1 I'm going to speak briefly for about 45
2 seconds, and then the invocation will be a
3 moment of silent worship that will be about
4 two minutes, a little bit longer than most
5 people are used to being in silence.

6 Quakers are the religion that founded
7 Philadelphia. And our form of relation --
8 of worship always includes some element of
9 silence. And what we do in the silence is
10 we focus on the light of God that exists in
11 each and every one of us and that exists in
12 everyone else. And what that lets us know
13 is that we have a piece of God's truth each
14 individually, and we need to recognize that
15 everyone else also has an element of the
16 truth in them.

17 When we start meetings for business like
18 this, we do take time about two minutes,
19 again, for silent worship. And so, that's
20 what I'm going to do. And one little trick
21 I will give -- and Quakers do have tricks.
22 One little trick I'll give is that in
23 meetings for business for worship, we often
24 think and try to listen and hear the voices

1 of those who are in the meeting with us.
2 And it often, for me, helps me to listen and
3 hear what that person is saying even and
4 almost especially when I don't agree with
5 them.

6 So with that said, I'm going to settle
7 down. We will sit -- everyone can sit for
8 two minutes in silent worship. I will break
9 worship by shaking hands with President
10 Clarke.

11 (Two-minute silent worship.)

12 (Clerk shakes hands with President Clarke.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you so
14 much for those inspiring thoughts.

15 Council be at ease.

16 (Council at ease.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
18 all.

19 The next order of business is the
20 Approval of the Journal of the meeting on
21 Thursday, May 4, 2017.

22 And the Chair recognizes Greenlee.

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you,
24 Mr. President.

1 I move that the Journal of the Meeting
2 of Thursday, May 4, 2017 be approved.

3 (Duly seconded.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
5 It's been moved and properly seconded that
6 the Journal of the meeting on Thursday,
7 May 4, 2017 stand approved.

8 All those in favor, say aye.

9 (Ayes.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
11 opposed?

12 (No response.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
14 And the Journal is approved.

15 The next order of business is request
16 for leave of absence. And the Chair
17 recognizes Councilman Henon.

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
19 Mr. President. On behalf of the Majority,
20 there are no requests of leaves of absence
21 today.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair thanks
23 the gentleman.

24 Chair now recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

1 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
2 Mr. President. On behalf of the
3 Republicans, there are no requests for leave
4 of absence.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair thanks
6 the gentleman.

7 At this time, I would like to dispense
8 with the regular order of business, and I
9 would like to thank everyone who has taken
10 time out of their busy day to come down and
11 witness their government in action. We
12 really appreciate the fact that you are
13 here. And we also hope that you have a
14 knowledgeable day. But more importantly, we
15 hope that you have a pleasurable day so much
16 so that you come back again.

17 So again, thank you so much for being
18 here.

19 At this time -- folks, I am going to
20 have to ask you all to like -- it's a lot of
21 talking going on. Thank you.

22 At this time, the Chair recognizes
23 Councilwoman Blackwell to present a
24 resolution on behalf -- on my behalf,

1 Honoring Julia R. Masterman School Students.
2 Would Brett Mandel and those accompanying --
3 hey you guys -- would those accompanying him
4 please join the Councilwoman at the podium.

5 (Councilmembers and guests approach
6 podium.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: There they
8 go. And joining the Councilwoman we have
9 Councilman Greenlee and Councilman Johnson
10 and Councilman Squilla.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,
12 Mr. President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: It is with
15 great pride that we present this resolution
16 on your behalf. Resolution honoring,
17 congratulating and recognizing Julia R.
18 Masterman School students for being crowned
19 World Famous Finalists in the Odyssey of the
20 Mind International Competition.

21 Whereas, Odyssey of the Mind is an
22 international creativity competition that
23 synthesizes science, technology, engineering
24 and the arts; and whereas, Odyssey of the

1 Mind has been encouraging students around
2 the world to "think outside the box" and
3 work together as a team to solve challenging
4 problems since 1978; and

5 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas, Julia R.
6 Masterman School Odyssey of the Mind
7 Division I team consisting of Emma
8 Chrizmer -- Chrismer, Havana Covington, Az.

9 (Students: Azalea)

10 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Azaleah Derrickson.

11 (Students: Azalea)

12 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Azaleah?

13 (Students: Azalea)

14 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Azalea.

15 (Students: Yes.)

16 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: All right. Michael
17 Fenerty, Amelia Hoffman, Sidney Mandel,
18 Lancelan --

19 (Students: Lachlan)

20 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Lachlan Pepersack.

21 (Laughter)

22 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Is that right,
23 Pepersack?

24 (Students: Yes.)

1 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: All right. All in
2 5th grade and coached by Chris Hoffman and
3 Brett Mandel won second place overall.
4 First place in spontaneous problem solving
5 at the Pennsylvania State Finals Tournament
6 on April 1, 2017; and.

7 Whereas, the Division I teams winning
8 performance consisted of famous ghosts
9 trying to avoid the Ghostbusters by
10 traveling in a hovercraft taxi, a battery
11 magnet shuttle that traveled through a
12 coiled copper wire, and a fan-powered car;
13 and

14 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas, the Julia
15 R. Masterman School's Odyssey of the Mind
16 Division II team, consisting of Drew Brown
17 in the 8th grade, William -- Willem
18 Cousineau in the 8th grade, Abiona Flora in
19 the 8th grade, Samuel --

20 (Students: Njiru)

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Njiru, 7th grade;
22 Julia Powers, 6th grade; Rory McDonald, 8th
23 grade and Ariel Weinbaum, 8th grade and
24 coached by Chris Powers, a Powel Elementary

1 School teacher and the one and only Brett
2 Mandel won Second Place in addition to the
3 Renatra Fusca Award --

4 (Students: Ranatra Fusca)

5 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Ranatra Fusca Award
6 for Ultimate Creativity at the Pennsylvania
7 State Finals Tournament on April 12, 2017;
8 and

9 Whereas, the Division II team competed
10 in the "Catch Us If You Can" problem solving
11 problem by creating vehicles that travel
12 from a multi-level parking garage to a
13 secret meeting place while also performing
14 and acting to avoid being followed; and

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas, the
16 Division II Team won their Ranantra Fusca --

17 (Students: Ranatra Fusca.)

18 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: You know what,
19 come on up here with me and help me out,
20 will you please.

21 (Laughter)

22 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: For Ultimate
23 Creativity, the highest award in Odyssey by
24 creating a performance about the inner

1 working of the human body that included a
2 train-of-thought fan car, a blood-vessel
3 boat that traveled in a blood stream --
4 really -- and a walking neuron; and

5 Whereas, the Julia R. Masterman School,
6 the Philadelphia Public School, will for the
7 fourth straight year compete in the Odyssey
8 of the Mind World Finals. Approximately,
9 6,000 students from across the United States
10 and around the world will represent the best
11 of young creative minds and compete at
12 Michigan State University in East Lansing on
13 May 24, 2017 through May 17, 2017; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Now therefore
15 be it resolved, that the Council of the City
16 of Philadelphia does hereby honor,
17 congratulate and recognize the Julia R.
18 Masterman School's Odyssey of the Mind Team
19 on their success in the state competition,
20 and wish them success in the World Finals
21 competition; and

22 Further, be it resolved that an
23 engrossed copy of this resolution be
24 presented to the Julia R. Masterman School's

1 Odyssey of the Mind Team as evidence of the
2 sincere sentiments of our legislative body.

3 And certainly, this is a sign it was
4 introduced by President Clarke, agreed to
5 and signed and cosponsored by all Members
6 of Council.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And the Chair
9 recognizes Mr. Mandel.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Our friend.

11 MR. MANDEL: Thank you so, so much for
12 this honor, Mr. President. And seems like
13 there are fewer people worthy of that title
14 every day in the country.

15 But, Mr. President, thank you so, so
16 much for having us. It's an incredible
17 little streak that we have been on. With
18 apologies to Walt Whitman, the school that
19 is great, is the one with the great
20 students. The best part about this run has
21 been watching all of the well-funded and
22 well-healed suburban private and public
23 school standing and cheering for our
24 students as they beat them year after year.

1 It is a wonderful trip. It is a
2 wonderful program. I am thrilled to have
3 been a participant honored by this Council
4 when I was but a kid in school. These guys
5 are going to have a great time. And it is
6 wonderful that you guys have been our good
7 luck charm sending us off each time.

8 Hear from the students very briefly what
9 they like the most about this program.

10 AMELIA HOFFMAN: Thank you. I really
11 love Odyssey of the Mind. It's one of my
12 favorite programs to do. But my most
13 favorite part about it is thinking outside
14 the box and being creative and really
15 getting to show things that we wouldn't
16 usually do in the 5th grade. So, I really
17 love that.

18 MR. MANDEL: That was Amelia Hoffman.
19 Say your name before you speak.

20 (Applause.)

21 SIDNEY MANDEL: My name is Sidney
22 Mandel. And my favorite part of Odyssey of
23 the Mind World Finals is getting to trade
24 pins with people from all over the world and

1 get to meet them and watching him get all
2 emotional. That was fun. We all love that.

3 ARIEL WEINBAUM: My name is Ariel
4 Weinbaum. My favorite part of Odyssey of
5 the Mind World Finals is meeting new people
6 from all around the world and creating
7 friendships that last me a lifetime.

8 STUDENTS: My name is Drew Brown. My
9 favorite part of Odyssey of the Mind is
10 getting to see the different creations and
11 being inspired and amazed by what other
12 teams and kids have done; however.

13 STUDENTS: We can't get to Worlds Finals
14 in Michigan without "your help."

15 (Applause.)

16 STUDENT: We have a Go Fund Me Page. I
17 don't know exactly what the link is.

18 MR. MANDEL: The Council President will
19 chair the link, I'm sure.

20 STUDENT: Yeah. So, we have a Go Fund
21 Me page. If you'd like to donate, you can
22 also you can write checks out to Masterman
23 HSA if you would like to help us.

24 Thank you.

1 (Applause.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

3 Council will be at ease.

4 (Council at ease.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

6 Thank you.

7 At this time, the Chair recognizes

8 Councilman Henon who will present a

9 resolution honoring Father Judge High School

10 Students, Jack Flynn and Dylan Feby.

11 Would Jack Flynn and Dylan Feby, Ed

12 Harrington and those accompanying him, please,

13 join the Councilman at the podium. And we

14 also have Councilman Greenlee, Councilman

15 Domb, Councilwoman Gym and Councilman

16 Taubenberger and Councilman Green.

17 (Councilmembers and guests approach the

18 podium.)

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: Well, good evening --

20 good morning, everybody. And before we

21 start with the presentation and the folks

22 are joining us here, I have to tell you this

23 is a -- an impressive story that deserves

24 the accolations and the recognition that it

1 deserves. You know, you will hear in the
2 resolution the story behind why we are here
3 and why we are honoring these two young men.

4 You have a freshman and a senior who
5 acted instinctively, instinctively where
6 most people would just walk by. And you see
7 on some of these reality TV shows and some
8 of these prank shows where you have, you
9 know, the setups for response of people.
10 And normally, people ignore situations.
11 These two young men saved a person's life by
12 instinctively jumping in while the rest of
13 the bus that they were on sat there, while
14 people out front walking the street kept
15 walking by.

16 And it is quite remarkable that these
17 kids who were -- get up, go to school doing
18 their normal routine, go to catch a bus,
19 SEPTA bus, public transportation to go home.
20 And an individual who attempted suicide who,
21 you know, obviously, had some -- some deep
22 issues that they were dealing with or could
23 not deal with ran into the bus. Ran into
24 the bus. These two kids were on the bus and

1 they were off the bus as quick as he hit the
2 bus.

3 And you know, the measures that they
4 took without having any knowledge of being a
5 paramedic, an EMT or CPR, all right, they
6 quickly took off the clothes that they were
7 wearing off of their sweater and applied the
8 tourniquet on the laceration on the neck.
9 And noticed the scene as they were -- in
10 seconds. Noticed that there were wrist
11 lacerations and a neck laceration bleeding
12 profusely.

13 And they were told upon the arrival from
14 our emergency medical responders that if it
15 wasn't for their quick actions, as quick as
16 they did and the actions that they took to
17 stop the bleeding to keep the man alive and
18 coherent until the medics responded, that
19 gentleman would not be here with us today.
20 So, it is an amazing, an amazing, amazing
21 story.

22 So today, we are honoring Father Judge
23 High School students Jack Flynn and Dylan
24 Feby for their heroic actions on February 7,

1 2017.

2 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas, rooted in
3 the spirituality of their patron, St.
4 Francis de Sales, Father Judge High School
5 educates the whole young man, spiritually,
6 intellectually, physically, emotionally and
7 socially in the Catholic tradition; and

8 Whereas, the motto of Father Judge High
9 School is educating the minds and souls of
10 their students in the spirit of the
11 gentleman saint, St. Francis de Sales; and

12 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Whereas, on
13 Thursday, February 7, 2017, never were these
14 qualities more evident as Senior Jack Flynn
15 and Freshman Dylan Feby, both students at
16 Judge, began what was and what is normally a
17 routine journey from home from -- to school
18 on their usual SEPTA Route 20 bus; and

19 Whereas, the bus was en route when an
20 unidentified male was spotted running
21 towards the moving bus in an attempt to be
22 deliberately hit; and

23 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the man
24 bounced off the bus and fell to the ground.

1 The bus door was open and Jack noticed the
2 man was bleeding from his neck and wrist in
3 an apparent suicide attempt; and

4 Whereas, Jack and Dylan sprang into
5 action using their Judge sweaters to stop
6 the bleeding from the man's neck and wrist,
7 and waited for him until the ambulance
8 arrived; and

9 Whereas, paramedics reached the scene
10 and were very appreciative of the boy's
11 actions in saving and assisting this man's
12 life; and

13 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Jack Flynn will be
14 getting ready to graduate in June and is
15 planning to join the United States Navy soon
16 thereafter. It's Jack's dream to follow in
17 his father's footsteps and become a
18 Philadelphia Firefighter. Jack is proud to
19 be a member of the Father Judge ice hockey
20 team and lives with his parents and younger
21 brother; and

22 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, Dylan Feby
23 is currently a Freshman at Judge and enjoys
24 playing basketball. Dylan is also

1 interested in astronomy. It is his hope to
2 continue his education after graduating from
3 Judge and major in engineering. He resides
4 with his mother and stepfather, and enjoys
5 hanging out with his father and two younger
6 sisters; and now therefore

7 COUNCILMAN HENON: Therefore, be it
8 resolved by the Council of the City of
9 Philadelphia that we hereby honor and
10 congratulate Father Judge High School
11 students Jack Flynn and Dylan Feby for their
12 heroic actions on February 7, 2017.

13 Resolved further, that an engrossed copy
14 of this resolution be presented to Jack and
15 Dylan further evidencing the grateful
16 appreciation and deep admiration of this
17 legislative body.

18 And I also want to add in closing that,
19 you know, I want to thank the parents of
20 these two young gentleman who have an
21 incredible future, all right, to have
22 instincts like that. They are good people.
23 Good people do good things, and great people
24 who come from good families and have the

1 opportunity to be part of the community.

2 You know, you should be honor -- honored of
3 their heroic actions. Should be honored as
4 fine young men.

5 And to the school Father Judge, I happen
6 to be a product of albeit to St. Francis de
7 Sales. And I have to tell you, Father Judge
8 does a wonderful job in making sure that
9 family and community come together, all
10 right, for the service of good and for all
11 good men and women.

12 So, you should all be proud. And I want
13 to thank you all and congratulations to you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And the --
16 and the Chair recognizes Mr. Harrington for
17 remarks.

18 MR. HARRINGTON: Good morning.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Morning.

20 MR. HARRINGTON: It goes without saying
21 how proud we are, Father Judge, on behalf of
22 the Administration of these two young men.
23 In the world today where a lot of young
24 people kind of maybe get a bad rap or they

1 have their ear buds in on their cell phones,
2 here is two young men that didn't think.
3 They simply saw something happen to them
4 visual, and they just sprang into action.
5 And when they told me the story, I saw the
6 pictures, I was just blown away.

7 Their character development in school,
8 we pride ourselves in character development.
9 Started a long time ago with their parents.
10 The Northeast Philadelphia neighborhoods
11 they grew up in, these are great kids and
12 they have bright futures. And we are so
13 proud of them.

14 And thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

17 Council be at ease.

18 (Council at ease.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
20 very much young men.

21 At this time -- where is the Councilman?

22 Chair again recognizes Councilman Henon
23 who will present a resolution honoring the
24 Community Life Improvement Program, also

1 known as CLIP.

2 Would Tom Conway and those accompanying
3 him please join the Councilman at the
4 podium.

5 (Applause.)

6 (Councilmembers and guests approach the
7 podium.)

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: I hope not everybody
9 has a camera that's coming up here. We do
10 have work today.

11 Well, again, thank you everybody.
12 Welcome CLIP, CLIP Team. Let's hear it for
13 the CLIP team.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILMAN HENON: We are here to
16 celebrate the 15th Year Anniversary of CLIP
17 right here in the Chambers. And for those
18 who have been around, understand and know
19 what went into the creation of CLIP. I see
20 Councilwoman Blackwell and I know Council
21 President Clarke were all a part of it. And
22 Councilman O'Neill were around at the time.

23 CLIP was a -- in conjunction with the
24 creation of the neighborhood Mayor Streets

1 Neighborhood Transformation Initiative. And
2 that initiative was bold. It was strong.
3 We still have remnants of that programs and
4 different names today that is -- you know,
5 Council President Clarke and I laugh at
6 times when we see new programs. But there
7 are not actually new programs, are they
8 Council President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Not actually.

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: They were created at
11 one time and have evolved. But the creation
12 of CLIP, which I am proud of and we all
13 should be proud of, originated and started
14 as a pilot in the 6th Councilman District
15 with my predecessor Joan Krajewski. Who --
16 one thing I was taught through her and
17 through other members of this body is we may
18 not all agree on everything, all right, but
19 we agree that, you know, we can fight for
20 the quality of life and the issues, all
21 right, of the District and the people that
22 we represent. And Joan Krajewski did just
23 that.

24 And the creation of CLIP started, and

1 the creation of accolades to Tom Conway
2 during every budget hearing, you know, since
3 then has been outstanding. And I remember
4 CLIP going out and doing graffiti and was
5 happy to have as a Committee person and a
6 community organizer in my neighborhood as a
7 young man.

8 I remember, you know, using the tools
9 that they have which started with -- with
10 graffiti. Blight. Destroying our
11 neighborhoods. And now we have a program
12 that is citywide, and there is not one
13 Councilmember, there is not one citizen of
14 the City of Philadelphia who has not
15 benefitted from CLIP.

16 Over a million properties that have
17 been -- had graffiti removed from it;
18 200,000 vacant lots; three -- 30,000
19 exteriors of properties that are now in
20 compliance with 69 percent or above with
21 property maintenance. That is all the
22 quality of life issues that we deal with on
23 a daily basis. And CLIP and its team and
24 everybody up here and those who are not up

1 here who are out there remediating, out
2 there who are cleaning up and working, all
3 right, because, you know, the City must move
4 on and they are working and they are doing a
5 fantastic job. They are all a part of that.

6 One thing that I did when I was first
7 elected, I took a little picture from
8 Undercover Boss that you see on TV. I did
9 Undercover Councilman. And I passed by this
10 one house where -- on Welsh Road that I did.
11 And I think they actually probably were just
12 out there recently because it was -- it's
13 cut down. So, I did an undercover with
14 CLIP. And they had me weed whacking. And
15 they had me mowing the lawn. They had me
16 pulling little trees out and bagging and
17 everything like that. I think they hazed
18 me. I think that was my initiation thing.

19 But they do a great job and deserve all
20 the credit, all the credit for expanding its
21 program citywide, making sure that we get
22 the best quality of life that we deserve.

23 Tom, he's up here wearing a peach shirt.

24 And his top, his button is buttoned. So

1 without further ado, all right, I want to
2 thank you, Tom, for growing with this and
3 managing the program here now as we honor
4 the Community of Life Program of the
5 occasion of the 15th Year Anniversary.

6 Whereas, CLIP, Community of Life
7 Program, was created April 2, 2002 in
8 conjunction with Mayor John Streets
9 Neighborhood Transformation Initiative by
10 long time Councilmember Joan Krajewski.

11 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas, originally
12 designed to address quality of life issues
13 in the 6th Councilmanic District, CLIP now
14 can be found on a Citywide level. The
15 Community Life Improvement Program consists
16 of several programs dedicated to improving
17 the appearance of neighborhoods throughout
18 the City of Philadelphia through the
19 eradication of blight.

20 Last year, CLIP cleaned over 15,000
21 vacant lots and 3,000 exteriors of
22 properties. These programs are designed to
23 maximize effectiveness and efficiency by
24 inspecting and abating entire blocks; and

1 Whereas, CLIP encourages business and
2 residents of the City of Philadelphia to get
3 involved in their neighborhood and partner
4 with CLIP programs to make a difference.
5 Their Community Partnership Program, CPP
6 assisted over 500 organizations last year
7 and has supplied resources available for
8 neighborhood cleanups to foster sustainable
9 communities; and

10 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Whereas, CLIP's
11 Graffiti Abatement Teams and rapid response
12 teams dedicated to the quick removal of
13 graffiti, vandalism and has been in
14 existence for over 20 years. Tom started
15 that in Mayor Rendell's second term, 24
16 hours then. A little different when we were
17 working with the Police. But still, part of
18 CLIP is why it works so well.

19 This division of CLIP has been working
20 with community organizations and business
21 associations since 1996 removing graffiti
22 vandalism from over 1 million properties;
23 and

24 Whereas, CLIP truly appreciates those

1 groups that have partnered with the program
2 and wishes to recognize the efforts and
3 remarkable results that have come through
4 these partnerships. Only through the
5 combined efforts of community organizations,
6 business associations, elected officials,
7 city, state and federal agencies working
8 together can the quality of life truly
9 improve in neighborhoods throughout the
10 City; now therefore

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Therefore be it
12 resolved that the Council of the City of
13 Philadelphia hereby honor and commend the
14 quality -- Community Life Improvement
15 Program on the occasion of their 15th Year
16 Anniversary.

17 Resolve further, that an engrossed copy
18 of this resolution be presented to the
19 representatives of CLIP as further evidence
20 of their sincere, respect and admiration of
21 this legislative body.

22 And you know, one thing that you learn
23 along the way that when you only have
24 X-amount of years in Council and others have

1 tenure, you get taught a little lesson that
2 it doesn't just start in the 6th District.
3 It was companioned with the 10th District.
4 And I'm sure Brian O'Neill was one of the
5 founders leveraging and champion for the
6 district of the 10th Councilmanic District
7 along with Joan Krajewski and the Mayor to
8 make sure that Northeast was represented in
9 ways that it wasn't before continuing to
10 address the quality of life issues.

11 So, thank you all. And thank you,
12 Brian.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And Chair
15 recognizes Tom Conway for remarks.

16 MR. CONWAY: Thank you, Mr. President,
17 Members of City Council for this resolution.
18 Honored of the team at CLIP. I would also
19 like to thank you for being so supportive of
20 CLIP over the last 15 years.

21 Thanks to you and Mayor Kenney, CLIP
22 received additional funding last year to
23 continue our mission of working with
24 businesses and residents in cleaning up

1 Philadelphia. I believe standing here with
2 you today are some of the hardest work in
3 public servants in this City's history,
4 employees that truly care about making a
5 difference, not just in our great city but
6 also in society.

7 Is not just a job, it has become a
8 mission to be the most effective, efficient
9 and caring agency in City government. And I
10 believe we are on our way to succeeding.

11 Our biggest accomplishments -- although
12 Councilman Henon mentioned what we have
13 accomplished over the last 15 years. Our
14 biggest accomplishment is our ability to
15 change people's lives by giving people a
16 second chance. CLIP has a very robust
17 hiring practice where we hire people
18 reentering society to work for CLIP.

19 I am extremely proud of this
20 accomplishment and the diversity of our
21 workforce as we truly represent the City and
22 are up there as one of the most diversified
23 organizations in the City.

24 I would like to thank my employees for

1 their dedication, loyalty and commitment and
2 improving the lives and quality of life of
3 Philadelphians across this great city.

4 Those standing here with me today have
5 over ten years of experience working for
6 CLIP. None of this could have been
7 accomplished if it were not for the two old
8 school politicians -- well three: Mayor John
9 Street and the late Councilman Krajewski and
10 Brian O'Neill -- not the late Brian O'Neill.

11 Mayor Streets' Neighborhood trans --
12 (Laughter)

13 MR. CONWAY: Mayor Streets' Neighborhood
14 Transformation Initiative was the right fit
15 at the right time. His vision of
16 transforming neighborhoods lives to this day
17 through CLIP. He wanted to ensure that all
18 Philadelphian neighborhoods received a
19 lasting piece of the NTI Program. And he
20 succeeded. The Councilwoman's unwavering
21 support of this enforcement education arm of
22 the program allowed us to build the
23 foundation to succeed early on.

24 Again, I would like to thank City

1 Council, Mayor Kenney and CLIP employees for
2 their strong effort in cleaning up
3 Philadelphia and improving the quality of
4 life on a daily basis in a very meaningful
5 way.

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Council will
9 be at ease.

10 (Council at ease.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
12 very much. Thank you.

13 The next order of business is
14 Communications. And the Chair requests that
15 the Sergeant of Arms delivers the messages
16 from the Mayor to the Chief Clerk.

17 (Mayors messages delivered.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And,
19 Mr. Decker, if you will please read those
20 messages.

21 CHIEF CLERK: To the President and
22 Members of the Council of the City of
23 Philadelphia, I am pleased to advise you
24 that on May 8, 2017, I signed all the bills

1 which were passed by Council at its session
2 on April 27, 2017. And that on May 5, 2017,
3 I signed the following bill, which was
4 passed by Council at its session on May 4,
5 2017: Bill No. 170168.

6 And I am submitting herewith for the
7 consideration of your Honorable Body, a
8 resolution authorizing the Philadelphia
9 Redevelopment Authority to dispose of
10 certain properties located in the 7th
11 Councilmanic District. They will be
12 transferred by the City to the Authority by
13 conveyance of such properties to the
14 Philadelphia Land Bank. And an ordinance
15 authorizing the Parks and Recreation
16 Commissioner and the Procurement
17 Commissioner on behalf of the City to
18 execute a concession agreement with Tree Top
19 Quest or its wholly owned subsidiary for an
20 aerial adventure park in West Fairmount
21 Park, all under certain terms and
22 conditions.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Do you have
24 any additional communications, Mr. Decker?

1 CHIEF CLERK: I have none, Mr. Clerk.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
3 very much.

4 And the next order of business is
5 introduction of bills and resolutions.

6 And the Chair recognizes Councilwoman
7 Reynolds Brown.

8 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Good
9 morning, I offer one resolution this
10 morning.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
12 Councilwoman.

13 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution
14 recognizing the month of May as National
15 Foster Care Month in the City of
16 Philadelphia.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will
18 be on this week's Final Passage Calendar.

19 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. I have one bill and one
22 resolution. I would like to be recognized
23 on the resolution, if possible.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: After the

1 reading of the resolution, all right.

2 Thank you, Councilwoman.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you.

4 CHIEF CLERK: An Ordinance authorizing
5 Route 34 Group to install, own and maintain
6 an open-air sidewalk cafe at 5021-23
7 Baltimore Avenue.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Refer to
9 Committee.

10 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
11 resolution hereby recognizing May 18, 2017
12 as Haitian Flag Day in Philadelphia.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And Chair
14 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you,
16 Mr. President.

17 This bill is cosponsored by Helen Gym,
18 Allan Domb, Cherelle Parker, Mark Squilla
19 and Derek Green. And let me say, I was
20 pleased to receive it. It was written by
21 Steve Paul who works for Councilwoman Gym
22 and who was Haitian born. Been here since
23 he was a little boy, around six or seven.
24 And he's been to our meetings. And we are

1 very -- and we are very proud of his
2 commitment and interest.

3 As many of you know, Haiti was the first
4 independent Black country in the world who
5 successfully fought French -- the French
6 colonizations. We are very proud that we
7 will be joining them next week in flag
8 raising and being involved in many
9 activities in addition to that.

10 I know that Councilwoman Gym wants to
11 speak, as well.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
13 recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

14 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you very much,
15 Council President. Thank you so much to
16 Councilwoman Blackwell for her amazing
17 partnership on a host of issues, especially
18 impacting our African and Carribean
19 immigrant nations. In these times as we
20 face the rise of a reactionary and
21 regressive administration that often seeks
22 to turn the clock back on hard-won freedoms.

23 This resolution about the Haitian
24 revolution and Haiti's legacy of

1 revolutionary struggle for a just and equal
2 society is an example for all of us today.

3 The Haitian Revolution was one of most
4 influential uprisings in the Western
5 hemisphere. It sparked slave revolts
6 throughout the Carribean, which forced the
7 eventual end of slavery in the British and
8 French-occupied territories. And
9 additionally, it inspired the three major
10 slave revolts in the United States of
11 America.

12 The African heroes in Hispaniola fought
13 for human rights, liberty, equality and
14 fraternity and went on to establish the
15 first free Black republic in the world, the
16 Republic of Haiti. The first independent
17 nation in Latin America and the first nation
18 to renounce slavery.

19 We must never forget Haiti. We must
20 never forget Haiti's history, its legacy.
21 We must celebrate and hold Haiti up in times
22 like these. We need those historical
23 lessons more than ever.

24 Thank you so much, Councilwoman

1 Blackwell.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
3 Council Ladies. And that will be on this
4 week's Final Passage Calendar.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
7 recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

8 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you,
9 Mr. President. On your behalf I offer one
10 bill.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
12 Councilman.

13 CHIEF CLERK: An Ordinance authorizing
14 Boyd's Realty Partnership to install, own
15 and maintain concrete planter encroachments
16 at 1818 Chestnut Street.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That bill
18 will be referred to Committee.

19 And Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you, Council
21 President. Today I offer one bill and two
22 resolutions.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
24 Councilman.

1 CHIEF CLERK: An Ordinance to amend the
2 Philadelphia Zoning Maps by changing the
3 zoning designations of certain areas of land
4 located within an area bounded by Linden
5 Avenue(extended), Academy Road, Grant
6 Avenue, Frankford Avenue, the Poquessing
7 Creek and the Delaware River.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Refer to
9 Committee.

10 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
11 resolution authorizing the Committee on
12 Public Property and Public Works to hold
13 public hearings on the status of
14 implementation of the cable television
15 franchise renewal agreement between the City
16 of Philadelphia and Comcast of Philadelphia
17 passed by this Council on December 10, 2015.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's
19 calendar.

20 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
21 resolution recognizing May 4, 2017 as
22 International Firefighters Day in
23 Philadelphia and further honoring the men
24 and women of the Philadelphia Fire

1 Department for their continual dedication
2 and service to the City of Philadelphia.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's
4 calendar.

5 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
7 Mr. President. I have two bills and two
8 resolutions. The resolutions cosponsored by
9 Parker, Oh, Brown, Bass, Johnson, Greenlee
10 on both.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
12 Councilman.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: And Oh.

14 CHIEF CLERK: An Ordinance authorizing
15 the Parks and Recreation Commissioner and
16 the Procurement Commissioner, on behalf of
17 the City, to execute a Concession Agreement
18 with Treetop Quest, or its wholly-owned
19 subsidiary, for an aerial adventure park in
20 West Fairment Park.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Councilman,
22 after Council, I want to ask you what that
23 is.

24 Refer to Committee.

1 COUNCILMAN JONES: Mr. President, I can
2 show you better than tell you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All right.
4 Thank you. I will look forward to seeing
5 that.

6 Refer to committee.

7 CHIEF CLERK: And an Ordinance to amend
8 the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by changing the
9 zoning designations of certain areas of land
10 located within an area bounded by Gates
11 Street, Henry Avenue, Roxborough Avenue,
12 Magdalena Street, Walnut Lane, Henry Avenue,
13 Kingsley Street, Houghton Street, Walnut
14 Lane, Shurs Lane, Tower Street, Levering
15 Street, Silverwood Street, Leverington
16 Avenue, Silverwood Street, Fountain Street
17 and Ridge Avenue.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Refer to
19 Committee.

20 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
21 resolution recognizing and honoring
22 Overbrook High School graduates, Joyce Eli
23 Bevins and Jean Lu Bevins for their
24 recognition by the Cannes Film Festival for

1 the short film "My Dear Arthur."

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's
3 calendar.

4 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged
5 resolution also naming the 5800 block of
6 Race Street as Reverend Albert F. Campbell
7 Way.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next weeks'
9 calendar.

10 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council President,
12 I have one privileged resolution and one
13 non-privileged resolution and one resolution
14 regarding the renaming of Broad and
15 Christian Street to Carpenter Street to
16 "Boyz II Men Boulevard" as primarily
17 sponsored by my good friend from South
18 Philadelphia, Councilman Mark Squilla and
19 signed by all Members of Council.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
21 Councilman.

22 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution
23 honoring Principal Joanne Beaver of
24 Philadelphia High School for the Creative

1 and Performing Arts, a recipient of the 2017
2 Lindback Award which recognizes
3 distinguished principal leadership.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's
5 calendar.

6 CHIEF CLERK: And A non-privileged
7 resolution also naming Broad Street from
8 Christian Street to Carpenter Street, "Boys
9 II Men Boulevard."

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will
11 be on next week's Final Passage Calendar.

12 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Sanchez.

13 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Thank
14 you, Council President. I have one
15 privileged resolution, one non-privileged
16 and two bills. And I wish to be recognized
17 after the bill has been read.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
19 Councilwoman.

20 CHIEF CLERK: An Ordinance establishing
21 a no truck parking regulation on both sides
22 of the 4400-4500 block of Castor Avenue from
23 Wyoming Avenue to E. Cayuga Street.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Refer to

1 Committee.

2 CHIEF CLERK: And an Ordinance amending
3 Title 2 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled
4 "City-County Consolidation," by amending the
5 Chief Assessment Officer's authorization to
6 set standards for the valuation of
7 properties for taxation purposes.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
9 recognizes Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

10 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES-SANCHEZ: Thank
11 you, Mr. President.

12 I recently attended a senior event. And
13 I was talking to one of my beloved seniors
14 who was very happy about the shopping mall
15 that we are building on 3rd and Allegheny.
16 She talked to me about how excited she was
17 that she was going to have all of those
18 amenities close to her. And then she asked
19 me is it time for me to sell my property and
20 move to a smaller apartment.

21 And I said why? And she says, because
22 these improvements mean my property taxes
23 are going to go up, and I'm not going to be
24 able to afford the house that I have lived

1 in with my children. This story, Council
2 President, is one that all of us hear time
3 and time again.

4 I recently fixed the sidewalks of my own
5 community of Norris Square in the park. And
6 I got -- sent an email from folks that say
7 Maria, why are you gentrifying my
8 neighborhood, our neighborhood. And I
9 responded that my seniors had actually asked
10 me for those sidewalks because every Friday
11 morning at ten o'clock they do their weekly
12 walk. And in fact, always invite me and I
13 don't get there often to do it with them.

14 We face this every day. People are
15 scared about new development. A couple of
16 weeks ago when OPA was here, I asked Michael
17 Piper over and over how do we ensure that
18 people don't look at development as
19 something that is going to tax them out of
20 where they live. This Council, under your
21 leadership, has been steadfast in their
22 support of AVI, Homestead Exemptions, LOOP,
23 property tax deferrals, our Senior Freeze.
24 We have done just about everything we can to

1 reassure folks that we are building the City
2 and that we really do value and want to
3 protect our working poor.

4 That is why today I introduce a bill to
5 further protect long time homeowners from
6 what could be perceived as artificially
7 inflated tax bills by closing a critical
8 loophole in the way the City is going to
9 assess property values. I am fearful of
10 what this new annual assessment is going to
11 mean for communities like my own
12 neighborhood of Norris Square and Old
13 Kensington.

14 This legislation will authorize the
15 Office of Property Assessment to look at
16 ways of valuing markets, particularly of
17 properties on the ten-year tax abatement
18 when computing neighborhood market values
19 based on recent sales. This mechanism will
20 ensure that both new and long time
21 homeowners share the benefits of our tax
22 relief programs.

23 The sale or purchase of your neighbor's
24 home should not increase your tax bill

1 simply because your new neighbor is entitled
2 to the tax abatement. People deserve a tax
3 bill that really represents the true value
4 of their property, not an artificial value
5 that may be created by our own development
6 strategies.

7 As we move forward toward annual
8 assessments, we must look at ways to
9 calculate values by each neighborhood, block
10 by block, as precisely and as fairly as
11 possible. I look forward to a very robust
12 conversation with everyone in Council about
13 what this potential bill could mean and the
14 critical consequences that we hear all too
15 often in neighborhood to neighborhood about
16 people fearing new development and
17 enhancements, their own community
18 enhancements in their neighborhoods.

19 For me, it hurts me because people
20 believe that we are fixing our neighborhoods
21 for the new ones to come. And I fight every
22 day to convince them that -- and I apologize
23 that it's taken us so long to fix their old
24 neighborhood amenities in every neighborhood

1 for them, those folks who have believed and
2 have raised their families in their
3 neighborhoods.

4 I look forward to the conversation with
5 the Administration. And I ask any of my
6 colleagues who are interested in discussing
7 this with me to be part of a work group as
8 we look at what this potentially can mean.
9 I welcome their input and their advise.

10 Thank you, Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
12 Councilwoman. And that bill will be
13 referred to the appropriate committee.

14 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
15 resolution recognizing, honoring and
16 celebrating Sharon Lopez on being named the
17 First Latina President of the Pennsylvania
18 Bar Association.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's
20 calendar.

21 CHIEF CLERK: And a non-privileged
22 resolution authorizing the Philadelphia
23 Redevelopment Authority to dispose of
24 certain properties located in the 7th

1 Councilmanic District that will be
2 transferred by the City to the Authority by
3 conveyance of such properties to the
4 Philadelphia Land Bank.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will
6 be on next week's calendar.

7 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

8 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you, Council
9 President. I have one bill and one
10 non-privileged resolution.

11 Council President, I will request a
12 suspension of the rules for this
13 non-privileged resolution. This resolution
14 replaces the resolution that's on the Final
15 Passage Calendar for today. That would make
16 a motion withdraw that resolution. Today's
17 resolution is a technical change for the
18 legislation that was introduced last week
19 regarding the Tourism Improvement District.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Okay. You
21 making a motion now for the suspension --

22 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Yes.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: -- to allow
24 today's ruling? Is there a second?

1 (Duly seconded.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All those in
3 favor?

4 (Ayes.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
6 opposed?

7 (No response.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
9 That will be on this week's Final
10 Passage Calendar.

11 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you, Council
12 President.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You're
14 welcome.

15 CHIEF CLERK: An Ordinance establishing
16 a business improvement district encompassing
17 certain existing and future hotel properties
18 within the boundaries of the City of
19 Philadelphia to be known as the Philadelphia
20 Hospitality Improvement Levy District,
21 designating the Philadelphia Hospitality
22 Improvement Levy District Corporation to
23 serve as the Neighborhood Improvement
24 District Management Association for the

1 District.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will

13 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

14 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you,

16 resolution co-authored by Councilwoman
17 Reynolds Brown, co-sponsored by Members
18 Green, Bass and Taubenberger and supported
19 by all Members of Council.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
21 Councilwoman.

22 CHIEF CLERK: A privileged resolution
23 recognizing and honoring the Members of
24 Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Incorporates its

1 Quaker City Alumni Chapter Social Action
2 Committee on the occasion of the 14th year
3 of Delta Days at City Council.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's
5 Final Passage Calendar.

6 And the Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Domb.

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Morning, Council
9 President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Morning.

11 COUNCILMAN DOMB: No bills or
12 resolutions today.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
14 Councilman.

15 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

16 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Good morning, Council
17 President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Morning.

19 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: One non-privileged
20 resolution co-sponsored by Councilmembers
21 Reynolds Brown, Green, Bass Domb, Sanchez
22 and Parker with gratitude.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
24 Councilwoman.

1 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged
2 resolution recognizing the critical role
3 that guidance counselors and counselors play
4 in meeting students' academic, social and
5 emotional needs and urging the School
6 District of Philadelphia to devote
7 additional resources to expanding the number
8 of counselors in high schools with the
9 highest needs.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's
11 calendar.

12 And the chair recognizes Councilman
13 Taubenberger.

14 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Good morning,
15 Council President and Colleagues. I have no
16 bills or resolutions this week.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm sorry,
18 Councilman?

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
24 Councilman.

1 And the Chair recognizes Councilman
2 O'Neill.

3 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
4 Mr. President. I have no bills or
5 resolutions.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
7 Councilman.

8 Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

9 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you, Council
10 President. I introduce eight bills today.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
12 Councilman.

13 CHIEF CLERK: An Ordinance to amend the
14 Philadelphia Zoning Maps by changing the
15 zoning designations of certain areas of land
16 located within an area bounded by Front
17 Street, the Delaware Expressway, Laurel
18 Street, Canal Street and Poplar Street.

19 And an Ordinance to amend Title 14 of
20 The Philadelphia Code, entitled "Zoning and
21 Planning," by revising certain provisions of
22 Section 14-500, entitled "Overlay Zoning
23 Districts," for the amendment of the North
24 Delaware Neighborhood Commercial Overlay

1 District.

2 And an Ordinance amending Title 3 of The
3 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Air Management
4 Code," by amending Chapter 3-200 thereof,
5 entitled "Prohibited Conduct," to add a new
6 section prohibiting the cutting of rubber
7 tires by any person.

8 And an Ordinance amending Section 14-702
9 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled "Floor
10 Area and Height Bonuses," and Section 14-704
11 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled "Open
12 Space and Natural Resources," by making
13 technical changes relating to the CDO,
14 Central Delaware River Front Overlay
15 District.

16 And an Ordinance authorizing 2732
17 Donna's Bar to install, own and maintain an
18 open-air sidewalk cafe at 2732 E. Allegheny
19 Avenue.

20 And an Ordinance authorizing B1 Holdings
21 to install, own and maintain an open-air
22 sidewalk cafe at 767 South 9th Street.

23 And an Ordinance authorizing 1338
24 Incorporated to install, own and maintain an

1 open-air sidewalk cafe at 1338-40 South 10th
2 Street.

3 And an Ordinance authorizing WT
4 Restaurant Holdings to install, own and
5 maintain an open-air sidewalk cafe at 743
6 South 4th Street.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
8 Those eight bills just read by the Chief
9 Clerk will be referred to the appropriate
10 committees.

11 And the Chair recognizes Councilwoman
12 Bass.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I offer one privileged
15 resolution cosponsored by Councilmembers
16 Gym, Quinones-Sanchez and Green.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
18 Councilwoman.

19 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged
20 resolution supporting House Bill 1302 which
21 would prohibit Pennsylvania law enforcement
22 agencies from using state resources to
23 investigate, interrogate, detain or arrest
24 people for immigration enforcement purposes.

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that will
2 be on next week's Final Passage Calendar.

3 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

4 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you, Council
5 President. I offer no bills or resolutions.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
7 Councilman.

8 That concludes our introduction of bills
9 and resolutions. We have no reports from
10 Committee today.

11 And the next order of business is
12 consideration of the Calendar.

13 Mr. Decker, would you please read the
14 bills on the First Reading Calendar.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Bill No. 170306, entitled
16 "An Ordinance to Reinstate Bill No. 140309"
17 Amending Section 140-502 of the Zoning Code,
18 entitled "CTR, Center City Overlay," and
19 Section 14-602 of the Zoning Code, entitled
20 "Used Tables," and to amend Section 14-803
21 Motor Vehicle Parking standards.

22 And Bill No. 170289, entitled an
23 Ordinance Amending Section 12-701 of The
24 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Bicycle Lanes,"

1 by authorizing the Department of Streets to
2 designate bicycle lanes in both directions
3 on American Street, from Jefferson Street,
4 to Lehigh Avenue for the removal of a travel
5 lane on American Street in the same limits,
6 all under certain terms and conditions.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

8 The Chair agrees, these bills will be
9 placed on our Second Reading and Final
10 Passage Calendar at our next session of
11 Council.

12 Chair now recognizes Councilman Henon
13 for a motion concerning the bills on the
14 Second Reading and Final Passage Calendar.

15 COUNCILMAN HENON: Mr. President, is
16 this for the Consent Agenda first or --
17 thank you, Mr. President.

18 I move that the Rules of Council be
19 suspended to permit the use of the Consent
20 Agenda to consider the following bills on
21 the Second Reading of Final Passage
22 Calendar.

23 Bill Nos. 170140-A, 160680, 170149,
24 170201, 170265, 170310, 170331, 170333,

1 170015, 170016, 170308, 170329, 170330,
2 161108, 170002, 170086, 170203, 170264,
3 170281, 170283, 170284, 170286, 170292,
4 170305, 170311 and 170336.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

7 It's been moved and seconded that the Rules
8 of Council be suspended to permit the use of
9 the Consent Agenda to consider the bills
10 just read by Councilman Henon.

11 All those in favor say aye.

12 (Ayes.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
14 opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The ayes have
17 it. The motion carries. And we will
18 consider the Consent Agenda shortly.

19 Chair again recognizes Councilman Henon
20 for the purpose of calling on bills and
21 resolution on the regular Second Reading and
22 Final Passage Calendar.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
24 Mr. President. In addition to the bills

1 being considered on the Consent Agenda, the
2 following resolution and bill are being
3 called up for a Second Reading and Final
4 Passage Calendars today.

5 Bill Nos. 170443, 170449, 170335, 170205
6 and 170332. All other bills and resolutions
7 are being held.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
9 very much. Before considering our calendar
10 today, we will have our Public Comment
11 session.

12 The Public Comment session will go as
13 follows. If you are interested in
14 testifying on a bill or resolution that is
15 on the Final Passage Calendar, if you have
16 not already signed up, you may do that, the
17 table to my left. When your name is called,
18 you will go to the podium in the middle of
19 the Council chambers.

20 There is a device on that podium. When
21 the light turns green on that device, it
22 will be your time to speak. When the light
23 turns yellow, you will have 30 seconds to
24 conclude your remarks. When the light turns

1 red, we would ask that you please adhere to
2 those guidelines established by Council and
3 conclude your remarks. You will be given
4 three minutes to testify. Thank you very
5 much.

6 Mr. Decker, can you please call the
7 first name.

8 CHIEF CLERK: Stan Shapiro, commenting
9 on 170330.

10 (Approaches podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good morning.

12 MR. SHAPIRO: Thank you, Council
13 President, Members of Council. I'm Stan
14 Shapiro. And I'm testifying today on behalf
15 of Philadelphia Neighborhood Networks.

16 We applaud Council for recognizing that
17 the City must attach itself from serial
18 abuser Wells Fargo, but there is no other
19 mega bank that the City can morally
20 substitute for it, certainly not Citizens
21 Bank.

22 In August 2015, three cooperating
23 federal agencies ordered Citizens to pay
24 tens of millions of dollars in restitution

1 and penalties for pocketing money from
2 customers who made mistakes on their deposit
3 slips. In a truly remarkable pattern of
4 grand larceny, if a customer's deposit slip
5 inadvertently understated the amount of
6 their actual deposit, the bank would credit
7 the customer with the mistaken amount and
8 pocket the difference. And it did it over
9 and over and over again.

10 Just last month, the Citizens Bank
11 affiliate was fined for overcharging
12 charitable and retirement plan, mutual fund
13 customers by failing to waive unallowable
14 fees. And of course, just like Wells Fargo,
15 Citizens is a funder of the notorious Dakota
16 Access Pipeline. In addition, it's also a
17 funder of the Mariner East Pipeline, which
18 brings the dangers of breaks, spills and
19 noxious emissions right into our region.

20 Yes, moving the City's money or most of
21 it to Citizens might be a small step up from
22 keeping it at super-predator Wells Fargo.
23 But ultimately, there is only one good way
24 for the City to manage its money, and that's

1 to create its own bank modeled after the
2 Bank of North Dakota. That bank created in
3 1919 and getting stronger and stronger as it
4 approaches its 100th birthday holds all the
5 funds of the State of North Dakota and then
6 it reinvests them in the students, farmers,
7 school districts, homeowners and small
8 businesses of the state.

9 When it lends to School Districts for
10 construction or reconstruction of school
11 buildings, it frees of tens of millions of
12 dollars for districts to invest in teachers,
13 supplies, equipment and all of the
14 essentials that are in such short supply in
15 our City. And when it invests in small
16 businesses, it is investing in itself by
17 growing the economy and tax ratables that
18 then benefit the entire community through
19 provision of robust services.

20 It's time for the City to go 100 percent
21 renewable energy to boost its stock of
22 affordable housing to let every business
23 have access to local financing to boost the
24 coop sector of the economy to fix its

1 schools. It's time the City had a tool
2 other than zero-sub tax incentives to lure
3 established businesses to the City and to
4 enable start up -- start ups. And it's high
5 time that the City rid itself once and for
6 all that the pernicious impacts of dealing
7 with the Wall Street predators.

8 Let's create the Public Bank of
9 Philadelphia.

10 (Applause.)

11 (Councilwoman Reynolds Brown sitting in as
12 Chair.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Thank you.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Kelly morton, commenting
15 on 170330.

16 (Approaches podium.)

17 MS. MORTON: Hi. My name is Kelly
18 Morton. And I'm a member of Reclaim
19 Philadelphia. We applaud the removal of the
20 \$2 billion from Wells Fargo Bank. However,
21 we reject the perception that we are chained
22 to big banks like Wells Fargo and Citizens
23 Bank because they are the only ones that can
24 handle our large account.

1 This perception leads us to tolerate
2 criminal practices like those of Wells Fargo
3 for far too long. Practices that have
4 directly harmed Philadelphians, our School
5 District, vulnerable and indigenous minority
6 populations and the environment as others
7 have pointed out here today.

8 We ask City Council to join other
9 progressive cities in exploring a public
10 bank for Philadelphia. Our City faces
11 financial threats from the Federal
12 Government and the State Government over our
13 status as a Sanctuary City. We also face
14 constant threats of budget cuts from the
15 State Legislature.

16 In the face of these threats, the
17 autonomy provided by a public bank is
18 uniquely beneficial to our City. Beyond the
19 initial economic boon of saving millions in
20 fees every year, a public bank could offer
21 below market rate loans to projects that
22 would foster real economic and community
23 growth.

24 Our City is full of innovators who have

1 real solutions to our problems. Beyond --
2 rather than relying on a partnership program
3 with a big bank who practices undermine its
4 contributions, the City could invest
5 directly in these initiatives via a public
6 bank.

7 The key points here are that a
8 Philadelphia public bank could save the City
9 millions in fees. And all of its revenue
10 would be invested back into the City where
11 it's needed and where we can directly see
12 the results of our investment.

13 Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: You're
16 welcome.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Susan Saxe, commenting on
18 170330.

19 (Approaches podium.)

20 MS. SAXE: My name is Susan Saxe. And
21 I'm here today as a member of POWER,
22 Philadelphia Organized to Witness, Empower
23 and Rebuild. We're a grass roots
24 organization that advocates for economic

1 environmental racial and social justice.
2 And we are part of the coalition of
3 organizations working toward a public
4 municipal bank for the City of Philadelphia.

5 We applaud the decision of the City to
6 move its payroll business from Wells Fargo
7 and want to thank Councilwoman Bass for
8 taking the initiative to get this done.
9 This is a step in the right direction. But
10 all corporate banks engage in practices that
11 hurt our City, the neighborhoods and the
12 environment. Why should we remain at the
13 mercy of these predatory banks when a much
14 better alternative is possible?

15 We believe that the only acceptable long
16 term solution is for the City to create its
17 own publicly-owned bank modeled after the
18 Bank of North Dakota, the publicly-owned
19 bank that has serve the State of North
20 Dakota since 1919. A Philadelphia public
21 bank would charge the City no fees, engage
22 in no predatory lending or other abuses and
23 invest its fund solely in Philadelphia and
24 its communities at well below market

1 interest rates. All profits would go back
2 into the City's coffers rather than into the
3 hands of distant shareholders and bank
4 executives.

5 The Bank of North Dakota has been doing
6 this for almost 100 years. I have left an
7 article with your staff about the success of
8 the Bank of North Dakota, and a move by the
9 City of Sante Fe to move forward with its
10 own investigation of public banking.

11 As of the spring Of 2010, North Dakota
12 was the only state boasting a major budget
13 surplus. It had one of the best funded
14 school system and the lowest unemployment in
15 default rates in the country. And it had
16 the most community banks per capita,
17 suggesting that the presence of a
18 state-owned bank actually helped the local
19 banks.

20 This is why comparable forward thinking
21 cities like Oakland, Portland, Seattle and
22 Sante Fe are actively exploring the creation
23 of their own municipal banks. We believe
24 that Philadelphia is a natural leader of

1 this movement because we are, in fact, the
2 home of public banking which was first
3 introduced to these shores by the Quakers.
4 We can begin today to take steps toward the
5 development of our Philadelphia public
6 municipal bank.

7 We are asking you to consider two paths
8 of action. First, we ask that the words a
9 publicly -- "bank publicly owned and
10 controlled by the City of Philadelphia" be
11 added to the City depository list so that
12 the commitment of the City to organizing a
13 public bank is clear even while the details
14 are being worked out.

15 Also, we would like City Council to
16 authorize a study to determine best
17 practices for moving forward with the
18 creation of a public municipal bank. We are
19 ready to work with Council to design such a
20 study and to develop the standards and
21 policies that would best benefit our
22 neighborhoods, our school systems and our
23 public institutions.

24 Thank you so much. And we will be happy

1 to answer any questions that you have at any
2 time.

3 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Thank you.
4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Meghna Chandra commenting
6 on 170330.

7 (Approaches podium.)

8 MS. CHANDRA: Hi. My name is Meghna
9 Chandra. And I'm a community organizer with
10 215 Peoples Alliance, an organization that's
11 fighting for racial and economic justice. I
12 am here today to testify in favor of 170330
13 and 170329, following up on the testimony of
14 our member Van Fields of the Finance
15 Committee.

16 So when the news broke about the
17 fraudulent account scandal in which Wells
18 Fargo got caught telling their staff to make
19 2 million fake bank accounts in their
20 customer names, we decided to ask people
21 about their experiences with Wells Fargo.
22 So, I spent the last few months talking to
23 hundreds of people outside of Wells Fargo
24 Bank. And every time we went out, we would

1 meet at least three to four people who told
2 us about ghost charges on their account,
3 hidden fees, discriminatory treatment and
4 unresponsive or disrespectful customer
5 service.

6 We have heard how people on fixed
7 incomes -- from people on fixed incomes, how
8 Wells purposely takes money out of people's
9 bank accounts when they know they don't have
10 money so they can charge them \$35 in
11 overdraft fees. We have heard stories of
12 discriminatory treatment. How one of our
13 members was approved for a loan on property
14 in a rapidly gentrifying neighborhood, but
15 was mysteriously denied it several days
16 later, an African-American member.

17 We've heard from former employees who
18 left Wells Fargo because they didn't like
19 pushing products on low income and immigrant
20 communities who didn't know what they were
21 signing up for. We can connect our members'
22 experience to Wells Fargo's predatory
23 business model.

24 They've been found guilty in the Supreme

1 Court for the overdraft fees and pushing
2 that on working people. They make
3 one-fourth of their profits, their
4 non-interest related profits in these kind
5 of hidden charges. They are found guilty of
6 discriminatory lending. And they are one of
7 the biggest foreclosures in the City.

8 And also, they are part of consortium of
9 banks that took 161 million from the
10 Philadelphia School District by selling them
11 swap deals, which went back after the
12 Recession which was caused by banks and
13 corrupt banks like Wells Fargo and corporate
14 banks. And they are also one of the top
15 financiers of private prisons, Corsovic an
16 GEO Group. In doing business with Wells
17 Fargo, the City is supporting a known
18 predator of poor and working people.

19 Our members also see the swindling of
20 their bank accounts and foreclosure of their
21 homes as connected with Wells Fargo's
22 funding for Dakota Access Pipeline and the
23 oil refinery. And more people talk about
24 the pipeline. But the refinery is

1 responsible for 72 percent of toxic
2 emissions in Philadelphia. And as Van, one
3 of our members said, Wells Fargo is funding
4 polluters that fund the well being of my
5 family and my community. And the City
6 enables them by doing business with them.

7 So, we just want to say we applaud City
8 Council under Cindy Bass' leadership for
9 responding to community and activist groups
10 to take on Wells Fargo. But we know that
11 Wells Fargo is one of the worst of the bad.
12 And to get to the heart of the problem, we
13 need the City to hold its money in a public
14 bank that will put the people before profits
15 and invest in the community.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Mabel Egrede commenting on
18 170330.

19 (Approaches podium.)

20 MS. EGREDE: Good morning.

21 My name is Mabel Egrede Alfaro. I am
22 member of Philly with Standing Rock and
23 Indigenous 215. I am 29 years resident of
24 the United States and citizen of Chile from

1 South America. I am Estesa, mixed blood
2 which means that median Chile is generically
3 about 44 percent Native American, 51 percent
4 European, and 5 percent of African descent.
5 I come from the lands of various indigenous
6 groups including the Aracanos Armepuces, the
7 people of the Earth who until this day are
8 defending the life, land, waters and
9 biodiversity for expropriations by
10 destructive corporate colonization.

11 Now I stand in front of you on the
12 occupy land Philadelphia. My humble message
13 to you saying to Cindy Bass says thank you
14 for ending some of your financial
15 relationship with Wells Fargo as well as we
16 all know, it is far overdue. However, in
17 moving into the 21st Century we
18 Philadelphians and we need institutions that
19 are going to invest in our future
20 generations. We need institutions that are
21 going to stand up in the defense of our
22 indigenous, black bodies. In defense of our
23 nation's most vulnerable communities from
24 Flint, Michigan to Standing Rock's Sioux

1 territory, in the defense of all native
2 nations. We need institutions who will
3 fight for healthy sustainable equitable
4 future for all peoples. We need cities that
5 are going to bring healthy and healing
6 reparation for the belongings against
7 African-American relations and similarly
8 against Native American relatives.

9 Because as my dear friend Liz Ellis, a
10 Native American from the Peoria Tribe in
11 Oklahoma and residents of Philadelphia
12 denotes, to the indigenous people comes to 5
13 percent of the world population, but their
14 territories house more than 80 percent of
15 our planet's biodiversity. For centuries,
16 native people have held reciprocal
17 relationship with the lands they inhabit.
18 Most famously de Lakhota Dakota led Pan
19 indigenous movement to stop the Dakota
20 Access Pipeline. Represents the constant
21 battle of native peoples who stop extracted
22 corporate colonialism. The fight seeks not
23 only to protect the community from
24 destruction, but also to defend the water,

1 lands and human relations, all things of an
2 entire planet.

3 As we have seen in recent years in
4 Apache's fight against defense of their
5 sacred lines from copper mining, the Navajo
6 fights against uranian mining and
7 population. We moving forward from
8 Philadelphia. We need financial
9 institutions that are going to defend our
10 shared environments and planning for
11 diversity.

12 So, I urge you to divest from city banks
13 within the year because they also fund the
14 Dakota Access Pipeline.

15 Thank you.

16 (Applause.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Priscilla Bell commenting
18 on 170330.

19 (Approaches podium.)

20 MS. BELL: Madrica, welcome, good
21 morning Philadelphia City Council. My name
22 is Priscilla Bell. I'm Boriqua born and
23 raised in Philadelphia. I'm also an active
24 member of the Tejano Revitalization Movement

1 which brings aware of my indigenous people
2 who were the first to encounter colonialism
3 in this hemisphere.

4 I lived in Greys Ferry since 2002, which
5 is one of the most effected neighborhoods in
6 the City due to the toxic air emissions
7 coming from the Philadelphia Energy
8 Solutions Oil Refinery. So, I know
9 firsthand how environmental racism can
10 impact our lives. My 15-year-old son
11 developed asthma at two years old when I
12 first moved into the area. But I want to
13 thank you still for divesting some of the
14 City's money from Wells Fargo.

15 But I also urge for you to be cautious
16 on your decision in moving forward because
17 like Citizens Bank, there are other
18 institutions that do not have the best
19 interest of our people Philadelphia and of
20 our environment. But right now I would like
21 to read a really quick letter from my friend
22 who was going to testify, but due to her
23 health related emergency, she wasn't able to
24 be here today.

1 Dear Mayor Kenney and Philadelphia City
2 Council, (speaks in another language). In
3 English, my name is Jennifer Diapo. I am a
4 citizen of Philadelphia as well as of the
5 Mohawk Nation of Ga Na Wayeh. I apologize
6 for my absence. And as much as I like to --
7 as much as I ask my comrades to read this
8 for me today. This morning, once again, I
9 am sitting in the oncology office at Fox
10 Center -- Fox Chase Center praying this time
11 that my breast cancer has not returned or
12 metastasized. And that I will be here long
13 enough on this earth to see my
14 three-year-old daughter grow up.

15 The realities of what happens to us
16 human beings when oil spills and toxic
17 chemicals are dumped and released has been a
18 reality for our Mohawk people for decades.
19 We have astronomical rates of birth defects
20 in our children, excessively high rates of
21 cancer due to years of proven dumping and
22 leaching of chemicals in our waterways. In
23 my family alone, my grandmother, father,
24 stepmother, sister, one-year-old son,

1 16-year-old daughter, myself have been
2 affected all by cancer. In addition to our
3 illness in the oncology of our land, the
4 wildlife and the water has been destroyed.

5 So in closing, I would like to -- I urge
6 you to consider standing with us, the first
7 nation's people and help us win our battle
8 against the destruction and the dwindling of
9 the sacred lands and clean water. I plead
10 with you to fully divest our City from banks
11 funding the Dakota Access Pipeline.

12 Naiweh. Thank you.

13 (Applause.)

14 CHIEF CLERK: Celeste Hardester
15 commenting on 170355.

16 (Approaches podium.)

17 MS. HARDESTER: Thank you Councilpeople.
18 Good morning. It's often humbling to hear
19 concerns -- often humbling to hear the
20 concerns expressed in this room. I am here
21 to give testimony on Bill 170335. I'm
22 representing the Chestnut Hill Community
23 Association.

24 We understand a primary goal of this

1 legislation is to enable all RCOs to have a
2 method for obtaining more complete
3 information upon which to base their
4 decisions. We support this intention but
5 have several concerns about the outcome.

6 In our communications with multiple
7 RCOs, we have learned of none that were
8 aware of this legislation until very
9 recently. Because RCOs are generally
10 volunteer based, last minute notifications
11 can be problematic. The Chestnut Hill
12 Community Association did not learn of the
13 bill until April 25, which did not allow
14 adequate time for responding at the April 28
15 Rules Committee hearing.

16 We feel this legislation as it is
17 currently written will be onerous to all
18 parties involved, including City agencies,
19 developers and RCOs. The project
20 information form within the legislation sets
21 a platform for a tremendous amount of
22 information to be provided far more than
23 RCOs with a bench of professional capacity
24 generally request to see.

1 We question the wisdom of this
2 legislation, its potential detrimental
3 impact, and would like the opportunity to
4 have a greater understanding of it before it
5 is voted on. We appreciate that this
6 legislation be held on the calendar pending
7 the opportunity for further discussion.

8 For the record, we want to say that the
9 Chestnut Hill Community Association review
10 process has been mentioned verbally and in
11 writing as being a model for this
12 legislation. For the record, we disagree
13 with this characterization. We have been
14 told that the intention of the legislation
15 is to level the playing field. We are
16 concerned that the invasive nature of some
17 of the information requested on the project
18 information form exceeds leveling of the
19 playing field and instead somewhat changes
20 the game.

21 This form goes well past what is used in
22 Chestnut Hill asking for information about
23 job creation related issues that open an
24 additional dimension that we are not

1 convinced is constructive. We are concerned
2 that in solving one problem, a whole new set
3 of new ones will open up with this
4 legislation. Many find it dense reading and
5 difficult to understand. We feel an interim
6 solution would be to make an information
7 gathering form available through the
8 Planning Commission, perhaps with plans to
9 assess it's use after an appropriate period
10 of time.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: You're
13 welcome.

14 (Applause.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Bill James commenting on
16 170335.

17 (Approaches podium.)

18 MR. JAMES: Yes. Hello, everyone. My
19 name is Bill James. I'm a member of the
20 50th Ward registered community organization,
21 that serves the portions of East Mount Airy
22 and West Oak Lane Community. I am here
23 today to support my -- support Bill No.
24 170335 introduced by Councilwoman Cherelle

1 Parker.

2 This bill is nothing more -- I'm sorry.
3 I'm nervous. The bill is nothing more than
4 a practical educational tool for residents
5 who deserve to know how development projects
6 will impact their neighborhood. All RCOs do
7 not have members who work in the development
8 related industries against their membership.
9 But this does mean -- does not mean that the
10 residents in my community are not interested
11 in how the projects are developed in our
12 neighborhoods and how they will effect us.

13 This legislation provides us, the people
14 who keep the City going, with important
15 information and questions that we need also
16 to be answered. We have the right to access
17 this information just as well as anyone
18 else. The bill corrects a longstanding
19 wrong in the neighborhoods throughout our
20 City. It levels the playing field of -- and
21 having access to information.

22 I thank Councilwoman Parker for her
23 leadership in the community. You asked for
24 feedback from the RCOs while you are

1 drafting this legislation. And we
2 appreciate your providing an opportunity for
3 us to be heard. I want to thank the bill
4 sponsors, Councilwoman Maria Sanchez and
5 Blondell Reynolds Brown, Chairman Bill
6 Greenlee and all the Members of the Rules
7 Committee for supporting this bill. I hope
8 the City Council will pass this bill and
9 make it law.

10 If you do, it will be bold steps making
11 sure that all Philadelphians, regardless of
12 their ZIP code, have access to information
13 they need for strong communities.

14 Thank you, Council -- Council
15 President Clarke.

16 (Applause)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Bernadette Tanksley
18 commenting on 170335.

19 (Approaches podium.)

20 MS. TANKSLEY: Hello. I am Bernadette
21 Tanksley, a member of the OCA, the Oak Lane
22 Community Action Association, registered
23 community organization that serves East Oak
24 Lane, which is situated on the northern

1 border between the City of -- the City and
2 Cheltenham Township on the north, Godfrey
3 Avenue on the south, Broad Street on the
4 West and 5th Street on the east. I am here
5 today to show you my support for Bill No.
6 170335 introduced by Councilwoman Cherelle
7 Parker.

8 Our RCO has been in existence since the
9 RCO legislation was first implemented. The
10 range of information provided to the RCO
11 from the City and the applicant has varied
12 from a statement of three lines or less that
13 reflects little thought or preparation to
14 full documentation and slide presentations.
15 As the community attempts to review
16 applications, it becomes clear that at the
17 very least an informed recommendation
18 requires significantly more than is
19 currently required.

20 The proposed form addresses an extensive
21 array of highly relevant information. It
22 alerts applicants to items that deserve
23 consideration such as job creation,
24 community impact and community benefit or

1 detriment. As proposed, the City would not
2 require it for small scale projects. It is
3 hard to understand why the City would choose
4 to continue the RCO process without a
5 mechanism for sharing this kind of
6 information with the community reviewing the
7 application.

8 As indicated, the form would only be
9 required for larger projects. It recognizes
10 that some information may not be known at
11 the time of the application. Meanwhile, the
12 form would provide a major support to RCOs
13 attempting to present appropriate
14 information during the community review
15 process.

16 I want to thank Councilwoman Parker for
17 her leadership and engagement in our
18 community. You asked for feedback from RCOs
19 while you were drafting the legislation, and
20 we appreciate you for providing an
21 opportunity for us to be heard. I also want
22 to thank the bill sponsors Councilwoman
23 Maria Sanchez and Blondell Reynolds Brown,
24 Chairman Bill Greenlee and all members of

1 the Rules Committee for supporting this
2 bill.

3 I hope City Council will pass this bill
4 and make it law. If you do it, it's a bold
5 step towards making sure that all
6 Philadelphians, regardless of their Zip
7 code, have access to the information they
8 need to build strong, sustainable
9 communities.

10 Thank you, Council President Clarke.

11 (Applause.)

12 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel commenting on
13 170449 and 170205.

14 (Approaches podium.)

15 MR. DANIHTEL: Morning. This is an
16 official decree of the people and writ of
17 mandamus quo warranto; and as such, requires
18 immediate action remedy.

19 This Council continues every week to
20 authorize private property be given to RDA,
21 Land Bank and other public agencies. The
22 people are clearly designated beneficiaries
23 of the Constitution, and government is by
24 the people. Why has government refused to

1 investigate and provide immediate remedy,
2 appearing to violate oath of office,
3 Constitution rule of law? Violation of God
4 given 42 USC 1982 property rights appears to
5 violate Miranda B Arizona where rights
6 secured by Constitution are involved, there
7 can be no rule making or legislation which
8 would obligate them.

9 The Council and Mayor claim that when
10 your God-given rights are violated, it's a
11 matter for the courts. Have Council and
12 Mayor forgotten their sworn oaths and their
13 fiduciary duty. Cooper v. Aaron says you
14 cannot violate the Constitution and laws
15 without first violating your oath of office
16 to uphold, obey and defend the constitution
17 and laws.

18 To Council, Mayor and the City opposed
19 my seventh amendment common law trial by
20 jury. Violating your sworn oath laws and
21 constitution is non an option. The
22 constitution requires immediate remedy of
23 this breach of law. Your oath of office
24 requires you to act or face prison. 42 USC

1 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986; 1918 USC 241, 242,
2 2381, 2384. PA Constitution Article I
3 Section 1 through 11. 26 PA CSA 703, 705,
4 708, 709, 712, 713, 716 and other all
5 listing SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056
6 appear violated.

7 I call for the federal and commonwealth
8 governments to perform their constitutional
9 obligations to investigate and prosecute all
10 involved in the theft and illegal deed
11 transfer of my home 1038 West Wyoming
12 Avenue, the denial of God-given 42 USC 1982
13 property rights for 23 years is egregious
14 extraordinary oath violating and requires
15 immediate remedy.

16 A just government must obey the rule of
17 law. The cover of all government must have
18 it's charter government revoked until a
19 constitutionally compliant government is
20 installed. Public servants cannot refuse
21 their sworn duty to act any more than a
22 fireman can refuse to fight a fire.

23 The sovereign people require the
24 constitution laws be enforced. Jail is

1 required for all who would violate oath or
2 law. It takes a lot of cooperation to
3 create and allow monumental corruption.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Bob Burdge?

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Not here --
7 there he is. He is here.

8 (Approaches podium.)

9 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on 170289.

10 MR. BURDGE: Good morning, sirs and
11 ma'am.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Morning.

13 MR. BURDGE: Ma'ams.

14 Two things. That I agree with the bill
15 that's being passed today or voted on today
16 with Wells Fargo, but also I think that we
17 need to look at some of the other banks that
18 are in this country that are good, honest
19 banks. We don't need to perform -- and this
20 is only my opinion, that we don't need to
21 start a bank of Philadelphia because it's a
22 lot of hassle and to get involved with that.

23 And the other thing that -- my biggest
24 thing today is that I know you put this on

1 next week's bill, but thank -- I want to
2 thank the City Council and the Indigo bike
3 people for the job well done. And thank you
4 for keep funding that and making new bike
5 lanes for the City bicycle riders. We
6 appreciate that. And I'm urging that the
7 bicycle people and the car people work
8 together on the streets of Philadelphia
9 because I have seen a couple accidents
10 already since I started riding bikes. My
11 six months going into being in the bicycle
12 world. But -- and I've been in a couple
13 myself because of cars being impatient --
14 impatient with that.

15 So, thank you. And thank you the
16 gentleman and ladies from Indigo Bike Path
17 watching this. Thank you for all your hard
18 work and good job that you maintaining the
19 bikes and keeping our bicycle world alive.

20 Thank you, sirs.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you for
22 your testimony.

23 (Applause.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: There are no other

1 speakers in the Public Comment list, Mr.
2 President.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
4 very much. That concludes our Public
5 Comment.

6 We will now continue with our Calendar.

7 MS. SMITH: Excuse me. I have a
8 comment. I signed up.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You signed
10 up?

11 MS. SMITH: I did.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just state
13 your name for the record, ma'am.

14 MS. SMITH: Yes. My name is Trine
15 Smith. I want to say good afternoon to my
16 fellow Philadelphians, President Clarke,
17 City Councilmembers and the public.

18 I am a social and environmental justice
19 activist. And I urge you all to take bold
20 calculated stance against injustice on all
21 fronts. We understand that America can be a
22 much better place if we would all just do
23 that with fervent passion. I want to thank
24 all earth protectors, those of air, land and

1 water and all who really fight for equality
2 and justice. May we uncompromisingly in our
3 search for truth -- may we be uncompromising
4 in our search for truth. May we be
5 relentless in our efforts to transform evil
6 into justice. May we learn to imagine
7 ourselves as healing, as thriving through
8 the future and as creating new ways through
9 the complexities of our times so that we are
10 constantly reminded of our power and of our
11 need to constantly evolve with life.

12 Brightest blessings to all who will do.
13 And may those contrary be damned.

14 This is a testimony from Dr. Elizabeth
15 Ellis in favor of Bills 1073300 [sic] and
16 10733900[sic] May 11, 2017.

17 Since all Wall Street -- excuse me.
18 Since all Wall Street banks engage in the
19 same harmful and predatory practices, the
20 only real remedy is to establish a public
21 bank for the City of Philadelphia. The only
22 ethical action for the City Council is to
23 refuse to invest in either Citizens or Wells
24 Fargo. We must protect Philadelphians from

1 predatory lending practices and exploiting
2 management of our education funds, but we
3 must also be accountable to native people
4 and Americans most vulnerable -- in
5 America's most vulnerable community across
6 the nation.

7 Liz went on to say as a citizen of
8 Philadelphia as well as a citizen of the
9 Peoria Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma, it is
10 encouraging to hear that the plans to move
11 our City money out of Wells Fargo, but city
12 bank is not a solution. Both Citizens and
13 Wells Fargo was among the top funders of
14 Dakota Access Pipeline. The construction of
15 the Dakota Access Pipeline is not only an
16 environmental disastrous as it impacts
17 drinking water of 18 million Americans, but
18 it also clearly violates native sovereignty
19 with funding from both Citizens and Wells
20 Fargo, energy transfer partners violated
21 federal treaties including the Fort Laramie
22 Treaty of 1868, broke legal precedent as the
23 Supreme Court guaranteed Indian nations
24 water rights and that territories in 1908

1 and circumvented federal regulatory
2 procedures designed to protect Americans and
3 all the environment that we all share.

4 By investing in Wells Fargo and Citizens
5 Philadelphia -- by investing in Wells Fargo
6 and Citizens, Philadelphia taxpayers are
7 thereby financing the violent and illegal
8 assault on native bodies and territories and
9 directly supporting regulatory capture in
10 North Dakota. I urge you to follow and lead
11 the City Councils of Seattle, St. Monica and
12 neighbors in East Orange County, New Jersey
13 to reject both of these banks.

14 Thank you.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you for
17 your testimony, ma'am. That concludes our
18 Public Comment for today.

19 We will now -- Chair recognizes
20 Councilman O'Neill.

21 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. As I mentioned to you
23 earlier off the sidebar, I asked to be
24 excused from the rest of this session. And

1 be recorded as voting aye on all bills and
2 resolutions.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
4 Thank you, Councilman. The record shall
5 reflect.

6 We will now consider today's bill
7 Consent Agenda. I will ask the Clerk to
8 read the title of all the bills on the
9 Consent Agenda. After each title is read,
10 any Member may object to the inclusion of
11 the bill on the Consent Agenda. But such an
12 object and without debate, the bill will
13 immediately be removed from the Consent
14 Agenda and placed on our regular Final
15 Passage Calendar.

16 The Clerk will now read the titles of

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you,

21 (Duly seconded.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
23 moved and properly seconded.

24 All those in favor say aye?

1 (Ayes.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
3 opposed?

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it.
6 And that resolution is adopted.

7 CHIEF CLERK: There are no other
8 resolutions on the Final Passage Calendar,
9 Mr. President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
11 very much, Mr. Decker. That concludes our
12 calendar for today.

13 Are there any speeches on the part of
14 the Minority and speeches on part of the
15 Majority?

16 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

17 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
18 Mr. President.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Welcome.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: A couple of words and
21 comments that I've heard you say by way of
22 approaching development in your district and
23 Maria talked about it a bit, Councilwoman
24 Sanchez talked about it a bit today.

1 Councilman Johnson wrestles with it all the
2 time. Councilwoman Blackwell has had to
3 deal with it because there's an ebb and flow
4 to development. Neighborhoods start, they
5 rise, they have seen better days, sometimes
6 they rise again. But in that rising, all
7 progress isn't forward for all people.
8 Meaning, some people get crushed in the wake
9 of that progress.

10 Yesterday had an opportunity to join the
11 Philadelphia Tenants Union at one of my
12 facilities at Penn Wynn on Lebanon Avenue.
13 If you know anything about Wynnefield, it --
14 that property was built in 1960. 240 units
15 right around the time when that kind of
16 architecture for the Jetsons. It was way
17 cool. Like when you walk by there, you
18 always thought some rich person lived in
19 there. When I delivered orders to there,
20 you felt like you were some place.

21 Well, its seen better days. It was
22 purchased recently by a group of investors.
23 By now, those residents had been disabled
24 Veterans, people have had challenges in

1 their life that wound up on Section 8. And
2 when I went out there -- we had gotten
3 complaints about it before. But when I went
4 out there, the total disrespect to those
5 people to receive a letter saying in 30 days
6 you just got to go.

7 Now some of those people had -- are
8 newbies, had only been there 7 years. Some
9 people had been there 20 years. One lady I
10 met, 32 years. And as important as the
11 longevity, paid her rent on time. Never had
12 rowdy parties. Never had a reason,
13 legitimate reason, to be evicted at all.
14 Find themselves in the wake of that
15 development, property values go up.
16 Investors see it. Come in and say, oh,
17 well.

18 Well, oh well isn't good enough. Oh
19 well isn't good enough. I understand
20 economic development. I have done
21 development. I went to compete with you on
22 shovels, you know. I never catch up, but I
23 can try. But what will not happen, what we
24 cannot abide is a disregard for humans to be

1 given a letter two months before -- oh, no
2 two weeks before the Christmas holidays and
3 told you got 30 days and then you got to go
4 is wrong.

5 These are men and women who served our
6 country. These are men and women who are
7 taxpayers, and only because of economic
8 value are being displaced. And they are
9 going to go somewhere. And we should be
10 concerned about the process by which they
11 do.

12 So, I want to challenge us -- I'm pro
13 development. I have done my share of deals.
14 But there has to be a rule and guide in how
15 you treat tenants and how you do them. And
16 so, we are going take this as a case example
17 and try to look at similar patterns around
18 the City, whether in the First District or
19 the Fifth to see if there's a commonality of
20 what is going on.

21 And Philly is on the rise. But as they
22 say about tides, all boats should rise with
23 that tide. People shouldn't be drowned by
24 it.

1 Thank you, Mr. President.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
3 Councilman.

4 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

5 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you, Council
6 President.

7 Yesterday during the School District
8 testimony, we heard some good news. We were
9 informed by our colleague Councilwoman
10 Parker that Estelle Richman had been
11 confirmed to the SRC. We also heard some
12 good news from Dr. Hite in his testimony
13 that the School District is committed to
14 negotiating a contract with the teachers
15 union.

16 And I would like to remind our -- my
17 colleagues here today that approximately one
18 year ago, we passed a resolution that urged
19 the School Reform Commission, Superintendent
20 Hite, the School District of Philadelphia to
21 actively negotiate a mutually agreeable new
22 contract with the Philadelphia Federation of
23 teachers that provide adequate staffing of
24 our schools, acknowledges the contributions

1 and sacrifices of teachers and other staff
2 and respects both seniority and traditional
3 payment structure like Step Pay.

4 Now just a few days ago, I believe the
5 Philadelphia Federation of Teachers released
6 a survey that highlighted the impact that
7 this contract impasse has had on both
8 students and teachers in the City. And in
9 this survey they released, they also
10 informed us it's been 1,349 days since the
11 teachers had a contract. From my respect, I
12 believe this impasse impacts not only the
13 students, teachers, but our City as a whole.
14 And as a son of a retired school teacher, I
15 remember the challenging contract
16 negotiation of the '80s. I'm also as a
17 parent of Philadelphia School District
18 student, I'm also concerned how this
19 contract impasse may impact us going
20 forward.

21 So, I urge both the School Reform
22 Commission, Dr. Hite and his staff as well
23 as Philadelphia Federation of Teachers to
24 work together to resolve this contract

1 impasse. Thank you.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
3 Councilman.

4 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

5 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you very much,
6 Council President and Colleagues.

7 This week is the week before Mothers
8 Day. And I just want to acknowledge all the
9 mothers in the room of course and fathers,
10 too, but this is our day. And it is also a
11 day that Philadelphia's joining
12 organizations around the country as part of
13 a National Mommas Bail Out Day.

14 And this national day is to recognize
15 the number of incarcerated mothers who are
16 currently spending Mothers Day in jail
17 because they cannot afford to pay bail.

18 Every day an average of 700,000 people
19 who have yet to be convicted of a crime are
20 sitting in jails and separated from their
21 families simply because they cannot afford
22 to pay bill. Women held in local jails
23 represent the fastest growing group of
24 incarcerated people in the United States.

1 Since 1970, the number of women in U.S.
2 jails has increased by 14 times. And nearly
3 80 percent of women in jails are mothers.
4 And without our support this Mothers Day,
5 many women and mothers could be languishing
6 in these changes separated from their
7 families and loved ones simply because they
8 cannot afford bail.

9 And I hope that as we enter into this
10 Mothers Day, that we will think about the
11 impact and dehumanization of holding people
12 in prison interminably because of cash bail
13 requirements. I believe and I think the
14 City believes that we have to end this
15 practice. Mothers Day is a reminder of the
16 impact on the broader population, on women
17 in particular, and in the families that
18 suffer.

19 So for those who are interested, the No
20 215 Jail Coalition is supporting the
21 bailout, and donations that they are raising
22 to help with that. But more importantly, as
23 we look ahead to the future, I hope that we
24 will commit ourselves to making sure that

1 practices like cash bail end in our City.

2 And that we will all work together to make
3 that happen.

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
6 Councilwoman.

7 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
9 Mr. President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Welcome.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: You know, we had a
12 number of schools who were represented
13 today, Father Judge and also Masterman. And
14 I wanted to acknowledge that we have some
15 young people here from my district for North
16 Philadelphia. I know that you, as well,
17 from North Philadelphia. And wanted to
18 recognize North Philadelphia's own Kenderton
19 Elementary School.

20 If we can have our students from
21 Kenderton stand up.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Stand up
23 guys.

24 (Applause.)

1 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And they came down.
2 And I am sure they enjoyed themselves and
3 enjoying the pizza that we are providing, as
4 well. Thank you so much for coming down.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
6 Thank you, Councilwoman.

7 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you, Council
9 President. I want to talk about a topic
10 that I haven't talked about in at least two
11 weeks, and that's the Earned Income Tax
12 Credit. But I wanted to give you some
13 results because I think it's some good news.

14 I met with Mary Arthur this morning with
15 Campaign For Working Families. And she
16 tells me that our returns and monies going
17 back to people in Philadelphia are up
18 10 percent, which is good. But we have a
19 lot of work to do. She also shared with me,
20 I donated some office space at Broad and
21 Sansom for the Campaign For Working
22 Families. And the good news there is that
23 we had almost 2,997 taxpayers filed returns
24 that got them back 4.2 million. But we need

1 three other locations for next year.

2 So, I am going to ask you Council
3 President, Broad and Erie for a location
4 there or Councilwoman Sanchez, we need
5 something on Frankford Avenue and 4300. And
6 for Councilman Squilla we need Broad and
7 Oregon. We need landlords to donate for
8 four months the space. It's not a big deal.
9 And I am happy to work with you to do it.
10 It makes a big difference.

11 Thank you. And thank you very much,
12 Councilman.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
14 Councilman. A shameless plug for a great
15 business. We can meet in City View Pizza at
16 Broad and Erie. Guarantee a lot of people
17 showing up. Thank you.

18 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you,
20 Mr. President. I want to make just a brief
21 comment about Bill No. 170335. And want to
22 say to my colleagues a special thank you for
23 passing the technical amendments that we
24 just made to the bill. And we will vote on

1 it on Final Passage next week.

2 And while I have, Mr. President, thought
3 that I would reserve from making any
4 comments until we got the final passage,
5 unfortunately, one of the individuals who
6 stood up to testify during Public Comment
7 talked about the prospect that this project
8 information form would preempt an existing
9 RCOs form.

10 I want to just state for the record that
11 this form will not preempt any existing RCOs
12 forms. The purpose of this form is to
13 create a floor, a baseline of information
14 for not just RCOs. And let me just say that
15 for the record, but for Philadelphia
16 residents who may not even be active in RCOs
17 to have information relative to development
18 taking place in their communities.

19 In addition to that, and I won't read
20 the names. And I know my colleagues are
21 about tired of seeing this information. But
22 I just want to remind you on the information
23 packet that was left on your desk, we
24 provide samples of -- sort of sample project

1 information forms that are used by one, two,
2 three, four, five, six other community-based
3 organizations throughout the City of
4 Philadelphia. And I applaud them for the
5 development of their forms.

6 As a matter of fact when I look at them,
7 they make the contents of this project
8 information form look like a marshmallow as
9 one of the community-based organizations
10 told me when we were in the midst of the
11 drafting process.

12 So thank you, Mr. President and
13 colleagues. Thank you for your support.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
15 Councilwoman.

16 There being no additional speeches, this
17 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown
18 for a motion to adjourn.

19 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Yes.
