17   assembled City Council. I pray for the  
18   agenda set before them today, and please  
19   give an assurance of what would please  
20   you and what would benefit those who live  
21   and work here in the City of  
22   Philadelphia.

23            Finally, Father, renew us with

25   of helping to build our city worthy of

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you so much, Reverend, for those  
10 inspiring words.

11 Council will be at ease.

12 (Council at ease.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you. The next order of business is  
15 the approval of the Journal of the  
16 meeting of Thursday, May 25th, 2017, and  
17 the Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

18 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

19 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
20 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, May  
21 25th, 2017 be approved.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It  
24 has been moved and properly seconded that  
25 the Journal of the meeting of Thursday,

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Those opposed?

8 (No response.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
10 ayes have it, and the Journal is  
11 approved.

12 Councilman Green, did you want  
13 to be recognized now?

14 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Yes, at your  
15 pleasure. Thank you, Council President.  
16 I just wanted to acknowledge Ed McBride  
17 from PECO is here. He has a number of  
18 students with him that PECO has hired for  
19 the summer. My understanding is that  
20 Robin Bell, who is attending LaSalle  
21 University, Briana Crocker attending West  
22 Chester University, Samantha Dibali (ph)  
23 attending the University of Delaware,  
24 Jack Mosley attends Colorado College. In  
25 total, PECO has 70 direct co-ops this

3 high school students. I just wanted to  
4 thank PECO/Exelon for their work in  
5 encouraging our youth to join Exelon and  
6 to provide them with career training over  
7 the summer.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 The Chair recognizes  
12 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
14 Mr. President. Let me just echo  
15 Councilman Green's remarks. Any higher  
16 ed institution that wraps their arms  
17 around young people during their growth  
18 stage deserves to be recognized, so we  
19 need to thank PECO for that.

20 In the spirit of celebrating  
21 higher ed institutions and their alumnae,  
22 I believe it's great always to seize the  
23 moment to lift up a Penn State alum, who  
24 is a friend of this City Council and  
25 joins us every Thursday morning to see

3       this morning I wanted to seize the moment  
4       to congratulate one of good friends of  
5       City Council for his distinguished alumni  
6       award that was bestowed upon him by my

8       has a deep love and loyalty to Penn State  
9       that has been clearly demonstrated by his  
10      actions having served on the Pension  
11      Board for a number of years. Coupled  
12      with that, he has served as a  
13      philanthropist, advisor, and mentor to  
14      many, including me, and is dedicated to  
15      helping students develop professionally  
16      while investing in the time they have in  
17      Penn State.

18                 This past weekend he was  
19      celebrated. He's an alum of Penn State.  
20      And I ask all to join me in saluting our  
21      friend Nick Maiale. And he would say, we  
22      are?

23                         (Penn State.)

24                         COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Penn  
25      State.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
4 Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilwoman.

7 The next order of business is  
8 requests -- Councilman Johnson, did you  
9 want to be recognized?

10 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yes.

11 Thank you, Council President. I just  
12 want to acknowledge I have a group of  
13 students from Mastery Cleveland Campus  
14 who are here observing us today, a varied  
15 group of astute young men with their -- I  
16 just want to give them a round of  
17 applause.

19 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,

14          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
15     Thank you, Councilman. Leave shall be  
16     granted, and the Chair thanks the  
17     gentleman.

18          The Chair recognizes Councilman  
19     O'Neill.

20          COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
21     Mr. President. On behalf of the  
22     republicans, there are no requests for  
23     leave of absence.

24          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
25     Chair thanks the gentleman.

2                   At this time, I would like to  
3 dispense with the regular order of  
4 business and I would like to welcome and  
5 thank everyone who has come down today to  
6 witness their government in action. I  
7 would hope your stay today is an  
8 enjoyable one and a knowledgeable one, so  
9 much so that you would like to come back  
10 again. So we really appreciate it, and  
11 we'll see you the next time you come.  
12 Thank you.

13                   At this time, the Chair  
14 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who  
15 will present a resolution on my behalf to  
16 my good friend Kevin Upshur. Would  
17 Mr. Upshur and those accompanying him  
18 please join the Councilwoman at the  
19 podium.

20                   (Councilmembers and guests  
21 approached podium.)

22                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
23 Always humble. I love it.

24                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
25 you for the honor, Mr. President.

2                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3    Thank you, Councilwoman.

4                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

5    Resolution on behalf of our President,  
6    President Darrell Clarke, honoring and  
7    recognizing Kevin Upshur and the  
8    Strawberry Mansion Learning Center for  
9    their outstanding work throughout the  
10   Strawberry Mansion Community.

11                   Whereas, Kevin Upshur is a  
12   graduate of Strawberry Mansion High  
13   School and attended Cheyney University.

14                   All right.

15                   (Applause.)

16                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: For  
17   over 20 years he has worked as a social  
18   worker, most recently as a youth  
19   detention counselor, serving as a mentor  
20   for hundreds of kids; and

21                   Whereas, in 2008 Kevin founded  
22   the Strawberry Mansion Learning Center  
23   where he transformed his mother's local  
24   bar into an education and resource center  
25   with after-school and mentoring programs

2           for the youth of Strawberry Mansion; and

3                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, his

4           work at the center has been guided by the

5           words of his late mother, Shirley, who

6           died in 2006, urging Kevin to give back

7           to the community to help curb the

8           violence by creating a place where young

9           people could learn. "My mother is the

10          motivation in this," he told the Daily

11          News during an interview in 2013; and

12                   Whereas, the Strawberry Mansion

13          Learning Center has become a safe haven

14          for kids in the neighborhood by providing

15          access to computers, libraries, healthy

16          meals, trips for students. By providing

17          a productive outlet for Philadelphia

18          youth, the Strawberry Mansion Learning

19          Center hopes to reduce crime among the

20          students; and

21                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,

22          during the summer of 2016 while world was

23          focused on Philadelphia during the

24          Democratic National Convention, the

25          Huffington Post visited North

2 Philadelphia and Strawberry Mansion  
3 Learning Center while filming a story on  
4 gun violence. This placed a national  
5 spotlight on the center for its positive  
6 work in a challenging environment; and

7           Whereas, in August of 2016, a  
8 GoFundMe page was created to raise money  
9 for the center's kitchen and bathroom  
10 renovation project. Because of the  
11 initial video posted by the Huffington  
12 Post, GoFundMe decided to spotlight the  
13 center's mission and donated the first  
14 \$2,000 in the fundraising campaign; and

15           COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
16 because of Kevin's great work, NBC News  
17 Anchor Lester Holt visited the center to  
18 highlight the work in the community in a  
19 story that aired nationally. Almost  
20 overnight, GoFundMe donations began  
21 pouring in from people across the  
22 country; and

23           Whereas, Kevin has also been  
24 featured on the Rachel Ray Show where he  
25 was presented with a \$25,000 donation

2           from Philadelphia based Beneficial Bank;

3                       COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Now

4           therefore be it resolved, that the

5           Council of the City of Philadelphia

6           hereby honors and recognizes Kevin Upshur

7           and the Strawberry Mansion Learning

8           Center for their outstanding work

9           throughout the Strawberry Mansion

10          Community.

11                       Be it further resolved, that an

12          engrossed copy be presented to Kevin

13          Upshur as evidence of the true and

14          sincere sentiments of this legislative

15          body.

16                       And this was introduced and

17          sponsored by the President. I'm happy to

18          join him, and we are happy that all

19          members are pleased to be a part of it.

20                       Thank you.

21                       (Applause.)

22                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

23          the Chair recognizes Kevin Upshur for

24          remarks. Go ahead, sir.

25                       MR. UPSHUR: I'm just very

2 honored to be here. It's really  
3 emotional for me, because my mother  
4 actually said, You got to do something.  
5 And I didn't know exactly what to do,  
6 because I was already working with young  
7 people over 20 years in youth detention  
8 at the Youth Study Center. So as time  
9 went on, we transformed the bar, because  
10 we had a building to work with. So we  
11 put books in the building. I said let's  
12 open up a bookstore, and people were  
13 saying, You're crazy. Open a bookstore  
14 at 30th and Dauphin? Nothing is going to  
15 happen, you know. But really it wasn't  
16 about money. It was just about trying to  
17 make a difference and have an impact.  
18 And everybody in this room, I look  
19 around, has been an influence, an  
20 encouragement. Councilwoman Jannie  
21 Blackwell who has given us Lucien  
22 Blackwell Humanitarian Award, it touched  
23 me really deeply, because I said if I can  
24 get something in honor of her husband,  
25 that means I must be doing the right

2     thing, and I really appreciate that. And  
3     I think about my mom all the time,  
4     because that was -- we listen to our  
5     parents. They tell you things that will  
6     help you to go the extra mile. So what  
7     my mom told me, I think about it. I  
8     said, wow, she really told me to do the  
9     right thing, and I'm following up and  
10    we're doing good things. We have an  
11    impact.

12                   And I'd like to thank  
13    Councilman Clarke, President Clarke, and  
14    his staff. They're always there to help.  
15    Councilman Clarke stops by -- sometimes I  
16    think he has a key. I mean, he just pops  
17    up, and he's like, What's going on, Kev?  
18    How you doing, man? On Saturdays, you  
19    know, you stand on the corner like one of  
20    the corner boys, you know.

21                   So everybody in this room, I  
22    just want you to know, I appreciate being  
23    here. It's an honor. And as I look  
24    around and see all the Councilpeople, who  
25    you don't know you encourage me. When I

2           turn on the television and see meetings,  
3           Council meetings, I'm encouraged. I'm  
4           watching it, I'm saying, wow, people are  
5           making a difference.

6                        So thank you so much.

7           Appreciate your time.

8                        (Appplause.)

9                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10          Council will be at ease.

11                       (Council at ease.)

12                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13          Thank you very much.

14                       And one more time we will  
15          recognize Councilwoman Blackwell, who  
16          will present a resolution honoring  
17          Cheyney University. Would Jasmine  
18          Sessoms and those accompanying her please  
19          join the Councilwoman at the podium.

20                       Here we go.

21                       (Councilmembers and guests  
22          approached podium.)

23                       COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

24          Mr. President and members of Council, as  
25          Jannie from Cheyney, I'm proud to make

2       this presentation. We welcome Jasmine  
3       Sessoms, Director of University  
4       Advancement for External Relations, and  
5       certainly Chantelle Fitzgerald, President  
6       of Cheyney Foundation, who honored me and  
7       three others. And I would say I would  
8       have held it up if I knew that Michael  
9       Coard, heeding Cheyney's call, could not  
10      be here. I was just at a meeting with  
11      him this week, Monday or Tuesday, where  
12      he's always fighting for Cheyney  
13      University.

14                I have so many people, my  
15      family, from Lu's grand-kids to sisters  
16      to sisters-in-law to nieces. One day  
17      when we have a program, I'll invite all  
18      of them, and people will wonder if  
19      there's anybody else left after my family  
20      is included.

21                Resolution honoring Cheyney  
22      University of Pennsylvania on the  
23      occasion of its 180th Founders Day  
24      celebration.

25                Whereas, Cheyney University was

2   founded as the African Institute on  
3   February 25th, 1837, through the bequest  
4   of the Quaker philanthropist Richard  
5   Humphries, who envisioned an institution,  
6   "to instruct the descendants of the  
7   African race in school learning, in the  
8   various branches of the mechanical arts,  
9   trades and agriculture, in order to  
10  prepare, fit and qualify people to act as  
11  teachers" -- you know it's the oldest one  
12  in our country too -- and

13           COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the  
14  institution that would later become  
15  Cheyney University, originally known as  
16  the Institute for Colored Youth, operated  
17  at various locations in and around the  
18  City of Philadelphia until 1902, when its  
19  Board of Managers recommended the  
20  purchase of George Cheyney's farm at  
21  Cheyney Station, roughly 25 miles west of  
22  Philadelphia; and

23           Whereas, in 1914, after a  
24  suggestion by newly hired President  
25  Leslie Pinckney Hill that its name should

2     better reflect the nature of the school  
3     and the purpose of its work, the school's  
4     name was officially changed to Cheyney  
5     Training School for Teachers; and

6                   Whereas, in 1922, after more  
7     than eight decades under the direction of  
8     a Quaker Board of Managers, Cheyney was  
9     purchased by the Commonwealth of  
10    Pennsylvania for \$75,000; and

11                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, in  
12    1930, Pennsylvania's Council of Education  
13    recommended an extension of the school's  
14    curricula, leading to the first awarding  
15    of baccalaureate degrees in 1932; and

16                   Whereas, in 1951, following the  
17    recommendation of the Middle States  
18    Association, Cheyney Training School for  
19    Teachers became Cheyney State Teachers  
20    College, and by legislative act in 1959,  
21    the school's name was changed yet again,  
22    this time to Cheyney State College; and

23                   Whereas, the Pennsylvania State  
24    System of Higher Education was  
25    established by statute on July 1st, 1983,

2   and by joining the System as a charter  
3   member, Cheyney State College became  
4   Cheyney University of Pennsylvania; and  
5           COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
6   Cheyney University has produced more than  
7   30,000 graduates, a good number of whom  
8   ascended to positions of leadership in  
9   our City and Commonwealth, and some, like  
10   the late "60 Minutes" correspondent Ed  
11   Bradley, the late legendary civil rights  
12   activist Bayard Rustin, and Philadelphia  
13   Tribune publisher and CEO Robert Bogle,  
14   and the late great Barbara Daniel-Cox,  
15   who helped soror Dorothy Height bring the  
16   Black Family Reunion to Philadelphia,  
17   rose to the top of their respective  
18   professions; and

19           Whereas, today, Cheyney  
20   University students, who represent a  
21   variety of races, cultures, and  
22   nationalities, still become teachers, but  
23   also enter careers such as journalism,  
24   medicine, business, science and  
25   technology, law, communications, and

2 government; now, therefore, be it

3           COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

4 Resolved, by the Council of the City of  
5 Philadelphia, that Council does honor  
6 Cheyney University of Pennsylvania on the  
7 occasion of its 180th Founders Day  
8 celebration.

9           Resolved further, that an  
10 engrossed copy of this resolution be  
11 presented to Cheyney University of  
12 Pennsylvania evidencing the sincere  
13 admiration and respect of our legislative  
14 body.

15           And in addition to all those  
16 who stand here who co-sponsored this,  
17 this was sponsored and signed by each and  
18 every member of City Council.

19           Thank you, Mr. President.

20           (Applause.)

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
22 the Chair recognizes Ms. Sessoms for  
23 remarks.

24           MS. SESSOMS: I'll be brief.  
25 Thank you to Philadelphia City Council.

6                    We look forward to serving the  
7    community. We're in our 180th year and  
8    we're going to be here for 180 more. So  
9    thank you for this honor.

10                   (Applause.)

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That  
12    was brief. Thank you very much.

13                   Council will be at ease.

14                   (Council at ease.)

15                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16    Thank you.

17                   The Chair recognizes  
18    Councilwoman Bass.

19                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
20    Mr. President. I just wanted to  
21    acknowledge that we've been joined by  
22    some students from Martin Luther King  
23    High School, and we have the privilege  
24    and honor of hosting the Augusta Clark  
25    Institute for Local Politics at Martin

3   we're pleased to have them and also  
4   Principal Keisha Wilkins, if they could

6                    (Appause.)

7           COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you.

9   Thank you for coming down today. We  
10 really appreciate it.

11                   Thank you, Councilwoman.

12                   The next order of business is  
13 communications, and the Chair requests  
14 that the Sergeant-of-Arms delivers the

5                   And I am submitting herewith  
6       for the consideration of your honorable  
7       body a resolution authorizing the  
8       Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority to  
9       execute and deliver to the Philadelphia  
10      Land Bank deeds conveying title to  
11      certain properties located in the Fifth  
12      Councilmanic District; and

13                   A resolution approving the  
14      redevelopment contract of the  
15      Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority for  
16      the redevelopment and urban renewal of a  
17      portion of the Cecil B. Moore Avenue  
18      Urban Renewal Area, identified by house  
19      numbers and street addresses as 1405  
20      Jefferson Street and 1407 Jefferson  
21      Street; and

22                   A resolution approving the  
23      redevelopment contract of the

14                   An ordinance authorizing the  
15   Procurement Commissioner, on behalf of  
16   the City of Philadelphia, to enter into a  
17   an agreement with the Philadelphia  
18   Municipal Authority to provide for the  
19   acquisition of Bigbelly waste and  
20   recycling receptacles, related  
21   maintenance and software licensing, and  
22   authorizing an advertising concession,

10  key building block for economic  
11  opportunity, and higher energy prices

21  human beings, as citizens than the air we

23               Here's the fact: One day we  
24  are going to hand over the keys,

10                      Every day from one sunrise to  
11           the next we can expect three or four  
12           Philadelphians to get shot and/or  
13           murdered. That's not right, and it's  
14           totally unacceptable.

15                      Shootings are so common if you  
16           go to a Philadelphia classroom and ask  
17           the young boys and girls whether they  
18           know somebody who has been shot, every  
19           one of their hands will probably go up.  
20           I know because I have visited classrooms  
21           and recreation centers and asked that  
22           question. I also know because I was one  
23           of those young men who witnessed a family  
24           member being murdered. I've personally  
25           taken the crushing blow of hearing that a

2    loved one has lost his life to gun  
3    violence.

4           The devastating impact that gun  
5    violence has had on our communities  
6    should never be accepted. We have  
7    focused our attention and resources on  
8    many of the major problems of the City,  
9    but we have yet to do so specifically on  
10   the issue of gun violence.

11           The Special Committee that this  
12   resolution establishes will dictate  
13   itself to two goals, neither of which has  
14   been ever undertaken here in the City of  
15   Philadelphia. First, to facilitate  
16   ongoing coordination by stakeholders  
17   across sectors and disciplines. Second,  
18   to form a comprehensive citywide  
19   strategic plan for gun violence and  
20   prevention. That plan may vary in  
21   specifics from neighborhood to  
22   neighborhood, but throughout the City it  
23   will be thorough, evidence-based, and  
24   accountable.

25           The committee's first order of

2 business will be to develop preliminary  
3 action items, along with deadlines for  
4 those action items.

5                   I want to recognize my primary  
6 co-sponsors, first and foremost, you,  
7 Council President Darrell Clarke,

9 Safety, Councilman Curtis Jones, for  
10 their support, as well as the Kenney  
11 Administration for being a key part of  
12 this undertaking.

13                   We have no time to lose. In  
14 the words of Reverend Dr. Martin Luther  
15 King, Jr., "We are now faced with the  
16 fact that tomorrow is today. We are  
17 confronted with the fierce urgency of  
18 now. This unfolding conundrum of life  
19 and history, there is such a thing as  
20 being too late. This is no time for  
21 apathy or complacency. This is a time  
22 for vigorous and positive action."

23                   And, again, Council President,  
24 I want to thank you for your support, our  
25 late night talks about how this issue

2       needs to be aggressively addressed, not  
3       only now but for the long term. If we're  
4       ever going to be a great city, that means  
5       we need to make sure our young people are  
6       safe, our neighborhoods are safe. We

9       for help because her two-year-old son was  
10      shot four times and the individuals who  
11      shot this young child haven't even been  
12      apprehended yet. So we want to stay on

8 people were gathered -- and they're going  
9 to plan an event so that we can gather  
10 and have the opportunity, because we

17 Ahmeenah and mentorship and trailblazing,

21   something that we don't often see, is  
22   that when people mentor, lots of times  
23   people say, I created that entity or that  
24   person, as if they brought nothing along.  
25   For everyone that she promoted, you never

7 members of the City Council. My name is  
8 Will Luttrell. I am an entrepreneur,  
9 software engineer, and investor with a  
10 specific focus in advertising technology  
11 and proud Philly resident.

12 Most recently, I'm founder and  
13 CEO of Currency Inc. I'm here today to  
14 testify against Governor Wolf's proposed  
15 technology tax.

16 I moved to Philadelphia from  
17 New Jersey in 2005. In 2008, I  
18 co-founded Integral Ad Science as Chief  
19 Technology Officer. I am proud to say  
20 that we took a small team of three  
21 founders, a few interns and grew it into  
22 a 400-person company with over \$100  
23 million in annual revenue in 2016.

24 Unfortunately, this is not a  
25 Philly success story. That company was

2   built in New York City on the backs of  
3   thousands of hours of Amtrak travel from  
4   my home to Manhattan.

5                       Shortly before founding  
6   Integral, I was contacted by venture  
7   capital friends to do technical due

9   based in Center City Philadelphia. That  
10   company was Invite Media, subsequently  
11   acquired by Google in 2010 for \$81  
12   million. As a division within Google,  
13   that company has grown into the largest  
14   programmatic ad-buying platform in the  
15   world worth billions of dollars and  
16   creating hundreds, perhaps thousands of  
17   jobs.

18                      Unfortunately, this is also not  
19   a Philly success story. By the time of  
20   the Google acquisition, most of Invite's  
21   employees and operations had moved to New  
22   York City, which is where Invite lives on  
23   today under the name DoubleClick Bid  
24   Manager.

25                      When I decided to start

8       either headquartered or has a presence  
9       there. Working capital is easy to raise  
10      there. The network of experienced sales,  
11      marketing, product executive, engineering  
12      talent is robust. But I chose Philly.  
13      It's a city where I live and love, where  
14      I'm raising my child and planting my  
15      roots.

16                    In addition to the business  
17      thesis of my company, we also have the  
18      thesis that this type of company can be  
19      built right here in City limits. We have  
20      launched in January and currently employ  
21      15 people in our office at 19th and  
22      Market. We are recruiting employees from  
23      New York City and from New Jersey instead  
24      of the other way around.

25                    But our future in Philly is in

2   jeopardy. As we move from these humble  
3   beginnings, a new additional 6 percent  
4   sales tax on our services will create an  
5   undeniable incentive to move our  
6   operations out of the City and out of the  
7   state. The addition of this tax will  
8   impact the many software services we  
9   consume, adding to our costs and hitting  
10   us further on both ends, exacerbating the  
11   situation.

12                 If this tax is imposed on our  
13   industry, the highest in its kind in the  
14   country, you're saying loud and clear we  
15   don't want tech industry here. You're  
16   telling the Googles and the Facebooks do  
17   not expand here or be subject to this  
18   tax. You're saying do not invest in tech  
19   companies here or be subject to the tax,  
20   which is a killer of companies like mine,  
21   and, finally, have the worst possible  
22   outcome. Once a company grows to be  
23   successful and perhaps looking to be  
24   acquired, a tech tax in PA might  
25   literally force them to move before

2           completing the transaction, a disaster.

3                     Pushing the high growth tech  
4           companies out of the state in the pursuit  
5           of short-term tax gains is the wrong  
6           approach and will leave Pennsylvania and  
7           Philly behind the modern economy.

8                     Thank you so much for your time  
9           today.

10                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you for your testimony.

12                    THE CLERK: Lauren Schwartz,  
13           commenting on 170584.

14                    (Witness approached podium.)

15                    MS. SCHWARTZ: Hello, and thank  
16           you very much for your time. My name is  
17           Lauren Schwartz. I'm the CEO and owner  
18           of TechWise Group, a Microsoft Gold  
19           Partner that provides technology services  
20           to small and growing businesses in the  
21           Greater Pennsylvania region. I have  
22           spent my entire career in technology  
23           working with and for some of the largest  
24           companies and some of the smallest.

25                    Today I am speaking to you on

1           6/8/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2    behalf of the hundreds of smaller  
3    businesses that TechWise Group supports  
4    and the one million small businesses,  
5    over 98 percent of the businesses in the  
6    state, that provide jobs for 2.4 million  
7    people. These businesses are the  
8    physicians practices, the law offices,  
9    consulting companies, manufacturers,  
10   construction firms, restaurant chains,  
11   retailers, farmers, you name it, that  
12   provide needed services and create jobs  
13   in this region. Each of these businesses  
14   are also technology companies. No  
15   business, regardless of size, can do what  
16   they do without technology, and these  
17   businesses are the ones who will be most  
18   impacted by reinstating the tech tax  
19   imposed in 1991 and lifted in part in  
20   1997.

21                    Small businesses must invest in  
22   their technology to modernize and protect  
23   against cyber threats that are increasing  
24   every day. They invest in technology to  
25   grow and to compete. They invest in

2    technology to protect their information,  
3    process orders, service their clients,  
4    and so many other things. In short,  
5    technology to them is not a luxury.

6           These technology investments  
7    are paid for from limited budgets, loans  
8    when attainable, and directly from the  
9    pockets of the owners of the business.

10   The most powerful and innovative  
11   technology investments in areas like  
12   marketing automation, client relationship  
13   management, collaboration, and data  
14   analytics require significant technology  
15   consulting to configure, customize, and  
16   integrate. Imposing a 6 percent tax on  
17   the services needed to configure,  
18   customize, and integrate technologies is  
19   more than an additional cost or an  
20   additional strain on limited budgets.

21   Reinstating this tax is saying to small  
22   business owners, all one million of them,  
23   that Pennsylvania wants to place tax on  
24   their efforts to grow, their ability to  
25   create jobs, and Pennsylvania wants to

2 tax innovation, sending us back to 1991.

3           Thank you for your  
4 consideration.

5           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you for your testimony.

7           THE CLERK: Dean Miller,  
8 commenting on 170584.

9           (Witness approached podium.)

10          MR. MILLER: Good afternoon.

11 Thank you to the City Council for having  
12 us here and to Councilman Oh for  
13 sponsoring this important resolution. I  
14 am Dean Miller, the President and CEO of  
15 the Philadelphia Alliance for Capital and  
16 Technologies, which is the largest  
17 membership and trade organization focused  
18 on the technology community in and around  
19 Philadelphia, and we thank you for having  
20 us here today to talk about the tech tax.  
21 It is officially known in the  
22 Commonwealth as the computer services  
23 tax, and as you've just heard from two  
24 CEOs and will hear from two more, it is a  
25 job killer. It is a job killer. It's a

2   6 percent tax on computer services,  
3   custom software development, and a host  
4   of other computer-related and  
5   technology-related taxes that will kill  
6   the technology growth that we have so  
7   experienced here in Philadelphia in  
8   particular.

9           There are only three other  
10   states in the land that tax these things,  
11   and they do so at half the rate of what  
12   has been proposed by the Commonwealth.  
13   They are Hawaii, South Dakota, and New  
14   Hampshire, not major tech hubs. None of  
15   our surrounding states tax these areas of  
16   technology services.

17           And the most important thing to  
18   leave you with is this: These jobs are  
19   portable. They don't require real  
20   estate. They don't require physical  
21   space. The people can pick up their  
22   computers with their Internet connections  
23   and they can move across the bridge to  
24   New Jersey, down south into Delaware or  
25   even quite simply to Texas, South

2    America, Central America or India. These  
3    are jobs that have been increasingly  
4    coming here to Philadelphia. They're  
5    coming here because of the great  
6    resources that we have with our wonderful  
7    universities, but they can leave very  
8    quickly as soon as they're taxed. And  
9    we're talking about jobs and important  
10   technology developments both for small  
11   businesses, medium-sized businesses, and  
12   large businesses. It's across the board.

13                    So we encourage you to pass  
14   this resolution against the technology  
15   tax, again the computer services tax  
16   proposed by the Governor and the  
17   Commonwealth, and we thank you again here  
18   today.

19                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20   Thank you for your testimony, sir.

21                    THE CLERK: Alex  
22   Urevick-Ackelsburg, commenting on 170584.

23                    (Witness approached podium.)

24                    MR. UREVICK-ACKELSBURG: Hello.  
25   I'd just like to quickly thank Councilman

2       Oh and the rest of Council for letting me  
3       speak on this issue. This is an  
4       extremely distressing issue to my  
5       company, Zivtech. We are a web  
6       development, design, and software company  
7       based right across the street at One  
8       South Broad.

9                   I'm a lifelong Philadelphian  
10       and graduate of Philly public high  
11       schools and we've created 25 jobs here  
12       over the last nine years that are very  
13       well paying. And for us there's a couple  
14       really big problems with the tax. Number  
15       one is that it's really picking winners  
16       and losers and isn't fair, and we hope  
17       that that alone would have you support  
18       it. In a state where no retirement  
19       income is taxed, we feel like either  
20       retirement income or even an increase in  
21       the income tax would be more fair than  
22       taxing one industry alone 6 percent.

23                   We work with a large number of  
24       international clients, some who have  
25       Pennsylvania locations, and we compete

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2 against not just other states but other  
3 countries that don't have the same sorts  
4 of standards of living and costs  
5 associated with being here in the United  
6 States, and 6 percent would, for most  
7 service businesses, be equivalent to the  
8 majority of their margins, because  
9 service businesses are, generally  
10 speaking, not extremely profitable, and  
11 most service businesses are just small  
12 one- or two-person contractors or shops.

13 So we believe also that at  
14 Zivtech that we would have a really hard  
15 time dealing with this, because a lot of  
16 our contracts with big clients stipulates  
17 that we would be responsible for that  
18 sales tax if it was to be enacted. So  
19 that would essentially prevent us from  
20 either working with that company or  
21 move -- would necessitate us moving to  
22 New Jersey or Delaware where those  
23 companies also have locations.

24 I also would just like to  
25 mention that this is really a tax on the

2 Philadelphia region and the Pittsburgh  
3 region. These are industries that are  
4 creating jobs in these areas. They may  
5 not be creating as many jobs in rural  
6 counties in Pennsylvania, but this is  
7 really going to disproportionately affect  
8 our region and our economy.

9           Thank you very much.

10           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12           CHIEF CLERK: David Bookspan,  
13 commenting on 170584.

14           (Witness approached podium.)

15           MR. BOOKSPAN: Good afternoon,  
16 President Clarke and distinguished  
17 members of City Council. My name is  
18 David Bookspan. I have started four tech  
19 companies in Pennsylvania. I am founder  
20 and Executive Chairman of Currency Inc.,  
21 which I started with Mr. Luttrell, who  
22 testified earlier. I'm also founder and  
23 Board member of Monetate, founder and  
24 Board member of DreamIt, and was founder  
25 and CEO of MarketSpan, which today is

2           LexusNexus CourtLink.

3                         I'm here today to urge the

4           passage of the resolution opposing

5           proposed taxes for technology and

6           computer services in Pennsylvania.

7           Technology companies are a huge part of

8           our future. Five of the top six most

9           valuable companies in the world are tech

10          companies. Apple, Alphabet, and Facebook

11          are all located in the Bay area.

12          Microsoft and Amazon are in Seattle. We

13          need to be able to develop those type of

14          companies in Pennsylvania. And to put a

15          finer point on what Mr. Lutrell said

16          earlier, we will have to move Currency,

17          which we think can be a very, very

18          significant company, if this tax is

19          imposed.

20                         We have enough challenges

21          trying to launch a great company in

22          Philadelphia without having the added

23          disadvantage of having to pay 6 percent

24          tax on not only our revenues but also the

25          services that we purchase and use.

2                   Pennsylvania has a lot of  
3 talent, but there are lots of other  
4 places to find talent. If this tax  
5 passes, we're going to lose companies,  
6 and it's not going to be to New Jersey  
7 and Delaware. It's going to be to New  
8 York, Boston, and the Bay area.

9                   When we started DreamIt in  
10 2008, Philadelphia was not far behind New  
11 York. That gulf has widened. This tax  
12 will make it unbridgeable.

13                   I think it will be a lot  
14 smarter for us to try and become in the  
15 21st century to tech what Delaware became  
16 in the 20th century for industrial  
17 companies. There are -- we should make  
18 it an incredibly business-friendly, tech  
19 company-friendly environment, and we  
20 should be recruiting, not chasing away  
21 these companies.

22                   Another example of things that  
23 we will lose if this tax passes is, right  
24 now because of the high cost of living in  
25 the Bay area, lots of those Bay area

2   companies are encouraging people, their  
3   employees, very highly talented and  
4   skilled people, to move elsewhere. You  
5   can work here and live anywhere. We  
6   should be bringing those people to  
7   Pennsylvania. Having a hostile business  
8   environment to tech companies will not  
9   accomplish that.

10           Thank you very much for the  
11   opportunity to testify, and I again urge  
12   the passage of the bill.

13           (Applause.)

14           CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,  
15   commenting on 170198, 170199, 170575, and  
16   170200.

17           (Witness approached podium.)

18           MR. DANIHEL: I'm waiting until  
19   I get my full three minutes.

20           Thank you.

21           This is an official decree of  
22   the people of writ of mandamus quo  
23   warranto and, as such, requires immediate  
24   action and remedy. This Council and  
25   Mayor continue every week to transfer

2 private property to government, possibly  
3 illegally.

4                   As instructed by oath-bound  
5 officials, I paid 23 years for a home I  
6 have not been allowed to occupy since  
7 1993. As instructed by oath-bound  
8 officials, I filed six times for a  
9 Seventh Amendment trial by jury, only to  
10 have oath-bound officials oppose my  
11 God-given right to trial by jury.  
12 Doesn't this clearly violate their oath  
13 of office?

14                   The Constitution, Article I,  
15 Section 10 requires payment before  
16 taking. Since a self-identified HUD  
17 agent sold me the home, was Philadelphia  
18 paid hundreds of millions of federal  
19 taxpayer dollars to justly compensate all  
20 of Logan but spend only 34 million  
21 compensating most of Logan? Why was I  
22 never paid? Has Philadelphia  
23 Redevelopment Authority announced upwards  
24 of 100 million, mostly federal dollars,  
25 to build a mall on my stolen home? Why

2       was I required to pay 23 years and told  
3       hundreds of times that it would violate  
4       the Constitution and laws not to  
5       reimburse me for government-caused  
6       delays? Why was no due process, just  
7       compensation or trial by jury allowed?

8                    Are oath-bound officials above  
9       the law? The constitutions require  
10      immediate remedy of this breach of law.  
11      Your oath of office requires you to act  
12      or face prison. 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985,  
13      1986, 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384,  
14      PA Constitution, Article I, Section 1  
15      through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,  
16      712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in  
17      SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear  
18      violated.

19                   I call for the federal and  
20      Commonwealth governments to perform their  
21      constitutional obligations to investigate  
22      and prosecute all involved in the theft  
23      and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
24      1038 West Wyoming. The denial of  
25      God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for

1           6/8/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2    23 years is egregious, extraordinary,  
3    oath-violating, and requires immediate  
4    remedy.

5           A just government must obey the  
6    rule of law. This color of law  
7    government must have its Charter to  
8    govern revoked until a constitutionally  
9    compliant government is installed.

10           Public servants cannot refuse  
11   their sworn duty to act any more than a  
12   fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
13   sovereign people require Constitution and  
14   laws be enforced. Jail is required for  
15   all who violate oath or law.

16           I remind Council, it takes a  
17   lot of cooperation to create and allow  
18   monumental corruption.

19           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
20   Thank you for your testimony, sir.

21           CHIEF CLERK: Ann Montgomery,  
22   commenting on 170583.

23           (Witness approached podium.)

24           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
25   afternoon.

2                   MS. MONTGOMERY: Thank you. I  
3 would like to especially thank Councilman  
4 Oh, Councilwoman Gym, and Councilman  
5 Taubenberger for supporting this  
6 resolution. Earlier this week -- last  
7 week actually, Pennsylvania lost an  
8 adoptee to a tragic suicide that most of  
9 us never knew about. Philip Clay became  
10 an American at eight years old when he  
11 was adopted by two Pennsylvania residents  
12 and brought from Korea here. But he died  
13 alone, deported, living in Seoul when he  
14 took his life off a 14-story building.

15                   He is not alone. The American  
16 system of adoption is fatally flawed.  
17 Under this system, U.S. children have  
18 been denied the promise of adoption, a  
19 safe, secure, permanent home. As a  
20 society, we do not act in the best  
21 interest of a child when we sanction a  
22 system that endangers children by  
23 providing for childhood, but  
24 intentionally depriving that same child  
25 of a future in America.

2                   Under current law, children  
3 adopted internationally by U.S. citizens  
4 are not guaranteed the most fundamental  
5 right other children receive by virtue of  
6 birth, the right to citizenship. Most  
7 Americans are unaware that the legal  
8 process of adoption on its own does not  
9 confer the right to U.S. citizenship.

10                   The Child Citizenship Act of  
11 2000 grants automatic citizenship to  
12 some, not all, internationally adopted  
13 children. The Child Citizenship Act  
14 excludes two groups, adoptees who are  
15 under the age of 18 when the law was  
16 implemented and for whom their parents  
17 did not complete the naturalization or  
18 adoption process. The second, children  
19 whose adoptions are not finalized in  
20 their birth country. In a lot of cases,  
21 adoptive parents continue to bear the  
22 responsibility to readopt their child in  
23 the U.S., finalize the adoption process  
24 in the U.S. law, and file for  
25 naturalization. History has demonstrated

1           6/8/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2       that not all U.S. adoptive parents are  
3       willing or able to fulfill this  
4       responsibility. One hundred thousand  
5       Korean children were adopted by U.S.  
6       citizen parents. Twenty percent, 20,000  
7       of these children, were never  
8       naturalized.

9           The reasons vary, but the  
10       responsibility lies with the U.S.  
11       government authorities who created this  
12       system and adoptive parents who were  
13       misinformed of their obligations,  
14       neglected to fulfill them or refused.  
15       The U.S. government does not maintain  
16       accurate numbers on international  
17       adoption and does not track the  
18       citizenship. However, we have 354,000  
19       internationally adopted children here in  
20       the United States adopted by U.S.  
21       citizens. If the Korean numbers are  
22       representative, that means we could have  
23       anywhere between 35,000 to 70,000 adults  
24       today legally adopted without the  
25       protection of citizenship.



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2 Does it matter if the number is  
3 20,000, 35,000 or 50,000? Isn't one  
4 child legally adopted by U.S. citizens  
5 but deprived of citizenship too many?

6 So I thank you and encourage  
7 you to support this resolution and  
8 support the Adoptee Citizenship Act,  
9 which will remedy this problem.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you so much for your testimony,  
12 ma'am.

13 CHIEF CLERK: Tiffany Green,  
14 commenting on 170285.

15 (Witness approached podium.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
17 afternoon.

18 MS. GREEN: Good afternoon or  
19 good morning. I'm not sure what time it  
20 is right now.

21 I want to speak on this because  
22 in this bill, you have the word  
23 "permanent." And when you put the word  
24 "permanent" in a bill, that means that  
25 you are saying you are banning community

2 groups and residents from a process, from  
3 a City process that you use taxpayers'  
4 dollars in order to run. You use  
5 taxpayer dollars to hire an RCO  
6 administrator under the Planning  
7 Commission to run the RCO process. So  
8 when you say ban, that's a problem  
9 without an independent appeal process.

10                 If Trump travel ban had went  
11 into place, without an independent appeal  
12 process, you would not have been able to  
13 overturn the travel ban. So why not as  
14 legislators make sure that there is an  
15 independent appeal process. It is not  
16 the community residents' job to come up  
17 with an appeal process. It is the  
18 legislators' job to guarantee due process  
19 right.

20                 The other thing is at this  
21 point, how do you take away your own  
22 power to help your community groups?  
23 You're going to let your community groups  
24 be suspended and when they come to you,  
25 what are you going to say? Oh, we don't

2    have no control, I can't help you. How  
3    do you do that? That's ludicrous to take  
4    away your own power from yourself.

5           The reality of it is is that --  
6    and Solomon said this -- over \$200  
7    million worth of development has come  
8    into this community, with very little  
9    minority participation. It is community  
10   groups that stand up for this and makes  
11   sure it's a level playing field. Why  
12   would you want to ban them? You are  
13   banning them with this permanent.

14           I understand penalties. And  
15   I've gotten e-mails from RCOs that didn't  
16   even know about this bill. They said  
17   they didn't receive any information about  
18   this bill. Why not -- why do you have to  
19   pass it through? Why not have meetings  
20   over the summer, let's come together,  
21   let's talk about some of the issues and  
22   come up with some solutions as opposed to  
23   putting through a bill that bans people  
24   from the process.

25           You have developers who have

2       tons of violations in this community and  
3       they are not banned from doing business  
4       with the City of Philadelphia. You have  
5       tons of developers who have different  
6       types of not following rules and  
7       regulations, but they're not banned, but  
8       why do you want to clamp down on us like  
9       a plantation and keep us reined in for  
10      your own good, but yet you're going to  
11      let the developers from New York and LA  
12      come in here and do what they want to do  
13      without being banned or permanently  
14      suspended from participating with the  
15      City.

16                 I think this bill need to be  
17      put on hold. I'm not saying RCOs are all  
18      good. I don't know what they do out  
19      there. I don't know. But I think that  
20      we need to take some of the language out  
21      of the bill and try to make it more where  
22      we do have some things in place to make  
23      sure people operate correctly, but take  
24      out the word "permanent" and also make  
25      sure that you have oversight over the

2 regulations. You don't have no control  
3 over what regulations are being put  
4 forth. Let's take a look at the  
5 regulations before you put through this  
6 bill. That's all we're asking at this  
7 point. Okay?

8           Thank you very much.

9           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you very much for your testimony.

11           (Applause.)

12           CHIEF CLERK: Emily Cohen.

13           (No response.)

14           CHIEF CLERK: Emily Cohen.

15           (No response.)

16           CHIEF CLERK: There are no  
17 other speakers on the public comment  
18 list, Mr. President.

19           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

21           We will now consider the bills  
22 and resolutions on the Second Reading and  
23 Final Passage Calendar.

24           Mr. Decker, can you please read  
25 the title of 170572.

2           CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
3 adding "Saddiq's Water Ice Way" to the  
4 street signs on South 60th between Locust  
5 and Spruce Streets in recognition of the  
6 great success of Saddiq's Real Fruit  
7 Water Ice and his commitment to providing  
8 public service to seniors and young  
9 people in Philadelphia.

10           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
11 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

12           COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
13 you, Mr. President. I move for the  
14 adoption of the resolution.

15           (Duly seconded.)

16           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
17 been moved and properly seconded.

18           All those in favor say aye.

19           (Aye.)

20           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
21 Those opposed?

22           (No response.)

23           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
24 ayes have it, and Resolution 170572 is  
25 adopted.

2           Mr. Decker, 170573.

3           CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
4 adding Sonny Hill Way to the street signs  
5 on South 50th between Larchwood and Osage  
6 Avenues in recognition of Sonny Hill's  
7 remarkable contributions to the  
8 basketball community in Philadelphia and  
9 his efforts in mentoring young people all  
10 over the City.

11           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
12 Chair again recognizes Councilwoman  
13 Blackwell.

14           COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
15 you, Mr. President. I move for the  
16 adoption of the resolution.

17           (Duly seconded.)

18           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
19 been moved and properly seconded.

20           All those in favor say aye.

21           (Aye.)

22           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
23 Those opposed?

24           (No response.)

25           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

2       ayes have it. Resolution 170573 is

14           (Aye.)

15           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16           Those opposed?

17           (No response.)

18           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

22 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

23          COUNCILMAN HENON: I move for  
24 the adoption of the resolution.

25          (Duly seconded.)

10   ayes have it, and 170581 is adopted.

11                   Mr. Decker, read the title of  
12   170583.

13                   CHIEF CLERK:  A resolution  
14   urging the President of the United States  
15   and the United States Congress to enact  
16   legislation securing the citizenship of  
17   internationally adopted adult  
18   individuals.

19                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  The  
20   Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

21                   COUNCILMAN OH:  Thank you very  
22   much.  I move for the adoption of the  
23   resolution.

24                   (Duly seconded.)

25                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  It's

3           All those in favor say aye.

4           (Aye.)

6       Those opposed?

7           (No response.)

10       is adopted.

11           Mr. Decker, 170584.

12           CHIEF CLERK:   A resolution

13       opposing proposed taxes for technology

14       and computer services in Pennsylvania.

15           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   The

16       Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

17           COUNCILMAN OH:   Thank you very

18       much.   I move for the adoption of the

19       resolution.

20           (Duly seconded.)

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   It's

22       been moved and properly seconded.

23           Before we take the vote, I have

24       to recognize we have Councilman Greenlee.

25           COUNCILMAN GREENLEE:   Thank

1           6/8/17 - STATED - 2ND READING

2       you, Mr. President.

3                       Mr. President, I'll be voting  
4       no on this resolution and I urge other  
5       members to vote no, and it's not because  
6       I necessarily support the tax. I  
7       understand some of the arguments that  
8       were used in public comment. None of us  
9       like taxes, but I think we all know how  
10      difficult it is here in the City to put  
11      together a budget, and I would argue and  
12      I think our colleagues that were former  
13      members of the House would concur that it  
14      probably is even more difficult in  
15      Harrisburg.

16                      This proposal by Governor  
17      Wolf -- and that's what it is right now,  
18      and as we know, in budgets things change.  
19      Things are used as negotiations,  
20      whatever. It's just part of the whole  
21      budget process. And, remember, part of  
22      the reason for it, as I understand -- and  
23      I'm far from an expert on this -- is to  
24      try to take care of a huge deficit that  
25      the state has, and sometimes we have to

2       make difficult decisions. We had to make  
3       them -- we have to make them all the  
4       time. We certainly had to make them last  
5       year when we voted on the soda tax, which  
6       a lot of us necessarily didn't like, but  
7       we felt it was the thing we had to do to  
8       fund the programs that it was going to  
9       fund.

10                So I think it is not in our  
11       place, in my opinion, to take a position  
12       on a piece of Governor Wolf's budget,  
13       something that he and the Legislature is  
14       trying to put together up there. And,  
15       again, while -- and I don't believe a no  
16       vote on this resolution is in support of  
17       the tax. It is basically opposing  
18       getting involved in taking a vote on a  
19       piece of the whole budget process that's  
20       going on up there. I don't think we  
21       would necessarily like our legislators,  
22       and although they do it a lot, take  
23       positions on stuff we do down here, so I  
24       don't think we can criticize them for  
25       doing that to us and then we do that to

2       them.

3                       So I would vote -- I would urge  
4       a no vote on this.   Again, not in support  
5       of the tax but against taking a position  
6       on a piece of the Governor's budget.

7                       Thank you, Mr. President.

8                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9       Thank you, Councilman.

10                      The Chair recognizes Councilman  
11       Domb.

12                      COUNCILMAN DOMB:   Thank you,  
13       Council President.   I just wanted to  
14       share a few facts on this, because I am  
15       in favor of voting for this resolution  
16       even though I'm a democrat.

17                      Pennsylvania Economy League did  
18       a report recently that 25 percent of all  
19       jobs in Philadelphia in the last 14 years  
20       were in technology, 25 percent of all  
21       jobs in Philadelphia the last 14 years,  
22       technology.   It also said that one-third  
23       of those jobs don't require a high school  
24       diploma.   And the message this sends is  
25       wrong to the hundred thousand millennials

2       that have moved here in the last ten  
3       years and the fact that Philadelphia has  
4       the highest percentage of millennial  
5       growth of the largest 20 cities in the  
6       country in the past 12 months. It sends  
7       the wrong message.

8           The other statistics we should  
9       be aware of is the economic job  
10       multiplier of technology. It's five to  
11       one. There's no other industry that's  
12       higher. For every job of tech, five more  
13       jobs get created. And in the  
14       Pennsylvania Economy report it said the  
15       average income of tech is 39,000 higher.

16           But I think the big piece here  
17       is the message this is sending. I  
18       understand the Governor's situation, but  
19       I don't agree that we should be putting a  
20       6 percent tax on the back of the one area  
21       of Philadelphia that's booming, booming  
22       right now and we're attracting young  
23       people here and we want them to stay here  
24       in the City.

25           So for that reason, I'd be

2       voting in favor of this resolution.

3           Thank you.

4           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5       Thank you, Councilman.

6           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
7       Green.

8           COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
9       Council President. This is a difficult  
10      vote. I understand and I want to thank  
11      Councilman Greenlee for his comments in  
12      reference to budget process. We all know  
13      that a budget is not done in isolation.  
14      It's hard to just pick out one piece of  
15      legislation that a body is trying to do.

16           However, when you think about  
17      the impact this legislation would have.  
18      If it was more of a broad-based impact, I  
19      would have less of a concern. However,  
20      this legislation is going to  
21      disproportionately impact the City of  
22      Philadelphia if it were to go into  
23      effect. And if you think about the fact  
24      that we have a high rate of poverty in  
25      this city and some of the issues we're

2     trying to address, it just concerns me  
3     that this type of proposal could go  
4     through and have this type of impact on  
5     our city.

6           I do understand the issues and  
7     concerns that Councilman Greenlee has  
8     articulated and some of the other issues  
9     along with this legislation. I just  
10    think that this proposal will have a  
11    significant impact here in the City of  
12    Philadelphia. And so in that regard, I  
13    do have a concern with some of the  
14    arguments articulated by Councilman  
15    Greenlee and others in reference to their  
16    no vote.

17           So thank you.

18           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19     Thank you, Councilman.

20           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
21     Henon.

22           COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
23     Mr. President. And I also want to echo  
24     and share some of Councilman Green and  
25     Greenlee's considerations when we're

2    talking about the separation of the City,  
3    the sovereignty of the City budget and  
4    the state budget, and the difficulty that  
5    I find, and you with more experience in  
6    City government and being the Council  
7    President and other members here,  
8    understanding that the timing of our  
9    budget that is finalized and voted on  
10   prior to the state's budget really kind  
11   of puts us at a little bit of a  
12   disadvantage, but they have their  
13   challenges, and some of our members or  
14   colleagues and friends here understands  
15   that completely with their experience and  
16   understands the challenges. They have to  
17   deal with 203 members. That's just on  
18   the House side. And then you have a  
19   democratic governor we're relying on on  
20   veto power.

21                 We have major issues here in  
22   the City of Philadelphia that we rely on  
23   the state on. Right now we have the  
24   bifurcation of the constitutional change  
25   with our real estate taxes. We have

2   education funding, having a fair -- a  
3   lawsuit that's in the federal courts with  
4   fair education funding and relying on the  
5   state to really fund our schools with a  
6   little more money so we can educate our  
7   kids. We have a uniform construction  
8   code that hasn't been adopted. I mean,  
9   we're operating off of 2009 building  
10  codes while we have this economic boom.  
11  We're outdated by many years from 2009,  
12  and here we are in 2017. So we rely on  
13  the state and the cooperation with the  
14  state.

15           The state hasn't been able to  
16  come up with a way that they can tax the  
17  shale and Marcellus gas, and there's all  
18  kinds of things that are going on in the  
19  state, and it puts us in a precarious  
20  position, because I don't believe -- I do  
21  not personally support the tax on our  
22  tech companies, but we have to make a  
23  tough decision whether we support our  
24  democratic governor when it comes to  
25  leverage. And I'm going to be voting no

2    on this resolution, even though I  
3    personally don't support it, because I  
4    believe that we need the Governor to  
5    govern after our city budget is complete,  
6    for him to continue to fight to make sure  
7    that our codes are updated, which are not  
8    now, to make sure that even though tech  
9    is the fastest growing sector, it's even  
10   a faster growing sector when it comes to  
11   the healthcare industry. It's really  
12   growing there, that he considers and/or  
13   the Legislature considers exempting the  
14   cities of the first class from anything  
15   that is going to be onerous, because  
16   we're going to take a look at that. Your  
17   creation of a special committee on  
18   regulatory laws that we have in our city,  
19   which has been outdated and used and not  
20   used and so forth. I think we need to  
21   really take a hard look at leveraging,  
22   giving the Governor leverage, but the  
23   City of Philadelphia wants something back  
24   in return. And it's not a quid pro quo.  
25   It is, hey, man, we're at 2009 codes,

2    more funding for education, and giving  
3    the city of the first class a little more  
4    sovereignty when it comes to some of our  
5    bifurcation of our real estate taxes so  
6    we can use those resources that will  
7    attract and retain millennials, business  
8    folks, and how about just City residents  
9    right here in the City of Philadelphia.

10           So difficult vote, but we're  
11   going to have to take it.

12           Thank you.

13           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14   Thank you, Councilman.

15           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
16   Jones.

17           COUNCILMAN JONES: So this is a  
18   straw vote that has no power to determine  
19   what happens about 103 miles from here,  
20   right? No, it doesn't, right? We don't  
21   have any power over the Governor's  
22   budget. So why -- wait a minute. Hold  
23   on. I'm talking. Then push your button.  
24   Then push your button. Then push your  
25   button.

2           So wait a minute. I know we do  
3 it all the time, but I just watched an  
4 eight-hour struggle yesterday about  
5 Rebuild, right, and we were pulling our  
6 hair out. I think we've become addicted  
7 to doing this kind of stuff, particularly  
8 where we don't have a say in it.

9           And so I want to just point out  
10 to you that the Governor's coming here  
11 tomorrow to talk about the I-95 ramp that  
12 will connect into Queen Village where  
13 these millennials live, right? Isn't  
14 that where these millennials live? And  
15 he's bringing a check to do that, right?  
16 So I'm just saying -- Old City. And I'm  
17 just saying, to me when I go see him  
18 tomorrow, I don't want to bring the  
19 resolution saying keep your money.

20           In all seriousness, though, in  
21 all seriousness, they have a \$3 billion  
22 projected deficit, 3 billion with a B,  
23 and if we look to Washington for  
24 assistance, they're calling their budget  
25 the skinny budget, which takes about \$500

2 billion out of the state federal budget.  
3 Hello. I want you to understand they're  
4 cutting at the federal level, they're  
5 scrambling at the state level, and if we  
6 limit what the state is going to do,  
7 you're going to be finding new and  
8 innovative ways to tax your constituents  
9 here just to keep and make ends meet. So  
10 let the Governor and let the state  
11 Legislature and let the Senate do their  
12 jobs and let's focus on ours.

13                   Thank you, Mr. President.

14                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilman.

16                   The Chair recognizes  
17 Councilwoman Parker.

18                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank  
19 you, Mr. President. And I appreciate all  
20 of the comments and the constructive  
21 dialogue of my colleagues, but if you saw  
22 me scrambling over here, I'm scrambling  
23 to get the data, the numbers, and the  
24 facts from Harrisburg so that we can  
25 literally know what we're doing here

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2           today.

3                         And just for the record, I want  
4           to start with this: All of the speakers  
5           who commented on the negative impact of  
6           this tax, I agree with them potentially  
7           wholeheartedly, and there was one person  
8           who put forth a potential solution that I  
9           am willing and I'm sure many of my  
10          colleagues will take him up on. He  
11          talked about he knew that there was a  
12          need to plug the \$3 billion projected  
13          budget deficit that we have in the  
14          Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and he said  
15          that he thought a broad-based tax like a  
16          potential increase in the PIT was  
17          something that was something more fitting  
18          instead of picking winners and losers as  
19          it relates to industries. I want to tell  
20          that gentleman that I agree. I would be  
21          willing to work with the industry to  
22          motivate and inspire our colleagues,  
23          particularly those who live in the  
24          five-county area, to help us with a  
25          campaign to support a broad-based tax in

2       Harrisburg that is not simply an ask that  
3       is coming from Philadelphia.

4           In addition to that, I want to  
5       say to Councilman Greenlee,  
6       Councilmembers Jones and Henon, each of  
7       you I think hit the hammer on the nail  
8       when you talked about current  
9       negotiations. I right now am holding an  
10      analysis of revenue proposals that was  
11      conducted not by the democratic caucus or  
12      republic caucus. It was conducted by the  
13      Independent Fiscal Office, and everything  
14      that is being proposed, it is not just  
15      this, what is being referred to as the  
16      tech tax. They are talking about the  
17      corporate net income tax, a natural gas  
18      severance tax, an insurance premium tax,  
19      a sales and use tax, and they also have  
20      tax credit here.

21           So there is a litany of  
22      proposals, and I'm not sure if today what  
23      we would be doing if we wanted to lend  
24      our voice to the argument if we needed to  
25      be talking about how a tax in each of

2       these areas would be impacting the City  
3       of Philadelphia.

4                        So with that being said, I too,  
5       who am not in support of this tax in  
6       particular, but what I am very mindful of  
7       is the reality of a \$3 billion deficit,  
8       the reality that in five years if we  
9       don't find a way to generate additional  
10      recurring revenue for the School District  
11      of Philadelphia, if we listen carefully,  
12      we talked about a \$700 million projected  
13      deficit, we've got no signal that we're  
14      going to plug the charter school  
15      reimbursement line item.

16                      And with that being said,  
17      Mr. President, I will be voting no on  
18      this resolution today, but it is not,  
19      again, because I support the tax. I  
20      would much prefer to see a broad-based  
21      tax entered into, but as they go into the  
22      negotiating stages of this process again,  
23      which only had ten pre-K years of just  
24      watching from afar, I don't want to limit  
25      the discussion on anything, and that's

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2           for both sides of the aisle.

3                     Thank you, Mr. President.

4                     If anyone is interested in  
5           looking at this analysis of the revenue  
6           proposals so they'll get that this is not  
7           the only projected revenue stream, again,  
8           that's projected to generate \$349  
9           million, all of those other revenue  
10          streams were proposed also.

11                    Thank you, Mr. President.

12                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13           Thank you, Councilwoman.

14                    The Chair recognizes Councilman  
15           Oh.

16                    COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
17           much, Council President. Let me start by  
18           saying this: I have introduced  
19           resolutions when I disagree with the  
20           Trump administration or with Governor  
21           Corbett or any other republican, because  
22           I represent the citizens of Philadelphia.  
23           If every Councilmember who just said they  
24           don't like this tax voted for the  
25           resolution, then the Governor would get a

2 message. It might help him. He needs  
3 the guidance. He's going to run for  
4 reelection. I'm getting that from this  
5 conversation. But for Philadelphia this  
6 tax is very problematic. We lose jobs.  
7 We lose taxes. We lose revenues. We  
8 lose growth.

9           What happens is exactly what's  
10 been described. We don't have money from  
11 Harrisburg. We don't have money from the  
12 federal government. We're going to rely  
13 on ourselves. We need as many jobs, job  
14 opportunities as we can have, and this is  
15 one of our hottest areas right now.

16           If you look at what's  
17 happening, we've built four innovation  
18 centers - University of Penn, Drexel,  
19 Science Center, and Comcast Innovation  
20 Center. That has been great for the  
21 building trades. It's been great for a  
22 lot of things. Those are all  
23 tech-related jobs. NBC Universal coming  
24 to Philadelphia, the medical devices, the  
25 medical healthcare, post production film,

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2 all of this relates to technology.

3           What I would say is that this  
4 tax is difficult to understand,  
5 particularly when people don't feel it  
6 relates to them, and I believe that the  
7 representatives of rural Pennsylvania are  
8 making themselves well known. They're  
9 saying, listen, this tax don't affect us,  
10 so go ahead with this tax. But what I'm  
11 saying is Philadelphia has to let the  
12 rest of the state know so that they can  
13 balance it out that this tax is very  
14 detrimental to our citizens, our economy,  
15 and our region.

16           And, listen, you know, I was at  
17 an event where Governor Wolf was talking  
18 about how much hardship he was getting on  
19 a partisan basis on the opioid issue. I  
20 said publicly, Look, I support you,  
21 Governor. And I will be very happy to  
22 support him in his efforts to fund and  
23 fight the opioid/heroin epidemic. This  
24 is an area where I disagree with the  
25 Governor. It doesn't mean I disagree

1           6/8/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2 with him on everything, but this hurts  
3 Philadelphia.

4           And so I do understand all the  
5 reasons and we're all here as elected  
6 officials. I am very clear that this  
7 resolution does in fact impact things.  
8 It does send a message to the Governor.  
9 It is an official resolution. And I  
10 would urge everyone to vote in favor of  
11 it and help the Governor out.

12           Thank you.

13           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Thank you, Councilman.

15           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
16 Taubenberger.

17           COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank  
18 you, Council President. As one of the  
19 sponsors, I will say very clearly and  
20 being in this body not the longest as  
21 many, I'm rather new around here, I know  
22 we take positions on things that are not  
23 in our realm, but I think it's a good  
24 thing. And letting people know where we  
25 stand and what is particularly important

2   to Philadelphia I think is very  
3   important.

4           I sit here as a minority  
5   candidate -- or minority member of  
6   Council, but I represent all  
7   Philadelphia, and when four businesses  
8   come here asking us to do something, they  
9   say that it's not good for their  
10   business, it will hurt them, one of which  
11   clearly said if this bill passes on the  
12   state level, I'm moving out, and guess  
13   what, 15 minutes from here by motor car,  
14   you're in another state.

15           I think these folks have taken  
16   a sincere amount of their time. They've  
17   asked us to do something, and I intend to  
18   do that, and I urge my colleagues to vote  
19   yes on this resolution.

20           Thank you, Mr. President.

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22   Thank you, Councilman.

23           The Chair recognizes Councilman  
24   Jones.

25           COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,

2       Mr. President. I'm requesting a leave of  
3       absence. I will be voting no on this  
4       resolution and aye on all amendments,  
5       bills, and resolutions going forward. I  
6       have to go meet with the Secretary of  
7       Transportation, who works for the  
8       Governor, who is bringing a check to fix  
9       a bridge. So we will cross that other  
10      bridge when we come to it.

11                 Thank you, Mr. President. I  
12      need an excuse, not a leave of absence.

13                 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
14      Thank you, Councilman. Leave shall be  
15      granted, and your vote will be reflected  
16      in the final tally.

17                 The Chair recognizes  
18      Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

23          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
24 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

25          COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you. I

3                     (Duly seconded.)

4           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   It's

6                     All those in favor say aye.

11           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   The

19           COUNCILMAN HENON:   Thank you,

21                    That completes the Calendar for

23                    Are there any speeches on the

25                    The Chair recognizes Councilman

3                   COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
4 much. I just wanted to thank all of my  
5 colleagues, everyone in City Hall, our  
6 Police Department, firefighters,  
7 especially the paramedics and the staff  
8 at Penn Presbyterian, for the wonderful  
9 treatment that they provided me last  
10 Thursday. I also wanted to thank the  
11 public in general for their concern,  
12 their prayers, which was very meaningful  
13 to me.

14                   I just wanted to share just a  
15 little bit about my kind of perspectives  
16 on it.

17                   I believe myself that we are  
18 here for a purpose, and I believe that we  
19 in this room come here for a purpose, and  
20 we can bring our best self, and I hope to  
21 bring my best self to my work.

22                   I met a young man last Thursday  
23 night and he ended up stabbing me, and  
24 I'd like to think about the meaning of  
25 that encounter. And I bear him no ill

2 will. In fact, quite frankly, people  
3 have asked me are you okay physically. I  
4 am fine. And they ask me are you  
5 emotionally okay, and I tell them I'm  
6 fine. In fact, I'm kind of just -- kind  
7 of unaffected by the entire thing.

8           But the point that occurs to me  
9 is, I should just not only bear no ill  
10 will. The challenge is do I have any  
11 love. Do I have any love for this young  
12 man. And the reason I think that is  
13 because -- the reason I try to be a  
14 better person, the reason I think about  
15 being a better person is I've seen good  
16 examples in my parents, in my church, in  
17 my community. And so when I think about  
18 this young man, I have to be challenged  
19 that he may have not had the same  
20 opportunities and maybe he didn't listen,  
21 but certainly as an elected official, how  
22 can I incorporate those perspectives into  
23 the laws and the policies that we are  
24 trying to deal with, all of us, in terms  
25 of the violence, opportunities in our

2           schools and education.

3                       Certainly I would like to  
4           commit myself to do the best I can to try  
5           to not only do good for our city but in  
6           particular for this young man that I  
7           encountered last week, to particularly  
8           think about him and his circumstances and  
9           see how I may be a better public servant.

10                      I will say he needs to be off  
11           the street. He is dangerous. But while  
12           he's off the street, he should be  
13           productive, intelligent, rehabilitated,  
14           and I certainly hope that there be  
15           intervention in his life and lead to  
16           positive things, and for that reason, I  
17           may say perhaps God brought us together,  
18           for my good and for his good. But I'll  
19           do the best I can, and I appreciate  
20           everybody's support.

21                      Thank you.

22                      COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
23           Councilman. And we're glad that your  
24           recovery was speedy and you are here  
25           today.

4           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
5 Majority Leader.

6           Councilman Oh, you need to know  
7 that we appreciate who you are, what you  
8 do, and the amazing best self that you  
9 bring every single day to City Council.  
10 You really are exceptional.

11           (Applause.)

12           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: One  
13 announcement, Majority Leader, at 2  
14 o'clock p.m. this afternoon, the  
15 Philadelphia Energy Authority will be  
16 doing a briefing on Solarize Philly  
17 initiative, and Councilman Green has been  
18 intimately involved with this effort as  
19 well. So we want to invite members to  
20 attend and/or send their staff.

21           Secondly, as a member of  
22 Philadelphia alumnae chapter of Delta  
23 Sigma Theta, it would behoove me to lift  
24 up and celebrate the Omega Omega Chapter  
25 of AKA. And history tells us that AKA

2       was the first sorority founded on Howard  
3       University's campus. We want to ask  
4       those ladies that have been able to stay  
5       to rise.

6                   What we need to know is that  
7       2016 was a banner year for the Omega

9       awarded six out of nine awards, including  
10      the best large chapter and best president  
11      at their recent conference in Baltimore.  
12      We, of course, know their President as  
13      the beloved and adored Lorina  
14      Marshall-Blake of Independence Blue  
15      Cross.

16                   The undergraduate chapters were  
17      celebrated as well, and in this region,  
18      the undergraduate chapters are University  
19      of Penn, Drexel, University of LaSalle,  
20      Saint Joe make up that Philadelphia  
21      Chapter. Additionally, we know that the  
22      government relation officer for the  
23      School District, Evelyn Sample-Oates, is  
24      also an active member of the AKA.

25                   Lastly, I want to acknowledge

5                        (Appause.)

6           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN:   And  
7       Carlene Neil, who like Councilman  
8       Taubenberger and myself, bleed blue and  
9       white.  She chairs the Connection  
10      Committee.  And because of their good  
11      work, they received the Making a  
12      Difference Award.

13                      So we want to salute President  
14      Lorina Marshall-Blake, President Carol  
15      Parkinson-Hall, the new President, and  
16      Carlene Neil for your leadership and what  
17      you do every single day to lift up  
18      service, which is the foundation of our  
19      sororities.  We thank you, and  
20      congratulations.

21                      (Appause.)

22           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN:  Thank you,  
23      Majority Leader.

24           COUNCILMAN HENON:  Well, thank  
25      you.

3 congratulations to you all.

4                   The Chair now recognizes  
5 Councilman Green.

6                   COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
7 Majority Leader Henon. I want to echo  
8 the words of Councilwoman Brown. I want  
9 to thank -- I'm glad to see our colleague  
10 David Oh here, and I want to thank you  
11 for your humanity.

12                   I also want to thank  
13 Councilwoman Brown for her bipartisanship  
14 in supporting the ladies of Alpha Kappa  
15 Alpha. I think her colleague and fellow  
16 soror Councilwoman Parker is also in that  
17 spirit and wearing green today supporting  
18 the ladies of the Omega Omega Chapter of  
19 Alpha Kappa Alpha.

20                   I have one announcement I want  
21 make and then a quick speech. Just to  
22 let people know that at 3:30, there will  
23 be a flag raising for Pride Month on the  
24 north apron of City Hall. That will be  
25 today at 3:30. There will be a new flag

2       that will be raised for the LGBTQ  
3       community, and that will be this  
4       afternoon at 3:30 for Pride Month.

5           In addition, I just want to  
6       make a few comments. Many of you all  
7       know that here in the City of  
8       Philadelphia, poverty is, if not one of  
9       our major issues, our number one issue.  
10      One organization that has been really at  
11      the forefront of trying to address  
12      poverty here in the City of Philadelphia  
13      is the Philadelphia Unemployment Project.  
14      And one initiative of many that they have  
15      to address poverty in the City of  
16      Philadelphia is a program called Commuter  
17      Options. The Commuter Options program is  
18      a reverse commuting program that takes  
19      City residents to suburban jobs.

20           To support this program,  
21      Councilman Jones and I, as well as  
22      Philadelphia Unemployment Project  
23      Executive Director John Dodds, Lou Agre,  
24      President of the Philadelphia Metal  
25      Trades Union, representatives of POWER

2   and others participated in a press  
3   conference this Monday in the Caucus Room  
4   to call on SEPTA to fund the Commuter  
5   Options program.

6           Today we took votes regarding  
7   the budget, and in this year's budget,  
8   the City will provide a subsidy of \$83  
9   million to SEPTA. Now, with just  
10   \$750,000, Philadelphia Unemployment  
11   Project will enable 300 citizens to be  
12   able to get jobs in the suburbs. And so  
13   thinking about our budget and the  
14   significant subsidy, I proposed an  
15   amendment to our budget to reduce SEPTA's  
16   \$83 million City subsidy to fund the  
17   Commuter Options program and to enable  
18   reverse commuting.

19           I would like to thank my  
20   colleagues in Council for supporting this  
21   amendment. Many of you I saw in the last  
22   day or two to get your support, and I've  
23   got an overwhelming response. With this  
24   response, I did reach out to SEPTA and  
25   informed them of this amendment, and we

2       had a number of conference calls and  
3       discussions regarding this issue. I want  
4       to publicly thank Wendy Green-Harvey of  
5       SEPTA for helping to coordinate three  
6       conference calls that we had over the  
7       past two days regarding this amendment.

8           In our discussions, we were  
9       able to identify four different funding  
10       sources that can help the Commuter  
11       Options program. In addition, SEPTA  
12       agreed to support and lobby both PennDOT  
13       and PA DCED on PUP's behalf, or the  
14       Philadelphia Unemployment Project's  
15       behalf, as well as use their staff to  
16       help the Unemployment Project complete  
17       these grant applications and do support  
18       letters.

19           I'd also like to thank our  
20       Managing Director, Mike DiBerardinis, who  
21       also is supporting this initiative and  
22       he's been lobbying our state  
23       Transportation Secretary, Leslie  
24       Richards, in reference to additional  
25       dollars for the Commuter Options program

2   run by the Philadelphia Unemployment  
3   Project.

4           Considering all this  
5   collaboration and discussions between  
6   both SEPTA and the Philadelphia  
7   Unemployment Project, I decided to hold  
8   this amendment to their subsidy. I look  
9   forward to a future announcement for  
10   additional money for the Commuter Options  
11   program and reverse commuting, which will  
12   bring City residents to suburban jobs.  
13   If we are not successful in this funding,  
14   I will revisit this important issue in  
15   the future.

16           Thank you, Mr. Majority Leader.

17           COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
18   Councilman.

19           And before we go to the last  
20   two speakers that are in the queue, if I  
21   can ask all the members to hang in there  
22   for a few more minutes. I know it's been  
23   a long session, but we need a quorum to  
24   close out our session and make sure that  
25   we are present.

4           COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
5 you, Mr. Chairman. Let me say that  
6 yesterday I mentioned this to some of

8 getting calls from the principal and CEO  
9 of Richard Allen Preparatory Charter  
10 School when children who come from his  
11 school kept playing with a train, and one  
12 6th grader was dragged 500 feet. He  
13 first called and said they were trying to  
14 save a leg. He called back 20 minutes  
15 later to let us know that this child had  
16 lost one leg and they were trying to  
17 operate on the other. He's been calling  
18 us. He called us yesterday when we were  
19 here during our hearing. He's called us  
20 this morning. They are trying to save  
21 the second leg.

22           She's responding to her family  
23 voices, and she's having surgery again  
24 tomorrow. So we need to pray for her,  
25 that this 6th grader may be able to keep

2       one leg, and we want to thank CEO and  
3       Principal Lawrence Jones on trying to  
4       keep us informed about what's going on.

5           Thank you. Everybody keep  
6       these folks in prayer. Thank you.

7           COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
8       Councilwoman.

9           The Chair now recognizes  
10       Councilwoman Bass.

11          COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
12       Mr. Chairman, and thank you, Councilwoman  
13       Blackwell, for that update as we keep our  
14       children and our young people close to us  
15       and in prayer at all times, especially  
16       during something like this.

17          Also I did want to join in the  
18       chorus and say to my good friend, one of  
19       my closest friends, David Oh, that I'm  
20       just so happy and relieved that he was  
21       okay and that he's sitting here next to  
22       me. So I just wanted to say that for the  
23       record also.

24          And, thirdly, I wanted to again  
25       join in the chorus and welcome the women

2   of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority and for all  
3   of the wonderful work that they do in our  
4   community, and we certainly know that  
5   they just had a clean-up in my  
6   neighborhood, in my district in

8   weeks ago. So I wanted to acknowledge  
9   and recognize Alpha Kappa Alpha for all  
10  of their hard work.

11           And speaking of clean-ups, I  
12  did want to announce that our office is  
13  joining with State Senator Sharif Street  
14  to do a series of clean-ups. We're  
15  calling it Sweep 16 and -- right? Sweep  
16  16 - 16 sites in 16 weeks. We're going  
17  to be cleaning starting this coming
