2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning, everyone. It's going to be a  
4 great day.

5 Before we start, because we  
6 always need a little spiritual guidance,  
7 this morning to give our invocation the  
8 Chair is going to recognize Pastor Dwaine  
9 Ross of Divine Destiny Community  
10 Fellowship. He is here today as the  
11 guest of Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell.

12 I would ask all members,  
13 guests, and visitors to please rise.

14 (Councilmembers, guests, and  
15 visitors rise.)

16 PASTOR ROSS: Good morning.

17 (Good morning.)

18 PASTOR ROSS: It is an honor to  
19 stand here to open up this prayer this  
20 morning, and I would like to encourage  
21 our Councilwoman -- thank our  
22 Councilwoman Blackwell for the invitation  
23 and her support staff and to encourage  
24 all of our City leaders to keep on  
25 fighting what the Bible calls the good

3           called the good fight of faith is because  
4           we always win. We win.

5                     Let us pray.

6                     Eternal God, our Father, we  
7           come to you once and again to thank you  
8           for this awesome new day. The Bible says  
9           this is the day that the Lord has made  
10          and we will rejoice and be glad in it.

11                    As we wake up and look around  
12          and observe this new day, we can look at  
13          the seasons and see that they are  
14          changing. The beautiful leaves are  
15          changing colors and falling off of the  
16          trees, and the air is beginning to  
17          change. And so as in the spiritual, it  
18          is in the natural. Our seasons are  
19          changing. Things are getting better. We  
20          are entering into our new season.

21                    We're going to remember in this  
22          prayer -- ask the Lord to remember in  
23          this prayer our City officials, our  
24          Police Department, our Fire Department,  
25          our schools, our teachers, our youth.

2           We're asking the Lord to look upon our  
3           senior citizens, which area often  
4           overlooked, those that are less  
5           fortunate, the homeless, those that are  
6           just everyday hardworking people two and  
7           three jobs just to make a living or to

9                        As I conclude this prayer for  
10           this great city and for our great  
11           communities and for our great leaders, I  
12           would like to declare something called  
13           the Deuteronomy Blessing, Deuteronomy 28,  
14           and I declare and decree in this  
15           atmosphere that we are blessed in our  
16           cities. We are blessed in the field.  
17           We're blessed coming and we're blessing  
18           going.

19                        Our jobs are blessed. Our  
20           homes are blessed. Our physical bodies  
21           are being healed and blessed. We are  
22           blessed.

23                        Amen, amen, and amen.

24                        (Amen.)

3 (Council at ease.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you. Thanks to the Pastor for  
6 those very inspiring words.

7 We have a special guest today,  
8 no stranger to us all, but before we do  
9 that, I'd like to just recognize some  
10 good friends and individuals who are  
11 here. It would be appropriate because of  
12 their interest in today's subject matter.  
13 And if I miss anybody's name, you have to  
14 look at the table to my left, because  
15 that's who wrote the list. All right?

16 I'd like to recognize our good  
17 friend State Senator Anthony Williams.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
20 State Senator Vincent Hughes.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
23 I saw -- where are you going? You're not  
24 leaving, are you, Rep?

25 REPRESENTATIVE KELLER: No.

4 Our good friend State  
5 Representative Bill Keller.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
8 the gentleman who seems like at least  
9 today can't make up his mind if he wants  
10 to be a Councilman or a State Rep, our  
11 good friend State Representative Eddie  
12 Neilson.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
15 our great City Commissioner, Lisa Deeley.

16 (Applause.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
18 our good friend from labor, Henry  
19 Nicholas.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
22 Gabe, Gabe Morgan from SEIU.

23 (Applause.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
25 Jerry, I know this is a special day for

2 you. Our good friend Jerry Jordan from  
3 the PFT.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
6 our man, Pat Eiding.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
9 I saw Ryan Boyer. Where is Ryan?

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
12 a former member of this body, Denny  
13 O'Brien. Denny still here?

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: So,  
16 again, if I missed anybody's name, speak  
17 to these people over here.

18 So right now we would like to  
19 introduce our special guest in the  
20 Chambers today. Ladies and gentlemen, we  
21 would like to introduce to you the Mayor  
22 of the City of Philadelphia, Jim Kenney.

23 (Standing ovation.)

24 (Councilman O'Neill entered  
25 Chambers.)

3 that will be the Tenth Council District  
4 Mayor, Brian O'Neill.

5 Where is the Mayor?

6 He's coming, I promise.

7 (Standing ovation.)

8 MAYOR KENNEY: That's pretty  
9 weird, the teleprompter is backwards. I  
10 guess I'm going from notes.

11 Now it's forward. Thank you.

12 Well, good morning, everyone,  
13 and thank you for attending. Must be  
14 something big going on today. So thank  
15 you.

16 Two years ago I stood in this  
17 room and told the story of a young man I  
18 met at the Pennypack School. The  
19 Pennypack School was inside the  
20 Philadelphia Industrial Correctional  
21 Center on State Road and the young man,  
22 along with his classmates, were all  
23 charged with serious crimes.

24 Despite his situation, the  
25 young man told me that he was enjoying

2 his time at Pennypack. He said it was  
3 the best school he had ever attended.

4 After telling the story, I  
5 asked the members of this body to take on  
6 a big challenge so we could get more of  
7 our children on the road to Penn instead  
8 of on the road to Pennypack.

9 City Council met that  
10 challenge, and as a result, we've made  
11 historic investments in Philadelphia's  
12 children. Nearly 3,000 children have  
13 gained access to free, quality pre-K.  
14 Sixty-five hundred students and their  
15 families have been served by a community  
16 school. And we're on the verge of  
17 kicking off the first round of Rebuild  
18 projects, which will provide much-needed  
19 improvements to libraries, rec centers,  
20 and parks that serve our children and  
21 their families.

22 These achievements were no  
23 small feat, but ultimately our children's  
24 success and Philadelphia's success  
25 depends on the quality of our schools,

2           and right now we are leaving our city's  
3           fate largely in someone else's hands.

4                        If we do not have quality  
5           schools in every neighborhood, the people  
6           who have helped to reverse the City's  
7           decades of population loss will not stay.  
8           The children whose families cannot afford  
9           to leave will be unprepared to compete in  
10          the 21st century economy. Businesses  
11          will not come to Philadelphia, and those  
12          that are here won't have the local talent  
13          pool to grow. The City's poverty and  
14          crime rates will remain stagnant or they  
15          will worsen.

16                       So today, after nearly two  
17          years of careful consideration and  
18          research, 98 school visits, and  
19          conversations of 158 principals and  
20          countless parents, teachers, and business  
21          leaders, I'm officially calling on the  
22          members of the School Reform Commission  
23          to vote to dissolve at their next  
24          scheduled meeting.

25                       (Standing ovation.)

2 MAYOR KENNEY: After they  
3 dissolve, we will return to the School  
4 Board, as it is currently written in the  
5 Charter, a nine-member Board appointed by  
6 the Mayor.

7 These --

8 (Applause.)

9 MAYOR KENNEY: These nine Board  
10 members are recommended to the Mayor by a  
11 nominating panel. The nominating panel  
12 is composed of 13 Philadelphians,  
13 including four members of the public at  
14 large, as well as nine leaders of  
15 organizations described in the Charter  
16 whose institutions support the public  
17 good across the City.

18 When the nominating panel is in  
19 place later this year, we will begin to  
20 take in recommendations and applications  
21 for individuals interested in serving on  
22 the Board of Education.

23 We will select the members of  
24 the School Board with one goal in mind:  
25 ensuring every child has access to

2           quality schools, no matter where they  
3           live or no matter what they look like.

4                        (Applause.)

5                        MAYOR KENNEY: And I believe  
6           there are four primary factors that must  
7           be present for that goal to become a  
8           reality.

9                        The first is accountability.  
10          For too long we've pointed fingers at  
11          each other, whether it be traditional  
12          public schools and public charter schools  
13          or City elected officials and state  
14          elected officials. Again and again,  
15          we've told the people of Philadelphia  
16          that the state of their schools are  
17          someone else's responsibility. That ends  
18          today.

19                       (Applause.)

20                       MAYOR KENNEY: When the SRC  
21          dissolves itself and we will return to a  
22          School Board appointed by the Mayor, you  
23          can hold me and future mayors accountable  
24          for the success or failure of our  
25          schools. The buck will stop with us.

2 This model --

3 (Applause.)

4 MAYOR KENNEY: This model will  
5 create quality schools.

6 In a 2016 report, the Pew  
7 Charitable Trust found that school  
8 districts' governance must avoid  
9 uncertainty about accountability in order  
10 for its schools to succeed. School  
11 districts under mayoral control;  
12 specifically, Boston, New York City, and  
13 Washington, DC, have seen substantial  
14 improvement in student performance in  
15 recent years.

16 I also hope that clearer  
17 accountability can provide an opportunity  
18 to shift the unhealthy debate between  
19 public charter schools and traditional  
20 District schools.

21 The District currently serves  
22 over 200,000 students, including the  
23 nearly 70,000 of those students attending  
24 a public charter school.

25 (Applause.)

2 MAYOR KENNEY: I am  
3 responsible, we are responsible to every  
4 one of those children, no matter the type  
5 of school that they attend. And we  
6 will -- I will judged and we will be  
7 judged by the voters on the number of  
8 high-performing schools in every  
9 neighborhood, not whether those schools  
10 are District or public charters.

11 (Applause.)

12 MAYOR KENNEY: The second  
13 factor necessary for our schools to  
14 succeed is collaboration between our  
15 schools and our City leadership.  
16 Philadelphia's collaboration with the  
17 School District has increased  
18 dramatically in the last few years. We  
19 have embarked on a project to create 25  
20 community schools by the year 2020.  
21 We've increased our financial  
22 contribution by \$520 million annually  
23 over the last six years, with the  
24 courageous help of this City Council.

25 The District has been a key

2           strategic partner in PHLpreK, serving not  
3           only as a provider but also lending their  
4           expertise in the program's design and  
5           implementation.

6                     The Read by 4th campaign was  
7           critical to the increase we saw in  
8           reading test scores for our elementary  
9           school students this year. And the  
10          Philadelphia Police School Diversion  
11          program has reduced school-based arrests  
12          by nearly 70 percent.

13                    In each of these areas, when  
14          the City and the School District had a  
15          shared goal, we were able to succeed.  
16          Local control will multiply these  
17          benefits because we will now be working  
18          under one common vision, with the full  
19          support of the City's departments and  
20          resources behind our School District.

21                    Specifically, we can improve  
22          the ways in which school facilities are  
23          made available for community use during  
24          non-school hours. We can look at  
25          transportation planning for safer routes

2           to schools, and we could also improve our  
3           students' career readiness.

4                     Working with the Managing  
5           Director's Office and the Commerce  
6           Department, the District has committed to  
7           all high school students gaining a  
8           quality work experience, including a  
9           summer job, mentoring or shadowing with  
10          an employer. All students will also  
11          receive a post-secondary plan that helps  
12          them prepare for the career or college of  
13          their choice.

14                    The other two fundamentals our  
15          schools need to succeed are adequate  
16          resources and strong leadership. During  
17          the past 15 years of SRC control, we've  
18          had three superintendents, with current  
19          Superintendent Dr. Hite serving the  
20          longest term. Dr. Hite has helped our  
21          students succeed, even while dealing with  
22          very difficult resource challenges.

23                    Over the last several years,  
24          the District has had to make hundreds of  
25          millions of dollars in cuts. They've

2           closed more than 24 schools and laid off  
3           nearly 4,000 employees. Our schools were  
4           left without full-time nurses or  
5           counselors, and many classrooms have  
6           persistent teacher vacancies.

7                       Children lost months of  
8           valuable education time, setting them  
9           back in test scores and, more  
10          importantly, setting them back in life.  
11          Some of them never made up that lost  
12          ground.

13                      Children with chronic health  
14          issues had to turn to principals or other  
15          non-medical staff to administer  
16          life-saving medication. Extracurricular  
17          activities were reduced and in some cases  
18          altogether eliminated.

19                      Our teachers went five years  
20          without a contract or a raise, all while  
21          working more and more to make up for  
22          these cuts.

23                      It is only in the last couple  
24          of years that Dr. Hite was able to  
25          address some of these issues, thanks to

2           an increase in financial support from  
3           Philadelphians. Thanks to these  
4           investments, the graduation rate is now  
5           up to 66 percent and schools classified  
6           as persistently dangerous have been  
7           eliminated.

8                       The latest test scores show  
9           that 35 percent of 3rd graders are now  
10          reading on grade level, and that's up  
11          from 30 percent the year prior. There  
12          are also small improvements in algebra,  
13          biology, and literature test scores in  
14          high schools.

15                      But we cannot expect Dr. Hite,  
16          our teachers, our students to take this  
17          incremental progress and expand it into  
18          greater success while enduring another  
19          cycle of drastic cuts.

20                      Due to factors outside its  
21          control, the District is facing a deficit  
22          which begins next year and will grow to  
23          nearly \$1 billion over the next five  
24          years. I am unwilling to sacrifice the  
25          hard-won progress our students have made

2           and go back to the days of classrooms  
3           without teachers and schools without  
4           counselors or nurses.

5                           (Applause.)

6                           MAYOR KENNEY: I am committed  
7           to providing the supports Dr. Hite needs  
8           to produce better educational outcomes  
9           for all of our kids.

10                          So in the next budget, I will  
11           propose a plan to meet the District's  
12           needs. These investments go toward a  
13           capital improvement program that will  
14           begin to address our schools' many  
15           physical building needs.

16                          (Applause.)

17                          MAYOR KENNEY: In addition, the  
18           9th Grade Academy, which provides  
19           academic supports and counseling to new  
20           students in order to decrease the dropout  
21           rate; modernizing our CTE programs and  
22           expanding access to them so that our  
23           students are prepared to compete;  
24           expanding college access through  
25           continued free PSAT and SAT testing for

2           all students; more AP classes; and the  
3           first middle college program in  
4           Pennsylvania, where high schools students  
5           can earn an Associate's degree; hiring  
6           specialized reading coaches for every  
7           school and improving training in the  
8           structural support for K to 3 teachers;  
9           equipping every K to 3 classroom with new  
10          libraries full of books; and remodeling K  
11          to 3 classrooms in schools with the  
12          lowest literacy rates; increasing the  
13          number of bilingual counseling  
14          assistants; filling all teacher  
15          vacancies; and continuing to increase the  
16          diversity of our teaching workforce so  
17          our teachers look like the City they  
18          serve.

19                           (Applause.)

20                   MAYOR KENNEY: And all of those  
21           other supports we need to bring quality  
22           schools to every neighborhood in our  
23           city.

24                   Let me be clear. There will be  
25           no easy solutions for funding these

2           resources. The District has nothing left  
3           to cut. They have negotiated significant  
4           concessions from all of their unions and  
5           reduced their administrative staff to  
6           just 3 percent of the budget. And the  
7           District's projections already assume  
8           that we'll close two District schools a  
9           year based on declining enrollment trends  
10          and aging facilities.

11                        Unfortunately, the same is true  
12          of our City departments. While our City  
13          departments are already looking at  
14          targeted budget cuts, so much was already  
15          cut during the recession that the money  
16          to meet the District's needs solely  
17          through cuts just isn't there.

18                        While local control may  
19          ultimately create administrative or  
20          operational efficiencies, these will take  
21          years to identify and effectively  
22          transition.

23                        Delinquent taxes are also not  
24          the answer. The City and School  
25          District's Five Year Plans already assume

2           a total of \$600 million in delinquent  
3           collections. PILOTs, while worth  
4           exploring, only produce about \$30 million  
5           annually for the City of Boston.

6                     And help from the Commonwealth  
7           is not coming. It's not coming. Our  
8           delegation has worked diligently over the  
9           past two years to extend our local  
10          cigarette and sales tax and adjust the  
11          formula so Philadelphia would not be  
12          negatively impacted by our move to full  
13          valuation. But the structural issues the  
14          state faces make additional help for  
15          Philadelphia highly unlikely.

16                    No matter how anyone may feel  
17          about it, that's the reality. To say  
18          otherwise would only push off the  
19          responsibility we all say we want with  
20          local control.

21                    So the final plan we will  
22          propose to meet the District needs will  
23          be difficult and it will require everyone  
24          to pitch in, but the alternative is far  
25          worse. If we do not provide our children

2           the resources they need, the cycle of  
3           budget cuts and instability which have  
4           hindered our students' success for  
5           decades will continue, and Philadelphia  
6           will slowly but surely fail. That's a  
7           dark prediction, but it's an accurate  
8           one.

9                     Our schools are the key to  
10           reducing our poverty rate. Education is  
11           the only way out. If we don't create  
12           quality schools, then the brief  
13           renaissance our City is experiencing will  
14           evaporate, and families will choose to  
15           move in search of a better education for  
16           their children.

17                    If our schools don't attract  
18           new businesses or produce quality talent,  
19           then no new jobs will come. If we don't  
20           take responsibility for the fate of our  
21           schools, then we will continue to  
22           relegate generations of Philadelphia  
23           families to poverty.

24                    I am not willing to do that.

25                    We must choose to meet this

2 moment and become the masters of our own  
3 destiny. If we pair local control with  
4 increased investments, we can finally  
5 confront our City's most persistent  
6 challenge. We can create a School  
7 District that is more collaborative, more  
8 financially stable, more accountable to  
9 Philadelphians and, as a result, a School  
10 District where our students progress and  
11 is accelerated.

12 If we decide not to pass the  
13 buck but rather double down on our  
14 commitments, we can ensure that no  
15 child's fate is determined by their zip  
16 code.

17 I have a vision of a child that  
18 is leaving a quality pre-K in June and  
19 entering kindergarten in September who is  
20 prepared to progress through 8th grade  
21 and do well and then make a choice to go  
22 to a regular high school, an accelerated  
23 high school, a CTE school and do well  
24 there, and then have the opportunity to  
25 go to college or to graduate school. And

2           that if companies like Amazon or others  
3           come into our City -- and it doesn't have  
4           to just be Amazon. It could be any of  
5           the companies we attract. If that child,  
6           if that young man or woman now graduating  
7           from college or from graduate school can  
8           accept a job for \$75,000, \$80,000,  
9           \$100,000 and be able to raise a family if  
10          they choose, to buy a home in our  
11          neighborhoods, to make our neighborhoods  
12          stable, and to make sure -- to ensure  
13          that their children and their children's  
14          children for generations will not be  
15          facing poverty and opioid addiction and  
16          gun violence and crime, but will be able  
17          to do the things that our parents all  
18          wanted us to do and have a better life  
19          than we've had.

20                        We owe it those kids, and we  
21          will do this together.

22                        Thank you.

23                        (Standing ovation.)

24                        (Pause.)

25                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I

11 The next order of business is

15 Greenlee.

16 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
17 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
18 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,

20 (Duly seconded.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you. It's been moved and properly  
23 seconded that the Journal of the meeting

25 approved.

6 Those opposed?

10 The next order of business is  
11 requests for leaves of absence, and the  
12 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

13 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
14 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
15 majority, there are no requests of leave  
16 of absence today.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you. The Chair thanks the  
19 gentleman.

20 And the Chair recognizes  
21 Councilman O'Neill.

22 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
23 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
24 republicans, there are no requests for  
25 leave of absence.

3 Chair thanks the gentleman.

4 At this time, I would like to  
5 dispense with the regular order of  
6 business and I would like to welcome and  
7 thank everyone who has come to witness  
8 our government in action. We really  
9 appreciate the fact that you've taken  
10 time out of your day to come down today  
11 and be with us. Again, thank you so  
12 much.

13 At this time, the Chair  
14 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown,  
15 who will present a resolution  
16 representing the service of women  
17 veterans in the United States and the  
18 extraordinary contributions of the  
19 Women's Veteran Center. Would Anna  
20 Stormer and those accompanying her please  
21 join the Councilwoman at the podium.

22 (Councilmembers and guests  
23 approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
25 joining the Councilwoman, we have

6 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
7 Mr. President. This is a thrill for us,  
8 as it is a first when we are recognizing  
9 the service of women veterans in the  
10 United States of America and the  
11 extraordinary contributions of the  
12 Women's Veterans Center.

13 Whereas, women have been  
14 actively serving in the United States  
15 military since the Revolutionary War.  
16 For us history buffs, I'll repeat that.  
17 Women have been actively serving in the  
18 United States military since the  
19 Revolutionary War, oftentimes disguised  
20 as men so they could serve in combat  
21 roles. The Women's Armed Services  
22 Integration Act of 1948 allowed women to  
23 serve permanently in the military, rather  
24 than only during times of war; and

25 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

2 Whereas, in 1974, women were admitted to  
3 the United States Merchant Marine Academy  
4 in Kings Point. In 1976, women were  
5 first admitted to the remaining service  
6 academies, including U.S. Military  
7 Academy in West Point, U.S. Naval Academy  
8 in Annapolis, U.S. Coast Guard Academy in  
9 New London, and the U.S. Air Force  
10 Academy in Colorado Springs; and

11 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

12 Whereas, the U.S.S. Acadia departed for  
13 the Persian Gulf in 1990 with both men  
14 and women aboard for the first time ever  
15 in wartime. More than 41,000 women were  
16 deployed in war zones between 1991 and  
17 1992 during the Persian Gulf War; and

18 COUNCILMAN OH: Whereas, in  
19 1998, female fighter pilots flew combat  
20 missions for the first time ever.

21 Captain Kathleen McGrath became the first  
22 woman to command a U.S. Navy warship in  
23 2000. In 2004, Colonel Linda McTague  
24 became the first female commander of a  
25 fighter squadron in the U.S. Air Force.

2 In 2011, women deployed on a submarine  
3 for the first time; and

4 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas,  
5 Obama Administration Defense Secretary  
6 Leon Panetta announced in 2013 that the  
7 ban on women serving in combat would be  
8 lifted. In 2015, during the first year  
9 that women were permitted on ground,  
10 Captain Kristen Griest and First  
11 Lieutenant Shaye Haver became the first  
12 two women to graduate from Army Ranger  
13 School, shifting the paradigm from "if  
14 women could meet the standard" to "now  
15 that women have met the standard"; and

16 Whereas, the military,  
17 influenced by the performance of women on  
18 the front lines since 9/11 and by these  
19 first women Ranger School graduates, is  
20 setting the stage for women to command  
21 young men outside the wire in infantry  
22 and armor platoons, with the same risks  
23 and responsibilities as their male  
24 counterparts;

25 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, as

2           they transition out of the military,  
3           women now make up 10 percent of the  
4           veteran population. Women veterans, and  
5           their accomplishments in service, often  
6           go unrecognized, even though the number  
7           of women in the military continues to  
8           grow and women continue to break barriers  
9           during and after their military service;  
10          and

11                    COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
12           the transition from military life to  
13           civilian life can be difficult. More  
14           than four-in-ten female post-9/11  
15           veterans say their readjustment to  
16           civilian life after their military  
17           service was very or somewhat difficult;  
18          and

19                    COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas, the  
20           Veterans Multi-Service Center created the  
21           Women's Veterans Center in 2014 to  
22           address the growing and unique needs of  
23           women veterans and their families.  
24           Through its mission of providing a  
25           separate and communal space to heal, grow

2 and thrive to date, the WVC has served  
3 over 650 women and their families; and

4 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Whereas,  
5 the Women's Veterans Center is focused on  
6 creating community and strengthening  
7 one-on-one relationships through a  
8 variety of services, including assistance  
9 with immediate needs (meals, clothing,  
10 toiletry products) housing case  
11 management, benefits counseling,  
12 referrals to community partners, and a  
13 robust calendar of fellowship activities;  
14 and

15 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,  
16 women of America's military, past and  
17 present, have served their nation in  
18 times of peace and war, at great personal  
19 sacrifice for both themselves and their  
20 families. Women have consistently  
21 answered the call without hesitation to  
22 defend our democracy and freedom, playing  
23 a significant role in developing the  
24 extraordinarily capable military that  
25 continues to protect the foundation of

2 our great nation; now, therefore, be it

3 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Resolved,

4 by the Council of the City of

5 Philadelphia, that we hereby honor and

6 recognize the service of women veterans

9 Women's Veterans Center.

10 Further resolved, that an

11 engrossed copy of this resolution be

12 presented to the Women's Veterans Center

13 as evidence of the sincere sentiments of

14 this legislative body.

15 Let's celebrate the Women's

16 Veterans Center and all women who

17 sacrifice, step up, and stand up for the

18 land that we serve.

19 Thank you very much,

20 Mr. President.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

23 the Chair recognizes Ms. Stormer for

24 remarks.

25 MS. STORMER: Thank you,

3           wonderful community of all the

5           name is Anna Stormer and I have the honor  
6           and privilege of serving as the

11           grateful for the acknowledgement of our  
12           hard work and dedication to serving those  
13           who served. In preparation of receiving  
14           this citation, I went to the experts, the  
15           women that I assist, for help with my  
16           remarks. I asked them, What would you  
17           like City officials to know about being a  
18           woman vet in Philly? Aside from the ask  
19           of forgiveness for parking tickets and  
20           help filling in potholes, overwhelmingly  
21           the group shared that time and time again  
22           they felt that once their uniform came  
23           off, their service and sacrifices often  
24           went unnoticed.

25                        These sentiments contribute to

2 some harrowing statistics. Female  
3 veterans have a 250 percent higher risk  
4 than civilian women for suicide and make  
5 up 10 percent of the entire homeless  
6 veteran population. This continuous and  
7 prevalent theme of invisibility is one we  
8 try hard to change at the Women's  
9 Veterans Center, and this citation and  
10 recognition goes a long way in  
11 accomplishing that goal.

12 The VMC is beyond proud of our  
13 Women's Veteran facility, and we look  
14 forward to reaching more women veterans  
15 and supporters as we continue to grow in  
16 the years ahead.

17 If you'd like to learn more  
18 about the VMC and the Women's Veterans  
19 Center and continue celebrating women  
20 veterans, please join us next week, in

5 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'd like  
6 to say thank you to the entire City

9 yes, for me it was quite a transition to  
10 transition from being the soldier into  
11 the civilian sector, and as Anna stated,  
12 a high percentage of women do experience  
13 homelessness after leaving and making  
14 that transition.

15 I was one that was too proud to  
16 go to my mother and father and tell them  
17 what my experiences was, so I experienced  
18 homelessness myself for seven months  
19 while being a student at Temple  
20 University.

21 So on behalf of all of the  
22 current soldiers that are serving around  
23 the country and around the world and of  
24 course for those women who have made the  
25 ultimate sacrifice with their life, I

15          laughed so much in one hour in my life.  
16          And I want to welcome them to the City of  
17          Philadelphia again by recognizing them.

18                         Recognizing and honoring the  
19          UniverSoul Circus for 24 years of  
20          outstanding productions on the local and

22                         Whereas, the UniverSoul Circus  
23          was founded 24 years ago in Atlanta,  
24          Georgia by concert and theatre promoter,  
25          Cedric Walker. Walker had a vision of

10                      Whereas, the UniverSoul Circus  
11           is a highly interactive combination of  
12           circus arts, theatre, and music that  
13           spans genres including Pop, Classic, R&B,  
14           Latin, Hip Hop, Jazz and Gospel. The  
15           show embraces and celebrates the unique  
16           and familiar aspects of global cultures  
17           and ethnicities in one stellar  
18           production; and

19                      COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
20           since its debut, the UniverSoul Circus  
21           has successfully turned the traditional  
22           circus world upside down. By 1997, the  
23           production had grown from a single show  
24           in Atlanta to a ten city tour, which  
25           further expanded to 19 cities by 1999 and

2           25 cities by 2012. The UniverSoul Circus  
3           even presented an international  
4           engagement in South Africa Tour in 2001;

24          with whereas, UniverSoul has been rated  
25          one of the top three circuses in America

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
22 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
24 Mr. President. And I'm just so excited  
25 about this bill that's being introduced

2           today, and I wanted to give just a little  
3           bit of background about the bill.

4                       And this is primarily a bill to  
5           deal with nuisance businesses that we  
6           know as stop-and-go's in our  
7           neighborhoods, and I wanted to thank you  
8           for all of the work that you've done on  
9           this issue and for being so supportive on  
10          this particular matter.

11                      In the beginning when you had a  
12          deli in your neighborhood, a deli was a  
13          deli and a bar was a bar, and they were  
14          two completely separate establishments.  
15          They were local, and they served food in  
16          a neighborhood, and many were sit-down  
17          restaurants.

18                      Yesterday I was at 26th and  
19          Allegheny, my neighborhood where I grew  
20          up, and my mind wandered to Marcal's  
21          Deli, which was right down the street at  
22          25th and Allegheny. They had -- it was a  
23          deli. They had booths to sit down and  
24          eat. They had counter service. And it  
25          was real food. You could sit down; you

2           could take out. And it wasn't alone.  
3           There were other establishments like  
4           Ida's. Remember Ida's in North Philly?  
5           And then there were white tablecloth  
6           restaurants in North Philadelphia, like  
7           Fisher's on North Broad Street, which was  
8           around where Temple Medical is now. I  
9           remember my mother took me there for my  
10          16th birthday. And when you eat  
11          something really good, you remember it  
12          forever. I still remember the soup.

13                        The bill stretched her budget,  
14           and it was a rare treat for us, but these  
15           were amenities that were in our  
16           neighborhood.

17                        Somewhere along the way things  
18           changed. Most of our sit-down  
19           restaurants closed and local spots that  
20           serve cheese steaks and hoagies and some  
21           of the best in the City were all of the  
22           sudden no longer in business. But what  
23           did come -- they didn't close  
24           completely -- was that even though it  
25           would say deli on the outside advertising

2           those same cheese steaks, hoagies, and  
3           seafood, but actually serving no food,  
4           flagrantly disregarding City violations.  
5           Again, no food. The food that was served  
6           was a break with the spirit of the law as  
7           intended. Oodles of Noodles just doesn't  
8           cut it. No bathrooms available to  
9           customers, which is the law. Tables and  
10          chairs for 30 was out of the question.  
11          They were a haven or are a haven for  
12          loitering, and allegedly other nuisance  
13          activity happens, including the sale of  
14          loosies, allegedly public urination,  
15          defecation, and possibly other items sold  
16          by the proprietor and/or others.

17                    Today with this bill we start  
18                    the process to change that. Currently  
19                    with stop-and-go's in my neighborhood,  
20                    they are mostly in poor neighborhoods,  
21                    mostly in the hood as we know it. Most  
22                    of these establishments sell beer, some  
23                    sell liquor. I can buy a shot and my  
24                    8-year-old daughter can also buy a bag of  
25                    potato chips at the same time. And

2 there's a reason why we don't allow  
3 children in bars, but somehow this has  
4 been allowed and accepted in  
5 stop-and-go's.

6 I have more stop-and-go's in my  
7 district than I have public schools, and  
8 something is really, really wrong with  
9 what is happening here.

10 I also want to take a moment  
11 and thank Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell,  
12 who coined the term "stop-and-go" many  
13 moons ago and has been a fighter against  
14 nuisance businesses, and we wouldn't be  
15 here with this bill without her as well.  
16 So many thanks to Councilwoman Blackwell.

17 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
18 you.

19 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: But, again,  
20 today we start to change the process.  
21 This bill I believe is a game changer,  
22 and I want to join with Councilwoman  
23 Blackwell, Council President Clarke, and  
24 all members of Council who are in support  
25 of this bill. Special thanks to the City

2           Law Department, L&I, Health, and the  
3           Police Department for making this happen.  
4           It actually came together -- about a year  
5           ago we did a tour with Health  
6           Commissioner Farley, L&I Commissioner  
7           Perri, then Fire Commissioner Sawyer, and  
8           Liquor Control Board and enforcement  
9           officers. They were astonished at what  
10          they saw.

11                        This bill will revise licensing  
12          requirements for food establishments  
13          related to restroom facilities, service,  
14          and seating to ensure that we don't have  
15          these makeshift bars that serve liquor to  
16          vulnerable populations, in some cases  
17          from 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 a.m. every  
18          single day.

19                        As an aside, we hear a lot  
20          every day about the opioid and heroin  
21          crisis, and this is another legal but  
22          legal self-medication that folks are  
23          doing, and this issue deserves a lot of  
24          attention as well.

25                        This bill restores dignity to

2           providing food and food service to our  
3           communities. It requires that either  
4           establishments be defined as a large or  
5           small establishment. Large  
6           establishments are required to have two  
7           restroom facilities, no more bathrooms  
8           that cut through kitchens, which are real  
9           gems if you've ever seen one of those.  
10          Large establishments remove physical  
11          barriers, also known as the plexiglas,  
12          the prison-style service that many of  
13          these establishments have; food, in the  
14          cases where they do serve food, without  
15          dignity; readily available and accessible  
16          tables and chairs, no more fold-up chairs  
17          pushed together in a corner, no tables to  
18          be seen; and specific square footage  
19          requirements which must be adhered to.

20                   I look forward to working with  
21          all of the departments to ensure that  
22          enforcement is actual and that it  
23          happens. I'm so very hopeful on this  
24          issue, because I always tell folks you  
25          don't have to have things in your

2           neighborhood that you don't want to have,  
3           and on this issue I think that the  
4           community, my colleagues, we're all the  
5           way in. We're all ready to put together  
6           our hands, roll up our sleeves, and do

9           establishments that we deserve in our  
10          communities.

13          address climate change in a meaningful  
14          way.

15                       We're excited about the work

19          this is a private sector-led initiative,  
20          and the business community has really  
21          stepped up to show that they are ready to  
22          take on the challenge of reducing climate

25 remedy.

2 Every week Council, Mayor, and  
3 others transfer private property to  
4 government, probably illegally. What  
5 could be more fascist than to deny rights  
6 to sovereign people?

7 Recently, Philadelphia

9 fascist Nazis. Do fascist Nazis steal  
10 their own people's homes without due  
11 process and compensation?

12 Sovereign people owning  
13 property should be a goal of a  
14 constitutional government. The  
15 Fourteenth Amendment, no state shall make  
16 or enforce any laws that shall abridge  
17 the privilege or immunities of the  
18 citizens of the United States, nor shall  
19 the state deprive any people of life,  
20 liberty or property.

21 If thou shall not covet, if  
22 thou shall not steal are commandments  
23 from God, why has Council, Mayor, and  
24 others denied commandments, oaths,  
25 constitutions, and laws to steal homes?

2           Founding fathers wrote extensively about  
3           the inviolable property rights of the  
4           people. Clearly, prosecution of oath,

9           require immediate remedy of this breach

14          1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA  
15          Constitution, Article I, Sections 1  
16          through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,  
17          712, 713, 716, and other laws listed in  
18          SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear  
19          violated.

20                       I call for the federal and  
21          Commonwealth governments to perform their  
22          constitutional obligations to investigate  
23          and prosecute all involved in the theft  
24          and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
25          1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of

2           God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for  
3           23 years is egregious, extraordinary,  
4           oath-violating, and requires immediate

6                     A just government must obey the

10          compliant government is installed.

11                    Public servants cannot refuse  
12          their sworn duty to act any more than a  
13          fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
14          sovereign people require the Constitution  
15          and laws be enforced. Jail is required  
16          for all who violate oath or law.

17                    I remind Council, it takes a  
18          lot of cooperation to create and allow  
19          monumental corruption.

9 November 17, 1967 Citywide Black Student  
10 Walkout, and honoring the continuing  
11 tradition of youth organizing and  
12 activism around education, equity and  
13 racial justice in the City of  
14 Philadelphia, introduced by Councilwoman  
15 Gym.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
17 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

18 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you  
19 very much, Council President. I wanted  
20 to acknowledge my co-sponsors on the  
21 resolution, Councilmembers Parker,  
22 Blackwell, Bass, Jones, Johnson, Reynolds  
23 Brown, and Green and just wanted to share  
24 a little bit about this resolution.

25 It's a moment that spurred a

2 movement that we're still seeing today,  
3 which had a lot to do with  
4 self-determination, community control of  
5 schools, and equity and the fight for  
6 young people, a fight that was led by  
7 youth, black youth in particular, had a  
8 critical role and continue to play a  
9 critical role in the passionate fight  
10 that we see around public education.

11 Back then in 1967 the students  
12 had organized and mobilized for years to  
13 write a student bill of rights. They  
14 planned a series of walkouts, culminating  
15 in the walkout of 3,500 students from  
16 high schools all across the City. It was  
17 a joyful affair, one that was marked with  
18 hope, energy, and possibility.

19 Students spoke about many  
20 different things that still resonate with  
21 us today, including the need for more  
22 black teachers and administrators, the  
23 teaching of black history, the ability to  
24 wear African clothing, the ability to  
25 protest the flag even and the Pledge of

2 Allegiance.

3 But these students were met by  
4 a significant response to their pushback  
5 in front of the Board of Education.

6 Witnesses that saw police charge the  
7 students and beat them wept with tears,  
8 and many of them became and moved on to  
9 do -- become very politically active in  
10 our city today.

11 The movement continued on for  
12 the next 50 years, with youth leaders  
13 proving that they're not just the leaders  
14 of tomorrow. They're the leaders of  
15 today.

16 In 2005, the School Reform  
17 Commission mandated African American  
18 history and specifically drew on the  
19 struggle and spirit of these students.  
20 And it was really nice to see in the  
21 audience today former SRC Chair Sandra  
22 Dungee Glenn, who really ushered that  
23 through.

24 And today Philadelphia's youth  
25 movements, including Philadelphia's

2           Student Union, Youth United for Change,  
3           Asian Americans United, Be It Lead, also  
4           continued this tradition and broadening  
5           their work into deeply intersectional  
6           organizing.

7                        City Council, our office, in  
8           partnership with the African American  
9           Museum of Philadelphia, is supporting a  
10          series of events on November 17th and  
11          18th, including a panel and reception  
12          with Matthew Countryman, who is the  
13          author of Up South, who documented a  
14          whole chapter on community control of  
15          schools in Philadelphia and the catalyst  
16          for the black power movement in the City.  
17          And on November 18th will be a citywide  
18          community teach-in with young people and  
19          activists then and today, and we  
20          certainly welcome anybody to support, be  
21          part of that, join in and celebrate.

22                       And with that, I call for the  
23          adoption of the resolution.

24                       (Duly seconded.)

6           you, Council President. I just would

8           colleague and friend Kenyatta Johnson on  
9           his birthday. I do appreciate that, and  
10          he's a good man to serve with.

11                   I also want to acknowledge  
12          Councilman Green for organizing our  
13          Council trick or treat on Friday evening.  
14          I thought it was a wonderful thing. To  
15          see the young people and their faces when  
16          you actually gave them candy and some  
17          were scared and others were not, but it  
18          was a heck of a lot of fun, not only for  
19          those children but for our staffs, and  
20          I'd like to tell Councilman Green  
21          publicly again thank you so much for  
22          organizing this, and you can count on my  
23          support and my office's support in the  
24          future to do this again. I liked it.

4 The Chair recognizes Councilman

5 Oh.

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
7 much, Council President. I wanted to  
8 note the importance of today with the  
9 Mayor's speech. I do also want to say I  
10 admire his straightforwardness and I  
11 appreciate his directness in stating the  
12 difficulties and challenges of this  
13 situation.

14 I would also say that I  
15 distributed to our colleagues the report  
16 that Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell and I  
17 had undertaken in a series of hearings  
18 regarding best practices in education,  
19 simply because I believe that we will  
20 have many things to consider as we move  
21 forward with the actual complexities and  
22 challenges of both funding public schools  
23 in Philadelphia and ensuring that there  
24 is a governance structure that will  
25 actually ensure equity for all our

3 Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you, Councilman. Today is the  
6 beginning of a long journey.

7 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
8 Jones.

9 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
10 Mr. President. I was told as a kid loud  
11 don't make right, but it does make you  
12 listen. In conjunction with the office  
13 formerly known as MOCS, we were  
14 conducting the other day a poverty  
15 simulation, and what that basically is is  
16 that we take an amount of money, we put  
17 it in a simulator where we do scenarios  
18 about people 26 percent of the population  
19 living below the poverty belt. So you  
20 have to manage a budget, try to make a  
21 dollar out of 50 cents, go to the grocery  
22 store, Welfare Department, and all the  
23 things balancing priorities of the poor.  
24 And in the middle of that simulation,  
25 life broke out. Asa Khalif came in and

2           interrupted the proceeds and started  
3           passionately talking about issues that he  
4           cared about, suggested that we should,  
5           instead of simulating, come see the real  
6           hood.

7                   Those of you who know me in  
8           this Chamber, if ever my street cred is  
9           challenged, I accept that all day every  
10          day. And so we went out and we caught  
11          the El, and we found ourselves at  
12          Kensington and Allegheny. I have to tell  
13          you that my colleague Councilwoman  
14          Sanchez always talks about her district  
15          being the poorest district in  
16          Philadelphia. I mean, ever since we came  
17          here, she's been saying that. And we nod  
18          appropriately and say yeah, yeah, yeah,  
19          but K and A is ground zero, and what I  
20          saw out there was something that  
21          Councilwoman Sanchez deals with every  
22          single day.

23                   I saw a vet, who had served  
24          this country proudly, priced out of an  
25          old neighborhood, moved into concentrated

2                   poverty where he had to live. When he  
3                   served in foreign countries, their  
4                   circumstance was better than his.

5                   I saw a mother that was too  
6                   busy to stop and really have an engaging  
7                   conversation because she was coming from  
8                   her second job where she had a second  
9                   shift, where she couldn't afford to leave  
10                  her kids in day care and not pay that  
11                  extra fee.

12                  I met drug dealers that had  
13                  more authority on that corner than law  
14                  enforcement, politely told me, you know,  
15                  that's nice, but keep it moving, I'm  
16                  working.

17                  I walked around the corner and  
18                  a gun battle broke out. I mean, this was  
19                  real life. It wasn't simulated. And I  
20                  have to admit that what Councilwoman  
21                  Sanchez deals with every day is something  
22                  we cannot ignore. We have to do  
23                  something about that level of deep  
24                  poverty. That's not poverty. That's  
25                  deep poverty, where kids who walk through

2           that every day lose hope that they will  
3           ever get out, that this is what the world  
4           is, that the ten square blocks that they  
5           experience every day is the entire world.  
6           And for us to see corner stores that have  
7           no vegetables, no fruit, nothing healthy,  
8           but chips and a soda is not a meal.

9                   And so when we got to see that,  
10          I will admit that it moved me, that I  
11          immediately called my colleague and said,  
12          Tell me what I can do.

13                   That's not my district. I get  
14          it. We are very territorial. But  
15          poverty knows no bounds like that. And  
16          with Philadelphia being discovered as a  
17          great place to live, work, and play, we  
18          are concentrating that poverty in smaller  
19          and smaller areas and intensifying the  
20          misery. We've got to do something. We  
21          can do better. They deserve better, and  
22          we got to make it happen. And I just  
23          appreciate even though it was loud, even  
24          though it was rude -- we have a new term  
25          now called "hood-net." I wasn't

2                   kidnapped, because it wasn't forcible. I  
3                   went on my own. But I was taken,  
4                   compelled to go to the hood.

5                   Each of us got a poor district,  
6                   a poor area in our district. It's  
7                   nothing new, but I will say from a 50,000  
8                   foot view is much different, the reality  
9                   that those 26 percent of people face  
10                  every day, and it can't be ignored.

11                  Thank you, Mr. President.

12                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13                  Thank you, Councilman.

14                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
15                  Henon.

16                  COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
17                  Council President. On a non-school note  
18                  and the new cycle, some exciting news has  
19                  happened with our Pennsylvania codes when  
20                  it comes to building construction.

21                  Through the help of City Council, the  
22                  construction industry, led by  
23                  Representative Bill Keller, the Governor  
24                  and the Administration, we were able to  
25                  successfully pass a bill, HB 409, which

2                   allows the city of first class, which is  
3                   the City of Philadelphia, to adopt the  
4                   2018 code.

5                   So it's going to be on a fast  
6                   track. It will be coming in front of  
7                   City Council for approval and sign-off  
8                   and public hearings. There will also be  
9                   a public hearing process with the  
10                  Commonwealth with our Uniform  
11                  Construction Code Committee, which I'll  
12                  be presenting, along with you, to this  
13                  body for input and codes that are  
14                  Philadelphia centric that really deal  
15                  with the quality of life and issues that  
16                  we are all concerned about, such as lead  
17                  and other bills and measures that we have  
18                  passed through this body through our due  
19                  diligence and responsibility.

20                  So we do it, and it may not be  
21                  sexy. It may not -- it's kind of boring,  
22                  but it affects everybody's daily life and  
23                  the quality of life and public safety.  
24                  So I just want to let everybody know  
25                  thank you for their due diligence and

2                   look forward to working with everybody  
3                   and making sure that we, on a fast track  
4                   here, have all our stakeholders and our  
5                   constituents be made aware and have their  
6                   input heard.

7                   So thank you.

8                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9                   Thank you, Councilman. We've been  
10                  working on that for a long time.

11                  The Chair recognizes  
12                  Councilwoman Bass.

13                  COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
14                  Mr. President. And I also want to thank  
15                  our Mayor for beginning to lay out what  
16                  public education, the next chapter of  
17                  public education, is going to look like  
18                  post-SRC here in Philadelphia. And to  
19                  that end, I wanted to announce that we're  
20                  going to be hosting community-based  
21                  hearings. The first one is going to be  
22                  next Wednesday, November 8th, 6:00 to  
23                  8:00 p.m. at Lutheran Theological  
24                  Seminary, 7301 Germantown Avenue. And  
25                  we're going to have a community

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2 conversation in five different locations  
3 throughout the Eighth District with  
4 former SRC Commissioner, Sandra Dungee  
5 Glenn. And also at some point some of my  
6 colleagues may join us, and I know that I  
7 spoke yesterday with Councilwoman  
8 Blackwell, who is the Chair of the  
9 Education Committee here in City Council,  
10 who has agreed to join us, and also  
11 Councilwoman Gym, who I'm just signing up  
12 now to attend. I got the thumbs up. I  
13 know she'll be there.

14 So I just wanted to announce  
15 that.

16 And also regarding the passing  
17 of Jimmy Tayoun, who was a good friend to  
18 all of us and always some good advice,  
19 sage advice and just a wonderful person  
20 to be around. He was truly -- he just  
21 had a presence that made you want to be  
22 around him.

23 And I wanted to yield some of  
24 my time to Councilman Squilla, who I know  
25 represented Mr. Tayoun and who had a

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you, Councilwoman.

5 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,

6 Councilwoman.

7 And it is important that

8 Councilman Tayoun, who was the First

9 District Councilperson and also lived in

10 the district, and one thing I remember

11 when coming into Council, you always

12 remembered that Jim Tayoun was a person

13 that was at every location every place.

14 And I remember seeing him and I said, you

15 know, if I become Councilperson, I want

16 to make sure that I'm available as much

17 as you were to your constituents, and

18 that's something that Jimmy Tayoun

19 represented. He was always everywhere

20 and he always cared about the needs of

21 the community, and on this day, it's

22 great to honor him with this resolution.

23 So I want to thank Councilwoman

24 Bass. Happy to co-sponsor that.

25 And also I wanted to make a

3 K and A and how Councilwoman Sanchez and  
4 myself share that area. And, you know,  
5 poverty is part of that problem over  
6 there, but it's just part of it, and it's  
7 the opioid epidemic that's really driving  
8 the homelessness and the crime and  
9 everything that's going on around there,  
10 and we really do need to step up and make  
11 some drastic changes there and working  
12 with Councilwoman Sanchez and the Police  
13 and Administration hopefully to come up  
14 with new ways to attack this, because  
15 what we're doing now isn't working, but  
16 hopefully what we do in the future will  
17 work to make a difference. And I want to  
18 thank Councilman Jones for visiting that  
19 and coming to a district that's not --  
20 people usually go see the good parts of  
21 people's district and not the tough parts  
22 of our districts. But it is something  
23 that is on our radar and something that  
24 we are addressing, and when we go to  
25 those community meetings, believe me, we

3 that we continue to address this problem  
4 and work on solutions.

5 So thank you.

7 Thank you, Councilman.

8 Thank both of you.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
10 Johnson.

11 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
12 Council President. Just a couple brief  
13 statements. I want to also follow up on  
14 the comments of my colleagues Councilman  
15 Squilla and Councilwoman Bass and our  
16 resolution just honoring the memory of  
17 former Councilman Jimmy Tayoun, who  
18 always made it his mission and also made  
19 it his business to let me know that  
20 regardless of what I do all throughout  
21 the City of Philadelphia, only the work  
22 that I do within the Second Councilmanic  
23 District is what matters, because at the  
24 end of the day, those are the people who  
25 put you in office. And he talked about

4 work, but he also was a Councilman during

9 the great work that he did when he served  
10 as a Councilman. So I just wanted to  
11 offer brief statements in honor of his  
12 life.

13 I want to also -- I'm proud to  
14 say that we recently had the go ahead and  
15 green light for building a casino in the  
16 Second Councilmanic District at 11th and  
17 Packer, which will be Live Casino. And  
18 so as we move forward through that  
19 process, we look forward to providing  
20 jobs and professional service contracts  
21 and working with the building trades to  
22 make sure that people throughout the  
23 Second Councilmanic District have an  
24 opportunity to participate in the work  
25 that's going to be available with this

2                   new hotel and casino that's going to be  
3                   built in the Second Councilmanic  
4                   District.

5                   And last, but not least, today  
6                   we made a very historical move by  
7                   transferring the power from the School  
8                   Reform Commission, which was basically  
9                   overseen by the state. And me being a  
10                  former legislator working in Harrisburg  
11                  under Governor Tom Corbett and Governor  
12                  Rendell recognize the significance of the  
13                  responsibility that we're taking on, and  
14                  that responsibility will give us an  
15                  opportunity to have direct oversight over  
16                  the operations of how the Philadelphia  
17                  School District operates.

18                  Most may or may not know, I'm a  
19                  public school graduate from Edward Bok  
20                  High School. I'm a graduate of the  
21                  University of Mansfield where I got a  
22                  degree in criminal justice, with two  
23                  minors in philosophy and sociology, and  
24                  then I came home and went to University  
25                  of Pennsylvania and got a Master's degree

3 finance and did some coursework and got a  
4 certificate from Harvard Business School  
5 in non-profit leadership and board  
6 management. And I say all that to say I  
7 recognize the critical importance of us

10 recognize that you don't get a second  
11 chance in really helping your children  
12 get on a straight path when it comes to  
13 getting a quality education. And the  
14 Honorable Malcolm X once said that  
15 education is our passport to the future.

16 And so I look forward to the  
17 robust debate, conversation, strategic  
18 plan in making sure that we put all of  
19 our resources and efforts, most  
20 importantly, the efforts, in raising the  
21 bar of a quality education for our young  
22 people and working together to make sure  
23 we get it right moving forward, because  
24 at the end of the day, I mean, all due  
25 respect, I don't know where people send

2           their children to school and we all have  
3           our choice, rather it's public or private  
4           or parochial schools, but we're dealing  
5           with lives, and some of these young  
6           people that live in some of these zip  
7           codes, if we don't improve the quality of

9           may not have a shot.

10                   So I look forward for us  
11           getting this right with a strategic plan  
12           to move forward with the City of  
13           Philadelphia overseeing the Philadelphia  
14           School District. And thank you, Council  
15           President, for your leadership and making  
16           sure the negotiations with the  
17           Administration was on par with how we  
18           would like to move forward with the  
19           nominating process, making sure that's  
20           balanced, that's fair when these  
21           nominations come through City Council for  
22           approval.

23                   Thank you very much.

5                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
6                   you, Mr. President. I wanted to thank my  
7                   colleague Councilwoman Bass who is  
8                   working so hard on stop-and-go's. We  
9                   remember the Purple Fox back in the days  
10                  at 49th and Baltimore when we named the  
11                  whole issue stop-and-go's, and thank her  
12                  for doing an outstanding job.

13                  And certainly what Councilman  
14                  Jones said about Councilwoman Maria  
15                  Quinones-Sanchez, she fights hard for  
16                  people, and we've commended her before.  
17                  And I wanted to let him know that in his  
18                  very office was where Jim Tayoun's office  
19                  was. I didn't know if he remembered  
20                  that. And I want to certainly add my  
21                  voice to those, because Lucien Blackwell  
22                  was here and we were across the hall then  
23                  and next door to him when Tayoun was  
24                  Councilperson. And to his family and  
25                  certainly to all those who mourn, he did

12 to say a couple things. One is that I  
13 too wanted to just mention Jimmy Tayoun,  
14 graduate of the political school of hard  
15 knocks. He, however, was so generous  
16 with his advice and I remember when he  
17 first gave me advice, I really was very  
18 suspicious about his advice. He told me  
19 when he ran, he used to take a camel with  
20 him. He was Jimmy Tayoun, the Arab with  
21 the camel. And I was new to politics,  
22 and I thought it was the craziest thing I  
23 ever heard. And later I began to  
24 appreciate kind of what he was telling me  
25 and things like that. And that was Jimmy

3           very directly, and just it was very plain  
4           and he was very kind and generous, and so  
5           I appreciated that.

6                   What I also wanted to say is  
7           that I'm a Councilman at-large, so I  
8           cover the whole city, and I've had the  
9           opportunity to go into every neighborhood  
10          of Philadelphia, and the work that our  
11          District Councilpeople do in detail in  
12          that one-tenth of the City is tremendous.  
13          And I just wanted to say, because I think  
14          many people don't appreciate that  
15          Councilmembers are working evenings,  
16          mornings, weekends, and holidays.

17                   And in particular, I was with  
18          Councilwoman Maria Quinones-Sanchez a  
19          couple Saturdays ago with her and her  
20          staff sweeping and cleaning up under the  
21          El. And for anyone who wants to come out  
22          this Saturday at 10:00 a.m. at Kensington  
23          and Tioga, you can also get a broom and  
24          pick up trash.

25                   Before that, she invited me out

2 to where she was involved in a  
3 rehabilitation of an entire block right  
4 near there. And there's been so many  
5 other invitations. She had an event  
6 where there was a huge rally about  
7 fighting drug addiction. She has been  
8 just very generous with the idea that  
9 anyone who wants to help her district,  
10 you're welcome to help.

11 And I say that because I have  
12 heard, sometimes people say, well, you  
13 know, the District Councilpeople need to  
14 be more real about things. I will say  
15 this: There's nobody more real than our  
16 District Councilpeople, who are on top of  
17 every type of issue in the City of  
18 Philadelphia, from business to nuisance  
19 issues to crime to health to schools.  
20 There are so many issues, potholes, jobs,  
21 guns, all types of things. And while  
22 it's always good to say that we should do  
23 more -- raccoons. I'm sorry. Bees,  
24 right? We did bees, environment, you  
25 know, so many issues that occur.

2 I also want to let people know  
3 that your City Council people are really  
4 working very hard. And, Council  
5 President, I've been to your district as  
6 a guest, Strawberry Mansion Day and so  
7 many other things that you do that you  
8 invited me to and, you know, there has  
9 never been a distinction based on party  
10 or anything, just how can we work  
11 together to make our city better. And so  
12 I do appreciate that and just wanted to  
13 let people know that you can be assured  
14 that City Council members are really  
15 working -- you may not agree with us all  
16 the time. We don't agree with each other  
17 all the time, but certainly I have not  
18 seen anyone who is slack in this Council  
19 body.

20 Thank you.

5                   Chair of the Education Committee has  
6                   asked that we remind my colleagues that

8                   Council Education Committee where we will  
9                   be addressing the issue of suspensions  
10                  immediately following session.

11                  And I too want to go on the  
12                  record to commend the Mayor for outlining  
13                  the four pillars of the education agenda  
14                  for us for this coming year and remind  
15                  us -- well, he got into the weeds this  
16                  morning, which was refreshing, because  
17                  when we dig down in the weeds, there's a  
18                  lot of work in front of us that we're for  
19                  sure willing to embrace, the deepest of  
20                  which is that the District is going to  
21                  face a deficit which begins next year and  
22                  will grow to nearly \$1 billion over the  
23                  next five years.

24                  So the collaboration that he  
25                  spoke about will indeed be required and

10          thankful to him for that generous advice  
11          that he offered.
