3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
6 We're going to start now. I'd ask all  
7 the guests and visitors to please retire  
8 behind the rail, and as soon as the  
9 members take their seats, we'll get  
10 started.

11 To give our invocation this  
12 morning, the Chair recognizes Reverend  
13 William Shaw of White Rock Baptist Church  
14 of Philadelphia. He is here today --  
15 somebody giving shout-outs?

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: He  
18 is here today as the guest of  
19 Councilwoman Blackwell.

20 I would ask all members,  
21 guests, and visitors to please rise.

22 (Councilmembers and guests  
23 rise.)

24 REVEREND SHAW: Council  
25 Chairperson, Councilmembers, White Rock,

2           and Chamber guests, let us pray.

3                       From the founding documents of  
4           our country we hear, we hold these truths  
5           to be self-evident, that all men are  
6           created equal, that they are endowed by  
7           their Creator with certain unalienable  
8           rights. To secure these rights,  
9           government is instituted among men.

10                      Our city identifies herself by  
11           name as a people, place of brotherly  
12           love. The noted late black theologian  
13           Howard Thurman said challengingly that  
14           love is the willing of the well-being of  
15           the other and that hate is the willing of  
16           the none being of the other.

17                      Oh, Gracious God, under the  
18           umbrella of these ideals, we pray the  
19           presence of your spirit and power within  
20           and upon the governing people and places  
21           of this country and city and, at this  
22           moment especially, upon the people and  
23           places of this legislative Chamber, to  
24           the end that the moral claims of the  
25           country's and the City's very being and

3 are represented here will be boldly and

10 never none being to any.

11 We pray all this in the name of  
12 Jesus.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. The next order of business is

13                   (Aye.)

14                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15          Those opposed?

16                   (No response.)

17                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
18          ayes have it, and the Journal is  
19          approved.

20                   The next order of business is  
21          requests for leaves of absence, and the  
22          Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

23                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
24          Mr. President. On behalf of the  
25          majority, there are no requests of leave

5 The Chair now recognizes  
6 Councilman O'Neill.

7 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
8 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
9 republicans, there are no requests for  
10 leave of absence.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
12 Chair thanks the gentleman.

13 At this time, I would like to  
14 welcome everyone who has taken time out  
15 of their busy day to come down to witness  
16 their government in action. We really  
17 appreciate you coming down. We hope your  
18 stay here today is a pleasurable one and  
19 a knowledgeable one, so much so that you  
20 come back again. So, again, thank you so  
21 much for being here today.

22 At this time, the Chair  
23 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who  
24 will present a resolution honoring

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
11 joining the Councilwoman, we have  
12 Councilman Oh, Councilwoman Gym,  
13 Councilman Jones, Councilwoman Reynolds  
14 Brown, and Councilman Green.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:  
16 Mr. President and members of Council, I  
17 have one question to ask. Is White Rock  
18 in the house?

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Stand  
21 so they can see who you are.

22 (White Rock guests standing.)

23 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Say to  
24 my colleagues, that whole section behind  
25 us is all White Rock.

2                   I would like to say that I had  
3 something to do with this, but let me  
4 tell you that before Lucien Blackwell was  
5 Thomas W. Blackwell, and his father was  
6 the one who helped forge the relationship  
7 between White Rock and the Blackwell  
8 family. So I am truly honored that all  
9 of you are here.

10                   And let me say, Reverend and  
11 Mrs. James S. Allen, Vine Memorial, raise  
12 your hand so they know.

13                   (Applause.)

14                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:  
15 Everybody knows them as well.

16                   So I am sure on this past  
17 weekend in Coatesville was funeralized  
18 the last Blackwell of that generation,  
19 Jean Foster, and your pastor, as all of  
20 you know, was there. No matter what  
21 happens, we are always together. And I  
22 know all nine of them and the two who  
23 died early are up there looking down  
24 saying thank you and being honored that  
25 we are all here together. God bless you

5 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

6 Resolution adding Reverend William J.  
7 Shaw Way to the street signs on the 100  
8 and 200 blocks of South 53rd Street  
9 between Chestnut and Walnut Streets in  
10 recognition of Reverend Shaw's 60  
11 remarkable years of ministry and service  
12 to the West Philadelphia Community.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: That's three  
14 blocks outside my district, but maker of  
15 presidents, governors, mayors,  
16 councilpeople, and state reps.

17 Whereas, William J. Shaw was  
18 born in Marshall, Texas as the youngest  
19 of six children. At a young age, he  
20 dedicated his life to serving God. He  
21 was baptized at the age of seven, served  
22 as supply pastor to his home church at  
23 the age of fifteen and was ordained as  
24 Pastor of Oak Hill Baptist Church by  
25 seventeen; and

2                   COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas,  
3 Reverend Shaw considers his work as a  
4 Pastor his highest calling. In 1956 he  
5 was called to serve as Pastor of the  
6 White Rock Baptist Church in  
7 Philadelphia, a position he still  
8 maintains after 60 years; and

9                   COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,  
10 on September 9th, 1999, Dr. Shaw was  
11 elected the sixteenth President of The  
12 National Baptist Convention USA,  
13 Incorporated. Dr. Shaw was reelected to  
14 the Convention presidency in September  
15 2004. Dr. Shaw completed his second term  
16 as President of the Convention in 2009;  
17 and

18                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
19 Reverend Shaw has been recognized  
20 nationally and internationally for his  
21 service. In 2009 our President,  
22 President Barack H. Obama, appointed  
23 Dr. Shaw to the President's Advisory  
24 Council on Faith-Based and Neighborhood  
25 Partnerships and in 2010 appointed him as

2           a Commissioner on the United States  
3           Commission on International Religious  
4           Freedom. Dr. Shaw was reappointed by  
5           President Barack Obama in 2013 to serve a  
6           second term as a Commissioner on the  
7           USCIRF Committee; and

8                   COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, in  
9           addition to his work as Pastor, Reverend  
10          Shaw has been recognized as a leader in  
11          other areas. He serves as the Chairman  
12          of the Trustee Board of the Hospital of  
13          the University of Pennsylvania and is a  
14          member ex officio on the Board of Penn  
15          Medicine. He served on the Board of  
16          Directors of Junior Achievement of  
17          Delaware Valley, Incorporated. He has  
18          membership in the Philadelphia Rotary;  
19          Martin Luther King, Jr. Fellows in Black  
20          Church Studies; Community Legal Services  
21          in Philadelphia; and the Airport Advisory  
22          Board. He has also served as Executive  
23          Director of the Opportunities  
24          Industrialization Center; and

25                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,

2           Dr. Shaw is married to Camellia L. Shaw.

3           They are the parents to one son, Timothy,

4           grandparents to two daughters, Lillian

5           and Brittany, and great-grandparents to

6           two great-granddaughters, Zanaira and

7           Nyela; and

8                        COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,

9           above all else, Reverend Shaw is a man of

10          God that seeks to serve God daily.

11          Despite his many achievements, Reverend

12          Shaw has consistently maintained that his

13          highest and most sacred calling has been

14          as Pastor to the people of God.

15                       COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Now,

16          therefore, be it resolved, that the

17          Philadelphia City Council hereby adds

18          Reverend William J. Shaw Way to the

19          street sign on the 100 and 200 blocks of

20          South 53rd Street between Chestnut and

21          Walnut Streets in recognition of Reverend

22          Shaw's 60 remarkable years of ministry

23          and service to the West Philadelphia

24          Community.

25                       COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: And I want

2           to say it's truly an honor to have the  
3           opportunity to participate in honoring  
4           Reverend Shaw, who I had the opportunity  
5           to learn about his leadership in the  
6           faith-based community and organizing here  
7           in the City of Philadelphia under my  
8           mentor, the former State Senator Hardy  
9           Williams, and also my Pastor, James A.  
10          Lovett from Tasker Street Baptist Church.

11                   Further resolved, that an  
12          engrossed copy of this resolution be  
13          presented to the Reverend William J. Shaw  
14          and his family as a sincere expression of  
15          the Philadelphia City Council's gratitude  
16          and recognition. And say  
17          congratulations.

18                           (Standing ovation.)

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
20          at this time, the Chair recognizes  
21          Reverend Shaw for remarks.

22                   REVEREND SHAW: Thank you very  
23          much, Mr. Chairman and to all the  
24          Councilmembers and to the members of the  
25          church and others who may be present. I

2           am deeply appreciative of this action of  
3           the Council.

4                        I said to the White Rock Church  
5           when they told me of this that I am  
6           comfortable with my name on the street  
7           sign, because on that same corner there  
8           is a name and a symbol above the church  
9           and, therefore, above us all. On the  
10          tower of the church there's the name  
11          White Rock Baptist, but above the tower  
12          is a cross. So that my name is beneath  
13          that church name and beneath the  
14          church -- above the church name is the  
15          symbol of our faith.

16                      And so in that spirit, I say  
17          thank you, and thank you very much to  
18          Councilwoman Blackwell. The Blackwell  
19          family has been a vital part of the White  
20          Rock Church throughout my years there.  
21          The tower name and the tower cross were  
22          presented to the church by the son, a  
23          member of the Blackwell family, Charles  
24          Blackwell. So that whenever we look, we  
25          see a reminder of our heritage.

9 Since that time, we've seen lots of

10 headlines by environmental groups, "Clean

11 Cars Under Attack," "Anti-Clean Car

12 Legislation," "Bill 170093 Will Gut

13 Philadelphia's Electric Vehicle Parking

14 Law."

15 The Philadelphia Crosstown

16 Coalition supports Bill 170093-A. We are

17 not opposed to electric vehicles. We

18 believe that use of electric vehicles

19 should be encouraged. The problem is

20 that the existing legislation takes a

21 public good, an on-street parking place,

22 and effectively privatizes it for the use

23 of a single person, the person who

24 controls the electric switch.

25 We would have no problem with

4                     The last few weeks have been a  
5           whirlwind, and I've worked to oppose Bill  
6           179003 [sic] as written, and I appreciate  
7           the advice of the legislative staff.

8                     The most important lesson I've  
9           learned is that the details of this bill  
10          should have been hammered out in  
11          committee with the bill sponsors. The  
12          hard work to correct a commonsense bill  
13          was never done, and the voices most  
14          knowledgeable regarding EV use and the  
15          impact of this moratorium were never  
16          invited to the table.

17                    The most harmful piece of this  
18          bill altering the ten-year established EV  
19          parking program hours was done in a  
20          haphazard fashion without thinking  
21          through the implications to current and  
22          future EV use with two last-minute  
23          amendments.

24                    Crosstown Coalition's support  
25          is often cited as a reason to approve

2 this bill as written. The member civics  
3 supporting the moratorium were never  
4 properly informed of its hardship to  
5 current EV use or its citywide impact to  
6 charger installations. The 23 civics out  
7 of those 14 simply voted for an end to  
8 the installation of private chargers in  
9 public spaces, which I agree is a program  
10 that cannot continue. While that is a  
11 majority of the organization, two civics  
12 in densely crowded areas did not support  
13 this. Passyunk Square abstained and East  
14 Point Breeze voted no. Seven weren't  
15 able to vote. Citing unanimous support  
16 of the Crosstown Coalition does not  
17 fairly represent the members of that  
18 organization.

19 The cited logic that this  
20 moratorium is needed to implement a  
21 future program is a smoke screen.  
22 Nothing is preventing the creation of  
23 robust shared EV charging infrastructure  
24 today other than a commitment to do so.

25 When national politicians use

2           shenanigans like this with legislation,  
3           we have no trouble calling it as we see  
4           it. It should be no different with our  
5           City officials.

6                     The PPA is not accepting new  
7           applications, so taking a few weeks to  
8           create a thoughtful moratorium bill that  
9           preserves the current progress made for  
10          EVs and protects the future's success of  
11          the new program makes good common sense.  
12          Cancelling the EV program today without  
13          safeguarding a future replacement program  
14          is bad policy and sends a clear message  
15          to the EV industry that Philadelphia is  
16          not committed to expanding its EV  
17          infrastructure and is not a safe bet for  
18          them to invest in.

19                    Today we have simple rules to  
20          finding EV parking when it's needed and  
21          the PPA to enforce it as intended. I am  
22          begging you to consider your vote  
23          carefully. If the bill before you today  
24          was a good one, one you should vote for,  
25          why is there opposition? Why have two

2           additional bills cropped up to address  
3           its shortcoming? Why have your  
4           colleagues refused to include reasonable  
5           compromises with this bill to build an  
6           end date to the moratorium, allow the EV  
7           charging permits to proceed citywide, and  
8           preserve the 24-hour EV parking access?

9                       EV cars in Philadelphia cannot  
10          be lost to a neighborhood turf war over  
11          parking. Cleaning up pollution that is  
12          plaguing our city is more important.

13                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14          Thank you for your testimony.

15                       (Applause.)

16                       CHIEF CLERK: Lorna

17          Katz-Lawson, commenting on 170093-A.

18                       (Witness approached podium.)

19                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
20          morning.

21                       MS. KATZ-LAWSON: My name is  
22          Lorna Katz-Lawson and I'm a member -- a  
23          Board member of the Society Hill Civic  
24          Association, which is also a member of  
25          the Crosstown Coalition who did support

2           this amendment.

3                         We'd like to thank Council  
4           President Clarke, members of Council,  
5           especially Councilman Mark Squilla and  
6           David Oh, for this opportunity to testify  
7           on behalf of the electric vehicle parking  
8           permit moratorium. You've both strongly  
9           supported us in this current situation.

10                        We'd like to point out that we  
11           enthusiastically support clean vehicles,  
12           incentivizing them in the City and all  
13           the efforts to achieve cleaner water and  
14           air, but we also support the proposed  
15           moratorium for the reasons that were  
16           previously noted, that it's a very  
17           undemocratic allocation and it's not an  
18           equal opportunity type of situation.

19                        We believe that this bill is  
20           just a starter for a conversation to get  
21           very -- in a good grasp on issues across  
22           the City on parking, because in every  
23           neighborhood it's an issue, and to find  
24           ways to make public access as most other  
25           cities, more sophisticated cities, have

2 done considering the newer developments  
3 and technology that we now have.

4 Our neighborhood in particular  
5 has had impacts that some blocks have  
6 three or four spaces in front of private  
7 homes. We have cases where residents  
8 needing handicap parking have been turned  
9 down because the permits for the number  
10 of EV spaces already on the block have  
11 taken up the spaces.

12 Our residents have been loud  
13 and clear on this appropriation of public  
14 good for private use should not continue.

15 I'll skip my other thing here  
16 since I'm out of time.

17 In closing, we support the  
18 moratorium and the creation of an  
19 infrastructure of public off-street  
20 charging stations available to all  
21 residents. We look forward to an  
22 opportunity to review and comment on  
23 future recommendations.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
25 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

3 And I think you already have the  
4 testimony up there.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Davis Dure,  
8 commenting on 170093-A.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
11 morning.

12 MS. DURE: Good morning.

13 There is a curbside EV charging  
14 station on East Gorgas Lane in Mount Airy  
15 near where I live. It has no reserved  
16 parking signs, just a single post the  
17 size of a parking meter. What I learned  
18 about this charging station, I realized  
19 that even though I didn't have a garage  
20 or driveway, I could still have an  
21 electric car. Then when I learned about  
22 the new Chevy Bolt, Motor Trend's 2017  
23 Car of the Year, I realized now was the  
24 time. Then I learned about this  
25 moratorium and that it applies to me even

2 though I don't need a reserved space. I  
3 have always been able to park in the same  
4 spot right in front of our house.

5 I called my Councilwoman and  
6 Councilman David Oh to ask for an  
7 exemption in this moratorium for people  
8 who don't need a reserved space. As a  
9 result, I understand that a separate bill  
10 has been introduced that would allow  
11 this. However, I think that the bill  
12 you're voting on today should include  
13 this provision in the spirit of repeal  
14 and replace in the same bill.

15 Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Adam Garber,  
18 commenting on 170093-A.

19 (Witness approached podium.)

20 MR. GARBER: Thank you. My  
21 name is Adam Garber. I'm the Deputy  
22 Director for PennEnvironment. We are  
23 opposed to 170093-A as it currently  
24 stands, and on behalf of our 20,000  
25 supporters inside the City, we hope you

2           will go back and revisit it.

3                     The issue here in many ways is  
4           about air pollution. Today our report  
5           showed that 79 days in Philadelphia are  
6           unsafe to breathe the air in one year.  
7           That's one out of every four days we are  
8           causing asthma attacks, heart attacks,  
9           respiratory problems, and a significant  
10          amount of that pollution comes from cars  
11          and light trucks on our roads.

12                    We as a city need to be moving  
13          forward full steam on reducing emissions  
14          by encouraging electric vehicles, not  
15          standing in the way of the progress in  
16          front of us. And while I understand as a  
17          resident of South Philadelphia the  
18          concerns over parking, as having I drove  
19          around for 20 minutes last night looking  
20          for a parking spot, the reality is this  
21          idea of putting in place a moratorium  
22          will not solve this problem.

23                    The existing 60 parking spots  
24          we are talking about will still be there  
25          on the streets of people's concern, and

2           in the meantime, there will be no way to  
3           encourage new electric vehicle parking  
4           spots.

5                         We would hope that City Council  
6           would hold the legislation and come up,  
7           as the previous speaker said, with a  
8           repeal maybe and replace, but something  
9           that actually solves the problem and  
10          allows us to move forward on the electric  
11          vehicles that every single speaker today  
12          has said they support. Can we put in  
13          public electric vehicle charging spots  
14          throughout every part of every  
15          neighborhood in the City? That would be  
16          a good process, and then end this  
17          program. But until such proposals are  
18          considered, discussed, debated, bringing  
19          in outside stakeholders and citizens, we  
20          should not put an end to the only option  
21          for getting cleaner cars on the road to  
22          make sure that everyone in the City can  
23          breathe a little bit easier.

24                         So we hope you will vote  
25          against this bill or put it on hold so

2           those discussions and a full solution to  
3           the electric vehicle charging station  
4           issue within the City can be decided upon  
5           that will allow us to get cleaner cars.

6                     Thank you.

7                     (Applause.)

8                     CHIEF CLERK: Gretchen  
9           Dahlkemper, commenting on 170093-A.

10                    (Witness approached podium.)

11                    MS. DAHLKEMPER: Good morning.  
12           My name is Gretchen Dahlkemper, and as  
13           the Director of Clean Air Moms Action, I  
14           represent over one million parents across  
15           the United States united to protect our  
16           children from toxic air pollution.

17                    Most importantly, I'm a mom in  
18           Point Breeze to three kids - Reinaldo,  
19           Fiona, and Declan. Fiona is five years  
20           old and she suffered her first asthma  
21           attack at just ten months. Watching your  
22           baby turn blue and struggle to breathe is  
23           something that no parent should ever  
24           witness.

25                    We lived just two blocks from

2 I-95 in Pennsport, Councilman Squilla's  
3 district. As we talked to health  
4 professionals and our doctor, we realized  
5 that the air pollution from the cars and  
6 I-95 was going to make the increase --  
7 possibly cause increases in asthma  
8 attacks in my baby. So we moved to Point  
9 Breeze, and I'm happily represented now  
10 by Councilman Kenyatta Johnson. We moved  
11 there so that we can eliminate that close  
12 proximity to the highway and decrease the  
13 pollution from cars. But we still  
14 receive a failing grade all across  
15 Philadelphia.

16 I fully acknowledge that the  
17 current law needs to be revised and  
18 improved, as the EV market has changed  
19 drastically over the past ten years, but  
20 putting a permanent moratorium without a  
21 plan in place is totally irresponsible of  
22 this body and it sends a message to the  
23 industry that Pennsylvania, the entire  
24 state, is closed for business if the  
25 largest city eliminates the pathway,

2           however imperfect, for EV ownership  
3           without a new plan in place.

4                       My son is seven. He attends  
5           public school in South Philly. Like his  
6           mom, he finds it nearly impossible to sit  
7           down and be quite, but because he has  
8           amazing teachers, he has special  
9           considerations put in place. He gets to  
10          stand up if he's feeling antsy so that he  
11          can stay in the classroom and learn. But  
12          we always have to reevaluate his  
13          behavior, as things change, as  
14          circumstances change, but we don't stop  
15          the rules. We don't stop the  
16          circumstances, special circumstances, for  
17          the other kids with ADHD in his class as  
18          we reevaluate his behavior. We  
19          reevaluate it together and then we come  
20          up with a new plan and implement it.  
21          That's all we're asking you to do here  
22          today.

23                      This bill eliminates the  
24          pathway, flawed as it is, the pathway  
25          nonetheless, for Philadelphia residents

2           to buy an electric vehicle. It  
3           eliminates the pathway without first  
4           bringing the stakeholders to the table.

5                     I spoke with Tesla on Friday.  
6           I spoke with them on Monday. I spoke  
7           with them on Tuesday. They can get here  
8           next week. I've asked Councilman Oh to  
9           hold the bill until Tesla, arguably one  
10          of the most famous electric vehicle car  
11          manufacturers, can come to Philadelphia  
12          and talk to members of Council from  
13          California, and he has refused.

14                    Bring the stakeholders to the  
15          table before you vote on this bill.

16                    I ask City Council to vote no  
17          and work with the stakeholders here  
18          today, industry, the residents who are  
19          impacted. This maybe is an issue in  
20          certain areas. It is not an issue in  
21          Point Breeze, but I hope that we can come  
22          up with a plan that for residents like  
23          myself in Point Breeze, that we can have  
24          a comprehensive plan that works for  
25          everyone, whether they own an electric

2 vehicle or not.

3 Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 MS. DAHLKEMPER: I would also  
6 like to add to the record, I have a  
7 letter from 16 different organizations,  
8 faith, public health, parents, and  
9 environmental organizations representing  
10 over 100,000 people here in the City of  
11 Philadelphia.

12 (Applause.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Mary Pisculli.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 MS. PISCULLI: Hello again.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on  
17 170093-A.

18 MS. PISCULLI: Hello. I'm Mary  
19 Pisculli, and I have already provided  
20 testimony showing that the hours  
21 restrictions would restrict the ability  
22 for me to use my vehicle, as it requires  
23 charging twice a day. But I have also  
24 provided written testimony and I have  
25 several other owners showing that given

2 our cars' technology and the warnings  
3 that come with our vehicles' manuals,  
4 that proper maintenance of our cars to  
5 maintain a charge during cold weather.

6 This means the car has to remain plugged  
7 in when it's freezing temperatures or the  
8 battery can be irreversibly damaged. We  
9 also have a similar warning in hot  
10 weather. And if you'll know, these  
11 weather extremes are about more than half  
12 the year in Philadelphia.

13 These time restrictions are not  
14 merely an inconvenience. They are  
15 incompatible with EV ownership in the  
16 City and all its environmental benefits.  
17 These proposed restrictions were not  
18 based on parking needs or on prior  
19 testimony even from ChargePoint.

20 When I e-mailed the sponsors, I  
21 was told the policy has become a draw  
22 essentially for those interested in  
23 owning a parking space more so than they  
24 are interested in owning an electric  
25 vehicle.

2 To me that sounds like this  
3 restriction was meant to be punitive, and  
4 I am not sure how they know what my  
5 motivation was to buy a car. I have put  
6 my money where my conscience is. I have  
7 put my money where my mouth is. It is  
8 not lip service to want cleaner air for  
9 all when we consider paying more for  
10 electric vehicles, when we consider  
11 paying more for electricity through an  
12 energy co-op that uses wind farm energy  
13 than the default less costly PECO  
14 provider.

15 By undoing this program, EVs  
16 will exclusively be owned, by the way  
17 these bills are set up, by people who  
18 live either outside the City and have  
19 driveways or have the means to a private  
20 garage.

21 Electric vehicles support the  
22 greater good of cleaner air. I know this  
23 was made clear by my colleagues who have  
24 spoken today. This Council made a  
25 commitment to all citizens by supporting

2           electric vehicles. This amendment and  
3           bill are shortsighted. They undercut  
4           this promise. It undercuts the  
5           credibility of this Council when it  
6           sponsors an initiative. Citizens respond  
7           to the call and then the Council pulls  
8           the rug out from underneath them.

9                         Please stand firm in your  
10           promise of a cleaner Philadelphia.  
11           Please vote against this bill and  
12           amendment.

13                         (Applause.)

14                         CHIEF CLERK: Matt Walker,  
15           commenting on 170093-A.

16                         (Witness approached podium.)

17                         MR. WALKER: Hi. My name is  
18           Matt Walker and I'm the Advocacy Director  
19           for Clean Air Council. The Council is a  
20           non-profit environmental health  
21           organization whose mission is to protect  
22           everyone's right to breathe clean air.  
23           The Council has 8,000 paying members and  
24           almost 30,000 advocates, including many  
25           in Philadelphia.

2 Council Bill 170093, which you  
3 are being asked to vote on today, will  
4 gut Philadelphia's electric vehicle  
5 parking law, which currently allows  
6 residents to pay for and install an  
7 electrical vehicle charging station in  
8 their neighborhood. This tool is  
9 critical to create the infrastructure we  
10 need to expand electric vehicles.

11 Council Bill 170093 is an  
12 anti-environmental and anti-public health  
13 bill. We live in a country, state, and  
14 city where the cars came. Yet the car is  
15 also one of the main sources of air  
16 pollution that harms Philadelphia  
17 residents. Cars and truck pollution  
18 contribute to ground level ozone, which  
19 is the main component of smog,  
20 particulate pollution, hazardous air  
21 pollution, and greenhouse gases.

22 Encouraging electric cars should be a  
23 high priority for this legislative body.  
24 Clean Air Council received Councilman  
25 Oh's justification for why he is

2           determined to move forward with this  
3           legislation. Respectfully, the  
4           justification does not make any sense.

5                         Certainly the sponsors of this  
6           bill are right that much more needs to be  
7           done to allow for the orderly expansion  
8           of electric cars in the City, but doing  
9           away with the one program that presently  
10          incentivizes electric cars in  
11          Philadelphia while hoping some day to  
12          come up with a better and more  
13          comprehensive plan -- and that's a  
14          quote -- makes absolutely no sense at  
15          all.

16                        The Council urges you to not  
17          kill this program simply because one day  
18          you hope to come up with a better one.  
19          Our challenge, the City Council today, is  
20          to do your homework and develop the  
21          better plan that's called for to expand  
22          electric cars in Philadelphia and then  
23          implement that program as quickly as  
24          possible. Until then, leave the existing  
25          program in place. The Council will

2           gladly work with members of City Council  
3           in developing a more comprehensive  
4           program for electric cars.

5                     At a time when we are seeing  
6           the environment under constant attack by  
7           President Trump, it is deeply  
8           disappointing that we have to come here  
9           today to urge Philadelphia City Council  
10          to not roll back an existing  
11          environmental program.

12                     (Applause.)

13                     MR. WALKER: I'm attaching as  
14          part of my testimony an article from  
15          reporter Inga Saffron that does a good  
16          job of covering the issue. I handed it  
17          in up front. So please take a look, and  
18          thank you for your time and  
19          consideration.

20                     (Applause.)

21                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22          Thank you for your testimony.

23                     CHIEF CLERK: Richard Yoka,  
24          commenting on 170093-A.

25                     (Witness approached podium.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning.

4 MR. YOKA: Good morning. Good  
5 morning, Council. Thank you for having  
6 me. I want to thank Councilman David Oh,  
7 Councilman Squilla for agreeing to put  
8 this amendment forth.

9 Ten years this law has been  
10 into place, from what I've heard this  
11 morning, and I want to thank everyone who  
12 testified. Good points. The fact of the  
13 matter is, we have people buying cars to  
14 have parking spots in front of their  
15 houses. We'll hear all the testimony you  
16 want. Clean air, I'm all for it. I walk  
17 to work. My phone tells me I've done  
18 three miles each day. But I also drive  
19 around with my mother-in-law, who is 80  
20 years old, when we're delivering  
21 groceries to her home because we can't  
22 get a parking spot in the Fairmount  
23 community.

24 I'm not saying do away with  
25 electric parking or charging stations,

2           but what complex -- what is complexing  
3           about this law is why does someone need  
4           seven days a week, 24 hours a day to  
5           charge their car? The vehicles today,  
6           they don't need that long -- that  
7           duration to charge. Give them two days.  
8           Let them pick two days.

9                     Thank you so much for your time  
10           today.

11                     (Applause.)

12                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
13           Thank you for your testimony.

14                     CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,  
15           commenting on 170320.

16                     (Witness approached podium.)

17                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
18           afternoon.

19                     MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.  
20           This is an official decree of the people  
21           in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as  
22           such, requires immediate action.

23                     It is tax time. The people  
24           expect the government to spend wisely,  
25           but the RDA, as you well know for the

2           year and a half I've been testifying,  
3           receives boatloads of money from the  
4           federal and state coffers. You  
5           elected -- you are elected to monitor  
6           these funds and required by the oath to  
7           obey, defend, and support the  
8           Constitutions and laws.

9                         Why in the face of numerous  
10           allegations of laws violated does Council  
11           and the Mayor not act? They're sitting  
12           there acting like stuffed animals and not  
13           doing a damn thing. This is not what you  
14           are paid handsomely to do.

15                         Jefferson stated in 1804, When  
16           corruption has prevailed in these  
17           offices, be alive to bring punishment and  
18           the brand of eternal disgrace to every  
19           man guilty of it, whatsoever his station.

20                         Following the rule of law is  
21           not optional. The Constitution requires  
22           immediate remedy of the breach of law.  
23           Your oath of office requires you to act  
24           or go to prison.

25                         42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,

1           4/6/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA  
3           Constitution, Article I, Sections 1  
4           through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 708, 709, 712,  
5           713, 716, other laws listed in SCOTUS  
6           15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear  
7           violated.

8                       I call for the federal and  
9           Commonwealth governments to perform their  
10          constitutional obligations to investigate  
11          and prosecute all involved in the theft  
12          and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
13          1038 West Wyoming. The denial of  
14          God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for  
15          23 years is egregious, extraordinary,  
16          oath-violating, and requires immediate  
17          remedy.

18                      A just government must obey the  
19          rule of law. This color of law  
20          government must have its Charter to  
21          govern revoked until a constitutionally  
22          compliant government is installed.

23                      Public servants cannot refuse  
24          their sworn duty to act any more than a  
25          fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The

2           sovereign people require the Constitution  
3           and laws be enforced. Jail is required  
4           for all who violate oath of law.

5                     It takes a lot of cooperation  
6           to create and allow monumental  
7           corruption.

9           Thank you for your testimony.

10                    The Chair recognizes Councilman  
11           Jones. Councilman, you need to be  
12           recognized?

13                    COUNCILMAN JONES: I want to  
14           wait until the bill of question.

15                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16           That's coming up next.

17                    COUNCILMAN JONES: All right.

18                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So  
19           you want to wait until after --

20                    COUNCILMAN JONES: I want to  
21           wait, yes, sir.

22                    CHIEF CLERK: Benjamin Lerner,  
23           commenting on 170318-A.

24                    (Witness approached podium.)

25                    JUDGE LERNER: Thank you. Good

2 afternoon, Mr. Council President,  
3 Councilmembers. My name is Benjamin  
4 Lerner. I am the Deputy Managing  
5 Director for Criminal Justice, and I  
6 appreciate the opportunity to speak  
7 briefly here today in support of  
8 Council's resolution urging the  
9 Pennsylvania Legislature to reject the  
10 current proposal to renew mandatory  
11 minimum sentencing laws for Pennsylvania.

12 Mandatory minimum sentencing  
13 laws have had their day in this state and  
14 around the country, and what we've  
15 learned from them is basically two  
16 things. One is that they do absolutely  
17 nothing to further public safety. They  
18 don't make our communities any safer.  
19 What they do instead is to make our jails  
20 and prisons overflow with individuals  
21 who, from the point of view of public  
22 safety, do not need to be locked up.

23 Throughout this country and  
24 here in Philadelphia, Council, the  
25 Administration, the criminal justice

2 partners are engaged in efforts to  
3 reverse the effects, the long-term  
4 effects, of over-incarceration.

5 Mandatory minimum -- a return to  
6 mandatory minimum sentencing runs  
7 directly counter to those efforts.

8 What we've proved with  
9 mandatory minimum sentencing is that by  
10 taking sentencing discretion away from  
11 courts and putting it exclusively in the  
12 hands of prosecutors, we do not improve  
13 either justice or safety.

14 Our sentencing system in this  
15 country requires that the sentencer, the  
16 judicial authority, in a public  
17 proceeding consider not only the  
18 seriousness of the offense for which an  
19 offender has been convicted, but that  
20 that sentencing authority consider  
21 everything there is to know about the  
22 offender and that the sentencing be  
23 appropriate not only to the crime but to  
24 the offender.

25 Mandatory minimum sentencing

1           4/6/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           takes that power away from judges and  
3           puts it solely in the hands of the  
4           prosecutor, and nobody benefits from  
5           that. I can say that on the basis of a  
6           substantial amount of experience in  
7           various criminal justice positions.

8                     Thank you for your time.

9                     (Applause.)

10                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you for your testimony.

12                    The Chair recognizes Councilman  
13           Johnson.

14                    COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
15           Council President. I just wanted to take  
16           a moment to thank Judge Lerner for taking  
17           time out of his busy schedule just to  
18           come down here and be supportive of the  
19           resolution but, most importantly,  
20           providing insight from his expertise in  
21           serving as a judge and being on the bench  
22           as to the ramifications of reinstituting  
23           mandatory sentences here in the State of  
24           Pennsylvania.

25                    Thank you very much, Council

5 Mr. Decker.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Angus Love,

7 commenting on 170318.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
10 afternoon.

11 MR. LOVE: Good afternoon or  
12 morning, whatever it is. I thank you for  
13 the opportunity to speak. Angus Love in  
14 support of Councilmember Johnson's  
15 Resolution 170318. I'm the Executive  
16 Director of the Pennsylvania  
17 Institutional Law Project. We provide  
18 free civil legal services to the  
19 institutionalized people in Pennsylvania,  
20 of which there are over 100,000 persons  
21 in over 100 facilities. We are part of  
22 the Pennsylvania Legal Aid Network. I  
23 have been in this position for quite some  
24 time, and during that period, I have  
25 become familiar with many of the problems

2           that occur in our prisons and to the  
3           people held therein.

4                         Since 1980, the biggest problem  
5           facing the Pennsylvania Department of  
6           Corrections is prison overcrowding. Upon  
7           my first visit to the state correctional  
8           institute in 1980 at Graterford, there  
9           were 1,600 inmates in a 2,000-bed  
10          facility. If an inmate had a problem  
11          with a sink or a toilet, he just moved to  
12          another empty cell. All inmates were  
13          single-celled at that time. There were  
14          eight state prisons and the budget was  
15          \$200 million.

16                        Through the passage of  
17          mandatory sentencing, sentencing  
18          guidelines, and the war on drugs, that  
19          population has grown over sixfold, from  
20          8,000 to over 50,000. There are now 26  
21          facilities with an annual budget of \$2.2  
22          billion. Most inmates are double-celled,  
23          and in Philadelphia some are  
24          tripled-celled. The burden falls most  
25          frequently on people of color, who

2 comprise two-thirds of this population.

3 The tremendous strain on the  
4 prison system and staff have created many  
5 problems, such as poor sanitation,  
6 medical care, mental healthcare, and  
7 levels of violence.

8 Mandatory sentencing is the  
9 single most driving force behind mass  
10 incarceration. The legislators in  
11 Pennsylvania and around the country  
12 mistakenly believed that judges were too  
13 soft and not buying into the new war on  
14 drugs. Thus, the all-important  
15 sentencing function was taken from  
16 judges.

17 In my law school days many  
18 years ago, drugs and alcohol were viewed  
19 as public health problems and treated  
20 accordingly. President Richard Nixon,  
21 himself a convicted felon, started the  
22 war on drugs. Decades later there is  
23 near unanimous opinion that the so-called  
24 war is an extremely costly failure and a  
25 financial disaster. The 2008 recession

2           forced individuals to reexamine this  
3           issue.

4                       Recently Todd Stephens  
5           reintroduced House Bill 741, which seeks  
6           to reinstate mandatory sentencing, which  
7           was struck down by the Pennsylvania  
8           Supreme Court and the United States  
9           Supreme Court.

10                      We strongly urge that this  
11           legislation be defeated. As Judge Lerner  
12           pointed out, it has nothing to do with  
13           public safety and will only end up  
14           costing us more money.

15                      Thank you.

16                      (Applause.)

17                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18           Thank you for your testimony.

19                      CHIEF CLERK: Liz Randol,  
20           commenting on 170318.

21                      (Witness approached podium.)

22                      MS. RANDOL: Good afternoon,  
23           Council President Clarke and members of  
24           the Philadelphia City Council. My name  
25           is Elizabeth Randol. I'm the Legislative

2           Director for the ACLU of Pennsylvania.  
3           We thank you on behalf of our 44,000  
4           members. We thank you for the  
5           opportunity to provide some testimony  
6           today.

7                        The Pennsylvania House of  
8           Representatives passed legislation  
9           yesterday to restore the Commonwealth's  
10          mandatory minimum sentences. Introduced  
11          by Representative Todd Stephens of  
12          Montgomery County, House Bill 741  
13          reinstates many mandatory minimum  
14          sentences for drug offenses and for  
15          violent crimes.

16                       Mandatory minimums were  
17          invalidated in 2015 after the  
18          Pennsylvania Supreme Court, following the  
19          lead of the U.S. Supreme Court, ruled  
20          that the process used to impose them in  
21          criminal trials was constitutional.

22                       The American Civil Liberties  
23          Union of Pennsylvania opposes House Bill  
24          741 for the following five reasons:

25                       First, mandatory minimums

2 impede judicial discretion. Legislating  
3 mandatory minimum sentences prevents  
4 judges from performing their most  
5 fundamental role, making decisions based  
6 on the case before them. Judges do not  
7 need minimum sentence requirements. They  
8 look to Pennsylvania's existing  
9 sentencing guidelines for direction and  
10 apply those guidelines 90 percent of the  
11 time.

12 Two, there is also no evidence  
13 that mandatory minimums deter crime or  
14 prevent recidivism. The 2009  
15 Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing  
16 report concluded that it does neither of  
17 those. It does not deter crime nor  
18 prevent recidivism. Among their findings  
19 was that most Pennsylvanians cannot name  
20 a single offense that carries a mandatory  
21 minimum sentence nor the sentence that  
22 accompanies such an offense. And if 66  
23 percent of your fellow Pennsylvanians  
24 can't name such an offense, then it  
25 defies reason and established research

2           that mandatory minimums deter crime.

3                     Three, mandatory minimums  
4           balloon the prison population and  
5           increase costs. Last session the House  
6           Appropriations Committee estimated the  
7           fiscal impact of reinstating mandatory  
8           minimums could increase costs to the  
9           Commonwealth by as much as \$85 million  
10          annually due to approximately 2,200  
11          inmates having their sentences increased  
12          by four to six months as a result of the  
13          reinstatement of mandatory minimums.

14                    Four, the school zone provision  
15          disproportionately punishes people in  
16          cities. This bill includes the  
17          controversial school zone mandatory  
18          minimum sentence, which is triggered when  
19          drug offenses occur within 1,000 feet of  
20          the property of a school or university.  
21          It disproportionately affects people when  
22          crimes happen in cities. House Bill 741  
23          moves Pennsylvania backwards. This  
24          throwback bill puts Pennsylvania on a  
25          collision course with evidence-based

2 reform efforts that are now standard  
3 across the United States.

4 The courts gave us a gift when  
5 they overturned our mandatory minimum  
6 sentencing process. After several  
7 decades abusing mandatories, the evidence  
8 is in. They don't make the public safer,  
9 they are expensive, and they  
10 disproportionately impact people of  
11 color.

12 We're not going to resolve  
13 issues of public safety by resurrecting  
14 an ineffective sentencing regime that  
15 attempts to arrest our way out of a  
16 problem.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you for your testimony.

20 (Applause.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: The Chair  
22 recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank  
24 you, Mr. President. Mr. President, I

9 commenting on 170318.

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 MS. GREENLEE: Good afternoon,  
12 Council President --

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
14 afternoon.

15 MS. GREENLEE: -- and members  
16 of City Council. I'm Ellen Greenlee, a  
17 Board member and former Board Chair of  
18 the Pennsylvania Prison Society here in  
19 support of Councilman Johnson's  
20 resolution in opposition to House Bill  
21 741, which would restore certain  
22 mandatory minimum sentences in  
23 Pennsylvania.

24 Since 1787 -- this is our 230th  
25 year -- the Pennsylvania Prison Society

2           has advocated on behalf of people in  
3           prison and their families. The Society  
4           promotes humane and restorative  
5           corrections by serving thousands of  
6           returning citizens and their family  
7           members each year through direct services  
8           and programs.

9                        I am here today to lend our  
10           support to this resolution urging the  
11           Legislature to reject House Bill 741,  
12           which would reintroduce certain  
13           mandatories. For more than 30 years, the  
14           state has had a sentencing commission and  
15           sentencing guidelines to assist judges in  
16           fashioning an appropriate sentence for  
17           anyone convicted of a crime. In my 41  
18           years as a Public Defender in  
19           Philadelphia, I never observed any judge  
20           incapable of imposing a sentence without  
21           the use of mandatory minimums.

22                       In this era of increasing  
23           concern about mass incarceration, which  
24           disproportionately affects our citizens  
25           of color, we have finally seen a decline

2 in our state prison population, in part  
3 due to the end of mandatory minimums, as  
4 confirmed by John Wetzel, the Secretary  
5 of Corrections. Creditable research over  
6 the years suggest that mandatory minimum  
7 sentences do not deter crime. They do  
8 not enhance public safety. Rather, they  
9 increase sentence lengths and tremendous  
10 costs to the criminal justice system and  
11 innumerable Pennsylvania families.

12 Restoring mandatory minimums will turn  
13 back the tide of our declining prison  
14 population at a time when there is no  
15 evidence that mandatories are effective  
16 in terms of public safety.

17 At this time, while they are  
18 off the books, crime rates have not gone  
19 up. So it makes no sense to bring them  
20 back, only to needlessly and expensively  
21 fill prison cells.

22 We at the Prison Society join  
23 in opposition to the reintroduction of  
24 mandatory minimum sentences with our City  
25 Council representatives, the Pennsylvania

4                   Council President, according to  
5 the Pew Charitable Trusts' report  
6 published in 2015, they issued a research  
7 brief stating, Federal drug sentencing  
8 laws bring high cost, low return.  
9 Penalty increases enacted in the 1980s  
10 and 1990s have not reduced drug use or  
11 recidivism.

12                   I'd like to take a moment to  
13 underscore the importance of this issue  
14 and to acknowledge the broad coalition  
15 working on it. Mandatory minimums lead  
16 directly to mass incarceration. The  
17 evidence is that they not only fail to  
18 enhance public safety, they also  
19 undermine it. Too many lives and too  
20 many taxpayer dollars are wasted on  
21 warehousing men and women who simply need  
22 guidance and support and opportunity.

23                   I want to take a moment to  
24 personally acknowledge my colleague  
25 Councilman Curtis Jones, who is Chairman

2           of the Public Safety Committee but also  
3           Chairman of the Criminal Justice Reform  
4           Committee, who has been a tireless voice  
5           for criminal justice reform here in  
6           Philadelphia and across the state. I

8           also Council President Darrell Clarke,  
9           who has made mass incarceration a central  
10          focus of not only the Council body but  
11          also the Administration and has already  
12          achieved significant reductions in  
13          Philadelphia's prison population.

14                   Finally, to all the advocates,  
15           those who are most important, who are the  
16           boots on the ground advocating on  
17           fighting to address this issue, who wake  
18           up every day to push the ball forward on  
19           criminal justice reform. Some of them  
20           are here today and you just heard them.  
21           I want to personally take a moment to  
22           thank all of them for taking time out of  
23           their schedule and highlighting this  
24           issue.

9           word in this case is moratorium on  
10          electric cars. If we are going to keep  
11          up with our promise to make this city the  
12          kind of city that is a beacon of hope and  
13          promise for others, then you have to do  
14          it citywide.

15                    I recognize that the impact of  
16          electric cars has been more present in  
17          Center City than it has in East Falls,  
18          Roxborough, Manayunk, West Philly,  
19          Overbrook Park or others, but the promise  
20          of it going there can't be stifled by a  
21          moratorium. Thus in some parts of my  
22          district, there are driveways, garages  
23          where you can easily install, but in  
24          other parts of my district, it is every  
25          bit as impacted as Center City. In fact,

2           in Manayunk and Roxborough and parts of  
3           Wynnefield even, parking is an issue.  
4           But if we're ever going to expand  
5           alternatives to fossil fuel, then we have  
6           to build the infrastructure and deal with  
7           the hiccups that we're dealing with and  
8           figure ways around that.

9                     I do not think a moratorium  
10           does that, and so I will not be voting  
11           aye on this bill.

12                     Thank you, Mr. President.

13                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14           Thank you, Councilman.

15                     (Applause.)

16                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
17           Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

18                     COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
19           Council President. I want to make a  
20           request of information to Councilman  
21           Squilla regarding the bill he introduced  
22           today, because I know that impacts this  
23           bill that's up for a vote. So I'd like  
24           to get some additional information  
25           regarding the bill that he introduced

2           today and the impact of that legislation,  
3           because that does impact this bill that's  
4           up for a vote.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6           question was -- would you like that  
7           information verbally?

8                   COUNCILMAN GREEN: Just a  
9           request for information, if he could  
10          explain the bill he introduced today,  
11          because that does impact some members'  
12          decisions on today's vote, because it  
13          does touch on the same topic.

14                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
15          Okay.

16                   Councilman Squilla.

17                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,  
18          Mr. President.

19                   Thank you, Councilman Green.

20                   The bill introduced today from  
21          meeting with some of the  
22          environmentalists were concerned that the  
23          moratorium did not have an end date. So  
24          there was no plan moving forward. So  
25          what we introduced today is to put a

2           sunset on the moratorium, to have a plan  
3           in place before the 24-month period  
4           moving forward, and to have an interim  
5           plan in place before an infrastructure  
6           plan would then be able to be put into  
7           place here in the City of Philadelphia.

8                         Knowing the concerns that we  
9           heard from some of the environmental  
10          groups and knowing Philadelphia to be a  
11          green city, my concern obviously for  
12          introducing this bill is knowing that the  
13          plan we have in place right now just  
14          doesn't work, and since it doesn't work,  
15          it doesn't work for several reasons, and,  
16          one, because in the denser areas of the  
17          City, which a lot of them that I  
18          represent, is involved with parking. So  
19          the issue involves both green, electric  
20          vehicles, and parking. You can't  
21          separate them. They're all together.

22                         So this moratorium will allow  
23          us to then move forward with a plan. We  
24          also have met during this process with a  
25          lot of people in the EV manufacturer

2           business. We met with ChargePoint and  
3           other manufacturers. We met with PECO.  
4           Understanding the Volkswagen lawsuit  
5           settlement, this is a perfect time to  
6           actually move forward with a plan to grow  
7           our city's infrastructure so we could  
8           grow EVs in our city. This is the time  
9           to do that.

10                        We've had this plan for almost  
11           ten years, just about ten years, and  
12           nobody is looking at anything else but  
13           this plan. So by keeping this plan in  
14           place, we're setting ourselves up  
15           continually to fail with this program,  
16           because we already have a program.  
17           Forcing this plan now for a moratorium  
18           allows us to force Council, put everybody  
19           on call, the Mayor, the Administration,  
20           the City, the Streets Department, DVRPC,  
21           who had a plan in place and we never  
22           acted on it.

23                        So this will now force us to  
24           make the changes necessary to move  
25           forward to really grow Philadelphia to be

1           4/6/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           a true green city instead of what it is  
3           today, is a trickle city that allows a  
4           couple people to have EVs in front of  
5           their homes.

6                     Thank you.

7                     (Applause.)

8                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Thank you, Councilman.

10                    Councilman Green.

11                    COUNCILMAN GREEN: Yes. Thank  
12           you, Councilman Clarke.

13                    Thank you, Councilman Squilla,  
14           for giving that information regarding  
15           legislation that you introduced today. I  
16           appreciate the work that you and  
17           Councilman Oh have done to this bill to  
18           amend the bill to make it more palatable  
19           to address an issue that a number of  
20           people in the City have been concerned  
21           about from a quality of life perspective.

22                    Electric vehicles came to the  
23           City through legislation ten years ago,  
24           and as anyone knows, technology changes  
25           very quickly. However, my concern is

2           what type of message does this send to  
3           not only across the nation but also other  
4           industries in reference to how we can  
5           grow the City of Philadelphia from a jobs  
6           perspective.

7                         Just this week as we're taking  
8           a debate on this bill, the stock price of  
9           Tesla surpassed Ford and is in striking  
10          distance of GM. So electronic vehicles  
11          and a lot of other type of electric  
12          products will be coming and are coming  
13          and is having impact in reference to the  
14          growth from a stock market perspective  
15          and therefor.

16                        My concern is when we pass  
17          legislation without putting together a  
18          plan, it sends a chilling effect on the  
19          industry, and it reminds me of what's  
20          happening in DC when you have a repeal,  
21          then replace. And my concern is is the  
22          process of which we could have done all  
23          of this legislation in one bill to  
24          address the issues raised by a number of  
25          civic organizations and constituents

2           around the City but at the same point,  
3           not just doing a blanket moratorium  
4           without having a replacement that's going  
5           to happen sometime in the future.

6                     I commend Councilman Squilla  
7           for his bill he introduced today, but  
8           based on those concerns and the fact  
9           we'll be voting on a moratorium today, I  
10          cannot support the bill in its current  
11          form.

12                    Thank you.

13                    (Applause.)

14                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
15          Councilman Squilla, is your light on in  
16          response to that or is it based on  
17          your --

18                    COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: It was  
19          based on the bill. Let them speak and  
20          then I'll speak.

21                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22          Okay. Thank you, Councilman.

23                    The Chair recognizes Councilman  
24          Johnson.

25                    COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

1           4/6/17 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           Council President. We've been grappling  
3           over this issue over the last two weeks,  
4           and I remember either when I served in  
5           the capacity of a State Representative or  
6           when I first arrived in Council, I  
7           remember hosting a hearing in this  
8           Chamber about the future of electronic  
9           vehicles here in the City of Philadelphia  
10          but, most importantly, electronic  
11          charging stations and how we should be on  
12          the forefront as a city making sure that  
13          we have an infrastructure plan for  
14          charging stations all throughout the  
15          City, and if we would have moved on it at  
16          that particular time, we probably  
17          wouldn't be in the position that we're in  
18          right now.

19                        But, however, I'm going to be  
20          supportive of my two colleagues who  
21          worked on this issue. As Chairman of  
22          Transportation and Public Utilities, I  
23          want to just make sure -- and I have  
24          talked to both of them -- that there's a  
25          commitment that I believe that they're

2           sincerely going to work on this issue to  
3           address the issues, putting together a  
4           working group with all the stakeholders  
5           so we can have a plan that's effective  
6           for the whole City of Philadelphia as we  
7           move forward.

8                         And so I just wanted to state  
9           what my position is for the record, but I  
10          believe wholeheartedly in the leadership  
11          of the Chairman of the Streets Committee  
12          as well as the work of Councilman David  
13          Oh to make sure that we get this right.  
14          So I wanted to make sure that my  
15          statement is read in the record, but I  
16          will be voting for the bill.

17                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18          Thank you, Councilman.

19                        The Chair recognizes  
20          Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

21                        COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
22          Mr. President. In listening to this  
23          debate, I am reminded in a delightful way  
24          of the two-year effort around lead and  
25          the -- the three-year effort around lead

2           and the two-year effort around menu  
3           labeling. They were big, huge issues  
4           that had citywide impact, and there was  
5           no way we could piecemeal either of those  
6           issues and arrive at a place that would  
7           engender 12-plus votes and/or support  
8           from the advocates and the champions who  
9           live and breathe these issues every day.

10                    The suggestion that a task  
11           force be created, I would suggest, is  
12           essential for this huge issue, because  
13           electric vehicles are the future and it  
14           behooves us to be thoughtful,  
15           deliberative, and very, very circumspect  
16           in how we wrap our arms around this  
17           elephant.

18                    Just this morning, Councilman  
19           Green had a press conference with  
20           PennEnvironment about the release of a  
21           major report focused on improving air  
22           quality. So there are multiple  
23           confluence of factors involved with this.  
24           Given that and given that it is an issue  
25           that really requires stakeholders to be

2           around the table, not in three or four  
3           months, it may take a year to adequately  
4           and comprehensively look to see how we do  
5           this, get it right the first time, not do  
6           it quickly but do it right, as we try to  
7           take electric vehicles and make that a  
8           citywide opportunity.

9                        So as Chair of the Committee on  
10           the Environment and Sustainability who  
11           actually brought up the notion of  
12           electric vehicles more than ten years  
13           ago, I think it's imperative that we do  
14           take a more holistic, thoughtful,  
15           deliberative approach to this. And with  
16           that in mind, for that reason and all the  
17           others stated, I will be voting no on  
18           this bill.

19                        Thank you, Mr. President.

20                        (Applause.)

21                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22           Thank you, Councilwoman.

23                        The Chair recognizes Councilman  
24           Jones.

25                        COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

2 Mr. President. I have to ask permission  
3 to leave to be at another meeting on an  
4 important topic of stop-and-go's, but I  
5 want to be recorded voting no on Bill No.  
6 170093-A.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,  
8 Councilman. Leave shall be granted and  
9 the record will reflect your vote on  
10 170093-A.

11 The Chair recognizes -- and  
12 you're voting aye on everything else,  
13 Councilman?

14 COUNCILMAN JONES: Yes. Yes.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just  
16 for the record, say you're voting aye on  
17 all other bills and resolutions.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: I'll be  
19 voting aye on all other bills and  
20 resolutions, Mr. President.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22 Thank you, Councilman.

23 And the Chair recognizes  
24 Councilwoman Gym.

25 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you

1           4/6/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           very much, Council President. So I think  
3           that embarking in a new industry is  
4           always very difficult, and the transition  
5           over into new energy and new energy  
6           solutions will always pose challenges.

7                        When the law was first  
8           introduced over a decade ago, it  
9           certainly had the visionary hopes that we  
10          see starting to come to fruition today.  
11          It obviously has a lot of improvements  
12          that need to be made, but I in particular  
13          want to salute the pioneers of a new  
14          movement and the new energy movement who  
15          put forward a lot of their own efforts,  
16          their resources, their hopes and  
17          investments in this future that they're  
18          trying to bring to our city. And because  
19          of that, I think it's really important  
20          that, again -- I want to thank my  
21          colleagues for all the work that they've  
22          put in. I'm very hopeful about any plan  
23          that they may put in place, but today we  
24          are not voting on a bill that has a  
25          sunset. We are voting on one without a

2           sunset, and for that reason, I do not  
3           believe in a moratorium. I do believe  
4           that we can figure this out without the  
5           moratorium being put in place.

6                     We'll certainly be supportive  
7           of all plans that move forward to address  
8           this area, but at this point, I agree  
9           with my Council colleague. There's no  
10          repeal without a replacement. So I'll be  
11          voting no on Bill No. 170093-A.

12                    I'd also like to be recorded as  
13          voting aye on all other bills and  
14          resolutions, as I have to also leave.

15                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Wait  
16          a minute now.

17                    COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you.

18                    (Applause.)

19                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I  
20          got to make sure we still have a quorum.

21                    We're okay. Nobody else can  
22          leave. Nobody else can leave.

23                    Sergeant-of-Arms, lock the  
24          doors.

25                    Councilwoman, you asked for a

2 leave now? Councilwoman, you asked for a  
3 leave of absence now?

4 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Yes, please.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye  
6 on all bills with the exception of?

7 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: 170093-A.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
9 record shall reflect that. Leave shall  
10 be granted.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
12 Domb.

13 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,  
14 Council President. I guess my concern on  
15 this bill is 56 people who played by the  
16 rules, made an investment. Some of these  
17 investments were not inexpensive, 30, 40,  
18 50, 60, 75,000 dollars or more and now  
19 we're changing the rules on those people.  
20 That's my biggest issue with this.

21 I recognize the problems of the  
22 parking. I think it's a big problem. We  
23 need to address it. I'm not sure I feel  
24 comfortable taking away what we gave 56  
25 people. And that to me is a big issue.

2                   So I'd like us to -- we need an  
3           overhaul of our whole parking, by the  
4           way. I mean, we have neighborhoods where  
5           people drive in from the suburbs, park  
6           their cars in our neighborhoods, and go  
7           into work, and it's ridiculous. We need  
8           to really review all parking and get this  
9           under control.

10                   But for that specific reason of  
11           the 56 people that I don't feel this is  
12           right is the reason I'm going to vote no  
13           for this bill. I do appreciate  
14           Councilman Oh and Councilman Squilla's  
15           work. They did a great job. They're  
16           doing amazing work, but that's the piece  
17           that is troubling for me.

18                   Thank you.

19                   (Applause.)

20                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21           Thank you, Councilman.

22                   Councilman Squilla, did you  
23           want to be recognized or was that --

24                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: No. I

25           just wanted to -- you can let Councilman

2 Oh speak. I'll just say one other thing.  
3 I just want to thank everybody who did  
4 come testify. It's great to hear both  
5 sides of every argument and every story,  
6 also the environmentalists who played a  
7 role in talking to us. And I'm hoping  
8 they all will be involved in the process  
9 moving forward, the hearings that we're  
10 having, and coming up with a structure to  
11 make this happen. And I know  
12 unfortunately sometimes we make decisions  
13 that affect some people negatively, but  
14 other people are happy with that. And  
15 they're decisions we have to make all the  
16 time and they're tough decisions, but we  
17 have to represent our constituent base  
18 the best we can, and we try to do that  
19 fairly and keep dialogue open, knowing  
20 our office is always open to your  
21 concerns, complaints. Not that we're  
22 going to agree all the time, 100 percent  
23 of the time, because I know we won't, but  
24 I do appreciate you speaking your mind,  
25 hearing your voice, listening to what our

2           concerns are for our whole constituent  
3           base, and understanding that as a  
4           Councilperson, you have to look at all  
5           angles of your district and the City of  
6           Philadelphia if we really want it to  
7           continue to grow.

8                        So thank you for everybody's  
9           time, effort on this matter. Appreciate  
10          it.

11                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
12          Thank you, Councilman.

13                       The Chair recognizes Councilman  
14          Oh.

15                       COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
16          much, Council President. A house built  
17          on stand cannot stand.

18                       There was an ordinance  
19          introduced in 2005 -- 7. I'm sorry;  
20          2007. It simply allowed for a resident  
21          to install a charger, which was turned on  
22          inside their home, not publicly  
23          accessible, and reserved for them an  
24          exclusive parking right. It wasn't a  
25          plan. It was just an ordinance that

2           allowed that. In fact, in the ten years,  
3           there have only been 68 approvals.

4                     It's not a plan, and we cannot  
5           continue to do that without having a plan  
6           in place if we're going to seriously  
7           tackle this issue.

8                     A moratorium is not permanent.  
9           It is a stop to something that is bad,  
10          but it allows us a public opportunity to  
11          bring in experts, to bring in witnesses.  
12          And so I'm not making that decision. The  
13          thing about the legislature is, we have  
14          rules and procedures. Everything we do  
15          is public and we get public input. So on  
16          May 15th, we have scheduled tentatively a  
17          hearing on best practices for EV  
18          infrastructure.

19                    I'd like to clarify details  
20          about the Bill 170093 and how it fits  
21          into a broader strategy to encourage  
22          widespread electric vehicle or EV  
23          adoption in Philadelphia. The ultimate  
24          reason I introduced Bill 170093, which  
25          places a moratorium on the installation

2 of new EV parking spaces, is that the  
3 City's current EV process is problematic,  
4 unsustainable, and has actually hindered  
5 the development of increased EV charging  
6 infrastructure throughout the City. It  
7 does not help the current policy -- it  
8 does not help that the current policy is  
9 not supported by civic associations  
10 representing thousands of residents, many  
11 of whom have been equally or more vocal  
12 against EV parking spaces currently. And  
13 as new spaces open up in neighborhoods,  
14 that protest will only increase, because  
15 the public needs to know that when  
16 they're asked to give up something such  
17 as a parking space, that they're doing it  
18 for the best possible reason and the best  
19 public good. Right now we cannot say  
20 that. It's a haphazard process. And so  
21 I would put a moratorium on this until  
22 we've had the opportunity to hear from  
23 the industry experts and other experts.

24 Under Philadelphia's 2007  
25 ordinance regarding EV parking spaces, a

2           resident can be approved to install a  
3           private EV charging station in front of  
4           their home and reserve the parking space  
5           in front of their home 24 hours per day,  
6           seven days per week, as only EV parking  
7           can be there. And while this parking  
8           space is technically open to all EVs, the  
9           owner is not obligated to make their  
10          private charging station accessible to  
11          other EVs. In crowded neighborhoods  
12          where parking is at a premium and private  
13          garage parking spaces can cost \$350 a  
14          month, this policy has become a draw for  
15          those more interested in essentially  
16          owning a parking space in front of their  
17          home than in owning an EV.

18                   This policy has drawn  
19          widespread opposition from community  
20          groups, civic organizations, residents,  
21          and businesses. Further, if this policy  
22          were to continue, it would severely limit  
23          the number of EVs that could be adopted.  
24          A better policy would have likely  
25          resulted in more widespread adoption of

2 EVs.

3 Over the past ten years, only  
4 68 applications for EV parking spaces  
5 have been approved. The current policy  
6 limits the number of EV parking spaces  
7 allowed per block. Only two residents  
8 per block in many cases may be approved  
9 for an EV parking space and any other EV  
10 owner will be denied.

11 An additional problem is that  
12 there is a limit to the overall number of  
13 reserved parking spaces per block,  
14 opening the possibility that a person  
15 with a severe disability would not be  
16 able to obtain a disability-only parking  
17 space because of existing EV parking  
18 spaces.

19 The moratorium in Bill No.  
20 170093 will put a halt to a policy that  
21 has not satisfactorily resulted for  
22 people interested in encouraging EV  
23 ownership and people interested in  
24 parking their cars in their neighborhood.  
25 This moratorium is supported by the

1           4/6/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           Streets Department, the Philadelphia  
3           Parking Authority, and it was passed  
4           unanimously by City Council's Committee  
5           on Streets and Services and Global  
6           Opportunities.

7                     The moratorium allows the 68  
8           people who have been approved to have an  
9           EV exclusively in that spot from the  
10          hours of 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m., and they  
11          don't have to move their car. They can  
12          continue to have their car there from  
13          6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. However, if they  
14          move their car and that space is open or  
15          if they go on vacation for two weeks and  
16          that space is open, then their neighbors  
17          will have an opportunity to use that  
18          space for up to two hours.

19                    Addressing concerns about  
20          residential EV charging during the  
21          moratorium on EV parking spaces, last  
22          week I introduced Bill 170311, which was  
23          previously mentioned by one of the  
24          witnesses. It allows residents to  
25          install a curbside EV charging station

2           without being granted an EV parking  
3           space. It's important to note that  
4           Philadelphia City Council is moving  
5           forward to establish a citywide EV  
6           charging infrastructure. To date, there  
7           has been no public or private effort to  
8           establish publicly accessible EV charging  
9           throughout Philadelphia, and this is the  
10          effort which I am undertaking, beginning  
11          with this bill.

12                         We are the only city of which I  
13          am aware that has ever offered reserved  
14          parking for residential EV charging  
15          access. With this policy instead of one  
16          that actually encourages EV charging  
17          infrastructure, Philadelphia is already  
18          far behind peer cities in EV adoption.

19                         While Bill No. 170093 will be  
20          voted on today, my office has already  
21          taken steps, along with Councilman Mark  
22          Squilla and others, in realizing the goal  
23          of establishing a citywide EV charging  
24          infrastructure. We've researched best  
25          practices throughout the world and have

2           already consulted with ChargePoint, a  
3           global expert in EV charging  
4           infrastructure, with PECO, which is also  
5           very interested in building up an EV  
6           infrastructure in Philadelphia.

7                        In the next two months, we plan  
8           to hold hearings, the third City Council  
9           hearing this year on EVs, which will  
10          discuss best practices and EV  
11          infrastructure adoption strategies in  
12          Philadelphia.

13                       The current prevailing vision  
14          is to install or incentivize installation  
15          of a mixture of Level 2 and high-speed DC  
16          charging stations in strategic locations  
17          such as public parking facilities,  
18          commercial streets, workplaces, major  
19          transportation nodes. Again, this will  
20          be done in consultation and partnership  
21          with entities such as ChargePoint, PECO,  
22          Streets Department, and the Parking  
23          Authority. The Delaware Valley Regional  
24          Planning Commission has already published  
25          planning and policy recommendations for

1           4/6/17 - STATED - 2ND READING

2           EV adoption, and we intend to work with  
3           them as well.

4                     I have reached out to Hyundai  
5           Motor Company regarding their new EVs and  
6           the possibility of establishing a  
7           facility here in Philadelphia to receive  
8           and accessorize these EV imports.

9                     Again, City Council is very  
10          much in favor of EV adoption, and we seek  
11          to establish an intelligent plan to  
12          create a world-class EV charging  
13          infrastructure. That will take  
14          coordination among stakeholders,  
15          legislation from both the City and the  
16          state, sources of funding, and  
17          public-private partnerships.

18                    We know we can do better. What  
19          we cannot do, however, is allow a bad  
20          policy to continue while we work to  
21          establish an excellent plan with a  
22          greater public benefit.

23                    Thank you very much.

24                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25          Thank you, Councilman.

3           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

6 input. Democracy means we don't always  
7 agree, but we agree on the good purpose  
8 and the public interest certainly.  
9 Everyone has represented their  
10 constituents and their conscience and  
11 everything. It's been a robust process,  
12 and we'll all work together to do the

14                   I also wanted to thank  
15 Councilman Johnson on his introduction of

17 prosecutor, I do not support and have not  
18 found many prosecutors who support  
19 mandatory minimum sentences. There are  
20 sentencing guidelines in order to try to  
21 ensure an evenhandedness, but mandatory  
22 minimum sentences, they are oftentimes  
23 very unjust, in that they apply a minimum  
24 sentence regardless of the circumstance,  
25 and that's why we have judges.

9                   you, Mr. President. Many may already  
10                  know that the Chamber of Commerce is  
11                  filing a federal lawsuit today  
12                  challenging Bill No. 160840, which I  
13                  sponsored along with Councilwoman  
14                  Reynolds Brown, and which Council passed  
15                  unanimously and was signed into law by  
16                  Mayor Kenney. This law would prohibit  
17                  employers from asking prospective  
18                  employees about their wage history and is  
19                  an attempt to deal with the wildly  
20                  acknowledged wage disparity between men  
21                  and women.

22                  Apparently included in their  
23                  lawsuit is the allegation that the law  
24                  infringes on an employer's right to free  
25                  speech. So in that vein, I know we've

2           heard from a lot of speeches today, but  
3           please allow me to exercise my free  
4           speech right.

5                    Although I am upset at this  
6           lawsuit, my upset is tempered somewhat by  
7           the fact that to be honest with you, the  
8           Chamber of Commerce just doesn't get it.  
9           To start with, they don't even get how to  
10          oppose a bill correctly.  When we took up  
11          this bill last year, the Chamber didn't  
12          even appear at the hearing, sent what I  
13          would call a rather mild opposition  
14          letter, with suggested amendments that we  
15          at least partially incorporated in the  
16          bill.  Yet after we unanimously passed  
17          the bill, the Chamber, together with  
18          Comcast -- and I'll get to them in a  
19          second -- started going ballistic and  
20          threatening lawsuits, which they now have  
21          done.

22                    The Chamber just doesn't get  
23          it.  The Chamber doesn't get that wage  
24          equity is a rapidly growing nationwide  
25          issue.  The State of Massachusetts has

2                   already passed a similar law, and there  
3                   are many pending laws, including in New  
4                   York City and San Francisco, and there's  
5                   even been a bill introduced into the U.S.  
6                   Congress, and as Councilwoman Reynolds  
7                   Brown stated during recent budget  
8                   hearings, the issue is discussed on  
9                   national morning news shows.

10                   The Chamber has stated that the  
11                   law itself isn't the total problem, but  
12                   it is, quote, "the straw that broke the  
13                   camel's back," unquote, of laws that  
14                   burden businesses. Let me first state  
15                   that while no one's back is being broken  
16                   by this law, I'm sure there's a lot of  
17                   women's backs that ache from doing the  
18                   same job as men and getting paid  
19                   oftentimes significantly less.

20                   But as far as the City being  
21                   anti-business, we have passed laws that  
22                   have helped workers, which the Chamber  
23                   doesn't get, that many of us feel is a  
24                   part of our job. But we have done over  
25                   the years, this Council, many, many

2           things that aid businesses - tax  
3           abatements, TIFs, BIDs, NIDs. Overall,  
4           approximately 27 tax incentives and  
5           credits. And just to mention a few  
6           specifically very quickly, only one-third  
7           of businesses pay BIRT due to the  
8           \$100,000 exemption and other tax credits  
9           that Councilwoman Sanchez championed.  
10          Wage tax rates have been slashed over 20  
11          percent. Net profits tax rates have been  
12          slashed over 20 percent over many years.  
13          Gross tax receipts have been slashed over  
14          56 percent.

15                   It is estimated as the years go  
16          on with the tax -- with the  
17          business-friendly actions that are  
18          planned, that the total planned business  
19          tax is projected to amount to \$528  
20          million in foregone revenue in the next  
21          five years.

22                   So, I mean, I think we have  
23          shown in lots of ways that we are  
24          certainly not business unfriendly, and I  
25          just find -- I must add that it is

2                   particularly ironic that the firm that  
3                   regularly represents Comcast, Comcast, is  
4                   filing the lawsuit against the bill. The  
5                   towering buildings that are just west of  
6                   us, which we helped with significant tax  
7                   breaks and incentives, I believe attest  
8                   to the fact that we certainly haven't  
9                   been anti-business. And it is projected  
10                  that once Tower 2 is completed, that we  
11                  may give as much as \$160 million in tax  
12                  breaks to Comcast for being here. We're  
13                  glad they're here, but I think we have  
14                  done our part to help them be here.

15                  So I guess I would just wrap up  
16                  by saying to Comcast and to other  
17                  businesses, to turn the phrase a little  
18                  bit, with enemies like us, they don't  
19                  need friends. But I guess, again,  
20                  Chamber and Comcast just doesn't get it.

21                  So, finally, I guess the  
22                  Chamber and Comcast think that they are  
23                  showing strength by putting in this  
24                  lawsuit and I guess they think as the  
25                  future goes on, they'll get more respect

2                   from us by filing this lawsuit to hold up  
3                   the ability for women to get paid on an  
4                   equal basis with men. Let me just  
5                   finally say, but at least from this  
6                   member, they won't get it.

7                   Thank you, Mr. President.
