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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning, everyone. We're going to get started today. We have a number of presentations. And we may not have him coming to dinner today, but we have him coming here. I'll just put that Phillies hat up there.

We're going to get started, if members will take their seat. We have established a quorum.

To give our invocation this morning, the Chair recognizes Reverend Dr. James H. Buck, Jr. of Berean Baptist Church. He is here today as the guest of Councilman Curtis Jones.

I would ask all guests, visitors, and members to please rise.

(Councilmembers and guests rise.)

REVEREND BUCK: Let us pray.

The heavens declare the glory of God and the firmament show forth his handiwork.

This morning, oh God, we settle

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2 our souls and spirits, wherein we rest
3 behind these hallowed walls that we, your
4 creation, abide as one. It is in the
5 grace of this unity that we petition
6 wisdom this morning beyond the rams of
7 partisanship. But, oh God, we ask that
8 you give us the temerity of an
9 unapologetic will to do the business of
10 the people, to establish justice, to
11 generate peace, and to serve with dignity
12 and integrity.

13 We seek the welfare of the
14 City, the peace and the prosperity to
15 which we have been exiled, and we pray
16 for it, for if it prospers, we prosper.
17 We lend ourselves that we may be
18 catalysts for the redeemed, wounded
19 justice.

20 Now unto that spirit that is
21 ultimate and yet inconceivable, to that
22 spirit that stretches beyond the eternal
23 toss, to that spirit that embodies itself
24 in flesh illuminated and penetrated,
25 intellect between heaven and earth that

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2 reveal truth of God, I pray in Jesus'

3 name.

4 Amen.

5 (Amen.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you so much, Pastor, for those
8 inspiring words. We really appreciate
9 it.

10 Council will be at ease.

11 (Council at ease.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you very much. Thank you.

14 The next order of business is
15 the approval of the Journal of the
16 meeting of Thursday, October 13th, 2016,
17 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Greenlee.

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
20 you, Mr. President. I move that the
21 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
22 October 13th, 2016 be approved.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you. It has been moved and

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2 properly seconded that the Journal of
3 Thursday, October 13th, 2016 stand
4 approved.

5 All those in favor say aye.
6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Those opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
11 ayes have it, and the Journal is
12 approved.

13 The next order of business is
14 requests for leaves of absence, and the
15 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. On behalf of the
18 majority, there are no requests of leaves
19 of absence today.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 Chair thanks the gentleman.

22 The Chair now recognizes
23 Councilman O'Neill on behalf of the
24 minority.

25 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,

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2 Mr. President. On behalf of the
3 republicans, there are no requests for
4 leave of absence.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 Chair thanks the gentleman.

7 At this time, I would like to
8 dispense with the regular order of
9 business and I would like to thank
10 everyone who has taken time out of their
11 busy day to witness their government in
12 action. We really appreciate you coming
13 down. We hope that today is not only a
14 knowledgeable one but a pleasurable one,
15 so much so that you come back again. So
16 thank you so much today.

17 At this time -- drum roll --
18 the Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson,
19 who will present a resolution recognizing
20 Ryan Howard. Would Mr. Howard and those
21 accompanying him please join the
22 Councilman at the podium.

23 Give a big hand to our guy.

24 (Applause.)

25 (Councilmembers and guest

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2 approached podium.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

4 joining Councilman Johnson, we have

5 Councilman Green, Councilwoman

6 Quinones-Sanchez, Councilman Squilla,

7 Councilwoman Bass, Councilman Henon,

8 Councilman Domb, Councilwoman Parker,

9 Councilwoman Gym, Councilman

10 Taubenberger.

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Would all

12 members please come on up.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 There you go. Can we have all members

15 up, please.

16 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: So good

17 morning, everyone.

18 (Good morning.)

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Good

20 morning, everyone.

21 (Good morning.)

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: So I want

23 to do this the right way. On being newly

24 married, going on five years, I recognize

25 that on the side of every strong man is a

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2 stronger woman. So we're going to ask
3 for Mrs. Howard to please come on up and
4 join her husband, please, and his
5 daughter.

6 (Applause.)

7 (Guests approached podium.)

8 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: So today I
9 am truly honored and privileged with my
10 colleague Councilman Allan Domb to honor
11 a gentleman who has definitely left a
12 mark here in the City of Philadelphia.
13 You know, this is a city that loves our
14 sports teams and, most importantly, we
15 love championships. And so in 2008,
16 which was an historical year, we elected
17 the first African American President by
18 the name of Barack Obama. We also
19 elected State Representative of the 186th
20 legislative district, a young man by the
21 name of Kenyatta Johnson. But we also
22 became world champions with the
23 Philadelphia Phillies but, most
24 importantly, we all know we would not --
25 that would not have been possible without

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2 the hard work, dedication, and close to
3 400 grand slam home runs by Mr. Ryan
4 Howard.

5 Let's give him a round of
6 applause.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: I'm going
9 to ask my colleague Councilman Allan Domb
10 to come on up here to say a few remarks
11 as well.

12 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
13 Councilman Johnson.

14 And really to Ryan Howard, your
15 wife, and family, this is a great honor.
16 It's great to have sports figures who
17 represent Philadelphia in the best light,
18 and we couldn't have asked for someone
19 better to represent Philadelphia.
20 Besides being a great Philadelphia
21 Phillies player, the tremendous pride you
22 bring to the City of Philadelphia is
23 great, and that to me is worth
24 everything. So thank you very much on
25 behalf of all of us. Thank you.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: You know,
4 besides being an outstanding athlete and
5 bringing a world championship here to the
6 City of Philadelphia, he's also a great
7 outstanding human being. In Councilwoman
8 Maria Quinones-Sanchez's district she has
9 the Ryan Howard baseball field, which he
10 supported. In the 2nd Councilmanic
11 District, we have the Ryan Howard
12 Baseball Academy and baseball fields at
13 the Marian Anderson Recreation Center as
14 well as FDR Park. So this is a gentleman
15 who came to the City of Philadelphia,
16 rolled up his sleeves, and said, How can
17 I give back to the community in which I
18 am working in.

19 And so we sincerely say thank
20 you for thinking about those most in need
21 and, most importantly, improving the
22 quality of life of all of our young
23 people in the neighborhoods here in the
24 City of Philadelphia.

25 And so --

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: The
4 citation reads: Recognizing,
5 congratulating, and honoring Ryan Howard
6 for his 12 seasons with the Philadelphia
7 Phillies; and commending his dedication
8 to philanthropy throughout the City of
9 Philadelphia.

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
11 Ryan James Howard was born on November
12 19th, 1979 in St. Louis, Missouri and
13 attended Lafayette High School and
14 Missouri State University before being
15 selected by the Philadelphia Phillies
16 (the "Phillies") in the 5th round of the
17 2001 Major League Baseball draft; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
19 Ryan Howard made his MLB debut on
20 September 1st, 2004 and hit his first
21 Major League home run 10 days later on
22 September 11th, a sight that would become
23 familiar to Phillies fans and opposing
24 pitchers over the course of Ryan's
25 impressive career; and

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2 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,

3 Ryan is the last player remaining from

4 the Phillies' 2008 World Championship

5 team and played a pivotal role in that

6 victorious post-season run, the team's

7 first championship since 1980 and the

8 City of Philadelphia's first since 1983.

9 Over the course of that season, Ryan led

10 the league in home runs with 48 and

11 swatted 3 more during the 2008 World

12 Series, helping to lift the Phillies over

13 the Tampa Bay Rays 4 games to 1; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Council

15 President Clarke and I are extremely

16 grateful to the Ryan Howard Foundation,

17 because they really set the stage for

18 what has been a major renovation of

19 Hunting Park and the staple being used

20 now in the City for what open space and

21 top-level sports facilities should be.

22 So we're forever thankful, and going to

23 make sure that that Ryan Howard field

24 remains a valuable resource in Hunting

25 Park.

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2 And whereas, in addition to the
3 team's success, Ryan has also earned
4 several individual honors over the course
5 of his outstanding career. In 2005, Ryan
6 won the National League Rookie of the
7 Year and the National League's Most
8 Valuable Player Award in 2006.

9 Additionally, Ryan is a three-time
10 National League All-Star and has won the
11 Silver Slugger Award, the Hank Aaron
12 Award and the National League
13 Championship Series Most Valuable Player
14 Award in 2009; and

15 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

16 Whereas, known for his power, Ryan is a
17 member of the 50 home run club, a
18 two-time National League home run
19 champion, and became the fastest player
20 in MLB history to reach both the 100 and
21 200 home run milestones, passing these
22 marks in 2007 and 2009, respectively; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, not
24 surprisingly, Ryan holds the franchise
25 record for home runs by a Phillies batter

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2 in a single season with a total of 58
3 home runs in the 2006 season, surpassing
4 Mike Schmidt's record of 48 home runs set
5 during the 1980 season.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Ryan will
8 finish his career with the Phillies at
9 number 67 on the list of Major League
10 all-time home run leaders with a total of
11 382 home runs; and

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, in
14 addition to all of Ryan's success on the
15 field, Ryan was also one of the team's
16 most visible volunteers in the community.
17 His dedication to his adoptive City of
18 Philadelphia has been felt through
19 several charities including Ryan Howard's
20 Celebrity Servers, his work with the
21 Police Athletic League, The Ryan Howard
22 Family Foundation and The Ryan Howard Big
23 Piece Foundation, which is dedicated to
24 improving the lives of children by
25 promoting academic and athletic

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2 development. The Ryan Howard Reading
3 Challenge, created by The Ryan Howard Big
4 Piece Foundation, is a K to 3
5 literacy-based program that encourages
6 reading among students from across
7 Philadelphia; and

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
9 most recently, this past summer, Ryan
10 opened a new training center, The Ryan
11 Howard Training Center. Comprised of
12 7,500 square feet and four retractable
13 batting cages, the facility will provide
14 over 8,000 Reviving Baseball in Inner
15 Cities --

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: --
18 participants access to fitness training
19 and educational instruction; and

20 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
21 throughout his 12-year career with the
22 Philadelphia Phillies, Ryan Howard has
23 earned the gratitude and admiration of
24 our great City through his remarkable
25 dedication to philanthropy and public

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2 service, and through his heroic 2008
3 World Series Championship performance;
4 now, therefore, be it

5 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Resolved,
6 that the Council of the City of
7 Philadelphia, hereby recognizes,
8 congratulates, and honors Ryan Howard for
9 his 12 seasons with the Philadelphia
10 Phillies; and commends his dedication to
11 philanthropy throughout the City of
12 Philadelphia.

13 Further resolved, that an
14 engrossed copy of this resolution be
15 presented to Ryan Howard as evidence of
16 the sincere respect and admiration of
17 this legislative body.

18 Ryan, we also have an
19 additional presentation that we would
20 like to present to you as well. We
21 reached out to our current Mayor, whose
22 schedule, he's a little busy, but he
23 wanted be here and also be supportive of
24 our efforts in honoring you. It's the
25 Liberty Bell on behalf of the Mayor here

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2 in the City of Philadelphia.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Now,
5 again, Mrs. Howard, we want to thank you
6 for letting Ryan come to the City of
7 Philadelphia to play for the Phillies
8 but, most importantly, being his
9 strength, his wisdom, his backbone in
10 this process. And so we just want to
11 show you our appreciation as well.

12 MRS. HOWARD: Thank you so
13 much.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
16 now we would ask Mr. Ryan "Big Piece"
17 Howard to say a few words.

18 (Applause.)

19 MR. HOWARD: I don't even know
20 how to respond to all that, first off.

21 I just want to say thank you to
22 everyone here. You know, my time here
23 playing for the Phillies has been great.
24 I want one thing to be known, that if I'm
25 not here playing in a Phillies uniform,

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2 that doesn't mean that I'm finished with
3 my work in the City and around
4 Philadelphia. So my presence will still
5 be felt here in Philadelphia, because
6 there's still a lot of work that needs to
7 be done and I still plan on being part of
8 it.

9 (Applause.)

10 MR. HOWARD: I mean, is there a
11 rattle -- I'm still trying to figure this
12 whole thing out. I mean, hearing all the
13 different things, you know, over the
14 course of my career that have taken place
15 off the field brings great pride to me,
16 because for me that's what it's always
17 been about. It's always been about
18 giving back. It's always been about
19 helping to give children and people
20 opportunities to succeed. And I've been
21 blessed to be able to be in this
22 situation that I'm in, being able to play
23 baseball, but I use that as a platform, a
24 platform to try to give back, a platform
25 to try to teach. You know, you're a role

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2 model whether you want to be or not, so
3 the way I look at it is, I might as well
4 try to be the best role model that I can
5 be for my kids, for --

6 (Applause.)

7 MR. HOWARD: For the kids and
8 not only kids but parents and everybody
9 in the community to where, you know, we
10 all have to work together.

11 And I want to thank all the
12 Council men and women that were able to
13 help with the Urban Youth Academy,
14 Hunting Park, all of the different
15 things, PAL, Police Athletic League. And
16 I just want to say it's been my pleasure,
17 and, like I said, I'm not finished. I
18 may not be in a Phillies uniform next
19 year, but my presence will definitely be
20 felt around the community here.

21 So I just want to thank you for
22 recognizing me and my family, and it
23 means so much. Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Council will be at ease.

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Can we
4 give him like a real big round of
5 applause like.

6 (Standing ovation.)

7 (Council at ease.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Okay. We got to go back to work. Thank
10 you. Thank you very much.

11 At this time, the Chair
12 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,
13 who will present a resolution
14 commemorating October 17th, 2016 as Juror
15 Appreciation Week. Would President Judge
16 Woods-Skipper and those accompanying her
17 please join the Councilwoman at the
18 podium.

19 (Councilmembers and guests
20 approached podium.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
22 joining the Councilwoman, we have
23 Councilman Greenlee and Councilman Jones.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
25 Mr. President. Historically we have gone

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2 over to the --

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Councilwoman, hold on a second.

5 Could we hold it down, please.

6 Thank you.

7 Go ahead, Councilwoman.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,

9 Mr. President.

10 Historically we have gone over
11 to the Juanita Kidd Stout's Criminal
12 Justice Center to present this resolution
13 to citizens who show up and do exercise
14 their civic duty during Jury Appreciation
15 Week. This morning we're pleased to have
16 citizens, professionals, jurists from the
17 judicial side of government who are
18 joining us here this morning, and we want
19 to simply say thank you to them in a
20 public way for the important work they do
21 every day with those that they have to
22 sit before.

23 So this morning we are
24 commemorating the week of October 17th,
25 2016 as Juror Appreciation Week in the

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2 City of Philadelphia.

3 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
4 the right to a trial by jury is one of
5 the core values of American citizenship;
6 and

7 Whereas, the obligation and
8 privilege to serve as a juror are as
9 fundamental to our democracy as the right
10 to vote; and

11 Whereas, our courts depend upon
12 citizens to serve as jurors; and

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
14 service by citizens as jurors is
15 indispensable to the justice system; and

16 More citizens should be
17 encouraged to respond when summoned for
18 jury service;

19 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
20 a continuing and imperative goal for the
21 courts, the bar, and civic associations
22 is to ensure that jury selection and jury
23 service are fair, effective, and not
24 unduly burdensome to our community; and

25 Whereas, the courts, the bar,

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2 civic associations, and individual
3 citizens should have greater appreciation
4 for the jury system and for the thousands
5 of citizens who annually give of their
6 time and talents to serve on juries; and
7 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
8 the goals of the Juror Appreciation Week
9 are applauding the efforts of jurors who
10 fulfill the most important civic duty;
11 educating the public about jury duty and
12 the importance of jury service; ensuring
13 that the responsibility of jury service
14 is shared fairly among citizens and that
15 a fair cross section of the community is
16 called for jury service; ensuring that
17 all jurors are treated with respect and
18 that their service is not unduly
19 burdensome; providing jurors with tools
20 that will assist their decision-making;
21 and continuing to improve the jury system
22 in the City of Philadelphia by
23 encouraging productive dialogue between
24 jurors and the court; now, therefore, be
25 it

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Resolved,
3 by the Council of the City of
4 Philadelphia, that this City Council does
5 hereby commemorate October 17th, 2016 as
6 Juror Appreciation Week in the City of
7 Philadelphia and that the undersigned
8 support the celebration of this week
9 which shall include various activities,
10 in furtherance of the aforementioned
11 goals.

12 Further resolved, that an
13 engrossed copy of this resolution be
14 presented to our President Judge Sheila
15 Woods-Skipper and her colleagues as
16 evidence of the sincere sentiments of
17 this legislative body.

18 Let's salute Philadelphia's
19 jurists and President Judge Sheila
20 Woods-Skipper.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you. The Chair recognizes Judge
24 Woods-Skipper for remarks.

25 JUDGE WOODS-SKIPPER: Thank

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2 you, President Clarke.

3 To Councilwoman Blondell

4 Reynolds Brown and all other

5 Councilmembers who have submitted this

6 resolution and to those others present,

7 thank you for recognizing the importance

8 of jury service and acknowledging Jury

9 Appreciation Week here in the First

10 Judicial District.

11 I am joined today by my

12 colleagues Judge Barbara McDermott who

13 chairs our Board of Judges' Jury

14 Committee, by Judge DeFino-Nastasi, by

15 Judge Ros Robinson, and by our Jury

16 Commissioner Dan Rendine, and our Court

17 Administrator Joe Evers, all as an

18 indication of the importance that we put

19 upon this service.

20 This Jury Appreciation Week

21 gives us the opportunity to recognize the

22 importance of jury service and the

23 thousands of conscientious private

24 citizens who consistently show up for

25 jury duty and participate in this vitally

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2 important and essential part of our
3 justice system.

4 We want those who serve as
5 jurors to recognize that their time is
6 valued and the personal sacrifice that
7 they make to serve is an unheralded
8 service that we don't often recognize and
9 we should do so more often. It is one of
10 the keystones of our American democracy,
11 and jury service truly is a right. It
12 gives us the important opportunity to,
13 with our constitutional mandate, to allow
14 people from all walks of life -- that
15 includes every economic background, every
16 neighborhood, all geographies, every
17 educational level -- to come together
18 regardless of race, color, creed or
19 religion and to ensure that our system of
20 justice works for everyone, that everyone
21 has access to justice and there is
22 equality in our system.

23 It's an opportunity for
24 citizens to have their voices heard. And
25 we thank them for the contributions to

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2 democracy and for those jurors who serve.

3 They deserve our respect and gratitude.

4 Throughout this week, the court

5 is seeking to showcase the importance of

6 jury service as a shared American

7 position and a vital part of our

8 democracy. The Constitution guarantees

9 this individual right, and the citizens

10 who answer this call to serve is the only

11 way that makes our system churn. Because

12 as judges, we cannot do our jobs if we

13 don't have jurors who are available to do

14 theirs.

15 The citizens of Philadelphia,

16 who constitutes your constituents, we

17 encourage them to appear for jury

18 service, and we seek to educate them more

19 about the importance of that service as

20 we move forward. So spread the word, and

21 I challenge you as Councilpeople to

22 spread it to your constituents so that

23 they show up when they are summoned to

24 appear for jury service. And I thank all

25 jurors who serve here in the First

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2 Judicial District.

3 Thank you again for this honor,
4 and we are certainly happy to be here
5 this morning. Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Council will be at ease.

9 (Council at ease.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you very much.

12 At this time, the Chair
13 recognizes Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez,
14 who will present a resolution recognizing
15 McDonald's USA, LLC. Would Jorge Salvat
16 and those accompanying him please join
17 the Councilwoman at the podium.

18 (Councilmembers and guests
19 approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
21 joining Councilwoman Sanchez, we have
22 Councilman Green and Councilman Jones.

23 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I'll
24 take this time to remind folks that after
25 Council, our independent McDonald's

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2 operators will be providing food in the
3 Caucus Room. There will be no french
4 fries, but there will be healthy food.
5 Thanks to our menu labeling sponsor,
6 Blondell Reynolds Brown, many of the
7 industry has moved to healthy foods, and
8 we are going to be hosted by McDonald's
9 with some of their healthy foods.

10 The first independent
11 McDonald's operator that I met was Craig
12 Welburn. I don't know if people remember
13 Craig. And I remember Craig because
14 Craig not only owned the McDonald's on
15 2nd and Lehigh, he was an incredible
16 valuable community representative, and he
17 embraced the bodheal (ph) in the Latino
18 community and participated in so many
19 events. I always thought he was Latino.
20 But in the 7th Councilmanic District --
21 and I hope this is the experience for the
22 rest of my colleagues -- the McDonald's
23 operators are real partners. So whether
24 it's Ken on Frankford Avenue who is a
25 lead partner in our Frankford corridor

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2 redevelopment, also a member of our
3 business association, to Frank Franco,
4 who joins us today, at 2nd and Allegheny,
5 they really look at themselves as
6 strategic partners.

7 So I want to congratulate
8 McDonald's for providing minority
9 independent franchise opportunities in
10 the community. And I know my Council
11 colleague Councilwoman Parker is always
12 talking about who owns these businesses,
13 do they look like us. In the 7th, they
14 do.

15 But I'm very proud to be able
16 to recognize on some of their educational
17 initiatives, we are all working hard to
18 figure out how we incentivize corporate
19 America to do right by its workers, and
20 today we're going to recognize
21 McDonald's, because they figured out that
22 investing in their workers is good for
23 their bottom line, and I think we need to
24 highlight that when they do good work.

25 And so with that, recognizing

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2 and honoring McDonald's USA, LLC and its
3 46 independent Owners and Operators in
4 the City of Philadelphia for their
5 continued dedication to the communities
6 they serve, the people they employ, and
7 the charitable services they undertake,
8 and the "Archways to Opportunity" program
9 which provides free English as a second
10 language classes, a pathway to an
11 accredited High School Diploma and
12 tuition for College.

13 McDonald's restaurants are in
14 120 countries, with 36,000 restaurants
15 worldwide, serving approximately 69
16 million people daily and employing 1.7
17 million people;

18 McDonald's and its independent
19 Operators have provided and continue to
20 provide resources and charitable
21 contributions to the communities in which
22 they serve and to the people that they
23 respectively employ;

24 Whereas, on October 15th, 1974,
25 with the support of the McDonald's Owners

2 and Operators, the world's first Ronald
3 McDonald House was founded in
4 Philadelphia, in the 7th Council
5 District, and has since grown to a
6 network of more than 359 Houses in 42
7 countries and regions; and

8 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I would like
9 to also salute my fellow church member
10 from Canaan Baptist Church, Reverend John
11 Dawkins, who is also a longtime
12 owner/operator for a McDonald's
13 franchise.

14 Whereas, for over 40 years,
15 with the support of McDonald's and its
16 independent Owner/Operators, the
17 Philadelphia Ronald McDonald House has
18 and continues to provide Philadelphians
19 and families all over the world with a
20 supportive place to stay while their
21 children are in treatment; and

22 Whereas, Philadelphia has two
23 Ronald McDonald Houses, one located at
24 3925 Chestnut Street and the other at 100
25 East Erie Avenue; and

2 Whereas, this year alone,
3 McDonald's and its independent
4 Owner/Operators in Philadelphia, as well
5 as surrounding areas, have helped raise
6 over 1.1 million dollars for the local
7 Ronald McDonald Houses and Ronald
8 McDonald House Charities of the
9 Philadelphia Region; and

10 Whereas, in 2015, McDonald's
11 launched the "Archways to Opportunity"
12 program which gives employees who work at
13 a company-owned or independently
14 franchised restaurant the opportunity to
15 improve English skills, earn a high
16 school diploma, work toward a college
17 degree and also helps these individuals
18 develop an educational plan for success;
19 and

20 Whereas, "English under the
21 Arches" is a program that teaches crew
22 and managers the English language skills
23 needed to communicate effectively with
24 colleagues, customers, and in their daily
25 lives; and

2 COUNCILMAN JONES: I have to
3 say the first two deals I ever did as a
4 young underwriter banker at PCDC were two
5 McDonald's. They paid back their money,
6 and they're still open.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, the
9 High School completion program is a
10 nationally accredited High School program
11 available to restaurant crew and
12 management who work at the company or own
13 independent franchise restaurants to
14 obtain a high school diploma at no cost;

15 Whereas, the college access and
16 completion program helps in many areas,
17 including: tuition assistance for
18 college courses at higher education
19 institutions accredited by the U.S.
20 Department of Education, and the
21 McDonald's employee training curriculum
22 which carries an American College Credit
23 (ACE) college credit recommendation which
24 can be transferred to various colleges;
25 and

2 Whereas, nationally over 819
3 restaurant employees who have worked at
4 the company-owned or independent
5 franchise restaurants were awarded
6 tuition assistance for high school, 3,346
7 were awarded tuition for college, 872
8 graduated from English classes and 308
9 completed advising sessions; and

10 Whereas, so far this year,
11 Philadelphia's nearly 100 companies or
12 independent franchise employees have or
13 are taking advantage of the "Archways to
14 Opportunity" program and that number is
15 projected to triple by the end of 2016;
16 and now, therefore, be it

17 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ:

18 Resolved, that we hereby recognize and
19 honor McDonald's USA, LLC and its 46
20 independent Owners and Operators in the
21 City of Philadelphia for their continued
22 dedication to the communities they serve
23 and the people that they employ, the
24 charitable services that they undertake,
25 and particularly the "Archways to

2 Opportunity" program.

3 Be it further resolved, that an
4 engrossed copy of this resolution be
5 presented to Steven Kerley, Vice
6 President, General Manager and, of
7 course, some of our well-known
8 independent operators here in the City of
9 Philadelphia.

10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair recognizes Mr. Salvat for remarks.

14 MR. SALVAT: Good morning, City
15 Council. My name is Jorge Salvat and I
16 serve you as Vice President of Operations
17 for McDonald's Corporation in the
18 Philadelphia region. And so we're truly
19 honored to be here today to speak on
20 behalf of McDonald's and the close to
21 25,000 employees that we have here in the
22 Philadelphia region.

23 And so first to Councilwoman
24 Maria Quinones-Sanchez, thank you for
25 your introducing this resolution and to

2 the entire Council really for your
3 ongoing partnership. We appreciate you
4 for acknowledging our company for the
5 work we are doing on behalf of our crew
6 and our communities.

7 We recognize the importance of
8 working closely with our City officials
9 to ensure our efforts are in line with
10 what the community needs and to support
11 the workforce in a meaningful way.

12 At McDonald's, we know that the
13 advancement of our people is a key to our
14 shared success. Internally we identified
15 a need to better develop our managers and
16 crew to their fullest potential, and as a
17 result, we launched the "Archways to
18 Opportunity" program in 2015. This
19 customizable platform provides resources
20 at no cost for our employees in four
21 different areas. First, to improve their
22 English skills; then to earn a high
23 school diploma, not a GED; work towards a
24 college degree; and plan their education
25 goals. So since the program's inception,

2 McDonald's has enrolled more than 10,000
3 employees and awarded more than 9 million
4 in tuition assistance.

5 I'm especially excited to
6 report that here in the Philadelphia
7 region, we've awarded a total of \$664,000
8 in tuition assistance dollars to over 600
9 employees. And while we're proud to
10 support our employees with tuition
11 assistance for college, we also believe
12 that the real opportunity is to ensure
13 all of our people have a college diploma
14 or its equivalent. And so with that, we
15 know at the essence is really starting
16 with the high school diploma. We know
17 that 40 million working adults are
18 without a high school diploma in our
19 country, 40 million. And so McDonald's
20 Career Online High School gives the
21 employees the flexibility they need to
22 balance work and school. They also gain
23 real-world career skills with
24 adult-focused class content.

25 Ultimately we also want our

2 employees to feel confident in all that
3 they do. Our English Under the Arches
4 program helps improve English speaking,
5 listening, reading, and writing skills.
6 Whether they're speaking to customers or
7 to our staff, we want their voices to be
8 heard.

9 And, finally, education
10 advising can be critical to an
11 individual's success, from making the
12 right school choice to understanding
13 necessary time commitments and time
14 management skills.

15 The state of academic advising
16 in our country is in great disrepair.
17 The advisor-to-student ratio in high
18 school is one advisor for every 491
19 students, and about 20 percent of our
20 high school students have no access
21 whatsoever to an advisor. So we view
22 this as an incredible benefit to our
23 employees who may not have had such
24 guidance in school, and advising is
25 available to all employees and can be

2 scheduled at any time for them 24/7.

3 And while we certainly know
4 that there's more work to be done, we're
5 extremely proud of the work we're doing
6 to empower and to develop our employees.
7 It's no small feat, but we couldn't do it
8 without the commitment of many of our
9 local McDonald's owners/operators that
10 are with us here today.

11 And so with that, I'm pleased
12 to be joined today by Marlene Weinberg to
13 share more of our story.

14 Marlene.

15 MS. WEINBERG: Thank you,
16 Jorge. And I'd like to thank the Council
17 for recognizing our work with this honor.

18 I have been a McDonald's
19 owner/operator for 20 years. I currently
20 have two restaurants in Bucks County, but
21 when I had eight restaurants, four of
22 which were in Philadelphia.

23 I serve on the Board of
24 Directors of the Ronald McDonald House
25 Charities in Philadelphia. I currently

2 am the Capital Campaign Chair for the
3 Philadelphia House and I'm on the Board.
4 I also am Co-Chair of Ronald McDonald
5 Camp. You can see I'm very heavily
6 invested.

7 For those of you that are not
8 familiar with the work of RMHC, we are a
9 non-profit 501(c)(3) corporation that
10 finds, creates, and supports programs
11 that directly improve the health and
12 well-being of children. Through RMHC we
13 are able to assist local charities with
14 grants. We give out and award \$130,000 a
15 year in scholarships to our high school
16 seniors, and we provide funding and
17 support to the Ronald McDonald Care
18 Mobile, which is operated by Saint
19 Christopher's Foundation for Children.
20 It is a mobile dental clinic, and as your
21 dentist will tell you, if you have good
22 healthy teeth, you'll have a good healthy
23 body.

24 The Ronald McDonald Houses are
25 the cornerstone of our charity, and as

2 previously said, the very first one in
3 the world is right here in Philadelphia.
4 The mission of the Ronald McDonald House
5 is to keep the families close to their
6 children who are critically ill and are
7 being served and taken care of at local
8 hospitals.

9 We are fortunate to have two
10 houses in Philadelphia, one at Chestnut
11 Street, which primarily serves CHOP, and
12 one at Front and Erie, which serves Saint
13 Christopher's Hospital and Shriners. In
14 2015, we served 1,388 individual families
15 for 2,279 total family stays. However,
16 we could not accommodate 6,000 requests
17 because we were full. And so the Board
18 of Directors of the House embarked on a
19 \$50 million capital campaign, and we're
20 hoping that a city known for brotherly
21 love and sisterly affection will help us
22 keep families close.

23 We are in the midst of this
24 campaign. The House has 45 rooms. We
25 will grow to 127. If you're in a

2 position to help, I brought all my
3 literature and would be glad to speak
4 with you at lunch.

5 In closing, thank you for
6 having us here today. We appreciate you
7 giving us this important platform to
8 share our information about our people
9 and our community programs. We look
10 forward to continuing to work together to
11 make the arches shine brighter in
12 Philadelphia.

13 Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Council will be at ease.

17 (Council at ease.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you.

20 And for our last presentation,
21 the Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker,
22 who will present a resolution recognizing
23 the Ducky Birts Foundation. Would Ducky
24 Birts and those accompanying him please
25 join the Councilwoman at the podium.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Councilwoman, you want to --

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Yes.

7 Thank you, Mr. President.

8 Although there were only seven
9 whereas clauses in the resolution to
10 read, all members of Council have been
11 honored and sponsored this resolution.
12 So we're going to ask all members to
13 please join us. Will all members of
14 Council please join us. We look back
15 through these ten years and we've seen
16 each of your faces.

17 (Councilmembers approached
18 podium.)

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Let me
20 just start by saying for those who are
21 familiar with the life's work of national
22 and regional civil and human rights icons
23 like the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King,
24 Jr., Rosa Parks, C. Delores Tucker, the
25 late great Lion of Zion, Reverend

2 Dr. Leon Sullivan, late Congressman Bill
3 Gray and his partnership with the late
4 great Councilwoman Augusta Clark, you
5 can't know any of those people and their
6 presence here in the City of Philadelphia
7 and have not seen Donald "Ducky" Birts
8 and his infamous smile. He's been in
9 every photo, a part of the history and
10 the work but, more important -- and we
11 know that his son David who is here who
12 has picked up the mantle, his lovely
13 wife, Linda, the Zion Baptist Church
14 family, Masjidullah, Tommy Blackwell,
15 senior aide to Congressman Bob Brady, and
16 Jeff Brown of Brown ShopRite, who has
17 been the chief long-term sponsor of the
18 Foundation's Medallion Scholarship
19 Banquet, they're here and a number of
20 others. You know that one thing that is
21 not often talked about is Ducky's work,
22 and when I first met him, it was through
23 the late Councilwoman Augusta Clark and
24 her work with the United Negro College
25 Fund and the raising of money to send

2 children of color to college. And Ducky
3 Birts never had a problem asking somebody
4 for a check to help buy some books and
5 pay tuition to send a child who needed
6 assistance to college.

7 And so, Ducky, with that, we
8 want to say thank you. We know you
9 reached a milestone last week with the
10 presentation of the 10th Annual Medallion
11 Scholarship Banquet, but what people also
12 don't know is that Ducky just celebrated
13 his 80th birthday. 80. 80.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: So with
16 that in mind, the resolution in which we
17 finally, Ducky, as the legislative body
18 get an opportunity to say thank you for
19 your work, and this is just our way to
20 say thank you, and it reads as follows:

21 Recognizing and congratulating
22 The Ducky Birts Foundation on the
23 occasion of its 10th Annual Medallion
24 Scholarship Gala.

25 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I just want

2 to thank my good friend Donald "Ducky"
3 Birts for all your work from Camden to
4 Philadelphia, being the risk-taker that
5 you are, and all that you do for the
6 young people of our city and the region.

7 And whereas, the Ducky Birts
8 Foundation was founded by civic activist,
9 community leader, and longtime special
10 assistant to Congressman Robert Brady,
11 Donald "Ducky" Birts in 2006; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And
13 whereas, my heart is filled because Ducky
14 Birts is adored by so many, including me.

15 Whereas, Ducky has created a
16 legacy of caring for others and nurturing
17 the growth of our community's most
18 valuable, vulnerable resource - children.
19 He understands that having an education
20 is a means to social justice, equity,
21 self-determination, and freedom;

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
23 you for this honor.

24 And whereas, since its
25 founding, the foundation has provided

2 scholarships for students attending my
3 alma mater, Cheyney University, and
4 Lincoln University and educated 4th, 5th,
5 and 6th graders on economic development
6 and government operations on all levels;
7 and

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the
9 foundation has also developed its own
10 food products, like Ducky's Eggs, and
11 quality lunch meats, which are sold and
12 sponsored by Brown's Super Stores, Inc.
13 which operates ten ShopRite supermarkets
14 in the Delaware Valley. The proceeds
15 from these sales go to benefit the
16 capital building fund; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, on
18 October 15th, 2016, the Ducky Birts
19 Foundation held its 10th Annual Medallion
20 Scholarship Gala. The theme of this
21 year's gala was "Creating Bridges for a
22 Better Community"; and

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Love you,
24 Ducky.

25 Whereas, this year's Medallion

2 Award Honorees were Bruce Crawley,
3 Honorable Larry Farnese, Jr., Meg Grant,
4 Honorable Stephen Kinsey, Obra S.
5 Kernodle, IV, Mellanie Lassiter, Carla
6 Moss, Don Scott, Calvin Tucker, and Fred
7 Wright. The Couples and Families Working
8 Together "Making a Difference" honorees
9 were Frank and Tina Green, Mayor Dana
10 Redd and Novella Hinson Starks, Ryan
11 Boyer, and Omar Sabir, and Reverend and
12 Mrs. Joseph Williams, Jr.; now,
13 therefore, be it

14 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you. My
15 congratulations to Donald "Ducky" Birts,
16 great person. And you may not know, but
17 he also has his own hot dog brand, Ducky
18 Dogs, at Jeff Brown ShopRite. I see
19 them. They are good.

20 Resolved, by the Council of the
21 City of Philadelphia, that it hereby
22 honors and recognizes The Ducky Birts
23 Foundation on its 10th Annual Medallion
24 Scholarship Gala.

25 Further resolved, that an

1 10/20/16 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 engrossed copy of this resolution be
3 presented to Ducky Birts as evidence of
4 the sincere sentiments of this
5 legislative body.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair recognizes Donald "Ducky" Birts for
9 remarks.

10 MR. BIRTS: Thank you,
11 Mr. President.

12 First, give honor to God. And
13 without God, it's impossible.

14 I had a stroke about a year
15 ago, about a year ago, and my wife nursed
16 me back to health. God knocked me down,
17 but he didn't knock me out. Got my
18 attention. Going to get all of our
19 attention when you get past 50. And I
20 try to do the right thing for our people.

21 Last time I was here, Jannie
22 Blackwell, 25 years ago, helping Cheyney,
23 Jannie Blackwell, the Wade Wilson
24 Scholarship Fund, because we know that
25 Cheyney do not receive money from the

2 Negro College Fund. Neither does
3 Lincoln. We don't understand that,
4 because when Bill Gray took over the
5 colleges, he asked me to come with him.
6 I told Bill, I can't do that, because you
7 got the big corporation with you, but
8 Cheyney and Lincoln need the hot dogs and
9 baked beans. You got the steaks, but
10 these kids in Philadelphia need hot dogs
11 and baked beans. From there they can get
12 the doctorate and masters and get out of
13 schools.

14 We have to be able to take care
15 of our next-door neighbor first and then
16 go down the corner and give money to
17 other schools. If you can give a dollar
18 to the Negro College Fund, but give 75
19 cent and give a quarter to Cheyney and
20 Lincoln, because they're right here in
21 our district. They don't get money --
22 the money they get from the state is very
23 small compared to Penn State, Pittsburgh,
24 and Temple. We got 13, 14 other small
25 schools, but we got to get the money from

2 the budget from Harrisburg. Same problem
3 the City got here. Get the money from
4 Harrisburg. I understand that, Darrell,
5 you need them in Harrisburg to help you
6 here. The same thing -- it goes around,
7 and our kids need help.

8 I'm not going to talk too long,
9 because I know we've been here a long day
10 and out of competition, but my wife keep
11 me strong. She take care of me.

12 (Applause.)

13 MR. BIRTS: And she was really
14 a godsend. That's deep for people that
15 go to church. She's a christian girl.
16 She's a godsend. She's there for me.

17 I see Brother Muhammad out
18 there. Hey, Brother. And his wife is
19 over there. I like her too. I like
20 everybody. I don't have no hang-up.
21 Ergo, when it comes to my kids, I don't
22 play politics when it comes to my black
23 kids. I'll take money from republicans,
24 democrats, independents. Anybody that
25 can help my black kids, I'll take the

2 money. I don't have no problem with
3 that. We get hung up with all this
4 stuff. Help our kids. You're talking
5 about hanging on the corner. Well, get
6 them some jobs and give some education.
7 I'm teaching economics and government
8 relations, which are part of political
9 science and politics. That's what our
10 kids got to learn from 4th, 5th, and 6th
11 grade before they get out there, and our
12 chance to give back. We got to grab them
13 early, like the captains, grab them to
14 the grave. We got to do that.

15 And Jeff Brown, who has been
16 here from the start -- where you at,
17 Jeff? Come up here, Jeff. This man here
18 been with me 15 years. People don't know
19 we go back, way back, way back. People
20 don't know that. And I'm there for him
21 and he's there for me. That's a
22 beautiful thing. I don't see color. I
23 see human rights. As Reverend Sullivan
24 taught me, zigzag for our people. That's
25 what I see. And I don't have no problem

2 telling you.

3 Where that President at, that
4 Darrell? That guy been down here for 50
5 years. Where's he at?

6 My man up there, North Philly.
7 I remember when he was running down there
8 and I was coming, he was a kid. And it
9 makes me feel good. You don't know how
10 it makes me feel when I see Cherelle
11 helping Marian as the interns, as
12 interns. Let's see, what is she --
13 state, up there, the state stuff up
14 there. Now she saying that highway too
15 much. Come on back home. Now she's in
16 this Chamber. In this Chamber. That's
17 the proof of our women missing our young
18 girls to get them in this position to
19 help our community. That's what it's all
20 about.

21 Our men, I got the young guys.
22 I'm trying to coach them in the Sonny
23 Hill league and the Baker league, and
24 I've been pretty good in my day. I give
25 back to the world, because God give me

2 the strength. God. I'm still here.

3 God bless you.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. Council will be at ease.

7 (Council at ease.)

10 The next order of business is
11 communications, and the Chair requests
12 that the Sergeant-of-Arms delivers the

17 A resolution authorizing the
18 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority to
19 dispose of certain properties located in
20 the Seventh Councilmanic District that
21 will be transferred by the City to the
22 Authority, by conveyance of such
23 properties through the Philadelphia Land
24 Bank in accordance with the terms of
25 Chapter 16-700 of The Philadelphia Code;

3 A resolution authorizing the

17 all under certain terms and conditions.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 de-fund and quit using the Sheriff's

2 Department, the District Attorney's
3 Office, City Controller's Office, and the
4 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority for

8 after the deed transfer and not before.

9 Is due process no longer
10 required? 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
11 U.S. and PA Constitutions say otherwise.

12 Last week Council honored
13 Mrs. Abernathy, who stated we are not
14 free until there is liberty and justice
15 for all. She also acknowledged the
16 diversity of the Councilmembers. What
17 strikes me is the injustice that can be
18 inflicted by all races and sexes upon all
19 races and sexes.

20 Council pats itself on the
21 back, says it obeys and helps the people.
22 Then how does Council allow deed transfer
23 and seek to deny jury trial for the theft
24 of 1038 West Wyoming Avenue?

25 Same tyranny, different faces.

2 Noting the above laws and
3 others unnamed, it is illegal to not
4 provide instant remedy in jury trial.
5 Council and its members dishonors the
6 civil rights struggles and sacrifices.
7 Council and its members dishonors
8 patriots and veterans' sacrifices. If
9 Ben Franklin himself could dig out of his
10 grave, he would come down here and smite
11 all of you for ruining this republic and
12 violating the sacred rule of law.

13 Obviously my comments aren't
14 sacred enough that Council President
15 remained in the building while they were
16 being spoken.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you very much.

16 We will now have speeches on
17 behalf of the minority, and the Chair
18 recognizes Councilman Taubenberger.

19 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
20 you, Council President. Yesterday there
21 was an event that was sponsored by AARP
22 and City Controller Alan Butkovitz at the
23 University of Pennsylvania. I found it
24 exceptionally informative. I was joined
25 there by Councilwoman Parker and

2 Councilman Green. I thought it was a
3 great opportunity to hear firsthand about
4 retirement and the need for that,
5 particularly on the private sector.
6 There were some great speakers, including
7 former Lieutenant Governor of Maryland,
8 Townsend Kennedy, and also
9 representatives of the federal
10 government. I think this was an
11 excellent opportunity. It also leads
12 into what was passed by my colleague, and
13 I helped to support it as well as you,
14 the Task Force on Retirement Security, a
15 very, very important subject for the
16 City, sometimes not looked at as
17 importantly as it can because it affects
18 our economy. And I want to thank City
19 Controller Alan Butkovitz and my
20 colleagues Councilman Green and also
21 Councilwoman Parker for their initiative
22 in this, and I look forward to working
23 with them.

24 I also want to make note that
25 this Saturday at Pelbano Recreation

2 Center, which is the recreation center in
3 Northeast Philadelphia in the Rhawnhurst
4 section, in City Councilman Brian
5 O'Neill's district, there will be another
6 program regarding financial wellness.
7 City Controller Alan Butkovitz will be
8 there. I just urge my colleagues and all
9 Philadelphians that have an interest in
10 this subject to attend. I think it will
11 be well worth their time.

12 Thank you so much.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 The Chair recognizes Councilman

16 Oh.

17 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
18 much, Council President. I have two
19 things to talk about. The first is about
20 PHL LIVE Center Stage, our third year
21 doing it. Again, it's about the music
22 economy, talented people who need an
23 opportunity in order to develop their
24 talents, have an opportunity to earn a
25 living and maybe even help others earn a

2 living. I'd invite my Council colleagues
3 and the folks from the Mayor's Office to
4 please attend. There's ten events, ten
5 genres of music, and an award show. If
6 you would like to attend, we'd certainly
7 like to recognize you at each one of
8 these events. And so it should be a
9 great thing, and so please, I left a
10 flyer on everyone's desk.

11 The second thing, I'd like to
12 recognize and thank State Representative
13 Stephen Kinsey. He introduced or is
14 introducing a bill to return local
15 control of the Philadelphia Parking
16 Authority to Philadelphia. I appreciate
17 that perspective. I think he's acting in
18 the best interest of his constituents and
19 the people of our city.

20 At the same time, there's a
21 bill moving forward which would allow two
22 members of the Parking Authority Board to
23 either live outside of our city or to be
24 appointed from outside of our city.

25 These Board members are appointed for ten

2 years, and outside of that, we here in
3 Philadelphia have very little ability to
4 influence them other than the fact that
5 they live in our community and our
6 neighborhoods.

7 With all the issues that have
8 arisen over the Parking Authority,
9 starting with the failure to deliver
10 money to our School District,
11 mismanagement of funds and funds not
12 being provided to our city, and then the
13 issue that a lot of money has been
14 collected in Philadelphia and provided to
15 communities outside of our city, I think
16 it's important for us here in
17 Philadelphia to be at the table when we
18 start talking about how this Parking
19 Authority is being run.

20 I also want to bring up in that
21 light what's going on in Harrisburg,
22 House Bill 1885, and I'm very alarmed,
23 and I've said so. And I understand we
24 can all disagree, and we should agree to
25 disagree. In this situation, whether

2 people support or don't support sanctuary
3 cities, I think it is majorly problematic
4 that a bill is moving forward that would
5 withhold funding to our city unless the
6 Mayor changes his mind. I think the
7 Mayor was elected by the people in
8 Philadelphia, and I think we'll deal with
9 the Mayor if we like or don't like what
10 he's doing, but I don't want to see that
11 whenever someone disagrees with what the
12 Mayor is doing and they were not elected
13 Mayor, that they start trying to withhold
14 our funds. It would be catastrophic for
15 our city. 2.7 billion dollars would be
16 withheld. Well, people told me it's not
17 going to make it out of the House. It
18 did make it out of the House with
19 bipartisan support. Now it goes to the
20 Senate. And what I mean is, bipartisan,
21 Philadelphia democrats voted to withhold
22 money to Philadelphia. And now it's
23 going to the state Senate, and there are
24 no Philadelphia republicans in the state
25 Senate, and the question is why would any

2 state Senator in this Commonwealth vote
3 against a bill that was introduced by
4 Philadelphians and passed by both
5 democrats and republicans. So people
6 tell me it's not going to pass. I'm
7 telling them it's going to pass, and when
8 it passes, that will be the beginning of
9 a new precedent in Pennsylvania. If
10 someone doesn't like what we're doing,
11 they get to hold up \$2.7 billion. Let's
12 talk about gun control. Let's talk about
13 abortion access. And I don't care where
14 you fall on that issue, but we're going
15 to either make that decision as a local
16 community or we're going to be held up at
17 gunpoint over every issue that arises
18 that a legislator in Harrisburg disagrees
19 with the Mayor. If you disagree with the
20 Mayor, talk to our delegation. If you
21 disagree with the Mayor, run for Mayor.
22 Outside of that, I think this is a big
23 problem for us here in Philadelphia.

24 There are a number of issues
25 that are moving forward in Harrisburg,

2 including whether or not we get local
3 control of our School District. These
4 issues are in Harrisburg. I would
5 encourage everyone to take a look at how
6 our Philadelphia elected officials are
7 voting, especially on this upcoming bill,
8 House Bill 1885, and other ones.

9 Thank you very much.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Councilman.

12 On behalf of the majority, the
13 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: So it's not
15 a red state or a blue state. We agree on
16 the state of Harrisburg. We are part of
17 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. We are
18 part of the Commonwealth family, but
19 right around now I feel like we're being
20 treated like the stepchild of the family,
21 where we need parental supervision to
22 govern our affairs.

23 I agree with my colleague on
24 House Bill 29, which would allow poll
25 workers from Potter County to come down

2 and inspect the integrity of our voting
3 process. I would suggest to you that if
4 they want to come down and tell us about
5 how tall the corn grows there outside of
6 the poll and how to advocate for that, I
7 welcome them. Freedom of speech.
8 They're a part of the Commonwealth
9 family. But if they want to go inside
10 the polls, some of them may possibly --
11 as the great Donald Trump said, it be
12 rigged -- they can go back to Potter
13 County and become anonymous again. So I
14 am very concerned about
15 non-Philadelphians going into the
16 apparatus of our elective process.

17 I agree also with my colleague
18 that House Bill 1885 and their ability to
19 penalize us if we allow for someone to
20 seek refuge here and they do something
21 wrong, that we then are responsible for
22 their behavior. Can you micromanage us
23 any further? If regular people who are
24 already born here do something, should we
25 be liable for that? We're already liable

2 and we take steps to hold people
3 accountable for those actions. I think
4 they are going beyond what the state
5 Charter actually intended for them.

6 House Bill 1998, a proposal to
7 allow six members, six, to be
8 non-Philadelphians to dictate how the
9 Parking Authority should be run. We
10 can't find Philadelphians that possess
11 the logistics and accounting skills to
12 run that place? I think we can, and I --
13 it further goes whether you're talking
14 about a lot of the things that are
15 regional -- I'm okay with participation
16 if it has a regional impact, but if it's
17 in Philadelphia, let Philadelphia govern
18 it. And I just don't understand why all
19 of the sudden they're overreaching their
20 authority.

21 So with respect to the rights
22 of our state legislators, we'd like you
23 to please treat us like family members
24 and not like the stepchild that they
25 propose.

4 Thank you, Councilman.

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman
6 Green.

7 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
8 Council President. As we prepare for
9 November 8th, we are in a very
10 hyper-partisan environment, and sometimes
11 regardless if you're a democrat or
12 republican, you forget that you're a
13 citizen. So I want to commend Councilman
14 Oh for his comments. I'd also like to
15 commend other colleagues from the right
16 side of the aisle, Councilman
17 Taubenberger and O'Neill, because
18 although they may be republicans, they
19 are Philadelphians first, and I've always
20 seen them advocate on behalf of the City
21 of Philadelphia first regardless of
22 party.

23 Also I would like to speak on
24 the fact that this Saturday is the Autism
25 Speaks walk at Citizens Bank Park at 9

2 o'clock a.m. As many of you know, that
3 my son Julian is autistic. This is our
4 seventh year of participating in the walk
5 this Saturday, October 22nd. For those
6 of you who are listening and those who
7 are here, I hope you can come out and
8 participate. We are Team Green. So you
9 can always look for the green balloons.

10 And it's interesting how this
11 challenge, the physical challenge and
12 learning challenge of autism, has
13 dramatically changed over the years.
14 When he was diagnosed, one out of every
15 200 children were diagnosed on the autism
16 spectrum. One out of every 68 children
17 are now diagnosed with autism. There are
18 more children on the autism spectrum than
19 AIDS, cancer, and diabetes combined.

20 So I hope that people will be
21 able to come out to the walk this
22 Saturday at 9:00 a.m. at Citizens Bank
23 Park.

24 In addition, my involvement in
25 autism led me to learn a lot more about

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2 medical marijuana, and in being an
3 advocate in the autism community, I've
4 learned that in a number of states -- and
5 we have 26 states in the nation that
6 allow medical marijuana -- a number of
7 parents who have children who are
8 autistic have been using medical
9 marijuana as a way to help their
10 children. So that's why I was very
11 pleased that in April of this year,
12 Governor Wolf signed into law the
13 Pennsylvania Medical Marijuana Act. And
14 this law allows for people suffering from
15 ALS, autism, cancer, epilepsy, HIV/AIDS,
16 post-traumatic stress syndrome and other
17 conditions to use, with a physician's
18 recommendation, marijuana in the form of
19 pills, oils, topicals, tinctures, vapors
20 or liquids.

21 This body on September 8th of
22 this year had hearings in the Public
23 Health and Human Services Committee to
24 really discuss the impact of this new
25 legislation and how it may impact the

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2 City. It was as a result of these
3 hearings and discussions with the
4 Administration, the legislation I
5 introduced today will allow medical
6 marijuana growers and processors to
7 operate in light, medium, and heavy
8 industrial districts in the City and,
9 additionally, medical marijuana
10 dispensaries will be allowed in some
11 commercial districts as long as they are
12 500 feet away from protected uses and
13 1,000 feet away from regulated uses.

14 Some of you may not recall, but
15 today is actually the two-year
16 anniversary of the decriminalization of
17 the possession of small amounts of
18 marijuana in Philadelphia, and you all
19 should remember that was introduced and
20 passed by then-Councilman Jim Kenney, our
21 current Mayor.

22 So clearly things have changed
23 with regard to marijuana, and hopefully
24 through the legislation I introduced
25 today we'll continue the conversation

2 regarding medical marijuana and its
3 impact in our city.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Thank you, Councilman.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Johnson.

8 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
9 Council President. You know, back in
10 1998, you know, it was a major transition
11 in my life from me going from being a boy
12 to a man in my neighborhood in South
13 Philadelphia where a cousin of mine was
14 murdered in the streets of South Philly,
15 17th and Dickinson where I grew up at.
16 And during that particular time, I used
17 that anger, I used my passion for revenge
18 to create an organization called Peace
19 Not Guns in honor and memory of not only
20 of my cousin but also several young men
21 who were murdered in the streets of South
22 Philadelphia during the two-year time
23 period when I was coming home from
24 college on the weekends. Every time I
25 would come home, I would find out

2 somebody I grew up with was murdered.
3 So after my cousin was
4 murdered, I created an organization
5 called Peace Not Guns, and one of the
6 first people who I reached out to to come
7 and participate and advocate around this
8 issue was a gentleman by the name of
9 Bilal Qayyum, and it's close to 20 years
10 later he's still on the same case
11 advocating against violence in the
12 streets of Philadelphia, and on this
13 weekend in South Philadelphia at
14 Audenried High School, he will be hosting
15 the National Conference on Black Youth
16 Gun Violence. The conference kicks off
17 tomorrow at 5:30. Councilman Curtis
18 Jones and myself will kick the conference
19 off. But it's a two-day conference to
20 look at comprehensively how we can
21 address the issue of black on black
22 violence, not only in the City of
23 Philadelphia but also as a national
24 issue. And so if anyone is interested in
25 coming out and participating, come on out

2 tomorrow. It starts at 5 o'clock at
3 Audenried High School, 32nd and Tasker
4 Street. But I would bring as many young
5 people out to the event as possible,
6 because I know oftentimes we all have our
7 agendas pretty full focusing on a variety
8 of different issues, but when you look at
9 the issue of youth gun violence, every
10 day you turn on the television, African
11 American young men between the ages of 15
12 and 24 are constantly being murdered, and
13 this is for me the number one issue that
14 should be a priority here in the City of
15 Philadelphia. And so it's issues like
16 tomorrow on a grassroots level we'll
17 continue to make sure it's a priority
18 but, most importantly, do the work on the
19 grassroots level in terms of supporting
20 people to try to combat youth gun
21 violence.

22 Thank you very much, Council
23 President.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Thank you, Councilman.
