2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If
6 members will take their seats, we're
7 going to get started now. We have a
8 quorum. If guests and visitors will
9 retire behind the rail, we will get
10 started. And we will start with our
11 invocation.

12 To give our invocation this
13 morning, the Chair recognizes a good
14 friend of ours, the Honorable Joanna
15 McClinton. She is here today as the
16 guest of Councilwoman Blackwell. We must
17 say that having a dual role of being an
18 awesome State Representative, we really
19 appreciate you taking time out of your
20 day to come down and give us some
21 spiritual advice.

22 Honorable, thank you so much.

23 REPRESENTATIVE McCLINTON: Dear
24 Lord, we thank you and praise you, for
25 this is the day that you have made.

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2 We're rejoicing and we're glad.

3 Father, we thank you for this
4 awesome city that I've been blessed to
5 call home my entire life. God, I thank
6 you because we are the City of Brotherly
7 Love and Sisterly Affection. And it's my
8 prayer this morning that love would
9 abound.

10 You told us to love our
11 neighbors as ourself. So, Father, I
12 thank you for every distinguished leader
13 in this Chambers. I thank you for their
14 life commitment to service. I thank you

16 and day out and their staff and all those

18 Father, it's our prayer today
19 that you not only bless this session, but
20 that you would move through each of these
21 leaders. God, you know everything that
22 we stand in need of. You know what our
23 families are in need of. You know what
24 our children are in need of. So I pray
25 especially for these members that you

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2 would just meet every one of their needs,
3 that you would strengthen them from the
4 inside out.

6 sufficient for us and you strengthen us
7 in our weakness. So, Father, I pray that
8 you be with them at every moment of the
9 day that they lead. I pray that through
10 these vessels, great changes will come
11 about in our city.

14 and that they be able to work together to
15 implement them to help all those who are

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you so much, Honorable.

6 Council will be at ease.

7 (Council at ease.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you all very much.

10 The next order of business is
11 the approval of the Journal of the
12 meeting of Thursday, October 6th, 2016,
13 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Greenlee.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
16 you, Mr. President. I move that the
17 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
18 October 6th, 2016 be approved.

19 (Duly seconded.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It
21 has been moved and properly seconded that
22 the Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
23 October 6th, 2016 stand approved.

24 All those in favor say aye.

25 (Aye.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Those opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

6 ayes have it, and the Journal is

7 approved.

8 The next order of business is

9 requests for leaves of absence, and the

10 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

12 Mr. President. On behalf of the

13 majority, there are no requests of leaves

14 of absence today.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

16 Chair thanks the gentleman.

17 The Chair on behalf of the

18 minority recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

19 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,

20 Mr. President. On behalf of the

21 republicans, there are no requests for

22 leave of absence.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

24 Chair thanks the gentleman.

25 At this time, I would just like

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2 to thank everyone who has taken time out
3 of their busy day to come down to witness
4 their government in action, clearly
5 unlike the government in Washington, but
6 I'm not going to get into that today. We
7 really appreciate you being here. This
8 hopefully will be an experience that will
9 be knowledgeable and pleasurable, so much
10 so that you come back again. So, again,
11 thank you for coming down today.

12 At this time, the Chair
13 recognizes Councilman Oh, who will
14 present a resolution urging the United
15 States Department of Defense to include
16 the names of the 74 fallen sailors of the
17 U.S.S. Frank E. Evans on the Vietnam
18 Veterans Memorial. Would Tom Corcoran,
19 Suzanne Meissler, and those accompanying
20 them please join the Councilman at the
21 podium.

22 (Councilmembers and guests
23 approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
25 joining Councilman Oh, we have Councilman

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2 Jones, Councilman Henon, and Councilman
3 Domb and Councilwoman Parker and
4 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

5 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
6 much, President. As we gather, I'd just
7 like to state that we did a flag raising.
8 We raised the family flag, the flag that
9 draped the body of Seaman Patrick M.
10 Corcoran. That is the only object the
11 family has to remember their son and
12 their brother, because he and 73 sailors
13 perished when their destroyer was cut in
14 two by an Australian aircraft carrier.
15 They had shell benang (ph). They were
16 ordered out of the perimeter. They
17 reloaded, but the accident occurred
18 outside of the war zone. Therefore,
19 their names are not on the wall of those
20 who were killed during the Vietnam War.

21 That flag is flying, and it
22 will be returned to the family later
23 today.

24 At this time, I'd like to
25 present this resolution, and I'm joined

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2 by my Council colleagues and the family
3 of Patrick Corcoran as well as friends of
4 the family, who I ask to join us
5 afterwards when we take a picture.

6 This is a resolution urging the
7 United States Department of Defense to
8 include the names of the 74 fallen
9 sailors of the U.S.S. Frank E. Evans on
10 the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, including
11 Philadelphia native Patrick Michael
12 Corcoran.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, a
14 Philadelphia native kid, Patrick A.
15 Corcoran, remembered as a typical "Irish
16 Catholic Philly kid," graduated from
17 Father Judge High School in 1968.
18 Concerned by the threat of the United
19 States Army draft and the harrowing death
20 toll of the Vietnam War, Corcoran joined
21 the United States Navy; and

22 Whereas, Corcoran served for
23 several months aboard the U.S.S. Frank E.
24 Evans, which had already collected four
25 battle stars for action during the

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2 Vietnam War; and

3 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, on
4 March 29th, 1969, the officers and men of
5 the U.S.S. Frank E. Evans departed Long
6 Beach, California towards Vietnam for the
7 Western Pacific Deployment with the
8 United States Navy to carry out the
9 operational orders of their Commander in
10 Chief; and

11 Whereas, on June 3rd, 1969, the
12 U.S.S. Frank E. Evans, while on an allied
13 naval exercise, collided with the
14 Australian aircraft carrier, HMAS
15 Melbourne, in the South China Sea near
16 the coast of Vietnam; and

17 Whereas, the collision took the
18 lives of 74 American sailors. Within a
19 year after his high school graduation,
20 Patrick Corcoran was one of the
21 casualties; and

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
23 members of the United States Armed Forces
24 who died during the Vietnam War have been
25 memorialized by having their names

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2 engraved on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial
3 in Washington, DC; and

4 Whereas, the Department of
5 Defense, despite the favorable
6 endorsement of the Department of the Navy
7 that the names be added to "The Wall" in
8 Washington, continues to falsely maintain
9 that the men who died aboard the U.S.S.
10 Frank E. Evans do not meet the criteria
11 for inclusion of the Vietnam Veterans
12 Memorial because the accident occurred
13 outside of the combat zone when, in fact,
14 the ship and every other American ship in
15 the vicinity was awarded a Vietnam
16 Service Medal on that day of the very
17 accident; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
19 the Vietnam War's combat zone boundaries,
20 which were ill defined and changed from
21 time to time -- talk about a moving
22 target -- should not be applied to
23 exclude the names of the lost sailors
24 from the Memorial because other members
25 of the United States Armed Forces who

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2 died outside the designated Vietnam War
3 combat zone have had their names placed
4 on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial; and

5 Whereas, the Vietnam Veterans
6 Memorial in Washington still does not
7 recognize Philadelphia's own Patrick
8 Corcoran and his 73 shipmates, five of
9 whom were from Pennsylvania. Yet the
10 Philadelphia Vietnam Veterans Memorial
11 lists Corcoran as a casualty, as many
12 state and city Vietnam veteran memorials
13 include this group of fallen American
14 sailors and heroes; and

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
16 the U.S.S. Frank E. Evans Association and
17 Patrick Corcoran's family have petitioned
18 the Department of Defense for decades to
19 have the names of the 74 sailors
20 inscribed on the Vietnam Veterans
21 Memorial in Washington, DC. Philadelphia
22 City Council adopted Resolution 140660,
23 introduced by Councilman Dennis O'Brien
24 and Councilman David Oh, on September
25 18th, 2014, "Urging the United States

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2 Department of Defense to include the
3 names of the 74 fallen sailors of the
4 Destroyer U.S.S. Frank E. Evans on the
5 Vietnam Veterans Memorial." The United
6 States House of Representatives also
7 passed a resolution in 2014 urging the
8 inclusion of the names on the memorial,
9 and the Veterans of Foreign Wars passed a
10 similar measure at the national
11 convention; now, therefore, be it

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Resolved, by
13 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
14 that we urge the United States Department
15 of Defense to include the names of the 74
16 fallen sailors of the U.S.S. Frank E.
17 Evans on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial,
18 including Philadelphia native Patrick
19 Michael Corcoran.

20 Further resolved, that an
21 engrossed copy of this resolution be
22 presented to Thomas Corcoran, Patrick
23 Corcoran's brother, evidencing the
24 sincere admiration and respect of this
25 legislative body.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
4 the Chair recognizes Mr. Corcoran for
5 remarks.

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
7 Council President. Joining us is the
8 sister as well, Suzanne Corcoran, and I
9 would like to point out that our
10 Executive Director, Scott Brown, of the
11 Philadelphia Veterans Advisory Commission
12 is here, along with Joe Griffies, a
13 veterans advocate and radio show host,
14 and just point out that today is the
15 Navy's 241st birthday. All right.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Happy birthday.

18 (Applause.)

19 MR. CORCORAN: Good morning.
20 This has been an absolute humbling
21 morning for my sister and I and our
22 entire family, who is here joining us.
23 This has been quite a ride. It's been 47
24 years since the accident occurred.
25 There's been a lot of trials and

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2 tribulations in trying to get Patrick's
3 name and the 73 sailors on the wall in
4 Vietnam. And my sister and I, we'd just
5 like to thank each and every one of you
6 for making this such a great day for us.
7 Also for putting this resolution together
8 to try to get Patrick Corcoran's name,
9 along with the 73 other sailors, onto the
10 wall in Vietnam.

11 I wholeheartedly, my sister
12 also, want to thank each and every one of
13 you individually. We would like to do
14 that. But thank you again for making
15 this possible. My dad and my mother, who
16 aren't here today with us, they must be
17 above us right now just smiling down. So
18 thank you again for making this such a
19 great day and for also making it such an
20 honorable day for Patrick Corcoran and
21 those 73 sailors aboard the Frank E.
22 Evans.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Council will be at ease.

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2 COUNCILMAN OH: Would all the
3 friends please come up and join us for
4 this photograph. Thank you.

5 (Council at ease.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you very much.

8 At this time, the Chair
9 recognizes Councilman Domb, who will
10 present a resolution honoring the late Ed
11 Snider. Would Craig Snider and those
12 accompanying him please join the
13 Councilman at the podium.

14 (Councilmembers and guests
15 approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
17 joining Councilman Domb, we have
18 Councilman Green, Councilwoman
19 Quinones-Sanchez, Councilman Johnson,
20 Councilman Squilla, Councilman Henon,
21 Councilwoman Parker, Councilman
22 Taubenberger, and Councilwoman Gym and
23 Councilwoman Bass.

24 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Today we
25 honor the late Ed Snider. Before we get

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2 started, I just wanted to say a few
3 words. You talk about entrepreneurship.
4 This is a man who's created a tremendous
5 amount of jobs in Philadelphia, a
6 Philadelphia icon in the sports world and
7 in the business world. And when you
8 think about it, I mean, today I just
9 learned that there's over 3,200 jobs
10 affiliated with the Flyers organization
11 that Ed Snider created but, more
12 importantly, it's the charitable work
13 that Ed Snider did, which is pretty
14 amazing, which you'll hear about. But
15 also when you think about it,
16 entrepreneurism -- and I know that
17 Council President tomorrow is having an
18 event on entrepreneurship tomorrow, if I
19 recall right.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

21 COUNCILMAN DOMB: So here's a
22 man like Ed Snider who would have been
23 great to have at that event. And for
24 those of you that don't know about it,
25 there's an event tomorrow on

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2 entrepreneurism being hosted by Council
3 President Clarke. We should get the word
4 out. People should attend.

5 So let me start with the
6 resolution. Today we're honoring and
7 remembering the late Ed Snider,
8 co-founder and owner of the Philadelphia
9 Flyers for nearly 50 years who passed
10 away Monday, April 11th, 2016 at the age
11 of 83 after a long battle with bladder
12 cancer.

13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
14 Ed Snider, known as one of the most
15 enthusiastic sports owners in
16 Philadelphia history, formed the
17 Philadelphia Flyers with several partners
18 when Philadelphia was awarded an
19 expansion team in 1966;

20 Whereas, despite the fact that
21 Philadelphia was a city with no hockey
22 tradition, base of hockey fans or an
23 arena, the Spectrum was built on Broad
24 Street in the 2nd Councilmanic District
25 and Ed Snider and the Flyers turned

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2 Philadelphia into a town that loved
3 bare-knuckle fights on the ice and one
4 proud to bear the name, the "Broad Street
5 Bullies"; and

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas, in
7 1974 and 1975, the Flyers won consecutive
8 Stanley Cup Championships making the
9 Flyers the National Hockey League's first
10 expansion team to win the hockey's holy
11 grail.

12 And my neighbor, by the way,
13 who made me listen to those albums --
14 they used to have albums of Gene Hart
15 during the series, and I've listened to
16 them for about three years straight. So
17 I still hope he has them.

18 Whereas
19 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: And
20 whereas, Councilman Al Taubenberger's
21 life was changed because he became an
22 avid hockey fan.

23 Even though the Flyers have not
24 won any Stanley Cups since the team has
25 become one of the best in the National

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2 Hockey League, making the playoffs 38
3 times and playing in six more Stanley Cup
4 Finals, the last in 2010.

5 And as a season ticket holder,
6 there's a lot of things that are going to
7 happen in a positive way.

8 Whereas

9 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, Ed
10 Snider became one of the most influential
11 National Hockey League owners, attending
12 nearly all of the Flyers' home games and
13 creating an organization that felt like a
14 family; and

15 Whereas, in 1999, a
16 Philadelphia Daily News poll named Ed
17 Snider the City's greatest sports mover
18 and shaker, surpassing basketball
19 broadcaster Sonny Hill and the legendary
20 Athletics manager, Connie Mack; and

21 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
22 Whereas in 1980, Ed Snider received the
23 Lester Patrick Trophy for contributions
24 to hockey in the United States and was
25 inducted into four Hall of Fames: the

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2 Hockey Hall of Fame (1988), the
3 Philadelphia Jewish Sports Hall of Fame
4 (1997), the Philadelphia Sports Hall of
5 Fame (2005) and the United States Hockey
6 Hall of Fame (2011); and

7 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
8 Ed Snider's most important legacy,
9 however, is the Ed Snider Youth Hockey
10 Foundation, created by Ed in 2005, which
11 promotes life skills and hockey through
12 after-school, recreational and
13 supplemental educational activities for
14 children and families in Philadelphia and
15 Camden, New Jersey and is provided at no
16 cost and focused on underserved boys and
17 girls who would not otherwise have the
18 opportunity to play. And one of those
19 sites is in the 9th District at Simons
20 Recreation Center.

21 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: And
22 whereas, among other things, Ed Snider's
23 Foundation partnered with the City and
24 State on a \$14.5 million project to
25 refurbish four Philadelphia rinks for

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2 year-round use and today serves
3 approximately 30,000 children in
4 Philadelphia and Camden with a plan to
5 double the size of the program over the
6 next several years. The 7th has a rink
7 and a playground supported by the Snider
8 Foundation, so we're very happy.

9 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
10 there are very few owners in the history
11 of sports that have the decades-long
12 legacy of Ed Snider. From the founding
13 of the franchise through over 40 years of
14 stewardship, his dedication to the Flyers
15 and the City of Philadelphia can't be
16 celebrated enough as we mourn his loss;
17 now, therefore, be it

18 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Resolved,
19 that the Council of the City of
20 Philadelphia hereby honors and remembers
21 the late Ed Snider, co-founder and owner
22 of the Philadelphia Flyers for nearly 50
23 years who passed away Monday, April 11th,
24 2016 at the age of 83 after a long battle
25 with bladder cancer.

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2 One other thing I wanted to
3 mention, though, is that besides being a
4 great entrepreneur and a great
5 philanthropist, Ed was also a great dad
6 and a wonderful grandfather. He had six
7 children, 15 grandchildren. And today
8 we're blessed to have his sister,
9 Phyllis, from Chevy Chase, Maryland here
10 with us today right behind, Phyllis, and
11 three of his children, Lindy, Craig, and
12 Sarena, and Craig's wife, Edna. So I
13 thank them for being here today, and
14 can't say enough about Ed Snider and what
15 he did for the City of Philadelphia.

16 Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
19 the Chair recognizes Mr. Snider for
20 remarks.

21 MR. SNIDER: Hello. Members of
22 the City Council and Councilman Domb,
23 thank you for honoring my father, Ed
24 Snider, here at City Hall today. My name
25 is Craig Snider and I was 10 years old

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2 when my dad pulled me and my younger
3 brother, Jay, aside and told us not to
4 worry. He was an Eagle then, but he was
5 about to become a Flyer.

6 He was only 33 years old when
7 he mortgaged all he owned to start the
8 Flyers. It was a family affair from the
9 start. His sister, Phyllis, is here with
10 me today. She named the team. My mother
11 designed the Flyerette uniforms. And
12 Freddie Flyer, well, I don't know who
13 designed Freddie, but we were all there
14 sitting in Section T, Row 11 when the
15 very first puck was dropped at the
16 Spectrum at the first game. I can still
17 remember the roar of the fans. No, it
18 was not a sellout. It was those loud air
19 conditioning fans overhead that would
20 never be heard again once the Flyers took
21 off. But we did hear the mighty roar of
22 Philadelphia's real fans on the road to
23 those two Stanley Cups in '74 and in '75
24 and in every playoff run since Clarkie
25 started off with guys like Moose and

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2 Bird, Hammer and Hound, Dorney, Bernie,
3 and the Watson brothers. I'll never
4 forget when old man Watson came down from
5 Smithers, British Columbia straight from
6 the farm to hoist the Cup with his boys.
7 We were family then and we're family now,
8 50 years later. Amazing. And my dad
9 knew he was leaving the organization in
10 good hands with Brian Roberts and the
11 Comcast team, which adopted Ed Snider and
12 the Flyers 20 years ago.

13 Dad said Philly fans were the
14 greatest fans on earth. He fought year
15 in and year out to bring the Cup back to
16 Philadelphia as much for them as for
17 himself.

18 Ed Snider wasn't born here, but
19 Philadelphia became his true home, and I
20 am honored to represent the Snider family
21 in accepting this special resolution on
22 his behalf.

23 Thank you all very much.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Council will be at ease.

3 (Council at ease.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you.

6 At this time, the Chair
7 recognizes Councilman Domb, who will
8 present a resolution honoring the
9 Philadelphia Flyers on their 50th
10 Anniversary. Would Paul Holmgren and
11 those accompanying him please join the
12 Councilman at the podium.

13 (Councilmembers and guests
14 approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
16 joining Councilman Domb, we have
17 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, Councilman
18 Henon, Councilman Taubenberger,
19 Councilman Squilla, Councilman Greenlee,
20 Councilman Oh, Councilwoman
21 Quinones-Sanchez, Councilman Green,
22 Councilwoman Bass, Councilman Jones,
23 O'Neill, and Johnson.

24 Councilwoman, you need to come
25 up here. I don't know if you have a

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2 role, if you have a speaking role, but
3 you probably should be up here.
4 Councilwoman Blackwell, you probably need
5 to come up here too. They're not
6 speaking. They just look lonely out
7 there.

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: I'd like to
9 honor today, of course, the Philadelphia
10 Flyers on their 50th Anniversary. So
11 we'll get started with the resolution.
12 And we have here today from the Flyers
13 Shawn Tilger, John Page, and Paul
14 Holmgren. So let's get started.

15 Honoring and recognizing the
16 Philadelphia Flyers on their 50th
17 Anniversary and acknowledging the
18 2016-2017 hockey season as the 50th
19 Anniversary season of Philadelphia Flyers
20 hockey.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
22 February the 9th of 2016 marked the 50th
23 year anniversary of the NHL announcement
24 that Philadelphia would be among six
25 expansion teams for the 1967-'68 season;

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2 and

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
4 the early group called The Philadelphia
5 Hockey Group, Incorporated, included Ed
6 Snider, then treasurer of the
7 Philadelphia Eagles, coach Keith Allen
8 and general manager Norman "Bud" Poile,
9 and was given little over a year to
10 present a \$2 million expansion fee to
11 guarantee its entry; and

12 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas,
13 on February 8th, 1966, in order to close
14 the deal in obtaining the franchise, Ed
15 Snider traveled to New York to present
16 their plan to the convened NHL owners,
17 which promised the building of a modern,
18 15,000-seat arena in Philadelphia, later
19 named the Spectrum by Lou Scheinfeld, the
20 Flyers' first vice president of business
21 operations; and

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, the
23 following day, Philadelphia was
24 officially awarded a conditional NHL
25 franchise, the condition was to deliver

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2 on the promise of a state-of-the-art
3 arena and pay the franchise fee; and

4 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

5 Whereas, the Philadelphia Flyers not only
6 made good on their promise, but were also
7 the first expansion team in the
8 post-Original Six era to win the Stanley
9 Cup, victorious in 1973-1974 and again in
10 1974 and 1975. And Al Taubenberger was
11 there for 49 of the 50 years.

12 Whereas

13 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
14 since their first season in 1967-'68 the
15 Flyers have an all-time points percentage
16 of 57.7 percent, as of the 2015-2016 NHL
17 season, the second best in the NHL,
18 behind only the Montreal Canadiens and
19 the Boston Bruins at 60.1 percent;

20 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: And
21 whereas, the Flyers also have the most
22 appearances in the conference finals of
23 all the 24 expansion teams with 16
24 appearances and 8 wins, and they are
25 second behind the St. Louis Blues for the

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2 most playoff appearances out of all the
3 expansion teams with 38 out of 48
4 seasons, of which Al was in 49 of them;

5 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
6 although the Flyers have not won a
7 Stanley Cup since the '74-'75 season,
8 there have been plenty of other
9 highlights, including the 1976 win over
10 the Soviet Red Army and the NHL record
11 for the longest undefeated streak with 35
12 games during their '79 through '80
13 season; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
15 the Flyers currently have eighteen
16 personnel in the Hockey Hall of Fame,
17 including famed players Bernie Parent,
18 Bobby Clarke, Bill Barber, Mark Howe and
19 Eric Lindros; and

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
21 when asked to comment about the Flyers
22 50th Anniversary, the late Ed Snider
23 said, "It's hard to believe that we're
24 going to be celebrating our 50th
25 anniversary. It feels like it was just

2 yesterday when the National Hockey League
3 awarded us the expansion franchise. In
4 our first season, The Hockey News thought
5 we would most likely not succeed, but
6 were they ever wrong. Now we are here
7 with memories of two Stanley Cups, the
8 Russian Game in 1976, the 35-game
9 unbeaten streak, the five-overtime win
10 against Pittsburgh in the 2000 playoffs,
11 coming back against Boston in 2010 down
12 three games, two Winter Classics, and so
13 many more. My favorite part has been
14 sharing these memories with all the
15 players who define Flyers Hockey, with
16 the hundreds of employees who work
17 tirelessly to create a great experience
18 with the millions and millions of
19 dedicated, loyal, and passionate Flyer
20 fans who have made our first 50 years so
21 incredible. Together we truly have
22 something special"; and

23 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, over
24 the last 50 years the Philadelphia Flyers
25 have been a team the City of Philadelphia

3 we wish them the best during their

6 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Be it

9 recognize the Philadelphia Flyers on
10 their 50th Anniversary and acknowledges
11 the 2016-'17 hockey season as their 50th
12 Anniversary season of Philadelphia Flyers
13 hockey.

14 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Further
15 resolved, that an engrossed copy of the
16 resolution be presented to the
17 Philadelphia Flyers as evidence of the
18 sincere respect and admiration of this
19 legislative body.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILMAN DOMB: I just want
22 to say a few other words that I thought
23 of and, that is, that it's important that
24 Ed Snider and the Flyers, they go
25 together, and that's why we have them

2 both today, because without Ed Snider,
3 we'd have no Flyers. So it's really,
4 really impactful.

5 And the other thing I want to
6 mention is, so many of the Flyers are out

10 job, and I think we should applaud that
11 too, because they do a tremendous amount
12 of charity work.

13 Thank you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 Chair recognizes Mr. Holmgren for
17 remarks.

18 MR. HOLMGREN: Thank you very
19 much. First of all, I'd really like to
20 congratulate the Corcoran family on what
21 they received today. I feel honored that
22 I was here to witness that. It's an
23 incredible fight that they've gone
24 through over the number of years that
25 they've fought that fight, and hopefully

12 and all the Council for welcoming and
13 honoring us here today. It was 50 years
14 ago this year that Ed Snider brought
15 hockey to Philadelphia, and what an
16 impact it's made on the City. You know,
17 Ed Snider -- somebody mentioned it
18 earlier. I think it was Craig. He
19 wasn't from Philadelphia, but
20 Philadelphia was his home. He loved this
21 City. He loved this team more than
22 anyone, the Flyers, and he really loved
23 the City and the people in Philadelphia
24 very passionately, our fans.

25 Fifty years of Flyer hockey.

2 What can you say? Other people have
3 thrown out numbers. I'd like to throw
4 out some of those numbers just to
5 reinforce what's happened over the last
6 50 years. The Flyers have won 1,895
7 games over those 50 years, regular season

10 Montreal Canadiens, and they've been
11 around like 100 years.

12 The Flyers have been in the
13 Stanley Cup finals eight times and
14 they've won two championships, and
15 there's more to come focusing on the
16 future.

17 Looking back on the past, we
18 have a lot of things going on this
19 season. We have many, many heritage
20 nights, many, many memories that we're
21 going to celebrate, but we're really,
22 really, really looking forward to the
23 next 50 years. So thank you again for
24 having us here today.

11 Abernathy is the lone survivor from day
12 one who was at the forefront of the
13 creation of the American Civil Rights
14 Movement. The youngest of eight
15 children, she earned a Bachelor of
16 Science degree in business education at
17 Tennessee State University. In 1952, she
18 married her first boyfriend, Ralph David
19 Abernathy -- how you like that -- the
20 pastor of the First Baptist Church of
21 Montgomery, the Dean of Men at Alabama
22 State University, and a Professor of
23 Sociology and Mathematics at the college,
24 whom she met on the campus of Selma
25 University College Preparatory School

2 where she was matriculating when he
3 visited the campus while at home on
4 furlough from World War II; and

5 COUNCILMAN JONES: She's still
6 giggling. That's love.

7 Whereas, in 1955, Ralph David

9 Ministers, organized the boycott, and
10 issued the first call for the creation of
11 the Civil Rights Movement when Rosa Parks
12 was arrested. From Montgomery to
13 Memphis, the Abernathy home was the
14 meeting place for strategic planning with
15 Dr. King, Reverend Abernathy, and other
16 leaders. Mrs. Abernathy hosted at her
17 house the Freedom Riders in their home
18 where Reverend Abernathy, Dr. King, and
19 John Lewis held the press conference
20 announcing the continuation of the
21 Freedom Ride after the riders were
22 assaulted and trapped overnight, with
23 mass meetings participating in Reverend
24 Abernathy's First Baptist Church; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,

2 Mrs. Abernathy and three of her five
3 children participated in the following:
4 the March on Washington, led the Selma to
5 Montgomery March for the right to vote,

9 People's Campaign March, and the
10 Charleston Hospital Workers Strike March.
11 After the assassination of Dr. King in
12 1968, Mrs. Abernathy stood with her
13 husband as he called for calm and
14 non-violence to replace the violence that
15 erupted in the streets across America.
16 Mrs. Abernathy worked with her husband as
17 he led poor people of all races in the
18 human rights movement of the Poor
19 People's Campaign. As a result,
20 Dr. Abernathy was instrumental in leading
21 the Congress to establish the National
22 Food Stamp Program and the Free Meal
23 Program for low-income children in public
24 schools across America;

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And

2 whereas, while marching in Belfast,
3 Ireland, Mrs. Abernathy was shot at for
4 her support of non-violence. She
5 accompanied Dr. Abernathy on non-violent
6 pilgrimages across America, Europe, South

8 Southern Christian Leadership Conference
9 and the World Peace Council of Helsinki,
10 Finland. Ms. Abernathy has served for 15
11 years on the Metropolitan Atlanta Rapid
12 Transit Authority Board, the Fulton
13 County Development Authority Board, and
14 as National Sales Director in Mary Kay
15 Cosmetics and is the President of the
16 Ralph David Abernathy and Juanita Jones
17 Abernathy Foundation. Mrs. Abernathy is
18 truly a human rights pioneer and an
19 inspiration to young people all over the
20 world for generations to come.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Therefore,
22 by virtue of this citation, the Council
23 of the City of Philadelphia does hereby
24 honor and recognize Ms. Juanita Jones
25 Abernathy as a civil and human rights

2 pioneer and legend. We commend
3 Ms. Abernathy for all that she does and
4 has done for the civil and human rights
5 of the citizens of our country and extend
6 to her the sincere respect and admiration
7 of this legislative body and say

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
11 at this time, the Chair recognizes Mrs.
12 Abernathy for remarks.

13 MS. ABERNATHY: Good morning.

14 (Good morning.)

15 MS. ABERNATHY: Mayor Kenney in
16 his absence, President Clarke,
17 Councilwoman Blackwell, and
18 Minister Muhammad of the NAACP, and all
19 of the other members of the Council of
20 Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, it is indeed
21 an honor and a privilege to receive this
22 honor and recognition. And I am so
23 pleased to see so many people of color in
24 your Council, which means you are
25 concerned and you have representation

2 from all races, and that is a good thing,
3 because we are the people, and there was
4 a time -- everybody criticizes the man

10 allegiance every morning, and my

20 talk about us in America, and I'm very
21 prejudice towards my country. I was in
22 Switzerland recently and Germany and they
23 were talking about America this and
24 America that. I said, Well, I don't
25 discuss the ills of your country. I

2 practices to address the retirement

3 security crisis in Philadelphia.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
5 the Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
7 you, Mr. President. Mr. President, about
8 30 days after we started our session,
9 this Council passed a resolution
10 authorizing the Committee on Labor and
11 Civil Service to convene public hearings
12 to examine the state of retirement
13 security in our great city, and it was
14 with your leadership and support,
15 Mr. President, that we were able to begin
16 that process from a data-driven and a
17 research-based perspective with the study
18 that was commissioned via the Schwartz
19 Center for Economic Policy Analysis at
20 The New School for Social Research, and
21 they conducted a report about whether or
22 not Philadelphians were, in essence,
23 prepared for retirement.

24 Unfortunately, their research
25 found what we expected and, that is, that

2 Philadelphia was not doing well not only
3 just on an absolute level but also at a
4 relative level when you compared the
5 state of retirement security for
6 Philadelphians compared to those
7 nationwide.

8 For example, in Philadelphia,
9 48 percent of workers ages 25 to 64 work
10 for an employer that sponsors a
11 retirement plan compared with 53 percent
12 nationwide, and only 37 percent of
13 workers actually participate in a plan
14 compared with 45 percent nationwide.

15 We actually received an update
16 on that report at our hearing that was
17 held on June the 15th. We also heard
18 from local residents being adversely
19 affected by the financial insecurity of
20 retirement, non-profit institutions,
21 research institutions, practitioners, and
22 also other folks from cities and states.
23 And I noted that New York had clearly led
24 the way in this effort.

25 We also ensured that we had

2 intergovernmental support from
3 representatives from not just our local
4 government, but state government and our
5 federal government as well.

6 After that hearing on June the
7 15th, I introduced a resolution calling
8 for the creation of a Task Force on
9 Retirement Security for Private-Sector
10 Employees in the City of Philadelphia.
11 Over the summer, my team and I, we
12 traveled to a few cities. We reviewed
13 their data, their prospective policy and
14 legislative proposals, and as a result,
15 this resolution today is actually naming
16 the member organizations of our task
17 force and laying out our purpose and our
18 duties. It is structured to ensure that
19 there is appropriate representation from
20 all industries that can in fact add value
21 to our process.

22 For the record, I want you to
23 know we do have an intergovernmental
24 policy development expert, an ERISA
25 retirement security expert,

2 representation from SEIU, Community Legal
3 Services, Mayor's Commission on Aging,
4 Pew, Keystone Research Center, Greater
5 Philadelphia Chamber of Commerce, Urban
6 Affairs Coalition, and the Sustainable
7 Business Network.

8 Our first meeting is going to
9 be next year in mid February, and we will
10 provide a short-term and long-term action
11 plan. The end goal of the task force is
12 to make recommendations to this Council
13 regarding the potential solutions and
14 legislation to address this issue.

15 I also want to just state for
16 the record that our timing is in fact
17 appropriate, because in the nation, there
18 are cities and states across the nation
19 awaiting the expected ruling from the
20 U.S. Department of Labor about whether or
21 not and how larger cities can establish
22 retirement savings programs, and we
23 expect that ruling to take place in
24 December.

25 In addition to that, I want to

2 give a special thanks to our Controller's
3 Office. They've done a great deal of
4 research on this issue. Special kudos to
5 Jeff Hornstein -- and I hope I pronounced
6 his name correctly -- who is the staffer
7 who has done a great deal of work.
8 They've put together a very impressive
9 panel discussion on the conference that I
10 know is taking place soon. We will be
11 attending that and using whatever data is
12 compiled as a result of it and given to
13 our task force so that it can inform our
14 efforts.

15 I also want to give a special
16 thanks to Econsult that has agreed to
17 serve as the special technical advisor to
18 the chair of the task force, and to say
19 to my colleagues I thank them for their
20 foresight and supporting our efforts on
21 this issue, and I look forward to
22 reporting our work and a prospective plan
23 that this Council can think about how it
24 will implement on the issue of retirement
25 security.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

3 RABBI BOWEN: Thank you. My
4 name is Rabbi Debra Bowen and I'm here to
5 comment on Resolution No. 160853, adding
6 Rabbi L.E. Dailey to the street signs on
7 Lowber Avenue between Mayland Street and
8 Mohican Street. I would like to thank
9 Council President Darrell Clarke and also
10 City Councilwoman Cherelle Parker and all
11 the members of the Council for making
12 this amazing event happen.

13 I would also like to thank
14 Mr. Evans, who is currently hospitalized,
15 unable to be here, who was instrumental
16 in approaching Councilwoman Parker with
17 the request.

18 Today I stand before you as the
19 daughter of Rabbi Louise Dailey and I
20 have with me members of CTB family and my
21 sons and their sons here.

22 In Judaism we have a concept
23 called l'dor va'dor, which means from
24 generation to generation, and that is to
25 show that the works that Rabbi Dailey did

2 has passed not only to her but to
3 generations to follow.

4 I am humbled by the honor that
5 the Philadelphia City Council is about to
6 bestow on this most deserving woman of
7 blessed memory. My mother was a
8 diminutive individual who was a visionary
9 with big dreams. She came to
10 Philadelphia in the late '30s as a result
11 of a job transfer for my father and
12 sought to find her place in the world.
13 What she subsequently did was to begin a
14 spiritual works that has blossomed into
15 what we now know as Congregation Temple
16 Bethel in West Oak Lane in Philadelphia.
17 What started as a chavurah, or a prayer
18 group, in our living room has become a
19 beacon of hope in West Oak Lane for
20 individuals of all faith. She had an
21 indomitable spirit and a can-do attitude.
22 She was a brilliant teacher of Torah and
23 a gatherer of souls. People heard the
24 message that she so adeptly taught, and
25 they believed and followed her. As a

2 result, we now have five generations of
3 families who follow her teachings of
4 righteousness, civility, and sadaqah,
5 which means giving to charity.

6 Her most important legacy is
7 the message she taught about the
8 necessity of education. As such, 98
9 percent of our young people who graduate
10 from high school go on to an institution
11 of higher learning. In our small
12 community, we currently have three
13 individuals who are in a doctoral
14 program, following in the footsteps of
15 other members who have done so.

16 She was not only a teacher of
17 Torah, but also a financial genius who
18 was instrumental in allowing us to build
19 our synagogue by way of investments and
20 donations from the congregations without
21 having to obtain a bank loan nor
22 incurring any debt.

23 Congregation Temple Bethel is
24 in need -- we thank you for the
25 privilege.

5 (Applause.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,

9 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.

10 How many official decrees can City
11 Council ignore? Law U.S. Code 42 USC
12 1982, 1983, 1985, and 1986 say none. The
13 Pennsylvania and the U.S. Constitutions
14 say none. Yet Council refuses to de-fund
15 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority, DA
16 Office, City Controller's Office, and the
17 Sheriff's Office until a complete
18 investigation and prosecution of all
19 involved occurs.

20 My home at 1038 West Wyoming
21 was stolen. The government has committed
22 to spend up to \$100 million to build a
23 mall on my stolen home. I have received
24 no payment. That is why it is stolen. I
25 have received no jury trial, which I have

2 tried to file and had to file because I
3 was not paid since 1994.

4 The City Council, the City, the
5 Mayor's Office, and others have opposed
6 my right to jury trial in complete
7 violation of their oaths of office noted
8 in the federal and Commonwealth's
9 Constitution. Yet this Council's
10 inaction is definite and possibly
11 criminal. Making a mountain out of this
12 issue seems to delight you all.

13 I call again as an official
14 decree for the immediate de-funding and
15 stop using of the Philadelphia
16 Redevelopment Authority, the DA's Office,
17 City Controller's Office, Sheriff's
18 Office as an elected decree -- as an
19 official decree. This must be acted on
20 immediately. It cannot be ignored.
21 These possible criminal acts and oaths
22 violation must be addressed. Is this the
23 kind of government that our service
24 people have died to protect?

15 African American students in its --
16 African American students in regards to
17 disparate treatment around disciplinary
18 matters, and instead of seeking to
19 contest the findings of this, the College
20 has chosen instead to exercise a seeking
21 of immunity from the Pennsylvania Human
22 Relations Act entirely. And because of
23 that, I believe that it is a matter for
24 City Council to consider and address;
25 that no institution, religious or

2 otherwise, has the freedom to racially
3 discriminate and that this appeal has the
4 potential to impact thousands of students
5 and employees as well as dozens of
6 colleges all across the State of
7 Pennsylvania.

8 And, most importantly, I think
9 today we heard a profound statement by
10 Juanita Abernathy about what it means to
11 fight for justice today and that her
12 experiences over the last 70 years have
13 put her in situations that are
14 unimaginable for everybody unless you're
15 there, and she was always there in that
16 fight and that the fight for racial
17 justice isn't about looking back 70 years
18 ago when it seemed like we all should
19 have stood up to do it. It challenges us
20 in difficult circumstances and times
21 today to stand up on issues that have
22 been clearly established and those who
23 fought for the Human Relations Act to
24 apply equitably and broadly to all actors
25 within the State of Pennsylvania. We're

2 fighting for that to be relevant and
3 powerful and meaningful today.

4 And with that, I --

6 Before you call on the motion,
7 Councilwoman Brown.

9 like to speak on this matter.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Please.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: At the
13 appropriate hour.

14 I first should say thank you to
15 Councilwoman Gym and Councilwoman Cindy
16 Bass, where this institution sits, for
17 standing up and raising their voices on
18 this matter. I'm still amazed that even
19 when we work nine days a week and 72
20 hours a day we're not able to pay close
21 attention to so many issues that come
22 before us. And now that I've recently
23 learned what this is all about, the
24 sadness for me is for an institution of
25 higher learning who has this foundation

2 based on religious beliefs to take this
3 position for young people is
4 disheartening.

5 And so the good news is that we
6 have a chance in this legislative body to
7 speak up and speak out about matters like
8 this. And if we don't advocate for young
9 people, then who will?

11 repeat myself -- that an institution of
12 higher learning that has its foundations
13 rooted in religious beliefs has taken
14 this position. I'll be voting in favor
15 of this matter, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

21 much, Council President. It's a
22 disturbing matter that the Pennsylvania

12 portion today and vote against the
13 resolution primarily because I simply
14 believe that at any time people can
15 appeal.

19 Immigration Laws" by restoring due
20 process to immigration procedures, ending
21 automatic deportation, and discontinuing
22 mass detention, in order to uphold human
23 rights and dignity in the United States
24 immigration system.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

9 retroactively applied to individuals who
10 may have plea bargained or who may have
11 had other kinds of circumstances and also
12 coincided with the rise of increasingly
13 punitive laws around juvenile justice,
14 mandatory sentencing, the war on drugs
15 that basically created the framework of
16 what Michelle Alexander has called The
17 New Jim Crow of Mass Incarceration that
18 defines American racism in the 21st
19 century.

20 We had an amazing hearing late
21 last summer -- or late in June that
22 talked about the consequences of these
23 20-year-old laws, and as this nation
24 struggles with thinking through what
25 immigration reform would look like, there

2 are people all across the country,
3 including very active individuals who
4 helped establish Philadelphia's sanctuary
5 city laws, that have encouraged us to
6 look at the 1996 immigration laws as a
7 means to -- as a pathway to start to

9 put us on a correct path so that we are
10 allowing for due process, that we don't
11 just do automatic deportation and mass
12 detention. We focus in on family values
13 and we uphold the human rights and
14 dignity of everybody in the U.S. And
15 that's part of the reason behind the
16 resolution, and we'll be pushing for
17 immigrant justice and reform with the new
18 presidency starting in January.

19 And with that, I move for the
20 adoption of the resolution.

23 ayes have it and the motion passes.

24 The Clerk will read the letter
25 from the Mayor.

5 requested by your resolution adopted

9 designations of certain areas of land
10 located within an area bounded by Henry
11 Avenue, Coulter Street, School House
12 Lane, Wissahickon Avenue, and Lincoln

15 Warden Drive, Calumet Street, Merrick
16 Street, Gypsy Lane, and School House

11 (No response.)

13 ayes have it. A majority of all members
14 having voted in the affirmative, the
15 motion carries and the vote by which Bill
16 No. 160516 was passed has been
17 reconsidered. This bill will be placed
18 on the Final Passage Calendar at our next
19 session of Council.

20 That completes our Calendar for
21 today.

22 Are there any speeches on the

24 And the Chair recognizes

9 today we have just four more days. If
10 any organization would like to march in
11 the parade, they have until October 17th
12 to file their application.

13 And, finally, happy birthday to

18 Thank you, Councilman, and thank you for
19 your continued good work for our armed
20 services.

21 The Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Taubenberger.

23 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
24 you, Council President. As Chair of the
25 Aging Committee, I'm very proud to be

4 be hosted in our Caucus Room, and I
5 invite all my colleagues to join us.

6 Thank you very much.

8 Thank you, Councilman.

9 On the part of the majority,
10 the Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

11 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. Good news. Our
13 Resolution No. 160817 introduced and
14 adopted September 29th, which is your
15 particular interest in dealing with
16 bandit guns in Pennsylvania's effort to
17 block us from protecting ourselves
18 against these proliferation of firearms
19 in our city, the Editorial Board of the
20 Inquirer agrees with us. And we are
21 lockstep in opposition of this, and we
22 thank them.

23 Second thing that -- since
24 we're on a roll, I'd like them to
25 consider what's going on with

3 would enable individuals from other
4 counties to come to Philadelphia County
5 and to be poll watchers. So somebody
6 from Carbon County can come down here and
7 watch the polls in your district,

10 elections better than you and the City
11 Commissioners in the City of
12 Philadelphia.

13 House Bill 29 -- and I'm almost
14 of the opinion that I'm going to send
15 Councilman Johnson and Councilwoman
16 Parker back up there to regulate, because
17 they're coming down here with this
18 insanity -- is reminiscent of election
19 suppression, ballot integrity officers
20 who have come to Philadelphia in a
21 threatening manner to suppress voter
22 turnout in Philadelphia. It is further
23 reminiscent of the Jim Crow era when they
24 used to have poll taxes, literacy tests
25 and the other.

2 We've registered in the
3 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania 300,000 new
4 people. I remember in one election not
5 too long ago where they put out flyers in
6 the inner city community saying that
7 integrity officers would be at the poll
8 to look to see if you paid your parking
9 tickets and whether you had any
10 outstanding warrants. And obviously that
11 was an attempt to keep people from
12 supporting their candidates in a
13 one-person, one-vote manner. Guess what?
14 We came out anyway. We elected President
15 Obama, and we're going to come out again
16 today.

17 So I would urge people to
18 monitor the House Bill 29 where you can
19 go and send people, because maybe you
20 can't find people from Philadelphia that
21 would support a cause of yours. You need
22 to go to Potter County to find someone of
23 like mind to bring them down here to not
24 just hand out flyers in front of our
25 polls, but to go into the voting machine

2 and to look at strike-off lists and other
3 things. And whatever damage they do,
4 when they're done, they go back to Potter
5 County.

6 So it's reminiscent of someone
7 looking for a solution but when there is
8 no problem. We do not have a problem

10 elections. We count one person, one
11 vote, and I think we should be allowed to
12 do our job, Mr. President.

13 Thank you.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilman. Well said.

16 The Chair recognizes Councilman
17 Green.

18 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
19 Council President. I just want to second
20 the comments reflected by Councilman
21 Taubenberger regarding AARP and the
22 luncheon that will be provided for
23 Councilmembers and staff. AARP will be
24 talking about livable communities and how
25 we can make the City of Philadelphia more

3 Secondly, I would like to thank

9 to do a lot of book reading over the

10 summer, and this summer I've been reading

11 a book by Matthew Countryman also

12 entitled "Up South" and making

13 reflections on how although we are in the

14 North, a lot of the issues and challenges

15 that have occurred in the South happen

16 "up South." And this week I had an

17 opportunity to have conversations with a

18 few people, and although we've made a lot

19 of change in the City, in some ways we

20 are still up South, and I'm reflecting on

21 the recent issues that have been

22 occurring in our Gayborhood where an

23 owner used the N word. And although I'm

24 still researching and getting information

25 regarding all the circumstances and

2 issues around that situation and some of
3 the events that have been brought to my
4 attention, the use of the N word is never
5 acceptable. Never acceptable.

6 I'm glad that the Commission of
7 Human Relations will be having a hearing
8 on October 25th from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. at
9 Liberty Resources, and they have
10 subpoenaed a number of the bar owners in
11 the Gayborhood to talk about this issue
12 and to not only talk about an incident
13 that was on the video, but also about
14 some incidents that have been occurring
15 for some time.

16 But the issue and the use of
17 the N word is never acceptable, no matter
18 what perspective, what ethnicity, what
19 background. Use of discriminatory,
20 inflammatory words are never acceptable
21 in the City of Philadelphia, especially
22 if we're going to call ourselves the City
23 of Brotherly Love and Sisterly Affection.

24 So I look forward to getting
25 additional information regarding that

2 issue on the hearing on October 25th so
3 we can continue to try to live up to our
4 high ideals of the City of Philadelphia.

10 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
11 Council President. Just three quick
12 things. One, I want to mention that you
13 probably saw in the news, but I have been
14 visiting a lot of the public schools, and
15 I will say that I am amazed how great
16 they are, despite what people say.
17 Principals, teachers are doing an amazing
18 job in our public schools. We don't talk
19 about the positive of that enough and we
20 need to. There might be 5 percent
21 negative, but there's 95 percent
22 positive, and these principals are
23 amazing, Lewis Elkin and other schools,
24 just amazing what they're doing, and we
25 need to talk more about the positive.
