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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning, everyone.

(Good morning.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: We have a pretty long day today, so we're going to get started.

The members will take their seats, any visitors retire behind the rail, and we can get started with our invocation.

The next order of business is the approval of the Journal -- I'm sorry; the invocation.

To give our invocation this morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor Garth Gabriel Gittens of Calvary Baptist Church. He is here today as the guest of Councilman Jones.

I would ask all members, guests, and visitors to please rise.

(Councilmembers and guests rise.)

PASTOR GITTENS: Let us pray.  
Lord, we thank you for this

10                    Lord, we pray that you would

13           issues.

14                    Lord, we pray for the peace of  
15           our great city. We take authority over  
16           the spirit of violence. Every spirit of  
17           corruption, we take authority over it.  
18           We pray for justice. We pray, Lord God,  
19           that you will protect the City, keep this  
20           City, build this City, every aspect,  
21           every situation that would come against  
22           the effective governing of this City.  
23           Lord, we pull it down in the name of  
24           Jesus.

25                    And we pray, God, that you

2 would strengthen us through unity and  
3 understanding, that we would be  
4 compassionate, one to another, and heal  
5 the wounds of this City. Help us to come  
6 together that in this great City of  
7 Brotherly Love, there would be a true  
8 demonstration of love, of caring, of  
9 unity, and effective joy that people who  
10 come here will recognize, Lord, that you  
11 are indeed Lord of this City.

12 Amen.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you so much, Pastor, for those  
16 inspiring words.

17 (Council at ease.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you very much.

20 The next order of business is  
21 the approval of the Journal of the  
22 meeting of Thursday, April 6, 2017, and  
23 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
25 you, Mr. President. I move that the

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6                   Thank you. It has been moved and  
7                   properly seconded that the Journal of the  
8                   meeting of Thursday, April 6, 2017 stand  
9                   approved.

10                  All those in favor say aye.

11                  (Aye.)

12                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13                  Those opposed?

14                  (No response.)

15                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
16                  ayes have it, and the Journal is  
17                  approved.

18                  The next order of business is  
19                  requests for leave of absence, and the  
20                  Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

21                  COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
22                  Mr. President. On behalf of the  
23                  majority, there are no requests of leave  
24                  of absence today.

25                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

4                   COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
5           Mr. President. On behalf of the  
6           republicans, there are no requests for  
7           leave of absence.

8                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
9           Chair thanks the gentleman.

10                   At this time, I would like to  
11           dispense with the regular order of  
12           business and I would like to thank  
13           everyone who has taken time out of their  
14           busy day to come down to witness their  
15           government in action. We hope your stay  
16           here is actually a pleasurable one and a  
17           knowledgeable one, so much so that you  
18           come back again. So, again, thank you  
19           and we really appreciate having you here  
20           at this time.

21                   At this time, the Chair  
22           recognizes Councilman Squilla.

23                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,  
24           Mr. President. Today is a day that we  
25           have young people here joining us to show

2           them government in action. I have two  
3           special guests, one who's shadowing me  
4           here today, Kyle Nelson from Mastery  
5           Charter School, who is going to be  
6           attending East Stroudsburg and looking to  
7           get into political science. So he may be  
8           hopefully a future leader. But I'd like  
9           to announce Kyle. Please stand and  
10          recognize him for being here.

11                           (Applause.)

12                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: And also  
13           we're joined by the 7th and 8th grade  
14           students from the Eliza Kirkbride School  
15           in South Philly. They are here today  
16           over here on my right.

17                           (Applause.)

18                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: The pencil  
19           holders that they brought today for every  
20           Councilmember are part of a large project  
21           called American Dreams. The project is a  
22           partnership with COSACOSA Art At Large  
23           and Passyunk Square Civic Association,  
24           supported with a grant from PCCY's  
25           Picasso Project and Ted Gibbons, who is

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2 here today. Under the direction of  
3 Principal Rebecca Julien and led by art  
4 teacher Peter Metcalfe and special  
5 education teacher Eileen McGinley, the  
6 interdisciplinary project explores  
7 connections among immigrant stories,  
8 student collection from their families,  
9 schools and neighborhoods, and explore  
10 the meaning of the American dream in  
11 today's complicated world.

12 In honor of Philadelphia Art  
13 Advocacy Week, Kirkbride students ask  
14 that you please make funding available  
15 and make it a priority. Without funds  
16 for art education, the public schools and  
17 projects like these are not possible, and  
18 our children are deprived of proven  
19 benefits that come from the innovative  
20 and hands of art and experience.

21 Please remember that art  
22 education is part of our American dream  
23 and that thousands of children in our  
24 city are counting on us to create and  
25 work on their future. And like Jane



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2 Golden says, art ignites change.

3 Thank you very much, and  
4 welcome. Stand up again, our Kirkbride  
5 students, for your great participation.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
9 Congratulations, and thank you so much  
10 for coming down today.

11 At this time, the Chair  
12 recognizes Councilman Green, who will  
13 present a resolution recognizing  
14 Philadelphia CeaseFire. Would Marla  
15 Davis-Bellamy and those accompanying her  
16 please join the Councilman at the podium.

17 (Councilmembers and guests  
18 approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
20 joining Councilman Green, we have  
21 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Henon,  
22 Councilman Oh and Councilwoman Bass,  
23 Councilwoman Gym and Councilwoman  
24 Blackwell, Councilman Domb and  
25 Councilwoman Parker and Councilman

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2 Taubenberger and Councilwoman

3 Quinones-Sanchez.

4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Good

5 morning. It's a true pleasure to honor  
6 Philadelphia CeaseFire for the work that  
7 they do in our communities. Many of you  
8 have read in the past couple weeks some  
9 of the violence that's been occurring in  
10 the City of Philadelphia. So to have an  
11 organization like CeaseFire actively  
12 working to address violence in our city  
13 and helping especially young men, young  
14 men of color to find alternative ways to  
15 come to dispute resolution, and it's a  
16 pleasure to be here to recognize them for  
17 their efforts.

18 This resolution recognizing  
19 Philadelphia CeaseFire for their ongoing  
20 violence-reduction efforts in the City of  
21 Philadelphia.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,  
23 dedicated and sustained work from a broad  
24 coalition of anti-violence activists, law  
25 enforcement agencies, religious leaders,

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2 businesspeople and many others has  
3 contributed to a multi-year downward  
4 trend of violent incidents in the City,  
5 including gun homicides; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

7 Whereas, despite the commendable work and  
8 the heartening progress that has been  
9 made thus far, violent incidents,  
10 particularly those which involve firearms  
11 and young people, are still occurring at  
12 unacceptably high levels, causing  
13 devastation to our families and placing  
14 tremendous strain on the limited  
15 resources of our institutions; and

16 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,  
17 Philadelphia CeaseFire began its campaign  
18 in 2011, at the Center for Bioethics,  
19 Urban Health & Policy at the Katz School  
20 of Medicine at Temple University, joining  
21 dozens of organizations and hundreds of  
22 individuals already working to mitigate  
23 the City's violence epidemic; and

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
25 Philadelphia CeaseFire is a replication

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2           site of the national public health  
3           organization Cure Violence, previously  
4           known as Chicago CeaseFire, which  
5           developed a structured, deliberate, and  
6           disciplined violence intervention  
7           strategy based on the premise of violence  
8           as a preventable public health issue; and

9                   COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,  
10           Philadelphia CeaseFire's approach is  
11           evidence-based and has been proven to be  
12           effective in the reduction of homicides  
13           and shootings in Philadelphia's 22nd and  
14           39th Police Districts; and

15                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,  
16           their program includes efforts to  
17           heighten community awareness about gun  
18           violence and encourage area residents as  
19           well as the community, business and  
20           religious leaders to work towards  
21           reducing violence, especially shootings  
22           and homicides; and

23                   COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas,  
24           crucial to the success of Philadelphia  
25           CeaseFire is their choice of the most

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2 appropriate and effective people to  
3 deliver their anti-violence message  
4 directly to high-risk individuals,  
5 including CeaseFire staff, the program  
6 manager, outreach supervisor, outreach  
7 workers, and violence interrupters; and

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
9 these staffers, many of whom once were  
10 involved in the violence they now seek to  
11 prevent, spend 80 percent of their time  
12 outside of the office, employing direct  
13 intervention strategies to mediate  
14 conflicts and prevent interpersonal  
15 violence which is often the cause of  
16 shootings and killings in Philadelphia;  
17 and

18 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,  
19 one such employee is Rasheed Smith, whose  
20 compelling story, including a felony gun  
21 charge at the age of sixteen, the harsh  
22 wake-up call of imprisonment and the  
23 successful transition into the community,  
24 was recently told by Shawnette Wilson of  
25 FOX 29; and

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2 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, we  
3 salute and thank Mr. Smith and his  
4 colleagues and the rest of the CeaseFire  
5 team for all of the brave, tireless,  
6 face-to-face work they do to prevent and  
7 reduce violence, and we share the hope  
8 that one day, such efforts will no longer  
9 be necessary; now, therefore, be it

10 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

11 Resolved, by the Council of the City of  
12 Philadelphia, that Council does hereby  
13 recognize Philadelphia CeaseFire for  
14 their ongoing violence-reduction efforts  
15 in the City of Philadelphia.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
18 Councilman.

19 COUNCILMAN GREEN: I just want  
20 to thank CeaseFire for all their work and  
21 the great efforts they've done to address  
22 violence in our city.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All  
24 right. The Chair recognizes  
25 Ms. Davis-Bellamy for remarks.

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2 (Applause.)

3 MR. SMITH: How you doing,  
4 ladies and gentlemen? I'm Rasheed Smith  
5 from Philadelphia CeaseFire. I just want  
6 to say thank you to my team. They've  
7 been a big help. They've been like big  
8 brothers and sisters. Also Ms. Marla  
9 Davis for being like not just a boss,  
10 just like a mother and providing me and  
11 guiding me and always on me about getting  
12 my life together, not just for myself but  
13 for my son and my family also.

14 So I just want to thank you  
15 guys for coming today, and this is not  
16 the end for me. You're going to see me  
17 much more, not just on TV. I'm not doing  
18 it for television, and when I first  
19 started this job, I wasn't doing it for  
20 the money. I do it passionately, because  
21 there's a lot of other youth out there  
22 such as myself that's just like me going  
23 through a lot of the things that I went  
24 through, and I was blessed by God and  
25 provided with a job to share my story and

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2           motivate other youth such as myself to  
3           become better than me and look forward to  
4           achieving more of their goals.

5                        So, once again, I want to thank  
6           my team, Philadelphia CeaseFire,  
7           Philadelphia City Council, and the guys  
8           that's here today and the police officers  
9           that's here today. You guys have a  
10          blessed day.

11                       (Applause.)

12                       MS. DAVIS-BELLAMY: Good  
13          morning. I want to thank Councilman  
14          Green for this honor as well as Council  
15          President Clarke and all members of City  
16          Council for your ongoing support and  
17          acknowledging the work of the  
18          Philadelphia CeaseFire program.

19                       There's so many members of our  
20          family that are here, including our  
21          prayer team. These individuals pray for  
22          us on the first Monday of every month and  
23          they pray for our city. We're also very  
24          grateful to our partners, Department of  
25          Behavioral Health and the Managing



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2           Director's Office. We're also grateful  
3           for Dr. Kathleen Reeves of the Center for  
4           Bioethics, Urban Health & Policy at  
5           Temple School of Medicine where our  
6           program is housed. We're also extremely  
7           grateful to Temple University, who eight  
8           years ago made this commitment to embark  
9           on this journey.

10                   Oftentimes when I talk about  
11           our program, people ask me if I'm from  
12           Philadelphia, and I think this is an  
13           important question. I am from  
14           Philadelphia, a Masterman graduate who  
15           has done a number of things, including  
16           attending Johnson C. Smith University in  
17           Charlotte, North Carolina, Ohio State  
18           University, the Fels School of  
19           Government, and Temple Law School. I'm a  
20           Philadanco alum. I headed a small  
21           healthcare foundation. I was the speaker  
22           at the 2000 Democratic National  
23           Convention. I've worked for Congressman  
24           Evans, Dr. Walter Lomax, Mr. Kenny  
25           Gamble. I was a law clerk for Johnnie

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2           Cochran, part of the WURD family, and the  
3           Chief of Staff of the Pennsylvania  
4           Department of Health under Dr. Calvin  
5           Johnson.

6                         Needless to say, I have been  
7           involved in a few projects, have worked  
8           for the federal government and state, and  
9           I have run a couple of non-profit  
10          organizations, and I can tell you without  
11          any reservation this team and this  
12          program has been proven to be effective  
13          in the reductions of shootings and it  
14          works.

15                        I tell people all the time that  
16          I work for these group of young men and  
17          women who have dedicated their lives  
18          24/7, 365 days a year in an effort to  
19          prevent violent crime in many high-risk  
20          neighborhoods across the City. They  
21          canvas neighborhoods. They've developed  
22          risk reduction plans for those coming  
23          home from prison. They mediate  
24          conflicts. They have visited over 100  
25          schools in the District. They're on call

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2           24/7 for two of our Level 1 trauma  
3           centers. They attend court hearings.  
4           They visit their clients in prison, and  
5           they help their clients secure jobs.

6                     One of our clients recently was  
7           hired to work in Hatboro. His shift was  
8           7:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m. Our supervisor  
9           took him to work at 7:00 p.m. and another  
10          outreach worker, Michael Greenwood,  
11          picked him up at 2:00 a.m. This is how  
12          serious these young men and women are.  
13          And they're not volunteers. They're  
14          full-time employees of Temple School of  
15          Medicine. They make over \$30,000 a year  
16          with the same health, education, and  
17          pension benefits of any Temple employee.  
18          They're incredible case messengers who  
19          are from the neighborhoods in which they  
20          serve. They're hired by a community  
21          panel. They're trained for over 75 hours  
22          a year, and they have spent time in  
23          prison.

24                     However, Temple University did  
25          not make their backgrounds a barrier to

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2 employment. They have spent over 7,000  
3 hours working with their clients this  
4 year who they've met on the streets, in  
5 schools, hospitals, and through  
6 referrals. These men and women represent  
7 and serve the young people of our city  
8 who are deeply troubled and make poor  
9 decisions, whether it's carrying a gun,  
10 dropping out of school, engaging in a  
11 flash mob or selling drugs. This is a  
12 public health issue. It's an epidemic,  
13 and our program treats it as such.

14 Given the fact that 14,000  
15 people have been shot, according to  
16 police records, since 2006, all of us in  
17 this room and outside of this must  
18 embrace the fact that Philadelphia has a  
19 problem. However, CeaseFire has been  
20 working diligently to address this  
21 problem.

22 These young men and women have  
23 beat the odds. One of them was living in  
24 a shelter and we hired him and last year  
25 he bought his own home. They've been

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2           featured on Oprah Winfrey's network. Our  
3           program manager was contacted one night  
4           by the Secret Service and spent the next  
5           full day with President Obama.

6                        But your recognition today is  
7           important. It continues to help motivate  
8           and encourage them. But we should not  
9           stop here. We should consider  
10          duplicating this effort across the City.  
11          This program has been endorsed by the  
12          U.S. Conference of Mayors, the Department  
13          of Justice. New York City started with  
14          one CeaseFire program and now has 18.  
15          Baltimore has four, and there's 60 cities  
16          across the country that are duplicating  
17          this effort and eight international  
18          countries.

19                       I'm so proud of these young men  
20          and women. They are our city's  
21          gladiators and will do whatever is  
22          necessary to save a life. They have  
23          influence on the streets of our city, and  
24          young people who are in crisis listen to  
25          them. They listen to them because they

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2 know that these young men and women have  
3 changed their lives and they can too.

4 Thank you very much, and we  
5 hope that Council will certainly join us  
6 for a reception immediately following  
7 today's meeting.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Council will be at ease.

12 (Council at ease.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you very much.

15 At this time, the Chair  
16 recognizes Councilman O'Neill, who will  
17 present a resolution recognizing the week  
18 of April 23rd through April 30th as the  
19 Annual Days of Remembrance of the Six  
20 Million Jewish Martyrs. Would Sarita  
21 Gocial and those accompanying her please  
22 join the Councilman at the podium.

23 (Councilmembers and guest  
24 approached podium.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

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2 also joining Councilman O'Neill is  
3 Councilman Domb.

4 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
5 Mr. President.

6 The resolution reads as  
7 follows: In solemn recognition during  
8 the week of April 23rd to 30th, 2017 as  
9 the Annual Remembrance of the Six Million  
10 Jewish Martyrs Who Perished During The  
11 Holocaust.

12 Whereas, over sixty years ago,  
13 six million Jews were murdered in a Nazi  
14 Holocaust as part of a systematic program  
15 of genocide, and millions of other people  
16 suffered as victims of Nazism; and

17 Whereas

18 COUNCILMAN DOMB: I just want  
19 to thank Councilman O'Neill, by the way,  
20 for including me in this recognition, and  
21 just share with you a personal story,  
22 because every time this comes up, as is  
23 last year, my grandfather came from  
24 Warsaw, Poland. His brothers and sisters  
25 were all killed in the concentration

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2           camps, and I still have some of the  
3           letters actually that he gave me that  
4           they wrote to him, but it was blacked out  
5           by the camps.

6                        So thank you for including me,  
7           by the way.

8                        Whereas, the people of the City  
9           of Philadelphia should continually  
10          rededicate themselves to the principle of  
11          equal justice for all people; and

12                       Whereas, the people of the City  
13          of Philadelphia should remain eternally  
14          vigilant against all tyranny, and  
15          recognize that bigotry provides a  
16          breeding ground for tyranny to flourish;  
17          and

18                       Whereas, the Memorial Committee  
19          for the Six Million Jewish Martyrs has  
20          chosen as the theme for this year's  
21          Memorial, "Anti-Semitism - Confronting  
22          the Oldest Hatred." Given the alarming  
23          growth in the number of anti-Semitic  
24          threats since the beginning of 2017,  
25          desecration of Jewish cemeteries, and the



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2 bomb threats to Jewish Community Centers  
3 and schools across the country, it is  
4 clear that we cannot be complacent in the  
5 face of anti-Semitism or any other forms  
6 of bigotry and hatred. This year's  
7 ceremony will feature Kenneth Jacobson,  
8 Deputy National Director of the  
9 Anti-Defamation League. The ceremony  
10 will also feature poems, readings and  
11 music that speak to the theme. We  
12 applaud the Committee for the honor they  
13 will bestow on the memory of those who  
14 perished and on those who survived to  
15 build and strengthen life in Philadelphia  
16 and other communities;

17 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas,  
18 Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia  
19 and the Memorial Committee for the Six  
20 Million Jewish Martyrs invite all  
21 citizens of Philadelphia and the region  
22 to join in the commemoration ceremony on  
23 April 23rd, 2017 in front of the  
24 Holocaust monument on the Benjamin  
25 Franklin Parkway from 1 o'clock to 2:30

3                       Therefore, by virtue of this  
4           citation, the Council of the City of  
5           Philadelphia does hereby recognize the  
6           week of April 23rd through April 30th,  
7           2017 as the Annual Days of Remembrance of  
8           the Six Million Jewish Martyrs. We  
9           further recognize the horror of the  
10          Holocaust, and extend to the Memorial  
11          Committee the respect and admiration of  
12          this legislative body.

13                      This is a certification that  
14          this is a true and correct copy of the  
15          original resolution, adopted by the  
16          Council of the City of Philadelphia on  
17          the 6th of April 2017. Signed by the  
18          President of City Council, Darrell  
19          Clarke, co-sponsored by myself,  
20          Councilman Domb, and all Councilmembers.

21                      Thank you.

22                      (Applause.)

23                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
24          the Chair recognizes Ms. Gocial for  
25          remarks.

2 MS. GOCIAL: Thank you.

3 Good morning. It is a pleasure  
4 for me to address you once again about  
5 our annual memorial ceremony for the six  
6 million Jewish martyrs who were  
7 annihilated by the Nazis simply because  
8 they were Jews. A very special thanks to  
9 Councilmen O'Neill and Domb for  
10 sponsoring this City Council resolution  
11 and to all the members of City Council  
12 for co-sponsoring as well.

13 At this year's ceremony we are  
14 highlighting the upsurge of  
15 anti-Semitism, which has been called the  
16 longest hatred. It is global, ingrained,  
17 and resilient. It affects everyone and  
18 can exist even where there are no Jews.  
19 Its alarming rise in recent years,  
20 especially in the lands where the  
21 Holocaust occurred, give us pause. While  
22 anti-Semitism is not government sponsored  
23 in Europe as it was in the 1930s, denial  
24 and distortion of the Holocaust are part  
25 of the narrative that is driving these

3 During the past year,  
4 anti-Semitism has been on the rise in the  
5 United States as well. Cemeteries have  
6 been desecrated. Swastikas have been  
7 painted on grave markers. Doors and  
8 walls of synagogues have been defaced,  
9 and openly anti-Semitic materials are  
10 being distributed around the country,  
11 including right here in Philadelphia and  
12 its close suburbs.

13 My friends, anti-Semitism  
14 cannot be allowed to grow and flourish.  
15 We have seen the results of hatred.

16 So what do concerned citizens  
17 do. First, we must not be afraid to  
18 address these issues. Representatives of  
19 all minority groups must come together to  
20 create venues for learning. We are all  
21 human beings. We want the same things  
22 for ourselves and our families, and we  
23 must work together to make sure that this  
24 message is not shouted down.

25 Our children must be educated

3           and appropriate ways of responding. It  
4           all begins with one - one person reaching  
5           out to another, one person teaching and  
6           learning from another, one person

8                         We must not stand by and watch

10          the American tapestry. Each of us has  
11          added to the beautiful foundation of  
12          acceptance and inclusion that our country  
13          has been founded on.

14                        This Sunday, April 23rd, the  
15          Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia  
16          will present our annual memorial program  
17          for those whose lives were cut short by  
18          hatred, and honor those who survived the  
19          atrocities inflicted upon the Jewish  
20          people. We invite you and your families  
21          to join us in solidarity to those who  
22          were sacrificed. We must be resolute in  
23          our commitment to keep their story alive  
24          and teach our children and fellow  
25          citizens about the downfalls of

3 I hope to see you all this

10           honoring and celebrating the outstanding  
11           career of Belinda Ann Mayo for her

15                       Whereas, Belinda Ann Mayo, a  
16           seasoned professional, has devoted her  
17           career to public service by emphasizing  
18           research, planning, coordination of  
19           programs and services, training and  
20           direction of urban housing policy; and

21                       COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:  
22           Whereas, Belinda most recently worked for  
23           the City of Philadelphia's Office of  
24           Housing and Community Development as the  
25           Director of Neighborhood Program

3           Neighborhood Geographic Information  
4           System and Network, which incorporated a  
5           database and inventory of vacant property

9           a former Assistant Director for Community  
10          Development for the City of Philadelphia  
11          Office of Housing and Community  
12          Development, Belinda was responsible for  
13          the development and implementation of  
14          technical assistance programs for  
15          non-profit community based corporations.  
16          Belinda was also in charge of the  
17          disbursement of \$1.5 million grants,  
18          which manage to fund a selection process,  
19          and completing the Strategic Neighborhood  
20          Development plans for 15 community based  
21          development corporations; and

22                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
23          as Director of the Philadelphia Housing  
24          Policy Board, Belinda examined new  
25          housing initiatives and programs designed

21          Board of Trustees for Mercy Housing, Inc.  
22          in Denver, Colorado, an Alumnus on the  
23          Board of Directors and Executive  
24          Committee of Philadelphia Development  
25          Partnership, a member of the Philadelphia

3           Local Advisory Board, and both Co-Chair

15          for us through all our trials and  
16          tribulations that we've had, and she took  
17          her job not only seriously but as a  
18          person who really understood  
19          neighborhoods and communities, and that  
20          is something that is not done often for  
21          somebody in the City through our  
22          bureaucracy that we have.

23                         We in Council join in wishing  
24          Belinda Ann Mayo well in any future  
25          endeavors and hope her retirement is

22 My first encounter with City  
23 Council was in 1981 when then-Councilman  
24 John Anderson, along with myself and Eva  
25 Gladstein and Mary Scullion and George

3           helped to sponsor a bill called the Women  
4           and Children's Bill. What that bill did  
5           was, it eliminated landlords' ability to

9           that said no kids and no DPA were no  
10          longer an obstacle to people looking for  
11          rental housing that can afford and that  
12          they could live in. It's gone on for  
13          years after that. It set a precedent, a  
14          national precedent that maybe people  
15          don't even know about in this country,  
16          but it is because of what Philadelphia  
17          did and what this Chamber did that women  
18          and children had an opportunity to  
19          realize their dream of a decent, safe,  
20          sanitary, and affordable place to live  
21          without discrimination.

22                   I can think back to the other  
23          Councilpeople who aren't here, some of  
24          whom were very instrumental in my career  
25          and the work that I did and my

2 motivation. I think about Lucien  
3 Blackwell.

4 (Applause.)

5 MS. MAYO: I think about Gussie  
6 Clark, I think about Joe Coleman, I think

9 soldiers who helped me. But then I look  
10 here and while there are some faces that  
11 I don't know, there are others that I  
12 knew from a long time ago, Councilman  
13 Jones, who was an OHCD employee at one  
14 point. I think about Councilman Street,  
15 who went on to become the Mayor, of  
16 course, who worked with us to hold this  
17 Council for 12 hours while we fought to  
18 make sure that the Community Development  
19 Block Grant program benefited the people  
20 that it was supposed to benefit. I think  
21 about all those journeys, I think about  
22 all those challenges, and I say thank  
23 you. I say thank you to God. I say  
24 thank you to all of you for having the  
25 opportunity to do the work that I've done

3 Thank you again.

5 MS. MAYO: And I especially  
6 want to say thank you to this little  
7 feisty chica standing beside me, who I

10 And she's turned out to be a champion.  
11 She's turned out to be my partner, and  
12 this morning when she invited me to come  
13 in for breakfast at 9:30, she immediately  
14 put something in front of me to deal

18 not be at the Tower at 1234 Market  
19 Street, I am a resident of Philadelphia.  
20 I am an advocate for the least of us, and  
21 I am a change agent, and I always will

11          testimony for our Prisons, it was  
12          confirmed that juveniles in various  
13          capacities are still being held in adult  
14          prisons routinely placed in solitary  
15          confinement.

16                   By now, most of us know the  
17          story of Kalief Browder, who spent three  
18          years at Rikers Island, two in solitary  
19          confinement, for allegedly, allegedly  
20          stealing a backpack, who ultimately  
21          committed suicide. Tragedies like  
22          Kalief's story are unacceptable and they  
23          are preventable.

24                   When troubled teenagers are  
25          criminally charged as adults, it is easy

2 to shrug and write them off as bad  
3 apples. It's easy to ignore a brutal  
4 system which crushes justice-involved  
5 youth in its gears due to malignant  
6 neglect. But let's note that virtually  
7 all these kids have not yet been  
8 convicted of a crime and are, therefore,  
9 presumed innocent. Let's remember that  
10 the facilitation of their redemption is  
11 supposed to be our focus.

12 Which one of these youth who  
13 were involved in our criminal justice  
14 system, juvenile justice system, could be  
15 a gentleman such as William Cobb, who did  
16 six and a half years in a Pennsylvania  
17 correctional facility, also served on the  
18 Criminal Justice Reform Committee in  
19 which you established, Council President,  
20 and Councilman Curtis Jones chaired, but  
21 he now serves as Deputy Director of the  
22 National ACLU in their national office?

23 Which one of these youth who  
24 are involved in the juvenile justice  
25 system such as Shon Hopwood, who did time

2 for bank robbery, but just became a  
3 Professor at Georgetown Law School?

4 Which one of these youth who  
5 are involved in our criminal justice and  
6 juvenile justice system such as Kevin  
7 Harden, who left the life of the streets  
8 for higher education and is now the  
9 President of the Barristers Association,  
10 which represents the black lawyers here  
11 in the City of Philadelphia?

12 And which one of these youth  
13 who are involved in the juvenile justice  
14 system formerly such as myself, who went  
15 on to attend the University of  
16 Pennsylvania, Mansfield University, as  
17 well as Harvard Business School, also  
18 served as a former State Representative  
19 and now Councilman of the Second  
20 Councilmanic District?

21 Nelson Mandela, who spent 27  
22 years in prison himself, told us that a  
23 nation should not be judged by how it  
24 treats its highest citizens but its  
25 lowest ones. Our at-risk youth, who have

2 no resources and no political capital,  
3 are our lowest citizens.

4 I intend to closely investigate  
5 how to abolish the inhumane use of  
6 solitary confinement for juveniles here  
7 in the City of Philadelphia. I  
8 appreciate the support of my colleagues  
9 and co-sponsor Councilman Curtis Jones,  
10 who is Chairman of the Public Safety  
11 Committee as well as Chair of the  
12 Criminal Justice Reform Committee as well  
13 as Councilwoman Helen Gym for bringing  
14 their experience to justice reform and  
15 the protection of vulnerable children to  
16 this endeavor. There may be legal  
17 obstacles and there may be practical  
18 obstacles to resolve, but we will not  
19 rest until this work is done.

20 Thank you very much, Council

22 MR. O'DONNELL: Is it green?

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 There you go. Yes, sir.

25 MR. O'DONNELL: I'm color

8 Poor, and I and millions of people in  
9 this city are appreciative of  
10 Councilwoman Blackwell's commitment to  
11 helping the poor.

12 Now, this resolution, and there  
13 are four other resolutions similar today,  
14 they're references to vacant properties,  
15 vacant lots, deeds to properties and so  
16 forth. There are many vacant properties,  
17 buildings, houses, lots in Philadelphia  
18 and there's billions of dollars in the  
19 bank accounts of our city's charities.  
20 We're spending 526 million to renovate  
21 the Art Museum, 120 million yesterday on  
22 the Revolution Museum. Let's take a  
23 chunk of that money and working with  
24 Habitat for Humanity, Project HOME, the  
25 churches, the charities, build and

2           renovate beautiful places where the  
3           homeless, every homeless person, can  
4           sleep inside every night with food,  
5           friendliness, love and so forth and refer  
6           to this Francis House at 8th and Arch as

8           homeless. Then take some of that money  
9           and get a guaranteed job for everybody,  
10          passing out literature for small  
11          businesses, picking up litter, cleaning  
12          apartments and businesses.

13                   And then we're talking about  
14                   quality of life. Philadelphia has the  
15                   highest rate of cigarette smoking of any  
16                   city in America. I'm allergic. I get  
17                   blown in my face, I get a headache. So  
18                   let's crack down on that.

19                   So you get the message.

20                   Now, one more point. On the  
21                   museum yesterday, I passed out a press  
22                   release. Let's have a museum on  
23                   pacifism, anti-war efforts, and honoring  
24                   pacifists, Quakers, conscientious  
25                   objectors, Mennonites.

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2 So let's get involved in this,  
3 try to help the homeless and the poor,  
4 the people at the bottom. Jesus said the  
5 people who are well don't need the  
6 doctor. It's the people who are sick.

7 Thank you very much.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,  
11 commenting on 170339, 170345, 170346,  
12 170347, 170348, and 161060.

13 (Witness approached podium.)

14 MR. DANIHEL: This is yet  
15 another official decree and writ of  
16 mandamus quo warranto and, as such,  
17 requires immediate action and remedy.

18 This Council transfers hundreds  
19 of private deeds to Philadelphia  
20 Redevelopment Authority every week.  
21 According to the Redevelopment Authority,  
22 upwards of 100 million taxpayer dollars  
23 are going to be spent to build a mall on  
24 my stolen home.

25 This Council and the Mayor have

2           long known of accusations of illegal deed  
3           transfers, questionable spending, lack of  
4           due process/law violations occurring at  
5           City agencies. The Mayor and Council are  
6           well aware that the oath of office and  
7           laws require this government to

9           for violations. The rule of law requires  
10          action. Theft of my home was not  
11          allowed. The Declaration states, to  
12          secure these rights, governments are  
13          institute among men, depriving their  
14          power from the consent of the governed.

15                   I ask the governed assembled in  
16          this room, who has allowed this Council  
17          to steal my home and possibly others?  
18          Seeing no authorization for your actions,  
19          the Constitution requires immediate  
20          remedy of this breach of law. Your oath  
21          of office requires you to act or face  
22          prison.

23                   42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
24          1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA  
25          Constitution, Article 1, Sections 1

2           through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 708, 709, 712,  
3           713, 716, and other laws listed in SCOTUS  
4           15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear  
5           violated.

6                        I call upon the federal and  
7           Commonwealth governments to perform their  
8           constitutional obligations to investigate  
9           and prosecute all involved in the theft  
10          and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
11          1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of  
12          God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for  
13          23 years is egregious, extraordinary,  
14          oath-violating, and requires immediate  
15          remedy.

16                       A just government must obey the  
17          rule of law. This color of law  
18          government must have its Charter to  
19          govern revoked until a constitutionally  
20          compliant government is installed.

21                       Public servants cannot refuse  
22          their sworn duty to act any more than a  
23          fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
24          sovereign people require the Constitution  
25          and laws be enforced. Jail is required

3 takes a lot of cooperation to create and  
4 allow monumental corruption.

15 Philadelphia. I'm here to express my  
16 sincere concern over the proposed zoning  
17 changes of Bill 170005. This bill  
18 down-zones the entire area between Girard  
19 Avenue and Cecil B. Moore and North Broad  
20 and Ridge Avenue to single-family zoning.

21 I'll keep my remarks brief, as  
22 I know that there are others here in  
23 opposition of the bill. I also want  
24 their voice heard.

25 I was born and raised in

2 Philadelphia, educated at Temple  
3 University, made my life's work and  
4 purpose to contribute to the positive  
5 growth and development of Philadelphia.  
6 I'm a member, active member, of the Asian  
7 American Political Action Committee,  
8 contributor to the Aquinas Center, which  
9 is a protector of immigrant rights. It's  
10 located in South Philadelphia.

11 The life that's being brought  
12 into many of these neighborhoods in  
13 Philadelphia, along with resources,  
14 energy, and heart being poured out by  
15 residents, developers, community  
16 organizers, and leaders would be  
17 devastated by passing of this bill. The  
18 down-zoning proposed would drastically  
19 reduce foot traffic, decrease economic  
20 opportunity, limit local business, and  
21 stifle community development efforts.

22 I know that diversity is  
23 important to community planning, and  
24 having housing at multiple pricing points  
25 helps to protect and ensure diversity and

2           contribute to thriving neighborhoods.  
3           Down-zoning would eliminate many  
4           affordable price points and make for a  
5           less diverse community. And the  
6           properties that I build are for that  
7           group, the middle income group, middle  
8           class group.

9                        I urge you to consider and not  
10           pass Bill 170005 and collaborate with the  
11           developers and other stakeholders to  
12           compromise towards a more effective  
13           solution.

14                       I'm here with a couple of my  
15           business partners. One her name is  
16           Felicia Middleton. She's going to be  
17           designing a coffee shop that's going on  
18           1320 North 18th Street, which was going  
19           to do community outreach, et cetera.  
20           With this down-zoning, it's going to  
21           deter this effort. Might stop it.

22                       That's it. Thank you.

23                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24           Thank you for your testimony.

25                       (Witness approached podium.)

2 MS. MIDDLETON: Hi. My name is  
3 Felicia Middleton. I'm in support of Mr.  
4 Raza and --

7 on one second. Your name is not on the  
8 list?

9 MS. MIDDLETON: My name is on  
10 the list, but I think he put my name  
11 separate from him.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
13 on? Can you wait until you're called?

14 MS. MIDDLETON: Sure. Sure.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16 Thank you.

17 Don't go anywhere. You're  
18 next.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Felicia  
20 Middleton.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22 Don't go anywhere.

23 MS. MIDDLETON: Hello again.  
24 My name is Felicia Middleton. I'm an  
25 architectural designer, a business owner.

2 Actually, my business used to be in the  
3 district that we're speaking about right  
4 now, right on Ridge Avenue at 20th and  
5 Master -- I'm sorry; not 20th and Master,  
6 but right at 20th -- on Ridge Avenue at  
7 20th Street.

8 As an architectural designer,  
9 I've worked with a lot of business  
10 owners, tenant fit-outs, and a lot of  
11 business owners unaware of the changes in  
12 the Zoning Code. They're really not  
13 aware of the Zoning Code themselves.  
14 They purchase buildings that look like  
15 they're commercial buildings and they're  
16 designated as RSA-5. Unfortunately I see  
17 a lot of minority business owners and a  
18 lot of business owners that are immigrant  
19 business owners purchase these buildings,  
20 not understanding the nuances of the  
21 codes, and they don't understand why this  
22 building that looks commercial is  
23 designated as a single-family home.

24 They buy the building. Then  
25 they have to go through the zoning

2 process, the variance process, and it  
3 becomes a financial burden on them, and  
4 some of them have gone out of business.  
5 I've actually witnessed this happening.

6 And I'm just in support of  
7 Mr. Raza and his development and what  
8 he's doing in that area and his opinions  
9 on the bill, because I too have the same  
10 opinions. And I feel for a lot of the  
11 small business owners that end up in this  
12 situation, and I'm just hoping that City  
13 Council would go along with our desires  
14 and recognize some of the burdens that  
15 are placed on these small business owners  
16 and just consider this when you're going  
17 through the rezoning process.

18 Thank you.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Tavis Scales,  
20 commenting on 170005.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 MR. SCALES: Hello, everyone.  
23 I'm not -- I'm not good at public  
24 speaking, so please forgive me for this.  
25 But I actually work directly with Raza.

2 I'm his realtor. And with the rezoning,  
3 what's going to happen is they're not  
4 going to be able, like he was saying, to  
5 develop in the neighborhood the way they  
6 want to.

7 I work with a lot of young  
8 professionals. As a real estate agent,  
9 there's not enough inventory, and what  
10 happens is when these young professionals  
11 graduate school, they don't really have  
12 nice neighborhoods to move into, and  
13 Mr. Raza has given me the opportunity to  
14 go out and be able to help these young  
15 professionals find a place to be able to  
16 move into.

17 So I just hope that this bill  
18 doesn't get passed and he's able to still  
19 finish developing.

20 Thank you.

16 an organization and our constituency are  
17 joining hands -- originally it was around  
18 City Hall until the NFL Draft -- within  
19 the corridor of City Hall to show support  
20 to survivors of sexual assault and sexual  
21 violence here in the City of  
22 Philadelphia. We're the only rape crisis  
23 center in this city.

24 In the City of Philadelphia,  
25 there were 1,199 reported rapes last year

2 alone. Rape still continues to be the  
3 lowest reported crime here in the City  
4 and nationally. So I just wanted to  
5 extend support and thanks for the  
6 resolution, and hopefully next year when  
7 we plan a Teal Day, that Council will  
8 also participate and wear teal on that  
9 day.

10 So thank you very much.

9 issuance of permits for what he hopes  
10 will be a relatively brief period is  
11 appropriate.

12 Based on the rapidly changing  
13 technology, disparity of approaches in  
14 peer cities, and the unique  
15 characteristics of Philadelphia, that we  
16 need to establish the most appropriate  
17 approach.

18 He does lay out his concerns,  
19 and I wanted to say on behalf of  
20 Councilman Mark Squilla and myself that  
21 we have been working on this. We have  
22 had meetings, and there will be a public  
23 hearing on May 15th at 1 o'clock to look  
24 at best practice in EV infrastructure,  
25 which is ultimately the issue that we all

2 share, how people can get electric  
3 vehicles and charge them publicly.

4 Confirmed witnesses are PECO,  
5 which has been very involved and has  
6 successfully applied for a portion of the  
7 \$2 billion available for a Volkswagen to  
8 fund EV infrastructure. So we are one of  
9 11 cities that will divide up \$300  
10 million, thanks to PECO.

11 ChargePoint, one of the leading  
12 companies in electric vehicle  
13 infrastructure, is confirmed. They will  
14 testify, as well as the Delaware Valley  
15 Regional Planning Commission that created  
16 a regional EV infrastructure plan back in  
17 2013. We have also invited the Mayor's  
18 Administration, Tesla, Electric Drive  
19 Transportation Association, Enterprise  
20 CarShare, Shared Use Mobility Center,  
21 Eastern Pennsylvania Alliance of Clean  
22 Transportation, and we will be inviting,  
23 as we have done research and made our  
24 contact points, Electrify America, EV  
25 Connect, Karma, representatives of the

2           City of Portland, Oregon, San Francisco,  
3           California, Houston, Texas, and  
4           Amsterdam, Netherlands.

5                        So I think we have a very  
6           robust and high-quality hearing. Of  
7           course we expect some testimony to be by  
8           written testimony, but this is just a  
9           first of what will be many hearings for  
10          best practices.

11                       Thank you very much.

12                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13          Thank you, Councilman.

14                       Speeches on behalf of the  
15          majority?

16                       The Chair recognizes Councilman  
17          Henon.

18                       COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
19          Council President. This is a bitter but  
20          sweet moment for me to acknowledge the  
21          services of one of my staffers who are  
22          leaving, going on to better passages and  
23          a better opportunity. I'm going to do it  
24          in absentia, because he doesn't like the  
25          spotlight. So this is one of the

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2           benefits of having these Council sessions  
3           taped, right, and videod. So he can  
4           watch it remotely or he can be here and

8                         And I would want to take the  
9           moment to acknowledge the service of  
10          Chris Creelman, who will be leaving my  
11          office to join the Capital Office over  
12          Parks and Recreation. And most people as  
13          you see come and go in this building.  
14          People leave offices maybe on a weekly  
15          basis. Sometimes they get acknowledged  
16          here in City Council. But most stay for  
17          a term or two. Chris stayed for 18  
18          years. I don't know how he did it, but  
19          he stayed for 18 years, but in that time  
20          he has become an expert on parks and  
21          recreation in the capital budget from the  
22          Appropriations Committee, managing a lot  
23          of the projects over the years for the  
24          Sixth Councilmanic District. And it's  
25          always been a priority for me to position

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2 my staff to expand their careers and use  
3 their experience that they have had here  
4 to achieve great things.

5 So I'm proud. I really am  
6 proud to announce that we are not just --  
7 that we're losing him but for other  
8 opportunities, but that we'll be able to  
9 work together in his career to give him  
10 the opportunity to focus on the parks and  
11 recs over there on making our rec centers  
12 stronger and better, especially in light  
13 of Rebuild. So there's a vision that the  
14 Administration has. There's a vision  
15 that this Council has, and he's going to  
16 be a part of that.

17 So I can speak for us all, and  
18 I know I can, but there are some stooges  
19 who are behind me, because he has a  
20 pretty wise sense of humor, that sit back  
21 here, I'm going to call Comedy Row.  
22 They're going to miss, as I'm going to  
23 miss, his wise sense of humor, his ugly  
24 holiday sweaters, his pins that light up  
25 around the holidays, and his short socks.

10                      COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

24                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
25          Thank you, Councilman.

2                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
3       Jones.

4                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
5       Mr. President. We do a lot of work in  
6       these Chambers, and we're in the midst of  
7       the budget process. The other day we  
8       were working with the Fire Commissioner  
9       on his budget. And sometimes it's not  
10      the big picture headline stuff that you  
11      get to do that matters the most; it's  
12      some of the small ball stuff that people  
13      really don't read about. And one of  
14      those things was the ten-year lithium  
15      battery legislation we did. And I asked  
16      the Fire Commissioner had it made a  
17      difference, had it saved lives, has it  
18      caused a movement of the needle in the  
19      right direction towards fire safety, and  
20      I held my breath, because if he'd have  
21      said no, I'd have been grossly  
22      disappointed. But when he said yes and  
23      when he could quantify it with the  
24      numbers, it's the stuff -- the reason why  
25      we sit here.

2                         Similarly, I have to ask if a  
3 tree falls in the woods and no one hears,  
4 was there a sound? If we pass a bill  
5 into law and it doesn't get enacted upon,  
6 is it really a law?

7                         We had a tragic death on the  
8 2200 block of Saint James Street in  
9 Rittenhouse Square, fire escape collapsed  
10 killing a young 22-year-old Albert Suh, a  
11 graduate from Penn State University who  
12 worked at JPMorgan Chase, the kind of  
13 millennial that you want to move in and  
14 take root in Philadelphia.

15                        Two years later in these  
16 Chambers, 2016, 26-year-old Ms. O'Brien,  
17 a kindergarten teacher that was with him  
18 that was a friend of his, testified about  
19 the horrific nature of that collapse, his  
20 death, and her injury as well. We then  
21 got together, worked through, passed Bill  
22 No. 160462. It was passed and the law  
23 signed 6/28/16.

24                        I raise this now to let folk in  
25 the older parts of the City of

2           Philadelphia that have buildings that are  
3           over 50, 60, 70 years old that have done  
4           wonders in interior work, looks beautiful  
5           inside, but we have to make sure that  
6           they're safe outside. And these fire  
7           escapes weren't built to have millennial  
8           parties on. They weren't built for that,  
9           but unfortunately, you know, young people  
10          take advantage, a little more risque,  
11          more risque than I would be, but it is  
12          time to ante up.

13                   All those fire escapes built  
14          before 2017 have until July 1st to get  
15          their first inspection. All those that  
16          are built after 2008 have over the next  
17          ten years, because they're newer and  
18          probably a bit more secure. A fire  
19          escape built in the 1900s is probably  
20          rusty, is probably in need of  
21          maintenance, and we need to have those  
22          maintenance checks so that we safeguard  
23          people who live there.

24                   Thank you, Mr. President.

25                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2           Thank you, Councilman.

3                     The Chair recognizes  
4           Councilwoman Gym.

5                     COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you  
6           very much, Council President. First of  
7           all, I wanted to also acknowledge  
8           Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell for the  
9           tremendous work that she did, not only on  
10          the current resolution that she shared  
11          with us but, most importantly, that she  
12          just finished a spring break where her  
13          office helped pilot for the first time  
14          free lunches and breakfast for  
15          schoolchildren who would not normally be  
16          fed during the spring break holiday. So  
17          I just want to thank Councilwoman  
18          Blackwell for being a wonderful mentor  
19          and advisor, not just in the kind of  
20          person that she is but in particular the  
21          way she shows us how to get it done.

22                     The other thing I wanted to add  
23          very briefly was that this week the  
24          Washington Post reported about the  
25          staggering number of increases in

2           immigrants being detained, arrested, and  
3           deported by ICE, and they specifically  
4           included Philadelphia in it as, one, the  
5           third highest jurisdiction that's seen  
6           the largest increase. Our increase was  
7           six times higher here in the City in the  
8           first three months of this year than it  
9           was last year at the same time.

10                    So the people who are being  
11           targeted are not criminals. They are  
12           DACA recipients, children, adoptees,  
13           parolees reporting in for probation. The  
14           arrests have sent shock waves through a  
15           lot of our communities, because they have  
16           switched up the kind of people who would  
17           have normally been and have previously  
18           been explicitly protected, including by  
19           the current President of the United  
20           States, and that those rules are changing  
21           every single day.

22                    This week also Councilwoman  
23           Quinones-Sanchez and myself met with the  
24           Field Director of ICE, Jennifer Ritchey,  
25           and her team over at 1600 Callowhill

2           Street. It was an important sit-down to  
3           discuss some of the concerns that we had,  
4           requests for information, understandings  
5           of procedures. And it's clear that we're  
6           not on the same side of issues, but at  
7           the same time, we do not have to see  
8           within our city's borders the kinds of  
9           terrorizing tactics that we're seeing  
10          across the country. We don't want to be  
11          the kind of city like Los Angeles that  
12          reported declining numbers of domestic  
13          violence and sexual assault as we have in  
14          other places where we have also seen  
15          retaliatory raids and other types of  
16          things that have rounded up people who  
17          don't come anywhere near the criminal  
18          pipeline.

19                   And so I thought it was an  
20          important dialogue. It's important for  
21          us right now to be as vigilant as  
22          possible, to pay attention, to let our  
23          federal authorities who operate within  
24          our borders to know that we're paying  
25          attention, and that we're going to fight

2 for our communities. We're going to  
3 recognize and respect the boundaries  
4 between federal, state, and local  
5 authorities, of course. We're abiding by  
6 the law, but we are concerned and we need  
7 to keep our city safe.

8 It doesn't keep us safe if  
9 people are afraid to report. It doesn't  
10 keep us safe if parolees do not want to  
11 report into probation. It doesn't keep  
12 us safe if kids are afraid to get dropped  
13 off at school if their parents aren't --  
14 each one of them have their paperwork  
15 right in order.

16 So I want to thank Councilwoman  
17 Quinones-Sanchez. I want to thank this  
18 Council for standing strong on this  
19 issue, and we'll keep vigilant.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you, Councilwoman.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
23 Green.

24 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
25 Council President. I just want to remind

3           in the Caucus Room with Philadelphia  
4           CeaseFire. There's some information  
5           presented about the work they have done  
6           that was the basis of the resolution that  
7           was presented today. In addition, lunch  
8           will be provided.

9                        So thank you.

10                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you, Councilman.

12                      The Chair recognizes  
13           Councilwoman Blackwell.

14                      COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
15           you, Mr. President. Let me thank all my  
16           colleagues for the kind remarks. Let me  
17           say that I'm glad, Councilwoman Gym, that  
18           you and Maria went to see the ICE folks,  
19           because we sure enough passed a  
20           resolution in here criticizing them. As  
21           you know, we represent 35 African  
22           countries, and they've been pretty rough  
23           on people who don't need that.

24                      But I really rose to say that  
25           we all know Mike Piper. His parents were

3           district. That's how I met him. But his  
4           wife passed on Monday, and they will have  
5           a funeral and memorial service for her on  
6           Monday at 10:00 at the Unitarian Society

8                         Thank you.

9                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10           Thank you, Councilwoman.

11                         There are no other speeches.

12           The Chair recognizes Councilwoman  
13           Reynolds Brown for a motion to adjourn.

14                         COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
