on the public comment
6 list, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

9 That concludes our public
10 comment session. We will now move to our
11 Calendar.

12 And, Mr. Decker, if you can

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

9 then-President Jimmy Carter signed the
10 executive order officially establishing
11 Women's History Month, and his remarks
12 included, "From the first settlers who
13 came to our shores, from the first
14 American Indian families who befriended
15 them, men and women have worked together
16 to build this nation. Too often the
17 women were unsung and sometimes their
18 contributions went unnoticed."

19 So as we close the national
20 formal celebration of Women's History
21 Month, the still prevailing question is,
22 Why should we? It's already been
23 established by Judge Renee Cardwell
24 Hughes that women make 78 cents to the
25 dollar of our male counterparts. I might

2 add that that's gone up 2 cents in the
3 last 15 years, and if we continue at the
4 current pace, my 19-year-old daughter
5 will be 75 years old before we reach full
6 parity.

7 Further, while women have
8 caught up with men in college attendance,
9 specifically in medical, law school, and
10 the Ph.D. programs, not the case in
11 business school, the fact remains that
12 this attendance is not translated to
13 gains in our pocketbooks. This is
14 acutely evident by the ordinance I
15 introduced today designed to combat
16 gender price discrimination by cleaners
17 that charge a woman more than a man
18 item -- more than a like item of clothing
19 from my male counterparts.

20 A recent undercover report from
21 Philadelphia CBS News showed that when a
22 woman and a man brought nearly identical
23 100 percent cotton button-down shirts in
24 comparable sizes to dry cleaners and
25 requested the same service, the woman was

2 often charged at least twice as much of
3 our male counterpart.

4 Therefore, I submit that we
5 must continue to claim this month, not as
6 a statement of history but as an
7 opportunity to remind ourselves and the
8 nation that gender equity remains a human
9 imperative.

10 In other words, I'm again
11 beating a drum, some might call it a
12 broken record, for pay equity for women.
13 What we know and what research supports
14 is that when women do well, families do
15 better. And when families thrive,
16 communities thrive. When women are not
17 paid well, families are not cared for.
18 When women are kicked to the curb
19 economically, children suffer, poverty
20 ensues, and we as legislators are looked
21 to resolve the consequences. Fair
22 treatment of women is an investment in
23 the growth and development of our city.

24 Here's the good news: Women
25 continue to strive for total equality in

2 the business world and have indeed made
3 substantial progress. Today, women
4 almost own ten million businesses in the
5 country, which constitute 36 percent of
6 American businesses nationwide. Women of
7 color in particular have made massive
8 gains as well. In 2002, less than one
9 million businesses were owned by women of
10 color. In ten years, that number has
11 tripled to 3.8 million. However, when it
12 comes to our presence in elected
13 leadership, only 20 percent of elected
14 national leadership is women.

15 So here's the test. What does
16 Pennsylvania -- what grade would
17 Pennsylvania get in political leadership?
18 It's not a rhetorical question.
19 Pennsylvania would get a D when it comes
20 to women in leadership, behind Alabama
21 and Mississippi.

22 In closing, my staff and I
23 ground ourselves always in the following
24 quote that I came to understand when
25 working in Harrisburg as a legislative

2 aide, that if women are not at the table,
3 we may indeed be on the menu. The
4 mission continues, Mr. President.

5 Thank you.

18 40,000 families.

19 Quick example, single person,
20 \$44,000 of income, married with 49,000
21 with two children can get up to \$5,500 in
22 credits for the federal government's
23 check and file back three years.

24 Last night I was on Belfield
25 Avenue speaking to a small community of

3 aware of Earned Income Tax Credit. So
4 whatever my fellow colleagues can do,
5 whatever the press can do, people in the
6 audience today, tell ten people about it.
7 This is found money. It's \$100 million.
8 There's nothing better we can do for the
9 40,000 Philadelphians who deserve it.

10 Thank you.

2 more faded crimson. But in 2003, I
3 became very close to another color, the
4 color blue. And I say that because my
5 son was diagnosed with autism. And so
6 this Saturday, April 2nd is World Autism
7 Awareness Day, and people all around the
8 entire world will be wearing blue. So we
9 light it up for blue on Saturday, April
10 2nd.

11 And when my son was diagnosed
12 with autism, one out of every 200
13 children were diagnosed with autism. Now
14 that's one out of every 68. So it's
15 something that's very important to me.
16 And autism does not discriminate. It
17 does not make a difference whether your
18 background, your ethnicity, your economic
19 status. Many people are affected with
20 this learning difference. And this
21 increase in autism has a huge impact not
22 only in the world, not only in the state
23 but also in our city.

24 Recently, the Federal Reserve
25 Bank of Philadelphia did a study on its

2 increase in autism and how this will
3 impact the City of Philadelphia from an
4 economic development perspective going
5 forward. I'm sure many of you have
6 someone in your family, someone that you
7 know, a colleague, a friend, a co-worker
8 or a Councilmember like me that has a
9 friend that has this learning difference
10 called autism. So as we look this
11 Saturday, think about all the people you
12 may have in your life that are affected
13 by this learning difference as we light
14 it up blue.

3 Last evening I worked in
4 partnership with the Center City
5 Residents Association to address the
6 issue that my colleague Councilwoman
7 Jannie Blackwell has been aggressively
8 working on prior to my arrival to City
9 Council, and that's the issue of
10 homelessness here in the City of
11 Philadelphia, and I learned a lot of
12 information last evening. The meeting
13 was based upon the assault of the Supreme
14 Court Justice Kevin Dougherty when he was
15 downtown in Rittenhouse Square, the
16 district in which both of us share, with
17 his family and he was assaulted by a
18 homeless vet. And then prior to that,
19 there was a young man who was murdered
20 around 3 o'clock in the morning during
21 Saint Patrick's Day weekend, also as a
22 result of a homeless individual.

23 And so as we look at the issue
24 of homelessness here in the City of
25 Philadelphia, particularly public safety,

2 around how do we address the root causes
3 of mental health and homelessness here in
4 the City of Philadelphia. So you have
5 representatives from your district,
6 Project HOME, that came out and
7 participated. And so we want to look
8 at -- and Councilman Allan Domb also came
9 out and let also his input regarding
10 homelessness around the Rittenhouse
11 Square area and really addressing it from
12 a public safety perspective but, most
13 importantly, how do we get to the root
14 cause of alleviating homelessness and,
15 most importantly, mental health issues
16 here in the City of Philadelphia.

17 So it was a very eye-opening
18 experience last evening. And so we're
19 going to continue working on that issue
20 and trying to find ways to get
21 individuals who are on the street the
22 help that they need so no one else can be
23 harmed. And I had small run-ins with
24 individuals, and it was based upon now
25 that there's work being done on the

2 Parkway and there's work being done on
3 Love Park, now you have more individuals
4 who are usually using the Parkway and
5 Love Park as their homes panhandling
6 aggressively all throughout different
7 parts of Center City.

8 So it's something that we all
9 should be paying attention to as we move
10 forward and to make sure that everyone is
11 safe. And so we're going to be doing
12 some outreach and some strategy around
13 that, because obviously we want to make
14 sure that people are safe when they're
15 walking out and about, rather it's in
16 Center City, in any other parts of my
17 district, but nevertheless, you should be
18 able to walk the street without fear of
19 anyone doing something to you, but also
20 making sure we get to the root cause,
21 which is helping individuals who have
22 mental health issues.

23 Separate from that, this
24 evening -- I mean this afternoon at 2:00
25 p.m. in the Caucus Room, I'm going to be

2 honoring roughly 45 women throughout the
3 2nd Councilmanic District as we wrap up
4 Women's History Month. And so anyone
5 that wants to come past and greet some of
6 those individuals. These are women who
7 have contributed to our city in a variety
8 of different capacities, some in
9 business, some in community service, some
10 in politics, but continually to highlight
11 the role that women have played not only
12 in the City of Philadelphia but in
13 society as a whole.

14 Thank you very much, Council
15 President.
