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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning. We have a quorum. If the members will take their seat, we will get started.

To give our invocation this morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor Dominic Pennachietti of New Greenwich Light Baptist Church. He is here today as the guest of Councilman Mark Squilla.

I would ask all members, guests, and visitors to please rise.
(Councilmembers and guests rise.)

PASTOR PENNACHIETTI: Good morning, everyone.

(Good morning.)

PASTOR PENNACHIETTI: I can't begin to express the gratitude and the great honor it is for me to be here with you this morning. I prayed for you last night and I prayed for you this morning. And I want to remind you that you are where you are today for such a time as this. God has ordained you and God has

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2 placed you in the position that you are
3 in today. And I appreciate your service,
4 I appreciate your dedication, and I
5 appreciate your devotion to our beloved
6 city.

7 Today I want to give honor and
8 give value to you, because I believe with
9 all my heart that you are so
10 significantly important to the welfare of
11 the citizens of this great city.

12 I just want to let you know
13 today that we stand with you, we stand by
14 you, and we stand for you. Our church
15 prays for you every single week, and by
16 God's grace, we will continue to pray for
17 guidance and strength and wisdom and
18 courage to do what is right for our
19 beloved city.

20 Shall we pray.

21 Our Heavenly, Gracious Father,
22 we bow our heads humbly before you
23 recognizing, Lord, that we do not have
24 all the answers, recognizing that we
25 don't always know what is the right way.

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2 And you said in your scriptures, in a
3 multitude of counselors, there is great
4 safety. And, Lord, you also said in your
5 beloved scriptures, Lord, unless you
6 build the house, we labor in vain to
7 build it. And so we humbly ask for your
8 wisdom this morning. We humbly ask for
9 guidance for our dear people here today.
10 We ask for wisdom to govern amid the
11 conflicting interests of our times,
12 courage to stand up for what is right,
13 honesty in all of our dealings with man
14 before you.

15 Lord, we ask for a sense of
16 welfare and, Lord, for the true needs of
17 our people of our great city. Lord, we
18 ask for desire for justice and right, the
19 ability to work together in harmony even
20 when there is honest disagreement.

21 I pray for this agenda set
22 before us today that you give an
23 assurance of what would please you and
24 what would benefit those who live and
25 work in and around our great City of

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2 Philadelphia.

3 Dear Jesus, may every decision
4 that is made here today may be governed
5 and guided by your omnipotent, powerful
6 hand. We'll thank you for what you will
7 do and continue to do in our great city.

8 In your name, we pray these
9 things.

10 Amen.

11 (Amen.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you so much, Pastor.

14 Council will be at ease.

15 (Council at ease.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you very much and, Pastor, thank
18 you for those spiritual words.

19 The next order of business is
20 the approval of the Journal of the
21 meeting of Thursday, September 22nd,
22 2016, and the Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Greenlee.

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
25 you, Mr. President. I move that the

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2 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
3 September 22nd, 2016 be approved.

4 (Duly seconded.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. It has been moved and
7 properly seconded that the Journal of the
8 meeting of Thursday, September 22nd, 2016
9 stand approved.

10 All those in favor say aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Those opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 ayes have it. The Journal is approved.

17 The next order of business is
18 requests for leave of absence, and the
19 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. On behalf of the
22 majority, there are no requests for leave
23 of absence today.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair thanks the gentleman.

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2 The Chair now recognizes
3 Councilman O'Neill.

4 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. On behalf of the
6 republicans, a leave of absence is
7 requested for Councilman Al Taubenberger.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Leave shall be granted. The Chair thanks
10 the gentleman.

11 At this time, I would like to
12 dispense with the regular order of
13 business and I would like to thank
14 everyone who has taken time out of their
15 busy day to come down to witness their
16 government in action. I hope your day
17 here is a knowledgeable one and also a
18 pleasurable one, so much so that you come
19 back again. Again, thank you so much for
20 coming down.

21 At this time, the Chair
22 recognizes Councilman Greenlee, who will
23 present a resolution declaring October as
24 "Domestic Violence Awareness Month."
25 Would Jeannine Lisitski and those

3 Councilman at the podium.

4 (Councilmembers and guests
5 approached podium.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
7 joining Councilman Greenlee, we have
8 Councilman Green and Councilman Domb and
9 Councilman Johnson and Councilman Jones.

10 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
11 you, Mr. President.

12 Good morning, everybody. It's
13 very important, I believe, that every
14 year or actually throughout the year we
15 keep the public aware of the tremendously
16 important issue of helping domestic
17 violence victims and also to recognize
18 all of those who work real hard every day
19 to help those victims.

20 So this is a resolution
21 declaring October as "Domestic Violence
22 Awareness Month."

23 Whereas, "Domestic Violence
24 Awareness Month" is being sponsored
25 locally by Women Against Abuse and,

2 through their sponsorship, they are
3 encouraging everyone to help to increase
4 the awareness of domestic violence in our
5 homes and communities and decrease its
6 negative impact on Philadelphia; and

7 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
8 in 2015, the Philadelphia Police
9 Department responded to more than 100,000
10 domestic-related calls, and domestic
11 violence is not just a local problem but
12 a national issue where more than three
13 women a day are murdered by their
14 husbands or boyfriends in the United
15 States; and

16 Whereas, founded in 1976, the
17 mission of Women Against Abuse is to
18 provide quality and compassionate
19 services, in a manner that fosters
20 self-respect and independence in persons
21 experiencing intimate partner violence
22 and to lead the struggle to end domestic
23 violence through advocacy and community
24 education; and

25 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,

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2 2016 marks the 40th Anniversary of Women
3 Against Abuse, founded as a part-time
4 domestic violence hotline in a
5 neighborhood women's center. Women
6 Against Abuse has served as a pioneering
7 voice for change - opening Philadelphia's
8 only emergency safe haven for domestic
9 violence in 1977, launching one of the
10 first legal centers in the nation
11 dedicated to the needs of survivors of
12 domestic violence, establishing the
13 region's first transitional housing
14 program for survivors in 1987; and
15 continually adapting to the changing
16 needs of people experiencing relationship
17 abuse, including partnering with the
18 Philadelphia Police Department and
19 tripling the number of domestic violence
20 victims receiving free representation for
21 a protection from abuse order by
22 stationing attorneys directly in
23 Philadelphia Family Court; and
24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
25 Women Against Abuse, in partnership with

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2 Congreso de Latinos --

3 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Unidos.

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: -- Unidos,
5 Lutheran Settlement House's -- thank you
6 for helping me, Maria -- Bilingual
7 Domestic Violence Program and Women in
8 Transition, the Philadelphia Domestic
9 Violence Collaborative provides a
10 comprehensive continuum of services to
11 survivors of domestic violence and their
12 families in Philadelphia, which includes
13 housing, legal aid, counseling, medical
14 advocacy and behavioral health; and

15 Whereas, the Philadelphia
16 Domestic Violence Collaborative provides
17 education and training to the community
18 about domestic violence issues and
19 resources and has partnered with the City
20 of Philadelphia to operate the Domestic
21 Violence Hotline and, in fiscal year
22 2016, approximately 15,000 calls were
23 answered through the Hotline; and

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
25 to ensure a more holistic approach to

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2 addressing violence in our community,
3 Women Against Abuse and its sister
4 agencies are partnering with the City
5 Administration and over 50 different
6 community stakeholders to implement a
7 citywide strategic plan to respond to
8 domestic violence in Philadelphia; and

9 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, to
10 support a coordinated community response
11 to domestic violence, Women Against Abuse
12 will hold its 9th Annual iPledge Press
13 Conference on Friday, September 30th at
14 noon in Thomas Paine Plaza as a community
15 awareness initiative to promote knowledge
16 about domestic violence and to build
17 community support so that all
18 Philadelphians will take a stand against
19 violence; now, therefore, be it

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Resolved,
21 that the Council of the City of
22 Philadelphia, declares and recognizes
23 October as "Domestic Violence Awareness
24 Month."

25 Further resolved, that an

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2 engrossed copy of this resolution be
3 presented to representatives of Women
4 Against Abuse as a sincere expression of
5 City Council's gratitude and commendation
6 for raising the public's awareness
7 regarding domestic violence and
8 appreciation for aiding domestic violence
9 victims for 40 years.

10 This was introduced by myself,
11 co-sponsored by the members here, and
12 signed by all members of City Council.

13 Jeannine, et al., everyone
14 here, thank you for everything you do on
15 this very important issue. Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
18 the Chair recognizes Ms. Lisitski for
19 remarks.

20 MS. LISITSKI: Thank you.
21 Thank you all so much. It's so wonderful
22 to be here among such a group of
23 champions in our City Council. None of
24 our work we could alone, and I just thank
25 you for all that you do each day.

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2 I especially want to thank
3 Councilmembers Greenlee, Reynolds Brown,
4 Jones, Johnson, Green, Domb, and all of
5 the members. We are honored to be here
6 again this year to proclaim October as
7 Domestic Violence Awareness Month in
8 Philadelphia. And as the Executive
9 Director of Women Against Abuse, I am so
10 pleased to be celebrating our 40th
11 anniversary this year, because it marks
12 another year of progress towards ending
13 domestic violence here in Philadelphia.

14 As you know, we are currently
15 working with the City Administration and
16 more than 50 stakeholders throughout
17 Philadelphia to implement a truly
18 holistic, coordinated response to
19 domestic violence. This work includes
20 things like creating a universal
21 screening tool and response, training
22 plans and protocols, new interventions,
23 even data collection protocols and much,
24 much more. The main goal is that we are
25 ensuring that no matter where a person

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2 turns for help, there's going to be a
3 response. They're going to get what they
4 need.

5 This work has been made
6 possible through the dedication of our
7 sister agencies, Congreso, Lutheran
8 Settlement House, Women in Transition,
9 and Women Organized Against Rape and
10 Women's Law Project, all of whom are
11 unfailing in their commitment to
12 improving the lives of survivors of
13 domestic violence.

14 It's really important to
15 remember that although we have made great
16 strides towards a more effective
17 response, we're still experiencing a
18 growing demand. Last year alone, we
19 fielded 15,000-plus calls on the
20 Philadelphia Domestic Violence Hotline.
21 We had to turn away over 14,000 requests
22 for safe shelter, because we are always
23 full in the 200 beds we have. So it is
24 vital, it is really foundational that our
25 community be able to respond to every cry

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2 for help. We need to do that if we're
3 going to get a handle on the violence in
4 our community.

5 So while today is a really
6 important day to proclaim Domestic
7 Violence Awareness Month in our city, we
8 have to remember that every day there's
9 thousands of people who are experiencing
10 domestic violence, and even today while
11 we're here, 300 calls to the police just
12 in this day for a response will be made.

13 So as we kick off this year's
14 Domestic Violence Awareness Month, let's
15 make the most of it. There's many, many
16 ways that people can get involved. As
17 you know, tomorrow is the Women Against
18 Abuse iPledge Press Conference at noon at
19 Thomas Paine Plaza, and please also join
20 us in downloading the iPledge toolkit to
21 use in your circle of influence.

22 Additionally, join us for the
23 Lutheran Settlement House's Men Can
24 Rally, which will be October 5th, 11:00
25 a.m., Thomas Paine Plaza. You can join

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2 us for Councilman Johnson's Philly 400
3 Run. It's October 8th, 8:00 a.m. at FDR
4 Park. Also at Congreso, survivor
5 soliloquies, October 27th at 3:00 p.m.

6 So there's so many ways you can
7 get involved. You can also join us and
8 join one of the subcommittees of the
9 coordinated community response
10 implementation plan for the City. And
11 please join us as we work to create
12 shared safety for each of us as part of
13 our wonderful City of Brotherly Love and
14 Sisterly Affection. Our city looks to
15 you for leadership. How will you be a
16 part of working to end relational
17 violence, not just during this month but
18 each and every day.

19 So I want to thank you all
20 again for your commitment to be a part of
21 this struggle that we're in. I believe
22 that together we can change the course of
23 family violence and we can create a safer
24 and healthier Philadelphia.

25 Thank you.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Council will be at ease.

5 (Council at ease.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, and congratulations.

8 At this time, the Chair
9 recognizes Councilman Jones, who will
10 present a resolution recognizing the 32nd
11 Anniversary of Philadelphia Minority
12 Enterprise Development Week. Would Nolan
13 Atkinson, Jr. and those accompanying him
14 please join the Councilman at the podium.

15 (Councilmembers and guests
16 approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
18 joining Councilman Jones, we have
19 Councilman Green, Councilwoman
20 Quinones-Sanchez, Councilwoman Gym, and
21 Councilman Domb and Councilwoman Parker
22 and Councilwoman Bass.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Good
24 morning, everyone.

25 (Good morning.)

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2 COUNCILMAN JONES: I am pleased
3 to be a part of the continuum of
4 inclusion recognizing MED Week, Minority
5 Enterprise Development Week's 33rd
6 Anniversary, and that deserves a round of
7 applause.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: This is a
10 concept that has had its ups and downs,
11 ebbs and flows, court challenges,
12 overturning, and still we rise.

13 I want to also say that I'm
14 pleased as punch to be doing a workshop,
15 Ready Set Grow, with my colleague
16 Councilwoman Parker at Pipeline
17 Wednesday, October 5th at 6 o'clock, and
18 we're going to be getting people ready to
19 get into business. It was raised in our
20 hearings eloquently by Councilwoman
21 Parker about there's not enough ownership
22 in commercial corridors in our respective
23 neighborhoods.

24 But I want to take you back to
25 a time when there was civil unrest in the

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2 streets of Philadelphia, in the nation at
3 large, where classes of people who felt
4 disenfranchised took it to the streets
5 because the American dream did not apply
6 to them and it felt it was more like an
7 American nightmare. And the federal
8 government in its infinite wisdom at
9 times decided the answer in part was to
10 create a business class, to create an
11 entrepreneurial environment where people
12 could share in that American dream, that
13 minority and female companies could be a
14 part of a growing partnership, if you
15 would, of prosperity in this country.

16 No matter how far we go, here
17 we are. Because now we're talking about
18 during those times of unrest then, people
19 were saying words like "law and order."
20 Think about that. And other people were
21 talking about, well, we need to include
22 people in the American dream. And we
23 don't have to go that far, maybe to
24 Monday, to hear those sentiments echoed
25 from different corners of our country.

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2 So what these people behind us
3 are doing is critical. They don't get a
4 lot of fanfare. They get a lot of grief.
5 Am I right? Can I get an amen?

6 (Amen.)

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: They get a
8 lot of grief, because every day they rise
9 and grind to make sure people have
10 opportunities so that small companies can
11 become medium-sized companies and
12 contributors to the tax base in the City
13 of Philadelphia, and making sure women
14 and others who hire other women and other
15 minorities actually get a fair shake at
16 leveling the playing field.

17 So to that end, we are
18 presenting a resolution honoring and
19 recognizing Minority Enterprise
20 Development Week.

21 Whereas -- I cut out my whereas
22 to include others.

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:
24 Councilman, that won't work for me. I
25 need the 25 bold print script.

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2 So whereas, since 1983, the
3 U.S. President has proclaimed a National
4 Minority Enterprise Development Week
5 observance to recognize the outstanding
6 achievements of Minority Business
7 Enterprises and to honor those
8 corporations and financial institutions
9 that support minority business
10 development. Annual regional conferences
11 and activities are organized by the U.S.
12 Department of Commerce Minority Business
13 Development Agency in collaboration with
14 the U.S. Small Business Administration's
15 Office of Government Contracting and
16 Business Development; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
18 Whereas, the MED Week celebration was
19 started locally in Philadelphia in 1984
20 to honor and promote minority-owned
21 businesses in the Philadelphia area;

22 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And
23 whereas, all of you are invited to join
24 us Tuesday, October 4th at the Naval
25 Shipyard wherein PIDC and my office will

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2 invite MBEs and WBEs to figure out how
3 you can be actively engaged in the
4 Mayor's rebuild initiative; and

5 Whereas, the organizers of the
6 first MED Week activities were dearly
7 beloved and sorely missed Barbara Daniel
8 Cox, former Director of Mayor Wilson
9 Goode's Women's Commission, and community
10 activist Bilal Abdul Qayyum, former
11 Assistant Deputy Director of the City
12 Commerce Department; and

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the
14 32nd Anniversary of Philadelphia MED Week
15 is sponsored by corporations, hospitals,
16 local colleges and universities, local
17 and regional government agencies and
18 organizations that are committed to
19 supporting opportunities for minority
20 businesses, including the African
21 American Chamber of Commerce, Asian
22 American Chamber of Commerce of Greater
23 Philadelphia, Greater Philadelphia
24 Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, the City of
25 Philadelphia Commerce Department, and the

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2 MBDA Business Center of Pennsylvania; and
3 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
4 small businesses in Philadelphia and
5 across the country are the cornerstone of
6 economic growth, creating two-thirds of
7 new jobs in the country and comprising 50
8 percent of America's employment.

9 I just want to add an aside. I
10 always say you make a living working in a
11 small business. You create wealth owning
12 it. And I want to thank everybody behind
13 me for helping people achieve that goal.
14 Thank you.

15 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, the
16 sources of capital, technical resources,
17 and contracting opportunities are
18 essential to the development, growth, and
19 prosperity of minority business. MED
20 Week will host some of the most prominent
21 contracting organizations and resource
22 providers that stand for the success of
23 the small business community;

24 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
25 MED Week has grown exponentially since

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2 its inception. This year's celebration
3 includes over 40 sponsors offering more
4 than 30 workshops, seminars and
5 networking opportunities across the
6 region including, as Councilman Domb
7 always says: "There's Money Out There -
8 How to Get It," "Doing Business with EDs
9 and MEDs," "Philly Airport 2016 Annual
10 Business Opportunity Forum," and
11 "Lighting the Torch"; now, therefore, be
12 it

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Be it
14 resolved, by the Council of the City of
15 Philadelphia, that it hereby supports the
16 National Minority Business Development
17 Agency and recognizes October 1st through
18 October 8th, 2016 as Philadelphia
19 Minority Enterprise Development Week,
20 which provides critical information,
21 resources, opportunities and inspiration
22 to foster a clear trajectory for growth
23 and sustainability in the minority
24 business community.

25 Further resolved, that an

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2 engrossed copy of this resolution be
3 presented to the Philadelphia MED Week
4 Committee as evidence of the strong
5 support and sincere sentiments of this
6 legislative body.

7 Congratulations.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 Chair recognizes Mr. Atkinson for
11 remarks.

12 MR. ATKINSON: Council
13 President Clarke and members of City
14 Council, I am honored to represent the
15 MED Week Committee and acknowledge the
16 co-chairs of this year's program, its
17 33rd, which has the theme of
18 "Philadelphia the Center of Opportunity:
19 Building Capacity for Prosperity." Those
20 co-chairs, African American Chamber, the
21 Asian Chamber of Commerce, the Commerce
22 Department of the Office of Economic
23 Opportunity and its staff and Angela
24 Dowd-Burton who leads that staff, the
25 Greater Philadelphia Hispanic Chamber of

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2 Commerce, and the United States Minority
3 Business Development Business Agency, and
4 all other members of the Committee who
5 have spent so much time in building such
6 a great program this year.

7 On each Councilperson's desk is
8 a schedule of the calendar of events for
9 this year's MED Week, and I urge you all
10 to take a good look at that and
11 participate.

12 Councilman Jones has said that
13 economic inclusion is the last rung in
14 the ladder of equality. As a participant
15 in the first MED Week, when my little law
16 firm was a struggling enterprise on Pine
17 Street, I know the importance of MED
18 Week. It is an opportunity to get
19 education, networking, and a host of
20 opportunities that only comes during this
21 special time.

22 All of the events this year
23 will foster the growth and capacity of
24 the Philadelphia minority business
25 community.

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2 On behalf of the Committee, I
3 am honored to accept this resolution and
4 pledge that every member of the Committee
5 will work with all of our energy to
6 achieve the goal of full economic
7 inclusion.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Council will be at ease.

12 (Council at ease.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you very much.

15 A little quiet, please. Thank
16 you.

17 The next order of business is

24 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
25 and members of the Council of the City of

5 recommendation of the City Planning
6 Commission on the following bills: Bill

8 160717, and 160718.

9 And I am pleased to advise you
10 that on September 27, 2016, I signed all
11 of the bills which were passed by Council
12 at its session on September 15, 2016.

13 And I am transmitting for the
14 consideration of your honorable body a
15 resolution approving the redevelopment
16 contract of the Philadelphia
17 Redevelopment Authority for the
18 redevelopment and urban renewal of a
19 portion of the Whitman Urban Renewal
20 Area, identified by house number and
21 street address as 2127 South Sixth
22 Street; and

23 An ordinance amending Title 4
24 of The Philadelphia Code by amending
25 Subcode "A" (The Philadelphia

1 9/29/16 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 Administrative Code) and Subcode "B" (The

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning.

22 MS. COOPER: Good morning,
23 members of Council. My name is Donna
24 Cooper. I'm the Executive Director of
25 Public Citizens for Children and Youth,

2 and I'm here to testify to urge Council
3 to vote unanimously for Resolution
4 160659, which calls for an audit of the
5 Parking Authority by the City Controller.

6 I ask for a unanimous vote
7 because I know this Council cares so much
8 about kids and schools. You've shown
9 over and over again you're willing to
10 invest for them.

11 Unfortunately, the Parking
12 Authority has not done their part. Year
13 after year their contributions to the
14 School District have been declining in
15 spite of the fact that they have had
16 increases in the meter rates, but as we
17 see in the recent activity reported in
18 the Philadelphia news by Chairman
19 Fenerty, the Board and the leadership of
20 the Parking Authority seem to have a
21 commitment to tasks other than regulating
22 the parking, regulating themselves,
23 ensuring they're efficient, delivering
24 their money to the City, and delivering
25 money to the School District. They are

2 failing on all of those fronts, and
3 that's why we ask for a unanimous vote
4 for their audit, so that we can end the
5 culture of waste, secrecy, and corruption
6 at the Parking Authority so our schools
7 can be funded.

8 Be clear. The one known
9 settlement that we know of, the 150,000,
10 would be enough to reduce class size in
11 first grade in one elementary school.
12 Imagine that. The 4 million that the
13 Parking Authority is seeking to regulate
14 Uber and other ride-sharing services
15 would be enough to staff an entire
16 elementary school with teachers. Imagine
17 that.

18 We should be doing more than
19 this resolution. We should be calling
20 for the Board members to reconsider
21 whether they're up to the task. We
22 should be pulling in the Attorney General
23 and the Auditor General so that we can
24 make sure that this public institution,
25 which has an obligation on an annual

2 basis to fund the City and the School
3 District, is living up to that.

4 This Board resolution is a --
5 this Council resolution is a first step
6 in that regard, but there is much more
7 that needs to be done to clean up the
8 Parking Authority and ensure that it's
9 doing what it agreed to under state law
10 in 2004, which was to generate funds to
11 help us fund our schools and to be your
12 partner in doing that.

13 In 2009, the Controller of the
14 City of Philadelphia found the Parking
15 Authority to ineffectively be controlling
16 costs and could not find all of its
17 contracts. That suggests a much deeper
18 review of what's going on there needs to
19 happen.

20 So I ask for a unanimous vote
21 today. I ask you to put the kids first.
22 This is a public institution that we
23 collectively must make sure is delivering
24 for our children, and we urge a yes vote,
25 and we urge this Council to join us in

1 9/29/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 asking that the Attorney General and the
3 Auditor General of Pennsylvania also step
4 up and do a full investigation so that
5 our kids get the resources they deserve.

6 Thank you very much.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you
9 for your comments.

10 Clerk, would you please read
11 the name of the next speaker, please.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Hannah Sassaman,
13 commenting on 160659.

14 (Applause.)

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 MS. SASSAMAN: Good morning,
17 everybody. I'm also commenting on
18 160659. I'm here in a personal capacity.
19 I'm the mom of a kindergartner at a
20 Philadelphia public school, at Penn
21 Alexander, and I was really shocked to
22 learn earlier this year that the PPA is
23 required to be paying resources to our
24 public schools and hasn't been doing so.
25 And as you know, it's a \$240 million

2 agency whose contributions to schools
3 have plummeted from 14 million in 2012 to
4 a projected 8 million in 2017, where
5 we're paying far more in fees and taxes
6 to the PPA as drivers and as consumers.
7 And so if revenues have risen, why have
8 resources to the School District
9 plummeted?

10 Personally -- and I've started
11 to get involved in this on the Home and
12 School Association. My daughter's school
13 parents raise over \$100,000 each year to
14 fund art, music, and other resources for
15 the children at that school, which just
16 won a Blue Ribbon award because of the
17 major improvements and resources, a very
18 prestigious national award that we are
19 able to give to populations that are
20 struggling in that school. And the PPA
21 is considering legalizing Uber and Lyft
22 in an effort to get even more money.

23 So we really require that true
24 performance audit of the PPA. It's basic
25 good governance. And Council expects

2 this of every agency. Our kids shouldn't
3 get any less. And as we're fighting to
4 make sure that the PPA is resourcing our
5 schools, we also need to make sure that
6 the PPA is protecting all drivers and
7 riders with both Uber and Lyft as well.

8 Okay. Thank you very much.

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Robert Blount,
12 commenting on 160659.

13 (Witnesses approached podium.)

14 MR. BLOUNT: Good morning,
15 members of this honorable Council, and
16 thank y'all for this place of democracy.
17 We're not used to it. Our voices have
18 always felt it fell on deaf ears at the
19 Philadelphia Parking Authority.

20 So I'm here today on behalf of
21 the taxi drivers, the limo drivers, the
22 neighborhood limo drivers, and we just
23 want to say that the PPA is very
24 efficient in collecting revenues. I
25 mean, they got tricky signs out there.

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2 They dispossess poor people, they
3 vehicles.

4 Taxi drivers, limo drivers, our
5 fees have constantly gone up, from \$50
6 when they first started. We're paying
7 over \$125 each year just for a
8 certificate. Our assessment fees for the
9 vehicles have gone up almost double over
10 the last two years since they've been in
11 there, and we do know that they staff
12 continues to expand.

13 So we also want to talk about
14 our ridership. All of this is going on,
15 all our fees and stuff are going up while
16 the ridership has gone down because of
17 the new TNC companies and stuff like
18 that. But even in Harrisburg when we in
19 Harrisburg trying to negotiate a good
20 bill for everyone, the PPA is pushing
21 that the schools get nothing, that they
22 get 1 percent or they get 2 percent. So
23 this has been a constant battle.

24 And so we all know that the PPA
25 is very efficient in collecting revenue,

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2 but to get the PPA to pay they civic
3 duty, it's really hard. In 2006-2007,
4 when they were supposed to give money to
5 the schools, we were out in the streets,
6 the taxi drivers, the limo drivers, the
7 students, the education advocates, City
8 Councilwoman Gym. We all was out in the
9 streets to get the PPA to do they fair
10 share, and as soon as the lights and
11 cameras go away, they go back again
12 hiding money.

13 But we do know what the PPA is
14 good at spending money on, expanding they
15 staff. Their staff down there at the
16 taxi and limousine division has almost
17 doubled. Where they should be hiring
18 employees, they're hiring people that
19 retired from the City and are working for
20 the Parking Authority as independent
21 contractors. They're paying people's
22 down there college tuitions to law school
23 when they should be doing other things
24 with their money.

25 And the lawsuits. There's

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2 hundreds of lawsuits coming from the taxi
3 industry, limousine industry that the
4 taxpayers have to pay for. And who gets
5 these contracts from these law firms?

6 So we need to do the audit to
7 follow the trail, where the money is
8 being spent, who is spending something
9 from the Parking Authority. It's not the
10 City of Philadelphia. It's who is on
11 they Board, that nephew or a nephew who
12 can't get a job, Joe Ashdale's niece. I
13 don't want to go down the list, but they
14 need to be audited, and we are humbly
15 asking this Council to do they job. Take
16 a look at this. This is our city.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Could you
18 conclude your remarks, please.

19 MR. BLOUNT: Thank you.

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you so
21 much.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Clerk, would
24 you kindly read the next speaker. Thank
25 you.

3 Hernandez.

4 (No response.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Wilberto

6 Hernandez.

7 (No response.)

8 CHIEF CLERK: Aaron Sudler,

9 commenting on 160659.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 MR. SUDLER: Hi. I'm an

12 artist, visual artist. Me and Kenyatta

13 Johnson are childhood friends.

14 What's going on?

15 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Hey.

16 MR. SUDLER: Once again, I

17 believe that corruption starts with the

18 lack of independence. Okay? I have a

19 program, as me and Kenyatta spoke about,

20 in regards to funding our own schools

21 through creativity. And as long as we

22 stay dependent, corruption is going to

23 always be there, bottom line.

24 So I'm just here as a courtesy,

25 you know, to everyone that's in this

2 building, in this room to indicate that
3 through the art, through designing
4 clothes, getting our kids involved with
5 designing clothes, we can really make a
6 major impact and stay independent in
7 regards to money being made.

8 Just imagine if we have a
9 relationship with Nike and Adidas and we
10 say these are the clothes that the kids
11 are making.

12 What I do is, I do
13 one-of-a-kind clothing, one-of-a-kind by
14 hand. We don't use silk screen or
15 anything. We just do it through the
16 vinyl cutter, and we do one-of-a-kind.
17 Every item is different. I showcase my
18 talent throughout the City, from South
19 Street to the park on Sundays when we got
20 the motorcycles out during the
21 summertime.

22 I'm a product of where
23 Ms. Blackwell is from. She knows me as
24 well, West Philly. That's where I'm
25 from, 40th and Lancaster where Dr. King

2 addressed 10,000 people. There's a
3 reason why he came to that area, because
4 he knew the talent was there.

5 So as I try to get with
6 Ms. Blackwell and Kenyatta, we're going
7 to do things. We won't need no Parking
8 Authority. We won't need no outside
9 entity. Because from what I understand,
10 they're a part of New Jersey. So
11 Philadelphia, we're going to stay
12 independent, as we always have been.
13 It's just a matter of the art rising
14 above and taking over and staying
15 independent.

16 And I don't really have too
17 much to say, but I will see you and I
18 will see you as well, and I love my
19 people, and through the art, we will do
20 everything. No Walmart.

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

22 MR. SUDLER: Thank you.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Clerk, could
24 you read the next speaker, please.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Robert Taylor,

2 commenting on 160817.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MR. TAYLOR: Good morning,

5 ladies and gentlemen. I am Robert

6 Taylor, President of Transport Workers

7 Union Local 700 and WPEB 88.1 FM co-host

8 on the Jasper Jones Show. I am

9 commenting on Resolution 160817,

10 denouncing Pennsylvania House Bill 2258.

11 The Pennsylvania House bill is

12 sorely needed in Philadelphia due to the

13 misbehavior of cities' public servants

14 under the Second Amendment, U.S.

15 Constitution, and the State Constitution,

16 Article I, Section 21, which states,

17 quote, "The right of the citizens to keep

18 and bear arms in defense of themselves or

19 the State shall not be questioned." Yet

20 this Council constantly interferes with

21 that right with endless passing of

22 useless gun violence rules.

23 News flash: The guns didn't

24 commit the crimes. Law-breaking

25 criminals did. And contrary to the

2 propaganda, the criminals won't give up
3 their guns. Just ask the folks in
4 Chicago, where they have all sorts of gun
5 laws, what they think of Chicago as the
6 murder capital of the world. They are
7 headed toward a new record even as we
8 speak. Therefore, these needless rules
9 only serve to make Philadelphia a
10 criminal wonderland like Chicago. No
11 thank you.

12 As Martin Delany said in his
13 speech of 1851, quote, "Honorable Mayor,
14 whatever ideas of liberty I may have I
15 have received from reading the lives of
16 your revolutionary fathers. I have
17 therein learned that a man has a right to
18 defend his castle with his life, even
19 unto taking of life. Surely my house is
20 my castle. In that castle are none other
21 but my wife and my children, as free as
22 the angels of heaven and whose liberty is
23 as sacred as the pillars of God," end
24 quote.

25 Why should any Philadelphian

2 wish to be a slave to Council's
3 wrong-headed rules? On September 15th a
4 pastor's wife in Philadelphia opened fire
5 on an assailant as the family returned
6 home from a concert, including their
7 12-year-old son, Breitbart.com. We need
8 groups like the National Rifle
9 Association and the Gun Owners of America
10 to bring suits against cities like
11 Philadelphia that go against the Supreme
12 law of the Constitution and the rights of
13 the citizens.

14 Dear God, please preserve our
15 rights. Let's support HB 2258 and all
16 similar efforts.

17 Thank you for your time.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you for your testimony, sir. Thank
20 you.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Susan Schewell.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MS. SCHEWELL: My name is Susan
24 Schewell and I'm the Executive Director
25 of the Women's Medical Fund, a local

1 9/29/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 non-profit that provides emergency
3 financial assistance for abortion to
4 people who are struggling to make ends
5 meet.

6 I stand here today with
7 advocates from many Philadelphia
8 communities in support of Resolution
9 160828. We are grateful to the
10 leadership of Councilwomen Bass and Gym
11 and for the sponsorship from
12 Councilmembers Parker, Green, Johnson,
13 and Quinones-Sanchez.

14 Last year our phone counselors
15 provided financial support to almost
16 1,800 Philadelphians so that they could
17 follow through on their decision to have
18 an abortion. One of those is a young
19 woman named Kiana, 20 years old, a
20 student at Community. She works at a
21 fast food restaurant to pay her bills.
22 She grew up in foster care. She's
23 getting straight A's at Community. She's
24 ecstatic and she's starting to dream big
25 for her future.

2 But then she was shocked and
3 dismayed to learn that her health
4 coverage, Pennsylvania Medical
5 Assistance, would not pay for her
6 abortion. That's right. Current federal
7 policy, known as the Hyde Amendment,
8 withholds insurance coverage for this
9 medical care from women who qualify for
10 Medicaid. And the pain and the
11 punishment of Hyde have been expanded
12 over the years to include military
13 service members and their dependents,
14 veterans who receive coverage through the
15 VA, federal employees, and other groups
16 of people.

17 Seventeen states do provide
18 Medicaid coverage of abortion using their
19 own dollars, but Pennsylvania is not one
20 of them. In fact, Pennsylvania doubled
21 down on the Hyde Amendment's restrictions
22 in 2013, passing a law that prohibits
23 insurance coverage of abortion purchased
24 through the Pennsylvania Health Insurance
25 Exchange. These insurance restrictions

2 on abortion have made access to abortion
3 dependent on where a woman lives and how
4 she is insured.

5 Listen to these words from
6 another caller to our help line: I'm a
7 27-year-old mother of a little boy. I've
8 been on my own working and going to
9 school since I was 18. I only make \$250
10 a week. My Medicaid did not cover my
11 abortion. Paying the full cost would
12 have left me unable to pay my rent or
13 some child care while I'm at work. Where
14 would I be if I lost my job?

15 This week on the 40th
16 anniversary of the Hyde Amendment, we
17 urge City Council to join your
18 counterparts in ten other cities, from
19 Austin to Chicago, Seattle to Boston, to
20 pass this resolution in support of
21 women's health and equality.

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
25 have four other individuals listed. I

1 9/29/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 believe they're part of the same
3 organization or entity on Resolution
4 160828. So we're going to call all their
5 names and all four of them just come up
6 and prepare to speak.

7 Mr. Decker, just call the four
8 names.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Seneca Joyner,
10 Emily Bland, Sheila Madali, and Lexi
11 White.

12 (Witnesses approached podium.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you.

15 MS. JOYNER: Hello. My name is
16 Seneca Joyner, and I am asking all of you
17 today to vote in support of Resolution
18 160828. As I said, my name is Seneca
19 Joyner. I am a daughter, a friend, a
20 spouse, a scholar, and a mother, and 15
21 years ago I had an abortion. At the
22 time, I was a 19-year-old working full
23 time and going to school full time with
24 not enough food, money or sleep to make
25 ends meet. And while I had survived the

2 assault that resulted in my pregnancy, I
3 was certain of two things. I was certain
4 that I was -- that being a parent at that
5 point was not what I wanted and also not
6 what I was going to do. So I turned to
7 my family for help. I endured the pain
8 and humiliation that was required to
9 confirm my pregnancy, and I had it
10 terminated at ten weeks.

11 In a lot of ways, I was lucky.
12 I was lucky to live near one of only
13 three clinics that were operating in
14 Georgia at the time. I was lucky that my
15 mother and my aunts were able to scrape
16 together the thousand U.S. dollars that
17 was required to pay for my procedure. I
18 was also lucky that the health insurance
19 my mother subscribed to would eventually
20 reimburse her for those costs. I was
21 lucky that the decision to obtain the
22 care that I so desperately needed at that
23 point in my life would not further result
24 in me sinking deeper into poverty and the
25 poverty of my family.

2 But that was 15 years ago. As
3 already discussed and as some of you well
4 know, the opportunity for people in the
5 United States and in the Commonwealth of
6 Pennsylvania to obtain abortion has
7 become increasingly difficult.

8 In the 15 years since my
9 abortion, I have accomplished many, many
10 things, and no singular action that I
11 have ever undertaken has mattered as much
12 to me in my entire life as the decision
13 to become a parent.

14 Then, now, and always women and
15 their families deserve better than luck.
16 We deserve to have our decisions trusted
17 and we deserve to have the abortion care
18 provided to us regardless of how much
19 money we have or what kind of insurance
20 we subscribe to. I ask you all again to
21 unanimously support Resolution 160828.

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you for your testimony.

1 9/29/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Good morning.

3 MS. BLAND: Good morning. My
4 name is Emily Bland and I am a resident
5 of West Philadelphia. I'm here to
6 testify today in support of Resolution
7 160828 in support of the EACH Woman Act.

8 The lack of safe, affordable,
9 and easily accessible abortion services
10 has directly affected me. In 2012, I was
11 working at a Catholic school. Over 98
12 percent of my students were living
13 beneath the poverty line. I found my
14 profession to be fulfilling in addition
15 to being extremely important, as I'm sure
16 members of this esteemed Council can
17 agree.

18 In the winter of that year I
19 found out I was pregnant, due most likely
20 to what was a birth control failure. I
21 had been on the pill and my brand was
22 re-called by the FDA that year for being
23 mislabeled. However, that doesn't even
24 really matter to me. People deserve safe
25 and affordable abortion on demand

2 regardless of the circumstances of their
3 pregnancies.

4 When I found out I was
5 pregnant, I found myself in an incredible
6 double bind. If I were to carry to term,
7 I would lose a job that I loved because I
8 was pregnant and unwed. If I terminated
9 the pregnancy, I'd face huge financial
10 barriers to the services I needed,
11 something that seemed completely
12 undoable. I would need to take a few
13 days off work at two different jobs. I
14 would need to come up with the money to
15 fund the abortion. I'd have to figure
16 out transportation costs to and from the
17 clinic.

18 As a school employee,
19 especially a Catholic school employee, I
20 was making far below a livable wage. I
21 was working full time at the school and
22 part time as a server just to survive and
23 barely getting by. I had no savings and
24 no way of asking my devout Catholic
25 family members for help. I was stuck.

2 In the end, I had to borrow money from
3 friends in addition to saving money for
4 almost two months, nearly missing the
5 cutoff date for my termination procedure.
6 It was a struggle, but a necessary one at
7 the time.

8 I'm proud of my decision and do
9 not regret my abortion in the slightest.
10 That's why I'm here today to proudly
11 stand with the other women and men here
12 today to support our work to make
13 reproductive justice a reality in this
14 city, this state, and this country. I'm
15 proud to tell my personal abortion story
16 because I'm proud to fight for free
17 abortions on demand.

18 Women deserve more than this.
19 Our partners deserve more than this. As
20 our state and national legislators ramp
21 up a tax on reproductive health, the time
22 to act is now. It is my hope that you
23 join me today in action by passing this
24 resolution.

25 Thank you for your time, and

2 end the bans.

3 (Applause.)

4 MS. MADALI: Hi. Thank you for
5 having me.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 morning.

8 MS. MADALI: Thank you for
9 having me. My name is Sheila Madali and
10 I'm the Director of the Restaurant
11 Opportunities Centers of Pennsylvania, a
12 statewide organization of restaurant
13 workers, owners, and consumers uniting
14 for better working conditions and wages
15 in the restaurant industry. I'm here
16 today to testify in favor of lifting
17 insurance bans on abortion on behalf of
18 myself and the 485,000 restaurant workers
19 who live and work in Pennsylvania.

20 Insurance bans on abortion fall
21 hardest on low-income women and women of
22 color, many of whom already struggle with
23 access to quality healthcare. This is
24 the reality for far too many people
25 working in the restaurant industry.

2 Our industry is characterized
3 by low wages and a lack of access to
4 benefits. There are over 220,000 tipped
5 workers in Pennsylvania who are paid as
6 little as \$2.83 per hour, over 70 percent
7 of whom are women and 11 percent of whom
8 are on Medicaid. As a result of these
9 abysmally low wages, the restaurant
10 workforce in Pennsylvania experiences
11 poverty at twice the rate of the general
12 workforce.

13 It is unconscionable that
14 people can work full time in the
15 restaurant industry and still qualify for
16 Medicaid, and it's compounded by the fact
17 that relying on customer tips that
18 fluctuate widely make it nearly
19 impossible to have a savings from which
20 to afford an abortion out of pocket when
21 coverage is denied by politicians.

22 I myself worked in the
23 restaurant and retail industries for many
24 years and, as a teenager, had to make a
25 really important decision about a

1 9/29/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 pregnancy, and I decided and made a very
3 difficult decision to terminate. But
4 even after making that decision, my
5 struggle did continue because of my
6 series of low-wage jobs. Like so many
7 other restaurant workers, I had no
8 savings and could not afford the
9 procedure. So I had to delay it until I
10 could borrow enough money from friends to
11 be able to afford the procedure, thus
12 prolonging the physical and emotional
13 impact.

14 Insurance coverage for my
15 procedure would have made a huge
16 difference in my life. All women deserve
17 to be able to make the important personal
18 decisions that would allow them to live a
19 life with dignity and economic security.
20 Higher wages and access to quality
21 healthcare, including a full range of
22 pregnancy-related care, are necessary.

23 So on behalf of myself and the
24 Restaurant Opportunities Centers of
25 Pennsylvania, we urge City Council to

2 pass this resolution in favor of lifting
3 insurance bans. All women should be
4 empowered to make the pregnancy-related
5 decisions that are best for them, and
6 this includes the decision to have an
7 abortion.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 Good morning.

13 MS. WHITE: Good morning.

14 Thank you for your time, attention, and
15 action towards reproductive health rights
16 and justice. My name is Lexi White. I
17 am a resident of West Philadelphia in
18 Morris Park area. I'm 24 years of age,
19 an age range that many would deem in my
20 reproductive prime, so to speak.

21 Through my own lived experience
22 and that of the women in my family,
23 circles, and communities, I'm
24 increasingly aware of and disturbed by
25 the ways that barriers to accessible

2 reproductive health services deeply and
3 disproportionately affect the full health
4 and well-being of black women and women
5 of color, young women, poor women, and
6 their communities and families here in
7 Philadelphia but also across the State of
8 Pennsylvania and beyond.

9 Black women and women of color
10 are disproportionately uninsured,
11 underinsured and affected by deep and
12 cyclical cycles of poverty. I believe
13 that these factors cannot be separated
14 from the decisions we make when it comes
15 to deciding about pregnancy and
16 parenting.

17 I currently work as an
18 organizer and community advocate with an
19 organization called New Voices for
20 Reproductive Justice. At New Voices, we
21 advocate for the full health and
22 well-being of black women and women of
23 color and girls through the language and
24 framework of reproductive justice. The
25 reproductive justice and the practice of

2 self-determination reasserts our basic
3 rights to have children, to not have
4 children, and to raise and rear our
5 children in healthy, sustainable, and
6 safe communities.

7 I believe today's hearing and
8 the resolution it represents is a
9 crucial, symbolic, and progressive step
10 for the City of Philadelphia in the wider
11 fight towards removing harmful barriers
12 on abortion coverage at the local, state,
13 and national levels, barriers that are
14 currently imposed by the Hyde Amendment,
15 but that operate alongside pervasive
16 socioeconomic and environmental health
17 and wellness disparities occurring at the
18 intersections of race, class, and gender.

19 To support Resolution 160828 is
20 to support the health and well-being of
21 all women, but especially black women and
22 women of color in the City of
23 Philadelphia and beyond.

24 Thank you.

25 (Applause.)

3 Thank you for your testimony.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Carol Tracy,
5 commenting on 160659.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MS. TRACY: Thank you. I'm
8 Carol Tracy. I'm the Director of the
9 Women's Law Project. And I want to
10 say -- I came today to be a participant
11 here and just listen, but today's Council
12 has seen an inspiring and unified front
13 in support of women and women's rights
14 and women's health. Between the
15 resolution of Women Against Abuse for the
16 iPledge campaign and Domestic Violence
17 Awareness Month and the testimony we've
18 just heard about abortion access, it
19 shows us how central women's issues are
20 to all of our public policy.

21 I also, though, feel that I am
22 compelled to also add my voice to the
23 voices in support of the audit of the
24 Philadelphia Parking Authority. I think
25 that Council needs to make clear that

2 sexual harassment in the workplace is as
3 offensive and of concern to you as the
4 issues around violence against women and
5 issues around access to healthcare for
6 all women. So I want to join my voice
7 and my organization's support in that
8 audit.

9 Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 afternoon.

17 MR. DANIHEL: Well, if it were
18 a good afternoon, I wouldn't have to be
19 here and tell you yet again of what's
20 going on. You would act accordingly.

21 Again, I address my elected
22 representatives, who fail to act by
23 violating your oath of office and 42 USC
24 1982, 1983, 1985, and 1986, 18 USC 2381
25 and 2384 and others unnamed. You have

2 become an elected monarchy. According to
3 James Madison, this cannot be allowed, as
4 you have been informed by me and other
5 people that homes are being taken without
6 any compensation, violating the U.S.
7 Constitution. By doing nothing, you are
8 violating those laws and others.

9 The RDA and now the PHA that
10 you have transferred some of the people
11 from the RDA to have been noted in
12 articles and Council testimony as
13 performing numerous alleged illegal
14 activities and possible theft of
15 property. Reagan said government's first
16 duty is to protect the sovereign people.

17 Taking my home at 1038 West
18 Wyoming Avenue without compensation is
19 not protecting them. Over 22 years I
20 have waited for justice, while the City,
21 some of the Councilpeople, and other
22 officials protested my right to a trial.

23 Our founding fathers and fallen
24 veterans weep in their graves. This is
25 not what they gave their lives for.

2 I in open Council am making an
3 official decree to immediately de-fund
4 the Sheriff's Department, the RDA, the
5 District Attorney's Office, and the
6 Controller's Offices until such time that
7 1038 West Wyoming Avenue is paid for as
8 outlined in Supreme Court documents
9 158965 and the prosecution of all
10 involved for fraud, 42 USC 1982, 1983,
11 1985, 1986 and other laws that have been
12 named and unnamed.

13 Thank you.

14 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
15 other speakers on the public comment
16 list, Mr. President.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

19 Thank you. We will now move to
20 our Calendar. Mr. Decker, please read
21 the title of 160659.

22 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
23 requesting the City Controller to conduct
24 an audit of the Philadelphia Parking
25 Authority's policy and procedures on the

2 administration of its operations in the
3 City of Philadelphia.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Mr. Decker.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Oh.

8 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
9 much, Council President. I move that
10 Resolution 160659 be taken off the table.

11 (Duly seconded.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
13 been moved and properly seconded that
14 Resolution 160659 be untabled.

15 All those in favor say aye.

16 (Aye.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Those opposed?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 ayes have it and 160659 has been untabled
22 and is now on the Calendar.

23 The Chair again recognizes
24 Councilman Oh.

25 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very

2 much. I move that the resolution be
3 adopted.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Do
5 you have a second?

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
8 been moved and properly seconded.

9 All those in favor say aye.

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Those opposed?

13 (No.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Okay.

16 COUNCILMAN OH: Roll call,
17 please.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
19 right. There's been a request for roll
20 call.

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:
22 Mr. President?

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
24 sorry. I'm sorry. Councilman Greenlee.
25 I'm sorry. My fault.

1 9/29/16 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: No

3 problem.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

6 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
7 you, Mr. President. I don't want to get
8 into a long discussion on this, but
9 obviously the purpose of the resolution
10 is to conduct an audit of the
11 Philadelphia Parking Authority.

12 Certainly I don't think any of us are
13 against audits. I just want to put on
14 the record, though, that just a couple
15 weeks ago, we got a copy of a 50-page
16 audit that was state mandated by an
17 independent auditor for the Philadelphia
18 Parking Authority. So in my opinion, at
19 least we need to consider that audit,
20 that document before we start asking for
21 another audit. So I think at this point,
22 this resolution should be rejected.

23 Respectfully, I ask that it be rejected
24 and let us at least all be able to deal
25 with the audit that's in front of us,

1 9/29/16 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 again, a state-mandated independent
3 audit.

4 Some of the other issues that
5 were brought up are certainly serious
6 issues, but we're talking about an audit
7 here and we have just been, within the
8 last week or two, been delivered an
9 audit. So I would ask at this point that
10 the resolution be rejected.

11 Thank you, Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCILMAN OH: May I be heard
15 on that, Mr. President?

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
17 on.

18 The Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Parker.

20 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
21 you, Mr. President. Let me just state
22 for the record that I respect and have a
23 deep level of admiration for my colleague
24 and believe that several of the issues
25 that he has raised regarding the need for

2 an audit and/or overview and oversight is
3 extremely important, but let me just
4 repeat something that I heard a woman
5 we've all been listening to quite
6 frequently say not long ago, and that was
7 she said that, I am a progressive, but a
8 progressive who likes to get things done.

9 And with that being said, let
10 me say that one of the things that I
11 would have liked to have seen happen as a
12 result of the audit we just received was
13 an intergovernmental cooperative work
14 group, Mr. President, established that
15 would have included representatives from
16 our School District, along with our SRC,
17 along with the office of our executive,
18 our Mayor, and this City Council via our
19 technical staff to actually review the
20 independent audit that had been conducted
21 and report those findings to this body so
22 that we could have determined based on
23 data, based on a data-driven,
24 research-based approach that we needed to
25 have further research conducted into the

2 findings of the audit that were presented
3 to us.

4 And, Mr. President, why is this
5 important for me to say this today? It
6 is incumbent upon me, particularly being
7 one who just spent ten years in
8 Harrisburg, and I know what it is like
9 when you are not -- you don't have the
10 luxury of simply being an advocate --
11 and, believe me, the advocacy drives the
12 legislative process from the outside in,
13 but when you're responsible for actually
14 getting some things done on the inside,
15 it would have given great levity for us
16 to be able to say we've done our
17 homework, that there was a process. And
18 I know a lot of time, research, and
19 energy has gone into this, but the layer
20 that I just described -- and I'm going to
21 keep on echoing intergovernmental
22 cooperation planning, because I know what
23 it's like when everyone at the table and
24 we all agree with the findings. Not one
25 branch, not one office, not one elected

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2 official, but every branch of government
3 and/or office that is responsible
4 particularly for funding for the School
5 District of Philadelphia, that they be a
6 part of this process. And I just needed
7 to state that for the record with
8 transparency regarding our vote not
9 support for this measure in mind.

10 Thank you, Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilwoman.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Green.

15 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
16 Council President. I wanted to echo some
17 of the comments made by Councilwoman
18 Parker in this issue.

19 The other thing I would like to
20 raise is that considering I have not
21 personally had a chance to review the
22 audit information that this body has
23 received, I would like to see that
24 information. I also don't like to be
25 spending additional money until we've

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2 actually seen the information presented
3 to us.

4 But also this body is a
5 legislative body where we have hearings,
6 and deferring a review of the Parking
7 Authority to a separate entity at this
8 point without having all the information
9 I don't think is prudent at this time. I
10 would like to see this body take the time
11 to be able to investigate some of the
12 issues and concerns. And with a child in
13 the School District, I'm also concerned
14 about the amount of money that's going to
15 the School District from the Parking
16 Authority as well as some of the other
17 concerns going on with the Parking
18 Authority, but before we as a body defer
19 to a separate entity, I think we should
20 take an opportunity to review the
21 information that was presented and also
22 have a conversation within this body
23 regarding this issue.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Councilman.

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2 The Chair recognizes
3 Councilwoman Gym.

4 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
5 very much, Council President. Thank you
6 very much to my colleagues and especially
7 Councilwoman Parker and Councilman Green
8 for pointing out some -- and others who
9 have echoed some real need for
10 accountability and standards at a
11 troubled agency.

12 You know, I think that one of
13 the things that I'm definitely committed
14 to is working with my colleagues to
15 figure out a good solution to how we
16 approach this. And more than ever, I
17 think what should be made clear is that
18 there has been a number of financial
19 audits. The Parking Authority has one
20 done every year. This one that was just
21 delivered is not much different from
22 others that we've received before, and it
23 is fundamentally different from what the
24 resolution requests, which is a
25 performance and management audit.

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2 Members from the Taxi Workers Alliance
3 have noted that the taxi and limousine
4 service, for example, has doubled in
5 terms of numbers. Those types of things
6 won't immediately be evident from a
7 financial audit. Those would be more
8 clearly determined under a performance
9 audit.

10 I know that my colleagues share
11 a tremendous amount of concern about the
12 news that has been revealed in the
13 papers. I know that we're dedicated to
14 figuring out issues of transparency and
15 holding them accountable when they need
16 to be called for, but I do think that
17 this is an entity that has relentlessly
18 pulled its weight in Harrisburg to lobby
19 against more money for school kids around
20 the Uber/Lyft money. It has systemically
21 underfunded schools for the last four
22 years and refused and in fact dissembled
23 somewhat before City Council in appealing
24 for a rate hike just a few years ago, not
25 ten years or five years ago, and that

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2 troubling issues around potential
3 taxpayer money being given for settlement
4 to silence or quiet victims is something
5 that I know that we're all going to pay
6 close attention to.

7 I'm going to stand with my
8 Council colleague on this, but if it
9 doesn't move forward, I'm hoping that we
10 can work with our other colleagues to
11 figure out another solution.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, Councilwoman.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Domb.

16 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
17 Council President. I'm not sure where
18 this weighs in, but I was just going to
19 give you my business observation, because
20 I have a few parking garages, of what
21 I've seen from the PPA.

22 We own four garages. I'm not
23 sure this comes out in an audit, but I
24 know the PPA was going to meet with me to
25 discuss this. But I've looked at the

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2 numbers and it's probably \$300,000 to
3 \$500,000 per year per facility of these
4 four garages that we could save on
5 expenses and revenue enhancement. That's
6 just one piece, which could be \$1.2 to \$2
7 million.

8 We also don't charge for
9 loading zones. So one of the thoughts
10 was we charge \$3 per hour for loading
11 zones. There's a thousand loading zones.
12 We could generate over \$10 million a year
13 just from loading zones.

14 So there's a lot of revenue
15 potential, is my point, that could come
16 out of this that -- I'm not sure it's an
17 audit or how we handle it, but I think
18 there's potential there.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilman.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman

23 Oh.

24 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
25 much, Council President. This resolution

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2 requests that the City Controller, who is
3 the proper authorized entity, elected
4 official -- we cannot audit the Parking
5 Authority. This Council body could hold
6 a hearing. We've held hearings, and
7 we've had various things said to us that
8 are not true. The accounting that we've
9 seen are very general. And so a
10 performance audit and a management audit
11 digs deep into what's happening at the
12 Parking Authority.

13 The last time a performance
14 audit was done of the Parking Authority
15 was 2009, and both Rob Dubow and the City
16 Controller, Alan Butkovitz, have stated
17 that they believe a performance and
18 management audit is a good idea.

19 I think in light of what is
20 revealed and what is going to be revealed
21 about the Parking Authority, the train
22 has left the station. The issue right
23 now is whether or not the public believes
24 that the City Council is not a party to
25 what has been going on at the Parking

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2 Authority. And I'm just saying public

3 perception-wise. I'm sorry, my

4 colleagues. Public perception-wise.

5 Because what happens is, Vince Fenerty

6 did not act alone. He was in a cohort.

7 He was in an environment that encouraged

8 him and supported him and covered him,

9 and that is what the public wants to see.

10 They want to see that this is looked

11 into. They want to see how far it goes.

12 And to my colleagues who have

13 expressed it, the bill that I introduced

14 withdraws the City parking functions,

15 street operations, garages from the

16 Parking Authority. It brings it back

17 into the department, the Streets

18 Department, and we will go from there.

19 But I think it is -- unless we have

20 legislation and unless we dig deep,

21 because the issues about like the

22 performance audit, they only lead to how

23 we're going to negotiate if we negotiate

24 with the state about how the Parking

25 Authority is run and operated.

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2 And with that, we're going to
3 take a vote and I would make a motion
4 that we have a roll call vote.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
6 right. And I'm not allowed to influence
7 votes or decisions. I just want to point
8 out one simple fact with respect to the
9 City Controller. The City Controller
10 does not need the authorization of City
11 Council to do a performance audit or any
12 other audit on an entity that has a
13 relationship with the City of
14 Philadelphia.

15 COUNCILMAN OH: Agreed. And I
16 will just respond that the City
17 Controller does not need a resolution
18 from us to go ahead and conduct an audit.
19 The Attorney General staff has already
20 said they are looking into auditing the
21 Parking Authority from the state
22 functions, because the Parking Authority
23 cannot be audited by one entity, not a
24 performance audit. The Attorney General
25 does the state portion. City Controller

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2 does the City portion. I think the
3 Attorney General can do both. It could
4 do a complete audit. But why would the
5 City Council not pass a resolution making
6 the request for the City Controller so
7 that we unify in our interests to ensure
8 transparency and good governance of a
9 public entity under such problematic
10 circumstances where even the Board now is
11 being questioned?

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
14 right. Like I said, I'm not trying to
15 influence the vote, but I just want to
16 state out the fact that Mr. Butkovitz
17 does not need our authorization to do an
18 audit.

19 COUNCILMAN OH: Yes. Thank
20 you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
22 just want to give a little clarity on
23 that. Okay.

24 You want to make another
25 motion? You previous -- make another

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2 motion.

3 COUNCILMAN OH: I'd make a
4 motion that we have a roll call vote.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
6 is there a second?

7 (No response.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Okay. There's a significant level of
10 flexibility on roll calls per the
11 authority of the Council President. So
12 I'm going to do this: I'm going to
13 simply ask those individuals, since the
14 voice vote was somewhat unclear, members
15 who support the Resolution 160659, can
16 you simply raise your hands?

17 (Some Councilmembers raised
18 hands.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Five. That is clearly not the majority
21 of the members present. So, therefore,
22 the motion fails.

23 Thank you very much.

24 As I told the witnesses, that
25 you will see your democracy in action.

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2 That you did. Thank you very much. We
3 will move on.

4 Mr. Decker, please read the
5 title of 160797.

6 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
7 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
8 Property to execute and deliver to the
9 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority,
10 without consideration, deeds conveying
11 conditional fee simple title to certain
12 City-owned lots or pieces of ground with
13 the buildings and improvements thereon,
14 situate in the Thirty-Ninth Ward of the
15 City of Philadelphia.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

18 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
20 of the resolution.

21 (Duly seconded.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
23 been moved and properly seconded.

24 All those in favor?

25 (Aye.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Those opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 ayes have it, and 160797 is adopted.

7 Mr. Decker, 160813.

8 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
9 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
10 Property to execute and deliver to the
11 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority,
12 without consideration, deeds conveying
13 conditional fee simple title to certain
14 City-owned lots or pieces of ground with

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
21 you, Mr. President. I move for the
22 adoption.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
25 been moved and properly seconded.

1 9/29/16 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 All those in favor?

3 (Aye.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Those opposed?

6 (No response.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 ayes have it, and Resolution 160813 is
9 adopted.

10 Mr. Decker, 160814.

11 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
12 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
13 Property to execute and deliver to the
14 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority,
15 without consideration, deeds conveying
16 conditional fee simple title to certain
17 City-owned lots or pieces of ground with

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

5 All those in favor say aye.

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Those opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 ayes have it, and Resolution 160814 is
12 adopted.

13 Mr. Decker, 160815.

14 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
15 approving the redevelopment contract of
16 the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority
17 for the redevelopment and urban renewal
18 of a portion of the New
19 Kensington-Fishtown Urban Renewal Area,
20 identified by house number and street
21 address as 2056 East Sergeant Street.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

24 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
25 Mr. President. I move for the adoption

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2 of the resolution.

3 (Duly seconded.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

5 been moved and properly seconded.

6 All those in favor?

7 (Aye.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Those opposed?

10 (No response.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

12 ayes have it. Resolution 160815 is

13 adopted.

14 Mr. Decker, 160817.

15 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

16 denouncing Pennsylvania House Bill No.

17 2258, which would allow for the National

18 Rifle Association and other similar

19 organizations to challenge local gun

20 regulations and hold municipalities

21 liable for their legal fees.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

23 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

25 Mr. President. I move for its adoption.

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2 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
4 been moved and properly seconded.

5 All those in favor?

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Those opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 ayes have it. Resolution 160817 is
12 adopted.

13 Mr. Decker, 160820.

14 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution also
15 naming the 2200 block of McClellan Street
16 "James C. 'Hott' Hudgins, Jr. Way" to
17 honor the memory of James C. Hudgins,
18 Jr., to recognize his years of service to
19 his community, and to memorialize his
20 lasting legacy.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

23 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council
24 President, I move for the adoption of the
25 resolution.

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2 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
4 been moved and properly seconded.

5 All those in favor?

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Those opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 ayes have it. Resolution 160820 is
12 adopted.

13 Mr. Decker, 160821.

14 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
15 appointing Paulette Adams, Jennifer
16 Kates, Michael Koonce, Angel Rodriguez,
17 and Courtney Voss to the Board of
18 Directors of the Philadelphia Land Bank.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair recognizes Councilwoman
21 Quinones-Sanchez.

22 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
23 you, Mr. President. I move for its
24 adoption.

25 (Duly seconded.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
3 been moved and properly seconded.

4 All those in favor?

5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Those opposed?

8 (No response.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 ayes have it, and Resolution 160821 is
11 adopted.

12 Mr. Decker, 160824.

13 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
14 calling upon the United States federal
15 government to suspend construction on the
16 Dakota Access Pipeline and expressing
17 solidarity with the Indigenous resistance
18 to the Dakota Access Pipeline.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. The Chair recognizes
21 Councilman O'Neill.

22 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Yes, Mr.
23 President. I'll be voting no on this. I
24 would vote for a hearing on this.

25 I called a friend I know

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2 through the National Association of
3 Counties up in North Dakota and I spent
4 some time up there a couple of times. It
5 is flatter than flat gets. There are no
6 raised railroad crossings or places for
7 trucks to go over roads. I was told that
8 this has been vetted and compromised by
9 every agency involved. It goes way
10 beyond just what's in this resolution. I
11 think we're just going too far with it,
12 but I would certainly vote for a hearing
13 on it and have people come in and explain
14 why they got to this point. But I was
15 told the train traffic would be, from all
16 the oil that's coming out of the ground
17 there and helping all the local economies
18 and the state economy, there would be a
19 nightmare, and that was part of what went
20 into this. And I don't really care what
21 the reasons are, but sometimes all
22 politics is local and all government is
23 local, and I'm going to vote no, but I
24 would have voted for hearings, because we
25 may some day have a natural gas fracking

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2 issue here and I don't want to get out on
3 a position one way or the other that may
4 be brought up later that we feel one way
5 about North Dakota where we don't know
6 anything and now we got a lot of facts in
7 front of us here and we're making other
8 judgments.

9 But thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 And we need to be reminded that sexual
21 harassment occurs in all industries,
22 professions, and companies and,
23 therefore, no space is exempt.

24 As we speak up and speak out on
25 this issue this morning, this injustice,

2 I also believe we have to be circumspect
3 and we have to be cautious, as there are
4 victims who want to remain nameless.

5 I've spoken with the Mayor's
6 Commission for Women, a number of my
7 colleagues, and heads of women
8 organizations this week, and while I have
9 spoken with multiple sides and
10 stakeholders about this issue, I have not
11 spoken to all sides of this issue.
12 Nonetheless, City Council has
13 responsibility to use our collective
14 voice and have our say on issues that
15 troubles us, issues that sicken us, and
16 on issues that we find reprehensible.

17 In spite of the work that my
18 office and others have done on behalf of
19 women, children, and families, and my
20 office specifically, the women on boards
21 bill, the Mayor's Commission for Women,
22 the Yes Means Yes legislation, we're
23 still reminded that we have a lot of work
24 to do on behalf of women and girls.

25 Laura Bates of the Sexism

2 Project says it best. This issue is not
3 just about women. It is not a women's
4 issue. It is a matter of human rights.
5 To describe sexism, sexual harassment,
6 and sexual violence as a women's issue
7 sidelines and reduces women. Further, it
8 neglects male victims and let
9 perpetrators get off the hook.

10 The good news in doing our
11 homework this week is that our city
12 government has policies that have been in
13 place and were more recently updated in
14 1998, allowing and providing City
15 employees a clear path and course of
16 action during times when they have been
17 sexually harassed.

18 The bad news is that some of
19 our state agencies and quasi public
20 entities still have serious work to do.
21 Leaders and heads of those Boards of
22 Directors have to take serious attention
23 and look to make sure that they encourage
24 a culture that normalizes "see something,
25 say something."

2 While we are encouraged by the
3 action of the Philadelphia Parking
4 Authority, we will formally request a
5 copy of a report that shows evidence that
6 they have taken a closer look to sharpen,
7 refine, and redefine their policies on
8 sexual harassment. We have a vital role
9 to play in helping to combat normalized
10 sexism, and we have a role to speak up
11 for those who fall in this ugly space,
12 but it's clear given what we know this
13 week that the Parking Authority Board
14 should feel compelled to do more when it
15 comes to their sexual harassment policy.

16 I want to thank my colleagues
17 again for working collectively to
18 register our voice in a way that's
19 respectful and in a way that sensitizes
20 us to the victims that have been caught
21 up in this mess.

2 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
3 other resolutions on the Final Passage
4 Calendar, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

7 Are there any speeches on the
8 part of the minority?

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Oh.

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
12 much, Council President. Does crime pay?
13 Do bad actions pay? I would say they
14 sure look like they do. After years of
15 sexual harassment and other accusations
16 that may come to light, the Executive
17 Director, who received \$230,000 a year,
18 resigned, getting \$154,000 a year for the
19 rest of his life. If you ask anyone on
20 the street would you do what he did and
21 pay the price, I think the answer will be
22 yes. And I'm sorry for that.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 Speeches on behalf of the

3 The Chair recognizes
4 Councilwoman Parker.

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
6 you, Mr. President. On behalf of
7 CeaseFire PA, I just wanted to remind all
8 of our colleagues and those who are
9 present that today at 1:00 p.m. there
10 will be a press conference here in the
11 Chambers regarding CeaseFire's efforts to
12 lead a charge across the Commonwealth to
13 give renewed efforts to the fight against
14 taking away a local municipality's
15 ability to enact commonsense gun reform.
16 And we just passed a resolution today. I
17 know, Council President, both you,
18 Councilman Jones, and Councilman Johnson
19 in particular have worked extremely hard
20 on this issue on the local level, and we
21 would just encourage folks to join. The
22 "who" is Mayor Kenney, Council President
23 Clarke, members Jones, Johnson, Parker,
24 Greenlee, Gym, Domb, Blackwell, Reynolds
25 Brown, Green, Senators Leach, Hughes,

2 Farnese, and CeaseFire Executive Director
3 Shira Goodman, again, today at 1:00 p.m.

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilwoman.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman
8 Jones.

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. I guess when President
11 Obama catches a cold, the rest of the
12 nation actually catches on. I want to
13 talk about three S's very quickly -
14 public safety, saving money, and even
15 saving some souls. And as Co-Chair of
16 the Special Committee on Criminal Justice
17 Reform, I thank you for appointing this
18 body to actually start to do a deeper
19 dive into the issue of criminal justice.

20 Today I introduced a resolution
21 calling for hearings to talk about the
22 directional shift from a mass
23 incarceration to reducing of the census
24 up on State Road and possibly even saving
25 the taxpayers some money, but in that

2 what we want to start to look at is how
3 those savings are appropriated. Should
4 we put it back in the General Fund where
5 we do worthwhile things like bike lanes
6 and fixing potholes, because those are
7 important, or do we reinvest in justice?
8 Do we go and look at the programs that
9 are working, find ways to bring them to
10 scale so that we really have a tipping
11 point in this city where young people
12 aren't on the pipeline to prison?

13 We are charged with two things
14 in that committee. One, to stop the
15 bleeding and then reduce the systemic
16 reasons for criminal activity. This fund
17 will be dedicated to the latter. It
18 would be dedicated to finding programs
19 that work to reduce people's propensity
20 to want to do wrong.

21 If you look at Washington, DC,
22 and many of my colleagues and staff have
23 been looking at the whole bail situation
24 and the lack of bail in Washington, they
25 were able to cut out a cash bail system,

2 reduce crime, increase public safety, all
3 at the same time by investing in
4 pre-incarceration efforts, diversionary
5 programs, day reporting centers and the
6 like.

7 The Prison Department was
8 appropriated over 258 million Fiscal Year
9 2017 to keep prisons running at its
10 current capacity. With the reduction in
11 the prison population and size that we
12 anticipate, we will be able to reduce
13 costs and some savings to the City.

14 To this date, we have the
15 highest recidivism rate in the
16 Commonwealth and rivals many in the
17 nation, 60.5 percent recidivism. That
18 means 65 people out of 100 will go back.
19 60.1 percent rearrest, meaning if you get
20 arrested once, you're more likely to be a
21 repeat offender. 41.1 percent
22 re-incarceration, where an arrest doesn't
23 require release, it requires
24 incarceration.

25 So we want to stop -- and this

2 costs us \$94 to \$120 on average a day to
3 incarcerate an individual. What we are
4 simply saying is that we want to move
5 from just being mad at cancer to
6 investing in probable cures. That's what
7 we want to do. If we're going to really
8 move in this direction, we should
9 reinvest, and these programs that the
10 court and that the prisons are doing are
11 beginning to work. We're seeing modest
12 reductions in the census, but if we're
13 ever going to bring them to scale, if
14 we're ever going to stop some of the
15 activities in our barber shops, these
16 young people heading to these prisons, we
17 have to reinvest those savings in a
18 proper way.

19 So I thank you, Mr. President.

20 I thank all those members on the
21 Committee that have done such hard work,
22 Mr. President. And once you start
23 digging and uncovering layers of the
24 onion, you start crying first, but then
25 you start making progress.

2 Thank you, Mr. President.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you and
5 Councilman Johnson for being such
6 significant representation on that
7 Criminal Justice Committee. You guys are
8 doing great work. Thank you very much.

9 The Chair recognizes
10 Councilwoman Bass.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. Earlier our colleague
13 David Oh started out his comments with
14 does crime pay. And it certainly seems
15 like it does for some people, and I'm
16 referring to Wells Fargo and the
17 resolution which we introduced earlier
18 this afternoon. And I just wanted to
19 make a couple of points about Wells Fargo
20 and some of the concerns that I think
21 that we all should have and to state that
22 I think it's really time for us to
23 divest. Remember that word when we
24 talked about South Africa and apartheid
25 and that movement in the '80s, and it was

2 a call to divest assets and for companies
3 to divest and investments, and it made a
4 difference and it worked.

5 And at what point will we
6 decide that we're going to make a
7 difference in terms of these big
8 companies who operate in ways which are
9 completely unacceptable and that we
10 continue to forgive when they say that
11 they're sorry. We continue to work with
12 them and we accept their apology. And by
13 now, we all know about Wells Fargo's
14 business practices, and basically they've
15 admitted to stealing and committed fraud
16 by opening millions of bogus accounts.

17 Now, if I open an account or
18 you open an account in someone else's
19 name and using their information, we'd be
20 behind bars. Senator Elizabeth Warren
21 suggested this, that there should be a
22 criminal investigation into Wells Fargo,
23 and she said, and I quote, "This just
24 isn't right. A cashier who steals a
25 handful of 20's is accountable, but a

2 Wall Street executive almost never holds
3 themselves accountable, not now, not in
4 2008 when they crushed the worldwide
5 economy. The only way that Wall Street
6 will change is if executives face jail
7 time when they preside over massive
8 fraud."

9 And so I want to know, I'm just
10 asking -- and I think this is something
11 that we can discuss further in the
12 hearing -- why is the City of
13 Philadelphia still doing business with a
14 bank that has admitted to committing
15 fraud?

16 The State of California has
17 decided to immediately suspend its
18 relationship with Wells Fargo, and in
19 case anybody hasn't noticed, California
20 is a whole lot bigger than Philadelphia,
21 and if they can do it, maybe we can do it
22 too. And let's know that California is
23 the nation's largest issuer of municipal
24 bonds. California is now barring Wells
25 Fargo from underwriting state debt and

2 handling all banking transactions. So
3 why aren't we?

4 I'm looking forward to this
5 hearing on this particular matter and
6 what we can do to -- what kind of
7 conversation we can have about beginning
8 the process of divestment from Wells
9 Fargo. There's got to be a lot more
10 conversation about Wells Fargo. I know
11 that Congress is having a hearing today
12 chaired by a congressman from Texas who,
13 according to the Today Show, recently
14 received a \$10,000 contribution from
15 Wells Fargo, and he's chairing that
16 committee today down in Washington, DC.
17 So that's very interesting.

18 Just so everyone knows the
19 facts, Wells Fargo opened about two
20 million bank accounts for customers who
21 were then charged fees, penalties, and
22 damaged credit scores because they didn't
23 know that these fees and penalties were
24 then being sent to a collection agency.
25 Fifty-three hundred employees, 90 percent

2 of whom were hourly, were fired. No
3 executives were fired or lost the bonus
4 money that they received as a result of
5 these two million bank accounts.

6 It's the most valuable bank in
7 the world, and right now I just feel
8 like, Wells Fargo, you owe us, the City
9 of Philadelphia, an explanation. We want
10 to know how many Philadelphians were
11 affected. We want to know how many
12 Philadelphians lost their jobs. And this
13 is a bank that holds \$3 billion worth of
14 deposits that run through from the City
15 of Philadelphia. They owe us the
16 answers. How many were fired, how many
17 accounts were opened here in
18 Philadelphia, what was the domino effect?
19 Anyone who has ever bounced a check knows
20 that there's a domino effect from that.
21 There's bad credit, there's collections,
22 there are other bills that are unpaid.
23 What happens. And as we talked earlier
24 about this week being -- or in a few
25 weeks being MED Week, as we talk about

2 small businesses, how were people who
3 operate small businesses affected.

4 So it all comes full circle,
5 and we look forward to the hearing and
6 hearing answers from Wells Fargo
7 directly.

8 Thank you, Mr. President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilwoman.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman
12 Johnson.

13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
14 Council President. I just want to
15 acknowledge as Chairman of Transportation
16 and Public Utilities the incident of the
17 train derailment that took place earlier
18 today in Hoboken, New Jersey on its way
19 to New York, a major transportation hub,
20 reminiscent of the actual same derailment
21 that we had here in the City of
22 Philadelphia regarding Amtrak. At that
23 particular time, our bodies stepped up to
24 the plate, was very supportive of
25 addressing the issue and supporting the

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2 victims and the first responders as it
3 related to Amtrak, and we extend the same
4 support with this particular issue
5 dealing with the derailment in Hoboken,
6 New Jersey and just want to extend our
7 support on behalf of the City of
8 Philadelphia and members of City Council
9 to the particular families as well as the
10 first responders addressing the issue,
11 and just say thank you, Council
12 President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 The Chair recognizes

16 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

17 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank

18 you, Mr. President. To quote her on
19 Monday during the debate, Hillary Clinton
20 said to Donald Trump, "Her name is Alicia
21 Machado." For some of you, that was the
22 first time you heard that name. For a
23 young girl for me when Alicia Machado
24 became Miss Universe, I remember thinking
25 not only is she gorgeous, she has a real

2 body. And I remember being proud as a
3 Latina, who is not average shape,
4 thinking, wow, what an incredible woman.
5 She later went on to do Latina
6 telenovelas and other things. But this
7 week as the highlight of the video came
8 out about Alicia Machado and the
9 treatment she received by Donald Trump
10 calling her Miss Piggy, the housekeeper,
11 degrading women is just not acceptable.
12 That's why I'm always proud to be in a
13 body where we talk about domestic
14 violence, we talk about sexual
15 harassment, and there is no place for the
16 degrading of women.

17 She had an eating disorder.
18 She had to get counseling. And this is
19 not even about the elections, but it is
20 about how we treat women and this is
21 about income inequality. It's about all
22 of those issues that we still have to
23 work on in this country.

24 I was very happy to see
25 Michelle Obama come and encourage people

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2 to participate, because she is right.
3 It's not about the selfie. It is not
4 about the rally. It is about what are we
5 going to do over the next few weeks to
6 demand respect, respect in this country,
7 respect for social justice, respect for
8 women and young girls.

9 And so I'm encouraged, I'm
10 outraged but, more importantly, I'm
11 motivated. So tomorrow I will get in my
12 car and I'm going to go to Reading, I'm
13 going to go to Allentown, and I'm going
14 to encourage Latina women to demand
15 justice for Alicia Machado on Election
16 Day.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilwoman.

20 That being the --

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 There being no additional speeches, the
24 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds
25 Brown for a motion to adjourn.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. I move that Council stand
4 adjourned until Thursday, October 6th,
5 2016 at 10:00 a.m.

6 (Duly seconded.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you. It has been moved and
9 properly seconded that Council stand
10 adjourned until Thursday, October 6th,
11 2016, 10:00 a.m.

12 All those in favor will say
13 aye.

14 (Aye.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Those opposed?

17 (No response.)
