17                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

18                  Chair thanks the gentleman.

19                  On behalf of the minority, the

20                  Chair recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

21                  COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,

22                  Mr. President. On behalf of the

23                  republicans, there are no requests for

24                  leave of absence.

25                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

3                     At this time, I would like to  
4           dispense with the regular order of  
5           business and I would like to thank

11          knowledgeable and I guarantee you much  
12          more pleasurable. So we hope that your

18                    At this time, the Chair  
19          recognizes Councilman Henon, who will  
20          present a resolution honoring Barney  
21          Boyce as Grand Marshal of the 247th  
22          Annual Saint Patrick's Day Parade. Would

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And

4           joining Councilman Henon, we have

5           Councilman O'Neill, Councilman Squilla,

6           and Councilman Taubenberger.

7                   (Bagpipes playing.)

8                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   I

9           think we should applaud that.

10                   (Applause.)

11                   (Woman singing.)

12                   (Applause.)

13                   (Gentleman singing.)

14                   (Applause.)

15                   COUNCILMAN HENON:   You may sit

16           down.   Thank you.

17                   So good morning.   Dia dhuit.

18           It is my honor to join all of you here

19           today with friends and family of the

20           Irish community, and I think we're all

21           Irish as we approach Saint Patrick's Day,

22           to honor our Grand Marshal of the 2017

23           Saint Patrick's Day Parade, Mr. Barney

24           Boyce.

25                   Before beginning to read the

2           resolution, I just want to say a few  
3           words, a few words of appreciation of the  
4           men and women who make the Saint  
5           Patrick's Day Parade such a success and  
6           the ceremonies that happen.

7                     First I'd like to thank our  
8           Parade Director, Michael Bradley.

9                     (Applause.)

10                    COUNCILMAN HENON: The parade  
11           does not happen without a great director  
12           such as we have here on the Saint  
13           Patrick's Day Parade as Michael Bradley.

14                    And our President of our Saint  
15           Patrick's Day Parade -- or Saint  
16           Patrick's Day Observance Committee, we  
17           all know Bill Ivers. Bill Ivers is a  
18           member of our City Council community. He  
19           is at all the ceremonies. He's at all of  
20           the groups. He freely gives his time  
21           like any other Board member, and he is in  
22           every single office of our City  
23           Councilmembers making sure that the show  
24           goes right. So let's hear it for our  
25           President, Bill Ivers.

3                   COUNCILMAN HENON: We have our  
4 bagpipers, Joe Tobin and Karen Boyce. I  
5 want to thank you for the lovely Irish  
6 National Anthem. And our own Judge Lynn  
7 for our National Anthem right here.

8                   To all our Board members, past  
9 and present, and our Ring of Honors, I  
10 want to welcome you and thank you.

11                   The theme of this year's Saint  
12 Patrick's Day Parade is: Saint Patrick,  
13 protect and guide our police officers.  
14 And I can say and I can think and we can  
15 speak for each other, all of us here,  
16 that we are continued grateful for all of  
17 their services that our men and women of  
18 our Police Department, many of whom are  
19 Irish Americans, who protect us on a  
20 daily basis.

21                   So let's hear it for our men  
22 and women and our theme for our parade.

23                   (Applause.)

24                   COUNCILMAN HENON: I'd also  
25 like to take a moment to recognize all

3           which are police officers of Irish  
4           American descent and those who serve our  
5           public, great public servants, whether  
6           they are police officers, whether they  
7           are in our Irish communities, in Family  
8           Court, and many, many other ways that we  
9           protect our citizens of the City of  
10          Philadelphia.

11                        So as we take our time today  
12           and over the next -- course of the next  
13           week to honor Saint Patrick and the  
14           history of the Irish, we would all do  
15           well to remember the impact that the  
16           Irish have had on the City of  
17           Philadelphia and indeed this nation.

18                        With that, it is my honor to  
19           recognize Barney Boyce as Grand Marshal  
20           of the 247th Annual Saint Patrick's Day  
21           Parade.

22                        Whereas

23                        COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:   Whereas,  
24           Barney Boyce was born and raised in  
25           Mallymore, Milford-County Donegal.   He

2           came to the United States in 1957 and was  
3           drafted into the U.S. Army the following  
4           year, serving in Germany until 1960; and

5                       Whereas, Barney and his wife  
6           Carmel married in 1965 and settled in  
7           Upper Darby. They raised 6 children in  
8           the environment of Irish culture, with  
9           Irish music and dance receiving the  
10          highest priority in their children's  
11          activities. Barney owned and operated  
12          his own roofing company to support his  
13          family, a job he held until his  
14          retirement in 2007; and

15                      COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,  
16          Barney and Carmel are extremely devoted  
17          members of the Irish community. They  
18          have dutifully served in a number of  
19          Irish organizations, including the long  
20          time membership in the Donegal  
21          Association of Philadelphia and as board  
22          members of the Commodore Barry Club.  
23          Barney has been a member of the Danny  
24          Browne AOH Division 80 for over 25 years;  
25          and

2                       Whereas, Barney and the Boyce  
3 family have been recognized for their  
4 contribution to the Irish Community,  
5 being inducted into the Delaware Valley  
6 Irish Hall of Fame in 2005 and honored by  
7 the Saint Patrick's Day Observance  
8 Association in their Ring of Honor in  
9 2009; and

10                      COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

11                      Whereas, Barney and Carmel's children and  
12 19 grandchildren -- that's a soccer team  
13 with a very deep bench -- carry on the  
14 tradition of Irish culture through music,  
15 dancing and sports, a reflection of  
16 Barney and Carmel's dedication to the  
17 Irish community that spans five decades;  
18 and

19                      Whereas, in addition to  
20 recognizing Barney's distinction as  
21 serving as Grand Marshal for this year's  
22 parade, the Ring of Honor this year will  
23 also include Jude Conroy, Gerard Dillon,  
24 John Dougherty, Sr., Robert Heenan,  
25 Michael Meehan, Thomas O'Donnell, and

2           Philadelphia Police Officers Patrick  
3           Boyle, Robert Hurst, James Lennox,  
4           William Maye, Edward Miller, Edward  
5           Monaghan, and Joseph Sullivan; now,  
6           therefore

7                        COUNCILMAN HENON: Therefore,  
8           point of personal privilege. That's  
9           Bobby Heenan with the Operator Engineers,  
10          not me. And I'd also like to recognize  
11          one of our Ring of Honors that we should  
12          all be proud of. Joe Sullivan, who is  
13          Chief Inspector, has just been risen to  
14          Deputy Police Commissioner.

15                       (Applause.)

16                       COUNCILMAN HENON: So,  
17          therefore, be it resolved that the  
18          Council of the City of Philadelphia, that  
19          we hereby honor and congratulate Barney  
20          Boyce as Grand Marshal of the 247th  
21          Annual Saint Patrick's Day Parade.

22                       Resolved further, that an  
23          engrossed copy of this resolution be  
24          presented to Barney Boyce, further  
25          evidencing the grateful appreciation and

3                    Congratulatory.

4                    (Applause.)

5                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And

6           the Chair recognizes Mr. Boyce for

7           remarks.

8                    MR. BRADLEY:   I'm not the Grand

9           Marshal.   Mr. President --

10                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   Yes,

11           sir.

12                   MR. BRADLEY:   -- members of

13           Council, thank you so much for this great

14           honor.   I'm the Parade Director for the

15           Philadelphia Saint Patrick's Day Parade.

16           It was started in 1771, five years before

17           this great country was founded right down

18           the street here at Independence Hall.   So

19           it's a tremendous honor for me to

20           represent the City of Philadelphia.

21                    And I'd like to thank our Board

22           members for all their hard work,

23           congratulate the Ring of Honor.   But I

24           have the opportunity to introduce our

25           Grand Marshal.   And with this great

2           national debate raging on about  
3           immigration, it's important to remember  
4           the contributions that these two fine  
5           immigrants made to our country, with six  
6           children, who are all here today and many  
7           of their 19 grandchildren.

8                        So I'd just like to say a few  
9           words about Barney. He came here in  
10          1957, but right away served in our Armed  
11          Forces, and that's pretty admirable.

12                       All our veterans in the room,  
13          please, how about saluting our veterans  
14          with a nice round of applause.

15                       (Applause.)

16                       MR. BRADLEY: He's been  
17          involved in over 40 boards in the last 60  
18          years. He's very involved with the Irish  
19          Center, which is right here in  
20          Philadelphia in the Mount Airy section of  
21          Philadelphia. He's involved with the  
22          Irish Immigration Center. I could go on  
23          and on with all the different things.  
24          Probably his favorite thing is the  
25          Donegal Association of Philadelphia.

2                   And one thing that we do, I've  
3 always seen Barney and Carmel together,  
4 so we're not going to honor just Barney  
5 Boyce. We're going to honor Barney and  
6 Carmel Boyce together.

7                   So, ladies and gentlemen, I  
8 give you the 2017 Grand Marshal of the  
9 Philadelphia Saint Patrick's Day, Mr. and  
10 Mrs. Barney and Carmel Boyce.

11                   (Applause.)

12                   MR. BOYCE: Well, first of all,  
13 I want to thank President Clarke and  
14 Councilman Henon for sponsoring this  
15 resolution today, and I'm highly honored,  
16 very grateful.

17                   As an immigrant from County  
18 Donegal, I came here 60 years ago and  
19 joined the -- I didn't join. I was  
20 drafted in the Army by Uncle Sam. I  
21 didn't know I had an uncle here called  
22 Sam, but I found out later I did, and he  
23 had a lot of nephews.

24                   Anyway, I'm very honored to be  
25 here accepting this award today, and

3           years to continue on my tradition and the  
4           tradition of the culture of Ireland and  
5           Philadelphia and the surrounding areas

5           for the consideration of your honorable  
6           body an ordinance amending Chapter 1-100  
7           of The Philadelphia Code, entitled  
8           "Definitions, Construction, Penalties and  
9           Enforcement," to authorize the Law  
10          Department to standardize the appearance,  
11          numbering and formatting of The  
12          Philadelphia Code without need for  
13          further Code amendment, all under certain  
14          terms and conditions.

15                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16          Mr. Decker, do you have any other  
17          messages?

18                      CHIEF CLERK: I have none,  
19          Mr. President.

20                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
21          Thank you very much.

22                      And the next order of business

10 of Girls in partnership with the Franklin  
11 Institute on the Occasion of the 3rd  
12 Annual STEM Conference, Sharing Solutions  
13 2017: Advancing Girls in STEM.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
15 Today's Calendar.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a  
17 non-privileged resolution urging the  
18 United States' Federal Trade Commission  
19 to delay the merger of the Rite Aid  
20 Corporation with Walgreens Boot Alliance  
21 until the impact of the merger is fully  
22 disclosed to the Citizens of  
23 Philadelphia.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
25 that will be on next week's Final Passage

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
11 Thank you, Councilman.

12 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance  
13 granting permission to Houston Small and  
14 Debra Wilson, owners and operators of  
15 Tasty Eats Food Truck located in the  
16 right-of-way on the east side of 13th  
17 Street between Norris Street and Diamond  
18 Street; and

19 An ordinance granting  
20 permission to Stephen Ngo, owner and  
21 operator of the Royal Tea Food Truck  
22 located in the right-of-way on the north  
23 side of Norris Street between 13th Street  
24 and Broad Street; and

25 An ordinance amending Chapter

2           1-100 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled  
3           "Definitions, Construction, Penalties and  
4           Enforcement," to authorize the Law  
5           Department to standardize the appearance,  
6           numbering and formatting of The  
7           Philadelphia Code without the need for  
8           further Code amendment.

9                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  And  
10           those three bills just read by the Chief  
11           Clerk will be referred to the appropriate  
12           committees.

13                   CHIEF CLERK:  And a  
14           non-privileged resolution authorizing the  
15           Commissioner of Public Property to  
16           execute and deliver to the Philadelphia  
17           Redevelopment Authority, without  
18           consideration, deeds conveying  
19           conditional fee simple title to certain  
20           City-owned lots or pieces of ground with  
21           the buildings and improvements thereon,  
22           situate in the Sixth Ward of the City of  
23           Philadelphia.

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  And  
25           that will be on next week's Final Passage

5                     COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
6           Mr. President. I have no bills or  
7           resolutions.

8                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
9           Thank you, Councilman.

10                    The Chair recognizes Councilman  
11           Jones.

12                    COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
13           Mr. President. Good morning. I have one  
14           bill co-sponsored by Councilman Johnson  
15           and now Councilman O'Neill.

16                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17           Thank you, Councilman.

18                    CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance  
19           amending Title 12 of The Philadelphia  
20           Code, entitled "Traffic Code," by  
21           amending Chapter 12-1200, entitled  
22           "Traffic Control Devices," to require a  
23           report, recommendation and appropriate  
24           safety improvements regarding hazardous  
25           intersections; and by amending Chapter

1           3/9/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS  
2           12-1400, entitled "Penalties and  
3           Procedure for Violations," to provide for  
4           a reward program.

5                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And  
6           that bill will be referred to the  
7           appropriate committee.

8                    The Chair recognizes Councilman  
9           Johnson.

10                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON:   Council  
11           President, I introduce one privileged  
12           resolution and one non-privileged  
13           resolution, one bill -- one resolution  
14           sponsored by Councilman Bobby Henon and  
15           would like to speak briefly on one of my  
16           resolutions, please.

17                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
18           Thank you, Councilman.

19                    CHIEF CLERK:   A privileged  
20           resolution honoring and recognizing the  
21           Deborah Grand Chapter of the Order of  
22           Eastern Star for its contributions to the  
23           City of Philadelphia and Commonwealth of  
24           Pennsylvania, and congratulating the  
25           Chapter for its 100th anniversary.

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3       Councilman, is that the resolution?

4                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: No.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
6       that will be on this week's Final Passage  
7       Calendar.

8                   CHIEF CLERK: And a  
9       non-privileged resolution urging the  
10      United States Congress to reject  
11      H.R. 785, also known as the National  
12      Right-to-Work Act, due to the  
13      legislation's negative impact on the  
14      ability of unions to bargain on behalf of  
15      working-class families.

16                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
17      Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

18                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
19      Council President. Most may or may not  
20      know that my dad recently retired after  
21      30 years serving in Local 332 Laborers  
22      District Council union, and through his  
23      service and his work, he has provided my  
24      family an opportunity to live a good  
25      quality of life growing up in Point

2           Breeze, South Philadelphia.

3                     And so today I'm introducing a  
4           resolution calling for the United States  
5           Congress to reject H.R. 785, also known  
6           as the National Right-to-Work Act, which  
7           will prevent employers and unions from  
8           entering into union security agreements.  
9           This legislation has a negative impact on  
10          unions' ability to advocate on behalf of  
11          working-class families.

12                    Unions are important to raising  
13          the standard of living for millions of  
14          hard-working citizens and their families.  
15          The power of collective bargaining has  
16          time and time again brought fair wages,  
17          better healthcare, improved workplace  
18          safety to workers, and transformed the  
19          relationship between employers and  
20          employees.

21                    The Right-to-Work legislation  
22          will allow non-union members to take  
23          advantage of the union-negotiated  
24          benefits without paying or repaying their  
25          share of the cost, disincentivizing union

2           membership. If unions lose the resources  
3           needed to stand up and negotiate for its  
4           workers, it undermines the essential role  
5           in protecting and uplifting working  
6           citizens in Philadelphia and across  
7           America.

8                         Thank you very much, Council  
9           President.

10                        (Applause.)

11                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
12           Thank you, Councilman. And that  
13           resolution will be on next week's Final  
14           Passage Calendar.

15                        The Chair recognizes

17                        COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank

3           solutions to stabilize and support these  
4           neighborhoods.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6           Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

7                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank  
8           you, Mr. President. As a former State  
9           Representative, Mr. President, for ten  
10          years and now as a member of this  
11          legislative body, I've long been an  
12          advocate for the issue of neighborhood  
13          preservation. We've often referred to it  
14          as neighborhoods that are on the tipping  
15          point. We can see them decline and/or be  
16          empowered and grow. But I'm now pleased  
17          to note for the record that academicians  
18          and other scholars and researchers have  
19          now defined these types of neighborhoods  
20          with the term "middle neighborhoods," and  
21          they are defined as areas that are not  
22          thriving enough to attract sustained  
23          private investment, yet not troubled  
24          enough to warrant concentrated public  
25          attention.

2                   Paul Brophy, who is the editor  
3 of a new book entitled "On the Edge:  
4 America's Middle Neighborhoods,"  
5 estimates that about 46 percent of  
6 Americans live in middle neighborhoods,  
7 and its contemporary Reinvestment Fund  
8 estimates that just about over 40 percent  
9 of Philadelphians live in these  
10 neighborhoods.

11                   And just for the record, I want  
12 to note that sort of Lawncrest, Lawndale,  
13 Tacony, West Oak Lane, Overbrook Park,  
14 and there are several other regions in  
15 the City would be categorized as middle  
16 neighborhoods.

17                   Some of the main challenges  
18 facing these neighborhoods are  
19 stabilization and housing preservation.  
20 In Philadelphia, for example, many of the  
21 residents of these neighborhoods have  
22 literally been consistent contributors to  
23 our tax base for decades, and yet many of  
24 them, particularly those who are at or  
25 near retirement, they no longer have

2           enough disposable income to make much  
3           needed home improvements.

4                     It will save us time, money,  
5           and effort if policy solutions focusing  
6           on preventing these neighborhoods from  
7           further decline are considered as opposed  
8           to waiting until they get further  
9           distressed and then we go looking for a  
10          cure.

11                    Several policy solutions  
12          already exist and thanks to your  
13          leadership, Mr. President, with the  
14          increase in the realty transfer tax and  
15          our efforts to try to use 60 percent of  
16          that to address the BSRP backlog and the  
17          \$40 million to be used in efforts to help  
18          many of these residents to make those  
19          home improvements.

20                    So I just wanted to give a  
21          special thanks to Paul Brophy and the  
22          Reinvestment Fund and to say that I agree  
23          that the time is now to raise awareness  
24          of middle neighborhoods. Reinvestment  
25          Fund has readily available data with

4                         MR. NORTON: Good afternoon.

5                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
6           afternoon.

7                         MR. NORTON: My name is Michael  
8           Norton. I'm the Chief Policy Analyst at  
9           Reinvestment Fund, and thank you very  
10          much for inviting me to comment on  
11          Councilwoman Parker's resolution and  
12          support the Philadelphia's middle  
13          neighborhoods.

14                         Roughly 46 percent of the  
15          nation's urban populations live in middle  
16          neighborhoods. These neighborhoods  
17          typically receive little or no attention  
18          from mayors, city managers, and local  
19          housing officials, in part because they  
20          are not distressed enough to qualify for  
21          federal Community Development Block Grant  
22          funds and because financially stressed  
23          local governments seldom allocate tax  
24          dollars to neighborhood improvement  
25          strategies. And yet it is not possible

2           to overstate the importance of these  
3           neighborhoods as places that provide  
4           quality homes for many individuals and  
5           families, support a substantial portion  
6           of the local property tax revenues, and  
7           that are also susceptible to decline if  
8           steps are not taken to support them.

9                       Over the past two decades,  
10          Reinvestment Fund has conducted in-depth  
11          studies of local real estate markets in  
12          over three dozen cities across the  
13          country. These studies are designed to  
14          help local governments strategically  
15          allocate scarce public resources across a  
16          range of different neighborhood types,  
17          from the most distressed to the most  
18          vibrant.

19                      In the legacy cities we've done  
20          this work, there are a number of common  
21          features that generally represent middle  
22          neighborhoods. There are homes that are  
23          a significant portion of these cities'  
24          population. They are reasonably  
25          affordable to people with middle incomes.

2           They are racially and ethnically diverse.  
3           Their residents are also relatively well  
4           educated.

5                         Real estate markets in  
6           Philadelphia's middle neighborhoods  
7           reflect a mix of stability and ongoing  
8           challenges. The majority of people  
9           purchasing homes in middle neighborhoods  
10          do so with FHA insured mortgages.  
11          Foreclosures remain elevated, but  
12          substantially below the recession peaks.  
13          An increasing number of residents rely on  
14          Housing Choice vouchers to supplement  
15          their rent. Affordability in these areas  
16          remain stable, but renters experience  
17          elevated rates of eviction compared to  
18          citywide levels.

19                        In Philadelphia, registered  
20          voters' party affiliation in middle  
21          neighborhoods is similar to that of the  
22          City overall, and what can be considered  
23          as frequent voters are most often found  
24          in these middle neighborhoods.

25                        Examples of middle

2           neighborhoods in Philadelphia include  
3           East Mount Airy, Burholme, East and West  
4           Oak Lane, Rhawnhurst, Germantown, Olney,  
5           Mayfair, Tacony, and Wynnefield. Like  
6           many neighborhoods throughout the  
7           country, these neighborhoods face a  
8           number of challenges related to ongoing  
9           sociodemographic and economic conditions  
10          throughout the region. These  
11          neighborhoods are in the middle, but the  
12          middle class throughout the country is  
13          shrinking. This shrinking contributes to  
14          observable patterns of economic  
15          segregation that concentrate increasing  
16          numbers of higher income and lower income  
17          residents in smaller spaces while middle  
18          neighborhoods face increasing pressure  
19          from above and below.

20                        Without clear space in public  
21          policy investment conversations, the  
22          future of middle neighborhoods as an  
23          opportunity -- as areas of opportunity is  
24          in doubt. Cities ignore their middle  
25          neighborhoods at their own peril. Unless

2           policymakers recognize and act to  
3           maintain the quality of life and  
4           stability in these areas, residents may  
5           well leave because their economic  
6           wherewithal allows them to find those  
7           opportunities elsewhere.

8                     Thank you.

9                     COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

10                    Clerk, can you read our next  
11           speaker, please.

12                    CHIEF CLERK: Andrew Frishkoff,  
13           commenting on Councilwoman Parker's  
14           resolution introduced today on middle  
15           neighborhoods.

16                    (Witness approached podium.)

17                    MR. FRISHKOFF: Good morning.

18           My name is Andy Frishkoff. I'm the  
19           Director of Philadelphia LISC, Local  
20           Initiative Support Corporation. Thank  
21           you for the opportunity. Thank you,  
22           Councilwoman Parker, for introducing the  
23           resolution.

24                    Philadelphia's middle  
25           neighborhoods are often very strong

2           civically. LISC tends to work with  
3           community development corporations. We  
4           work in these neighborhoods as well as  
5           lower income neighborhoods, but one thing  
6           you often find is that the community  
7           development capacity is not always there,  
8           and so the ability for you to support  
9           initiatives is sometimes hampered.

10                    But I want to point out a  
11           number of things that are already in  
12           place that can be knit together and  
13           supported by this body and by the  
14           Administration that can help support  
15           these neighborhoods.

16                    The Councilwoman referenced the  
17           new proposed home repair initiative, and  
18           anything we can do to increase access to  
19           loans for homeowners and for our good  
20           landlords in these communities is  
21           essential for stabilizing those  
22           properties. But there are also things  
23           that private sector can do.

24                    Jumpstart Germantown is an  
25           excellent model that can work in

2 neighborhoods where there isn't  
3 necessarily a community development  
4 corporation and where private sector can  
5 partner with civic groups to make sure  
6 that vacant homes are renovated and  
7 brought back to the market. And I know  
8 that there will be hearings on Jumpstart,  
9 thanks to Councilman Green, later this  
10 spring.

11 I also want to point out the  
12 civic activity through Citizens Planning  
13 Institute. That can be fostered and  
14 strengthened to make sure that middle  
15 neighborhoods have strong community  
16 organizations and where there have often  
17 been longtime members who have been  
18 leading those civics, there are  
19 possibilities of training new, younger  
20 residents. And many of these  
21 neighborhoods are experiencing  
22 demographic change, and if we want these  
23 neighborhoods to stay strong, we have to  
24 support existing residents, but we also  
25 have to recognize that these are

2           neighborhoods where immigrants are  
3           welcome and where we need to make sure  
4           that we strengthen and open our arms to  
5           all the residents, both new and old.

6                     And then I want to point out  
7           that efforts of civic groups like the  
8           Friends of Neighborhood Education who are  
9           working, again, very often in middle  
10          neighborhoods, they need support. They  
11          need strength. They're still a fledgling  
12          group. But if we want to support  
13          neighborhoods, we have to look at the  
14          neighborhood schools.

15                    Thankfully, I think we're all  
16          excited by the prospect of Rebuild that  
17          soon will come. Rebuild on the one hand  
18          is an excellent opportunity to repair the  
19          civic assets in these neighborhoods, but  
20          it's also an opportunity to build the  
21          capacity of those civic groups, whether  
22          it's the Friends of the Library, the  
23          Friends of the Park or the active  
24          neighborhood civic groups. This is an  
25          opportunity to make sure that they stand

2           strong with you and with the  
3           Administration in preserving our  
4           libraries, our parks, our recreation  
5           centers.

6                        So I know my time is running  
7           short and there will be many other  
8           opportunities for us to talk further, but  
9           I just want to point out you have a  
10          number of things already in place here in  
11          Philadelphia. What we need to do  
12          together is strengthen them, knit them  
13          together, and help preserve our  
14          neighborhoods.

15                       Thank you.

16                       COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you  
17          for your testimony.

18                       Clerk, would you please read  
19          our next speaker.

20                       CHIEF CLERK: Kathy Fisher,  
21          commenting on Councilwoman Gym's  
22          resolution introduced today on Breakfast  
23          Resolution Day.

24                       (Witness approached podium.)

25                       MS. FISHER: Good morning. My

2           name is Kathy Fisher. I'm the Policy  
3           Director at the Coalition Against Hunger.  
4           Thank you for the opportunity to speak  
5           with you today about a critical, yet  
6           underutilized support for student health  
7           and learning, school breakfast.

8                     Decades of research has shown  
9           that school breakfast helps to increase  
10          standardized test scores, concentration,  
11          memory, and the amount of vitamins and  
12          minerals in a student's diet. It's been  
13          shown to reduce tardiness, absenteeism,  
14          behavioral issues, hyperactivity, and  
15          trips to the school nurse.

16                    Considering both District and  
17          charter schools, there are over 100  
18          schools in the City reaching more than 70  
19          percent of their students who participate  
20          in lunch with school breakfast. This  
21          week we celebrate the success of those  
22          schools and their ability to overcome  
23          obstacles to ensure that students have  
24          access to school breakfast.

25                    However, we also know that

2           there are many schools that lag far  
3           behind. More than 100 District and  
4           charter schools are on the other end of  
5           the spectrum, reaching less than half of  
6           the students who participate in school  
7           lunch with school breakfast. And this is  
8           at a time when large districts across  
9           America are making improvements in  
10          breakfast participation.

11                     In FRAC's "School Breakfast:  
12          Making it Work in Large Districts" report  
13          released last month, the School District  
14          of Philadelphia ranked 44th out of the  
15          nation's 73 largest school districts,  
16          reaching 60 percent of students who  
17          participate in school lunch with school  
18          breakfast. This is a respectable 60  
19          percent, but it masks the fact that the  
20          high participation schools bring up the  
21          average for the many schools that are not  
22          making breakfast accessible to their  
23          students.

24                     The disparities in the number  
25          of children eating breakfast can be

2           attributed to how school breakfast is  
3           served and when. Schools that require  
4           students to arrive early and eat only in  
5           the cafeteria routinely have lower  
6           participation than those that make  
7           breakfast part of the day and that  
8           utilize effective service models, like  
9           Breakfast in the Classroom, Grab-n-Go,  
10          and Second Chance.

11                        This is why we're launching the  
12          Philadelphia School Breakfast Challenge  
13          to encourage schools to learn from the  
14          ones that are doing well, evaluate what  
15          models will work best for them, and  
16          implement new approaches in September of  
17          2017.

18                        So we encourage all  
19          Councilmembers who have a relationship  
20          with schools in their district to  
21          encourage them to look at their breakfast  
22          programs and see how they can improve,  
23          because Philadelphia students deserve all  
24          the support they can get, and school  
25          breakfast is one of them.

2                   As a city, we must continue to  
3           make progress and make sure all our  
4           students start the day with the nutrition  
5           they need to learn.

6                   Thank you. And thank you to  
7           Councilwoman Gym for introducing the  
8           resolution.

9                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.  
10                   Clerk, our next speaker,  
11           please.

12                   CHIEF CLERK: Trecia Gibson,  
13           commenting on Councilwoman Gym's National  
14           School Breakfast Week resolution  
15           introduced today.

16                   (Witnesses approached witness  
17           table.)

18                   MS. GIBSON: Good morning. My  
19           name is Trecia Gibson and I'm a junior at  
20           Parkway West High School, and this is  
21           Zaire White and he's a sophomore at  
22           Parkway West High School.

23                   I just want to start off by  
24           saying good morning and thank you for  
25           this amazing resolution.

2                   School breakfast is very  
3           important, because we are in school and  
4           breakfast help us get our day started.  
5           If we have breakfast in the morning, we  
6           will have the energy to get through the  
7           day.

8                   We are encouraging all to eat  
9           breakfast in the morning and get the  
10          nutrients that are needed. This  
11          opportunity for us is very important  
12          because we are young entrepreneurs who  
13          are running a business named Rebel  
14          Ventures and we have been working with  
15          the School District to come up with a  
16          breakfast product to be in schools  
17          throughout Philadelphia. This is a very  
18          unique and great experience for myself to  
19          be able to be a part of creating products  
20          to be in schools and I am still enrolled  
21          in school.

22                   This breakfast product is  
23          called Rebel Crumbles. So we are  
24          encouraging all to be in breakfast in the  
25          morning and have a healthy meal.

5           Clerk, our next speaker,

8           CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,

11           (Witness approached podium.)

12           MR. DANIHEL: Yes. This is an  
13 official decree and writ of mandamus quo  
14 warranto and, as such, requires immediate  
15 reaction and remedy.

16           The rule of law keeps  
17 civilization civilized. The rule of law  
18 requires prosecution of any law that  
19 appears to be violated.

20           All must follow the law. As  
21 George Mason, delegate to the  
22 Constitutional Convention asked, Can  
23 anyone be above the law?

24           The path of lawlessness, the  
25 stealing of my home, and denial of due

2           process disrespects the numerous  
3           sacrifices of patriots and veterans  
4           alike. Veterans fight for a flag and the  
5           Constitution, not the elected monarchy.

6                       Public servants have taken the  
7           sworn oath to obey laws and govern by the  
8           consent of the government. The law  
9           requires immediate remedy of this breach  
10          of law.

11                      42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
12          1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, oath  
13          of office, PA Constitution, Article I,  
14          Sections 1 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703,  
15          708, 709, 711, 712, 716 and other laws  
16          listed in SCOTUS 15-8965 and other  
17          lawsuits appear violated and, as such,  
18          require immediate prosecution of all  
19          involved.

20                      There can only be one law. I  
21          again call upon the federal and  
22          Commonwealth governments to perform their  
23          constitutional obligations to investigate  
24          and prosecute all involved in the theft  
25          and illegal deed transfer of my home,

2           1038 West Wyoming. The denial of  
3           God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for  
4           23 years is egregious, extraordinary,  
5           oath violating, and requires immediate  
6           remedy.

7                     A just government must obey the  
8           rule of law. This color of law  
9           government must have its Charter to  
10          govern revoked until a constitutionally  
11          compliant government is installed.

12                    Public servants cannot refuse  
13          their sworn duty to act any more than a  
14          fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
15          sovereign people of the United States  
16          require the laws and Constitution be  
17          enforced and this constitutional crisis  
18          to be immediately resolved. Jail is  
19          required for all who violated their oath  
20          or laws.

21                    It takes a lot of cooperation  
22          to create and allow monumental  
23          corruption.

24                    COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you

10   recognizing and commending Patrick  
11   Blessington for his distinguished service  
12   to the City of Philadelphia as a  
13   Prosecutor in the Office of the District  
14   Attorney, introduced by Councilman Oh.

15           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   The  
16   Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

17           COUNCILMAN OH:   Yes.   May I be  
18   heard on this matter?

19           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20   Absolutely, sir.

21           COUNCILMAN OH:   Thank you very  
22   much.

23                   Council President, last week I  
24   was looking at an article online and  
25   something caught my eye at the bottom of

1           3/9/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           the page, and it was entitled "Among Porn  
3           Scandal Casualties: Four Who Didn't Send  
4           a Single E-Mail." It was an article  
5           written and published November 23rd of  
6           last year, 2016, by Craig McCoy and  
7           Angela Couloumbis. Well, I hope I  
8           pronounced that wrong -- correctly, but  
9           Couloumbis, I think.

10                    Anyway, the article states that  
11           two years ago, then-Attorney General  
12           Kathleen Kane staged one of the most  
13           unusual public gatherings in the history  
14           of Harrisburg. She summoned reporters to  
15           a room to examine pornographic e-mails  
16           found on her agency's computers and named  
17           eight officials. The impact was swift  
18           and nasty. Reputations were tarnished.  
19           Five people lost their jobs. Careers  
20           were thrown off track.

21                    On Tuesday, Kane's successor,  
22           Attorney General Bruce Beemer, said Kane  
23           had been on the wrong side -- or had been  
24           wrong to single out eight, when hundreds  
25           of government workers had received

2           offensive e-mails, including more than  
3           350 in her agency alone. And as it  
4           turned out, her sister, a high-ranking  
5           officer in the Attorney General's, had  
6           not only received but forwarded and sent  
7           these e-mails.

8                     After Beemer's remarks, Mark W.  
9           Tanner, a lawyer for several of these  
10          men, criticized Kane and said that her  
11          misinformation was accepted at face value  
12          when distributed by Kane and her  
13          operatives for political retribution.

14                    The follow-up investigation  
15          found that there was a core group of 38  
16          former and current officials who were  
17          identified as high volume senders who had  
18          sent 50 or more troubling e-mails outside  
19          the agency. Of the eight named by Kane,  
20          none of them were in this high volume  
21          group. In particular, three of them,  
22          including Patrick Blessington, did not  
23          originate or forward a single troubling  
24          e-mail.

25                    The issue had gained a lot of

2           attention. We ended up with what we  
3           have. The Attorney General has been  
4           prosecuted. Two Supreme Court Justices  
5           have stepped down. As the investigation  
6           found, 350 members of her office had  
7           received, forwarded, sent these e-mails,  
8           which were and are troubling.

9                     Justice should be fair, and Pat  
10          Blessington has been a career public  
11          servant, very respected for his work and  
12          his fairness, and his reputation as one  
13          of three people in this city has been  
14          tarnished to an unjust level.

15                    I introduced this resolution to  
16          recognize his good work. Let me say  
17          people have asked me what is my  
18          relationship with Patrick Blessington. I  
19          don't hang out with him. I hardly see  
20          him. I worked with him for about two and  
21          a half years, in 1986 and '87 and part of  
22          1988.

23                    I know Pat Blessington to be a  
24          very decent person, a very quiet person,  
25          a methodical, hard-working person who

2           spent many weekends, holidays, and late  
3           nights working on his cases. I know him  
4           to be a person who has spent money out of  
5           his pocket to help victims of crime. I  
6           know that he put on the Santa Claus suit  
7           to go into poor African American  
8           neighborhoods to hand out toys. And I  
9           know him, above all, to be a person who I  
10          respect, because there is a very  
11          important principle in the prosecutor's  
12          office and, that is, prosecutors should  
13          not be persecutors. And so a prosecutor  
14          has an ability when the evidence shows  
15          that there is not a reasonable cause of  
16          action to null prosee the case, even  
17          against their supervisors' wishes that  
18          they should move forward and prosecute.  
19          Patrick Blessington is a person who if  
20          the evidence shows that there should not  
21          be a prosecution, he will not move  
22          forward on a baseless case.

23                        For that reason, I do submit  
24                        this resolution, and I thank you very  
25                        much.

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2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3           Thank you, Councilman.

4                   The Chair recognizes

5           Councilwoman Gym.

6                   COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you  
7           very much, Council President. You know,  
8           as all of us who hold higher an elected  
9           office, we understand the context and  
10          nature of our responsibilities and the  
11          role, most importantly, that we play in  
12          the very public eye.

13                   This scandal involving these  
14          communications that were all over the  
15          state department involved attorneys and  
16          judges and included their female staff,  
17          and they were shocking, to say the least.  
18          They violated the public trust and they  
19          certainly compromise the integrity of  
20          those who were either receiving or  
21          passing them along. And in the face of  
22          those kinds of harassing types of things,  
23          men simply cannot remain silent or  
24          passive when faced with such e-mails that  
25          came through. They have to speak up.

2           People have to push back. Otherwise,  
3           these behaviors persist, as they  
4           persisted in the state as long as they  
5           did, and they are being tacitly endorsed  
6           by those who stayed silent when those  
7           things happen.

8                         I would have loved to have seen  
9           a resolution for the women who are  
10          negatively impacted by the horrible  
11          pornography e-mails that went around, and  
12          I would have loved to have seen a  
13          resolution or a statement from these men  
14          who publicly denounced it and what they  
15          could have done to combat what  
16          essentially became a deeply destructive  
17          and hostile work environment. But we  
18          didn't, and thus I am unable to support  
19          this resolution.

20                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21          Thank you, Councilwoman.

22                         The Chair recognizes Councilman  
23          Jones.

24                         COUNCILMAN JONES: I agree with  
25          my colleague who said men can't be

2           silent. I don't think we should reward  
3           behavior that you should do anyway. You  
4           should not be sexist. You should not  
5           persecute through prosecution. You  
6           should not do those things. And to say  
7           that somehow even if it was just about an  
8           individual doing the right thing, that  
9           they should be recognized in a Council  
10          resolution.

11                    This morning I come into my  
12          office, my legislative aide is in tears,  
13          in tears. Having a good feeling about  
14          the Women's Day celebrations and honoring  
15          power in women, only to be crushed by  
16          having to bring to me a resolution  
17          honoring someone allegedly that had  
18          dishonored women. Even if they are  
19          innocent, you don't need a proclamation  
20          to say I'm innocent. Just go about being  
21          the enlightened male that you should be.

22                    So I want to thank my female  
23          colleagues, Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,  
24          Cherelle Parker, Jannie Blackwell, Maria  
25          Quinones-Sanchez, Cindy Bass, Helen Gym,

2           for keeping this body of enlightened men  
3           and making sure that as sometimes we can  
4           be offensive, we are corrected. As men,  
5           we can be knowingly offensive and  
6           sometimes as men we can be unknowingly  
7           offensive, but enlightened men make the  
8           conscious decision to know the difference  
9           from right and wrong and act accordingly.

10                    There are those who know that  
11           they are offensive and say and perform  
12           rude acts, like catcalling, like  
13           referring to women as honey or baby. And  
14           then there are those who do not know they  
15           are being offensive because of their  
16           unfamiliarity with women's values. That  
17           is an evolving thing. But once we know  
18           that you're being offensive to any group,  
19           we should make a conscious choice to hold  
20           ourselves accountable to that knowledge  
21           and grow.

22                    The evolution of growth of men  
23           is driven by the knowledge and awareness  
24           obtained from women in their lives.

25                    So I will not be supporting

2           that resolution.

3                       (Applause.)

4                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5           Thank you, Councilman.

6                       The Chair recognizes

7           Councilwoman Bass.

8                       COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,

9           Mr. President. Let me start by saying

10          David Oh is my good friend, but I will

11          not be supporting his resolution either.

12          And I did have an opportunity to speak

13          with the Councilman about it. And, you

14          know, we all make decisions. We all have

15          an opportunity to decide where we're

16          going to be on the side of history and

17          whether we're going to be on the right

18          side or the wrong side of history, and I

19          think that this particular person has

20          made his decisions along the way by

21          choosing not to speak out.

22                       And it doesn't matter that you

23          did not send an e-mail. It doesn't

24          matter that you were only a recipient.

25          The e-mails were so offensive -- I viewed

2           them. They were so beyond just being  
3           sexist. They were racist, they were  
4           homophobic, and there's just no place for  
5           this kind of material to be circulating.

6                     You know, no matter what you  
7           think of Kathleen Kane, I have to say  
8           that if it was not for her and her  
9           actions, we would know absolutely nothing  
10          about what has been happening in these  
11          offices for years. This isn't something  
12          that just happened that she stumbled  
13          across one or two e-mails. There were  
14          hundreds of e-mails that were actually  
15          circulated.

16                    And so I just wanted to lend my  
17          voice to my colleagues that have decided  
18          not to support this particular resolution  
19          and say that this is not I think  
20          something that's appropriate for this  
21          body.

22                    Thank you, Mr. President.

23                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24          Thank you, Councilwoman.

25                    The Chair recognizes

2           Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

3                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
4           Mr. President. It's 2017, and the sad  
5           news is that we have to have this type of  
6           debate in a legislative body.

7                   For those of us who are  
8           mothers, we need to underscore. For  
9           those of us who are fathers of girls, we  
10          need to put what Councilman Jones has  
11          said in capital letters. For those of us  
12          who care about women being treated in a  
13          respectable, honorable mention,  
14          everything that has been said needs to  
15          have 15,000 exclamation points behind it.

16                   It's a sad day when we have to  
17          have a debate in a legislative body about  
18          the conduct that has been referred to.

19                   And so as a mother of a  
20          20-year-old, I will not be supporting  
21          this resolution.

22                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
23          Thank you, Councilwoman.

24                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
25          Johnson.

2                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
3 Council President.

4                   Council President, Dr. King  
5 once said, In the end, we will remember  
6 not the words of our enemies, but the  
7 silence of our friends.

8                   I will be voting no on this  
9 resolution.

10                  Thank you, Council President.

11                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
14 Oh.

15                  COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
16 much. The actions that were committed by  
17 hundreds of government officials was  
18 shocking and problematic, including  
19 supervisors, high court members, their  
20 staffs and others. However, the face of  
21 that activity was placed upon a person  
22 who did the minimal and may not have done  
23 more, we don't know, simply receiving  
24 e-mails. And I would say that when I saw  
25 the article, I was surprised, because you

2           can go through pages of Google and read  
3           all kinds of untrue statements about what  
4           his conduct was. And this article I  
5           appreciate, whether it registers or not  
6           with anybody else, that clarifies that  
7           his conduct was -- his computer received  
8           e-mails and he has been unjustly  
9           vilified, in my opinion. And I am  
10          pleased at any time to have this  
11          opportunity regardless of the outcome to  
12          let people know that he is a good person,  
13          a good professional, and a good public  
14          servant.

15                    I will also say for those who  
16                    are upset, you should have something to  
17                    be upset about. Don't turn to facts and  
18                    make it fit the claim. And if you'd like  
19                    to continue to vilify the person, he is  
20                    not able to defend himself. Every one of  
21                    us elected officials have been vilified  
22                    in one sense or another, but we're public  
23                    officials and we can defend ourselves.

24                    So we'll take the vote. I  
25                    certainly appreciate everybody's opinion.

2           I respect your opinion. This is my  
3           opinion and I stand by it.

4                     Thank you.

5                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6           Thank you, Councilman.

7                     The Chair recognizes Councilman

9                     COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
10          Council President. I respect Councilman  
11          Oh's right to have an opinion. However,  
12          I disagree with the resolution and will  
13          not be supporting it.

14                    I served as both a prosecutor  
15          here in the District Attorney's Office  
16          and also in the Attorney General's  
17          Office, and someone that has that  
18          responsibility as a prosecutor to  
19          represent the citizens of the  
20          jurisdiction where they live to do  
21          justice, regardless if that person just  
22          received information, and as a member of  
23          the Bar, they have a responsibility, from  
24          my perspective as a prosecutor, to uphold  
25          justice, to report and provide

2           information to those, even if they just  
3           received information. And from my  
4           perspective, when someone decides to take  
5           an oath to be a member of the Bar and  
6           even more to be a prosecutor, if they  
7           receive information that is not right,  
8           not forthcoming and that taints not only  
9           the office and also taints their role as  
10          a prosecutor, regardless if they  
11          forwarded information or did not, just by  
12          receiving that information they, in my  
13          eyes, have a responsibility to make a  
14          statement and to inform others about that  
15          information and say the wrongdoing that  
16          has occurred.

17                        So based on that perspective, I  
18                        will not be supporting this resolution.

19                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20                        Thank you, Councilman.

21                        The Chair recognizes Councilman  
22                        Domb.

23                        COUNCILMAN DOMB: I want to  
24                        also mention that I'll be voting no, but  
25                        I also don't think this is productive for

2           us as City Councilmembers to go any  
3           further in this conversation. So we can  
4           either have a vote and just move on and  
5           end this discussion.

6                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7           Thank you, Councilman.

8                        The Chair recognizes Councilman  
9           Oh.

10                      COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
11           much. I appreciate everyone's opinions.  
12           I appreciate the very high standards that  
13           have been enunciated. Apparently not  
14           standards that 350 people in the Attorney  
15           General's Office were able to hold up.

16                      Certainly all of them bear the  
17           responsibility as much as any individual  
18           and more so. And I do think there is an  
19           issue that is important and, that is,  
20           that when we as public officials lay  
21           blame upon others, it should be fair and  
22           even-handed. There is a principle in law  
23           and, that is, that if a person commits a  
24           similar criminal action, the punishments  
25           should be the same. The mercy should be

2           the same. And that puts into perspective  
3           what the action is or was, and certainly  
4           all of that is taken in consideration of  
5           all that they have contributed or failed  
6           to contribute.

7                        So with that, I move for the  
8           adoption of the resolution.

9                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10          Thank you.

11                        Is there a second?

12                        (Duly seconded.)

13                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
14          been moved and properly seconded.

15                        All those in favor of the  
16          resolution say aye.

17                        COUNCILMAN OH: Aye.

18                        COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Aye.

19                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All  
20          those opposed?

21                        (No.)

22                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
23          resolution fails. Thank you very much.

24                        Mr. Decker --

25                        CHIEF CLERK: There are no

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5                   Thank you very much.

6                   Are there any speeches on the  
7                   part of the minority?

8                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
9                   Oh.

10                  COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
11                  much. We just debated a resolution.  
12                  It's probably not the most important  
13                  thing to Philadelphians. But I would  
14                  like to say that we did hold a hearing  
15                  about the City's loss of control over the  
16                  very important functions of online [sic]  
17                  parking, which is the Parking Authority.  
18                  That is not to say that the Parking  
19                  Authority should not and is not or should  
20                  not continue to operate online parking.  
21                  It's a question of whether Harrisburg  
22                  controls online parking in Philadelphia  
23                  or whether Philadelphians control online  
24                  parking -- on-street parking in  
25                  Philadelphia.

2                   The issue in that matter is  
3                   unresolved because the Law Department  
4                   issued a memorandum stating that the City  
5                   did not have the ability to regain its  
6                   control. I did dispute that and have  
7                   provided in 25 slides in layman's terms  
8                   why the City is able to control the  
9                   Parking Authority and why it is  
10                  prohibited under the Pennsylvania  
11                  Constitution to have the state take the  
12                  revenues off the streets of Philadelphia  
13                  and in part send them to other parts of  
14                  this Commonwealth.

15                  At a time when state funding is  
16                  being reduced and is being threatened to  
17                  be reduced and where it appears that  
18                  there's more interest in taking revenues  
19                  off the streets of Philadelphia and  
20                  sending them around the county, I think  
21                  it is important, as was raised by  
22                  Councilwoman Gym and Councilman Derek  
23                  Green, that the Parking Authority appear  
24                  before the Law and Government Committee  
25                  chaired by Councilman Bill Greenlee.

2                   They failed to appear, and we have called  
3                   upon them to make their appearance, as  
4                   well as the Streets Department. And I  
5                   have met with the City Solicitor,  
6                   explained my position, and invited them  
7                   to respond. I certainly said that if you  
8                   can show me that I am wrong under the  
9                   law, I will be the first person to  
10                  happily tell them I am wrong. By the  
11                  same token, if you cannot defend your  
12                  position, I'd like to know from you that  
13                  we are able to move forward in the City's  
14                  ability to control and regain control of  
15                  this important street function.

16                  If we were collecting the  
17                  revenues of the Parking Authority, I'm  
18                  not sure we would need to do four real  
19                  estate increases and a cigarette tax and  
20                  possibly not even have a soda tax. And  
21                  as we look down at more taxes and more  
22                  fee increases, I certainly invite the  
23                  Parking Authority, the Streets  
24                  Department, and the Law Department to  
25                  come to the next hearing to present their

2                   case to the public.

3                   Thank you.

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5                   Thank you, Councilman.

6                   On behalf of the majority, the  
7                   Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

8                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
9                   Council President. Earlier this week,  
10                  myself and Chairman of Public Safety,  
11                  Councilman Jones, held a hearing on the  
12                  negative impact of certain fees and fines  
13                  on families who are poor who have  
14                  children going through the juvenile  
15                  justice system. With the support of  
16                  Councilwoman Helen Gym, Councilman Derek  
17                  Green, Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell, we  
18                  were able to outlaw the practice with the  
19                  Department of Human Services of charging  
20                  poor families for the cost of juveniles  
21                  going through the juvenile justice  
22                  system, and that was a big win and the  
23                  first step towards making sure that the  
24                  City of Philadelphia doesn't become  
25                  Ferguson where we're balancing the budget

2           of the City of Philadelphia on the backs  
3           of poor families and juveniles going  
4           through the system.

5                   We want to hold our young  
6           people accountable and supporting them  
7           when they make bone-headed decisions, but  
8           nevertheless, we don't want to penalize  
9           them with a lifelong of poor credit or  
10          going through the juvenile justice system  
11          only for the simple fact that their  
12          parents can't pay the fines.

13                   Just to give you an example,  
14          you had one dad who decided to put his  
15          son through the adult juvenile system,  
16          let him be charged as an adult, because  
17          he couldn't take on the actual fine, the  
18          restitution if his son would be charged  
19          as a juvenile.

20                   And so we thank the Department  
21          of Human Services, Commissioner Figueroa,  
22          for working in partnership with us but,  
23          most importantly, we as a unit in this  
24          body held DHS accountable, nevertheless,  
25          to take a look at this issue, because I

2                   know in other parts of Pennsylvania,  
3                   there were some judges who were profiting  
4                   off of putting young people through the  
5                   juvenile justice system.

6                   And so this is just the first  
7                   step, and we will continue looking at the  
8                   process while certainly making sure that  
9                   our young people get the support  
10                  necessary that they need as juveniles,  
11                  but we don't want to penalize them to the  
12                  point where they can't become productive  
13                  members.

14                  I'm not shy to say as a young  
15                  man, as a juvenile, I wasn't always on  
16                  the right path, but I'm a Penn grad,  
17                  former State Rep, first African American  
18                  to represent the most powerful district  
19                  in the City of Philadelphia. So, you  
20                  know, for me, it's important that we  
21                  support our young people, hold them  
22                  accountable, nevertheless make sure we're  
23                  not overly penalizing poor people who are  
24                  trying to support young people who are  
25                  making some poor decisions but,

2                   nevertheless, they still want to go on  
3                   and do great things with their lives.

4                   Thank you, Council President.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6                   Thank you, Councilman. They say south of  
7                   Market, west of Broad, most powerful  
8                   Council district.

9                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
10                  Green.

11                  COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
12                  Council President Clarke. I just want to  
13                  take a quick moment to salute our  
14                  colleague Councilwoman Cindy Bass on an  
15                  achievement that occurred today.

16                  I have a strong affinity to the  
17                  Chew and Belfield community. At a very  
18                  young age, my maternal grandmother used  
19                  to babysit me in that community. And so  
20                  when I was President of East Mount Airy  
21                  Neighbors and I did the housing and land  
22                  use and zoning work for EMAN for a long  
23                  period of time, there was a desire by the  
24                  community to have a supermarket at Chew  
25                  and Washington Lane. And we were able to

2                   get a supermarket at that location.

3                   However, the supermarket that was there  
4                   was acquired by another entity -- I'll  
5                   keep them nameless -- and closed the  
6                   supermarket, and it sat idle and vacant  
7                   for a period of time and it was a lot for  
8                   the most part.

9                   And so that entity had a  
10                  restrictive covenant in the  
11                  legislation -- I mean had a deed  
12                  restriction at that location saying that  
13                  no other market could come to that  
14                  location. Reverend Chester Williams, who  
15                  is head of the Chew and Belfield  
16                  Neighbors, was very active in organizing  
17                  people in that community, and our  
18                  colleague Councilwoman Bass introduced  
19                  legislation to kind of move the needle  
20                  and force the issue.

21                  And so this morning, there was  
22                  a grand opening and ribbon cutting for  
23                  the new Save-A-Lot at Chew and Washington  
24                  Lane, and I was happy to be there at the  
25                  grand opening, along with Councilwoman

2                   Bass and other elected officials from the  
3                   region.

4                   So I just want to take a moment  
5                   to thank her and for her work and using  
6                   the power of her office to provide  
7                   economic development opportunity for that  
8                   community.

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10                  Thank you, Councilman.

11                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
12                  Jones.

13                  COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
14                  Mr. President. My colleague Kenyatta  
15                  Johnson and I agree on a great many  
16                  things. Greatest district in the City is  
17                  not one of them, but let me focus on  
18                  where we do.

19                  From the time he entered this  
20                  body, he has been an advocate for  
21                  juveniles and particularly those -- they  
22                  call it now opportunity youth that we  
23                  used to call at-risk youth. And this  
24                  piece of work this week by way of moving  
25                  DHS to agree to stop creating debtors

2           prisons, particularly on young people,  
3           and making parents have to choose between  
4           honoring their kids or moving them on to  
5           adulthood to avoid fiscal calamity in a  
6           lot of cases was huge. It made the  
7           national news, but that's not why  
8           Councilman Johnson championed it.

9                   But I want to also point out  
10          that you had placed a great priority on  
11          justice reform. And so those little  
12          victories that we are beginning to make  
13          are moving the needle in the right  
14          direction, Mr. President. So as captain  
15          of this ship, I believe sincerely you are  
16          moving it in the right direction, and as  
17          the respective mates on the ship, we get  
18          it, and I hope that we will continue in  
19          that direction during the budget so that  
20          we can -- and there are a lot of people  
21          counting on us. I mean, the courts are  
22          hoping that this year we actually pay  
23          attention to the recommendations that  
24          they've been making for a great number of  
25          years to do alternatives to

2                   incarceration. But here's the  
3                   opportunity for all of us to put our  
4                   money where our mouth is.

5                   Councilman Johnson really bent  
6                   my ear about doing a program similar to  
7                   ones we've done that kind of get ahead of  
8                   the curve. So instead of reentry,  
9                   pre-entry. Make sure we give them some  
10                  assistance, intervention if you would,  
11                  before they get in the system.

12                 So we will be -- and you've  
13                 charged us with putting together that  
14                 agenda, and for which we happily do our  
15                 work. But we are going to move an agenda  
16                 during this fiscal year.

17                 And, no, Rome wasn't made in a  
18                 day. We won't undo some of the problems  
19                 in one fiscal year, but we will plant the  
20                 seeds that will bear fruit in future  
21                 fiscal years. And it's the intersecting  
22                 point where the most conservative members  
23                 and the most liberal members -- and I  
24                 didn't just look at you, Councilwoman,  
25                 but can intersect.

2                   Whether you want to save money  
3                   or save a soul, there's an agenda that we  
4                   can put together mutually that  
5                   accomplishes both. So we look forward to  
6                   this process, Mr. President.

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8                   Thank you, Councilman. And, again, thank  
9                   you and Councilman Johnson for your great  
10                  work on that Criminal Justice Reform  
11                  Committee, and I do believe that you  
12                  would see some of the recommendations  
13                  reflected in the upcoming budget process.

14                  The Chair recognizes  
15                  Councilwoman Bass.

16                  COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
17                  Mr. President. I just wanted to remind  
18                  everybody that shortly after we break  
19                  here, there will be a briefing by PHMC  
20                  over in the City Hall Caucus Room. We  
21                  invite everyone to come over and to hear  
22                  information about, again, the Affordable  
23                  Care Act, the opioid crisis, which is  
24                  addressing our city right now, and so  
25                  many other things that are important

2           related to health-related issues. Again,  
3           lunch will be provided. So we just want  
4           to invite everyone to come over to the  
5           Caucus Room across the hall.

6                     Thank you.

8           Thank you, Councilwoman.

9                     That concludes the speeches on  
10           behalf of the majority and minority, and  
11           the Chair recognizes Councilwoman  
12           Reynolds Brown for a motion to adjourn.

13                    COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
14           Mr. President. I move that Council stand  
15           adjourned until Thursday, March 16th,  
16           2017 at 10:00 a.m.

19           Thank you. It has been moved and
