3 morning.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
6 We're going to get started. We're
7 running a little late.

8 We have a quorum. I'd ask all
9 guests and visitors to please retire
10 behind the rail and the members take
11 their seat.

12 To give our invocation this
13 morning, the Chair recognizes Reverend
14 Robin Hynicka, Senior Pastor of the Arch
15 Street United Methodist Church. He is
16 here today as the guest of Councilwoman
17 Gym.

18 I would ask all members,
19 guests, and visitors to please rise.

20 (Councilmembers, guests, and
21 visitors rise.)

22 REVEREND HYNICKA: Council
23 President Clarke, Councilwoman Gym, and
24 all Councilpersons represented here today
25 and citizens, it's indeed an honor to

2 stand before you.

3 Let us pray.

4 Holy one of awesome

5 accountability whose image we each hold

6 in our hearts, souls, and minds, move us

7 to remember that we occupy a sacred space

8 that belongs to our siblings, the Lenni

9 Lenape. We honor their physical and

10 spiritual presence and ask to be held

11 accountable for how we still exploit the

12 land and oppress our siblings. Hold us

13 accountable.

14 Move us into just and right

15 ways of being and building together.

16 Infuse integrity into our development of

17 this sacred space we call Philadelphia.

18 So many promises have been broken. Make

19 us honor the will of the people, not the

20 whims of the powerful.

21 Holy one of radical resistance,

22 open our eyes and ears to witness the

23 prophetic imagination of the immigrants

24 among us as they proclaim a vision for

25 Philadelphia that is truly a sanctuary

2 city. Help us expand sanctuary so our
3 city becomes a sanctuary that works for
4 all human beings and global citizens.

5 This is a vision that has no
6 racial profiling, no stop and frisk, no
7 lives stopped and vehicle confiscation,
8 no raids of homes, no detention or
9 deportation without due process. Open
10 our eyes and ears and move us to resist
11 the normalization of politics, policies,
12 and laws that reflect xenophobia, fear,
13 and hate.

14 Holy one of racial
15 reconciliation, instruct us and cause us
16 to dismantle racism by confronting white
17 privilege, denouncing white supremacy, by
18 censuring black and brown voices, and
19 honoring and protecting black and brown
20 bodies.

21 Prevent us from buying into the
22 myth of an American dream that by design
23 exists for some but not for others.
24 Remind us that the system of cash bail is
25 a product of a willful web of insidious

2 intention. Cash bail is a system that
3 has catastrophic consequences when
4 families, children, and far too many
5 persons of color give us a skill set and
6 a will redeemed by true justice to test
7 our intentions against the impact they
8 create.

9 Finally, holy one of jubilee
10 justice, remind us of our highest calling
11 as faith leaders, elected officials, and
12 citizens of the world that it is our
13 sacred responsibility to provide,
14 promote, and protect the human rights of
15 all. And those human rights include
16 unfettered access to quality education,
17 universal healthcare, affordable, safe
18 homes and neighborhoods, a clean
19 environment, a sustainable wage, and
20 dignity in labor, and access to art,
21 culture, and leisure. Elevate us,
22 enlighten us, empower us to be truly
23 human in this sacred space and time. And
24 as we create legislation, may the laws be
25 passed and the lives we live always be

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you very much. The next order of
13 business is the approval of the Journal

17 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

11 The next order of business is
12 requests for leaves of absence, and the
13 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
15 Mr. President. On behalf of the
16 majority, a leave of absence is requested
17 for Councilman Domb.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
19 Chair thanks the gentleman.

20 The Chair now recognizes
21 Councilman O'Neill.

22 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. On behalf of the
24 republicans, there are no requests for
25 leave of absence.

3 Chair thanks the gentleman.

4 At this time, I would like to
5 dispense with the regular order of
6 business and I would like to thank and
7 welcome everyone who has come down today
8 to witness your government in action. We
9 hope your stay here today is a
10 knowledgeable one but, more importantly,
11 a pleasurable one, so much so that you
12 come back again. So, again, thank you
13 for being here today.

14 At this time, the Chair
15 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who
16 will present a citation recognizing Ms.
17 Bernice Dapaah, founder and CEO of the
18 Ghana Bamboo Bikes Initiative. Would Ms.
19 Dapaah and those accompanying her please
20 join the Councilwoman at the podium.

21 (Councilmembers and guests
22 approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
24 joining Councilwoman Blackwell, we have
25 Councilwoman Parker, Councilwoman Gym,

2 Councilman Jones, and Councilman Oh.

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
4 you, Mr. President.

5 We would also like to ask
6 Patricia Harris and Bruce Crawley to make
7 sure they are both here and come forward,
8 because this is their project. We've
9 been involved in it from the beginning,
10 but it was after their creation and their
11 commitment to helping in this area.

12 Many of you may not know, but
13 that bike that we brought in to show you
14 in front of us is made of bamboo. That's
15 the bamboo bike that they are talking
16 about and that they are trying to help
17 people in Ghana and students and people
18 going to work to get for free as they try
19 to go about their lives and their school
20 and their businesses.

21 So we are very, very proud to
22 call them friends and to commend them for
23 the wonderful work that they do and
24 certainly to acknowledge their affair
25 tonight to continue to try to raise money

2 for those in need overseas.

3 City Council, City of
4 Philadelphia citation honoring and
5 recognizing Bernice Dapaah.

6 The Council of the City of
7 Philadelphia is pleased and proud to
8 honor and recognize Bernice Dapaah of
9 Ghana Bamboo Bikes Initiative for her
10 contributions to the economic and social
11 advancement of the Ghanaian people; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Just a brief
13 point of privilege. It was so wonderful
14 to listen to Bernice speak at a women's
15 forum to talk about how women need to
16 come together and really stand tall
17 together, and thank you so much for that.
18 Well, I've got a long way to go, but, you
19 know, but Bruce and Patricia did a
20 wonderful job with that.

21 Whereas, Bernice Dapaah is the
22 founder and CEO of the Ghana Bamboo Bike
23 Initiative in Kumasi, Ghana, which
24 manufacturers the iconic Eco-Ride Bamboo
25 Bicycle, featured right here. Under her

2 leadership, the initiative has developed
3 from a project idea to an award-winning
4 social enterprise that has won several
5 international awards; and

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
7 access to bicycles is so impactful to the
8 lives of many in Ghana. According to the
9 Ghanaian Statistical Service, 30 percent
10 of Ghanaians do not have a school within
11 their immediate community, and almost 30
12 percent of rural women and 30 percent of
13 male children were not attending school.
14 UNESCO reports that the school attendance
15 of young rural Ghanaian girls increases
16 by 600 percent -- repeat, UNESCO reports
17 that the school attendance of young rural
18 Ghanaian girls increases by 600
19 percent -- when provided access to
20 bicycles. The gift of mobility affects
21 residents' ability to access education of
22 course, clear water, clean water,
23 healthcare, and marketplaces to buy and
24 sell their goods. With support from the
25 Philadelphia-based African Bicycle

2 Contribution Foundation, these
3 Ghanaian-made bicycles have been
4 distributed at no cost to transport
5 dependent students, teachers, small
6 farmers, and healthcare workers
7 throughout Ghana's rural areas. In
8 addition to the many benefits seen by
9 those who receive the bicycles, the
10 factory in Kumasi, Ghana provides steady
11 employment for local residents; and

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas,
13 Bernice Dapaah holds a diploma in human
14 resource management and marketing from
15 the Institute of Commercial Management UK
16 and a Bachelor's degree in business
17 administration from the Christian Service
18 University College in Kumasi. She is an
19 alumna of Harvard University's executive
20 education program and has more than a
21 decade of work experience for both the
22 for-profit and non-profit industries.
23 Ms. Dapaah is a member of the World
24 Economic Forum's Global Agenda Council on
25 Biodiversity and Natural Capital made up

2 of the world's foremost intellectual
3 network, convening the most relevant and
4 knowledgeable thought leaders from
5 business, government, academia, and civil
6 society to address key global issues; and

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas,
8 Ms. Dapaah named as an ambassador to the
9 World's Bamboo Organization, having also
10 been appointed as a member of the
11 prestigious Global Teacher Prize Academy.
12 In addition, she has been honored with
13 the World Entrepreneur Forum's
14 Entrepreneur for the World Award for her
15 impact on society and capacity to change
16 the world; and

17 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER:
18 Therefore, by virtue of this citation,
19 the Council of the City of Philadelphia
20 does hereby honor and recognize Bernice
21 Dapaah for her contributions to the
22 economic and social advancement to the
23 people of Ghana. We commend her for her
24 innovative and socially conscious
25 approach to a societal challenge and

2 extend to her the sincere respect and
3 admiration of this legislative body.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
6 the Chair recognizes Ms. Dapaah for
7 remarks.

8 MS. DAPAAH: Thank you very
9 much, ladies and gentlemen. I'm so, so
10 honored and very, very pleased to be here
11 this morning. I can imagine, I'm so
12 excited, and I'm so happy about the
13 communication that we have with our
14 partner, African Bicycle Contribution. I
15 never imagine I could get such
16 opportunity to be here this morning. And
17 I'm very pleased for this citation.

18 I'm actually going to see how
19 best, we're going to do our best in Ghana
20 to employ a lot of youth to manufacture
21 bamboo bicycle in Ghana, to also export
22 it in the City of Philadelphia.

23 I'm very, very grateful, and I
24 could see my team in Ghana, they are so
25 happy about the relationship we are

2 having here in the City of Philadelphia.
3 I have been communicating with them for
4 the past days, and I can imagine, they
5 are so enthused. And I'm so glad African
6 Bicycle Contribution is also supporting
7 us, the amazing bicycles for kids in
8 Ghana. Hot workers, teachers, they walk
9 miles before they can go to school.

10 I was so pleased, very emotion,
11 when I had a call from Juangel Bennett
12 (ph). Do you think this bicycle donated
13 to me yesterday is for me forever?

14 And I said, That is yours
15 forever.

16 And she told me, I'm going to
17 take opportunity to go to school very
18 early and I'm going to make sure I will
19 become one of the first students in my
20 class.

21 Thank you so much for being
22 here with me, supporting me. I'm very
23 glad. Thank you so much.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

3 MR. CRAWLEY: Thank you,
4 President Clarke, members of Council, all
5 assembled, and especially the
6 Councilpeople who have played such a huge
7 role in making sure all this happened,
8 and I have to start with Councilwoman
9 Jannie Blackwell, who in addition to
10 being the District Councilperson in the
11 Third is also a person who chairs the
12 Mayor's Commission on African American
13 and Caribbean Immigrant Affairs, and
14 working with her staff and others, Stan
15 Straughter and others, who have been
16 longstanding members of that group, they
17 have been with us every step of the way.
18 We wouldn't be here without Councilwoman
19 Blackwell and the Commission. So please
20 recognize that.

21 Beyond that, there are certain
22 Councilpeople here who have really done
23 an extraordinary job. I'm sitting here
24 looking at one who is sitting in front of
25 me, Councilman Kenyatta Johnson. All of

2 them who have been helpful are not here
3 on the stage. Councilman Green, who is a
4 member of our leadership committee. Some
5 of the leadership committee members are
6 here.

7 And so this has been a citywide
8 effort. And some people might wonder why
9 Africa. Africa because there is such a
10 great need. We looked at bicycles and we
11 found, as has been stated, that there was
12 a critical need for young people and for
13 farmers. Although Ghana is a wonderful
14 emerging economy with oil, with cocoa
15 beans, with soy beans, with gold, with
16 all kinds of industrial strength, growing
17 industrial strength, Ghana is also still
18 a country where 51 percent of the
19 population is involved in agriculture.
20 And so we've got farmers who grow small
21 plots, but they've got to then get that
22 produce into the marketplace. And if you
23 have to carry it and you don't have
24 motorized vehicles, by the time you get
25 in, you've lost a lot of money. You

2 don't have efficiency. So farmers, small
3 farmers, teachers and students.

4 Quickly, we always tell the
5 story about the young lady who was asked
6 off camera how long it takes her to get
7 to school, and she says, I can get to
8 school in two hours if I run. We don't
9 have that mindset here, and we ought to
10 have it. And so one of the things we're
11 trying to do beyond the bikes is to have
12 an exchange between students here, both
13 secondary school students and higher
14 education students, and students over
15 there. There is a great propensity for
16 people to do entrepreneurship in Africa,
17 greater than the propensity here. So we
18 need to have an exchange. We're going to
19 do that.

20 And then, finally, we are
21 pressing -- and Councilwoman Blackwell
22 knows it and the members of our committee
23 know that we're pressing to do an
24 enhanced trade agreement with Ghana.
25 Right now Philadelphia does \$111 million

2 a year in trade with Ghana. We need to
3 do more. Everybody is moving to Africa
4 for economic advantage. Don't say China
5 because they're all over. We are left at
6 the gate if we don't begin to do business
7 with the people who are the source of
8 most of the wealth in the world today.

9 So we think that starting with
10 Bernice Dapaah's program, this is going
11 to be a jump-off point for better
12 economic and educational relationships
13 between us here and them there.

14 So thank you all very much for
15 this, and I'm sure Bernice Dapaah really
16 does appreciate all that the City of
17 Philadelphia has done for her. Thank
18 you.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: I
21 neglected to mention the Honorable Stan
22 Straughter, Honorary Consul to Guinea and
23 past President of the Mayor's Commission
24 of African and Caribbean Immigrant
25 Affairs and Echoes of Africa, because he

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you very much. The next order of
11 business is communications, and the Chair
12 requests that the Sergeant-of-Arms
13 delivers the messages from the Mayor to
14 the Chief Clerk.

15 Mr. Decker, hold on one second,
16 please.

17 Mr. Decker, please read those
18 messages from the Mayor.

19 CHIEF CLERK: To the President
20 and members of the Council of the City of
21 Philadelphia, I am pleased to advise you
22 that on September 14, 2017, I signed the
23 following bill which was passed by
24 Council at its session early on the same
25 date: Bill No. 170623.

4 body an ordinance authorizing the
5 Commissioner of the Department of Public
6 Property to acquire a trestle over
7 Germantown Avenue just below Cresheim
8 Valley Drive and enter into an agreement
9 to license from PECO Energy Company a
10 certain strip of land running parallel to
11 a portion of Cresheim Creek; and

12 An ordinance amending Chapter
13 19-3200 of The Philadelphia Code,
14 entitled "Keystone Opportunity Zone,
15 Economic Development District, and
16 Strategic Development Area," to provide
17 for additional extensions of certain
18 benefits, all under certain terms and
19 conditions.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you, Mr. Decker. Do you have any
22 additional messages?

23 CHIEF CLERK: I have none,
24 Mr. President.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
10 Council President. I just want to take a
11 moment to acknowledge some of my guests
12 who are here standing with me today.

13 First and foremost, in honor of
14 National Day of Remembrance Day for
15 Murder Victims -- and I'm going to ask
16 them to stand -- is Dorothy
17 Johnson-Speight, who is also joined by
18 Movita Harrell of the CHARLES Foundation,
19 Dorothy Johnson-Speight from Mothers in
20 Charge, Michael Cogbill from CeaseFire
21 and other advocates who are here. Can
22 they please stand.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: And also
25 I'm being honored by Marjorie Morris of

2 the Mayor's Office of Adult Literacy, as
3 well as Wanda Steward. Wanda Steward is
4 the subject of an honorary resolution I'm
5 going to introduce today. Ms. Steward
6 has a truly inspirational story,

8 year later publishing her own acclaimed
9 children's book The Little Chicken Named
10 Pong-Pong. And I'm going to ask for her
11 to stand and thank her for her hard work
12 and her dedication in achieving her
13 accomplishments in literacy.

14 (Appause.)

15 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: A portion
16 of her book was also read by the actor
17 Idris Elba as a part of International
18 Literacy Campaign.

19 So we all recognize that to
20 truly rise out of poverty, to really
21 truly achieve your goals, dreams, and
22 aspirations, education plays a critical
23 part, and it starts with reading.

24 Thank all of you for being here
25 today.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
13 that will be referred to committee.

14 And the Chair recognizes
15 Councilman Greenlee.

16 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
17 you, Mr. President. On your behalf, I
18 offer one bill, and I offer one
19 resolution which is co-sponsored by many
20 members of City Council.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance to
24 amend the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by
25 changing the zoning designations of

9 resolution declaring October as "Domestic
10 Violence Awareness Month."

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That
12 will be on today's Final Passage
13 Calendar.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Henon.

16 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you,

24 Immobilizing of Parked or Abandoned

25 Vehicles," and Chapter 12-2800 of The

2 Philadelphia Code, entitled
3 "Administrative Adjudication of Parking
4 Violations," by adding provisions for the
5 payment of fees and charges for, and the
6 recovery of, vehicles from areas marked
7 by temporary no parking signs in spaces
8 which otherwise permit on-street parking.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
10 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
12 much, Council President. I just want to
13 explain. This is kind of a rare thing
14 that happens. You're parked a block from
15 your home, for example, and you go on a
16 business trip or you go on vacation.
17 You're away for a few days. Unbeknownst
18 to you, your neighbor has gone to your
19 local police department and put up a
20 temporary no parking sign so they could
21 load. For example, they're moving some
22 furniture in. And so unbeknownst to you,
23 your car is towed.

24 When you get back two or three
25 days later, you find out that it's

2 impounded by PPA. You go down there.
3 You have to pay the full fee, the towing,
4 everything, maybe \$400, plus fees.

5 If you do that, you waive your
6 right to an expedited hearing. If you
7 get your car back, you pay your fees, you
8 cannot have an expedited hearing. Most
9 people need their vehicles. And so four
10 weeks later or five weeks later, you get
11 a hearing and you prove that you were
12 away. You weren't in a position to move
13 your vehicle. You didn't know about it.
14 And so they approve you for a refund,
15 which takes between four, six weeks or
16 longer. So typically a person would be
17 out of their money for two and a half
18 months, and for a lot of folks, 400-plus
19 dollars that is out of their pocket is
20 important money.

21 So this bill simply says we're
22 going to now define temporary towing
23 spots, and when you go there and pay your
24 money, you get an expedited hearing no
25 later than one day after the release of

2 the vehicle, excluding like Sunday or the
3 weekend. And that's really why I've
4 introduced the bill.

5 Thank you very much.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman.

8 That bill will be referred to

10 That concludes our introduction
11 of bills and resolutions. The next order
12 of business is reports from committee,

20 today.

21 The next order of business is

19 The Chair now recognizes

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

19 All those in favor signify by
20 saying aye.

21 (Aye.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Those opposed?

24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

2 ayes have it. The motion carries. And
3 we will consider the Resolution Consent
4 Agenda shortly.

5 The Chair now again recognizes
6 Councilman Henon for the purpose of
7 calling up bills and resolutions on the

9 Calendar.

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
11 Mr. President. In addition to the
12 resolutions being considered on the
13 Consent Agenda, the following resolutions
14 and bills are being called up for Second
15 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
16 today: Bill No. 170595-A. All other
17 bills and resolutions are being held.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 Before considering our bills
21 and resolutions on the Final Passage
22 Calendar today, we will have our public
23 comment session. It will go as follows:

24 If you are interested in
25 testifying on a bill or resolution on the

19 (Witnesses approached podium.)

20 MS. JOHNSON-SPEIGHT: Good
21 morning --

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
23 morning.

24 MS. JOHNSON-SPEIGHT: --
25 Council President and members of Council,

1 9/21/17 STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 City Council. My name is Dorothy
3 Johnson-Speight and I'm Founder and
4 Executive Director of Mothers in Charge.
5 We are approving the resolution that's
6 being introduced as a homicide is a
7 public health epidemic today. We are
8 honored to be here for this very
9 important resolution.

10 Homicide is the leading cause
11 of death among African American males,
12 and standing with me are mothers and
13 grandmothers and aunts and sisters who
14 have lost children to homicide. Also
15 represented is CHARLES Foundation, Momida
16 Yancy here as well with Mothers in
17 Charge.

18 Homicide is a public epidemic.
19 It's the leading cause of death among
20 African American males 14 to 34. It has
21 to be treated as a public health epidemic
22 in the City of Philadelphia and across
23 this country. Since 2015, Mothers in
24 Charge has been circulating petitions
25 that says homicide in America as a public

2 health crisis, are implementing
3 legislative reforms to reduce the number
4 of homicides and violent incidents across
5 this nation. Mothers in Charge is a
6 national organization now, and the work
7 that we're doing is to have this country
8 recognize homicide as a public health
9 epidemic, which is what it is. It needs
10 to be treated as such.

11 There are people that are
12 losing their lives every single day, and
13 we've got to find a way to stop the
14 spread of it. So we believe that
15 introducing it as a public health
16 epidemic, that will get the message to
17 everybody that needs to understand that
18 it is the leading cause of death among
19 African American males and men of color
20 across this nation, and we can't just sit
21 by and stand by and do nothing.

22 So I'm very grateful and
23 honored today especially to Councilman
24 Kenyatta Johnson for introducing this
25 resolution. You too know the pain of

2 losing loved ones to violence, and it's
3 something that you never get over, but we
4 need everyone to be on board to make a
5 difference with this issue. Only then
6 will we see a change in the City of
7 Philadelphia as well as this country.

8 So I thank you for this today.

9 Thank you.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you very much.

12 MS. JOHNSON-SPEIGHT: I also
13 wanted to mention and recognize the
14 National Day of Remembrance. September
15 25th in 2007 Congress implemented this
16 day, September 25th, as the National Day
17 of Remembrance for Murder Victims across
18 this country. So we will be celebrating
19 the lives of the ones that we've lost on
20 Monday, September 25th by having a
21 national podcast. There's a number, and
22 we passed around some flyers like this
23 that we'd like folks to call in and give
24 comments on that day, National Day of
25 Remembrance for Murder Victims. There's

2 a number to call in between 12:00 and
3 2:00 and express your concern and your
4 interest on this very important topic and
5 issue.

6 We also are passing out these
7 petitions still getting signatures that
8 we're going to eventually take to
9 Congress to say homicide is a public
10 health crisis.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you. Thank you so much for your
14 testimony.

15 (Applause.)

16 CHIEF CLERK: Michael Cogbill.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
19 morning.

20 MR. COGBILL: Good morning.

21 Councilman Johnson, Council President,
22 Cindy, good morning. On behalf of
23 CeaseFire Pennsylvania and our Executive
24 Director, Shira Goodman, I would like to
25 thank Councilman Johnson and Dorothy

2 Johnson-Speight for initiating such a
3 vital resolution to recognize gun
4 violence homicide as a public health
5 epidemic.

6 In 1996, Congressman Jay Dickey
7 sponsored legislation that would restrict
8 federal spending on gun violence
9 research. This 20-year ban is widely
10 known as the Dickey amendment and has
11 prevented the CDC from conducting any
12 comprehensive studies pertaining to gun
13 violence deaths.

14 At this very moment, there are
15 still attacks on what little bit of
16 funding is allocated towards gun violence
17 reduction efforts. An epidemic happens
18 to be a widespread occurrence of an
19 infectious disease in a community at a
20 particular time. Councilman Jones said
21 that this morning.

22 Our intern, Emily Jacobson, who
23 happens to be a fourth-year medical
24 student at Jefferson, reiterated that
25 while more than 33,000 Americans die

2 annually to gun violence right here in
3 the Commonwealth, African Americans make
4 up 12 percent of the population, but
5 comprise for 69 percent of victims that
6 are murdered by firearm, affirming that
7 these disproportionate statistics are in
8 need of epidemiological attention.

9 We must also observe the
10 non-fatal injuries that bound individuals
11 to wheelchairs and cause life-changing
12 spinal and neurological effects.

13 CeaseFire Pennsylvania fully
14 supports this resolution, and we look
15 forward to assisting community partners,
16 residents, stakeholders, and any
17 forthcoming effort to reduce gun violence
18 in our city.

19 Thank you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you so much for your testimony.

22 (Applause.)

23 CHIEF CLERK: Emma Kornetsky,
24 commenting on 170735.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

3 morning.

4 MS. KORNETSKY: Good morning.

5 My name is Emma Kornetsky and I'm the
6 Manager of Government Affairs for
7 Philabundance. We're the largest
8 regional anti-hunger organization. I'm
9 here today, I want to thank Councilwoman
10 Blackwell for introducing Resolution
11 170735. It's really important that I
12 think Philadelphia speaks up about the
13 importance of SNAP and the federal
14 nutrition programs.

15 In Philadelphia, almost one in
16 three residents receive SNAP, and I think
17 it's important to get a sense of the
18 scale of that program. Approximately \$65
19 million worth of food is coming into the
20 City each month through the SNAP program.
21 In contrast, Philabundance is
22 distributing about \$1 million worth of
23 food into Philadelphia each month. So
24 that just gives you a sense of how big
25 SNAP is, and it means that even just a 10

2 percent cut would force Philabundance to
3 double, triple, quadruple what we're
4 doing. And I'm here to say that we just
5 couldn't do that.

6 So Philabundance is working as
7 hard as we can to find new sources of
8 food, distribute more food, and recover
9 food that would otherwise go to waste,
10 but we could never grow large enough to
11 fill that gap. Private donations will
12 never be enough, and the government needs
13 to play its part.

14 So I think it's also worth
15 mentioning that SNAP is valuable
16 economically. The \$65 million go into
17 our local grocery stores each month,
18 generating jobs and profits all along the
19 food supply chain. Even small cuts to
20 the SNAP program would be devastating,
21 and we need to make sure that our federal
22 legislators hear us loud and clear that
23 Philadelphia values SNAP and the federal
24 nutrition programs. So we encourage City
25 Council to pass this resolution to urge

2 our federal representatives to protect
3 SNAP and other federal nutrition programs
4 from harmful cuts and structural changes
5 that are currently being considered.

6 Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 CHIEF CLERK: Kathy Fisher,
11 commenting on 170735.

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MS. FISHER: Good morning. My
14 name is Kathy Fisher, and I'm the Policy
15 Director at the Coalition Against Hunger.
16 I thank Councilmembers Blackwell,
17 Taubenberger, Green, and Gym for offering
18 this resolution and for the opportunity
19 to provide comment this morning.

20 I don't want to reiterate too
21 much of what Emma just said. We're on
22 the same page on this on how important
23 SNAP, the Supplemental Nutrition
24 Assistance Program, is to Philadelphia
25 and its residents. It provides benefits

1 9/21/17 STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT
2 to just shy of half a million
3 Philadelphians per month, and as Emma
4 mentioned, \$65 million comes to
5 Philadelphia each month in SNAP benefits.
6 Sixty-five million may sound like a lot,
7 and it is, but the breakdown is about
8 \$133 per person per month or \$4.50 per
9 day. The fact that Congress is
10 considering cuts to the program, a
11 critical support that not only helps our
12 most vulnerable but also helps tens of
13 millions of low-wage workers across
14 America, is shameful.

15 Each dollar of SNAP is
16 estimated to generate \$1.70 in economic
17 activity. So it helps not just those
18 receiving the benefits but, as Emma
19 mentioned, retailers, farmers, others.

20 The \$1.70 economic multiplier
21 equates to about 1.6 billion in economic
22 activity in Philadelphia in 2016. So
23 each and every dollar of SNAP helps a
24 family stretch its budget to afford other
25 basics, housing, clothing, medicine and

2 more. SNAP has tremendous ripple effect.

3 We thank Council for this
4 resolution, and we also stress that we
5 must make sure that Congress, as it works
6 to finalize the 2018 budget, its upcoming
7 tax reform, its work on the farm bill and
8 everything, that we speak with one voice
9 and engage as many people in echoing this
10 call for no cuts. SNAP supports all of
11 our other critical investments, city,
12 state, and federal investments, in
13 health, in education, in housing, in
14 workforce development and more.

15 Hungry people cannot thrive. A
16 cut to SNAP is a cut to our investment in
17 our people, and we must make sure that
18 Congress knows these are cuts that
19 America cannot afford.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you for your testimony.

23 (Applause.)

24 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on
25 170735, Deborah Bentzel and Robert

4 MS. BENTZEL: Good morning.

5 Thank you for the opportunity to testify

6 today in support of Resolution 170735.

7 My name is Deb Bentzel and I'm the

8 Associate Director of Community Food

9 Systems at The Food Trust, a Philadelphia

10 based non-profit organization working

11 around the country to ensure everyone has

12 access to nutritious, affordable food and

13 information to make healthy decisions.

14 SNAP, formerly known as food

15 stamps, plays a critical role in reducing

16 hunger and poverty, supports child and

17 adult health, and drives our local

18 economy. A disproportionate number of

19 Philadelphians experience food

20 insecurity, diet-related disease, and

21 lack consistent access to healthy foods

22 in their neighborhoods.

23 SNAP is our first line of

24 defense against hunger, and it helps

25 families purchase the groceries they

2 need, support sound nutrition for child
3 development and education, and quality of
4 life and health for adults. SNAP is
5 important to our business community as
6 well. Grocery stores, especially those
7 located in lower-income neighborhoods,
8 depend on SNAP dollars to keep their
9 doors open, and in turn these stores
10 provide access to nutritious foods.

11 The economic impact of SNAP to
12 the Commonwealth is undeniable. In
13 Pennsylvania, \$2.5 billion in SNAP
14 benefits were spent at grocery restores,
15 farmers' markets, and other food
16 retailers.

17 Further, research from the USDA
18 shows that every \$5 in SNAP benefits
19 generates \$9 of economic activity. Cuts
20 to SNAP on the federal level will leave
21 families hungry, make Philadelphians more
22 vulnerable to diet-related disease, will
23 negatively impact farmers, grocery
24 stores, corner stores, and bodegas.

25 At The Food Trust, we also

2 believe that to have the greatest impact,
3 it takes a comprehensive approach that
4 includes improving access, providing
5 nutrition education, and utilizing SNAP
6 incentives. Our team of nutrition
7 educators and dietitians implement
8 innovative and engaging programming
9 through SNAP-Ed, which is also slated for
10 cuts, and this program teaches children
11 and adults how to eat healthy, how to
12 cook, and how to shop on a budget. We
13 also operate a network of 20 farmers'
14 markets throughout the City, all of which
15 accept SNAP, Farmers' Market Nutrition
16 Program checks, and Philly Food Bucks, a
17 program that's being replicated across
18 the state, thanks to the Federal Food
19 Insecurity Nutrition Incentive Program,
20 making these lower-income neighborhood
21 farmers' markets more accessible to
22 shoppers and more revenue generating for
23 farmers and thus more sustainable in the
24 long term.

25 As Congress prepares to

2 reauthorize the farm bill, which
3 authorizes and provides appropriations
4 for programs like SNAP, SNAP incentives,
5 SNAP-Ed, FMNP, and the Healthy Food
6 Financing Initiative, it's critical that
7 these programs are protected and
8 strengthened.

9 From both the health and
10 business perspective, Philadelphia cannot
11 afford cuts to SNAP and these important
12 programs. We know that SNAP works,
13 increasing access to healthier foods and
14 supporting local businesses like grocery
15 stores and farmers' markets.

16 We applaud the City of
17 Philadelphia for elevating this issue and
18 for resisting the proposed federal
19 spending cuts.

20 Thank you very much.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you for your testimony.

23 (Applause.)

24 (Witness approached podium.)

25 MR. BURDGE: My name is Bob

2 Burdge. I am a SNAP benefit person, and
3 I really don't know where I would get
4 the -- I get \$90 a month from SNAP, and I
5 don't know where that would come from,
6 because taking that out of what little
7 money I get from the federal government
8 would take away from other things that I
9 need.

10 So I thank the Councilmen for
11 sponsoring that and I also thank -- a
12 little side note, thanks to Curtis about
13 the bill about gun violence in the City.
14 That's important to us, because I just
15 had a friend killed in Atlanta from gun
16 violence about six months ago, and it's
17 important. Thank you, brother, for that.

18 Also I want to say thank you to
19 Philabundance, because we can't do
20 without you either.

21 Thank you.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you for your testimony.

25 CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,

2 commenting on 170731.

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 MR. DANIHEL: There's a lot
5 more bills other than that, sir. You
6 want to read them all?

7 CHIEF CLERK: 170732, 170733,
8 170744, 170750, 170758, 170761 and
9 170762, 170763 and 160720.

10 MR. DANIHEL: Thank you. All
11 those bills have to deal with property
12 transfer.

13 Now, this is an official decree
14 of the people in writ of mandamus quo
15 warranto and, as such, requires immediate
16 action and remedy.

17 Every week this Council and
18 Mayor transfers private property to the
19 government, probably illegally. In my
20 case, the denial of due process, trial by
21 jury, and theft of my home sold to me by
22 a self-identified HUD agent to ban swift
23 prosecution to leave no doubt that we are
24 a republic governed by the rule of law,
25 not by the elected monarchy.

2 Paraphrased quotes from
3 patriots and founder fathers warned us of
4 times like these. From Adams, all men
5 would be tyrants if they could.

6 Jefferson, the two enemies of the people
7 are criminals in government, so let's tie
8 down the government with the change in
9 Constitution so that the government will
10 not become the legalized version of the
11 criminals. Ben Franklin, Patrick Henry
12 noted that the Bill of Rights and
13 constitutions were designed to protect
14 the people by restraining the government.

15 In my case, constitution and
16 laws have been violated multiple times in
17 the city that celebrates itself as the
18 birthplace of the Constitution. The
19 Revolutionary War veterans and patriots
20 buried in this City cry out from their
21 graves for prosecution of officials to
22 act like tyrants and violate the
23 Constitution and laws. The constitutions
24 require immediate remedy of this breach
25 of law. Your oath of office requires you

2 to act or face prison.

3 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,
4 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA
5 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1
6 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
7 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in
8 SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear
9 violated.

10 I call upon the federal and
11 Commonwealth governments to perform their
12 constitutional obligations to investigate
13 and prosecute all involved in the theft
14 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
15 1038 West Wyoming. The denial of
16 God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for
17 23 years is egregious, extraordinary,
18 oath-violating, and requires immediate
19 remedy.

20 A just government must obey the
21 rule of law. This color of law
22 government must have its Charter to
23 govern revoked until a constitutionally
24 compliant government is installed.

25 Public servants cannot refuse

2 their sworn duty to act any more than a
3 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
4 sovereign people require the Constitution
5 and laws be enforced. Jail is required
6 for all who violate oath or law.

7 It takes a lot of cooperation
8 to create and allow monumental
9 corruption.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you for your testimony.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Movita
13 Johnson-Harrell.

14 (Witness approached podium.)

15 MS. JOHNSON-HARRELL: Good
16 morning.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 morning.

19 MS. JOHNSON-HARRELL: First I
20 would like to thank our Councilman,
21 Kenyatta Johnson, for introducing this
22 resolution to declare homicide a national
23 health epidemic. I'd like to thank our
24 Councilman, Curtis Jones, Jr., and
25 Dorothy Johnson-Speight of Mothers in

2 Charge, Moms Demand Action, and the
3 National Justice Homicide Alliance for
4 being on the front line of this fight for

9 I am Movita Johnson-Harrell and
10 I am the Founder of the CHARLES
11 Foundation. CHARLES is an acronym for
12 Creating Healthy Alternatives Results in
13 Less Emotional Suffering. My foundation
14 was created in January -- excuse me;
15 April of 2011, exactly three months after
16 the death of my 18-year-old son, Charles
17 Andre Johnson, who was murdered in the
18 case of mistaken identity here in
19 Philadelphia. This should not happen to
20 families in our communities. Our
21 children are getting a hold of illegal
22 guns. They are not properly educated,
23 and when we know that there are systemic
24 blocks to helping them to progress in our
25 city.

2 So we stand with City Council.

3 We implore you to pass this resolution so
4 that the necessary funds can come into
5 the system to make sure that these
6 homicides are reduced and hopefully

22 Those opposed?

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 ayes have it. That resolution is

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
16 been moved and properly seconded.

17 All those in favor say aye.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
20 Those opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
23 ayes have it, and that resolution is
24 adopted.

25 CHIEF CLERK: There are no

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

6 Are there any speeches on
7 behalf of the minority?

8 The Chair recognizes Councilman
9 Oh.

10 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
11 much. I just have some notices and then
12 I'd just like to just provide some
13 information about a little more serious
14 issue.

15 Three notices. First, I've put
16 on every Councilperson's desk just a
17 flyer about the Green Beret fundraiser
18 we're having on October the 6th for the
19 Green Beret Foundation with Governor
20 Rendell, Speaker of the House Mike
21 Turzai, and the former Undersecretary of
22 the Army, former Congressman Pat Murphy,
23 also Danny Swift Garcia, world boxing
24 champion, International DJ Casper and
25 others.

2 For any filmmakers, if you're
3 looking to learn how to finance, produce,
4 and distribute your film -- and I just
5 find more and more young people
6 interested in making their films. We
7 have an event at Community College. It's
8 free, open to the public, Thursday,
9 September the 28th, 6:00 to 8:00 p.m.

10 And then, finally, you'll have
11 until September 30th to enter PHL LIVE
12 Center Stage, Coors Lite, PHL LIVE Center
13 Stage. Simply go to www.phllive.org.
14 And if you are selected, you'll perform
15 live and possibly win \$1,000, free studio
16 recording time, and other good prizes.

17 On kind of a serious note, I'd
18 just like to say that I have come across
19 kind of an interesting situation, and I
20 appreciate the fact that I'll be meeting
21 with our District Attorney, Kelley Hodge,
22 tomorrow. And I'm not sure where this is
23 in the rest of the City, but a couple
24 left for vacation. It's a pastor and his
25 wife. They have a church. And when they

2 returned to Philadelphia, they went to
3 check up on the church's building. It's
4 just a residence where normally a pastor
5 would live. They have their own home.
6 And there was someone in the house. They
7 didn't rent it. There's no lease,
8 anything like that.

9 So they called the police,
10 because the locks were changed and
11 everything. And to make a long story
12 short, they were advised to file in
13 Landlord-Tenant Court. I would say this:
14 Landlord-Tenant Court is for landlords
15 and tenants. You need a lease. If you
16 go file in Landlord-Tenant Court and you
17 don't have a lease, which you wouldn't
18 have if someone broke into your house,
19 you cannot have a case. And it's been
20 two and a half months.

21 I spoke with the district
22 police captain, who assured me that the
23 patrol officer contacted the District
24 Attorney's Office Charging Unit and
25 wanted to proceed by arresting the person

2 in the home. The person said she was
3 online and through Craigslist contacted
4 someone and she's legitimately renting
5 the house.

6 Okay. Where are you paying
7 rent? Where's your lease? If you're
8 innocent, understood, but it's not your
9 house. You have to leave.

10 She has not left that house in
11 two and a half months. We have called
12 almost every day for two and a half
13 months for the police to make an arrest
14 at this point in time, to remove the
15 person. They have broken water valves
16 and other things in this house.

17 I don't understand for the life
18 of me how it could take two and a half
19 months. This is not a tenant. This is a
20 criminal. If they're not a criminal at
21 the beginning, they sure are now.

22 How come the people of this
23 city cannot get a simple thing done like
24 getting someone who broke into their home
25 removed from it?

2 They have to pay the water.

3 The water has been cut off. And this is
4 a pastor of a church. I really can't
5 understand it. I have sent letters.
6 I've made phone calls. I think the
7 police have done their part. What
8 happened in the DA's Office, I don't
9 know, but if people continue to be told
10 you have to go to Landlord-Tenant Court
11 to remove a criminal, that is absolutely
12 incorrect.

13 If there's anyone out there who
14 is facing a similar situation, please let
15 me know. I know there's people very
16 sympathetic about housing. This is not
17 about housing.

18 Thank you very much.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman. I
21 actually had a couple of those calls in
22 my office, so I will refer them to you,
23 sir.

24 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 9/21/17 STATED - SPEECHES

2 Thank you.

3 Speeches on behalf of the
4 majority?

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman
6 Henon.

7 Oh, I'm sorry. Councilman
8 Taubenberger.

9 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Just
10 because I sit here in the back row, I am
11 a member of the minority here.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
13 That's my fault, sir. You're new.
14 That's why you're in the back row.

15 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: I'm a
16 freshman. I understand. I'm new around
17 here. I get it. I get it.

18 I wanted to speak about
19 something else, but actually Councilman
20 Oh raises a very good point and something
21 that is really a problematic situation,
22 on squatters in Philadelphia homes.

23 Over the summer, I was involved
24 in three different events in Northeast
25 Philadelphia, and he is correct in there

2 is some really problematic bureaucratic
3 mess that allows people to stay there.
4 It isn't right. They come almost like a
5 perfect crime. They come with a fake
6 lease. The police officers cannot make a
7 judgment on the spot about whether that
8 lease is accurate or not, but the rules
9 and regulations are so bureaucratic to
10 get someone out, I truly believe it takes
11 a long, long time.

12 We were fortunate in the
13 situations that I was involved with, it
14 moved a little quicker, but the fact is
15 that the average citizen has no idea or
16 understanding how our bureaucracy works,
17 and to be very blunt about it, I'm not so
18 clear myself either. So I'd like to get
19 to the bottom of this, and I think this
20 is something we ought to as a body take a
21 very strong look at. It is a big, big
22 problem.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you.

25 Hold on. The Chair recognizes

2 Councilman O'Neill.

3 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: The only
4 reason the one moved quicker was because
5 the owner paid \$1,000 for them to leave.

6 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: And
7 that is correct, Councilman. Thank you
8 for -- and that has been offered really
9 many, many times in situations as well.
10 It is not reported. They call it cash
11 for keys. And if a certain price is
12 reached -- in this case it was \$1,000, in
13 other cases it's higher -- then the
14 process moves quicker because they may
15 then move out. But it is a crime that is
16 really -- I wouldn't say widespread, but
17 it's moving quickly, and it's something
18 that is a danger to our city and actually
19 adds to a degree of lawlessness if people
20 disregard other people's property rights
21 in the sense of their home, the very
22 thing that they own. So I think
23 Councilman Oh is absolutely correct, and
24 it is time this body take a look at it.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 We'll get our tech staff on it
3 immediately.

4 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: I did
5 want to invite everyone to an event
6 coming up with Dr. Christine Benz. This
7 is being sponsored by the German American
8 Chamber in Commerce in Philadelphia as
9 well as the Committee on Germany, also
10 centered in Philadelphia and, that is,
11 the German apprentice program. They're
12 going to have a meeting. Two things.
13 We're having a meeting in City Hall as
14 well, but on Monday, September the 25th
15 between 5:30 and 7:30 at the great hall
16 of the Community College, there will be a
17 discussion by her on the German
18 apprenticeship program. It is something
19 I think, being America's largest poorest
20 city, we must take a look at so our
21 workforce is ready and able to be
22 involved in the jobs that are awaiting
23 them. So I think this is something we as
24 City Council and as a city need to take a
25 very closer look at.

2 The German Chamber of Commerce
3 and the German government is very much
4 involved in helping us with the start of
5 this program. We should take a look at
6 it.

7 And I thank you very much for
8 the time, Council President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you. Thank you, Councilman.

11 The Chair recognizes
12 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

13 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank
14 you, Council President.

15 I want to thank all of my
16 colleagues who have reached out to me
17 over the last 48 hours with the situation
18 in Puerto Rico and the Caribbean. I want
19 to remind folks that even before
20 Hurricane Irma and Maria, the irony,
21 Puerto Rico was already in crisis. We
22 were in a financial debt that had taken
23 us there due to a lot of United States
24 bad tax policy. We had a colonial status
25 and a financial control board. So we

2 were already suffering.

3 We want to join the 150,000

4 Puerto Ricans in the Philadelphia area,

5 many who are still waiting to hear from

6 their families. But after these national

7 disasters, Puerto Rico is in ruins. A

8 hundred percent of the folks have no

9 electricity or running water. We have

10 billions in damages, a closed airport for

11 the next week. Only the military will be

12 allowed in. And we are months, if not

13 years, away from totally restoring basic

14 municipal services. Puerto Rico and the

15 other Caribbean islands really do need

16 our help.

17 Locally, Unidos for PA were

18 taking advantage of the already scheduled

19 Puerto Rican Week activities to highlight

20 the tragedy and to raise money. I know

21 many people called on the cancellation of

22 events. We really believe people at this

23 particular time want to rally together,

24 and what better way to do it. We are

25 committed to toning down the events, but

2 also building some consciousness about
3 the fact that Puerto Rico is going to
4 need us for a long time.

5 So I want to acknowledge all
6 the local elected officials. I know
7 Mayor Kenney and Governor Wolf will be
8 joining us in some public declarations
9 and offering support.

10 I want to acknowledge AT&T that
11 on Sunday will be donating an 800 number
12 and the ability for us to do a telethon
13 during our parade and post-parade event.
14 So if you have time on Sunday -- I know
15 Councilman Greenlee and Councilman Oh
16 always join us. Greenlee. I said
17 Greenlee -- at our donors reception.

18 We put the information on
19 folks' desks. We'd be happy to have you
20 there. Concilio, who hosts the parade,
21 is serving as our fiscal agent, and 100
22 percent of the proceeds are going to go
23 to Puerto Rico. The Salvation Army and
24 our good Reverend Bonnie are advising us
25 on our efforts. They have 20 staging

2 areas in Puerto Rico. We will be looking
3 to work with them when the airport opens
4 up, and we will be recruiting volunteers
5 for the Red Cross and the Salvation Army,
6 who can give us a couple of weeks to help
7 in the restoration effort. Even
8 Councilwoman Tasco called me last night
9 and immediately said, You need to have
10 hearings on global warming and the
11 impacts around the country. So she gave
12 me the work to do as part of this effort,
13 and I'll talk to Councilwoman Blondell
14 Reynolds Brown about that and what are we
15 doing about getting our preparedness
16 around the country for these natural
17 disasters.

18 I have not heard from all of my
19 family. Some of them I've been able to
20 communicate with WhatsUp, through the
21 WhatsUp application. All of the cell
22 phone towers are down. I don't know what
23 my little house will look like at the end
24 of this, but I will be joining all of the
25 relief efforts and traveling to Puerto

2 Rico soon to see firsthand.

3 But I want to thank everybody
4 who has expressed their concern and
5 willingness to help. So if you have
6 time, come join us on Sunday as we begin
7 what will be a long, long rebuilding of
8 Puerto Rico.

9 So thank you all.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Councilwoman. I'm sure we'll
12 give whatever support we can.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman
14 Henon.

15 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
16 Mr. President.

17 First, to our colleague and
18 friend, Councilwoman Maria
19 Quinones-Sanchez, our hearts, our
20 prayers, and our thoughts are with you
21 and your family and support all the
22 efforts where we can possibly make a
23 difference in your endeavors to start the
24 rebuild. It needs to start somewhere.
25 So we're thinking of you during these

2 times.

3 On a lighter note, on behalf of
4 City Commissioner Lisa Deeley, who I
5 happen to be friends with for a few years
6 and worked together as colleagues and
7 worked together on a lot of initiatives,
8 is now the highest ranking elected
9 official female in the City of
10 Philadelphia citywide. She's leading for
11 the second year in a row the recognition
12 of National Voter Registration Day, which
13 is going to be on Tuesday.

14 So on her behalf and
15 Commissioner Al Schmidt, it's a privilege
16 to ask everybody to participate next week
17 on Tuesday, September 26th, this year,
18 2017. Last year they had mock elections.
19 I was a part of it in our educating our
20 kids on the electoral process, why we
21 vote, how you vote. I mean, just a
22 simple this is a voting machine, this is
23 why we vote. So they have expanded their
24 efforts on National Voter Registration
25 Day to 23 voter registration locations

2 throughout the City of Philadelphia and
3 to 13 mock elections.

4 I have to tell you the
5 enthusiasm on our youth as they
6 participate in the process was
7 encouraging. Because I know as we have
8 seen in the past, voter turnout is low,
9 and it's important for so many issues and
10 some of the things that we support here
11 and legislation as a policy body to have
12 people participate in this process.

13 So I want to thank Commissioner
14 Deeley and Al Schmidt as they lead again
15 another day in recognizing the National
16 Voter Registration Day and encouraging
17 all colleagues to participate where they
18 can, especially in districts who are
19 having these mock elections. I'm sure
20 the Commissioners are going to be
21 reaching out to everybody, but it's all
22 good stuff. It's about education and
23 reminding people the importance of our
24 ability to come out and vote and vote for
25 issues that affect our quality of life

2 every day.

3 So thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilman.

6 The Chair recognizes Councilman
7 Johnson.

8 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
9 Council President. Just a couple small
10 brief announcements. First and foremost,
11 also I do want to show support for my
12 colleague, Councilwoman Maria
13 Quinones-Sanchez, as I had privately but,
14 most importantly, publicly for the state
15 of Puerto Rico and also for the recovery
16 of all those who live there, also all of
17 them who have family members here in the
18 City of Philadelphia. So I wanted to
19 acknowledge that.

20 Two, I want to acknowledge and
21 say happy Rosh Hashanah to all of those
22 who are celebrating the Jewish new year
23 today.

24 And last, but not least,
25 Council President, under your leadership

2 in establishing the Special Committee on
3 Gun Violence, we continue to move forward
4 aggressively, advocating and making sure
5 that we address the issue of gun violence
6 here in the City of Philadelphia. And I
7 think today was a great step forward to
8 really highlight the health component
9 when you talk about the issue of gun
10 violence. When we look at the
11 post-traumatic stress that some of our
12 young people are going through in the
13 City of Philadelphia as a result of the
14 gun violence and the shootings that's
15 taking place in their neighborhoods, we
16 want to rise and take this issue to a
17 whole different level.

18 We should never go into a
19 public school or any school and ask a
20 classroom full of young people, how many
21 of you ever seen someone shot and/or
22 murdered, and everyone or half of the
23 class or the majority of the kids in the
24 classroom raise their hand.

25 When we go through

2 neighborhoods and we talk to young men
3 and young ladies who have lost a loved
4 one or friends to senseless gun violence
5 how are they coping with that loss, most
6 of the time you have a type of negative
7 response or retaliation or I don't get
8 down with those individuals who pull the
9 trigger. So like we're really in a
10 health crisis.

11 And so we'll continue to
12 advocate and move forward. I'd like to
13 thank the people from the subcommittee on
14 victims advocacy who came today and
15 showed their support for that particular
16 resolution put forth by Dorothy
17 Johnson-Speight.

18 So I just want to personally
19 just thank you for stepping up to the
20 plate, being part of this process, and
21 also to Councilman Curtis Jones as well.

22 Thank you very much.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Councilman, thank you, and thank you for
25 your great leadership and your continued

2 push to make sure that this does not make
3 its way to the back page and continues to
4 stay on the front page. I want to
5 commend you for being consistent on that.

6 The Chair recognizes
7 Councilwoman Blackwell.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
9 you, Mr. President. I agree with all and
10 I associate myself with all the
11 resolutions we dealt with today.

12 We want to bring special
13 greetings to our colleague, Councilwoman
14 Maria Quinones-Sanchez. We mentioned
15 last week some of the islands who have
16 been affected by these tornadoes and the
17 Mayor's Commission on African and
