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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning, everyone.

(Good morning.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Come on, guys. We can do better than that.

5 rise.)

6 PASTOR MAXWELL: Good morning,
7 everyone.

8 (Good morning.)

9 PASTOR MAXWELL: I'd first like
10 to thank Councilman Johnson for this
11 wonderful privilege and to my
12 Councilwoman also, Jannie Blackwell.

13 So let us look to the Lord in
14 prayer.

15 Heavenly and Most Gracious God,
16 we come before you this day with
17 thanksgiving in our hearts. Almighty
18 God, we welcome your holy presence into
19 this session, that you might lead and
20 direct us, Lord God.

21 Almighty God, we ask that you
22 will continue to bless this city, our
23 Mayor, and especially those
24 Councilmembers who diligently serve and
25 work to make this city great.

19 continue to meet your requirements first
20 and then the requirements of the offices
21 that they hold.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you very much. Pastor, thank you
7 so much for those inspiring words. We
8 really appreciate it.

9 The next order of business is
10 the approval of the Journal of the
11 meeting of Thursday, March 23rd, 2017.

12 The Chair recognizes Councilman
13 Greenlee.

14 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
15 you, Mr. President. I move that the
16 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, March
17 23rd, 2017 be approved.

18 (Duly seconded.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. It has been moved and
21 properly seconded that the Journal of the
22 meeting of Thursday, March 23rd, 2017
23 stand approved.

24 All those in favor say aye.

25 (Aye.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Those opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 ayes have it, and the Journal is
7 approved.

8 The next order of business is
9 requests for leaves of absence, and the
10 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. On behalf of the
13 majority, there are no requests of leave
14 of absence today.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 Chair thanks the gentleman.

17 And the Chair recognizes
18 Councilman Oh on behalf of the minority.

19 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
20 much. On behalf of the minority, there
21 are no requests for leaves of absence.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you very much, Councilman.

24 At this time, I would like to
25 dispense with the regular order of

2 business and I would like to welcome and
3 thank everyone who has taken time out of
4 their busy day to come down to witness
5 their government in action. We hope your
6 stay here today is a knowledgeable one
7 but more so a pleasurable one, so much so
8 that you come back again. So, again,
9 thank you so much for being here.

10 At this time, the Chair
11 recognizes Councilman Green, who will
12 present a resolution honoring Henry H.
13 Houston Elementary School. Would
14 Principal Larry Hall and those
15 accompanying him please join the
16 Councilman at the podium.

17 (Councilmembers and guests
18 approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
20 joining Councilman Green, we have
21 Councilman Taubenberger and Councilwoman
22 Bass.

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Good
24 morning. It's always a pleasure to honor
25 one of our great public schools here in

2 the City of Philadelphia.

3 For the members of Council, you
4 may recall in our last session of Council
5 last spring we had a great performance
6 from students from Henry H. Houston
7 Elementary School who presented songs
8 from their CD "A Day in the Life." That
9 CD was actually nominated for a Grammy.
10 Unfortunately, it did not win, but we
11 wanted to make sure that we acknowledge
12 their great work and the great work that
13 they do at Houston Elementary School and
14 the joy they bring not only to the Mount
15 Airy community but to the City of
16 Philadelphia.

17 And so honoring and celebrating
18 Henry H. Houston Elementary School on the
19 occasion of a student-created album, "A
20 Day in the Life," being placed on the
21 first-round ballot for a Grammy
22 nomination in the category of "Best
23 Children's Album."

24 Whereas, "A Day in the Life" is
25 an album of 16 original songs created by

2 the students of Henry H. Houston
3 Elementary School over the course of a
4 yearlong cross-curricular writing and
5 music-making collaboration with the music
6 non-profit LiveConnections; and

7 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
8 Houston Elementary, located in West Mount
9 Airy, in the Eighth Council District, is
10 a neighborhood K through 8 public school
11 in the School District of Philadelphia
12 known for strong academics and a top-tier
13 music program; and

14 Whereas, LiveConnections
15 inspires learning and builds community
16 through collaborative music-making,
17 reaching 6,000 public school youth in
18 Philadelphia annually with free,
19 innovative music education programs; and

20 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
21 Whereas, "A Day in My Life" project,
22 which includes a 44-page companion book
23 of poems and lyrics, was contributed to
24 by each and every Houston student, in
25 collaboration with the Houston family and

2 more than a dozen top professional music,
3 dance, theatre, poetry artists; and

4 Whereas, the album was released
5 on the Rural Lane Records label, which
6 was established in 2011 by music teacher
7 Ezechial Thurman, who led the project
8 with David Bradley and Andrew Lipke of
9 LiveConnections; and

10 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, the
11 consideration of "A Day in My Life" on a
12 first-round Grammy ballot is a testament
13 to the energy, passion and talent which
14 was poured into the project by students
15 and educators; and

16 Whereas, the project's success
17 also speaks to the power of the arts to
18 motivate profound learning, creativity
19 and critical thinking; showcases the
20 strength and power of students' social
21 consciences; and demonstrates how much
22 can be accomplished through strong
23 community partnerships; now, therefore,
24 be it

25 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Resolved, by

1 3/30/17 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS
2 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
3 that Council does honor and celebrate
4 Henry H. Houston Elementary School on the
5 occasion of its student-created album, "A
6 Day in My Life," being placed on the
7 first-round ballot for a Grammy Award
8 nomination in the category of "Best
9 Children's Album."

10 Further resolved, that an
11 engrossed copy of this resolution be
12 presented to representatives of Henry H.
13 Houston Elementary School, evidencing the
14 sincere admiration and respect of this
15 legislative body.

16 This resolution was introduced
17 by myself as well as Councilwoman Bass,
18 Councilman Taubenberger, Councilwoman
19 Gym, and supported by all members of City
20 Council. And as a father of a proud
21 Houston alumnus, congratulations.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
24 the Chair recognizes Principal Hall for
25 remarks.

2 PRINCIPAL HALL: Thank you.

3 Thank you, Council President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 You're welcome.

6 PRINCIPAL HALL: And thank you,
7 wonderful City Council. This is big and
8 this is big for a few reasons. "A Day in
9 the Life" is a project that represents
10 students finding their voice and the
11 adults that empower them. See, this CD
12 was written almost exclusively by Houston
13 students, through songs like "One Life
14 Taken, One Life Saved" and "Dear Future
15 Me," there is a pain you can hear through
16 the speakers when you hear the songs of
17 these students. But what did this
18 project do? It allowed that pain to come
19 through in a constructive,
20 community-building way, not in a negative
21 I'm-going-to-do-something-to-get-my-
22 frustration-out type of way. They didn't
23 pick up a gun. They didn't pick up
24 drugs. They picked up a pen and they
25 picked up a microphone. It was that art

2 element that allowed students to express
3 themselves, without limitations, in a
4 productive manner.

5 For this reason, as a principal
6 and as a parent, I'm excited about Mayor
7 Kenney's and our beloved City Council's
8 push for arts in the schools. Whether
9 through community partnerships or through
10 a certified teacher in your building, art
11 is key and that in organizations like
12 PCCY and LiveConnections that are ready
13 and willing to help our schools and
14 students get the art element that are our
15 students need. It's all about teaching
16 the whole child, and everybody likes good
17 music.

18 (Applause.)

20 Council will be at ease.

21 (Council at ease.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you very much, and congratulations.

24 At this time, the Chair
25 recognizes Councilwoman Gym, who will

4 Sharon Cooks and those accompanying her
5 please join the Councilwoman at the
6 podium.

7 (Councilmembers and guests
8 approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
10 joining the Councilwoman, we have
11 Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman
12 Blackwell, Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,
13 Councilman Henon, Councilwoman Parker and
14 Councilman Green, Councilwoman Bass,
15 Councilman Squilla, and Councilwoman
16 Quinones-Sanchez.

17 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you,
18 everybody. We are gathered here today to
19 celebrate the humanity, beauty, and
20 achievements of trans people in
21 Philadelphia and across the country.

22 The public conversations we so
23 often have about trans people is driven
24 by -- is too often driven by stereotypes
25 and heartbreaking stories of violence,

2 but we know that trans people are our
3 neighbors, our siblings, our parents, our
4 children, our friends, our co-workers.
5 We know that trans people are overcoming
6 enormous challenges in their fight for
7 freedom, dignity, and equality. This is
8 what we honor and celebrate.

9 As our resolution states,
10 celebration does not equal justice, and
11 for trans people, especially trans people
12 and trans women of color, people who face
13 daily threats, insufficient support, and
14 the very real danger of transphobic
15 violence and murder, justice is something
16 that is sorely needed.

17 I'm thinking about trans women
18 of color who have been murdered in
19 Philadelphia - Stacey Blahnik, Kyra
20 Cordova, Nizah Morris. They deserve
21 justice, and they have not been given it
22 for far too long.

23 I'm thinking as well about the
24 trans women of color who have been
25 murdered since this year began. They too

2 deserve justice.

3 And I'm thinking of the
4 generation of young trans people growing
5 up in a time when bathroom bills and hate
6 buses and political parties are sending
7 messages of hate and rejection.

8 We will reject this hate. We
9 will stand up and fight back with our
10 love, our dignity, and our community.

11 And I want to thank especially
12 the organizations who have been doing
13 this work for a long time and who are
14 here today. I want to especially
15 acknowledge Amber Hikes, our new
16 Executive Director of the Mayor's
17 Commission on LGBT Affairs.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: I want to
20 acknowledge my State Representative,
21 Brian Sims.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: We won't
24 have to do the applause for everybody,
25 but we have a number of different

2 organizations who are here, including
3 William Way LGBT Community Center, LGBT
4 Home of Hope, Morris Home, Galaei, Black
5 and Brown Workers Collective,
6 Philadelphia Fight, and Youth Health
7 Empowerment Project, ACLU of
8 Pennsylvania, the Children's Hospital of
9 Philadelphia, Sexuality and Gender
10 Development Clinic, which serves more
11 than 500 trans youth on the East Coast,
12 Mazzoni Center, the University of
13 Pennsylvania, the Friends Council on
14 Education and so many more. This is our
15 community, this is our pride, this is our
16 support and our center, and this year
17 City Council honors Trans Resistance and
18 the deeply necessary work of Mobilizing
19 for Justice in this moment, in this
20 country, at this time. We are here to
21 commit ourselves to standing with the
22 trans community in joy and in pain, to
23 celebrate and to fight and to persevere.
24 And with that, we're going to
25 start our resolution.

2 Declaring March 31st,
3 Transgender Day of Visibility in the City
4 of Philadelphia.

5 Whereas, one million Americans
6 are transgender and have gravely overcome
7 significant hardships to build vibrant
8 and thriving communities, often in the
9 face of systemic and interpersonal
10 prejudice, discrimination, and violence;
11 and

12 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
13 we cannot simply celebrate visibility
14 without also recognizing that it does not
15 always equal justice; still far too many
16 Trans people, in particular Trans women
17 of color, continue to face profound
18 threats to their safety and wellbeing;
19 and

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,
21 already this year we know of eight Trans
22 women of color who were murdered -
23 Jaquarius Holland, 18 years old; Ciara
24 McElveen, 21 years old; China Gibson, 31
25 years old; Keke Collier, 24 years old;

2 JoJo Striker, 23 years old; Mesha
3 Caldwell, 41 years old; Jamie Lee Wounded
4 Arrow, 28 years old; and Alfonza Watson,
5 38 years old. For each Trans person
6 killed or lost this year and in years
7 past, we mourn, we honor, and we say
8 their names; and

9 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
10 we also celebrate the beauty and
11 resilience of Trans people through
12 history and those who are us today, and
13 we recognize that Trans people have
14 contributed and continue to contribute in
15 myriad ways to the betterment of our
16 society and our City, often working at
17 the forefront of social justice activism
18 and human rights work; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
20 Trans people, and in particular Trans
21 women of color including Sylvia Rivera,
22 Miss Major, and Marsha P. Johnson, were
23 instrumental in the creation of the
24 modern gay rights movement in the United
25 States, from the 1965 Dewey lunch counter

2 protests in Philadelphia to the Stonewall
3 riots in 1969 to the creation of radical
4 civil rights organizations; and

5 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,
6 transgender non-conforming Americans have
7 made profound strides in challenging
8 social and political norms that had
9 forced many to live in secrecy regarding
10 their gender identity, sentenced them to
11 coercive medical and psychological
12 treatments, and have denied them
13 employment and housing opportunities; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,
15 civil rights victories won by Trans
16 activities have expanded judicial
17 recognition of constitutional protections
18 for gender identity and expression, and
19 provided a greater number of people with
20 the basic protections needed to ensure
21 human dignity and self-determination,
22 however these rights are still not
23 universally guaranteed, with laws varying
24 by state and locality and regressive
25 measures still being pursued; and

2 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, as
3 a result of determined activism and
4 advocacy, Trans people now serve as
5 religious and educational leaders, reach
6 the highest level of athletic
7 competition, star in film and television,
8 and serve in prominent government
9 positions, beginning to reverse many
10 years of tragic exclusion; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,
12 in Philadelphia and across the country,
13 Trans people have courageously and
14 powerfully organized in response to hate
15 crime and violence that have been
16 directed at members of their community,
17 especially at Trans women of color,
18 nonetheless receiving insufficient
19 mainstream coverage and recognition; and

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:
21 Whereas, we recognize and celebrate the
22 work that is being done by Trans advocacy
23 groups to continue to fight for dignity
24 and equal rights for members of the Trans
25 community, to build inclusive and healing

2 spaces, and to protect and defend those
3 who are most vulnerable including people
4 with disabilities and in prison; and

5 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,
6 while Philadelphia has helped lead the
7 way in extending non-discrimination
8 protections and equal benefits to Trans
9 people, including Trans youth in our
10 School District, the commitment is even
11 more needed in the face of threats that
12 the federal government will curtail or
13 abandon its enforcement of civil rights
14 protections and deeply cut healthcare and
15 other crucial programs; and

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas, in
17 Philadelphia, we believe in the inherent
18 value of each other and every resident of
19 our City, including especially our Trans
20 and gender non-conforming residents,
21 without exception; now, therefore, be it

22 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Now,
23 therefore, be it resolved, that on this
24 last official day of Women's History
25 Month, we have an expansive notion of

2 what it means to be the fullness of our
3 gender and our identity. The City of
4 Philadelphia declares March 31st as
5 Transgender Day of Visibility.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
8 Chair recognizes Ms. Cooks for remarks.

9 MS. COOKS: Hello, everyone,
10 and thank you so much for joining us. I
11 would first like to thank City Council
12 for acknowledging the contributions of
13 trans women of color and the LGBT
14 community. I would like to thank the
15 Office of LGBT Affairs for initiating
16 this first step toward the acceptance of
17 gender identity and equal rights that we
18 have here in the City of Philadelphia.

19 I think that there is a call to
20 action that we need to have in our
21 community that needs to be centered
22 around the issues that we face daily,
23 such as high amounts of HIV and AIDS
24 rates, violence against transgender women
25 of color in particular, as well as the

2 poverty rate. There are trans people who
3 are living below the poverty rate, about
4 less than \$10,000 a year, and that needs
5 to change.

6 So although this resolution,
7 which I deeply appreciate, I would also
8 like to extend to our City government
9 officials conversations about how we
10 could address some of these epidemics
11 that we're not only facing in our city
12 but that we are facing in our
13 Commonwealth and across the state.

14 So thank you so much for
15 welcoming us into your session and for
16 acknowledging the contributions that we
17 have had towards equality in our city, in
18 our Commonwealth, and our nation.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Council will be at ease.

22 (Council at ease.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. The next order of business is
25 communications, and the Chair requests

5 Mr. Decker, please read those

7 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
8 and members of the Council of the City of
9 Philadelphia, pursuant to Sections 4-604
10 and 2-307 of the Home Rule Charter, I am
11 today transmitting to the Council the
12 recommendation of the City Planning
13 Commission on the following bills: Bill
14 Nos. 170005, 170140, 170141, 170162,
15 170163, 170192, 170194, and Bill No.
16 170201.

17 And I am pleased to advise you
18 that on March 28, 2017, I signed all of
19 the bills which were passed by Council at
20 its session on March 16, 2017.

21 And I am transmitting for the
22 consideration of your honorable body a
23 resolution approving the redevelopment
24 contract of the Philadelphia
25 Redevelopment Authority for the

2 redevelopment and urban renewal of a
3 portion of the American Street Industrial
4 Corridor Urban Renewal Area, identified
5 by house number and street address as
6 2501 through 2525 North American Street;
7 and

8 An ordinance constituting the
9 Sixteenth Supplemental Ordinance to the
10 Amended and Restated General Airport
11 Revenue Bond Ordinance, providing for
12 certain amendments to the Amended and
13 Restated General Airport Revenue Bond
14 Ordinance; and

15 An ordinance authorizing the
16 Commissioner of Public Property, on
17 behalf of the City of Philadelphia, to
18 acquire fee simple title or a lesser real
19 estate interest to all or a portion of a
20 parcel of land located in the area
21 bounded by East Bristol Street, O Street,
22 Leiper Street and the Frankford Creek;
23 and

24 An ordinance amending Chapter
25 9-200 of The Philadelphia Code (entitled

1 3/30/17 - STATED - INTRO OF BILLS
2 "Commercial Activities on Streets"), by
3 amending Section 9-213, entitled
4 "Farmers' Markets," to revise certain
5 provisions relating to the permissible
6 locations of the farmers' market on South
7 43rd Street near Clarke Park, all under
8 certain terms and conditions.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you, Mr. Decker. Do you have any
11 additional communications?

12 CHIEF CLERK: I have none,
13 Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you very much.

16 The next order of business is
17 the introduction of bills and
18 resolutions, and the Chair recognizes
19 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Good
21 morning. I offer one resolution this
22 morning.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Thank you, Councilwoman.

25 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
7 that will be on next week's Final Passage
8 Calendar.

9 The Chair recognizes
10 Councilwoman Blackwell.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

12 The next order of business is
13 the consideration of the Calendar. There

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 ayes have it. The motion carries. And
20 we will consider the Consent Agenda
21 shortly.

22 The Chair again recognizes
23 Councilman Henon for the purpose of
24 calling up bills and resolutions on the
25 regular Second Reading and Final Passage

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you, Councilman.

15 Before considering these bills
16 and resolutions on the Final Passage
17 Calendar today, we will have our public
18 comment session. Our public comment
19 session will go as follows:

20 If you are interested in
21 testifying on a bill or resolution that
22 is on the Final Passage Calendar today,
23 if you have not already done so, we'd ask
24 that you sign up at the table to my left.

25 When your name is called, you

11 your remarks. You will be given three
12 minutes to testify.

13 Mr. Decker, please call the
14 first name on the list.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Debra Lutz,
16 commenting on 170093.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MS. LUTZ: Good morning,
19 members of Council. My name is Debra
20 Lutz. As a concerned Philadelphia
21 resident, I am here to ask you to vote
22 no -- can you hear me now? Okay.

23 As a concerned Philadelphia
24 resident, I'm here to ask you to vote no
25 on Bill 170093. It is a flawed

1 3/30/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 legislative bill. The bill is incomplete
3 regarding the short-term impact of EV
4 ownership and damages the long-term
5 support of EV car use in Philadelphia.
6 This is not just about Center City
7 parking wars. This is a well-documented
8 and -- there is a well-documented and
9 concerted effort across the country to
10 halt EV car ownership, and any decision
11 to cancel the existing program has to be
12 understood in a greater context.

13 This is an open-ended
14 moratorium and effectively terminates the
15 progressive 2007 EV parking law. It
16 retroactively changes the rules for
17 existing program participants, which is
18 punitive. In addition, it weakens
19 Philadelphia's recognized best practice
20 of dedicated EV parking spaces.

21 Twenty-four hour access is
22 established and matches what is available
23 for handicapped and car-sharing spaces.
24 Any robust support plan for EV ownership
25 requires 24-hour dedicated spaces to

2 public chargers, and chipping away at the
3 regulation is foolish before a
4 replacement program is established. The
5 often cited unsustainability of this plan
6 is not about parking. It's about the
7 private ownership of the chargers in
8 those spaces.

9 I urge all of you to consider
10 your support of this bill carefully and
11 before voting yes, changes are needed to
12 address the right-of-way encroachment as
13 the bill was introduced today. Making it
14 a separate bill is confusing and
15 unnecessary and doesn't guarantee that it
16 will pass with this moratorium.

17 Preserve the established EV
18 parking program rules and remove all
19 regulatory-taking impacts to program
20 participants. Set a reasonable end date
21 for the moratorium of 12 to 24 months.

22 If issues for this program and
23 public chargers cannot be implemented,
24 Philadelphia should allow private funding
25 and market forces to freely support EV

2 use in Philadelphia. Putting a
3 moratorium in place thoughtfully
4 preserves the progress Philly has made
5 and lays the foundation for a successful
6 program in the future. Passing this bill
7 without thorough review and the necessary
8 changes is not needed to prevent new
9 spaces from being issued today, as the
10 PPA has not accepted applicants since the
11 Streets Committee originally had its
12 hearing in January.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you very much for your testimony.

15 CHIEF CLERK: William Morlock,
16 commenting on 170093.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. MORLOCK: Good morning.
19 Thank you for the opportunity to speak
20 about the EV bill, 170093.

21 Councilman Oh states that he
22 wants to make the EV program more robust
23 and successful, and we're for that. We
24 are the City's EV pioneers. We put our
25 money into this program. But the

2 Councilman's contention that it's
3 necessary to decimate to take through
4 regulation the utility of the existing
5 permit holders in order to do that is
6 illogical and incorrect.

7 I believe I just heard that
8 there would be a new definition for what
9 constitutes an EV vehicle, which is brand
10 new news and we have no knowledge of. We
11 do think that the six to six charging
12 restriction dramatically reduces utility,
13 and if there's a change in the EV
14 definition, it will destroy the utility
15 of my vehicle.

16 Two-hour day limits is not
17 workable. I should sit by my window as
18 soon as the charger becomes available,
19 sprint to wherever my car might be, and
20 then charge back to see if the space is
21 still there. Repeat every two hours as
22 necessary.

23 Nothing in the existing program
24 is in the way of a new improved future,
25 and nothing in this bill will promote it.

2 I've contacted each of you and
3 the Mayor that my conviction is that the
4 68 spaces should be grandfathered,
5 without condition. Three reasons. We
6 made significant and good-faith
7 investment. We relied on the good faith
8 of the City in maintaining its ordinance,
9 and there's significant precedent in the
10 fact that the City has grandfathered,
11 without condition, hundreds of curb cuts
12 for individual garages. That was
13 properly done even though it is now
14 recognized that granting those curb cuts
15 in the first place was a bad decision.
16 That's changed, but only going forward.

17 I am asking Council for
18 fairness. I'm asking Council for equal
19 treatment. I am asking you to treat us
20 as you treated our neighbors with
21 garages. I want you to grandfather 68
22 permits. That's 68 citywide permits for
23 EV charging, without condition. Then we
24 can move forward. We can move forward
25 together, without rancor, to make a

2 better sustainable future.

3 Put a moratorium on this
4 project if you must while we craft this
5 future, but in fairness, you must
6 grandfather, without condition, current
7 permit holders.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Deen Kogan.

12 Deen Kogan.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 MS. KOGAN: Hi.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on

16 170093.

17 MS. KOGAN: It's a lady, not a
18 man.

19 I have lived on the 200 block
20 of Delancey Street for 50 years. We've
21 had a wonderful neighborhood. Parking
22 has always been a problem. I have
23 pictures of 4 o'clock yesterday on my
24 block, big empty spaces. I thought the
25 ordinance called for two spots, either

2 handicapped or electric or whatever. We
3 have three. And in my neighborhood, my
4 immediate neighborhood, Second Street,
5 Delancey, Pine, we have over nine spaces.
6 It's caused a tremendous amount of
7 contention in the neighborhood.

8 I don't understand, and nobody
9 has been able to explain to me, how
10 public land has been given to private
11 owners. One of our electric car owners
12 had a neighbor towed because they
13 happened to park in his spot. I've been
14 threatened, because I have a big mouth.

15 I really appreciate the fact
16 that City Council is looking into this,
17 Councilman Squilla, Councilman Oh, and
18 everybody else. I hope this is just the
19 beginning, and I really hope that this
20 ordinance will be overturned completely.
21 There's no justification for it.

22 My attorney says that we are in
23 violation of the ADA Act. I have a
24 couple on my block that I'm speaking for
25 who need a handicapped space and they

2 need it terribly. They can't get it. I
3 don't know what else to say. I don't
4 know what else to do, but I sincerely
5 hope that these people are not
6 grandfathered in for their lifetime.
7 It's not fair and it's not what
8 Philadelphia should be about.

9 If you have any questions, see
10 me later.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Roseanne Loesch,
14 commenting on 170093.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 MS. LOESCH: It's hard to
17 follow that act.

18 I am actually -- you are in my
19 district.

20 My name is Roseanne Loesch and
21 I am President of Society Hill Civic
22 Association, which represents over 5,000
23 residents. Thank you, Council President
24 Clarke and Council and especially
25 Councilman Oh, for this opportunity to

2 testify on behalf of the electric vehicle
3 charging station moratorium bill, and I'd
4 like to thank our District Councilman,
5 Mark Squilla, who has strongly supported
6 us in trying to correct the current
7 situation.

8 Society Hill Civic Association
9 strongly supports the increase of clean
10 vehicles in the City, and we also support
11 this proposed moratorium on new electric
12 vehicle parking spaces and looking into
13 the question of grandfathering spaces,
14 which was raised today.

15 Our neighborhood in particular
16 has had a disproportionate amount of the
17 total permits issued for this purpose.
18 In Councilman Squilla's district, there
19 has been about 75 percent of the permits
20 issued, and our residents have let us
21 know loud and clear that the
22 appropriation of a public good for
23 private use cannot and should not
24 continue.

25 As you all must be aware, under

1 3/30/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 the current practice, in theory, any
3 electric vehicle can park and use a
4 recharger installed in front of a private
5 home. However, in practice, no other
6 electric vehicle owner but the homeowner
7 who installed the recharger has access to
8 it. So essentially this amounts to one
9 individual getting a permanent personal
10 parking space on a public street.

11 In our review of other cities
12 in the United States, no other city
13 essentially gives away the extremely
14 valuable commodity of a reserved parking
15 space to an individual homeowner.

16 The fee the City charges for
17 this privilege is a tiny fraction of the
18 price of renting a monthly parking space
19 in Center City Philadelphia. And
20 allowing these vehicles to park at night
21 only is the worst time of day for trying
22 to find a parking space in our
23 neighborhood. So that does not solve the
24 problem.

25 I urge Council to pass this

2 bill, and I welcome any questions you may
3 have from Council.

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you so much for your testimony.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Mary Pisculli,
8 commenting on 170093.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 morning.

12 MS. PISCULLI: Good morning,
13 Councilmembers. My name is Mary
14 Pisculli. I come to ask you to please
15 preserve the electric vehicle parking
16 space program as it was written for all
17 current and approved EV space holders.

18 I'm a proud supporter of the
19 City of Philadelphia's green initiatives,
20 and I share the concern of many about our
21 air quality, our proximity to I-95, and I
22 sincerely appreciate the Council's
23 efforts to green the entire city.

24 We purchased an electric
25 vehicle in October of 2016 after years of

2 saving and months of research. We needed
3 a seven-seater car and had only two
4 options on the market at the time. In
5 truth, really only one option, as the
6 Tesla seven-seater cost nearly 30,000
7 more. Our choice has a short battery
8 range. However, it's exactly sufficient
9 for our transportation needs when we can
10 charge it twice a day.

11 I bring the car back in the
12 morning after I drop my kids off and my
13 neighbor's to school. I plug it in to
14 charge and then I come back in the late
15 afternoon, ready for the late afternoon
16 pick-up. Without access to the charger
17 that cost \$3,600 to install, with holes
18 drilled into my house's foundation and
19 through all the floor joists, I cannot
20 use my clean energy vehicle.

21 As you know, the start-up costs
22 for any type of green infrastructure are
23 expensive. We, the private owners of EVs
24 in Philadelphia, have assumed all of
25 these costs. I want to underline for you

2 what these costs were. My electric
3 vehicle cost \$22,000 more than the
4 non-electric equivalent. I followed the
5 spirit and the letter of the law in
6 selecting my vehicle. Like many others
7 on the market, it is not compatible with
8 a DC fast charger. My vehicle's usage
9 and my reason for buying it are not
10 compatible with only nighttime charging
11 or restricted daytime charging.

12 With restricted charger access,
13 I would not and could not have purchased
14 my vehicle, which I did only a few months
15 ago. There are other EV owners that have
16 the same concerns of short battery time
17 and need to frequently charge. There is
18 no industry standard for battery size,
19 battery range or even charger
20 compatibility, which I know frustrates
21 your ability to create a public
22 infrastructure. This means policy cannot
23 be retroactively changed as it can't
24 accommodate the spectrum of EVs that
25 already have been purchased in keeping

2 with the law. Going forward, you may be
3 able to influence that.

4 Any change to the ordinance
5 after we have adopted it is wholly unfair
6 and will penalize us and other EV owners
7 who adopted the City's green initiatives
8 at considerable personal expense and
9 sends a terrible message about the City's
10 commitment to green initiatives in the
11 future.

12 To comment on what was said
13 before, I live on the 100 block of
14 Delancey. I am the only electric vehicle
15 on that block, where four were eligible.
16 There are a couple of open spots on our
17 street every day for parking. Day
18 parking is not the issue. I also know
19 that this is not private land. It does
20 not increase my property value. It is
21 not transferable.

22 Having said that, someone
23 parked in our charger spot yesterday and
24 was still there as of 9:30 this morning,
25 without a ticket.

3 you wrap it up, ma'am.

4 MS. PISCULLI: Thank you. I
5 just ask you to please embrace the
6 initiative that we embraced in good
7 faith.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you, ma'am, for your testimony.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Brian Egan,
12 commenting on 170093.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
15 morning.

16 MR. EGAN: Good morning,
17 Council. My name is Brian Egan. I am
18 here today requesting that you reject
19 proposed Bill 170093. In short, the
20 proposed bill disparately treats those
21 who have expended significant time and
22 resources to participate in
23 Philadelphia's novel charging station
24 program as compared to other similar
25 programs offered by the City.

2 In addition, the proposed hours
3 restriction on electric vehicle parking
4 does little to curb parking problems,
5 which are generally present at night, not
6 during the day, and punish those who rely
7 on their ability to charge their vehicle
8 throughout the day.

9 A comparison that has been
10 missed in this process is, one, The
11 Philadelphia Code, Section 12-918,
12 entitled "Parking for Auto Sharing
13 Organizations." That section of the code
14 permits for-profit companies, including
15 Enterprise and Zipcar, to pay \$150 a year
16 for a street-side parking spot that is
17 reserved for the exclusive use of a
18 single ride-share vehicle. These
19 ride-sharing programs are designed such
20 that the reserved spot is for the
21 exclusive use of only a single vehicle.
22 That is, a member of the ride-sharing
23 program that chooses to use the vehicle
24 must return that vehicle to the same
25 exact spot. This means that any time the

2 vehicle is in use, the parking spot
3 remains vacant and no other vehicle can
4 park in that spot, not even other
5 ride-sharing vehicles.

6 These cars can be rented hourly
7 or by the day, meaning that extensive
8 periods of time may lapse with the spot
9 remaining vacant. Yet the City takes no
10 issue with these vacancies and affords
11 for-profit companies exclusive rights to
12 these parking spaces even when some or
13 all residents in the block are not
14 members of these ride-sharing programs.

15 By comparison, the electric
16 vehicle charging station program requires
17 the same annual expenditure from
18 participants, \$150 for space in Center
19 City, but also requires a significant
20 cost up front, which runs upwards of
21 \$4,000 for installing the charging
22 station, plus the cost of the vehicle
23 itself. The participants and pending
24 participants are all residents and who
25 personally absorb the installation cost

2 total less than 70 citywide. Zipcar
3 alone had over 400 vehicles parked
4 throughout Philadelphia as of June 2015.

5 In contrast to these reserved
6 spaces, the electric vehicle parking
7 spots are not for the exclusive use of a
8 single electric vehicle. Any electric
9 vehicle can park in these spots, but
10 somehow it is the electric vehicle
11 program that is being singled out by the
12 City for its exclusivity to the detriment
13 of those who invested in it. Other
14 programs, including the for-profit
15 ride-share program that dedicates a
16 reserved parking space to a single
17 vehicle, remain intact.

18 I urge the Council to take this
19 point into consideration when evaluating
20 the merits of Bill No. 170093. The bill
21 should be rejected and those current
22 permit holders of electric vehicle
23 parking spaces should be grandfathered
24 under the program as originally
25 implemented.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Jack Cassidy,
6 commenting on 170093.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 MR. CASSIDY: Good morning,
9 Council.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
11 morning.

12 MR. CASSIDY: I'm an electric
13 vehicle owner with an electric vehicle
14 parking spot.

15 Sorry.

16 As I stated, I'm an electric
17 vehicle owner with an electric vehicle
18 parking spot. I also live in Council
19 President Clarke's district.

20 I want to give you -- and I
21 urge Council to vote no on this bill
22 that's going to restrict our use of
23 parking from 6:00 p.m. 6:00 a.m.

24 I just want to give you an
25 example of for me how it will adversely

2 affect my use of my car. I purchased
3 this car about a year ago, and I'm sure
4 all the other electric car owners will
5 have similar examples, but I'm going to
6 give you my example.

7 As I stated, I have a fully
8 electric car, not a hybrid. And if I
9 visit my daughter in Langhorne, PA, then
10 return home, I would be completely out of
11 electric when I come home. And if
12 somebody is parking in the spot for the
13 entire day, I would not be able to use
14 that charger until 6:00 p.m., and this is
15 going to restrict my ability to get
16 around if I want to go out that evening.
17 So that's a real problem for me, and it
18 could be problems for everybody else.

19 As you know, electric vehicle
20 owners made a large investment in this
21 program, and I just want to give you an
22 example. As was stated before, electric
23 vehicles do cost 3,000 to 5,000 more than
24 combustion engine cars. The electric
25 installation and the charger was over

2 \$3,500. The application just to get into
3 the program was \$50. There is also a fee
4 of \$150 that I had to pay for installing
5 the "electric vehicle only" signs. And
6 then every year there's a \$75 renewal
7 fee, which I just paid on March 1st.

8 Now, if this amended bill is
9 passed, I will have to purchase a permit,
10 because my street has permit parking. So
11 that's going to be another whatever it
12 is, \$20 or \$30.

13 As you know, electric car
14 owners purchase cars because they like
15 clean air and they care about the
16 environment. We followed the rules of
17 the program as currently posted and
18 should be grandfathered under the current
19 rules. Any amendment to the rules should
20 apply to all new applicants.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you for your testimony.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Robert Curley,
25 commenting on 170093.

2 (Witness approached podium.)

3 MR. CURLEY: Good morning and,
4 again, thank you, Council, for allowing
5 this testimony. I'm here today on behalf
6 of the Crosstown Coalition, which is a
7 coalition of 23 neighborhood civic
8 associations.

9 The Coalition membership voted
10 to support Philadelphia City Council Bill
11 17009301 amending Section 12-1131 of The
12 Philadelphia Code. The 23 members were
13 asked on March 23rd to vote yes or no in
14 support of the bill. In that short
15 turnaround period, 20 associations
16 voted - 14 favored the bill and two voted
17 against it, and four abstained because
18 they could not convene a board vote in
19 the time period allowed.

20 The members who voted in favor
21 agreed to the following statement: The
22 advent of practical electrical vehicles
23 is full of promise for cleaner air and
24 reduced dependence on non-renewable fuel
25 sources. Their increased use should be

2 strongly encouraged.

3 However, the use comes with one
4 major drawback. In a dense urban core
5 lacking driveways or garages, where do
6 you plug them in? Providing
7 infrastructure to recharge electric
8 vehicles encourages their use.

9 The current practice in
10 Philadelphia is to reserve on-street
11 parking spaces for the exclusive use of
12 one electric vehicle. The Streets
13 Department may designate a space for an
14 electric vehicle without consent of the
15 adjacent neighbors and prohibit
16 non-electric vehicles from parking in
17 that space. There are currently no time
18 limits on the electric parking spaces.

19 This practice has its
20 consequences. Reserving an on-street
21 parking space effectively turns a public
22 asset into a private one, reducing the
23 availability of on-street parking for
24 non-electric vehicles in the
25 neighborhoods where demand for on-street

2 parking exceeds supply. The adverse
3 effects are exacerbated if there's more
4 than one electric vehicle designation on
5 a block or when combined with handicapped
6 parking and other restrictions.

7 Current practices may also have
8 a natural limit on how many spaces can be
9 designated and even breed resentment
10 among neighbors who own non-electric
11 cars. Over time both only serve to
12 discourage electric vehicle usage.

13 The Crosstown Coalition
14 supports the proposed moratorium on new
15 electrical vehicle parking spaces
16 provided that City Council and the
17 Streets Department investigate best
18 practices for electric vehicle
19 infrastructure and recommend workable
20 alternatives to 24/7 on-street parking
21 designation that balances the needs of
22 all City residents. The Coalition
23 welcomes the opportunity to discuss this
24 matter further with any Councilmembers.

25 Thank you.

3 Thank you for your testimony.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,

5 commenting on 170294, 170296, and 170297.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.

8 This is an official decree, yet another
9 one, dealing with the City's practices in
10 using the Redevelopment Authority and
11 other agencies and is a writ of mandamus
12 quo warranto and, as such, requires
13 immediate action and remedy.

14 Following the law is not
15 optional. Does hypocrisy reign supreme
16 in Philadelphia? In articles, the Mayor
17 says he believes Trump administration
18 wants to deny rights. The Mayor also
19 acknowledged the Mayor and all public
20 servants are oath-bound to never violate
21 the Fourth Amendment, Constitution, and
22 laws.

23 I, as sovereign people, demand
24 the rule of law be enforced by the
25 Attorney General. Fourth Amendment

2 states the right of the people to be
3 secure in their persons, houses, papers
4 and effects against unreasonable seizures
5 shall not be violated. How then was my
6 home at 1038 West Wyoming stolen, taken
7 without payment? How then was my deed
8 transferred without due process? How
9 then was my Seventh Amendment trial by
10 jury denied and protested by public
11 agents that are oath-bound?

12 The law requires immediate
13 remedy of this breach of law. 42 USC
14 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986, 1987, 18 USC 241,
15 242, 2381, 2384, oath of office, PA
16 Constitution, Article I, Section 1
17 through 11, 26 PA SCA 703, 708, 709, 712,
18 713, 716, and other laws listed in SCOTUS
19 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear violated
20 and, as such, requires immediate
21 prosecution for all involved.

22 There can only be one law. I
23 again call for the federal and
24 Commonwealth governments to perform their
25 constitutional obligations to

2 investigate, prosecute all involved in
3 the theft and the illegal deed transfer
4 of my home. The denial of God-given
5 USC 1982 property rights for 23 years is
6 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
7 and requires immediate remedy.

8 A just government must obey the
9 rule of law. This color of law
10 government must have its charter to
11 govern revoked until a constitutionally
12 compliant government is installed.

13 Public servants cannot refuse
14 their sworn duty to act any more than a
15 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
16 sovereign people of the United States
17 require laws and Constitution be enforced
18 and this constitutional crisis to be
19 immediately resolved. Jail is required
20 for all who violate oath and law.

21 It takes a lot of cooperation
22 to create and allow monumental
23 corruption, and we hold these truths to
24 be self-evident that all men are created
25 equal.

3 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Meenal Raval,
5 commenting on 170093.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MS. RAVAL: Correct.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
9 morning.

10 MS. RAVAL: Hi. Many of us
11 sense that the path to a livable planet
12 to bringing the climate back into balance
13 hinges on the mantra, electrify
14 everything and upgrade the electricity
15 grid.

16 For personal transportation,
17 this translates to electric cars. When
18 making a new car decision, households as
19 well as fleet managers should focus on
20 electric cars.

21 The Philadelphia Office of
22 Sustainability tells us that Philadelphia
23 is part of 30 cities seeking a combined
24 purchase of 114,000 electric cars for
25 future fleet purchasing. Our local

2 policy must encourage electric cars and
3 help solve a new problem that they raise,
4 where to charge them. This is easy
5 enough for someone with a garage, but a
6 majority of our urban residents park on
7 the street overnight.

8 Our Mayor Kenney when he was a
9 Councilman had the foresight in 2007 to
10 allow owners of electric vehicles to
11 apply for special reserved parking spaces
12 where they could install curbside
13 charging stations. Ten years later, with
14 less than 60 such permitted spaces, our
15 current Council intends to place a
16 moratorium on new curbside EV parking
17 spaces prompted by one resident's
18 complaints to Councilmembers Oh and
19 Squilla.

20 We need to make it easy for
21 more people to embrace electric vehicles.
22 We need to vote no on this moratorium on
23 new EV permits. Make it easy, guys.
24 I'll leave the details up to you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 doomed if we go down this path.

9 special all by itself, but that wasn't
10 why she's going to be known in history.

11 Unbeknownst to her and her
12 family, she had a thing called immortal
13 human cells, which meant simply her cells
14 didn't die. They keep reproducing over
15 and over again. And those cells were one
16 of the most important stem cell and cell
17 discoveries in the history of medicine.
18 In the history of medicine. No one knew
19 that her cells never died, and when they
20 were stolen by medical researchers, they
21 went on to be used for decades. They
22 were harvested, grown again, used in
23 experiments on inmates to see if cancer
24 could be produced in that manner, but it
25 also went on to discover things like

2 polio vaccines, stem cell research. They
3 even went in space to be experimented on
4 in zero gravity.

5 Many scientific landmarks, in
6 vitro fertilization, have come from that
7 discovery, from that gene pool, which was
8 stolen without her permission, without
9 her family's knowledge, for decades.

10 So here's an African American
11 woman from the South, tobacco farmer,
12 that nobody knew about and nobody was
13 going to know about until the discovery
14 of her immortal cells, which have been
15 used to save tens of thousands of people
16 since.

17 So I wanted to recognize her in
18 History Month, and I would say to my
19 colleague Blondell Reynolds Brown, that's
20 a lady who had moxie.

3 Council President. Tomorrow at 12:00
4 p.m. in the Caucus Room, I will be
5 hosting my annual Women on the Move
6 Women's History Month Luncheon from 12:00
7 to 2:00. So I invite all of my
8 Councilmembers and colleagues to come on
9 out and participate. Keynote speaker
10 will be Philly's own native Erin Coleman.
11 She's the reporter for NBC 10, but born
12 and raised in Philadelphia. She left and
13 came back.

14 Some of the notable women that
15 we will be honoring are Jane Golden from
16 the Mural Arts Program, Renee Cardwell
17 Hughes from the Red Cross, and other
18 notable women who are consistently doing
19 work, great work, here in the City of
20 Philadelphia.

21 But I just wanted to extend the
22 invitation to anyone who wants to come
23 past. And also your very own Shalimar
24 Blakely, who is running the North Broad
25 Renaissance Program as well.

2 So if anyone wants to come past
3 and shake hands with our awardees

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Green.

11 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
12 Council President. I want to thank my
13 colleagues for supporting and holding up
14 the photo for Light It Up Blue. As many
15 of you know, that April is Autism
16 Awareness Month. This Sunday, April 2nd
17 is World Autism Awareness Day. So
18 hopefully as you're moving and around the
19 City of Philadelphia, going to church,
20 make sure you wear blue and put posts on
21 social media #lightitupblue! for Autism
22 Speaks. So thank you for your support.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman. Will do.

25 The Chair recognizes

3 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
4 you, Council President. Next Wednesday,
5 we have our annual Council briefing with
6 the Utilities Emergency Fund. It's very
7 important, particularly in June we kick
8 off our new tap water affordability bill
9 legislated through this body.

10 I wanted this morning to talk a
11 little bit about -- I know the
12 apprehension that exists in the air
13 around this whole sanctuary cities
14 discussion, and on Monday and Tuesday I
15 was in New York with leaders from over 30
16 cities in a conference hosted by Local
17 Progress, which was founded by our
18 esteemed Councilmember Councilman Goode,
19 and now Councilwoman Gym serves as the
20 Vice President.

21 It's always very gratifying to
22 sit in a room of very intelligent,
23 progressive folks who really do care
24 about protecting and defending our
25 Constitution and the law.

2 It is really important that we
3 understand the national role that
4 Philadelphia plays in this debate since
5 the Constitution was written here and
6 this country was founded in this city.
7 Understanding our Tenth Amendment rights
8 and our Fourth Amendment rights of
9 individuals is hugely important, and for
10 this reason, I want to publicly thank the
11 Mayor for proactively seeking legal
12 counsel to research and prepare the City
13 to defend ourselves from what's going on
14 in Harrisburg and what's going on in
15 Washington.

16 We will continue to strongly
17 advocate for legislative and regulatory
18 measures that really do create a safe
19 city, so muni ID, municipal ID, and other
20 programs that really help make our city
21 safer.

22 Despite the national rhetoric,
23 data has confirmed to us what we all
24 know, sanctuary cities are safer. Let me
25 repeat that. Sanctuary cities are safer.

2 And they're cities that promote more
3 economic growth, particularly from our
4 immigrant communities and neighborhoods.

5 Despite the national rhetoric,
6 the law is on our side. Let me repeat
7 that. Despite the national rhetoric, the
8 law is on our side. We're going to
9 continue, as we always have, going to the
10 federal courts to protect and uphold our
11 laws. And we're watching it all over the
12 country as cities go and begin their suit
13 against the federal government actions.

14 I understand as legislators we
15 have a fiduciary responsibility to the
16 City, but as leaders, we have a greater
17 responsibility when we take the pledge
18 and our oath of office to uphold our laws
19 and our Constitution and in Philadelphia
20 our Charter.

21 There is a reason why
22 government doesn't negotiate with
23 terrorists or bullies. Because the
24 minute you engage them in a compromise,
25 you give their positions credence. There

2 is no compromising when we seek to
3 protect the laws and we seek to protect
4 unduly targeted people.

5 I have repeatedly stated in
6 these Chambers that we are on the right
7 side of history when it comes to this,
8 and for that reason, I thank my
9 colleagues for their continued support
10 and diligence around how do we govern and
11 how do we protect the laws.

12 I, along with Councilwoman Gym
13 and anyone else who is interested, do
14 want to organize a briefing for Council
15 and our staff to look at what's going on
16 across the country. We saw yesterday
17 Seattle filed a federal lawsuit in court.

18 We have a very capable social
19 justice legal community in the City of
20 Philadelphia, and what we need to talk
21 about is how do we arm them with the
22 resources so they can continue to protect
23 our residents and uphold the law.

24 We need to continue to support
25 our Mayor and our immigrant community

2 advocates as we proactively develop
3 strategies for what we all know is a
4 different world. Some of us sometimes
5 feel we're in the middle of a reality TV
6 series.

7 Just yesterday, the AFT and the
8 PFT sponsored a resource forum for
9 parents and teachers about knowing their
10 rights and what we do in our schools.

11 It's not easy to be leaders
12 during tough times. I have always been
13 proud of the work we've done in this
14 Council and how thoughtful we've been as
15 we try to protect and defend the laws
16 that we've taken a solemn oath to
17 protect.

18 We need to send a strong
19 message and know that we're not alone
20 across the country in defending our
21 Constitution.

22 So thank you very much, Council
23 President, for always supporting that
24 kind of work. I look forward to, again,
25 providing my Council colleagues with real

2 data. I know facts sometimes don't
3 matter in this new world, but facts do
4 matter and the data is on our side and
5 the law is on our side, and we have a
6 responsibility to just be as prepared as
7 possible to fight back what is a very
8 mean-spirited debate. People have a good
9 way of creating chaos. Chaos unnerves
10 people and creates a scenario that
11 bullies enjoy, which is scaring people.
12 As leaders, we have the obligation to let
13 folks know that we're going to be okay.
14 We're going to be okay.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

18 The Chair recognizes

19 Councilwoman Gym.

20 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
21 very much, Council President. And I
22 can't thank my colleague Councilwoman
23 Quinones-Sanchez enough for that
24 extraordinarily eloquent statement that
25 she gave. It was an honor to be in New

2 York City with dozens of elected
3 officials also very concerned about their
4 cities, very concerned about their
5 communities, but also very clear about
6 what's ahead.

7 This week in Chicago ICE broke
8 into the house of a legal permanent
9 residence seeking to mistakenly arrest a
10 U.S. citizen, guns blazing, shooting
11 somebody. And the Councilmember from
12 Chicago said that this is why we fight
13 back. Because we can't have this kind of
14 lawlessness in the guise of national
15 security being put out there, because in
16 fact when we don't have controls, when we
17 don't recognize that ICE requires
18 warrants, that we actually make our
19 cities less safer. And we've had reports
20 out of Los Angeles with rape victims and
21 victims of sexual assault and domestic
22 violence being afraid to report crimes.
23 We have situations where children are
24 afraid to go to school, where people who
25 are sick are afraid to go to the

2 hospital. None of those things makes our
3 country safer. None of those things
4 makes our -- doesn't make us more
5 American in any way, shape or form. In
6 fact, it's the exact opposite.

7 Sanctuary policies were put in
8 place because they uphold the law,
9 because they enforce responsible
10 protections for our residents from all
11 status, and that we have aspiring -- we
12 have new Americans and aspiring citizens
13 in this country who deserve a chance at
14 immigration reform that has been lacking
15 for over 20 years. And Congress should
16 get down to the heart, nuts and bolts of
17 immigration reform, get people into
18 citizenship and end this war on our
19 communities and our cities.

20 But it was no surprise that 72
21 hours after our President suffers the
22 most humiliating defeat in Congress over
23 a bill that he failed to get through that
24 the first thing that they would do on
25 Monday would be to pick up and try to

2 threaten and scapegoat immigrants. So
3 the divisiveness is clear. The rhetoric
4 is not something that we're going to play
5 into.

6 I really want to thank my
7 Council colleagues for having the smarts
8 and the courage to stand strong in these
9 times. We're not alone, as my Council
10 colleague said. The law is on our side.
11 There are a lot of smart people who are
12 working on this, not only in the White
13 House, and we're going to be serious
14 about taking this forward.

15 I also just would like to
16 invite my colleagues with myself and
17 Councilwoman Cindy Bass, we're holding a
18 community meeting about the issue of
19 evictions that are happening across our
20 city. That will happen on April 5th at
21 6:00 p.m. at New Covenant Church. We
22 expect a great turnout and a lot of
23 dialogue and healthy dialogue about
24 discussing the importance of addressing
25 evictions in our city.

4 Thank you, Councilwoman.

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman
6 Domb.

7 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
8 Council President. I just want to give a
9 30-second to a minute overview of what
10 we've seen so far this week as far as the
11 budget is concerned. And I sit here and
12 say to myself, we're like a Board of
13 Directors of a \$4.3 billion company
14 called the City of Philadelphia, and
15 we're looking at in 2022 -- I mentioned
16 this earlier -- our fringe benefits, just
17 fringe alone, going to 91 cents of every
18 dollar from where it is in 2016 of 77
19 cents. We're looking at borrowing costs
20 increasing to 65 percent in the next six
21 years. That's huge. Huge. I just want
22 everybody to be aware of this. And then
23 we're faced with a bond rating that was
24 slightly adjusted in September. And they
25 say the three biggest issues of our bond

2 rating are fund balance, pensions, and
3 expansion of our tax base. And so our
4 fund balance is low. Our pensions need
5 to be funded dramatically. They're very
6 low. We need to address those issues.
7 Those are the big pieces to me in this
8 puzzle of the budget.

9 I just wanted to share that
10 with everyone, because I am concerned.
11 I'm concerned about the amount of
12 spending we're doing. I'm concerned
13 about the amount of borrowing we're
14 doing, and I'm worried about 2022 and the
15 years after that. So I just wanted to
16 put that on the record.

17 Thank you, Council President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 That concludes our speeches on
21 behalf of the majority and minority.

22 The Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for a motion
24 to adjourn.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes. I
