2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning. Can we have a little quiet,
7 please. We're going to get started.
8 We've established a quorum. Thank you.

9 At this point, we would like to
10 have our invocation, and this morning the
11 Chair recognizes the Imam Muhammad
12 Abdul-Aleem of Masjidullah. He is here
13 today as the guest of Councilwoman
14 Parker.

15 I would ask all guests,
16 visitors, and members to please rise.

17 (Councilmembers, guests, and
18 visitors rise.)

19 IMAM ABDUL-ALEEM: As we begin
20 this invocation, I would like to first
21 give a few remarks. I want to give
22 thanks to my Councilwoman, Cherelle
23 Parker, who has been a great blessing to
24 our councilmanic district and who has
25 shown great visionary leadership in terms

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2 of including all of the members of her
3 district, and as a Muslim, I'm always
4 happy to know that people see us as
5 partners in the need to make the society
6 and our community better.

7 I also want to thank
8 Councilwoman Helen Gym, who has come up
9 and helped to stand with us and to stand
10 with all of the disenfranchised people in
11 this current political environment.

12 I want to thank my brother
13 Councilman Curtis Jones, who has had the
14 foresight to understand that as a Muslim,
15 you can't wear your religion on your
16 sleeve, but you must be a servant of the
17 people and look for the good of humanity.

18 I want to thank Councilwoman
19 Jannie Blackwell, who has for years stood
20 with us in terms of making her
21 councilmanic district better and us
22 working as partners.

23 And, lastly, I want to thank my
24 brother Council President Darrell Clarke,
25 who has made us all proud by being a true

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2 servant of the people and working hard to
3 put neighbor back in the hood.

4 These are the people that I
5 worked with over the years, and I want to
6 just thank them before I give this
7 invocation.

8 Our Lord, the merciful
9 benefactor, the merciful redeemer, who
10 opened the doors to all people a way of
11 good conscience and good work. Grant to
12 this Council as they continue to serve
13 the people of this city taking pride in
14 human dignity, human industry, and the
15 search and struggle for human excellence.

16 Let us pray that this Council
17 be an inspiration to other city councils,
18 this state, and this nation to move
19 toward social and economic justice for
20 all.

21 Grant that this Council always
22 have the human heart for charity,
23 compassion, and mercy for the weak and
24 less fortunate among us.

25 Grant that we as human beings

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2 always have more hope than trouble and
3 ever-growing goodness and in wisdom.

4 Bless us to always cherish our
5 freedom and the noble excellence of our
6 own human life. Grant that we as
7 citizens understand better our brothers
8 and sisters in our neighborhoods and also
9 around the world, and reject unsuitable
10 racism, sexism, dualism, and we work for
11 a human society of brotherhood and peace.

12 Bless us as citizens to live up
13 to the noble name of this City of
14 Brotherly Love and Sisterly Affection.
15 Bless us in the City neighborhoods to
16 return the neighbor back to the hood.
17 Bless us to establish our city as a city
18 of safety and security for all citizens.

19 Bless the workers of our city
20 and those in uniform and those not in
21 uniform. Bless all citizens and
22 government that we work together, those
23 of great means and small means to
24 appreciate more our city and work
25 together to make the environment good for

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2 all.

3 Bless our homes and our
4 schools. Bless our parents. Bless our
5 troubled youth, our burdened
6 neighborhoods and never be without hope
7 or direction.

8 Bless us as neighbors to keep
9 the best of our ways. Bless us to
10 cherish more the pride of industry and
11 self-reliance. Bless the efforts of this
12 Council and all efforts and progress for
13 more jobs and more opportunities for this
14 great city of ours, more for all of us.

15 Bless marriage and matrimony
16 and families here and around the world.
17 Bless us to understand the great time in
18 which we live, the time of the human
19 being. Increase the Council and its
20 leadership and every member of the
21 Council, the leaders of this city to
22 strive more for the excellence of the
23 human spirit, the excellence of the human
24 intellect, and that of statesmen so that
25 we may build a better world for all of

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2 us.

3 Amen.

4 Thank you so much, and I pray
5 that our words will be sufficient to help
6 us grow.

7 Thank you, sir.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Imam, so much for those
10 inspiring words.

11 Council will be at ease.

12 (Council at ease.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you again, Imam, for those
15 inspiring words. We really appreciate
16 it.

17 The next order of business is
18 the approval of the Journal of the
19 meeting of Thursday, May 18th, 2017, and
20 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

21 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
22 you, Mr. President. I move that the
23 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, May
24 18th, 2017 be approved.

25 (Duly seconded.)

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you. It has been moved and
4 properly seconded that the Journal of the
5 meeting of Thursday, May 18th, 2017 stand
6 approved.

7 All those in favor say aye.

8 (Aye.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Those opposed?

11 (No response.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 ayes have it, and the Journal is
14 approved.

15 The next order of business is
16 requests for leaves of absence, and the
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
19 Council President. On behalf of the
20 majority, there are no requests of leave
21 of absence today.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 Chair thanks the gentleman.

24 The Chair now recognizes
25 Councilman O'Neill.

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2 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
3 Mr. President. On behalf of the
4 republicans, there are no requests for
5 leave of absence.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
7 Chair thanks the gentleman.

8 At this time, I would like to
9 dispense with the regular order of
10 business and I would like to welcome and
11 thank everyone who has taken time out of
12 their busy day to come down to witness
13 their government in action. We hope that
14 your stay here today is a knowledgeable
15 one but, more importantly, a pleasurable
16 one, so much so that you come back again.
17 Again, thank you so much.

18 As we celebrate Small Business
19 Week in the City of Philadelphia, City
20 Council would like to extend a warm
21 welcome to the Chamber of Commerce of
22 Greater Philadelphia small business
23 members and representatives who are
24 joining us here today.

25 Could I ask them to please

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2 stand.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you all very much. We really
6 appreciate you being here, and we
7 appreciate all the wonderful things you
8 do in our wonderful city.

9 At this time, the Chair
10 recognizes Councilwoman Bass, who will
11 present a resolution recognizing Imhotep
12 Charter Men's Basketball Team. Must have
13 won another championship.

14 Would Coach Andre Noble and
15 those accompanying him please join the
16 Councilwoman at the podium.

17 (Councilmembers and guests
18 approached podium.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
20 joining Councilwoman Bass, we have
21 Councilman Green, Councilman Jones,
22 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez, and
23 Councilwoman Blackwell.

24 Oh, here we go.

25 (Applause.)

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2 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Good
3 morning. Well, what a wonderful day it
4 is. Despite the weather, this is a day
5 for winners. And so everybody likes a
6 winner, right? And I have to say Imhotep
7 has just done an outstanding job. Let's
8 give them a round of applause.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: We hear so
11 many negative things about our young
12 people that when we have an opportunity
13 like this, I just really want to
14 celebrate. And everybody likes a winner.
15 Everybody plays ball to some degree, you
16 know. And I can play. I can do a little
17 something-something, in my mind, but I
18 can't do anything near what these young
19 people have done. And so I am just
20 really honored and pleased and pleased
21 to be able to recognize them here today.

22 And so we have a resolution and
23 it reads:

24 Honoring and recognizing
25 Imhotep Charter men's basketball team for

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2 winning the 2017 Philadelphia Public
3 League Championship title.

4 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, on
5 February 23rd, 2017 at Saint Joseph's
6 Hagan Arena the Imhotep Charter Panthers
7 won the men's basketball championship for
8 the Philadelphia Public League by
9 defeating the Martin Luther King Cougars
10 53 to 49 in overtime; and

11 Whereas, Imhotep's starting
12 point guard Daron Russell was deemed the
13 Most Valuable Player for the second time
14 in his basketball career for scoring a
15 game-high of 24 points; and

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: So now I
17 have to do Helen Gym's part. This is
18 punishment. But congratulations.

19 Whereas, with the Philadelphia
20 Public League Championship Imhotep will
21 have won its 6th Public League
22 championship and now faces Conwell-Egan
23 on March 4th, 2017 at Philadelphia
24 University for the all-city title and the
25 right to go on to the state playoff game;

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2 and

3 Whereas, even before the recent
4 win, Imhotep's men's basketball team was
5 ranked number seven in the nation by USA
6 Today;

7 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Now,
8 therefore, be it resolved, by the Council
9 of the City of Philadelphia, that it
10 hereby honors and recognizes Imhotep
11 Charter men's basketball team for winning
12 the 2017 Philadelphia Public League
13 Championship title.

14 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Let's
15 hear it for Northwest Philadelphia. Do
16 we have the Sixers in the house? Anybody
17 from the Sixers here? Let's recruit.
18 We're building our Sixers team, folks,
19 right?

20 Further resolved, that an
21 engrossed copy of this resolution be
22 presented to Imhotep Charter School and
23 its Head Coach Andre Noble as evidence of
24 the high esteem and deep admiration of
25 this legislative body.

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2 Congratulations.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
5 the Chair recognizes Coach Sutton.

6 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Six
7 years.

8 COACH SUTTON: On behalf of Dr.
9 Ayesha Imani, our Executive Manager, and
10 Principal Jury Segers, we want to thank
11 City Council for recognizing us. I'm
12 very proud of the young men that are
13 behind me. Council, this is -- winning
14 state titles is usually the second best
15 day of our calendar. The first day is
16 when our young people sign their national
17 letters of intent to go on to
18 post-secondary education.

19 (Applause.)

20 COACH SUTTON: With that, two
21 seniors, David Beatty will be going to
22 the University of South Carolina and
23 Daron Russell will be going to University
24 of Rhode Island in the fall. So we're
25 grateful for that.

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2 We're also grateful for our
3 Councilwoman for inviting us down. And I
4 didn't want her to know that I actually
5 had something for her, so I had to stick
6 it in my pocket, but we have a state
7 championship medal for her to be a part
8 of our state championship team.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you. Thank you. Council will be
12 at ease.

13 (Council at ease.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, and congratulations again.

16 At this time, the Chair
17 recognizes Councilman Squilla, who will
18 present a resolution recognizing the
19 American Bible Society. Would Dr. Roy
20 Peterson and those accompanying him
21 please join the Councilman at the podium.

22 (Councilmembers and guests
23 approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
25 joining Councilman Squilla, we have

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2 Councilman Green, Councilman Oh, and
3 Councilwoman Blackwell.

4 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Good
5 morning, everybody. Today is a special
6 day in honoring the American Bible
7 Society on the occasion of its 200th
8 Anniversary and now also back in
9 Philadelphia where it all started. So
10 it's a great honor to be here and have
11 this honor today.

12 The American Bible was founded
13 on May 11th, 1816. Philadelphia native
14 Elias Boudinot, a president from the
15 Continental Congress, served in the first
16 president. Other early leaders of
17 American Bible Society include John Jay,
18 Francis Scott Key, and John Quincy Adams;
19 and

20 Whereas, American Bible Society
21 originally sought to unite more localized
22 Bible societies with the goal to
23 distribute the Bible across the country.
24 This vision soon expanded worldwide.
25 Over the past 200 years, the American

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2 Bible Society has distributed
3 approximately 6 million Bibles around the
4 world;

5 COUNCILMAN OH: 6 billion.

6 Whereas, American Bible Society
7 has supported the American military since
8 its founding. It distributed Bibles to
9 the American military for the first time
10 in 1817, and it has delivered Bibles and
11 New Testaments to American soldiers in
12 every war in which American troops have
13 participated since the Mexican-American
14 War in 1846; and

15 Whereas, in a 1901 address to
16 an auxiliary of American Bible Society,
17 then-Vice President Theodore Roosevelt
18 remarked, quote, Every thinking man, when
19 he thinks, realizes what a very large
20 number of people tend to forget that the
21 teachings of the Bible are so interwoven
22 and intertwined with our whole civic and
23 social life that it would be literally
24 impossible for us to figure to ourselves
25 what that life would be if these

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2 teachings were removed. We would lose
3 almost all standards by which we now
4 judge both public and private morals; all
5 the standings toward which we, with more
6 or less resolution, strive to raise
7 ourselves; and

8 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, a
9 pioneering spirit has always been a vital
10 part of American Bible Society's success
11 and longevity. It co-published the first
12 Bible in Braille in 1842. Between 1918
13 and 1919, American Bible Society
14 appointed its first women board members
15 and two women vice presidents, a year
16 before women had the right to vote in
17 America. In 2012 it introduced The
18 Digital Bible Library. Visitors to
19 American Bible Society's website can
20 search the Bible in over 582 versions and
21 over 466 languages. New endeavors
22 include developing Bible-based online
23 games and virtual reality programs to
24 help new audiences discover the stories
25 found in the Bible; and

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2 Whereas, after nearly 200 years
3 in New York City, the American Bible
4 Society moved into a new Philadelphia
5 headquarters at 101 North Independence
6 Mall East in August of 2015. Most of
7 American Bible Society's approximately
8 200 employees work in this new office;
9 and

10 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

11 Whereas, the bicentennial legacy of
12 American Bible Society is a testament to
13 over 200 years of religious liberty in
14 Philadelphia and the United States which
15 has proven beneficial to moral, civic,
16 and public life. Philadelphia is excited
17 to build its relationship with American
18 Bible Society as it celebrates the
19 promising start of a new century,
20 establishes a wider presence, and has a
21 deeper impact in its new home; therefore,
22 be it

23 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you.

24 I do want to say this Bible Society is
25 going to be one of the places to go to,

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2 and when you're in Philadelphia, it's
3 going to be a "must see" once they get
4 everything up and running, and we are
5 proud, and I'm sure we'll hear from them
6 later on what it is that they're going to
7 be presenting to us here in Philadelphia.

8 So resolved, by the Council of
9 the City of Philadelphia, that we hereby
10 recognize and honor American Bible
11 Society on the occasion of its 200th
12 Anniversary.

13 Resolved further, that an
14 engrossed copy of this resolution be
15 presented to American Bible Society,
16 evidencing the sincere admiration and
17 respect of this legislative body.

18 Introduced by myself,
19 Councilman David Oh, and Derek Green,
20 Councilwoman Blackwell, and all members
21 of Council.

22 Congratulations.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
25 the Chair recognizes Dr. Peterson for

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2 remarks.

3 DR. PETERSON: Thank you very
4 much. On behalf of American Bible
5 Society, our Board of Trustees, and our
6 staff, we express our sincere gratitude
7 to you for this honor.

8 Councilman Honorable Mark
9 Squilla and Honorable David Oh and to
10 each of you, thank you for this gift.

11 To Council President Honorable
12 Darrell Clarke for your leadership of
13 this Chamber, we give you thanks and
14 gratitude for making this a vibrant city
15 for us to relocate back to.

16 To each of you on the Council,
17 we appreciate your service and are
18 thankful for the honor that you have
19 given us today. We feel welcomed and
20 back at home in Philadelphia. We've had
21 a wonderful two years here already.

22 Our roots do go back to 1740
23 with Elias Boudinot born in this city as
24 our founding President.

25 One thing that you may not know

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2 as we came back, we incentivized all 200
3 of our staff to locate in the City, to be
4 in the neighborhoods, to be in the
5 churches, in these schools, and to be
6 serving this city along with you.

7 As we opened our doors, we had
8 the privilege of being part of the Host
9 Committee to welcome Pope Francis and the
10 World Meeting of Families here in
11 Philadelphia, and we produced a Scripture
12 portion for the Catholic church for that
13 occasion as he arrived in our wonderful
14 city.

15 We've recently produced a
16 Scripture portion for all the police
17 chaplains, thousands of copies for
18 Commissioner Ross and the chaplains to
19 serve the men and women in our city who
20 serve us day by day. And we've also
21 linked arms with ministries that are
22 working with the homeless and with
23 veterans as a beginning of our first
24 chapter here being back in Philadelphia.

25 So it would not be possible to

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2 be doing all these things without your
3 support, your incredible support, and the
4 welcome you've given us to come back
5 home.

6 When it comes to serving the
7 people of Philadelphia, we think of you
8 and how you sacrificially serve the
9 people day by day in our government.
10 Your service reminds me of the words of
11 Christ when he said, I did not come to be
12 served, but to serve.

13 You are truly public servants,
14 sacrificing for the good of Philadelphia.
15 As a thank you, we have placed on each of
16 your desks a personalized engraved copy
17 of the Bible as a gift. And as you look
18 at that piece of Scripture, I want you to
19 remember it represents our commitment to
20 serve alongside of you to serve this
21 city, and we believe working together the
22 future is bright for Philadelphia.

23 And Councilman Squilla is
24 correct, we are opening a Faith and
25 Liberty Discovery Center on Independence

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2 Mall to help tell the story, the amazing
3 history that happened in that square mile
4 that we live in today in Old City. This
5 beautiful space will proclaim the
6 liberty, justice, and faith that are part
7 of our heritage here in our nation, the
8 brotherly love that William Penn saw was
9 possible if we would all work together.

10 And, finally, I remember the
11 words of William Penn when he said this
12 city is a holy experiment. And so today
13 we are thankful to join hands with you to
14 be part of this holy experiment for many,
15 many years to come.

16 God bless the City of
17 Philadelphia.

18 Thank you very much.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Council will be at ease.

22 (Council at ease.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. At this time, the Chair
25 recognizes Councilman Henon, who will

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2 present a resolution recognizing
3 Construction Safety Week. Would Mary Pat
4 Geppert and those accompanying her please
5 join the Councilman at the podium.

6 (Councilmembers and guests
7 approached podium.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
9 joining Councilman Henon, we have --

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Point of
11 information for Councilmembers when we
12 come up. When Council is at ease and we
13 take pictures, it would be appreciated if
14 you wore and brought the hard hats as a
15 symbol of our appreciation for
16 Construction Safety Week.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
18 Thank you, Councilman.

19 Joining Councilman Henon, we
20 have Councilman Squilla, Councilman
21 Jones, Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: I don't want
23 to get written up by the Public Safety
24 and Construction Safety Committee, but
25 thank you. It's May 1st through May 5th,

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2 and we're doing the presentation now
3 because we didn't have the opportunity
4 when it was National Construction Safety
5 Week, and we observed it here, and no
6 better than observing that is through the
7 GBCA, which is really old. It's an old
8 organization. It's been around since
9 1891.

10 So some information that I
11 think is important, because they have a
12 history and a culture of being safe and
13 promoting safety on our work sites. As
14 you know, this Committee, our legislative
15 body, through a lot of different
16 policies, Special Committee on Demolition
17 that our Council President put together
18 working with the Administration, had a
19 lot of recommendations, and those
20 recommendations were in consultation with
21 the GBCA.

22 So with Philadelphia currently
23 experiencing the growth of construction,
24 more than ever, more than ever, we need
25 construction safety awareness and

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2 construction safety awareness in all our
3 communities.

4 And this is beyond Safety Week.

5 GBCA has worked closely with the City of
6 Philadelphia, again, like I had
7 indicated, on a lot of its policies, a
8 lot of its building codes and have
9 invaluable information dating back from
10 1891 where we observe national best
11 practices. We implement best practices
12 not only here in the City, but they do
13 that every single day with Philadelphia
14 workers on all our Philadelphia work
15 sites. So this is an opportunity to
16 thank and acknowledge them for all of
17 their hard work that they do from the
18 Chairman, Jim Dolente, Benjamin Connors,
19 who is the President, and Mary Pat
20 Geppert, who is the Chair, who has the
21 awesome responsibility of being the Chair
22 of the Public Safety Committee.

23 So it is my honor recognizing
24 and observing the week that has passed,
25 May 1st through May 5th -- but we

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2 practice all year long -- 2017 as
3 "Construction Safety Week" in the City of
4 Philadelphia.

5 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Let me
6 add, the value and the importance of
7 having the relationship that the GBCA has
8 had with this City Council and this
9 Administration I believe has led us to
10 being more proactive and putting forth
11 better legislative initiatives. So we
12 really appreciate their partnership all
13 year long.

14 Whereas, every year across the
15 United States more than 80,000 workers
16 suffer an injury on construction job
17 sites; and

18 Whereas, the General Building
19 Contractors Association Safety Committee
20 works to support safe construction
21 practices here in Philadelphia; and

22 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Is my hat
23 crooked? Mess my hair.

24 And whereas, the Construction
25 Industry Safety group and the Incident

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2 and Injury Free CEO Forum have joined
3 forces to create U.S. Industry Safety
4 Week with a single aim: to inspire
5 everyone in the construction industry to
6 be leaders in safety and to make safety
7 the number one focus in the U.S.
8 construction industry; and

9 Whereas, "Construction Safety
10 Week" is recognized annually by thanking
11 workers for supporting safety and
12 recognizing their efforts to be injury
13 free, increasing awareness of the
14 importance of being committed to safety,
15 inspiring the construction industry to
16 work together to strengthen safety
17 culture, celebrating the need to be
18 injury free, and conducting on-site
19 safety awareness activities to support
20 education; and

21 COUNCILMAN JONES: Just to take
22 a second, Mr. President, when you
23 appointed the Demolition Safety
24 Committee, this organization stepped up
25 to the plate without hesitation, without

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2 reservation and gave us positive input,
3 which helped keep people safe on
4 construction sites and around. So I am
5 thankful for what your contribution is.

6 Whereas, "Construction Safety
7 Week" increases awareness of the
8 importance of being committed to safety,
9 every day, and inspires sharing of best
10 practices and working together to
11 strengthen construction industry's safety
12 culture; and

13 Whereas, the City of
14 Philadelphia and the City Council have
15 worked diligently in recent years to
16 ensure and improve safety in construction
17 practices and pass regulations
18 encouraging safe, injury-free
19 construction in Philadelphia; and

23 to Friday, May 5th.

24 Therefore, be it resolved, that
25 the Council of the City of Philadelphia

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2 hereby recognizes and observes May 1st
3 through May 5th, 2017 as "Construction
4 Safety Week" in the City of Philadelphia;
5 and

6 Further be it resolved, that an
7 engrossed copy of this resolution be
8 presented to the GBCA, General Builders
9 Contractors Association, as evidence of
10 the sincere respect and admiration of
11 this legislative body.

12 And no matter what we do,
13 whether it's on a work site or whether
14 it's a home site or anywhere, safety is
15 always first. So thank you and
16 congratulations.

17 (Applause.)

23 but a lot of trees would have to pay the
24 price for this much paperwork, but it's
25 for your review for the next week.

10 and Benefits," to require the provision

11 of coverage of egg freezing, in vitro

12 fertilization and related procedures

13 under City health insurance plans.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

15 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

16 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you

17 very much, Council President. Before

18 Council today, I joined 12 other women

19 leaders, including my Council colleague

20 Councilwoman Bass, from across

21 Southeastern Pennsylvania to hear

22 testimony on women's health and in

23 particular on women's reproductive health

24 and the dangers posed by HHCA.

25 We're here today to firmly

2 declare that healthcare for women, LGBTQ
3 people, cancer survivors, and those who
4 struggle to build their families mustn't
5 be optional. The choice to have
6 children, as a mother of three, is a
7 deeply personal one, and the freedom to
8 build a family in whatever ways we choose
9 is at the center of what it means to be
10 human.

11 For many of us, though, this
12 choice isn't simple and it's not free.
13 When the City insurance plans covered
14 medically assisted family assistance and
15 pregnancy treatments, 14 of our
16 colleagues across the entire City
17 workforce, 14 of our friends and
18 neighbors had access to procedures and
19 treatments necessary to make that choice,
20 to build their own families and to forge
21 their own paths in life. These were
22 women, these were LGBTQ family members,
23 they were cancer survivors and families
24 that got the help and care that they
25 needed, and that's why, along with my

2 Council colleagues, I'm introducing a
3 bill today to require that all insurance
4 plans for City employees cover care for
5 egg freezing, in vitro fertilization, and
6 medically approved procedures for
7 establishing pregnancy. And I deeply
8 want to thank the co-sponsors of this
9 bill - Councilmember Henon, Parker,
10 Greenlee, Reynolds Brown, Bass, Green,
11 Blackwell, Johnson, and Quinones-Sanchez,
12 and the Mayor's Administration for
13 working with us on this.

14 As we fight for a medical
15 system for all, for a system that truly
16 meets the needs and the choices and the
17 lives of all Philadelphians and all
18 Americans, we are firm in the conviction
19 that it's up to all of us to share the
20 burdens of caring for and lifting up one
21 another in our moments of pain and of
22 challenge and especially of joy.

23 And in this moment, I just want
24 to give special recognition to one of our
25 Council colleagues, Randi Trent, who has

2 bravely faced a cancer diagnosis and
3 fought to keep open the possibilities of
4 carrying children and starting her own
5 family. We stand with Randi, whose
6 strength is an inspiration to all of us,

9 I look forward to working with
10 the Administration and City employees to
11 implement this critical policy and thank
12 everybody involved who helped make it
13 possible.

4 Mr. President. I offer one bill on your
5 behalf, of which I am co-sponsor.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,
12 Council President. Today I offer one
13 bill and two non-privileged resolutions
14 co-sponsored by Councilmembers Gym,

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
5 Mr. President. I move that the rules of

10 the Whole reports out six bills with a
11 favorable recommendation.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you.

14 Mr. Decker, please read that

16 CHIEF CLERK: The Committee of
17 the Whole, to which was referred Bill No.
18 170195, entitled "An ordinance to adopt a
19 Capital Program for the six Fiscal Years

23 and

9 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. I now move that the rules

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 (Aye.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Those opposed?

3 (No response.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
5 ayes have it, and these bills will be
6 placed on our First Reading Calendar
7 today.

8 The next order of business is
9 consideration of the Calendar. I note
10 that the bills just reported from
11 committee with a suspension of the rules
12 have been deemed to have had a first
13 reading. These bills will be placed on
14 our Second Reading and Final Passage
15 Calendar at our next session of Council.

16 There are no other additional
17 bills on the First Reading Calendar, and
18 the Chair recognizes Councilman Henon for
19 the purpose of calling up bills and
20 resolutions on the Final Passage Calendar
21 today.

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. The following resolutions
24 and bills are being called up for Second
25 Reading and Final Passage Calendars

2 today: Bill Nos. 170526, 170527, 170532,
3 170533, 170534, 170282-A, 170265-A, and

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman.

8 Before considering these bills
9 and resolutions on the Final Passage
10 Calendar today, we will have our public
11 comment session. It will go as follows:

12 If you have not already done so
13 and you are interested in testifying on a
14 bill or resolution that is on the Final
15 Passage Calendar today, you may sign up
16 at the table to my left.

17 When your name is called, you
18 will go to the podium in the middle of
19 the Council Chambers. There's a device
20 on that podium. When the light turns
21 green on that device, it will be your
22 time to speak. When the light turns
23 yellow, you will have 30 seconds to
24 conclude your remarks. When the light
25 turns red, we would ask that you please

3 your remarks. You will be given three
4 minutes to testify.

5 Mr. Decker, please call the
6 name of the first witness.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,
8 commenting on 170526.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MR. DANIHEL: Good morning.
11 This is an official decree of writ of
12 mandamus quo warranto and, as such,
13 requires immediate action and remedy.

14 If God created the people, if
15 God gave the people inalienable,
16 involatile rights, if the government is
17 created by the people, how can the
18 government steal from the people and defy
19 and deny God-given rights?

20 Every week the Council and
21 Mayor take property from people, possibly
22 illegally, and give it to the government.
23 Mandamus quo warranto asks by whose
24 authority. Where does the government,
25 Council, and the Mayor claim their power

2 to violate the Constitution and law?
3 Clearly your oath reminds you no
4 authority exists. Clearly, God and the
5 people's sovereignty over government has
6 been usurped. Clearly, by the people,
7 for the people has been violated. When
8 did "by the people" and "for the people"
9 become screw the people?

10 The constitutions require
11 immediate remedy of this breach of law.
12 Your oath of office requires you to act
13 or face prison.

14 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
15 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
16 Constitution, Article I, Section 1
17 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
18 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in
19 SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear
20 violated.

21 I call upon the federal and
22 Commonwealth governments to perform their
23 constitutional obligations to investigate
24 and prosecute all involved in the theft
25 and illegal deed transfer of my home,

2 1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of
3 God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for
4 23 years is egregious, extraordinary,
5 oath-violating, and requires immediate
6 remedy.

7 A just government must obey the
8 rule of law. This color of law
9 government must have its Charter to
10 govern revoked until a constitutionally
11 compliant government is installed.

12 Public servants cannot refuse
13 their sworn duty to act any more than a
14 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
15 sovereign people require the Constitution
16 and laws be enforced. Jail is required
17 for all who violate oath or law.

18 I remind Council, it takes a
19 lot of cooperation to create and allow
20 monumental corruption.

21 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

22 I would ask the Clerk please
23 read the name of our next speaker.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Maria Ortiz,
25 commenting on 170285.

2 (Witness approached podium.)
3 MS. ORTIZ: Good morning,
4 everyone. I'm here on Bill 170285. It
5 doesn't provide an appeal process for the
6 RCO. We know the importance of an appeal
7 process. In this case, for example, our
8 Smith School, the community was not
9 allowed to appeal the SRC decision of the
10 sale of our school to a market-rate
11 developer and now -- and to now to learn
12 that Concordia turned around and sold to
13 another developer after arguing for
14 months about a five package deal of a
15 school. Within 24 hours after May 19,
16 they resold the property to another
17 high-end developer. If there had been an
18 appeal process, that would never have
19 happened.

20 The point of appeal is
21 important to give the right to see the
22 process done in the right way. An appeal
23 gives you a chance to explain why it
24 should or should not be done. I feel an
25 appeal process would have benefit a

2 project.

3 RCO plays an important role if
4 done in the right manner. Community
5 needs to have an input to make community
6 safe if all -- for all, a community safe
7 for all.

8 When new people come in the
9 community, they want to see schools,
10 recreation center. I know this because
11 we lost my neighbors, nine new neighbors,
12 because there is no place for children or
13 seniors. An appeal plays an important
14 part. It is a right for all. Now our
15 Smith School will be turned into
16 market-rate housing, pushing low-income,
17 moderate, and working family out of the
18 community. If the appeal was put in
19 place, this would never have happened.
20 Appeal is the right for everyone, not
21 just for some.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

24 Clerk, please read the name of
25 the next speaker, please.

1 5/25/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 CHIEF CLERK: Tiffany Green,
3 commenting on 170285.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 MS. GREEN: Good afternoon. I
6 ask that City Council vote no to 170285.
7 This bill gives the Planning Commission
8 the right to suspend community groups in
9 Philadelphia without an independent
10 appeal process.

11 An independent appeal process
12 allows us to go and make an argument if
13 we feel that we've been suspended
14 wrongly. Initially the RCO process was
15 supposed to be a registry for
16 notification for new development coming
17 into the community, not to turn into a
18 private club where you have to now follow
19 rules, regulations and now suspension and
20 then no appeal process.

21 This bill gives the Planning
22 Commission -- to make them a judge and a
23 jury. How can you make them the judge
24 and jury when our community, 250 minority
25 registers came out and voted no to 20th

2 and Wharton, what was on fire last week,
3 and the Planning Commission voted in our
4 face to pass it through for one
5 particular developer, with very little
6 community support. In that community,
7 that's bitter feeling.

8 Councilman Henon, this might be
9 a good bill for your district, but you
10 have no right to go around to other
11 districts where there is not a good
12 relationship with the Planning
13 Commission. We need an independent
14 appeal process. At this particular
15 point, thank God our forefathers,
16 Benjamin Franklin and Thomas Jefferson,
17 had the foresight to put an independent
18 appeal process so that if you don't
19 give -- if you're not able to -- you're
20 able to go to someone. You, of all
21 people, should understand the importance
22 of having an appeal process if you are
23 falsely accused of something that you did
24 not do and you need to be able to go
25 ahead and defend yourself and everything.

2 Who is going to do the
3 investigation? Who is going to look into
4 it? The Planning Commission has passed
5 over 500 new market-rate developments
6 over the last five years, and you want to
7 make them the judge and the jury? I
8 don't think so.

9 We need leadership that's going
10 to stand up for us. Thank God our
11 forefathers stood up for us and had the
12 leadership. If the leadership supports
13 suspending community groups that come to
14 your fundraisers, that come to your
15 community events and you don't feel the
16 need to give them appeal process, then
17 you don't have their best interest at
18 heart. As the minister said, have a
19 human heart. Understand that everything
20 is not perfect, but you cannot be
21 suspending groups and making this into
22 some type of private club that allows new
23 groups to come in with the resources to
24 set up a non-profit quickly in your
25 neighborhood and then claim RCO status as

2 if they have the power and the say to say
3 what goes on in your community.

4 And if you want to talk about
5 construction safety, then why is 20th and
6 Wharton still building after 15 open
7 violations after that fire? Let's start
8 with that. Let's deal with that first
9 before you start talking about canceling
10 community groups throughout the City of
11 Philadelphia.

12 Thank you.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

15 Clerk, please read the next
16 speaker.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Tracey Fisher.

18 (No response.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: Tracey Fisher.

20 (No response.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Toni Ebright,
22 commenting on Councilman Johnson's
23 resolution introduced today on Reentry
24 Awareness Month.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

2 MS. EBRIGHT: Good afternoon.

3 My name is Toni Ebright. It's a
4 privilege to be able to show my support
5 for the reentry bill. I'm here as a
6 returning citizen, an employee of Mothers
7 in Charge, and an advocate for many
8 people that are returning home from jail.

9 I just basically want to show
10 my support and want to briefly tell you
11 who I used to be and who I am today to
12 show you the importance and the
13 significance of reentry to people like
14 myself today.

15 I've been -- I'm actually a
16 grateful recovering addict today, but I
17 was in addiction for nine years, went in
18 and out of incarceration nine times in
19 the last ten years, eventually made it
20 upstate. I had two children, one
21 daughter, who followed in my process and
22 also became a heroin addict.

23 The opiate epidemic is a
24 nightmare today in Philadelphia and
25 across the country, and I've lost many

2 friends to the disease, and I'm here
3 today to show my support, because many of
4 us -- I wouldn't be where I am today
5 without that support that I received when
6 I arrived in Philadelphia a year ago.

7 I work for Mothers in Charge
8 today. I started off in a program called
9 Women Working for a Change. It's a job
10 readiness program that basically has a
11 cognitive piece to that. There's
12 problem-solving, social skills, and that
13 actually saved my life when I came here
14 to Philadelphia.

15 So I wanted to basically just
16 get up here and speak today in support of
17 that. Today I actually work for Mothers
18 in Charge. I'm the Program Coordinator
19 for that program. I go to college again.
20 My daughter has over two years in
21 sobriety, and I have my life back again
22 today.

23 Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you

10 tax has been tried before. It has been
11 withdrawn, and I would really urge the
12 Governor to reconsider the harm that tax
13 would do.

10 life for their country, for those who
11 fought and gave us our forefathers and
12 created our government in which we serve
13 in the most public way.

14 I want to thank all the
15 veterans and for those who made the
16 ultimate sacrifice in giving their own
17 life and for those who serve now and
18 those who will serve in the future. I
19 want to thank and honor all of their
20 service.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman.

23 The Chair recognizes Councilman
24 Green.

25 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,

2 Council President. Yesterday we learned
3 about a new proposed development for a
4 new police headquarters at 400 North
5 Broad Street. As a nephew of two former
6 police officers, our hard-working men and
7 women of the Philadelphia Police
8 Department deserve a new facility. This
9 development provides an opportunity for a
10 significant upgrade in the public safety
11 in our city. A new building would
12 provide a new headquarters, a combined
13 Fire/Police communications system, and a
14 new Morgan Toxicology Lab. Further, this
15 development is another major economic
16 development project in our city. As
17 proposed, this new development is a \$290
18 million project.

19 The time of this project could
20 not be better. Recently Councilwoman
21 Blackwell announced a major new program
22 that provides a pathway into the building
23 trades at projects at Penn. Further, and
24 as a part of the Rebuild program, the
25 Administration is working on an MOU with

2 the building trades to create a pathway
3 to union membership.

4 As the proposed future owner of
5 400 North Broad Street as our police
6 headquarters, I call on the
7 Administration to use these examples from
8 Rebuild and Penn to create an opportunity
9 for minority and women workers to become
10 union members and for minority and
11 women-owned businesses to have a
12 significant opportunity to be a part of
13 this \$290 million project.

14 We all know that poverty is one
15 of the biggest issues that face our city.
16 Through this project, we have an
17 opportunity to address poverty by
18 enabling those that have often been left
19 out of major development projects a
20 chance to participate in our local
21 economy.

22 Thank you, Council President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilman.

25 The Chair recognizes Councilman

3 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
4 Council President. Just another
5 reminder, after Council inside the
6 Council Caucus Room we will be hosting a
7 reentry reception with the various
8 organizations who are down here visiting
9 us for Reentry Month.

10 And also on June the 2nd, in
11 honor of National Gun Violence Awareness
12 Day, I will be hosting an inter-faith
13 prayer vigil and rally to recognize and
14 address the issue of gun violence
15 downstairs on the plaza at 11:00 a.m. So
16 I'll make sure everyone receives a copy
17 of the information if they would like to
18 come out and stand against gun violence.
19 But also just as a city, I think we need
20 to do a reality check in the current
21 state of the City of Philadelphia as it
22 relates to youth violence.

23 My heart was saddened early on
24 this week when I watched a mother on
25 television cry and a family member

2 talking about moving out of their
3 neighborhood because two young men
4 went -- two thugs decided to ride up on a
5 bicycle and shoot indiscriminately at
6 another young man while he had his
7 two-year-old son on the porch with him,
8 and the two-year-old son was shot four
9 times, but through the grace of God, that
10 young man is doing okay now.

11 And so I'm always staying on
12 this case. This is something I'm
13 passionate about. But we will never be a
14 great city until we address this issue
15 comprehensively.

16 I thank you for your leadership
17 and encouragement through the
18 conversations that you and I have been
19 having, Council President, as it relates
20 to this issue, as well as Councilman
21 Curtis Jones through our late night
22 conversations regarding how we're going
23 to be addressing these issues in our
24 various districts.

25 So that information will be

2 forthcoming to everyone, but let's
3 continue to make sure we keep our pulse
4 on the issue of youth gun violence and
5 gun violence in general here in the City
6 of Philadelphia.

7 Thank you, Council President.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for
10 keeping the issue alive.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman
12 Jones.

13 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
14 Mr. President. I too was a part of the
15 briefing on the proposed headquarters at
16 400 North Broad. I support it. I
17 believe, like my colleague, Councilman
18 Green, that our officers have the
19 daunting job and need a world-class,
20 first-class headquarters. So I support
21 that project.

22 However, I also support that
23 the facility at 4601 Market Street needs
24 to be renovated. That place has been
25 vacant for over a dozen years. It serves

2 as the gateway into West Philadelphia.

3 It, before that, was besieged by the El

4 construction, was left pretty much

5 unattended, and then we put a great deal

6 of effort in that.

7 So I am for that, but I don't

8 want to neglect 46th and Market, because

9 that is not my district but it is the

10 gateway to my district. All development

11 will feed off of that particular

12 cornerstone on Market Street.

13 So as we look to upgrading

14 facilities, as we look to establishing a

15 world-class headquarters, do not forget

16 the cornerstone of West Philadelphia,

17 which is 4601 Market Street, and we need

18 development there. We need jobs there.

19 We also enjoy Center City, but there are

20 neighborhoods, those middle neighborhoods

21 that my colleague talks about, that need

22 that economic stimulus there.

23 So I look forward to the plans

24 that the Administration has, the RFP that

25 they should let so that maybe service

2 industries find a home and a
3 headquarters, so maybe that some of the
4 agri-grow that my colleague Taubenberger
5 talks about can be there, but let's show
6 some vision for West Philly.

7 Thank you, Mr. President.
