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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

We're going to start now. We had some administrative functions to take care of, which is why we have the delay.

We have a quorum. I'd ask all the members to take their seats and the visitors retire behind the rail, and we can get the show started.

To give our invocation this morning, the Chair recognizes Reverend Leroy Simmons of Enon Tabernacle Baptist Church, Germantown Clergy Initiative, and Parents United for Public Education. He is here today as the guest of Councilwoman Gym.

I would ask all members and guests and visitors to please rise.

(Councilmembers and guests rise.)

REVEREND SIMMONS: Shall we pray.

Almighty God, thou who has been our resting place throughout all generations, as taught by one of our

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2 junior deacons, before we ask you for
3 anything, we want to thank you for
4 everything. Thank you for City
5 government that has the habit of pausing
6 to reverence you, to seek your guidance
7 before they carry out the people's
8 business, a people that you love. Keep
9 them mindful of the fact that though they
10 were elected by constituents, they are
11 set aside by you to justly divide limited
12 resources for us all, especially for the
13 children, the poor, and the underserved.

14 We are grateful to you for the
15 victories that you've achieved through
16 them, the victories that you've brought
17 about even as they've been reconstructed.

18 Lord, we thank you for what
19 they've done with the School District.
20 We thank you for what they've done with
21 abuse. We thank you for the things that
22 they've done that no one knows but you.
23 Bless them for that.

24 Father, richly bless them as
25 they face this aggressive agenda today,

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2 in the culmination of their sessions and
3 before their summer break. Bless them
4 with divine wisdom and understanding that
5 they not sacrifice excellence in doing
6 the public greater good for expediency.

7 Grant them the courage to stand
8 for what is right in your sight, the
9 grace to forgive as they are forgiven,
10 and also to handle those things that
11 could come from criticism and ridicule,
12 so that they can justly divide and
13 legislate.

14 Father, remove barriers of
15 unity that may be lodged in hearts and
16 minds in this body, in individuals, so
17 that they might be able to reason
18 together. Lift them beyond self-seeking
19 and keep each of them focused on the
20 greater good.

21 Father, help them as they
22 finish this day to go into summer break
23 so they can rejuvenate themselves,
24 restore family relationships, families
25 that have sacrificed just like them, and

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2 to rest and spend some quality time.

3 Prepare them to come back and take care
4 of your people's business.

5 Father, we also can't come to
6 you without lifting up and joining that
7 great chorus of folks who beseech you to
8 add condolences, special, special
9 condolences to those who suffered in
10 Orlando, those who have suffered
11 throughout the world in Kenya, those who
12 are suffering today.

13 Father, we ask that you will
14 send your comforting angels to comfort
15 those who have lost. We ask that you
16 will send your healing hands to heal
17 those who have been hurt physically and
18 traumatically, psychologically.

19 Lord, we thank you for what you
20 will do today, and we give it over to
21 you. We thank you for how you will do
22 it, and that we pray that it will all be
23 pleasing in your sight, for we know as my
24 ancestors, the Akan people in West
25 Africa, who would say, Ishe oluwa ko le

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2 baje, which interpret, God's work will
3 never be destroyed.

4 We thank you. I offer this
5 prayer in the matchless name of your son
6 Jesus, the Christ.

7 Amen.

8 (Amen.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you so much for those inspiring
11 words.

12 Council will be at ease.

13 (Council at ease.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you very much. The next order of
16 business is the approval of the Journal
17 of the meeting of Thursday, June 9th,
18 2016, and the Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Greenlee.

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

21 you, Mr. President. I move that the
22 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, June
23 9th, 2016 be approved.

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you. It has been moved and
3 properly seconded that the Journal of the
4 meeting of Thursday, June 9th, 2016 stand
5 approved.

6 All those in favor say aye.

7 (Aye.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Those opposed?

10 (No response.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 ayes have it, and the Journal is
13 approved.

14 The next order of business is
15 requests for leave of absence, and the
16 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
18 Council President. On behalf of the
19 majority, there are no leaves of absence
20 today.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 Chair thanks the gentleman.

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 O'Neill for request for leave of absence
25 on the minority.

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2 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. On behalf of the
4 republicans, there are no requests for
5 leave of absence.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 Chair thanks the gentleman.

8 At this time, I would like to
9 dispense with the regular order of
10 business and I would like to welcome
11 everyone who has come down to witness
12 their government in action. It's a
13 pleasure to see the rafters filled. We
14 usually get this at this time of year.
15 We hope that your stay here today is a
16 pleasurable one, so much so that you come
17 back again. Again, thank you so much for
18 coming down.

19 At this time, the Chair
20 recognizes Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez,
21 who will present a resolution recognizing
22 Consul Carlos Giralt-Cabrales. I hope I
23 did that right. Would the Consul and
24 those accompanying him please join the
25 Councilwoman at the podium.

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2 (Councilmembers and guests
3 approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And,
5 Councilwoman, I understand we're going to
6 have a little entertainment also,
7 Councilwoman.

8 Folks, can I ask for a little
9 quiet, please. We're still in session.
10 Thank you.

11 (Musical and singing
12 performance.)

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
15 right.

16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: We
17 needed a little bit of music. We needed
18 a little bit of music to liven this up.

19 So good morning, and I don't
20 want to belabor it. I know we have a
21 long program. The person we're honoring
22 today really exemplifies the type of
23 leadership that allows Philadelphia to be
24 the leader, a global city, proud of our
25 sanctuary status, proud about the fact

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2 that we protect immigrants, that we
3 welcome immigrants, and that this
4 particular constituency, the Mexican
5 community, has been well represented as
6 it grows and contributes to the economy
7 of the City of Philadelphia.

8 I'm going to briefly allow my
9 Council colleague Councilwoman Gym who
10 wanted to say a few words before the
11 presentation.

12 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you so
13 much, Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

14 I just wanted to make a few
15 statements. Prior to coming into
16 Council, I spent 20 years of my life
17 working with immigrant communities, who
18 don't often have a voice in power, and in
19 all of our struggles that we dealt with,
20 whether it was around issues with force
21 or whether it was language access,
22 whether we were dealing with the schools
23 and harassment and bias issues, issues
24 that were challenging and difficult,
25 issues that were joyful and cultural

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2 celebrations, our Consul General from
3 Mexico was there, and I want to extend
4 our deepest gratitude from all the
5 diverse immigrant communities of
6 Philadelphia who wish him, from the
7 bottom of our hearts, much gratitude,
8 much joy in his next ventures in Asia and
9 that he will always have a home here in
10 Philadelphia.

11 Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: So with
14 that, we'll get started.

15 Recognizing and honoring Consul
16 Carlos Giralt-Cabrales on 25 years of
17 outstanding Public Service to Mexico and
18 the City of Philadelphia.

19 Whereas, Carlos Giralt-Cabrales
20 was born in Mexico City in 1963, where he
21 took courses in Strategic Studies at the
22 National Institute for Public
23 Administration;

24 Whereas, Carlos has been
25 working with the Mexican Ministry of

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2 Foreign Affairs since 1983, and became a
3 Foreign Service career member in 1991;
4 and

5 COUNCILMAN OH: And I'll just
6 point out as Chair of Global
7 Opportunities and the Creative/Innovative
8 Economy that our state does \$4.6 billion
9 worth of trade with Mexico, one of our
10 top trading partners to our benefit, and
11 the Consul General has been fantastic for
12 the economic benefit of our city.

13 Whereas, as an officer in
14 Mexico City he was the Analyst, Chief of
15 Department for Consular Statistics,
16 Vice-Director for Consular Coordination,
17 Director of Consular Affairs, Deputy
18 General Director for Consular Services,
19 and Acting General Director for Consular
20 Services; and

21 Whereas, in his role as a
22 diplomat, he was appointed Deputy Consul
23 at the Consulate of Mexico in
24 Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Deputy Consul
25 and Acting Consul General at the

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2 Consulate General of Mexico in
3 Sacramento, California; and Consul of
4 Mexico in San Bernardino, California. He
5 returned to Philadelphia as the head of
6 the Consulate of Mexico and has served
7 here since August 20th, 2010; and

8 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,
9 Consul Giralt-Cabrales has demonstrated
10 his commitment to improve the quality of
11 the services provided by the Consulate of
12 Mexico in Philadelphia or has reached out
13 into the community in order to establish
14 a consistent political dialogue with
15 authorities, business organizations,
16 cultural entities and community leaders,
17 with the intention of building better
18 relations between Mexico and the Delaware
19 Valley region; and

20 Whereas, in his role, Consul
21 Giralt-Cabrales has been a leading
22 advocate for immigration reform, language
23 access, and increasing access to
24 government to the Mexican community; and

25 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,

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2 Consul Giralt-Cabrales has promoted the
3 economic development of Philadelphia's
4 Mexican community and expanded the
5 region's relationship with Mexico; and

6 Whereas, Consul Giralt-Cabrales
7 has received several proclamations,
8 diplomas, and commendations during his
9 career from elected officials,
10 authorities and institutions, including
11 the "Influential Latino of the Year 2003"
12 by the Inland Empire Hispanic Image
13 Awards, in Riverside, California; "Latino
14 of the Year 2005" by the Northside Impact
15 Committee in Redlands, California; the
16 "Most Influential Latinos" award from the
17 Delaware Valley Most Influential Latinos
18 Foundation; and a Mexican presidential
19 award acknowledging his 25 years of
20 service; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Now,
22 therefore, be it resolved, that the
23 Council of the City of Philadelphia,
24 recognizes, honors, and celebrates the
25 over 25 years of outstanding public

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2 service Consul Giralt-Cabrales has
3 dedicated.

4 And further resolved, that a
5 copy of this resolution will be presented
6 to the Consul as evidence of el sincero
7 respeto y la admiracion que le tenemos.

8 Gracias.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 Chair recognizes Consul Cabrales for
12 remarks.

13 CONSUL GIRALT-CABRALES: Buenos
14 dias.

15 (Buenos dias.)

16 CONSUL GIRALT-CABRALES: This
17 is most probably the first time that a
18 Mexican Consul is saluted from the
19 (unintelligible) in this hall. Thank you
20 for that.

21 (Applause.)

22 CONSUL GIRALT-CABRALES: It's
23 also a small footprint of the presence of
24 the Mexican community in this great City
25 of Philadelphia. Thank you for allowing

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2 us to do that.

3 I want to also thank you,
4 President Darrell Clarke, Councilwoman
5 Maria Quinones, Councilwoman Helen Gym,
6 Councilman David Oh, Councilman Green,
7 for this wonderful opportunity to be
8 here.

9 I live in Philadelphia. Monday
10 is my last day as the Consul of Mexico in
11 Philadelphia, but I have seen a
12 tremendous growth in the presence of the
13 Hispanic community and in particular the
14 Mexican community in this city. I have
15 seen also something very important, that
16 inter-commerce are part of the solution
17 and not part of the problem, that the
18 Mexican community have become a member of
19 the Greater Philadelphia communities and
20 is working hard for this city, is working
21 hard to educate our kids, is working hard
22 to make business, is working hard to make
23 the City greater.

24 Thank you very much. On behalf
25 of the Mexican community, I receive this

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2 commendation with all heart.

3 Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Council will be at ease.

7 (Council at ease.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you very much.

10 We will be moving to our next
11 presentation. At this time, the Chair
12 recognizes Councilwomen Bass and Gym, who
13 will present a resolution declaring
14 Johnson House Historic Site's annual
15 Juneteenth Festival as the Philadelphia
16 Juneteenth Festival.

17 Would Onyx Finney and those
18 accompanying her please join the Council
19 ladies at the podium.

20 (Councilmembers and guests
21 approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Joining the Councilwomen, we also have
24 Councilman Jones, Councilwoman Blackwell,
25 Councilman Taubenberger.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good
3 morning. Good morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Well, today
6 is a celebration, and as we are planning
7 for Juneteenth, which is this coming
8 Saturday, it is our honor and our
9 pleasure to recognize the folks over at
10 Johnson House who have just done an
11 extraordinary job of recognizing and
12 commemorating this very important and
13 special day, not just for the African
14 American community but really for all
15 Americans to know and to be aware of.
16 And so we have here today a resolution
17 and the title of which is, Declaring
18 Johnson House Historic Site's annual
19 Juneteenth Festival as the Philadelphia
20 Juneteenth Festival and recognizing,
21 honoring, and celebrating Juneteenth in
22 Philadelphia as the day when enslaved
23 African Americans were freed in the
24 United States of America more than 150
25 years ago.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you so
3 much, Councilwoman. Just one quick
4 statement. Just having been a teacher 20
5 years ago, I remember taking my fifth
6 grade class to Johnson House on a regular
7 basis and talking about how close history
8 is to us at every moment, and as we
9 remember Juneteenth this weekend -- and
10 we certainly hope everybody in
11 Philadelphia joins Johnson House and the
12 celebration there on Saturday all day
13 long -- that we remember that the fight
14 continues and the struggle goes on in
15 ways that are deeper, broader, and more
16 important than we thought possible.

17 Whereas, on June 19th, 1865,
18 slaves in Galveston, Texas were informed
19 that they were free, long after slaves
20 were freed in all other states. Former
21 slaves coined the phrase Juneteenth to
22 celebrate their newfound freedom by
23 combing the month of the occurrence
24 (June) with the day (19th); and

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,

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2 located on the corner of Germantown
3 Avenue and Washington Lane in
4 Germantown's neighborhood in
5 Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Johnson House
6 stands as a site where the principles of
7 1688 Germantown Protests Against Slavery
8 were acted upon, and is designated as a
9 National Historic Landmark; and

10 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
11 Philadelphia has a rich history for its
12 significant role in the Underground
13 Railroad and the Abolitionist movement;
14 the Johnson House was a "station" and
15 meeting place for other abolitionists,
16 including conductors Harriet Tubman and
17 William Still; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
19 Whereas, Johnson House Historic Site is
20 an historic house museum and center for
21 civil and social advocacy that represents
22 what everyday people have done and can do
23 to make a difference in their community
24 and beyond the creating -- in their
25 community and beyond by creating

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2 interactive educational opportunities,
3 fostering community initiatives, and
4 preserving the historic integrity of the
5 house, grounds and outlier buildings; and

6 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

7 Whereas, Johnson House Historic Site will
8 celebrate Juneteenth, the oldest
9 nationally celebrated holiday
10 commemorating the end of slavery in the
11 United States, by leading and organizing
12 and planning for its 10th Annual
13 Juneteenth Festival on Saturday, June
14 18th, 2016; and

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
16 the Festival attendees enjoy shopping,
17 the arts, food, access to educational
18 information from diverse vendors and the
19 opportunity to attend a Black Colleges
20 Matters panel on the history of
21 Historically Black Colleges and
22 Universities; now, therefore, be it

23 Resolved, by the Council of the
24 City of Philadelphia, that it hereby
25 declares Johnson House Historic Site's

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2 annual Juneteenth Festival as the
3 Philadelphia Juneteenth Festival and
4 recognizes, honors, and celebrates
5 Juneteenth in Philadelphia as the day
6 when enslaved African Americans were
7 freed in the United States of America
8 more than 150 years ago.

9 Further resolved, that an
10 engrossed copy of this resolution be
11 presented to the Board of Johnson House
12 Historic Site for their leadership in
13 hosting the annual Juneteenth Festival,
14 and as further evidence of the sincere
15 admiration of this legislative body.

16 And we want to thank the Board,
17 the staff, the supporters of Johnson
18 House for maintaining this history,
19 spreading the word. This is African
20 American history, this is American
21 history, and it's important history not
22 to be forgotten.

23 Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

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2 Chair recognizes Ms. Finney for remarks.

3 MS. FINNEY: I'd like to thank
4 the Academy for this award.

5 I'm joking. I've always wanted
6 to say that. I'm a graduate of the High
7 School for Performing Arts, so please
8 forgive me.

9 (Applause.)

10 MS. FINNEY: My name is Onyx
11 Finney and I'm a Board member of Johnson
12 House Historic Site, and some of our
13 Board members are here: Connie Swinson,
14 the Executive Director Connie Swinson is
15 here. Sheila Bennett, one of our Board
16 members, and Al Butler, who will be on
17 our panel on Saturdays here. And we'd
18 like to thank on their behalf City
19 Council for this honor and also
20 Councilman Al Taubenberger, Councilman
21 Curtis Jones, Councilwoman Helen Gym for
22 co-sponsoring this resolution and a big,
23 big thank you to our phenomenal City
24 Councilwoman Cindy Bass for sponsoring
25 the resolution and always, always,

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2 always, always supporting Johnson House.
3 Johnson House's Juneteenth
4 Festival is the first and the longest
5 running Juneteenth celebration in Philly.
6 It's a partnership with the 6300 Business
7 Alliance in Historic Germantown. The
8 national historic significance of Johnson
9 House celebrating Juneteenth in
10 Germantown lies in its role in the
11 abolition movement and the Underground
12 Railroad. The Johnson family were
13 considered infidel abolitionists, and
14 when John Brown was captured after his
15 raid at Harpers Ferry, the Johnsons hid
16 the Brown family. Post-emancipation, the
17 Johnsons continued to advocate for
18 African Americans by signing petitions so
19 African Americans could ride in street
20 cars. Israel Johnson managed the
21 Institute for Colored Youth that was
22 dissolved to help create Cheyney
23 University.
24 During our pop-up beer garden
25 at Juneteenth, we will host the Black

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2 Colleges Matter Panel and present this
3 year's Unsung Hero Award to Ena Lindner
4 Swain.

5 Johnson House continues to
6 represent what everyday people can do and
7 have done to make a difference. Although
8 some celebs like Snoop Dog don't want to
9 relive the painful past while certain
10 presidential candidates rush to return to
11 a dark time in American history, we must
12 tell our stories and celebrate our
13 triumphs.

14 Johnson House's Juneteenth
15 Festival -- I mean the Philadelphia
16 Juneteenth Festival is not an event. It
17 is a celebration steeped in tradition,
18 history, heritage, and culture. When you
19 come to celebrate Juneteenth in
20 Germantown, you are entering the womb of
21 freedom. Juneteenth is not just a
22 celebration of our past; it is a reminder
23 that there's still so much left to do.

24 On behalf of the Johnson House
25 Board that I must say is

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2 intergenerational, it's interracial, and
3 it's multicultural and our Board members
4 go from the ages of in their 30's to 85
5 years old, I thank you so very much for
6 this honor, and I look forward to seeing
7 all of you at Juneteenth.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Council will be at ease.

11 (Council at ease.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you.

14 At this time, the Chair
15 recognizes Councilman Taubenberger, who
16 will present a resolution recognizing
17 Philadelphia Business Journal and their
18 2016 "40 under 40" Class.

19 Would Craig Eye and those
20 accompanying him please join the
21 Councilman at the podium.

22 (Councilmembers and guests
23 approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
25 joining Councilman Taubenberger, we have

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2 Councilwoman Parker and Councilman Domb.

3 And before we proceed, I would
4 like to ask if anyone has an electronic
5 device or even a mechanical device that
6 makes any noise, will you please turn it
7 off. Thank you.

8 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: I
9 think it's always very important to
10 recognize the youth, and in this case
11 they're about 20 years younger than me,
12 and that's all a good thing. And I'm
13 also very honored to have my colleagues
14 Councilwoman Cherelle Parker, Councilman
15 Domb here with me.

16 This is important. So please
17 take notice. And also Councilman Domb
18 wanted to say a few words before we
19 actually had the proceedings, and he was
20 actually one of the 40 at one time. Last
21 year, I believe.

22 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
23 Councilman Taubenberger.

24 I just wanted to mention,
25 because this is a great event, 40 under

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2 40, and I was a member. It was so long
3 ago that the event was held at Morton's
4 on the site of the Four Seasons, and most
5 of you don't even remember that, but
6 that's where it was held.

7 But the one message I want to
8 send to a lot of the people who I know
9 are behind me is that the importance of
10 business people and the people 40 under
11 40 to get involved in government. And at
12 some point in their career, after you've
13 done really well in business, think about
14 it and try to help our city. It's very
15 important. So thank you.

16 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
17 Councilwoman Parker.

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
19 the Philadelphia Business Journal has
20 published a top "40 under 40" class since
21 1991 to award the next generation of
22 business leaders; and

23 Whereas, the Philadelphia
24 Business Journal takes the time each year
25 to highlight the successes and work ethic

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2 of young entrepreneurs; and

3 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the

4 Philadelphia Business Journal receives

5 hundreds of nominations each year and

6 narrows it down to only 40; and

7 Whereas, the Philadelphia

8 Business Journal selects the top "40

9 under 40" based on business success,

10 financial results, career growth,

11 volunteer work, community involvement and

12 leadership abilities, and influence on

13 the quality of life for all; and

14 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

15 Whereas, the City of Philadelphia hopes

16 these business leaders will continue to

17 grow their companies, careers and lives

18 here in the City of Philadelphia; now,

19 therefore, be it

20 Resolved, the Council of the

21 City of Philadelphia, hereby recognizes

22 and honors the Philadelphia Business

23 Journal editors, staff and the "40 under

24 40" Class of 2016 for their service to

25 the City in creating a business-friendly

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2 atmosphere in the City of Philadelphia.

3 Congratulatory.

4 (Applause.)

10 will consider the Consent Agenda shortly.

11 The Chair again recognizes
12 Councilman Henon for the purpose of
13 calling up bills and resolutions on the

15 Calendar.

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. In addition to the
18 resolutions and bills being considered on
19 the Consent Agendas, the following
20 resolutions and bills are being called up
21 from the Second Reading and Final Passage
22 Calendars today: Bill Nos. 160644,
23 160659, 160517-A, 160138-A, 160176,

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Thank you.

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: Mr.
10 President, point of information. The
11 last bill that I wanted to read for
12 clarification is 160311 for the record.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you, Councilman. The record shall
15 reflect that. 331, okay.

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: I'll take it
17 boxed. So 160331.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Correct. Thank you. Thank you,
20 Councilman. The record shall reflect
21 that.

22 Our next order of business is
23 the public comment session. I would ask
24 that you bear with me as we work this
25 out, because understandably we have a

2 significant number of individuals on the
3 list. Hopefully we'll be able to work
4 this out. I'm sure that there will be
5 some people who will not be happy with
6 the conclusion, but the simple reality is
7 that I'm going to read the rules, because
8 I knew that this would come up.

9 The Council rules with respect
10 to public comment: Each resident or
11 taxpayer who wishes to provide public
12 comment shall be limited to three
13 minutes, which we always do, in such time
14 and period that the President shall
15 announce. The President may place
16 additional reasonable limitations. And I
17 want you to hear that word, reasonable
18 limitations on public comment to permit
19 Council to conduct its meetings and to
20 maintain order, including limiting
21 repetitious comments.

22 So I fully anticipate when we
23 look at this there will be a significant
24 amount of limited repetitious comments.
25 With all due respect, we have heard a lot

2 about at least two of these bills, so we
3 will try to work out and get as many as
4 possible. So give us a couple of seconds
5 so we can try to come to some conclusion
6 on this.

7 (Brief pause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: What
9 we're going to do -- can I have your
10 attention, please. What we're going to
11 do, we're going to proceed with the
12 non-beverage/soda/whatever we're calling
13 it today. It keeps changing, very
14 evolving situation. We're going to
15 proceed with those comments that don't
16 relate to that, that relate to other
17 matters, and then we're trying to work
18 out the schedule on who is going to
19 testify on those bills or resolutions.

20 So, Mr. Decker, we can start
21 out with this list. We're going to start
22 on the non-beverage/soda tax-related
23 comments.

24 CHIEF CLERK: The following
25 individuals can approach the podium,

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So
8 let me state in terms of the -- excuse
9 me, folks. Can I have your attention,
10 please.

11 In terms of the public comment
12 session, when your names are called, you
13 obviously go to the podium in the middle
14 of the Council Chambers. There's a
15 device. When the light turns green, it
16 will be your time to speak. When the
17 light turns yellow, you will have 30
18 seconds to conclude your remarks. When
19 the light turns red, we'd ask that you
20 please adhere to the guidelines and
21 conclude your remarks. You will be given
22 three minutes each. Thank you.

23 Mr. Decker, did you call all
24 five of the names?

25 CHIEF CLERK: Ms. Shikomba.

2 MS. SHIKOMBA: I'm here.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you. Please proceed, Ms. Shikomba.

5 MS. SHIKOMBA: Okay. Council
6 President, President Darrell Clarke, and
7 other members of Council, I come before
8 you today to speak on four bills really
9 that are considered for passage. They
10 deal with and will allow residential
11 development on Washington Avenue. These
12 bills are 160300, 160302 and 160518.
13 I've also added Bill No. 160176.

14 We're sure that we are being
15 discriminated against because we are poor
16 and handicapped, low and moderate income
17 living in this residential area, which is
18 north of Washington Avenue. I represent
19 NOWAC, North of Washington Avenue, which
20 is a Registered Community Organization.
21 We share the same values as SOSNA.
22 Neither NOWAC nor any of the other
23 organizations was informed about the
24 passing of these zoning bills, nor were
25 we provided with any information until

2 these deals were already made. These
3 projects are too big for a few people who
4 live within 200 feet to be the sole
5 deciders on what is to be built. These
6 projects will affect our entire area, and
7 we are opposing right now to having CMX-3
8 and IRMX introduced without full
9 community impact and full community
10 information.

11 I don't know if you know
12 anything about the (unintelligible)
13 according to Emile Zola, who published a
14 letter in 1898 accusing the French
15 government of impropriety, a letter dated
16 J'accuse, which means in English I
17 accuse. It is on behalf of the NOWAC
18 community and I that I make these
19 accusations. We accuse the
20 Administration, Councilman Johnson, and
21 City Council of continuing what previous
22 Administrations have done and, that is,
23 to show an acute indifference to the
24 poor, handicapped, low- and
25 moderate-income people, residents living

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2 in the City and failing to provide us
3 with adequate housing. We accuse you of
4 continuing to cast us, low- and
5 moderate-income people, aside to wealthy
6 interests. We accuse you of continuing
7 to exclude us from the negotiating
8 process when it comes to developing
9 housing in the City. We accuse you of
10 continuing to allow exclusion of black
11 and brown people and people of color from
12 jobs by not enforcing City legislation on
13 the building trades to enable them to
14 secure employment. We accuse you of
15 continuing to allow development to ignore
16 the poor and marginalized income people
17 in this City. We accuse you of using the
18 poor, poverty stricken, disadvantaged
19 children living in poverty neighborhoods
20 as bait to obtain approval of a proposed
21 sugar tax to fix the City's budget debt.
22 The sugar tax was proposed and promoted
23 as providing pre-K instruction for the
24 17,000 kids living in Philadelphia.

25 What we want? We want to be

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2 treated with respect. We want inclusion,
3 not exclusion. We want equal treatment
4 and end to economic discrimination and
5 (unintelligible). We want to be treated
6 humanely and with dignity. We want our
7 voices heard and not suppressed or
8 ignored. We want substantial low- and
9 moderate-income and handicap housing be
10 included in any project and development
11 coming in this City. We want a
12 commitment that these projects will
13 include a percentage of low and moderate
14 income.

15 We want an increase in the
16 employment of people of color, of men and
17 women on these projects and in enforcing
18 existing laws and not just so-called best
19 efforts. We want development without
20 displacement.

21 We want money generated from
22 the sugar tax to be used solely for the
23 funding of pre-K, as it was stated, and
24 we want legislation introduced that will
25 provide for the public audit and the full

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2 disclosure of how this money is being
3 spent.

4 That is what we want and that's
5 what we're asking for. We, therefore,
6 respectfully request that Bill 160300,
7 160302-A, 160518 be placed on hold and
8 that we favor passage of the sugar tax
9 bill with the provisions noted.

10 Thank you.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Richard Gliniak.

12 (No response.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Tiffany Green,
14 commenting on 160300, 160302-A, and
15 160518-A.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 afternoon.

19 MS. GREEN: Good morning -- or
20 good afternoon. In order for a city to
21 be a leader or a global leader, it's how
22 you treat your poor, and right now these
23 bills that have been passed, we have a
24 real concern because the Bill 160302 will
25 allow developers to build condominiums on

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2 Washington Avenue and it takes away the
3 RCO process, the community process, and
4 the community vote.

5 My concern is, we have
6 Councilpeople who say they're champions
7 for the children and for the poor. So,
8 therefore, why is there not an opposition
9 vote on the floor right now? You can't
10 say you're a champion for poor and the
11 children and yet you allow that this
12 particular bill that will take away the
13 right to have a say in your community and
14 build condominiums that will push out 500
15 to 1,000 families in South Philadelphia.

16 At this point, if our
17 Councilman want to continue to cater to
18 the rich and the affluent, then let him
19 do that, but we have 16 other
20 Councilpeople who can vote opposed to
21 this. We cannot allow poor people to
22 continue to be mistreated like this.

23 I have a real serious problem
24 with the fact that you created the RCO
25 process and made it a law, but now you're

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2 going to take it away from us and allow
3 them to be able to build. We can't even
4 discuss design, parking, not even the
5 time that they open or close. How could
6 you sit here and take that away from us?

7 I am standing here and I am
8 livid at this particular point, but I say
9 this, because you cannot continue to take
10 money out the poor. I come from a family
11 who taught me how to be confident and the
12 ability to say no, and if we have someone
13 who is not going to represent us at this
14 particular point, then it's up to us to
15 take it.

16 This day you sat here and
17 passed this bill and this bill is
18 hurtful, but you know what, in the words
19 of Gone with the Wind, tomorrow is
20 another day.

21 At this particular point, I am
22 so sick and tired of hearing "all in
23 favor say aye." It cringes my stomach
24 not to see individuality on this floor.
25 But I tell you what, from here on, all of

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2 you -- this vote today, it says to me all
3 in favor to take money out of the poor
4 people pockets with the sugar tax. All
5 in favor to remove our rights of the poor
6 to have a say in our community. You're
7 all in favor to say that it's okay for
8 Philadelphia to have the highest poverty
9 rate in the country. It's okay for --
10 you all in favor to say that Philadelphia
11 will be the number one broke, busted, and
12 disgusted city in America.

13 I refuse to let you sit here
14 and disrespect the poor, but I know one
15 thing. No weapon formed against us shall
16 prosper.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you for your testimony.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Theresa
21 McCormick.

22 (No response.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: Theresa
24 McCormick.

25 (No response.)

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Maria Ortiz.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 afternoon.

6 MS. ORTIZ: Good morning,
7 everyone. My name is Maria Ortiz. I
8 live in the South Philadelphia area. I
9 am terribly upset on what's going on in
10 our area with these bills, 160300,
11 160302, 160518. It is disgusting how we
12 are being treated that's human and also
13 with the soda tax and also with all the
14 taxes in the area that they want to
15 increase.

16 We talk about there's no money
17 in the City, but we got an \$18 million
18 house on Rittenhouse Square that has not
19 paid taxes. Why don't we get taxes from
20 those who been in the community that
21 don't pay taxes and get taxes from them?

22 (Applause.)

23 MS. ORTIZ: Can still get
24 raises in their taxes. People and high
25 officials get raises, but people of the

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2 working class, no income, that's working
3 hard to put food on our table, to serve
4 you in your home as butlers, housekeeper
5 or whatever don't get raises or vacations
6 and being mistreated. This is not
7 justice in the United States.

8 I'm also upset because we call
9 ourselves people that deserve better, but
10 this is a new form of slavery for
11 everyone of all colors.

12 As far as the other taxes in
13 our area, we need to sit down and have
14 talk with people of the community, not
15 people in high levels. You need to come
16 out and spend a day or give one of your
17 pay a month once a year to see what's
18 going on and live on the salary we
19 deserve -- or live on the salary that we
20 do not have.

21 Also, the schools, Dr. Hite
22 came from another district. If he is so
23 great, why did he come from another
24 district and Philadelphia hired him?
25 All's I see our schools going down.

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2 We're not recouping. We're not getting
3 anything. And as far as that, I think as
4 far as people getting raises, they should
5 not get no raises if they don't do they
6 job, and that goes for all courses of
7 action.

8 Thank you and have a nice day.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Majeedah Rashid.

13 (No response.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Robert Burdge,
15 commenting on 160175.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MR. BURDGE: Yes. My name is
18 Robert Burdge. Thank you, Council.

19 Thank you for letting me -- we have a
20 serious problem here with this wage tax
21 going up. I know we're going to lose a
22 lot of businesses if we don't be careful
23 with this. I've seen it in other cities,
24 and we're losing businesses.

25 This morning I went by two

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2 empty stores on Market Street, because
3 they just closed down, because they can't
4 afford the taxes or can't afford the
5 rents and the taxes. We need to be
6 careful. I know it's a point in that we
7 have these taxes, but please -- a lot of
8 the employees are leaving town.

9 Also it's not fair to, like the
10 people say, it's not fair to the
11 employees that have to pay these taxes
12 also. It's very hard for people to pay
13 these taxes. And I know for myself, I'm
14 trying to get a new job here in the City,
15 and a lot of the people -- a lot of the
16 employees are going outside the City and
17 bringing in employees, and that's not
18 good for the people that live here in
19 Philadelphia, like myself.

20 We need to be very careful with
21 that wage tax and net profit, because the
22 small business -- it's not just the large
23 businesses. It's the small businesses
24 that we have to look at, because the
25 small businesses, their profit,

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2 everything is going up, the cost of
3 living, the cost of operating, the cost
4 of employment, hiring people, and also
5 the cost of just products, the bringing
6 in certain things. I know a friend of
7 mine has a restaurant over on 3rd and
8 Market. It closed down last year, the
9 pizzeria right on the corner, because it
10 couldn't afford the rent and the
11 employment. So we need to be careful
12 with that.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Ms. Rashid.

18 MS. RASHID: Good morning.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
20 morning -- good afternoon.

21 MS. RASHID: Good afternoon,
22 Councilmembers. My name is Majeedah
23 Rashid. I'm the Chief Operating Officer
24 of the Nicetown CDC, and I want to thank
25 you for allowing me to give my testimony

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2 this morning on Bill 160115.

3 The Nicetown CDC has been
4 working diligently in the community since
5 we were founded in 1999, and we fulfill
6 our mission with a holistic and inclusive
7 approach that prioritizes community
8 organizing through reeducation and
9 training, neighborhood planning, public
10 health and safety, affordable housing
11 development, commercial corridor
12 revitalization, land management, and arts
13 and culture.

14 The Nicetown CDC staff works
15 with local stakeholders to investigate
16 nuisance establishments. In our service
17 area for our Neighborhood Advisory
18 Committee program, we serve six
19 neighborhoods that have been faced with
20 the challenges of these nuisance
21 establishments. These establishments are
22 often blighted and responsible for
23 attracting loiterers, illicit behavior,
24 open-air drug sales, and pose serious
25 safety and health issues in our

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2 neighborhood.

3 We receive numerous reports
4 about nuisance establishments from
5 community residents and businesses, our
6 NAC office as well as local RCOs, and
7 these reports have increased
8 significantly over the past few years.
9 These reports range from operating hours
10 violations to seniors being afraid to go
11 in where crowds regularly gather to
12 gamble, drink beer, alcohol, and smoke
13 marijuana.

14 We do know that our
15 Councilwoman Cindy Bass and her staff
16 have always paid attention and worked
17 diligently to address the problems
18 related to these nuisance establishments
19 in her district. Case in point, a couple
20 months ago one of my staff called me to
21 report a lot of police presence in front
22 of Councilwoman Bass's district office.
23 I happened to be driving in the area and
24 recognized some of her staff and police
25 officers from the 35th and 39th Police

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2 District, and I also saw our L&I
3 Commissioner Perri, so I was really
4 interested then, really kind of nosey. I
5 got out of my car and walked over to ask
6 them what was going on, and they said
7 they were about to conduct random raids
8 or assessments of reported nuisance
9 establishments. They asked me did I want
10 to go with them, and I said yes.

11 We went to three different
12 sites. One was a stop and go on Broad
13 and Wingohocking, one was a scrap yard in
14 Germantown, and one was a so-called auto
15 repair shop. All three had such
16 deplorable conditions, and the L&I
17 Commissioner himself said he thought he
18 had seen it all before, but was
19 astonished to find what he did at these
20 sites. Unfortunately, these conditions
21 do not only exist in the 8th Council
22 District but throughout the City, and
23 this is why I'm here today, to encourage
24 you to support the approval of Bill No.
25 160115. It's time for the City to put

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2 some teeth in the laws that exist and
3 include the language of this bill, which
4 will hold nuisance business owners and
5 managers accountable. This bill will
6 have immediate impact on improving the
7 quality of life, health, and safety in
8 our shared constituencies.

9 Thank you again for giving me
10 this opportunity to comment.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
13 commenting on 160481-A, 160620, 160623,
14 160625, 160619, 160621, 160624, 160627,
15 and 160631.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MR. DANIHEL: This is a
18 representative form of government. You
19 and Council are representatives of the
20 people's will and, if asked, must produce
21 evidence to back up the way you vote.

22 My property at 1038 West
23 Wyoming was sequestered for 18 years
24 under a bait and switch that was
25 allowed -- that was to allow a shopping

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2 mall in lieu of relocation. In 2012, the
3 Sheriff, the RDA, and others in this
4 government changed the deed and leveled
5 my home without payment that is
6 constitutionally required.

7 When Council was notified of
8 violations to federal law 42 USC 1982,
9 1983, 1985, 1986 and others, Council is
10 fiducially required to stop funding and
11 using the RDA, Sheriff and courts, DA's
12 Office and others until this serious
13 breach of the Constitution is corrected.

14 There has been no movement from
15 the Council to correct illegal and
16 without due process property deed
17 transfers.

18 Council continues its
19 relationship with the RDA, Sheriff,
20 courts and others involved. Audit the
21 RDA, Sheriff, courts, and the DA's Office
22 now. You as representatives of the
23 people are required by law to follow the
24 will of the people.

25 I ask the people in this room,

2 have you authorized your representative
3 to steal my home and others, 1038 West
4 Wyoming Avenue, and pay a contractor up
5 to \$100 million to build a commercial
6 property on top of what used to be my
7 home?

8 Hearing nobody saying that
9 they've authorized you to act, Council
10 now has the people's authority to act.
11 De-fund, investigate now these agencies.
12 The City just might find the missing
13 millions that can fund the schools.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 CHIEF CLERK: A.T. McNeil, Sr.,
17 commenting on 160644.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
20 afternoon.

21 MR. McNEIL: I thank City
22 Council for setting up these meetings and
23 I thank the people for coming today to
24 hear about the resolution, Resolution
25 160644, a resolution to stop Donald

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2 Trump.

3 I pray that this bill -- or
4 resolution will be passed, because anyone
5 present that have watched television and
6 all the other press, TV ads on Donald
7 Trump know that something must be done.

8 David stopped Goliath with a
9 rock when the whole people of Israel was
10 afraid. As we do the Stop Trump Now
11 Campaign, we see that 99 percent of the
12 people that we talk with are afraid.

13 So you cannot be a City Council
14 representative unless you show
15 intelligence. You cannot be a
16 representative of the people whether it's
17 religious, for in the Constitution of
18 Pennsylvania it states that we, the
19 people of the Commonwealth, grateful to
20 almighty God for the blessings of civil
21 and religious liberty.

22 I come today under exercising
23 of my religious liberty to ask you
24 without sale, denial or delay, as it
25 states in Article 1, Section 11 of the

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2 Declaration of Rights. It says man's
3 remedy: Every man for an injury done him
4 in his land, goods, person or reputation
5 shall have remedy, compensation for
6 injury, without sale, denial or delay.

7 You, the representatives of the
8 people of the great City of Philadelphia,
9 when you pass this resolution, you are
10 saying to Donald Trump when you come to
11 Philadelphia, be on your best behavior,
12 because if you say anything to insinuate
13 a riot or to injure anyone, we have an
14 orange jumpsuit for you and we have
15 plenty of space on State Road.

16 Stop Trump now. Stop Trump
17 now. We know about the great song of the
18 year.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Sir?

20 MR. McNEIL: What is the great
21 service --

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Sir?

23 MR. McNEIL: -- speaking of the
24 year?

25 Yes.

2 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Your
3 opinion matters. However, we have a
4 clock to honor, so we ask that you
5 finish.

6 MR. McNEIL: I ask you to pass
7 this without sale, denial or delay.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Wayne Rahman.

12 (No response.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Wayne Rahman,
14 commenting on 160644.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 MR. RAHMAN: Good afternoon. I
17 just got a brief comment to say to my
18 friends here in City Council. I haven't
19 been here in a while and I kind of miss
20 coming down here, but I do want to say
21 that the tax that the Administration is
22 talking about, I'm so sad that a lot of
23 my friends in South Philly probably will
24 not agree with me, but, hey, that's the
25 way it is.

2 This tax is very important.

3 Number one, it's for the children. It's
4 for the children. It's for the children.

5 Number two, they're our
6 children here in Philadelphia.

7 And, number three, the
8 teachers. Often when I go to bed in the
9 evening, at night, I try to catch as much
10 news as I can. One forgotten hero,
11 unsung hero out there is the school
12 teachers.

13 (Applause.)

14 MR. RAHMAN: I don't work for
15 the school teachers. I don't work for
16 the union. But the school teachers are
17 the last people I hear when I go to
18 sleep. We don't have enough supplies.
19 That really bothers me. That bothers me
20 greatly.

21 I know I'm an ex-Marine and
22 Vietnam and all that, but that really
23 bothers me, because I remember when I was
24 a little kid at Kelley Junior High School
25 and Vaux, we had enough material for the

2 teachers to go into the closet and bring
3 the stuff out for us to work with.

4 When I walk or drive through
5 different areas of Philadelphia -- I'm
6 talking about I love all of Philly. I
7 was raised in North and South, but I love
8 all Philly. I watch the teachers
9 struggling to their buildings. Some
10 neighborhoods are not that great, but
11 we're going to make them great. Anyway,
12 struggling to their classrooms, loaded
13 down with materials that they have to
14 reach into they pocket and pay for the
15 materials. That's a sad situation for
16 me, and it should be a sad situation for
17 us.

18 Thank you very much.

19 (Applause.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Beverly Chandran.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: I'm going
22 to ask Michael to tee up the next
23 individual so that we can utilize our
24 time more efficiently.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Followed by

2 Ne'Chelle Kennedy.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MS. CHANDRAN: Good afternoon,
5 everyone. My name is Beverly Chandran,
6 born, raised, and educated here in
7 Philadelphia. I am a product of the
8 Philadelphia public school system, first
9 graduating class of Martin Luther King
10 High School in West Oak Lane and a
11 graduate of the Wharton School at the
12 University of Pennsylvania. I'm a
13 realtor eight years, four years in
14 Philadelphia and four years in the
15 Washington, DC area. And for two years I
16 have been a volunteer member of the GPAR
17 Government Affairs Committee.

18 Real estate is my third career,
19 and I chose it because it allows me to
20 educate people of all economic
21 backgrounds on how to make sound choices
22 as to where to purchase real estate for
23 their primary residence but also to
24 utilize real estate as a tool to create
25 wealth.

2 No doubt there's a need to fix
3 and repair homes, but to increase the
4 cost of doing a real estate transaction
5 is making the proposition of owning a
6 home for low- and middle-income
7 residents, a great majority of the City's
8 population, unaffordable.

9 It is wonderful to see the real
10 estate market booming in Philadelphia,
11 and it is quite sad to see the cost of
12 doing a transaction being the reason so
13 many hard-working Philadelphians born and
14 raised here cannot afford to purchase a
15 home because of the fees associated with
16 closing costs, specifically the real
17 estate transfer fee.

18 The issue associated with not
19 being able to purchase a home is not
20 because of the buyer's credit rating nor
21 is it the issue because of a buyer not
22 being able to get a mortgage with a low
23 interest rate. The issue has become the
24 fees associated with doing the
25 transactions. The fees are already

2 keeping a lot of low to middle-class
3 people from purchasing a home.

4 I realize that many people are
5 upset with the real estate boom in
6 Philly, angry about the price of real
7 estate as well as gentrification as a
8 result of real estate, two very valid
9 concerns, but let's not forget that to
10 purchase even a 150,000 to 200,000 home
11 will cost anywhere from \$13,000 to
12 \$17,000 with the FHA mortgage and
13 significantly higher for a conditional
14 mortgage.

15 A few points: \$150,000 to
16 \$200,000 home is almost considered
17 low-income housing given how much the
18 price of the real estate has risen in
19 Philly in the last five years.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Good
21 afternoon, Ms. Chandran. Regrettably, we
22 do have to honor the clock, and so we
23 need you to finalize your remarks, as the
24 bell has rung.

25 MS. CHANDRAN: And seller

2 assist is a thing of the past.

3 In closing, I hope I have
4 encouraged members of the City Council to
5 do more diligence and find another
6 revenue source for the housing repair and
7 preservation program instead of
8 increasing the real estate tax.

9 Thank you for listening.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Ne'Chelle
11 Kennedy, commenting on 160471.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MS. KENNEDY: Thank you,
14 Mr. Council President and the members of
15 Council. My name is Ne'Chelle Kennedy.
16 I'm also a realtor with Greater
17 Philadelphia Association of Realtors, and
18 I respectfully urge you to vote against
19 Bill No. 160471.

20 I wholeheartedly support the
21 effort to address secure, safe, healthy,
22 and affordable homes for our city's
23 residents. However, increasing taxes for
24 property owners while incurring
25 additional bond debt is something the

2 City cannot afford. Funding should come
3 from collecting delinquent taxes,
4 assessing properties appropriately, and
5 reducing government inefficiencies.

6 An increase to the realty
7 transfer tax makes housing less
8 affordable for our clients, who live or
9 move into each and every section of
10 Philadelphia. We walk through each step
11 of the home buying and selling process
12 with our clients. It's an emotional and
13 a stressful journey on both sides of the
14 process. We work with first-time
15 homebuyers as they take one of life's
16 biggest and scariest steps. We help the
17 senior citizen as they transition to a
18 new phase in life, and we provide
19 assistance to clients when heart-breaking
20 life challenges do occur. Our clients
21 are the residents of Philadelphia, and we
22 are advocating on their behalf.

23 The tax increase will have the
24 greatest impact on our senior,
25 low-income, and millennial clients. It

2 hurts fixed-income senior citizens who
3 have spent a lifetime building equity
4 into their home by making them surrender
5 an additional portion of their equity to
6 taxes when they downsize to a smaller
7 home or a senior living arrangement. To
8 a much greater extent, this tax increase
9 will be the burden of the low-income and
10 millennial first-time homebuyers. Most
11 first-time homebuyers struggle to qualify
12 for mortgages and save for the down
13 payments, and they have to pay premiums
14 because the lack of credit and are often
15 required to purchase mortgage insurance.
16 Up-front costs are the biggest obstacles
17 to homeownership for first-time and
18 low-income buyers. For every 1 percent
19 increase needed for a down payment, home
20 affordability decreases by up to 70
21 percent for potential homebuyers.

22 The amount of these fees and
23 taxes involved in closing cost
24 transactions only compound the would-be
25 homebuyers' financial stressors.

2 I just urge that you guys vote
3 against this because 1 percent to you is
4 an additional \$800, \$900, \$1,000 for
5 somebody who is already trying to only
6 come up with \$7,000 to purchase a home.
7 We're making them stay a renter for the
8 rest of their lives, and it's not fair.
9 It's not fair to any of them. You guys
10 can find a different way.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN:

12 Ms. Kennedy?

13 MS. KENNEDY: Can I just have
14 one second?

15 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: We do have
16 a clock to honor as well. I need you to
17 wrap it up.

18 MS. KENNEDY: Okay. You guys
19 are all intelligent. I'm pretty sure
20 that you can find a different means of
21 coming up with this money. I personally
22 know of investors who owe over \$200,000
23 in real estate taxes. You guys sit there
24 and tell them, Oh, they can't have a
25 building permit. What do they do? They

2 go get one of their friends to get a
3 building permit. Oh, you say they can't
4 buy from the Sheriff Sales. What do they
5 do? They find somebody to buy from the
6 Sheriff Sales for them. There has to be
7 another --

8 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Ms.
9 Kennedy, thank you for your important
10 opinion.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Walter Spencer.

13 (No response.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Walter Spencer.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Madam Chair,
17 if I may, I just want to reemphasize the
18 consideration of time as we give public
19 comment today, because the list is quite
20 long and we want to make sure that all
21 citizens get their fair chance and
22 opportunity to speak.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Well
24 taken, Majority Leader.

25 Proceed, sir.

2 MR. SPENCER: Thank you very
3 much. My name is Walter Spencer. I live
4 in the Rittenhouse Square community. I'm
5 here today to testify on behalf of Bill
6 160138, which requires a tax compliant
7 certificate to receive a building permit.
8 I can tell you that when I was living in
9 Massachusetts in the early 1980s and the
10 state had serious financial problems,
11 they implemented a similar rule or
12 similar statute actually that required
13 anyone gaining benefit from the state to
14 either come current on their taxes or be
15 in a payment plan. In six months after
16 that law took effect, the state received
17 \$100 million in delinquent payments that
18 were owed, and there were additional
19 delinquent payments made under the
20 payment plans.

21 So given the needs of both the
22 school system and the Department of Human
23 Services, I recommend passage of this
24 bill.

25 Thank you.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Hannah Sassaman,
4 commenting on 160659.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 MS. SASSAMAN: Hello. My name
7 is Hannah Sassaman. I'm speaking on my
8 own behalf and on behalf of my rising
9 public school kindergartner, and I'm
10 speaking in support of a true performance
11 audit of the Philadelphia Parking
12 Authority. I was personally shocked to
13 learn that the PPA is required to be
14 paying resources to our public schools
15 and hasn't been doing so.

16 The PPA is a \$240 million
17 agency whose contributions to schools
18 have plummeted from 14 million in 2012 to
19 a protected 8 million in 2017. This is
20 happening while I know that all of us are
21 paying more in fees and taxes to the PPA
22 as drivers and as consumers. And so if
23 revenues have risen, why have resources
24 to the School District of Philadelphia
25 plummeted so much?

2 My daughter's fellow school
3 parents at the school she will be
4 attending in the fall raise over \$100,000
5 each year personally to fund art, music,
6 and other resources for our kids. And so
7 if the PPA is considering legalizing Uber
8 and Lyft in the City in an effort to get
9 more money into their pockets, we
10 absolutely need a true performance audit
11 of the PPA. That's just basic good
12 governance. Council expects this of
13 every other agency, and we're not sure
14 why our kids should get any less.

15 So I'm saying please audit the
16 PPA. And if the PPA also is going to be
17 regulating Uber and Lyft in Philadelphia,
18 please ensure that drivers of those cars
19 are protected with all the basic
20 resources they need and that all riders,
21 including riders with disabilities, can
22 use those cars.

23 Thank you very much.

24 (Applause.)

25 CHIEF CLERK: Nick Panarella,

2 commenting on 160658.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MR. PANARELLA: Thank you. I
5 will be brief. I think many of you know
6 me. I happen to be a national officer of
7 something known as the Special Forces
8 Association, which is an organization
9 which is essentially a VFW, but it's
10 reserved for people who are Green Berets.
11 So for us, how we treat third-world
12 nationals who fought for us, generally
13 what we're saying is they fought for
14 Green Berets, because it was our
15 responsibility to train, organize, equip,
16 and lead them.

17 Mountain Yards, who are a part
18 of -- who would become within the ambit
19 of this statute, are people that I fought
20 and bled with. Think Band of Brothers.
21 They were our men. They had my back; I
22 had theirs.

23 We have an obligation to them
24 because they relied upon us, our work,
25 that we would be there with them if they

2 stood with us. And, quite frankly, we
3 abandoned them. We're talking about
4 people who are at the very, very end of
5 the food chain in terms of being very
6 lucky to get out of that place after like
7 Vietnam fell.

8 So do I think that we have an
9 obligation to them? Absolutely.

10 But there's a very practical
11 reason why, in addition to a moral
12 obligation, that we should honor
13 commitments to third-world nationals who
14 fight for us, and that's because we need
15 them now. As an ally, we are a very,
16 very poor partner. Since World War II,
17 since Korea, we've abandoned virtually
18 everybody who has fought with us. Today
19 there are Special Forces teams in
20 Afghanistan. One of my best friend's
21 sons just got back. When we talk about,
22 oh, we're going to send special ops and
23 that's going to be a combat multiplier
24 and we're not going to need conventional
25 forces to combat terror, what we are

2 talking about are using third-world
3 nationals.

4 Why would somebody fight for us
5 if we don't recognize what they have done
6 for us? It won't happen. They will be
7 subject to -- I mean, here, communism
8 were part of the force that we worked
9 with. If they said, hey, guess what,
10 America is going to finny Vietnam and
11 you're going to be in the lurch, and that
12 was true. If we maintain that attitude,
13 then we won't get people to come fight
14 with us, and we need allies for a number
15 of reasons. So to support anything that
16 says that, yes, we recognize an
17 obligation and we will fulfill a
18 partnership is a good thing.

19 Thank you very much.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
21 sir.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: The next
24 ten testifiers are here to give us your
25 say on the soda tax. So let me remind

2 you that as much as we want you to have
3 your say, we will have to have our way
4 with the clock. Please honor the clock.

5 Proceed, Michael.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Will the first
7 five individuals approach the podium and
8 line up along the wall by the podium in
9 this order: Yvette Hill-Robinson.

10 (No response.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Yvette
12 Hill-Robinson.

13 MS. HILL-ROBINSON: Yes.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Norberto
15 Santiago, Kenneth Margulies, Chris
16 Hunter, George Matysik.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Proceed.

19 MS. HILL-ROBINSON: Good
20 afternoon, Councilmembers. My name is
21 Yvette Hill-Robinson, a lifelong friend
22 of libraries in general and a friend of
23 the Overbrook Park Library in particular.

24 There is a magic inside of the
25 Overbrook Park Library located at

2 Haverford and Woodbine. It is a one-stop
3 lifelong learning communication center
4 for our neighborhood. It is a safe place
5 where our children and our neighborhood
6 know that they can go after school. It
7 is not uncommon to hear one yell down the
8 street, Make sure somebody saves a seat
9 for me.

10 It is because of the library
11 that these students are excited to
12 prepare for tests, get help with their
13 homework, attend the book club, a coding
14 class, work on the garden, participate as
15 a book buddy, spending time with their
16 friends in a place with caring adults
17 they see every day.

18 However, on May 26th, the
19 library closed due to a broken air
20 conditioning system. That afternoon it
21 was heartbreaking to see students
22 gathered outside the doors, staring past
23 the "closed" sign trying to look inside.
24 They looked around at each other,
25 frantically confused, unsure what they

2 were supposed to do next. Many of them
3 had nowhere to go, as this was where they
4 spend their time after school, and they
5 were not in a position to travel to
6 another library outside of their
7 neighborhood. This was disheartening, as
8 Overbrook Park Library is more than a
9 neighborhood library; it's the heart of
10 the community. It's their safe place.

11 The Friends of the Overbrook
12 Park Library learned that the library
13 would be closed until July 4th. We were
14 terrified what this would mean for our
15 community, for the people who rely on the
16 library. Remembering the library was
17 also closed last summer, we knew that we
18 could not let these children miss another
19 summer of library activities.

20 With only one week's notice, we
21 rallied the entire community together in
22 order to move the summer reading kick-off
23 celebration to a nearby recreation center
24 and playground.

25 Additionally, we feared for how

2 the young people would be spending their
3 time now that they were not able to go to
4 the library after school. There was one
5 young man in particular who we knew would
6 only stay outside of trouble because he
7 was engaged at the library every day
8 after school. During the library's
9 closure, members of the Friends group, we
10 have observed regularly, found this young
11 man on his way to or engaged in unsafe
12 activities. We have tried to serve as
13 mentors to him and encouraged him to --

14 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Ma'am, the
15 clock has spoken twice. So we have to
16 ask you to finish.

17 MS. HILL-ROBINSON: Okay.

18 (Applause.)

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 DR. MARGULIES: Council
21 President Clarke, leader, members of City
22 Council, my name is Ken Margulies. I
23 serve as the President of the Board of
24 the American Heart Association of
25 Southeastern Pennsylvania. I'm an

2 academic cardiologist at Penn Medicine.

3 I see the medical consequences and human
4 impact of cardiovascular disease every
5 day.

6 At this historic moment for
7 public health, I wish to convey the deep
8 heartfelt appreciation and gratitude of
9 the American Heart Association and the
10 American Stroke Association for Council's
11 courage as you vote to pass the country's
12 most significant sugary drink tax.

13 (Applause and booing.)

14 MR. MARGULIES: Through your
15 actions, Philadelphia will experience a
16 reduced incidence of diabetes, heart
17 disease, obesity, and strokes --

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Can those
19 who are in this Chamber, this is an
20 opportunity for folks to have their say.
21 Everyone deserves our silence while we
22 allow them to have their say. Because
23 you get a chance to have your say as
24 well. If you care to speak, please sign
25 up.

2 Proceed, citizen.

3 DR. MARGULIES: Through your
4 actions, Philadelphia will experience
5 reduced incidence of diabetes, heart
6 disease, obesity, and strokes while
7 promoting citywide pre-K education, park
8 and recreation center improvements, and
9 the health and quality of life benefits
10 that these worthy programs entail.

11 On a broader level, our city is
12 at the vanguard of a central public
13 health effort across America by
14 demonstrating what is possible as our
15 country grapples alarming trends in
16 obesity and type 2 diabetes. In the
17 years ahead, our city will be able to
18 report that hundreds, even thousands of
19 Philadelphians avoided a number of
20 chronic diseases thanks to what you will
21 do today. Those Philadelphians and their
22 families may not have the chance to thank
23 you for your leadership. So I will.
24 Thank you.

25 As Philadelphia has done time

2 and again, you are acting boldly to deal
3 with very real concerns and needs of
4 Philadelphians and our country as a
5 whole. What you do here today and your
6 leadership will resonate citywide and
7 beyond.

8 So thank you on behalf of the
9 American Heart Association, the
10 Philadelphia medical community, and the
11 broader American medical establishment.

12 (Applause and booing.)

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 MR. SANTIAGO: Good afternoon.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MR. SANTIAGO: My name is Rob
18 Santiago. I'm a resident of Philadelphia
19 for 39 years. I would like to thank you
20 for giving me this opportunity to speak
21 to you today to express my point of view
22 on the grocery tax.

23 I've been an employee of Pepsi
24 Cola for 19 years, and in that time, I've
25 had several roles there, selling and

2 service roles. My current role is
3 working in an inner city dealing with
4 primarily Spanish-speaking store owners.
5 It's because of this that I stand here
6 before you today.

7 Many, if not all, of my
8 customers have expressed a disapproval of
9 the passage of this tax. However, they
10 feel intimidated to stand before you
11 because of their limited ability to
12 effectively communicate in English their
13 concerns with the passage of this tax.
14 Therefore, I come before you as their
15 advocate. They have all signed
16 petitions. They have all called your
17 offices to voice their opinions and to
18 oppose this tax.

19 My job in dealing with these
20 customers every day is to ensure service
21 along providing great products. Mostly
22 importantly, my job is to bring value to
23 the final consumer, your constituents.
24 Because of the price and language
25 barriers, all of my customers purchase

2 their products from wholesalers and
3 distributors that only offer a limited
4 priority of products. They are
5 accustomed to traveling to find a deal on
6 products for their stores. Through
7 discounts, customer agreements, and
8 overcoming the language barrier, I can
9 provide options to our customers by
10 selling them various products like juice,
11 water, iced tea and coffee, isotonic
12 drinks and, of course, a wide variety of
13 carbonated soft drinks.

14 By enacting this tax, my
15 ability to offer our consumers the value
16 within their neighborhood stores will be
17 impossible. The owners of these stores
18 will return to the old ways of finding
19 options to supply their stores that will
20 probably lead them outside the City
21 confines to get the lowest price and also
22 to maximize the profit. This will limit
23 the variety of product offerings within
24 the City stores, which will include
25 non-carbonated healthier options. What

2 this will also limit is the revenue that
3 you seek by imposing this tax.

4 As I stand before you, they are
5 not adverse to traveling out of the City
6 to support their stores, to stock their
7 store shelves. The amount of revenue
8 that you will yield from this tax will
9 decline over time. It will not sustain
10 your long-term goals. It will also cost
11 jobs, such as mine, reduce options in the
12 corner stores that I service, which will
13 also reduce the health benefits that you
14 seek.

15 Before you vote today, please
16 ask yourself --

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Excuse me, sir. Sir? Sir? Can you kind
19 of wrap up it up. Your time is up.

20 Thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MR. MATYSIK: Good afternoon,
24 members.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

2 afternoon.

3 MR. MATYSIK: Good afternoon,
4 members of Council. My name is George
5 Matysik. I'm Executive Director of the
6 Philadelphia Parks Alliance.

7 As we've all heard, Council
8 President Clarke begins every Council
9 meeting by welcoming folks to see their
10 government in action, their local
11 government in action. But for most
12 Philadelphians who can't make it down to
13 Council, aside from seeing your trash
14 picked up once a week, aside from
15 expecting somebody to show up when you
16 dial 911, their local government in
17 action is at our parks, our rec centers,
18 and our libraries, sites that are
19 literally falling apart around us, and
20 that's what they're seeing in their local
21 government in action.

22 With the passing of the soda
23 tax, with the passing of the soda tax to
24 fund rebuild, we can stop looking at our
25 rec centers as just athletic centers and

2 begin looking at them as what they can
3 be, community centers that can invest
4 directly into our neighborhoods.

5 Today's vote can be historic
6 for many reasons, many reasons. We can
7 make a lot of national news, but as
8 historic as it is for you on Council, it
9 will be even more historic for that kid
10 at Happy Hollow Rec Center or Cecil B.
11 Rec Center or Lawncrest Rec Center or the
12 kid waiting in line for pre-K.

13 (Applause.)

14 MR. MATYSIK: It will be
15 historic for them, for the underserved
16 communities in our city. And that is our
17 local government in action.

18 And so I urge you all to
19 support Bill 160176 and pass the soda
20 tax.

21 Thank you very much.

22 (Applause and booing.)

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 MR. HUNTER: Hello,
25 Mr. President, Council, and guests. My

2 name is Chris Hunter. Thank you for
3 allowing me the time to share my thoughts
4 and concerns of this proposed beverage
5 tax.

6 I'm a current resident of the
7 Far Northeast for over 20 years and an
8 employee of Coca-Cola.

9 First, the proposed beverage
10 tax would hurt the livelihood of myself
11 and my son, my son who is currently
12 enrolled in Philadelphia public schools,
13 in the system, and attended pre-K in his
14 early years. He loved it, yes. Every
15 child should have the opportunity;
16 however, not on the backs of hard-working
17 Philadelphians in one industry.

18 I would love to continue
19 raising him in the City he was born and
20 raised. However, Mayor Kenney's bad idea
21 proposal of a beverage tax could dash and
22 hurt those dreams, because I possibly may
23 lose my job. Council, please give me
24 pointers on how to explain this to my
25 son.

2 Second, several of my employees
3 would be also affected by this beverage
4 tax and can lose their jobs should this
5 pass. These employees have families too
6 and are middle class, working, living
7 paycheck to paycheck, paying taxes just
8 like you and I. Don't crush their dreams
9 of living the American dream. These jobs
10 are good-paying, middle-class jobs that
11 could leave the City, who I remind you
12 pay wage taxes, now gone, not to mention
13 these companies possibly taking
14 operations outside of the City limits.
15 What would that cost the City?

16 (Applause.)

17 MR. HUNTER: Bad idea.

18 Philadelphia needs to keep jobs
19 in Philly.

20 Last, if this tax is passed,
21 Philadelphia would create the worst black
22 market for non-alcoholic beverages since
23 prohibition, which was back in the 1920s
24 and '30s. Let's not go back in history.
25 Similar to the cigarette tax, which fell

2 \$20 million short of what City officials
3 projected, the beverage tax would cost
4 even worse shortfalls, the black market.
5 The City would have no control of
6 collecting any tax.

7 Finally, as a taxpayer in the
8 City, I already pay some of the highest
9 taxes in the country. I pay a tax on
10 wages, property, sales, income, and an
11 increased utility tax, just to name a
12 few. This was rejected twice before and
13 should be for a third time. As City
14 leaders of Philadelphia, when are you
15 going to say enough is enough?

16 Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Orlando Cruz.

19 (No response.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Orlando Cruz.

21 (No response.)

22 CHIEF CLERK: Calla Bush St.

23 George.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MS. ST. GEORGE: Good

1 6/16/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 afternoon. Hi. My name is Calla Bush
3 St. George. I live in Councilwoman
4 Bass's district, and I want to thank you
5 all for allowing me to be here. I am
6 here today to testify in support of the
7 sugar-sweetened beverage tax, because it
8 is imperative that this tax gets passed
9 today.

10 This tax hits me on a very
11 personal note. When I was young, I was
12 fortunate that my mom could send me to
13 pre-K. I had a chance to get ahead
14 academically, and when I entered
15 kindergarten, my teachers could tell.
16 Those years, when I was three and four,
17 prompted my academic success. I am
18 currently a senior at J.R. Masterman High
19 School, and this fall I will start at
20 Swarthmore College. I am a product of
21 pre-K. I can see its importance, and I
22 urge that others are given the same
23 chance as me, so that what I have
24 achieved becomes the norm in Philly
25 public schools, not the exception.

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2 The main opposition to the soda
3 tax besides that from the soda
4 manufacturing companies is saying that it
5 will disproportionately affect the poor
6 and people of color. I understand that
7 you do not want to pass a tax that hurts
8 those who have already been hurt, but you
9 have been misled by this argument. This
10 tax will help, not hurt, low-income
11 families.

12 My family has come from
13 poverty, and my aunts and uncles lived a
14 life I can only imagine, and today they
15 are facing the repercussions of their
16 lack of nutritional education. Most
17 everyone in my family up to this year who
18 has died has died from a health-related
19 cause.

20 When my mom was growing up,
21 there was no money to spare, so cheap
22 sugary drinks were what were bought.
23 Although they were inexpensive, the
24 diabetes that has wrecked my family's
25 lives and my aunts' is not. The heart

2 attacks, the strokes, the hospital
3 visits, the funerals were due to a poor
4 diet, a diet enabled by the cheapness of
5 the drink they drank. This tax will save
6 lives, and it would have saved so many
7 lives in my family.

8 I am here today to shed insight
9 as a product of pre-K, as a student at a
10 Philadelphia public high school, and as
11 someone whose loved ones live in pain
12 every day due to the sugary drinks they
13 consumed.

14 Thank you for listening to me.
15 Have a nice day.

16 (Applause.)

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. CRUZ: My name is Orlando
19 Cruz. Good afternoon. First and
20 foremost, thank you for this opportunity.

21 Again, my name is Orlando Cruz
22 and I was born and raised in
23 Philadelphia. As a resident and
24 Philadelphia taxpayer, I'm so
25 disappointed with the City Council's

2 decision to pass this
3 one-and-a-half-cent-per-ounce beverage
4 tax in our great city. Philadelphia is
5 one of the greatest cities in the
6 country, yet its citizens also pay some
7 of the highest taxes in this country. I
8 know I don't need to remind the City
9 Council that we are also one of the
10 poorest cities in the United States.

11 Now after months of debate over
12 the impact that this tax will have on the
13 people living in the poorest communities,
14 the City wants to implement this beverage
15 tax. The Mayor sold this bill of goods
16 as money for the kids as a way to expand
17 pre-K and as a way to upgrade recreation
18 centers in Philadelphia. Now, while some
19 of that might get accomplished, we cannot
20 turn a blind eye to the fact that we just
21 found out that \$41 million in beverage
22 tax revenue will now support fund
23 balance.

24 I ask you all today, do you
25 really believe this was all about the

2 kids?

3 (Some audience members yelling
4 "no.")

5 MR. CRUZ: As many of the
6 Councilmembers in this room know, this
7 tax will have a major negative impact on
8 small business owners that depend on the
9 residents of the community to help keep
10 them in business. My fear is that many
11 of my friends' businesses will be forced
12 to close. How about the small
13 mom-and-pop shop where you get your
14 coffee every morning? What will happen
15 to them?

16 If this bill passes, the City
17 will not generate the revenue the
18 Administration anticipate it would.
19 Businesses will shut down, jobs will be
20 lost, and the kids and the advocates in
21 this room will not see the programs that
22 they were promised. We will all lose.

23 This great city should be known
24 as an innovative city that supports small
25 businesses and working class, not one to

2 take a gamble on an Administration that
3 wants to be considered trailblazers.

4 Thank you for your time, and I
5 ask that you please vote this down.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Danny Grace.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 afternoon.

13 MR. GRACE: Thank you,
14 President Clarke. I am Daniel Grace,
15 Secretary/Treasurer of Teamsters Local
16 830.

17 There is no other way to say
18 this. The Kenney Administration has
19 snookered City Council and the City's
20 tax-weary citizens. The sugary drink tax
21 just became a beverage tax, including all
22 diet drinks as well. So much for the
23 Mayor's pledge that those who didn't want
24 to pay the sugary drink tax could simply
25 make the switch to diet beverages.

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2 The tax hurts an entire
3 industry, one that employs thousands of
4 Philadelphians. It hurts the companies
5 my union represents and it hurts the
6 citizens, like the men and women of my
7 union who are here today.

8 This tax ignores the impact on
9 retailers, forces shoppers out of the
10 City, hurts the overall business climate,
11 and will be catastrophic for small
12 business owners, restaurants, and
13 consumers. And it's decisive.

14 We all agree on the value of
15 education, but the way it was done was
16 decisive for the City and the labor
17 community, pitting one union against many
18 others. As if that is not bad enough,
19 Council and the City taxpayers discovered
20 at the last second that the
21 Administration earmarked at least \$40
22 million annually in beverage tax revenues
23 for the depleted fund balance, not to
24 mention an additional 15 million annually
25 in programs completely unrelated to

2 children.

3 I thought the tax was all about
4 the kids. Isn't that what we were all
5 sold from the onset? Now we know we were
6 sold nothing but a bill of goods. It is
7 clear, the 95 million the Mayor claimed
8 he needed annually to fund pre-K,
9 community schools, and the rest was a
10 sham. He wanted 95 million annually in a
11 brazen cash grab from one industry and
12 one industry only to pay for other
13 initiatives that have nothing to do with
14 children.

15 Since the majority of
16 Councilmembers are unaware of the many
17 other essential programs the
18 Administration intends to fund with
19 revenue from the tax, Council should
20 delay today's final vote. The proposed
21 legislation you intend to vote on today
22 bears no resemblance to the
23 Administration's original proposal. It
24 is now clear that the amount the Mayor
25 claimed he needed for pre-K upon which

2 the revised beverage tax was calculated
3 was wildly misleadingly inflated. You
4 were all hoodwinked by the Administration
5 to protect Council's integrity and
6 independence. The right thing to do is
7 delay final passage to allow for further
8 scrutiny and public debate. The citizens
9 you represent deserve nothing less.

10 One final note, no less of a
11 legal authority than retired state
12 Supreme Court Justice Ron Castille has
13 publicly declared the beverage tax
14 illegal, stating that only the state
15 Legislature can determine where and on
16 what items the tax can be imposed. Think
17 about that before you pass your final
18 vote.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you. Thank you very much.

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: The last two
24 speakers approach the podium: Hillary
25 Linardopoulos. Hillary Linardopoulos and

2 Debbie Maienshein.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MS. LINARDOPOULOS: Good

5 morning, Council. My name is Hillary

6 Linardopoulos and I am testifying on

7 behalf of the Philadelphia Federation of

8 Teachers. I want to thank this entire

9 body for consistently focusing on funding

10 and services that directly impact the

11 children of Philadelphia.

12 Year in and year out, you have

13 worked to find ways to respond to a

14 funding crisis that affects our school

15 communities in very real ways on a daily

16 basis. At the PFT, there has never been

17 a question in our minds that Council

18 would debate debt and ultimately coalesce

19 around the best mechanism to ensure

20 funding for pre-K, community schools, and

21 rec centers.

22 Council President Clarke and

23 each of you deserve enormous credit for

24 your unwavering respect for and

25 commitment to the children of

1 6/16/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Philadelphia. We will continue to work
3 alongside of you to fight for the schools
4 our children and educators deserve, and
5 we thank you for everything you do for
6 the citizens and children of Philadelphia
7 every day.

8 (Applause.)

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MS. MAIENSHEIN: Good
11 afternoon. Let me start by saying I know
12 there's been a lot of rhetoric and a lot
13 of communication and testimony regarding
14 this issue. For those of you who are
15 still present and attentive, I thank you
16 for that. We thank you for that.

17 Good afternoon, Council
18 President Clarke and Councilmembers. My
19 name is Deborah Maienshein and I work at
20 the Coca-Cola plant at G and Erie in
21 Philadelphia with over 700 of my fellow
22 associates. Coca-Cola has been a part of
23 the Philadelphia community for more than
24 114 years and provides good-paying jobs
25 and great benefits.

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2 I've attended every hearing
3 since March, and I would like to
4 respectfully tell the members of this
5 Council how very disappointed I was last
6 week when we all found out that the
7 sugar-sweetened beverage tax was not all
8 about parks and rec, but it was in fact
9 also about the fund balance. That is not
10 the transparent government we voted for,
11 and I was shocked to see the bait and
12 switch that occurred here in this very
13 room.

14 Everyone here supports pre-K
15 education. However, many Philadelphians
16 disagree with singling out the beverage
17 industry as a means to pay for it. A
18 beverage tax is regressive and it's bad
19 public policy.

20 Today, most companies have to
21 tighten their belts to survive. Our
22 local bottling operation is no different.
23 Many businesses have already implemented
24 zero-based budgeting in one form or
25 another so they are prepared to address

2 ever-changing economic conditions. In
3 fact, Mayor Kenney recognized the value
4 of zero-based budgeting during his
5 campaign.

6 We encourage the City to
7 utilize this approach going forward so
8 they can plan for today and the future
9 and invest in the City versus continuing
10 to tax hard-working Philadelphians.

11 Lastly, I want to dispel a few
12 myths that we have heard. It sounds like
13 a small tax at one and a half cents per
14 ounce, but in reality, it is equivalent
15 to a 50 percent tax on the cost to
16 consumers. This tax will be passed on to
17 retailers. As you have heard from many
18 small businesses, they will pass the tax
19 on to consumers. A business cannot
20 survive without passing on the cost of
21 this unprecedented regressive tax.

22 The beverage tax covers more
23 than soda, including juice drinks, sports
24 drinks, teas, flavored waters, and energy
25 drinks, and now diets have been included

1 6/16/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 as well. Most Philadelphians will avoid
3 beverage purchases in the City and will
4 take their business to surrounding
5 suburbs; that is, if they have the means
6 to. In essence, the tax will be unfairly
7 shouldered by the poorest of the poor.

8 There is still time. We
9 implore you, please vote no on this
10 sugary drink tax.

11 Thank you.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you for your testimony.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 MS. DUNN: My name is Madeline
17 Dunn and I came down here prepared to
18 vote no, but I changed my mind for one
19 reason. If, if we get an audit going and
20 the audit is to see that the money goes
21 to the children only, you got a yes vote,
22 and I mean it. It has to go.

23 In Philadelphia, it seems as
24 though we are all over the place on
25 everything when -- let me just run this

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2 by you since I'm not going to keep going
3 on with the tax. I made a decision on
4 that.

5 My house was worth \$35,000 in
6 year '10. In year '11, it went up to 50.
7 Nothing been built in my neighborhood,
8 nothing. Okay? Guess what it was worth
9 last year? \$187,000. I'll be 83 in
10 October. Where am I getting money to pay
11 that kind of taxes from? So my kids
12 don't get nothing for Christmas,
13 grandchildren, graduation. Nobody got
14 anything. If I decide to stroll down to
15 Dunkin Donuts and get a coffee, I have to
16 really punish myself, because I cannot
17 afford it. My taxes are outrageous.

18 So I understand the tax
19 situation, but our children are in need,
20 and I would like to see -- can I get a
21 half a minute more, 30 seconds?

22 I would like to see an audit on
23 the Parking Authority, where the money
24 comes from, because I think my community
25 pays more in that than anybody else. I'd

2 like to see an audit on the School
3 District, where the money is used, the
4 textbooks. I mean, everything that they
5 do for our children.

6 I went to Martha Washington
7 back in 1938 and they had papers and
8 books, and people weren't making much
9 money. And I can remember Mr. Dunn and I
10 working like dogs, saving money. We have
11 properties. And what's it worth now?
12 What's the properties worth now? They
13 all of the sudden went (indicating). I
14 can't afford to pay the tax. But I'm
15 paying it. You know why? Because I'm
16 getting another job. I'm available. I'm
17 available.

18 (Applause.)

19 MS. DUNN: I'm getting another
20 job. I'm only going to be 83 in October.
21 My brain still works. I can move around
22 some. I do have --

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
24 right. Thank you. Thank you, Ms. Dunn.

25 (Applause.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Okay, Ms. Dunn. All right.

4 Before our last speaker, just

5 for the record, we're going to invoke

6 Rule 16, Subsection 2 on public comment

7 with respect to repetitious testimony.

8 We have heard -- ma'am, hold on one

9 second, please.

10 So we have heard an

11 unimaginable amount of testimony about

12 the sugar tax, the beverage tax,

13 whatever. So this is going to be our

14 last speaker and then we're going to move

15 ahead and we're going to conduct our

16 business, and there will ultimately be a

17 vote on all the measures before us today.

18 Ma'am, please proceed.

19 MS. BAZEMORE: Good afternoon.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

21 afternoon.

22 MS. BAZEMORE: Thank you for

23 allowing me, because you was going --

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Say

25 your name for the record, ma'am.

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2 MS. BAZEMORE: My name is Ruth
3 Bazemore. I've been a community person
4 for a long time, and I really want to
5 speak on the fact that this bill has been
6 put through without representation or due
7 process.

8 First of all, as a senior in
9 Philadelphia, we find that we are being
10 pushed out to all these crazy things that
11 the City is making us responsible for.
12 The bill for our children, we need to be
13 very clear. It's not about the children.
14 It's about how Philadelphia runs its
15 business. We're losing our homes through
16 eminent domain. The colleges are taking
17 over. Nobody is paying taxes but a few
18 people and, therefore, all of the things
19 that they say are children should already
20 be paid by our taxes.

21 So we need to be very clear.
22 We need an investigation of why we're
23 losing everything in the City of
24 Philadelphia and the City is building
25 condos and nobody is paying taxes and tax

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2 abatement, and we're losing our city
3 through all of the profits and nobody is
4 paying taxes, but the people who are
5 paying taxes are paying water bills,
6 sewer bills. And so I want us, the City,
7 to be accountable.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
24 you, Mr. President. I move that Bill
25 No -- I'm sorry; Resolution No. 160659 be

24 I will now recognize Councilman
25 Oh.

2 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
3 much, Council President. This resolution
4 is quite benign. It simply is a
5 resolution requesting the City Controller
6 to conduct a performance audit of the
7 Philadelphia Parking Authority, which has
8 not been audited since 2009.

9 Philadelphians read in the
10 paper about the millions of dollars that
11 are collected in our city and then fund
12 projects all over our state. A lot of
13 what we've done today, which is
14 difficult, is the issue of whether pre-K
15 shall be funded by a beverage tax or
16 whether there's money in the budget. I
17 believe there's money in the budget to
18 fund this. But what I don't think we can
19 dispute is that from the streets of
20 Philadelphia, the parking fees that are
21 collected in the hundreds of millions of
22 dollars are not being distributed to the
23 City of Philadelphia or the School
24 District of Philadelphia and that we
25 should audit the Parking Authority.

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2 The Parking Authority collected
3 between 2010 and 2015 \$1.37 billion; gave
4 the City only \$394 million. The question
5 is, what happened to the remaining \$980
6 million?

7 In October of 2013, the
8 Philadelphia Parking Authority came
9 before Council to request an increase in
10 fees and fines, stating that this would
11 provide an additional \$2 million per year
12 for the Philadelphia public schools.
13 Council approved that request, and the
14 very next year funding to the School
15 District was cut by \$3.5 million. The
16 next year the Philadelphia Parking
17 Authority came before City Council to
18 request a 50 cent per hour increase for
19 parking meters in areas outside of Center
20 City, such as Roxborough, Mayfair,
21 Chestnut Hill, many areas that are
22 challenged by high parking fees. The
23 request was granted because in particular
24 the testimony of the Executive Director
25 was that this would generate \$7.5 million

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2 for the public schools. Council approved
3 this increase and the School District
4 then made a projection that that year,
5 the following year, it would receive 19.5
6 million from the Philadelphia Parking
7 Authority. In fact, it received less
8 than \$11.1 million. And then in 2015,
9 even though the revenues did increase by
10 \$5.7 million from 2014, the Parking
11 Authority increased its operating and
12 administrative expenses by \$6.4 million.
13 There's a question, \$1 million in
14 bonuses. Only an audit by the
15 Controller's Office would be able to find
16 out whether this is true or not.

17 On March 23rd, the Philadelphia
18 School District learned from an article
19 in the Notebook that the Philadelphia
20 Parking Authority would reduce payments
21 to the School District in Fiscal Year
22 2017 by \$3 million and, therefore, it's
23 only budgeted \$8 million.

24 The Philadelphia School
25 District was not at the table when the

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2 City met with the Philadelphia Parking
3 Authority to review its financial
4 reports. It only was invited to the
5 table when this Council body through its
6 joint committee held hearings a couple
7 weeks ago.

8 For both the City and the
9 School District, the Philadelphia Parking
10 Authority provides limited funds in
11 comparison to what it collects, and it
12 only gives the City and the schools what
13 is left over after expenses and funding
14 projects all over our state.

15 It's important to know if the
16 Philadelphia Parking Authority is running
17 efficiently, if it's running effectively,
18 and the last -- because, well, we're here
19 on a beverage tax because we don't have a
20 funding source that people are
21 comfortable with. If they don't accept
22 that there's money in the budget, they
23 want more money.

24 The Parking Authority was taken
25 over by the state in 2001, the same year

2 our School District was taken over by the
3 state. And so the report of the
4 Controller looked at seven categories,
5 Center City garages, and its summary
6 states, Increases in administrative
7 expenses significantly outpaces increases
8 in operating revenues over the six-year
9 period.

10 Airport parking operations, and
11 it states, Inconsistent approval protocol
12 exists for the issuance of free parking
13 passes to PPA personnel and the Division
14 of Aviation.

15 Salary costs: No consistency
16 in preparing staff plans to demonstrate
17 the need for all personnel currently
18 employed.

19 On-street parking operations:
20 No documented policies and procedures for
21 the determination of payment amounts due
22 to the City and School District of
23 Philadelphia.

24 Profitability: The revenue
25 bond activity significantly diminishes

2 PPA's profitability. Interest on debt
3 was 43.4 percent. Of the total expenses
4 on average, the industry average is only
5 28 percent.

6 New responsibilities:
7 Management did not prepare revenue and
8 expense projections beyond one year.

9 And, finally, contracted
10 services: Management could not produce a
11 comprehensive list of contracts. And it
12 also stated that they do not have open
13 bidding, which affects many of our
14 minority and female-owned businesses in
15 the City.

16 I would like to say that if you
17 look at the first page, Page 1 of the
18 handout that I provided, we received two
19 different sets of data from the Parking
20 Authority - total expenses from the
21 financial statement and total expenses
22 provided to City Councilmembers. And you
23 can see that over the five-year period
24 there is a difference of \$24 million. So
25 we do not know what that was for.

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2 Council President, I think that
3 we have raised sales tax, real estate
4 tax, use and occupancy tax, cigarettes,
5 and now we look at soda, real estate
6 transfer tax, all upon the people of
7 Philadelphia, when in fact the people's
8 resources, the streets, the parking lots,
9 are producing hundreds of millions of
10 dollars that should be benefiting the
11 people of this city and our schools, and
12 I think it's incumbent that we continue
13 to look at that source of revenues rather
14 than burdening the people with more and
15 more taxes.

16 Thank you very much.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 The Chair recognizes
21 Councilwoman Gym.

22 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: I will be
23 very brief, Council President. Thank you
24 very much, and thank you to my colleague
25 Councilman Oh, who laid out very clearly

2 the concerns that specifically address in
3 my interest the funding for the School
4 District of Philadelphia.

5 The Philadelphia Parking
6 Authority in 2014, as the Councilman laid
7 out, came and testified before this
8 Council that it would promise to increase
9 \$7 and a half million to the School
10 District in funds if we then increased
11 on-street parking meter rates and kiosk
12 fees. By that measure, they should be
13 delivering between \$18 to \$20 million a
14 year to the public schools. Next year
15 they are projected to deliver 8. The
16 difference between \$10 to \$12 million is
17 a cohort of full counselors throughout
18 our district. It's about books and
19 supplies in our schools. It's about
20 children struggling to even get water
21 access.

22 We are going to hit a fiscal
23 cliff in FY19 with the School District of
24 Philadelphia, and to me, it is important
25 that we have exhausted all other options

2 before we go back to our residents any
3 further for additional taxes that we may
4 have to come before them for. And at the
5 end of the day, this resolution was
6 fundamentally about an audit.

7 I really look forward to
8 working and hope I can work very closely
9 with my colleagues on City Council during
10 this summer to talk about what that can
11 look like in a better way and that as we
12 revisit this in the fall, that we'll have
13 come to a better place about what we want
14 to do, because I think it's important
15 that we are all in agreement about what
16 we're looking for. But, again, at the
17 end of the day, this is about an audit,
18 and if an agency is actively seeking not
19 to have an audit, I think that is darn
20 well a reason why they should be audited.

21 Thank you very much.

22 (Applause.)

9 recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. I'd like to be heard
12 before the vote is taken.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
14 sorry, Councilwoman.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: I'd like to
16 be heard on the bill.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Oh,
18 absolutely. Please.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And I just
20 wanted to say while I certainly applaud
21 my colleague Councilman Domb and the
22 spirit in which this bill was developed,
23 I have deep concerns about the impact it
24 will have on our citizens, particularly
25 those who are low income, those who are

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2 minority, those who may be less savvy in
3 dealing with the City of Philadelphia.

4 And I did notice that during our public
5 comment session, there was a speaker who
6 came forward from Rittenhouse Square who
7 would not likely fall into any of those
8 categories.

9 The bill's intentions I support
10 1,000 percent. No license or permit
11 should be issued if someone is delinquent
12 in payment of any taxes, charges, et
13 cetera, through the City of Philadelphia,
14 but the problem that we have is that
15 there seems to be numerous problematic
16 issues with the Department of Revenue, a
17 lack of structure under how agreements
18 are made, under what circumstances for
19 payment arrangements and et cetera. They
20 seem to be very arbitrary in terms of
21 what is allowable and what is not, and I
22 speak from experience as a member of
23 Council, as a District Councilperson and
24 dealing directly with my constituents who
25 have worked with the City's Revenue

2 Department.

3 We attempted in our last
4 Finance or one of our last Finance
5 Committee hearings to address the issue.
6 I want to thank the Commissioner,
7 Commissioner Breslin, for his
8 cooperation, but it's clear that we
9 really do have a long way to go. And one
10 of the things that we did suggest was the
11 implementation of a Tax Revenue
12 Collection Task Force that would include
13 folks from the City of Philadelphia and
14 outside, from private institutions, that
15 they could actually weigh in on the way
16 the City collects revenue. We clearly
17 have a situation and a problem here in
18 what we do and how we do it.

19 I just wanted to give a couple
20 of examples as to why I'm not able to
21 support this bill today, and one is that
22 I have a constituent who actually came to
23 my front door last summer, and he should
24 have, because he paid his real estate tax
25 bill, which had been delinquent, through

2 the City of Philadelphia. He went to the
3 wrong window to stop a Sheriff Sale that
4 was pending. He owed a balance, let's
5 say, of \$10,000. He paid what was
6 requested, which was maybe \$5,000, and
7 his property was sold anyway. When we
8 contacted Revenue to find out why it was
9 sold and the circumstances, we were told
10 that he went to the wrong payment window.

11 No one should ever have to go
12 to the right window or do this or do
13 that. If they have the resources to make
14 the payment to the City of Philadelphia
15 and we accept that payment, then there
16 should be a system in place so that they
17 do not have to go back and then re-track
18 the sale, get their property back from
19 the City of Philadelphia, and these sorts
20 of things are completely outrageous and
21 unacceptable, and I think that we would
22 all agree to that.

23 We have many other examples
24 that I could go into, including some that
25 I just referred to Commissioner Breslin,

2 but I just wanted to ask Councilman Domb
3 to consider holding this bill, as I've
4 asked the Revenue Commissioner and Mayor
5 Kenney's Administration to work to
6 develop a Revenue Collection Task Force
7 with input, again, from public and
8 private sectors to fix what is wrong, and
9 we certainly hope that that will be
10 considered, because we can't ask our
11 citizens to get themselves straight if
12 the City of Philadelphia isn't straight
13 itself.

14 Thank you very much.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman

19 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
20 Council President. I understand the
21 concerns. I just wanted to mention that
22 the BIA, Building Industry Association,
23 with the amendment that we put in place
24 supports this bill, number one.

25 I have a few comments just

3 my comments here. It just says this bill
4 will require that no building permit or
5 license be issued or renewed if an
6 applicant is delinquent in the payment of
7 any City or School District dollars

10 must continue to take the necessary steps
11 to tackle the outstanding issues
12 involving delinquencies, and while we've
13 made slight improvement in our collection
14 rates, we still have more work to do, and
15 I want to make sure we equip our
16 government with the means necessary to
17 catch those who aren't paying while the
18 rest of us do pay.

19 We owe it to the taxpayers of
20 this city who play by the rules to clean
21 up our books. We have over \$700 million
22 of delinquent taxes right now on the
23 City's books right now. We owe it to the
24 children of the City who have the right
25 to a quality education supported by

2 sufficient resources and we owe it to
3 ourselves, the City government. Because
4 if we prove we can be a fiscally
5 responsible enterprise, more companies
6 will want to do business with us.

7 Collecting delinquent taxes is
8 one of my priorities as a new member of
9 this distinguished body, and this bill is
10 a step in the right direction.

11 I want to thank the Building
12 Industry Association of Philadelphia and
13 the Kenney Administration for working
14 with me and my office on this
15 legislation. We'll continue to work
16 together to address inefficiencies and
17 improve our efforts to address this very
18 important issue.

19 Thank you, Council President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 work with the City's Revenue Department
24 to get an acceptable plan in place to be
25 able to make payments. We want folks to

2 be able to pay their taxes. We certainly
3 want to collect that revenue, but there
4 has to be a system in place to be able to
5 do it. We should have already had it in
6 place, and now is the time to do it. We
7 cannot wait any longer.

8 I certainly do understand
9 Councilman Domb wanting to move forward
10 with this bill, but I do think that there
11 is more work to be done before we shut
12 out folks who may be less savvy in terms
13 of dealing with the City of Philadelphia.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Henon.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
24 Council President. Before I make a brief
25 statement, I want to remind everybody --

2 first of all, Happy Father's Day to all
3 the fathers in this room and in the City
4 of Philadelphia, and remind everybody
5 that there's a Gary Papa Father's Day Run
6 that is going to be on the Parkway this
7 Sunday, the 19th. You can register
8 online. Just come out and join us. This
9 is a little personal to me.

10 Unfortunately, and it's been no secret,
11 that I have beat prostate cancer seven
12 years ago, and I'm going to run my tail
13 off, no matter how long it takes. I'll
14 be there and be proud. So join me and
15 join other fathers and just join the
16 cause to educate our men and families
17 just to get a brief checkup. So I want
18 to get that out of the way.

19 But I wanted to take a moment
20 to thank all the members here in this
21 body for an incredible, an incredible
22 spring. This has been the most
23 contentious and complex budget process
24 that I've been a part of, but this body
25 was able to come together, to build a

2 consensus, and to move forward with a
3 plan that I think will invest in the City
4 of Philadelphia and invest in the City of
5 Philadelphia's children and the City's
6 future.

7 And I think it's important also
8 to point out that we as a body in this
9 City Council have done a lot of other
10 things and not just pass a sugary
11 beverage tax. This spring we have dealt
12 with many issues, one being public safety
13 in the criminal justice reform,
14 highlighted financial challenges
15 Philadelphia has faced regarding
16 retirement and student loan debt and the
17 impact those challenges will have on our
18 city as a whole. We prioritized our
19 health and welfare being of our children,
20 looking at lead exposure, water access in
21 our schools; ensuring longtime homeowners
22 had received tax relief; urged the state
23 and federal government to do many things,
24 many a number of things, including
25 protect our workers' rights; addressed

2 predatory lending and perform its
3 constitutionality and its constitutional
4 duty; emphasized the importance of fiscal
5 responsibility for our city, the City of
6 Philadelphia; prioritized small
7 businesses on our commercial corridors,
8 especially those who live in the City of
9 Philadelphia; authorizing joint hearings,
10 Council President, as we have done in the
11 past to investigate absentee landlords,
12 tax delinquents, and bank foreclosure
13 properties that are blighting our
14 neighborhood and that are causing a
15 nuisance and putting our public at risk
16 on a regular basis. That's what we've
17 done in the first five months of this
18 year, in this calendar year. So that
19 only begins to cover what we have done
20 and will continue to do.

21 So Council President Clarke has
22 always talked about how productive we are
23 as a body, and all I can say is that I am
24 in awe of every member of this Council
25 and all the high-quality work that we

3 and I look forward to working with you
4 and the tremendous amount of advocates,
5 constituents for the betterment of the
6 City of Philadelphia, and I'm honored to
7 be with you and serve with you.

8 So thank you.

10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman
12 Jones.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: So I'm going
14 to keep it short. I had this long speech
15 about Juneteenth and the importance of
16 it, but for purposes of consciousness, we
17 are one of 43 states that are celebrating
18 Juneteenth tomorrow, and Councilwoman
19 Bass talked about the Johnson home
20 celebration from 10:00 to, I think, 6:00.
21 I think that's important. But the first
22 Juneteenth parade kicks off tomorrow at
23 12 o'clock, and I think it's really
24 important to recognize that Rahim Islam
25 and Kenny Gamble and others put together

2 this parade to recognize the fact that it
3 took two years from the time the
4 Emancipation Proclamation happened for
5 folk to get the word, the memo, the
6 e-mail down in Texas. So it's an
7 interesting celebration.

8 Our Mayor, Mayor Kenney, who
9 always has been really conscious about
10 history in Philadelphia, is going to be
11 there, along with many of my colleagues,
12 Councilman Johnson and others, and I
13 think it's worthwhile. I think it's the
14 kind of thing that highlights the fact
15 that we are a city that is diverse and we
16 recognize each and every aspect of our
17 cultural diversity.

18 I feel honored every year when
19 my Irish colleagues allow me to be on St.
20 Patrick Day an honorary member, and we're
21 going to keep that tradition alive. And
22 please come out and enjoy yourselves
23 responsibly on the Juneteenth parade.

10 has been a wonderful group. Our new

11 folks are very, very talented and

12 hard-working, and those of us who have

13 been here are very, very pleased with

14 this new Council.

15 This was a tough Council. It's

16 not often we see labor split. That made

17 life difficult, and hopefully we can all

18 come together and all continue to work

19 together.

20 And let me say all that is

21 said, for our Commission, we deal with,

25 to the next level and a number of series.
