2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 We're going to get started. We're  
7 running a little late. If the members  
8 will take their seats.

9 To give our invocation this  
10 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor  
11 Terrence Griffith.

12 Good morning, my friend.

13 He is here from the First  
14 African Baptist Church of Philadelphia,  
15 and he is the guest of Councilman Jones.

16 I would ask all members,  
17 guests, and visitors to please rise.

18 (Councilmembers, guests, and  
19 visitors rise.)

20 PASTOR GRIFFITH: Good morning.

21 (Good morning.)

22 PASTOR GRIFFITH: We certainly  
23 give honor to God, to Council President  
24 Clarke, to my Councilman, to all the  
25 Council individuals.

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2 Let us pray.

3 Without in whose presence our  
4 soul takes the light, in whom an  
5 affliction we call, a comfort by day and  
6 a song in the night, a hope of salvation  
7 of all.

8 Almighty God, we come to you  
9 today. We come acknowledging you as our  
10 God, our savior, our father. God, we  
11 bless you because you're God all by  
12 yourself. And as we come, God, we  
13 confess our sins, because there are many  
14 like the sands of the sea, but you said  
15 that if we confess your faithful and  
16 just, you'll forgive us of our sins and  
17 to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.  
18 And so, God, we ask for your forgiveness  
19 today for sins of omission and sins of  
20 commission.

21 But, God, as we come, our  
22 nation is in crisis. We know, God, that  
23 you do all things right. We know, God,  
24 that you set up and you take down, but  
25 our nation needs your help. We pray

9       face, turn from their wicked ways, then  
10      will I hear from heaven and heal the  
11      land.

12                    God, we ask that you heal the  
13      land together. Heal America, God. Heal  
14      our cities. Heal our states. And, God,  
15      we pray as Council deliberates today  
16      that, God, they'll deliberate, they'll  
17      discuss, and then they'll make decisions.  
18      May they be fair in their dealings.

19                    And, God, we're careful to give  
20      you the praise, the honor, and the glory.

21                    In the name of Jesus the  
22      Christ, we pray.

23                    Amen.

24                    God bless you.

25                    (Amen.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you. Thank you, Pastor, so much.

4 (Council at ease.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you. And thank you again, Pastor,  
7 for those inspiring words.

8 The next order of business is  
9 the approval of the Journal of the  
10 meeting of Thursday, November 2nd, 2017,  
11 and the Chair recognizes Councilman  
12 Greenlee.

13 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
14 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
15 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,  
16 November 2nd, 2017 be approved.

17 (Duly seconded.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
19 Thank you. It has been moved and  
20 properly seconded that the Journal of the  
21 meeting of Thursday, November 2nd, 2017  
22 stand approved.

23 All those in favor say aye.

24 (Aye.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Those opposed?

3 (No response.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
5 ayes have it, and the Journal is  
6 approved.

7 The next order of business is  
8 requests for leave of absence, and the  
9 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Good  
11 morning, Mr. President. Thank you. On  
12 behalf of the majority, a leave of  
13 absence is requested for Councilmembers  
14 Parker and Green.

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
16 Chair thanks the gentleman, and leave  
17 shall be granted.

18 The Chair now recognizes  
19 Councilman Oh.

20 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
21 much, Council President. On behalf of  
22 the minority, there's a request of leave  
23 of absence for Minority Leader Brian  
24 O'Neill.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The

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2 Chair thanks the gentleman. Leave shall  
3 be granted.

4 At this time, the Chair  
5 recognizes Councilman Taubenberger.

6 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

7 Council President, thank you very much.

8 I just wanted to take this moment to  
9 introduce some students from Devon Prep  
10 and their teachers. If they could stand.  
11 That's Peter Haas, Dan Macini (ph), and  
12 Marie LaPrise. Please acknowledge them.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Just  
15 a moment about them. Devon Prop is a  
16 private Catholic preparatory school in  
17 Devon, but their colors are the same  
18 colors as our city, and I thought them  
19 coming down here today and working with  
20 their teachers to show the history of our  
21 city and City Hall is something that can  
22 educate all students, and I believe it is  
23 incredibly important to educate these  
24 students on the way our local government  
25 works, with the hope that they one day

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2 get involved in their local government.

3 Thank you, Mr. President, and  
4 thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilman.

7 And welcome. Thank you for  
8 coming in.

9 (Applause.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
11 Chair now recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

12 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you  
13 very much, Council President. I also  
14 wanted to recognize students from Jubilee  
15 School, Central High School, and the  
16 Workshop School who are here today for  
17 today's resolution reading.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Please stand.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilwoman.

23 And good morning and welcome,  
24 and thank you all for coming today.

25 At this time, I would like to

2    dispense with our regular order of  
3    business and I would like to thank  
4    everyone, particularly these young people  
5    that have come here today, to witness  
6    their government in action. We genuinely  
7    appreciate you taking time out of your  
8    busy day to be here. We hope that your  
9    stay here today is a knowledgeable one  
10   but, more importantly, a pleasurable one,  
11   so much so that you come back again. So,  
12   again, thank you so much for being here.

13                   At this time, the Chair  
14    recognizes Councilwoman Gym, who will  
15    present a resolution commemorating the  
16    50th Anniversary of the November 17th,  
17    1967 Citywide Black Student Walkout.  
18    Would Karen Asper-Jordan and those  
19    accompanying her please join the  
20    Councilwoman at the podium.

21                   (Applause.)

22                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
23    joining Councilwoman Gym, we have  
24    Councilman Jones, Councilwoman Bass,  
25    Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez, Councilman

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2 Henon, Councilman Johnson, and  
3 Councilwoman Blackwell.

4 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: We have a  
5 big group, so just getting ready.

6 Thank you very much, everybody.  
7 Fifty years ago, the elders who are  
8 standing here with us today in Council  
9 were middle school and high school  
10 students who on November 17th, 1967  
11 bravely stood up from their desks, walked  
12 out of their schools, along with  
13 thousands of other students all across  
14 the City of Philadelphia.

15 With the teaching, support, and  
16 love of community leaders, Cecil B.  
17 Moore, Mary Seymour, William Mathis,  
18 Karen Asper-Jordan, David Richardson, and  
19 Walter Palmer, among others known and  
20 unknown, these brave students walked  
21 miles from every corner of our city to  
22 demand their civil rights and basic  
23 fairness in their schools.

24 Today we honor you all. We  
25 honor your bravery. We honor your

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2 legacy. Today it is a fact that we have  
3 African Americans in leadership as  
4 teachers, as administrators, and  
5 superintendents. Today African American  
6 history is a mandated course in the  
7 School District of Philadelphia, and  
8 today students still use the tools of  
9 non-violent protests like walking out and  
10 speaking out to demand even greater civil  
11 rights for themselves and for all of us.

12 Today our youth, especially our  
13 black, brown, immigrant, and LGBTQ youth,  
14 are carrying the baton of justice and  
15 showing us what it means to believe and  
16 to fight with passion and energy. And as  
17 we are today on the brink of restoring  
18 local control back into our public  
19 schools in Philadelphia, let us remember  
20 that this fight for education equity  
21 remains alive and well because of the  
22 courage of those who came before us.  
23 This movement continues.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: On behalf of

1           11/16/17 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS  
2    City Council, today City Council  
3    commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the  
4    November 17th, 1967 Citywide Black  
5    Student Walkout, and honoring the  
6    continuing tradition of youth organizing  
7    and activism around education equity and  
8    racial justice in the City of  
9    Philadelphia.

10                    (Appause.)

11                    COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

12    Whereas, the Black Power Movement marked  
13    a period in which cross-generational  
14    activists in the City of Philadelphia  
15    organized mass protests and boycotts in  
16    order to speak truth to power; and

17                    Whereas, in 1967, Black  
18    students joined and expanded the growing  
19    Black Power Movement by writing a student  
20    bill of rights and demanding community  
21    control of their public schools; and

22                    Whereas, Black students decried  
23    the African American student dropout  
24    rate, and called for a greater  
25    representation of African Americans in

2 the teaching force, administration, and  
3 governance of their schools as well as  
4 the teaching of African American history.

5 Sound familiar?

6 And whereas, school  
7 administrators at a number of high  
8 schools refused to recognize Black  
9 student unions as legitimate clubs;  
10 students sought recognition of these  
11 unions in order to strengthen their voice  
12 and role in school policies and  
13 governance; and

14 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas,  
15 students who protested racial injustice  
16 and school segregation demanded the right  
17 to refuse to salute the United States  
18 flag or say the pledge of allegiance  
19 without penalty, greater representation  
20 of Black students in union-sponsored  
21 apprenticeship programs, the freedom to  
22 express themselves through wearing  
23 African clothes and jewelry, and the use  
24 of African names; and

25 Whereas, Walter Palmer of the

2   Black Peoples Unity Movement and William  
3   Mathis of the Philadelphia Chapter of the  
4   Congress of Racial Equality provided  
5   youth activists with training and  
6   resources to develop an organizational  
7   strategy and create a students bill of  
8   rights; and

9           Whereas, youth organizations  
10   dedicated significant time, energy, and  
11   spirit to create demands around issues of  
12   representation, self-determination, and  
13   diversity in their schools; and

14           COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
15   with strategy and materials in place,  
16   student activists led a series of  
17   organized student walkouts throughout  
18   October and November 1967. The first  
19   demonstration occurred on October 26th  
20   when 300 Gratz High School students  
21   exited during lunchtime to rally outside  
22   of the school, holding signs that read  
23   "The School Board Doesn't Serve the Black  
24   Community" and "We Need an Independent  
25   School Board." Three hundred students at

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2 Bok Technical High School followed suit;  
3 and

4           Whereas, these demonstrations  
5 culminated on Friday, November the 17th,  
6 1967, with the walkout and non-violent  
7 gathering of over 3,500 Black student  
8 protesters from South Philadelphia High  
9 School, William Penn, Gratz, Germantown,  
10 Kensington, Bartram, Bok, West  
11 Philadelphia, Benjamin Franklin, Edison  
12 High School, and I am so sure Girls High  
13 School as well. Hundreds of elementary  
14 and middle school students also walked  
15 out of their schools to show solidarity  
16 with high school student protesters; and

17           Whereas, student activists  
18 marched from their schools to the School  
19 District of Philadelphia headquarters at  
20 21st Street and the Benjamin Franklin  
21 Parkway, chanting "Black Studies Now" and  
22 "more Black Power in the school system."  
23 Superintendent Mark Shedd met with march  
24 leaders upon their arrival to acknowledge  
25 demands and attempt to address student

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2           grievances. Student leaders yelled  
3           updates from the windows of the School  
4           District building, eventually declaring  
5           that the Superintendent and the school  
6           board officials had agreed to almost all  
7           of their demands.

8                         (Applause.)

9                         COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: And the  
10           struggle continues. I'm so honored to be  
11           with all of these wonderful trailblazers  
12           and all of the young people who remind us  
13           why we do what we do.

14                        Whereas, Walter Palmer  
15           described the mood of the walkout and  
16           gathering as one of hope, energy, and  
17           possibility that must never be forgotten  
18           and the Evening Bulletin described the  
19           atmosphere as more like a picnic than a  
20           demonstration; and

21                        Whereas, while the plainclothes  
22           civil disobedience squad was present for  
23           much of the gathering, as more Black  
24           students gathered outside the School  
25           District headquarters, Police



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2 Commissioner Frank Rizzo ordered 111  
3 newly sworn-in police sergeants in full  
4 riot gear to control the crowd of  
5 students. When police attempted to  
6 arrest the students who ran across a  
7 series of parked cars, police violence  
8 escalated, starting with the beating of a  
9 young woman and an Episcopal priest who  
10 sought to protect protesters from police  
11 violence; and

12 Whereas, officers charged at  
13 student activists with their clubs drawn,  
14 shouting racial epithets and launching  
15 tear gas. Some students held their  
16 ground, as some leaders called for  
17 students to fight back; and

18 Whereas, activists, School  
19 District employees, and bystanders said  
20 they broke down in tears witnessing the  
21 violence against the youth. School Board  
22 President and former Mayor Richardson  
23 Dilworth described the events this way:  
24 Things were under control until  
25 Commissioner Rizzo, without our request,

2       saw fit to let loose a couple of hundred  
3       men, swinging clubs and beating children;  
4       and

5                   COUNCILMAN JONES:   So these  
6       millennials believe they started civil  
7       rights and all that stuff.   Well, here  
8       they are behind us right here.   All  
9       right?

10                   So whereas, the School District  
11       of Philadelphia responded to the protest  
12       by meeting with students and staff from  
13       predominantly Black schools and  
14       discussing means to quell racial tensions  
15       and improve teaching practices.   Schools  
16       established community-parent-student  
17       committees in predominantly African  
18       American high schools to diversify the  
19       curriculum and better serve the African  
20       American students, by providing space and  
21       resources for the Black students union to  
22       meet; and

23                   Whereas, the November 17th,  
24       1967 student protest inspired a  
25       generation of Black students and youth

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2       activists who continue to work for Black  
3       Power, racial justice, and inclusion in  
4       Philadelphia; and

5                       Whereas, the legacy of this  
6       walkout catalyzed a wave of community and  
7       political activity in 1968, including the  
8       establishment of the Council of  
9       Organizations of Philadelphia Police  
10      Accountability and Responsibility --  
11      Police Accountability and  
12      Responsibility -- the Black Coalition,  
13      the Philadelphia Chapter of the Black  
14      Panther Party, and the Black Political  
15      Forum, and launched the careers of  
16      ground-breaking Philadelphia politicians  
17      such as Hardy Williams, David P.  
18      Richardson, Wilson Goode, John White, Jr.  
19      and Novella Williams; and

20                      COUNCILMAN JOHNSON:   And  
21      whereas, in 2005, the School Reform  
22      Commission Chairperson, under the  
23      direction of Commissioner Sandra Dungee  
24      Glenn, honored the determination of  
25      student protests by unanimously approving

1           11/16/17 - STATED - PRESENTATIONS  
2           a district-wide mandated course in  
3           African American history. The SRC  
4           recognized that the goal of the 1968  
5           resolution had not been fully realized,  
6           and that the concerns related to academic  
7           achievement addressed by this resolution  
8           remained a concern in 2005, and in an  
9           effort to close the largest academic  
10          achievement gap in the District, the  
11          School District of Philadelphia became  
12          the first and only school system in the  
13          nation to require each of its students to  
14          complete a course in African American  
15          history; and

16                       Whereas, the 1967 Citywide  
17          Black Student Walkout remains a key event  
18          in the vibrant, ever-growing history of  
19          youth activism in the City of  
20          Philadelphia over the past half century;  
21          and

22                       COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,  
23          Philadelphia's youth activists - led by  
24          Black, Brown, and Immigrant youth of  
25          color - continue to lead the call for

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2   education equality and racial justice in  
3   their schools and in our city, including  
4   the sit-in during the state takeover of  
5   the Philadelphia schools, walkouts to  
6   decry school budget cuts, and the  
7   immigrant students who boycotted and won  
8   the federal civil rights settlement  
9   around racial harassment at their school.  
10  They demand a more racially diverse  
11  teaching force, a democratic governance,  
12  and an end to the school-to-prison  
13  pipeline, fairer school discipline  
14  practices, clean water access in schools,  
15  a student complaints process, and other  
16  changes that advance racial equality in  
17  the Philadelphia school systems and far  
18  beyond;

19                   COUNCILWOMAN GYM:  And whereas,  
20  Philadelphia's youth organizing  
21  movements, including the Philadelphia  
22  Student Union, Youth United for Change,  
23  Asian American United, VietLead, and many  
24  others continue this activist tradition  
25  today, broadening the work into deeply

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2 intersectional organizing, which has  
3 earned them national recognition despite  
4 too few resources supporting youth  
5 leadership programs; and

6 Whereas, in a time when too  
7 many talk about youth as tomorrow's  
8 leaders, we build organizations -- we  
9 have organizations which build the youth  
10 leaders of today; now, therefore, be it

11 Resolved, that the Council of  
12 the City of Philadelphia, commemorates  
13 the 50th Anniversary of the November  
14 17th, 1967 Citywide Black Student Walkout  
15 and honors the continuing tradition of  
16 student organizing and activism around  
17 education equity and racial justice in  
18 the City of Philadelphia.

19 Thank you so much.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
22 the Chair now recognizes Ms. Asper-Jordan  
23 for remarks.

24 MS. ASPER-JORDAN: Good  
25 afternoon, everyone, and I want to thank

2    Councilwoman Gym and City Council for  
3    having us here and honoring us today and  
4    the very humbling experience.

5                   Fifty years ago, just imagine,  
6    our children -- and we were all children  
7    then -- going to demonstrate for equality  
8    and justice for schools that catered to  
9    our needs, and that was education. This  
10   is what the children wanted 50 years ago.  
11   Why are we still fighting for the same  
12   thing now?

13                   (Applause.)

14                   MS. ASPER-JORDAN: Just imagine  
15    your children, many had never been in a  
16    demonstration at all in their lives,  
17    going to the Board of Education just to  
18    voice their concerns.

19                   I was standing a few feet from  
20    Rizzo, Commissioner Rizzo, and Earl Vann,  
21    who was a Councilman then. I was  
22    standing on the side and I heard Earl  
23    Vann plead with Rizzo, tell him not to  
24    attack the children. Earl Vann said,  
25    They're only children.

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2 Rizzo said, Get their asses.

3 This was what was done to our  
4 children. Imagine a child not having  
5 anything to fight with, digging up dirt  
6 out of the ground to throw to defend  
7 themselves.

8 When I was thrown to the  
9 ground, I was dragged about a half a  
10 block. Formerly known as "Dick Trailer,"  
11 Mr. Imgeesi (ph), while they were  
12 dragging me by the front door of the  
13 Board of Education, he jumped on my body  
14 to keep them from dragging me. They beat  
15 him with those blackjacks unmercifully.

16 I want to thank the children.  
17 Know that you are our future. You have  
18 to continue the fight, and through you,  
19 we have new ideas.

20 To the old folks, and us  
21 included, we don't know everything. You  
22 have to listen to these children.  
23 They're the ones that are on the front  
24 lines in these schools. They know what's  
25 going on.



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2 Our children are our best and  
3 future commodity in this world. They  
4 deserve an education.

5 To our young people out there,  
6 if they kept education from the enslaved  
7 Africans, this is a question you must ask  
8 yourself: Why are they trying to keep it  
9 from us now? All right?

10 To our older staff, our  
11 representatives, fight for these  
12 children. You have to fight. And I know  
13 money goes a long way, but as I said  
14 before when I spoke here about Cecil B.  
15 Moore, you have to look out for the  
16 little person. You have to.

17 And I thank you.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
20 Chair recognizes Dr. Walt Palmer.

21 DR. PALMER: Thank you,  
22 Mr. President. And I want to thank the  
23 President and the City Council in  
24 general. I'd like to thank Councilwoman  
25 Helen Gym in particular for driving this

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2 initiative, and I want you to take away  
3 from this a couple of things.

4 One is, I want you -- don't  
5 focus on the attack on the children. I  
6 went to jail. I was charged with  
7 conspiracy, riot, mayhem, assault and  
8 battery, profanity, et cetera. That's  
9 not the focal point. I've been used to  
10 going to jail for these matters for  
11 years, but it was my babies. These are  
12 all my babies, right? I was 33 years old  
13 at the time. And so what happens is, I  
14 want you to remember, it did not happen  
15 like a flash mob. This was -- this  
16 started -- I started this journey in  
17 1955. 1955. I want you to picture  
18 Philadelphia in 1955. There were no  
19 black police officers. There were no  
20 black bank tellers. There were no black  
21 telephone operators. There were no  
22 blacks driving taxicabs and driving of  
23 any recognition, the El's and the trains,  
24 et cetera. It didn't exist.

25 Blacks were sequestered into

2 ghettos and housing stock that had been  
3 run over from previous years. There were  
4 no professors at University of  
5 Pennsylvania where I teach now. I  
6 started 50 years ago training teachers at  
7 Penn on racism and racism courses and  
8 still continue to do that today.

9           So the Black People's  
10 University, Black People's University  
11 created a template, 1955, a grassroots  
12 template, organizing and training and  
13 teaching young people from preschool to  
14 high school and beyond how to take care  
15 of themselves, self-help, self-reliance,  
16 and self-determination, how to become the  
17 future leaders. You cannot become a  
18 leader without training. You cannot have  
19 social training without training. If you  
20 fail to plan, you're planning to fail.  
21 And the reason it was so successful,  
22 because we had a template. We had an  
23 organizational template. That is the  
24 same template we use in order to make  
25 sure that there were blacks inside of

2 City Council.

3 Back then, there was no,  
4 Councilman Oh, there were no Asian  
5 Americans in Council.

6 Councilwoman Sanchez, there  
7 were no Hispanic Latinos. We used that  
8 template to force people to recognize  
9 there's a black and Latino population.

10 We helped to create the first  
11 Spanish parade in 1967. We had to fight  
12 for Dr. Ethel Allen, a black woman, to  
13 become here in Council.

14 What I learned along the years  
15 was to be able to recognize this problem  
16 we face as not an either/or. It's not a  
17 here or there. I was able to work on the  
18 inside and the outside. I worked with  
19 Bill Barrett of the Congress, the  
20 legendary Barrett of South Philadelphia,  
21 C and Frannie (ph), Jimmy Tayoun, Fumo.  
22 I worked with all the people on the  
23 inside as well as the outside, which gave  
24 us leverage.

25 So by the time 1965 came

3           same one that would go on to create the  
4           National Black Power Conference, the  
5           Black Panther Conference, the anti-war

7                        It was not by accident. These  
8           children were willing to spend a year

10          these schools to get to training at the  
11          Black People's University, where we go  
12          into Heritage House. They came there.  
13          It was orchestrated. And out of that  
14          came a young Dave Richardson. He started  
15          with me. He was just 18, 19 years old.  
16          He became the first and the youngest  
17          person ever in the history of  
18          Pennsylvania to be in the Legislature at  
19          24.

20                       John White, Jr. John White,  
21          Jr. became a councilman and a legislator  
22          and went on to become Secretary of  
23          Education.

24                       A young Chaka Fattah and a  
25          young Curtis Jones, they were able to

2 learn from the lessons. Falaka Fattah  
3 and David Fattah, the House of Umoja,

5 organized.

6 These young people are required  
7 to come for these trainings. They had to

10 the neighborhood. They had to engage the  
11 churches, the black churches. They  
12 didn't have cell phones. They didn't  
13 have copy machines. We took a mimeograph  
14 machine at Black People's University and  
15 built 5,100 page copies of African  
16 American history. Then they had to  
17 distribute it all across the City.

18 Please take away from this.  
19 These are not victims. These are not  
20 victims. These are people who stood up  
21 at the plate, and they became the models.

22 I watched the idea of an older  
23 people, elders, taking time with me. We  
24 created that model. I watched in this  
25 Council. I watched Schwartz, George

2 Schwartz. He mentored in here. I  
3 watched David Cohen. David Cohen  
4 mentored in here. I watched Hardy  
5 Williams mentor Kenyatta. I watched a

8 President Clarke.

9 These are the things, these are  
10 the outcomes of serious organizing and  
11 planning. It's not the flash in the pan.  
12 And I continue that move. I don't know  
13 how long it will last. Seven years from  
14 now I'll be 90, but I'll tell you this, I  
15 continue working every day of my life. I  
16 jog and train 40 blocks every other day.  
17 I still box. I got a shot. And I won't  
18 stop until I drop, and hope that none of  
19 you. This is only a stepping stone. We  
20 cannot bail on our laurels. We have to  
21 continue to build and build and build  
22 until we make the change we want.

23 This country is worth saving,  
24 and it's those that are left at the  
25 bottom who make the top.

11 black and brown people included, to be  
12 fairly represented on these contracts and  
13 these places of work in the City.

14 This helps make sure that  
15 people don't take us for a joke. This  
16 helps make sure that the people in this  
17 city is cared for by you. So when they  
18 vote for you, they know that you're  
19 caring about them too. This helps you,  
20 helps Council, helps the City, helps  
21 those who live here, pay taxes, work  
22 here, and if they out of work, can gain  
23 worthwhile employment.

24 This helps all people in this  
25 city, and if you come in here for a

2 contract and you sign an agreement, you  
3 can't go back later and say, Oops, my  
4 bad, I'm going to change it in midstream.

10 I'm free now. I lived here all

16 black and brown people are included for

18 Thank y'all for standing up.

10 the future of my children. I'm going to

11 tell you about my deceased husband for a

12 moment, so please be patient with me.

13 Lawrence graduated from

14 Benjamin Franklin High School in 1980.

15 He had carpentry skills. He was proud of

16 himself. He was going to take care of

17 his family and the child we were

18 expecting.

19 He had a hard time gaining

20 employment and gaining experiences that

21 he needed, but finally he secured an

22 interview with a job that he thought he

23 was going to be happy at. He was going

24 to finally build a career that he could

25 take care of his family.

2 He was interviewed by a  
3 45-year-old middle age -- that was middle  
4 age then -- white man. He brought him  
5 into the shop. He allowed Lawrence to  
6 try, you know, showing him what he could

9 everybody in the shop, you know, praised  
10 him, because he was good at what he did.  
11 He was young, but he was good at what he  
12 did.

13 As the interview concluded,  
14 they went back to his office. The  
15 gentleman continued to praise Lawrence.  
16 So happy you interviewed. When Lawrence  
17 stood up to shake his hand because the  
18 interview is over, he's proud of himself.  
19 The gentleman didn't shake his hand. The  
20 gentleman, the supervisor in the shop, he  
21 slapped his face, an 18-year-old man. He  
22 slapped his face. A scuffle ensued. My  
23 husband ran home, afraid for weeks how  
24 was this going to end up. Are they going  
25 to come lock me up? What do we do now?

2 How does he feed his family?

3 This kind of discrimination, if  
4 you allow it to continue, is nothing but  
5 a continuous slap in our faces.

6 Lawrence and I have two  
7 grandsons, 23 and 25, aspiring

9 business. I plan on buying them a truck.

10 Don't discriminate against my  
11 grandchildren. We need jobs with equal  
12 opportunities the same way yours do. We  
13 will be sharing the same community. I  
14 appreciate you making this very first  
15 start, but to continue this practice is a  
16 continuing slap in our faces, and it's  
17 our after life.

18 Once again, I'm Elizabeth  
19 McGraw, a 65-year-old grandmother. I  
20 represent all grandmothers and all of our  
21 grandchildren in our society when I  
22 speak.

25 Council care about veterans? Veterans

3 their families, friends, and neighbors

9 Cooper v. Aaron states you  
10 cannot violate the Constitution and laws  
11 without first violating your oath of  
12 office to uphold, obey, and defend the  
13 Constitution and laws. Justice Brandeis  
14 is quoted, If the government becomes the  
15 lawbreaker, it breeds contempt for the  
16 law. It invites every man to be a law  
17 unto himself. It invites anarchy.

18 Why has the elected monarchy  
19 not provided constitutionally required  
20 immediate remedy for 1038 West Wyoming  
21 Avenue? The Constitution and laws  
22 require immediate remedy of this breach  
23 of law, breach of close, breach of  
24 fiduciary duty. Your oath of office  
25 requires you to act or face prison.

23 Councilmember Bass to speak on this very,  
24 very important matter. Sunday evening

3 looking at. The interesting thing -- and  
4 I would like to advise the citizens of

9 matter is that he was also Mayor of the  
10 City of Philadelphia from 1828 to 1829.  
11 The Dallas fans ought to know that, and I  
12 say, go Eagles.

13 (Applause.)

14 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank  
15 you, Council President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17 Thank you, Councilman.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
19 Oh.

20 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
21 much, Council President. I just wanted  
22 to thank all our colleagues, yourself,  
23 Council President, the leadership, for  
24 continuously, and I think this Council  
25 body in particular in an unprecedented

2 manner, working hard to ensure that all  
3 Philadelphians are treated equally and  
4 fairly and under the Constitution that  
5 they are not discriminated against.

6 This bill that has passed for  
7 the first time gives Council the power to  
8 enforce anti-discrimination laws that  
9 have long been in Philadelphia but,  
10 sadly, have not been enforced.

11 I would like to also thank the  
12 community groups, because they've really  
13 been the push behind this to get it done.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCILMAN OH: I got to  
16 recognize different kind of democrat, all  
17 26 community leaders, for taking this  
18 grassroots effort and really bringing  
19 this in a way that is understood by the  
20 people. Particularly with the  
21 opportunity of \$500 million for Rebuild,  
22 in an unprecedented manner there will be  
23 opportunities in our communities for  
24 people who have the skills and the  
25 ability, and now each District

2 Councilperson and each member of Council  
3 can ensure that if there is  
4 discrimination on the job site or at any  
5 other contract, that this body will be  
6 able to act where there has not been in  
7 the past a willingness to act.

8 I really have to praise and  
9 thank the Law Department. I am one of  
10 the staunch critics of the Law Department  
11 when I feel they are not doing their job  
12 right. That's just my opinion. But I  
13 also want to say that the Law Department  
14 also does a fantastic job, and in this  
15 case, the Law Department was really  
16 spot-on, informing me things I had no  
17 idea about and ensuring that we would  
18 have a meaningful bill that we've passed  
19 today.

20 And, finally, I want to say  
21 that none of this would have been  
22 possible without Councilman Wilson Goode,  
23 Jr. He has been long relentless on this  
24 issue of fairness and equity, and this  
25 entire enforcement bill is built upon his

3 provides the basis for doing what we can  
4 do today.

5 So, Councilman Wilson Goode,  
6 Jr., thank you so much for your work, and  
7 I hope you'll see it paying off today.

9 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
10 much.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
12 Thank you, Councilman. And  
13 congratulations to both of you.

14 Speeches on behalf of the  
15 majority?

16 The Chair recognizes  
17 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

18 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
19 Mr. President, and let me thank  
20 Councilman Oh for that terrific segue  
21 into my remarks.

22 Forever, and I always use the  
23 expression "ad nauseam," members of this  
24 body have spoke about, talked about,  
25 debated about the importance of ensuring

2 that we have a government that looks like  
3 the City of Philadelphia. This has  
4 included reducing barriers in contracting  
5 so that every person, every business has  
6 an opportunity to successfully start and  
7 grow businesses here in Philadelphia.

8 A little over ten years ago  
9 City Council passed a bill requiring the  
10 development of Economic Opportunity Plans  
11 for certain contracts and projects. The  
12 significance of this bill provided what  
13 we hope to be a new pathway for  
14 meaningful, more substantive and systemic  
15 protocols for opportunities for black and  
16 brown citizens, women, and disabled  
17 businesses to participate in all phases  
18 of projects and contracts.

19 I was proud to co-sponsor this  
20 legislation with you, Councilwoman  
21 Blackwell, and a dear friend who remains  
22 quite dear to me, former Councilman W.  
23 Wilson Goode, also former Chair of City  
24 Council's Committee on Commerce and  
25 Economic Development.

2 He has been exceedingly  
3 consistent and unapologetically narrow in  
4 that which he cares about. Diversity is  
5 the goal not only in the workforce but  
6 should be reflected on our board of  
7 directors and in our executive suites.  
8 When companies bring women and people of  
9 color to the table -- and this has been  
10 researched and documented. When  
11 companies bring women and people of color  
12 to the table for major decisions, the  
13 conversation changes and the outcome is  
14 always different and better.

15 Goals are vital to the process,  
16 but they only represent the beginning.  
17 In addition, simply focusing on hiring  
18 people of color and women is not enough.  
19 When you take a close look at the  
20 definition of diversity and inclusion,  
21 you cannot have one without the other.  
22 Mr. Webster says that diversity is any  
23 dimension used to differentiate groups  
24 and people from one another with respect  
25 to and appreciation for differences in

2 ethnicity, gender, age, national origin,  
3 disability, sexual orientation,  
4 education, and religion.

5 Inclusion is the state of being  
6 valued, respected, and supported.

7 Inclusion, when successful, is reflected  
8 in the culture, practices, and  
9 relationships that support a diverse  
10 workforce.

11 Inclusion looks beyond numbers.  
12 Just because an organization meets their  
13 numbers doesn't necessarily mean they are  
14 and remain serious and authentic about  
15 new hires or contractors by the  
16 decision-makers.

17 So at the end of the day, I  
18 agree, Councilman Oh, that Councilman  
19 Goode, in my personal opinion -- and I am  
20 sure shared by many -- has been the  
21 architect of well over 66 bills, that's  
22 factual, 66 bills that have always  
23 narrowly focused on diversity and  
24 inclusion. And so with that, we know  
25 that this mission of diversity and

3 Thank you, Councilman Goode.

4 (Applause.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilwoman.

7 The Chair recognizes

8 Councilwoman Bass.

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
10 Mr. President. And I want to echo the  
11 sentiments of my colleague Blondell  
12 Reynolds Brown and thank Councilman Goode  
13 and Councilman Oh for all of their hard  
14 work. This has really been a  
15 considerable effort from so many people,  
16 and even when we did the presentation  
17 earlier and talked about the student  
18 walkout, part of my section in reading  
19 was talking about how inclusion was a  
20 part of the conversation 50 years ago,  
21 and here we are still having the  
22 conversation today. So clearly there is  
23 still a lot of work to be done.

24 Also I wanted to make sure  
25 everyone was aware that we're going to

3       regarding replacing the School Reform  
4       Commission. We have our next meeting  
5       scheduled for this coming Saturday from  
6       9:00 to 11:00 a.m. at Oasis City Church,

8       Street. So we certainly hope folks could  
9       come by. Last week Councilwoman  
10      Blackwell and myself were there, and it  
11      was just a dynamic conversation. It was  
12      really something not to be missed, and we  
13      want to encourage folks to come out and  
14      get as much information as possible and  
15      be a part of that conversation.

16                So I just really wanted to make  
17      sure folks knew that it's going to be  
18      this coming Saturday, November 18th, 9:00  
19      to 11:00 a.m. at Oasis City Church, 5248

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
4 Mr. President. I refuse to talk about my  
5 good friend Wilson Goode, Jr. I intend  
6 to talk more about his daddy, Wilson  
7 Goode, Sr. He has gone on, after serving  
8 with distinction as our Mayor, to do  
9 worthwhile efforts but within criminal  
10 justice. One of the things that he has  
11 done is the Amachi Foundation, which  
12 deals with the children of incarcerated  
13 individuals and look out for their  
14 well-being. One of the things that was  
15 talked about in the 1967 protest was the  
16 pipeline from school to prison, which  
17 existed then and continues to exist now.

18 I rise today to talk about  
19 because of your efforts, I was appointed  
20 to the Juvenile Justice Crime and  
21 Delinquency Commission to try to look at  
22 prevention efforts. I was sitting in a  
23 meeting and they were talking about  
24 ground-breaking legislation that was  
25 passed in bipartisanship with republicans

2 to deal with providing one percent of all  
3 of the proceeds from companies that do  
4 business with the prison system. And  
5 trivia pursuit for my friends in the  
6 press, the number one purveyor of prison  
7 services in the United States is Bob  
8 Barker from Let's Make a Deal. They  
9 provide all of the toothpaste and the  
10 hair brushes and the TV's to inmates.  
11 It's a multi-billion-dollar industry.

12 And so when they were talking  
13 about this legislation that put a  
14 set-aside to take care of social issues  
15 that children who have incarcerated  
16 parents might have, tuitions, social  
17 services, things like that, I just  
18 swelled with pride that someone was  
19 forward-thinking enough to introduce and  
20 then pass it.

21 I really fell out my chair and  
22 wanted to say I know him when they told  
23 me it was Senator Vincent Hughes. I just  
24 wanted to say, Philly, he's from our  
25 district, and I wanted to give him a

2 shout-out for that.

3 We introduced today a companion  
4 piece that will look at our prison  
5 system, to look at the prison industrial  
6 complex to say maybe there's a little  
7 that we can do to separate the chain.

8 And Wilson Goode, Sr. talks about the  
9 fact that he visited prisons where there  
10 was a grandfather, a son, and a grandson  
11 in the same institution.

12 We can do better. We will do  
13 better, and I think this legislation  
14 moves that in the right direction.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilman. Thank you.

18 The Chair recognizes

19 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez.

20 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Thank  
21 you, Mr. President. I'll try to be  
22 brief, although I'll take as long as it  
23 takes, right? John Street, Mayor Street.

24 I would be remiss not to echo  
25 the sentiments and really acknowledge

10 Bass for all of these community meetings.  
11 I think it's hugely important,

15 Blackwell and the Education Committee,  
16 this conversation has been a long time  
17 coming, and so hopefully I'll be able to  
18 stop by and join her as it's close to our  
19 district borders.

20 I want to remind folks that in  
21 Room 576 in about ten minutes, we have an  
22 inclusionary zoning briefing for  
23 legislative policy staff and my Council  
24 colleagues. I want to personally thank  
25 you, as this is not a new idea, something

3 class real early on. No new ideas. Just  
4 a different time. Things evolve, and

9 recognition, we are destined to keep  
10 repeating our history if we are not as  
11 focused, deliberate, and unapologetic  
12 about our values and what is important to  
13 us. So kudos to everyone for the work,  
14 Councilwoman Gym for the recognition.  
15 I'm really honored to stand up there with  
16 many folks who are incredibly proud of  
17 the work that they have done for  
18 education and the City of Philadelphia.

19 Thank you, Mr. President.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you very much, Councilwoman.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24 There are no additional speeches, so with
