14 ever be a continued beacon of light in
15 this dark, dim society.

17 pray.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Pastor, for those inspiring
22 words.

23 Council will be at ease.

24 (Council at ease.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you very much, and thank you for
3 those inspiring words.

4 The next order of business is
5 the approval of the Journal of the
6 meeting of Thursday, September 29th,
7 2016, and the Chair recognizes Councilman
8 Greenlee.

9 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
10 you, Mr. President. I move that the
11 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
12 September 29th, 2016 be approved.

13 (Duly seconded.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you. It has been moved and
16 properly seconded that the Journal of
17 Thursday, September 29th, 2016 stand
18 approved.

19 All those in favor say aye.

20 (Aye.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Those opposed?

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 ayes have it, and the Journal is

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2 approved.

3 The next order of business is
4 requests for leave of absence, and the
5 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
7 Council President. On behalf of the
8 majority, there are no requests for
9 leaves of absence today.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 Chair thanks the gentleman.

12 The Chair now recognizes
13 Councilman O'Neill for the minority.

14 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. On behalf of the
16 republicans, there are no requests for
17 leave of absence.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair thanks the gentleman.

20 At this time, I would like to
21 dispense with the regular order of
22 business and I would like to thank
23 everyone who has taken time out of their
24 busy day to come down to witness their
25 government in action. We hope your stay

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2 here today is a pleasurable one and, more
3 importantly, a knowledgeable one, so much
4 so that you come back again. So, again,
5 thank you so much for coming down to
6 visit us today.

7 At this time, the Chair
8 recognizes Councilman Johnson, who will
9 present a resolution declaring October 6,
10 2016 to be Prince Hall Day. Would Most
11 Worshipful Grand Master Joseph Jefferson
12 and those accompanying him please join
13 the Councilman at the podium.

14 (Councilmembers and guests
15 approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
17 joining Councilman Johnson, we have
18 Councilman Jones, Councilman Green,
19 Councilman Henon. And I believe we also
20 have our illustrious Sheriff, Jewell
21 Williams, and our good friend
22 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell and
23 Councilwoman Bass.

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good
25 morning.

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2 (Good morning.)

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Today I'm
4 truly honored and privileged to have the
5 opportunity to honor a fraternity and
6 declare today in the City of Philadelphia
7 during our 201st Grand Lodge Session
8 Prince Hall Masons Day.

9 It was in 2007 which I decided
10 to join the fraternity that will help
11 shape who I have become as a man, a
12 fraternity that has helped shape my
13 character, a fraternity that has given
14 countless hours of service in helping
15 others, not only in the City of
16 Philadelphia but also throughout the
17 United States and even throughout this
18 world. And so it's only fitting that the
19 brothers that are standing here with me
20 today be honored as we embark upon our
21 201st Grand Lodge Session.

22 And I want to thank my Council
23 colleagues who are standing with me here
24 today to help me present this resolution.

25 And the resolution reads:

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2 Declaring October the 6th, 2016
3 to be Prince Hall Day in the City of
4 Philadelphia; honoring the outstanding
5 civic and philanthropic contributions of
6 the Prince Hall Grand Lodge of
7 Pennsylvania throughout Philadelphia and
8 across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania;
9 and celebrating the 201st Grand Lodge
10 Session of Prince Hall Masons.

11 COUNCILMAN JONES: Behold how
12 good and how pleasant it is for brethren
13 to dwell together in unity.

14 Whereas, Prince Hall is widely
15 recognized as the Father of Black
16 Masonry. The brotherhood that he helped
17 to initiate is an important part of
18 Philadelphia's historic landscape since
19 our nation achieved its independence and,
20 today, it has a membership of over
21 300,000 individuals in 4,500 lodges
22 worldwide; and

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
24 Prince Hall helped to establish African
25 Lodge No. 459 of Philadelphia, the first

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2 Masonic Lodge for Black Masons in the
3 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, on
4 September 22nd, 1797. In 1815, African
5 Lodge No. 459 joined with other nascent
6 Masonic Lodges in Philadelphia to form
7 the first African Independent Grand Lodge
8 of Free and Accepted Masons, the historic
9 antecedent of the Prince Hall Grand Lodge
10 of Pennsylvania; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

12 Whereas, as the organization grew
13 throughout the United States, the spirit
14 of brotherhood, service, and charity
15 began to truly shine. Prince Hall Lodges
16 were being founded in Africa and around
17 the world; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
19 today, the Prince Hall Grand Lodge is
20 involved in countless philanthropic
21 endeavors, giving back to the community
22 and spreading brotherhood across the City
23 of Philadelphia; and

24 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
25 Philadelphia Sheriff Jewell Williams is

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2 joining with this Council to honor the
3 Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Pennsylvania
4 and extend his sincere appreciation for
5 its contributions to our great City and
6 Commonwealth; now, therefore, be it

7 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Resolved,
8 by the Council of the City of
9 Philadelphia, on behalf of itself and
10 Philadelphia Sheriff Jewell Williams,
11 that we hereby declare October the 6th,
12 2016 to be Prince Hall Day here in the
13 City of Philadelphia in honor of the
14 outstanding civic and philanthropic
15 contributions of the Prince Hall Grand
16 Lodge of Pennsylvania throughout
17 Philadelphia and across the Commonwealth
18 of Pennsylvania and celebrate the 201st
19 Grand Lodge Session of Prince Hall
20 Masons.

21 Further resolved, that an
22 engrossed copy of this resolution be
23 presented to the Prince Hall Grand Lodge
24 of Pennsylvania as evidence of the deep
25 appreciation and sincere sentiments of

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2 this legislative body.

3 And on behalf of the City of
4 Philadelphia, I want to say
5 congratulations.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
8 the Chair recognizes the Most Worshipful
9 Grand Master Joseph Jefferson for
10 remarks.

11 (Applause.)

12 GRAND MASTER JEFFERSON: Thank
13 you. Good morning.

14 (Good morning.)

15 GRAND MASTER JEFFERSON: To
16 Mr. President, Darrell Clarke, to City
17 Council, friends, citizens of
18 Philadelphia, indeed it is an honor and
19 pleasure for me and this illustrious
20 group behind me to stand before you.

21 We thank you, Councilman
22 Kenyatta Johnson, for all that you have
23 done. The Sheriff of Philadelphia, you
24 as well have been a contributor to Prince
25 Hall Masonry in these United States.

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2 We are here this weekend and we
3 will be having our annual session, 201
4 years of Prince Hall Mason in the
5 jurisdiction of Pennsylvania.

6 (Applause.)

7 GRAND MASTER JEFFERSON: We
8 will be housing at the Sheraton at
9 17th -- or 201 North 17th Street, I
10 should say, a hotel where we have about
11 2,500 individuals coming in for our
12 annual conference. This will provide
13 economic affordability to the citizens of
14 Philadelphia. Indeed we do these things
15 not only for ourselves but we do it to
16 help the poor, the weak, and those who
17 cannot stand for themselves.

18 Behind me I have several of my
19 stalwarts that have served this office
20 before me. This side, okay. I have past
21 Most Worshipful Grand Master Lorenzo
22 Cruger, whom some of you might know
23 because he has his name on a few bridges
24 in Philadelphia. We have past Most
25 Worshipful Grand Master Herbert Nathaniel

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2 Gibbons. Those in law enforcement know
3 who he is, I'm quite sure. Next we have
4 an educator in Leonard -- past Most
5 Worshipful Grand Master Leonard Heard,
6 the educator in Philadelphia and was the
7 principal of William Penn.

8 I think that's it. The rest --
9 oh, yes. But we are also here today --
10 after we leave here today, we are going
11 to distribute gun locks throughout the
12 areas of the downtown. The gun locks are
13 to serve the purpose of those individuals
14 that have their guns so that a child
15 cannot get them. We want to lock it up
16 so that they cannot hurt themselves or
17 anyone else for gun safety throughout not
18 only just today but throughout the year
19 and years to come.

20 The immediate people in the
21 back of me -- and they took time to come
22 out of their schedule -- are some of the
23 new Masters that run this jurisdiction.
24 I'm only one person, but I have over 200
25 officers throughout this state, and I

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2 want to thank them for coming.

3 Thank you so very much for your
4 time and attention, and God bless.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Council will be at ease.

8 (Council at ease.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you very much. Thank you for your
11 attention.

12 At this time, the Chair
13 recognizes Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez,
14 who will present a resolution recognizing
15 Hispanic Heritage Month. Would Scott
16 Steenrod and those accompanying him
17 please join the Councilwoman at the
18 podium.

19 (Councilmembers and guests
20 approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
22 joining Councilwoman Sanchez, we have
23 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

24 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Good
25 morning.

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2 (Good morning.)

3 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: It's
4 only fitting as we celebrate Hispanic
5 Heritage Month that we highlight the many
6 contributions of Hispanics and Latinos
7 throughout the City. This year we've
8 chosen to, in collaboration with the
9 Restaurant Association, highlight some of
10 the many restaurant establishments in the
11 City of Philadelphia.

12 There are over 600
13 Hispanic-owned restaurants in the City of
14 Philadelphia, and for that reason, I
15 invited Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds
16 Brown, the former Chair of the Arts and
17 Culture, who has always understood the
18 value of jobs in the cultural industry,
19 and the current Chair, Councilwoman Bass,
20 because it is about jobs, right?

21 And I want to just say that as
22 for Latinos, we're a mixed race and
23 there's no better place to see it than in
24 our food. It is fitting that salsa, it
25 is one of the most heavily used

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2 ingredients in how we cook and obviously
3 in our music also, but it is that mixture
4 of our, for many of us, our African
5 descent, the Taino and the Indian
6 influence, and then our Spaniard
7 influence that I think makes for the
8 spiciness in which you see. Some of you
9 would agree that sometimes we're a little
10 too spicy, but it is only fitting. And I
11 really want to thank the Restaurant
12 Association and the many businesses in
13 the City who have really helped the City
14 thrive. And whether it's a
15 Hispanic-owned restaurant -- I think of
16 Tequila's who's celebrating its 30th
17 anniversary. That was actually one of
18 the first restaurant business deals I did
19 when I worked at a community development
20 corporation 30 years ago. When I see the
21 celebration of 30 years of thriving and
22 the rebirth of downtown, whether it's the
23 restaurant that they own or, as we all
24 know, the kitchen, Hispanics are making a
25 significant contribution to the City of

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2 Philadelphia. So I'm very happy to
3 celebrate this today.

4 So with that, declaring
5 September 15th, 2016 through October 15th
6 as Hispanic Heritage Month to honor the
7 role that Hispanics have played and
8 continue to play in the economic,
9 cultural and social development of our
10 nation.

11 Whereas, each year, Americans
12 observe National Hispanic Heritage Month
13 by celebrating the histories, cultures
14 and contributions of American citizens
15 whose ancestors have come from Spain,
16 Mexico, the Caribbean, Central and South
17 America; and

18 Whereas, this day the 15th is
19 significant as it's the anniversary of
20 independence for many Latin American
21 countries like Costa Rica, El Salvador,
22 Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua, in
23 addition to Mexico and Chile, which
24 celebrate their independence days the
25 16th and the 18th, respectively. Also,

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2 many of you know, Columbus Day or, as
3 we've now pegged, Dia de la Raza, which
4 also falls on October 12th is within this
5 timeframe;

6 The observation started in 1968
7 by President Lyndon Johnson and was later
8 expanded by President Ronald Reagan in
9 1988 to take 30 days -- and you know us,
10 we keep extending it, 30, 40, 50 -- into
11 law in 1988 to recognize the Hispanic
12 ancestry and recognize the many
13 accomplishments and contributions made by
14 Hispanics nationwide; and

15 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
16 Hispanics make up a significant portion
17 of the labor force, working as elected
18 officials, like our own Councilwoman
19 Maria Quinones-Sanchez, CEOs, small
20 business owners, entrepreneurs and
21 homemakers who provide leadership,
22 guidance and support of the values which
23 strengthen our economy; and

24 Whereas, Hispanics in the City
25 of Philadelphia are unique leaders and

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2 exceptional role models in all
3 professions and have distinguished
4 themselves as smart and wise business
5 owners, creating jobs, paying wages and
6 demonstrating that they are a positive
7 contributing force in our local
8 communities and neighborhoods; and

9 Whereas, Hispanics in the City
10 of Philadelphia own more than 600
11 restaurants in our City, significantly
12 contributing to the local food culture
13 renaissance of the City, a movement that
14 crosses ethnic and social backgrounds;
15 and

16 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
17 Chef Jose Garces, one of the most dynamic
18 and distinguished chefs in the nation and
19 proudly calls Philadelphia home, has been
20 leading Philadelphia's food movement
21 since opening his first of nine
22 restaurants in the City in 2005; and

23 Whereas, Hispanic business
24 owners, despite the many risks and
25 personal sacrifices they encounter,

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2 continue to be inspirations to their
3 families, employees and the community and
4 whose success stories we can learn to
5 emulate; and

6 Whereas, when Hispanics
7 succeed, our nation, our state, our
8 region and our City succeeds; and their
9 potential should only be limited by the
10 breadth of their dreams; now, therefore,
11 be it

12 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ:
13 Resolved, by the Council of the City of
14 Philadelphia, that we hereby declare
15 September 15th through October 15th as
16 Hispanic Heritage Month in the City of
17 Philadelphia to recognize the many
18 accomplishments and contributions made by
19 Hispanics, and encourage all residents to
20 learn more about the people who have
21 played such an important role in our
22 history.

23 Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

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2 the Chair recognizes Mr. Steenrod for
3 remarks.

4 MR. STEENROD: Good morning.

5 (Good morning.)

6 MR. STEENROD: Chef Garces
7 sends his apologies that he can't be with
8 you today, so it's my honor to be here on
9 his behalf as the COO of the Garces
10 Group.

11 As a child, Jose spent hours
12 with his beloved grandmother, whom he
13 called Amada, in her kitchen, where he
14 forged a deep-seated love for the cuisine
15 and traditions of the Hispanic community.
16 He later translated this love into a
17 career as a chef and found a home in the
18 beautiful City of Philadelphia.

19 In 2005, Jose brought his
20 passion for what we like to call
21 Latin-inspired hospitality to life with
22 the opening of Amada, a restaurant that
23 he named after his beloved grandmother.
24 Since then, it's been a journey beyond
25 his wildest dreams. As our family has

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2 grown throughout Philadelphia and beyond,
3 we continue to seek Jose's leadership and
4 commitment through staying true to our
5 roots of -- our Hispanic roots of humble
6 beginnings in his grandmother's kitchen.
7 Our goal remains very simple and, that
8 is, to bring the very best of
9 Latin-inspired hospitality to each and
10 every guest every day.

11 It remains our humble privilege
12 and honor to serve you and the entire
13 Philadelphia community, and thank you so
14 very, very much for this honor.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Council will be -- I'm sorry.

18 MS. SUZARRA-CAMPBELL: Buenos
19 tardes, buenos dias. How are you,
20 everybody? My name is Judy
21 Suzarra-Campbell, and I guess I'm new in
22 this community. I don't know too many
23 people here, but I have been in the
24 restaurant business for 12 years. I own
25 the only traditional Venezuelan cuisine,

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2 Venezuelan restaurant in Philadelphia. I
3 have been very happy to bring this
4 cuisine to this country, beautiful
5 Philadelphia. People love my food. So I
6 invite everybody to get a little piece of
7 Venezuela, whatever you wanted to go, and
8 have some Latin cuisine or the
9 Cuba-Mexican. So enjoy one of those
10 days.

11 So my place is located in
12 Spring Garden, 10 and Spring Garden, how
13 you say, 10 and Spring Garden, 941 Spring
14 Garden Street. I have been running the
15 restaurant with my husband very
16 successfully. It's the only location. I
17 don't have the time to open too many,
18 because I'm him own. So I'm always
19 cooking. You will find me there. I will
20 take care of you. I will feed you, and
21 you will be leaving happy, believe me.

22 So I am very pleased to receive
23 this honorable resolution in the name of
24 Hispanic Heritage Month, especially
25 recognizing our great Latin restaurant in

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2 the beautiful City of Philadelphia.

3 Thank you very much, and I hope
4 to see everyone.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Council will be at ease.

8 (Council at ease.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you very much, and congratulations.

11 At this time, the Chair
12 recognizes Councilman Squilla, who will
13 present a resolution recognizing Joe
14 Schiavo and Janet Kalter. Would
15 Mr. Schiavo and Ms. Kalter and those
16 accompanying them please join the
17 Councilman at the podium.

18 (Councilmembers and guests
19 approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
21 joining Councilman Squilla, we have
22 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Domb, and
23 Councilman Henon.

24 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: I just
25 want to say today is a special day and

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2 really for Philadelphia when we honor
3 people. It's so important to realize
4 what it means to have great civic
5 leaders. And not that we agree with each
6 other all the time or have understandings
7 of what the community needs, but to have
8 community leaders and civic leaders that
9 really care about their neighborhood and
10 care about their community is what makes
11 Philadelphia such a great place. And
12 today we're honoring two people that
13 really not only walk the walk, but talk
14 the talk, and they use their own
15 resources, their own time and give back
16 to our city to make it a better place.

17 So today I'm honored to be able
18 to read this resolution, along with my
19 members and signed by all members of
20 Council, because the civic leaders in our
21 society today deserve a lot of credit,
22 and these are two really very special
23 people that we want to honor.

24 So as the resolution reads:
25 Honoring and recognizing Joe Schiavo and

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2 Janet Kalter for their tireless
3 dedication to the City of Philadelphia
4 and especially their Old City
5 neighborhood.

6 Whereas, in 1981 Joe Schiavo
7 and his partner, Janet Kalter,
8 established their furniture and lighting
9 business, OLC, on North 3rd Street in Old
10 City, where they also live. OLC became a
11 significant part of Old City's
12 renaissance. Joe and Janet too became
13 active in the Old City Civic Association,
14 on whose board Joe served for many years;
15 and

16 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
17 Joe and Janet have been highly involved
18 members of the community for the past 35
19 years, as the neighborhood has
20 experienced tremendous growth and change.
21 They have dedicated thousands of hours to
22 making Old City cleaner and greener.
23 They have helped plant, water and
24 maintain street trees all over the
25 neighborhood. They started a distinctive

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2 dog waste initiative, complete with
3 custom-designed awareness posters and
4 custom-made receptacles, which have
5 become a model for efforts throughout
6 Center City and the river wards; and

7 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas, Joe
8 and Janet have donated significant sums
9 of their own money, along with hundreds
10 of hours of labor, to renovating a
11 marquee pocket park on Arch Street,
12 adjacent to the Old City fire station.
13 Joe and Janet also served as unofficial
14 communication leaders in the
15 neighborhood, maintaining a community
16 bulletin board to keep the residents
17 informed of everything that's happening
18 in their neighborhood; and

19 Whereas, Joe has become the
20 City's preeminent citizen authority on
21 the City's new zoning code, which I can
22 attest to. He's in my office a lot. He
23 serves as chair of the Zoning Committee
24 of the Philadelphia Cross-town Coalition,
25 a coalition of more than 20 of the City's

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2 most active civic associations. Joe is
3 also Vice Chair of the Central Delaware
4 Advocacy Group, a coalition of 15
5 community groups dedicated to
6 safeguarding the Central Delaware Master
7 Plan. For most of the past decade, he
8 has repeatedly played a key role in
9 shaping and improving legislation
10 impacting the City's new zoning code and
11 the Central Delaware Zoning Overlay; and

12 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, Joe
13 is unfailingly civil, polite, and
14 thorough, his unimpeachable character has
15 made him a reliable advocate entrusted by
16 multiple civic groups to represent their
17 interests. He is similarly trusted by
18 members of City Council and the Planning
19 Commission to be an honest broker on
20 behalf of the public; and

21 Whereas, together, Joe and
22 Janet are model citizens, for whom
23 Philadelphia should be proud. They have
24 poured their hearts, minds, hands, and
25 financial resources into our city as

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2 business owners, residents, and civic
3 leaders; now, therefore, be it

4 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Further
5 resolved, that an engrossed copy of this
6 resolution be presented to Joe Schiavo
7 and Janet Kalter as evidence of the
8 sincere sentiment of this legislative
9 body.

10 Congratulations.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
13 the Chair recognizes Mr. Schiavo and
14 Ms. Kalter for remarks.

15 MR. SCHIAVO: Janet and I
16 haven't actually prepared a statement,

18 Council Chambers, I may actually be
19 speechless. But thank you all for
20 coming. Thank you for my friends from
21 the Cross-town Coalition, from CDAG, and
22 Pennsylvania Horticultural Society, who
23 came out to witness this award. Thanks
24 so much.

25 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
22 morning.

23 MR. SAVAL: Good morning. My
24 name is Nikio Saval and I'm a member of
25 Reclaim Philadelphia. I am here today to

2 urge Council to pass the resolution
3 introduced by Councilman Johnson opposing
4 the Trans-Pacific Partnership. In doing
5 so, Philadelphia would join dozens of
6 cities - Seattle, San Francisco,
7 Pittsburgh, and New York City - in
8 opposing a deal negotiated in secret,
9 written by corporations for corporations,
10 which, if passed, would exacerbate the
11 power of elites at the expense of working
12 people all across the deal's member
13 states and the world at large.

14 The resolution would send a
15 powerful message to the local
16 congressional delegation and the country
17 at large that Philadelphia stands with
18 workers against the deal.

19 Today I single out for censure
20 one special and crucial provision of the
21 TPP, the Investor State Dispute
22 Settlement, or ISDS provision. Modeled
23 after the North American Free Trade
24 Agreement, these wide-ranging laws allow
25 a foreign company to sue the United

2 States in a form of corporate arbitration
3 outside of U.S. courts when that company
4 feels its profits are threatened by
5 regulations. This mechanism puts at risk
6 nearly every form of U.S. regulation.
7 Financial, environmental, land use, and
8 labor protections could all be at risk.

9 Using ISDS provisions, for
10 example, offshore corporations have the
11 right to sue the U.S. for upholding the
12 Clean Water Act as well as many other
13 host state regulations that might
14 negatively impact their profits. Locally
15 the Green Cities, Clean Waters program,
16 which is creating a green stormwater
17 infrastructure and working-class jobs, is
18 also at risk from the TPP.

19 ISDS provisions threaten local
20 zoning ordinances. For example, should a
21 multi-national waste management plant on
22 the Schuylkill be determined to pose a
23 threat to the City's water supply,
24 rezoning to move it could also lead to
25 ISDS lawsuits. Minimum wage laws,

2 occupational health and safety laws,
3 there is practically no regulatory area,
4 no measure of municipal sovereignty that
5 is not under threat from the TPP. It
6 would have a chilling effect on any
7 attempt to pass local regulations of this
8 kind.

9 These are only a few of the
10 reasons why the TPP is bad for
11 Philadelphia and bad for the country. I
12 hope Council will do the right thing by
13 its city and its workers and adopt this
14 resolution.

15 Thank you for your time.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 morning.

24 MR. RAZZI: Good morning,
25 everyone. My name is Shane Razzi. I'm a

2 member of Reclaim Philadelphia, and I was
3 born and raised in Port Richmond.

4 I'm anaphylactically allergic
5 to dairy. That's including, but not
6 limited to, milk, cheese, whey, butter,
7 and casein. These are all things that
8 are commonly found in most foods. And I
9 joke that I'm going to run out of my nine
10 lives one of these days, but I've
11 actually been in a hospital, my throat
12 closing, purple skin, blown up like a
13 balloon, clinging to life more times than
14 I can count. Every bite that I take or
15 sip that I drink is like a game of
16 Russian roulette. EpiPens have the power
17 to keep me alive for 15 minutes while
18 someone rushes me to the hospital. The
19 price of EpiPens are already outrageously
20 high, and if the TPP passes, they could
21 skyrocket even more.

22 Currently I need two EpiPens
23 close at all times. Plus I need one at
24 my girlfriend's house, my mom needs one,
25 my friends need one, I need one at work,

2 I need one at school. Already at \$300 to
3 \$600 a pop, that's way too much for
4 anyone to afford. I have insurance for
5 now, but there are many Irish Americans
6 who have to choose between this
7 life-saving medication and putting food
8 on their table or paying their mortgage
9 that month. Plus EpiPens expire in a
10 year, so that's a constant expense.

11 The TPP will allow corporate
12 giants like Mylan to keep raising prices
13 to this and many other medication at the
14 expense of your constituents. Innocent
15 people choose to go without. They could
16 very easily die a terribly painful,
17 uncomfortable, and undignified death
18 because someone thought profits were more
19 important than the people.

20 I, along with the rest of our
21 city, need you to stand with us against
22 this monster trade deal that will most
23 definitely hurt the families that you
24 were chosen to protect.

25 Thank you for your time and

1 10/6/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 consideration.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you for your testimony.

5 (Applause.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
7 commenting on 160745, 160850, 160846, and
8 160855.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MR. DANIHEL: Same bat time,
11 same bat channel. Every week I am here.

12 It is criminal this Council's
13 callous disregard of 42 USC 1982, 1983,
14 1985, 1986, 18 USC 2381, 2384 and
15 constitutional violations in addition.

16 The supreme law of the
17 Commonwealth, the PA Constitution, states
18 Article I, Section 1, all men are born
19 equally free and have certain inherent
20 inalienable rights, among which are
21 defending liberty, acquiring and
22 possessing and protecting property.
23 Section 6 says, trial by jury shall
24 heretofore and the right thereof remain
25 inviolate.

1 10/6/16 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Your oaths of office require
3 every public agent to defend and uphold
4 federal and state constitutions and laws.
5 Then how does my decree go unanswered?
6 Why is the Council continuing to do
7 business as usual? The official decree
8 requires immediate action to de-fund the
9 federal -- or the Philadelphia
10 Redevelopment Authority, Sheriff's
11 Department, District Attorney's
12 Department, Department of the Comptroller
13 immediately for failing to act to remedy
14 for the theft of 1038 West Wyoming
15 Avenue.

16 The Council officers, the
17 Mayor, the City have motioned more than
18 once in open court to deny my right to
19 jury trial. This is a complete violation
20 of the multitudes of laws. Article I,
21 Section 11 of the PA Constitution, the
22 court shall be open, and every free man
23 for injury done him in lands, goods,
24 person or reputation shall have a remedy
25 by due course of law. It is criminal for

2 this body to defy the rule of law and an
3 official decree of the people.

4 I see your eyes wandering,
5 Council President. Obviously you still
6 don't give a crap.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you for your testimony.

9 Mr. Decker, before you -- the
10 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
12 much, Council President. I just want to,
13 on a point of order, provide just some
14 information concerning the first two
15 witnesses and the statement, which is not
16 actually correct.

17 The Investor State Dispute
18 Settlement, ISDS, in the United States
19 we're already party to 51 agreements.
20 It's not a new organization or entity.
21 We have never lost a case in front of the
22 ISDS, and that's because the ISDS
23 provides the basic protections against
24 discrimination and other things that are
25 in the Constitution, such as

2 appropriation without compensation to
3 both domestic and foreign companies,
4 investors, and other folks. TPP simply
5 extends that protection that is provided
6 in the U.S. to participating countries,
7 of which there are 12.

8 So that is just a correction to
9 the record. Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Councilman.

12 Mr. Decker.

13 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
14 other speakers on the public comment
15 list, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you very much.

18 We will now move to our
19 Calendar and, Mr. Decker, can you please
20 read the title of 160846.

21 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
22 authorizing the Commissioner of Public
23 Property to execute and deliver to the
24 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority,
25 without consideration, deeds conveying

1 10/6/16 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 conditional fee simple title to certain
3 City-owned lots or pieces of ground with
4 the buildings and improvements thereon,
5 situate in the Forty-Seventh Ward of the
6 City of Philadelphia.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

9 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
10 you, Mr. President. I move the adoption
11 of the resolution.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
14 been moved and properly seconded.

15 All those in favor?

16 (Aye.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Those opposed?

19 (No response.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 ayes have it, and Resolution 160846 is
22 adopted.

23 Mr. Decker, 160850.

24 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
25 urging the United States Congress to

1 10/6/16 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 reject the proposed Trans-Pacific
3 Partnership due to the agreement's
4 negative impact on workers' rights in the
5 United States and across the world; and
6 calling on the Pennsylvania Congressional
7 delegation to unite in opposition to the
8 agreement's ratification.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Before we call for the motion, the Chair
11 recognizes Councilman Oh -- I'm sorry;
12 O'Neill. I'm sorry. Councilman O'Neill,
13 did you want to --

14 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: You said
15 Councilman Oh.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
17 saying I made a mistake. Councilman
18 O'Neill.

19 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 There's so many republicans on the
22 Council, I get mixed up, you know.

23 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: We just
24 set this up to try to trick you.

25 With all due respect to my

1 10/6/16 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 colleague, I support him on anything he
3 does and I have in his district, he does
4 great work, but I just think that I made
5 a decision a long time ago not to run for
6 Congress. Spend a day down there and you
7 probably would agree with me, maybe a
8 couple hours even. But I do believe that
9 while we could have hearings on this
10 probably for a week, hundreds of people,
11 thousands of hours whose job it is to do
12 these treaties and international
13 agreements have spent all this time. We
14 come in here and we get a page. All the
15 whereases are assumed to be factual. I'd
16 probably be against this treaty if I were
17 in Congress, but I have to know a whole
18 lot more than I know today.

19 So I'm going to vote against it
20 for those reasons. I just think it's way
21 beyond our scope.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

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2 Taubenberger. You want to speak on that?

3 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Just
4 for one brief moment. And I concur with
5 Councilman O'Neill and that I would also
6 like to be recorded as a no vote on that
7 motion.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilman.

10 Councilman Oh, you want to come
11 back?

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Well, I wasn't
13 going to say anything, but now I'm going
14 to have to. And I did speak to my friend
15 Councilman Johnson, who I support in
16 every which way. You know, I will agree
17 with Councilman O'Neill. This issue --
18 because I chair the Global Opportunities
19 and Creative/Innovative Economy
20 Committee, I felt I should look into this
21 matter, and I have spoken to various
22 experts, including the U.S. Ambassador to
23 Vietnam, the U.S. Ambassador to Bernay,
24 and from what I can understand, there are
25 two competing treaties. The U.S. treaty

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2 would be TPP. That would be Asian
3 countries, and it would be U.S. led, with
4 a lot of very good provisions, including
5 no child labor, collective bargaining in
6 foreign countries. Every country that
7 would sign on would have to allow
8 collective bargaining, which would
9 actually increase the cost of labor in
10 those countries and benefit the U.S.
11 These are countries that are friends of
12 ours. They want to be part of TPP with
13 the U.S. because there's a competing
14 treaty.

15 That China-led treaty is called
16 RCEP, Regional Comprehensive Economic
17 Partnership. And so if we don't do TPP,
18 we will end up with RCEP. That China-led
19 treaty is quite different from ours and
20 would be detrimental to U.S. interests.

21 I also would say that the
22 Congressional Research Service did a --
23 and that is from the Library of Congress.
24 It's neutral. They did an extensive job
25 of researching, and they found that the

2 Tufts report, with its very negative
3 estimations, was unconventional, has come
4 under great criticism, and they stated
5 that the Tufts model uses very little
6 trade data and lacks important details.

7 Then the U.S. International
8 Trade Commission performed an independent
9 analysis of international trade issues
10 resulting from TPP, and they concluded
11 that TPP would boost both U.S. employment
12 and GDP. And particularly here in
13 Philadelphia, it would be beneficial to
14 us.

15 There are winners and losers in
16 this, Council President, and the losers
17 are going to be on the side of persons
18 who have less education, less skills.
19 And so I do understand why there's
20 concern over TPP. The thing I would say
21 is, those jobs are being challenged
22 simply by the fact that other countries
23 are employing better technology,
24 educating their population, and are
25 competing with us. So 87 percent of

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2 manufacturing job loss in the U.S. over
3 the last ten years was not because of
4 lower wages but because of the
5 implementation of technology abroad.

6 So I will be voting against the
7 resolution based on the fact that I do
8 understand that at least the trade
9 experts and others seem to agree with
10 President Obama that TPP is good for the
11 country.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 The Chair recognizes Councilman
16 Jones.

17 Councilman, I was just holding
18 up on you because you're going to make
19 the motion.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: So I respect
21 my colleagues. Nobody can be an expert
22 on everything in this body, so we tend to
23 lean and draw upon each other when we
24 dive deep into an issue or a phase of
25 expertise, and there are very rare times

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2 when we really disagree with our
3 republican colleagues. We may not always
4 say it because we have to keep up our ID
5 and our registrations, but this time we
6 have a deep disagreement.

7 TPP is trumped-up,
8 trickled-down economics, and at the end
9 of the day, the people at the lower rung
10 in the City of Philadelphia wind up
11 losing jobs.

12 We used to be the center for
13 garment manufacturing. We used to be the
14 center of -- my grandfather walked out of
15 high school, Central, and walked right
16 into a job that was a wage-earning,
17 family-supporting income.

18 The more we tend to export
19 these opportunities, the folk at the
20 bottom of the rung trying to get their
21 first leg up into a society wind up being
22 the losers. So you talk about winners
23 and losers. I understand that there are
24 winners and losers. I don't want them to
25 be in my district. I don't want them to

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2 be folk that used to be employed because
3 they're -- whether it's Tastykake or
4 whatever is now being produced in a
5 foreign country. To the degree that we
6 can keep wage-earning, family-supporting
7 jobs in Philadelphia, we should be
8 involved right here in letting our voice
9 be known about these kinds of impacts.
10 And so we can't just ignore it. If we
11 ignore it, it will not ignore us.

12 Thank you, Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair one more time recognizes Councilman
18 Oh.

19 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
20 Council President. Oddly, Donald Trump
21 is quite against TPP. So it's not
22 trumped up.

23 The other thing is that -- I'm
24 sorry. The other thing is that our city
25 has lost 223,000 jobs in total between

1 10/6/16 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 1970 and 2010. Between 1960 and 1990,
3 our city has lost 300,000 manufacturing
4 jobs. That wasn't because of treaties.
5 That was because of competitiveness and
6 other issues. There are treaty issues
7 involved, but the net for America has
8 been plus in terms of jobs and surplus in
9 trade wherever we've had a treaty.

10 So the issue that I would say
11 is this, that as the U.S. continues to
12 grow and as other countries improve their
13 economic condition, their education,
14 healthcare and other things, they too
15 begin to look at the environmental
16 concerns, healthcare, collective
17 bargaining and other issues, the
18 challenge for us is whether we can stop
19 the world from progressing or that we
20 meet the challenge, as we have done time
21 and time again, to lead the world in
22 education, innovation, and productivity.

23 And so that for me is the kind
24 of critical issue, but at the same time,
25 the rest of the world is forming

2 treaties. You're going to be with TPP or
3 you're going to be the victim of RCEP.

4 It's either U.S.-led with all our
5 concerns about democracy, equality, and
6 the rule of law or you're going to be
7 China-led, and that's going to be a
8 challenge for us and probably the loss of
9 more jobs to Americans.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 The Chair again recognizes
14 Councilman Jones.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: To my good
16 friend and colleague, who we share a
17 great many things with, as Chair of City
18 Council's Economic Development Committee
19 and Commerce Committee, we have shared
20 projects such as Rotem, brought them from
21 Korea, created 300 jobs. I support that
22 because it's right here creating wealth
23 and opportunity right here. I stand -- I
24 try to correct you. It is trumped-up
25 economics still, because my father told

2 me don't watch what I say, watch what I
3 do, and most of his products are produced
4 outside of Philadelphia, outside of the
5 United States and elsewhere, wherever he
6 can get an exploitive opportunity to
7 produce it. So trumped-up economics by
8 any other name is still a rose.

9 Thank you, Mr. President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, sir.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
14 Chair recognizes Councilwoman
15 Quinones-Sanchez.

16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I had a
17 conversation with Councilman Oh, and I
18 appreciate the value of us being in an
19 international market, but I'll only use
20 Puerto Rico as an example, because when
21 NAFTA and CAFTA came to be, Puerto Rico
22 had 200,000 more pharma-allied jobs than
23 it does today, and the reason is that in
24 American soil, we follow EPA standards,
25 OSHA standards, minimum wage standards,

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2 and in the global market, as has been
3 highlighted, child labor and a bunch of
4 other issues are exploited.

5 American-born Puerto Ricans could not
6 compete with Mexico and other places, and
7 we've watched the pharmaceutical industry
8 leave. And the devil is always in the
9 details. It is not just the treaty, but
10 then it is what are the IRS standards
11 that allow these companies to make money,
12 take the money out with no taxes and move
13 that money around within their global
14 industry.

15 So I do think Council has a
16 role in playing -- in voicing our
17 concerns around these issues, because it
18 does impact us. In a city where we've
19 tried to protect manufacturing and be
20 globally competitive, it is important to
21 us, but the devil is always in the
22 details.

23 And just to add, you can't
24 highlight more when Trump says that he's
25 smart because he knows how to bypass our

2 IRS code. That's where the details fall.

3 It's how this income that is generated

4 and how workers are treated lead to the

5 exploitations by big corporations.

6 So you don't have to look far.

7 There's 200,000 people that are

8 unemployed in Puerto Rico now as a result

9 of NAFTA and CAFTA.

10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilwoman.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman

15 Henon.

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

17 Council President. And I do not want to

18 belabor the treaty trend that we happen

19 to be on. I think the TPP has gotten

20 more conversation in this body than it

21 has in the national debates, but what I

22 am enjoying about this, even though it's

23 been a long topic of conversation, is

24 this discussion is bringing us back to

25 our core values of putting people to work

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2 here in the City of Philadelphia.

3 This is the end of National
4 Manufacturing Week. We are visiting
5 manufacturers and CTE programs all
6 throughout the City of Philadelphia. I
7 encourage everybody to make it here,
8 utilize our supplier network that we have
9 with our universities, with our city, and
10 our commodities and our purchase buying
11 power that we have, and let's form this
12 back into our procurement process, which
13 I think is a major focus of this body,
14 and let's concentrate on getting local
15 people, local business, local jobs and
16 utilizing the supply network that we do
17 have here, that does exist, so we can
18 lift some of our people that live here in
19 the City that's in poverty, 27 percent
20 poverty, and increase our graduation
21 rates, support some of the initiatives
22 like yourself and Councilman Jones with
23 trying to reduce our prison population
24 and getting people back to work and
25 reduce our recidivism rate.

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2 So it is about humanity. It is
3 about dignity. It is about respect of
4 the products that we produce. It is
5 about educating our kids to be the
6 future, and it is our responsibility to
7 be smart about that. And we may not have
8 control over what Congress does in its
9 totality, but we do have a voice and we
10 do have a responsibility to stick up for
11 the people of the City of Philadelphia
12 and keep it a priority and to work smart
13 together collectively.

14 So I want to thank the sponsor
15 in this kind of spirited conversation.
16 This is not and should not be a party
17 line issue. Putting people to work and
18 making it here and utilizing our supplier
19 network, again for the third time as I
20 stated here, is our responsibility to try
21 to put in the forefront in Philadelphia.

22 So thanks for the conversation.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 Okay. We now recognize

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2 Councilman Johnson for a motion on the
3 resolution.

4 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council
5 President, I just want to just make a
6 brief --

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Absolutely.

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: A couple
10 brief remarks, and for the most part, my
11 colleagues have already summed up my
12 position, but just a couple of facts.

13 According to the Brookings
14 Institute, NAFTA, which started on the
15 promise that they would create 200,000
16 new jobs, in reality we lost 683,000
17 jobs. The same thing with the U.S.-Korea
18 free trade agreement. There was a
19 promise that they would create 71,000 new
20 jobs. In reality, they lost 40,000 jobs.
21 And so for me, this is about focusing on
22 a treaty that's right now being done in
23 secrecy. Like the whole negotiation is
24 behind closed doors. There is no public
25 input at this particular point in time.

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2 And so for me, as a city if we're going
3 to support such a treaty, then we should
4 have an opportunity to have input that
5 specifically deals with workers' rights
6 and making sure that we are supporting
7 corporations expanding their profits on
8 the back of workers, rather it's within
9 the United States or another country.

10 We have no problem with doing
11 business with other countries, but for
12 the most part, the reason why our country
13 has lost so many businesses, because
14 after NAFTA, most of the major
15 corporations went to go get free, cheap
16 labor out of America. And so I think in
17 this particular case, we need to proceed
18 with caution, and I ask all my colleagues
19 to affirmatively vote for the resolution.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Can
21 we get a second?

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
24 been moved and properly seconded.

25 I'd better hurry up.

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2 Councilman? Never mind?

3 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
4 President Clarke. I think everybody said
5 already what we need to say. I don't
6 think we need to belabor it any longer.
7 So I think we'll have a vote, second.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you. It's been moved and properly
10 seconded.

11 All in favor of Resolution

12 160850 say aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Those opposed?

16 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: No.

17 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: No.

18 COUNCILMAN OH: No.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 ayes have it. Resolution 160850 is
21 adopted.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you.

25 Mr. Decker, can you please read

2 the title of 160855.

3 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
4 approving the redevelopment contract of
5 the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority
6 for the redevelopment and urban renewal

9 street address as 2127 South Sixth
10 Street.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

13 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I move for the adoption
15 of the resolution.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
18 been moved and properly seconded.

19 All those in favor say aye.

20 (Aye.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Those opposed?

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

18 All those in favor?

14 Mr. Decker, call the roll.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

12 The ayes are 17; the nays are
13 zero. A majority of members present
14 voting in the affirmative, the bill
15 passes.

16 Mr. Decker, can you please read
17 the title of 160767.

18 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
19 authorizing the Bond Committee to sell
20 bonds at public or private negotiated
21 sale, to provide funds toward various
22 capital municipal purposes; providing for
23 appropriations to the Sinking Fund
24 Commission for the payment of such bonds;

3 important resolution passed this body. I
4 was very honored to be able to be a
5 sponsor of it. What it really
6 reaffirms -- I'd like to speak on it
7 personally -- is the zero tolerance
8 policy against sexual harassment in the
9 workplace, frankly any place in
10 Philadelphia.

11 Recently in my capacity as a
12 Board member of the Philadelphia Parking
13 Authority, I made some very
14 inappropriate, insensitive comments to
15 the press regarding former Parking
16 Authority Executive Director Vince
17 Fenerty's admitted sexual harassment of a
18 female worker. I deeply regret my
19 ill-chosen words. In no way did I mean
20 to minimize the seriousness of the sexual
21 harassment charge against Mr. Fenerty.
22 These words did not reflect how I feel
23 and the values that I hold dear. I am
24 not that person. My mother raised me
25 better than that. I'm a married man and

2 the father of two daughters.

3 I've made several public
4 apologies since uttering these
5 regrettable words, and I would like to
6 take the opportunity to personally
7 apologize to Mayor Kenney and to every
8 member of this City Council. I am a
9 human being. Like all of us, I'm very
10 fallible, and I beg for your forgiveness.

11 Sexual harassment is a serious
12 issue here and across the country, and
13 last fiscal year the Equal Opportunity
14 Commission reported that 90,000 charges
15 were received. Fully one-third of these
16 charges included allegations of sexual
17 harassment in the workplace.

18 Sexual harassment is
19 intolerable, unacceptable at any level
20 and must be abolished from the workplace.
21 This resolution is a timely and decisive
22 step in the right direction, and I thank
23 my colleagues for introducing it and
24 passing it. And I would like to
25 personally pledge to this resolution my

2 personal energies in helping make this a
3 reality.

4 Thank you so much.

21 again just be clear with the public. So

10 He served as Mayor from 1824 to 1827, and
11 the remarkable thing he did is, he
12 received notification that Philadelphia
13 children, African Americans, were being
14 kidnapped and sold into slavery in the
15 South, and he and the Constable, with
16 funding from City Council, went out and
17 got those kids back. Ten youth were
18 recovered. And then he acted as the
19 prosecutor. They caught the gang that
20 was doing this. But I just thought, wow,
21 I did not know that. It's one of the
22 wonderful Philadelphia facts about what
23 our government did in this critical time
24 to show leadership and humanity, and I
25 just thought this person should be

3 Obama. But the reason that I wanted a
4 word was, it's always difficult to lose a
5 staff person, particularly one who is
6 doing very, very good work, but to lose
7 that person to the United States Navy is
8 I think important for our country, and my
9 scheduler, Andrew Brenner -- Andrew,
10 please stand up -- he is leaving.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: He's
13 leaving very shortly for the Officers
14 Candidate School in Newport, Rhode
15 Island. He was given his commission with
16 your permission, President, in this very
17 hall. I think that's very, very
18 important. I just want to acknowledge
19 the service he's about to give to our
20 country.

21 And, Andrew, thank you very,
22 very, very much.

23 (Applause.)

25 Thank you. And thank you for your

5 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
6 you, Mr. President. I just want to
7 highlight the discussion around poverty.
8 I'm really concerned as I've watched the
9 debates unfold and the campaign rhetoric
10 that we're experiencing that we keep
11 forgetting the theme around poverty, and
12 that's why the legislation sponsored by
13 Councilwoman Gym today and supported by
14 all of us around closing loopholes and
15 being very targeted at when we subsidize
16 development, we expect development to
17 provide, as Councilman Jones mentioned,
18 family-sustaining jobs.

19 But I'm really concerned and I
20 want to encourage all of us as we go down
21 to the last 30 days of this election
22 cycle that we start talking about the
23 issues that are important to us. We as a
24 city continue to experience a decrease of
25 HUD funding, which is vital as we talk

2 about affordable housing in the City, the
3 family-sustaining jobs. And Councilman
4 Oh always refers to this issue around
5 adequate education and really preparing a
6 global workforce. I feel like this is
7 getting lost in this debate. And when
8 you represent a constituency that I
9 represent and a constituency that we see
10 in the City of Philadelphia, I think we
11 need to bring that in the forefront. And
12 so since we're getting visited by all of
13 the candidates, let us continue to put
14 that on their radar, because there's not
15 enough discussion about what this country
16 is going to do to help women, single
17 mothers, to help support public
18 education, and to have a real robust
19 economic development strategy that allows
20 poor people working for -- go from being
21 poor to the working poor and being able
22 to afford a house and send their children
23 to a publicly funded school that is
24 adequate.

25 So I feel like that's getting

3 we need to continue to remind ourselves
4 and, more importantly, the candidates

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
13 Mr. President. I do want to take a
14 moment for two items today. First I
15 wanted to recognize that we have a
16 student here with us from Mastery Lenfest
17 Campus, Ms. Aliya Wilson, who is in the
18 10th grade, who is spending the day down
19 in --

22 here in Council. We hope she'll come
23 back. And she's originally from
24 Southwest Philadelphia. And we're just
25 pleased and proud and honored to have her

3 Also, earlier we did introduce
4 a resolution regarding stop-and-go
5 establishments, everybody's favorite
6 topic, particularly those who have been
7 working on this for many, many years, and
8 I wanted to specifically recognize
9 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown, who
10 I know has been working on this issue,
11 along with Senator Art Haywood in the
12 Northwest. Councilwoman Maria
13 Quinones-Sanchez has done significant
14 work, as has Councilman Jones and Johnson
15 around stop-and-go establishments. And
16 we actually did a tour in my district to
17 see how many of these, quote/unquote,
18 restaurants do we have in the 8th
19 District, and we found 28 of them, 90
20 percent of which don't sell food even
21 though they call themselves restaurants.
22 So what do they sell? They sell beer.
23 And another quarter of them, 25 percent
24 of that number, sells liquor. And we
25 think that that number is actually

2 higher, because there's some funny
3 business going on with the liquor sales
4 as well. These, quote/unquote,
5 restaurants, 70 percent of which don't
6 have tables and chairs, over 90 percent
7 don't have restrooms and over 90 percent
8 do advertise the sale of food on the
9 exterior of the establishment.

10 So our resolution today is
11 actually calling on the Liquor Control
12 Board, along with the Department of
13 Health and L&I, to actually investigate
14 what these establishments are. We know
15 they're not restaurants. We know that
16 they are not bars, but what are they?
17 They're somewhere in some sort of a
18 hybrid in between a liquor store, a beer
19 distributor, and a bar, and we need to
20 better clarify what these establishments
21 are, because children are able to go into
22 these establishments and purchase popcorn
23 or potato chips or candy, which some of
24 them do sell. So that's something that
25 we are really looking into.

2 And also we'd like for the
3 investigators to look at the distance.
4 These are all pretty much in the same
5 types of neighborhoods. We did an
6 analysis and found that all of these
7 establishments in my district are between
8 a one- and six-minute drive one to
9 another, and that there are approximately
10 six per square mile throughout the
11 district. So you have your choice of any
12 of these establishments. And that's not
13 even including the other liquor sales,
14 which would include bars and beer
15 distributors in the neighborhood.

16 So we're really looking forward
17 to this investigation, and I just wanted
18 to bring it to folks' attention.

19 Thank you, Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you so much, Councilwoman, for your
22 diligent work on this. You have 28 in
23 your district. In some cases I might
24 have that many in one block, I'll tell
25 you. So trust me, it is an issue. I'm

13 then the Purple Fox at 49th and
14 Baltimore, and all that she says we've
15 been through. Every now and then the law
16 changes and they take out all we've done.
17 We fought so hard and so long on this
18 very issue.

19 So I'll pull out some of the
20 language and some of the law that we've
21 been through. We did these tours and
22 visited these stop-and-go's where -- they
23 still -- they've come back. The law
24 changes and then we're back where we
25 started with these little windows that

2 are there, where children are trying to
3 buy a candy bar and somebody else is
4 getting a shot, as they call them, for
5 liquor through these little things.

6 So I am going to pull out some
7 of our stuff and get to the Councilwoman.
8 And, as you know, you talk about the 28
9 you have in the small area. We've been
10 through here, and it's just sad when the
11 law changes and we have to revisit these
12 things, which brings me to the point of
13 education. And we all know that two
14 members of the SRC announced that they
15 are going to be gone in short order, step
16 down. And that's another issue that we
17 want to mention, because you know we
18 introduced a bill that passed and it went
19 on the ballot that dealt with the public
20 and how they felt about the SRC and how
21 they felt about our representation. So
22 now we're here again, but this time we
23 are grateful they did. But these are
24 exciting times, because it gives us a
25 chance and the public a chance to talk

2 about what is going to happen in public
3 education and what's going to happen with
4 our representation and what level will
5 exist with the School Reform Commission,
6 with that board and with the public and
7 with local representation.

8 So I'm looking forward to this
9 dialogue that will happen between us, the
10 Administration, and the Governor on where
11 we go from here with the School District
12 of Philadelphia and can't wait for us to
13 have our first discussions all together.

14 Thank you. Thank you all,
15 colleagues.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilwoman. Thank you so
19 much. I'm sure we'll hear a lot more on
20 that issue.

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Jones.

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. In these Chambers today
25 we've talked about criminal justice,

2 poverty, slavery, kidnapping,
3 international trade agreements, living
4 wage, sexual harassment, stop-and-go's,
5 red and blue states. I want to lighten
6 it up a little bit.

7 Yesterday I had a lot of -- I
8 had a really good day. We had MED Week.
9 We had a lot of good things going on.
10 The high point of my day was in
11 Hestonville at a rain garden, redone, a
12 vacant lot that was trash strewn. A lot
13 of bad things happened on that lot.
14 Commissioner Debbie McCarty from the
15 Water Department, people from Cahill,
16 from Parks and Recs, all of them got
17 together and transformed about a quarter
18 of an acre into one of the nicest places
19 on earth. We had a mural that was used
20 tile in, the natural light to glisten off
21 of it. I had to touch the mural. It was
22 like transformative. We had a gazebo put
23 out there. We had rainwater,
24 bio-retention basins added. It stops a
25 four-corner intersection from flooding.

2 It was beautiful. And when I say to you
3 that I'm truly thankful, it took four
4 years of -- Morgan Cephas started on the
5 project when she first got here and by
6 the time yesterday it was completed, but
7 it was worth the wait. And I want to
8 encourage all my colleagues, if you
9 aren't taking advantage of the Water
10 Department's ability to transform lots
11 and save rainwater runoff, you should,
12 because it improved the quality of life
13 in that neighborhood, Hestonville. It
14 increased the property values in all of
15 the circumference of the lot. It was
16 awesome. So if you're not doing anything
17 or particularly my at-large counterparts
18 want to come to 55th and Heston, right
19 off of Lancaster, you come there.

20 And by the way, Hestonville is
21 the family of Charlton Heston. So it has
22 some historical value beyond just a
23 beautiful place to live, work, and play.

24 Thank you, Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Squilla.

5 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I just got a quick
7 reminder for tomorrow, Friday at noon.
8 You can join me for the Columbus Day
9 resolution and then we're followed by a
10 great Italian lunch right over in the
11 Caucus Room. So if anybody is hungry
12 tomorrow here in Council.

13 Sunday is the annual parade
14 down South Broad Street. We'll step off
15 at Broad and McKean at 11:30 and then
16 proceed to Marconi Plaza for a great
17 Italian festival. We hope everybody will
18 join us, except for Hurricane Matthew.
19 So it should be a good time.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

22 This concludes the speeches on
23 behalf of the -- with the exception of
24 one more. No? Okay. You're going to
25 do the --
