2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning, everyone. I'd ask the members
4 to take their seat, the visitors will
5 retire behind the rail, we will get
6 started. Thank you.

7 To give our invocation this
8 morning, the Chair recognizes Reverend
9 Christian Pennachietti of the Third
10 Baptist Church. He is here today as the
11 guest of Councilman Squilla.

12 I would ask all guests,
13 visitors, and members to please rise.

14 (Councilmembers, guests, and
15 visitors rise.)

16 REVEREND PENNACHIETTI: Good
17 morning, Council.

18 (Good morning.)

19 REVEREND PENNACHIETTI: Gandhi
20 said this, and I quote, The best way to
21 find yourself is to lose yourself in the
22 service of others, end quote.

23 Solomon, the wisest king in the
24 Bible, said this in Ecclesiastes, Chapter
25 9: For whatsoever thy hand findeth to

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15 Thank you. The next order of business is
16 the approval of the Journal of the
17 meeting of Thursday, October 12th, 2017,
18 and the Chair recognizes Councilman
19 Greenlee.

20 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
21 you, Mr. President. I move that the
22 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,
23 October 12th, 2017 be approved.

24 (Duly seconded.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you. It has been moved and
3 properly seconded that the Journal of the
4 meeting of Thursday, October 12th, 2017
5 stand approved.

6 All those in favor say aye.

7 (Aye.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Those opposed?

10 (No response.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
12 ayes have it, and the Journal is
13 approved.

14 The next order of business is
15 requests for leave of absence, and the
16 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. On behalf of the
19 majority, there are no requests of leave
20 of absence today.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 Chair thanks the gentleman.

23 The Chair now recognizes
24 Councilman O'Neill.

25 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,

2 Mr. President. On behalf of the
3 republicans, there are no requests for
4 leave of absence.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
6 Chair thanks the gentleman.

7 At this time, I would like to
8 dispense with the regular order of
9 business and I would like to thank
10 everyone who has taken time out of their
11 busy day to come down to witness their
12 government in action. We genuinely
13 appreciate you coming down. We hope
14 today is a pleasurable one, but so much
15 more a knowledgeable one, so much so that
16 you come back again. So, again, thank
17 you so much for being here today.

18 At this time, the Chair
19 recognizes Councilwoman Parker, who will
20 present a resolution honoring and
21 recognizing the students, staff, and
22 partners of Hill-Freedman World Academy
23 High School. Would the students please
24 join the Councilwoman at the podium.

25 (Councilmembers and guests

2 approached podium.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

4 joining Councilwoman Parker, we have

5 Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Henon,

6 Councilman Green, Councilman

7 Taubenberger, Councilman Jones, and

8 Councilman Domb and Councilman Johnson

9 and Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

10 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank

11 you, Mr. President, and I'll take this

12 opportunity while we are getting

13 assembled here to say, one, I am excited

14 about welcoming Hill-Freedman World

15 Academy to the City Council of

16 Philadelphia Chambers.

17 I also want to note that

18 everyone knows Hill-Freedman, but we were

19 very fortunate in the Ninth Councilmanic

20 District when in 2016, thanks to the

21 leadership of Dr. Hite and the School

22 District of Philadelphia and Principal

23 Majewski, they made the former Leeds

24 School their school here in the City of

25 Philadelphia. And in 2016, the 10th

2 grade class -- and they're now 11th
3 graders -- they began learning
4 computer-based music production and
5 composition, and they did this in
6 partnership with David Bradley and
7 LiveConnections.

8 David Bradley, raise your hand
9 so the people watching know who you are.

10 And I learned this: While I
11 was proud as a District Councilperson to
12 say that they have a music production
13 studio, I was even more proud, Councilman
14 Johnson, to learn that while we are not
15 the only school with a music production
16 studio, we are the only school that we
17 are aware of which has produced and
18 published its own CD and distribute it to
19 the public. So that is huge for us.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And while
22 the process will be normal and that we
23 will go through our resolution
24 presentation, it will be a little
25 different in that in true leadership

2 style, the school has said, We do not
3 want you to hear from the principal and
4 the leadership of the school. We want to
5 yield our time so you can hear 60 seconds
6 from the young people of what is actually
7 on their CD.

8 So I want you to raise your
9 hand, Principal Majewski, just so people
10 will know who you are. Raise your hand,
11 Principal. Raise your hand higher. The
12 people are watching on television.

13 And so, Principal Majewski,
14 thank you so much for your leadership, a
15 student-centered community onto
16 principals. He doesn't sit in the office
17 to govern like these other people in the
18 school. So that's important.

19 Ezechial Thurman. You'll
20 remember him. Councilman Green, you had
21 him when he was here at Houston. They
22 produced actually some work there, but he
23 led the music production program at
24 Houston Elementary, the students CD
25 production project of 2014-'15, and we

2 have an in-school studio that supports
3 Hill-Freedman students and community
4 because of Zech Thurman.

5 Zech, where are you? Because I
6 don't think -- thank you so much.

7 Recognition is important. When Houston
8 was here, I don't know that people knew
9 that we recognized some folks, but you
10 were the man who made it happen. So we
11 need to note that for the record.

12 I'll talk about Bria later.
13 Dana Hinkson, the Associate Student
14 Producer, she spent hours supporting and
15 encouraging her, crossed every T and
16 dotted every I.

17 David Bradley, where are you,
18 the rock star? Raise your hand. David
19 of LiveConnections. Understands the
20 importance of music and the arts and
21 connected our young students to writing
22 workshops. And Yolanda Wisher, who is
23 the Poet Laureate for the City of
24 Philadelphia. Sponsors are here. The
25 guys who gave the money are extremely

2 important. I want to know who they are.
3 Stockton Rush Bartol, Patricia Kind,
4 Wyncote. And, listen, you heard Ezechial
5 Thurman. He was so vested that his
6 family ended up being one of the
7 sponsors, John and JoAnn Thurman, and the
8 Pennsylvania Council of the Arts.

9 So after we make the
10 presentation, you will hear from Solomon
11 Smith and Bria Jordan, and every
12 Councilmember today will receive a copy
13 of this, which is the official First
14 Verse CD.

15 The resolution reads as
16 follows:

17 A resolution honoring and
18 recognizing the students, staff, and
19 partners of Hill-Freedman World Academy
20 High School, in collaboration with
21 LiveConnections, on the release of FIRST
22 VERSE, a student-led, original CD album
23 of poetry set to music.

24 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
25 in the fall of 2016, Hill-Freedman World

2 Academy High School, under the leadership
3 of Principal Anthony Majewski, opened its
4 new music studio, record label, and music
5 technology program; and

6 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,
7 Music Technology Teacher Ezechial
8 Thurman, who designed and implemented the
9 new program and launched Hill-Freedman
10 Records, taught all 11th graders as they
11 immersed themselves in learning
12 computer-based music production and
13 composition as part of the school's
14 International Baccalaureate Programme;
15 and

16 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:
17 Whereas, as students developed their
18 music composition skills, Thurman reached
19 out to LiveConnections, a non-profit
20 dedicated to inspiring, learning, and
21 building community through collaborative
22 music-making, to partner together through
23 an artist residency at the school, led by
24 Founding Director, David Bradley; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

2 Whereas, LiveConnections brought City of
3 Philadelphia Poet Laureate, Yolanda
4 Wisher, to the music studio to lead a
5 poetry-writing program; and

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: It's good to
7 be the first, but you can't be the only.
8 We're putting 2.5 million in Overbrook
9 High School to match what you're doing.
10 And so competition is on.

11 Whereas, students wrote about
12 personal struggles and issues that they
13 were dealing with at home, at school, and
14 in the community. They wrote verses
15 inspired by imagery of color and poems
16 driven by what Ms. Wisner called "John
17 Henry" level hyperbole; and

18 COUNCILMAN HENON: And whereas,
19 working in the recording studio, the
20 students performed and recorded their
21 poems and joined their writing with their
22 music compositions, with additional
23 support from LiveConnections Artist
24 Andrew Lipke;

25 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: I'm

2 going to have to ask Councilman Oh to let
3 them open up in next year's competition,
4 right? There we go.

5 Whereas, in the final phase of
6 the project, producers Thurman and
7 Bradley worked with student producers to
8 create the original CD album; and

9 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,
10 student leadership led to the project
11 expanding from a planned 15-track album
12 to one comprising 29 tracks, entitled
13 FIRST VERSE. In total the project
14 involved 88 students, including two
15 student producers;

16 COUNCILMAN GREEN: As a parent
17 of a Hill-Freedman World Academy student,
18 I'm incredibly proud to be here to see
19 all the phenomenal work that
20 Hill-Freedman has been doing, and it's a
21 pleasure that this is a school that
22 combined an international baccalaureate
23 program but also a program where children
24 have learning differences and challenges.

25 Whereas, the debut from

2 Hill-Freedman World Records, FIRST VERSE
3 announces the school's ambition for
4 what's ahead: distinctive student
5 voices, rigorous process, and
6 collaboration with top artists and arts
7 organizations in the City; now,
8 therefore, be it

9 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Resolved,
10 that the Council of the City of
11 Philadelphia, hereby honors and
12 recognizes the students, staff, and
13 partners of Hill-Freedman World Academy
14 High School, in collaboration with
15 LiveConnections, on the release of FIRST
16 VERSE, a student-led, original CD album
17 of poetry set to music.

18 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Further
19 resolved, that an engrossed copy of this
20 resolution be presented to the students
21 and staff of Hill-Freedman World Academy
22 High School as a sincere expression of
23 the Philadelphia City Council's
24 recognition.

25 And now Council will hear

2 selections from Solomon Smith and Bria
3 Jordan since we just read the resolution.

4 Thank you.

5 (Applause.)

6 MR. SMITH: I would like to
7 give thanks to Council President Clarke
8 and Councilwoman Parker for allowing us
9 the opportunity to showcase our skills.
10 Thank you.

11 Roots. Far back as the king
12 himself, David, versus poetry detailed as
13 the songs. Not as wise as the Proverbs,
14 but I'm getting there.

15 I'm heavenly. You know it. I
16 have Gabriel behind me in case anybody
17 want to try.

18 Never smoked, but I'm still, I
19 feel high as a kite.

20 Ignore fools. I'm Beethoven.

24 dance. Never considered myself a poet or
25 a rapper, but you have to give me a

10 you see my love, my pain, my joy, my

11 dreams.

12 (Applause.)

13 MR. SMITH: The next voice you

14 will hear will come from Bria Jordan.

15 MS. JORDAN: My poem is named

16 Gold Bills On Top.

17 My melanin is so potent that

18 even black coffee gets jealous. My

19 butter toffee cocoa-filled pigment, those

20 who lack thinks my brown is overzealous.

21 My hair is so thick and

22 voluminous that even Pocahontas gets

23 upset.

24 My density versus her length

25 overpowers, that even the peas on the

12 Marianne is responsible for the
13 strategy and management of new business
14 development, fund development, also known
15 as fundraising, marketing and
16 communications, research, public policy
17 and government relations, along with
18 strategic partnerships and consulting
19 here in the City of Philadelphia.

20 So we want to welcome her to
21 this legislative body, Marianne Fray.

6 redevelopment contract of the

9 portion of the New Kensington-Fishtown
10 Urban Renewal Area, identified by house
11 number and street address as 2610
12 Frankford Avenue; and

13 An ordinance amending A-301 of
14 Title 4 of The Philadelphia Code,
15 entitled "Application for Permit," and
16 Section 9-1008, entitled "Demolition
17 Contractor License," by adding and
18 amending certain provisions related to
19 permits for demolition and the licensing
20 of demolition contractors; and

21 An ordinance amending Section
22 B-3303 of Title 4 of The Philadelphia
23 Code, entitled "Demolition," by amending
24 requirements regarding site grading and
25 use of mechanical equipment; and adding

2 requirements regarding materials chutes,
3 dust control fencing and storage of
4 demolition debris; and making technical
5 changes; all under certain terms and

22 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
23 Mr. President. The following resolutions
24 and bills are being called up from the
25 Second Reading and Final Passage

9 Before considering these bills
10 and resolutions on the Final Passage
11 Calendar today, we will have our public
12 comment session. It will go as follows:

13 If you have not already done

15 on a bill or resolution today, I'd ask
16 that you sign up at the table to my left.

17 When your name is called, you

7 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting on
8 170892, in this order, Maggie Groff,
9 Jovida Hill, Monique Howard, and Melissa
10 Robbins.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
13 morning.

14 MS. GROFF: Good morning.
15 Thank you for the opportunity to take a
16 stand today against the Trump
17 Administration's recent attack on basic
18 healthcare that almost every woman in
19 America will rely on at some point in her
20 life, birth control.

21 Birth control is not
22 controversial. It's basic healthcare.
23 The Trump Administration's recently
24 issued rule that means essentially any
25 employer can decide that a woman can no

2 longer have birth control covered by her
3 insurance is a direct attack on the 2.5
4 million women in Pennsylvania alone who
5 are currently benefiting from the mandate
6 under the Affordable Care Act. In fact,
7 polls show that before the Affordable
8 Care Act birth control provision went
9 into effect, one in three women struggled
10 to afford prescription birth control.

11 Let's be clear. This has
12 nothing to do with religion as claimed.
13 Under the Affordable Care Act, religious
14 organizations already have an
15 accommodation. This rule is about taking
16 away women's fundamental healthcare,
17 plain and simple. And it won't stop
18 here. This Administration is carrying
19 out a full-scale attack to dismantle
20 birth control access, and they're doing
21 it in many ways. They're trying to end
22 health insurance coverage for birth
23 control with this rule. They want to
24 eliminate programs that help lower-income
25 women access birth control, including the

2 federal family planning program known as
3 Title X. They're planning on prohibiting
4 healthcare providers from giving women
5 information about birth control and
6 abortion, and they're determined to also
7 deny Medicaid reimbursement to Planned
8 Parenthood.

9 A woman's reproductive
10 healthcare should not be at the
11 discretion of her boss or the President,
12 but between herself and her healthcare
13 provider. We will not be fooled. This
14 is just an attempt by the Trump
15 Administration to chip away at access
16 through the back door since they have
17 been unsuccessful in repealing the
18 Affordable Care Act. We cannot go back
19 on the progress that we have made.

20 According to polls, 86 percent,
21 86 percent of Americans, including 83
22 percent of republicans, support policies
23 that make it easier to get a full range
24 of birth control. It took us eight years
25 to make sure that 62 million women across

2 the country have access to birth control,
3 and we're not going to give that up.

4 Because of this increased access, we're
5 presently at a 40-year low for rates of
6 unintended pregnancy, teenage pregnancy,
7 and abortion. This means that more women
8 have access to opportunities and they're
9 better able to plan their families and
10 their lives.

11 We applaud City Council for
12 taking a stand against this outrageous
13 rule.

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

15 Clerk, would you please read
16 the name of our next speaker, please.

17 CHIEF CLERK: Jovida Hill.

18 (Witness approached podium.)

19 MS. HILL: Yes. Good morning.

20 My name is Jovida Hill. I am the
21 Director of the Office of Engagement for
22 Women and Executive Director of the
23 Philadelphia Commission for Women. I
24 would like to thank the Councilmembers
25 who introduced this resolution. It is

2 very much appreciated.

3 We oppose the U.S. Department
4 of Health and Human Services' new rules
5 that would deny contraception coverage to
6 women, coverage that was mandated under
7 the Affordable Care Act.

8 The continuous assault on the
9 Affordable Care Act has been particularly
10 mean-spirited and discriminatory and has
11 posed tremendous health risks to women,
12 particularly minority women and poor
13 women and their families.

14 I appreciate this body is
15 considering this resolution today, and I
16 urge its passage. The Office of
17 Engagement for Women stands with women's
18 health organizations across the City and
19 this nation, and we are appalled by the
20 discriminatory consequences of the new
21 rules that limit women's access to
22 reproductive healthcare.

23 Nearly 50 years ago I stood
24 with women locally and nationally as we
25 chanted together "My body, my choice,"

2 and it saddens me that my granddaughter
3 will still have to lift up her voice for
4 her body and her choice.

5 Thank you.

6 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you
7 for your testimony.

8 Clerk, would you please read
9 the name of our next speaker.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Monique Howard.

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 DR. HOWARD: Good morning. My
13 name is Dr. Monique Howard and I'm the
14 Executive Director of Women Organized
15 Against Rape and a member of the National
16 Coalition of 100 Black Women,
17 Pennsylvania Chapter. I respectfully
18 submit the following testimony in support
19 of Resolution 170892 introduced by
20 Councilmembers which opposes the decision
21 by the Trump Administration to roll back
22 access to contraceptive coverage for
23 female employees under the Affordable
24 Care Act.

25 Women Organized Against Rape is

2 the only rape crisis center in the City
3 of Philadelphia, its mission to eliminate
4 rape and sexual assault. In 2017, we
5 provided services to 88,000 individuals;
6 93 percent of them were females.

7 Under the Affordable Care Act,
8 more than 55 million women have access to
9 birth control without co-payments because
10 of the contraceptive coverage mandate.
11 Under the new regulation, hundreds of
12 thousands of women could lose their birth
13 control benefits. This mandate crosses
14 socioeconomic status lines, education
15 level, literacy level, and geographic
16 location. All women who utilize
17 contraceptives will be negatively
18 impacted when they are denied control
19 over their reproductive function and
20 their decisions. Some women are more
21 likely to be doomed to poverty, low level
22 work, poor educational attainment, higher
23 risks of illness, and diminished
24 opportunities for themselves, their
25 children, and their family.

2 The new Trump Administration
3 mandate means that affordable
4 contraceptive, which saves lives,
5 prevents unintended pregnancies, and
6 improves maternal mortality, will no
7 longer be available to many women and
8 many families. This may not affect the
9 thousands of women who are able to report
10 their rape or sexual assault and receive
11 immediate medical attention and emergency
12 contraceptives. However, this new
13 mandate will negatively impact the
14 hundreds of thousands of women who do not
15 report their rape and who are not using
16 consistent contraceptives because of
17 cost. These women may end up pregnant,
18 carrying a child linked to the most
19 horrific event in their lives.

20 It is sad that we are still
21 struggling over the issue of
22 contraception, a basic right for women
23 and couples to plan a family, basic
24 insurance coverage, and federal funding
25 for reproductive health. This fight

2 started in the '60s and through the
3 Affordable Care Act was finally resolved.

4 Fundamental women's health
5 rights are continually under attack and
6 being taken away. When will there be
7 consistent investment in the lives of
8 women?

9 Again, thank you for supporting
10 the passage of this resolution.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you
12 for your testimony.

13 Clerk, would you please read
14 name of our next speaker.

15 CHIEF CLERK: Melissa Robbins.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MS. ROBBINS: Good morning,
18 everyone, City Council President and
19 Councilmembers. My name is Melissa
20 Robbins and I'm here to speak on behalf
21 of the Philadelphia Chapter of the
22 National Organization of Women in support
23 of Resolution No. 170892, which was
24 introduced on October 12th by
25 Councilmembers Bass, Reynolds Brown,

2 Greenlee, Green, Parker, and Gym.

3 As we've all heard, the current
4 Commander-in-Chief and his Administration
5 has recently made it easier for employers
6 to opt out of the ACA mandate. The
7 Health and Human Services Division issued
8 a new rule that broadens exemption to the
9 ACA requirement that employers' health
10 plans cover no-cost birth control. It is
11 now easier for employers to opt out of
12 covering contraception on religious and
13 moral ground. These exemptions
14 previously applied to places of worship,
15 religiously affiliated non-profits, and
16 closely held private companies.

17 These rules changes in the
18 Administration show complete disregard to
19 women's health and rights, while opening
20 the gates of employer discrimination
21 against women. Millions of women will
22 now face costly out-of-pocket birth
23 control coverage. These changes were
24 made effective immediately and put
25 nationwide women at risk of losing their

2 benefits.

3 Having access to no-cost birth
4 control means avoiding an unwanted
5 pregnancy by an area teen. It also means
6 irregular and heavy, painful menstrual
7 cycles can be regulated of the 62 million
8 females ages between 15 and 44.

9 Sixty-two percent of them will use a
10 contraceptive method.

11 I can give you my own personal
12 account of why having access to no-cost
13 birth control is detrimental to women's
14 health. For about three years, I was
15 what society would have called an at-risk
16 youth. I had a very religious mother and
17 I had no access to birth control. So at
18 the age of 16 in the 11th grade, not only
19 was I junior class president, but I was
20 also a pregnant teen in high school. I
21 had a cesarean section and gave birth to
22 my son at the age of 17, went on to serve
23 in the United States Army at age 19, and
24 found myself working on a GYN ward, a
25 female surgery ward, labor/delivery,

2 anti-partum and post-partum. Many of the
3 women that came into the GYN clinic, of
4 course they were spouses of current
5 serving soldiers, as myself, and these
6 women were soldiers themselves serving in
7 the United States Army and the Marine
8 Corps on our base. These women had
9 painful tissue removed that grows on the
10 outside of the uterus called
11 endometriosis. The tissue attaches
12 itself to the ovary, the fallopian tubes,
13 and as well as the abdominal walls. It's
14 extremely painful and creates heavy
15 bleeding for women. There is no cure,
16 and it creates a continuum of visits to
17 the GYN care for relief. However, birth
18 control does relieve women of this pain.
19 Five million women are affected by this,
20 and birth control is a solution.

21 As you leave here today, I want
22 you to consider how this will impact the
23 women and the children in your lives.

24 Thank you very much.

5 CHIEF CLERK: Commenting, in
6 this order, on 170890, Yoline Scutt.

7 (No response.)

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Excuse me.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

12 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,
13 Mr. President Pro Tem. I would like to
14 be excused for the rest of the session
15 and be recorded as voting aye on all
16 bills and resolutions.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: It will be

19 resolutions, and you are excused. Thank
20 you.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Josephys Dafils,
22 Eric Edi.

24 MR. DAFILS: Good morning,
25 Council. My name is Josephys Dafils.

2 I'm a part of Haitian American and I'm in
3 support of the resolution that will be
4 passed to ensure that Haitians have TPS.
5 TPS stand for Temporary Protection
6 Status, and it was given to Haitians
7 after the earthquake to come here and be
8 able to work, and our President give them
9 only six months, and now November 23rd
10 they're going to have a decision to be
11 made to know if they're going to give
12 them 18 months. Normally they give them
13 18 months, not six months, but they was
14 only given six months.

15 As of right now, as I'm talking
16 to you right now, there are protests in
17 Haiti. The economy is still not well,
18 and those people here, they have jobs.
19 They support their family in Haiti, and
20 we need that support. It was given to
21 other people. Why not given to us also?

22 Our roots with Philadelphia go
23 way, way, way back, 1824. We had black
24 Philadelphian on leaving Haiti after the
25 1804 independence. So we have Haitians

2 right now, Philadelphian right now, they
3 have Haitian last name. They don't even
4 know why they have French last name, but
5 1824 they leaving Haiti because Haiti was
6 free at that time.

7 So we need your support. We
8 need you to help us ensure that those
9 people have 18 months, not six months,
10 because going back right now to Haiti is
11 not a good thing for them.

12 The UN is still in Haiti. The
13 UN is still in Haiti and they providing
14 security, because the country is not safe
15 yet. Yes, we have made some stride. We
16 working on getting things better. We had
17 an election. We have a new president,
18 but things are still not the way they're
19 supposed to be.

20 Some Haitians that I contacted,
21 part of my non-profit that I have,
22 Haitian American United for Change, they
23 are afraid to come here. So that's why I
24 come here and speak, because they're
25 like, I don't want my name out there. I

2 don't want people to know who I am, so
3 when things doesn't go right, they don't
4 get deported. That's why they didn't
5 come here.

6 Thank you for the support of
7 Council Parker, Council Gym. Thank you
8 for your support, Council Bass, Council
9 Green. Thank you for your support of the
10 Haitian people.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you
12 for your testimony.

13 Is there anyone else here who
14 signed up to provide public comment on
15 today's agenda?

16 CHIEF CLERK: Eric Edi.

17 (Witness approached podium.)

18 MR. EDI: Thank you. My name
19 is Eric Edi. I am the CEO of the
20 Coalition of African Community and I'm
21 also a lecturer at Jefferson University,
22 which has recently merged with
23 Philadelphia University, and I am here to
24 support the Haitian community and also
25 support Resolution 170890 introduced by

2 Councilmen and women Gym, Parker, Green,
3 and Jannie Blackwell.

4 The simple act of our support
5 in here as immigrants from Africa is to
6 support our brothers and sisters from
7 Haiti who are facing also the end of TSP
8 for Haiti. It is similar. We have to
9 support that. We are here because many
10 other African countries also have seen
11 the TPS status terminated; for instance,
12 Sudan, and this is putting quite a lot of
13 these immigrants at risk of deportation.

14 Whereas TPS is not a -- is just
15 a temporary solution for the problem, it
16 does provide quite much relief of those
17 immigrants. And we are, therefore, here
18 to support our brothers and sisters again
19 from Haiti and support the Councilmen and
20 women who have introduced this
21 resolution.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you
24 for your testimony.

25 Clerk, could you please read

10 important for technology for people with

11 disabilities, because without technology,

5 official decree of the people in writ of
6 mandamus quo warranto and, as such,
7 requires immediate action and remedy.

8 Every week this Council, Mayor,
9 and others transfer private properties to
10 the government, probably illegally.

11 Last week Council addressed the
12 crime with if you see something, say
13 something. What law allows taking
14 property without compensation?
15 Britannica Legal defines theft as removal
16 of property without the consent of the
17 lawful owner.

18 Should the people allow the
19 government to become the legalized
20 version of the criminals? Did the U.S.
21 Congress, Senate, and General Accounting
22 Office issue documents directing the
23 amounts of just compensation owed to
24 Logan property owners? Was federal tax
25 money -- taxpayer money used as lawfully

2 directed?

3 What good is saying something

4 if government fails to prosecute law

5 violations? If violating one law one

6 time would land people in jail, why

7 hasn't the Commonwealth or federal

10 elected monarchs above the law? Can

11 Philadelphia and Pennsylvania government

12 treat its people any more egregiously?

13 Is this how a sanctuary city

14 acts against its own sovereign people?

15 Why has there been no prosecution by

16 federal or Commonwealth attorney

17 generals?

18 The Constitution and laws

19 require immediate remedy of this breach

20 of law, breach of close, breach of

21 fiduciary duty. Your oath of office

22 requires you to act or face prison.

23 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,

24 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA

25 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1

2 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,
3 712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in

8 constitutional obligations to investigate
9 and prosecute all involved in the theft
10 and illegal deed transfer of my home,
11 1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of
12 God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for
13 23 years is egregious, extraordinary,
14 oath-violating, and requires immediate
15 remedy.

16 A just government must obey the
17 rule of law. This color of law
18 government must have its Charter to
19 govern revoked until a constitutionally
20 compliant government is installed.

21 Public servants cannot refuse
22 their sworn duty to act any more than a
23 fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The
24 sovereign people require Constitution and
25 laws be enforced. Jail is required for

3 I remind Council, it takes a
4 lot of cooperation to create and allow
5 monumental corruption.

17 to thank the two earlier speakers who
18 talked about the real need to discuss the
19 measures that were put in place to
20 address the 2010 earthquake that impacted
21 so many Haitians and families around the
22 world.

23 We have 2,900 Haitians
24 currently living here in Philadelphia.
25 They are revitalizing our economic

20 All those in favor say aye.

21 (Aye.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
23 Those opposed?

24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

2 ayes have it, and that resolution is
3 adopted.

4 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
5 Recognizing and Congratulating Comcast
6 NBCUniversal for being honored as a 2017
7 Employer Support Freedom Award recipient,
8 presented by the Secretary of Defense for
9 their commitment to members of the
10 military, veterans, and their families,
11 introduced by Councilman Henon.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
13 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

14 COUNCILMAN HENON: I move for
15 the adoption of the resolution.

16 (Duly seconded.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
18 been moved and properly seconded.

19 All those in favor say aye.

20 (Aye.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Those opposed?

23 (No response.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
25 ayes have it, and that resolution is

3 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution
4 authorizing the Committee of the Whole to
5 hold hearings regarding Philadelphia's
6 Amazon HQ2 proposal, introduced by
7 Councilman Green.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
9 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

10 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
11 Council President. A moonshot is an
12 ambitious, exploratory, groundbreaking
13 project, and the phrase "moonshot" came
14 about during the Apollo 11 space mission
15 trying to put a man on the moon. And so
16 Philadelphia in the past couple years,
17 we've had a number of moonshot moments,
18 from the NFL Draft, both the DNC, the RNC
19 some years ago, as well as the World
20 Meeting of Families. And so today there
21 was an announcement regarding the City's
22 proposal regarding the Amazon HQ2
23 proposal that was submitted. It was an
24 opportunity to bring together a unique
25 collaboration of a number of different

2 interests that came together. We had 150
3 regional leaders sign a letter in support
4 of that proposal. Over 50 college
5 presidents signed a letter in support of
6 this proposal. Also this body, under the
7 leadership of Councilwoman Blondell
8 Reynolds Brown, passed a resolution
9 supporting that initiative.

10 And so I thought it was
11 important to try to learn and get some
12 ideas about best practices on how this
13 collaboration came together, what were
14 the things that we learned in putting
15 together this process. There are a
16 number of different people that can be
17 thanked in putting together the proposal,
18 along with the Mayor, Commerce Director
19 Harold Epps and Vaughn Ross and Silvie
20 Gallier-Howard, the Chief of Staff for
21 Harold Epps, as well as John Grady from
22 PIDC and John Fry from the Chamber. But
23 this was a true collaborative effort, and
24 I think we would be remiss if we did not
25 use this opportunity to really learn

2 about how this collaboration came
3 together and how can we use this energy
4 and motivation so that we can address
5 other moonshot issues that we have in our
6 City, like poverty and homelessness and
7 others.

8 So with that, Council
9 President, I move for the adoption of the

13 been moved and properly seconded.

14 All those in favor say aye.

15 (Aye.)

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
9 Council President. I move for the
10 adoption of the resolution.

11 (Duly seconded.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
13 been moved and properly seconded.

14 All those in favor say aye.

15 (Aye.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Those opposed?

18 (No response.)

20 ayes have it, and that resolution is

22 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution

9 (Duly seconded.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's
11 been moved and properly seconded.

12 All those in favor say aye.

13 (Aye.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Those opposed?

16 (No response.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
18 ayes have it, and that resolution is
19 adopted.

20 CHIEF CLERK: There are no
21 other resolutions on the Final Passage
22 Calendar, Mr. President.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
24 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

25 That concludes our Calendar for

3 Are there any speeches on the
4 part of the minority?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Okay. Speeches on behalf of the
8 majority?

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman
10 Henon.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
12 Mr. President. Sometimes we have the
13 pleasure, a lot of times, and we should
14 recognize a lot of people who do good
15 work, and sometimes the good work that we
16 do here in City Council as members, as
17 elected members of the City of
18 Philadelphia, the people that surround us
19 and live with us and in some cases may be
20 our better halves. In the case of
21 Councilman Jones with his wife, Jaz, as
22 we all know, who is doing great work,
23 fantastic work with the City of
24 Philadelphia, was just reappointed in the
25 Commonwealth to the Pennsylvania Women's

2 Commission. And I think that is
3 extremely important for her representing
4 us at the level that she is with civic
5 engagement, policies, advising not just
6 the Governor but the ongoing continuation
7 of advisement and legislation and
8 policies that are set here in the City of
9 Philadelphia.

10 So I just want to take a public
11 moment to congratulate not only our
12 colleague for having such a pretty
13 awesome spouse, but I want to thank her
14 for the work that she does on behalf of
15 the City of Philadelphia.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
17 Thank you.

18 Congratulations. Tell her we
19 all said congratulations, Councilman.

20 The Chair recognizes Councilman
21 Green.

22 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,
23 Council President. Tomorrow marks the
24 three-year anniversary of the
25 decriminalization of small amounts of

2 marijuana that was done by
3 then-Councilman Jim Kenney, now our
4 Mayor, and that has led to a change in
5 how we view marijuana not only in the
6 City of Philadelphia but around the
7 Commonwealth. However, we still have a
8 lot more to do.

9 There was a recent article, I
10 believe, in the Inquirer that talked
11 about even in the Commonwealth of
12 Pennsylvania, you still have African
13 Americans more likely to be arrested,
14 eight to one, compared to others in our
15 society, and in some counties that's ten
16 to one. So we still have much more to do
17 in reference to how people of color are
18 impacted in reference to criminal justice
19 as it also pertains to marijuana.

20 But with this sea change, that
21 will also, I think, provide the
22 opportunity for the medical marijuana
23 legislation to be passed in the
24 Commonwealth. And there's been various
25 supports that when you have opportunities

2 to use medical marijuana, it provides
3 less opioid addiction, and I think that's
4 something that will happen not only in
5 the City but also the Commonwealth of
6 Pennsylvania, because that's what's
7 happened in other states around this
8 nation, and it will provide an
9 opportunity for various people who have
10 ailments, from Lou Gehrig's disease,
11 post-traumatic stress disorder, as well
12 as autism. And as many of you know that
13 I'm a strong supporter and advocate
14 regarding autism, and that's how I got
15 involved regarding the medical marijuana
16 issue when learning from advocates in
17 other parts of the country talk about the
18 benefits that medical marijuana has
19 provided.

20 And so to close, I just want to
21 remind people that on Saturday we will
22 have the annual Autism Walks -- Autism
23 Speaks walk at Citizens Bank Park at 9:00
24 a.m. Hopefully everyone that's available
25 under the sound of my voice can come out

2 and support this initiative and really
3 deliver an opportunity for more people to
4 benefit from the research and all the
5 services that Autism Speaks does, not
6 only in Philadelphia but around our
7 nation.

8 So thank you.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 The Chair recognizes
12 Councilwoman Blackwell.

13 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank
14 you, Mr. President. There are a few
15 notices passed out. One has pumpkins on
16 it for Families Forward, who is
17 collecting candies, apples, various
18 things for their program, which deals
19 with homeless women and children. Last
20 night they had their Jannie L. Blackwell
21 Gala, which they have yearly, and I'm
22 honored to be associated. So certainly
23 we invite anyone to contribute who can.

24 And also there's a copy of the
25 30th Anniversary reception for Douala,

2 Cameroon. They are our sister city, the
3 only country from Africa that is a sister
4 city to us. There are 35 others, but
5 only one African one, and we were happy
6 to have the Mayor part of honoring the
7 Ambassador and some others. And so we
8 invite everyone who can, along with
9 Senator Street, who I don't think can be
10 there. He's having some masquerade
11 party. But there's a flyer. We invite
12 you tomorrow to a reception across the
13 hall if you are able to come.

14 And, finally, I would like to
15 say a special thank you to our colleague
16 Maria Quinones-Sanchez. Every time I
17 meet somebody from Puerto Rico, she
18 already knows them. Even last week when
19 we went to -- we want to thank her for
20 Local 57, and we mentioned the business
21 manager, Esteban Vera. She already knew
22 him. Not only that, when it came time
23 Local 57 had these big -- you don't call
24 them containers. Whatever you call them,
25 trucks, whatever they are, to fill up to

2 take back to Puerto Rico, she told them
3 where to go to get all this stuff. So at
4 least one-third of the containers were
5 filled up with stuff she had in other
6 centers. I tell you, people in our city
7 are very, very blessed to have her. Her
8 people are blessed to have her. She does
9 so, so much.

10 I went to the Puerto Rican Day
11 Parade this year. You know, we're all
12 concerned about what's going on there.
13 All those people knew her, and you know
14 how many hundreds of people there were,
15 as well as elected officials and other
16 leaders in our city.

17 So we just wanted to say we're
18 proud to be a part of this organization
19 and work with you, and for all the things
20 you do, God bless you and thank you.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Ditto. Thank you, Councilwoman.

24 The Chair recognizes

25 Councilwoman Bass.

3 Mr. President.

4 And as always, great job,
5 Councilwoman Sanchez.

6 I just wanted to make sure that
7 every member of Council and really anyone
8 who is listening knows about what's
9 happening in Germantown right now, but
10 for those members of Council, you may see
11 on your desk that there's currently a
12 competition for a very exciting
13 opportunity presented by National
14 Geographic called Vote Your Main Street.
15 And the Vote Your Main Street contest is
16 designed to highlight main streets across
17 the country, but will choose one
18 crowd-selected winner for a monetary
19 prize.

20 Right now Germantown ranks
21 seventh out of 25 of America's favorite
22 main streets, in the running to receive
23 \$2 million in preservation funding from
24 American Express. A win for us would
25 invest those funds to provide facade

2 improvements, structural improvements to
3 some of America's and the neighborhood's
4 African American historic sites,
5 including Parker Hall and the John Trower
6 buildings on Germantown Avenue. Both
7 structures were built late in the 1800s,
8 and today Parker Hall is the home to the
9 Aces Museum, which highlights the
10 contributions of soldiers of color.

11 Philadelphia was already named
12 a national treasure by the National Trust
13 for Historic Preservation, one of the
14 competition sponsors, and we in City
15 Council know that each of our
16 neighborhoods are national treasures,
17 containing hidden gems everywhere you
18 turn. Winning this competition wouldn't
19 just be a win for Germantown or the
20 Eighth District. It will be a win for
21 the whole City and all of the diverse
22 neighborhoods that makes us truly unique.

23 So in that spirit of citywide
24 pride, I ask that all of you go to
25 voteyourmainstreet.com and choose

2 Germantown, which is also, by the way,
3 the only neighborhood in the City and,
4 again, I believe the only neighborhood in
5 the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. You
6 can vote up to five times a day. It's
7 legal, every day. And the contest ends
8 on October 31st. Let me say that again.
9 You can vote five times a day every day,
10 and it's legal. So it's not a problem.
11 And the contest ends October 31st.

12 We'll also be sending around an
13 e-mail with more information and a link
14 for everyone's convenience, and we would
15 love to have everyone's support.

16 Thank you very much.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Councilwoman.

19 The Chair recognizes Councilman
20 Johnson.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,
22 Council President. Just a couple brief
23 announcements. So tomorrow at Audenried
24 High School, Universal Audenried located
25 at 32nd and Reed Street, we will be

2 having our annual Peace Not Guns memorial
3 basketball game. That's a game we have
4 young men from the Point Breeze Youth
5 Development Basketball League play a
6 friendly game of basketball against the
7 members of the Philadelphia Police
8 Department, all in the effort to improve
9 upon community and police relations, but
10 we also memorialize all those who have
11 lost their lives to gun violence here in
12 the City of Philadelphia. So that's
13 going to take place from 6:00 to 9:00,
14 again, tomorrow at 32nd and Reed,
15 Universal Audenried High School, Friday,
16 October the 20th.

17 Also there's a major issue
18 we're dealing with in the district
19 regarding the closing down of a major rec
20 center, Class A rec center in my district
21 known as Vare Recreational Center. And
22 this is a building that will possibly be
23 a historical building, and we had to
24 close down the building based upon the
25 structural damages that goes beyond the

2 million dollars that we receive as
3 capital funding as individual
4 Councilmembers. But it really just
5 highlights the fact that the Rebuild
6 project is significantly needed. In this
7 particular project, if I can give my
8 capital funds that I have right now to
9 fix the whole rec center, I would, but
10 unfortunately that's not the case. And
11 it's a hub for the community. It's where
12 all the young people come. And the sad
13 part about the whole situation that's
14 frustrating is that we are a community of
15 neighborhoods, right? And what
16 complicates the issue is that when you
17 move the children around to different
18 neighborhoods, then you have to deal with
19 the issue of turf wars.

20 But nevertheless, hopefully
21 this will take a moment for us to all sit
22 back and think about how we can come
23 together as a community. Because,
24 honestly, you should be able to go to any
25 neighborhood regardless of where you live

2 and feel safe, without being threatened
3 of being shot or murdered. But in the
4 meanwhile, that will be my call to arms
5 to the community members, that going
6 through this tough transition period as
7 we address the Vare Recreation Center and
8 some people may have to go to other rec
9 centers that's in other parts of my
10 district or we have some community space
11 in certain schools they're going to be
12 partaking in, we all have to step up
13 together to make sure the kids are safe.
14 And so rather that's creating safe
15 corridor programs along certain streets
16 and, most importantly, stepping up and
17 being each other's eyes and ears so all
18 young people can be safe regardless of
19 where they go to enjoy themselves. But
20 it also highlights how critically
21 important it is that we receive that
22 funding to address our infrastructure
23 when it comes to parks and recreational
24 facilities across the City of
25 Philadelphia.

2 And so for me, all politics
3 aside, this is for the kids. This is for
4 the babies. And so I'm going to be on
5 the front line making sure I get my
6 recreational center back up and running
7 and fully renovated.

8 Thank you, Council President.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10 Thank you, Councilman.

11 The Chair recognizes Councilman
12 Domb.

13 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,
14 Council President. I just wanted to
15 revisit something I may have talked about
16 earlier, but last year, I attended a
17 diversity dinner in technology and opened
18 my mouth and made the commitment that we
19 would sponsor 20 high schools in a
20 program called Coded by Kids, a
21 technology program. This is a program
22 that teaches kids in the 10th, 11th, and
23 12th grade coding. We pick 15 kids per
24 high school. The four high schools I
25 committed to are Edison, Roxborough,

2 Bartram, and YES High School on North
3 Broad Street.

4 The program has already
5 started. We have another 11 schools
6 committed by business people and tech
7 people. We are up to 15 high schools.
8 So we're going to be teaching -- the goal
9 is to get to 20, then the goal is to get
10 to 50.

11 The cost, if anyone has anyone
12 who might be interested, it's
13 inexpensive. For 15 kids at Edison High
14 School, it costs over a three-year period
15 \$13,500, less than \$1,000 per student for
16 three years. And Sylvester, Sylvester
17 Mobley who runs the program, has
18 guaranteed me he can get them jobs in
19 technology when they graduate. So you
20 talk about a return on investment of our
21 young people. This is unbelievably --
22 for \$1,000 we're teaching them coding
23 over a three-year period.

24 So I'm making a plea that we
25 get more schools endorsed, more

1 10/19/17 - STATED - ADJOURNMENT
2 businesses involved, more tech companies
3 involved. It's peanuts compared to the
4 return we're getting from these kids
5 learning coding and getting jobs. So I
6 know the dinner is next week, and I
7 wanted to bring this up because I think
8 to me it's the best investment we can
9 make in our young people.

10 Thank you.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 That concludes the speeches on
14 behalf of the majority and minority, and
15 the Chair recognizes Councilwoman
16 Reynolds Brown for a motion to adjourn.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,
18 Mr. President. I move that City Council
