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COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning, everyone.

(Good morning.)

COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If the guests and visitors will retire behind the rail, we will get moving. Thank you.

Before we start our session today, I would ask that if anyone has a cell phone or any other electronic device that makes any kind of noise, would you please turn it off or turn it on airplane mode. Thank you very much for your cooperation.

To give our invocation this morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor William Brawner of Haven Peniel United Methodist Church. He is here today as my guest.

I'd ask all guests, members, and visitors to please rise.

(Councilmembers and guests rise.)

PASTOR BRAWNER: Good morning.

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2 (Good morning.)

3 PASTOR BRAWNER: Let us look to  
4 the Lord.

5 Dear Heavenly and Most Gracious  
6 God, we worship you. We give you thanks.  
7 We praise you for your glory.

8 God, right now as we sit in  
9 this Chamber, as we sit at the helm of  
10 your feet, God, we ask that you lead us,  
11 guide us, and direct us. Fill this place  
12 with your spirit, God. Allow us always  
13 to remember that people in whom you wish  
14 us to touch and the people who have been  
15 lost and forgotten and the people who we  
16 represent on this morning, dear God.

17 God, right now we pray for our  
18 schools. We pray for our churches. We  
19 pray for our communities. We pray for  
20 that mother who is single and has no food  
21 to eat. We pray for that brother who has  
22 come home from prison and has no job to  
23 welcome him home.

24 God, right now we ask that you  
25 remind us of who we are but whose we are,

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2 God, and who has put us in the positions  
3 that we're in right now.

4 God, allow us not to forget  
5 what you have called us to do. And, God,  
6 we will be ever so mindful to give you  
7 all the praise, honor, and glory.

8 It is in Jesus' name we pray.

9 Amen.

10 (Amen.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you so much, Pastor.

13 Council will be at ease.

14 (Council at ease.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you very much.

17 The next order of business is  
18 the approval of the Journal of the  
19 meeting of Thursday, April 20th, 2017,  
20 and the Chair recognizes Councilman  
21 Greenlee.

22 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
23 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
24 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, April  
25 20th, 2017 be approved.

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2                   (Duly seconded.)

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
4                   been moved and properly seconded that the  
5                   Journal of the meeting of Thursday, April  
6                   20th, 2017 stand approved.

7                   All those in favor say aye.

8                   (Aye.)

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10                  Those opposed?

11                  (No response.)

12                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
13                  ayes have it, and the Journal is  
14                  approved.

15                  The next order of business is  
16                  requests for leave of absence, and the  
17                  Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

18                  COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
19                  Mr. President. On behalf of the  
20                  majority, there are no requests of leaves  
21                  of absence today.

22                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
23                  Chair thanks the gentleman.

24                  The Chair now recognizes  
25                  Councilman O'Neill. Where's Councilman

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2 O'Neill? Oh, there he is.

3 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
4 O'Neill.

5 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
6 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
7 republicans, there are no requests for  
8 leave of absence.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
10 Chair thanks the gentleman.

11 At this time, I would like to  
12 dispense with the regular order of  
13 business and I would like to thank  
14 everyone who has taken time out of their  
15 busy day to come down to witness their  
16 government in action. We hope that your  
17 stay here today is a knowledgeable one  
18 and, more importantly, a pleasurable one,  
19 so much so that you come back again.  
20 Again, thank you so much for your  
21 participation in today's session.

22 At this time, the Chair  
23 recognizes Councilman Johnson, who will  
24 present a resolution welcoming the  
25 National Football League Draft. Would

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2 Peter O'Reilly and -- I don't know  
3 whether to call you former Eagles player  
4 or Congressman. I'm going to call you  
5 Congressman John Runyan and our good  
6 friend Garry Cobb please join the  
7 Councilman at the podium.

8 (Councilmembers and guests  
9 approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
11 joining Councilman Johnson, we have  
12 Councilman Taubenberger.

13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: So this is  
14 a joint effort, and I learned under the  
15 explicable and dynamic leadership of my  
16 Council President that all things that we  
17 do in City Council is a joint effort and  
18 it's a team effort. So I'm going to ask  
19 for all of my colleagues to please join  
20 me at the podium and don their NFL Draft  
21 hats, please.

22 (All Councilmembers approached  
23 podium.)

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: So we also  
25 have joining with us is Garry Cobb, also

4           Peter O'Reilly, and with my colleague  
5           Councilman Al Taubenberger, we're doing a  
6           bipartisan presentation. We won't hold  
7           it to our former congressman republican,  
8           so you'll just read background about the  
9           things he's worked on and I'll talk about  
10          Mr. Cobb.

11                           COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

12          Absolutely. Congressman Runyan, it's a  
13          pleasure.

14                         John Runyan is the current Vice  
15          President of Policy and Rules  
16          Administration for the National Football  
17          League. Runyan is a former two-term  
18          United States Congressman from Jersey's  
19          Third Congressional District. Prior to  
20          running for office, Runyan was an  
21          offensive tackle and played 14 seasons in  
22          the NFL, nine of which were right down on  
23          Broad Street for the Philadelphia Eagles.

24                         During his 2002 season with the  
25          Eagles, Runyan was selected for the Pro

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2 Bowl. Runyan was also a member of the  
3 2004 Super Bowl team. Runyan lives in  
4 New Jersey suburbs with his wife,  
5 Loretta, and three children.

6 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Mr. Garry  
7 Cobb is the current TV and radio  
8 personality on Fox 29 and Sports Radio 94  
9 WIP. Mr. Cobb also runs a popular  
10 Philadelphia sports website, gcobb.com.  
11 Prior to joining Sports Radio, Cobb  
12 played 11 seasons in the NFL as a  
13 linebacker, three of which were for the  
14 Philadelphia Eagles as a crucial member  
15 of Coach Buddy Ryan's extraordinary  
16 defense. Some of Cobb's teammates  
17 include Hall of Famers Troy Aikman and  
18 Michael Irvin.

19 Mr. Cobb was honored in 2002 by  
20 President George W. Bush for his work  
21 with troubled youth. Mr. Cobb is married  
22 to his college sweetheart and they have  
23 three adult children.

24 Representing the NFL, we have  
25 Peter O'Reilly, who is the current Senior

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2 Vice President of Events for the National  
3 Football League. Peter O'Reilly oversees  
4 events such as the Super Bowl, Pro Bowl,  
5 NFL Draft and others. Peter O'Reilly is  
6 no stranger to the NFL. He previously  
7 worked for the League in the Fan Strategy  
8 and Marketing Department. O'Reilly has  
9 also worked for the NBA and on New York  
10 City's 2012 Olympic bid.

11 So it's only fitting that my  
12 colleagues who are standing by -- who are  
13 standing on this podium here with me  
14 today honor the NFL Draft as we host them  
15 here this weekend here in the City of  
16 Philadelphia.

17 I want to say hats off to the  
18 Administration, Mayor Kenney and his team  
19 and, most importantly, the First Lady of  
20 our Councilman, Curtis Jones, Jazelle  
21 Jones, who leads all the efforts here in  
22 the City of Philadelphia.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: And so the  
25 event is hosted in the great councilmanic

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2 district of the Fifth, sponsored by  
3 Council President Darrell Clarke, but I  
4 just think as we move forward, as the  
5 City, we had the Democratic National  
6 Convention. We also had the Pope. And  
7 hosting this event is just another  
8 example of the City of Philadelphia  
9 moving in the right direction. And as  
10 the Council President always says, this  
11 is a team effort, the Administration but,  
12 most importantly, members of City Council  
13 that's doing the hard day-to-day work  
14 making sure we get things done.

15 And so on behalf of the City of  
16 Philadelphia, we want to welcome the  
17 National Football League Draft to the  
18 City of Philadelphia, commemorating the  
19 first ever NFL Draft, which took place on  
20 February the 8th in our city 1936.

21 Whereas, the 82nd NFL Draft  
22 will take place April the 27th to April  
23 the 29th, 2017, largely centered around  
24 the Philadelphia Museum of Art and  
25 Benjamin Franklin Parkway. The event is

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2           expected to draw 200,000 football fans to  
3           Philadelphia; and

4                       COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

5           Whereas, Philadelphia has a long history  
6           with the NFL Draft. Having played host  
7           to the inaugural draft on February 8th,  
8           1936, the Philadelphia Eagles made the  
9           first player selection. Over the course  
10          of its 81-year history, the Draft has  
11          returned to the City 15 times; and

12                      Whereas, the NFL Draft was  
13           instituted as a measure to create  
14           competitive balance in the league by  
15           allowing weaker teams from the previous  
16           season to select the most talented  
17           incoming players. As a result, the NFL  
18           has been able to create compelling  
19           competition across the league; this model  
20           has been followed by all other major  
21           American sports. In fact, there's a book  
22           about it on any given Sunday, so it  
23           proves it works.

24                      Whereas, major events such as  
25           the NFL Draft help to advertise the

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2           City's thriving tourism industry. The  
3           Draft will draw attention to  
4           Philadelphia's many attractions and  
5           offers yet another opportunity to  
6           showcase our great city; and

7                         Whereas

8                         COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
9           the citizens of Philadelphia are deeply  
10          devoted to the sports franchises that  
11          call this city home, particularly the  
12          Philadelphia Eagles, which is located in  
13          Second Councilmanic District. The 2017  
14          NFL Draft will allow Philadelphians to  
15          gather with sports fans from across the  
16          country in celebration of their favorite  
17          teams. The City of Philadelphia is proud  
18          to join with the NFL as the host of the  
19          2017 Draft; now, therefore, be it

20                         Resolved, that the Council of  
21          the City of Philadelphia hereby welcomes  
22          the NFL Football League Draft to the City  
23          of Philadelphia and commemorates the  
24          first ever NFL Draft, which took place in  
25          the City of Philadelphia on February the

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2 8th of 1936.

3 And on behalf of the City of  
4 Philadelphia, we want to officially  
5 present you this citation and say welcome  
6 to the City. Thank you very much.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
9 the Chair recognizes Mr. O'Reilly for  
10 remarks.

11 MR. O'REILLY: Thank you so  
12 much, Councilmember Johnson. Thank you  
13 so much, Councilmember Taubenberger.  
14 Thank you, Council President. On behalf  
15 of the National Football League, we could  
16 not be more excited that the NFL Draft is  
17 headed home to its birthplace here in  
18 Philadelphia starting today.

19 (Applause.)

20 MR. O'REILLY: This city, this  
21 City Council, the Mayor, everybody across  
22 the City, Superintendent, the Convention  
23 and Visitors Bureau, certainly Jazelle  
24 Jones and her husband have been with us  
25 throughout this process and been

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2           incredible partners. They have embraced,  
3           you have embraced the NFL Draft, and I  
4           think you will see today and tonight and  
5           over the next three days that we at the  
6           NFL are embracing Philadelphia and  
7           bringing that to life on the national and  
8           global stage through the NFL Draft.

9                         This is for us one of our  
10           biggest moments, and we couldn't be more  
11           proud to be back here. It's not only  
12           about those three days on the Parkway,  
13           but it's everything we're doing this  
14           entire week in partnership with you, in  
15           every part of the community, in schools  
16           to make sure we leave a lasting impact  
17           here in Philadelphia. That's important  
18           wherever we go.

19                         We're thrilled to be here. The  
20           weather is fantastic, which we thank you  
21           for as well, and we are excited for a  
22           great three days.

23                         And I'll hand it over to my  
24           taller and more accomplished colleague,  
25           Mr. John Runyan.

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2                   (Applause.)

3           MR. RUNYAN: Thank you, Council  
4           President Clarke, Councilman Johnson,  
5           Councilman Taubenberger, and all members  
6           of Council for this acknowledgment.

7                   When I speak and from my  
8           background, what this is all about, it's  
9           about teamwork. We all had a role in  
10          this. We all have a hand in this. And  
11          when you want to talk about this nation,  
12          you want to talk about the National  
13          Football League, it all started right  
14          here in Philadelphia. Talking about the  
15          first National Football Draft 81 years  
16          ago here, Bert Bell started right here at  
17          the Ritz Carlton on Broad Street.

18                  But you want to know the irony  
19          of the whole thing? The last time the  
20          NFL Draft was in Philadelphia was 1960.  
21          What happened? The Eagles won the World  
22          Championship.

23                   (Applause.)

24          MR. RUNYAN: Another thing just  
25          to hang your hat on.

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2                   So on behalf of another former  
3 Eagle, Troy Vincent, who is actually  
4 Executive Vice President of Football  
5 Operations at NFL and my boss, we thank  
6 you for your partnership. Between Troy  
7 and I, we know how much football means to  
8 this city. It's great to be here. And,  
9 again, on behalf of the National Football  
10 League, thank you for this resolution and  
11 thank you for your hospitality, and have  
12 a great day. The gates open at noon  
13 today.

14                   (Applause.)

15                   MR. COBB: Good afternoon,  
16 everybody. I also would like to thank  
17 City Council, of course, for welcoming  
18 the National Football League, but I'd  
19 like to emphasize something else that  
20 these few days are about. Last night I  
21 was sitting with a young man who could  
22 very well be drafted by the Eagles. His  
23 name is Derek Barnett. He played at the  
24 University of Tennessee. I was sitting  
25 with him and his mom, and they were

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2           recounting all of the different  
3           challenges they've been through, you  
4           know, raised by a single mom and they  
5           went through some tough times where they  
6           had some challenges financially and a lot  
7           of different challenges they went through  
8           as a family. But they're able to  
9           experience what can be -- what's going to  
10          be an outstanding evening for the young  
11          man and his family, and that's one of the  
12          great things about the NFL. The National  
13          Football League is giving these young men  
14          a chance to live out their dream, giving  
15          a lot of young families an opportunity to  
16          experience really some of the great  
17          things about not only our world and our  
18          country, but of course the City of  
19          Philadelphia, but being able to live out  
20          their dream. And really that's what it's  
21          all about. That's what we really expound  
22          as a country, for young folks to be able  
23          to dream of doing different things and  
24          then get the chance to experience it.  
25          That's what we're going to see tonight.

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2 So you're going to see a lot of tears, a  
3 lot of people tearing up and crying about  
4 this experience, but we're going to all  
5 be able to enjoy it with them.

6 So I just encourage you to  
7 enjoy this night. It's going to be a  
8 great time for everybody, and there'll be  
9 a lot of tears shed, but they'll be tears  
10 of joy, and that's what's going to be  
11 great about it.

12 God bless you, and nice to talk  
13 to you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you.

17 Council will be at ease.

18 (Council at ease.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. It's going to be an exciting  
21 three days.

22 At this time, the Chair  
23 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who  
24 will present a resolution acknowledging  
25 the PennAssist Program - Bridging the Gap

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2           from High School to Building Trades.  
3           Would Steve Greulich, Anthony  
4           Wigglesworth, Dr. William Hite, and those  
5           accompanying them please join the  
6           Councilwoman at the podium.

7                         (Councilmembers and guests  
8           approached podium.)

9                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   And  
10          joining the Councilwoman, we have  
11          Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman --  
12          Councilwoman is suggesting that everybody  
13          come up.

14                        (All Councilmembers approached  
15          podium.)

16                        COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:   Thank  
17          you.   So we're asking all of labor, all  
18          of Penn, Dr. Hite, the School District,  
19          Della Clark, my partner, all who are  
20          here.   And Kenyatta thought he started  
21          something, but we have everybody  
22          included, because this resolution will  
23          affect all our districts.   It's not just  
24          Jannie Blackwell in West and Southwest.  
25          This is a citywide change, and that is

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2 why we're asking everybody to read a  
3 part.

4 Blondell, please start us out.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: I would  
6 add my editorial comment that this is a  
7 citywide sea change wherein the entire  
8 city, when done right -- and under  
9 Councilwoman Blackwell's leadership, I am  
10 sure it will be done right. I had the  
11 good fortune to work in Harrisburg as a  
12 legislative aide when Governor Casey  
13 was -- Senator Casey's father was  
14 Governor, and I often heard him say, The  
15 question is, and what did you do with the  
16 power when you had it. Councilwoman  
17 Blackwell has pulled together an  
18 unprecedented group of stakeholders who  
19 under her leadership I am sure will get  
20 it right when it comes to ensuring that  
21 young people in the School District end  
22 up with skills that they can get them a  
23 job and move them so that we can reduce  
24 that 25 percent poverty rate. This  
25 matters, and I congratulate Councilwoman

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2 Blackwell for that.

3 Acknowledging and commending

4 the University of Pennsylvania, LF

5 Driscoll, the School District of

6 Philadelphia and the Philadelphia

7 Building Trades Council for their

8 establishment of the unprecedented

9 PennAssist Program - Bridging the Gap

10 from High School to Building Trades,

11 PennAssist Program - Bridging the Gap

12 from High School to Building Trades, an

13 unprecedented effort to promote and

14 support our city's youth in their pursuit

15 of careers in the building trade.

16 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,

17 Penn Medicine is developing a new

18 state-of-the-art hospital to be known as

19 the New Patient Pavilion in the

20 University City area of the Third Council

21 District in the City of Philadelphia; and

22 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, the

23 development of the hospital will provide

24 significant economic opportunities for

25 residents and businesses in the City of

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2 Philadelphia and the region; and

3           COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,

4 minority and women workers and minority

5 and women-owned businesses have often not

6 had equal opportunity to work on

7 construction projects occurring in the

8 City; and

9           COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, the

10 School District of Philadelphia Career

11 and Technical Education (CTE) programs in

12 construction are half empty because

13 graduates have not been able to find work

14 as apprentices or continue their building

15 trades education by getting into union

16 apprenticeship programs; and

17           COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, in

18 October 2016, the Director of the CTE

19 program testified in Council that the

20 District views City Council as an

21 important partner and requested that

22 Council advocate for the building trades

23 unions to partner with the District CTE

24 programs to increase student access to

25 the union apprenticeship programs; and

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2 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,  
3 the University of Pennsylvania, its  
4 construction manager LF Driscoll, the  
5 Philadelphia Building Trades Council and  
6 the School District of Philadelphia have  
7 collaborated to create the PennAssist  
8 Program to provide a pathway to union  
9 apprenticeship for graduates of CTE and  
10 other pre-apprenticeship programs, to  
11 promote workforce diversity on Penn  
12 construction projects and construction  
13 projects around the City; and

14 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
15 under the program, 2017 CTE graduates can  
16 enroll after completing a CTE program  
17 focused on a career in the building  
18 trades. An information session will be  
19 provided at each of the CTE locations to  
20 inform students of the program. All  
21 interested students can sign up; and

22 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,  
23 students will undergo a skills assessment  
24 and receive help obtaining a driver's  
25 license. Students will participate in a

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2 two to three-week boot camp to begin July  
3 2017, where they will receive basic math  
4 and work with skills training, as well as  
5 OSHA training. The skills assessment and  
6 boot camp results will aid in the  
7 PennAssist team of students to identify  
8 the trades most suitable for each  
9 student. All students will receive a  
10 small stipend to cover the cost of lunch  
11 and transportation for the duration of  
12 the boot camp; and

13 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
14 you, Councilwoman Blackwell.

15 Whereas, following the boot  
16 camp, the PennAssist Team will pair each  
17 student with the most aligned trade and  
18 trade contractor and the student will  
19 begin to work on a Penn Medicine or Penn  
20 construction project where students will  
21 perform work of a first-year apprentice  
22 and receive pay of \$16.50 an hour; and

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: And a point  
24 of personal privilege. I'm a 26-year  
25 member of the Philadelphia Building

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2 Trades, and I could not be prouder than  
3 this moment here today. The Building  
4 Trades have had partners with the School  
5 District and a lot of non-profits  
6 throughout its years and its end users,  
7 its institutions, but it took leadership  
8 of Councilwoman Blackwell -- thank you,  
9 Councilwoman Blackwell -- the business  
10 manager of Philadelphia Building Trades,  
11 John Dougherty, to put these pieces  
12 together in one agreement like this is  
13 historic, and I am extremely proud, as  
14 you all should be, to present this  
15 resolution here today as we stand with  
16 all members of City Council.

17 Whereas, during the twelve  
18 months of the program, students will have  
19 the opportunity to sit for an  
20 apprenticeship test in their trade choice  
21 and may access additional math and work  
22 skill training through the General  
23 Builders Contractors Association.

24 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: If a  
25 student misses a scheduled test, the

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2           Philadelphia Building Trades Council will  
3           allow for an apprentice test to be  
4           administered to a student outside the  
5           regular testing schedule. Students who  
6           pass the test will join the union and  
7           continue working in the building trade;  
8           and

9                        COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas,  
10           the program is planned for the 2017 CTE  
11           graduates and it is intended to be  
12           continued into the future and is further  
13           intended to be expanded to include future  
14           graduates and other young Philadelphians  
15           outside the CTE program; now, therefore,  
16           be it

17                       COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Resolved,  
18           that City Council hereby acknowledges and  
19           commends the University of Pennsylvania,  
20           LF Driscoll, the School District of  
21           Philadelphia and the Philadelphia  
22           Building Trades Council for their  
23           establishment of the PennAssist Program -  
24           Bridging the Gap from High School to  
25           Building Trades; and

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2                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Further  
3 resolved, that an engrossed copy of this  
4 resolution be presented as an expression  
5 of City Council's sincere thanks and  
6 gratitude for this unprecedented effort  
7 to promote and support City youth in  
8 their pursuit of careers in building  
9 trades.

10                   And let's give another huge  
11 round of applause for Councilwoman Jannie  
12 Blackwell and her leadership.

13                   (Applause.)

14                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
15 the Chair recognizes Steve Greulich,  
16 Anthony Wigglesworth, and Dr. William  
17 Hite, in that particular order.

18                   Whatever order you want.

19                   DR. HITE: Thank you, Council  
20 President Clarke. Thank you, members of  
21 City Council, in particular Councilwoman  
22 Blackwell, for making sure that the  
23 School District was a part of this work.  
24 And one thing that we have always and  
25 continue to do is to ensure that our

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2           young people have opportunities, and this  
3           type of partnership creates those  
4           opportunities for young people coming  
5           directly out of high school. It gives  
6           them opportunities to work in the field  
7           of building trades.

8                        The fact that 2017 graduates,  
9           once they graduate from one of our CTE  
10          programs, has a direct pathway into this  
11          type of opportunity is very exciting and  
12          a very exciting day for the students in  
13          the City of Philadelphia and the School  
14          District of Philadelphia.

15                       So, once again, to all of the  
16          individuals who were involved, thank you,  
17          LF Driscoll, Building Trades, University  
18          of Pennsylvania. Thank you to my  
19          colleague and the CTE Office and all of  
20          the other individuals who made this  
21          happen but, more importantly, thank you,  
22          Councilwoman Blackwell, for making us a  
23          part of this very important initiative.

24                        (Applause.)

25                        MR. GREULICH: Good morning.

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2           I'm Steve Greulich with Penn Medicine,  
3           and on behalf of Penn and Penn Medicine,  
4           I would just like to thank Council for  
5           this honor and especially like to thank  
6           Councilwoman Blackwell for her leadership  
7           in this and for her passion for bringing  
8           and for getting young Philadelphia  
9           students into the building trades.

10                   I believe that behind every  
11           successful program is a strong  
12           partnership, and as has been noted here,  
13           I'd just like to acknowledge the School  
14           District of Philadelphia, the General  
15           Building Contractors Association,  
16           Philadelphia Building Trades Council,  
17           Built-Rite, and LF Driscoll for  
18           partnering with Penn Medicine on this  
19           program. And so I think I speak for all  
20           of us when I say we look forward to  
21           starting this, implementing this program,  
22           and seeing its fruits in the youth of the  
23           City of Philadelphia.

24                   Thank you.

25                   (Applause.)

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2 MR. WIGGLESWORTH: Good eve --  
3 good morning. It's not good evening yet.  
4 What you see up here is a manifestation  
5 of the process that we engaged in to come  
6 up with this program, starting with the  
7 persistence and the challenges that were  
8 thrown out by Councilwoman Blackwell. A  
9 large group of us got together to figure  
10 out how to make a better process to allow  
11 our young men and young women in the City  
12 of Philadelphia who are in our public  
13 schools access to our Building Trades  
14 Council unions.

15 The Building Trades Council and  
16 its affiliates is foursquare behind this  
17 program. There is a belief that this is  
18 the way to find our talented -- and I  
19 want to emphasize talented -- young men  
20 and young women to find their way into  
21 our building trades unions. Some do now.  
22 More will in the future.

23 I want to thank my partners in  
24 this process, the Philadelphia Building  
25 Construction Trades Council, LF Driscoll,

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2 Penn Medicine, the University of  
3 Pennsylvania, and the School District of  
4 Philadelphia's CTE program for what I  
5 think will be an extremely effective way  
6 to move people into family-sustaining  
7 jobs.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
13 you very much. I'd like to ask Della  
14 Clark and John Christmas to join me here.  
15 These are my partners, along with Stan  
16 Straughter, who had to go to Jersey today  
17 on another issue. And all of those who  
18 are here have not been introduced. We  
19 have Sam Staten, Local 332, and other  
20 members who are here who have come to  
21 show all of their support. We invite  
22 them to stand. Many of you have come  
23 from labor.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

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2           you, Sam, as well.

3                     And let me say that Tony

4           Wigglesworth and I -- I got moved,

5           because I think of Lucien Blackwell. As

6           all of you know, this is a labor town.

7           We can't do it without one another. We

8           couldn't do it, of course, without the

9           kids, Dr. Hite, and we couldn't do it

10          without all of you. And we included all

11          of you in this resolution because it

12          affects all of us in our neighborhoods

13          and in our schools. And Tony

14          Wigglesworth and I worked years ago when

15          Lucien was still alive and we had the

16          Lucien E. Blackwell Apprenticeship

17          Program before the economy hit and we

18          lost that program with Penn. And I'm

19          just moved today that we're all here

20          together and that we prove no matter how

21          much we can agree or disagree, we can

22          come together to improve the quality of

23          life, help youngsters, help people in

24          neighborhoods, because some people have

25          already graduated who want to take the

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2 test and they're not children, but it's  
3 an open program so that we can make life  
4 better. We can do better in all jobs.  
5 We can do better across the board when it  
6 comes to employment. And I'm moved  
7 today, and I say thank you, Lord. God  
8 bless you.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
11 Council will be at ease.

12 (Council at ease.)

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you and, again, congratulations to  
16 the Councilwoman.

17 Thank you. At this time, the  
18 Chair recognizes Councilwoman  
19 Quinones-Sanchez, who will present a  
20 resolution honoring Judith  
21 Bernstein-Baker. Would  
22 Ms. Bernstein-Baker and those  
23 accompanying her please join the  
24 Councilwoman at the podium.

25 (Councilmembers and guests

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2 approached podium.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
4 joining the Councilwoman, we have  
5 Councilman Oh, Councilman Jones,  
6 Councilman Greenlee, Councilwoman Parker,  
7 Councilwoman Blackwell.

8 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Could  
9 her family join her up here. I know her  
10 grandson and her husband. Could you  
11 please join us.

12 Thank you. It's a different  
13 world post November, and I think this is  
14 a fitting time to really honor and  
15 recognize someone who has been really a  
16 trailblazer when it comes to protecting,  
17 defending refugees and really has  
18 educated and informed the City of  
19 Philadelphia around the importance of our  
20 immigrant community.

21 Judy has retired, but she is  
22 busier today than she was when she was  
23 running HIAS. I asked her what are you  
24 going to do, outside of recovering from  
25 her surgery, and she gave me 12 things -

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2           well, I wrote a book, I'm teaching at  
3           Community College, I am educating lawyers  
4           around immigration, and I've learned to  
5           knit. And she is making pussy hats.  
6           Sorry. And so the women of Council are  
7           going to put in an order for our hats.

8                         We really thank her for all of  
9           the work that she has done. She has  
10          helped all of us in our advocacy and in  
11          our work, and I am sure there are  
12          hundreds of people who are in this  
13          country as contributing members who  
14          sought refuge with her and the work that  
15          she's done, and we really want to thank  
16          her.

17                        So with that, I thank my  
18          Council colleagues to join me this  
19          morning in recognizing and honoring  
20          Judith Bernstein-Baker.

21                        Judith Bernstein-Baker, born to  
22          Jewish immigrants from Poland, and raised  
23          among Latino and Asian seamstresses in  
24          New York, has devoted every waking moment  
25          of her career to welcoming strangers

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2           facing exclusion and genocide into the  
3           fabric of our community, and to ensuring  
4           these new neighbors full access to  
5           everything our diverse and vibrant  
6           neighborhoods have to offer; and

7                        COUNCILMAN OH:   Whereas, Judi's  
8           eighteen years of service to HIAS  
9           Pennsylvania has been deeply personal;  
10          per the Jewish value of welcoming the  
11          stranger, HIAS is the nation's oldest  
12          international migration and refugee  
13          resettlement agency, providing legal and  
14          supportive services to immigrants,  
15          refugees, and asylum seekers to assure  
16          their fair treatment and full integration  
17          into American society; and

18                       Whereas, since joining HIAS  
19          Pennsylvania as Executive Director in  
20          1998, Judi has led the non-profit to  
21          triple in size and expand its services to  
22          provide legal, social, and resettlement  
23          services to low-income Philadelphians who  
24          seek political asylum, citizenship, and  
25          relief from deportation; and

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2                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
3           during Judi's tenure, HIAS Pennsylvania  
4           has relocated refugees fleeing violence  
5           in Central America and West Africa;  
6           secured temporary protective status to  
7           Haitians after the 2010 earthquake;  
8           helped citizens obtain special visas for  
9           refugees from domestic abuse; and became  
10          the region's largest provider of free  
11          immigration services to unaccompanied,  
12          abused, and neglected minors; and

13                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
14          since the day Judi first arrived in the  
15          City of Brotherly Love - to attend the  
16          University of Pennsylvania's graduate  
17          School of Social Work and Temple  
18          University's Beasley School of Law - she  
19          has helped grow the City of  
20          Philadelphia's international reputation  
21          for welcoming, supporting, and embracing  
22          members of our society who have fled  
23          oppression, violence, and even torture;  
24          and

25                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

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2 Whereas, Judi's tireless outreach and  
3 advocacy has influenced the preservation  
4 and expansion of immigrant rights not  
5 only by the City of Philadelphia, but  
6 also by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.  
7 In 2003, Judi courageously established  
8 the Pennsylvania Immigrant and Citizen  
9 Coalition, our first and only statewide  
10 immigration advocacy organization. Most  
11 famously, Judi halted PennDOT's proposed  
12 cancellation of thousands of licenses for  
13 immigrants and refugees in need; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,  
15 Judy Bernstein-Baker is a living legend  
16 in Philadelphia's public interest  
17 community. She was the first staff  
18 attorney at the Support Center for Child  
19 Advocates, the nation's oldest and  
20 largest pro bono program for abused and  
21 neglected children. She founded and  
22 directed the Penn Law Public Service  
23 Program - the first of its kind in an Ivy  
24 League school. She enlisted and trained  
25 hundreds of attorneys and law students in

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2 order to assist applicants for  
3 citizenship. She co-wrote Understanding  
4 Immigration Law and Practice, a guide for  
5 the next generation of practitioners to  
6 protect immigrants and refugees to the  
7 fullest extent of our laws. And she  
8 continues to advocate, tirelessly and  
9 without pause, for all Philadelphians'  
10 right to legal counsel to secure basic  
11 everyday needs; and

12 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, in  
13 2013, the Philadelphia Bar Foundation  
14 Award, originally known as the Apothaker  
15 Award, was presented to Judi  
16 Bernstein-Baker for exemplifying the  
17 highest ideals of public interest law and  
18 exceptional service to the legal service  
19 community; and

20 Whereas, Judi's career is  
21 perhaps, most of all, marked by her  
22 unwavering dedication to her staff,  
23 colleagues throughout the Philadelphia  
24 public interest community. Best put by  
25 Reggie Shuford, Executive Director of the

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2           ACLU of Pennsylvania, and I quote, "Judi  
3           always took the time to offer a word of  
4           encouragement or support, to attend an  
5           event, or to send a congratulatory  
6           message. It is her warmth, compassion,  
7           empathy and genuine interest in others  
8           that made her so effective as an advocate  
9           for social justice. We will miss her  
10          among the ranks of the executive  
11          directors of non-profit legal service  
12          organizations, but we are comforted to  
13          know she is just a phone call away"; now,  
14          therefore, be it

15                    COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ:

16          Resolved, by the Council of the City of  
17          Philadelphia, that the Council honors,  
18          recognizes our dear friend Judith  
19          Bernstein-Baker upon her retirement and  
20          her second cycle of advocacy from HIAS  
21          and a lifelong career in support and  
22          embracing of our most vulnerable  
23          neighbors.

24                    Thank you so much, Judi.

25                    (Applause.)

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2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
3 the Chair recognizes Ms. Bernstein-Baker  
4 for remarks.

5                   MS. BERNSTEIN-BAKER: Thank you  
6 very much, Council President Clarke, and  
7 of course thank you, Councilwoman Sanchez  
8 and Gym and Councilman Jones, Greenlee,  
9 and Oh and Councilwoman Blackwell, all of  
10 whom have done so much to welcome  
11 immigrants and refugees to Philadelphia.  
12 And I don't know if there's anybody left  
13 from the Building Trades Council, but  
14 just so you know, my mother was an  
15 immigrant union organizer with the then  
16 IOGWU, and her story was recorded because  
17 she participated in many strikes and  
18 picket lines. And she informed me that  
19 one of the biggest problems they had was  
20 the fear that immigrants had to press for  
21 their labor rights, and the story hasn't  
22 changed much. I'm so happy to see  
23 there's a resolution later following this  
24 about fair wages for our working-class  
25 brother and sister immigrants.

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2 But now I am truly honored and  
3 humbled by this resolution, and it is  
4 true that work with immigrants and  
5 refugees is my passion, but retired  
6 advocates don't just fade away. We  
7 continue to work as volunteers and  
8 activists, especially when the current  
9 climate targets immigrants and refugees  
10 based on unfounded fear and xenophobia.  
11 Keeping Philadelphia a welcoming city has  
12 never been more important.

13 I want to share very briefly  
14 four lessons I learned when I was  
15 privileged to be the Executive Director  
16 of HIAS Pennsylvania.

17 I learned the real importance  
18 of religious freedom, because so many of  
19 the refugees and immigrants even that we  
20 provided legal and social services to  
21 fled religious persecution in their home  
22 countries, and it reminded me what an  
23 important value that is to be treasured.  
24 Policies like a refugee and Muslim ban  
25 that are so diametrically at odds with

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2 its foundation need to be opposed, and I  
3 thank our City leadership who came to the  
4 airport on Saturday night and later on  
5 Sunday and those who wanted to come but  
6 couldn't to protect the refugees and  
7 immigrants who were caught in the  
8 executive ban. And, by the way, one of  
9 those refugees, the spouse of an Iraqi  
10 translator for the U.S. Armed Forces was  
11 a client of National HIAS, my national  
12 organization, and is now reunited with  
13 their family.

14 I learned that immigrants and  
15 refugees contribute economically,  
16 culturally, professionally and, of  
17 course, financially to our City and  
18 nation. I've witnessed individuals who  
19 work two and three jobs to support their  
20 families, who have opened businesses and  
21 have revitalized neighborhoods. Look at  
22 West Philadelphia. Look at Northeast  
23 Philadelphia. Look at South  
24 Philadelphia, and hopefully one day look  
25 at my own community, Northwest

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2 Philadelphia. It is, therefore,  
3 astounding, absolutely astounding, that  
4 high public officials perpetrate  
5 alternative facts that immigrants take  
6 jobs away from Americans, that they are  
7 criminals and that they will do harm to  
8 our country. I suppose immigrants are  
9 scapegoated to deflect attention from our  
10 real problems of poverty, unemployment,  
11 and public education. And now we have  
12 solutions to this program that was just  
13 described before us, and I am sure some  
14 immigrants, young people will join that  
15 program. I am thankful to live in a city  
16 where our government does not engage in  
17 this divisive rhetoric or practice this.

18 I learned the critical  
19 importance of work of organizations,  
20 non-profits like HIAS Pennsylvania and  
21 there are others certainly in our city  
22 which provide legal, social, and support  
23 services to refugees and immigrants,  
24 working alongside community-based groups  
25 who are organizing for immigrant and

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2           refugee rights.

3                         But I can't sugarcoat this last  
4           lesson, and, that is, the ultimate goal  
5           of many who campaign to deport  
6           undocumented immigrants and even strip  
7           citizenship from children born to  
8           immigrants is to target immigrants of  
9           color and stop all immigration. It is  
10          alarming that today in high positions in  
11          the Department of Homeland Security and  
12          the executive branch there are  
13          individuals from the Federation for  
14          Immigration Reform and the Center for  
15          Immigration Study, these organizations  
16          seek to cut legal immigration to the  
17          United States by 70 percent. These same  
18          organizations have Board members whose  
19          goal is to maintain a, quote, and I'm  
20          quoting directly from the Board member,  
21          "a European American majority in the  
22          United States."

23                         But I've also learned that  
24          there's been an outpouring of support  
25          from the faith community and from the

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2           public at-large to challenge the  
3           demonization of refugees and immigrants.  
4           And in my own community, Northwest  
5           Philadelphia, there's a lot of stirring,  
6           and we now have new community coalitions  
7           coming together to support immigrant and  
8           refugee rights.

9                         An executive director of a  
10           small non-profit is a very taxing job,  
11           and I am fortunate to have had a husband,  
12           who is here today, Carl Baker and --

13                         (Applause.)

14                         MS. BERNSTEIN-BAKER: -- a  
15           family, my grandson is here, also lives  
16           in Philadelphia, who stood by my side as  
17           we weathered many new policy shifts and  
18           crises.

19                         I'm proud to have a wonderful  
20           and competent and diverse staff,  
21           including the current Executive Director,  
22           who is up here today, Cathryn  
23           Miller-Wilson, and half of our staff are  
24           refugees or former immigrants, and  
25           there's some sitting in the audience, and

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2 an active and hands-on Board at HIAS  
3 Pennsylvania, some of whom are also up  
4 here today. Together with scores of  
5 volunteers, the organization has helped  
6 thousands of immigrants and refugees  
7 whose only goal is to integrate into the  
8 fabric of the great American mosaic. And  
9 even though I was born and raised in New  
10 York City -- and believe it or not, I  
11 shared a ride with a cab driver the other  
12 day who lived in the house I was born in  
13 in New York, but moved to Philadelphia,  
14 like I did -- I am so proud we have a  
15 City Council and a Mayor who stand with  
16 immigrants and refugees, and that is  
17 really the vital lesson. We may have  
18 come over on different boats, some by  
19 choice and some by force through our  
20 ancestors, but we're all in the same boat  
21 now.

22 Thank you for helping us build  
23 a united Philadelphia.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Council will be at ease.

3 (Council at ease.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you very much.

6 And the next order of business  
7 is communications. The Chair requests  
8 that the Sergeant-of-Arms delivers the  
9 messages from the Mayor to the Chief  
10 Clerk.

11 Mr. Decker, would you please  
12 read those messages from the Mayor.

10 following bills which were passed by  
11 Council at its session on April 20, 2017:  
12 Bill Nos. 160808, 160999, and 161004.

13 And I am submitting herewith  
14 for the consideration of your honorable  
15 body a resolution approving the  
16 appointment of Michael Carroll to the  
17 Board of the Southeastern Pennsylvania  
18 Transportation Authority; and

19 An ordinance amending Section  
20 12-701 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled  
21 "Designation of Bicycle Lanes," by  
22 authorizing the Department of Streets to  
23 designate a buffered bicycle lane, in the  
24 eastbound direction, on Chestnut Street  
25 from South 45th Street to South 34th

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2 Street, and to remove a travel lane on  
3 Chestnut Street in the same limits; and

15 on the First Reading Calendar today, the  
16 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee for  
17 the purpose of calling up resolutions and  
18 bills on the Second Reading and Final  
19 Passage Calendars.

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
21 you, Mr. Chairman. The following  
22 resolutions and bills are being called up  
23 from the Second Reading and Final Passage  
24 Calendars today: Nos. 170369, 170370,  
25 170379, 170381, 170382, 161003-A, 170245,

2 and 170110. All other resolutions and  
3 bills are being held.

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
5 Councilman.

6 Before considering these  
7 resolutions and bills, we will consider  
8 public comment as follows:

9 Your public comment must  
10 concern matters on the Second Reading and  
11 Final Passage Calendars today, today's  
12 Council for action. All speakers must  
13 sign up in order to testify. If you have  
14 not already signed up for today's  
15 session, please do so by giving your name  
16 to the Sergeant-of-Arms at the table to  
17 my left.

18 You will be called in the order  
19 as it appears on the sign-in sheet. You  
20 will have three minutes to speak. In  
21 order to be fair for all those wishing to  
22 speak, I intend to hold that faithfully  
23 to within the three-minute limit.

24 So when you begin speaking, you  
25 will see the green light on the podium.

2 Then there will be 30 seconds remaining  
3 of your time, the light will turn yellow,  
4 in which you will be reminded to conclude  
5 your remarks. Once the three minutes  
6 have passed, a light will turn red and

8 microphone. At that point we will yield  
9 the podium for our next speaker. I also  
10 reserve the right pursuant to the rules  
11 of Council to limit repetitious comments  
12 on the same subject matter.

13 I ask the Chief Clerk, would  
14 you please read the name of our first  
15 speaker today.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,  
17 commenting on 170370, 170369, and 170381.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 MR. DANIHEL: Can I have my  
20 three minutes, Council President or  
21 Acting Council President, please. Can I  
22 have my three minutes.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON:  
24 Sergeant-of-Arms.

25 MR. DANIHEL: We're about 15

2 seconds in.

3 COUNCILMAN HENON: We'll reset  
4 your time.

5 MR. DANIHEL: Thank you.

6 This is yet another official  
7 decree of writ of mandamus quo warranto  
8 and, as such, requires immediate action  
9 and remedy.

10 This Council continues to  
11 transfer large quantities of private  
12 property through the RDA, Land Bank, and  
13 use the Sheriff to issue deeds, possibly  
14 without due process. Does rule of law,  
15 laws and constitutions, and your sworn  
16 duty mean nothing to you?

17 PA Constitution, Article 1,  
18 Section 10, Nor shall private property be  
19 taken without just compensation being  
20 first made or secured. From 26 PA CSA  
21 703, Fair market value is an amount which  
22 will be agreed to by the willing and  
23 informed buyer and seller. In addition,  
24 the delays in costs caused by the  
25 government are compensable by law. Yet I

2 have received no compensation. The City,  
3 Redevelopment Authority, Sheriff's  
4 Department, and numerous other agencies  
5 failed to obey the law before  
6 transferring my deed. Upon notification  
7 of this breach of constitutions and laws,  
8 you are required by oath to shut down  
9 agencies until breaches are repaired.  
10 The constitutions require immediate  
11 remedy of this breach of law. Your oath  
12 of office requires you to act or face  
13 prison.

14 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
15 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA  
16 Constitution, Article 1, Sections 1  
17 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,  
18 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in  
19 SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear  
20 violated.

21 I call for the federal and  
22 Commonwealth governments to perform their  
23 constitutional obligations to  
24 investigate, prosecute all involved in  
25 the illegal deed transfer and theft of my

2           home, 1038 West Wyoming. The denial of  
3           God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for  
4           23 years is egregious, extraordinary,  
5           oath-violating, and requires immediate  
6           remedy.

7                     A just government must obey the  
8           rule of law. This color of law  
9           government must have its Charter to  
10          govern revoked until a constitutionally  
11          compliant government is installed.

12                    Public servants cannot refuse  
13          their sworn duty to act any more than a  
14          fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
15          sovereign people require constitution and  
16          laws be enforced. Jail is required for  
17          all who violate oath or law. It takes a  
18          lot of cooperation to create and allow  
19          monumental corruption.

20                    COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.  
21                    Clerk, would you please read  
22          the name of our next speaker.

23                    CHIEF CLERK: Calvin  
24          O'Martinez, commenting on 170379.

25                    (Witness approached podium.)

2 MR. OKUNOYE: Thank you. For  
3 the record, it's Calvin Okunoye. So good  
4 morning, City Council. My name is Calvin  
5 Okunoye and I live in Philadelphia. I am  
6 a former restaurant worker who has worked  
7 in the restaurant industry as a cook, as  
8 a chef for ten-plus years. I am  
9 currently the High Road Coordinator for  
10 the Restaurant Opportunities Center of  
11 Philadelphia -- or Pennsylvania. Excuse  
12 me. The Restaurant Opportunities Center  
13 is a national non-profit whose mission is  
14 to improve the wages and the working  
15 conditions of our nation's 12 million  
16 restaurant workers.

17 I support this resolution  
18 because I care about my community. I  
19 care about the restaurant workers being  
20 treated as the professionals they are.  
21 ROC's Behind the Kitchen Door report  
22 found that 58 percent of workers reported  
23 not being paid overtime, close to 40  
24 percent not receiving safety training,  
25 and almost 80 percent of workers not

2 receiving regular raises. To me, these  
3 facts mean two things.

4 One, the local restaurant  
5 industry are in need of employers who are  
6 creating formal career ladders for their  
7 staff and workers who are advocating for  
8 their work. That is why I'm here in  
9 support of City Council's resolution  
10 recognizing every person's fundamental  
11 right to earn a living.

12 I am particularly here to  
13 advocate for my immigrant family who I  
14 have turned tables with. Over half of  
15 our industry's workers are below the  
16 poverty line. That means poor, which  
17 means -- which can be demoralizing when  
18 the politics du jour also criminalizes  
19 your work.

20 ROC Pennsylvania is here not  
21 only to recognize every person's right to  
22 make a wage, but that we all deserve a  
23 living wage. Our tipped workers, the  
24 people you see when you go in to eat, who  
25 also stand in solidarity with this

2           resolution, they know that immigrants are  
3           the lifeblood of the restaurant industry.  
4           Yet we know that restaurants are facing  
5           historical shortages because of  
6           anti-immigration rhetoric. That's why  
7           more and more of our servers are  
8           advocating for our immigrant community  
9           and other initiatives like One Fair  
10          Wage - One Fair Wage being a policy to  
11          end the legacy of slavery that is the  
12          tipped minimum wage or what some people  
13          call tips.

14                         In fact, if you are to step  
15          back and have a conversation at any  
16          dinner table with industry folk, if you  
17          sat in at a staff meal or if you shared a  
18          quick coffee with just the knife guy  
19          about Philadelphia's restaurant industry,  
20          you would most absolutely end up agreeing  
21          that the positive contributions of our  
22          City's immigrant population and the lack  
23          of protections they have and be really  
24          just kind of set back on the incoherent  
25          gap between the two.

2 People who work and live in  
3 this industry all agree, all workers  
4 deserve to feel safe and dignified.

5 So thank you guys for listening  
6 to the voices of restaurant workers who  
7 are unfortunately -- just remind you  
8 unfortunately are the lowest paid workers  
9 in America. We urge you to pass this  
10 resolution.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you  
13 for your testimony.

14 Clerk, would you please read  
15 the name of our next speaker.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Maria Christina  
17 Martinez, commenting on 170379.

18 (Witnesses approached podium.)

19 MS. MARTINEZ (through  
20 interpreter): We are here today to call  
21 attention to our unjust system of work,  
22 with the intention of opening  
23 conversation and building solidarity to  
24 change the federal system that  
25 criminalizes undocumented immigrants'

2 labor.

3 As a business owner of a  
4 Mexican restaurant, hiring people with  
5 the specific talents and experience to  
6 cook my food is illegal, and my people do  
7 not have the right to work.

8 The passion, talent, culture,  
9 and intelligence that our immigrant  
10 community brings to the United States  
11 gives this country strength and hope.

12 Unfortunately it's not enough  
13 to say that this is a broken system.  
14 Because a system which criminalizes labor  
15 that leaves workers vulnerable to  
16 exploitation is by design. We must look  
17 at this with clarity and fight for  
18 justice. We need to make the change.

19 As a restaurant, we have a  
20 platform, and we will continue to use it  
21 to advocate for human rights. We want to  
22 take this resolution to pass in other  
23 cities, starting in New York on May 1st,  
24 the National Day of Action, a Day Without  
25 Immigrants.

2 We ask City Council to  
3 unanimously vote yes to this resolution  
4 today.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you  
7 for your testimony.

8 Clerk, would you please read  
9 the name of our next speaker.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Estela Hernandez,  
11 commenting on 170379.

12 (Witnesses approached podium.)

13 MS. HERNANDEZ (through  
14 interpreter): Good morning. My name is  
15 Estela Hernandez and I'm a member of the  
16 New Sanctuary Movement of Philadelphia.  
17 I have been in the U.S. for 13 years, all  
18 here in Philly. I have three children,  
19 and I own a small business that employs  
20 24 people in the City.

21 Since we came to this country,  
22 my husband and I have worked cleaning  
23 supermarkets overnight. Four years ago  
24 we took the opportunity to open our own  
25 cleaning company. Since then our life

2           has improved significantly. Now I can  
3           dedicate more time to my family. We  
4           generate employment for immigrant workers  
5           and obviously we pay taxes.

6                       As a woman I am a worrier, and  
7           I fight to thrive in a country that too  
8           often does not feel like my own. The  
9           pain of being away from my family in the  
10          country where I was born is immense. It  
11          is difficult to not be by their side when  
12          something difficult happens and I want to  
13          hug them and support them.

14                      Being here is a sacrifice, and  
15          I make it to give my kids a better life  
16          and protect them from the violence in my  
17          country. I do not want my children to  
18          live in the poverty I lived. I want them  
19          to thrive, to have the education that  
20          they want and deserve.

21                      I raise my voice because there  
22          are so many people like me sustaining the  
23          City and this country. The current  
24          political situation is deporting people  
25          to violence and poverty and is

2 traumatizing our children. This  
3 country's economy exploits our work, yet  
4 we are denied basic rights. We generate  
5 employment. We make the food on your  
6 plates, the vegetables, the fruit. The  
7 bread that reaches your tables has  
8 probably gone through immigrant hands.

9 It is our duty as a society to  
10 recognize the labor of each person and  
11 fight for economic justice, not just for  
12 immigrants but for all of us. We know  
13 that the poverty that people of the  
14 United States experience is connected to  
15 the poverty in their birth countries. It  
16 is a global problem that goes beyond work  
17 and will require a long fight in unity.

18 I applaud Philadelphia for  
19 being at the forefront of the fight for  
20 migrant justice in this country. We,  
21 grassroots community organizations, have  
22 been working for justice in our city for  
23 a long time, and we are proud that we  
24 have won support from our local  
25 government. We applaud today's City

2 Council and encourage it to act on good  
3 values.

4 Today I am here proud of not  
5 just our daily work for economic  
6 sustenance, but also for our daily work  
7 for justice.

8 Thank you.

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you  
10 for your testimony.

11 Clerk, would you please read  
12 the name of our next speaker.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Abraham Lorenzo,  
14 commenting on 170379.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 MR. LORENZO: Good afternoon.  
17 Hello. My name is Abraham Lorenzo. I  
18 have lived and worked in Philadelphia for  
19 about 15 years. I am an immigrant to  
20 this country. For the past 12 years, I  
21 worked in a restaurant in Center City.  
22 They never pay me overtime. From 2005 to  
23 2016, they did not even pay me a minimum  
24 wage. I live off of tips, and they took  
25 money from my tips for broken dishes or

2 glasses and credit card fees. I knew  
3 what they were doing was wrong.

4 All of us employees bleed. For  
5 a while, though, I didn't really say  
6 anything. I didn't want to make waves.  
7 And I really wanted to keep my job. Plus  
8 we were all afraid to assert our rights.

9 A lot of the people I work with  
10 have families, and they were terrified of  
11 retaliation, whether it was losing their  
12 jobs or being deported. I was also  
13 scared. Well, I am scared. But I knew  
14 someone had to speak up, so I did then,  
15 and that is why I'm speaking today.

16 Philadelphia relies on its  
17 immigrant workforce. We are your chefs,  
18 waiters, dishwashers, you name it.  
19 Chances are you see us every day, but we  
20 work in the shadows. Some employers take  
21 advantage of us because they think they  
22 can, and others are afraid to stand up  
23 for us because it's against the law to  
24 employ us.

25 I support this resolution and

2           everything in it it is trying to do,  
3           because while we might not be able to fix  
4           immigration, Philadelphia can create a  
5           culture that recognizes all workers  
6           regardless of their immigration status  
7           and treats all workers fairly.

8                     And just to finish, do not be  
9           afraid. Just think for one minute if we  
10          don't speak up, these kind of actions are  
11          going to be on and on and on. Don't be  
12          afraid. Speak up.

13                    COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you  
14          for your testimony.

15                    CHIEF CLERK: There are no  
16          other speakers on the public comment  
17          list, Mr. Chairman.

18                    COUNCILMAN HENON: That  
19          concludes our public comment period for  
20          today's Calendar.

21                    We will now consider the bills  
22          and resolutions on the Second Reading and  
23          Final Passage Calendars.

24                    Clerk, will you please read the  
25          title of Resolution 170369.

8                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

11                   (Duly seconded.)

12                   COUNCILMAN HENON: It has been  
13 moved and seconded the resolution be  
14 adopted.

15                   All those in favor signify by  
16 saying aye.

17                   (Aye.)

18                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Opposed?

19                   (No response.)

20                   COUNCILMAN HENON: The  
21 resolution is adopted.

22                   Clerk, would you please read  
23 the title of Resolution No. 170370.

24                   CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
25 authorizing the Commissioner of Public

10                   COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair  
11           recognizes Councilman Greenlee for a  
12           motion.

13                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
14           you, Mr. Chairman. I move the adoption  
15           of the resolution.

16                   (Duly seconded.)

17                   COUNCILMAN HENON: It has been  
18           moved and seconded the resolution be  
19           adopted.

20                   All in favor signify by saying  
21           aye.

22                   (Aye.)

23                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Those  
24           opposed?

25                   (No response.)

2                   COUNCILMAN HENON: The ayes  
3 have it. The resolution is adopted.

4                   Clerk, would you please read  
5 the title of Resolution 170379.

6                   CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
7 recognizing every person's fundamental  
8 right to earn a living, regardless of  
9 immigration status, and affirming the  
10 City of Philadelphia's commitment to  
11 protect and secure a safe and dignified  
12 workplace for all.

13                   COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair  
14 recognizes Councilwoman Gym for a motion.

15                   COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Yes. Thank  
16 you very much, Council President. I want  
17 to first acknowledge Ben Miller,  
18 Christina Martinez, Estela, Abraham,  
19 Calvin, and the Restaurant Opportunities  
20 Center for coming out today with your  
21 voice and your message about what this  
22 resolution is. It is about a human  
23 right. It is about recognizing that the  
24 United States for the last two decades  
25 has been stalled on immigration reform

2           and has not advanced while the world has  
3           changed all around us, and it is  
4           recognizing that we have a responsibility  
5           to uphold fair labor practices and  
6           ordinances.

7                         That's what this resolution is  
8           about. It honors what it means to work,  
9           to work with justice. This is a city  
10          that has always upheld the right to labor  
11          and strong labor rights for all. We feel  
12          very strongly that those who exploit  
13          labor practices will allow people to live  
14          in exploitive circumstances. And by  
15          asserting people's rights and demanding  
16          that the United States seriously takes on  
17          immigration reform in this country today,  
18          we try to move people into fair work  
19          practices and to help the environments  
20          for all.

21                        In particular, I just want to  
22          note, just to be grateful for the people  
23          who are pushing on this issue, that it  
24          matters to have the restaurant industry  
25          diversify the message around immigration,

2           who it impacts, what it looks like, how  
3           it unfurls in places that we don't always  
4           see. And in our kitchens and in our  
5           dishwashing areas and in all the places  
6           where people do good work, this  
7           resolution honors them.

8                        So with that, I move for the  
9           adoption of the resolution.

10                       (Duly seconded.)

11                       COUNCILMAN HENON: It has been  
12           moved and seconded the resolution be  
13           adopted.

14                       All those in favor signify by  
15           saying aye.

16                       (Aye.)

17                       COUNCILMAN HENON: Those  
18           opposed?

19                       The ayes have it. The  
20           resolution is adopted.

21                       COUNCILMAN OH: I'd like to be  
22           heard on that.

23                       COUNCILMAN O'NEILL:  
24           Mr. Chairman, I'd like to be recorded as  
25           no, but Councilman Oh had his light on.

2 COUNCILMAN HENON: Let the  
3 record reflect that Councilman O'Neill is  
4 opposed, voting no.

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
6 Oh.

7 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
8 much. I will be voting no, and I'd like  
9 to simply explain that I do support  
10 immigrants and I do support fair labor  
11 practices, and they should be enforced.  
12 I do believe people should work and I  
13 support people working.

14 However, there is work  
15 authorization and work visas. We should  
16 encourage the reformation of those  
17 reforming them. But a person may have a  
18 right to an education, but without an F-1  
19 visa, they cannot attend school. A  
20 person may choose to marry the person  
21 they love, but if they don't file an  
22 I-130 and a 485 and if they are not  
23 approved, they cannot live with that  
24 person in the United States. And a  
25 person should work and they should

2           provide for the family, but it is a  
3           process. They need work authorization.

4                     And, therefore, I cannot  
5           support the language. Although I think  
6           the spirit is there, but I think it is  
7           important that we have a process that we  
8           support.

9                     Thank you.

10                    COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
11           Councilman.

12                    The Chair recognizes Councilman  
13           Taubenberger.

14                    COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:  
15           Mr. Chairman, thank you very, very much.  
16           Being the son of a dishwasher, a son of  
17           an immigrant who spoke more German than  
18           English when he arrived, I understand  
19           many of these processes, but I would have  
20           to agree with my colleague Councilman Oh  
21           in that there are work visas that have to  
22           be worked out. There is a difference  
23           between illegal immigration and  
24           exploitation in the restaurant industry.

25                    So I would like to be recorded

2           as voting no on this, although I am for  
3           labor to be fair. People have the  
4           ability to raise a family and dollars,  
5           but I think also we have to take a look  
6           at all these visas, and this is not the  
7           United States Senate. So in this sense,  
8           I would have to say on this issue I am  
9           voting no when it comes to all the  
10          technical parts of the language. The  
11          spirit is good. The language is  
12          cumbersome and difficult.

13                    COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
14          Councilman. The record will reflect the  
15          votes in opposition.

16                    The Chair recognizes  
17          Councilman -- the Chair recognizes the  
18          Clerk. Please read the title of  
19          Resolution No. 170381.

20                    CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
21          authorizing the Commissioner of Public  
22          Property to execute and deliver to the  
23          Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority,  
24          without consideration, deeds conveying  
25          conditional fee simple title to certain

12                   (Duly seconded.)

13                   COUNCILMAN HENON: It's been  
14          moved and seconded that the resolution be  
15          adopted.

16                   All in favor signify by saying  
17          aye.

18                   (Aye.)

19                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Opposed?

20                   (No response.)

21                   COUNCILMAN HENON: The  
22          resolution is adopted.

23                   Clerk, would you please read  
24          the title of Resolution 170382.

25                   CHIEF CLERK: A resolution

2           calling for the installation of a City  
3           Historic Marker in front of the home of  
4           the AIDS Library of Philadelphia, 1233  
5           Locust Street and for the dedication of  
6           this marker to occur in 2017 to  
7           commemorate the 30th Anniversary of the  
8           AIDS Library of Philadelphia.

9                   COUNCILMAN HENON: The Chair  
10           recognizes Councilman Squilla on a  
11           motion.

12                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you  
13           again, Mr. Chair. I move for the  
14           adoption of the resolution.

15                   (Duly seconded.)

16                   COUNCILMAN HENON: It has been  
17           moved and seconded the resolution be  
18           adopted.

19                   All in favor signify by saying  
20           aye.

21                   (Aye.)

22                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Opposed?

23                   (No response.)

24                   COUNCILMAN HENON: The ayes  
25           have it. The resolution is adopted.

2 Clerk, would you please read  
3 the title of Bill No. 161003-A.

4 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance to  
5 amend Title 14 of The Philadelphia Code,  
6 entitled "Zoning and Planning," by  
7 revising and clarifying certain  
8 provisions and making technical changes.

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: This bill  
10 having been read on two separate days,

8 you, Mr. Chair. I wanted to take this  
9 opportunity to thank residents of  
10 Northwest Philadelphia, in particular the  
11 450 who signed in. I'm sure there were  
12 more, because everyone didn't get a  
13 chance to sign in. And I want to say a  
14 special thank you to them for being  
15 extremely patient during the community  
16 meeting that I held on this past Tuesday,  
17 Mr. Chair, at the Oxford Presbyterian  
18 Church, and it was relative to the City  
19 of Philadelphia's issuance of a permit  
20 for a medical marijuana dispensary on the  
21 8300 block of Stenton Avenue.

22                   And I think it is very  
23 important, Mr. Chair, to say a special  
24 thanks to this community because they did  
25 not do what folks expected them to do at

2           this meeting, and that was to shout  
3           reasons associated with a NIMBY  
4           philosophy, not in my backyard, about why  
5           they did not want this medical marijuana  
6           dispensary in their community. In fact,  
7           Mr. Chairman, they did just the opposite.  
8           They showed that they were knowledgeable  
9           and well educated about the public  
10          benefits and all of the positive  
11          externalities associated with the  
12          medicinal use of marijuana and that they  
13          support the use of it 1,000 percent.

14                 All of the questions that they  
15                 raised were relative to the law and how  
16                 our zoning law from a land use  
17                 perspective conflicts with state law  
18                 along with what Council passed and/or  
19                 Council's intent.

20                 And I also want to say to them,  
21                 because we had a very good meeting and  
22                 you know how those large community  
23                 meetings can be, and they had about two  
24                 bus loads of people who were bused in,  
25                 Mr. Chairman, from other communities.

2           And I shared with my fellow Councilwoman  
3           Blackwell that one bus came from West  
4           Philadelphia and one bus came from the  
5           county. And as we, those who live within  
6           500 feet after they spoke and then the  
7           community at-large spoke, the disruption

9           successful.

10                        So to all of those residents  
11           who attended, thank you for holding your  
12           cool. Thank you for showing the  
13           savviness of our community and your  
14           support for the medicinal use of  
15           marijuana and only addressing this issue  
16           from a land use perspective.

17                        Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

18                        COUNCILMAN HENON: We thank you  
19           for your leadership, Councilwoman.

20                        The Chair recognizes Councilman  
21           Green.

22                        COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
23           Mr. Chair. Today is actually a very  
24           positive day to be here in the City  
25           Council. Every day is a good day to be

2           in City Council, but I wanted to  
3           acknowledge the work of two members of  
4           this body, in particular our Council  
5           President for helping to create the  
6           Philadelphia Energy Authority.

7                     This morning myself, along with  
8           Councilwoman Brown, had a chance to  
9           participate in the kick-off of Solarize  
10          Philly, which is a citywide program to  
11          lower costs, simplify the process, and  
12          create jobs and have all Philadelphians  
13          to go solar at their home.

14                    The sign-up period with the  
15          Philadelphia Energy Authority will begin  
16          July 1st and will go through September  
17          30th, and the Philadelphia Energy  
18          Authority will help with developers to  
19          keep the costs low by bundling  
20          neighborhood installations, reducing  
21          marketing outreach costs, and are going  
22          to work with the Office of  
23          Sustainability, our Department of License  
24          and Inspection, and PECO to keep the  
25          process moving as quickly as possible.

2           They also will work with developers and  
3           lenders to support financing to  
4           homeowners.

5                        Through this process, Solarize  
6           Philly would also help fund solar  
7           training at the School District and help  
8           low- and moderate-income families to go  
9           solar themselves. This is important  
10          because, one, it will create jobs. They  
11          anticipate that it will create at least  
12          73 jobs in 18 months, and I also know  
13          solar in itself creates 15 jobs for every  
14          100 households that participate, and we  
15          have over 120,000 rooftops eligible  
16          citywide for solar. It also supports our  
17          community. It keeps energy costs in  
18          check.

19                       As we all know, that the City  
20          of Philadelphia has the largest level of  
21          poverty of any large city in the country,  
22          and it provides an opportunity for people  
23          to reduce their energy bills and also it  
24          helps to combat climate change.

25                       And so with Solarize Philly,

2           what they plan to accomplish is by  
3           solarizing 500 homes, increase solar  
4           power on Philadelphia rooftops, subsidize  
5           137 low- and moderate-income households  
6           to install solar on their rooftops,  
7           expand solar job training programs in the  
8           Philadelphia schools, and create 73 good  
9           living-wage jobs.

10                         And in addition to the fact  
11           that we have Solarize Philly, which was  
12           an initiative that came out of the work  
13           of our Council President in creating the  
14           Philadelphia Energy Authority, I must  
15           also commend Councilwoman Blackwell for  
16           her initiative and the resolution we  
17           presented today and her using her power  
18           as a District Councilperson and  
19           leveraging the assets in her district,  
20           the University of Pennsylvania, and  
21           working with the building trades and the  
22           many other partners to really bring about  
23           a citywide initiative, something that  
24           many people in this body and those who  
25           were in this body before have really

2           worked hard to try to achieve and  
3           providing an opportunity for children  
4           coming through the School District of  
5           Philadelphia to go into apprentice

7                        So I want to thank Councilwoman

10          leadership in creating the Philadelphia  
11          Energy Authority.

12                       Thank you.

6           LGBTQ, HIV Positive, Muslim, young  
7           people, and workers, all who represent 75  
8           percent of our City's population, the  
9           growing vocal majority, on their day of  
10          action.

11                    I have publicly sent a letter  
12           to Rob Wonderling and the Chamber of  
13           Commerce asking that all businesses in  
14           the City of Philadelphia respect people's  
15           right to this day of action and hope that  
16           on Tuesday, workers are not penalized for  
17           exercising their private rights to  
18           publicly demonstrate.

19                    My Council colleagues have  
20           joined us as we've striked and gone back  
21           and walked workers back. I hope that on  
22           Tuesday, workers are walking back to  
23           their job sites without incident. And I  
24           want to thank all of the communities for  
25           standing up and particularly the black

2           and brown coalitions that are forming  
3           around this very important issue here in  
4           Philadelphia and across the country.

5                     Thank you, Mr. Chair.

6                     COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
7           Councilwoman.

8                     The Chair recognizes Councilman  
9           Domb.

10                    COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,  
11           Mr. Chairman. And I just wanted to call  
12           everybody's attention to next week is  
13           Philly Tech Week, and that's an important  
14           event in Philadelphia. We have a growing  
15           tech industry, especially among our young  
16           people. On Tuesday, May 2nd, from 5:30  
17           to 9:30 is a scavenger hunt at Curalate,  
18           2401 Walnut Street, as well as sponsors  
19           involved, and the money is going to Coded  
20           by Kids.

21                    On Wednesday, I think it's May  
22           3rd, 5:30 to 8:30 I invite everybody to  
23           go to the Philly Tech Expo at the Armory  
24           on 23rd Street. It's fascinating to see  
25           our young people and what they're doing.

2                   And on another note, I'll just  
3           share with you, Coded by Kids, I have a  
4           challenge out to the tech community to  
5           sponsor 20 different public high schools.  
6           I'm personally sponsoring four high  
7           schools, 15 kids in each high school.  
8           One of them is Bartram. We're going to  
9           teach coding to 10th, 11th, and 12th  
10          graders, 15 kids per school. The cost is  
11          about 15,000 per high school. I'm going  
12          to sponsor four schools. I'm asking the  
13          tech community to sponsor 16. We're up  
14          to 11 schools so far. So if you know of  
15          any tech companies or anyone who is  
16          interested, we can change the lives of  
17          300 young people.

18                   Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

19                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
20          Councilman.

21                   There are no more speeches on  
22          the majority or the minority.

23                   The Chair recognizes  
24          Councilwoman Brown for a motion to  
25          adjourn.
