18 (Councilmembers, guests, and
19 visitors rise.)

20 REVEREND JOHNS: Mr. Chair, I
21 thank you for this opportunity to share.

22 The Bible reminds us that we
23 have been called to preach liberty to the
24 captives, to preach to the oppressed, and
25 to reach out to those who are downtrodden

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
17 joining Councilman Johnson, we have
18 Councilman Jones and Councilmen Green and
19 Johnson.

20 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Good
21 morning. It's a pleasure to be here to
22 recognize this outstanding individual for
23 the work that she has done not only in
24 the City of Philadelphia but across the
25 nation really uplifting the image and

3 done a phenomenal job in doing that, as
4 well as helping provide resources to our
5 underserved African American men,
6 especially those who are returning
7 citizens and have come through some
8 challenging perspectives.

9 So it gives me great honor to
10 present this resolution, and so I will
11 read the following:

12 Recognizing Ky Dele, founder of
13 the Made Men Initiative, for her work
14 inspiring, educating, and outfitting
15 underserved men.

16 Whereas, the Made Men
17 Initiative is a national corporate and
18 community initiative designed to honor
19 the extraordinary achievements of notable
20 African American male influencers for
21 their leadership, lifetime achievement,
22 and their respective fields of work,
23 social consciousness, and significant
24 contributions to community empowerment
25 while building a bridge for the honorees

2 to volunteer their resources to provide
3 empowerment tools for underserved male
4 youth and adult students with
5 motivational mentoring workshops,

6 educational scholarships, and donating
7 business attire to Suit for Success; and

8 COUNCILMAN JONES: Whereas, Ky
9 Dele founded the Made Man Initiative five
10 years ago, leading to the national award
11 tour that began last year, which has
12 already showcased over 300 role models
13 and resulted in over 13,000 suits
14 donated, of which five were mine, offered
15 mentor workshops for over 2,000 men, and
16 sponsored over 5,700 applications to
17 HBCUs; and

18 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,
19 Ky Dele utilizes her professional
20 expertise, clinical skills, and lifestyle
21 management for the greater good; and

22 Whereas, Ky Dele brings life
23 into the conception of unique productions
24 while upholding the principle that giving
25 back is a lifestyle and responsibility;

3 Whereas, Ky Dele is an avid
4 believer in never turning a sky into a
5 ceiling; now, therefore, be it

6 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Resolved, by
7 the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
8 that Council does hereby recognize Ky
9 Dele, founder of the Made Man Initiative,
10 for her work inspiring, educating, and
11 outfitting underserved men.

12 Further resolved, that an
13 engrossed copy of this resolution be
14 presented to Ms. Dele, evidencing the
15 sincere admiration and respect of this
16 legislative body.

17 Introduced by myself as well as
18 Councilmembers Kenyatta Johnson and
19 Curtis Jones and supported by all members
20 of City Council.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
23 the Chair recognizes Ms. Dele for
24 remarks.

25 MS. DELE: Well, thank you.

2 This is quite an honor.

3 Hi, Cherelle. Alumni. Yes.

4 Yes.

5 Well, this year it's been quite
6 a journey. We have actually honored over
7 600 African American male leaders
8 nationally, collected over 18,000 suits,
9 sponsored over 5,800 students to apply to
10 HBCUs, and mentored over 300 students,
11 and none of it could have been done
12 without gentlemen like these Councilmen
13 that answer the phone calls, help us
14 donate the suits, come and get honored
15 and give back and not make it about them,
16 but overall the legacy of fulfilling the
17 community and serving underserved men all
18 over the country.

19 We are going international next
20 year to eight countries in Africa. So we
21 really, really take this to heart when
22 you take the moment to give me this
23 award. This motivates me to continue the
24 great work we're doing out here. None of
25 this is about me. It's about these men

2 who drop everything to make this work.

3 I'm from Philly. This is such
4 an honor. I'm just really humbled.

15 assessment and charges of the Center City
16 District for and concerning business
17 improvements and administrative services
18 to the central business district of the
19 City of Philadelphia for 2018 through
20 2022; amending an ordinance (Bill 1069,
21 approved November 2, 1990, as amended by
22 Bill No. 960631, approved November 25,
23 1996, and as further amended by Bill No.
24 120800, approved December 21, 2012)
25 adopted pursuant to the Municipality

12 Services' Community Umbrella Agencies
13 scorecard.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
15 that will be on this week's Calendar.

16 CHIEF CLERK: And a
17 non-privileged resolution authorizing the
18 Commissioner of Public Property to
19 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
20 Redevelopment Authority, without
21 consideration, deeds conveying
22 conditional fee simple title to certain
23 City-owned lots or pieces of ground with
24 the buildings and improvements thereon,
25 situate in the Twelfth Ward of the City

1 10/26/17 - STATED - INTRO. OF BILLS
2 of Philadelphia.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And
4 that will be on next week's Calendar.

5 The Chair recognizes Councilman
6 Oh.

7 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
8 much, Council President. I offer one
9 bill, and may I be heard after the title
10 is read?

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Certainly. Thank you, Councilman.

13 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
14 much.

15 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance
16 amending Section 9-627 of The
17 Philadelphia Code, entitled "Commercial
18 Establishments on Residential
19 Blockfaces," by revising requirements and
20 making related changes.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The
22 Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

23 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very
24 much, Council President. First, I'd like
25 to say that I'm introducing for

2 consideration of our Council body an
3 amendment. There's nothing wrong with
4 the bill itself. Unfortunately, the bill
5 has resulted in some problems, which I
6 think an amendment, a clarification would
7 help. And I would like to say that I
8 think it is appropriate because
9 unfortunately the way it has turned out,
10 however it has happened, the City's
11 enforcement of this bill is very
12 discriminatory and unjust.

13 This bill is being enforced by
14 the police because L&I is not enforcing
15 the bill. This bill is being enforced by
16 the police because L&I has not written
17 any regulations or process to enforce it
18 fairly, and probably the entire process
19 of enforcing the bill is illegal,
20 probably.

21 The bill is being enforced in
22 commercial areas where the bill does not
23 apply, and where it does apply, it is
24 being enforced against businesses very
25 unevenly and unfairly. It's being

2 enforced against some businesses and not
3 others.

4 In particular, 96 percent of
5 the businesses that were closed and fined
6 by the police were only Chinese take-out
7 restaurants. That is very strange. The
8 Chinese population in the City might be 1
9 percent, and 96 percent of the violations
10 are against only Chinese take-out
11 restaurants.

12 People will say they're getting
13 fined and closed by the police because
14 they're doing something wrong, and that's
15 the beginning of the problem. When the
16 police go some place and do something,
17 people assume those people must be doing
18 something wrong. The next thing is when
19 people say, well, I think they're being
20 discriminated against but they deserve
21 it, and we've heard that many times in
22 our country. We've heard it with African
23 Americans. We've heard it with LGBT.
24 We've heard it with Irish Americans.
25 We've heard it with Italian Americans,

2 with Jewish Americans, Muslim Americans.
3 We could go down the line.

4 The good news is, our country
5 stands for values and the wonderful
6 experiment that we can govern ourselves
7 and the second experiment that all of us
8 diverse people can do that fairly and
9 appropriately within the democratic
10 process.

11 One of the things that I would
12 like to say is that the double standard
13 that has existed throughout the history
14 of America is problematic, and I'm going
15 to speak up about it just a little bit
16 because it's often time not understood.

17 I will have people say to me,
18 well, you know the Chinese didn't
19 participate in the Civil Rights Movement
20 and, therefore, this is what they get. I
21 will have other kind of statements like
22 that, which is very grossly unfair and
23 unsubstantiated, but let me start with
24 this:

25 In 1790, you could not be a

2 citizen unless you were a white man.
3 Couldn't be. And in 1882, Congress
4 passed a law that excluded the Chinese or
5 anyone who looked Chinese from coming to
6 the United States or becoming a citizen.
7 That did not end until 1943. And we've
8 had generations of Americans born in this
9 country of Asian ancestry who could not
10 vote, could not vote anyway, and they
11 were forced to carry papers that proved
12 where they lived. You could be born in
13 America, a third generation, and you had
14 to have papers to prove that you lived in
15 a house somewhere in the United States or
16 you would be deported. And I tell people
17 the reason we have all these immigration
18 laws that we're now talking about is not
19 because of the Mexicans or the Muslims.
20 It was because of the Chinese. The
21 Chinese Exclusion Act excluded Chinese
22 from coming to this country. And if you
23 were a citizen, if you left this country,
24 the federal government would not let you
25 back in. And the United States

2 government pressured Canada to exclude
3 Chinese and it tried to pressure Mexico,
4 but the Mexicans did not want to be under
5 pressure from the U.S., and so we built
6 up the southern border.

7 In 1871, in Los Angeles there
8 was a mass lynching, which almost nobody
9 heard of, nobody remembers, because it's
10 not taught in the history books. Five
11 hundred people went through the Chinese
12 area of Los Angeles, going into homes,
13 stealing property, stealing items,
14 smashing things, and they took out 18
15 people, Chinese people, Chinese
16 Americans, shot them and lynched them.
17 But the law in Los Angeles, as in many
18 parts of this United States, was that
19 people of Chinese ancestry were not
20 allowed to testify against white people.
21 That's the history of our country.

22 In 1910, Pittsburgh passed an
23 ordinance. Fortunately the Mayor vetoed
24 it. I think there were about 45
25 Councilmembers. Forty-three of them

2 voted for an ordinance that Chinese
3 restaurants had to close earlier than any
4 other restaurant and that women could not
5 eat or work in a Chinese restaurant.
6 That was 1910 in Pittsburgh. That was
7 not unusual, because throughout the
8 history of that time period from after
9 and before the Civil War through that
10 period of time, Chinese restaurants were
11 competing with other restaurants, Chinese
12 restaurants and Chinese laundries,
13 because despite all the suppression,
14 Chinese couldn't go to school, all the
15 suppression, the Chinese found places
16 where they could make money. Laundry and
17 restaurants were one of those. And so
18 the laws were passed throughout the
19 United States that forbade women and
20 others. The AFL in that time issued a
21 statement to all the legislators that
22 beer and noodles are the corruption of
23 America. Beer and noodles.
24 And so we have seen after that
25 the Japanese who purchased farms lose all

2 their farms because they were the enemy
3 in World War II, and so many of their
4 children served in the United States
5 military and were highly decorated in
6 World War II.

7 In 1982, Vincent Chin, a
8 Chinese American who served in our
9 military, was at a bar when two men
10 approached him in Detroit and said,
11 Because of you Japanese, we're
12 unemployed. They started to beat him in
13 the bar. He ran out. That's called a
14 break in the action, for the lawyers.

15 They chased him outside, beat
16 him up some more. He ran away. They
17 grabbed a couple of baseball bats from
18 their car, chased him down the street and
19 beat him to death in front of McDonald's.
20 He was given probation, manslaughter, and
21 the judge said, These are good people.

22 The family reached out to all
23 the civil rights organizations, and none
24 of them responded, in part because of
25 this problem: the model minority issue.

2 And so that issue arises because some
3 people, typically identified as
4 republicans, say look at the Asians,
5 they're doing very well in our country,
6 why do other people have a problem. And
7 the other folks, typically democrats, say
8 because they are light-skinned and
9 they've received a lot of favoritism from
10 white America. And we call them
11 democrats. Well, neither is true. Both
12 are very ignorant statements.

13 Many Asian Americans face
14 discrimination, poor education, health
15 issues. They don't have insurance and
16 things like that. Yes, some Asian
17 Americans are doing well despite all
18 these problems. And, again, they're not
19 the only group of people. Women have not
20 been able to vote, African Americans,
21 Caribbean African immigrants, many people
22 in our country. So it's a continuing
23 issue of how we treat ourselves fairly
24 and not rely on prejudice and unfounded
25 statements.

2 Today, ALDEF, the Asian
3 American Legal Defense and Education
4 Fund, will serve the City with a letter
5 to desist enforcement of this very unfair
6 process. I thank the Mayor and the
7 Police Department for the temporary
8 suspension of the enforcement that is
9 very selective and discriminatory.

10 But it's not enough. We do and
11 should as a body amend this law to be
12 clear and logical so that it serves its
13 good purpose that it was written for.
14 And I appreciate the members of this
15 Council, yourself especially, Council
16 President, for your leadership in always
17 trying to ensure that our City leads the
18 way in fairness and equity for all
19 people.

20 I will say that many of the
21 people here today, they are struggling.
22 Many of them don't have a great deal of
23 education. They couldn't get a job
24 anywhere else, just like the other people
25 we talked about. They have to find a way

2 to earn money for themselves with the
3 thinnest of margins. They make their
4 money by not turning on the heat, they
5 work 16 hours a day, seven days a week.
6 That's how they do it, and these fines
7 are not only illegal, they're crippling
8 their businesses.

9 So with that, I would ask
10 everyone in Philadelphia, all fair-minded
11 people and especially our legislative
12 body and our Mayor, to ensure that our
13 process is fair, that we send a message
14 to the people that it is not okay to
15 discriminate, and that we enforce the
16 laws fairly and appropriately.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you, Councilman.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilman. That bill will be
23 referred to the appropriate committee.

24 That concludes our
25 introductions of bills and resolutions.

1 10/26/17 - STATED - BILLS ON 2ND READING

2 We apparently don't have any
3 reports from committee, so we will move
4 towards the consideration of the
5 Calendar.

6 There are no bills on the First
7 Reading Calendar today, so the Chair
8 recognizes Councilman Henon for the
9 purpose of calling up bills and
10 resolutions on the Final Passage Calendar
11 today.

12 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,
13 Mr. President. The following resolutions
14 and bills are being called up for Second
15 Reading and Final Passage Calendars
16 today: Bill Nos. 170908, 170910, 170913,
17 170915, 170916, 170918, 170674-A, 170683,
18 170720, 170802, and 170724. All other
19 resolutions and bills are being held.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
21 Thank you very much, Councilman.

22 Before considering these bills
23 and resolutions that are on our Final
24 Passage Calendar today, we will have our
25 public comment session. It will go as

2 follows:

3 If you have an interest in
4 testifying on a bill or a resolution that
5 is on the Final Passage today and you
6 have not already done so, you sign up at
7 the table to my left.

8 When your name is called, you
9 will go to the middle of the Council
10 Chambers. There's a podium. On that
11 podium there's a device. When that light
12 turns green on that device, it will be
13 your time to speak. When that light
14 turns yellow, you will have 30 seconds to
15 conclude your remarks. When that light
16 turns red, we'd ask that you please
17 adhere to our guidelines and conclude
18 your remarks. Thank you very much for
19 your anticipated cooperation.

20 Mr. Decker, please call the
21 first name of the individual on the
22 witness list.

23 CHIEF CLERK: Lynn Robinson,
24 commenting on 170908.

25 (Witness approached podium.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
3 morning.

4 MS. ROBINSON: Good morning.
5 Can you hear me?

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

7 MS. ROBINSON: My name is Lynn
8 Robinson. I'm a retired Philadelphia
9 public school teacher. I'm the founder
10 and Chair of Germantown Against the Gas
11 Plants. Thank you for maintaining this
12 democratic process of allowing public
13 comment.

14 I wish to begin with Resolution
15 No. 170408 introduced by Councilwoman
16 Reynolds Brown and Helen Gym, the
17 resolution calling on and urging the
18 School District of Philadelphia to
19 permanently prohibit the suspension of
20 elementary aged students from the first
21 through fifth grades. This is an attempt
22 at its root to protect young children
23 from unfair racially discriminating
24 punitive discipline and to rescue young
25 people from the school-to-prison

2 pipeline.

3 As a retired school teacher, I
4 remember observing different reactions on
5 the part of some teachers and principals
6 toward students of color when they broke
7 school rules. However, I would urge City
8 Council to take some time with this and
9 create a team of educators and parents to
10 discuss in-depth what is making children
11 misbehave or act out and disrupt
12 classrooms, sometimes preventing any
13 instruction for days, until they are
14 suspended.

15 The roots of negative school
16 climate are multiple. We no longer have
17 enough teachers of color in public
18 schools, so black and brown students see
19 very few role models that look like them.

20 Why is school so difficult
21 these days? One reason is that teachers
22 are handed a child unfriendly curriculum
23 designed to get results on standardized
24 tests. Our schools are pressure cookers,
25 partly because of large class size and

2 the promotion of competition between
3 students. This leads to stigmas and
4 pressures attached to quantitative, not
5 qualitative individual evaluations.

6 If City Council wants to
7 suspend punitive punishments, please
8 provide the alternative answers that
9 actually work. Principals need options
10 other than suspension before suspension
11 is removed from their toolbox.

12 If all public school students
13 had fields to run in and garden to plant
14 and ways to explore their innate talents
15 in the same way that wealthy suburban
16 students do, would we be talking about
17 suspensions? If public school students
18 in Philadelphia had clean air to breathe,
19 clean water to drink, and healthy and
20 delicious food to eat, a more comfortable
21 and healthy student population would be
22 less needy at the biological level.

23 And this brings me to speak in
24 support of Councilwoman Reynolds Brown's
25 Resolution No. 170907, urging the Trump

2 Administration to rescind its decision to
3 repeal the Clean Power Plan. In support
4 of President Obama's Clean Power Plan, I
5 challenge City Council to follow its
6 intention at the local level. Please
7 face and accept the science of natural
8 gas -- the science of the natural gas
9 process. Carbon dioxide is not the only
10 climate changing gas, and coal is not the
11 only dirty fossil fuel. Natural gas is
12 not an acceptable fuel. If we want to
13 reverse climate change and protect lungs,
14 blood vessels, and brains, the natural
15 gas process causes significant global
16 warming due to methane leaks.

17 I think I'm out of time. What
18 I'm asking you to do is not allow SEPTA
19 to build a polluting power plant on the
20 border of Nicetown and East Falls if you
21 really want to protect the students and
22 children of this city.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony,
25 ma'am.

2 CHIEF CLERK: Sandra Fuller,
3 commenting on 170908.

4 (Witness approached podium.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning.

7 MS. FULLER: Good morning. I
8 stand here today in support of Resolution
9 170908, a resolution naming 1300 South
10 46th Street "Ruby Knight Way" in honor of
11 the Woodland Avenue Community Historian
12 and a beloved resident of the Woodland
13 Avenue Community.

14 Ruby Knight was a longtime
15 resident of Woodland Avenue community.
16 She died in October 16th, 2015 at the age
17 of 89. Although Miss Ruby, as she was
18 affectionately called, was born in
19 Irwinton, Georgia, she moved to
20 Philadelphia as an infant with her
21 parents during the great migration
22 from -- when five million southern blacks
23 migrated to the north, beginning in 1915,
24 to escape the Jim Crow era of the South.

25 The family settled in a house

2 on St. Marks Street near 42nd and
3 Woodland Avenue where they grew to
4 include ten children.

5 Miss Ruby was educated in
6 Philadelphia public schools and graduated
7 from Bartram High School, where she
8 walked three miles to school and never
9 missed a day throughout her entire years
10 of schooling. Some said that that's why
11 she knew so much, because she was always
12 present.

13 Ruby was widowed at an early
14 age and began an early career at the
15 Veterans Administration that lasted 30
16 years to support her young children,
17 Frank, Martin, and Colette. It didn't
18 take long before she was practically
19 running the office, and if someone wanted
20 to know something, well, they would just
21 ask Ruby.

22 Several years after her
23 retirement from the VA, Ruby became
24 restless and, at 65 years old, returned
25 to the workforce as a teacher's assistant

2 for the Philadelphia Public Board, where
3 she worked ten years. Her duties
4 involved caring for infants of teen
5 mothers after they returned to school.
6 She took great pride in being an
7 encouragement to the young mothers.

8 Ruby was a member of the Mount
9 Zion Baptist Church 50 years at -- I mean
10 at 50th and Woodland Avenue for 74 years
11 and was very active in church functions
12 and clubs. She was a member of the
13 Senior Guild Progressive Co-Workers and
14 the History and Heritage Committee. She
15 took pride in supporting the events
16 surrounding the church's anniversary
17 before her passing.

18 Ruby's window to the world was
19 her front porch. She was across the
20 street from the neighborhood school,
21 where she had attended 80 years
22 previously. She enjoyed interfacing with
23 children on their way to and from school.
24 She seemed to know all the children,
25 their siblings, their parents.

2 Ruby's knowledge of the
3 Woodland Avenue community and its rich
4 history was indisputable. She prided
5 herself in the accuracy of the
6 information and enjoyed sharing it with
7 all those who were eager to listen. She
8 was an avid supporter of the continuance
9 of the Woodland Avenue reunion and all
10 things enhancing Woodland Avenue
11 heritage.

12 As the Woodland Avenue quickly
13 evolves, it is important and fitting that
14 Ruby Knight's name be added to the street
15 sign at 46th and Woodland Avenue to serve
16 as a footprint and reminder of the people
17 who lived in Woodland Avenue community
18 prior to the transition and their rich
19 heritage. Her family continues to live
20 in that community and are active and an
21 integral part of that community.

22 Respectfully submitted. Thank

24 CHIEF CLERK: Brad Wilson,
25 commenting on 170907.

3 MR. WILSON: Hello, everybody.

4 I'm Brad Wilson.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
6 morning.

7 MR. WILSON: One thing to talk
8 about, well, guys, don't get mad. It's
9 not the issue here. What I came about
10 is, everybody, I ride a bicycle to get
11 around town. I ride a bicycle around
12 town to get around. What I have is my
13 old Schwinn Varsity my dad bought me when
14 I was in high school. The bike is 40
15 years old.

16 Everybody, this morning at
17 exactly 8:20 I was hit by a car. It was
18 a hit-and-run accident. Thank God I
19 don't have serious injuries. My right
20 knee is killing me. I'm dead in pain.
21 August 31st at the same time -- they were
22 both on a Thursday -- I was hit by a car
23 again, and I have stitches in my eyes.
24 My face had road rash for two weeks. My
25 bike was almost damaged. I managed to

2 put it back together and start riding it
3 last week. Now I'm hit and now I can't
4 ride the bike again.

5 Something needs to be done
6 about the safety laws and rules and
7 guidelines of riding a bicycle in the
8 street. Each time I was hit, I was hit
9 by a white car making a left turn --

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
11 Excuse me one minute, sir. Are you
12 talking about the Clean Air Act?

13 MR. WILSON: No, Darrell. It
14 has nothing to do with your issues. It's
15 the fact that we can't ride in the street
16 safely, and I was hit by a car twice,
17 Darrell.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Hold
19 on one second. So you're supposed to
20 talk about the issue on the Calendar
21 today on a bill or resolution.

22 MR. WILSON: I know.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So
24 you're not really talking about the Clean
25 Air Act.

1 10/26/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 MR. WILSON: No, I'm not. It's
3 a safety issue.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I
5 understand. No; I understand. And we're
6 more than likely very shortly going to
7 have a conversation around bike lanes.
8 The guidelines say that you're supposed
9 to talk about -- and people sometimes pay
10 us no mind and all of that, right?
11 But --

12 MR. WILSON: Well, I mean, how
13 else are we --

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
15 Well, I'm just saying it's not a
16 free-flowing opportunity to talk about
17 anything in the world. It's supposed to
18 be about what's on the Calendar.

19 MR. WILSON: But how else do I
20 bring this issue to all of you, though?

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: You
22 should go to a Councilperson,
23 particularly a Councilmember -- a lot of
24 Councilmembers are very interested in
25 bike issues, safety, the whole nine

2 yards, and there is going to be very
3 shortly an extensive conversation
4 about -- matter of fact, I introduced
5 some legislation --

6 MR. WILSON: Well, the only
7 Councilwoman I know is Ms. Blackwell
8 around that.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
10 Well, at some point she will be moving on
11 that. But make sure we get your name and
12 we're going to make sure you get invited
13 to come in and talk about that. And if
14 there's a specific issue relating to --
15 and, unfortunately, sorry about what
16 happened. We can just deal with that.

17 MR. WILSON: All right.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
19 Thank you, sir.

20 CHIEF CLERK: Michael Meng,
21 commenting on 170907.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MR. MENG: My name is Michael
24 R. Meng, 7314 Devon Street, Philadelphia
25 19119. I'm here today to speak in favor

2 of the importance and necessity of this
3 Council approving the resolution proposed
4 by Councilwoman Reynolds Brown urging the
5 executive administration in Washington to
6 rescind its decision to repeal the Clean
7 Power Plan.

8 This decision on the part of
9 the Trump Administration displays a mean
10 and insensitive draconian indifference to
11 the needs and well-being of hundreds of
12 millions of people by prioritizing profit
13 for long-established interests and an
14 irresponsible national weakness for
15 fast-profit speculation, both over
16 intelligent respect for the long-term
17 health of everyone in the U.S. and the
18 wide variety of other species that we now
19 know are always harmed by such human
20 action.

21 The weight of scientific
22 evidence has made clear that half
23 measures benefiting the status quo are
24 not good enough. The U.S. has already
25 begun turning from fossil fuel to

2 renewable energies. The City of
3 Philadelphia must play a fully honest
4 part by opting in favor of those hard
5 choices that will make clear its honest
6 commitment to be a part of the solution.
7 Supporting this resolution is a minimal
8 step in the right direction. It must be
9 approved, and that approval must be given
10 further real life in Philadelphia.

11 Beyond that, there is an
12 ever-wider variety of tangible options
13 splaying out from a base commitment to
14 the shift to renewable energy. Today the
15 vast majority of those options are
16 predominantly invisible in Philadelphia
17 because of the lack of any plan built
18 upon a true commitment to that shift.

19 Not only should the City of
20 Philadelphia approve Councilwoman
21 Reynolds Brown's proposal, but it should
22 legislate to establish its own plan and
23 it should take the tangible steps open to
24 it today by, for example, making certain
25 that SEPTA's effort to build a

2 gas-powered generation plant in Nicetown
3 is brought to a clean and final stop and
4 that no other fossil fuel generation
5 plants or infrastructure in the City get
6 any listening for furtherance at all.

7 Fossil fuel generation is
8 anathema to human health. It is only bad
9 faith denial prioritizing selfish and
10 indifferent fear of loss that denies
11 these things today, and it is only your
12 true commitment to admitting this hard
13 fact that can set yourselves aright as
14 the necessary gatekeepers that you are
15 occupying our city's common seats of
16 power today.

17 Thank you for your attention.

25 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA Constitution,

10 Calendar, Mr. President.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
12 Thank you very much.

13 Are there any speeches on
14 behalf of the minority?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Any
17 speeches on behalf of the majority?

18 And the Chair recognizes
19 Councilman Jones.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,
21 Mr. President. Earlier this month myself
22 and Councilman Green stood in front of
23 the SRC building on Broad Street where we
24 were challenging the potential revoking
25 of the charter for the charter school

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2 Eastern Academy Charter School. This is
3 an academy that was sponsored by Eastern
4 University. It is a small school that
5 services 330 students grades 7 through
6 12, 41 percent male, 59 percent female.
7 It is in an area where a lot of
8 repurposing for the building is. So
9 there is a useful purpose for the
10 building.

11 The reason why we were standing
12 out there is that there is a matrix by
13 which the SRC decides whether a school
14 should be closed or whether it should
15 continue. This is well within their
16 purview to do when it makes sense, when
17 it is not arbitrary and capricious, when
18 there is an apple-to-apple comparison for
19 you to look at a school and say I'm going
20 to compare this school to a school that
21 is special admit or to this school where
22 folk have a different level of income.
23 It is not a fair comparison. We think
24 that matrix that really matter are when
25 350-plus parents decide to take their kid

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2 to a school. That's a matrix that
3 matters to me. The climate, how young
4 people get along, how they interact with
5 each other, matters to me. When colleges
6 and universities nationally decide that
7 this kid is meritorious of being in my
8 school, being admitted, getting
9 scholarship, that's a matrix that matters
10 to me. And when you decide that you're
11 going to pull things out the air and
12 because -- and I'm never going to
13 question another man or woman's
14 motivation or an entity, but sometimes
15 things get a little peculiar to me,
16 right?

17 When big fish eat little fish,
18 that's nature. I learned that in biology
19 in public school. I've learned those
20 things. But when big fish eat our
21 children, that's a problem for me. And
22 when you have these kinds of tensions
23 between large oligopolies and monopoly
24 charter schools that need to, because of
25 their growth, need to have and eat

2 smaller schools, our kids get devoured in
3 the process.

4 I'm going to tell you this,
5 that one out of three African American
6 men is in jail, probation or parole.
7 That's not something I made up. Google
8 it. And one of the reasons, the number
9 one factor that is attributable to that
10 is how our children are educated.

11 We had a debate about
12 prison-to-school pipeline. I had a young
13 lady talk about it today in public
14 comment. And one of the things that they
15 start to realize is that there are 48 zip
16 codes in the City of Philadelphia.
17 Eleven of them are the census population
18 for 90 percent of the young men and women
19 in prison. Out of the 48 zip codes, 11
20 of them send 90 percent of the inmates up
21 on State Road. Ironically, we've closed
22 23 schools in the City of Philadelphia
23 and most of them come from those zip
24 codes. Coincidence? I don't know. But
25 we're going to pay a lot more attention

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2 to these processes so that our kids
3 aren't devoured in the process.

4 Thank you, Mr. President.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you so much, Councilman.

7 The Chair recognizes

8 Councilwoman Bass.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,
10 Mr. President. And I want to applaud my
11 colleague for his work on that issue.

12 And I wanted to talk a little
13 bit about the resolution I introduced
14 earlier today about CUAs and DHS and the
15 Improving Outcome for Children scorecard
16 that was released.

17 But before I go into that, I
18 did want to, number one, on behalf of my
19 colleague Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds
20 Brown and Jane Golden from Mural Arts
21 remind everyone that there is a Council
22 briefing today. It's going to be right
23 after Council in the Caucus Room, and we
24 hope that everyone can come by and
25 support Mural Arts and find out what new

2 and interesting things they have going
3 on. Always something great with Jane
4 Golden.

5 Also I wanted to thank my
6 Council colleagues for their support in
7 the Vote Your Main Street competition,
8 and because of your votes, Germantown
9 jumped from seventh place to third place
10 to second place, and now we're in first
11 place.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And so just
14 above some little towns in Arizona and
15 Iowa, which we won't even mention who
16 they are. But we want to stay number
17 one. And so Germantown residents who are
18 actively keeping up with the contest sent
19 me a chart tracking daily voting totals,
20 and the biggest spike was last Thursday
21 after you all voted and spread the word
22 about the contest.

23 Just a reminder, winning the
24 Vote Your Main Street competition will
25 provide preservation funding to two

2 African American historical sites in
3 Germantown and national recognition for
4 our great City. You can vote up to five
5 times a day every day, and the contest
6 ends October 31st, which is next Tuesday.

7 We're a body that loves voting,
8 right? So we encourage everyone to vote
9 early and often. It's legal. You can do
10 it five times a day. There's nothing
11 wrong with it.

12 And I want to give a special
13 thank you to Yvonne Haskins and the
14 Germantown CDC, who have kept up with
15 this issue and have kept our offices up
16 to date. And this is really going to
17 make a difference.

18 So I just really wanted to
19 encourage everyone again to go back to
20 voting for the next few days, five times
21 a day, and we really, really appreciate
22 all of your support. We're number one,
23 and this is a great thing for the City of
24 Philadelphia. So thank you for your
25 support on that.

3 You're welcome.

4 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And last,
5 but not least, I did want to just make
6 some points about the report, the
7 scorecard that was issued by DHS and just
8 the information that was provided.

9 I want to ask the DHS -- and
10 we're going to have a hearing
11 obviously -- but to go back to the
12 drawing board on what they issued to us.
13 Eighty percent of the CUAs have at least
14 one F. The rating system that was
15 provided to us, in my opinion, was
16 misleading and you rated -- DHS rated
17 this on a system of liberty bells versus
18 a traditional grading and scoring system,
19 which would have been much more apparent
20 that we are in really deep trouble with
21 the CUA system that we have in place.

22 When you break it down, nine
23 categories -- each one was rated on nine
24 categories and all have at least one D.
25 Twenty percent of those rated have 60's,

2 thirty percent have five D's, and 20
3 percent have four D's. I counted 39 D's
4 among ten organizations. These are
5 organizations charged with caring for our
6 most vulnerable population, our children
7 who are in distress.

8 Eighty percent have at least
9 one F. One has three F's and three have
10 two F's. And what's most troubling is
11 Wordsworth, which I know Councilman Jones
12 has done a considerable amount of work in
13 the tragedy that happened out in his
14 district. Wordsworth had two B's, four
15 C's, one D, and two F's. So sort of a
16 mixed bag if you look on the surface of
17 it. And this is at an organization that
18 had, we know now, a number of sexual
19 assaults and a teenager who died under
20 their care and supervision. And,
21 interestingly enough, Wordsworth received
22 a B in supervision in this report.

23 So if these were the grades
24 that were received from an organization
25 which was as troubled as Wordsworth, I

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2 can only imagine what the -- if you dig a
3 little bit deeper, what these other
4 organizations really do look like.

5 And so I look forward to the
6 hearing, and I thank you, Mr. President.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilwoman, and thank you
9 for your continued good work. Appreciate
10 it.

11 There appears to be no
12 additional speeches, so I will recognize
13 Councilman Greenlee for a motion to
14 adjourn.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank
16 you, Mr. President. I move that Council
17 stand adjourned until Thursday, November
18 2nd, 2017 at 10:00 a.m.
