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1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
2 morning, everyone. Sorry to be a little tardy but
3 we had a lot of activity this morning. We are
4 going to start. We have our quorum. I ask all
5 guests and visitors if they would please retire
6 behind the rail. We can get going.

7 To give our invocation this morning the
8 Chair recognizes Pastor Shawn Hyska from the
9 Presbyterian Church in Kensington. He is here
10 today as my guest. I would ask all members, guests
11 and visitors to please rise.

12 PASTOR HYSKA: Good morning and peace
13 be with you. I want to thank the Council for this
14 honor and particularly Council President for coming
15 before you this morning. Let us now go to God in
16 prayer. Let us pray.

17 Oh loving creator God, we come before
18 you this morning asking for your presence to be
19 upon your servants here who serve this great City
20 of Philadelphia. You created all of us, oh God, in
21 your image and in your likeness to do good, to love
22 you as our God and ultimately to truly embody that
23 radical love in sharing it with all of your
24 creation, especially with our fellow brothers and
25 sisters. Oh God I lift up these servants of yours

1 gathered here today that they may be granted your
2 wisdom to discern that is not only best for the
3 City, but what is right and just in your eyes.
4 Give them guidance in their discernment and peace
5 and understanding in their disagreements to seek
6 the good for all Philadelphians so that we can
7 continue to be a beacon to a broken world showing
8 what true brotherly love looks like. Strengthen,
9 oh Lord, their collective resolves to end
10 homelessness and help all of our citizens have a
11 place to call home. To ensure all Philadelphians
12 have access to healthy and nutritious food. To
13 strengthen all of our youth and guarantee that they
14 receive the highest quality education and
15 opportunities that they deserve. To protect and
16 provide care and support services for all of our
17 seniors. To eradicate guns and drugs and get them
18 off of our streets. To preserve our land's history
19 and green spaces and to continue to open our city
20 borders and provide radical hospitality for all
21 visitors and new residents and in particular, those
22 seeking sanctuary. Lord God, allow your
23 illuminating light to shine upon the work about to
24 be done here today. In the power of your holy name
25 we pray. Amen.

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1 (Amen.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you so
3 much, Pastor. Council will be at ease.

4 (Council at ease.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The next
6 order of business is the approval of the Journal of
7 the meeting of Thursday, November 16, 2017 and the
8 Chair recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

9 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you, Mr.
10 President. I move that the Journal of the meeting
11 of Thursday, November 16, 2017 be approved.

12 (Duly seconded.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
14 It has been moved and properly seconded that the
15 Journal of the meeting of Thursday, November 16,
16 2017 stand approved. All those in favor say aye.

17 (Aye.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
19 opposed?

20 (No response.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it
22 and the journal is approved.

23 The next order of business is requests
24 for leave of absence and the Chair recognizes
25 Councilman Henon.

1 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you, Mr.
2 President. On behalf of the majority there are no
3 requests of leaves of absence today.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair thanks
5 the gentleman.

6 The Chair now recognizes Councilman
7 O'Neill.

8 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you, Mr.
9 President. On behalf of the republicans there are
10 no requests for leaves of absence.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair thanks
12 the gentleman. At this time I would like to
13 dispense with the regular order of business and I
14 would like to thank everyone who has taken time out
15 of their busy day to come down to witness their
16 government in action. We genuinely appreciate you
17 coming down. We hope your stay here today is a
18 knowledgeable one but more importantly a
19 pleasurable one, so much so that you come back
20 again. So again, thank you so much for your
21 participation in today's session.

22 At this time the Chair recognizes
23 Councilman Jones who will present a resolution
24 recognizing Rhonda Willingham, president and
25 founder of Menzfit. Would Ms. Willingham and those

1 accompanying her please join the councilman at the
2 podium. And we have this runway presentation. And
3 joining Councilman Jones we have Councilwoman
4 Blondell Reynolds Brown, Councilman Green,
5 Councilwoman Gym and Councilman Henon, Councilman
6 Taubenberger and Councilwoman Quinones Sanchez.

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: So you can learn a
8 lot about your colleagues when they're exercising
9 their alter egos on the runway. Car Dee "G" back
10 here who won. All of them who participated,
11 motorcycles and -- you learn a lot about your
12 colleagues when you do these kinds of charitable
13 events. And I wanted to thank all of them who
14 participated in Who Wore It Best on the runway and
15 those who came who did not participate on the
16 runway but contributed with their treasury such as
17 President Clarke, such as Councilwoman Blackwell
18 who is an champion for homeless people and also
19 Councilman Domb who is a kinder, gentler
20 capitalist.

21 So I want you to know, ladies and
22 gentlemen, it is not about who wore it best. It is
23 about who needs it the most. The day before we did
24 our affair, Councilman Johnson did a workshop and
25 hearing on gun violence prevention. At that we

1 took a deeper dive into some of the causes of gun
2 violence and at its core is poverty. At its core
3 are people who do not have jobs. So the day of the
4 fashion show afterwards and with all the hoopla,
5 the next morning me and Captain Jack Jones, who is
6 my dog, do our constitutional walk in the morning
7 and I was reminded why it's not about who wore it
8 best, but who needs it most. I ran into a young
9 man at 53rd and Uklung. He was posted up. And for
10 those of you who don't know urban vernacular that
11 means he's standing on the corner with his
12 colleagues. He was there and he said Congressman
13 Jones. I said no, no, no, no, no. Councilman.
14 And so he pulled himself away from his colleagues,
15 pulled me to the side and his head was on a swivel,
16 which means he's constantly in alert of any danger,
17 police or competitors that he has. You can always
18 tell one of those boys like Councilman Johnson when
19 their head is on a swivel. So he says to me he
20 does not like his life-style, but he felt trapped.
21 That he worked a minimum wage job for long hours,
22 had two children and at the end of the paycheck he
23 had just enough maybe to buy clothes and food and
24 felt as a man head of his household less than. I
25 looked him up and down. You know, my head on a

1 swivel because I'm at 7:15 in the morning hanging
2 out with these guys noticed that he was poorly
3 dressed, missing a tooth, pants hanging down. And
4 it wasn't that he was dressed down, because so was
5 I. It was that he didn't know. He was unaware of
6 his dress and how in an interview that it's totally
7 unacceptable. So that's why I support Menzfit,
8 because if you don't know what you don't know you
9 can't do better. If you don't know not to dress
10 for the job you have but to dress for the job you
11 want, you'll never get there. So Rhonda Willingham
12 has done this for 10 years straight. She deserves
13 our support, those young men, those 1200 or so that
14 she has saved deserve our support and it's not
15 about who wore it best. It is about who needs it
16 most. So therefore, recognizing, honoring Rhonda
17 Willingham, president and founder of Menzfit for
18 aiding in the employment of thousands of men across
19 the City of Philadelphia, hosting the annual City
20 Council Who Wore It Best Fashion Show whereas
21 Menzfit is a nonprofit organization that strives to
22 influence positive change within community by
23 providing financial literacy and career development
24 services, along with professional interview attire,
25 this mission is to assist low income men with

1 long-term rewarding employment and.

2 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Now I'd like to
3 congratulate this year's winner, Councilman Curtis
4 Jones. Although the people may say something
5 different.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: It's not a popular
7 vote.

8 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas the
9 organization originated in Washington D.C. in 2001.
10 In June 2007 Menzfit opened a location in our City
11 of Brotherly Love and Sisterly Effectiveness. The
12 Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency
13 noticed Menzfit advocacy endeavors and funded their
14 move to Philadelphia with a \$250,000 grant and --

15 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES SANCHEZ: Whereas
16 Menzfit was founded by Rhonda Willingham, a
17 Philadelphia native. Before starting the
18 organization Willingham worked at the Department of
19 Labor with the Clinton/Gore administration.
20 Serving as an appointee, Willingham had a focus on
21 public affairs and community outreach. She is a
22 recipient of Philadelphia's own WDAS FM Radio's
23 Women of Excellence award and she was named a local
24 hero when receiving Bank of America's Neighborhood
25 Excellence Award, and whereas in Philadelphia

1 Menzfit has helped more than 6100 men compete for
2 jobs which have created almost 54 million dollars
3 in taxable income. The organization is not only a
4 nonprofit but a movement to support
5 underrepresented men living in low income inner
6 cities and helping them realize and exercise their
7 greater personal liberty and --

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas Menzfit
9 offers workshop series with various focuses such as
10 business etiquette and communications, diversity
11 awareness and tips on how to get through an
12 interview with ease. Their wide range of services
13 allows clients to excel in the professional world
14 while obtaining self-sufficiency. And the winner
15 of the ladies. The ladies champion on fashion.

16 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Is Helen
17 Gym this year.

18 Whereas Menzfit also hosts several
19 events across the city to raise money to aid in
20 their efforts to get men employed. One of those
21 events is, as you have already heard, Who Wore It
22 Best, a wonderful entertaining evening fashion show
23 that features models from Philadelphia City
24 Council, Menzfit 2016 Fashion Show featured our
25 council members Jones, Green, Oh, Squilla, Henon

1 and Councilman Johnson. The 2017 fashion show did
2 feature styles from the women of Philadelphia City
3 Council and to the 2017 winner, Councilwoman Gym.

4 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas job hunting
5 is extremely challenging for most people, however,
6 it is more demanding when a job applicant lacks
7 confidence or is unable to present what is
8 considered an acceptable business image for
9 employment. Menzfit had proven to be the leading
10 Philadelphia organization of its kind by taking an
11 active and innovative role in assisting the
12 underserved population, especially in this
13 increasingly competitive job market. Now therefore
14 be it.

15 COUNCILMAN HENON: Resolved by the City
16 Council of the City of Philadelphia that hereby
17 recognizes and honors Rhonda Willingham, president
18 and founder of Menzfit, for aiding in the
19 employment of thousands of men across this City and
20 for hosting the annual Philadelphia City Council
21 Who Wore It Best Fashion Show, which I did not win.
22 Further be resolved that a copy of this resolution
23 be presented to Rhonda Willingham and Menzfit as
24 further evidence of the sincere admiration and
25 gratitude of this legislative body.

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And the
2 chair recognizes Ms. Willingham for remarks.

3 MS. WILLINGHAM: Wow. This is
4 exciting. As many times as I have come to City
5 Council meeting I never thought that I would be
6 standing up here in front of you to talk about
7 something that is very, very dear to my heart, is
8 actually my ministry which is Menzfit. And I'm so
9 thankful and thrilled and grateful. And I know I
10 speak for the rest of the team and the members of
11 the board of directors for Menzfit when I say thank
12 you not only to the City Council members here that
13 participated this year and last year. Also, I want
14 to thank Council President Darrell Clarke. I want
15 to thank the mayor. He also came to our event and
16 is also a supporter of ours, so I wanted to make
17 sure that I recognized everyone. Kenyatta Johnson
18 has been just a wonderful advocate for Menzfit and
19 I'm looking forward to working with those council
20 members that I have not built an intimate
21 relationship with but I'm looking forward to doing
22 that as we move forward into 2018. We have got a
23 lot of things planned for next year and you have
24 heard from the council folks on this stage about
25 the number of men that we have suited, the number

1 that we have helped. The guys that we work with
2 come from homeless shelters, they come from job
3 training programs, they come from Welfare to work
4 programs, some of them are veterans. But a large
5 majority of our clients are returning citizens and
6 that's a population that most people typically
7 don't work with and it's been difficult for them to
8 get a second chance.

9 We talk about a second chance, but in
10 all actuality it's very hard for them to get
11 employment. So one of the focuses of our program
12 for next year is that we will be focusing heavily
13 on the returning citizens. So we're looking at
14 doing some things within the Department of
15 Corrections where we will actually be going into
16 some of the state correctional facilities and
17 starting our workshops 60 to 90 days before
18 gentlemen are released so that we can give them --
19 so we really can give them a hand up and not a hand
20 down as they prepare to leave prison. So we're
21 excited about that. And I'm just thrilled to be
22 here. I'm a little girl from West Philly, born and
23 raised. So when I started Menzfit back in
24 Washington one of the first cities on our expansion
25 tour was obviously my home city, Philadelphia. And

1 I'm so happy. I'm thrilled. Thanks again to
2 everyone up here for honoring Menzfit and really
3 recognizing the good work that we do. We all are
4 our brother's keeper. So thank you very much.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Council will
7 be at ease.

8 (Council at ease.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
10 and again, congratulations.

11 At this time the chair recognizes
12 Councilman Johnson who will present a resolution
13 honoring the Philadelphia Sunday Sun with Joseph
14 Mondesire, Catherine Hicks and those accompanying
15 them please join the Councilman at the podium.

16 And joining Councilman Johnson, we have
17 Councilwoman Parker, Councilwoman Blackwell,
18 Councilwoman Bass, Councilman Green and
19 Councilwoman Blondell Reynolds Brown and
20 Councilwoman Gym.

21 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: It was 1996. I
22 had just graduated from Mansonville University
23 receiving a degree in criminal justice, with dual
24 minors in philosophy and sociology and made a
25 personal commitment to come back to my neighborhood

1 of Point Breeze South Philadelphia to improve the
2 quality of life for the neighbors of which I grew
3 up with. And I had an opportunity one day while I
4 was doing some volunteering political work, saw a
5 young man who had slick hair and a cowboy hat on
6 and some cowboy boots and saw him speaking truth to
7 power about the issue of police brutality. This is
8 a gentleman who advocated for criminal justice
9 reform before it was the progressive thing to do.
10 This was a gentleman who advocated around the issue
11 of youth gun violence before it became a slogan.
12 And so today I am truly honored and privileged to
13 recognize in honoring the life of Jerry Whyatt
14 Mondesire and the founding of the Philadelphia
15 Sunday Sun for its 25th anniversary. He was a
16 social activist, a civil rights activist and always
17 advocated for all things regarding social justice.
18 And so if you knew Mr. Mondesire, if you was his
19 friend -- you definitely didn't want to be on the
20 other side and being one of his enemies. And so I
21 had the good pleasure of being one of his friends
22 and having a chance to learn some of his wise
23 counsel during my run for City Council and he
24 invited me up to the radio station a couple times
25 and would give me some insight around why it was so

1 critically important that I continue to make sure
2 there's a voice for those who I was going to be
3 representing when I arrived in City Council, those
4 needed a voice in the second councilmanic district.

5 So the resolution reads honoring and
6 recognizing the Philadelphia Sunday Sun and its
7 founder, Jerry Whyatt Mondesire, on the occasion of
8 the Sun's 25th anniversary.

9 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: And whereas the
10 Philadelphia Sunday Sun is a weekly newspaper
11 dedicated covering local and national stories that
12 impact the African American community in
13 Philadelphia. Since its founding in 1992, the Sun
14 has grown into a nationally respected news outlet
15 while staying true to its mission of connecting
16 Philadelphia's African American community and --

17 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, the Sun
18 was the brainchild of J. Whyatt Mondesire who owned
19 and played an active role in the paper's
20 publication until his death until 2015. Trained as
21 a journalist at the City College of New York, Mr.
22 Mondesire joined in the historic 1969 campus
23 takeover that sought successfully to increase
24 diversity in the college's enrollment. After
25 college, Mr. Mondesire began his professional

1 journalism career with the Baltimore Sun with the
2 quality of his work garnering increasing national
3 attention and earning the young journalist a
4 position within the Philadelphia Inquirer. After
5 his arrival in Philadelphia, Mondesire became a
6 leading voice for diversity within the City's news
7 rooms helping to cofound the Philadelphia
8 Association of Black Journalists in 1973 and.

9 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Just wanted a point
10 of privilege to say to his beautiful wife and son,
11 as an Asian American woman in Philadelphia, Jerry
12 Mondesire was a mentor, a friend, a fellow warrior
13 who exhorted and embraced so many diverse people
14 into the civil rights movement and into building a
15 broader message.

16 Whereas after several years covering
17 local politics and rising to the rank of assistant
18 editor on the Inquirer's city desk, Mr. Mondesire
19 accepted a position with Congressman William H.
20 Gray, III, eventually serving as the Congressman's
21 chief of staff. Mr. Mondesire became involved with
22 a variety of political and social causes. Notably
23 working to craft the ball that levied sanctions
24 against South Africa's apartheid regime. And --

25 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Like many of the

1 people up here, I remember my good friend Jerry and
2 his 7:30 a.m. calls often when I was actually
3 calling him back when I was taking my son to
4 school. A few years ago I had the opportunity to
5 purchase one of his hats during a Philadelphia
6 Association Black Journalist auction, scholarship
7 auction. So I keep his hat in my office as a
8 reminder of his 7:30 calls.

9 After Congressman Gray's retirement in
10 1991, J. Whyatt Mondesire began again to channel
11 his passion for community activism through his work
12 in journalism. In 1992 Mondesire founded the
13 Philadelphia Sunday Sun as an outlet for news and
14 opinions that impacted the City's African American
15 community and --

16 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Whereas, as
17 the City of Philadelphia joins the Sun in
18 celebrating its 25 anniversary, the paper continues
19 to build upon the legacy of its founder J. Whyatt
20 Mondesire. Today the Philadelphia Sun remains to
21 be one of the most impactful news outlets in the
22 City of Philadelphia and serves as a model for
23 African American owned and operated newspapers
24 across the country. Now therefore --

25 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Now

1 therefore know that Jerry was also a father, and I
2 got to know him well when he would come to pick up
3 his little daughter Jennifer from the dance class
4 where she was one of my students. So his social
5 justice and his deep love for his children is
6 really unparalleled. And with that we resolve that
7 the Council of the City of Philadelphia hereby
8 honors and recognizes the Philadelphia Sunday Sun
9 and the rich legacy of social justice it's founder
10 J. Whyatt Mondesire leaves on the occasion of the
11 Sun's 25th anniversary.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And the
14 Chair recognize Mr. Mondesire and Ms. Hicks for
15 remarks.

16 MS. LAVELLE: Thank you. Boy, I tell
17 you, hearing all that it just brings back a lot of
18 memories. But I want to thank Councilman Johnson
19 for this opportunity, all of Council, Council
20 President, I'm just so humbled. On behalf of our
21 staff and management of the Philadelphia Sunday
22 Sun, we are just so thankful to receive this, we
23 are humbled and really thankful. 25 years, that's
24 a long time. Jerry started this paper as a voice
25 of the community. He wanted the opportunity to

1 tell the stories of the community through the paper
2 to give that opportunity to all the neighborhoods
3 that may not have that opportunity in mainstream
4 news media. So we strive to continue to do that.
5 I will strive along with his son, Joseph, who is
6 here along with me to ensure that your stories
7 continue to be in our paper. We ask that you
8 continue to support us. I thank all my family and
9 friends and our Sun staff who is here standing with
10 us. But we ask you to continue to support the
11 paper through subscriptions, through advertising
12 and through just letting us know what stories you
13 want told. Thank you.

14 (Applause.)

15 MR. MONDESIRE: Good morning. 25
16 years, that's a long time to be putting up with
17 that man. So I understand -- I'm first and
18 foremost grateful to the staff because, you know --
19 I mean, I know you all were doing it for a check,
20 but I mean, that's still a long time and a lot of
21 patience that you had to deal with, that you had to
22 persevere through. So I'm first and foremost
23 grateful for you all and I'm also grateful for the
24 people that buy this paper and read this paper on a
25 weekly basis. If it weren't for you all we

1 wouldn't be up here. There would be nothing to
2 acknowledge if people didn't spend that money and
3 that time investing in what we presented as a paper
4 and as a media outlet. So I'm truly grateful.
5 Again, I'm humbled as well eternally. And I really
6 can't thank everyone enough for this opportunity
7 and -- I really owe it to you all to keep this
8 paper going and to grow it because one thing that I
9 have learned throughout this time is that accuracy
10 and timeliness are truly essential to being a
11 successful media outlet, so that's what we're going
12 to continue to strive for and -- I mean, that's
13 what it is. The so thank you very much.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Council be
16 at ease.

17 (Council at ease.)

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And, again,
19 congratulations. Thank you.

20 The next order of business is
21 communications and the chair requests -- we have
22 one more? Sorry. We appear to have an additional
23 presentation. Thank you.

24 We have one more presentation. And
25 would like to recognize Councilman Domb. A

1 resolution recognizing Bernard "Bud" Newman. Ask
2 Councilman Domb to please come forward. Joining
3 Councilman Domb, we have Councilwoman Gym,
4 Councilwoman Reynolds Brown, Councilwoman Parker,
5 Councilman Taubenberger, Councilwoman Bass,
6 Councilman Green, Councilman O'Neill, Counselman
7 Henon and more importantly, Mr. Newman.

8 COUNCILMAN DOMB: I'm going to start
9 off by just saying we're honoring today Bud Newman,
10 who really has done an amazing job as president of
11 the Jewish Federation of Greater Philadelphia. And
12 when I thought about Bud, I looked up a quote that
13 I had remembered from Winston Churchill that he
14 exemplifies and that is, we make a living by what
15 we get, but we make a life by what we give. And
16 what you're going to hear today from all of my
17 colleagues is how much Bud, Judy, his children,
18 grandchildren and great grandchildren have given,
19 including a fact that he probably won't tell you
20 and that is as a past president of the Jewish
21 Federation, him and his family have made the
22 largest endowment, eight-figure gift, to the
23 Federation to help others in Philadelphia. Pretty
24 amazing. Pretty amazing.

25 Let me start with the resolution

1 recognizing and honoring Bernard "Bud" Newman,
2 immediate past president of the Jewish Federation
3 of Greater Philadelphia for his stewardship to the
4 organization and service to the Jewish community of
5 Greater Philadelphia.

6 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: And
7 whereas for more than a century, the Jewish
8 Federation has worked tirelessly to convene the
9 community, encourage and steward the generosity of
10 donor and make grants to meet critical needs and.

11 COUNCILMAN HENON: And point of
12 personal privilege, I want to congratulate Bud
13 Newman. They happen to be a business owner and
14 long supporter of the residents and underserved
15 communities of Northeast Philadelphia for many,
16 many, many, many years employing those who need it
17 and deserve second chances personally, personally
18 firsthand in his selection of employment
19 opportunities, and I want to thank him and Judy
20 because that leadership has demonstrated how he
21 operates as a successful business owner, land owner
22 and part of the community in Northeast
23 Philadelphia.

24 Whereas the Jewish Federation serves
25 vulnerable populations, facility community

1 engagement and promotes Jewish life and learning.

2 And --

3 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Whereas under
4 Newman's leadership, the Jewish Federation's
5 financial resources have grown and dollars have
6 been strategically invested into programs that most
7 effectively address the community's needs and --

8 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Whereas, Mr. Newman
9 and his dynamic professional team set the goal of
10 making the Jewish Federation a more inclusive place
11 and community engagement became one of their
12 highest priorities. And --

13 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: My own personal
14 privilege, he was Buddy at the time but he gave me
15 my first job in the summer of 1966. And we
16 reconnected a couple times. But it was the hardest
17 job I ever had, and if you ever need an incentive
18 to go to school so you don't have to work that
19 hard, get a job up at Newman Paper and you'll see
20 real work. Thanks, Buddy.

21 Whereas Bud Newman and his team
22 dedicated themselves to building and strengthening
23 partnerships with individuals and organizations
24 throughout the community. And --

25 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas, in

1 addition to Mr. Newman's leadership and commitment
2 to the community, Mr. Newman and his family made a
3 generous contribution to the Jewish Federation to
4 assist in providing for the dozens of Jewish
5 identity building, educational, social service and
6 Israel-related programs and institutions, both
7 local and global that the federation supports each
8 year and --

9 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, Bud Newman
10 is also committed to the City of Philadelphia and
11 its thriving business community as he is the
12 president of Newman & Company, a century-old family
13 business located in Philadelphia that is
14 Pennsylvania's leading recycler and supplier of
15 rigid cardboard and --

16 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Whereas, Mr.
17 Newman is also committed to the environment and
18 providing for those in need as he maintains a farm
19 in New Hope and distributes that produce from his
20 farm to the Mitzvah Food Project to feed those in
21 need and --

22 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas, the Jewish
23 Federation has thrived and expanded over the past
24 three years under the outstanding leadership of Bud
25 Newman and --

1 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES SANCHEZ: We are
2 so grateful for heros like Mr. Newman and his
3 selflessness and endless willingness to help others
4 in the community at large have made a positive
5 impact and we honor him for his contributions to
6 our city now and therefore.

7 COUNCILMAN JONES: Be it resolved that
8 the Council of the City of Philadelphia hereby
9 recognize and honors Bernard "Bud" Newman,
10 immediate past president of the Jewish Federation
11 of Greater Philadelphia for his stewardship to the
12 organization and his service to the Jewish
13 community of Greater Philadelphia.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
16 And the chair recognizes Mr. Newman for remarks.

17 MR. NEWMAN: Thank you all. Thank you,
18 Council President Clarke. Special thanks to
19 Councilman Domb and all of those who cosigned. I
20 certainly am humbled and grateful for this
21 recognition. For me it has been a wonderful
22 experience, especially in the City of Brotherly
23 Love for which I believe so strongly we all are
24 together. To have had the opportunity to be at the
25 helm of the Jewish Federation has given me much

1 greater insight into the needs of many more than
2 Jewish people. This city has welcomed our Jewish
3 federation and all that it does with open arms.
4 This city has superb citizenry. Its people are
5 open and willing and anxious to do for each other.
6 The world and the rest of our country needs to
7 recognize that. This City Council is an unusual
8 group who we are trying very, very hard to do that
9 which we do microcosmically in the Jewish community
10 and to them I send and give my praise and thanks.
11 For my wife, Judy, standing behind me, I always
12 recognize that I wouldn't be here without her
13 because without her support it wouldn't happen.
14 Without the support --

15 (Applause.)

16 MR. NEWMAN: Without the support of so
17 many people in the Jewish Federation who are
18 sitting to my left who have taken the time of this
19 day to be here as friends and professionals, my
20 humble thanks to all of you. God bless you and let
21 us continue to work together.

22 (Applause.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
24 very much. Now the next order of business is
25 communications, and the Chair request that the

1 Sergeant of Arms delivers the messages from the
2 Mayor to the chief clerk. And, Mr. Decker, would
3 you please read those messages.

4 MR. DECKER: To the President and to
5 Members of the Council of the City of Philadelphia,
6 pursuant to Sections 4604 and 2307 of the Home Rule
7 Charter I am today, November 27, 2017 transmitting
8 to the Council a recommendation of the City

12 that on November 27, 2017 I signed all the bills
13 which are passed by council at its session on
14 November 16, 2017. And I am submitting here for
15 the consideration of your honorable body a
16 resolution to reappointing Bernie Prazenica to the
17 board directors of the City Avenue Special Services
18 District of Philadelphia and Lower Merion. And a
19 resolution reappointing J.S. Feldstein to the board
20 of directors of the City Avenue Special Services
21 District of Philadelphia and Lower Merion. And a
22 resolution reappointing Gary Brandes to the board
23 of directors of the City Avenue Special Services
24 District of Philadelphia and Lower Merion. And a
25 resolution reappointing Mark C. Reed to the board

1 of directors of the City Avenue Special Services
2 District of Philadelphia and Lower Merion. And a
3 resolution approving the fiscal year 2018 through
4 2019 rebuild project statement and budget pursuant
5 to Bill 170206. And an ordinance authorizing the
6 City of Philadelphia to enter into lease agreements
7 with the Philadelphia Authority for Industrial
8 Development under which the City would lease to
9 paid on a project-by-project basis certain land and
10 facilities in the Fairmount Park system, recreation
11 centers, playgrounds and branches in the Free
12 Library of Philadelphia system and which would
13 permit paid to sublease such facilities on a
14 project-by-project basis to other organizations.
15 And an ordinance authorizing the revision of lines
16 and grades on a portion of City Plan number 295 by
17 striking from the City plan Harner Street from
18 Spring Lane to Manatawna Avenue and reserving and
19 placing on the City Plan a right-of-way for sewage
20 and drainage purposes within the lines of Harner
21 Street being stricken and authorizing acceptance of
22 the grant to the City of the said right-of-way all
23 under certain terms and conditions.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Mr. Decker,
25 do you have any additional communications?

1 MR. DECKER: I have none, Mr.
2 President.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT: Thank you very
4 much. And those messages will be printed in
5 today's Journal.

6 The next order of business is the
7 introduction of bills and resolutions and the Chair
8 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

9 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Thank
10 you, Mr. President. This morning I offer one
11 resolution and I would like to speak on it very
12 briefly after the introduction.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
14 Councilwoman.

15 MR. DECKER: A privileged resolution
16 calling on the joint committees on the environment
17 and transportation and public utilities to hold
18 hearings on the status of the City of
19 Philadelphia's Vision Zero Action Plan, which is
20 designed to reduce traffic crashes, improve
21 performance on the streets system and promote
22 active transportation, including bicycling within
23 the City.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
25 recognize Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

1 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Thank
2 you, Mr. President. While today I speak as someone
3 who has always feared of learning how to become a
4 bike rider, I have always fully respected the
5 physical fitness benefits it brings, and in 2014
6 approached this as a public policy matter because I
7 embraced the environmental benefits as well. The
8 record should reflect that interest on this Council
9 started in June 2014 where I introduced a bill
10 authorizing our City to plan and operate a bicycle
11 sharing program. Since then we have passed
12 collectively over seven pieces of legislation on or
13 about bikes, bike sharing and today given several
14 recent incidents in the news and having listened
15 carefully to Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell learned
16 what's happening in her district around bikes, it's
17 time for us to reexamine with concerned
18 stakeholders how we can learn to coexist and reduce
19 the number of those that are being harmed by bikes.
20 So I look forward to, I'm sure, robust discussion
21 between bike coalitions, interested communities,
22 including churches who are trying to figure out how
23 we can coexist with the good news around bikes and
24 bike sharing. And so with that, Mr. President, I
25 thank you.

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
2 Councilwoman. That will be on today's final pass's
3 calendar.

4 Chair recognizes Councilwoman
5 Blackwell.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you very
7 much. Today I introduce two bills on your behalf.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
9 Councilwoman.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you.

11 MR. DECKER: An ordinance authorizing
12 and approving the evaluation and delivery of a
13 service agreement between the City of Philadelphia
14 and the Philadelphia Authority for induction
15 development relating to the financing of energy
16 conservation and efficiency measures at the
17 Philadelphia Museum of Art, main building, the
18 Perelman Building, and the Rodin building. And an
19 ordinance authorizing the City of Philadelphia to
20 enter into a guaranteed energy savings project for
21 implementation and evaluation of energy
22 conservation and efficiency measures designed to
23 reduce energy, water waste or other consumption or
24 operating costs at specified city properties.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those both

1 will be referred to committee. And the Chair
2 recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

3 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you, Mr.
4 President, and on your behalf I offer two
5 resolutions.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

7 MR. DECKER: A privileged resolution
8 honoring, recognizing and congratulating Hazim
9 Hardeman for being named the 2018 Rhodes scholar.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That will be
11 on today's calendar.

12 MR. DECKER: And a nonprivileged
13 resolution authorizing the commissioner of Public
14 Property to execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
15 Redevelopment Authority without consideration
16 deeds, convey and condition of fees, pieces of
17 ground with the buildings and improvement thereon
18 situated in the 28th Ward of the City of
19 Philadelphia.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Next week's
21 calendar.

22 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you, Council
24 President. Today I offer two resolutions.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,

1 Councilman.

2 MR. DECKER: A nonprivileged resolution
3 also naming Almond Street between Venango Street
4 and Pickwick Streets as Storm Evans Way.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that
6 will be on next week's calendar.

7 MR. DECKER: And a nonprivileged
8 resolution urging the President of the United
9 States and members of the United States Congress
10 and all relevant federal officials to continue to
11 protect net neutrality and open Internet access.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And next
13 week's calendar.

14 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you, Mr.
16 President. Today I offer one bill, two privileged,
17 four nonprivileged resolutions.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
19 Councilman.

20 MR. DECKER: An ordinance authorizing
21 the revision of lines and grades on a portion of
22 City Plan number 295 by striking from the City Plan
23 Harner Street from Spring Lane to Manatawna Avenue
24 and reserving and placing of the City of Plan a
25 right-of-way for sewer and drainage purposes.

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Per the
2 committee.

3 MR. DECKER: And a privileged
4 resolution recognizing and honoring Ray Didinger
5 for being inducted into the Broadcast Pioneers Hall
6 of Fame.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's
8 calendar.

9 MR. DECKER: And a privileged
10 resolution honoring the life of Sheila J. Taylor
11 Hawkins for her dedication to the School District
12 of Philadelphia and offering our deepest and
13 sincerest condolences to her family, friends,
14 students and all of those grieving her untimely
15 death.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: This week's
17 calendar.

18 MR. DECKER: And a nonprivileged
19 resolution reappointing Jay Feldstein to the board
20 of directors of the City Avenue Special Services
21 District of Philadelphia and Lower Merion. And a
22 nonprivileged resolution reappointing Bernie
23 Prazenica to the board of directors of the City
24 Avenue Special Services District of Philadelphia
25 and Lower Merion. And a nonprivileged resolution

1 reappointing Mark C. Reed to the board of directors
2 of the City Avenue Special Services District of
3 Philadelphia and Lower Merion. And a nonprivileged
4 resolution reappointing Gary Brandes to the board
5 of directors of the City Avenue Special Services
6 District of Philadelphia and Lower Merion.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those would
8 be referred to committee.

9 Chair recognizes Councilman Johnson.

10 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: President, one
11 nonprivileged resolution.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
13 Councilman.

14 MR. DECKER: A nonprivileged resolution
15 supporting enactment of PA Senate Bill 501, a
16 bipartisan effort to enhance protections for
17 domestic violence victims by tightening
18 restrictions on gun possession for persons subject
19 to protective orders.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That will be
21 on next week's calendar.

22 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Quinones
23 Sanchez.

24 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES SANCHEZ: Thank
25 you, Mr. President. Before I introduce my

1 nonprivileged resolution, I just want to take
2 moment and recognize Palumbo Academy student Brian
3 McCurdy. He attends Palumbo which is in Councilman
4 Johnson's district and lives in Councilman Henon's
5 district. He wrote to our office about the pros
6 and cons about the Sugary Beverage Tax. And Brian
7 hopes to study business administration one day and
8 open up his own business in Philadelphia. And he's
9 here watching, as you like to say, our democracy in
10 action. So welcome him today.

11 (Applause.)

12 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES SANCHEZ: With
13 that I just have the one nonprivileged resolution.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
15 Welcome.

16 MR. DECKER: A nonprivileged resolution
17 authorizing the commissioner of Public Property to
18 execute and deliver to the Philadelphia
19 Redevelopment Authority without consideration these
20 conveyed conditional pieces simple titled to
21 certain city-owned lots or pieces of ground with
22 the buildings and improvements thereon situated in
23 the 19th Ward of the City of Philadelphia.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that
25 will be on next week's calendar.

1 Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

2 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you, Council
3 President. I have one privileged resolution.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
5 Councilman.

6 MR. DECKER: A privileged resolution
7 declaring December 1st World AIDS Day in
8 Philadelphia.

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That will be
10 on this week's calendar.

11 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

12 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you, Mr.
13 President. I have no bills or resolutions today.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
15 Councilwoman. Chair recognizes Domb.

16 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Good morning, Council
17 President. No bills or resolutions today.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
19 Councilman.

20 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Gym.

21 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Good morning,
22 Council President. No bills or resolutions today.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
24 Councilwoman.

25 Chair recognizes Councilman

1 Taubenberger.

2 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Good morning,
3 Council President. I have one privileged
4 resolution and it is cosponsored by all members of
5 Council and I thank them all for that.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
7 Councilman.

8 MR. DECKER: A privileged resolution
9 recognizing Julia Reynolds Masterman School for
10 their mock project that encouraged young people to
11 find and use their civic voices in making a
12 positive difference in their communities.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that
14 will be on today's calendar.

15 Chair recognizes Councilman O'Neill.

16 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you, Mr.
17 President. I have no bills or resolutions.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
19 Councilman.

20 Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

21 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: No bills or
22 resolutions.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
24 Councilman chair recognize Councilwoman Bass.

25 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: I offer two

1 nonprivileged resolutions.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
3 Councilwoman.

4 MR. DECKER: A nonprivileged resolution
5 appointing Angela Bowie to the board of directors
6 for the Germantown Special Services District. And
7 a nonprivileged resolution appointing Charles L.
8 Richardson to the board of directors for the
9 Germantown Special Services District.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And we refer
11 to committee.

12 And Chair recognizes Councilman Oh.

13 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very much,
14 Council President. I offer one nonprivileged
15 resolution and may be heard after the title is
16 read.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
18 Councilman.

19 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you.

20 MR. DECKER: A nonprivileged resolution
21 requesting the Mayor of Philadelphia, the
22 Pennsylvania General Assembly and the Governor of
23 Pennsylvania to act to restore control over the
24 Philadelphia Parking Authority and its revenues to
25 the City of Philadelphia.

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
2 recognizes Councilman Oh.

3 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very much,
4 Council President.

5 In 2001, the General Assembly took over
6 the City's on-street parking functions by taking
7 over the Parking Authority. Simply they changed
8 the appointment of the Parking Authority board from
9 being that done by the Mayor to that done by the
10 Governor. The reason that they used in court as to
11 why they had the authority to take over a
12 municipality's parking function, on-street parking
13 function which is unconstitutional according to
14 Article three, Section 32 of the Pennsylvania State
15 Constitution was the claim that they were held
16 responsible for funding the School District of
17 Philadelphia and, therefore, they had to fund the
18 school through the Parking Authority. And so Act
19 22 required that the Parking Authority contribute
20 45 million dollars per year to the School District
21 of Philadelphia, which if that had been done would
22 have provided over the last 16 years 720 million
23 dollars to the Philadelphia School District. It
24 has not. After enacting Act 22, the general
25 assembly provided additional duties and

1 responsibility to the Parking Authority within the
2 City of Philadelphia and those funds go to a
3 separate account, non-city accounts. We actually
4 don't know how much money that is.

5 In 2004 when the cooperation agreement
6 which the city and PPA entered was about to expire,
7 the general assembly passed Act 9, which extended
8 the agreement by 10 years, taking it to 2004 -- or
9 taking it from 2004 to 2014. But in July 2012, the
10 general assembly passed the July 2012 statute not
11 extending the agreement because the agreement was
12 going to expire in 2014, but simply enacted
13 legislation that the City's on-street parking would
14 be administered and enforced by the Philadelphia
15 Parking Authority. That is unconstitutional. And
16 so since 2004 and into the future, the Philadelphia
17 Parking Authority exists under the legal claim that
18 it funds our School District. In June of 2018, the
19 SRC will be dissolved. The City will be
20 responsible for funding the school entirely with a
21 shortage of state funds. With that, I would ask
22 that the Governor, the legislature and our Mayor
23 act to return the administration, the control and
24 the funding of the Philadelphia Parking Authority
25 back to the City of Philadelphia. I will note that

1 I did introduce Bill 160844 to withdraw the City's
2 authorization to the Parking Authority of the City
3 functions, which we can do, but hopefully we can
4 resolve this. On the other hand, I will say I will
5 find it very difficult to approve any additional
6 tax increases, property, business or otherwise if
7 we have not made an attempt to regain control and
8 revenues that are generated within our City to fund
9 our School District and City. Thank you very much.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
11 Councilman.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And that
14 will be on next week's calendar. That concludes
15 our introduction of bills and resolutions. And our
16 next order of business is reports on committee and
17 the chair recognizes Councilman Henon. Full report
18 from the Committee of the Whole.

19 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you, Mr.
20 President. And the Committee of the Whole reports
21 out 12 resolutions with a favorable recommendation.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
23 Mr. Decker, please read that report.

24 MR. DECKER: To the President, to
25 members of the council of the City of Philadelphia,

1 the Committee of Whole which is referred Resolution
2 number 170759 entitled a resolution appointing Drew
3 Murray to the Board of Directors of the Center City
4 District.

5 And Resolution number 170806 entitled a
6 Resolution appointing Tina Byles Williams to the
7 Board of Directors of the Center City District.

8 And Resolution number 170807 entitled a
9 Resolution appointing Maureen Anastasia to the
10 Board of Directors of the Center City District.

11 And Resolution number 171026 entitled a
12 Resolution appointing Donn Clendenon to the Board
13 of Directors for the Old City Special Services
14 District.

15 And Resolution number 171027 entitled a
16 Resolution appointing Jennifer Nagle to the Board
17 of Directors for the Old City Special Services
18 District.

19 And Resolution number 171028 entitled a
20 Resolution appointing Ashley Peel to the Board of
21 Directors for the Old City Special Services
22 District.

23 And Resolution number 171029 entitled a
24 Resolution appointing Carlos Sena to the Board of
25 Directors for the Old City Special Services

1 District.

2 And Resolution number 171030 entitled a
3 Resolution reappointing Greg DeShields to the Board
4 of Directors of the Center City District.

5 And Resolution number 171031 entitled a
6 Resolution reappointing Romulo L. Diaz, Jr., to the
7 Board of Directors of the Center City District.

8 And Resolution number 171032 entitled a
9 Resolution reappointing Robert Lane to the Board of
10 Directors of the Center City District.

11 And Resolution number 171033 entitled a
12 Resolution reappointing Joseph Zuritsky to the
13 Board of Directors of the Center City District.

14 And Resolution number 171035 entitled a
15 Resolution appointing Joseph Meade to the Board of
16 Directors for the Germantown Special Services
17 District.

18 Respectful reports of this considered
19 the same and returns the attached Resolutions to
20 Council with a favorable recommendation.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
22 Mr. Decker. These Resolutions will be placed on
23 our final passes calendar at our next session of
24 Council.

25 Chair now recognizes Councilwoman

1 Blackwell for report from the Committee on Finance.

2 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you, Mr.
3 President. The Committee on Finance reports out
4 one bill with a favorable recommendation.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

6 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you.

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Mr. Decker,
8 please read that report.

9 MR. DECKER: The Committee on Finance
10 which is referred Bill number 160111 entitled an
11 Ordinance amending Chapter 12-2800 of The
12 Philadelphia Code entitled Administrative
13 Adjudication of Parking Violations to establish an
14 amnesty program for fines, fees and penalties on
15 parking violations onto certain terms and
16 conditions. Respectful reports it has considered
17 and amended the same and returns the attached bill
18 to council with a favorable recommendation.

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
20 Mr. Decker.

21 Chair again recognizes Councilwoman
22 Blackwell.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you, Mr.
24 President. I move that the rules of council be
25 suspended so as to permit first reading this day of

1 Bill number 160111.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

3 It has been moved and properly seconded that the
4 rules of council be suspended so as to permit first
5 reading this day of Bills number 160111. All those
6 in favor aye.

7 (Aye.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
9 opposed?

10 (No response.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it
12 and this bill will be placed on our first reading
13 calendar today.

14 Chair now recognizes Councilwoman
15 Quinones Sanchez for a report from the Committee of
16 Licenses and Inspection.

17 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES SANCHEZ: Thank
18 you, Mr. President. The committee on Licenses and
19 Inspection reports four bills with a favorable
20 recommendation.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
22 Mr. Decker, please read that report.

23 MR. DECKER: The committee on Licenses
24 and Inspections which has referred Bill number
25 160768 entitled an Ordinance Amending Sub-Code A of

1 Title 4 of The Philadelphia Code and entitled The
2 Philadelphia Administrative Code by amending
3 Chapter three entitled permits by requiring a waste
4 collection plan for construction demolition or
5 alterations.

6 And Bill number 170898 entitled an
7 Ordinance amending Section A301 of Title 4 of the
8 Philadelphia Code entitled application for permit.
9 And Section 91008 entitled Demolition Contractor
10 License by adding and amending certain provisions
11 related to permits for demolition and the licensing
12 of demolition contractors.

13 And Bill number 170903 entitled an
14 Ordinance amending section B3303 of Title 4 of the
15 Philadelphia Code entitled demolition by amending
16 requirements regarding sight grading and use of
17 mechanical equipment and that requirements
18 regarding materials, shoots, dust control fencing
19 and storage of demolition debris.

20 And Bill number 170955 entitled
21 Ordinance amending Chapter 93300 of the
22 Philadelphia Code entitled erection, use and
23 inspection of tower cranes. By revising
24 requirements related to tower cranes and adding
25 requirements regarding the use and inspection of

1 mobile cranes. Respectful reports it has
2 considered and amended the same and returns the
3 attached bills to council with a favorable
4 recommendation.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
6 Mr. Decker.

7 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Sanchez.

8 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES SANCHEZ: Thank
9 you, Mr. President. I move the rules of council be
10 suspended as of first reading this day of Bill
11 numbers 160768, 170898, 170903 and 170955.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Can I get a
13 second?

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
16 It's been moved and properly seconded that the
17 rules of Council be suspended so as to permit first
18 reading this day of Bills 160768, 170898, 170903
19 and 170955.

20 All those in favor say aye.

21 (Aye.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
23 opposed.

24 (No response.)

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have

1 it. And this bill will be placed of our first
2 reading calendar today.

3 Chair now recognizes Councilman Jones
4 for report for the Committee on Commerce and
5 Economic Development.

6 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you, Mr.
7 President. The Committee on Commerce and Economic
8 Development reports one bill with a favorable
9 recommendation.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
11 Mr. Decker, please read that report.

12 MR. DECKER: The Committee on Commerce
13 and Economic Development which has referred Bill
14 number 170849 entitled an Ordinance amending
15 Section 17-1603 of the Philadelphia Code entitled
16 Economic Opportunity Plans Contents to require the
17 provision of information relating to prior history
18 of meeting goals established in connection with
19 City contracts and the prior history of related
20 corporate entities. Respectfully reports that it's
21 considered and amended the same and returns the
22 attached to bill to council with a favorable
23 recommendation.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
25 The chair again recognizes Councilman Jones.

1 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you again, Mr.
2 President. I move that the rules of council be
3 suspended as to permit the first reading of this
4 bill this day of Bill number 170849.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
7 It has been moved and properly seconded that the
8 rules of council be suspended so as to permit first
9 reading this day of Bill number 170849.

10 All those in favor say aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
13 opposed.

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have it
16 and this bill will be placed on our first reading
17 calendar today.

18 That concludes our reports on committee
19 and our next order of business is consideration of
20 a calendar. I note that the bills just reported
21 from committee with a suspension of the rules have
22 been deemed to have had a first reading. All of
23 those bills will be placed on our second reading
24 and final passes calendar at our next session of
25 Council.

1 If there are no additional bills on the
2 first reading calendar chair recognizes Councilman
3 Henon for a motion concerning the bills on the
4 second reading and final passes calendar.

5 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you, Mr.
6 President.

7 I move that the Rules of Council be
8 suspended to permit the use of a consent agenda to
9 consider the following bills on the second reading
10 and final passage calendars. Bill numbers
11 170683-A, 170902-A, 170819, 170878, 170924, 170363,
12 170713, 170723, 170820, 170823, 170824, 170825,
13 170826, 170851, 170855 and 170905.

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
16 It has been moved and seconded that the rules of
17 Council be suspended to permit the use of a consent
18 agenda to consider the bills just read by
19 Councilman Henon.

20 All in favor please indicate by saying
21 aye.

22 (Aye.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
24 opposed.

25 (No response.)

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
2 it. Motion carries and we will consider the
3 consent agenda shortly.

4 The chair again recognizes Councilman
5 Henon for the purpose of calling up bills and
6 resolutions on the regular second reading and final
7 passage calendar.

8 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you, Mr.
9 President. In addition to the resolutions and
10 bills being considered on the consent agendas
11 today, the following resolutions and bills are
12 being called up for the second reading and final
13 passage calendars. Bill numbers 171019, 171022,
14 171034. All other bills and resolutions are being
15 held.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
17 Councilman. Before considering these bills and
18 resolutions that are on the final passage calendar
19 today, we will have our public comments session and
20 it will go as follows. If you have an interest in
21 testifying on a bill or resolution that is on the
22 final passes calendar today, if you have not
23 already done so you can sign up at the table to my
24 left. When your name is called, you will come to
25 the middle of the chamber where there's a podium.

1 There's a device on that podium. When the light
2 turns green on that device, it will be your time to
3 speak. When the light turns yellow, you will have
4 30 seconds to conclude your remarks. And when the
5 light turns red, we would ask that you please
6 adhere to our guidelines and conclude your remarks.

7 Mr. Decker, please call the name of the
8 first witness.

9 MR. DECKER: Joe Dennahell, commenting
10 on 170683A and 170878.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
12 afternoon.

13 MR. DENNAHELL: Good morning. This is
14 an official decree of the people and as such
15 requires immediate action remedy. Every week
16 Council, Mayor and others transfer private property
17 to government, probably illegally. Last meeting
18 Council spoke endlessly about how it supports civil
19 rights. Nothing is more primary than the God-given
20 right to be secure in your houses, persons and
21 effects. Why is Council, Mayor and others denying
22 numerous constitution laws failing to perform a
23 known duty or task by denying due process and
24 remedy? The Mayor recently called out President
25 Trump as a bully and his family didn't raise him

1 right. Would a firefighter be proud of his son
2 that would violate those constitutional laws to
3 give upwards of a hundred million taxpayer dollars,
4 Federal taxpayer dollars to build a mall on my
5 stolen home. PA Constitution, Article 1, Section
6 11, every man for an injury done to him in lands,
7 goods or person shall have remedy by due course of
8 law, right and justice administered without cost,
9 denial or delay. The FBI and Justice Department
10 are required to investigate, prosecute missing,
11 misused hundreds of billions federal taxpayer
12 dollars given to Philadelphia. The Constitution
13 laws require immediate remedy of this breach of
14 law, breach of close, breach of fiduciary duty.
15 Your oath of office requires you that or face
16 prison. 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986, 1987. 18
17 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384. PA Constitution Article
18 1, Sections one through 11. 26 PA CSA 703, 705,
19 708, 709, 712, 713, 716 and other laws listed in
20 SCOTUS 1589 65. 141330, 144056. I call for the
21 Federal and Commonwealth governments to perform
22 their constitutional obligations to investigate and
23 prosecute all involved in the theft and illegal
24 transfer of my home 1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The
25 denial of God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for

1 23 years as egregious extraordinary oath violating
2 and requires immediate remedy. A just cover must
3 obey the rule of law, this color of law.
4 Government must have its charge of government
5 revoked until a constitutionally compliance
6 government is installed. Public servants cannot
7 refuse their sworn duty any more than a fireman can
8 refuse to fight fire. The sovereign people require
9 the Constitution laws be enforced. Jail is
10 required for all who violate those laws. I remind
11 Council, it takes a lot of cooperation to create
12 and allow monument corruption.

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
14 for your testimony.

15 MR. DECKER: Clark King commenting on
16 171022.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
18 afternoon.

19 MR. KING: Good afternoon, President.
20 Good afternoon, Council members. Thank you for
21 your time. I'd like to state that the -- I'd like
22 to start by saying that the tax on the president
23 are harmful, especially when they're irrational or
24 dishonest. Having said that, I would like to state
25 my support for Councilman Johnson's resolution

1 here. I believe that the Americans are facing a
2 tax reform hoax. A functioning Congress would go
3 after the missing and unaccounted for stolen
4 trillions of money which the Federal Reserve Bank
5 has supported, not work to give the almighty one
6 percent and the great U.S. super transnational
7 corporations a tax break in the hope of job
8 creation. The great U.S. corporations are now
9 paying an effective two-and-a-half to
10 three-and-a-half percent tax rate. Job creation
11 under this criteria should have happened decades
12 ago. Congress appears to be still dedicated to the
13 Wall Street system that drives a hundred million
14 Americans into poverty. Poverty is the actual
15 national security crisis. Our U.S. money system
16 has been subverted and all but privatized. The Fed
17 is still serving the banker speculators.

18 The U.S. Treasury and the Fed must
19 retrieve the unaccounted for and stolen trillions
20 with the goal of leaving the monetary financial
21 system stabilizing United States and funding the
22 redevelopment of North America. Congress threatens
23 the American standard of living in this tax hoax.
24 It is not acceptable to permit the liquidation of
25 Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security. Not

1 acceptable to shrink or eliminate programs that
2 serve the poor and the powerless. We still have
3 ACA and the I.R.S. hovering the main street economy
4 that Congress was supposed to untax the lower 80
5 percent. Instead, one percent wealth and finance
6 have conducted and won the war against the people
7 and the nation of the United States and can only
8 look to increasing their wealth and power at the
9 cost of the population. The Fed must be
10 reorganized to fund the 50 states infrastructure
11 and industry. The Republican party is no longer
12 the party of Lincoln who bequests to humanity a
13 nation and government of, for and by the people.
14 However, in overplaying their hand and recklessly
15 going after the population's economy, the
16 leadership may have killed the Republican party.
17 The U.S. government must spend money into the Main
18 Street economy so that people will be able to
19 purchase a decent standard of living, run their
20 businesses and pay their debts and taxes. It's a
21 national priority. Thank you.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
23 for your testimony.

24 MR. DECKER: Peter Gawford commenting
25 on 170793.

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good
2 afternoon.

3 MR. GAWFORD: Yes. Good afternoon
4 members of Council. I'm here to discuss Bill
5 number 170793 which is a rezoning Bill for the
6 South Kensington area. I'm here for myself as a
7 resident of the 1300 block of Hope Street and also
8 on behalf of other residents of that street.

9 The 1300 block of Hope Street is
10 currently a three-story street and we hope that
11 City Council can keep it that way. In looking at
12 the proposed bill, the bill proposes to keep most
13 of the 1300 block of Hope Street as RSA-5, which
14 has a 38 foot height limit, which is a positive
15 thing. But three parcels are being designated
16 CMX-3, which has no height limit and those three
17 parcels are 1309 North Hope, 1311 North Hope and
18 1321 North Hope and we are just hopeful that there
19 can be an amendment on the floor to amend the maps
20 for this bill to keep those parcels also as RSA-5.
21 And I would also like to submit as written
22 testimony a letter from the Townhomes of Liberty
23 North which is a community on the 1300 block of
24 Hope Street.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.

1 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

2 MR. DECKER: There are no other
3 speakers on the public comment list, Mr. President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
5 very much, Mr. Decker.

6 We'll now consider today's bill consent
7 agenda. I would ask the clerk to read the titles
8 of all the bills on the consent agenda. After each
9 title is read any member may object to the
10 inclusion of the bill on the consent agenda. Upon
11 such an objection and without debate the bill will
12 be immediately removed from consent agenda and
13 placed on our regular final passes calendar.

14 Mr. Decker, would you please now read
15 the titles of the bills on the consent agenda.

16 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you, Mr.
18 President. I am going to inform Council President
19 that I must leave the chambers and head to my
20 district on council business and want to be
21 recorded for the record voting aye on all bills and
22 resolutions today.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
24 Councilman. The record shall reflect that leave
25 shall be granted.

1 Mr. Decker.

2 MR. DECKER: Bill number 170683-A
3 entitled an Ordinance continuing the Port Richmond
4 Industrial Development Enterprise Neighborhood
5 Improvement District beyond its termination date in
6 the area bounded generally by the north side of
7 Allegheny Avenue, the west side of Memphis Street
8 between Allegheny Avenue and East Westmoreland
9 Street, the south side of East Westmoreland Street,
10 the property line of 3300 Agate Street and the back
11 of properties facing west along the east side of
12 Tulip Street between Westmoreland and Ontario
13 Streets, the south side of Ontario Street, the west
14 side of Tulip Street between Ontario and Tioga
15 Streets, the north side of Tioga Street, the back
16 of properties facing west on the east side of Tulip
17 Street between Tioga and Venango Streets, the back
18 of properties facing south along the north side of
19 Venango Street, including the property located at
20 2301-07 East Venango Street, and the back of
21 properties facing east along the west side of Amber
22 Street, as well as the properties located at
23 2066-80 East Tioga Street and 2082 East Tioga
24 Street; continuing the Port Richmond Industrial
25 Development Enterprise, Inc., a Pennsylvania

1 nonprofit corporation, as the Neighborhood
2 Improvement District Management Association for the
3 District.

4 And Bill number 170902-A entitled an
5 Ordinance amending section 14-503 of the
6 Philadelphia Zoning Code, entitled NCA,
7 Neighborhood Commercial Area Overlay District, by
8 creating the East Mount Airy NCA Overlay District
9 and making related changes, all under certain terms
10 and conditions; and amending the Philadelphia
11 Zoning Maps by changing the zoning designations of
12 certain areas of land located within an area
13 bounded by Fayette Street, East Vernon Road,
14 Michener Avenue, and Greenwood Street.

15 And Bill number 170819 entitled an
16 Ordinance to amend the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by
17 changing the zoning designations of certain areas
18 of land located within an area bounded by Girard
19 Avenue, 6th Street, Berks Street and 10th Street.

20 And Bill number 170878 entitled an
21 ordinance authorizing and approving the execution
22 and delivery of a Service Agreement between the
23 City of Philadelphia and the Philadelphia
24 Redevelopment Authority relating to the financing
25 of a home repair program for homeowners; approving

1 the issuance by such authority of bonds, notes or
2 other evidences of indebtedness (including
3 reimbursement obligations related to lines or
4 letters of credit) in one or more series to finance
5 or refinance such program and authorizing and
6 approving the obligation of the City to pay in full
7 when due the service fee and other amounts payable
8 under the Service Agreement.

9 And Bill number 170924 entitled an
10 Ordinance to amend the Philadelphia Zoning Maps by
11 changing the zoning designations of certain areas
12 of land located within an area bounded by
13 Cheltenham Avenue, Ditman Street, Cottman Avenue,
14 Ditman Street, Bleigh Avenue, Edmund Street,
15 Cottman Avenue, Vandike Street, Robbins Street,
16 Torresdale Avenue, Deveraux Avenue, and Hegerman
17 Street.

18 And Bill number 170363 entitled an
19 Ordinance establishing a no truck parking
20 regulation on the 1900 block of North 76th Street
21 between Overbrook Avenue and City Avenue, both
22 sides.

23 And Bill number 170713 entitled an
24 Ordinance authorizing 2601 Pennsylvania Avenue
25 Condo Association to install, own and maintain a

1 sign encroachment at 2601 Pennsylvania Avenue.

2 And Bill number 170723 entitled an
3 Ordinance authorizing Germantown Special Services
4 District to install, own and maintain various
5 bollard encroachments at 57 West Maplewood Mall.

6 And Bill number 170820 entitled an
7 Ordinance to amend Title 11 of The Philadelphia
8 Code, entitled Streets, by revising certain
9 provisions of Chapter 11-600, entitled
10 Construction, Encroachments, and Projections Over,
11 On and Under Streets, to amend the encroachment
12 regulations for signage.

13 And Bill number 170823 entitled an
14 Ordinance authorizing the relocation of the
15 southerly curblineline of Carpenter Street, from Broad
16 Street to 15th Street on City Plan number 15-S, a
17 variable distance southwardly, so as to wide the
18 cartway of said Carpenter Street.

19 And Bill number 170824 entitled an
20 Ordinance authorizing the revision of lines and
21 grades on a portion of City Plan number 359 by
22 relocating the southwesterly houseline and curblineline
23 of Byberry Road, from the Roosevelt Boulevard to a
24 point northwestwardly therefrom, and plotting on
25 the City Plan a right-of-way for sewer and drainage

1 purposes, contiguous with the northwesterly side of
2 the Roosevelt Boulevard and extending from Byberry
3 Road southwestwardly to a right-of-way for drainage
4 purposes.

5 And Bill number 170825 entitled an
6 Ordinance amending Section 2 of an Ordinance, Bill
7 number 130355, approved June 17, 2013, entitled An
8 Ordinance authorizing the plotting upon a portion
9 of City Plan number 58 of a two-foot wide area for
10 public pedestrian use extending along the southerly
11 side of Pearl Street, from 10th Street to a point
12 approximately 138 feet westwardly therefrom by
13 extending the period for compliance with the terms
14 and conditions stated therein.

15 And Bill number 170826 entitled an
16 Ordinance revising parking restrictions on
17 Maplewood Avenue, between Greene Street and Wayne
18 Avenue.

19 And Bill number 70851 entitled an
20 Ordinance authorizing and directing the changing of
21 the name of Convention Avenue, from Health Sciences
22 Drive to South Street, to Health Sciences Drive.

23 And Bill number 70855 entitled an
24 Ordinance authorizing Passyunk Avenue
25 Revitalization Corporation to install, own and

1 maintain various planter and bike rack
2 encroachments on Passyunk Avenue, South 12th
3 Street, Morris Street and Watkins Street.

4 And Bill number 170905 entitled an
5 Ordinance amending Section 9-203 of The
6 Philadelphia Code, entitled Street Vendors, by
7 prohibiting street vending on certain portions of
8 Olney Avenue and creating a special street vending
9 district on North 20th Street between West Clarkson
10 Avenue and Belfield Avenue, all under certain terms
11 and conditions.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
13 Mr. Decker.

14 These bills having been read on two
15 separate days, the question for each bill now shall
16 the bill pass finally. Mr. Decker shall call the
17 roll and upon being called each council member
18 shall vote aye on each of the bills, nay on each of
19 the bill or indicate those bills for which the
20 member is voting eye and those bills for which the
21 member is voting nay.

22 Mr. Decker, call the roll.

23 MR. DECKER: Councilwoman Bass.

24 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Aye all.

25 MR. DECKER: Councilwoman Blackwell.

1 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Aye all.
2 MR. DECKER: Councilman Domb.
3 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Aye on all.
4 MR. DECKER: Councilman Green.
5 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Aye on all.
6 MR. DECKER: Councilman Greenlee.
7 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Aye on all.
8 MR. DECKER: Councilwoman Gym.
9 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Aye all.
10 MR. DECKER: Councilman Henon is voting
11 aye on all bills.
12 Councilman Johnson.
13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Aye on all Bills.
14 MR. DECKER: Councilman Jones.
15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Aye on all Bills.
16 MR. DECKER: Councilman O'Neill.
17 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Aye on all.
18 MR. DECKER: Councilman Oh.
19 COUNCILMAN OH: Aye on all Bills.
20 MR. DECKER: Councilwoman Parker.
21 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Aye on all bills.
22 MR. DECKER: Councilwoman Quinones
23 Sanchez.
24 COUNCILWOMAN QUINONES SANCHEZ: Aye on
25 all bills.

1 MR. DECKER: Councilwoman Reynolds
2 Brown.

3 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Aye on
4 all bills.

5 MR. DECKER: Councilman Squilla.

6 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Aye on all bills.

7 MR. DECKER: Councilman Taubenberger.

8 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Aye on all
9 bills.

10 MR. DECKER: Council President Clarke.

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye on all
12 bills. A majority of all members having voted for
13 each of the bills, the bills on the consent agenda
14 are passed.

15 We will now consider the resolutions on
16 the regular second reading and final passes
17 calendar. Mr. Decker, 171019.

18 MR. DECKER: A resolution calling upon
19 the Managing Director's Office of Philadelphia to
20 promptly comply with Council Bill 1156 passed on
21 February 25, 1987 by: (i) transferring fee simple
22 title to 451 South University Avenue from the
23 Department of Public Property to PIDC; and (ii)
24 requesting that PIDC transfer fee simple title to
25 451 South University Avenue and the land upon which

1 it is located to The Consortium for nominal
2 consideration as soon as possible.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
4 recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank you, Mr.
6 President. I move for the adoption of the
7 resolution.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
10 moved and properly seconded. All those in favor
11 say aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
14 opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
17 it. Resolution 171019 is adopted.

18 Mr. Decker, 171022.

19 MR. DECKER: A resolution calling on
20 Congress to reject the GOP tax plans, which
21 eliminate or shrink programs that promote housing
22 affordability.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
24 recognizes Councilman Johnson.

25 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Can I say a few

1 remarks, Council President, before I call for the
2 adoption of the Resolution?

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Want to
4 speak on it?

5 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Yes. Yes, sir.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yes.

7 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Briefly. Probably
8 one of the hardest issues I work with, Council
9 President, as relates to the second councilmanic
10 district and that's the issue of affordable
11 housing. As I welcome development throughout my
12 councilmanic district one on the key fights is
13 making sure that long-term residents have the
14 opportunity to stay in their homes in which they
15 grew up in, and by also making sure that I
16 represent a district this reflects people's desire
17 to live there as opposed to their checkbooks and/or
18 their pocketbooks. Currently in Congress right now
19 we're dealing with a GOP tax reform plan that
20 significantly will rollback on the level of support
21 that is provided on a federal level, particularly
22 the four percent low income housing tax credit
23 program that will allow us to develop affordable
24 housing throughout the City of Philadelphia.
25 Similarly we have the elimination of -- proposal of

1 the elimination and cutbacks in the Community
2 Development Block Grant Program, as well as Home
3 Investment Partnership Program. You know, it's
4 totally disheartening for them even considering on
5 rolling back such initiatives that provide
6 resources that allow us to have vibrant
7 neighborhoods throughout not only the City of
8 Philadelphia but also on this particular country.
9 So I just want to ask for a yay from all of my
10 colleagues in support of this particular
11 resolution.

12 I move for the adoption of the
13 Resolution.

14 (Duly seconded.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
16 moved and properly seconded. All those in favor
17 say aye.

18 (Aye.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
20 opposed?

21 (No response.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
23 it. Resolution 171022 is adopted.

24 Mr. Decker, 171034.

25 MR. DECKER: A Resolution also naming

1 Diamond Street between 23rd Street and 25th Street
2 as Dawn Staley Lane.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
4 recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you, Mr.
6 President. On your behalf I move for the adoption
7 of the resolution.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
10 moved and properly seconded. All those in favor
11 say aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
14 opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
17 it. And Resolution 171034 is adopted.

18 Mr. Decker, do you have any additional
19 resolutions?

20 MR. DECKER: A resolution calling on
21 the joint committees on the environment and
22 transportation and public utilities to hold
23 hearings on the status of the City of
24 Philadelphia's Vision Zero Action Plan which is
25 designed to reduce traffic crash, improve

1 performance of the street system and promote active
2 transportation, including bicycling within the City
3 introduced by Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
5 recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown.

6 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Thank
7 you, Mr. President. I move for the adoption.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
10 moved and properly seconded. All those in favor
11 say aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
14 opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
17 it. That Resolution is adopted.

18 MR. DECKER: And a resolution honoring,
19 recognizing, and congratulating Hazim Hardeman for
20 being named a 2018 Rhodes Scholar introduced by
21 Councilman Greenlee on behalf of Council President
22 Clarke.

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
24 recognizes Councilman Greenlee.

25 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank you, Mr.

1 President, I move the adoption of the resolution.

2 (Duly seconded.)

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
4 moved and properly seconded. All those in favor
5 say aye.

6 (Aye.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
8 opposed?

9 (No response.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
11 it. And that Resolution is adopted.

12 MR. DECKER: And a resolution
13 recognizing and honoring Ray Didinger for being
14 inducted into the Broadcast Pioneer's Hall of Fame
15 introduced by Councilman Jones.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
17 Chair recognizes Councilman Jones.

18 COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you. And I
19 was amazed that some of my Millennial colleagues,
20 or close to it, didn't know who Ray Didinger was.
21 Amazing.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: I'm just
23 old.

24 COUNCILMAN JONES: I and my generation
25 move for the adoption.

1 (Duly seconded.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
3 moved and properly seconded. All those in favor
4 say aye.

5 (Aye.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
7 opposed?

8 (No response.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
10 it. And that Resolution is adopted.

11 MR. DECKER: And a Resolution honoring
12 the life of Sheila J. Taylor Hawkins for her
13 dedication to the School District of Philadelphia
14 and offering our deepest and sincerest condolences
15 to her family, friends, students and all those
16 grieving her untimely death introduced by
17 Councilman Jones.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair again
19 recognizes Councilman Jones.

20 COUNCILMAN JONES: On behalf of my
21 generation, again I move for the adoption.

22 (Duly seconded.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
24 moved and properly seconded. All those in favor
25 say aye.

1 (Aye.)

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
3 opposed?

4 (No response.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
6 it. And that Resolution is adopted.

7 MR. DECKER: A Resolution declaring
8 December 1st World AIDS Day in Philadelphia
9 introduced by Councilman Green.

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Chair
11 recognizes Councilman Green.

12 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you, Council
13 President. I move for the adoption of the
14 resolution.

15 (Duly seconded.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
17 moved and properly seconded. All those in favor
18 say aye.

19 (Aye.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
21 opposed?

22 (No response.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
24 it. And that Resolution is adopted.

25 MR. DECKER: And a Resolution

1 recognizing Julia Reynolds Masterman School for
2 their mock election project that encouraged young
3 people to find and use their civic voices in making
4 a positive difference in their communities.

5 Introduced by Councilman Taubenberger.

6 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: I move for
7 the adoption of the Resolution.

8 (Duly seconded.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's been
10 moved and properly seconded. All those in favor
11 say aye.

12 (Aye.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
14 opposed?

15 (No response.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
17 it. And that Resolution is adopted.

18 MR. DECKER: There are no other
19 Resolutions on the final passage calendar, Mr.
20 President.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you
22 very much that concludes our calendar for today and
23 I would like to ask for any speeches on behalf of
24 the minority?

25 (No response.)

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And speeches
2 on behalf of the majority? Chair recognizes
3 Councilwoman Parker.

4 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank you, Mr.
5 President. Mr. President, when I started working
6 in City Council in 1990 at the tender age of 17, I
7 had the great honor -- this is right after going
8 through the redistricting process and the District
9 had changed and the 35th Ward and moving up into
10 the lower northeast had become a part of the Ninth
11 Councilmanic District. And I didn't even know that
12 even back then -- you know, when you're 17 you
13 don't really know who you are. You're trying to
14 find yourself. But I had a deep appreciation for
15 this gentleman who was -- is what I often today
16 refer to as a bit of the "A" word. He was as
17 authentic as they come. If you were going to do
18 anything in the 35th Ward in the Lawncrest,
19 Lawndale area, if you wanted to work on the 4th of
20 July parade, if you wanted to do anything there,
21 you wouldn't do it without the support of George
22 Naulty. Last night I was in Lawndale, Lawncrest,
23 Burholme, Oxford Circle and all of those community
24 leaders were at a meeting that we had about the old
25 Fell School building last night. And as I talked

1 to Bill DeVeaux, current leader there, Chris and
2 Phil, I said, you know, at least we had the
3 opportunity to experience authentic leadership that
4 didn't change. If he gave you his word he meant
5 it, but he didn't give it to you easy. If you were
6 going to work in the community, it wasn't about a
7 press release to get some credit for your work. If
8 you were committed, you were going to do it at the
9 table and where the community needed it no matter
10 who knew about what you were doing. And with that
11 being said, I want to say special thanks to the
12 family of late George Naulty on his passing. When
13 we found out about this issue I was not here, Mr.
14 President. If you recall I missed City Council's
15 last session because I was representing yourself
16 along with our council at the conference on middle
17 neighborhoods in Baltimore. And so I did not get
18 the opportunity to send our regards to his family.
19 But I want to say to the people of Lawncrest and
20 Lawndale, you stand on strong shoulders with George
21 Naulty. I was honored to have had the opportunity
22 to work with him and we're going do our best to
23 continue to serve with the same model that he did,
24 authentically.

25 Thank you, Mr. President.

1 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
2 Councilwoman.

3 Chair recognizes, Councilwoman Reynolds
4 Brown.

5 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Yes, Mr.
6 President. We take great pride in our office of
7 embracing young people, both high school students
8 and college students and work with them carefully
9 to help them gain experience so that they can begin
10 to build and grow careers. This morning I want to
11 share with my colleagues that we are experiencing
12 the departure of Helena Rudolph who is a master of
13 environmental studies freshman at the University of
14 Pennsylvania. We want to thank her for her work
15 and we hope we have armed her with becoming the
16 next environmental czar.

17 Thank you, Mr. President.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
19 Councilwoman. Please stand up.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:
22 Congratulations and thank you for your wonderful,
23 wonderful support.

24 Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

25 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you, Council

1 President. I thought I would share with my
2 colleagues and City Council a little fact about me
3 that you don't know, and that is on Saturday
4 morning I bike from my home at 18th and Locust to
5 the Navy Yard and on Sunday morning I bike from my
6 home to Broad and Allegheny and have breakfast at
7 Breakfast Heaven, which I think is in Councilwoman
8 Bass's District. And on Tuesday I read about this
9 biker at 11th and Spruce who was killed by this
10 truck, trash truck. And I spoke to Deputy
11 Commissioner Montanez this morning and I know I
12 joined with Councilman Squilla, this is his
13 district and he's a hundred percent behind this, we
14 need to make sure these bike lanes that we put in
15 are painted and maintained. I know there's a lot
16 of issues, but at a minimum I want to make sure we
17 stress that they all should be maintained and
18 painted. If we put these in in '09 and they
19 haven't been painted for a while, that's really on
20 us to make sure we maintain it. And I will say
21 this, I'm a biker and I'm a motorist and when you
22 make a turn with a bike lane, it's treacherous
23 because you don't know if a biker is coming up, and
24 when you're a biker you don't know where the car is
25 turning. It's something we need to solve because I

1 think it's a major problem. So I just want to
2 bring that to everyone's attention. But more
3 importantly, I want to make sure we have all these
4 bike lanes painted out so that you can at least see
5 the lines. Thank you.

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
7 Councilman. Chair recognizes Councilman Green.

8 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you, Council
9 President. I just want to remind my colleagues --
10 I think all of you have a flier on your desk
11 regarding tomorrow's Polar Plunge. We are working
12 with the Special Olympics of Pennsylvania. As
13 chair of the Council Committee on Disabilities, I
14 am pleased to be plunging once again tomorrow,
15 along with my colleagues Councilman Squilla, Oh,
16 Taubenberger, Jones and Henon. Any other Council
17 members that would like to join us tomorrow
18 afternoon at 12:00 at Drexel University, you can
19 join us in the Polar Plunge.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you,
21 Councilman.

22 That concludes our speeches on behalf
23 of the majority and minority and with that the
24 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds Brown for a
25 motion to adjourn.

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1 COUNCILWOMAN REYNOLDS BROWN: Thank
2 you, Mr. President. I move that City Council stand
3 adjourned until Thursday, December 7, 2017 at 10:00
4 a.m.

5 (Duly seconded.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Thank you.
7 It has been moved and properly seconded that the
8 Council stand adjourned until Thursday, December 7,
9 2017, 10:00 a.m. All those in favor say aye.

10 (Aye.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Those
12 opposed?

13 (No response.)

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ayes have
15 it. Thank you very much.
