23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

25 morning.

2 MS. MELTON: Good morning. My
3 name is Karen Melton. I live in East
4 Falls and I'm the education chair for the
5 Southeastern Pennsylvania Sierra Club and
6 a volunteer with Citizens Climate Lobby
7 and 350.org.

8 I want to urge Council to vote
9 in favor of Resolution 170706 committing
10 Philadelphia to meet the targets of the
11 Paris Climate Accord and urging other
12 public agencies to do their part. The
13 various target dates sound far away, but
14 transitioning power systems and
15 technologies takes time, and we don't
16 have much left.

17 SEPTA has ordered 25 electric
18 buses and has contracted for several
19 solar projects in the City, and these are
20 good steps, but at the same time, it
21 plans to buy 525 more diesel hybrids over
22 the next five years and build a gas-fired
23 power plant in Nicetown. Each bus will
24 produce more than 221,000 pounds of
25 greenhouse gas tailpipe emissions

2 annually, according to SEPTA. They will
3 still be in operation in the 2030's.

4 The permit application for the
5 gas-fired power plant emissions are all
6 measured in tons per year, 20.7 nitrogen
7 oxides, 27 carbon monoxide, and more than
8 16 tons of volatile organic compounds.

9 These are pollutants known to contribute
10 to the formation of smog which can cause
11 or aggravate health problems, including
12 asthma, emphysema, bronchitis, and other
13 respiratory conditions.

14 The immediately adjacent zip
15 code to the proposed power plant has a 31
16 percent childhood asthma rate and the
17 highest rate of childhood visits to the
18 emergency room per asthma attacks in the
19 City. Burning fossil fuels doesn't just
20 destabilize our climate; it makes us
21 sick.

22 Yesterday the world's largest
23 auto market, China, announced it is
24 working on a plan to ban gas and diesel
25 automobiles, and it is not the first

2 country to make such an announcement.
3 There are U.S. transit systems already
4 transitioning to all electric bus fleets
5 powered by renewable energy.

6 While we discuss here how
7 quickly we can get Philadelphia to 100
8 percent renewables to help stabilize the
9 climate, SEPTA is down the street making
10 plans that will add many thousands of
11 tons of greenhouse gases and other
12 pollutants to our air for many years to
13 come.

14 Council, please support this
15 resolution and, more importantly, enact
16 measures to ensure that other agencies
17 such as SEPTA support these goals.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 MS. LIBBEY: I say this because

11 I've sworn to do everything I can to

12 protect our children and our

13 grandchildren. This was originally a

14 poem sent to Tom Wolf about fracking's

15 effects on children. It has been

16 hand-delivered by me to all of you

17 Councilpeople's offices. It's gone to

18 the Mayor, to Tom Wolf, Pam DeLissio,

19 Vincent Hughes, the DEP, DRBC, Office of

20 Sustainability, the Air Management

21 Council.

22 I am the voice of the stillborn

23 who cannot speak. I am the voice for the

24 disabled in pain. I am the voice of the

25 asthmatics who cannot breathe. I am the

2 voice for those we have slain.

3 They breathe the air that's
4 polluted by toxins. They drink the water
5 that's darkened by grime. They scratch
6 their skin raw on all the red rashes.
7 They go to school on roads covered in
8 slime.

10 sufferings and agonies. We are the cause
11 of their writhing in pain. Fracking is
12 killing our totally defenseless. It has
13 no sympathy for those it has slain.

14 Originally I thought that Tom
15 Wolf was the only one who could help us
16 with this. I now realize we are all
17 responsible every time we turn on a gas
18 appliance or the electricity that is made
19 by burning gas.

20 Thank you for supporting this
21 bill.

16 to say his peace and leave. He's
17 representing Black Lives Matter
18 Pennsylvania Chapter and the Justice for
19 David Jones Coalition, and I would ask

22 brother with his courage to come forward

3 I'd like to thank everybody for
4 being here. I would like to go into more
5 detail. After the David Jones killing --

9 believe that seven years ago when I was
10 shot in the back, no firearm was found
11 seven -- I mean, about a half an hour
12 later until I got to the other hospital.
13 They never brought to the fact that the
14 officer initially stopped me because I
15 had a piece of paper in my hand, thought
16 it was drug narcotics. He even testified
17 that he never seen the gun, but yet I'm
18 sitting in the wheelchair to this day
19 because I ran through an open field and
20 he opened fired on me.

21 Through the grace of God, I
22 didn't die, but I would not like my voice
23 to not go unheard. And it's not so much
24 about me. It's not so much about civil
25 suit. It's not so much about money.

3 believe that if you continue to keep
4 these officers out here that feel as

11 Imagine if your child, your nephew, or
12 you know how younger folks are, maybe
13 driving in their car and get pulled over
14 and then don't know who their
15 predecessors are and they get in the same
16 situation I got into.

17 When the cop shot me, not only
18 did they shoot me, they flipped me over,
19 found no gun. I was literally feet away
20 from the hospital where they could have
21 got nurses and C collars and, you know,
22 prepared me quick -- prepared me where
23 maybe my injuries wouldn't have been so
24 bad, but instead they decided to lift my
25 arms up in the back, which I was shot in

2 the C4 area, if you're familiar with
3 that. That's the upper back.

4 I was almost close to being on
5 a ventilator. They dragged me and threw
6 me in the back of the cop car. I'm
7 bouncing around their sheets with a brand
8 new bullet wound. And also they
9 continued to like, through the
10 transcripts to my lawyer, all they kept
11 asking was did he die, did he die, did he
12 die. So from what I get from that, my
13 main concern if he die, he can't testify
14 about the truth to the matter.

15 I was acquitted in court, and
16 through all the turmoil, I sat 18 months
17 in court to be acquitted and that that
18 wasn't -- I didn't believe that was fair
19 to me. I rolled with the punches. My
20 lawyer got me -- Max Kramer. He even
21 took the trial on -- he felt so bad, he
22 paid for the trial out of his own pocket
23 and acquitted me. And then I went into
24 civil suit and I got rural juries from
25 all over, and unfortunately it didn't go

2 my way.

3 But if I'm an immediate threat
4 to you, how would I be shot in the back?
5 I never had no firearm in my hands, not
6 of the nature. The cop even said he
7 never even seen me throw a firearm. He
8 paused behind the wall, lined me up in
9 the middle of the field. I first -- I
10 heard the first bullet go past my ear.
11 The second bullet hit me in my back,
12 which tackled me down to the ground.

13 Now, I'm not going to go on and
14 on and, you know. I just wanted to give
15 you a brief history of my story. And I
16 also would like a change, you know. You
17 know, I would like that if these police
18 officers get better training and get
19 better, you know, better -- excuse me.
20 This has been a traumatic experience for
21 me. I used to be a fitness trainer
22 before I got injured. So it saved me
23 because my muscle mass was thick and the
24 bullet didn't go all the way through.

25 But to get back to the David

2 Jones situation, his gun was by the cop
3 officer's feet. His gun jammed. So at
4 that point, he was supposed to recess the
5 situation. David Jones was fleeing.
6 Therefore, there's no imminent threat
7 towards the officer, but yet he still
8 chose to fire off shots that took this
9 man to heaven. You understand what I'm
10 saying?

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
12 understand.

13 MR. KHALIF: Excuse me one
14 second, and I understand and respect the
15 time for the other protesters and the
16 other activists, and we will respect that
17 time as well, but I just want to get this
18 brother to say what he needs to say,
19 because he's been dealing with this
20 trauma for years, and we want him to
21 understand that we care for him in this
22 city. We care for him in this city.

23 (Applause.)

24 MR. KHALIF: So just give us a
25 few minutes for him to close, and we'll

2 respect the time, and we thank the City
3 Council for respecting his time and his
4 voice as well.

5 Go ahead, Brother.

6 MR. WILLIAMS-CARNEY: I'm not
7 going to take too much more of your time,
8 but when I woke up after getting that
9 gunshot and that grass, my life has
10 changed to the point where I will get
11 justice for any -- don't matter whether
12 black, white, Hispanic, no matter what
13 race. If you're in -- you're being
14 injustice by police, the people that
15 supposed to protect and serve, as long as
16 I got breath in my body, you will see me
17 a lot. I don't care how much medical I
18 go through. I'm in nine nursing homes
19 with different complications, but I will
20 make it down here, because I believe that
21 there need to be a change, because this
22 is not helping the community and the law
23 enforcement communications, you know.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes,
25 sir.

2 MR. WILLIAMS-CARNEY: Now you
3 get brothers out here who read these
4 articles, first thing they think is, I
5 got to protect myself from the police,
6 and then the next thing you hear about,
7 you hear about cops getting killed.

8 I'm going to end with this: If
9 you have a heart in your heart, please,
10 please just think of my story as you go
11 home and think about that there's ways to
12 solve situations without using deadly
13 force.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you for your testimony, sir, and
16 thank you --

17 MR. KHALIF: Can y'all give a
18 hand to our dear brother for his courage.

19 (Applause.)

20 (Witness speaking without
21 microphone.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Thank you.

24 (Witness talking without
25 microphone.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
3 right. Thank you. Thank you for your
4 testimony.

5 (Audience member yelling.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
7 right. All right. All right.

8 (Audience member yelling.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
10 right. Okay. We got it. We got it.

11 (Audience member yelling.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 Thank you, sir.

14 (Audience member yelling.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you, sir.

17 (Audience member yelling.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you. You're right.

20 (Audience member yelling.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Okay. We got another group that wants to
23 testify also, sir. Thank you.

24 (Audience members yelling.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold

3 Mr. Decker, call the name of
4 the next witness.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Rasheed Holmes,
6 commenting on 170706.

7 (Witness approached podium.)

8 MR. HOLMES: It's time for
9 change, man. We people of color, we got
10 to come together, man. All that cop
11 killing and stuff, it's got to come to
12 the end, man. Because you reap what you
13 sow, man. You do the people dirty, you
14 must pay the price. That's how we --
15 when you do people dirty, we're going to
16 be punished. Ain't no way you're getting
17 away in life.

18 How can you live like this and
19 continue to unarm black people out here?
20 Any color. Don't matter what color you
21 are, white, Spanish, Mexico. Don't
22 matter, man. You must be punished. When
23 you do crimes to people, you must be
24 punished.

25 Ain't no way he should be

1 9/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 getting away. He should be punished for
3 what he just did to that boy right there.
4 That made me cry, tears in my eyes. It's
5 sad for him going through this. It could
6 be your kid, your nephew. It could be
7 anybody, especially the kids, young
8 folks. They need us. The kids is being
9 kidnapped out here, and they deserve to
10 live their life. They didn't ask to be
11 here. They deserve to be here and enjoy
12 their life and live their life.

13 We also need to be uniting
14 people of all colors, for real. This cop
15 killing got to stop, man. They got to
16 put an end to it. It has to stop.
17 Seriously. That's why I'm here, man, to
18 put in action, man. It's time to stop.
19 Seriously, man, for real.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you, sir. Thank you for your
22 testimony, sir.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Clarc King,
24 commenting on 170706.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 MR. KING: Good morning,
5 Council President, and thank you,
6 Councilmembers, for your time. I'm
7 speaking in opposition to Resolution
8 170706, and that is the City committing
9 itself to meeting or exceeding the target
10 set by the Paris Climate Accord.

11 Are we communicating that we're
12 going to continue with supporting the
13 Fed's and Wall Street bailout system? I
14 have to say poverty is the immediate
15 national security crisis, and it is
16 caused by Wall Street. I think we see
17 the results of poverty in this room every
18 day. The greatest depression exists.

19 Political leadership and power
20 must work to confront the crisis
21 unemployment in our city, the
22 Commonwealth, and the nation. The U.S.
23 Treasury and the Fed must stop supporting
24 the Wall Street bankers' speculators and
25 transition the Fed into a public bank

2 facility that funds the government,
3 industry, and infrastructure, making way
4 for wage-driven recovery and economic
5 growth.

6 The Federal Reserve Bank must
7 begin retrieving the bailout trillions,
8 the lost, unaccounted for, and stolen
9 trillions. That's our money. The U.S.
10 fiat money system is our money system.
11 Wall Street does not own us. We own
12 them.

13 The redevelopment of North
14 America depends on the reorganization of
15 the U.S. money and financial system.
16 Millions of lives are depending on
17 political leadership to perceive and
18 implement the national priorities that
19 support the population's survival and
20 perpetuation.

21 Climate change supports new
22 laws for Wall Street financial
23 engineering, Wall Street financial
24 products, taxes, swaps, and it has the
25 component of economic and population

2 contraction. Radical population
3 reduction policy is imbedded in climate
4 change.

5 Political leadership must face
6 up to the reality. The organization and
7 operation of the Fed from now on is the
8 immediate political priority.

9 Thank you for your time.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Diop Olugbala,
13 commenting on 170247.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
16 morning.

17 MR. OLUGBALA: Much like one of
18 the earlier speakers, I'm not here to
19 address one of the bills on the agenda,
20 but I'm here to address a bill that we
21 introduced this past February on black
22 community control of the police, which
23 need was underscored by the testimony
24 that we just heard from the brother that
25 was put in a wheelchair by a Philadelphia

2 police officer and the same cop that
3 killed David Jones. And we understand
4 that the only real permanent solution to
5 the problem of police brutality, murder,
6 stop and frisk, and all the other crimes
7 and offenses that the police committing
8 against the black community is for the
9 black community itself to have authority
10 and full control over the police force in
11 our community.

12 Therefore, we have drafted a
13 bill that is consistent with all your
14 legal language and structure that speaks
15 to specific demands that will result in a
16 different type of relationship that the
17 black community has with the police in
18 this city and in this country as a whole.

19 Firstly, this bill -- and you
20 have, all City Council members, you have
21 received this. We actually delivered it
22 to you several days ago and several
23 months ago. So you should be aware of
24 this bill.

25 But, one, we're calling for a

2 Black Community Control of Police

3 Commission that will be democratically

4 elected by the community within specific

5 Philadelphia police districts where the

6 population is at least 40 percent black

7 and Latino. This Black Community Control

8 of Police Commission will be

9 democratically elected and will be

10 structured on the black neighborhood and

11 district level.

12 This Black Community Control of

13 Police Commission will have the power to

14 hire, fire, set the training standards

15 and also discipline power, meaning

16 independent prosecutorial subpoena power,

17 so that when police violate the rights of

18 the people, we have our own independent

19 black community control of the police

20 prosecutorial commission that has the

21 ability, whether the DA wants to or not,

22 press charges and bring police up on

23 charges. And, most importantly, the

24 Black Community Control of the Police

25 Charter which will redefine how the

1 9/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 budget that is allocated towards the
3 Philadelphia police districts in
4 question, how that budget will be used.

5 No longer would the budget go
6 towards the scheme-ass running, assault
7 rifle-carrying occupying forces in our
8 community, but it would go towards the
9 real solution to so-called crime and
10 violence in our community, which is
11 economic development. The \$1.4 billion
12 that the City of Philadelphia spends on
13 police, prisons, and courts should be
14 going towards economic development in the
15 form of jobs, training, housing,
16 healthcare, et cetera.

17 (Applause.)

18 MR. OLUGBALA: We have drafted
19 a concrete bill that lays this out in a
20 very clear and understandable way. You
21 have all received it. We are calling on
22 City Council, at least one of you, to
23 sponsor this bill so that it can be
24 formally introduced on the City Council
25 agenda.

3 Thank you.

4 MR. OLUGBALA: We are from the
5 Black is Black Coalition standing
6 alongside our comrades of the Philly REAL
7 Justice and other forces that came with
8 us today to raise up this important
9 demand, and we're not leaving until we
10 get a resolution on the way forward with
11 this bill.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you.

14 MR. OLUGBALA: Meaning who is
15 going to sponsor this bill.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

18 Appreciate it.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Megan Malachi.

20 (Witness approached podium.)

21 MS. MALACHI: That's Megan
22 Malachi. I'm representing the Philly
23 Coalition -- I'm sorry. Actually, I'm
24 representing the Philly REAL Justice.

25 I'm here today to continue with

1 9/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 what my comrade, Diop, said. We are not
3 here to ask you about sponsoring this
4 bill. We're here to demand that you do
5 it.

6 We are in a crisis level in the
7 City where cops are murdering and
8 executing black people at a rate that is
9 outrageous. We're not here for any type
10 of liberal or symbolic demands where
11 police are able to investigate themselves
12 and then turn out and say that they are
13 not guilty. We are demanding a systemic
14 change in the way the society operates
15 when it comes to black people and law
16 enforcement.

17 The black people of
18 Philadelphia are tired of the police
19 coming into our community and terrorizing
20 us. We are demanding this democratic and
21 legitimate bill be adopted by City
22 Council. Darrell Clarke has a lot of
23 information about this. His own citizens
24 within North Philly have also demanded
25 similar change in structures. So you

2 need to answer to us and tell us why you
3 have not adopted this bill previously.

4 Comrade Diop has given you this
5 bill, what, back in February. So I'm
6 confused as to why we have to sit through
7 this long extended meeting and we're
8 still talking about this.

9 There's no reason why those
10 other people had to go all the way to the
11 Northeast to that pone-out's (ph) house
12 because you guys don't want to hold these
13 cops accountable.

14 This bill spells out exactly
15 what needs to happen, and all of you
16 black politicians who are sitting here
17 not passing this bill, you all are
18 complicit as well.

19 We're tired of asking you guys
20 to vote for us -- asking us to vote for
21 you all every November whenever the
22 elections are and you guys not doing
23 anything that you're supposed to do to
24 protect our community. In fact, you're
25 complicit because you're sitting here

2 with people like Henon, people like
3 Squilla, who have made it clear that they
4 are completely antagonistic and in
5 complicit with white supremacy when it
6 comes to the black community. So, quite
7 frankly, you need to be standing over
8 here with us.

9 You are sucking the blood and
10 the economic resources out of our
11 community. There's even no reason why
12 all these cops should be here right now.

13 Anybody else who is sitting in
14 the gallery who is interested in black
15 community control of the police, we can
16 give you a copy of this as well. This is
17 something that is going to happen or
18 there's going to be a real problem for
19 you all, because we can stay here all
20 day. I have no problem turning up in
21 here to make sure that black people are
22 not continued to be murdered by the
23 police. And we're not going to let you
24 obscure this issue anymore.

25 So you can tell us right now

2 whether or not you are going to adopt
3 this, because we will continue with this
4 if you refuse to. This is not us asking
5 you. This is us demanding that this
6 happen. This is going to turn into a
7 nice little bourgeois City Council
8 meeting into a revolutionary occupation
9 if you keep playing with us.

10 (Applause.)

11 MS. MALACHI: So what is it?
12 What's it going to be, Darrell Clarke?
13 Because I took off from work today. I
14 have students at my job with no books. I
15 have kids with no resources who have been
16 stopped and frisked. So what are you
17 going to do to stop my students from
18 having to deal with the same stuff that
19 that man in that wheelchair and David
20 Jones has to deal with? What is your
21 answer?

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you for your testimony.

24 MS. MALACHI: What is your
25 answer, sir?

4 (Pause for audience members
5 removed from Chambers.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All
7 right. We will conclude our public
8 comment.

9 Mr. Decker, can you call the
10 name of the next witness.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Cody Lamie.

12 (No response.)

13 CHIEF CLERK: Cody Lamie.

14 (No response.)

15 CHIEF CLERK: Kamau Mshak.

16 (No response.)

17 CHIEF CLERK: Anthony Smith.

18 (No response.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: Cornelius Moody.

20 (No response.)

21 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,

22 commenting on 170641.

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 MR. DANIHEL: Good afternoon.

25 This is an official decree of writ of

1 9/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 mandamus quo warranto and, as such,
3 requires immediate action and remedy.

4 Does this Council and Mayor
5 need a mirror to see the lone hipocrisy?
6 This government's officials have
7 criticized others about morality and
8 government ethics violations. In my
9 case, trial by jury was opposed by Mayor
10 and Council several times, violating the
11 oath of office to uphold, defend, and
12 protect the constitutions and laws.

13 Most of the first 14 amendments
14 deal with theft of property and denial of
15 God-given rights. If first come, first
16 served is truly impartial, why has
17 Council and Mayor approved payments to
18 people whose homes were taken decades
19 after mine? Why have I been required by
20 oath-bound officials to wait decades
21 while Council and Mayor consistently
22 place others ahead of me to path?

23 This is a violation of equal
24 treatment clauses and is cruel and
25 unusual punishment. The federal

1 9/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 government claims it has poured hundreds
3 of millions into the City to pay claims
4 in my case. Yet I wasn't paid a dime,
5 and the City cannot account for the
6 missing money.

7 Since my several trials by jury
8 were opposed and denied, why hasn't the
9 federal and Commonwealth governments
10 prosecuted those involved? The law
11 requires immediate remedy of this breach
12 of law. 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
13 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, oath
14 of office, PA Constitution, Article I,
15 Sections 1 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703,
16 708, 709, 712, 713, 716, and other laws
17 listed in SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330,
18 14-4056 all appear violated. As such,
19 requires immediate prosecution of all
20 involved.

21 There can only be one law. I
22 again call for the Commonwealth and
23 federal governments to perform their
24 constitutional obligation to investigate,
25 prosecute all involved in the theft and

1 9/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 illegal deed transfer of my home 1038
3 West Wyoming. The denial of God-given 42
4 USC 1982 property rights for 23 years is
5 egregious, extraordinary, oath-violating,
6 and requires immediate remedy.

7 A just government must obey the
8 rule of law. This color of law
9 government must have its Charter to
10 govern revoked until a constitutionally
11 compliant government is installed.

12 Public servants cannot refuse
13 their sworn duty to act any more than a
14 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
15 sovereign people of the United States
16 require laws and constitutions to be
17 enforced and this constitutional crisis
18 to be immediately resolved. Jail is
19 required for all who violate oath or law.

20 It takes a lot of cooperation
21 to create and allow monumental
22 corruption.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Thank you for your testimony.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Peter Winslow,

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MR. WINSLOW: President Clarke
5 and members of the Council, thank you for
6 providing me this opportunity to speak to
7 you in support of Resolution No. 170706,
8 committing the City of Philadelphia to
9 meet or exceed its share of the targets
10 set by the Paris Climate Accord for
11 mitigation of greenhouse gas emissions.
12 Together with other members of the
13 environmental and social justice
14 community, I look forward to working with
15 you to implement this commitment during
16 the current Council session.

17 My name is Peter Winslow. I'm
18 a resident of West Mount Airy in the
19 district of Councilwoman Bass. I thank
20 Councilwoman Bass and the co-sponsors of
21 the resolution, Councilmembers Green,
22 Johnson, and Gym, for introducing this
23 resolution, and I thank Councilwoman
24 Reynolds Brown for her leadership of the
25 Environmental Committee.

2 Moreover, in anticipation of
3 unanimous approval of the resolution, let
4 me express my appreciation to the entire
5 Council and to Mayor Kenney for stepping
6 up to meet our obligations as the Trump
7 administration steps away from
8 responsibility for meaningful response to
9 climate disruption.

10 A change of pace, change of
11 mood.

12 Council Resolution No. 170599
13 urging the President of the United States
14 to recommit and join with the Council of
15 the City of Philadelphia in affirming its
16 commitment to the Paris Climate Agreement
17 fell on deaf ears. Climate change
18 deniers lead the Environmental Protection
19 Agency, the Department of Energy, and the
20 Department of the Interior. The current
21 Congress appears incapable of positive
22 action on any environmental issue.
23 Likewise the Pennsylvania Legislature
24 ignores the provision of Article I,
25 Section 27 of the state Constitution that

2 the people have a right to clean air,
3 pure water, and to the preservation of
4 the natural, scenic, historic, and
5 aesthetic values of the environment.

6 Nevertheless, even if we
7 enjoyed the full commitment from other
8 levels of government, Philadelphia
9 remains responsible for meeting our share
10 of the Paris Accords. Furthermore, even
11 if the goals of the Paris Accords were
12 met, the results would be inadequate to
13 meet the challenge we face.

14 We must act quickly. We must
15 act aggressively. We must act
16 consistently to transition from an
17 economy dependent on fossil fuels to a
18 more sustainable society powered by
19 renewable energy sources.

20 May I continue?

21 We support the steelworkers,
22 steamfitters, and other workers of the
23 Philadelphia energy systems' refineries,
24 but we need, for their welfare as well as
25 everybody else's, to stop PES from

2 continuing to emit greenhouse gases and
3 other toxins into our environment.

4 We support SEPTA in its effort
5 to transport passengers more energy
6 efficiently than by private car, but we
7 need SEPTA not to construct an
8 unnecessary gas-powered electricity
9 generation plant in Nicetown.

10 We support the expansion of
11 container operations at PhilaPort, but we
12 need conversion of operations from diesel
13 to electric power.

14 We support energy efficiency
15 initiatives by the City, but we need a
16 program to obtain electricity from local
17 portable to ancillary installations and
18 much more.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony,
21 sir.

22 MR. WINSLOW: Thank you very
23 much for your time.

24 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
25 other speakers on the public comment

2 list, Mr. President.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you very much.

5 Mr. Decker, would you please
6 read the title of 170706.

7 CHIEF CLERK: A resolution
8 committing the City of Philadelphia to
9 meet or exceed its share of the targets
10 set by the Paris Climate Accord for the
11 mitigation of greenhouse gas emissions.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. I move for the adoption.

16 (Duly seconded.)

10 Are there any speeches on the
11 part of the minority?

12 And the Chair recognizes
13 Councilman Oh.

14 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
15 much, Council President. I have a few
16 things. I'd like to start with this:
17 This past Tuesday I had the pleasure of
18 attending the National Liberty Museum's
19 Awards of Valor. That is their 12th
20 year. First time I've been there. I
21 didn't know about it, but I will
22 definitely go every year after this and I
23 encourage everyone. It is recognition of
24 our first responders here in Philadelphia
25 and the region, our police and our

2 firefighters, who have done just a
3 fantastic job. It was a very moving,
4 very moving ceremony where they read what
5 each one of these firefighters and police
6 officers did, saving lives, great risk to
7 themselves, acting above and beyond what
8 we would expect a normal person to do,
9 but that's what they do every day. And
10 there were some very, very
11 heart-rendering moments, a firefighter
12 who crawled through 15 feet of sewage in
13 a very small pipe to then crawl through
14 15 more to save a person's life who had
15 been stuck in the sewer, a firefighter
16 who pulled a seven-year-old girl -- or a
17 child out of the fire, a police officer
18 who tried to revive a child who had
19 suffocated. Just tremendous effort.
20 Unfortunately she passed away. But just
21 the stories that are just the things that
22 occur every day from our men and women
23 who wear the uniform that so often and
24 too often go unrecognized, and I'd just
25 like to shout out to them job well done.

2 Thank you so much for your service and
3 your sacrifice to our city.

4 On that note, I do want to say
5 that I have a couple events I'd like to
6 alert the public. One is PHL LIVE is in
7 its fourth year. It's a free
8 opportunity, very easy. Go to
9 phllive.org, submit your YouTube video in
10 ten categories of music. We have Grammy
11 Award winners and others who will look at
12 your video and then select five finalists
13 in one of ten categories, and the winners
14 will perform live and can win \$1,000,
15 free studio recording time and those type
16 of things to advance their opportunities
17 to be who they want to be.

18 I would alert everyone if
19 you're available, we have a fundraiser
20 for the Green Beret Foundation on Friday,
21 October the 6th. These folks put their
22 lives on the line. They risk their lives
23 for our democracy, for our nation. We
24 can put their minds at ease. This
25 benefits the scholarship program for

2 their children and dependents so they'll
3 have assistance in getting an education.

4 And then, finally, on September
5 the 28th at Community College, 6:00 to
6 8:00 p.m., completely free program for
7 anyone who is interested in film, how to

9 film. We have a lot of filmmakers, but
10 having talent and ability to make a film
11 does not necessarily mean you'll be
12 successful in terms of getting your film
13 viewed, distributed, getting the money to
14 really make a solid production. And so
15 we'll have expert speakers there. I'd
16 invite everyone. Come to this event.
17 It's Thursday, September 28th, 6:00 to
18 8:00 at the Community College of
19 Philadelphia.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman.

23 On behalf of the majority, the
24 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

2 you, Mr. President. I want to take this
3 opportunity to invite my colleagues,
4 along with the public, to two events that
5 will be occurring this weekend in the
6 Ninth Councilmanic District. The first,
7 Mr. President -- because I was going to
8 call you Mr. Speaker just now,
9 Mr. President. So just thank you for
10 your patience and bearing with me there.

11 But this is our 10th year for
12 our College, Vocational and Labor
13 Information Fair, partnering with Future
14 Minds and Enon Tabernacle Baptist Church.
15 Again, our 10th year. We are so proud.
16 We have over 50 schools, over a dozen
17 labor unions, and several trade schools,
18 not just from the Philadelphia region but
19 from throughout the Commonwealth of
20 Pennsylvania. And I want to say a huge
21 thank you to Future Minds and Enon,
22 because we've been at this for ten years.
23 And that is this Saturday, September the
24 16th from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at Enon
25 Tabernacle Baptist Church and their

2 Family Life Center at 2800 Cheltenham
3 Avenue. All are invited. There's
4 something for everyone.

5 The next thing is called Hope
6 for Philly. Now, this is a new date. It
7 was supposed to take place on September
8 the 2nd, but it was rained out. It will
9 now take place on this Saturday. It is
10 from 11:00 to 3:00 and it is at
11 Pennypacker School, located at 1858 East
12 Washington Lane. It's hosted by Great
13 Commission Church. And, listen, they're
14 going to have employers, SEPTA, Shop
15 Rite, Police Department and more, several
16 sponsors. And so I want to give a huge
17 shout out to the pastor of Great
18 Commission Church, Levita Jones, and all
19 of the planning committee for putting
20 this together.

21 Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 The Chair recognizes Councilman
25 Jones.

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2 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
3 Mr. President.

4 Colleagues, welcome back.

5 I want to applaud you,
6 Mr. President, for having patience of
7 Job. I know sometimes the North Philly
8 in you wants to respond back, but you did
9 not. You represented our body in a
10 professional and tasteful manner, and I
11 applaud you for that.

12 I want to also say that --

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
14 Councilman, you have no idea how
15 difficult this is.

16 COUNCILMAN JONES: I
17 understand. I understand.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCILMAN JONES: But what was
20 lost in all of this today was GSD. And
21 GSD is get stuff done. And as Chair of
22 Public Safety, of the Special Committee
23 also on Criminal Justice, I've come to
24 realize that public safety means
25 different things to different people,

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2 Mr. President. To the African American
3 young man coming home at 2:00 in the
4 morning, public safety means the
5 assurance that he is treated fairly and
6 with respect and not unduly put in
7 danger.

8 To the police officer coming
9 home from the shift at 2:00 in the
10 morning, what it means is to be able to
11 return safely to his family and loved
12 ones at the end of that shift.

13 Those are not conflicting
14 issues. They are compatible issues. And
15 what we have to do in this body is get
16 stuff done. We need to provide
17 reasonable solutions for real issues in
18 our community, reasonable solutions for
19 real issues in our community. And I
20 think you began that today by offering
21 and co-sponsoring with me a bill that
22 would provide a dedicated resource fund
23 to the Police Advisory Committee that
24 during the past Administration, I believe
25 it was down to like 200-something

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2 thousand dollars. We have doubled that
3 to a half a million dollars a year, not
4 at the discretion of any Administration
5 but at the responsibility of the Charter,
6 providing get stuff done to deal with
7 reasonable solutions to real problems in
8 our community.

9 I think it goes a long way to
10 restore faith of this process to the
11 community, because obviously as exhibited
12 today, there is that gap of trust, and I
13 think that by doing these kinds of
14 things, that we can do that.

15 I call on my colleagues for
16 sound minds, reasonable judgment to work
17 together. We can't be one way too far
18 and the other way too far, because we
19 won't get nine votes to do real solutions
20 for real people facing our community.
21 And it was tough listening to that stuff
22 today.

23 I saw your face, Maria. I saw
24 you. But we have to be the grown-ups in
25 the room that deal with what's really

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2 going on on those streets to figure out
3 how we can come to compromise. And I
4 look forward to working with this body to
5 do that.

6 And so help ain't coming from
7 Washington. We'd be lucky if we get a
8 budget from the state. So the real
9 solutions don't always have to trickle
10 down. They can trickle up from us, and
11 I'm looking forward to working with my
12 colleagues to do that.

13 Thank you, Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Thank you, Councilman. And we will
16 continue to further the dialogue. I want
17 to thank you for all your work,
18 particularly around this particular
19 issue, and other members. So more to
20 come. Thank you.

21 The Chair recognizes
22 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

23 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
24 you. As if our President can't divide
25 this country any more, right?

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2 The last couple of weeks -- and
3 I want to thank Councilman Oh and
4 Councilwoman Helen Gym for their work on
5 DACA, and this immigration discussion
6 will continue. And that's why it's so
7 important that this Council in its
8 symbolic way recognize Hispanic Month,
9 Mexican Independence Day, and all the
10 other celebrations that will take place
11 to show you the value that these
12 immigrants bring to this country during
13 the tragedy, since we don't have global
14 warming, in Harvey, Florida, and in the
15 Caribbean and in Puerto Rico. Caribbean
16 brothers and sisters got together.
17 Puerto Rico was 24 hours finishing its
18 crisis and people loaded up yachts and
19 went over to Barbuda and other places and
20 took water and supplies. That's what we
21 bring to the United States, those values
22 about how we are in these boats together.

23 And so I want to thank all of
24 you for your support and remind my
25 colleagues that this Monday we will do

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2 the Puerto Rican week flag-raising.

3 Believe it or not, we have put together

4 Todos Para Puerto Rico, Todos PA PR, and

5 all of the Puerto Rican elected

6 officials -- don't laugh, guys. All of

7 the Puerto Rican elected officials in the

8 City of Philadelphia are playing nice in

9 the sandbox on behalf of Puerto Rico and

10 we are collecting money and joining the

11 government of Puerto Rico.

12 There's a million people

13 without electricity, 800,000 without

14 water, and despite that, people are

15 banding together and sending stuff and

16 food and other things to their Caribbean

17 brothers and sisters. So this is going

18 to be a long recovery. It's an opportune

19 time to talk about global warming. It's

20 an opportune time to talk about federal

21 relief and all those things, and that's

22 the beauty of the United States of

23 America, that kind of response. So 45,

24 it ain't going to work. We're better

25 than that.

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2 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilwoman.

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman
6 Domb.

7 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
8 Council President. I want to address
9 what I read today in the newspaper, the
10 Inquirer and Daily News, that
11 Philadelphia remains the poorest big city
12 in the country. And with 400,000 people
13 in poverty, 181,000 in deep poverty, two
14 points I want to get across, one you're
15 going to know about, which is the Earned
16 Income Tax Credit. We continue to leave
17 \$100 million that could go to 40,000
18 people that would dramatically change
19 their lives in the City and dramatically
20 change these numbers. So whatever we can
21 do to promote Earned Income Tax Credit,
22 we need to do.

23 Second, though, more long term,
24 I applaud the pre-K education, but I also
25 feel we need to teach from kindergarten

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2 to 12th grade financial literacy. It has
3 to be taught in every class.

4 So far I've paid for 25
5 teachers in the public school system to
6 take the courses at the Federal Reserve
7 Board where they're learning how to teach
8 financial literacy, but we need to get
9 the School District on board and teach
10 this in the classes. Kids need to know
11 these skills. It's very, very important
12 to help them climb out and succeed.

13 So I just want to make those
14 two points. Thank you very much.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 Thank you, Councilman.

17 The Chair recognizes
18 Councilwoman Blackwell.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
20 you, Mr. President. I agree with all
21 that has been said. As recently as last
22 night, we had our meeting with the
23 Mayor's Commission on African and
24 Caribbean Immigrant Affairs and those
25 from Antigua and Barbuda that was all but

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2 destroyed. Ninety percent of their whole
3 residence, their whole island is just
4 rubble. And we have the leaders of those
5 organizations here part of our
6 Commission.

7 So we submitted -- everybody
8 should have on their desk -- the things
9 they're asking for that they told us last
10 night and where they can contribute.

11 We know that Bibleway is
12 running buses now, that they're asking
13 for people so that they can contribute.
14 We have so many places here in this
15 country and even in Africa and the
16 Caribbean and Cuba and many other places.
17 So we thank you for all that we do in
18 spite of the fact that we are poor in
19 many, many areas.

20 I also want to say thank you
21 for passing -- we've been trying a couple
22 years to get more flags on the Parkway
23 for those places that ask. So we just
24 gave up and put in legislation, and we
25 thank you for supporting it.

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2 Another thing we -- I just have
3 two more issues. One is the days off
4 school meals program that will come into
5 effect as recently as next week,
6 September 21st and 22nd. I will make
7 sure -- I have six recreation centers.
8 Remember, we passed this last year. This
9 allows students to get a free lunch for
10 the school year as part of the days off
11 meals program. Recreation provides the
12 meals so that when schools are closed,
13 children still receive their meals.
14 There are six recreation centers in my
15 area, and I will make sure I pass around
16 the information that everybody else needs
17 for their area so they can get it out to
18 their groups.

19 And, finally, let me say a
20 special thank you to all of you. You
21 have been especially kind to me during
22 the passing of my Tommy, Thomas William
23 Blackwell IV. God bless you all and
24 thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you, Councilwoman.

3 That concludes our speeches,
4 and the Chair recognizes Councilwoman
5 Reynolds Brown for a motion to adjourn.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Almost,
7 Mr. President. Conclusion of speeches.
8 I want to put two notes on the record.
9 First, let me echo and underscore
10 Councilman Jones' remarks for your
11 graceful authority and leadership. It
12 mattered this morning and it made a
13 difference.

14 Secondly, at the end of the
15 day, as Councilman Oh well knows, it's
16 art and culture that ultimately binds us
17 and it's the glue for having a civil
18 society. So on that note, I want to --
19 and as one of the first Board members of
20 the Philadelphia Anti-Graffiti Network
21 under Mayor W. Wilson Goode, now known as
22 Mural Arts, I would ask that all of us
23 pay particular attention to the art
24 exhibit and art installation across the
25 street at the Municipal Services

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2 Building. It is unprecedented and really
3 puts in your face what art can do.

4 And then, lastly, I too want to
5 say a huge thank you to all my colleagues
6 for supporting me during the passing of
7 the matriarch of my family, Sadie Mae
8 Toney Reynolds.

9 And with that, I say that we
10 move that Council stand adjourned until
11 Thursday, September 21st, 2017 at 10:00
12 a.m.

13 (Duly seconded.)

14 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
15 Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you.

18 It's been moved and properly
