3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 We're going to get started. I see we
7 have a lot of wonderful young people in
8 here today.

9 To give our invocation today,
10 the Chair recognizes the Reverend William
11 J. Scott, III, Pastor of Harold O. Davis
12 Baptist Church. He is here today as the
13 guest of Councilwoman Bass.

14 I would ask all guests,
15 visitors, and members to please rise.

16 (Councilmembers, guests, and
17 visitors rise.)

18 REVEREND SCOTT: Let us pray.
19 Our Father and our God, we come
20 before you to say thank you. We thank
21 you, God, for a day that we've never seen
22 before.

23 We pray, God, that you will
24 bless your City officials, leaders,
25 Father, as they deliberate and discuss

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you so much, Pastor, for those
15 inspiring words.

16 Council will be at ease.

17 (Council at ease.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you very much.

20 Our next order of business is
21 the approval of the Journal of the
22 meeting of Thursday, May 11, 2017, and
23 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

24 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
25 you, Mr. President. I move that the

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you.

7 It has been moved and properly

9 of Thursday, May 11, 2017 stand approved.

10 All those in favor say aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Those opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
16 ayes have it, and the Journal is
17 approved.

18 The next order of business is
19 requests for leaves of absence, and the
20 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
22 Mr. President. On behalf of the
23 majority, there are no requests of leave
24 of absence today.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

3 The Chair now recognizes
4 Councilman O'Neill.

5 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
6 Mr. President. On behalf of the
7 republicans, there are no requests for
8 leave of absence.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Thank you very much.

11 At this time, I would like to
12 take a moment to thank everyone who has
13 taken time out of their busy day to come
14 down to witness their government in
15 action. We appreciate the fact that you
16 want to see what we do. I hope your
17 experience here today is a knowledgeable
18 one, but much more so a pleasurable one,
19 so much so that you come back again. So,
20 again, thank you so much for being here.

21 At this time, the Chair
22 recognizes Councilwoman Parker, who will
23 present a resolution recognizing the
24 members of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority.
25 Would Patricia Alford and those

3 Councilwoman at the podium.

4 (Councilwoman Parker and

5 Sorority members singing.)

6 (Councilmembers and guests

7 approached podium.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilwoman.

10 Also joining the Councilwoman,

11 we have Councilman Johnson and Councilman

12 Green, Councilman Domb, Councilman

13 Greenlee, and Councilwoman Blackwell.

14 And I would ask that if anyone

15 has an electronic device that makes any

16 noise such as the noise that we just

17 heard, could you please turn it off.

18 Thank you so much.

19 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

20 you, Mr. President.

21 And good morning to everyone.

22 First, I want to start by saying a hearty

23 thank you to all of our colleagues in the

24 City Council of Philadelphia along with

25 the staff who are dawning their red

2 today, the men with ties, the ladies with
3 some shade of red. So we want to say
4 thank you all.

5 On today we have the great
6 honor and privilege of continuing a
7 tradition in this body that was started
8 by our former colleague and Delta sister
9 Councilwoman Marian Tasco and, that is,
10 honoring Delta Sigma Theta Sorority
11 Quaker City Alumnae Chapter's Social
12 Action Committee and, very specifically,
13 the work they do with young people in
14 schools in the City of Philadelphia and
15 surrounding counties about educating them
16 relative to local government, and City
17 Council is one of the primary focuses of
18 their agenda.

19 And with that in mind,
20 Mr. President, I just want to state for
21 the record that Delta Sigma Theta
22 Sorority, Incorporated was founded on
23 January 13th, 1913 on the campus of
24 Howard University by 22 dynamic
25 collegiate women. And because we're

2 coming up -- I think we have three more
3 years, 2020 is on its way -- I want to
4 note for the record because sometimes
5 people see these women and I don't care
6 if you're talking about us or another
7 organization and folks think they just
8 like to get dressed up in a certain color
9 and come together and sip tea, but I want
10 you to know the first public act of this
11 organization was our participation in the
12 Women's Suffrage March in Washington, DC,
13 and what makes that to me such a
14 meaningful act is that as African
15 American women, there were some people
16 who wanted to put them in the box and say
17 that the only issues they should be
18 advocating for were those that were
19 associated with race. But these 22 women
20 said, we're women too and we have a place
21 in this struggle. So when you think of
22 Delta, I want you to think of that work.

23 The resolution reads as
24 follows:

25 Recognizing and honoring the

5 occasion of the fourteenth year of Delta
6 Days at City Council.

7 And before we get started with
8 that, our sorer, Blondell Reynolds Brown,
9 Councilwoman, will make comments before
10 we start.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Good
12 morning, colleagues and members of City
13 Council, along with our guests. The
14 underpinning of Delta Sigma Theta is
15 service. The underpinning of Delta Sigma
16 Theta is service. Women become actively
17 engaged in this organization because they
18 believe in service.

19 Gandhi said it best: The best
20 way to find yourself is to lose yourself
21 in service to others.

22 We need you to remember that
23 while we enjoy each other's professional
24 endeavors. The glue for us is that we
25 believe in service, and I'm thrilled to

2 say a year ago I stood here as a member
3 of Delta Sigma Theta, and a year later I
4 stand here as a mother of a daughter who
5 joined Delta Sigma Theta.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
8 you. Thank you for keeping this
9 wonderful tradition.

10 Whereas, Delta Sigma Theta
11 Sorority, Incorporated, founded in 1913
12 by twenty-two, as Councilwoman Parker
13 said, diligent collegiate women on the
14 campus of Howard University, has
15 blossomed into the largest African
16 American women's organization in the
17 United States; and

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
19 Delta Sigma Theta boasts twenty statewide
20 chapters in Pennsylvania from
21 Philadelphia to York and Allegheny
22 Counties;

23 Whereas, the Quaker City
24 Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta,
25 Incorporated, was chartered in

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2 Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on October
3 17th, 1976, by twenty-seven African
4 American women to proudly execute the
5 organization's Five-Point Programmatic
6 Thrusts, which includes the following:
7 Economic Development, Educational
8 Development, International Awareness and
9 Involvement, Physical and Mental Health,
10 and Political Awareness and Involvement.
11 Over the past forty years, this Chapter
12 has strategically expanded its membership
13 to more than 150 local women working to
14 build a more connected and informed
15 community built on the word and work of
16 service;

17 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: And
18 whereas, members of the Quaker City
19 Alumnae Social Action Committee have
20 dynamically continued in their
21 foremothers' footsteps to promote social
22 and political activism by addressing
23 voting rights, supporting voter
24 education, and hosting numerous voter
25 registration drives and voter phone

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2 banks, as well as advocating for adequate
3 educational funding, quality after-school
4 programs, and access to early childhood
5 education for all children; and

6 Whereas, the students joining
7 us today represent the Sorority's
8 dedication to ensuring that our future
9 leaders have firsthand knowledge of how
10 local government works as they are
11 developing into the next generation that
12 will carry the torch of social and
13 political leadership; and

14 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas,
15 these didactic women have assumed the
16 charge of ensuring that communities
17 receive well-rounded support through
18 various events and programs including
19 their much anticipated annual Health
20 Fair, renowned Delta Academy and Delta
21 Gems programs, annual College Expo, and
22 the infamous Dessert Hour; and

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
24 the women of Delta, artists in their own
25 right, also founded the Arts and Letters

2 Committee, which provides an arena for
3 local poets and musicians to showcase
4 their talents at the annual Artists' Cafe
5 while also serving as a fundraiser to
6 benefit the ongoing activities at the
7 historic Freedom Theatre; and

8 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
9 the Quaker City Alumnae Chapter continues
10 to explore new avenues to collaborate
11 with local organizations to tackle the
12 issues that impact Philadelphia residents
13 in an effort to effectively resolve
14 today's challenges by implementing
15 much-needed programming and advancing the
16 central policy initiative; and

17 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, as
18 the husband, son, brother and, more
19 recently, uncle of members of this
20 phenomenal sisterhood of service, the
21 women of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority,
22 Incorporated, continue to be a
23 magnificent example of servant-leaders
24 with an uncompromising commitment to
25 their community, which serves as the

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2 driving force to carry on the mission of
3 Delta Days at City Council; now,
4 therefore, be it

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Resolved,
6 by the Council of the City of
7 Philadelphia, that it hereby recognizes
8 and honors the members of Delta Sigma
9 Theta Sorority, Incorporated's Quaker
10 City Alumnae Chapter's Social Action
11 Committee on the occasion of the
12 fourteenth year of Delta Days at City
13 Council.

14 Further resolved, that an
15 engrossed copy of this resolution be
16 presented to the Social Action Committee
17 of Quaker City Alumnae Chapter as
18 evidence of the sincere sentiments of
19 this legislative body.

20 And, Mr. President, I just want
21 to note for the record because some
22 people said who are some Deltas we may
23 know, I wanted to quickly run through
24 this list: Sadie T.M. Alexander, Shirley
25 Chisholm, Ruby Dee, Dorothy Height,

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2 Barbara Jordan, Sheryl Lee Ralph, Angela
3 Bassett, Nikki Giovanni, Betty Shabazz,
4 Lena Horne, Cicely Tyson, Gwen Ifill, and
5 our very first Connie Clayton in the City
6 of Philadelphia.

7 Thank you, Mr. President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Awesome. Awesome.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

12 at this time, the Chair recognizes

13 Ms. Alford for remarks.

14 MS. ALFORD: Good morning.

15 (Good morning.)

16 MS. ALFORD: On behalf of our

17 Chapter President, Dr. Claudette Stone of

18 Quaker City Alumnae Chapter, and the

19 1,044 chapters of Delta Sigma Theta,

20 Incorporated nationally and

21 internationally, I bring you greetings.

22 My name is Patricia Alford and I'm the

23 Chair of Quaker City Social Action

24 Committee, and my Co-Chair, Annie

25 Williams Gadson, is over here.

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2 Once again, we celebrate the
3 youth in Philadelphia and the surrounding
4 areas by inviting them to observe and
5 experience the political process of
6 government and especially that of our
7 great city, Philadelphia.

8 We want the youth of
9 Philadelphia, who are our future leaders,
10 to understand that changes can be made,
11 but it needs to be developed, discussed,
12 and brought forth to benefit all of its
13 citizens.

14 Forty years ago, QCA was
15 chartered to assist this great city in
16 community activities that benefits and
17 enhances the lives of its citizens. Some
18 of the people before me have named some
19 of the things, the toy lending library at
20 Delta Academy, Delta Gems, scholarship
21 programs, and we have given out over
22 \$100,000 in scholarships to young people
23 in the Philadelphia area. We've had
24 college prep. We had social action
25 forums on aging gracefully 1 and 2,

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2 because we really care about our senior
3 citizens. Domestic violence. We're not
4 going to step back because some people
5 feel it's hurting them. We want to make
6 sure that we take care of our citizens
7 who have been abused. We have presented
8 candidates for elected offices.

9 Now, I want to let you know the
10 commitment of coming down here today. We
11 have three of our past presidents here,
12 and would they step forward. We have
13 Florence Oliver, Patricia Evans, and
14 Leslie Cousins-Mond.

15 (Applause.)

16 MS. ALFORD: These three ladies
17 have felt that social action is the core
18 of the volunteerism we do. We do a lot
19 of things, but social action is one of
20 them.

21 Our Chapter's commitment to
22 social action in Philadelphia will never
23 stop. On your desks is an ink pen.
24 Please hold it up. I left it on the
25 desk, the Councilpeople. Turn it on.

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2 There's a light.

3 You didn't get one?

4 Somebody got your pen. Where
5 the police?

6 We want you to know that Quaker
7 City Chapter members are working hard to
8 make our city outstanding and a city of
9 sisterly love.

10 Thank you very, very much.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Council will be at ease.

14 (Council at ease.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. At this time, the Chair
17 recognizes Councilman Henon, who will
18 present resolutions honoring Saint
19 Hubert's Bowling Team and Saint Hubert's
20 Cheerleading Team. Would Liz Anne Pando
21 and those accompanying her please join
22 the Councilman at the podium.

23 (Councilmembers and guests
24 approached podium.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

2 joining Councilman Henon, we have
3 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman
4 Taubenberger, Councilwoman Reynolds
5 Brown, and Councilman Domb and Councilman
6 Green and Councilwoman Blackwell and
7 Councilman O'Neill.

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: Are there
9 any Bambies in the house? I mean, I
10 can't hear you. Are there any Bambies in
11 the house? Can we hear it?

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: I know that
14 Bambies have some incredible spirit.
15 I've seen it over the years, and you
16 truly represent Northeast Philadelphia.

17 We have a lot of champions up
18 here, a lot of Bambi champions, who excel
19 in many, many areas. We have two
20 resolutions to honor state champions and
21 champions in the Catholic League with not
22 just cheerleading but bowling. But not
23 only are they excelling in their love and
24 passion in sports, but they have all
25 excelled, not just as a team but as a

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2 school in academics, receiving over \$19
3 million, \$19.6 million, in college
4 scholarships. So congratulations.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCILMAN HENON:

7 Congratulations to the awesome young
8 women and future of our city, but
9 congratulations to Liz Anne, who is our
10 leader of Saint Hubert's, and all the
11 administration, who does a fantastic job.

12 Right now we're going to start
13 with bowling. Now, bowling and other
14 sports would say -- well, I mean, I guess
15 in bowling too. It's a repeat. So they
16 repeated for their championship, 64 wins.
17 So they were 64 and 0, and today we honor
18 Saint Hubert's Bowling Team in winning
19 the 2017, repeat, Philadelphia Catholic
20 League Championship.

21 Whereas

22 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: The Saint
23 Hubert High School Bowling Team was in
24 first place all year, going a
25 record-setting 56 and 0 during the

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2 regular season, the likes of which have
3 never been accomplished before in
4 Catholic League play; and

5 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

6 Whereas, the Bambies crushed bitter rival
7 Little Flower High School in the Catholic
8 League semi-finals to move onto the
9 championship. Little Flower was also
10 soundly beaten by Saint Hubert's in last
11 year's championship game; and

12 Whereas, Saint Hubert's was
13 pitted against Bonner-Prendie in the
14 championship game, the top two seeds in
15 the Catholic League battling it out for
16 bragging rights; and

17 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the
18 Bambies refused to be denied their
19 perfect season, sweeping Bonner 4-0 at
20 the AMF Bristol Pike Lanes to cap off a
21 storybook ending, earning the Catholic
22 League Title; and

23 Whereas, in addition to their
24 Catholic League Championship, five
25 student-athletes earned First Team

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2 All-Catholic Bowling honors this season;
3 sophomore Gabrielle Smith, juniors
4 Michelle Morrissey, Shannon Lee and Regan
5 McGuinness and senior Tori Cross; and

6 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: My wife is
7 a Bambi, so I'm going to read this very
8 carefully.

9 Whereas, Hubert's bowlers
10 finished the year taking the top 3 spots
11 overall in the Catholic League. Rounding
12 out the awards was the honor for Catholic
13 League Most Valuable Bowler which went to
14 Michelle Morrissey; and

15 Whereas, the Bambies finished
16 their perfect season with a record of 64
17 wins and 0 losses; now, therefore

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Therefore,
19 resolved by the City Council of
20 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor and
21 recognize the Saint Hubert's School
22 Bowling Team on their Philadelphia
23 Catholic League Championship.

24 Resolved further, that an
25 engrossed copy of this resolution be

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2 presented to the head coach Pat Hamill
3 and the members of the 2017 Philadelphia
4 Catholic League Champions as further
5 evidence of the sincere respect and
6 admiration of this legislative body.

7 Congratulations, champs.
8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: We got two.
10 We're going to flow right into the next
11 one, under my guidance that I failed to
12 execute.

13 So now we have national champs
14 in cheerleading.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: And I got to
17 tell you, over the past four years, Saint
18 Hubert's, whether it's varsity or JV, has
19 been national champs. So they are
20 absolutely an elite team when it comes to
21 cheerleading, not only in the City of
22 Philadelphia, not only in Northeast City
23 of Philadelphia but nationally they are
24 recognized as an elite team. And I have
25 to tell you, representing half of

2 Northeast Philadelphia, and I know
3 Councilman O'Neill will attest to, people
4 want to go to Saint Hubert's because it's
5 a place of community for many, many
6 different areas that they feel
7 competitive, comfortable with each other
8 and a sense of community, along with its
9 academic successes that they have. So we
10 have and we're honoring again the varsity
11 team for being national champs. They won
12 one in 2012 and they won one this year in
13 2017.

14 So with that being said, I want
15 to again thank our President of Saint
16 Hubert's, Liz Anne Pando, for her
17 outstanding job and the administration,
18 the teachers, the coaches, the
19 volunteers, and yet we forget the parents
20 and the guardians of all of these kids.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Who take
23 them to meets and take them out of town,
24 who raise money, they fundraise. It's
25 tough to scrape up all the resource that

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2 they need, but they did it and they were
3 a success, and that's what brings a
4 community closer together. That's what
5 brings these young women closer together
6 and why they're such an elite team.

7 So honoring the Saint Hubert's
8 High School Cheerleading Team on winning
9 the National High School Cheerleading
10 Championship.

11 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Let
12 me be very blunt about this, national is
13 very, very important. We do a lot of
14 honors, but you know what, this is a big,
15 big nation and to be national champions
16 is very, very important.

17 (Applause.)

18 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
19 Whereas, the National High School
20 Cheerleading Championship is held at Walt
21 Disney World Resort in Orlando, Florida
22 and is televised nationally on ESPN and
23 ESPN 2 to more than 100 million homes and
24 32 countries annually; and

25 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,

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2 in order to get to Nationals, Hubert's
3 had to overcome many obstacles, including
4 fundraising a large amount of money to
5 attend the event and replacing injured
6 cheerleaders; and

7 Whereas, to prepare for their
8 routine, the team spends countless hours
9 training and practicing year round. In
10 addition to practicing, the team performs
11 at all Father Judge football and
12 basketball games; and

13 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,
14 during the competition, the squad
15 performs a two and a half minute routine
16 packed with stunts, pyramids, elite
17 tumbling skills, cheers and dance. These
18 routines take a tremendous amount of
19 endurance, strength and stamina; and

20 Whereas, Saint Hubert's
21 competed against 25 teams in the "Large
22 Varsity" division, which means competing
23 with 20 girls on their squad; and

24 COUNCILMAN DOMB: I think I
25 need to go on a diet to move around this

3 Whereas, this is the twelfth
4 year that Saint Hubert Cheerleading has
5 been to the NHSCC and their second
6 National Championship for Varsity; and

7 Whereas, the head coach of the
8 team is Lisa McNesby and she's assisted
9 by Paul Ballentine, Mary Kate McKnight,
10 and Kristin Mahon; and

11 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
12 the Saint Hubert Cheerleading Program
13 includes three teams with a total of
14 twenty-seven cheerleaders; and

15 Whereas, in addition to
16 practice and schoolwork and practice and
17 schoolwork and practice and schoolwork,
18 the girls still find time to volunteer
19 with various charitable organizations,
20 including the Athletes Helping Athletes;
21 now, therefore

22 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Resolved,
23 by the Council of the City of
24 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor and
25 commend the Saint Hubert High School

3 High School Cheerleading Championship.

4 Resolved further, that an
5 engrossed copy of this resolution be
6 presented to the Saint Hubert
7 Cheerleaders and their coaches, further
8 evidencing the sincere appreciation and
9 admiration of this legislative body.

10 Sponsored by Councilman Bobby
11 Henon and co-sponsored by all
12 Councilmembers.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you. And the Chair recognizes
16 Ms. Pando for remarks.

17 MS. PANDO: Thank you,
18 Councilman Henon and Council President
19 Clarke and the rest of City Council for
20 this wonderful honor to be here today.
21 My name is Liz Anne Pando and I'm the
22 proud President of these wonderful girls
23 and their accomplishments.

24 We thank you for honoring Saint
25 Hubert Catholic High School for Girls and

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2 their athletic achievements in this very
3 special way.

4 Saint Hubert's has been
5 educating women of integrity and faith
6 for 75 years and doing it through
7 spirituality, scholarship, service, and
8 sisterhood. And we can boast 30,000
9 alum. Obviously we have a couple here in

12 agribusiness across the world, and for
13 them to pick a school in Philadelphia, an
14 agricultural school, to help and come
15 down and volunteer their services is
16 something very, very special indeed.

17 I was there their day of
18 service where they cleaned out and
19 completely redid and painted the dairy
20 barn, which agriculture teaches children
21 and students science. It teaches math.
22 It teaches all the skills for good
23 citizenship, and also is a major business
24 in the world. And all you have to do is
25 take a look at this week's Wall Street

2 Journal to know how big agriculture is in
3 the United States. So I look forward to
4 its passage, and I thank all members for
5 co-sponsoring it with me.

6 Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 That will be on today's Final
10 Passage Calendar.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman
12 O'Neill.

13 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I have no bills or
15 resolutions.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Squilla.

20 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,

24 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
25 authorizing the revision of lines and

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
9 that will be referred to the appropriate
10 committee.

11 The Chair recognizes
12 Councilwoman Bass.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I offer one bill and one
15 privileged resolution, and I'd like to be
16 heard after the resolution.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you, Councilwoman.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: I'm sorry,
20 Mr. President. One bill on your behalf.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you, Councilwoman.

23 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
24 amending Chapter 19-1300 of The
25 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Real Estate

1 5/18/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 Taxes," by creating a tax foreclosure
3 diversion program that requires housing
4 counseling assistance, updating tax
5 installment payment agreements to help
6 taxpayers with financial hardships, and
7 other related items.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
9 Referred to committee.

10 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged
11 resolution commending and thanking the
12 police, first responders and witnesses
13 for their immediate rescue efforts of
14 Charles W. Henry School students,
15 teachers and chaperones involved in a bus
16 crash while on their way to Washington,
17 DC.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. I really just had to say
22 some thank-you's for the introduction of
23 that resolution. And while we have all
24 heard the phrase "it takes a village to
25 raise a child," this week that phrase is

2 particularly relevant in the aftermath of
3 the bus accident that occurred this past
4 Monday when a group of 8th graders and
5 their teachers and chaperones from the
6 C.W. Henry School in West Mt. Airy were
7 on their way to Washington, DC for their
8 end-of-year class trip. The rescue
9 efforts right after the accident by our
10 police, who just happened to be right
11 behind the bus, as well as the help by
12 family members of fallen police officers
13 and just good samaritans on I-95, was
14 truly a godsend.

15 On the day of the accident, I
16 was grateful for the support of State
17 Representative Chris Rabb, who also
18 joined me at C.W. Henry, and the
19 principal, staff, and parents. We just
20 really want to give a particular
21 shout-out and special thanks to Principal
22 Fatima Rogers for jumping into action,
23 the Philadelphia School District, the
24 Philadelphia Federation of Teachers, all
25 educators, parents, principals, and

2 volunteers who were on site on the scene
3 at the school with us to see what could
4 they do to be of assistance. Of course
5 the Philadelphia Police Department, all
6 of the Police Department jumped into
7 action and especially Inspector Anthony
8 Washington out of the Northwest Division
9 and his group, who were just really,
10 again, a godsend, and the folks
11 especially who were on I-95 as the crash
12 occurred.

13 It just happened that this bus
14 was behind the school's bus and they were
15 en route to Washington, DC for a
16 different event, but they were recruits
17 and police officers and family members of
18 fallen officers, and everyone just jumped
19 into action, the Office of Emergency
20 Management. And for those who just
21 really offered prayers and positive
22 thoughts, I just really had to say a
23 particular thank you to everyone for the
24 outpouring of love and support.

25 And also we did have a staffer

2 who had a child who was on the bus, who,
3 thank God, is fine, shaken up, but
4 absolutely fine. And so we want to thank
5 everyone for reaching out and being in
6 contact with our office. And we've heard
7 and gotten so much support from all of
8 our colleagues, I just really wanted to
9 say that.

10 Thank you, Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Awesome. Thank you, Councilwoman.

13 That will be on this week's
14 Final Passage Calendar.

15 The Chair recognizes Councilman
16 Oh.

17 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
18 Council President. Today I offer three
19 non-privileged resolutions co-sponsored
20 by Councilmembers Squilla, Taubenberger,
21 Domb, Green, Parker, Reynolds Brown,
22 Bass, Jones, and Henon. Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 CHIEF CLERK: A non-privileged

8 Calendar.

9 CHIEF CLERK: And a
10 non-privileged resolution creating the
11 Philadelphia Film Advisory Task Force.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
13 that will also be on next week's Final
14 Passage Calendar.

15 CHIEF CLERK: And a
16 non-privileged resolution Calling Upon
17 The Philadelphia Streets Department To
18 Post The Fine For Violation Of The
19 Electric Vehicle Parking Space
20 Restrictions On-Site, And Calling Upon
21 The Philadelphia Parking Authority To
22 Establish A Dedicated Call-Line To Report
23 Violations Of Electric Vehicle Parking
24 Space Restrictions And To Vigorously
25 Enforce Such Electric Vehicle Parking

2 Space Restrictions.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
4 next week's Final Passage Calendar.

5 That concludes our introduction
6 of bills and resolutions.

7 We have no reports from
8 committee today. We will now move to
9 special business.

10 We will proceed under a special
11 order of business, a motion to withdraw
12 Bill No. 170009.

13 At this time, the Chair
14 recognizes Councilman Jones.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
16 Mr. President. Bill No. 170009 was
17 introduced on January 26, 2017 and was
18 referred to the Committee on Rules. I
19 would now like to withdraw the bill from
20 further consideration by the Council.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Thank you.

23 The Chair recognizes the Clerk
24 to read the title of the bill.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Bill No. 170009,

1 5/18/17 - STATED - SPECIAL BUSINESS
2 entitled "An ordinance to amend the
3 Philadelphia Zoning Maps by changing the
4 zoning designations of certain areas of
5 land located within an area bounded by
6 Silverwood Street, Gay Street, Baker
7 Street, and Carson Street; and to adopt a
8 Master Plan for the former St. Mary of
9 the Assumption Catholic Church and
10 adjacent parcels; all under certain terms
11 and conditions."

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you very much.

14 And the Chair again recognizes
15 Councilman Jones.

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. I move that Bill No.
18 170009 be withdrawn.

19 (Duly seconded.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you. It has been moved and
22 properly seconded that Bill No. 170009 be
23 withdrawn.

24 All those in favor say aye.

25 (Aye.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Those opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 ayes have it. The motion passes, and
7 Bill No. 170009 is withdrawn. Thank you
8 very much.

9 The next order of business is
10 consideration of the Calendar.

11 There being no bills on the
12 First Reading Calendar today, the Chair
13 recognizes Councilman Henon for the
14 purpose of calling up bills and
15 resolutions on the Final Passage Calendar
16 today.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

12 When you go to the podium in
13 the middle of the Council Chambers, you
14 will see a device. That device has a
15 light on it. When the light turns green,
16 it will be your time to speak. When the
17 light turns yellow, you will have 30
18 seconds to conclude your remarks. When
19 the light turns red, we'd ask that you
20 please adhere to the guidelines and
21 conclude your remarks. You will be given
22 three minutes to testify.

23 Mr. Decker, please call the
24 first name on the list.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Don Garecht,

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
5 morning.

6 MR. GARECHT: Good morning.

7 Hello. I'm Don Garecht, Vice President
8 of the Burholme Community Town Watch and
9 Civic Association. We serve the Burholme
10 community in Lower Northeast
11 Philadelphia. I'm here today to show my
12 support for Bill No. 170335 introduced by
13 Councilwoman Cherelle Parker.

14 The biggest obstacle for our
15 organization in determining whether or
16 not to support or oppose a project is
17 lack of information. Despite our best
18 efforts to communicate with applicants on
19 many occasions, we do not have basic
20 details about projects until our
21 community meetings. This makes it
22 difficult for our members to fully
23 understand the scope of the matter and
24 ask informed questions. The proposed
25 Project Information Form will be a great

2 educational tool for our residents.

3 The Burholme Civic Association

4 is working hard to revitalize our

5 business corridor. We welcome new

6 businesses to our community and support

7 zoning variances that will help our

8 neighborhood thrive. If the Project

9 Information Form was a mandated document,

10 it would give us a greater ability to do

11 just that by suggesting tweaks to

12 projects to ensure they do not adversely

13 affect existing businesses.

14 The Project Information Form

15 helps educate community participants and

16 further professionalizes the zoning

17 process. The result of this commonsense

18 legislation is a better working

19 relationship between businesses and

20 residents.

21 Thank you, Council President

22 Clarke. I appreciate you giving me the

23 opportunity to provide testimony today.

24 Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 5/18/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you very much for your testimony.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Ken Yang,
4 commenting on 170335.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
7 morning.

8 MR. YANG: Good morning,
9 Mr. President. Hello. I am Ken Yang,
10 Executive Director of the Department of
11 Housing Counseling at Greater
12 Philadelphia Asian Social Service Center,
13 GPASS. GPASS serves the Philadelphia
14 community from our home in Olney/Logan,
15 contributing to multifaceted neighborhood
16 development. We provide a wide array of
17 social services that include emergency
18 energy assistance, housing counseling,
19 food bank programs, community vacant lot
20 maintenance, substance abuse outpatient
21 counseling, and DUI programs. GPASS is
22 also proud to be able to provide the
23 community with opportunities to
24 participate in the neighborhood planning
25 and development process as both a NAC

2 program agency and an RCO.

3 I am here today to show my
4 support for Bill No. 170335 introduced by
5 Councilwoman Cherelle Parker. On behalf
6 of GPASS, I would like to express our
7 full and unreserved support of
8 Councilwoman Parker's proposed Project
9 Information Form legislation. In accord
10 with the thoughts expressed by many
11 fellow RCOs during a meeting that
12 Councilwoman Parker specially held to
13 introduce us to the bill, GPASS feels
14 that implementation of the Project
15 Information Form will greatly strengthen
16 the citywide RCO process by introducing a
17 standardized source of key development
18 information. This development
19 information, which the applicant would be
20 required to provide directly, would have
21 the clear effect of increasing developer
22 accountability and empowering RCOs of all
23 experience levels and the communities
24 that they serve. In that respect, we
25 think it fitting that this bill was

3 is in keeping with both the level of
4 accountability and the style of
5 participatory leadership that has marked

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Thank you very much for your testimony
12 today.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
14 commenting on 170486, 170335, and 160720.
15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
17 morning.

18 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.
19 This is an official decree of the people
20 in writ of mandamus quo warranto and, as
21 such, requires immediate action and
22 remedy.

23 For too long, Philadelphia
24 government has continued willfully to
25 violate laws and constitutions. The

2 Fifth Amendment states no person shall be
3 deprived of life, liberty, property
4 without due process of law, nor shall
5 private property be taken without just
6 compensation first paid.

7 For 23 years, I have not been
8 allowed to use my home, but I have had to
9 pay all the bills, legal costs, interest,
10 replacement housing costs. This is a
11 clear violation of the rule of law and
12 constitutions.

13 Upon notification of my
14 government-created plight, Council,
15 Mayor, and other oath-bound officials are
16 not above the law and must provide
17 constitutionally required immediate
18 remedy and change the process that caused
19 this to occur to a constitutionally
20 compliant process.

21 Why has no trial by jury ever
22 been allowed? Why have numerous
23 officials opposed my Seventh Amendment
24 trial by jury several times?

25 Resolution is required. If

1 5/18/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 government doesn't want to do its job,
3 then the sovereign people must be allowed
4 by grand jury or trial by jury to provide
5 immediate remedy. The constitutions
6 require immediate remedy of this breach
7 of law. Your oath of office requires you
8 to act or face prison.

9 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
10 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
11 Constitution, Article I, Section 1
12 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 712,
13 713, 716, and other laws listed in SCOTUS
14 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear
15 violated.

16 I call upon the federal and
17 Commonwealth governments to perform their
18 constitutional obligations to investigate
19 and prosecute all involved in the theft
20 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
21 1038 West Wyoming. The denial of
22 God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for
23 23 years is egregious, extraordinary,
24 oath-violating, and requires immediate
25 remedy.

1 5/18/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 A just government must obey the
3 rule of law. This color of law
4 government must have its Charter to
5 govern revoked until a constitutionally
6 compliant government is installed.

7 Public servants cannot refuse
8 their sworn duty to act any more than a
9 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
10 sovereign people require constitutions
11 and laws be enforced. Jail is required
12 for all who violate the oath or law.

13 I remind Council it takes a lot
14 of cooperation to create and allow
15 monumental corruption.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you very much for your testimony.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Jones.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. I'd like to leave
22 Chambers early on official business. We
23 have Governor Wolf coming to tour what
24 Councilwoman Parker doves a middle
25 neighborhood in Wynnefield and would like

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Thank you.

15 The Chair again recognizes
16 Councilman Johnson.

17 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Council
18 President, I move for the adoption of the
19 resolution.

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
22 been moved and properly seconded.

23 All those in favor say aye.

24 (Aye.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 5/18/17 - STATED - 2ND READING

2 Those opposed?

3 (No response.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 ayes have it. Resolution 170484 is
6 adopted.

7 Mr. Decker, 170486.

8 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
9 authorizing the Philadelphia
10 Redevelopment Authority to dispose of
11 certain properties located in the Seventh
12 Councilmanic District that will be
13 transferred by the City to the Authority,
14 by conveyance of such properties to the
15 Philadelphia Land Bank.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
17 Chair recognizes Councilwoman
18 Quinones-Sanchez.

19 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
20 you, Mr. President. I move for its
21 adoption.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

25 All those in favor say aye.

2 (Aye.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

9 Mr. Decker, 170489.

10 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
11 recognizing the critical role that
12 guidance counselors play in meeting
13 students' academic, social, and emotional
14 needs and urging the School District of
15 Philadelphia to devote additional
16 resources to expanding the number of
17 counselors in high schools with the
18 highest needs.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
20 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

21 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you
22 very much, Council President. I call for
23 the adoption of the resolution.

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

3 (Aye.)

6 (Nay.)

16 The Resolution 170490 is

17 adopted.

18 Mr. Decker, 170335-A.

19 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance

20 amending Title 14 of The Philadelphia

21 Code, entitled "Zoning and Planning," and

22 Title 18 of The Philadelphia Code,

23 entitled "Commerce," to provide for the

24 preparation and distribution of Project

25 Information Forms with respect to certain

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 you, Mr. President. We know we just
8 concluded with our primary election on
9 Tuesday, and all of the campaigns I'm
10 sure are trying to get some rest, and our
11 constituents I think were very tolerant,
12 because I didn't get any calls on
13 yesterday, but on this morning,
14 Mr. President, we received calls from
15 residents throughout the Ninth reminding
16 us that there were posters on trees and
17 electrical poles that needed to be
18 removed in their neighborhood. And I
19 know it seems like it's something small,
20 but when you're a homeowner and you're
21 walking up and down your street and you
22 see them, they become a sense of blight.

23 So we just ask all of the
24 candidates if they would sort of work
25 with their teams. Although the election

2 is over, the campaign is still underway
3 until those signs are removed.

4 The next thing I wanted to do,
5 Mr. President, was to say a hearty thank
6 you, and I want to start with the chief
7 co-sponsors, Councilwomen Maria
8 Quinones-Sanchez and Councilwoman
9 Reynolds Brown. Councilman Domb, who was
10 a great help, he's been deemed the chief
11 connector for his help with the Project
12 Information Form legislation and a
13 special thanks to all of my colleagues
14 for doing what we hope will add some
15 transparency to the land use process and
16 development process in our neighborhoods.

17 In addition to that, I want to
18 invite all Councilmembers to join the
19 women of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority
20 afterwards for a luncheon immediately in
21 the Caucus Room.

22 Finally, Mr. President, some of
23 us may have heard the tragic story last
24 week of a young man named Malik Kelly,
25 who happened to live in my district,

2 actually two blocks from me, and he was a
3 4th grade student at the Pennypacker
4 School. And last night residents of our
5 community gathered en mass for a vigil
6 that was hosted by the Pennypacker School
7 family.

8 I want you to know that after
9 visiting with Malik's mother and her
10 family, that Malik was a smart and caring
11 young man who had a very bright future.
12 He could have been the next Thurgood
13 Marshall or Mark Zuckerberg, but
14 unfortunately he won't get that
15 opportunity because last week his mother,
16 Tynisha, found him in his room after he
17 had taken his own life.

18 And when I was sitting with
19 Tynisha last week, you realize, all of
20 us, that this is Malik's story today, but
21 it could be the story of any student or
22 young person tomorrow unless we continue
23 to say no more bullying.

24 Now, while I know the District
25 has a very, very stringent policy;

2 however, I just want to read a couple of
3 facts. One -- and this is according to
4 the National Education Association, the
5 PACER Center, and the stopbullying.gov.
6 One in seven students in grades K through
7 12 are either a bully or have been a
8 victim of bullying. One in seven. An
9 estimated 160,000 U.S. children miss
10 school every day due to the fear of
11 attack or intimidation from other
12 students. Nearly nine out of ten LGBTQ
13 youth report being verbally harassed at
14 school, and six out of ten teenagers say
15 that they witness bullying in school once
16 a day.

17 With that being said, I want to
18 say a special thanks to the members of
19 this body who have long raised awareness
20 regarding this issue, which is why,
21 Mr. President, this crisis occurred, but
22 there was no need to introduce a
23 resolution in this body about it to raise
24 awareness, because Councilmembers
25 Blackwell, Reynolds Brown, Councilwoman

2 Gym prior to her joining this body,
3 Councilman Oh, and even former Councilman
4 Dennis O'Brien working with the School
5 District and the Police Department and
6 our Office of Safe Schools Advocates,
7 you've already raised awareness about
8 this issue. But what Malik's
9 circumstances remind us of is that
10 bullying has serious adverse educational
11 effects, that students who are targets
12 often experience extreme stress that can
13 lead to the symptoms of physical illness,
14 diminish their ability to learn, and it
15 can translate into increased absenteeism
16 and impair performance.

17 So while we keep Tynisha and
18 Malik's family and friends in our
19 thoughts and prayers, we also need to
20 keep our thoughts on what we can do to
21 say no more to bullying. We have
22 campaigns about domestic violence. We
23 need to continue to raise awareness about
24 this issue of bullying, and we should say
25 no more.

10 opportunity to thank all the voters on
11 the referendums today, one that was a
12 creation of your due diligence. You did
13 a fantastic job with that, and I
14 appreciate what you do and you
15 recognizing the opportunity for the, I
16 think, the same mission of revitalizing
17 our neighborhoods, creating jobs and in
18 sync with this body and City Council when
19 we have elected Councilmembers who know
20 their neighborhoods and know their unique
21 qualities in redevelopment and what the
22 impact is going to be. You achieve just
23 that with that initiative, so --

25 Thank you, Councilman.

10 Green and other members of this Council
11 body. The voters overwhelmingly saw the
12 need and clear and transparent process
13 that helps modernize our city and
14 streamlines our way that we use our --
15 purchase our products and our services
16 for local citizens and local businesses
17 right here in the City of Philadelphia as
18 we continue to try to encourage LBEs,
19 community groups, and vendors to
20 encourage them to be a part of our city
21 procurement. It allows now the City to
22 take a look at different factors when
23 awarding contracts such as past
24 performances and similar work, the
25 ability to partner in joint ventures and,

3 our diversity goals that this body and
4 our Administration wants to see
5 accomplished, in addition to price. So
6 it's not the lowest and it's not the only

10 I think other members have a lot of a
11 concern with, especially Councilwoman
12 Parker. We talk about our commercial
13 corridors. We talk about different ways
14 to improve blight such as bandit signs
15 and political signs, as Councilwoman
16 Parker just noted. We want to make sure
17 that our neighborhoods reflect the
18 quality and integrity and dignity that we
19 represent, and we do that through
20 policies that we create here and
21 definitions of portable signs. And
22 waving these feather flags and portable
23 banners and pendants and moving devices
24 really can, I think, clutter when they're
25 in the rights-of-way and really take away

3 we're trying to connect with when we are
4 making our commercial corridors walkable,
5 presentable, and usable and inviting for
6 all citizens. So look forward to having
7 hearings on that and working with every
8 member.

11 here in the City of Philadelphia. So I
12 want to thank Lodge 5, all its retirees,
13 its current officers who make the
14 sacrifice every single day. They go out
15 in the morning, they go out at night,
16 whatever shift that they're on, not
17 knowing if they're going to come back.
18 So if there are memorials and events that
19 are taking place during the course of
20 this week, I know which they were, we
21 just want to say thank you and continue
22 to make sure that our community policing
23 is reflective of who we are as a
24 community, but there needs to be respect
25 for our law officers as we try to

16 make a few remarks about it, as I talked
17 very briefly last week. But the Haitian
18 people have a long tradition of freedom
19 and struggle. They rose up to end
20 slavery and established the first free
21 black state in the modern world. They
22 resisted a continuous onslaught of
23 economic exploitation and abandonment by
24 imperial powers.

25 But the reality today is that

2 Haiti also is recovering from the effects
3 of a devastating earthquake that killed
4 300,000 people, displaced more than a
5 million, and then was followed by a more
6 recent devastating hurricane, effects
7 that have been exacerbated by ineffective
8 and sometimes self-serving aid work, and
9 many Haitian refugees have found safety
10 and a home in the United States.

11 Nearly 60,000 Haitians have
12 been able to live, work, and prosper
13 here, thanks to a federal program that
14 offers them temporary protected status.
15 Many of these Haitian people now live in
16 and around Philadelphia.

17 Not only does TPS ensure refuge
18 and safety in the wake of humanitarian
19 emergencies, but TPS also generates
20 dearly needed economic resources for
21 families back in Haiti. By enabling
22 Haitians to work and contribute to the
23 United States, TPS also allows them to
24 send remittances home to support their
25 families and communities as they work to

2 rebuild.

3 This status currently is in
4 danger of being taken away if the
5 Department of State and Homeland Security
6 do not renew the program before July
7 22nd. And if the federal departments
8 choose not to act, many Haitians,
9 including those in our own City of
10 Philadelphia, will be forced to leave the
11 United States. Returning to Haiti now
12 would be catastrophic for so many
13 families. Last year Hurricane Matthew
14 inflicted further infrastructure damage
15 on the already struggling country,
16 leading to severe food shortages and
17 further burdening an already insufficient
18 medical system.

19 I join Mayor Kenney and leaders
20 from across the country in calling upon
21 Secretaries Tillerson and Kelly to extend
22 the TPS program and to continue to
23 support our Haitian neighbors, brothers,
24 and sisters in Philadelphia and across
25 the country, and on Haitian Flag Day, I

2 feel like that's the way to honor our
3 brotherhood.

4 Thank you.

10 well as a career.
