2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 We're going to get started. If members
7 will take their seat, our guests will
8 retire behind the rail, we will start our
9 invocation.

10 To give our invocation this
11 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor
12 Vincent Corbin of Crown of Life
13 Ministries of Christ. He is here today
14 as the guest of Councilwoman Cindy Bass.

15 I would ask all guests,
16 visitors, and members to please rise.

17 (Councilmembers and guests
18 rise.)

19 PASTOR CORBIN: How's everybody
20 doing? Before I start, I want to say
21 that my wife, Roxanne, and I find it a
22 great honor to have been invited here
23 today, and it's an honor and it's a great
24 pleasure. So at this time, we're going
25 to ask for all hearts and minds to just

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2 come together and we will bow our heads.

3 Dear Heavenly Father, in the
4 name of Jesus, as we collectively all
5 gather here today, Lord God, to invoke
6 your presence within these hallowed
7 halls, Lord. And, God, we ask you, Lord
8 God, that as I stand here, that we lift
9 up our Mayor, our City, and each and
10 every Councilperson and their entire
11 staffs before you that you may endue
12 them, Lord, with your divine wisdom and
13 your guidance.

14 Lord, I think all of us thank
15 you, Lord God, for allowing us another
16 opportunity to express our commitment and
17 our love to all those within these City
18 walls, Lord. God, we thank you, Lord
19 God, for these your public servants in
20 here, Lord God, and we ask that you give
21 them the strength and you give them the
22 endurance to be able to do the people's
23 business.

24 Precious God, we want you to go
25 beyond just what their public service is,

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2 Lord, but, God, we want you to go into
3 their private lives. God, we want you to
4 bless their families, bless their
5 neighbors, bless their friends, bless
6 their entire support group, Lord.

7 God, we want you to bless every
8 Councilperson and the entire staff, Lord
9 God. Bless them, Lord, in their homes,
10 in their finances. Bless their health.
11 If they have any issues, Lord God, we ask
12 that you bring it -- that you bring it
13 into concert to your divine will.

14 Lord, we want to thank you for
15 all things, Lord God. And, God, we ask
16 you to even bless them with the peace
17 that surpasses all understanding. And,
18 God, as we close, God, we ask you, Lord
19 God, that you just bless them with all
20 knowledge and that you preserve each and
21 every one of them blameless, and we
22 commit them into your hands and let you
23 keep them.

24 In Jesus' precious name, we
25 pray.

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2 Amen and amen.

3 (Amen.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Pastor. Thank you very much.

6 Council will be at ease.

7 (Council at ease.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you very much. Our next order of
10 business is the approval of the Journal
11 of the meeting of Thursday, April 21st,
12 2016, and the Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Greenlee.

14 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
15 you, Mr. President. I move that the
16 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, April
17 21st, 2016 be approved.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Is
19 there a second?

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
22 has been moved and properly seconded that
23 the Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
24 April 21st, 2016 stand approved.

25 All those in favor say aye.

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2 (Aye.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 ayes have it, and the Journal is
8 approved.

9 The next order of business is
10 requests for leaves of absence, and the
11 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

12 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
13 Council President. On behalf of the
14 majority, there are no leaves of absence
15 today.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair thanks the gentleman.

18 The Chair now recognizes
19 Councilman O'Neill.

20 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. On behalf of the
22 republicans, there are no requests for
23 leave of absence.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Thank you. The Chair thanks the

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2 gentleman.

3 At this time, I would like to
4 dispense with the regular order of
5 business and I would like to welcome and
6 I'd like to thank everyone who has taken
7 time out of their busy day to come down
8 to witness their government in action. I
9 hope that your stay here is an enjoyable
10 one, so much so that you come back again.
11 Again, thank you so much.

12 At this time, the Chair
13 recognizes Councilmembers Reynolds Brown
14 and Greenlee, who will present a
15 resolution honoring Kathy Black. Would
16 Ms. Black and those accompanying her
17 please join the Councilman at the podium.

18 (Applause.)

19 (Councilmembers and guests
20 approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
22 joining the Councilmembers, we have
23 Councilman Green and Councilwoman
24 Quinones-Sanchez. And we also have Fred
25 Wright.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Good

3 morning to Council colleagues and guests.

4 This morning we are thrilled to lift up,

5 celebrate, and salute a woman who has

6 been a warrior and a soldier in the labor

7 community, and all of us hope to at some

8 point do our goodwill and our good work

9 and then to move on and reinvent

10 ourselves.

11 Right, Kathy?

12 So this morning we are honoring

13 Kathy Black on the occasion of her

14 retirement from AFSCME District Council

15 47.

16 Whereas, Kathy Black was born

17 and raised in a Union family in North

18 Philadelphia; and

19 Whereas, Kathy graduated Summa

20 Cum Laude, Phi Beta Kappa, with a

21 Bachelor's Degree in Sociology and Labor

22 Studies from the University of Oregon in

23 1983; and

24 Whereas, in 1988, Kathy moved

25 home to Philadelphia and spent eight

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2 years representing New Jersey State
3 employees in the Department of Health for
4 CWA Local 1034 in Trenton, New Jersey.
5 For two years, she served as the
6 Governor's appointee to the New Jersey
7 Public Employee OSHA, also known as OSHA,
8 Advisory Board; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Can't
10 wait to see all the trouble she starts in
11 her retirement.

12 Whereas, Kathy served as the
13 elected President of the Philadelphia
14 Chapter of CLUW (the Coalition of Labor
15 Union Women) from 1993 until April 2014.
16 While CLUW President, she served as a
17 delegate from CLUW to the Philadelphia
18 Council of AFL-CIO and held a seat on
19 their Executive Board; and

20 Whereas, Kathy has served as a
21 Board member of PhilaPOSH (Philadelphia
22 Area Project on Occupational Safety and
23 Health) for many years and was elected
24 Chair (for the second time) in June 2011.
25 She served on the Board, the PAC and then

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2 as Vice President of Finance for
3 Philadelphia NOW (the National
4 Organization of Women) from 1999 until
5 December 2015 and currently serves as
6 Vice President of the Philadelphia
7 Chapter of the American Civil Liberties
8 Union; and

9 Whereas, in February 2007,
10 Kathy was elected as the sixth national
11 Co-Convener of the U.S. Labor Against the
12 War, the anti-war organization within the
13 labor movement, founded in 2003 in
14 response to the U.S. invasion and
15 occupation of Iraq;

16 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
17 Kathy previously served on the Boards of
18 Americans for Democratic Action
19 (Philadelphia Chapter), the Pennsylvania
20 Consumer Action Network, Citizens for
21 Consumer Justice and the national board
22 of Citizen Action; and

23 Whereas, Kathy chaired the
24 Program Committee and served on the
25 Steering Committee for the UNITY 2000

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2 March and Rally of 25,000 protesters,
3 held in Philadelphia the day before the
4 opening of the Republican National
5 Convention on July 30th, 2000; and

6 Whereas, Kathy has been a
7 leader in major issue campaigns,
8 including Labor Against Apartheid, the
9 Living Wage Coalition, the All Women's
10 Health Campaign, the Campaign for
11 Contraceptive Coverage, the movement to
12 end the wars and occupations in Iraq and
13 Afghanistan and the Coalition for Healthy
14 Families and Workplaces, which
15 successfully advocated for passage of a
16 City of Philadelphia Ordinance requiring
17 all employers to provide paid sick leave
18 to employees;

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: She also
20 lives in a great neighborhood, by the
21 way.

22 Whereas, Kathy has been honored
23 by the Pennsylvania Consumer Action
24 Network, Philadelphia FIGHT, United Way
25 of Southeastern Pennsylvania, the

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2 Philadelphia NAACP 100th Anniversary
3 Celebration, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority,
4 Incorporated and Philadelphia NOW. In
5 March 2015, Kathy was named a
6 Philadelphia Woman of Moxie -- that
7 works -- at an annual celebration of
8 Women's History Month established by
9 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown and
10 received the Paul Robeson Lifetime
11 Achievement Award from the Bread and
12 Roses Community Fund; now, therefore, be
13 it

14 Resolved, by the Council of the
15 City of Philadelphia, that the Council
16 does hereby honor Kathy Black on the
17 occasion of her retirement from AFSCME
18 District Council 47.

19 Further resolved, that an
20 engrossed copy of this resolution be
21 presented to Kathy Black, Health and
22 Safety Director of AFSCME District
23 Council 47, as evidence of the sincere
24 sentiments of this legislative body.

25 Kathy, thank you for everything

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2 you've done over the years for the people
3 who need it the most.

4 Congratulations.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you.

8 The Chair recognizes Ms. Black
9 for remarks.

10 MS. BLACK: Thank you. Thank
11 you so very much, everyone. Thanks
12 especially first to Hadji Maloumian, who
13 probably doesn't get enough thanks. He's
14 the aide to Blondell Reynolds Brown who
15 did all the work to make this happen in
16 his usual conscientious and efficient
17 manner.

18 Thank you, Council President
19 Clarke, my own district Council rep, and
20 all the members of Council for this
21 wonderful recognition, and especially
22 thanks to Bill Greenlee. Yes, he's my
23 ward leader. We are neighbors too, and
24 he's my paid sick days hero and the chief
25 sponsor of this resolution, and to

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2 Blondell Reynolds Brown, whose idea it
3 was to honor me today. Blondell and I
4 have worked together for many years in
5 many capacities, and I'm very proud to
6 have her as a friend and as a feminist
7 representative in this body.

8 Thanks to all my friends and
9 colleagues in the audience from the
10 mighty Philly labor movement, especially
11 my home for 19 years, AFSCME District
12 Council 47. Thanks for my colleagues for
13 being here, President Fred Wright.

14 (Applause.)

15 MS. BLACK: Althea Jones,
16 Donnell Martin, Barbara Dexter, and all
17 those in the audience. I see some NOW
18 members out there too and members from my
19 even longer affiliation with my sisters
20 from CLUW, the Coalition of Labor Union
21 Women. We're the women's movement, the
22 feminist conscience of the labor
23 movement, and proud to be so.

24 You've got much more important
25 work to do in this body and I don't want

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2 to take up your time, so I'm simply going
3 to say what a wonderful gift it has been
4 to spend my working life fighting to
5 advance the rights of workers and women
6 and for an end of war and militarism and
7 to get paid union wages and benefits to
8 do that work. These are issues that
9 continue to drive my passions and for
10 which I will continue to work unpaid.
11 Yes, Maria, I will still cause trouble in
12 between my planned world travels, that
13 is, now that my long union career has
14 allowed me to retire with dignity and in
15 relative comfort. No worker deserves any
16 less, and so let's keep the movement
17 alive and kicking until we have living
18 wages, safe and healthy working
19 conditions, and comfortable retirements
20 for all.

21 Thank you all very much.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Council will be at ease.

25 (Council at ease.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you. Before our next presentation,
4 the Chair recognizes Councilman
5 Taubenberger.

6 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
7 you, Council President. I would like to
8 acknowledge to my Council colleagues the
9 Pennsylvania Secretary for Agriculture,
10 Russell Redding, is here today, and I'd
11 appreciate a warm welcome and reception
12 for Secretary Redding.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: And
15 he is here today because of two
16 resolutions that are being put forward by
17 myself and all members of Council
18 regarding agriculture.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 Thank you, Mr. Secretary, for
22 your great work. Appreciate it.

23 At this time, the Chair
24 recognizes Councilwoman Parker, who will
25 recognize Delta Sigma Theta Sorority.

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2 Would Leslie Cousins-Mond and those
3 accompanying her please join the
4 Councilwoman at the podium.

5 (Singing.)

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good
7 morning, everyone, and thank you,
8 Mr. President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
10 morning.

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: It is my
12 distinct honor and privilege to welcome
13 the women of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
14 Incorporated, the Quaker City Alumnae
15 Chapter, along with the dynamic young
16 people who are with them here today to be
17 honored.

18 I want to note for the record
19 that I thought I was at a great loss.
20 For the past ten years in the
21 Pennsylvania House of Representatives, I
22 had the opportunity to welcome my sisters
23 here from across the state via our Social
24 Action Committee, and when they gathered
25 in their red on Harrisburg in the Capitol

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2 in the House, they were sitting at the
3 back of the Chamber and the Speaker said,
4 Cherelle, who are all of those women in
5 red?

6 And I said, Mr. Speaker, those
7 are my sisters.

8 And it gives us a great honor.
9 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown and I have
10 the distinct honor and privilege of being
11 a part of this organization that was
12 founded on January 13th, 1913 on the
13 campus of Howard University by 22
14 collegiate women. And I know when you
15 think of a sorority, you usually think of
16 women getting dressed up, having tea and
17 crumpets, but I want you to know that
18 what is different about these dynamic
19 women and our founders is that our first
20 act as a public sorority, our first act
21 was our participation in the Women's
22 Suffrage March in Washington, DC. And
23 for those who didn't know, there were
24 women of color there. They just didn't
25 report it.

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2 With that being said,
3 Mr. President, let me just note for the
4 record that this is a citation
5 recognizing Delta Days at City Council
6 and members of their local youth election
7 and leadership advocates on the occasion
8 of Delta Days in City Council.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
10 the Quaker City Alumnae Chapter of Delta
11 Sigma Theta Sorority, Incorporated was
12 chartered in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania
13 on October the 17th, 1976 by 27 African
14 American educated women to proudly
15 execute the organization's Five Point
16 Programmatic Thrust, which includes
17 Economic Development, Educational
18 Development, International Awareness and
19 Involvement, Physical and Mental Health,
20 and Political Awareness and Involvement.
21 Over the past 40 years, this chapter has
22 strategically expanded its membership to
23 more than 150 local women working to
24 build a more connected and informed
25 community; and

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2 Whereas, members of the Quaker
3 City Alumnae Social Action Committee have
4 dynamically continued in their
5 foremothers' footsteps to promote social
6 and political activism by addressing
7 voting rights, supporting voter
8 education, and hosting numerous voter
9 registration drives and voter phone
10 banks, as well as advocating for adequate
11 education funding, quality after-school
12 programming, and access to early
13 childhood education for all children; and

14 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
15 members of the Sorority's Social Action
16 Committee have furthered their commitment
17 to social and political engagement by
18 empowering and encouraging student
19 activism to the Election Ambassador Corps
20 offered at Paul Robeson High School for
21 Human Services, the completion of the
22 Behind the Ballot Badge by the Girl
23 Scouts of the Chesapeake Bay Council
24 Troop 309, and continued participation in
25 Youth Leadership Day where students

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2 observe Councilmembers in action at Delta
3 Days at City Council; and
4 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: I came
5 up from standing on the floor,
6 colleagues. We know our place.
7 And whereas, 18 students from
8 Paul Robeson High School for Human
9 Services dedicated much of their free
10 time to educating their peers and
11 community on the importance of social and
12 political activism by serving as Election
13 Ambassadors under the Committee of
14 Seventy's Youth Engagement Program. They
15 are: Abdul Hakim Ali, Amir Slaughter,
16 Almeda Dora Davis, Vinta Gisey, Dejalynn
17 Paylor, Dominique Anne Hudson, Indigo
18 Allen, Jye Waddell, Jamira Wally, Jonu
19 Ballard, Kara Destiny Jordan, Shadarina
20 O. Blackman, Shaman Nasir Levy, Taniya
21 Lee, Tacona Stuckey, Trelsey Trotman,
22 Tymere Hall, and Tiquan Dorsey. We
23 applaud your level of activism and
24 encourage you to continue in the
25 footsteps of youth leaders who paved the

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2 road for you; and

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
4 the Girl Scouts of the Chesapeake Bay
5 Council Troop 309 rallied their scouts
6 and set out on the mission to understand
7 what it takes to operate campaigns,
8 galvanize supporters, and change public
9 policy. Elsie Davis, Manisha Nelson,
10 Lena Underwood, Jessica Williams, and
11 Deanna Woolfolk, we salute your efforts
12 and congratulate you on earning that
13 prestigious badge; and

14 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the
15 Deltas of Quaker City, who believe that
16 it is never too early to begin grooming
17 our future leaders, have made it their
18 mission to introduce youth leadership
19 training programs at their respective
20 institutions, selecting well-deserving
21 students who exemplify outstanding
22 leadership skills and show a personal
23 commitment to developing those skills.
24 Ania Knight, Tamir Altatore, Storm
25 Johnson, Andre Lou, Kyla Nixon, and John

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2 Ross Flowers, we commend you for taking
3 this major step in social activism and
4 connecting with local elected officials,
5 and we look forward to your future as
6 selfless community leaders; and

7 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ:

8 Sisterhood and a development of an army.

9 Whereas, the Quaker City

10 Alumnae Chapter continues to explore new
11 avenues to collaborate with local
12 organizations to tackle the issues that
13 impact Philadelphia residents in an
14 effort to effectively resolve today's
15 challenges by implementing much-needed
16 programming and advancing essential
17 policy initiatives; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:

19 Therefore, by virtue of this citation,
20 the Council of the City of Philadelphia
21 proudly recognizes and honors the members
22 of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
23 Incorporated's Quaker City Alumnae
24 Chapter's Social Action Committee and
25 youth election and leadership advocates

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2 on the occasion of the 13th year of Delta
3 Days at City Council. We extend our
4 sincere gratitude for your commitment to
5 social and political engagement and your
6 dedication to blazing a trail for our
7 future advocates and leaders.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 Chair recognizes Ms. Cousins-Mond for
11 remarks.

12 MS. COUSINS-MOND: Yes. Good
13 morning.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 morning.

16 MS. COUSINS-MOND: My name is
17 Leslie Cousins-Mond. I am the President
18 of the Quaker City Alumnae Chapter of
19 Delta Sigma Theta Sorority. We want to
20 thank the Councilmembers for support of
21 the Delta Youth Day at City Council. We
22 want to thank you for the 12th year --
23 13th year actually.

24 Ten years ago, our chapter
25 changed the name and focus of the Delta

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2 Day at Philadelphia City Council to
3 highlight the youth of Philadelphia.
4 Today we celebrate the Council's
5 commitment to the youth of the City.

6 It's important that young
7 people in our city see how issues facing
8 our communities are discussed and
9 researched. It's important that the
10 young witness how adults handle and make
11 laws that affect them and their
12 communities, to understand that no one
13 community is better or receives more
14 services but how laws celebrate the
15 varieties of cultures, traditions,
16 maintain the safety and self-worth of all
17 of its citizens.

18 Delta Sigma Theta Sorority was
19 established and incorporated on January
20 13th, 1913. She quickly established
21 herself in social action by two weeks
22 later participating in the marching in
23 the Women's Suffrage March in 1913.
24 Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Quaker City
25 Alumnae Chapter was chartered on October

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2 17th, 1976. This October, Quaker City
3 will have left her mark and impact on the
4 community throughout Philadelphia with
5 programs that are meant to make the lives
6 of its citizens better. Toy Library,
7 which is one of the projects QCA
8 developed, moved on to include Delta
9 Academy, Delta GEMS, a program that works
10 with youth female girls to prepare them
11 for positive experiences at school,
12 address youth issues, and to move towards
13 continuing their education at a college
14 level. The QCA Physical and Mental
15 Health Program annually held in North
16 Philadelphia is making a sufficient
17 different for the residents of that
18 community. The QCA's Social Action
19 Committee has presence during its annual
20 December Dessert Hour, with topics such
21 as Aging Gracefully, which not only
22 discuss laws and services for our aging
23 population, but the services that their
24 caregiver can utilize to make sure that
25 their loved ones are comfortable in their

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2 older years. The committee has held
3 forums that allow citizens to discuss the
4 healthcare law as well as join with the
5 state senators to find sign-up locations.
6 Our members assisted a large population
7 in signing up for some form of
8 healthcare, many for the first time in
9 their lives. Twice a year throughout the
10 City of Philadelphia, our members
11 register citizens voting. Voting is a
12 citizen fundamental right. We visit the
13 State Capitol in Harrisburg, PA and
14 Washington, DC to solicit our
15 Representatives to support and fund
16 education from K to 12 grades into two-
17 to four-year colleges and universities.

18 Again, on behalf of the Quaker
19 City Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta
20 Sorority, Incorporated, we thank you for
21 inviting us and having us here today.

22 (Applause.)

23 MS. COUSINS-MOND: And now I'm
24 going to introduce Patricia Alford, our
25 Social Action Chair.

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2 MS. ALFORD: Good morning.

3 (Good morning.)

4 MS. ALFORD: Once again, I want
5 to thank you. I've been coming here for
6 a number of years. I'm a charter member
7 of Quaker City Alumnae Chapter, and it's
8 just phenomenal support that we get from
9 Philadelphia City Council.

10 But we'd like to make some
11 special presentations this morning. The
12 first one to our soror and your committee
13 person, Cherelle Parker, for your
14 dedication in assisting and supporting
15 the citizens of the City of Philadelphia
16 and the Quaker City Alumnae Chapter,
17 April 28th, 2016, Mrs. Leslie
18 Cousins-Mond, Chapter President.

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
20 you.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. ALFORD: The next award
23 probably is a little surprise, but this
24 Councilwoman has supported us ever since
25 we've been coming, and we'd like to have

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2 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell please come
3 forward.

4 (Applause.)

5 MS. ALFORD: Again, it honors
6 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell for your
7 dedication in assisting and supporting
8 the citizens of the City of Philadelphia.

9 We went to college together.

10 It's been a long time. You've been doing
11 this for a long time.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
13 you.

14 MS. ALFORD: And the Quaker
15 City Alumnae Chapter.

16 Thank you very, very much for
17 all your work that you do in the
18 communities.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
20 you.

21 MS. ALFORD: Thank you.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
23 you. I'm honored. Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you.

3 Council will be at ease.

4 (Council at ease.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. Before having our next and
7 last presentation, I would like at this
8 time to recognize a former member of the
9 City Council family and soon to be a new
10 member of the General Assembly family,
11 our good friend, Morgan Cephas.

12 (Standing ovation.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Quite an impressive win.

15 At this time, I would like to
16 recognize Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

17 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
18 you, Council President. I want to ask my
19 visiting students from Frankford Friends
20 to please stand up. A few months ago I
21 was visiting the school as we were
22 talking about what would be some new
23 learning space. The City awarded over to
24 Frankford Friends some land and they will
25 be expanding, and the students at that

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2 time I invited to come to City Council.
3 So I want to recognize the teachers,
4 Jonathan Clifton and Lisa Clapper, for
5 bringing the students.

6 As part of their visit today,
7 they wrote some essays to give me their
8 opinions on some of the budget proposals,
9 including the soda tax. I just want to
10 quickly read a couple of what I believe
11 to be some very thoughtful thinking on
12 the young people.

13 One of the kinds about this law
14 is that you're having poor people lose
15 money, because research shows that they
16 buy more soda than other people.
17 However -- and I'm paraphrasing -- I have
18 thought about this and my opinion is that
19 on the whole, it's a good tax.

20 Leda Porter writes, I realize
21 that if we do have to pay an extra 3
22 cents per ounce for soda, it will
23 increase grocery bills for families that
24 least can afford it, like lower income
25 and poor families. However, I think it

3 a good education.

4 Let it be known that young
5 people are watching us and that they too
6 have opinions and sometimes are more
7 sensible than the adults in the room. So
8 I want to thank them for coming down and

25 Two things I wanted to say

11 commenting on 160256, 160337, 160338,
12 160339, 160341, 160342, and 160007.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 morning.

16 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning,
17 sir. Evidently you love my company.

18 Speaking for a moratorium --
19 for the moratorium at the Sheriff's
20 Department against any use of the
21 Redevelopment Authority and/or Land Bank.
22 This Council has been told this regard
23 for the last nine months of public notice
24 of alleged possible illegal and
25 unconstitutional activities that the RDA

2 and the Land Bank is egregious and shows
3 the total disregard for the suffering of
4 others.

5 Though the moratorium of
6 mortgage foreclosures at the Sheriff's
7 Department is a start, it does not go far
8 enough. Improper deed transfers creates
9 fraudulent documents. This is not
10 allowed under federal, state, and local
11 laws. This legislative body is aiding
12 this abomination.

13 I called Council's attention to
14 federal law 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, and
15 1986 previously read in open Council
16 session. No action on the various issues
17 about 1038 West Wyoming and the other
18 properties involved leave me without my
19 home while government is prepared to give
20 up to \$100 million to a developer to
21 build on top of my stolen home.

22 Investigation of the RDA and
23 the Land Bank is required in this manner.
24 Lest we forget that Paul Robeson is
25 quoted that the answer to injustice is

2 not to silence the critic, but to end the
3 injustice.

4 This Council needs to act and
5 needs to investigate the RDA and the Land
6 Bank for these egregious behaviors or
7 they themselves are guilty of aiding and
8 abetting this criminal behavior.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Johnny Young.

13 MR. YOUNG: It's not moving.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Joan Stern.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 MS. STERN: Good morning,
21 Council President Clarke and members of
22 Council. My name is Joan N. Stern. I'm
23 a resident of the City of Philadelphia
24 and a public finance lawyer who has
25 worked with the City over the years on

2 bond and finance matters. I'm here to
3 speak in support of Resolution 160287,
4 and I commend Councilwoman Parker and
5 Councilwoman Gym for introducing it.

6 If Council adopts this

9 representing large issuers of municipal
10 bonds, such as the Government Finance
11 Officers Association, the National
12 Association of State Treasurers, the
13 League of Cities, in urging the Senate to
14 take up HR 2208 and pass it so that
15 high-quality municipal bonds such as
16 those issued by the City will continue to
17 be high-quality liquid assets in which
18 large banks can invest for purposes of
19 liquidity and collateral.

20 This is a significant market
21 for the City's bonds. It provides an
22 important segment of the market to
23 purchase the City's bonds in a
24 cost-effective way.

25 I hope that the Council will

3 maintaining the role of the City's bonds
4 in this high-quality liquid asset
5 classification so that the City can
6 continue to benefit from an enhanced and
7 improved market for its own bonds.

10 Thank you for your testimony.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Ali Razaik.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MR. RAZAIK: Thank you, City
14 Council, for letting me speak here on the
15 privileged resolution recognizing and
16 designating May 1st as International
17 Workers' Day and honoring workers and
18 laborers like me and others.

19 My ideas today where a
20 resolution has (unintelligible) and
21 passed that eight hours should be legally
22 considered up for -- considered a day of
23 work. I would like to ask City Council
24 to support our amendments of SP 984. SP
25 984 is for transportation workers, for

2 taxi drivers, for limousine drivers, and
3 for the (unintelligible). We need the
4 support of City Council in that amendment
5 regarding the minimum living wage,
6 regarding the issues that we should have
7 the right to collective bargaining, we

9 And I would also like to request City
10 Council to ask Mayor Jim Kenney to uphold
11 the laws against the carpool like Uber
12 and Lyft, who is actually violating all
13 this labor, ADA, and anti-business laws.

14 That's all.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Tom Earle.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 MR. EARLE: Good morning,

20 Council President and members of City

21 Council. My name is Tom Earle. I'm the

22 CEO of Liberty Resources, which is the

23 Center for Independent Living in

24 Philadelphia and serves our many City

25 residents who have physical disabilities,

3 for the resolution honoring May 1st as

10 drivers, who provide reliable, accessible
11 transportation service to our many
12 seniors and people with disabilities
13 throughout the City. And we hope that we
14 can count on the leadership of City
15 Council, Council President, and Mayor
16 Kenney in making sure that any state
17 legislation that impacts the operation of
18 transportation in Philadelphia has the
19 full input of Philadelphia legislators,
20 not only State Representatives and State
21 Senators but also members of City
22 Council, Council President Clarke, and
23 the Mayor to make sure that any law
24 passed by the state for Philadelphia
25 makes sure that transportation is

3 including UberX and Lyft, and that we
4 work together with the Parking Authority,

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
17 want to speak?

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Please go now.

21 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
22 you, Mr. President. Let me just take
23 this opportunity to thank Councilwoman
24 Gym for serving as the chief co-sponsor,
25 and I want to thank Joan Stern, who many

2 of us remember, particularly those who
3 were around when PICA was created and her
4 involvement there, and also our City
5 Treasurer, Rasheia Johnson, for lending
6 her voice to this very important issue.
7 It's not one, Mr. President, that's
8 pretty sexy and it's getting a lot of ink
9 in newspapers, but for those who -- and
10 we all were paying attention to the
11 City's Five Year Plan and our
12 significantly low fund balance. This
13 legislation, if it is not passed in the
14 U.S. Senate, could have a long-term
15 fiscal impact on the City of
16 Philadelphia's finances.

17 The municipal bond is just as
18 liquid as a corporate bond, but the
19 federal rule will allow banks to hold
20 large quantities of corporate bonds and
21 restrict them from holding any
22 significant amount of municipal bonds,
23 and this idea that Joan Stern adequately
24 referenced as the value of high-quality
25 liquid assets and not referring to

2 municipal bonds as high-quality liquid
3 assets is really interesting, thinking
4 about the 2008 crash, because when
5 corporate bonds became junk bonds, it was
6 municipal bonds that literally held on to
7 the value.

8 So today it is our hope that

10 issue and encourage our Pennsylvania
11 delegation and the U.S. Senate to work in
12 a bipartisan effort to pass this
13 legislation.

7 girlfriend's home, and the mother
8 fortunately at that time had a Percocet
9 for him. He took it, did not feel pain
10 relief, and unfortunately she gave him an
11 additional pill, which was methadone. So
12 he was an athlete, a person who was not a
13 drug abuser, burned his hand, and
14 unfortunately an additional pill.

15 So we would encourage everyone
16 don't flush those pills down the toilet.
17 Just return them to your police stations,
18 and that would be a good way for us to
19 start addressing the prescription
20 medications in our cabinets.

21 Thank you very much, Council
22 President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 Speeches on behalf of the

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Jones.

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. On Tuesday,
7 Philadelphians went to the polls en
8 masse, in turnout numbers higher than
9 I've seen in quite some time, since the
10 Obama election. Those high turnouts
11 turned some people into winners, some
12 people -- and we congratulate all the
13 winners. Some of them did not win. And
14 we thank them for moving into the public
15 forum for debate. It makes us all
16 better.

17 One contest on Tuesday did not
18 involve a candidate but a question, and
19 it was the question No. 3, which involved
20 the African American Males Commission
21 being made a permanent agency. I'd like
22 to inform all of you that 132,488
23 individuals said yes to that, which
24 represented 63.5 percent of the vote, and
25 I thank each and every one of them for

2 doing that. And the reason that we
3 should thank them is, we had a recent
4 trip to Graterford where a lot of bad
5 decisions in sequence accumulated into a
6 bad outcome, which was incarceration. If
7 we can start to undo some of those links
8 in the chain - universal pre-K, making
9 sure that people have as much employment
10 as the City can find in its budget - we
11 can begin to undue some of those bad
12 individual decisions that create terrible
13 outcomes. And I think this Commission
14 has in the last Administration raised a
15 lot of good questions, whether it was
16 health concerns, diabetes, high blood
17 pressure, single parent head of
18 households, and violence. If they can
19 now begin the work to come up with
20 solutions, this city, not just African
21 American males but the entire population,
22 will be better because of it.

23 So I thank the voters who
24 thought well enough of the Commission to
25 move it into permanency within the City

2 government structure.

3 Thank you, Mr. President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilman. Congratulations
6 on that strong vote.

7 The Chair recognizes
8 Councilwoman Parker.

9 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
10 you, Mr. President. Mr. President, this
11 is like aside from our elections and
12 we've all had to go through those, this
13 has been a challenging week in the City
14 of Philadelphia because we've lost some
15 mighty giants. And Councilwoman Blondell
16 Reynolds Brown did the resolution for
17 Barbara Daniel-Cox, and we all introduced
18 a resolution for Mr. Sam Staten, Sr. And
19 I don't know about the rest of you, but
20 over the past two weeks, it seemed like
21 every time we turned around someone
22 somewhere, I mean like nationally and
23 here locally, like we lost folks, and
24 we're in the midst of moving and you
25 really can't stop because you're going,

2 you know, and it made me think about
3 particularly in the case of Mr. Staten
4 when Ossie Davis gave the eulogy at
5 Brother Malcolm's funeral. He closed by
6 reminding the audience of what Malcolm
7 was, particularly to the black community,
8 and he ended the eulogy by referring to
9 him as our prince, our shiny, black
10 prince. And when I think about
11 Mr. Staten, to me he was Philadelphia's
12 mighty lion, particularly in the labor
13 movement and particularly for making sure
14 that people of color, black people and
15 black men, got to the table.

16 Each and every one of us in
17 this room who are elected I'm sure have a
18 story to tell and to share about
19 something he did to give. Mine quickly
20 is that I was not a product biologically
21 of a very wealthy family. I'm a product
22 of very humble beginnings. When I
23 decided to make the trek to run for
24 office, I was Cherelle Parker, an
25 employee in this body who just happened

2 to meet some elected officials. And I
3 went to Sam Staten, Sr. because people
4 told me to go and talk to him, and once
5 he finds out what you're interested in
6 doing, they said he will be with you.

7 I was shaking. My hands were
8 shaking. I was making this big ask to
9 open up a campaign office because I
10 needed that money. And he didn't say it
11 was because of X. He didn't say it was
12 because of Y. And that's his -- it was
13 little black girl. "I'm going to find a
14 way to help you," and I opened up my
15 campaign office. I won't forget that.

16 I know the City of Philadelphia
17 won't forget what he did for black men to
18 give them an opportunity to stand up
19 right, to earn a living, to be good
20 fathers, to be good husbands and good
21 providers, kind but stern. In this day
22 and age where in this business you can't
23 trust anybody, because they'll tell you
24 one thing, speak with a fork tongue, turn
25 around and do something different. When

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2 he gave you his word, it was his bond.

3 You didn't have to turn around and check
4 and call him five times to ask him if he
5 was still with you. He was still there.

6 To Sam, Jr., to all of the
7 Staten children, to Ryan Boyer, to all of
8 the Laborers' family, our hearts and
9 prayers are with you. Cheryl Lee, who
10 was there with him and took care of him
11 for many years, thank you all for sharing
12 him with us and allowing him to touch us.

13 The correspondence that they
14 sent to each of us, and I just wanted to
15 read it into the record. It notes that
16 the viewing will be held on Thursday,
17 April 28th, 2016 from 5:00 p.m. until
18 8:00 p.m. at Laborers' Local 332, 1310
19 Wallace Street, Philadelphia, PA 19123.
20 The Janazah funeral will be held on
21 Friday, April 29th, 2016 at 11:00 a.m. at
22 the Philadelphia Masjid located at 4700
23 Wyalusing Avenue, Philadelphia, PA 19131.
24 The repass will be held immediately
25 following the Janazah at the Laborers'

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2 Local 332, 1310 Wallace Street,
3 Philadelphia, PA 19123. And in lieu of
4 flowers, memorial donations may be made
5 to the Friends of Labor, attention Cheryl
6 Lee, again at 1310 Wallace Street.

7 Mr. President and colleagues,
8 thank you so very much for your patience.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you, Councilwoman.

11 The Chair recognizes
12 Councilwoman Gym.

13 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
14 very much, Council President. This
15 afternoon we're having hearings on a
16 serious issue that has been impacting
17 many of our public schools in our
18 communities, and that's the issue of
19 looking at youth who are experiencing
20 homelessness in our city. We've seen a
21 dramatic rise as our poverty in our city
22 deepens. Our young people are the ones
23 who can suffer the most significant
24 consequences.

25 But the most important thing is

2 that I feel that something can be done
3 about it, and that our working together
4 with Councilwoman Blackwell especially
5 and Councilman Domb can figure out some
6 solutions that can make an impact right
7 away.

8 So I invite all my colleagues
9 to stay. It's at 1 o'clock, and we look
10 forward to a good hearing.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilwoman.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Henon.

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
17 Council President. And I just want to
18 expand on my personal, personal
19 relationship with Mr. Sam Staten, who
20 recently just passed away.

21 I've been in the labor movement
22 for 26 years, and in my 26 years, I was a
23 business representative and political
24 director for Local 98 for 15 of those
25 years, and I have been blessed to have

2 known Mr. Staten on a personal level.

3 And there are labor leaders. There are

4 good labor leaders. There are great

5 labor leaders. And Mr. Staten was a

6 legendary labor leader. And he shaped

7 the labor movement on what it is today.

8 He personally from a social and a

9 right -- doing the right thing empowered

10 communities to reentry into the

11 workforce. He is responsible for the

12 initial programs with DAP and

13 inclusionary programs in the City and

14 into the trades with DAP, with PHA, with

15 University of Penn, with Lucien Blackwell

16 Apprenticeship Program, and many, many

17 more. It all started with Mr. Staten.

18 And he was the warmest and most generous

19 man that I have met in the City of

20 Philadelphia when it comes to people,

21 from founding the Sister Clara Muhammad

22 School and from his involvement in all of

23 the communities. And as Cherelle had

24 mentioned, his word, once he said

25 something, it was it. You didn't have to

2 second guess. You didn't have to ask any
3 details. He was a man of his word, and
4 he delivered to the best ability what he
5 was sought out to do.

6 So I want to thank him for a
7 legendary career. He's a legendary man.
8 He has the highest respect out of the
9 labor movement here in the City of
10 Philadelphia that everybody achieves to.
11 He was truly the teacher of great labor
12 leaders, and that's how we see him, and
13 he surely will be missed. And his marks
14 that he will leave behind is all in the
15 mentoring that he has accomplished
16 throughout the labor movement, especially
17 with 332 and their extended family.

18 So our hearts and prayers are
19 going to go out to the Staten family as
20 well as the 332 family and the entire
21 labor movement.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Green.

2 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
3 Council President. Just to follow up on
4 the comments of my colleagues in
5 reference to the passing of Sam Staten,
6 Sr. as well as Barbara Daniel-Cox. They
7 have been pillars in not only the City of
8 Philadelphia or the Commonwealth of
9 Pennsylvania but also throughout our
10 nation. And so everyone's hearts and
11 minds are with the family at this time of
12 home-going.

13 In addition, I wanted to thank
14 Councilman Taubenberger for your advocacy
15 earlier today in reference to urban
16 farming. As the grandson of an African
17 American farmer who bought a farm in
18 North Carolina in 1943, I'm glad you're
19 trying to bring back that spirit of
20 farming here in the City of Philadelphia
21 and all the opportunities it can provide
22 here in the City.

23 Also I would like to thank
24 Councilwoman Brown for her advocacy. She
25 last year was an early advocate to the

2 Treasury in reference to making sure that
3 we have prominent women of color, that
4 being Harriet Tubman, and also other
5 prominent Americans on future currency,
6 and this initiative actually was prompted
7 by a lawsuit by the American Council of
8 the Blind to advocate for change to the
9 nation's currency, which ultimately
10 led -- which was a successful lawsuit in
11 2008, which changed the future of our
12 currency with a number of prominent
13 Americans to be on our currency,
14 including Harriet Tubman. So I want to
15 thank Councilwoman Brown for her advocacy
16 in that regard.

17 And, finally, as you know,
18 April is Autism Awareness Month, and as
19 we conclude this month, I provided some
20 information on the desks of all members
21 of Council that let us know about the
22 impact of autism in your Council
23 districts. We have almost 25,000 people
24 in the City of Philadelphia living with
25 autism, and in just a six-year time

2 period, we had 116 percent increase of
3 autism here in the City of Philadelphia.
4 It's going to be an impact that's going
5 to have a profound effect throughout our
6 Council districts, throughout our city,
7 and to the lives -- and I'm sure you have
8 someone that you know in your church,
9 synagogue or a close family member who
10 has been touched by this learning
11 difference.

12 So I just wanted to remind
13 people of the impact throughout the City
14 of Philadelphia, and although April is
15 coming to a close, it's something that
16 we'll be dealing with every day.

17 So thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 The Chair recognizes Councilman
21 Johnson.

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
23 Council President. I want to also echo
24 the sentiments of my colleagues regarding
25 the passing of Sister Barbara Daniel-Cox

2 as well as Mr. Sam Staten, Sr. I think
3 all of us have had a relationship with
4 him that really expounded beyond
5 politics, but as public servants and
6 particularly his work within the labor
7 movement. He has significantly helped to
8 move this city forward, but also improve
9 the quality of lives of African Americans
10 and all Philadelphians. And so I want to
11 also just express my condolences to the
12 Sam Staten family as well as members of
13 the labor movement, particularly
14 Laborers' Local 332, but also members of
15 the labor movement as a whole.

16 I want to make a brief
17 announcement regarding two events that
18 are taking place in my district this
19 weekend as a part of National
20 Prescription Drug Take-Back -- National
21 Prescription Drug Take Back Your Drug Day
22 on this Saturday, April the 30th. We
23 will be partnering with Sheriff Jewell
24 Williams at the Point Breeze Pharmacy
25 located on the 1300 block of Point Breeze

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2 Avenue with Sheriff Jewell Williams,
3 Point Breeze Pharmacy. We'll be working
4 with individuals who will be taking back
5 their prescription drugs. And also we
6 will be having a tangled title and
7 property taxes workshop on Saturday,
8 April the 30th from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00
9 p.m. at the Dixon House. And that's a
10 significant workshop, because we want to
11 make sure that long-term residents in a
12 very changing community such as Point
13 Breeze, Grays Ferry have the opportunity
14 to come out and learn about all of the
15 resources that we provide that are
16 helping people stay inside their homes.
17 So, again, that's going to be Saturday,
18 April 30th, 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at
19 the Dixon House located in South
20 Philadelphia.

21 And also I just want to inform
22 not only my constituents but residents
23 throughout the City of Philadelphia
24 regarding an extension on the Longtime
25 Owner-Occupants Program open enrollment

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2 period, which now will be extended until
3 February 2017. And Councilman Squilla
4 and myself worked very hard on that
5 extension to allow long-term residents
6 the opportunity to take advantage of this
7 tax relief. And so surely if we're going
8 to be supportive of new development
9 through tax abatements, we can be
10 supportive of long-term residents through
11 making sure they take advantage of the
12 Longtime Owner-Occupants Program.

13 Thank you, Council President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilman.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Jones.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. Sam Staten, Sr. and
20 Barbara Daniel-Cox, I did not want to
21 repeat what was said, but I reflected on
22 my own personal interaction with them,
23 and when it comes to both of them, what
24 they have in common, if you were to look
25 up an urban dictionary, Webster and put

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2 "strong black man," "strong black woman"
3 and look for a picture, it would be their
4 respective pictures next to each.

5 When I first met Sam Staten,
6 Sr., I was taken in. We were running for
7 political office. And by the description
8 of him, I thought I was going in to see a
9 6'5" 250 pound guy, and when they brought
10 me in the side door up through -- I was
11 being escorted through the channels. If
12 you've ever been in that office, you get
13 lost coming in there. And they brought
14 me in. It was like now stand here, don't
15 move, and then we're going to bring you
16 in. And he was sitting behind the desk
17 just as relaxed, and he let me do my
18 pitch, and then after it, he looked at
19 his folk -- it was Tony Lewis -- and he
20 said, Okay. "Okay." Not even two words.
21 And everything was done and taken care
22 of.

23 And you're right, Cherelle, you
24 ain't have to look back after that,
25 because you had his full-fledged support.

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2 Similarly, with Barbara
3 Daniel-Cox, I was a young new Director of
4 the Minority Business Enterprise Council
5 and she was the Chair. So in that time,
6 there was a lot more conflict between
7 majority contractors and minority
8 contractors and female contractors and
9 the City, and you could be besieged by
10 all sides by people smacking you in the
11 head because of the controversy of the
12 issue. When I went into those Board
13 meetings, all I had to do was sit behind
14 Barbara Daniel-Cox and she handled each
15 and every aspect. And I must confess to
16 you, Mr. President, it's difficult
17 walking on the playground dealing with
18 the bullies and the toughest kid on the
19 block is your big sister. She handled
20 things so that we could make a
21 difference.

22 And so I'm truly appreciative
23 to both of those individuals, but what
24 I'm encouraged by is that they've trained
25 good people to replace them, and we

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2 should all take that lesson to always
3 have somebody that you're mentoring to be
4 able to take your place, because we too
5 shall pass.

6 Thank you, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilman.

9 The Chair recognizes
10 Councilwoman Blackwell.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
12 you, Mr. President. Let me say that I'm
13 blessed. Lucien Blackwell got a Sammy
14 Award and I was always -- I always
15 admired it and always wished I had one.
16 Well, last year, colleagues, I got a
17 Sammy. I got a Sammy Award.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: We are
20 so honored for the long, wonderful
21 relationship we've had with Local 332 and
22 everything everyone has said about Mr.
23 Staten, Sr. He was a sweet man, a good
24 man, a kind man. He cared about
25 everyone. He was the kind of person if

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2 you could carry him on your shoulders, as
3 his family and members did, you would be
4 happy to do so. Wonderful man. It was
5 an honor for me. And, again, if you want
6 to see what a Sammy looks like, come to
7 411 and it's right there.

8 Let me also say Barbara
9 Daniel-Cox went to college with my sister
10 and I, you know. You all know I'm Jannie
11 from Cheyney from our affair, and we
12 honored her last year. You all know
13 about our work with the African
14 community, the Mayor's Commission on
15 African and Caribbean Immigrant Affairs
16 and Echoes of Africa. Barbara Daniel-Cox
17 is a person everybody knows. She
18 serviced everyone. We were so happy to
19 honor her last year, because for all that
20 she does for our community and for all
21 communities, she had never been honored.
22 So we were very, very pleased to try to
23 give her her due and give her her,
24 quote/unquote, flowers while she could
25 smell them. We love Barbara Daniels, and

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2 whenever I saw -- we'd always ask -- you
3 know how you know someone all your life.
4 You always ask about people they see that
5 you don't. So we always caught up on
6 folks from the old school. And she was
7 just a wonderful, giving person, and we
8 are so happy to be part of this honor to
9 honor her again.

10 And let me say we all know that
11 Billy Paul passed too, and Billy Paul
12 knew the late and great Lucien Blackwell
13 from the waterfront. So this is one of
14 those weeks where we knew everyone, and
15 certainly I'm going to get the Police
16 Commissioner -- I meant to get his son's
17 number and call him yesterday. So one of
18 his sons was involved with that water --
19 see, I haven't mentioned it in a long
20 time -- with the water main break on
21 North 52nd Street. I've been good. So
22 one of his sons was involved with that.
23 I promised I wouldn't. When you get
24 tired of hearing yourself say something,
25 you know people are really, really tired

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2 of it. So the Commissioner's namesake
3 and son was on that block too when we had
4 that water main break. So you know we
5 have his number, and certainly we'll tell
6 him how we feel and certainly how I feel.

7 So, you know, sometimes it's
8 like that, but, you know, the older you
9 get, the more you do know everyone. And
10 we are just privileged to have known all
11 of these wonderful people and who have
12 been able to share their lives, and we
13 thank them for lives of service.

14 And, finally, let me say
15 that -- and I'm not saying this because I
16 got my award today, but Cherelle Parker
17 is sponsoring a Delta Sigma Theta
18 luncheon, sorority luncheon, in the
19 Caucus Room.

20 So, yeah, you see that,
21 Hasheem?

22 So we want to thank her and the
23 sorority and certainly remind everyone
24 that that luncheon is across the hall for
25 us.

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2 Thank you, Mr. President.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilwoman.

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman

6 Domb.

7 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,

8 Council President. I just wanted to give

9 a little positive news and, that is, that

10 I recently read that Urban Land Institute

11 was here about two weeks ago in

12 Philadelphia, and they called the Navy

13 Yard, which is in Councilman Johnson's

14 district, and PIDC, I guess, runs it -- I

15 want to give them both a shout-out. They

16 called it one of the most successful

17 master plan redevelopments in U.S.

18 history, in U.S. history. Kind of

19 amazing being where we came from a yard

20 that was closed with no jobs in 1995,

21 today over \$1 billion of investment and

22 12,000 jobs. And I think the lesson here

23 is that we can create more Navy Yard type

24 employment opportunities across the City

25 that will help all of us. And it's a

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2 great thing, and I'd like to just call
3 that to our attention.

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman
8 Johnson.

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yes. I
10 just want to follow up and thank
11 Councilman Domb for acknowledging the
12 great work taking place down in the Navy
13 Yard in the great 2nd Councilmanic
14 District, but also as we move forward in
15 the Philadelphia Navy Yard and working
16 with PIDC and Liberty Property Trust, I
17 think it's only going to continue to be
18 great as long as their process is
19 inclusive and we're making sure that as
20 the more they do development and building
21 down in the Navy Yard, it's an inclusive
22 process and people have the opportunity
23 to participate in all of the professional
24 services contracts as well as the
25 development taking place regarding the

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2 construction jobs available in the
3 Philadelphia Navy Yard.

4 Thank you very much, Council
5 President.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman. Look forward to
8 you making sure that that happens.

9 Before I call for a motion to
10 adjourn, I'm going to break the rule. I
11 don't want to abuse this. I know I'm not
12 supposed to speak up here. But real
13 quickly, the individuals that have
14 transitioned, Barbara and Billy Paul, I
15 have a little special affinity. Barbara
16 recently did a lot of good work for us on
17 Avenue of the Arts on North Broad. She
18 was the consultant to make sure we got
19 that thing up and running, because as you
20 all know, she's real good at --
21 Councilman Jones' reference about
22 ensuring that all the details are handled
23 and we're up and running on the Avenue of
24 North renaissance.

25 Billy Paul, we actually honored

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2 him two years ago at the Strawberry
3 Mansion Annual Festival. You were out
4 there. We gave him a nice honor, because
5 he was a really good guy that came from
6 North Philadelphia. He gave a little hit
7 about me and Mrs. Jones and teased the
8 people with two verses and then shut it
9 down. So there was a lot of disappointed
10 people.

11 Sam Staten, Sr. is actually a
12 person that, again, his office, the
13 headquarters is in North Philadelphia. I
14 was thinking about my first interaction
15 with Sam Staten. It was actually my
16 first year as a Councilperson, and I was
17 a newly minted Councilperson and I came
18 in and lo and behold, the first thing
19 that we had to deal with was the
20 stadiums. And those of you who were
21 around remember that, how challenging
22 that was. And my first level of detailed
23 interaction was, he was lighting me up on
24 the phone because I was holding out on my
25 vote for the stadium. You know, he

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2 called me up, said, This is Sam.

3 I'm like, Okay. I picked the
4 phone.

5 You don't understand.

6 Well, you don't understand, you
7 know.

8 I was a new guy. I didn't
9 know, you know. And it ended up pretty
10 bad on the phone. And ultimately the
11 stadiums happened, but what he did, he
12 called me up after the vote. He said, I
13 want to take you on a little ride. And,
14 Curtis, you talked about his people -- he
15 had the 6'5" perspective, but he was a
16 small person in stature, but you still
17 had that sense of who he was.

18 So he got me -- he came, picked
19 me up, got me in this big Cadillac and he
20 drove me up to Exton, Pennsylvania, where
21 their training facility was. And we're
22 driving. Anybody that ever had to go to
23 Exton or near Exton, it's a long way. So
24 the more we're driving and we're getting
25 out in farmland, and I'm not saying

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2 anything, and I'm telling you, I'm
3 getting nervous. I'm saying, I'm
4 thinking about TV, when they take you
5 out. I mean, you know, he's a laborer,
6 right? He got a lot of shovels around,
7 right? And I'm like, man. And I'm being
8 honest, I was quite nervous, because it
9 seemed like the trip never ended. But
10 when we finally reached our destination,
11 we got out and I saw the Laborers'
12 facility, training facility, out in
13 Exton, Pennsylvania, and I was amazed.
14 And he explained to me that what he was
15 talking about wasn't just a job. It was
16 an opportunity. It was a career. And I
17 got a different perspective on what it
18 was like to be involved in labor and
19 unions and all of the organized activity
20 that they had. We went around and I was
21 quite impressed. And I'm happy to say
22 that as of four days ago, there was an
23 agreement signed between Temple
24 University and the Laborers, all of the
25 Laborers' Union, where they will be

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2 moving the Exton training facility to
3 North Broad Street.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So
6 I'm just, you know -- while I'm extremely
7 sad, like we all are, about losing him,
8 his memory will live on in that facility
9 that will provide support.

10 So with that, sorry for a break
11 in the rules. I think you all will
12 probably give me a pass on this one.
13 With this, I'd like to recognize
14 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN:
16 Mr. President, I too am a beneficiary of
17 Barbara Daniel-Cox's wise counsel in that
18 we might remember that she was the first
19 Executive Director of the Mayor's
20 Commission for Women under Mayor W.
21 Wilson Goode. So when my office
22 proceeded to do our homework and
23 research, Barbara was always in the
24 wings, a quiet soldier offering counsel
25 on how to best get this done in the last

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2 Administration. So I am eternally
3 grateful for who she was and what she
4 meant to me and my career.

5 With regards to Sam Staten,
6 while we know he was a giant and indeed a
7 legend and left a huge footprint in the
8 labor community, he also made a
9 difference in housing. In 1983, one of
10 the first proposals that I wrote at
11 Philadelphia OIC was with Sam Staten,
12 Sr., who sat at the table with me and
13 guided us in how we could ensure a funded
14 project by the federal government
15 Department of Housing. And so not
16 knowing then the giant of his
17 personality, I've learned that he was
18 about fairness across the board, in labor
19 for sure but across the board, when it
20 came to what scripture might say, the
21 least of these. So we're lucky if our
22 lives were touched by these two citizens,
23 and I'm grateful to have known them both.

24 Thank you, Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilwoman. And I recognize
3 you again for a motion to adjourn.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
6 adjourned until Thursday, May 5th, 2016
7 at 10:00 a.m.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
10 been moved and properly seconded that
11 Council stand adjourned until Thursday,
12 May 5th, 2016, 10:00 a.m.

13 All those in favor say aye.

14 (Aye.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Those opposed?

17 (No response.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 ayes have it, and the motion carries.

20 Thank you all very much.

21 (Stated Meeting adjourned at
22 12:50 p.m.)
