13 recognizes Councilman Green, who will
14 present a resolution recognizing the
15 Philadelphia Alumni Chapter on the
16 occasion of the 106th annual Founders'
17 Day of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity,
18 Incorporated. Would Daryl Stephens and
19 those accompanying him please join the
20 Councilman at the podium.

21 (Councilman Green singing.)

22 (Councilmembers and guests
23 approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
25 Councilman, I didn't know you can sing.

5 impressed.

6 COUNCILMAN GREEN: That was my
7 church voice. That was my Sunday voice.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
9 joining Councilman Green, we have
10 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez,
11 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, Councilwoman
12 Gym, and Councilwoman Parker.

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Good
14 morning. Good morning. It's a pleasure
15 to do this resolution to honor a great
16 institution that has had a lot of
17 leadership. And we train people for
18 leadership in a lot of different fields
19 of human endeavor. At the municipal
20 elected official level, we've done
21 training for leadership all across this
22 nation, and I'm honored to follow in the
23 footsteps of some great cabinet men like
24 Mayor Tom Bradley from Los Angeles, Mayor
25 Wellington Webb from Denver, Mayor

3 then here locally a number of prominent

10 very important one, who is my father,

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: So with
14 that, we are recognizing the Philadelphia
15 Alumni Chapter on the occasion of the
16 106th annual Founders' Day of Kappa Alpha
17 Psi Fraternity, Incorporated.

18 Whereas, on January 5th, 1911,
19 on the campus of Indiana University at
20 Bloomington, Indiana, Elder Watson Diggs,
21 John Milton Lee, Byron K. Armstrong, Guy
22 Levis Grant, Ezra D. Alexander, Henry T.
23 Asher, Marcus Peter Blakemore, Paul W.
24 Caine, Edward G. Irvin, and George W.
25 Edmonds founded Kappa Alpha Psi

2 Fraternity, Incorporated; and

3 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

4 Whereas, through their vision, these ten

5 astute men founded a college fraternity

6 now comprised of functioning

7 Undergraduate and Alumni Chapters on

8 campuses in cities throughout this nation

9 and throughout the world. Through that

10 seed, a fraternal tree was grown whose

11 fruit of membership is available to, and

12 now enjoyed by, over 150,000 college men,

13 regardless of race, religion, or national

14 origin;

15 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,

16 from its origin through today, Kappa

17 Alpha Psi Fraternity is a unique

18 organization in that its members share a

19 common purpose of achievement in every

20 field of human endeavor and this unified

21 purpose is exemplified every day by its

22 members in Congress, city halls, city

23 councils, courtrooms, boardrooms, news

24 rooms, classrooms, concert halls, film

25 and recording studios, physician offices,

2 athletic fields, field of combat, pulpits
3 and more; and

4 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
5 in addition to the achievement of its
6 members, Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity is
7 dedicated to training for leadership and
8 through its various programs, including
9 the A-Man initiative, Achievement
10 Academy, Guide Right, Kappa Kamp, and
11 Kappa League has mentored several young
12 men into the past, current, and future
13 leaders of our country; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
15 members of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity
16 have a lifelong commitment to serving the
17 common person and, through their
18 commitment, have provided substantial
19 support to St. Jude Children's Research
20 Hospital, the United Negro College Fund,
21 Habitat for Humanity, and several other
22 nationwide and grassroots community
23 service initiatives across the country
24 and around the world;

25 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: And

2 whereas, Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity and
3 the City of Philadelphia share a special
4 bond in that the Fraternity's
5 International Headquarters is located in
6 Philadelphia and, historically, the
7 Greater Philadelphia region has become
8 home to hundreds of members in both
9 Undergraduate and Alumni Chapters.

10 Future mother of hopefully a
11 Kappa Alpha member. My son would say, It
12 is the organization with the most depth,
13 mom.

14 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Resolved, by
15 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
16 that we hereby recognize the Philadelphia
17 Alumni Chapter on the occasion of the
18 106th annual Founders' Day of Kappa Alpha
19 Psi Fraternity, Incorporated.

20 Further resolved, that an
21 engrossed copy of this resolution be
22 presented to Daryl Stephens, Polemarch of
23 the Philadelphia Alumni Chapter of the
24 Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated,
25 as evidence of the sincere admiration and

3 This resolution is supported
4 and signed by all members of Council and
5 it was a pleasure to present this
6 resolution this morning.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
9 the Chair recognizes Mr. Stephens for
10 remarks.

11 MR. STEPHENS: Good morning.

12 (Good morning.)

13 MR. STEPHENS: I'd like to
14 thank Councilman Green, Brother
15 Councilman Green, and all the
16 Councilpeople who supported this
17 resolution. It's an honor and a
18 privilege to be a representative of Kappa
19 Alpha Psi and the Polemarch of these fine
20 men. As Brother Green said, our motto is
21 achievement in every field of human
22 endeavor, and that's what we strive to
23 do.

24 So, again, I want to thank the
25 entire Council for your support, and

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Council will be at ease.

9 (Council at ease.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you so much. Thank you.

12 At this time, the Chair
13 recognizes Councilwoman Parker, who will
14 present a resolution recognizing Charisse
15 R. Lillie. Would Ms. Lillie and those
16 accompanying her please come to the
17 podium.

18 (Councilmembers and guests
19 approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
21 joining the Councilwoman, we have
22 Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman
23 Blackwell, Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,
24 Councilman Kenyatta Johnson, and
25 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez and

3 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
4 you, Mr. President. Mr. President, when
5 I, like the rest of Philadelphia, read
6 the article that first appeared in the
7 Philadelphia Tribune noting that Charisse
8 Lillie was set to retire, I'm sure that
9 I, like many others, sort of took a
10 stroll through my own mental history to
11 try to remember when I first learned that
12 Charisse Lillie was in existence. And I
13 was a teenager running in between Room
14 577 and your office, Councilman Johnson,
15 Room 580, between Councilwoman Tasco and
16 Councilwoman Augusta Clark's office, and
17 this lady whenever anything substantive
18 was happening in government, in the world
19 of non-profit, community-based
20 organizations, corporate was Charisse
21 Lillie.

22 When I thought about her, I
23 couldn't think of another Philadelphian
24 who had been bred in a strong foundation
25 based in education and public service

2 that she learned from a parent who was
3 educated. I think she made an awesome
4 choice in choosing her husband. Now,
5 he's wearing two hats, because you did
6 just see him standing -- where are you?
7 He's right here. You just saw him
8 standing with the Kappa men, but I'll
9 tell you, in 1989, Charisse Lillie became
10 a member, a proud member, of Delta Sigma
11 Theta Sorority, Incorporated. So they
12 wear those colors. And he also happens
13 to be a Lincoln man, class of 1968.

14 But what was so different about
15 Charisse is that from the community
16 government, the legal community,
17 corporate, research, no matter who the
18 bigwigs were that she was interacting
19 with, issues surrounding diversity and
20 inclusion in the world of academia, in
21 law and government, her message never
22 changed. Now, for some people that may
23 not be a big deal, but it is easy for
24 someone attempting to move forward in
25 their career and think that they have to

2 tone down the message regarding what they
3 believe in and when you get inside of
4 different rooms with different audiences,
5 your message changes. Charisse has been
6 consistent. She knows how to deliver a
7 message, but the message hasn't changed.

8 For that, Charisse Lillie, we
9 are grateful, and I'm honored to join
10 with my colleagues in saluting your
11 career and contributions to the City of
12 Philadelphia.

13 The resolution reads as
14 follows:

15 It's a resolution recognizing
16 and honoring Charisse R. Lillie upon her
17 retirement from Comcast Corporation, and
18 for over forty years of dedicated service
19 to the City of Philadelphia.

20 Whereas, Charisse R. Lillie, a
21 timeless public servant and corporate
22 citizen, recently retired from Comcast
23 Corporation after twelve years of
24 dedicated service; and

25 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the

2 Houston, Texas native received her BA,
3 Bachelor's of Arts, in '73 from Wesleyan
4 University - cum laude; her Juris
5 Doctorate, JD, in 1976 from Temple Law
6 School - Dean's Honor List; and her LLM,
7 a Master's in Law, in 1982 from Yale Law
8 School; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
10 Charisse worked as a research assistant
11 to the Honorable A. Leon Higginbotham,
12 Jr. from 1975 to 1976 on his first book,
13 In The Matter of Color. From 1976 to
14 1978, Ms. Lillie was a law clerk to the
15 Honorable Clifford Scott Green, U.S.
16 District Court for the Eastern District
17 of Pennsylvania; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
19 Whereas, Charisse has extensive legal
20 experience, ranging from Trial Attorney
21 in the U.S. Department of Justice Civil
22 Rights Division, Deputy Director of
23 Community Legal Services, Inc., Professor
24 at Villanova Law School, Assistant United
25 States Attorney for the Eastern District

2 of Pennsylvania, General Counsel to the
3 Redevelopment Authority of the City of
4 Philadelphia, and City Solicitor to the
5 City of Philadelphia; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Charisse's
7 practice included the following: the
8 representation of employers and
9 management in a wide variety of labor and
10 employment issues, including
11 discrimination, harassment, and other
12 civil rights litigation, at-will
13 litigation, restrictive covenant/trade
14 secret claims, ERISA litigation and
15 litigation before the National Labor
16 Relations Board and state agencies.
17 Further, she defended banks, hospitals,
18 universities, major corporations, the
19 City of Philadelphia, and the federal
20 government in federal and state court and
21 before administrative agencies, and she
22 has served as an advisor to clients,
23 including arts and cultural
24 organizations, like Philadanco, on
25 diversity and anti-discrimination issues.

2 She frequently lectures regarding
3 diversity, civil rights, employment
4 discrimination, and affirmative action
5 issues as well; and

6 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
7 prior to joining Comcast, Charisse was a
8 partner in the law firm of Ballard Spahr
9 Andrews and Ingersoll, LLP, from January
10 1992 to February 2005. At Ballard Spahr,
11 she was chair of the Litigation
12 Department from 2002 to 2005, and was a
13 member of the Employment and Labor Law
14 Group of the firm; and

15 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: And I also
16 want to thank Charisse for coming down to
17 Point Breeze, South Philadelphia when I
18 served in the State House to participate
19 in a leadership workshop around domestic
20 violence for young girls. And I was so
21 inspired by her participation because,
22 again, she works for one of the biggest
23 and largest corporations not only here in
24 the City of Philadelphia but also in the
25 United States, but she still did not

2 hesitate to come down and aspire a group
3 of young girls to go on to follow their
4 goals, dreams, and aspirations. So I
5 want to personally say thank you for your
6 service.

7 Whereas, Charisse joined
8 Comcast in 2005 as Vice President of
9 Human Resources for Comcast Corporation
10 and Senior Vice President of Human
11 Resources for Comcast Cable. She served
12 as President of the Comcast Foundation
13 from 2011 through 2016, and she most
14 recently served as a Fellow and Vice
15 President of Community Investment for
16 Comcast Corporation and as Executive Vice
17 President of the Comcast Foundation; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
19 Charisse has been a member of many civic
20 commissions, including the Independent
21 Charter Commission, the Philadelphia
22 Criminal Justice Task Force, the MOVE
23 Commission, and the Philadelphia Election
24 Reform Task Force. She is the former
25 president of the Philadelphia Chapter of

2 the Federal Bar Association and she has
3 served on the Board of the Pennsylvania
4 Intergovernmental Cooperation Authority
5 (PICA) from 1993 to 1998. She also
6 served as chair of the Board of Governors
7 of the Philadelphia Bar Association in
8 1995. She has served as chair of the
9 American Bar Association Commission on
10 Racial and Ethnic Diversity in the
11 Profession from 1999 to 2002 and was a
12 member of the ABA Standing Committee on
13 Federal Judiciary. She is co-chair of
14 the Racial Bias in the Justice System
15 Committee of the Philadelphia Bar
16 Association. She has also served on the
17 Supreme Court of the Pennsylvania
18 Committee on Racial and Gender Bias. She
19 has also received numerous honors from
20 organizations such as the Pennsylvania
21 Bar Association, the Philadelphia
22 Business Journal, the Black Women in
23 Sport Foundation, and the Girl Scouts of
24 Southeastern Pennsylvania, one of our
25 icons;

2 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
3 while Charisse retired from Comcast, she
4 is by no means retiring from her civic
5 engagement in Philadelphia. She will
6 continue to lecture at local universities
7 on diversity, community investment, and
8 corporate social responsibility. She
9 will also maintain her appointments on
10 the board of Penn Mutual Life Insurance
11 Company, the PECO Energy Company, an
12 Exelon Company, the United Way, and the
13 Franklin Institute, as well as serving on
14 the PNC Regional Advisory Board; now,
15 therefore, be it

16 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Resolved,
17 by the Council of the City of
18 Philadelphia, that it hereby recognizes
19 and honors Charisse Lillie upon her
20 retirement from Comcast, and for over
21 forty years of dedicated service to the
22 City of Philadelphia.

23 And be it further resolved,
24 that an engrossed copy of this resolution
25 be presented to Charisse R. Lillie as

2 evidence of the sincere sentiments of
3 this legislative body.

4 And I might add -- and I joshed
5 her earlier -- have you ever seen her
6 neatly coifed fro out of place one time
7 throughout these 40 years?

8 We don't know how you've done
9 it, but you've done it with grace,
10 dignity, charm, and we respect and thank
11 you, Charisse Lillie. Congratulations.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
14 the Chair recognizes Ms. Lillie for
15 remarks.

16 MS. LILLIE: I am so honored
17 and I am so grateful to this City
18 Council. As you all know, a big part of
19 my career was in City government, both as
20 general counsel to the Redevelopment
21 Authority and as City Solicitor of the
22 great City of Philadelphia.

23 My work is not done, and I will
24 continue to be a very active member of
25 the Philadelphia community, both in my

2 for-profit boards and in my non-profit
3 boards, and I'm sure that there are some
4 City Council people up here who are going
5 to get me involved in politics.

6 So I thank you for this honor.
7 I'm very grateful. And thank you to all
8 of my friends, who are very busy people,
9 and my wonderful husband for taking times
10 out of their day to be with me.

11 Thank you all so much.

12 (Applause.)

13 (Council at ease.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you. At this time, the Chair
16 recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
18 you, Mr. President, and thank you for the
19 latitude. Mr. President, I'm also
20 honored to have here today in our Council
21 a fifth grader, a proud fifth grader from
22 the Freire Charter School, who is Morgan
23 Stewart, along with her mother, Nafika Mu
24 Akhil. And Morgan is here because she
25 has an interest in one day running for

2 public office. So she's going to visit
3 the fourth floor, the third floor, the
4 fifth floor, but she said she's also
5 going down to the second floor too. I
6 don't know what that means, but she's
7 going to visit.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
23 will be on this week's Final Passage
24 Calendar.

25 And the Chair recognizes

2 Councilwoman Parker.

3 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
4 you, Mr. President. I have two bills.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 Thank you, Councilwoman.

7 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
8 amending Section 19-1703 of The
9 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Refunds,"
10 regarding credits and due dates.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Referred to committee.

13 CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance
14 amending Title 19 of The Philadelphia
15 Code, entitled "Finance, Taxes and
16 Collections," to include transfers
17 between stepparents and stepchildren as a
18 transaction excluded from the realty
19 transfer tax.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Referred to committee.

22 And the Chair recognizes
23 Councilman Domb.

24 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Good morning,
25 Council President. I have two privileged

2 resolutions and one non-privileged
3 resolution on your behalf.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

6 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged
7 resolution honoring and recognizing Joan
8 C. Mazzotti for her exceptional
9 leadership and dedication over the last
10 16 years as Executive Director of
11 Philadelphia Futures.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This
13 week's Final Passage Calendar.

14 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
15 recognizing January 27, 2017 as Earned
16 Income Tax Credit Awareness Day in the
17 City of Philadelphia.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: One
19 more time, thank you, Councilman. This
20 week's Final Passage Calendar.

21 CHIEF CLERK: And a
22 non-privileged resolution calling for the
23 adoption and implementation of 2016
24 Assessment of Fair Housing Report
25 recently submitted to the U.S. Department

1 1/26/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 of Housing and Urban Neighborhood to meet
3 the goals of the Affirmatively Furthering
4 Fair Housing Rule.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
6 will be on next week's Final Passage
7 Calendar.

8 And the Chair recognizes
9 Councilwoman Gym.

10 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Good
11 morning, Council President. One
12 privileged resolution and a request to
13 make very, very brief remarks.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you, Councilwoman.

16 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged
17 resolution declaring January 30th, 2017
18 Fred Korematsu Day of Civil Liberties and
19 the Constitution in Philadelphia.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
21 the Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

22 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you so
23 much, Council President. I want to thank
24 my colleagues Councilmembers Green,
25 Squilla, Oh, Parker, and Domb for

1 1/26/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 co-sponsoring this resolution, and it's a
3 great honor for me to ask our City
4 Council to consider this resolution to
5 honor Fred Korematsu here in the City.
6 He was a Japanese American who in 1942
7 was arrested when the orders for
8 internment came down, was arrested
9 because he had refused to abide by them.
10 He refused to report for internment.

11 He stood up against
12 discrimination against Americans of
13 Japanese ancestry. He was incarcerated
14 and interned at Topaz Concentration Camp
15 in Utah, but what Fred Korematsu did was
16 something that was extraordinary in the
17 history of American law, which was that
18 he challenged this internment and took
19 his case all the way to the U.S. Supreme
20 Court in 1944 when the Supreme Court
21 upheld his conviction by a six to three
22 vote, arguing that it was a military
23 necessity.

24 Fred Korematsu joined the
25 100,000 other Japanese Americans who

1 1/26/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 suffered for the number of years that
3 they were incarcerated, losing their
4 homes, personal properties, who died in
5 many of these internment camps, but as
6 soon as he was released, continued his
7 struggle. He continued to challenge his
8 convictions and pursue them until they
9 were finally overturned in 1983 in which
10 a court found, a federal court, found
11 that a grave injustice was done to Fred
12 Korematsu and the other Japanese
13 Americans and regretted deeply what had
14 happened.

15 Fred Korematsu continued to
16 speak out, filing friend of the court
17 briefs at the age of 85 on behalf of
18 Muslim inmates held in Guantanamo Bay and
19 filed a similar brief on behalf of an
20 American Muslim man being held in
21 solitary confinement.

22 Today we honor his memory -- or
23 ask that the City Council honors his
24 memory, especially as we coincide it with
25 the passage of a resolution that honors

1 1/26/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 our Muslim communities. And it's a
3 reminder that the profound injustice that
4 was done to Fred Korematsu and 100,000
5 members of Japanese ancestry is a
6 reminder to us about the evils of
7 legislation based on xenophobia and
8 racism, particularly in light of the
9 current proposals to limit or ban
10 immigrants and refugees in the United
11 States based on their faith.

12 And so with that, I
13 respectfully ask for the Council's
14 support and thank you when this comes up.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilwoman. That will be --
17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you. That will be on today's Final
20 Passage Calendar.

21 Councilwoman.

22 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Yes. With
23 apologies, I request a leave for the
24 remainder of the Council session and will
25 be voting aye on all resolutions and

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Good
11 morning, Council President and
12 colleagues. I offer one privileged
13 resolution co-sponsored by Councilman
14 O'Neill, Oh, Sanchez, and Blackwell.
15 Thank you very much.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you, Councilman.

18 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged
19 resolution authorizing the Committee on
20 Commerce and Economic Development to
21 conduct hearings concerning the Board of
22 Health's regulations relating to the
23 tobacco retailing license and the impact
24 these regulations could have on local
25 businesses.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman
6 Squilla.

7 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,
8 Mr. President. I offer three bills, one
9 non-privileged resolution.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Thank you, Councilman.

12 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance to
13 amend the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by

16 area bounded by Clearfield Street,

19 An ordinance amending Section

22 District," by amending provisions under
23 certain terms and conditions; and

24 An ordinance authorizing Adam
25 S. Harbin to construct, own and maintain

3 North Broad Street.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
5 Those three bills just read by the Chief
6 Clerk will be referred to the appropriate
7 committee.

8 CHIEF CLERK: And a
9 non-privileged resolution approving the
10 redevelopment contract of the
11 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority for
12 the redevelopment and urban renewal of a
13 portion of the New Kensington-Fishtown
14 Urban Renewal Area, identified by house
15 number and street address as 2323 East
16 York Street.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
18 that will be on next week's Final
19 Passage.

20 And we now go to Councilman
21 O'Neill.

22 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. I have no bills or
24 resolutions.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 1/26/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS

2 Thank you, Councilman.

3 And the Chair recognizes
4 Councilwoman Bass.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. I offer two bills and two
7 privileged resolutions.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Thank you, Councilwoman.

10 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
11 revising parking restrictions on
12 Bethlehem Pike, east side, between
13 Chestnut Hill Avenue and Newton Street.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Referred to committee.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And an ordinance
17 to amend the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by
18 changing the zoning designations of
19 certain areas of land located within an
20 area bounded by Wayne Avenue, Berkley
21 Street, Morris Street, and West Logan
22 Street (extended).

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Referred to committee.

25 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged

2 resolution authorizing Council's
3 Committee on Public Health and Human
4 Services to hold hearings on the impact
5 and the repeal of the Affordable Care Act
6 on the residents of the City of
7 Philadelphia and particularly on
8 low-income and elderly populations and
9 further investigating the City of
10 Philadelphia's preparedness to address
11 the increase of those who would be
12 without adequate healthcare insurance.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
14 that will be on this week's Final Passage
15 Calendar.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
17 resolution recognizing the Eighth
18 District sanitation initiative on its
19 efforts to find a solution to the chronic
20 and long-term problem of trash dumping in
21 the City of Philadelphia.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
23 this week's Final Passage Calendar.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Oh.

1 1/26/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS

2 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
3 much. I offer one non-privileged
4 resolution, two privileged resolutions,
5 and one bill. And may I be heard on the
6 bill once it is read, Council President?

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Absolutely.

9 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
10 much.

11 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
12 amending Chapter 19-2600 of The
13 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Business
14 Income and Receipts Taxes," by providing
15 for a tax credit for large employers who
16 employ low skill employees, as well as
17 providing exemptions from certain charges
18 and taxes imposed by Chapter 19-1600,
19 entitled "Water and Sewer Rents," and
20 Chapter 19-2700, entitled "Sales and Use
21 Tax and Hotel Occupancy Tax."

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

24 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
25 much, Council President. We are all, all

1 1/26/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 of us, engaged in trying to answer the
3 question of how do we create more jobs
4 for persons who may have at most a
5 college degree or not and how do we
6 create jobs in Philadelphia, good
7 family-sustaining jobs for people who do
8 not have a high level of skill.

9 So in looking at this issue as
10 we have over these many years, I do want
11 to offer a possible way of providing more
12 opportunities specifically for these
13 Philadelphians, and for me, I think it
14 ties in heavily with the global economy,
15 that we do need large employers, large
16 employers of 1,000 or more people that
17 hire 500 or more low skill workers as
18 defined by the U.S. Department of Labor,
19 that provide at least \$45,000 in salary,
20 plus additional benefits such as health
21 and other benefits. And I think that
22 while Philadelphia is a growing city with
23 a lot of opportunities for college
24 graduates and those with high skills and
25 high degrees, people in our neighborhoods

1 1/26/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 do not have the same opportunities, and
3 honestly I don't think they're going to
4 be provided by small businesses. The
5 problem is that folks in the
6 neighborhoods don't have enough money in
7 their pockets to support these small
8 businesses. Large employers are
9 critically important.

10 When we lose one large
11 employer, it is sending a message over
12 time that we are losing more. When we
13 gain a large employer, it is sending a
14 message that we can gain more. So on
15 this basis, I'm proposing that we create
16 a tax credit, an exemption for large
17 employers who invest in Philadelphia the
18 facilities that will hire at least 1,000
19 new employees, of which 500 are low
20 skill, that they be given a \$5,000 tax
21 credit against Philadelphia business
22 taxes per year for five years, and that
23 they be exempt from stormwater management
24 fees for that period of time as well as
25 the City portion of the use and occupancy

2 tax.

3 There are new opportunities.

4 They are not readily available to us, but

5 I think we can compete for them, and I

6 think this would be a tool along the way.

7 Thank you very much.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilman. And that bill

10 will be referred to the appropriate

11 committee.

12 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged

13 resolution recognizing and honoring

14 Philadelphia's Community Behavioral

15 Health organization on the occasion of

16 its 20th anniversary.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This

18 week's Final Passage Calendar.

19 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged

20 resolution recognizing and honoring the

21 2016 winners of PHL Live Center Stage.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This

23 week's Final Passage Calendar.

24 CHIEF CLERK: And a

25 non-privileged resolution appointing 15

1 1/26/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 individuals to the task force on the
3 Philadelphia music industry.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
5 that will be on next week's Final Passage
6 Calendar.

7 And that concludes our
8 introduction of bills and resolutions.
9 Thank you very much.

10 There are no reports from
11 committee, and before considering the
12 resolutions and bills on Final Passage
13 today, we will have our public comment
14 session. The public comment session will
15 go as follows:

16 If you are interested in
17 testifying on a bill or resolution, if
18 you haven't already signed up, I'd ask
19 that you please do so.

20 When your name is called, you
21 will go to the -- first day back
22 oversight. What I would like to do is
23 consider the Calendar on the first
24 reading. The next order of business is
25 consideration of the Calendar. There

2 being no bills on our First Reading
3 Calendar, the Chair recognizes Councilman
4 Henon for the purpose of calling up
5 resolutions and bills on the Second

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. The following resolutions
10 and bills are being called up for second
11 reading and final passage on today's
12 Calendar: Bill Nos. 161119, 160687-A,
13 161001, 161016. All other resolutions
14 and bills are being held.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you very much, Councilman.

17 We will now go to our public
18 comment session. Our public comment
19 session, as I said earlier, will go as
20 follows:

21 If you are interested in
22 testifying on a bill or resolution that's
23 on the Final Passage Calendar today, if
24 you haven't already done so, we ask that
25 you sign up.

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 When your name is called, you
3 will go to the podium in the middle of
4 the Council Chambers. There's a device
5 on that podium. When that light turns
6 green, it will be your time to speak.
7 When the light turns yellow, you will
8 have 30 seconds to conclude your remarks.
9 When the light turns red, we'd ask that
10 you please adhere to the guidelines
11 established and conclude your remarks.
12 You will be given three minutes to
13 testify.

14 Mr. Decker, can you please call
15 the first name on the witness list.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Colleen McCauley,
17 commenting on Councilwoman Bass's
18 resolution on affordable healthcare.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
21 morning.

22 MS. McCAULEY: Good morning.
23 Councilwoman Bass and City Council
24 members this morning, thank you very much
25 for your vocal support to protect

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 high-quality healthcare and affordable
3 insurance through the Affordable Care
4 Act, Medicaid, and the Children's Health
5 Insurance Program. I'm Colleen McCauley.
6 I'm the Health Policy Director at Public
7 Citizens for Children and Youth, a child
8 advocacy and policy organization working
9 on behalf of kids in Philly and Southeast
10 PA.

11 In over 20 years, PCCY has
12 operated a telephone help line assisting
13 thousands of parents apply for insurance
14 for their kids for Medicaid and CHIP.
15 One of those parents recently is a
16 self-employed single father with two
17 daughters. His youngest child has asthma
18 and a heart murmur, so she has
19 pre-existing conditions, but that's not a
20 problem because CHIP and Medicaid cover
21 kids who have pre-existing conditions.
22 So we helped him to get his daughter the
23 inhaler she needs and the monitoring she
24 needs for her murmur so that she can be
25 in school and be active and get the care

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 she needs to prevent complications for
3 her cardiac condition.

4 CHIP and Medicaid work. And
5 more than 75 percent, 75 percent of
6 children in Philadelphia are enrolled in
7 Medicaid and CHIP. An astounding three
8 in four rely on these programs to keep
9 them healthy and to provide them care
10 when they are sick. In fact, one in
11 three kids in Pennsylvania is covered by
12 CHIP or Medicaid. They are fabulous
13 examples of good public policy for
14 children. They offer comprehensive
15 child-focused benefits, and they are cost
16 effective.

17 Did you know that CHIP costs 50
18 percent -- it costs 50 percent less to
19 insure a child through CHIP than the
20 average uncompensated care costs for
21 children currently being covered by
22 hospitals in the state? Twenty-five
23 hundred dollars to cover a kid in CHIP,
24 almost \$5,000 to cover a kid for
25 uncompensated care.

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 We recently released a report
3 on Philadelphia child well-being, and it
4 was only in the health sector where
5 improvement for kids occurred since the
6 depth of the recession back in 2008. In
7 addition to health, we looked at how kids
8 fared in K through 12 public education,
9 early childhood, and in terms of economic
10 well-being, but it was only in the health
11 sector where kids saw improvements over
12 time.

13 Well, why is that? Because
14 good public policy such as Medicaid and
15 CHIP matter and have been demonstrated to
16 change the life outcomes of children.
17 And when some kids don't have health
18 insurance, all kids are impacted.
19 Programs like Medicaid work for kids and
20 for their parents and for other adults,
21 and as the old adage goes, don't fix
22 what's not broken.

23 Children and adults alike
24 should have access to affordable
25 high-quality healthcare coverage. We

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 can't go backwards at this time. Any
3 plan to modify CHIP, Medicaid, and the
4 Affordable Care Act must preserve
5 coverage gains for all Philadelphians and
6 the one million plus Pennsylvanians who
7 have them.

8 Thank you for your support.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Antoinette Kraus,
13 commenting on Councilwoman Bass's
14 affordable healthcare resolution.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 afternoon.

18 MS. KRAUS: Good afternoon. My
19 name is Antoinette Kraus. I'm the
20 Executive Director of the Pennsylvania
21 Health Access Network and a proud
22 resident of Philadelphia, and I'd like to
23 thank Councilwoman Bass for introducing
24 this resolution.

25 In Philadelphia, there's

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 220,000 individuals that rely on health
3 coverage through the marketplace and
4 Medicaid. In Pennsylvania, there's five
5 million individuals who are now free from
6 discrimination because they have a
7 pre-existing condition. That's almost
8 half of the population of Pennsylvania
9 has a pre-existing condition.

10 We need to stand up and make
11 sure that we fight for working families
12 here in Philadelphia by saying no to
13 repeal of the Affordable Care Act, no to
14 cuts to Medicaid and Medicare.

15 I'm proud to be joined here
16 today by other coalition partners who are
17 here with Access Matters, Community Legal
18 Services, Project Home, First Hospital
19 Foundation, and I'm also joined by folks
20 that are benefitting from the ACA. So we
21 have a small business owner who has no
22 idea what she will do for healthcare
23 coverage if her coverage is pulled from
24 her. We have folks here on Medicaid
25 expansion who are relying on care right

2 now to be able to see their doctor. We
3 have a primary care physician who is on
4 the front lines every day treating
5 patients in Philadelphia.

6 So we applaud City Council,
7 Councilwoman Bass for putting forth this
8 resolution to hold public hearings about
9 what the impact will be to not only the
10 residents of Philadelphia but our city
11 budget, our state budget, and our federal
12 budget. We cannot go backwards.

13 So we are here today to say no
14 repeals to the ACA, no cuts to Medicaid,
15 Medicare, CHIP. Our families' lives are
16 on the line and our budget is on the
17 line, and there's thousands of
18 Philadelphians right now in the streets
19 sending the same message.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you.

23 (Applause.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: Imam Mike

25 Abdullah.

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 IMAM ABDULLAH: That's the
3 wrong bill.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If
5 the Imam is here, please come up.

6 (Witnesses approached podium.)

7 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on
8 160687-A.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Imam?

11 IMAM SUETWEDIEN: We're here on
12 the bill on Islamophobia.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 That's not the bill that you wanted to
15 testify on?

16 IMAM SUETWEDIEN: We are here
17 for the Islamophobia bill.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Okay. Hold on a second.

20 (Pause.)

21 IMAM SUETWEDIEN: Good
22 afternoon. We're here on the bill on
23 behalf of the Muslim community and the
24 Islamophobia bill. And so we come
25 down --

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
3 can't hear you. You need to speak into
4 the mic.

5 IMAM SUETWEDIEN: Okay. So we
6 come down to talk about the Islamophobia
7 piece that the Muslims have been
8 experiencing in this city for a long
9 time. We have over 600,000 Muslims in
10 this city. A lot of people like to say
11 the numbers is 400,000, 200,000. We know
12 the numbers is 600,000. There's a lot of
13 them that's in the closet. There's some
14 of them that's even in this room that's
15 on Council. Yeah.

16 So the thing is, though,
17 Islamophobia that we are experiencing in
18 this city is subtle. We know some of our
19 brothers and sisters, they experience it
20 a little different. And really I'd like
21 to say to Councilwoman Parker, who really
22 has been instrumental in coming out to
23 the mosque, talking to the Muslims, the
24 things that you have been doing in the
25 Ninth Councilmanic District, we really

2 appreciate that. But we haven't been
3 experiencing that all the way across the
4 board, and the Muslims have to be very
5 careful, because it's a whole subtle line
6 where we're not receiving the services
7 that we need to receive in the City.
8 We're not receiving the respect that we
9 need to receive in the City as Muslims,
10 and we're really tired of it and fed up
11 with it.

12 And so we're down here. We
13 want to begin to address that. We're
14 going to be down if we have to be down
15 there every week addressing what's
16 happening in the Muslim community. And
17 the respect that we receive and even from
18 our own Councilmembers, no services that
19 we receive. It's just real crazy the
20 things that are going on.

21 So most times when people think
22 Islamophobia, they think of immigrant
23 Muslims and thinking they going to be out
24 the country and all that. We got African
25 American black Muslims here in the City

2 that's been receiving disrespect after
3 disrespect after disrespect from
4 Administration after Administration after
5 Administration, and really we're not
6 going to tolerate it anymore.

7 It's just disrespectful, and
8 we're going to be -- if we have to be
9 down there every week, we're going to be
10 knocking on your door. We're going to be
11 at your office. We deserve the respect
12 that we're supposed to get, because we're
13 citizens in the City, paying our taxes,
14 working in the City, doing everything
15 that everybody else do. And like I said,
16 you need to check the numbers, because
17 it's over 600,000 Muslims in the City, 66
18 Masjids in the City. And I've been a
19 Muslim in the City for 42 years and the
20 whole underlying subtleness of the
21 Islamophobia, the disrespect that we
22 receive and the services that we receive,
23 the minute that somebody hear that you a
24 Muslim, the door is closed.

25 So if we can't get the proper

2 representation down here -- the
3 republicans are right down the street a
4 block away. They took the White House.
5 They took the Senate. They took the
6 Congress. Next day they're going to take
7 City Hall if y'all not careful.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you for your testimony.

10 (Applause.)

11 CHIEF CLERK: Imam Suetwedien.

12 IMAM ABDULLAH: Just spoke.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Okay.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Imam Mike

16 Abdullah.

17 (Witnesses approached podium.)

18 IMAM SUETWEDIEN: That's us

19 again.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold

21 on, sir. Hold on.

22 IMAM SUETWEDIEN: I'm sorry.

23 Say again.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold

25 on a second.

2 IMAM SUETWEDIEN: Okay.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Are
4 you going to speak? Who is the next Imam
5 to speak?

6 IMAM ABDULLAH: That's me.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 You're going to speak? Why don't you
9 come up and speak.

10 IMAM ABDULLAH: You have a city
11 here that is --

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Do
13 me a favor, just state your name for the
14 record.

15 IMAM ABDULLAH: Imam Mike
16 Abdullah.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you.

19 IMAM ABDULLAH: You have a city
20 here -- in the City, right, we have a
21 community of different cultures of
22 Muslims, but we are the individual
23 Muslims. We have been here. We were
24 born here. We were raised here. And we
25 are involved in everything that goes on

2 in the City. We are part of the politics
3 of the City, like it or not.

4 We have a lot of our children
5 sitting in these jailhouses coming out,
6 looking for work, looking for different
7 things to go on, and we do everything
8 possible that I can think of to find
9 support so that we can correct issues all
10 throughout the City.

11 The City is majority -- they
12 wrote it in the Daily News paper that the
13 City was "Muslim Town." That's how many
14 Muslims they said was here. And when
15 they spoke about the majority of these
16 Muslims, they are so-called Afro American
17 Muslims, so-called black Muslims that was
18 here.

19 Now, the problem that we have,
20 you have people who are coming down here
21 and they are trying to represent those
22 people who are indigenous people, the
23 people who have been here always. They
24 cannot represent me. They don't
25 understand the issues and they don't have

2 the problems that I have that I grew up
3 with from being here. So the ones that
4 correct the problem in the City, the one
5 that corrects the things that's going
6 around here, it's actually us. And so we
7 should get the support in the leadership
8 position that we need in order to correct
9 a lot of problems that we have in the
10 City with the children, everyone.

11 We don't want to fill the jails
12 with a lot people coming out here saying
13 Islam, calling they self Muslims, but
14 they all over the place. So what we
15 need, we need the support of City Council
16 so that we can take and clear up the
17 matters that are going on out through the
18 City, period, with Muslims and everyone.

19 There's no greater answer than
20 to work with us so we can work with you.
21 Do not be afraid when we come and we ask
22 you for support or help. Don't be
23 afraid. Don't shut the doors to us.
24 Don't run us off. Don't give us "I'll
25 call you later," the phone calls. Don't

2 do that stuff. Work with us so that we
3 can make things right, correct a lot of
4 issues that's going on today.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you for your testimony.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Before we proceed, I would like to take a
11 moment to recognize our good friend,
12 State Representative Jordan Harris, and I
13 believe I saw my Senator, Senator Sharif
14 Street. Thank you all for coming down.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
17 I'd like to recognize Councilman O'Neill.

18 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. I'd like to ask to be
20 excused from the remainder of the Council
21 session and be reported as voting aye on
22 all bills and resolutions.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman. Leave shall be
25 granted and the record will reflect your

2 votes. Thank you.

3 Mr. Decker.

4 CHIEF CLERK: George Gould,
5 commenting on 160687-A.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MR. GOULD: Thank you. My name
8 is George Gould. I'm an attorney at
9 Community Legal Services in Philadelphia.
10 Our office represents low-income
11 families, giving advice, representation,
12 and also working on important policy
13 issues that affect our clients.

14 I am here today in strong
15 support of Bill No. 160687-A. This
16 important bill deals with the disclosure
17 of lead hazards in water in residential
18 properties in Philadelphia.

19 I have worked closely with
20 Councilwoman Bass's staff, particularly
21 Shoshana Bricklin, and Councilwoman Bass
22 and also from the City Robert Murdock in
23 finalizing the provisions of this bill.
24 This bill follows up on a bill passed by
25 Councilwoman Gym that dealt with water

2 quality regarding lead in our schools.

3 It also followed up an important bill by

4 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown which dealt

5 with child care facilities in

6 Philadelphia. They're now required to

7 get -- in order to get a license, they

8 must have a lead-safe certification.

9 The bill today has some

10 important provisions. First, tenants are

11 required to get from their landlords a

12 pamphlet regarding the best practices

13 that deal with lead water service lines

14 and lead plumbing components.

15 Secondly, a landlord is now

16 required to notify the tenant of a known

17 existence of a lead water service line in

18 their property.

19 Thirdly, a landlord cannot

20 discriminate against families with

21 children because there is a lead service

22 line or there is a lead plumbing

23 component.

24 Moreover, the bill also

25 provides that the lease gives a tenant a

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 ten-day period to get a lead inspection
3 done on the property to see if there are
4 lead water service lines or lead plumbing
5 components, and if there are, they have a
6 right to cancel the lease within two
7 days.

8 Finally, the bill has a
9 provision which specifically says there
10 can be no waiver of any provisions in the
11 bill in the lease.

12 I think this is a very
13 important bill, and I urge Councilpeople
14 to support it.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you
17 for your time.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: Clerk, could
20 you please read the name of our next
21 speaker.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Jacob Bender,
23 commenting on 161119.

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MR. BENDER: Good morning.

2 Assalamu alaykum, shalom aleichen. My
3 name is Jacob Bender and I am the
4 Executive Director of the Philadelphia
5 Chapter of CAIR, the Council on American
6 Islamic Relations. CAIR is America's
7 preeminent Muslim civil rights
8 organization, and I have the honor of
9 being the first non-Muslim and Jewish
10 director of one of its 30 chapters.

11 My presence here today is the
12 reputation of the ahistorical lie that
13 the Muslim community and Islam itself are
14 inherently anti-Semitic and that Jews and
15 Muslims are now and will ever be enemies.
16 Rather, I'm here today as proof that Jews
17 and Muslims, inspired by our receptive
18 religious traditions, can indeed work
19 together in this country for the greater
20 good and join with other communities in a
21 great coalition against the ignorant,
22 bigoted, and bullying men who now rule
23 our beloved country.

24 City Council Resolution 161119,
25 the resolution submitted by Councilwoman

2 Helen Gym, is an expression of the
3 age-old idea found in all the world's
4 sacred creeds that we are truly our
5 brothers' and sisters' keepers, united in
6 our common existence as passengers upon
7 this fragile and now endangered planet.
8 And now we have the new resident of the
9 Oval Office lethally banning tens of
10 thousands of desperate Syrian refugees
11 from these sometimes welcoming shores,
12 condemning them to almost certain death.

13 Should we be surprised at all
14 then that those who refuse to accept the
15 science of climate change or are too
16 concerned with corporate profits to let a
17 small thing like rising sea levels get in
18 their way are part of the same clique now
19 sequestered as the national cabinet that
20 sees all Muslims as inherently dangerous
21 traitors and, consequently, are planning
22 to implement such unconstitutional
23 policies as a national registry,
24 religious profiling, and the possible
25 reintroduction of torture as the official

2 go-to interrogation methodology of the
3 United States of America.

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: We want to
5 thank you for coming down and speaking
6 today.

7 MR. BENDER: One more
8 paragraph. Excuse me.

9 The widespread ignorance about
10 Muslims in this country at this moment is
11 truly astonishing, with those condemning
12 Islam the loudest hardly knowing the
13 difference between hummus and Hamas.

14 Councilwoman Gym's resolution
15 will not rewrite the history of this
16 nation, but is a small and absolutely
17 necessary action at the dramatic
18 moment -- in this dramatic moment in the
19 life of the republic.

20 Thank you very much.

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

22 Clerk, would you please read
23 our next speaker.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILMAN HENON: We're going

2 to take a brief moment to handle some
3 technical issues. We are not at ease,
4 still in session, but we're going to take
5 a brief moment to handle some technical
6 issues.

7 That was quick. Technology.
8 Clerk, would you please read
9 our next speaker, please.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Reverend Judith
11 Sullivan, commenting on 161119.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 REVEREND SULLIVAN: President
14 Clarke, members of City Council and good
15 people in Philadelphia, my name is Judy
16 Sullivan. I am the Chair of the Board of
17 the Interfaith Center of Greater
18 Philadelphia as well as the Dean of the
19 Philadelphia Episcopal Cathedral and a
20 proud Philadelphian. I speak to you
21 today in support of Resolution 161119
22 offered by Councilmembers Gym and Jones.

23 The principle of religious
24 liberty was the heart of William Penn's
25 dream for Philadelphia. He called it a

2 holy experiment, imagining a society
3 where people of different faiths could
4 share the benefits of freedom. That
5 dream became our gloriously diverse city
6 where persons of all faiths and economic
7 backgrounds live and work side by side,
8 peacefully and respectfully.

9 We who love Philadelphia will
10 not stand by when it is threatened by
11 ugly, inflammatory, hateful words and
12 actions that tear at the very fiber of
13 our democracy and our vision of a just,
14 inclusive society.

15 The recent escalation of hate
16 crimes, particularly against our sisters
17 and brothers from Muslim and Arabic
18 immigrant communities, is alarming. We
19 at the Interfaith Center of Greater
20 Philadelphia add our voices in condemning
21 these actions.

22 We call upon the citizens of
23 our region to join us in our campaign to
24 dare to understand those whose religious,
25 racial, and ethnic backgrounds may differ

2 from our own. We call upon all
3 Philadelphians to resist fear and the
4 voices that seek to divide us. Resist
5 hatred and prejudice. Respect the
6 dignity of every human being that we may
7 realize Penn's dream and a model of
8 religious pluralism that our constitution
9 protects. Let us be that holy people
10 that Penn intended. We urge your support
11 of this resolution.

12 Thank you very much.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

15 Clerk, could you please read
16 our next speaker, please.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Salima Suswell,
18 commenting on 161119.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MS. SUSWELL: Good morning,
21 Council President Clarke and City Council
22 members. Assalamu alaykum. Peace be
23 unto you. Again, my name is Salima
24 Suswell. I am a second-generation
25 African American Muslim woman born to my

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Muslim parents, Majeedah Rashid and Imam
3 Asim Abdur Rashid, and raised in the City
4 of Philadelphia.

5 Philadelphia, the birth place
6 of this nation, was founded upon the
7 principles of religious tolerance,
8 religious freedom, and religious
9 inclusion. Philadelphia is home to an
10 estimated over 250,000 Muslim citizens.
11 We are educators, we are doctors, we are
12 lawyers, we are elected officials, we are
13 the police officers that help to keep the
14 streets safe each day. We are your
15 neighbors, we are your sisters and your
16 brothers.

17 While this country hasn't often
18 lived up to the ideals of openness and
19 tolerance, those of us who strive for a
20 better society have always sought to
21 create a United States and a City of
22 Philadelphia that welcomes all regardless
23 of their religion or where they come
24 from.

25 Today I ask the Philadelphia

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 City Council to support Resolution
3 161119, which seeks to uphold the City of
4 Philadelphia's support for and protection
5 of Muslim communities, condemning
6 violence and hate speech targeted towards
7 Muslims, affirming the religious
8 pluralism of the United States, and
9 urging Philadelphia residents to stand in
10 solidarity with our American Muslim
11 communities, and all other communities,
12 for peace and for justice.

13 Although I recognize that the
14 road ahead is tough for the American
15 Muslim community, I have vowed to push
16 forward and to work harder and to work
17 together in solidarity with all groups of
18 all religions and ethnic and unique
19 backgrounds, because that is what it will
20 take for us to approach prosperity,
21 dignity, peace and harmony in this city
22 and in this nation.

23 And so, again, I ask that you
24 stand in solidarity with the Muslim
25 American community of Philadelphia.

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Again, social injustice, hate speech,
3 hate crimes, and vicious rhetoric
4 influences and ignites turmoil in our
5 society.

6 I would like to thank
7 Councilwoman Helen Gym and Councilman
8 Curtis Jones, Jr. for co-sponsoring this
9 resolution and for their unwavering
10 support of the Philadelphia Muslim
11 community. And thank you to all of the
12 Councilmembers here today that have
13 supported this resolution and who
14 continue to represent and support the
15 Muslims within your respective districts.

16 Thank you.

17 (Applause.)

18 CHIEF CLERK: Robert Taylor.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MR. TAYLOR: Good morning,
21 ladies and gentlemen. I'm Robert Taylor,
22 President of TWU Local 700 and WPEB
23 88.1-FM co-host on the Jasper Jones show.
24 I'm commenting on Resolution 161119.

25 Quote, "Upholding the City of

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 Philadelphia's support for and protection
3 of Muslim communities, condemning
4 violence and hate speech targeted toward
5 Muslims, and all other communities, for
6 peace and justice," end quote.

7 Let us not forget a little over
8 a year ago, 14 people were murdered, 29
9 injured by a Jihad couple in the San
10 Bernardino attack. It is important to
11 remember that this act stems from a
12 radical interpretation of certain Muslim
13 laws and traditions, which clearly
14 resulted in the death of American
15 citizens on multiple occasions.

16 According to former Muslim
17 Ayaan Hirsi Ali, quote, "Islam is not a
18 religion of peace. It is a political
19 theory of conquest that seeks domination
20 by any means it can," end quote.

21 Moreover, many average Muslims
22 support suicide bombing, according to Pew
23 Research. Quote, "In the United States,
24 it's 26 percent for 18- to 29-year-olds,
25 13 percent overall, with an estimated

2 200,000 such people in Philadelphia,"
3 thus this is a valid concern.

4 Then we have sanctuary city
5 policies that bring in illegal
6 immigrants, Muslim and others, not by law
7 but through executive orders by the way
8 of the Mayor's Office. This is lawless
9 and dangerous.

10 Quote, "One of the reasons that
11 we're seeing so many attacks here in the
12 United States is that we've been
13 importing wholesale tens of thousands of
14 people who hate us," Tucker Carlson.

15 When people come to the United
16 States, they must acknowledge that we
17 work under a constitutional system of law
18 and not under Sharia law or any other
19 law. If they fail or refuse to
20 acknowledge this, then they are invaders
21 and must be rooted out.

22 Quote, "Sneaking into a country
23 does not make you an immigrant any more
24 than breaking into a house makes you a
25 part of the family."

1 1/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 For those who will respect the
3 laws and come in in a lawful manner,
4 that's to say with proper vetting, I
5 welcome them and they should have our
6 support. I am thankful for the new
7 President Trump Administration that has
8 promised to do such vetting.

9 This nation is founded as one
10 nation under God, with liberty and
11 justice for all.

12 Thank you.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you for your testimony.

15 (Audience booing and yelling
16 "shame.")

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
18 right. All right. Everybody should have
19 a right to say what they have to say.

20 Next.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
22 commenting on 161114 and 160007.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 MR. DANIHEL: This is yet
25 another official decree from the people

2 that must be acted upon immediately.

3 As Philadelphians, we pay some
4 of the highest taxes. What does this buy
5 us? Better, more law-abiding government
6 employees ready to serve and protect,
7 better agents and agencies bound by oath
8 to protect and defend the constitution
9 and laws against all enemies, foreign and
10 domestic?

11 This Council was decreed
12 multiple times to act on possible illegal
13 and unconstitutional activities. These
14 allegations seem to violate constitutions
15 and laws requiring prosecution and
16 penalties of all involved. Is Council an
17 accessory after the fact?

18 I offer these laws, for
19 example: 42 USC 1982, 83, 85, 86, 18 USC
20 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA Constitution
21 Article I, Sections 1 through 11.

22 Why has this well-paid
23 government refused to allow the people to
24 decide? Why has this government failed
25 to prove that a public hearing that never

2 violated any constitutions or laws as
3 required by the way the mandamus
4 (unintelligible). Violations of oath of
5 office undermine the people's faith in
6 government and require prosecution.

7 This is the color of law of
8 government and, as such, has violated
9 franchise of the charter of the
10 government. I call upon the Commonwealth
11 and federal governments to act and
12 perform their respective constitutional
13 obligations to de-fund, investigate, and
14 prosecute to the fullest extent of the
15 law any and all violations of
16 constitutions and laws by said agents and
17 agencies in Philadelphia, to make
18 immediate remedy, restore and make whole
19 any and all damage by these
20 constitutional and law violations, to
21 restore the rule of law or deeds of
22 transfer by consent of the owner when
23 full due process and trial by jury is
24 never denied, where government pays for
25 white tapes because stealing is not

2 allowed. If average people must follow
3 the law, why can government claim
4 immunity? If a congressman receives a
5 trial by jury, then why am I denied?
6 Accountability requires auditable consent
7 of the government. The Declaration of
8 Independence reminds us, and I quote,
9 "After depriving us in many cases of the
10 benefit of trial by jury, it is our
11 rights and our duties to throw off such a
12 government."

13 This lawlessness cannot be
14 allowed. I remind Council, it takes a
15 lot of cooperation to create and allow
16 monumental corruption.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you for your testimony.

19 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
20 other speakers on the public comment
21 list, Mr. President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

24 We will now consider the bills
25 and resolutions on the Final Passage

11 Council President. I just wanted to
12 speak to this issue.

13 Over the past year and actually
14 probably even longer than that, but over
15 the past year, my colleagues in this
16 Chamber and members of the Administration
17 have heard me speak extensively about the
18 need for the City of Philadelphia to
19 improve its efforts on tax collections.
20 Today, Council President, you introduced
21 a resolution that acknowledges the issue
22 that has long troubled our city,
23 delinquencies, and I agree we must repair
24 the system.

25 I've been strongly advocating

1 1/26/17 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 that the City of Philadelphia pursue a
3 tax lien securitization method that has a
4 proven track record of success, most
5 notably in New York City where they have
6 improved their collection rate from 85
7 percent to 98 percent. Today in
8 Philadelphia we're at 92 percent. We can
9 do better.

10 As a major city, we lag behind
11 other comparable cities when it comes to
12 collecting monies. In fact, of the top
13 20, we're the lowest in collection.
14 These are monies that are due for the
15 School District. Fifty-five percent of
16 all the monies go to the schools. We
17 need these dollars to support our
18 children and their future. We must do
19 better.

20 In fact, in July we had a press
21 conference. We released a study that
22 documented we have 492 million of
23 delinquent taxes. We have the
24 possibility of collecting 90 to 120
25 million within six months, and we can

2 improve our ongoing collections by 25 to
3 40 million. Powerful.

4 We have a \$6 billion pension
5 deficit. We need these dollars. We have
6 a fund balance that's very low. We need
7 these monies. And, more importantly, the
8 school system needs the monies.

9 To your point, Council
10 President, which you've raised, which is
11 very valid, the Land Bank has the
12 opportunity to revitalize neighborhoods,
13 improve public safety and more, and we
14 could use these dollars to support it.
15 That's the only way it will be truly
16 successful with the planning,
17 rehabilitation, and demolition projects.

18 A securitization would be quite
19 beneficial to Philadelphia and its Land
20 Bank interests. In fact, it accommodates
21 a number of goals and the concerns in the
22 resolution and it gives the City
23 flexibility and control. We are in
24 control. A securitization is beneficial
25 not only to collect delinquent tax

2 dollars, but also for property
3 rehabilitation and demolition efforts
4 conforming to the City's redevelopment
5 initiatives.

6 Land Bank activities would be
7 promoted by a securitization in a number
8 of ways. During the pre-sale process,
9 property due diligence would be
10 undertaken with a City-created trust
11 handling the securitization. This due
12 diligence information would be available
13 to the City's planning and redevelopment
14 staff as well as the City's Land Bank
15 officials. The City could use this
16 information to determine which liens
17 could be conveyed to the trust for
18 collection and which underlying
19 properties to transfer to the Land Bank
20 for redevelopment purposes.

21 A land bank is a partner in the
22 process. A land bank can only be
23 effective if it has the resources. A
24 securitization can provide the needed
25 monies to accomplish both planning,

2 rehabilitation, and demolition. A
3 securitization is the solution to your
4 resolution, Mr. President. It
5 accomplishes a number of goals that this
6 body is fighting tirelessly to achieve.
7 If we choose this path, I am confident we
8 will accomplish these goals.

9 Thank you.

11 Thank you.

12 So I'm going to do something is
13 that I've never done before.

14 Councilman Henon, can you take
15 this for a second.

16 (Councilman Henon approached
17 podium.)

22 Thank you, Mr. Leader. This is a very
23 important issue to me, which is why I'm
24 here, which I rarely do. I don't think
25 I've ever done. And I want to make sure

4 only myself but a number of members, a
5 number of advocates, that the reality is
6 is that there was a significant effort
7 put in creating the Land Bank,

10 Representative Jordan Harris was a State
11 Rep. Our good friend Councilman Johnson
12 was at that point a State Rep when this
13 whole conversation started. And the
14 simple reality is is that we were
15 optimistic about the likelihood that we
16 finally had a tool, that we would be put
17 in a position where we had a balance --
18 an opportunity to have a balance and an
19 economically diverse strategy for
20 rebuilding our neighborhoods,
21 particularly those neighborhoods of,
22 quote/unquote, choice where there were
23 increasing values.

24 And what we're simply saying is
25 that we're asking for people to take a

1 1/26/17 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 step back, because the simple reality is
3 is that the same people that we would be
4 asking to oversee the securitization
5 program -- and I actually met with
6 Councilman Domb early on on a number of
7 occasions and met with the people from
8 New York where we had that conversation,
9 and it might be something that would
10 ultimately make some sense once we got
11 the data. But the simple reality is is
12 that if people in the government don't
13 adhere to the commitments that were made,
14 the same people who, frankly speaking,
15 committed to doing a land bank
16 strategy -- we actually just introduced
17 on behalf of the Administration a Fair
18 Housing Act and some of the other things
19 related to that. If they decided not to
20 adhere or to simply ignore the request of
21 the Land Bank and the Councilmembers,
22 then it doesn't matter, because those
23 same people will ignore and not adhere to
24 the recommendations that were made by
25 those same Councilmembers.

1 1/26/17 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 So my issue is not so much
3 around the strategies, but it is around
4 the notion that people within the
5 government can ultimately make the final
6 decision on how we proceed as it relates
7 to developing our communities in a fair
8 and equitable way.

9 So my concern is, one,
10 obviously we have to make sure that the
11 data is correct but, number two, we have
12 to have a commitment to participate and
13 participate in earnest. Not simply say
14 at a table that we're okay, but at the
15 end of the day because we have the
16 ability to proceed without any sign-off
17 or without any check and balance from the
18 City Council of Philadelphia, we're just
19 going to sell them.

20 So that's my most significant
21 issue. And I must tell you that it
22 will -- we're looking at going beyond
23 simply having a public hearing on this
24 process and this conversation.

25 I was on the radio a couple of

1 1/26/17 - STATED - 2ND READING
2 days and people were amazed that there
3 was no check and balance, Mr. Leader, as
4 it relates to Council's ability to have
5 influence as it relates to the Sheriff
6 Sale of property. That's a problem, and
7 we're looking at hopefully an
8 understanding between us and the Revenue
9 Department as to how we proceed and
10 continue the conversation around the
11 memorandum of understanding, but not
12 simply have -- and I don't know who's in
13 charge at that aspect of the
14 government -- simply have people ignore
15 the wish and the request of not only the
16 Councilmembers but the Land Bank Board
17 and all of the stakeholders that fought
18 to put this in place.

19 So that is my issue, and I'm
20 hoping that throughout the public hearing
21 process and probably some additional
22 measures that we will look at, that we
23 can get on the same page, as I said
24 earlier to a reporter, and we can move
25 towards truly being the neighborhood

2 Mayor, as Mayor Kenney has referenced --
3 and I believe in him and believe in his
4 commitment to doing that -- and the
5 neighborhood Council but, more
6 importantly, the neighborhood
7 bureaucracy, because -- and we sometimes
8 call them the B team, because they be
9 here when we get elected and they be here
10 when we get unelected, when we retire.
11 So we need to have within the structure
12 of government a commitment that's
13 systematic as it relates to our needs to
14 deal with the citizens of the City of
15 Philadelphia and subsequently to help
16 these people in these communities.

17 So I just wanted to say that.
18 That's the objective, and hopefully,
19 Mr. Leader, we can get back on the same
20 page and we can move forward on what we
21 believe that ultimately will be something
22 that's good for all of the citizens of
23 the City of Philadelphia.

24 So with that, I will give you
25 your chair back, sir.

1 1/26/17 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 COUNCILMAN HENON: I drank all
3 your water, Council President. But thank
4 you for your insights and explanation. I
5 think it really does help a lot.

6 The Chair recognizes
7 Councilwoman Sanchez.

8 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
9 you. And I want to thank Council
10 President for his Booker move, Cory
11 Booker move over here, and just add that
12 I think we're all interested in the
13 collection strategies. And I also
14 respect Councilman Domb and want to work
15 with him on a strategy for how do we
16 increase our collections. But economic
17 community development policy is set by
18 the Mayor and Council, and so any time
19 bureaucracy stands in the way of what is
20 an agreement that way is not good.

21 The strategic plan -- and we
22 worked very hard to create a very
23 transparent process and what we called
24 bucket of opportunities, and I look
25 forward and I believe that ultimately the

1 1/26/17 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Mayor will agree with the buckets of
3 opportunities and we will create a filter
4 that will allow everyone to meet basic
5 standards, and then we can move forward.

6 The article today highlighted
7 one thing, and I think it's important for
8 folks. We got to think about this in a
9 bolder way. At the current pace of
10 acquisitions in this new tool, it will
11 take us 50 to 70 years to just address
12 the current blight and vacancy that is in
13 the City. And we don't have that time.
14 Our neighborhoods are changing, the City
15 is growing, and we need to protect folks
16 in these neighborhoods and create those
17 opportunities in an equitable way.

18 So there's a sense of urgency,
19 and I really do appreciate always your
20 leadership, your strong leadership, on
21 this issue. And with that, I move for
22 its adoption.

23 (Duly seconded.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you very much, Councilwoman.

1 1/26/17 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 It's been moved and properly
3 seconded.

4 All those in favor say aye.
5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Those opposed?

8 (No response.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 ayes have it, and that resolution is
11 adopted.

12 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
13 recognizing the efforts of the
14 Philadelphia Anti-Violence Coalition and
15 declaring February 2017 as a month of
16 peace in the City of Philadelphia,
17 introduced by Councilman Green.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

20 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
21 Council President. Last week I was
22 honored to stand with Bilal Qayyum, who
23 is the Chair of the Philadelphia
24 Anti-Violence Coalition, and
25 representatives of over 55 organizations

2 declaring February as a month of peace.

3 The mission of the

4 Anti-Violence Coalition is to effectively

5 facilitate collaboration among diverse

6 grassroots organizations, to empower the

7 community, to increase the peace in our

8 neighborhoods through activism,

9 education, prevention/intervention

10 programs, and effective policy advocacy.

11 The Anti-Violence Coalition has

12 developed a ten point program. Some of

13 the points of that program include

14 establish street intervention teams to go

15 into neighborhoods where there has been

16 high numbers of shootings. The team will

17 go door to door with information to

18 provide employment opportunities,

19 housing, social service assistance, et

20 cetera; create activities year round for

21 youth in neighborhoods at churches,

22 mosques, recreation centers, and schools

23 and establish mentoring programs in each

24 of these settings; work to develop a

25 crisis response center that will train

2 intervention specialists to work with
3 troubled individuals; establish resources
4 in neighborhoods that help residents
5 build sustained leadership to build
6 partnership for social and government
7 agencies to develop systemic changes to
8 empower the residents; develop an

10 spiritual direction to the Philadelphia
11 Anti-Violence Coalition and promote the
12 unifying message of live and let live.

13 I move for the adoption of the
14 resolution.

15 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

19 All those in favor say aye.

20 (Aye.)

17 All those in favor say aye.

18 (Aye.)

8 Before we call for the motion, the Chair
9 recognizes Councilman Taubenberger.

10 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Well,
11 two things. I would be honored to call
12 for the motion. But when it comes to
13 internment as mentioned in the resolution
14 very well and many times, I know
15 firsthand of the difficulty and pain that
16 that can cause a family, as my father,
17 Alfred William Taubenberger, Sr., was
18 interned during World War II from 1942,
19 '43. I will be obviously voting aye for
20 this resolution. It's something that
21 should be brought to the public, and I do
22 so with the thousands of Americans of
23 Italian, German, and Japanese descent
24 that were unfairly, unjustly interned

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
13 been moved and properly seconded.

14 All those in favor say aye.

15 (Aye.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Those opposed?

18 (No response.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 ayes have it, and that resolution is
21 adopted.

22 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
23 recognizing and honoring the 2016 winners

3 Chair again recognizes Councilman Oh.

8 been moved and properly seconded.

9 All those in favor say aye.

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Those opposed?

16 adopted.

17 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
18 other resolutions on the Final Passage

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

22 Are there any speeches on
23 behalf of the minority?

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Oh.

2 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
3 much, Council President. I just wanted
4 to thank Councilwoman Gym for her timely
5 resolution. It's timely because when
6 concerns of citizens arise, it's
7 important to address their needs. And
8 let me say that that bill co-sponsored by
9 Councilman Curtis Jones, Jr. is not
10 unique to this body, and I want to make
11 sure when people see us in action, that
12 they understand that this body has been
13 on the forefront of standing up for human
14 rights, civil rights in this city. And
15 particularly when it comes to Muslims and
16 Arabs, discrimination towards Muslims and
17 Arabs, this body has introduced
18 resolution after resolution, ordinances
19 and other things, taken initiatives to
20 ensure our citizens that Philadelphia
21 government is protecting them and
22 ensuring there's equity in the law.

23 Thank you very much.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you, Councilman.

1 1/26/17 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 Speeches on behalf of the
3 majority?

4 And the Chair recognizes
5 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
7 Mr. President. This morning I introduced
8 a resolution recognizing January as Human
9 Trafficking Awareness Month, and it's no
10 more than a continuation of our
11 examination of this issue starting in
12 2015, and subsequently served on the task
13 force for Judge Lori Dumas around this
14 issue.

15 What we need to know is that it
16 is a global problem with local impact.
17 Human trafficking involves school-age
18 children most often vulnerable due to
19 challenging family situations. And human
20 trafficking takes on a number of variety
21 of forms, including forced labor,
22 domestic servitude, and the obvious,
23 commercial sexual exploitation.

24 Right here in Philadelphia a
25 kingpin of human trafficking known as

1 1/26/17 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 Bruce, middle initial Cash Steele, 44,
3 was operating his own human trafficking
4 ring right here in the Philadelphia
5 five-county area. And who were the
6 victims? Women addicted to drugs, women
7 with psychological trauma, women who were
8 homeless.

9 October 2016, the FBI
10 Philadelphia's division arrested 15 pimps
11 and associates as part of what is known
12 as the Operation Cross Country X, an
13 international effort focused on underage
14 human trafficking, which obviously
15 includes children.

16 Human trafficking is not a
17 someplace else issue. You can go up and
18 down the 95 corridor, from New York to
19 parts of Kensington in Councilwoman Maria
20 Quinones-Sanchez's district, who we have
21 a safe house, and find human trafficking.

22 So this morning I want to
23 particularly commend Police Commissioner
24 Richard Ross who served on that task
25 force led by Judge Lori Dumas, as this

1 1/26/17 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 office has joined with the FBI and the
3 U.S. Attorney's Office, along with the
4 Philadelphia Salvation Army, to pull
5 together finally a human trafficking task
6 force that will tackle this ugly issue,
7 that will help us coordinate and better
8 recognize the signs of human trafficking
9 and ultimately to dismantle trafficking
10 networks.

11 Again, kudos to Commissioner
12 Ross and Judge Lori Dumas.

13 Thank you, Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilwoman.

16 And the Chair recognizes
17 Councilman Jones.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. Today I'd like to invite
20 my colleagues to come out and join me at
21 4:00 p.m. in the Caucus Room for the
22 worst surprise reception in the history
23 of surprises. Everybody in here knows,
24 but I'm not supposed to know that. I'm
25 being sworn in, and thanks to your

2 appointment to the Committee on Justice
3 Reform, Governor Wolf has also appointed
4 me to the Human Relations Commission, the
5 Juvenile Justice Advisory Committee, and
6 a reappointment to PCCD. And we will be
7 sworn in in the Caucus Room by Judge
8 Dumas. The surprise is supposed to be
9 that Blondell Reynolds Brown is the emcee
10 and that you have agreed to speak. All
11 these surprises. But I guess the good
12 news is that my staff doesn't let
13 anything sneak up on me, made sure I wore
14 a power tie today. So I appreciate it,
15 would like my colleagues to come out.
16 And it just goes to show like in the
17 Army, never volunteer for a committee
18 because what happens is if you do it
19 fairly well, you'll wind up on different
20 committees. But I appreciate your trust
21 in me and the work that followed.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman. You did a great
25 job. Thank you so much. I look forward

2 to your continuing good work.

3 The Chair recognizes

4 Councilwoman Blackwell.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

6 you, Mr. President. Philadelphia

7 resident survey is my subject. The City

11 policing, public safety, trash

25 Monday.

2 So please encourage your
3 students to fill them out and -- did I
4 say students? Sorry. My past sneaks up
5 on me every now and then. And if you
6 need more, you can get them from the
7 Mayor's Office. Debbie is in charge of
8 this. And they're also asking that we
9 collect them or have them returned to our
10 offices, because the Mayor's Office wants
11 to get them back from us. And this
12 survey form will be open until February
13 15th.

14 So let's try to talk to our
15 constituents and groups so that the Mayor
16 can find out. And then we also know
17 what -- he'll know when he comes up here
18 for budget what people are saying. But
19 thank you very much. So you see the
20 forms on your desk in English and
21 Spanish, and thank you all very much.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Johnson.

2 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
3 Council President. I want to also say it
4 feels good to be back in City Council
5 doing the work of the people.

6 As a young man, a lawyer once
7 told me that ignorance of the law is no
8 excuse. So today I introduced a bill to
9 examine and mandate ethics training for
10 City Council members.

11 Currently, ethics trainings are
12 informally conducted, but I think it's
13 important moving forward as a city and a
14 body that we formalize a system and have
15 it codified that City Council members
16 have mandatory ethics training every
17 Council term. As elected officials and
18 City employees who get to introduce
19 legislation and change the rules in the
20 City, we want to be proactive in making
21 sure we are doing everything in our power
22 to stay knowledgeable of the code and to
23 set a positive example with our behavior.

24 The ethics rules and guidelines
25 are being examined and changed every

1 1/26/17 - STATED - ADJOURNMENT
2 year, and City Council is notified of
3 changes sometimes via e-mail, piecemeal,
4 which can be overlooked or forgotten in
5 the larger scheme of e-mails and
6 legislation that we look at. We want to
7 be sure we are promoting logical good
8 behavior for ourselves and future City
9 Council. And it also will give us an
10 opportunity as members of this body to
11 continue doing the good work of the
12 people, setting a positive example for
13 our staff members but, most importantly,
14 staying on point.

15 Thank you, Council President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman.
