2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. We're going to start now.
4 Thank you so much.

5 We've established a quorum. If
6 visitors will retire behind the rail, we
7 will get started.

8 To give our invocation today,
9 the Chair recognizes Pastor Darrell
10 Bradsberry of Second Baptist Church of
11 Frankford. He is here today as the guest
12 of Councilwoman Maria Quinones-Sanchez.

13 I would ask all members,
14 guests, and visitors to please rise.

15 (Councilmembers and guests
16 rise.)

17 PASTOR BRADSBERRY: I want to
18 thank the President, Councilwoman
19 Sanchez, and you for allowing me to be
20 here.

21 This is a historical time in
22 our world, in our nation, and if there's
23 any time that we should gather together
24 and embrace each other and support each
25 other, it's now. But the best way to do

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2 that is through prayer. So let us pray.

3 Lord, we thank you for allowing
4 us to be able to gather here. We thank
5 you for these leaders that have taken
6 part in this session. We ask that you
7 would bless them as they go through the
8 different topics that they need to
9 discuss.

10 We pray, Lord, that you would
11 bless this nation. Allow us to come
12 together and to be one, united as we say
13 we are. Go with this session not only
14 this time but even in the sessions to
15 come.

16 It is in your name I pray.

17 Amen.

18 (Amen.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you so much, Pastor. Appreciate
21 it.

22 Council will be at ease.

23 (Council at ease.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you very much. Thank you. The

6 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
7 you, Mr. President. I move that the
8 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
9 November 3rd, 2016 be approved.

10 (Duly seconded.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you. It has been moved and
13 properly seconded that the Journal of the
14 meeting of Thursday, November 3rd, 2016
15 stand approved.

16 All those in favor say aye.

17 (Aye.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Those opposed?

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 ayes have it, and the Journal is
23 approved.

24 The next order of business is
25 requests for leaves of absence, and the

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2 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

3 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. On behalf of the
5 majority, a leave of absence is requested
6 for Councilmember Green.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Thank you, Councilman. Leave shall be
9 granted.

10 And the Chair now recognizes
11 Councilman Oh.

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
13 Mr. President. On behalf of the
14 minority, a leave of absence is requested
15 for Councilmember O'Neill.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you, Councilman. Leave shall be
18 granted.

19 At this time, I would like to
20 dispense with the regular order of
21 business and I would like to welcome
22 everyone who has come down to witness
23 their government in action today. We
24 really appreciate you coming down. We
25 hope that your stay here today is not

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2 only a pleasurable one but a
3 knowledgeable one, so much so that you
4 come back again. So, again, thank you so
5 much for being here today.

6 At this time, the Chair
7 recognizes Councilman Jones, who will
8 present a resolution recognizing the
9 Guardian Civic League. Would Rochelle
10 Bilal and those accompanying her please
11 join the Councilman at the podium.

12 (Councilmembers and guests
13 approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
15 joining Councilman Jones, we have
16 Councilwoman Blackwell, Councilman
17 Johnson, Councilman Oh, and Councilwoman
18 Quinones-Sanchez and Councilman
19 Taubenberger, Councilwoman Bass and
20 Councilwoman Gym and Councilman Domb.

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: It is an
22 honor to stand here today on behalf of
23 the 60th Anniversary of the Guardian
24 Civic League. Give them a round of
25 applause, please.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: The members
4 of the Guardian Civic League have
5 tirelessly dedicated themselves to
6 improvement of all communities in which
7 they live. They are always on duty.
8 They're never off duty.

9 I have spoken to some of the
10 young people that you have at your summer
11 camp, changing the paradigm of how young
12 people perceive law enforcement in the
13 City and around the nation.

14 They have been engaged in
15 public affairs going back in my
16 recollection from a guy by the name of
17 Alphonso Deal, who dealt with the whole
18 issue of Delbert Africa and how he was
19 treated, and spoke up at a time when it
20 wasn't convenient to speak up. It was a
21 bold statement to speak up against
22 injustices. So black lives matter didn't
23 just happen now. It happened then, and
24 we appreciate that input.

25 The founder, Alphonso Deal, and

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2 to current President, Rochelle Bilal,
3 they have continued that legacy of
4 service for 60 years. And most recently
5 when all of the issues of Philadelphia
6 election corruption came up, they stepped
7 up. They went out into the community,
8 went out into different sections of town
9 to regulate how and enforce how fair
10 elections are conducted. I think there's
11 a job description now formed that they
12 have done it so well.

13 In controversial elections,
14 sometimes we can get a little feisty. We
15 can get a little rambunctious. People
16 are passionate about who will represent
17 them in public office. But no matter how
18 rambunctious or emotional or personal it
19 gets, there are rules that we follow, and
20 they're the blacks in blue, the blacks in
21 blue that enforce those rules, and we
22 appreciate them.

23 One of the authors -- and I use
24 that term. "Blacks in Blue" is a book
25 that was put out and talked about how

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2 their sojourn in this city, City of
3 Philadelphia and Brotherly Love, at first
4 there wasn't much love for the brothers
5 until 1881 when the first African
6 American police officer was sworn in in
7 the City of Philadelphia, and since that
8 time, they have had that charge of
9 fidelity, integrity, and law enforcement
10 in our town.

11 Every year I'm proud to go up
12 and talk to the rookies. Rochelle Bilal
13 brings us up, all the way up to the
14 training center where we indoctrinate the
15 young officers that walk these streets.
16 The first thing that we tell them is that
17 they are part of the community. They are
18 not an occupying force. They're one of
19 us. They're our neighbors, and that
20 there is a delicate balance between
21 having someone who is having a bad day
22 and dealing with a bad person, and it is
23 their charge through training and
24 understanding to know the difference.
25 And we appreciate them today and are glad

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2 that they are around for 60 years and may
3 they be around for 60 more.

4 So it's my charge to present
5 this resolution recognizing and honoring
6 the Guardian Civic League for their sixty
7 years of service as police officers and
8 its commitment to fostering relations
9 with law enforcement officers and the
10 communities they provide service to.

11 Whereas, the Guardian Civic
12 League, local chapter of The National
13 Black Police Association, was founded in
14 1956, with the mission of fostering
15 relationships with members of the
16 Philadelphia Police Department and the
17 communities in which they serve; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
19 Whereas, the Guardian Civic League's
20 founder and first president was Police
21 Officer Alphonso Deal.

22 I note that he used to call me
23 the 18th City Councilperson. I wasn't
24 always here. I worked for Lucien in
25 those days.

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2 Past presidents of the
3 organization include Harold Arnold, James
4 Holley, Harold James, John Green, Jimmy
5 Ghee, Ronald Oliver, William E. Blackman,
6 David E. Fisher, William Don Rodgers,
7 James Walker, Willie L. Williams, III,
8 and Kathryn D. McNeill-Battle. The
9 organization's current president,
10 Rochelle Bilal, is the second and longest
11 standing female president since the
12 organization's existence; and

13 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
14 since its inception, the Guardian Civic
15 League has spoken out on many important
16 matters that affect the lives of all
17 Philadelphians, as well as accomplished
18 several significant milestones; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: I just
20 wanted to say as an aside, speaking truth
21 to power has never been more important in
22 these times, and I especially want to
23 acknowledge the Guardian Civic League for
24 using its positions to speak truth to
25 power on issues that are deeply

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2 meaningful to all of us.

3 Whereas, in 1972, the Guardian
4 Civic League and twelve other black
5 police organizations from around this
6 country met in St. Louis, Missouri, and
7 formed the National Black Police
8 Association;

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
10 the National Black Police Association has
11 grown to have a membership in excess of
12 30,000 police officers. In 2010, the
13 Guardian Civic League hosted the Eastern
14 Region Conference of the National Black
15 Police Association in Philadelphia. In
16 2012, the Guardian Civic League also
17 hosted the National Conference for the
18 National Black Police Association; and

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: And we
20 also would like to thank the Guardian
21 Civic League for stepping up to the plate
22 and denouncing the endorsement of Donald
23 Trump serving as President-elect of these
24 United States and his endorsement by the
25 local Philadelphia FOP.

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2 Whereas, over the years, the
3 Guardian Civic League has developed and
4 implemented various programs throughout
5 the City of Philadelphia, which are
6 benefiting most Philadelphians. Some of
7 these efforts have included the creation
8 of summer enrichment programs, which
9 developed jobs for youth in the
10 community, as well as the "Steer Straight
11 Program," which teaches the new recruits
12 critical skills for maintaining a
13 positive career as a police officer;

14 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
15 Whereas, the organization also hosts the
16 "Lauretha Vaird Basketball Tournament,"
17 in honor of the first African American
18 female police officer killed in the line
19 of duty, as well as an annual "Family and
20 Friends Cookout," where book bags and
21 school supplies are provided to students
22 returning to school; and

23 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the
24 Guardian Civic League has shown its
25 continued dedication to improving the

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2 moral, civic and social well-being of the
3 community by ensuring accountability of
4 police officers and community members,
5 upward mobility for law enforcement
6 officers, and fair and equal treatment
7 for all; now, therefore, be it

8 COUNCILMAN OH: Resolved, by
9 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
10 that it hereby recognizes and honors the
11 Guardian Civic League for its sixty years
12 of service to police officers and its
13 commitment to fostering relationships
14 with law enforcement officers and the
15 communities they protect and serve.

16 Further resolved, that an
17 engrossed copy of the resolution be
18 presented to the Guardian Civic League of
19 Philadelphia, further evidencing the
20 sincere admiration and gratitude of this
21 legislative body.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILMAN JONES: Just as a
24 matter of record, the headquarters is
25 located in the 5th Councilmanic District.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 That's right. Thank you, sir.

4 The Chair recognizes Ms. Bilal
5 for remarks.

6 MS. BILAL: Thank you,
7 President.

8 In the name of God, the most
9 gracious, the most merciful. Thank you,
10 Council President Darrell Clarke and all
11 of the Councilmembers here today. I
12 think Alphonso Deal and those who thought
13 about forming the Guardian Civic League
14 is shining down on this Council today,
15 and we really do appreciate it.

16 I want to also thank the
17 Executive Committee that stands here
18 today for working with me these nine
19 years. And they call me the Task Master,
20 but I just want to get it done, and they
21 do get it done.

22 I need to get -- I need to let
23 you know them by name, because this is
24 the group, this is our future leaders of
25 the Guardian Civic League, and I need you

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2 to recognize them by name.

3 My right-hand person, my
4 Executive Vice President, Detective
5 Crystal Williams.

6 (Applause.)

7 MS. BILAL: Some of them are
8 not here today because they're active, so
9 they're on patrol.

10 My VP of Programs is Sergeant
11 Robert Billips; my VP of Community
12 Affairs is Michael Kennedy; my VP of
13 Membership is Detective Laura Hammond; my
14 Treasurer, Sergeant Shaun Butts; my
15 Financial Secretary, Police Officer
16 Doreen Napper; my Records and
17 Correspondence Secretary, Police Officer
18 Andrea Justice; my Chaplain, Sergeant
19 Denise Wood; my Parliamentarian stands
20 here with me today and he's retired,
21 Inspector -- Chief Inspector Arthur
22 Matthews.

23 (Applause.)

24 MS. BILAL: And let me not
25 forget our excellent assistant, Executive

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2 Assistant, who will call you at all times
3 and answers that phone at the Guardian
4 Civic League, Elaine Thomas. Our
5 photographer who is standing out there,
6 sometimes he acts like the
7 Sergeant-of-Arms. His name is Isaac
8 Carlton. Community Relations person,
9 Thera Milling, and our Executive Economic
10 Development person, retired, Sergeant
11 Jihad Ali, who stands here today with us.

12 The Guardian Civic League
13 stands on the shoulders of strong men and
14 women who in 1956 helped form this
15 organization for the betterment of our
16 membership and the communities that we
17 serve. Our first president took a lot of
18 heat for standing up against a system
19 that today still treats people of color
20 unfairly. Though we have had some ups
21 and downs, we are still relevant and
22 still standing strong.

23 On your desks is our pamphlet
24 that outlines the programs that we do for
25 our members in the community. I'm not

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2 going to read all of them out loud today,
3 but I ask that you read them so that you
4 know the things that we continue to do
5 from the Guardian Civic League.

6 I just want to outline a few
7 that is important to me and to our
8 hearts.

9 Our summer enrichment program:
10 We raise the funds to keep young people
11 motivated, safe during the summer. We do
12 two things with our program. One, to
13 help 7-year-olds to the age of
14 13-year-olds engage in reading, math,
15 science, and art. They still have fun,
16 so we still take them on trips and they
17 go swimming. So it's not just all work.
18 We work together in reference to that.

19 The other part we do in the
20 program is to help young teenagers who
21 act as our junior counselors and our
22 college students as our senior counselors
23 become job ready, teaching them to follow
24 the rules, time management, and
25 professionalism.

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2 So when I say we raise the
3 funds, you know I'm going to put my hand
4 out. I'm just saying we are now raising
5 funds for our 2017 summer enrichment
6 camp, and all donations are much
7 appreciated.

8 Our one-day boot camp, which
9 takes young people from the streets to
10 the District, to Temple University, and
11 then to the prison. We want them to see
12 that getting into the system is not like
13 a TV show.

14 Finally, our Lauretha Vaird
15 Memorial event held at the Boys and Girls
16 Club named after her. Lauretha Vaird is
17 the first female officer killed in the
18 line of duty in 1996. She was a member
19 of ours. In January of 2017, we will
20 have a two-day event at the Lauretha
21 Vaird Boys and Girls Club, 4700 Whitaker
22 Avenue. The first day starts that
23 Saturday, which will have two parts. The
24 morning workshop will be conflict
25 resolutions for young people and

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2 anti-bullying. The second part of that
3 day will be a basketball clinic. Day two
4 of that event would have appropriate-age
5 basketball game. It means all ages,
6 different categories. And that will be a
7 ticket event. The money raised from that
8 goes directly to the Lauretha Vaird Boys
9 and Girls Club.

10 So at this point, we would like
11 to honor some of our friends who
12 constantly reach out to us, and we do
13 appreciate it. Now, we put gifts on your
14 desk because we want to let you know we
15 appreciate all of you. So this is not to
16 slight anybody. This is for the ones
17 that constantly reach out to us and ask
18 us what we need to continue to do.

19 So we need to honor three
20 people. We today are making you an
21 honorary member of the Guardian Civic
22 League. We have one for Councilwoman
23 Jannie Blackwell.

24 (Applause.)

25 MS. BILAL: We have one for

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2 Councilman Curtis Jones.

3 (Applause.)

4 MS. BILAL: And we have one for
5 Councilman David Oh.

6 (Applause.)

7 MS. BILAL: We want to thank
8 those of you who bought tickets and took
9 ads out in our 60th anniversary ad
10 journal. Your support goes towards us
11 giving out our scholarships to young
12 people trying to get a higher education.

13 And on a final note, as I
14 finish up, our organization has been in
15 the 1500 block of Girard Avenue since
16 1972, and you know that area is
17 gentrified and there are condominiums
18 coming up all over the place. There's
19 only two organizations left there. One
20 is the church that's next door to us.
21 The second is us. And we're going to
22 stay there as long as we can and battle
23 to keep doing what we do.

24 We thank you for all that you
25 do. We appreciate this honor, and may

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2 God bless you to continue to do the work.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Council will be at ease.

6 (Council at ease.)

7 COUNCILMAN HENON: At this

8 time, the Chair recognizes Councilwoman

9 Bass, who will present a resolution

10 honoring Greta Greenberger. Would Greta

11 Greenberger and those accompanying her

12 please join the Councilwoman at the

13 podium.

14 (Councilmembers and guests

15 approached podium.)

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair

17 recognizes Councilman Greenlee,

18 Councilman Squilla, Councilwoman

19 Blackwell, Councilwoman Maria

20 Quinones-Sanchez, Councilman Johnson,

21 Councilman Taubenberger, Councilwoman

22 Blondell Reynolds Brown.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good

24 morning, everyone.

25 (Good morning.)

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: So we're
3 here recognizing Greta Greenberger for
4 all of her hard work and her preparation
5 for retirement, or actually her actual
6 retirement, after 25 years of service to
7 the City of Philadelphia. And, you know,
8 I have a funny story about how I first
9 met Greta. We actually were neighbors.
10 I didn't realize she was my neighbor
11 until I walked around. I was actually in
12 campaign mode. This was many, many years
13 ago. And she didn't know me from a can
14 of paint. And I knocked on her door, and
15 she invited me in her home. She invited
16 me in. She gave me a glass of iced tea,
17 I think it was, and then she grilled me.
18 And I was sweating so bad, I needed
19 another glass of iced tea.

20 But that's the person that she
21 is. She is warm and welcoming and tough
22 all at the same time, and I really
23 appreciate those qualities in you.
24 You've been a tremendous asset to the
25 City of Philadelphia.

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2 There's nobody like Greta.

3 We're really going to miss all
4 of the hard work that you do around here
5 in this building, and we just really
6 wanted to celebrate you today.

7 And so we have a resolution
8 which reads: Honoring Greta Greenberger
9 on her retirement after 25 years as tour
10 director of City Hall and recognizing her
11 dedication to the promotion and
12 preservation of the history, heritage and
13 beauty of this City.

14 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

15 Whereas, for the past 25 years, Greta
16 Greenberger has been the public face of
17 City Hall to visiting tourists.

18 And I know that personally
19 because I've sent many there.

20 She has been on her job through
21 five mayoral administrations and has
22 become an expert on all matters of the
23 building, its workings, its occupants as
24 anyone in the City. She has been the
25 curator for the building, working with

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2 the City Hall Art Program, Public
3 Property on issues of preservation,
4 maintenance and even the portraits of
5 former mayors;

6 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: At one
7 moment, she is lovingly communicating the
8 amazing story of the building and within
9 the same day can be organizing to have a
10 missing part of the bronze chandelier in
11 the Mayor's Reception Room replaced -
12 with money she personally raised. She
13 has become a dogged defender and advocate
14 for the building and the City's
15 obligation to the visiting public and has
16 seamlessly blended that visitation with
17 the day-to-day workings of City
18 government; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: We
20 want to thank her husband too for his
21 service to the City. Thank you.

22 Whereas, Greta Greenberger was
23 trained as an arts educator, originally
24 at the Tyler School of Art at Temple
25 University, eventually getting her degree

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2 from the Massachusetts College of Art in
3 Boston where she grew up. She became a
4 high school art teacher in Portland,
5 Maine where she taught for ten years. In
6 1979, she was offered a position with a
7 national program based in Philadelphia
8 called Architecture in Schools and moved
9 here with her five-year-old daughter,
10 Erika, during that summer; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas, a
12 colleague of hers in Architecture in
13 Schools happened to be an architect who
14 graduated from Rensselaer with Greta's
15 eventual husband, Alan Greenberger. They
16 all met on the street by chance -- how
17 romantic -- near 23rd and Walnut. In
18 1981, Greta and Alan married and had a
19 daughter, Julia, in 1984. Greta left her
20 job with Architecture in Schools to
21 become the Chief Exhibit Designer at the
22 Please Touch Museum where she oversaw the
23 museum's move to 21st Street.

24 That was monumental.

25 After the birth of her second

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2 daughter, the Greenberger family moved to
3 Australia where Alan's firm was designing
4 the new Australian Parliament House; and

5 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
6 the family returned in 1985 and Greta
7 took a job with the Foundation for
8 Architecture where she co-managed their
9 program Architecture in Education.

10 Eventually, she took on the leadership of
11 the Foundation's architectural tour
12 program which provided extensive public
13 tours throughout the City as well as
14 training to volunteer guides. In 1991,
15 the Foundation was invited by then-Mayor
16 Wilson Goode to run the tower tour
17 program of City Hall. Greta was the
18 natural person to lead this program and
19 turned her attention to City Hall and its
20 extraordinary architectural and social
21 history. With the election of Mayor Ed
22 Rendell, those responsibilities grew into
23 a full-fledged program involving public
24 tours inside and outside the building as
25 well as to the observation level beneath

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2 the statue of William Penn; and

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
4 and all the while, she has never actually
5 been an employee of the City of
6 Philadelphia. She started this program
7 with the Foundation for Architecture.

8 When it closed its operations, she
9 carried on as the sole proprietor of her
10 own business on contract to the City, and
11 eventually as an employee of the
12 Independence Visitor Center who currently
13 contract with the City to manage the
14 operation. The program, the Visitor
15 Center, the volunteers who have served
16 all these years, and the extraordinary
17 hospitality offered every day are Greta's
18 legacy and gift to her adopted City; now,
19 therefore, be it

20 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ:
21 Resolved, by the Council of the City of
22 Philadelphia, that it hereby honors Greta
23 Greenberger on her retirement after 25
24 years as tour director of City Hall, the
25 building she loves, loves, loves, and

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2 recognizes her dedication to the
3 promotion and preservation of the
4 history, heritage and beauty of the City
5 of Philadelphia.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And let's
7 celebrate them, but before we do, I also,
8 as Councilwoman Blackwell mentioned,
9 wanted to give a special acknowledgment
10 to Alan Greenberger, who for many years
11 led the City's Commerce Department. And
12 when you think about Philadelphia, there
13 is no couple I think that really
14 epitomizes Philadelphia more than the
15 Greenbergers. So let's really give them
16 a round of applause.

17 Congratulations.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

20 The Chair now recognizes
21 Mrs. Greenberger.

22 MS. GREENBERGER: Wow, I
23 usually don't use microphones in this
24 room.

25 I want to thank the Council for

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2 this wonderful recognition, and I can
3 only say what has been said. I love my
4 years here at City Hall. Matter of fact,
5 I'm going to continue to come in and help
6 out from time to time. So don't be
7 surprised if you see me leading a tour.

8 But this has been an amazing
9 experience for me to spend my days
10 sharing this incredible building, its
11 history, William Penn, our founder, and
12 his history, and certainly how our City
13 government functions. So I want to
14 personally thank each of the
15 Councilmembers who have been there to
16 support our program, have reached out to
17 our program and to me to help welcome
18 their visitors, and I hope that will
19 continue with the tour program. We are
20 here as ambassadors of the City and are
21 more than happy to be of assistance to
22 all the Councilmembers and all of the
23 visitors today.

24 I could not have done what I've
25 done if it weren't for the incredible

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2 volunteers who over the 25 years have
3 probably numbered over 50 people who have
4 come, some for like 10, 15 years, giving
5 their personal time to be here in the
6 Visitor Center to give out information to
7 visitors, to welcome people, and to
8 arrange for people to take tours.

9 The tour program is more than
10 just going to the tower, and yet that is
11 an extraordinary experience we hope
12 everybody will do.

13 I do have some of the
14 volunteers with me here. I want to thank
15 Elaine Morris, who will continue to give
16 tours and is a phenomenal person by
17 herself and with the program.

18 Did Heather come up here?

19 Back here is Heather Murphy,
20 who will now be the leader of the tour
21 program. And so reach out to Heather to
22 continue sharing this amazing building
23 with people.

24 We have visitors from all over
25 the world, all ages, all backgrounds, all

11 and she demonstrated to me that sometimes
12 it works and sometimes it doesn't work.

16 almost every Philadelphian who drives has
17 experienced coming up to a meter and it's
18 broken, and what happens is, you can't
19 park there, and if you do, you get a
20 ticket.

21 I have introduced for the

23 ordinance that requires that once the
24 defense of the meter is broken has been
25 raised -- well, first of all, if it's

16 endowed by their creator with certain
17 unalienable rights, that to secure these
18 rights, governments are instituted among
19 men, deriving their just powers from the
20 consent of the government, that whenever
21 any form of government become destructive
22 of these ends, it is the right of the
23 people to alter it or abolish it and to
24 institute new government.

25 I quote it is never the wrong

2 time to do the right thing. Twenty-two
3 years I have been without my home and
4 private property, taken without due

11 I make another official decree
12 to de-fund and stop using the

15 represent 4,500 members in the ten
16 surrounding county area of Philadelphia.

17 I rise in support of this
18 resolution because the RINs are taking
19 away the capital necessary to produce
20 jobs, especially in the refining area.
21 Local 420 produces about 5.3 million man
22 hours. Of that 5.3 million man hours, a
23 million of that is based in oil
24 refineries, which represents
25 approximately \$84 million in wages and

3 the local economies, which supports our
4 local communities.

5 I rise because the jobs are

11 that my members face and the members that
12 were working in them refineries was
13 incredible.

14 We are not only stewards of
15 jobs, I can assure every member of this
16 Council we are also stewards of the
17 environment. I know the concerns that we
18 have. I can assure you when we are
19 working in them places not only as
20 members of Steamfitters Local 420 but the
21 building trades, we do it safe, we do it
22 right, and we do it with concern of
23 property, equipment, and people. That is
24 our top priority - safety. Nothing, and
25 I mean nothing, comes before the safety

14 who chairs the Streets and Services
15 Committee, and myself, I just want to
16 explain that I introduced a resolution to
17 hold a hearing because in 2007 there was
18 a bill passed in favor of and to support
19 electric vehicles and electric vehicle
20 charging stations. However, they weren't
21 really being implemented until now, which
22 is 2016. And they may be done in a
23 really wonderful way. I just don't know,
24 but I have gotten complaints from folks
25 because, as I understand it and have

2 looked into it, there's an application
3 process that ultimately will cost at the
4 end of the day, including the charging
5 station, about \$4,000, and what the
6 applicant receives is a parking space in
7 front of their home, where only
8 electrical vehicles can park there.

9 However, they cannot use your charging
10 equipment. So if any other car parks in
11 that space, they will be towed. They
12 could be towed. Only other electrical
13 vehicles can park there, and they can
14 park there for three or four days, so you
15 can't park in front of your space anyway.

16 In 2007, the technology was far
17 slower than today. So today electric
18 vehicles can be charged halfway for 20
19 minutes and fully for about an hour and a
20 half, and I think it would be a good idea
21 just to look and see is this process the
22 best process given today's technology,
23 and that's the reason for the hearing.

24 On a different note, I'd just
25 like to say that this is the third year

2 of PHL LIVE and we have done nine final
3 shows, and tonight at Fire and Ice at 312
4 Market Street we're doing the DJ finals.
5 Again, this is really about the creative
6 economy. I was interviewing
7 International DJ Casper a couple days
8 ago. He's a DJ born in North
9 Philadelphia. He produced the music for
10 the movie Deadpool. Gets a check every
11 time they play that music. He's with
12 DarkChild doing the music for the TV
13 series Empire.

14 He's making a lot more money
15 today than probably in any other
16 profession that he would have pursued,
17 and he loves being a DJ. The highest
18 paid DJ for last year earned \$66 million.

19 We have a lot of talented
20 people. They need platforms and
21 opportunities. And so I invite everyone
22 to participate in the music economy and
23 supporting our music economy, supporting
24 the folks in our city, no matter their
25 age or socioeconomic background, who have

2 talent and want to pursue the
3 opportunity. So on Thursday, December
4 8th, the day I think everybody in this
5 Chamber knows, at 7:30 the doors will
6 open at the Trocadero where we hold our
7 awards show where for all ten genres we
8 bring up the finalists and announce the
9 winner. They win \$1,000, free studio
10 recording time and other types of prizes,
11 as well as the people's choice. And for
12 this year, our co-hosts are Vassy, who is
13 a seven-time multi-platinum recording
14 artist originally from Australia, and
15 Keith From Up Da Block, very funny
16 comedian from Philadelphia.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for
20 continuing to highlight the great artists
21 in the City of Philadelphia.

22 On behalf of the majority, the
23 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
25 Mr. President. First, let me thank you

2 for -- well, I guess what would come
3 first is that in the Army, they teach you
4 never volunteer, and there's a reason for
5 that. Because volunteers get put to work
6 in a substantial way. But I really want
7 to reverse that and thank you for getting
8 me to volunteer on the Committee for
9 Justice Reform. It has been worthwhile,
10 and I hope it will be productive.

11 We have produced an Interim
12 Report, and Keir Grey, who is a Co-Chair
13 that you appointed, wanted to title this
14 report "A Shift from Re-Entry to
15 Pre-Entry," which when you addressed the
16 Committee, at first we wanted to figure
17 out -- it's easier to prevent people from
18 getting in the pipeline than once they
19 get in trying to bring them back into
20 society. So we are spending a lot of our
21 time on that.

22 I want you to know that working
23 with CJAB, Criminal Justice Advisory
24 Board, working with the Mayor's MacArthur
25 Foundation, Judge Lerner and his staff,

2 members on this Committee are Councilman
3 Johnson, Councilwoman Blackwell has been
4 at meetings, and Councilman Henon has
5 been at meetings to offer input to the
6 document, interim document, you see here
7 today.

8 We started out we had, I think,
9 four major long hearings, starting with
10 Councilman Johnson's gun violence
11 resolution, where we heard passionate
12 testimony from the victims of what occurs
13 when these incidents happen throughout
14 our neighborhoods. We discovered in our
15 research that there are 48 zip codes in
16 the City of Philadelphia. Eleven of them
17 occupy 87 percent of the inmates up on
18 State Road.

19 It is also not lost to us that
20 in those 11 zip codes where those
21 populations come from, those are where
22 most of the 23 schools we closed come
23 from. And so if you can find what the
24 causes are -- if a kid can't read by the
25 time they're four years old up to par, we

2 know how many cells to build by the time
3 they're 18 -- you can reverse engineer
4 some of the solutions, which you've
5 insisted upon.

6 So this report talks about a
7 couple of key things, Mr. President. The
8 tenets of it are to initiate a reduction
9 of the prison to pipeline, strategies to
10 prevent young people's involvement early
11 in the criminal justice system,
12 systematic change to reduce the
13 population up on State Road, moving those
14 inmates out, reducing recidivism by
15 making improvements and enhancements to
16 local reentry programs, and institute
17 evidence-based programs that work, find
18 evidence-based programs that work.
19 That's going to be difficult, because
20 every program can make you feel good, but
21 you have to know how much "good" costs
22 and how to make these investments.

23 You insisted that we do our
24 work quickly because we have the budget
25 process coming up, and if we're going to

2 make substantial investments in criminal
3 justice, we need to start that process
4 now.

5 So what were the three key
6 things that are in this Interim Report?
7 We did the report for the summer. It was
8 real easy, low-hanging fruit. Increase
9 jobs for young people, increase
10 activities, watch out for hotspots. That
11 was easy. What we want to do now is to
12 pay attention to what many people who
13 came in and testified before have
14 reinforced through these hearings.

15 One, we want to do a new risk
16 assessment model. Just because a person
17 has a bad day doesn't make him a bad
18 person. We have to figure out who is a
19 risk to themselves and the rest of the
20 community and society and we need to hold
21 them. Those who are not a risk to
22 themselves -- we met with young people up
23 in prison, a couple of them that were
24 there because they could not afford \$100
25 bail. We were paying \$120-plus a day to

2 keep them there. Does not make sense.

3 Second thing that we want to
4 invest in is GPS technology, to be able
5 to say, All right, we want you back among
6 us, but we want to know where you are at
7 nighttime when it's going down in the DM.
8 So we are going to invest in that to make
9 sure we know that you're where you cannot
10 create harm for yourself and others.

11 The third we got from
12 Councilwoman Blackwell, day reporting
13 centers, day reporting centers, where as
14 opposed to going to jail, you can be
15 among the community paying back the
16 community by cleaning lots or removing
17 graffiti. No, we're not talking about
18 chain gangs, but what we are talking
19 about is going to the community you took
20 from and giving something back. And then
21 during the day, let's work on your
22 issues. If it's drug addiction, if it's
23 anger management, if it's a lack of
24 education or a trade, let's work on that,
25 and then at night you're going home to

2 your family hopefully, but you're going
3 home. You don't have to go home, but you
4 do have to get out of here.

5 So at the end of the day, we
6 want to shift from reentry to pre-entry,
7 which is prevention.

8 We've heard a lot of good
9 testimony from a lot of good people, and
10 we're taking it to heart. And I want to
11 thank you again for emphasizing that we
12 put our money where our mouth is, that if
13 we are really trying to change this
14 paradigm, then we have an opportunity to
15 do it and we have it within our means to
16 get it done.

17 Thank you, Mr. President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you. And, again, thank you,
20 Councilman, for your continued good work
21 and, Councilman Johnson and Henon, all
22 the members who have worked on this very
23 important issue. The front side is
24 always better than back side. Thank you
25 for your continued support.

3 Councilwoman Gym.

4 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
5 very much, Council President. I'll be
6 quick. I wanted to just say that like
7 many Philadelphians across the City and
8 people across the country, I'm coming to
9 terms with an election that will likely
10 see sweeping changes in policies and
11 funding for many of the programs and
12 issues that I and many others in this
13 Council Chambers hold dear that includes
14 things like criminal justice, immigrant
15 rights, poverty issues, housing, the
16 environment, healthcare, and public
17 education.

18 To that end, I think that there
19 are just, you know, two very brief
20 comments that I wanted to say. First, I
21 stand by the people's right to dissent
22 and protest, to march, and to speak their
23 minds about what the issues are that are
24 before them. First and foremost, because
25 it's a constitutional right protected and

2 hallowed within our democracy, but second
3 because there have been troubling remarks
4 made at the national level and in other
5 spaces by those who would quash or mean
6 dissent with state violence and force.
7 It does not serve our body politic. I
8 don't think anybody in this Chambers
9 believes that it is possible to be seen
10 in our city and in our times, but I think
11 more than ever it is important to make
12 that commitment as we face some of the
13 times ahead.

14 And I'm incredibly grateful to
15 have honored Guardian Civic League here
16 in these Chambers today and to thank our
17 Civil Affairs Department. I've been on
18 the outside doing a lot of the rallying
19 and protesting in my day and I know that
20 our Civil Affairs Department and our
21 Police Department are going to be
22 committed to seeing a peaceful allowance
23 of public dissent and protest in the days
24 to come.

25 And, second, I mean, I don't --

2 I think it's important for us to say
3 something about the hate crimes that are
4 cropping up all over our city and over
5 our country, dozens in Philadelphia,
6 including my alma mater at the University
7 of Pennsylvania, hundreds across the
8 country, and those are just the ones that
9 have been reported. There's very little
10 to say about how we're going to confront
11 an era in which hate crimes become part
12 of the conversation, but I am confident
13 that this city will do so and that we
14 have to, in order to do that, pay more
15 attention more than ever to the needs and
16 experiences of communities who walk
17 through our city that may experience
18 things that are far different from ones
19 that we can imagine, that more -- and
20 most especially includes our most
21 vulnerable communities, our LGBT
22 communities, our young people of color,
23 our black students in particular, our
24 LGBTQ communities, immigrants, Muslims,
25 women. My heart breaks for the struggles

2 that some of our communities are going to
3 face in the times to come, and that I
4 want them to know that we'll be there in
5 solidarity with them, that we'll be
6 listening, that we'll defend their rights
7 at every point. We'll resist when
8 necessary.

9 And, finally, I just want to
10 really state with pride my role and my
11 ability to stand with my colleagues here
12 in City Council. I ran for City Council
13 because I believed in the power of
14 municipalities to effect meaningful
15 change. I believe still, probably now
16 more than ever, that cities can lead. In
17 fact, we must lead in these times, that
18 we can establish standards and principles
19 that the rest of the country can look to
20 for hope and possibility as we confront
21 some challenging times ahead.

22 I know many of us in this room
23 are going to be challenged to rethink or
24 maybe walk back on some of the values
25 that we've held dear. I think those are

2 going to be hard and challenging
3 conversations, but as we face some of
4 those ahead, I want to know that I've
5 never been prouder to be part of a City
6 Council that has never hesitated to stand
7 up on a whole host of rights and
8 responsibilities and to further a
9 progressive movement not only in our city
10 but for this country.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilwoman.

14 The Chair recognizes
15 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

16 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
17 you, Mr. President. In 1964, the U.S.
18 Surgeon General released a report on
19 cigarettes that forever changed how
20 America dealt with cigarettes, its cause
21 for cancer, and how we've treated that
22 since then.

23 This morning the Surgeon
24 General released a report, a very timely
25 one, that talks about the addiction and

2 misuse and abuse of chemical substance.
3 Twenty million people suffer some sort of
4 substance disorder. It costs the United
5 States \$420 billion a year in healthcare
6 costs, lost economic productivity, and of
7 course the cost of criminal justice,
8 which my colleague referenced.

9 All of you saw Al Lubrano's
10 Inquirer cover story this Saturday, and
11 unfortunately this is just the surface.
12 There will be many, many articles to
13 come. El Campamento in the Air Bridge,
14 as troubling as it is, only begins to
15 scratch the surface. The members of Air
16 Bridge only represent less than 20
17 percent of the daily users and visitors
18 to El Campamento and in that area. The
19 federal government has called it a
20 national crisis. Governor Wolf and his
21 Health Secretary have talked about it.
22 Councilman Oh here led a series of
23 discussions and today submitted to this
24 Council the report and findings of many
25 of his town halls. Councilman Squilla

2 who, like me, has many of these recovery
3 houses in his district, and Councilman
4 Domb who has been very, very supportive
5 and steadfast in helping me bring to
6 light this incredible problem, which is a
7 perfect storm that has been created in
8 this open heroin market that we have in
9 Kensington.

10 All is not grim. There are
11 many stakeholders on the ground, Impact
12 Services, New Kensington CDC, Prevention
13 Point with its needle exchange program
14 that no matter how controversial has
15 really led to some positive outcomes,
16 HACE and others. To its credit, this new
17 Administration through a task force led
18 by the Managing Director's Office with
19 all department heads, the Streets
20 Department has put in skin in the game,
21 L&I, the Office of Homeland Services, and
22 the Office of Behavioral Health.

23 But the acknowledgment and
24 public statements in the article this
25 Sunday are extremely troubling. Many of

2 you know during Council budget
3 hearings -- I sound like a broken record
4 all the time, I said, and it's a song I'm
5 going to continue to play -- have heard
6 me talk about the recovery houses and the
7 lack of accountability by mental health
8 providers and their relationship with the
9 recovery houses, and the public
10 acknowledgment that some of those
11 providers pay cash directly to these
12 recovery house operators, or what I call
13 human traffickers, is unacceptable.

14 In my district I have worked
15 with the DEA and the federal government
16 to close some of these mental health
17 providers, but more needs to be done. I
18 will continue to urge the Administration,
19 Councilman Domb and I who have met with
20 Conrail and CSX around this El
21 Campamento, this is unacceptable. The
22 fact that CSX and Conrail did make some
23 investments in this area because they
24 needed to increase the traffic flow of
25 their trains bringing chemicals through

2 this district, but unwilling to own the
3 problem that they have created there is
4 also unacceptable.

5 So I'm going to continue to
6 push the Administration to declare this
7 area a healthcare crisis and for us to
8 begin to clean the aesthetics, only the
9 aesthetics of what's going on, because we
10 have yet to appropriately fund what a
11 coalition of folks called the Kensington
12 House Coalition has created, which is a
13 short-term plan that can lead to a
14 long-term strategy about how we deal with
15 what everybody knows is a national
16 crisis.

17 I want to thank the reporters
18 who are going to stay on this, Mike
19 Newall, who put it best in Wednesday's
20 article where he said, Now everybody
21 knows and there's no more deniability on
22 this.

23 So the time for action is now.
24 Let us hope that the Surgeon General
25 report continues to support the notion

2 that this is everyone's problem. Opium
3 abuse is something that we're going to
4 have to deal with for many years to come,
5 but nowhere, nowhere, and particular in a
6 city like Philadelphia, should a perfect
7 storm as the one created in Kensington
8 should be allowed to continue to
9 flourish.

10 Thank you, Council President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilwoman.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Domb.

15 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
16 Council President. Just briefly, I just
17 wanted to mention that there was a great
18 article today in the Inquirer showing the
19 Pew report, how that Philadelphia is
20 catching up. The differences between
21 doing business in the suburbs and doing
22 business in the City has dramatically
23 changed and the City of Philadelphia is
24 climbing up. I just hope this is a
25 message that suburban companies that have

2 not come to Philadelphia yet, they need
3 to take a look at our city, because we're
4 doing some great things here.

5 We should applaud all of us
6 here. And even the people who were
7 before us 10 years, 20 years ago who
8 changed these policies, I thank them,
9 because we're making great strides.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 That concludes our speeches
14 today, and the Chair recognizes
15 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for a motion
16 to adjourn.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. We want to wish everyone
19 a happy holiday and Council, therefore,
20 will stand adjourned until Thursday,
21 December 1st, 2016 at 10:00 a.m.

22 (Duly seconded.)
