7 Thank you. The next order of business is
8 the approval of the Journal of the
9 meeting of Thursday, April 27, 2017, and
10 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

11 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
12 you, Mr. President. I move that the
13 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, April
14 27th, 2017 be approved.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you. It has been moved and
18 properly seconded that the Journal of the
19 meeting of Thursday, April 27, 2017 stand
20 approved.

21 All those in favor say aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Those opposed?

25 (No response.)

5 The next order of business is
6 requests for leave of absence, and the
7 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. On behalf of the
10 majority, there are no requests of leaves
11 of absence today.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair thanks the gentleman.

14 The Chair now recognizes
15 Councilman Oh on behalf of the minority.

16 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
17 much. On behalf of the minority, there
18 are no requests for leaves of absence.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 At this time, I would like to
22 dispense with the regular order of
23 business and I would like to welcome and
24 thank everyone who has taken time out of
25 their busy day to come down to witness

2 their government in action. We hope your
3 stay here today is a knowledgeable one
4 but, more importantly, a pleasurable one,
5 so much so that you come back again. So
6 we really appreciate you coming down and
7 seeing us today.

8 At this time, the Chair
9 recognizes Councilman Jones, who will
10 present a resolution recognizing Gina
11 Snyder. Would Ms. Snyder and those
12 accompanying her please join the
13 Councilman at the podium.

14 (Councilmembers and guests
15 approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
17 joining Councilman Jones, we have
18 Councilman Domb, Councilman Taubenberger,
19 and Councilman Green.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES:
21 Mr. President, Philadelphia is a city of
22 neighborhoods. It's often been said.
23 I'd like to say in my district, it is a
24 city of small towns with various main
25 streets that reflect the neighborhoods in

2 which they reside.

3 I was told by this young lady
4 when I first got elected that -- I asked
5 her how to become part of the community,
6 and she explained to me, well, to be a
7 Fallser, it takes 20 years of
8 involvement. So I want to inform you
9 today that I'm halfway there, and then
10 maybe in another ten years, I will truly
11 be a Fallser.

12 I want to talk about this young
13 lady for a second and say words like
14 dogged, persistence, and advocacy for
15 East Falls, its community, and
16 businesses, whether it's parking spots or
17 farmers' markets or new offices and
18 signs, whether it's issues of angled
19 parking or dancing on the Falls Bridge,
20 Ms. Gina Snyder has been a dogged
21 advocate for both businesses and the
22 community. Businesses like In Riva, the
23 Trolley Car Cafe, Le Bus, 4th Street
24 Cookie Company all have come and
25 discovered East Falls because of her

2 continued advocacy.

3 Managing issues such as the
4 Bike Race, neighborhood border disputes,
5 she has been an ambassador on behalf of
6 the community and businesses, and I'm
7 thankful to have a partner or had a
8 partner and continue to have a partner
9 who has been fighting for that. Whether
10 it's capital projects, getting money out
11 of us for that, she has been there in the
12 forefront. And in spite all of those
13 activities, she manages to raise
14 children, and she, on this occasion of
15 this resolution, is moving to France for
16 a year to contemplate what she can bring
17 back to East Falls, similar rivers that
18 border France, so she's going to look and
19 see what they do to bring back good
20 things for us.

21 So without further adieu,
22 recognizing and honoring Gina Snyder on
23 14 years as Executive Director of East
24 Falls Development Corporation.

25 Whereas, Gina Snyder, Executive

2 Director of the Falls Corporation, has
3 served in that position for all 14 years;

4 Whereas, East Falls Development
5 Corporation provides community
6 information for East Falls businesses,
7 residents, visitors, including up-to-date
8 information on activities on East Falls
9 business opportunities, real estate,
10 recreational activities, bars and
11 restaurants; and

12 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

13 Whereas, EFDC started as a wholly
14 volunteer organization with almost no
15 budget. Determined to uplift the
16 organization, Gina developed multiple
17 funding streams that have put the
18 corporation on sound financial footing,
19 with a budget that has grown to over
20 \$200,000 per year.

21 Gina, I don't know why you're
22 going to France. We need you here.

23 Whereas, Executive Director for
24 the EFDC, Gina has worked tirelessly to
25 encourage new investment in the business

2 district and to assist local property
3 owners' efforts to improve their facade;
4 and

5 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
6 Gina has championed several key projects
7 that are of great significance to members
8 of the East Falls community. She worked
9 with the City's Mural Arts program to
10 create new murals under the twin bridges
11 and secured funds to light the Falls
12 Bridge and to renovate the historic
13 Bathey House, now the Trolley Car Cafe.
14 Gina also helped to establish the
15 "Gateway to East Falls," a pedestrian
16 island with signature signage to calm
17 traffic and welcome people to the
18 neighborhood, as well as the "Dance on
19 the Falls Bridge," a major event that has
20 grown into a regional attraction; and

21 Whereas, Gina was also
22 instrumental in adding a parking lot and
23 on-street parking along Ridge Avenue and
24 installed streetscape improvements with
25 new pedestrian-scale street lights. She

2 also brought in Farm to City and started
3 the East Falls Farmers' Market; and

4 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, in
5 addition to her day-to-day work in the
6 community, Gina also has been involved in
7 citywide economic development efforts,
8 including ten years on the Board of
9 Directors of the Philadelphia Association
10 of Community Development Corporations,
11 where she helped originate the Commercial
12 Corridor Working Group. She also started
13 and led the Northwest Commercial
14 Corridors Coalition, a working group of
15 organizations in Chestnut Hill, Mt. Airy,
16 Germantown, West Oak Lane, Roxborough,
17 Manayunk and East Falls; and

18 Whereas, in March of 2017, Gina
19 announced that she was leaving her
20 position as Executive Director of EFDC.
21 Gina's leadership has been invaluable in
22 building EFDC's capacity to secure
23 funding and implement projects. She has
24 raised EFDC's profile with local and
25 state agencies and leaves the

2 organization with several well-advanced
3 projects underway; and

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: Wine,
5 cheese, and truffles ain't a bad way to
6 spend a year.

7 Whereas, Gina will spend the
8 next year traveling with her husband and
9 two children to the south of France for a
10 year; now, therefore, be it

11 Resolved, by the Council of the
12 City of Philadelphia, that it hereby
13 recognizes and honors Gina Snyder on 14
14 years as Executive Director of the East
15 Falls Development Corporation.

16 Further resolved, that an
17 engrossed copy of this resolution be
18 presented to Gina Snyder as evidence of
19 our sincere admiration of this entire
20 legislative body.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
23 the Chair recognizes Ms. Snyder for
24 remarks.

25 MS. SNYDER: Thank you, Council

2 President Clarke. At this point, I'm
3 actually very moved. I didn't think I
4 would be.

5 Just I really want to thank
6 Councilman Jones, the other support of
7 the City Councilmen. We started with
8 Councilman Michael Nutter, who then
9 became the Mayor. And I particularly
10 wanted to thank former Councilman Wilson
11 Goode, Jr., who started the Business
12 Privilege Tax Credit program, and I
13 really want to honor him. That program
14 and the support from Councilman Jones and
15 the other Councilpeople has allowed the
16 East Falls Development Corporation to
17 leverage millions of dollars in resources
18 and to become another regional asset to
19 Philadelphia.

20 So I thank you very much for
21 this honor, and I guess I wish you au
22 revoir and a bientot, and I will be back
23 in a year and we'll see what kind of
24 adventures are in store at that point.

10 An ordinance approving the

12 for expenditures for the capital purposes
13 of the Philadelphia Gas Works (including

16 An ordinance constituting the
17 Fourteenth Supplemental Ordinance to the
18 General Gas Works Revenue Bond Ordinance
19 of 1998; authorizing the City of

25 establishing a business improvement

9 District Corporation to serve as the
10 Neighborhood Improvement District
11 Management Association for the District.

16 on a roll. Just last week, as we all
17 know, we had the great NFL Draft here in
18 our city. Recently we also had the DNC
19 as well as the papal visit, and then some
20 years ago we started all this tourism
21 development with the RNC back in 2000.

22 However, it wasn't that long
23 ago when the hospitality and tourism
24 industry was not great here in the City
25 of Philadelphia. Today's legislation

2 creates an improvement district which
3 allows us to continue the progress that
4 we have made in reference to hospitality
5 and tourism in our city. We have
6 approximately 8,000 employees at hotels
7 throughout the City of Philadelphia,
8 about 71,000 people that work in the
9 hospitality industry. And this industry
10 provides a living wage for people in our
11 city and also provides an entry point for
12 people to move up into other positions in
13 the tourism industry.

14 We need to continue and
15 maintain the great progress that we're
16 making in hospitality. This is one of
17 our major sectors that bring dollars to
18 our General Fund. It helps to provide
19 entrepreneurship opportunities and
20 economic development not only in the City
21 of Philadelphia but throughout the
22 region.

23 And so as we continue to try to
24 promote these great events in our city,
25 you have other jurisdictions that are

2 also trying to do the same. Recently, we
3 all are aware when the NBA All-Star Game
4 decided to leave Charlotte because of
5 legislation that was passed in their
6 General Assembly, they were looking at

9 the financial constraints that we have as
10 a city, we were not able to successfully
11 recruit the NBA All-Star Game to the City
12 of Philadelphia. Through this
13 legislation, we'll have the resources to
14 do that and other great events that will
15 help to continue the progress we're
16 making in our hospitality and tourism
17 industry.

18 I look forward to an engaged
19 conversation regarding this legislation
20 and look forward to support from my
21 colleagues for its future passage.

3 This is an official decree of the people

6 immediately provided. By continuing to

8 the Sheriff's Department, the Council and
9 the Mayor appear to be violating oath of
10 office, laws, and Constitution.

11 18 USC 242, deprivation of
12 rights under color of law. Whoever under
13 the color of any law, statute, ordinance,
14 regulation or custom woefully subjects
15 any inhabitant of any state, territory or
16 district to the deprivation of any
17 rights, privileges or immunity secured or
18 protected by the Constitution or laws of
19 the United States or to different
20 punishments, pains or penalties on
21 account of such or by reason of his color
22 or race shall be fined not more than a
23 thousand dollars or prison, not more than
24 one year or both per occurrence.

25 Why are most paid for their

2 homes, but I have been repeatedly
3 woefully, egregiously denied just
4 compensation, trial by jury, and due
5 process for my home, 1038 West Wyoming
6 Avenue, 23 years waiting for payments

8 while others were paid in as little as
9 three years? Discrimination?

10 The Constitutions require
11 immediate remedy of this breach of law.
12 Your oath of office requires you to act
13 or face prison.

14 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
15 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
16 Constitution, Article 1, Sections 1
17 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
18 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in
19 SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear
20 violated.

21 I call for the federal and
22 Commonwealth governments to perform their
23 constitutional obligations to investigate
24 and prosecute all involved in the theft
25 and illegal deed transfer of my home,

2 1038 West Wyoming. The denial of
3 God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for
4 23 years is egregious, extraordinary,
5 oath-violating, and requires immediate
6 remedy.

7 A just government must obey the

9 government must have its Charter to
10 govern revoked until a constitutionally
11 compliant government is installed.

12 Public servants cannot refuse
13 their sworn duty to act any more than a
14 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
15 sovereign people require the Constitution
16 and laws be enforced. Jail is required
17 for all who violate oath or law.

18 It takes a lot of cooperation
19 to create and allow monumental
20 corruption.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 MR. WALLEY: Hi. How is
5 everybody doing today? I wanted to
6 propose just a small revision to the
7 Resolution 170408. I am in favor of
8 prohibiting the suspension of
9 elementary-aged students from first
10 through fifth grades. However, I propose
11 that there should be an exception for
12 violent cases, such as when a child may
13 be in danger or vice versa.

14 And also rather than suspending
15 children, I feel as though it would be
16 more beneficial to provide training and
17 resources to involve interventions that
18 promote different values such as respect,
19 tolerance, that promote community
20 togetherness and also acceptance of
21 others; for example, maybe love and
22 kindness, meditation for different
23 children in order to maybe decrease
24 bullying or decrease violent behaviors in
25 children or decrease aggression, issues

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council
24 President, I move for the adoption of the
25 resolution.

2 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
4 been moved and properly seconded.

5 All those in favor say aye.

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

13 Mr. Decker, 170413.

14 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
15 urging the Pennsylvania Legislature to
16 reject Senate Bill 383, which would
17 permit school personnel to carry
18 concealed firearms in schools.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair again recognizes Councilman
21 Johnson.

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
23 Council President. I'd like to speak on
24 this resolution before I call for the
25 vote, please.

3 Sure. Absolutely.

4 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
5 Council President.

6 Yesterday, Council President,
7 in Cheltenham High School, there were
8 four young ladies fighting in the school
9 hallway. During that fight, four young
10 men also joined in the fight, and eight
11 teachers tried to break up the fight,
12 where two of the teachers suffered
13 concussions and one was actually knocked
14 out. And as I watched the news last
15 evening, we kept seeing the clips of
16 these young people fighting and this
17 teacher being knocked out. And so today
18 I am calling on our House -- the General
19 Assembly of Pennsylvania, specifically
20 the Senate, to reject Bill 383.

21 During a report, the
22 Pennsylvania Senate and House both
23 studied the issue of allowing school
24 personnel to carry firearms and found it
25 not advisable. The Pennsylvania House

2 Select Committee on School Safety
3 explicitly stated in 2014 that it did not
4 recommend arming general school
5 personnel. In the same report, testimony
6 from state agencies, law enforcement
7 groups, education groups, and district
8 attorneys led the Select Committee to
9 recommend that only, only school police
10 officers or security officers be armed on
11 school property.

12 An advisory committee on
13 violence prevention, formed at the
14 direction of the State Senate, echoed the
15 same conclusions of the House Select
16 Committee when it wrote in its 2014
17 report, Police officers undergo extensive
18 training in the use of their weapons, and
19 teachers do not. Therefore, it is
20 unreasonable to expect a teacher to have
21 the same firearms competency as a law
22 enforcement officer and not sound policy
23 to assign such responsibility to a
24 teacher.

25 And so if you watched the video

2 yesterday and I remember in my district
3 at John Bartram High School another
4 teacher was knocked out, it just shows
5 how this particular bill, if passed,
6 would put all children and teachers and
7 school personnel in harm's way.

8 Although a person may have the
9 right to carry an arm and they may be
10 certified, they may not be able to defend
11 themselves in an environment that may be
12 hostile when a fight starts, and who is
13 to say if a young person that has a
14 mental health issue or a young person
15 just totally knocked the teacher out and
16 takes their gun.

17 And so I just want to ask for
18 an affirmative vote from all of my
19 colleagues in rejecting Senate Bill 383.
20 We understand that people have a right to
21 carry firearms and I recognize, but we
22 want to use common sense. In this
23 particular case, this isn't common sense.
24 I think it will put more people in harm
25 than it would as it relates to keeping

17 sorry. Are there any speeches on the
18 part of the minority?

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 Taubenberger.

21 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank
22 you, Mr. President and colleagues. It's
23 always a sad moment when one loses a
24 staff member. Shannon Marietta has been
25 with me from the beginning of my time in

3 very well.

4 The happy thing is she is going
5 back to her home state of Georgia and to
6 continue the study of the science that we
7 practice here every day in this Chamber.
8 Political science is an important
9 subject. I see her at some point being
10 professor and leader in the teaching of
11 this important science, which is the
12 essence of our democracy, and I would
13 like my colleagues to join with me in a
14 round of applause for Shannon Marietta.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: And
17 if she ever needs a guest lecturer, I'm
18 available.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Thank you, Councilman.

21 And congratulations.

22 The Chair recognizes Councilman
23 Oh.

24 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
25 much, Council President. I just want to

6 of the region's Scholastic Art and

8 Philadelphia -- so I'm sure a student
9 from every one of the districts here in
10 Philadelphia -- have won these awards.
11 They are provided by Scholastic Art
12 Writing, Philadelphia Writing Project,
13 and the Philadelphia Arts and Education
14 Partnership. That will be 5:00 p.m. to
15 7:00 p.m. in the Mayor's Reception Room.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilman.

19 And on the part of the
20 majority, the Chair recognizes Councilman
21 Henon.

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
23 Council President. So today, May 4th, we
24 celebrate internationally International
25 Firefighter Day, and unfortunately I

2 didn't get a chance to put in a
3 resolution today honoring all the
4 firefighters, but I will next week, and
5 I'll make sure that all members of
6 Council have the opportunity to sign on.

7 The Commissioner in his new
8 philosophy of training and being the
9 Commissioner here in the City of
10 Philadelphia was able to host
11 international firefighters from France
12 for the past several days and discussing
13 their leadership philosophy in France,
14 discussing how we operate and do our
15 command here in the City of Philadelphia.

16 So I want to thank the
17 Commissioner on this day for his
18 innovation and his firefighter practices.
19 I want to thank his command, I want to
20 thank Local 22, and I want to thank all
21 the families of the past and present who
22 live on the front lines every day. So
23 firefighters dedicate their lives to the
24 protection of life and property.
25 Sometimes that dedication comes in the

2 form of countless hours volunteered over
3 many years and others. It is many
4 selfless years of working in the
5 industry. In all cases, though, it is
6 the risk ultimately of the ultimate
7 sacrifice of a firefighter's life.

8 International Firefighters Day,
9 which is today, every May 4th, is a time
10 where the world's community can come
11 together and recognize and honor the
12 sacrifices that the firefighters make to
13 ensure that their communities and the
14 environment is safe as possible. It is
15 also a day in which current and past
16 firefighters can be thanked for their
17 contributions. Just yesterday the
18 Commissioner, its command, and Local 22
19 celebrated at the Living Flame with our
20 guests. So they were able to contribute
21 in remembrance of theirs.

22 So International Fire, as I
23 said, is observed every May 4th, and on
24 this date, we are invited to remember
25 those who have sacrificed their life in

2 serving our community and dedicated their
3 lives in protecting us all and keeping us
4 safe. At the same time, we today can
5 show the support and appreciation as we
6 pass a firefighter, as we pass a station
7 and just thank them for their service.
8 Thank them for protecting our equipment,
9 our environment, protecting us. And we
10 here recognize that as we give them the
11 tools. I think they had an awesome
12 budget submittal in this year's budget,
13 unlike we haven't seen in the past, and
14 it is my pleasure to support that as we
15 move forward.

16 So I want to thank every
17 firefighter, every paramedic, and every
18 family member of Local 22 and their
19 command for their service.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you.

2 The Chair recognizes Councilman
3 Jones.

4 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. First, let me thank my
6 colleague Maria Sanchez for recently
7 inviting me up to tour the Pepsi
8 plant where we -- Coca-Cola. No. That's
9 okay. Wrong brand; same issue. So the
10 Coca-Cola plant in her district where we
11 had an opportunity to interact with
12 workers, and some of them a little bit
13 salty about the sugary drinks tax, but I
14 appreciate the opportunity to see what
15 was going on on the first hand, and I
16 thank her for that.

17 I also want to thank
18 Councilwoman Bass for her, as Blondell
19 Reynolds Brown says, laser beam attention
20 to small neighborhood stores and their
21 conduct within our community, whether
22 it's dealing with shot glasses or other
23 things that detract from the quality of
24 life. But I have to tell you, I was in
25 my district and I went to the opening of

2 a Fresh Grocer store up on Monument Road,
3 and in Aisle 7, my man Dupree came up to
4 me, a little bit overweight, he was
5 waddling a little bit, and he said -- and
6 I promised him I would give the message
7 to you. He said, Do you know how much my
8 Pepsi or Coke and my cigarettes cost
9 nowadays because of y'all? You raised
10 the cigarette tax. You raised the sugary
11 drinks tax.

12 So in my mind, I did the quick
13 calculation. It was about 12.50 if you
14 get the, you know, on sale kind of thing,
15 and I understood his plight. He coughed
16 as he walked away. I don't understand
17 why he's smoking and drinking Pepsi, but
18 that's his personal choice to do.

19 I think about when my mother
20 and my father sent me to the corner store
21 to get their Pepsi and their cigarettes,
22 my mom Virginia Slims, my father Pall
23 Malls. I want to say this, that I had to
24 bury both of my parents, one because of
25 lung cancer and the other, she had a

2 stroke. And when me and my brother found
3 her at the height of a snowstorm, there
4 was a cigarette that had burnt out in the
5 ashtray. So she went out the way she
6 wanted, and I get it.

7 So when these taxes come up
8 now, I think about the fact that my
9 granddaughter is in pre-K. She went in
10 pre-K a year and a half ago. So I love
11 my man Dupree. I love my granddaughter
12 more, and I understand that.

13 So there are two trips that we
14 had. I went up to the Shop Rite, and one
15 thing, my good friend Jeff Brown fought
16 tooth and nail about this. He had us all
17 on milk cartons down there talking about
18 what we did, but I appreciated his
19 up-front, forthright advocacy against it.
20 But when I went there yesterday, he had a
21 whole section. I put this photo on
22 everybody's desk, where he had a whole
23 section that was dedicated to products
24 that are non-sugary drink impacted, the
25 whole section, fruit juices and all of

2 that, and I thought that that was a kind
3 thing, a responsible thing to do for the
4 consumers.

5 So the second trip to my barber
6 shop, my barber laid me out. He said
7 that in the corner store where he goes --
8 and I won't identify it -- they were
9 charging him for 100 percent apple juice,
10 applying the tax to it. And it hurt me
11 because, you know, you should not gouge
12 the people. To apply it to product that
13 are not eligible for that is wrong. And
14 I want to encourage that L&I and Revenue
15 take a look at that. You cannot at our
16 expense politically, then apply it, and
17 you reap double profits off of that.
18 That is wrong.

19 So I'm hoping that we can, as
20 we look at the benefit of this, we're
21 over 12 million in revenue -- God
22 willing, that will go to the purposes
23 that it was supposed to go to -- that
24 those of us who are not good neighbors,
25 those of us who are not good stewards of

2 those businesses do not take advantage
3 and gouge poor people as a result of
4 their inability to distinguish what is
5 taxable by sugary drinks and what is not.

6 And so we're going to keep an
7 eye towards that. I'm going to join my
8 colleague Bass and my colleague Sanchez
9 to make sure that those things don't
10 happen to inner city people unfairly.

11 Thank you, Mr. President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Green.

16 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
17 Council President. The legislation we
18 passed today and the ongoing issues in
19 our city that prompted it are critical to
20 the people of Philadelphia.

21 During the hearing on this
22 piece of legislation, I mentioned how
23 this body over many decades has been a
24 strong advocate for progressive policies,
25 becoming a national leader regarding the

2 issues of rights for minorities,
3 particularly in addressing LGBTQ concerns
4 in the City of Philadelphia.
5 Nevertheless, in the City of the
6 Brotherly Love and Sisterly Affection,
7 discrimination continues.

8 Last fall I heard stirring
9 testimony at the Philadelphia Commission
10 on Human Relations hearing from various
11 advocates and others in the community,
12 some who have been fighting for equality
13 of treatment and equality of access to
14 public accommodations and equality of
15 human dignity over those same decades.

16 I remain concerned that
17 although we have come far, but we still
18 have a long way to go to obtain equal
19 treatment for each of our residents.
20 This legislation is a way to prompt
21 fairness to those would not do so
22 otherwise. The bill empowers the
23 Commission on Human Relations to issue
24 cease operation orders against businesses
25 that it has ruled have engaged in severe

2 or repeated violations of the existing
3 Fair Practices Ordinance
4 anti-discrimination provisions without
5 effective efforts to remediate those
6 violations. In other words, after a fair
7 hearing process, when the opportunity to
8 work with the Commission to rectify its
9 discrimination, businesses could be
10 closed down for discrimination that's
11 particularly severe.

12 That is an easy bar to clear
13 for violations that have largely existed
14 for decades and far more equitable than
15 the treatment experienced by those whom
16 this bill seeks to protect. We should
17 not have people live in our city or
18 people who visit our city being treated
19 differently based on fundamental aspects
20 of their identity by the establishments
21 that operate in the City of Philadelphia.

22 Considering where we are as a
23 country, as a nation, and as a city, we
24 need to make sure that we're sending the
25 message to all people in the City of

2 Philadelphia, regardless of your
3 ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation,
4 that we are a welcoming city.

5 Philadelphia is the City of
6 Brotherly Love and Sisterly Affection,
7 and we invite all people to participate
8 in our society and the economy to help
9 foster growth and share our prosperity.

10 I believe this legislation
11 helps ensure that all people in our city
12 and all visitors to our city have that
13 assurance, and I would like to thank my
14 colleagues for passing this legislation.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you, Councilman.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman
18 Domb.

19 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
20 Council President. I have two comments
21 today. One is on the resolution that
22 Councilman Oh and myself and others
23 sponsored about the James Beard Awards.
24 I just want to give the full impact,
25 because in Councilman Squilla's district,

2 we now have the best chef in the United
3 States in Michael Solomonov at Zahav.
4 And, by the way, Council President, in
5 your district, we have Greg Vernick, best
6 chef Mid-Atlantic, and Vernick is on
7 Walnut Street. And then --

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 What's the address? I need to go.

10 COUNCILMAN DOMB: If you need a
11 reservation, I can get you one. 2000
12 block of Walnut Street.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
14 right. I'll go check it out.

15 COUNCILMAN DOMB: That's yours.

16 And in the United States, it's
17 interesting, Stephen Starr was named the
18 best restaurateur in the country, and the
19 best restaurant in the country is the
20 Stephen Starr restaurant in New York City
21 called Le Coucou. It's pretty amazing,
22 though, that Philadelphia -- LA didn't
23 get one award. San Francisco didn't get
24 any. Philadelphia got them all, which is
25 amazing for us. I just want to

2 congratulate everybody on that award.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCILMAN DOMB: The other
5 piece of news is, this is the completion
6 of Philly Tech Week. I just wanted to
7 share some information from the Greater
8 Philadelphia -- the Economy League of
9 Greater Philadelphia.

10 So they gave out a report this
11 week, and they said of the top ten cities
12 in the United States from 2011 to 2016,
13 Philadelphia has had the slowest
14 employment growth of the top ten cities.
15 The range has been 7 to 16 percent -- 7
16 to 18 percent. We're at 7 percent.

17 That's the bad news. The good
18 news is from February of 2016 to February
19 of 2017, the Bureau of Labor Statistics
20 just reported that Philadelphia was the
21 third best in the country for job
22 creation, third best in the country for
23 job creation.

24 The other piece of interesting
25 news is that tech is a big area which we

1 5/4/17 - STATED - SPEECHES

2 can develop in. I know that you're a big
3 supporter of that. While our overall
4 employment is low, we rank second in the
5 United States in the last seven to ten
6 years in creating the most tech jobs of
7 any city in the country. Twenty-five
8 percent of every new job in Philadelphia
9 from 2002 to 2015 was in tech, and
10 one-third of the jobs in tech don't
11 require college degrees. High school
12 diplomas. That's huge for us.

13 IT employers in Philadelphia,
14 the report said, are struggling to fill
15 jobs in the tech world. Several tech
16 jobs provide careers for middle-class
17 workers with, again, one-third not
18 requiring a college degree.

19 The big issue for us is to
20 educate our students from kindergarten to
21 12th grade and adults on the path and
22 career opportunities in tech. Some of
23 those organizations I'm just going to
24 mention, Coded by Kids. Sylvester is
25 doing a great job with that. Philly

2 TechGirlz. Just a few of the options.
3 But here's the big piece: The economic
4 job multiplier of technology is five to
5 one. So every time we create one job in
6 tech, we create five more jobs somewhere
7 else.

8 As an example, I'm going to use
9 the port of Philadelphia, which is
10 important. It's 1.6. Tech is the
11 future. And the other interesting
12 statistic is that the average income of
13 technology jobs is \$39,000. The salary
14 is higher than any other field, 39,000.
15 One of the things we need to do in
16 Philadelphia is to raise our average
17 salaries across the board.

18 So tech is really our future.
19 We need to expand dramatically, and
20 whatever we can do as a body to advance
21 tech, I strongly recommend it.

22 Thank you, Council President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

2 Johnson.

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
4 Council President.

5 You know, I learned as a
6 student at Mansfield University a quote
7 by Dr. King that said, What affects one
8 directly affects all indirectly, because
9 we are all a part of mankind.

10 Last Thursday I had the humble
11 opportunity to speak at a home-going
12 service of a young man by the name of
13 Lonnie Sims, who was the son of a good
14 friend of mine that I grew up with that
15 was murdered as a result of senseless gun
16 violence.

17 We also recently saw in Texas
18 the death of a 15-year-old at the hands
19 of police officers as he was going home
20 from a party, and that police officer was
21 fired based upon fabricated evidence or a
22 fabricated story about how this young man
23 ended up murdered.

24 Last week I talked to a mother
25 about the joys of fatherhood, and she

2 mentioned to me that when she found out
3 that she was having a baby boy, she was
4 saddened. And it hit my heart, because
5 as a woman, particularly an African
6 American woman, she should not have to be
7 concerned about having an African
8 American baby growing up, particularly a
9 male growing up in America.

10 Last week I stood with my good
11 friend State Senator Anthony Hardy
12 Williams in Southwest Philadelphia
13 calling on Governor Wolf to restore the
14 Illegal Gun Task Force funding that
15 funded the Task Force through the
16 District Attorney's Office in partnership
17 with the Attorney General's Office so we
18 can remain focusing on the issue of youth
19 gun violence here in the City of
20 Philadelphia.

21 We have a task force on the
22 opioid crisis. We have a task force on
23 historical preservations of buildings.
24 We have a task force on an initiative
25 known as Vision Zero to make sure bike

2 lanes and streets are operational for
3 people to go out on Saturday just to
4 enjoy themselves. But we've been dealing
5 with this crisis since I've started my
6 life as an activist back in 1998 starting
7 my organization Peace Not Guns. Each
8 year we have thousands of shootings of
9 young African American males between the
10 ages of 18 and 25, and we have hundreds
11 of homicides that take place here in the
12 City of Philadelphia.

13 And so in the near future, I
14 will be establishing my own Youth Gun
15 Violence and Prevention Task Force to
16 begin focusing on an overall strategy,
17 bringing together the various City
18 agencies and stakeholders that have an
19 interest in making sure that we address
20 this epidemic. It's a complex issue.
21 There are a variety of different social
22 nuances that have an impact, such as
23 poverty, such as education, but we can't
24 sit idly by while these young men are
25 dying on the streets in the City of

2 Philadelphia. Certain neighborhoods are
3 safer than others, but I believe that
4 when you step up to the plate and I
5 believe when you take the issues that are
6 most complex and put them on your
7 shoulders to try to address, it does well

10 And so when I think about how
11 we focus on this issue, I think about
12 those two young men, Jordan Edwards,
13 Lonnie Sims. That could be Isaiah
14 Mandela Johnson. That could be Elijah
15 Kwame Johnson growing up here in this
16 great city.

17 Thank you very much, Council
18 President.
