morning. We're going to get started now.

Thank you. Guests and visitors will

retire behind the rail and we'll get

going.

To give our invocation this

morning, the Chair recognizes Mr. Jordan

Peterson, Stake President within the

10

Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day

11

Saints. He is here today as the guest of

12

Councilman Al Taubenberger.

Would all guests and members

and visitors please rise.

(Councilmembers and guests

rise.)

MR. PETERSON: Oh, God, the

18

Eternal Father, we bow our heads at the

19

beginning of this important meeting and

20

we ask for a blessing upon those who will

21

participate today. We do so in

22

gratitude, Father, for this wonderful

23

city in which we live and work. And we

24

are grateful for all those who give of

25

their time and talent to make this a

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2 better place, to improve lives.

3 We are grateful for the history
4 of this city, for our founding fathers
5 and mothers, for their faith in thee, and
6 for the principles upon which this city
7 and nation were founded.

8 We ask at this time a blessing
9 upon this body that they may receive thy
10 inspiration, they may have wisdom in the
11 decisions that they make as they counsel
12 together and as they look to improve and
13 make changes that will benefit the lives
14 of all of the inhabitants of this city.

15 We ask for a blessing upon all
16 civic leaders, upon those who are civil
17 servants, those who protect us, and all
18 those who are working on our behalf.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you so much for those inspiring
6 words.

7 Council will be at ease.

8 (Council at ease.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you very much.

11 The next order of business is
12 the approval of the Journal of the
13 meeting of Thursday, September 15, 2016,
14 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Greenlee.

16 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
17 you, Mr. President. I move that the
18 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
19 September 15th, 2016 be approved.

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you. It has been moved and
23 properly seconded that the Journal of the
24 meeting of Thursday, September 15, 2016
25 stand approved.

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2 All those in favor say aye.

3 (Aye.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

8 ayes have it, and the Journal is

9 approved.

10 The next order of business is

11 requests for leaves of absence, and the

12 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

14 Mr. President. On behalf of the

15 majority, a leave of absence is requested

16 for Councilmember Mark Squilla.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilman. Leave shall be

19 granted.

20 And the Chair recognizes

21 Councilman O'Neill.

22 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,

23 Mr. President. On behalf of the

24 republicans, there are no requests for

25 leave of absence.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you. The Chair thanks the
4 gentleman.

5 At this time, I would like to
6 dispense with the regular order of
7 business and I would like to welcome and
8 thank everyone who has taken time out of
9 their busy day to come down and witness
10 their government in action. We hope that
11 your stay here is a knowledgeable one and
12 an enjoitable one, so much so that you
13 come back again. So thank you so much.

14 At this time, the Chair
15 recognizes Councilwoman Parker, who will
16 present a resolution recognizing Rahim
17 Thompson. Would Mr. Thompson and those
18 accompanying him please join the
19 Councilwoman at the podium.

20 (Councilmembers and guests
21 approached podium.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
23 joining Councilwoman Parker, we have
24 Councilman Oh, Councilman Domb,
25 Councilman Johnson, and Councilwoman Gym

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2 and Councilwoman Blackwell.

3 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Good

4 morning, everyone. It's indeed an honor

5 and a privilege that we gather this

6 morning to honor a gentleman that I first

7 learned about on July the 1st after

8 reading an article in a magazine called

9 SLAMonline magazine. Now, I had never

10 read the article, Councilman Johnson, but

11 apparently if you're active in the world

12 of basketball in Philadelphia and in the

13 nation, you know what SLAMonline is. And

14 the article talked about Rahim Thompson's

15 work with something called The Chosen

16 League, and I thought I had knew for some

17 time that the chosen leagues that I knew

18 about -- and I just mentioned this to

19 Council President Clarke -- was the Sonny

20 Hill League was The Chosen League.

21 That's what I knew growing up. And then

22 I knew the 16th Street League that we

23 would go and visit as young people that

24 was sponsored and organized by Brother

25 Kintu. And if you're in this Chamber,

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2 you know of or who Brother Kintu was.
3 And so I was inspired by it, and with
4 that in mind, we were able to reach him
5 and ask him to be here. And he's here
6 with his beautiful wife, mother, but the
7 most beautiful folks who are in the
8 Chamber today are two little ones with
9 the yellow and the polka dot dresses.
10 Give them a round of applause. They're
11 front and center.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:

14 Mr. President, the resolution reads as
15 follows:

16 Resolution recognizing and
17 congratulating Rahim Thompson for
18 founding The Chosen League, the only
19 sponsored high school basketball league
20 in the country, free of charge to the
21 players and fans; and

22 Whereas, Rahim Thompson founded
23 The Chosen League in 2002 as a platform
24 for the top high school basketball
25 players in the region to play against one

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2 another in the 9th District at Cherashore
3 Park, which is located at 10th Street and
4 Olney Avenue in the Olney section of
5 Philadelphia; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,
7 Mr. Thompson was inspired to create The
8 Chosen League by the teachings and faith
9 he gained from Le Peristyle Haitian
10 Sanctuary, where he is a Gro Houngan and
11 lifetime member; and

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, The
13 Chosen League is not only a forum for top
14 high school athletes to showcase their
15 talents, but also a venue for the top
16 players in the region to play one
17 another. Additionally, many of the
18 former players come back to coach and
19 teach the next generation; and

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
21 Whereas, many players hope to get noticed
22 by coaches and get a scholarship to play
23 basketball and get an education in
24 college. Since 2002, 1,300 players from
25 the league have earned full or partial

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2 scholarships to college; and

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,

4 several collegiate players have been a

5 part of The Chosen League, including

6 Creighton floor general Maurice Watson,

7 University of Miami point guard Jaquan

8 Newton, and Duke forward Amile Jefferson;

9 and

10 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,

11 several NBA players have also been a part

12 of The Chosen League, including Miami

13 Heat guard Wayne Ellington, Toronto

14 Raptors guard Kyle Lowry, Philadelphia

15 76ers guard Gerald Henderson, Washington

16 Wizards forward Markieff Morris, and

17 Detroit Pistons forward Marcus Morris;

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And

19 whereas, the games at 10th and Olney have

20 become annual rites of passages for

21 Philadelphia area high school ball

22 players, and we hope this tradition

23 continues for many more years to come;

24 now, therefore, be it

25 Resolved, by the Council of the

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2 City of Philadelphia, that it hereby
3 honors and recognizes Rahim Thompson for
4 founding The Chosen League.

5 And further resolved, that an
6 engrossed copy of this resolution be
7 presented to Rahim Thompson as evidence
8 of the sincere sentiments of this
9 legislative body.

10 And let me just also just state
11 for the record, I did not acknowledge
12 grand-mom. Thank you so very much for
13 being here, because it all starts with
14 the wisdom.

15 And I just want -- I hope
16 everyone paid attention to aside from the
17 skill set of the best and brightest
18 playing, I think when you heard
19 Councilwoman Blackwell mention that 1,300
20 players from the league have earned full
21 or partial scholarships to college,
22 that's what makes this so unique,
23 considering the high cost of higher
24 education in our nation.

25 So thank you so very much.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
4 the Chair recognizes Mr. Thompson for
5 remarks.

6 MR. THOMPSON: Good morning,
7 everybody. First of all, I'd like to
8 thank God, Christ, and laws for allowing
9 us all to be here today.

10 I am truly humbled by this,
11 because when I first started Chosen
12 League, it was just a passion and dream
13 to do something for the community,
14 because like she said, The Chosen League,
15 yes, basketball is a platform, but what
16 it does is unifies the community, and
17 that's what this is all about. The
18 Chosen League brings out different
19 coaches, different races, different ages
20 and everything, but it's all because of
21 the love of basketball. But for me, the
22 biggest pride I get is just bringing the
23 community together.

24 We hear so much about the
25 violence that's going on and everything,

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2 and there's so much negativity, but there
3 are positive things going out here. And
4 for the youth, you have to present -- you
5 have to give them the right things to
6 show them that you could do the right
7 thing here, and that's why I take more
8 pride than anything with The Chosen
9 League.

10 So I'm very humbled for getting
11 this award today. I am kind of
12 speechless with this. If you know me,
13 I'm normally not speechless, but, you
14 know, things happen sometimes.

15 And before I leave, I'd just
16 like to let you know, on Thanksgiving day
17 I will be doing a dinner at the
18 playground where we'll be serving
19 everybody and anybody. So just please
20 pass the word and everything. I'm
21 accepting all donations. So far we have
22 about 37 people that have committed to
23 it. So it's just free for everyone.
24 It's just a part of giving back, and
25 that's what life is about. It's about

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2 charity.

3 So thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Council will be at ease.

7 (Council at ease.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you very much and, again,
10 congratulations.

11 At this time, the Chair
12 recognizes Councilman Henon, who will
13 present a resolution recognizing National
14 Voter Registration Day. Would City
15 Commissioners Al Schmidt and Commissioner
16 Deeley and Anthony Clark -- I didn't see
17 you. Sorry, sir -- please join the
18 Councilman at the podium.

19 (Councilmembers and guests
20 approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
22 joining Councilman Henon, we have
23 Councilman Taubenberger and Councilwoman
24 Reynolds Brown and Councilwoman Gym.

25 COUNCILMAN HENON: Now we can

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2 eat.

3 So good morning, everybody.

4 Before I start to recognize that Tuesday,
5 September 27th, 2016 as National Voter
6 Registration Day, I want to thank all the
7 Commissioners for their hard work and the
8 employees that run our elections with the
9 highest integrity every single day.

10 I have a point of personal
11 privilege before I begin. Somebody who
12 worked for me and I've been friends with
13 for many, many years, Lisa Deeley, has
14 been elected to the Commissioners Office
15 and has been discussing for years about
16 the voter turnout and the lack of turnout
17 with our youth and how we communicate
18 with them on an educational purpose.

19 So in this Chambers we talk
20 about preschool and early education, and
21 I think that the Commissioners
22 collectively, with Lisa Deeley taking the
23 lead, as thinking outside of the box with
24 a lot more innovation. And I'm so proud
25 of each Commissioner for bringing it to

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2 the schools as a partner, holding mock
3 elections, not only in our schools for
4 soon-to-be new voters with a low turnout
5 because it's kind of discouraging when we
6 have lack of participation in the
7 electoral process, but educating them on
8 why it's important. And why it's
9 important, because so it brings us to
10 here why we make bills and policy and
11 legislation in this body. So it's all
12 kind of connected together.

13 So the Commissioners will be
14 joining and partnering with our School
15 District, holding elections and bringing
16 the process to them and in neighborhoods
17 throughout the entire City of
18 Philadelphia.

19 So recognizing Tuesday,
20 September 27, 2016 as National Voter
21 Registration Day.

22 Whereas, National Voter
23 Registration Day has begun in 2012; and

24 Whereas, the need to establish
25 a National Voter Registration Day became

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2 apparent after confusion has arose in
3 regard to various voter registration
4 deadlines; and

5 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
6 it was discovered that a significant
7 number of people who were registered to
8 vote in the 2008 Presidential Election
9 were not aware of the deadline to
10 register to be eligible to vote in that
11 historic election; and

12 Whereas, the Philadelphia City
13 Commissioners Office, comprised of
14 Chairman Anthony Clark, Vice Chairman Al
15 Schmidt and Commissioner Lisa Deeley,
16 believe it is their responsibility to get
17 as many residents of the City as possible
18 registered for this upcoming November
19 general election; and

20 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
21 you. And just a personal note, being a
22 son of immigrants who came from a place
23 in 1930s Germany where elections were not
24 allowed at all and no one had any voice
25 for anything, this resolution introduced

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2 by Bobby Henon is very, very meaningful
3 to me personally.

4 Whereas, the City Commissioners
5 have worked to create a partnership with
6 the School District of Philadelphia. The
7 goal of this collaboration is to get more
8 young people registered to vote and out
9 to the polls on Election Day; and

10 Whereas, a study of youth voter
11 turnout showed that only twenty percent
12 of eighteen to twenty nine year olds cast
13 ballots in the 2014 election. That was
14 the lowest turnout rate ever recorded in
15 an election for this demographic; and

16 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, the
17 registration among eligible voters is
18 seventy one percent, but when looking at
19 eligible voters ages eighteen through
20 twenty four, that number falls to just
21 fifty nine percent; and

22 Whereas, reports on voter
23 turnout show that when registered, young
24 people will go to the polls to vote. For
25 example, in 2008, eighty three percent of

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2 registered eighteen to twenty four year
3 olds voted in that election; now,
4 therefore

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Be it
6 resolved, by the Council of the City of
7 Philadelphia, that we hereby recognize
8 Tuesday, September 27, 2016 as National
9 Voter Registration Day.

10 Resolved further, that an
11 engrossed copy of this resolution be
12 presented to the City Commissioners of
13 Philadelphia as an acknowledgment of this
14 action.

15 Thank you very much and
16 congratulations, and make sure that we
17 communicate with our youth, with our
18 neighbors and our communities how
19 important it is to come out and exercise
20 their rights that our country fought for
21 every single day.

22 Thank you.
23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair recognizes Commissioner Deeley for

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2 remarks.

3 COMMISSIONER DEELEY: Thank
4 you. Thank you, Council President
5 Clarke, and thank you to my former boss
6 and forever friend, Bobby Henon, and this
7 entire body. We would also like to thank
8 Evelyn Sample-Oates, one phone call
9 suggesting we partner with the School
10 District and do something for National
11 Voter Registration Day. Evelyn was at my
12 office, eager to get started on a plan.
13 Thank you, Evelyn.

14 Voter turnout numbers are low
15 nationwide, and when looking at our
16 younger voting population, those
17 statistics get far worse. We need to do
18 all that we can to engage and encourage
19 our young people to participate in this
20 process, the foundation of our democracy.
21 Our partnership on National Voter
22 Registration Day registering eligible
23 students to vote in high schools
24 throughout the City is a great way to
25 begin the process with a simple message

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2 to our young people: It's your power.

3 Own your vote.

4 Thank you, and we look forward
5 to Tuesday.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Council will be at ease.

9 Excuse me. Before we have the
10 formal presentation, Commissioner Clark
11 wanted to make an announcement.

12 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Good
13 morning, everyone. To find your polling
14 place or division and to see your ballot,
15 please go to www.Philadelphiavotes.com.
16 The last day to register to vote is
17 Tuesday, October the 11th, 2016. Monday,
18 October 10th is a holiday, Columbus Day,
19 of course. Last day to apply for a
20 citizen's absentee ballot is 5:00 p.m.
21 November the 1st, 2016.

22 Also we have here a voter
23 education book for Philadelphia. If you
24 need one, you can come to either office,
25 Al Schmidt, Vice Chairman; Lisa Deeley;

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2 and also myself, Anthony Clark, Chairman
3 of City Commissioners.

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 (Council at ease.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. At this time, for our last
11 presentation, the Chair recognizes
12 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez, who will
13 present a resolution recognizing Eddie
14 Alvarez. Would Mr. Alvarez and those
15 accompanying him please join the
16 Councilwoman at the podium.

17 (Councilmembers and guests
18 approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
20 joining the Councilwoman, we have
21 Councilman O'Neill, Councilman Henon,
22 Councilman Domb.

23 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Good
24 morning. In keeping in tune with the
25 celebration of National Hispanic Heritage

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2 Month and on Monday when we raised the
3 flag, albeit inside the building because
4 of the rain, the Puerto Rican flag, on
5 the 3rd floor, at that time Mayor Kenney
6 joined us and he spoke about the
7 relationship between the Irish
8 immigration to the United States and the
9 struggles of the Puerto Rican community
10 and some of the shared values. In Eddie
11 Alvarez, we have the best of two worlds.
12 He is Irish and Puerto Rican descent, and
13 we are extremely proud of his humble
14 beginnings in the 7th Councilmanic
15 District.

16 A couple of weeks ago
17 Councilman Henon joined him at a
18 celebration hosted by Local 22 in
19 recognition of his achievements to date.
20 Councilman Domb, who is also a fan,
21 recently posted an amazing video about
22 Eddie and Eddie's walk through his
23 neighborhood across the street from the
24 Ascension campus on G and Westmoreland,
25 and as Eddie walked the neighborhood, he

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2 talked about all of the good things he
3 learned growing up in a changing
4 neighborhood with all of its challenges.
5 Never talking negatively about it, but
6 really looking at the things that made
7 him stronger, whether it was how he ran
8 through the neighborhood to his
9 elementary school, and what touched me
10 was how he talked about how in his stoop,
11 as he sat down in his step, he talked
12 about -- he thought about all of the
13 possibilities that he had in the world.
14 So, you know, kids have their world at
15 their fingertip. Eddie sat at his step
16 and he knew he was going to be great and
17 that he was going to make his parents
18 proud and he was going to make his
19 neighborhood proud. And I like -- if you
20 haven't had a chance to see the video,
21 you should, because that's exactly the
22 type of mentor and leader we want to have
23 in the community for the young men who
24 still sit on the stoop in those
25 neighborhoods, don't choose to be there,

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2 but really do and should have access to
3 the world.

4 So I'm extremely proud. I had
5 an opportunity to share with him. And we
6 waited a little bit because his wife and
7 daughter were going to join us, Jamie.
8 So we're very, very happy to have him
9 here.

10 And with that, again, another
11 person from the 7th Councilmanic
12 District. We got it going on.

13 Recognizing and congratulating
14 and honoring the outstanding career of
15 Eddie "The Underground King" Alvarez on
16 being named the new UFC Lightweight
17 Champion.

18 Whereas, Eddie Alvarez was born
19 to Puerto Rican and Irish family in 1984
20 in Kensington, attended Northeast
21 Catholic High School. In high school --
22 which, by the way, Councilman Henon,
23 North Catholic grad.

24 In high school he was a
25 two-time National Prep All-American

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2 wrestler and placed 6th at the 2000 and
3 2001 National Prep School Wrestling
4 Championships at the weight of 145;

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: 145 seems
6 such a long time ago, but anyway...

7 Whereas, soon after graduating
8 from high school he began his
9 professional career, with only 8 months
10 of professional MMA training, on December
11 14th, 2003 at ROC 5: Ring of Combat with
12 his first round knockout victory; and

13 Whereas, Eddie "The Underground
14 King" Alvarez has brought recognition to
15 the City by winning the UFC Lightweight
16 Title on July 7th, 2016 at MGM Grand
17 Garden Arena in Las Vegas, Nevada --
18 bring it on, McGregor. Bring it on,
19 McGregor -- and

20 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Before I
21 say the whereas clause, Eddie may have
22 grown up in the 7th Councilmanic
23 District, as I grew up in the 6th, one
24 parish over, as we say, and now Eddie
25 lives in the 10th, one parish over from

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2 me, but when Councilwoman Sanchez called,
3 I said, You take it. This is about a lot
4 of things, but it's really about Hispanic
5 pride and Puerto Rican pride. So we
6 have --

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: We get our
9 priorities straight around here even
10 though we have strong feelings.

11 Whereas, Alvarez claimed the
12 title after a monumental victory over
13 Rafael dos Anjos.

14 Thank you, Bobby, for pointing
15 that out.

16 Alvarez threw a flurry of
17 punches with one clean strike to finish
18 Rafael dos Anjos to clinch the title 3
19 minutes and 49 seconds into Round 1 --
20 you could have waited a little while. I
21 mean, people were just starting to sit
22 down -- while also receiving the
23 Performance of the Night Award;

24 Whereas, Alvarez has a 28 and 4
25 record spanning 13 years of MMA fighting,

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2 with a number of Championship wins, UFC
3 Lightweight Championship, two Bellator
4 Lightweight titles, an MFC Welterweight
5 Championship title, and a Reality
6 Fighting Welterweight Championship title;
7 and

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: As the UFC
9 Lightweight Champion, Eddie Alvarez is a
10 role model for the youth of Kensington
11 and the City of Philadelphia due to his
12 athletic achievements over the past 13
13 years; therefore be it

14 Resolved, that the Council of
15 the City of Philadelphia, hereby
16 recognizes, congratulates, and honors the
17 outstanding career of Edward "Eddie"
18 Alvarez, capping it off by becoming the
19 new UFC Lightweight Champion; and

20 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: And
21 further resolved, that an engrossed copy
22 of this resolution will be presented to
23 Eddie "The Underground King" Alvarez as
24 evidence of our sincere respect and
25 admiration from this legislative body.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
4 the Chair recognizes Mr. Alvarez for
5 remarks.

6 MR. ALVAREZ: Thank you. I'm
7 not huge on words. That's why I chose
8 the career I chose. But when I
9 originally started fighting, it was just
10 to compete and do something that I
11 enjoyed doing. I didn't realize that it
12 would manifest into something like this
13 or a world title. I realized as I got
14 older and I had children that when I
15 stepped in the octagon and I fought for
16 the City of Philadelphia, I was bringing
17 the City together. From North Philly to
18 South Philly, Fishtown, Port Richmond,
19 Northeast, everybody tuned in and
20 everybody watched as I was -- I would go
21 out in the octagon and fight for our
22 city, and I think it inspired kids and
23 gave people hope and took a lot of people
24 who didn't have a lot of resources and
25 helped them dream for something better.

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2 So thank you guys, the
3 Councilmen and Councilwomen. It's my
4 honor to hold this belt and fight for the
5 City of Philadelphia.

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Council will be at ease.

10 (Council at ease.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you very much. And the Chair
13 recognizes Councilman Jones.

20 much, Council President. My resolution
21 simply has to do with the issue of
22 cutting off funds for Philadelphia.
23 Different people, elected officials, may
24 have different opinions. I don't always
25 agree with the Mayor, and that's one

2 issue. However, punishing all
3 Philadelphians for political
4 disagreements or prospective
5 disagreements is a very serious matter,
6 and as in particular a republican, I'm
7 very concerned about House Bill 1885
8 making it out of committee. This bill,
9 which disagrees with Mayor Kenney's
10 designation of Philadelphia as a
11 sanctuary city, would cut off all state
12 funding to Philadelphia for an indefinite
13 period of time. That is \$2.7 billion
14 annually. It includes \$220 million to
15 the General Fund, \$4.5 million to the
16 county liquid fuel, \$1 million to the
17 Water Fund, \$33.9 million to the Special
18 Gasoline Tax Fund which I believe repairs
19 our roads, \$1.3 billion to Health Choices
20 Behavioral Health revenues, and \$731
21 million for Grants Revenue, and \$250,000
22 for Aviation. It is a large amount of
23 money and it affects people in
24 Philadelphia and including the district
25 of the bill sponsor. It affects kids

2 with autism, after-school programs,
3 seniors with disabilities, police, fire,
4 emergency, medical, so forth and so on.

5 I would like to point out that
6 it is critical for our City government to
7 let the General Assembly know that
8 whatever the different opinions are that
9 occur in a democracy, cutting off funds
10 is not something that should be done in a
11 trifling way. And when we had a budget
12 impasse, many social service agencies and
13 providers, including those in that
14 district, suffered. And it seems to be a
15 popular thing in Harrisburg to talk about
16 Philadelphia and punishing Philadelphia
17 but, again, as a republican, I want to
18 make it clear to the republicans
19 throughout our state that if you have an
20 issue -- and I have my disagreements --
21 we'll do it in the democratic process,
22 but you don't cut off funding to an
23 entire city.

24 Thank you very much.

21 9/11 and the Patriot Act has the ability,
22 the tools to get anybody they want at any
23 time they want. What we've essentially
24 said as a city -- and I'm proud of what
25 some people might call the defiant

2 behavior of Philadelphia, and I
3 absolutely want to support the Mayor, and
4 Councilwoman Blackwell and others, Gym,
5 have stood up with the Mayor and said
6 this is the right thing to do. They
7 cannot use a city to indefinitely hold
8 people for no reason and have us absorb
9 the cost. If they want someone and they
10 know they're a criminal or they suspect,
11 all they do is go to court and get a
12 judicial order, and then they release us
13 from the liability of holding someone
14 unjustly for the sake of them figuring
15 out what it is they want to charge them.

16 This is about the core of
17 protecting our democracy and that people
18 are innocent until they're proven guilty
19 and that people will be given due
20 process. And unfortunately we're now
21 part of the national rhetoric and, again,
22 the Mayor -- and I want to continue to
23 support him to stay strong. What we're
24 doing is protecting who we are and what
25 our democracy stands for, and for the

2 federal government and for the political
3 folks in the political season to utilize
4 Philadelphia as an example, well, guess
5 what? I'm proud of this example. We
6 have the most progressive, most welcoming
7 political policy.

8 They can get anybody they want
9 any time they want. Our position is we
10 should not be the tools by which we
11 violate people's rights and that they
12 should follow due process. And it is a
13 shame. I am just not surprised but
14 continue to be disappointed about how
15 ugly we get in the name of putting forth
16 leadership and wanting to lead. Leading
17 is about justice. Whether you agree with
18 the policy or you don't, for those of you
19 who are lawyers, it is about due process.

20 So I thank Councilman Oh, and I
21 think that any entertaining of any
22 punishment for disagreeing in a democracy
23 goes against the core of why we are
24 elected officials and why we run.

25 Thank you.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
16 you, Mr. Chairman. The following
17 resolutions and bills are being called up
18 from the Second Reading and Final Passage
19 Calendars today: Nos. 160791, 160795,
20 160799, 160708-A, 160330-A, and all other
21 resolutions and bills are being held.

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
23 Councilman.

24 That brings us to our public
25 comment, and thank you. Before

3 we will consider the public comment as
4 follows:

5 Your comment must be concerning
6 the matters on the Second and Final
7 Reading Passage Calendars for today and
8 possible action in today's public comment
9 and on the Calendar. All speakers must
10 sign up with the Chief Clerk to my left,
11 your right. You will have three minutes.
12 Thirty seconds left the light will turn
13 yellow. And red you will be done
14 speaking. I want to thank you all for
15 joining us here today and engaging in
16 joining us in our public comment and our
17 process.

18 The Clerk, would you please
19 read the first person to testify.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Robert Burdge,
21 commenting on 160659 and 160365.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MR. BURDGE: My name is Robert
24 Burdge. I'm a Philadelphian. Again, I'm
25 again sponsoring Councilman Oh and

2 Councilwoman Gym about this -- having
3 auditing of the public Parking Authority,
4 and that's a start. We need to do it all
5 to the City.

6 And my other bill was getting
7 the property management of the City to
8 start taking care of their properties.
9 It's very important. A lot of -- out of
10 Center City there's a lot of properties
11 that are being not taken care of. One
12 instance, Kensington, South Philly, North
13 Philly. You know, it's all over the
14 City. We need to start taking care of
15 our properties. And these are people
16 that don't even live in the City.
17 They're people buying the properties here
18 and from out of the City and not caring
19 about them. And that's what's hurting
20 us.

21 Again, we need to start paying
22 attention to that, guys, because it's
23 very important. And people come out --
24 come visiting our city and sees this, and
25 they don't want to put money into the

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2 City. They don't want to put money into
3 the City when they see their property --
4 different parts of the property, people
5 are not taking care of their property.

6 I know for a fact when I first
7 moved into the City, I had some concerns,
8 and I'm interested in the City, but we
9 need to pay attention to that, paying
10 attention and getting our property
11 managing codes up to date. Also we need
12 to keep up with our codes and everything.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Jane Golden.

17 (Applause.)

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
20 morning.

21 MS. GOLDEN: Good morning. I'm
22 honored to be here today. Thank you.
23 Thank you. Thank you. I'm so excited.
24 I'm always excited, though.

25 So Philadelphia Mural Arts

2 Program is the largest public art
3 organization of its kind. Let's have a
4 round of applause.

5 (Applause.)

6 MS. GOLDEN: There's no city
7 anywhere that has anything like it.

8 Oh, can I start talking? Is
9 this okay? Oh, green, okay.

10 So for over 30 years, we have
11 united artists and communities through a
12 collaborative and equitable process,
13 creating 4,000 works of art since 1984.

14 (Applause.)

15 MS. GOLDEN: Transforming
16 public spaces but, more importantly,
17 individual lives.

18 Mural Arts wants to empower
19 people, stimulate dialogue, build bridges
20 of understanding with projects that
21 attract artists from Philadelphia and
22 around the world and programs that focus
23 on young people, education, restorative
24 justice, mental health and wellness, and
25 public art and its preservation.

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2 We are committed to being part
3 of a movement for positive and equitable
4 change. It's in our DNA and has been the
5 driving concept from the very beginning
6 where we were founded in 1984. And I'm
7 very thankful to our former Mayor, Wilson
8 Goode, and Tim Spencer for giving me a
9 chance and giving me access to
10 communities throughout the City of
11 Philadelphia. I will be forever grateful
12 to them.

13 The work we do now is different
14 in scope, but our beliefs are the same.
15 Our principles are the same. We've grown
16 and stretched over the years in order to
17 be more responsive to people and
18 communities, to expand pathways for
19 exploration and expression. We've begun
20 to work in sculpture, radio, performance,
21 light. We've taken up residence in
22 several Philadelphia neighborhoods,
23 embedding ourselves there so we can
24 provide services, a wide array of
25 services; opening up storefronts, turning

2 them into hubs and community centers;
3 working in partnership with extraordinary
4 community leaders all over the City.

5 Our iconic collection has
6 earned Philadelphia worldwide recognition
7 as the City of Murals. Yet we are not
8 content to rest on our laurels. That
9 would be bad. We can never stand still.
10 We are always changing, striving to
11 experiment and to explore public art in
12 the 21st century and to bring about
13 changes through innovative ways.

14 Oh, no, yellow.

15 So we're here today and I want
16 to thank Councilwoman Cindy Bass, who is
17 awesome, to celebrate October as Mural
18 Arts Month. It's a way to shine a light
19 on the artists, our community partners,
20 all the wonderful people that we work
21 with. In October we'll have panel
22 discussions, block parties, mural
23 dedications, exhibitions to give everyone
24 across Philadelphia a chance to get to
25 know us better and to participate.

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2 We started Mural Arts almost a
3 decade ago. I took the idea from the
4 City of San Francisco. They have a week.
5 It's not enough for Philly. We need a
6 month.

7 Anyway, I just want to -- we're
8 doing amazing projects all over the City,
9 and bottom line is, I want to thank City
10 Council. Your support has meant so much.
11 It has given us the sort of -- the
12 inspiration to just take art and stretch
13 it as far as it can go, to bring about
14 change throughout the City. That motto
15 that we have is that art ignites change.
16 We believe it with every bone in our
17 body, and I thank you from the bottom of
18 my heart. And I want to introduce
19 Tiffany Tavaréz, who is here from PECO
20 and is a Board member, and I want to
21 acknowledge David Pudlin, our Board
22 Chair, who is here.

23 Tiffany.

24 (Applause.)

25 MS. GOLDEN: Thank you.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Tiffany Tavarez.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Ms. Golden, thank you for your uplifting
6 testimony.

7 MS. TAVAREZ: Thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Tough act to follow.

10 MS. TAVAREZ: You're telling
11 me, President.

12 My name is Tiffany Tavarez,
13 following Jane Golden. It's not really
14 fair to actually follow her, but I must
15 say that I share the same vision and
16 passion that she does. Not just she but
17 our Board, our staff, our volunteers, and
18 the thousands of family and youth that
19 work in the City that get impacted by
20 Mural Arts Program.

21 So I work for an amazing
22 company here in Philadelphia, PECO, part
23 of the PECO Corporate Relations team,
24 which actually supports Mural Arts. But
25 I'm here today because I have the

2 pleasure and honor of serving on the
3 Board of Directors for Mural Arts
4 Program. See, my time in the City
5 started when I came to Philadelphia to
6 get a fantastic education at Temple
7 University, and I'm the first person at
8 Temple University ever awarded a full
9 scholarship for the arts and I'm the
10 first person in my family to go to
11 college. But prior --

12 (Applause.)

13 MS. TAVAREZ: Thank you.

14 But prior to this great
15 accomplishment, my history mirrored those
16 of many children in the City. I've
17 attended nine different grade schools and
18 I've had many in my family die from gun
19 violence, including my own father. In
20 this survival-of-the-fittest world I was
21 born into, now as a Mural Arts Board
22 member, I facilitate a system of giving
23 back, of paying it forward, and art
24 created that change for me. Art was my
25 ticket.

2 We strive every day to use art
3 to ignite change, change the way we see
4 our future, our children, our paths and,
5 of course, ourselves.

6 The organization has evolved in
7 the times as well. Our programming and
8 advocacy goes way beyond the wall now.
9 It ignites our vision in the way we look
10 at the world to see a thing that is very
11 hard to see, especially during this time,
12 and, that is, possibility.

13 Last year I had the really
14 fantastic opportunity to serve as
15 co-chair of Open Source, one of our most
16 ambitious projects. With that project
17 alone, we brought over 14 international
18 artists to eliminate the City's great
19 diverse and urban communities. We've
20 actually received a little over, I
21 believe, 200 million media impressions.
22 That's not just showcasing Mural Arts.
23 That's showcasing the City of
24 Philadelphia and all our advocates, our
25 millions of advocates.

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2 So with here I stand following
3 Jane's amazing energy and I want to thank
4 you, the guests, esteemed City
5 Councilmembers for your ongoing support
6 of this fantastic organization, and all
7 the different children in this city that
8 are just different versions of ourselves,
9 younger versions of ourselves that are
10 trying to essentially be where we are
11 right now. I want to create that path
12 for them.

13 So thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you for your testimony.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
18 other speakers on the public comment
19 list, Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you very much.

22 That concludes our public
23 comment session. We will now proceed
24 with our Calendar.

25 Mr. Decker, would you please

15 (Aye.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Those opposed?

18 (No response.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 ayes have it, and Resolution 160791 is
21 adopted.

22 Mr. Decker, 160795.

23 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
24 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
25 Property to execute and deliver to the

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 Chair recognizes Councilwoman
11 Quinones-Sanchez.

12 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
13 you, Mr. President. I move for its
14 adoption.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
17 been moved and properly seconded.

18 All those in favor?

19 (Aye.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Those opposed?

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 ayes have it, and Resolution 160795 is
25 adopted.

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1 9/22/16 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Mr. Decker, 160799.

3 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

4 acknowledging the efforts of the

5 Philadelphia Health Department and Board

6 of Health to reduce the high rate of

7 smoking in low-income neighborhoods and

8 calling attention to the intense

9 marketing efforts in these neighborhoods

10 to encourage smoking.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

12 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,

14 Mr. President. I move for the adoption

15 of the resolution.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

18 been moved and properly seconded.

19 All those in favor?

20 (Aye.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Those opposed?

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

25 ayes have it, and 160799 is adopted.

2 Mr. Decker, 160708-A.

3 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
4 amending Chapter 19-3200 of The
5 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Keystone
6 Opportunity Zone, Economic Development
7 District, and Strategic Development
8 Area," by providing for additional
9 Keystone Opportunity Expansion Zones.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
13 you, Mr. President. Members may recall
14 that just last week I removed certain
15 properties from the 3rd Council District
16 from the Keystone Opportunity legislation
17 because of issues related to minority
18 participation. During the past week, my
19 office worked -- and we couldn't have
20 done it without John Christmas. Thank
21 you. We worked with Drexel University,
22 Wexford, and the Science Center to
23 improve minority participation. We also
24 want to thank you because of what you've
25 done in this area.

2 As a result, we amended the EOP
3 for University City High project and have
4 distributed a new EOP draft for all
5 members, along with an amendment to Bill
6 No. 160708-A to include the properties
7 that I previously removed. We now have a
8 new Equal Opportunity Plan that does four
9 things. Number one, we have higher
10 minority participation goals. They were
11 32 percent, now 40 percent.

12 Two, separate participation
13 ranges for skilled and labor workforce
14 hours, minority labor hours now 60
15 percent, minority skilled hours 30
16 percent.

17 Three, separate ranges for
18 African Americans, Hispanic, and Asian
19 workforce. And so we already -- for
20 African Americans, Hispanic, and Asian
21 workforce, and we have now 22 percent of
22 all hours for African American, 15
23 percent for Hispanic, 3 percent for Asian
24 workforce, as we just said, the minority
25 participation, 60 percent for labor

2 hours, and skilled hours 30 percent.

3 And, number four, we also dealt
4 with women and we have skilled 5 percent
5 and labor hours worked 5 percent.

6 So we've done our part. We
7 know you've worked on this. I hope Lu is
8 looking down.

9 I'm trying to do my part, Lu.

10 And now we move for the
11 adoption of the amendment.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
14 been moved and properly seconded on the
15 amendment to 160708-A.

16 All those in favor say aye.

17 (Aye.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Those opposed?

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 ayes have it. The amendment to 160708-A
23 is approved.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
25 you.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair now recognizes Councilman Henon.

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
5 Council President. On behalf of
6 Councilman Squilla, who just joined us
7 here, for the sake of speediness, I offer
8 an amendment on his behalf in addition to
9 the amendment that was just passed to
10 160708-A. A copy of the amendment has
11 been circulated to all members and I move
12 for the adoption of this amendment.

13 (Duly seconded.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you. The amendment has been moved
16 and seconded.

17 All in favor?

15 The ayes are 17; the nays are

19 Mr. Decker, do you have any

20 additional resolutions?

21 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

22 recognizing and acknowledging the victims

23 of the shooting rampage that happened in

24 West Philadelphia at 52nd and Sansom

25 Streets on Friday night, introduced by

2 Councilwoman Blackwell.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
4 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
6 you, Mr. President. I want to thank
7 everyone who is doing something on the
8 issue. As you all know, we had the
9 shooting rampage in my district in West
10 Philly on Friday night, and we introduced
11 a resolution acknowledging the victims,
12 who were police as well as others and,
13 frankly, we lost a person, as all of you
14 know as well.

15 But so many in our city are
16 doing great things. I even heard on the
17 radio about people -- they're having a
18 meeting in your district on Saturday --
19 who were ex-gang members, who said we
20 have to come to the table because we have
21 to do what we can to change the world the
22 way it was when we grew up. And so we
23 know these are tough times. I thought we
24 should say something.

25 But I want to say thank you to

3 certainly with that, we move for the
4 adoption of the resolution.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
7 been moved and properly seconded.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 ayes have it, and that resolution is
15 adopted.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
17 recognizing and honoring Jeff Brown and
18 ShopRite Partners In Caring, for their
19 dedication and commitment to ending
20 hunger in the Philadelphia community and
21 across the country, introduced by
22 Councilman Jones.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
24 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

25 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

2 Mr. President, and for the record, it was
3 signed by every member of City Council.

4 I move for its adoption.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
7 been moved and properly seconded.

8 All those in favor say aye.

9 (Aye.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Those opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 ayes have it, and that resolution is
15 adopted.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
17 approving the redevelopment contract of
18 the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority
19 for the redevelopment and urban renewal
20 of a portion of the West Parkside Urban
21 Renewal Area, identified by house numbers
22 and street addresses as 1701 through 17,
23 1702, 1706 through 10, 1712 through 16,
24 and 1719 through 29 North Fifty-Second
25 Street, 1718 North Creighton Street, 1722

15 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
16 other resolutions on the Final Passage

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you very much.

20 I do believe we have --

21 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Mr.
22 President?

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
24 Councilwoman.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Just a

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2 small comment. Let me thank -- I was
3 talking, not paying attention. Let me
4 thank Councilman Henon, Councilman Domb,
5 Councilman Jones, Maria Quinones-Sanchez,
6 David Oh, Derek Green, Al Taubenberger,
7 and Helen Gym for supporting my
8 resolution.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilwoman.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
12 you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I do
14 believe we have a Calendar-related issue.

15 Thank you. The Chair
16 recognizes Councilman Squilla.

17 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. First of all, I'd like to
19 withdraw my leave of absence for today.
20 I did make it back in time for the vote.
21 And also I'd like to withdraw an
22 introduction of a resolution for a city
23 occupancy of 549 North 5th Street in the
24 City of Philadelphia.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Did

3 COUNCILMAN HENON: If that's a
4 motion, I'll second that motion.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
6 have to have Mr. Decker read the title
7 first.

8 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
9 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
10 Property, on behalf of the City, to enter
11 into a sublease agreement with the
12 Philadelphia Authority for Industrial
13 Development for use by the City of
14 premises located at 456 North 5th Street,
15 all under certain terms and conditions.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you.

18 There is a motion on the floor
19 by Councilman Squilla to withdraw.

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
22 been moved and properly seconded.

23 All those in favor?

24 (Aye.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Those opposed?

3 (No response.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 ayes have it, and that is withdrawn.

6 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Councilman Squilla, I've been told that
9 you are qualified to vote on all bills
10 and resolutions that have passed today or
11 that were up on the Calendar today. Do
12 you wish to do so now?

13 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Yes, sir.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, sir.

16 The record shall reflect that
17 Councilman Squilla voted aye on all bills
18 and resolutions on today's Calendar.

19 We will now have the
20 opportunity to have speeches on the part
21 of the minority.

22 And the Chair recognizes
23 Councilman Oh.

24 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
25 much, Council President. I wanted to say

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2 that democracy does involve different
3 opinions, different perspectives, and
4 certainly we do disagree, but in trying
5 to fix or correct issues or come up with
6 solutions, it is important that we do try
7 to work together. At the end of the day,
8 however, Philadelphia is in need of
9 funds. Our schools need funds, our
10 streets need funds, our police need
11 funds, our firefighters need funds.
12 There's so many programs that we need
13 funding for. We cannot fix things if we
14 don't fund them.

15 In that regard, I'd like to
16 thank Councilman Taubenberger and State
17 Representative John Taylor, Chairman of
18 the Transportation Committee. I did have
19 the opportunity to testify on Friday, and
20 my issue was that the radar speed cameras
21 would end up taking money out of the City
22 of Philadelphia and while you're
23 ticketing speeders, we won't have the
24 money to fix the problem. And I read on
25 Monday that John Taylor stated that he's

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2 amending his bill so that Philadelphia
3 and local jurisdictions will keep half
4 the moneys generated from the radar, and
5 that will help us to fix these problems.

6 I'd certainly encourage and ask
7 State Representative Martina White to
8 follow that example. If you disagree
9 with the Mayor, that's fine. If you can
10 do something, that's fine, but
11 withholding money to the citizens of
12 Philadelphia hurts the people you're
13 trying to help and does greater harm than
14 good.

15 Finally, with all that's going
16 on, we started a process of trying to
17 figure out how much money the Parking
18 Authority has for the School District and
19 I asked for an audit with Councilwoman
20 Helen Gym by the City Controller, who
21 cannot audit the entire Parking
22 Authority, but a portion. That was
23 tabled. I have not made a motion to take
24 it off the table, but I will do so next
25 session. I just wanted to alert my

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2 colleagues that I'll be doing so. We
3 will end up voting on that, and I
4 certainly hope, in light of all things,
5 that we get an audit of the Parking
6 Authority to see where the money is and
7 what's going on.

8 Thank you very much.

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
10 Councilman.

11 Are there any other speeches on
12 the part of the minority?

13 (No response.)

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: Are there
15 any speeches on the part of the majority?

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Jones.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
19 Mr. Chairman. First let me thank my
20 colleagues President Clarke and
21 Councilman Johnson for being on the
22 forefront of dealing with the issue of
23 the proliferation of firearms in the City
24 of Philadelphia. They've been on top of
25 their job since I've gotten here with

2 President Clarke and since Councilman
3 Johnson has gotten here. They've been
4 putting this in the forefront of the
5 issue.

6 But I rise today to talk about
7 the proposal of House Bill 2258. Once
8 again, a republican from Harrisburg is
9 telling Philadelphia how to deal with gun
10 violence in our city. In Perry County
11 where Representative Mark Keller
12 represents, we believe there has only
13 been one murder all year, and my heart
14 goes out. That's one too many murders,
15 compared to 208 year to date in
16 Philadelphia.

17 So where do these guns come
18 from? Every gun in the United States
19 starts off as a legal firearm, but can
20 quickly become an illegal one in many
21 ways. Each year thousands of guns are
22 purchased legally, making their way into
23 hands of criminals, ending up killing
24 often Philadelphians.

25 The number of guns manufactured

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2 in the United States grew from 2.9
3 million in 2001 to 5.5 million in 2010,
4 which was the highest volume in the
5 history of this country.

6 Where do these guns come from?
7 Sometimes from corrupt firearms dealers.
8 Statistics suggest that criminals
9 purchase these guns from these corrupt
10 firearms licensed dealers, knowing good
11 and well there's a big chance that they
12 will never get caught selling them to
13 people who have nefarious reasons for
14 purchasing them. They do so under the
15 cloak of the NRA, feeling safe that their
16 rights, Second Amendment rights, will be
17 protected by them.

18 Where do these guns come from?
19 Sometimes you can go in a bar and rent
20 them just like in a Redbox movie that you
21 get. Often, too often, people are coming
22 from out of state. They go to the
23 Carolinas where gun purchases are
24 relatively frequent and easy to do and
25 then bring them back here. Another way

2 that these guns find their way here are
3 through straw purchases. They are
4 conducted openly in a suggested manner
5 that a person comes with another person,
6 picks out the gun that they like, the
7 other person with them offers correct and
8 true ID, and then they wind up passing
9 off the gun.

10 Where do these guns come from?

11 Well, I've been to North Philadelphia in
12 Clarke's district. I've been to South
13 Philadelphia in Kenyatta's district.
14 I've been to Jannie Blackwell's district.
15 I've been to the hinterlands of the
16 Northeast, and I can't find a gun
17 manufacturing company in Philadelphia.

18 So where do these guns come
19 from? They are often trafficked and done
20 so -- there are over 400 guns diverted
21 into illegal -- 40,000 guns diverted into
22 illegal migration into our city.

23 So where do these guns come
24 from? Well, let me tell you what they're
25 doing when they get here. To date we've

2 had 266 murders. That's up by 9 percent
3 from last year. Each year on the 7th
4 floor of this building, the evidence room
5 melts down 3,000 guns that have been used
6 in the commission of a crime, not in
7 Perry County, not where Representative
8 Keller comes from but in Philadelphia.

9 So I want to say that there
10 have been over 3,447 assaults with a gun
11 this year thus far. Most recently five
12 people, as my colleague Councilwoman
13 Blackwell talked about, we had murder
14 mayhem over the weekend, 14 people
15 wounded, two police officers shot in the
16 span of 48 hours. I've watched the
17 movie -- a Clint Eastwood movie over the
18 weekend. Only seven people got shot in
19 the whole movie.

20 Philadelphia County has the
21 largest share of gun violence than any
22 other county in the Commonwealth. So
23 this is not survival of the fittest. I
24 do support Second Amendment rights, but
25 Perry County ain't Philly County, and

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2 when he has his hearings, I'll be there
3 to tell him that personally.

4 So I want to thank this Council
5 for being stand-up men and women in a
6 sit-down world.

7 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
9 Councilman.

10 Are there any other speeches on
11 behalf of the majority?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: With that,
14 the Chair recognizes Councilwoman
15 Reynolds Brown.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
17 Majority Leader. I move that Council
18 stand adjourned until Thursday, September
19 29th, 2016 at 10:00 a.m. Thank you.

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: It has been
22 moved and seconded to stand adjourned
23 until Thursday, September 29th, 2016,
24 10:00 a.m.

25 All those in favor say aye.

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2 (Aye.)

3 COUNCILMAN HENON: The ayes

4 have it. The motion carries.

5 Thank you for joining us today.

6 (Stated Meeting adjourned at
