2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning. We're going to get started now,
4 if members will take their seats and
5 visitors retire behind the rail. Thank
6 you.

7 To give our invocation this
8 morning, the Chair recognizes Mr. Larry
9 Gallegar of Calvary Chapel of
10 Philadelphia. He is here today as the
11 guest of Councilman Al Taubenberger.

12 I would ask all members,
13 guests, and visitors to please rise.

14 (Councilmembers, guests, and
15 visitors rise.)

16 MR. GALLEGAR: Thank you,
17 President Clarke. And I'd like to thank
18 everybody here for allowing me to be here
19 and pray today.

20 I want to just open up briefly
21 with Proverbs from the Book of Wisdom,
22 Proverbs, Chapter 11, Verse 14. It goes
23 something like this: Without wise
24 counsel, the people fall, but in the
25 multitude of counsel, there is safety.

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2 And I thought that would be appropriate
3 to start here, because I'm a small
4 business owner and I have about 25
5 employees, and I find it almost
6 impossible for me to go to work every day
7 without reading the word, hitting my
8 knees and praying for my employees.

9 I've been successful. I've
10 been blessed by God for many years now.
11 And I can't imagine what it would be like
12 to be responsible for a city of 1.5
13 million people and make decisions and
14 rules that affect so many of us. So I
15 just want to pray for Council and let you
16 folks get started with your work, and
17 just thank you again for letting me be
18 here.

19 Heavenly Father, we just ask
20 you, Lord, as you look down upon this
21 assembly, that you -- we know that you
22 see every heart that's here. You know
23 every secret, every intention. And,
24 Lord, we need your wisdom.

25 I pray that Council, all of our

12 words.

13 Council will be at ease.

14 (Council at ease.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

16 Thank you. Thank you very much,
17 Mr. Gallegar.

18 The next order of business is
19 the approval of the Journal of the
20 meeting of Thursday, October 5th, 2017,
21 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
22 Greenlee.

23 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
24 you, Mr. President. I move that the
25 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you. It has been moved and
6 properly seconded that the Journal of the

9 All those in favor say aye.

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Those opposed?

13 (No response.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
15 ayes have it, and the Journal is
16 approved.

17 The next order of business is
18 requests for leaves of absence, and the
19 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

20 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. On behalf of the
22 majority, there are no requests of leave
23 of absence today.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 Chair thanks the gentleman.

2 The Chair now recognizes
3 Councilman Oh.

4 COUNCILMAN OH: I'm sorry,
5 Council President. I was too eager.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
7 okay.

8 COUNCILMAN OH: Yes. On behalf
9 of the minority, there is one request for
10 leave. That is by Minority Leader
11 Councilman Brian O'Neill.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair thanks the gentleman. The record
14 shall reflect leave shall be granted.

15 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: At
17 this time, I would like to dispense with
18 the regular order of business and I would
19 like to welcome everyone and thank you
20 for taking time out of your busy day to
21 come down and witness your government in
22 action. We genuinely appreciate you
23 being here today. We hope your stay here
24 today is a knowledgeable one but, more
25 importantly, a pleasurable one, so much

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2 so that you come back again. Again,
3 thank you for being here.

4 At this time, the Chair
5 recognizes Councilman Oh, who will
6 present a resolution recognizing
7 Philadelphia's Stephen Starr, Michael
8 Solomonov, and Greg Vernick as winners of
9 the 2017 James Beard Awards. Would
10 Mr. Starr and those accompanying him
11 please join the Councilman at the podium.

12 Oh, I'm sorry, Councilwoman.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Mr.
14 President, before we begin our
15 presentation, may I make an introduction?

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Sure.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
19 you.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
21 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

22 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
23 you. We'll just let Councilman Oh stand
24 there longer than everybody.

25 It is with great pleasure that

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2 we introduce some special guests today.
3 In fact, we had them here at our meeting
4 last night with the Mayor's Commission on
5 African and Caribbean Immigrant Affairs
6 and Echoes of Africa. They are here.
7 First, I would like to -- they are the
8 Brazilian Delegation that we're welcoming
9 here. Of course, we have our own
10 Honorable Stanley Straughter, part of the
11 Commission, part of Echoes, immediate
12 past President, UNESCO, Honorary Consul
13 to Guinea, and so many other -- wears so
14 many other hats. He is here with --
15 would all of them stand for us as we call
16 your name. Dr. Ken Dossar, Mandinga
17 Productions; Mr. Leonel Leal Neto,
18 Director of the Center for Studies and
19 Strategies in International Relations.

20 We're having a meeting today on
21 tourism that we hope you all will attend.

22 Mr. Felipe Lucas. He's a city
23 councilman from Salvador, Bahia, leader
24 of the Cabinet Delegation. So he's your
25 counterpart, Mr. President, in Salvador.

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2 Ms. Regina Ahmed, Director of
3 Promotions, Bahiaturisa; Mr. Pedro
4 Gramacho, Marketing Manager, Bahiaturisa;
5 and Lucicleide Nascimento, Bahiaturisa.
6 They are in Philly to celebrate Bahia
7 Week and to explore collaborating with
8 the Mayor's Commission on African and
9 Caribbean Immigrant Affairs on the
10 development of African heritage tourism
11 in Philly and Salvador, Bahia, Brazil.

12 As you know, outside of Africa,
13 Brazil has the largest population of
14 Africans. Philly and Salvador have been
15 working together since 1984. The City of
16 Salvador has an 80 percent population of
17 Afro-Brazilian people. We thank Dr. Ken
18 Dossar from Temple, Suzana Silva, who
19 couldn't join us, and Leonel Leal Neto,
20 as well as our own Stan Straughter for
21 organizing this program to organize
22 African heritage tourism initiatives.

23 Thank you. There they are.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Thank you.

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2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Welcome. Thank you for being here.

5 Councilman Oh.

6 (Councilmembers and guests
7 approached podium.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
9 joining Councilman Oh, we have Councilman
10 Squilla, Councilwoman Bass, Councilman
11 Domb, and Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

12 COUNCILMAN OH: Just briefly,
13 we are so pleased that the three chefs,
14 famous chefs of Philadelphia, have been
15 honored with a tremendous recognition,
16 and just the publicity, of course, has
17 really elevated our city, as has their
18 restaurants. Philadelphia is a
19 destination point, and it has added to
20 our culture and to our tourism.

21 And with that, let me recognize
22 and honor Philadelphia's Stephen Starr,
23 Michael Solomonov, and Greg Vernick as
24 Winners of the 2017 James Beard Awards.

25 Whereas, established in 1990,

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2 the James Beard Awards recognize culinary
3 professionals for excellence and
4 achievement in their fields and
5 celebrate, nurture, and honor chefs and
6 other leaders making America's food
7 culture more delicious, diverse, and
8 sustainable for everyone. They are
9 considered the most prestigious culinary
10 awards in America, and Time magazine has
11 called them, quote, "the Oscars of the
12 food world"; and

13 Whereas, facing extremely tough
14 national competition, 20 restaurants,
15 chefs, and restaurateurs from the
16 Greater Philadelphia area were named
17 semifinalists for the 2017 James Beard
18 Awards; and

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, on
20 May 1st, 2017, 3 individuals based in
21 Philadelphia were announced as winners at
22 the 2017 James Beard Foundation Awards in
23 Chicago - a major recognition of the
24 excellent culinary scene in Philadelphia;
25 and

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2 Whereas, the 2017 James Beard
3 Award for Outstanding Restaurateur was
4 presented to Stephen Starr of Starr
5 Restaurants, based in Philadelphia. This
6 award is given to a working restaurateur
7 who sets high national standards in
8 restaurant operations and
9 entrepreneurship. Philadelphia alone is
10 home to 19 popular Stephen Starr
11 restaurants; and

12 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: This is
13 the perfect date night restaurant, folks.
14 I've done it, trust me. If you haven't
15 been to Zahav, it is well worth it.

16 The 2017 James Beard Award for
17 Outstanding Chef was presented to Michael
18 Solomonov of Zahav in Philadelphia. This
19 award is given to a working chef in
20 America whose career has set national
21 industry standards and who has served as
22 an inspiration to other food
23 professionals. Solomonov and
24 chef-business partner Steven Cook own 6
25 restaurants in Philadelphia including

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2 Zahav, their first restaurant; and

3 Whereas, the 2017 James Beard

4 Award for Best Chef: Mid-Atlantic was

5 presented to Greg Vernick of Vernick Food

6 & Drink in Philadelphia. This award is

7 given to a chef who has set new or

8 consistent standards of excellence in

9 Pennsylvania, Delaware, New Jersey,

10 Maryland, Virginia, and Washington, DC.

11 While Vernick's restaurant near

12 Rittenhouse Square has been open for only

13 5 years, he was a James Beard Award

14 finalist for the past 3 consecutive

15 years; and

16 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,

17 for years, Philadelphia and visitors have

18 enjoyed exquisite dining experiences at

19 restaurants run by Stephen Starr, Michael

20 Solomonov, Greg Vernick, now validated by

21 the 2017 James Beard Awards as some of

22 the finest in the United States.

23 Philadelphia's James Beard Award winners

24 feed the growth of the City's creative

25 economy, and recognition bolsters the

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2 City's reputation as a growing hub of
3 excellence in creativity and culture; and

4 Whereas, Philadelphia takes
5 great pride in its food, and Michael
6 Solomonov, Stephen Starr, and Greg
7 Vernick's restaurants are beloved local
8 favorites. These Philadelphians are more
9 than deserving of their illustrious
10 awards, and the City of Philadelphia
11 applauds their significant contribution
12 in building the local restaurant scene
13 into one which now receives national
14 renowned attention; now, therefore, be it

15 COUNCILMAN DOMB: I'm going to
16 add a few words off the record here, but
17 the good news is is that all three of
18 these tremendous restaurant entrepreneurs
19 behind me, fortunately or unfortunately,
20 I have eaten at every one of their
21 restaurants, and I must say, they're
22 unbelievable. But for Philadelphia the
23 uniqueness is that we took more James
24 Beard Awards than any other city in the
25 country, which is pretty amazing, and we

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2 have these three people to thank for
3 that.

4 So it hereby recognizes and
5 honors Philadelphia's Stephen Starr,
6 Michael Solomonov, and Greg Vernick as
7 winners of the 2017 James Beard Awards.

8 Further resolved, that an
9 engrossed copy of the resolution be
10 presented to Stephen Starr, Michael
11 Solomonov, and Greg Vernick as evidence
12 of the admiration and respect of this
13 legislative body.

14 Let me say a few other words.
15 Greg Vernick has a fabulous restaurant
16 2000 block of Walnut and he's opening a
17 new restaurant in the new Comcast Four
18 Seasons that will be a world-class
19 restaurant. Tremendous congratulations
20 to him.

21 And Michael Solomonov and Jeff
22 Cook have now, I think, 12 restaurants,
23 whether they're Federal Donuts or Zahav
24 or Abe Fisher or Dizengoff, and they're
25 all over. They're from Miami to New York

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2 and in Philadelphia.

3 And Stephen Starr has 36 total
4 restaurants, with Le Coucou in New York
5 being the big, big winner in the James
6 Beard Awards.

7 So tremendous congratulations
8 to all three.

9 And thank you, Councilman.

10 Thank you.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
13 the Chair recognizes Mr. Starr for
14 remarks.

15 MR. STARR: Thank you very much
16 for this honor. It is truly an honor to
17 be held in such esteem by your hometown.

18 I really want to thank the City
19 of Philadelphia, because I have
20 restaurants here and in New York and
21 Miami and Washington, DC and soon at Los
22 Angeles, but I would be nothing if it
23 weren't for this city. This is the city
24 I started in, the city that embraced what
25 I did, the city that kept me going and

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2 was loyal throughout all these years. So
3 my biggest gratitude is to the City of
4 Philadelphia and to the people, who
5 really made me what I am today, and I
6 want to thank you very much and I hope
7 City Council continues to make this city
8 a city that can thrive for small business
9 and business, because I was here before
10 all the restaurants were such a big deal
11 and it was a city that was not growing,
12 and once the restaurant scene started
13 here -- and I'm not the only one that
14 started it -- it became such a vital city
15 and such an important city, and I hope
16 that that stays in your mindset as you
17 pass laws and consider the future of the
18 City.

19 Anyway, thank you very much and
20 it truly is an honor to be here.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Council will be at ease.

24 Oh, sorry.

25 MR. VERNICK: Thank you very

2 much. Thank you, City Council. To echo
3 what Stephen said, this is truly an honor
4 to be recognized. I too love the City
5 with all my heart. My business is here.
6 My family is here. I spend every day
7 here. I'm very proud to represent
8 Philadelphia. I'm going to continue
9 working hard to make this city even
10 better than it is. I've seen it grow
11 over the last five years and I want to
12 continue to push.

13 I want to thank both Stephen
14 and Michael for sort of creating such an
15 amazing foundation for the restaurant
16 community for us to be part of. And
17 really thank you very much. We're just
18 going to keep pushing.

19 Thank you.

20 (Applause.)

21 MR. SOLOMONOV: I just want to
22 thank you all personally and thank you to
23 City Council and for the great City of
24 Philadelphia. It was an honor to be able
25 to hold a medal to win a national award

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2 and to be able to celebrate the city in
3 which we've sort of come up in.

4 I'm not from Philadelphia.
5 I've lived here for 17 years, and I'm
6 proud to be sort of a child of
7 Philadelphia. I feel like I have grown
8 up here as an adult, and to start here in
9 2000 and to see where we've come, it's
10 just amazing. I think that culturally,
11 culinary, we have so much going on for
12 the City, and it's amazing to get New
13 Yorkers and DC to come to Philadelphia to
14 have dinner. There's something really --
15 maybe from an ego perspective, I just
16 find it to be really awesome.

17 So thank you very much, and
18 we'll continue doing a good job for you.

19 (Applause.)

20 (Council at ease.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Congratulations again and thank you very
23 much.

25 authorizing and approving the execution

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2 and delivery of a Service Agreement
3 between the City of Philadelphia and the
4 Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority
5 relating to the financing of a home
6 repair program for City homeowners;
7 approving the issuance by such Authority
8 of bonds, notes or other evidences of
9 indebtedness (including reimbursement
10 obligations related to lines or letters
11 of credit) in one or more series to
12 finance or refinance such program and
13 authorizing and approving the obligation
14 of the City to pay in full when due the
15 Service Fee and other amounts payable
16 under the Service Agreement; authorizing
17 certain City officers to take certain
18 actions required to issue such bonds,
19 notes or other evidences of indebtedness;
20 covenanting that the City will make
21 necessary appropriations in each of the
22 City's fiscal years to provide for, and
23 will make timely payments of, the Service
24 Fee and other amounts due under the
25 Service Agreement.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
3 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

4 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank
5 you, Mr. President. As members of this
6 Council, along with the Administration,
7 worked to get the Rebuild initiative
8 passed, there was a lot of excitement
9 about the infrastructure improvements to
10 be made to our parks, rec centers, and
11 libraries, because all Philadelphians
12 could enjoy them sort of indirectly, but,
13 Mr. President, today is a very special
14 day, because this legislation that we are
15 introducing in fact will enhance
16 affordable housing in the City of
17 Philadelphia. And I literally want to
18 borrow your line. The best way to
19 increase affordable housing in the City
20 is to maintain our existing housing
21 stock.

22 And I just want to take a
23 minute to say thank you. And members of
24 the public may remember that last year we
25 passed a very small increase to the

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2 realty transfer tax that would allow us
3 to issue \$100 million in bonds, and 60
4 million of that 100 went to eliminating
5 the massive backlog associated with our
6 Basic Systems Home Repair and over 8,000
7 people will receive assistance from that.
8 But this legislation that I've introduced
9 today on your behalf will allow the
10 remaining \$40 million to move forward
11 with the service agreement between the
12 City and the Redevelopment Authority to
13 administer a home loan repair program.
14 And I say "loan" because it will be
15 sustainable. We're not talking about
16 simply just passing out grants and when
17 the well is dry, it's dry and we have
18 nowhere else to go. People now will have
19 access to revenue that will assist them
20 to repair crumbling steps, fix a
21 retaining wall, get their bricks pointed
22 and, Mr. President, if they choose, get
23 the driveway repaired. And this has been
24 an issue in the City for a long time.

25 It may not be a big deal to

2 some people, but if you own a house and
3 are retired in the City and make a nickel
4 over the income eligibility guidelines
5 for any of the City's grant programs,
6 this means everything to you, and this
7 would not have happened without your

14 driveways. I know you've been on that

11 about this merger before it happens.

12 But a couple weeks ago, you had
13 a person come to your Council meeting and
14 made some public comments about an
15 officer that had shot him, and they were
16 some profound comments and they were
17 comments that if he had made these
18 comments maybe a couple weeks after it
19 actually happened, maybe we could have
20 saved another person's life in this
21 Council -- or from the Council meetings.

22 I'm here to ask the public
23 comment not only include a section on the
24 agenda items and especially just the
25 agenda items that are in the Final

2 Passage Calendar, because how could
3 anybody really comment on anything when
4 you suspend the rules of the Council all
5 the time and you move everything to the
6 Final Passage Calendar? People should

10 they do in Houston. They do in every
11 other major city have the right to come
12 and make an open public comment about
13 matters of concern.

14 So if I have a matter of
15 concern -- I'll give you an example. I
16 lived in Smyrna, Delaware, a real small
17 town. Such a small town -- my wife
18 doesn't have a driver's license. The
19 Acme was across the street, but it was
20 across Route 13. Now, there was no
21 crosswalks in Smyrna, Delaware, and I'm
22 saying to myself, are they kidding me?
23 There's no crosswalks. How does she get
24 to the store?

25 She calls me at work. She

3 I say, Babe, just take the kid,

5 She said, I can't cross the

11 South Street, and I made the suggestion
12 that we put crosswalks in Smyrna,
13 Delaware. And guess what? There's now
14 crosswalks in Smyrna, Delaware from an
15 open public comment session about a
16 public safety issue.

17 This city is 1.5 million people
18 of good ideas, and we get to see what's
19 actually happening on the internal
20 working parts of the City. Let us have
21 the chance to come and tell you what's
22 happening in the City. Let us come and
23 tell you our thoughts on maybe bills or
24 things that you pass that we don't agree
25 with. I mean, I know that certain people

13 What law supersedes the
14 constitutional requirements of due
15 process and just compensation before
16 stealing my home? Did the U.S. Congress,
17 Senate, and General Accounting Office
18 issue documents directing the amounts of
19 just compensation owed in the Logan area?
20 Did Pennsylvania Commonwealth government
21 issue law clearly defining monies owed
22 before government can transfer title?

23 PA Constitution, Article I,
24 Section 10, 26 PA CSA 701 through 716.
25 Was U.S. HUD development bulk when a

2 government agency acquires your property
3 handed to Mr. Danihel multiple times, was
4 book violated? Were Constitution and
5 laws violated? Was trial by jury opposed

9 monies for over a decade? Were some paid
10 and not all, violating equal treatment
11 and cruel and unusual punishment clauses
12 of the Constitution?

13 Has Council, Mayor, and others
14 acknowledged that the District Attorneys
15 refuse sworn duty to prosecute theft of
16 property crimes? Why has no one been
17 prosecuted for violating oath,
18 Constitution, and law violations? The
19 Constitution and laws require immediate
20 remedy of this breach of law or breach of
21 close, breach of fiduciary duty. Your
22 oath of office requires you to act or
23 face prison.

17 The Chair recognizes Councilman

18 Oh.

19 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very

20 much, Council President. I just wanted

21 to inform the public that there will be a

22 regional candlelight vigil this Saturday,

23 Saturday, October the 14th at 6:00 p.m.

24 at Camden Waterfront Stadium, 401 North

25 Delaware Avenue, Camden, New Jersey. The

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2 reason I'm talking about it is because we
3 are dealing with the deaths from
4 overdose, we as a city and other cities
5 in our region, and we have been trying to
6 work out a regional approach to dealing
7 with in particular the heroin/opioid
8 epidemic that we have, and I discovered
9 that Camden has been doing a very
10 significant vigil every year and they
11 want to make it regional, and so they've
12 invited all our surrounding counties and
13 Philadelphia to participate. And this
14 will be an event that is free and open to
15 the public.

16 I just have to state, for those
17 who may not know this, that in the United
18 States, overdose is the number one cause
19 of death for individuals under 50 years
20 old, and we lose 142 lives every day to
21 overdose. In the year 2016, that's
22 52,404 Americans.

23 And so for those who can attend
24 and participate, and there's many who do
25 find this type of vigil very therapeutic

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2 and also a very positive thing to do in
3 terms of kind of reaching out to folks
4 and also letting people know the
5 seriousness of the drug addiction
6 epidemic, I certainly encourage everyone
7 to attend this vigil. Again, Camden
8 Waterfront Stadium, this Saturday,
9 October the 14th at 6:00 p.m.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 On behalf of the majority, the
14 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds
15 Brown.

16 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
17 Mr. President. Under the leadership of
18 our colleague Councilman Derek Green, my
19 office joined with the Philadelphia
20 Federation of Teachers, parents, and
21 advocates to join in and lift up, become
22 a part of the Philly Healthy Schools
23 Initiative, and the principal goal was to
24 create a thoughtful plan to make sure
25 each building, school building, in the

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2 system is safe and healthy for the
3 conditions -- are in safe and healthy
4 conditions for the health of our
5 children.

6 The importance of this work was
7 underscored yesterday when we learned
8 that the John B. Kelly School was forced
9 to close because of mold found in several
10 classrooms. Too often we are quick to be
11 critical of what the School District
12 doesn't do well. Today we need to
13 acknowledge and express appreciation that
14 the leadership at the School District
15 took swift action to remove all the
16 students and the faculty from that
17 building until it is deemed safe, and
18 that certainly underscores the important
19 work ahead for the Philly Healthy Schools
20 Initiative.

21 On a related but separate
22 issue, December 2016 the women of City
23 Council celebrated Philly's new lead
24 poisoning protection measures, and it was
25 Councilwoman Sanchez who said, and I

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2 quote, Many times people don't know if
3 people have a house built before 1974
4 that they may be exposed to lead. So
5 it's not about being punitive. It's more
6 about being thoughtful in the work that
7 we do to establish protocols to protect
8 our children.

9 This week, October 9th,
10 Philadelphia caught the attention of the
11 country media outlet CBS where the topic
12 was lead discovered in soil. The uptick
13 in development and construction has
14 uncovered a new but old health risk again
15 facing our children.

16 In booming Philadelphia
17 neighborhoods, lead poison has been found
18 in the soil of construction sites. Most
19 notably, the districts of Councilwoman
20 Sanchez and Councilman Mark Squilla. The
21 result, of course, is toxic coating of
22 playgrounds and backyards with dangerous
23 levels of lead dust. And we don't -- I
24 won't be repetitive in speaking about the
25 toxic dangers of lead. It severely

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2 impacts every aspect of a child's
3 development.

4 What is clear, what has been
5 pointed out in the stories, that
6 developers and construction managers are
7 simply not doing their part to protect
8 playgrounds and backyards. And the bad
9 news is that developers are not required
10 to test soil for lead as a routine
11 precaution before disturbing land.

12 Worse, our fact-finding tells us that no
13 single government agency is responsible
14 for making certain our yard's soil is
15 safe.

16 Our Administration responded by
17 issuing a series of recommendations in
18 the 2017 Philadelphia Childhood Lead
19 Poisoning Prevention Advisory report, but
20 clearly the lifting up of this story on
21 national news featuring purely
22 Philadelphia was troubling, and it's a
23 signal to us that we still have work to
24 do.

25 I'm of the view that we must

2 avoid the trap where everybody's problem
3 is nobody's problem if we're to fully
4 arrest this persistent health risk.

5 So there's still gaps in the
6 system, and be advised that my office
7 again is going to link up with interested
8 parties to fill the voids required to
9 further protect our most vulnerable
10 citizens, our children. Clearly, there's
11 still work to do, and our office is
12 rising to the occasion to do more.

13 Thank you, Mr. President.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you, Councilwoman.

16 The Chair recognizes
17 Councilwoman Blackwell.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
19 you, Mr. President. We just passed
20 around a picture of, it looks like, a gun
21 that was given to one of my staffers. If
22 you look closely, it is a phone case.
23 The phone is on the top, and it looks
24 just like a weapon. And so I'm asking my
25 colleagues to help me figure how we

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2 outlaw this so that we don't have people
3 in danger and children who could be
4 killed and gun issues because a phone
5 carrier is made like a weapon. That's
6 number one.

7 Number two, I would like to
8 certainly thank our Brazilians who were
9 here. I forgot to ask them to stay for
10 photos, but we thank them. They'll be
11 around --

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 They're still here, Councilwoman.

14 They're still here.

15 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Great.

16 Oh, they're still here. Thank you.

17 So I would like to request if
18 some of you would stay so we could get
19 pictures at the end with our colleagues
20 and them so that they can take them with
21 them.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you, Councilwoman.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Number

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2 three, on Saturday from 8:30 to 9:00,
3 Local 57 is asking us to join them on 6th
4 and Spring Garden where they will have a
5 trailer there to collect food, clothing,
6 any personal belongings, money for Puerto
7 Rico. This is done certainly under the
8 leadership of the business manager,
9 Esteban Vera, Jr., and I contacted, of
10 course, our colleague Maria
11 Quinones-Sanchez, who has done a fabulous
12 job in this, to ask her help in making it
13 happen.

14 So we hope if you're free,
15 you'll come. Maria has agreed to help
16 us. They want help in contacting others,
17 certainly in publication to the press as
18 well, so that people will know they are
19 doing their part in trying to help those
20 people adversely affected in Puerto Rico.
21 And we thank Esteban Vera, Jr. for
22 bringing it to our attention. He brought
23 it to me through a nephew, Charles
24 Blackwell. We call him Chi-Chi, who is
25 Lu's nephew, who is Vice President of

3 So let me thank Maria in
4 advance, because our colleague has been
5 fabulous in all that she's doing to help
6 Puerto Rico, and she's just been
7 wonderful.

8 Finally, let me say that today
9 is the 31st birthday of Roxanne Horrell,
10 my lawyer. So join me in wishing her
11 happy birthday.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
14 you.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
16 She's young enough that that won't be a
17 problem with you making that public.
18 Thank you, Councilwoman.

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 Green.

21 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
22 Council President. I want to thank my
23 colleague Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds
24 Brown for bringing up the issue of the
25 Philly Healthy Schools Initiative. The

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2 concern that she has raised as well as
3 all members of this body raised in
4 reference to the recent incident at J.B.
5 Kelly School is very important. We need
6 to make sure that all classrooms in the
7 City of Philadelphia are safe and healthy
8 for not only for the students that attend
9 but also the teachers and all other
10 professionals that work there.

11 One of the reasons -- well, two
12 of the main reasons why I got involved in
13 the Philly Healthy Schools Initiative is
14 because two of the most important titles
15 I've ever received are son and father.
16 Many people in this body know my mother
17 worked in the School District for well
18 over 30 years, many of those years at
19 Olney High School, and my son is a 10th
20 grader at Hill-Freedman World Academy.
21 So it's very important to me as well as
22 to all members of this body and to people
23 throughout the City of Philadelphia that
24 we have safe environments, safe
25 workplaces for our children to learn and

2 get a great education, because they are
3 the future leaders of our city, as well
4 as for all of the professionals that work
5 in our school buildings to be safe, have
6 safe environments, so that way, they can
7 really teach our children the education
8 and provide the instruction so they can
9 truly be the next leaders of the future.

10 As a father, it's also
11 important to note that next Saturday is
12 the Annual Autism Walk. As many people
13 in this body also know, that my son is
14 autistic. Next Saturday, October 21st at
15 9:00 a.m. at Citizens Bank Park, we will
16 have the Annual Autism Walk. It's a fun
17 activity, a fun event. Please come out
18 and have your co-workers, your friends,
19 members of your churches, synagogues,
20 mosques come out and support this great
21 event.

22 When my son was diagnosed with
23 autism, one out of every 200 children
24 were on the autism spectrum. Now it's
25 one out of every 66 and one out of every

2 54 boys. So everyone in this room and
3 everyone listening to my voice has either
4 a neighbor, a co-worker, a friend,
5 someone in their family, someone in their
6 religious institution that has been
7 affected by autism.

8 So I hope that everyone can
9 come out on Saturday, October 21st at
10 9:00 a.m. to support the Autism Walk.

11 Thank you.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 The Chair recognizes Councilman
15 Johnson.

16 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
17 Council President. Just an update. So
18 over the last two years, I've been
19 working on an issue along the Schuylkill
20 River Trail, specifically the issue of
21 public safety. A couple incidents took
22 place during the winter, a couple
23 incidents took place during the
24 summertime, and all of it revolved around
25 young people groping and assaulting

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2 individuals who exercise and individuals
3 who are out in the open enjoying
4 themselves along the Schuylkill River
5 Trail. Most recently, this week we had a
6 young lady from the district who was
7 assaulted by a group of young men on the
8 Schuylkill River Trail.

9 And so I continue to work with
10 my staff and the Department of Parks and
11 Recreation and Town Watch to improve
12 safety along a key part of the trail
13 that's in my district, and over the past
14 couple of months, we have been making
15 some accomplishments. One is, lighting
16 along the trail has been increased
17 significantly. And so I want to thank
18 you for working with me and putting up
19 some of your capital funds to increase
20 the lighting along the trail that
21 extended into your district.

22 We have put mile markers along
23 the trail, because a couple times when an
24 incident did take place, the person
25 didn't know where they were at. So when

2 they did call the police, they couldn't
3 say, I'm at this particular area. So we
4 did put mile markers out there.

5 But one of the proudest
6 accomplishments thus far, at least that
7 will go towards deterring crime along the
8 Schuylkill River Trail, is the
9 installment, the soon-to-be installment,
10 of 20 cameras along a portion of the
11 trail. And someone said, Well, the
12 cameras only prevent -- the camera only
13 addresses the issue after the fact, but
14 that's not actually the case. When
15 you're working in partnership with the
16 Philadelphia Police Department, they have
17 intel when they review who is just
18 hanging out on the trail every day. So
19 you'll have information ahead of time.
20 So when the patrol officers are along the
21 trail, they're able to again keep an eye
22 out for public safety. And we've been
23 working with the Ninth Police District to
24 increase bicycle patrol, but also
25 undercover officers but, most

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2 importantly, we need the public to, when
3 they see something, say something,
4 because at the end of the day, that
5 intel, when you see people up to no good,
6 is a good way to be proactive on this
7 issue.

8 So we're going to stay on top
9 it, but I wanted to personally
10 acknowledge you for putting up some funds
11 and also helped out with that process. I
12 know when I go out there, my family, we
13 run into Blondell Reynolds Brown jogging,
14 getting her exercise. So we're civilians
15 when we're on the trail. We're not
16 Councilperson A or Councilperson B.
17 We're just average Philadelphia citizens
18 trying to enjoy themselves. So we have a
19 vested stake in making sure that trail is
20 safe.

21 So I just want to say that for
22 the record and just thank you for your
23 leadership and your support on this issue
24 as well.

25 Thank you.

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2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for
4 your continued work. As you know,
5 violence can happen anywhere to anyone in
6 the City of Philadelphia. So thank you
7 for your continued vigilance on that very
8 important issue.

9 The Chair recognizes
10 Councilwoman Bass.

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. And I wanted to thank my
13 colleagues also for their comment and
14 conversation and making more awareness
15 about the J.B. Kelly mold situation. And
16 as a District Councilperson who
17 represents J.B. Kelly, which is in
18 Germantown, it's obviously not a surprise
19 in terms of the conditions of our
20 schools, that they need a lot of work,
21 they need a lot of help, they need the
22 resources. And so beyond repairing the
23 school and preparing it for children, our
24 young people, and teaching professionals
25 to go back into the school, we also need

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2 to make sure that while they are out,
3 that there is an action plan. And we did
4 have a conversation with the District as
5 well, because some parents were notified
6 quite late yesterday that there wouldn't
7 be school today.

8 So I want to thank the District
9 for working with us on that, and we look
10 forward to putting together an action
11 plan not just for J.B. Kelly but if this
12 should occur and likely will occur in the
13 future, what is the action plan so that
14 our children do not lose any more
15 educational time than they have to. So,
16 again, I wanted to thank them for that.

17 Also I wanted to mention that
18 today I introduced a resolution opposing
19 President Trump and his administration
20 for their attempt to curtail women's
21 access to contraception. The Trump
22 Administration announced plans to roll
23 back a crucial Affordable Care Act
24 mandate that requires employers to cover
25 contraception for women employees earlier

2 this month. The announcement was met
3 with swift resistance from the medical
4 community, human rights legal groups, and
5 our own Attorney General, Josh Shapiro,
6 who announced Wednesday that he's going
7 to be suing the Trump Administration for
8 its most recent attempt to revoke
9 healthcare access from our most
10 vulnerable citizens.

11 Since taking office, Trump has
12 demonstrated time and time again that he
13 has no interest in protecting the rights
14 and privileges of every American citizen.
15 He and his policies have attacked people
16 of color, Muslims, immigrants, low-income
17 Americans, and women. The
18 Administration's latest move to rip
19 contraception coverage from the hands of
20 as many as 2.5 million women in
21 Pennsylvania and millions more across the
22 country will roll back the clock on
23 women's healthcare.

24 In addition to preventing
25 unplanned pregnancy, birth control treats

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2 several other women's health issues,
3 including ovary syndrome, hormonal
4 imbalances, and others. That the Trump
5 Administration seeks to allow employers
6 to take away vital healthcare from women
7 on the basis of a religious or moral
8 objective is in fact morally corrupt, and
9 as usual, low-income women will be most
10 adversely affected.

11 We as elected officials and as
12 a nation simply cannot allow this to
13 happen. We have to stand with the women
14 of Philadelphia and across the nation and
15 show them that we support you, we care
16 about you, and we will fight against any
17 discrimination of any kind. And
18 ultimately this is about power and this
19 is about the control of women. If you
20 have a religious objection to birth
21 control, then don't use it, but for those
22 who do use it, ripping away this coverage
23 is completely unacceptable.

24 Thank you, Mr. President.

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2 Thank you so much, Councilwoman.

3 The Chair recognizes

4 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

5 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank

6 you, Mr. President. I just wanted to

7 thank Councilwoman Blackwell and all my

8 colleagues who have been supportive.

9 This morning I was going to come to

10 Council and speak to the \$120,000 that

11 was raised through Unidos PA'PR, which

12 the Kenney Administration and others have

13 been an integral member of. We've

14 invested \$25,000 in the Salvation Army's

15 14 feeding stations in Puerto Rico, and

16 we're shipping another \$25,000 worth of

17 solar lights and other things working

18 with PECO. We have shipped 189,000

19 pounds of goods to Puerto Rico, and I was

20 going to celebrate the kind of energy

21 around this effort. And then this

22 morning President Trump tweeted about

23 Puerto Rico, about our debt, and about

24 the fact that FEMA could not stay there

25 forever. FEMA is just arriving and still

2 not at the same level as other comparable
3 situations.

4 I just wanted to remind folks
5 that FEMA is still in New Orleans doing
6 infrastructure investment in the
7 billions. This is 12 years later. So I
8 don't know what he's talking about.

9 Thank you, Mr. President.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11 Thank you, Councilwoman. I'm not going
12 to say anything. I was getting ready to
13 say something inappropriate. I'm sorry.
14 I'm sorry.

15 That concludes our speeches on
16 behalf of the majority and minority.

17 The Chair recognizes
18 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for a motion
19 to adjourn.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes.

21 Thank you, Mr. President. I move that
22 Council stand adjourned until Thursday,
23 October 19th at 10:00 a.m.
