3 (Council at ease.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you. Thank you very much.

6 The next order of business is
7 the approval of the Journal of the
8 meeting of Thursday, February 9, 2017,
9 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Greenlee.

11 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
12 you, Mr. President. I move that the
13 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
14 February 9, 2017 be approved.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you. It has been moved and
18 properly seconded that the Journal of the
19 meeting of Thursday, February 9, 2017
20 stand approved.

21 All those in favor say aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 ayes have it, and the Journal is
4 approved.

5 The next order of business is
6 requests for leave of absence, and the
7 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. On behalf of the
10 majority, a leave of absence is requested
11 for Councilwoman Sanchez.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair thanks the gentleman. Leave shall
14 be granted.

15 On behalf of the minority, the
16 Chair recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

17 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. On behalf of the
19 republicans, there are no requests for
20 leave of absence.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 Chair thanks the gentleman.

23 At this time, I would like to
24 dispense with the regular order of
25 business and I would like to welcome and

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2 thank everyone who has come down to
3 witness your government in action today.
4 We hope your stay here today is a
5 knowledgeable one and, more importantly,
6 a pleasurable one, so much so that you
7 come again. So, again, thank you all for
8 coming today.

9 At this time, the Chair
10 recognizes Councilman Domb, who will
11 present a resolution honoring Joan
12 Mazzotti. Would Ms. Mazzotti and those
13 accompanying her please join the
14 Councilman at the podium.

15 (Councilmembers and guests
16 approached podium.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
18 joining Councilman Domb, we have
19 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Henon,
20 Councilwoman Gym, Councilwoman Reynolds
21 Brown, Councilwoman Parker, and
22 Councilwoman Blackwell.

23 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Good morning,
24 everyone. Today is a special day because
25 I get to honor someone I've known for a

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2 long time outside of the government world
3 actually. I'll tell you a little story.
4 In 1987, in the private world, I sold
5 Joan Mazzotti's condominium in Hopkinson
6 House, one bedroom. She shouldn't have
7 sold it, though, because the property
8 values went up a lot. But in any event,
9 I've known her a long time. I just
10 wanted to mention that.

11 But we're here today to
12 recognize Philadelphia Futures and Joan
13 Mazzotti. And the Futures program really
14 breaks the cycle of poverty. It's done
15 phenomenal work. There's over 600 kids
16 that have gone through the program and
17 thousands have been touched by it. And
18 basically it cradles kids from high
19 school through college and gets them
20 graduated in college. It's an
21 unbelievable program, that they normally
22 wouldn't have that opportunity.

23 The statistics are crazy
24 positive for Philadelphia Futures. The
25 average child that they take on typically

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2 would only have an 11 percent chance of
3 graduating college. In Philadelphia
4 Futures, it's 62 percent.

5 And the other statistic that I
6 love is when Joan took over, they had
7 like a million dollar budget. Today they
8 have a \$3 million budget, 12 million in
9 assets. And, by the way, Philadelphia
10 Futures gets no federal money, no state
11 money, and no city money. Self-funded.
12 Pretty amazing program.

13 The big statistic that I love,
14 though, is that 47 percent of the college
15 graduates of Philadelphia Futures --
16 these are kids in poverty -- when they
17 graduate, buy a home. 47 percent. The
18 average statistic nationally is 33.

19 So without further adieu, this
20 resolution honors and recognizes Joan C.
21 Mazzotti for her exceptional leadership
22 and dedication over the last 16 years as
23 the Executive Director of Philadelphia
24 Futures.

25 Whereas, on September 13, 2016,

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2 the Board of Directors of Philadelphia
3 Futures announced that Joan C. Mazzotti
4 will step down as Executive Director
5 after 16 years of extraordinary service;
6 and

7 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
8 Ms. Mazzotti, a Long Island native with a
9 Bachelor's degree in political science
10 from Rider University and a law degree
11 from Villanova University, was a
12 corporate lawyer for Aramark for more
13 than 20 years, before she joined
14 Philadelphia Futures as only its third
15 leader in the history of the
16 organization; and

17 Whereas, Philadelphia Futures
18 is a non-profit organization that
19 provides Philadelphia low-income,
20 first-generation-to-college students with
21 the tools, resources and opportunities
22 necessary for admission to and success in
23 college; and

24 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
25 Whereas, Philadelphia Futures provides

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2 comprehensive, long-term, direct services
3 and resources to students including
4 academic enrichment, college guidance,
5 one-to-one mentoring, career readiness
6 and financial incentives; and

7 Whereas, as a result of the
8 dedication and unwavering passion
9 Ms. Mazzotti brought to her job, the work
10 sometimes got personal. Ms. Mazzotti and
11 her husband, Michael Kelly, a retired
12 lawyer, mentored and became stand-in
13 parents to a Philadelphia Futures student
14 originally from Haiti who had lost his
15 parents years earlier, and who went on to
16 graduate from Haverford College; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
18 "Joan Mazzotti's exceptional leadership
19 over 16 years has shaped an organization
20 that deeply understands and serves the
21 needs of first-generation-to-college
22 students," said Laura Williamson, Chair
23 of the Board of Philadelphia Futures.
24 "Joan's agility in transforming a vision
25 to action with measurable results is

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2 evident in every part of the organization
3 today from the depth and reach of the
4 program to the loyalty and generosity of
5 the donor base"; and

6 Whereas, Ms. Mazzotti's
7 leadership of Philadelphia Futures is
8 recognized not only in Philadelphia but
9 around the country. Under her
10 leadership, Philadelphia Futures has
11 become a model of college retention and
12 success for low-income,
13 first-generation-to-college students; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, in
15 addition to launching new programs and
16 initiatives including College Connection
17 and Outreach Futures, and the
18 organization's groundbreaking
19 partnerships with colleges and
20 universities which have leveraged over 30
21 million in institutional financial aid
22 for Philadelphia Futures' students, in
23 2011 Ms. Mazzotti led the successful
24 merger of Philadelphia Futures with
25 White-Williams Scholars; and

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2 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas, in
3 2013, under Ms. Mazzotti's leadership,
4 Philadelphia Futures has received an
5 unprecedented \$1 million gift which has
6 allowed it to increase the organization's
7 reach; and

8 Whereas, over Ms. Mazzotti's
9 tenure, Philadelphia Futures' budget has
10 more than doubled to \$3.3 million, its
11 net assets have increased by more than
12 800 percent and, most importantly, the
13 six-year college graduation rate has
14 risen from 50 to 59 percent and over 500
15 Philadelphia Futures students have
16 received their college degrees;

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And
18 whereas, Ms. Mazzotti said, "The year
19 just ended was very strong. It was a
20 triple if not a home run. We have an
21 enormously talented and effective staff.
22 Philadelphia Futures is financially sound
23 and our students and programs are
24 thriving. As we enter the fifth year of
25 our current strategic plan, we soon will

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2 need to embark on a new planning process.
3 Accordingly, it is time for me to pass
4 the mantle to the person who will be
5 implementing the blueprint for the
6 organization's future"; and

7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: "I have
8 had the best job in Philadelphia and I
9 have loved every minute of it," said
10 Mazzotti. It is going to be very hard to
11 walk away from my work with my
12 colleagues, the students and their
13 parents, our donors, volunteers, partners
14 and friends"; and

15 Whereas, David O'Connor,
16 Philadelphia Futures board member, added,
17 "This has been more than a job to Joan.
18 It has been her mission, one that has
19 included her entire family. While this
20 work is never fully accomplished, for
21 many past, present and future
22 Philadelphia students, the work that Joan
23 has led has been life changing"; and

24 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
25 although her work life may be ending,

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2 Ms. Mazzotti and her husband intend to
3 continue volunteering for and
4 contributing to non-profit organizations
5 that advocate for those in need; now,
6 therefore, be it

7 Resolved, that the Council of
8 the City of Philadelphia, hereby honors
9 and recognizes Joan C. Mazzotti for
10 exceptional leadership and dedication
11 over the last 16 years as the Executive
12 Director of Philadelphia Futures.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 Chair recognizes Ms. Mazzotti for
16 remarks.

17 MS. MAZZOTTI: Thank you,
18 Council President Clarke, Councilman
19 Domb, and members of City Council.

20 I moved to Philadelphia from
21 New York over 40 years ago, and since
22 then, I eat hoagies instead of heroes, I
23 root for the Philllies instead of the
24 Yankees, and I put jimmies on my ice
25 cream instead of sprinkles. But, most

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2 important, for my entire professional
3 career in different ways and in different
4 venues, I have been committed to the
5 economic success of Philadelphia and its
6 citizens. For a proud Philadelphian,
7 your recognition today is profoundly
8 appreciated.

9 For the last 16 years, I have
10 been privileged to be the Executive
11 Director of Philadelphia Futures. This
12 has not for one moment been a job for me.
13 It's my passion, and in many ways it has
14 defined me.

15 We are known for the purposeful
16 pursuit of our mission to provide
17 low-income, first-generation-to-college
18 Philadelphia students with the skills,
19 opportunities, and resources needed to be
20 admitted to and succeed in college. We
21 are resolute in helping our students
22 reach their goal of a college degree and
23 professional and personal success.

24 As we ended 2016, we are now
25 providing comprehensive direct services

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2 to over 500 high school and college
3 students each year. Our college
4 graduation rates are continuing to rise,
5 and our work is recognized as a model for
6 others to follow. And we're finding new
7 and innovative ways to reach thousands
8 more students through our Step Up to
9 College resources. This fall we launched
10 a mobile app that is available without
11 cost to all Philadelphia students and
12 their families as they navigate the often
13 overwhelming path to college.

14 Over the last 16 years, we have
15 formed strategic partnerships with nine
16 colleges, including Drexel, Haverford,
17 Gettysburg, Lehigh, and Lafayette. Two
18 hundred and twenty-eight of our students
19 have attended a partner college, and as
20 you heard, they have received over \$31
21 million in institutional aid that is
22 above their state and federal aid.

23 Our results are strong and
24 consistent. A hundred percent of our
25 students graduate high school, almost all

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2 attend college, and our graduation rate
3 is now trending over 60 percent against
4 this national rate of 11 percent for
5 students living and families in the
6 lowest economic quartile.

7 But the true test of our
8 strength of our organization is founded
9 in the success of our alums. In 2016, we
10 surveyed our alums to evaluate the
11 long-term outcomes of students who
12 participated in the program, and as
13 Councilman Domb noted, the results
14 exceeded our expectations. They say the
15 proof is in the pudding, and this survey
16 is our pudding. Our alums have careers
17 and are well paid. They are satisfied
18 with their lives, and they generously
19 connect their success to Philadelphia
20 Futures. This in many ways is my legacy.

21 I am hopeful that the long-term
22 success of our students demonstrates
23 unequivocally that Philadelphia's public
24 school students can and do succeed if
25 given the opportunities and resources

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2 necessary for their success.

3 My great joy in the
4 achievements of Philadelphia Futures is
5 tempered by the fact that I am leaving
6 the organization at a time of great
7 uncertainty as we contemplate the
8 potential impact of the new
9 administration in Washington whose
10 policies threaten members of our
11 community. Philadelphia Futures is a
12 beautifully inclusive community, grounded
13 in the respect we have for each other.
14 We unwaveringly affirm that we are one
15 with members of our community who are of
16 color, identify as LGBTQ, are non-United
17 States citizens or members of vulnerable
18 religious groups. I am hopeful that I
19 can count on all of you in standing with
20 us in protecting each member of the
21 Philadelphia Futures community and each
22 citizen of Philadelphia from
23 discrimination, harassment, bias or other
24 harm. Our young people deserve no less.

25 Again, thank you for honoring

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2 my work. Please be assured although I am
3 stepping down from my position, I remain
4 committed to our city and I will not stop
5 fighting the good fight.

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Council will be at ease.

10 (Council at ease.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you.

13 At this time, the Chair
14 recognizes Councilman Jones, who will
15 present a resolution honoring
16 Philadelphia's living legends. Would
17 Heshimu Jaramogi, Ukee Washington, Rick
18 Williams, and Lady B and those
19 accompanying them please join the
20 Councilman at the podium.

21 (Councilmembers and guests
22 approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
24 joining Councilman Jones, we have
25 Councilman Green, Councilman Oh,

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2 Councilwoman Parker, Councilwoman
3 Blackwell, Councilwoman Gym, Councilman
4 Domb, Councilman Taubenberger, and
5 Councilman Johnson.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Good
7 morning, everyone.

8 (Good morning.)

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: Carter G.
10 Woodson in 1926 created Black History
11 Week. Not until 1976 did we expand to a
12 month, and I would only be noting that
13 it's the shortest month in the calendar,
14 but we'll take it. But when he did that,
15 he wanted to memorialize the impact and
16 importance of African Americans in the
17 history of the country and the world.
18 But what we wanted to do with the living
19 legends presentation was memorialize our
20 local legends, our local heroes, and not
21 when they passed away, but while they
22 were here to be able to smell the flowers
23 that we give.

24 My senior colleagues corrected
25 me. They're all too young to be -- but

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2 they're legends in spite of their age.
3 And they're very, as my kids would say,
4 Philly, like water ice, soft pretzels,
5 cheese steaks, like playing in the water
6 plugs in the summer. They are very
7 Philadelphia.

8 These individuals were preceded
9 by names like Georgie Woods on the radio,
10 who stopped spinning records to bring up
11 the issues of the day, Lady B;
12 individuals like Ed Bradley, who spent 26
13 years at CBS and then wind up on 60
14 Minutes to all of our shock and amazement
15 and we were happy to see him; Mary Mason
16 from WHAT, who was a pioneer and was able
17 to elect mayors, presidents, and
18 governors.

19 These legendary individuals
20 paved the way through sacrifice and hard
21 work for the individuals you see here
22 today: Heshimu Jaramogi, Ukee
23 Washington, Rick Williams, Ducis Rodgers,
24 and Lady B, leaders in the area of radio,
25 print, television, and journalism in

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2 Philadelphia. I like to call them the
3 Fabulous Five, but we only have four, so
4 they're the Fantastic Four today.

5 When you see these individuals
6 or hear their voices, they become a part
7 of your family. Ukee always says, All
8 right, family. And I feel it.

9 I have many a times on my way
10 to Council or leaving Council actually
11 been caught at the light chair dancing to
12 Lady B's music and The Basement Party. I
13 can't dance that well, so -- I actually
14 can.

15 Or to see Heshimu Jaramogi over
16 there with the stone face about what we
17 say and then the pen and radio mic as to
18 analyze that.

19 And so Tommie St. Hill asked me
20 on the way in why wasn't he up here, and
21 I'm going to answer you now, Tom St.
22 Hill, that you're so Philly when you're
23 known by one name. You got three, Tommie
24 St. Hill. But the individuals on this
25 stage - Ukee, Rick, B - all are known and

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2 are known by their first name. That's
3 when you know you're so Philly, and we
4 honor them today. Rick still gets his
5 hair cut at Pretty Boyz Barber Shop in
6 your district. So he's a regular guy.
7 He's a regular guy and he has --

8 MR. WILLIAMS: I should get a
9 free cut now. Thank you.

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: We don't do
11 that in these Chambers.

12 So without further adieu, this
13 resolution honoring living legends is
14 celebrating the Philadelphia Living
15 Legends: Heshimu Jaramogi, Ukee
16 Washington, Rick Williams, Ducis Rodgers
17 and Lady B, who are leaders in the areas
18 of radio, print, television, journalism
19 in Philadelphia, as a part of the
20 commemoration of Black History Month.

21 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
22 Whereas, Heshimu Jaramogi is an
23 award-winning journalist who has left his
24 mark on the Greater Philadelphia media
25 industry since the 1980s. Heshimu has

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2 worked for various local news
3 organizations, including WDAS, WCAU, WHY
4 and WPEN. In 1998, Heshimu became the
5 President and Founder of Jaramogi
6 Communications. He also founded, quote,
7 "The Neighborhood Leader" newspaper; and

8 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, in
9 more recent years, Heshimu Jaramogi has
10 worked with aspiring young writers at
11 Temple University, where he teaches
12 journalism courses. Jaramogi's
13 dedication to journalism was memorialized
14 when he became the recipient of the
15 Philadelphia Association of Black
16 Journalists' Lifetime Achievement Award;
17 and

18 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
19 Ulysses S. Washington, III,
20 affectionately known as Ukee, a member of
21 a proud and outstanding organization
22 known in this body as Kappa Alpha Psi
23 Fraternity, Incorporated, was raised in
24 Philadelphia and returned to the City
25 after graduating from the University of

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2 Richmond to pursue a career in broadcast
3 journalism. Washington started off as a
4 broadcaster at KYW TV in 1986.

5 Currently, Washington hosts Eyewitness
6 News on Philadelphia's CBS-3; and

7 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas,

8 Washington has also used his creative
9 talents in other areas of the media,
10 appearing in several movies of
11 Philadelphia-raised director M. Knight
12 Shyamalan. Washington has received
13 several accolades for his work, including
14 being inducted into the Broadcast
15 Pioneers of Philadelphia's Hall of Fame
16 in 2008 and the Pennsylvania Association
17 of Broadcasters Hall of Fame in 2015; and

18 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

19 Whereas, 6ABC Action News -- and the only
20 station allowed in the Taubenberger
21 household because of my wife, Joanne --
22 host Rick Williams worked in journalism
23 in several major cities across the
24 country before settling in Philadelphia
25 in 1988. Williams is one of the most

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2 recognized faces from the 6ABC
3 Thanksgiving Day Parade, which he has
4 co-hosted with Cecily Tynan since 2009;
5 and

6 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
7 Williams has made many significant
8 contributions to the Philadelphia
9 community, including his efforts to
10 inspire and uplift young Philadelphians
11 through his work with Philadelphia
12 Futures, a non-profit organization that
13 mentors students seeking higher
14 education. Williams' hard work was
15 honored in 2010, when he was inducted
16 into the Broadcast Pioneers Hall of Fame;
17 and

18 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
19 Ducis Rodgers moved to Philadelphia in
20 2012, becoming the Action News Sports
21 Director for 6ABC. Rodgers began his
22 career as an anchor and reporter for
23 WDEF-TV in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Prior
24 to coming to Philadelphia, Rodgers also
25 worked as a sportscaster in several major

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2 cities including Chicago, New York, and
3 Miami, where he was named the Miami New
4 Times "Best Sportscaster" in 2003.
5 Rodgers has also worked with ESPN and
6 WCBS-TV, covering major sporting events,
7 such as the Super Bowl and the World
8 Series; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
10 Lady B is one of the earliest female
11 rappers in Hip-Hop and one of the first
12 to record a studio album. In 1979, Lady
13 B began her radio career by interning at
14 WHAT radio station, where she worked with
15 Mary Mason, another Philadelphia radio
16 icon.

17 And I used to listen on the
18 steps with our box on Sundays when she
19 was on.

20 Lady B was hired full time
21 after improving ratings at the station by
22 assisting with the selection of new
23 music. In 1984, Lady B moved to
24 Philadelphia's Power 99 FM and started
25 the program "The Street Beat."

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2 Currently, Lady B broadcasts on
3 Philadelphia's premiere R&B station Old
4 School 100.3 FM. Lady B received the
5 prestigious Philadelphia Urban Legend
6 Award in 2002 and is also listed in VIBE
7 Magazine's History of Hip-Hop as "maybe
8 the most influential female in hip-hop
9 radio history"; now, therefore, be it

10 COUNCILMAN JONES: Be it
11 resolved, by the Council of the City of
12 Philadelphia, that it hereby honors and
13 celebrates Philadelphia's Living Legends:
14 Heshimu Jaramogi, Ukee Washington, Rick
15 Williams, Ducis Rodgers and Lady B, who
16 are leaders in the area of radio, print,
17 television, journalism in Philadelphia,
18 as part of the commemoration of Black
19 History Month.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
22 the Chair recognizes Ukee Washington for
23 remarks.

24 (Applause.)

25 MR. WASHINGTON: And let's keep

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2 that Ulysses right here. All right?

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: We're on
4 television.

5 MR. WASHINGTON: First, giving
6 honor to God and good morning, family,
7 and I do mean family. I am truly humbled
8 and grateful to be standing in front of
9 you and in front of you this morning
10 standing in the largest municipal
11 building in the United States, the
12 headquarters of the local government of
13 the great city, the great City of
14 Philadelphia, the city of which I was
15 born and raised while in my later years
16 commuting to and from Dover, Delaware by
17 way of West Philadelphia.

18 Now, I mention my origins
19 because it was here that the genes of my
20 career choice were formed, where the seed
21 was planted, and so shall they grow.

22 I was inspired and motivated by
23 watching television way back in the day
24 on my family black and white television,
25 with the vice grip because the knob fell

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2 off. Remember that? When we only got
3 channels 3, 6, 10, and 12, and if you
4 were lucky enough and had a UHF
5 converter, you got channel 17, 29 and 48
6 WKBS.

7 But watching television back in
8 the day and seeing people who look like
9 me motivated my soul, people like Trudy
10 Haynes, Sonny Hill, the late Jack Jones,
11 the late Malcolm Poindexter, true African
12 American pioneers who spoke to me as a
13 child without saying a word, but I heard
14 them loud and clear, so loud and clear on
15 so many levels.

16 I stand in front of you today
17 while maintaining my balance on their
18 shoulders and so many like them. And one
19 day with God continuing to be by our
20 side, all of the honorees here that you
21 are observing today, that we can serve as
22 the foundation, the foundation for so
23 many others, no matter where they are
24 from, no matter what they look like.

25 Dr. King once said many years

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2 ago that life's most persistent and
3 urgent question is, What are you doing
4 for others? What are you doing for
5 others?

6 It's our turn to help lead the
7 way, to pass that torch and keep our
8 historical flame burning bright. What an
9 inspiring day it is.

10 My family at home thanks you.
11 My family at CBS 3, past and present,
12 thanks you. But most of all, I thank
13 you.

14 I'm Ukee Washington, CBS 3,
15 Eyewitness News.

16 (Appause.)

17 MR. WILLIAMS: I'm Rick
18 Williams with Action News.

19 First of all, I would like to
20 accept this on behalf of my colleague
21 Ducis Rodgers, who is in Clearwater,
22 Florida covering the Phillies. I'm sure
23 he would be here as well. I know, we're
24 all jealous, but he is working, and I
25 accept this on his behalf.

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2 And very quickly I just want to
3 introduce you to my support system. We
4 all have support systems, people in our
5 corner, and that begins with my wife,
6 Jocelyn, Dr. Jocelyn Mitchell-Williams.

7 (Applause.)

8 MR. WILLIAMS: And she reminds
9 me every day that behind every successful
10 man is a woman who calls and says, Bring
11 dinner home on your way home from work.

12 I'm also joined by my news
13 director, Tom Davis. Tom, thank you for
14 being here.

15 (Applause.)

16 MR. WILLIAMS: And my friend
17 and executive producer, Rob Royal.

19 MR. WILLIAMS: But through it
20 all, my wife and I try to live by that
21 credo "to whom much is given, much is
22 required," and we know that we are
23 blessed to do what we do, to do what we
24 love. My wife is a very successful
25 OB/GYN. She's also dean of a medical

23 note was supported by yourself,
24 Mr. President, Councilman Taubenberger,
25 Green, along with Councilwoman Reynolds

3 Council, speaks to the U.S. House of
4 Representatives' action yesterday where
5 they passed two resolutions, Resolution
6 66 and 67, in essence repealing rules

9 cities to create retirement security
10 plans for private-sector workers.

11 Now, Mr. President, since we
12 took this issue on when joining this
13 body, this Council has worked very
14 methodically and intentionally. We've
15 been methodical about introducing a
16 resolution and passing it, holding our
17 hearing to study the state of retirement
18 security in the City of Philadelphia.
19 With your leadership, we commissioned the
20 Schwartz Center for Economic Policy
21 Analysis at the New School for Social
22 Research to prepare a report entitled
23 "Are Philadelphians Ready for
24 Retirement."

25 In October 13th, 2016, we named

2 members of our Task Force on Retirement
3 Security for Private Sector Employees.

4 And I want to note for the record,

5 Mr. President, that our task force is

6 comprised of 16 members who represent a

7 unique combination of stakeholders and

8 they are comprised of business member

9 organizations. So a process driven with

10 the private sector at the forefront and

11 at the table, academic and financial

12 research experts, private-sector labor

13 unions, and non-profit organizations

14 which represent many seniors and

15 low-income Philadelphians.

16 For us, Mr. Speaker [sic], a

17 solution coming from the federal

18 government is something that we would

19 welcome. Unfortunately, Mr. President,

20 you know you will be Mr. Speaker from

21 time to time. Until about the third

22 year, that should be out of my system.

23 When federal government does

24 not act, cities like New York, cities

25 like Seattle, and obviously our great

2 City of Philadelphia view addressing the
3 issue of retirement insecurity as a
4 neighborhood stabilization issue. We're
5 not talking about people who are not
6 working. We are talking about
7 private-sector workers. And in

9 ages 25 to 64, they work for an employer
10 that sponsors a plan compared to 53
11 percent nationwide. So in absence of a
12 federal solution, we are attempting to
13 address it here at the local level.

14 I want to note for the record
15 that while this action now moves over to
16 the Senate, we are working in a
17 bipartisan manner to communicate with our
18 Senate leadership. We will strongly
19 advocate that the Senate not support
20 these resolutions, and our task force
21 will continue its work.

22 We also ask, Mr. President, if
23 there is anyone who is watching and/or
24 paying attention to this effort and they
25 want to join our advocacy, to feel free

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilman.

24 Mr. Decker, please read that

6 The Chair again recognizes

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 (Aye.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 ayes have it, and this bill will be
19 placed on our First Reading Calendar for
20 today. Bill No. 170106 will be placed on
21 the First Reading Calendar at our next
22 session of Council.

23 That concludes the reports from
24 committee. The next order of business is
25 the consideration of the Calendar.

1 2/16/17 - STATED - BILLS ON 2ND READING

2 I note that the bills just
3 reported from committee have been deemed
4 to have had a first reading. These bills
5 will be placed on our Second Reading and
6 Final Passage Calendar at our next
7 session of Council.

8 As there are no additional
9 bills on the First Reading Calendar, the
10 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee for
11 the purpose of calling up resolutions and
12 bills on the Second Reading and Final
13 Passage Calendar today.

14 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
15 you, Mr. President. The following
16 resolutions and bills are being called up
17 from the Second Reading and Final Passage
18 Calendars today: Nos. 170115, 170117,
19 160687-AA. All other resolutions and
20 bills are being held.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you, sir.

23 Before considering the bills
24 and resolutions on the Final Passage
25 Calendar today, we will have our public

3 in testifying on a bill or resolution

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'd
25 ask that you please turn your cell phones

4 MR. OLAGBALA: My name is Diop
5 Olagbala. I'm a member of the Black is
6 Black Coalition as well as the Chair of
7 its Black Community Control of Police
8 Working Group, and I'm a concerned member
9 and citizen and a community member in the
10 City of Philadelphia, and we've come here
11 today to call on President Clarke and the
12 rest of City Council to adopt a
13 resolution that we have drafted on the
14 national scale --

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Are
16 you speaking on --

17 MR. OLAGBALA: -- of community
18 control of the police.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Excuse me one second, sir. Are you
21 speaking on the Land Bank bill? You
22 listed that you're speaking --

23 MR. OLAGBALA: I'm speaking on
24 the question of black community control
25 of the police.

1 2/16/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 That's not on the Calendar.

4 MR. OLAGBALA: That's all
5 right. That's what we speaking on.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
7 Yeah, but that's not on the Calendar
8 today.

9 MR. OLAGBALA: Okay.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
11 got to speak on --

12 MR. OLAGBALA: Well, this is
13 what I'm speaking on and it has a direct
14 relationship --

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
16 let me --

17 MR. OLAGBALA: -- to the
18 question of land grab --

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Let
20 me help you out. Let me help you out.
21 Start out by speaking on the bill on the
22 Calendar, and then if you figure out a
23 way within your three minutes to segue
24 into something else, but I ask that you
25 please adopt the guidelines. You said

2 you wanted to speak on the bill in the
3 Second District.

4 MR. OLAGBALA: I'm speaking on
5 all the bills really, because the
6 question of --

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
8 Speak on the bill.

9 MR. OLAGBALA: -- economic
10 development and other forms of public
11 policy being addressed in all the bills
12 that are on this paper being discussed
13 today have a direct relationship to the
14 question of the police, law enforcement,
15 and the economic development for the
16 African community, which our resolution
17 speaks to directly. And we're calling on
18 you as President of City Council and one
19 who has the ability to call the meeting
20 with one of your special committees,
21 perhaps Public Safety or any other
22 committee that you choose, to put this
23 bill directly on the agenda so that it
24 can be adopted by City Council.

25 I'm going to read the bill, and

2 I would like for people in the audience
3 to know that you can get a copy as well,
4 if you so choose.

5 This resolution by the City of
6 Philadelphia recognizing the right of the
7 black community to establish a Black
8 Community Control of Police Commission

10 black community.

11 Whereas, the black community of
12 Philadelphia has tired of the history of
13 terror and brutality imposed on black
14 people by the Philadelphia Police
15 Department;

16 Whereas, the demand for black
17 community control of police is a just and
18 democratic demand that addresses that
19 history as well as the contemporary
20 examples of police murder and misconduct
21 that have captured the attention of the
22 world since the August 9th, 2014 police
23 murder of Mike Brown in Ferguson,
24 Missouri and the resultant mass
25 resistance of the people;

2 Whereas, the history of police
3 terror and brutality has resulted in mass
4 incarceration of black people in the U.S.
5 which, like the public execution of black
6 people by police --

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir.

8 MR. OLAGBALA: -- destroys the
9 coherence and integrity of the entire
10 black community.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir.

12 MR. OLAGBALA: Whereas --

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
14 up. Sir, sir, sir.

15 (Microphone turned off.)

16 (Mr. Olagbala still reading.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
18 on. My man.

19 (Mr. Olagbala still reading.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
21 I'm going to ask you one more time.

22 (Mr. Olagbala still reading.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
24 let me ask you to do this. Let me ask
25 you to do this.

1 2/16/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 (Mr. Olagbala still reading.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: My
4 man, do me a favor, do me a favor.

5 (Mr. Olagbala talking without
6 microphone on.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: But
8 if you said earlier you wanted to have a
9 conversation and a sit-down, I'm prepared
10 to do that. So what I'd like you to do
11 is leave your name, your number where I
12 can reach out to you and we'll have that
13 sit-down and we'll discuss it. And then
14 if there's a specific issue that you
15 raise in the resolution, we can see if we
16 can get a Councilmember to introduce that
17 resolution so we can have a conversation
18 in this Chamber. Is that fair?

19 (Mr. Olagbala talking without
20 microphone on.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: But
22 you can't read all of that. I gave you
23 the time.

24 (Mr. Olagbala talking without
25 microphone on.)

1 2/16/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We
3 can talk about that in the meeting.

4 (Mr. Olagbala talking without
5 microphone on.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
7 asking you to give me your number so we
8 can have that conversation.

9 (Mr. Olagbala talking without
10 microphone on.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
12 offering you --

13 (Mr. Olagbala talking without
14 microphone on.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm
16 offering you that opportunity. Okay?

17 MR. OLAGBALA: When will that
18 be happening?

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If
20 you do what I ask you to do, if you leave
21 your name and a number where you can be
22 reached, we'll follow up and then we'll
23 have that discussion.

24 MR. OLAGBALA: When is the next
25 special Committee of Public Safety?

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,
3 I'm trying to accommodate you. You're
4 not going to disrupt the Council. Now,
5 I'm asking you to please leave your name

8 you. So can we do that? All right?

9 (Mr. Olagbala talking without
10 microphone on.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: My
12 man, you're not going to disrupt Council.
13 I'm sorry.

14 (Mr. Olagbala still talking.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Make
16 sure you leave your number and we'll
17 reach out.

18 (Mr. Olagbala still talking.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Leave your number. Just leave your
21 number. Okay?

22 Mr. Decker, please read the
23 next name.

24 (Mr. Olagbala still talking.)

25 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,

1 2/16/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 commenting on 160007, 160999, 160720,
3 161114, 170115, 170117.

4 (Mr. Olagbala still talking.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Come
6 on, man. You gotta go.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 MR. DANIHEL: This is an
9 official decree of mandamus quo warranto
10 and, as such, must be acted upon
11 immediately.

12 At this time, I am without my
13 private home at 1038 West Wyoming Avenue
14 due to egregious, outrageous, and lawless
15 actions and inactions of this Council and
16 other public servants.

17 I quote George Mason, delegate
18 to the Constitutional Conventional in
19 Philadelphia, "Can anyone be above the
20 law?"

21 Philadelphia government
22 officials claim they want to protect
23 everyone and anyone from predatory
24 government. As a government that has
25 allowed deed transfer without payment or

2 due process, Philadelphia is in fact a
3 predatory government. The law requires
4 immediate remedy of this breach of law.

5 42 USC 1982, 1983, 85, 86, 87,
6 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, oath of
7 office, PA Constitution Article I,
8 Sections 1 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703,
9 708, 709, 711, 712, and 716, among other
10 laws, appear violated and, as such,
11 require immediate prosecution and
12 punishment if convicted. There can be
13 only one law for everyone.

14 Millions of taxpayer dollars
15 may have been misused. I call again on
16 the federal and Commonwealth governments
17 to perform their constitutional
18 obligation to investigate and prosecute
19 all involved in the theft and illegal
20 deed transfer, deprivation of God-given
21 42 USC 1982 property rights for 23 years.
22 The Constitution requires immediate
23 remedy.

24 A just government must obey the
25 rule of law. This color of law

2 government must have its charter to
3 govern revoked until a constitutionally
4 compliant government is installed.

5 Public servants cannot refuse
6 their sworn duty any more than a fireman
7 can refuse to fight a fire. The
8 sovereign people of the United States
9 require the Constitution and laws to be
10 in force and this constitutional crisis
11 immediately resolved. Jail is required
12 for all who violate the oath of office
13 and law.

14 I remind Council, it takes a
15 lot of cooperation to create and allow
16 monumental corruption.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you for your testimony.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Denise Major,
20 commenting on National Caregivers Day
21 resolution introduced by Councilwoman Gym
22 today.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
25 morning.

2 MS. MAJOR: Good morning. My
3 name is Denise Major, and I want to first
4 and foremost thank you, Council, for at
5 least giving us some recognition as home
6 care workers.

7 To be a home care worker is a
8 very thankless job. It's a job whereas
9 we all never unite, but I'm so glad on my
10 left and on my right I have home care
11 workers that are standing right with me.

12 Home care workers are family,
13 and we all are family. We are sisters,
14 we are brothers, we are children, we are
15 adults, parents. And I want to thank you
16 guys for at least giving February the
17 17th as a day of recognition.

18 And first and foremost, I take
19 care of my son. I'm a back-up right now
20 as far as taking care of him. He got
21 shot in 2004 by a so-called friend that
22 found a gun, and it made my life change
23 drastically. I went from being a sheet
24 metal worker to have to come inside. So
25 I was about to make \$35 an hour and I had

2 to come inside making like \$10 an hour,
3 and that's a heck of a drop when you have
4 a child that does not have an income.

5 And he's grown, but he don't have income,
6 so the onus is on me. And for a home
7 care worker, there are eight people or
8 patients that need care to one home care
9 worker, and the problem arises in the
10 fact that we aren't making enough money
11 to be able to sustain people to stay in
12 the field to be able to care for us.

13 And I fight hard, and I'm going
14 to continue to fight, because I look at
15 all of us around this room. We have to
16 all stop and think. If we keep on
17 living, I might have to take care of you
18 or one of your friends or family may have
19 to take care of me. And I have to fight
20 to pave the way, and I think it's
21 something really serious, and I thank you
22 guys for at least acknowledging that we
23 are here, we have a voice and we do
24 exist, and that February 17th day will be
25 something that does pleasure to my heart

2 and I'm sure it does to our colleagues as
3 well.

4 And I thank the United Home
5 Care Workers for forming so that we can
6 have a union to be able to fight for what
7 we need and rightfully deserve, because
8 everyone else have benefits. Why
9 shouldn't we?

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Thank you very much for your testimony.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: There are no

16 Those opposed?

17 (No response.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 ayes have it. 170117 is adopted.

20 Mr. Decker, 160687-AA.

21 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
22 amending Title 6 of The Philadelphia
23 Code, entitled "Health," to require
24 disclosure of lead hazards, including
25 lead service lines, and making technical

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

11 Civil War and any war that America was
12 ever a participant in. That's the
13 ultimate sacrifice so this country can
14 live.

15 On a personal note, when my
16 father -- as the son of immigrants, I
17 know the story well. My father arrived
18 in 1930 from Germany, which was a
19 turbulent situation, with the Nazis about
20 to take control. He was a dishwasher at
21 the Benjamin Franklin Hotel. He served
22 there, and he worked his way up and
23 ultimately became head chef at the
24 Germantown Cricket Club.

25 My cousin, Heinz Taubenberger,

2 was literally a refugee from Germany. He
3 came to the United States in 1952. He
4 was immediately drafted in the United
5 States Army during the Korean conflict.
6 He served with distinction for over 25
7 years with two terms in Vietnam. He
8 ended as a Major.

9 I know firsthand the
10 participation that immigrants have given,
11 and I urge all Americans to take a look
12 at that and realize how important
13 immigration is into this country.

14 Thank you very much.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 On behalf of the majority, the
