3 We're going to start the Council session.

4 Thank you very much. If the members will

5 take their seat and the visitors can

6 please retire behind the rail, we will

7 get started.

23                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24          Thank you very much. The next order of

2                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
3 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
4 majority, there are no requests of leave  
5 of absence today.

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
7 Chair thanks the gentleman.

8                   The Chair now recognizes  
9 Councilman O'Neill.

10                  COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
11 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
12 republicans, there are no requests for  
13 leave of absence.

14                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
15 Chair thanks the gentleman.

16                  At this time, I would like to  
17 dispense with the regular order of  
18 business and I would like to welcome and  
19 thank everyone who has come down to  
20 witness their government in action. I  
21 anticipate that there will really be a  
22 level of witness of your government in  
23 action that maybe you haven't seen  
24 before, but we really appreciate you  
25 coming down today.

2                   At this time, the Chair  
3           recognizes Councilwoman Blackwell, who  
4           will present a resolution recognizing  
5           Joseph Starinieri. Would Mr. Starinieri  
6           and those accompanying him please join  
7           the Councilwoman at the podium.

8                   (Councilmembers and guests  
9           approached podium.)

10                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
11           joining Councilwoman Blackwell, we have  
12           Councilman Henon, Councilman  
13           Taubenberger, Councilwoman Parker, and  
14           Councilwoman Reynolds Brown and  
15           Councilman Greenlee.

16                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank  
17           you, Mr. President. This is a special  
18           privilege for me because the individual  
19           we are honoring was principal of Sayre  
20           School, and Ms. Winder, who was with him  
21           and who was head of Home and School and  
22           still is, I've known so long. Her  
23           husband was on the waterfront with Lucien  
24           Blackwell when Lucien Blackwell was  
25           President of Local 1332 International

2           Longshoremen's Association before it  
3           became Local 1291. So as you see, we go  
4           way back. We're friends in the struggle  
5           a long time, and the fight for the  
6           community has been one that we have  
7           enjoyed all these years up to and  
8           including today.

9                        So it gives me a real, real,  
10           real great pleasure to present this  
11           resolution to a gentleman who was there,  
12           who cares for children the way we need  
13           principals to today. Not to criticize  
14           anybody but to certainly let you know the  
15           kind of principal he's been, the kind of  
16           leader he is, and the kind of leader we  
17           hope will remain with us forever.

18                       City Council resolution  
19           recognizing and honoring Joseph M.  
20           Starinieri for his service as an educator  
21           and for his passion and dedication  
22           providing a quality education to  
23           underprivileged children.

24                       Whereas, Mr. Starinieri came  
25           from a family of educators. He attended

2           both public and Catholic schools in  
3           Philadelphia, and graduated from St. John  
4           Neumann High School. He went on to  
5           graduate from West Chester University,  
6           receiving his Bachelor's Degree in both  
7           Special Education and Elementary  
8           Education; and

9                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
10          in 1980, Mr. Starinieri began teaching at  
11          John Bartram High School. Within a few  
12          years, he became the Building  
13          Representative for the School as well as  
14          the Chairperson for Special Education;  
15          and

16                   Whereas, Mr. Starinieri pursued  
17          his graduate studies at Temple University  
18          where he received his Cooperative  
19          Education, Educational Administration and  
20          Supervisory Certificates. He also  
21          received his Superintendent's Letter from  
22          St. Joseph's University; and

23                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
24          in 1991, Mr. Starinieri was appointed as  
25          the Assistant Principal to

2           Stoddart-Fleisher Middle School. Then in  
3           1996, he was appointed as Principal at  
4           William L. Sayre Middle School. At  
5           Sayre, he was instrumental in developing  
6           a partnership with the University of  
7           Pennsylvania that led to one of the first  
8           community schools in Philadelphia; and

9                       Whereas, together with Penn,  
10          Mr. Starinieri developed a health center  
11          that services students, parents and  
12          community members. The center has also  
13          trained students for careers in the  
14          health industry; and

15                     COUNCILMAN HENON: Whereas,  
16          Mr. Starinieri also led the successful  
17          transition of converting Sayre School  
18          from a middle school to a comprehensive  
19          high school. During his tenure at Sayre,  
20          Mr. Starinieri was instrumental in having  
21          the school achieve adequate yearly  
22          progress through the many professional  
23          development sessions for teachers and  
24          after school tutoring programs for  
25          students;

2                       Whereas, Mr. Starinieri became  
3           the Principal of Dimner Beeber Middle  
4           School, where he developed a partnership  
5           with St. Joseph's University that  
6           included mentoring programs and a  
7           Saturday program;

8                       COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Whereas,  
9           in 2015, Mr. Starinieri worked as a  
10          School Administrator for Chester County.  
11          He contributed to the development of  
12          programs for students receiving special  
13          education; and

14                      Whereas, Mr. Starinieri has  
15          been recognized for his contributions in  
16          the education community on numerous  
17          occasions. Every year the Sayre/Johnson  
18          Health Clinic gives out the Starinieri  
19          Award to an individual in West  
20          Philadelphia who serves and gives back  
21          their time and efforts to the community.  
22          In 2014, Mr. Starinieri was awarded the  
23          Columbus Forum's Dr. Rocco Gigante, Jr.  
24          Award for Outstanding Service as School  
25          Principal; and

2                   COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

3       Whereas, Mr. Starinieri is currently an  
4       Adjunct Professor at West Chester  
5       University. He supervises special  
6       education student teachers in  
7       Philadelphia, Bucks County, Chester  
8       County, Delaware County and Montgomery  
9       County. In addition, Mr. Starinieri  
10      teaches graduate level courses at the  
11      university;

12                   COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Now,  
13      therefore, be it resolved, that the  
14      Council of the City of Philadelphia does  
15      hereby recognize and honor Joseph  
16      Starinieri for his service as an educator  
17      and for his passion and dedication for  
18      providing a quality education to  
19      underprivileged children.

20                   Further resolved, that an  
21      engrossed copy of this resolution be  
22      presented to Mr. Starinieri as a sincere  
23      expression of the Council of the City of  
24      Philadelphia's gratitude, admiration and  
25      recognition.

3           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
4 Chair recognizes Ms. Watkins for remarks.

5           MS. WATKINS: It's an honor and  
6 a pleasure to be here today to stand  
7 beside Mr. Joseph Starinieri, a principal  
8 that work hard. I always tell him that  
9 his wife and his daughter really is the  
10 one that should get all the awards  
11 because of the time that he spent in the  
12 school teaching community workshops,  
13 doing all this time to be away from his  
14 family.

15                   So we are so grateful for  
16 Council to give this citation to  
17 Mr. Starinieri, but we want the Council,  
18 Mr. Star and everyone to know that all of  
19 it goes to his wife and daughter.

20                   (Applause.)

21           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
22 Chair now recognizes Mr. Starinieri.

23           MR. STARINIERI: Good morning,  
24 everyone.

25                   (Good morning.)

5 Clarke, my family, my friends, my  
6 students, former students, Green. We

8 sincerity, and I appreciate everything  
9 that I had within my years at the School  
10 District of Philadelphia.

11 Thanks again.

12 (Applause.)

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Council will be at ease.

15 MS. WATKINS: You know, you  
16 have to give your flowers to people while  
17 they're living, and one thing I'd like to  
18 state to Curtis Jones. Council Curtis  
19 Jones, I know you don't recognize me, but  
20 I recognize you. We worked together at  
21 Beeber. Okay? You brought me to your  
22 office so many, many times and you were  
23 there with me and Mr. Starinieri, and you  
24 helped us so many times. I just wanted  
25 to thank you again.

6           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7   Thank you very much, and congratulations.

8                   At this time, the Chair

9   recognizes Councilman Green, who will

10   present a resolution declaring December

11   1st World AIDS Day. Would Robb Reichard

12   and those accompanying him please join

13   the Councilman at the podium.

14                   (Councilmembers and guests

15   approached podium.)

16           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17   Joining Councilman Green, we have

18   Councilwoman Bass, Councilwoman Blondell

19   Reynolds Brown.

20           COUNCILMAN GREEN: Good

21   morning. Unfortunately we were not able

22   to present this resolution last week, but

23   this is a resolution declaring --

24           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25   Councilman, hold on one second.

2                   Folks, could we please hold the  
3 conversation down. If you want to talk,  
4 go in the hallway.

5                   Thank you.

6                   COUNCILMAN GREEN:

7 Unfortunately we were not able to present  
8 this resolution last week, but this is a  
9 resolution declaring December 1st as  
10 World AIDS Day in Philadelphia. It's a  
11 very important issue that has not ceased  
12 to be a problem not only in our city or  
13 our Commonwealth or in our nation, and  
14 it's important that we continue to focus  
15 on the issue of AIDS and its impact not  
16 only in the nation, not only in the  
17 Commonwealth but also in our city.

18                   Whereas, the concept of  
19 observing World AIDS Day was the  
20 brainchild of Jonathan Mann, Director of  
21 the Global Programme on AIDS at the World  
22 Health Organization and, in 1988, at the  
23 World Summit of Ministers of Health,  
24 programs for AIDS prevention and the  
25 concept of a World AIDS Day was supported

2           by all participating nations and, in  
3           October, the United Nations General  
4           Assembly formally recognized this concept  
5           and the World Health Organization  
6           declared December 1st, 1988 as the first  
7           World AIDS Day; and

8                         Whereas, in 1996, an  
9           organization known as the Joint United  
10          Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS was formed  
11          to plan and promote the awareness of  
12          World AIDS Day and in 1997, UNAIDS  
13          strived to create an awareness regarding  
14          the causes of AIDS by propagating  
15          year-round communications through a  
16          campaign known as the World AIDS  
17          Campaign; and

18                        COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Whereas, in  
19          addition to raising awareness, World AIDS  
20          Day is also about raising money, fighting  
21          prejudice, and improving education,  
22          because it is important to remind people  
23          that HIV has not gone away, and that  
24          there are many things that still need to  
25          be done; and

2                       Whereas, there are an estimated  
3           38.6 million people in the world living  
4           with HIV, including 10 million people  
5           between the ages of 15 and 24, and last  
6           year, some 4.1 million people became  
7           newly infected with the virus; and

8                       Whereas, according to the  
9           Philadelphia Department of Health, there  
10          are about 30,000 people living with HIV  
11          in the Greater Philadelphia Region and  
12          Philadelphia has HIV infection rates 5  
13          times higher than the national average  
14          and double that of New York City; and

15                      COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
16          to promote local awareness, AIDS Fund  
17          will again participate in a number of  
18          World AIDS Day events throughout the  
19          Philadelphia Region, displaying the AIDS  
20          Memorial Quilt, and providing  
21          opportunities for people to unite in the  
22          fight against HIV, show their support for  
23          people living with HIV, and commemorate  
24          those we have lost; now, therefore, be it

25                      Resolved, that this Council of

2 the City of Philadelphia does declare and  
3 recognize December 1st as World AIDS Day.

4 Further resolved, that an  
5 engrossed copy of this resolution will be  
6 presented to representatives of the AIDS  
7 Fund as a sincere expression of City  
8 Council's gratitude and appreciation for  
9 your good work and your ongoing efforts  
10 to raise the public's awareness regarding  
11 HIV/AIDS and address this ongoing health  
12 crisis.

13 Introduced by Councilmembers  
14 Derek Green and Helen Gym and supported  
15 by all the members of the Philadelphia  
16 City Council. We thank you for your  
17 important work.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
20 Chair recognizes Mr. Reichard for  
21 remarks.

22 MR. REICHARD: I'd like to  
23 thank Councilman Clarke, Councilman Green  
24 for putting this resolution forward.

25 We've come a long way in the

2           fight against HIV in the last 36 years.  
3           Where once we were watching our friends,  
4           family, and neighbors die with no real  
5           treatments to help them, today we have a  
6           vast array of treatments. Today we're  
7           able to talk about getting to zero, zero  
8           stigma, zero new infections, and zero  
9           deaths, and we have all the tools we need  
10          to do that.

11                        We must continue to fight  
12          stigma on a day-to-day basis. We must  
13          continue to talk about HIV and keep it in  
14          front of people, continue to raise  
15          awareness. But we also now know that the  
16          same medicines that keep people alive  
17          with HIV will help slow the spread of  
18          HIV. Today people at high risk can take  
19          one pill a day and almost eliminate their  
20          chance of contracting the virus, but we  
21          must make sure that that is available to  
22          them and that they know about it.

23                        Today we also know that those  
24          in care and in treatment with HIV will  
25          not pass the virus on to anyone else. It

2           is absolutely critical that we remove  
3           every barrier that exists for people  
4           getting into and maintaining their care.  
5           We have all the tools we need to get to  
6           zero. We just have to continue and have  
7           the will to do it.

8                        So thank you for helping us to  
9           raise awareness about this critical  
10          issue. Thank you very much.

11                       (Applause.)

12                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
13          Council will be at ease.

14                       (Council at ease.)

15                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16          Thank you very much. The next order of

7           170997, 170999, 171006, and 171015.

8                     And I am pleased to advise you  
9           that on December 12, 2017 I signed all of  
10          the bills which were passed by Council at  
11          its session on November 30, 2017.

12                    And I am submitting herewith  
13          for the consideration of your honorable  
14          body an ordinance amending Chapter 9-4300  
15          of The Philadelphia Code, entitled "Wage  
16          Theft Complaints," to make various  
17          wage-related violations a violation of  
18          the Code; to further provide for  
19          determinations by the City regarding wage  
20          theft complaints and for appeals of such  
21          determinations; and

22                    An ordinance constituting the  
23          Twentieth Supplemental Ordinance to the  
24          Restated General Water and Wastewater  
25          Revenue Bond Ordinance of 1989, as

2           supplemented; authorizing the Bond  
3           Committee to issue and sell one or more  
4           series or subseries of tax-exempt or  
5           taxable water and wastewater revenue  
6           bonds and revenue refunding bonds; and

8           Twenty-First Supplemental Ordinance to  
9           the Restated General Water and Wastewater  
10          Revenue Bond Ordinance of 1989, as  
11          amended and supplemented (the "General  
12          Ordinance"), providing for certain  
13          amendments to the General Ordinance, all  
14          under certain terms and conditions.

15                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16          Thank you, Mr. Decker. Do you have any  
17          additional communications?

18                        CHIEF CLERK: I have none,  
19          Mr. President.

20                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
21          Thank you very much.

22                        And our next order of business

4 bill and three resolutions, and I'll  
5 speak very briefly on the one resolution  
6 sponsored by the women of Philadelphia  
7 City Council.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
9 Thank you, Councilwoman.

10 CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance  
11 providing for the submission to the  
12 qualified electors of the City of  
13 Philadelphia of a proposal set forth in a  
14 Resolution approved by Council proposing  
15 an amendment to the Philadelphia Home  
16 Rule Charter relating to the provision of  
17 mandatory training for City officers and  
18 employees regarding sexual harassment in  
19 the workplace.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
21 Referred to committee.

22 CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged  
23 resolution recognizing 314 Action for Its  
24 Tireless Efforts Advocating for Science,  
25 Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics

4                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
5 Today's Calendar.

6                   CHIEF CLERK: And a privileged  
7 resolution authorizing the City Council  
8 Committee of the Whole to hold hearings  
9 examining economic inclusion and  
10 diversity participation in professional  
11 services, capital projects, construction  
12 projects, business contracting, and other  
13 contracted work related to the Fashion  
14 District Philadelphia projects and all  
15 other projects that are beneficiaries of  
16 TIF financing.

17                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
18 that will be on today's Calendar.

19                   CHIEF CLERK: And a  
20 non-privileged resolution proposing an  
21 amendment to the Philadelphia Home Rule  
22 Charter relating to the provision of  
23 mandatory annual training for all City  
24 officers and employees regarding sexual  
25 harassment in the workplace.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

3 that will be referred to committee.

4 And the Chair recognizes

5 Councilwoman Blackwell -- oh,

6 Councilwoman, you wanted to speak. I'm

7 sorry.

8 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Yes,

9 Mr. President. Very briefly on the last

10 resolution.

11 While we, the members of the

12 Philadelphia City Council and the Women's

13 Caucus, are proud to put forth a

14 resolution calling for mandatory sexual

15 harassment training for all employees of

16 the City of Philadelphia, what we know

17 now is that sexual assault, sexual

18 harassment knows no racial, no gender,

19 nor class boundaries, period. We want to

20 make it clear that this is only a first

21 step towards creating an environment

22 across Philadelphia in which this

23 pervasive issue can be eliminated from

19 CHIEF CLERK: Chheng Muoy,

20 commenting on 170963.

21 (Applause.)

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And

24 I would ask the audience to respect the

25 individuals testifying. You may or may

6                        Good morning.

7                        MS. CHHENG: Thank you. Thank  
8           you, everybody.

9                        (Through interpreter): My name  
10          is Muoy Chheng. I live in South  
11          Philadelphia, 17th Street. My son's name  
12          Lucky Lee. I have a convenience store at  
13          South Philly. At the time my convenience  
14          store doesn't have a bulletproof glass.  
15          When my son came back from college, he  
16          was shot inside the store. After that my  
17          store was set up by the bulletproof  
18          glass. At the time, my son already dead.  
19          My son was shot by two guys came to rob  
20          in my convenience store, and after that,  
21          I set up a bulletproof glass.

22                        So please don't take the  
23          bulletproof glass from us. If you took  
24          the bulletproof glass from our store,  
25          there will be more people die.

2 Thank you.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Thank you for your testimony.

5 (Applause.)

6 CHIEF CLERK: Yolanda

7 Ballenger, commenting on 170963.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 MS. BALLENGER: Good afternoon.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

12 morning.

13 MS. BALLENGER: First of all, I

14 would like to say thank you for letting

15 me speak. I was involved with the --

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just

17 state your name for the record.

18 MS. BALLENGER: My name is

19 Yolanda Ballenger.

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you.

22 MS. BALLENGER: I was involved

23 with two tragedies. 1994 before the

24 bulletproof glass was put up, I was

25 involved with a robbery that went wrong

2           and the owner got killed. 2007 my dad  
3           that served his country for the Marines  
4           retired, worked the waterfront, and he  
5           got a job working for Textile and Science  
6           College as a foreman for the renovation  
7           of they college. He was on his way to  
8           work and he stopped at a Chinese store to  
9           get food to take for his night job. A  
10          robbery went wrong and my father lost his  
11          life. It just so happened the owner  
12          didn't because he had the bulletproof  
13          glass up.

14                    So I just beg you, please do  
15          not pass that bill.

16                    Thank you.

17                    (Applause.)

18                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19          Thank you for your testimony.

20                    CHIEF CLERK: Joe Brown.

21                    (No response.)

22                    CHIEF CLERK: Joe Brown.

23                    (No response.)

24                    CHIEF CLERK: Michelle Tran.

25                    (No response.)

2 CHIEF CLERK: Michelle Tran.

3 (No response.)

4 CHIEF CLERK: Reverend Robert

5 Shine, commenting on 170963.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 (Applause.)

8 REVEREND SHINE: Good morning,

9 Mr. President --

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

11 morning.

12 REVEREND SHINE: -- members of

13 City Council. I stand here to make a

14 privileged request, and that privileged

15 request is that you consider or

16 reconsider Section (g) of this bill. The

17 reason being that it would certainly

18 expose the proprietors to greater hazards

19 of danger to their lives, as the two

20 former speakers have testified. And this

21 is not a health issue than the reason

22 that I stand here is that to give good

23 consideration to review that once again

24 and remove it for the safety of those

25 proprietors in that establishment. I

2 think it would be just, fair, and right  
3 that you do so.

4 I think that we are not a city  
5 to expose any of our citizenry to hazards  
6 of life and to endangerment of their  
7 property. I think in the wisdom that is  
8 exhibited continuously in this City  
9 Council, that they would do the right  
10 thing.

11 Further, with your permission,  
12 I would like to add a third reason, and  
13 I'm sure that you may right now be aware,  
14 but I want to make City Council aware  
15 that in addition to that, in August of  
16 2018 the Progressive National Baptist  
17 Convention will be convening here at the  
18 Center City Marriott. One of the things  
19 that we want to introduce them to is the  
20 restaurants in the immediate area. We're  
21 talking about some 3,000 conveners here  
22 in the City. That's significant. And  
23 having the seating in the restaurant,  
24 available seating in the restaurant, we  
25 applaud all of those things that are in

2           this legislation, but in addition, as an  
3           officer of the convention, I would want  
4           to also be certain that their visit to  
5           these establishments will not hazard them  
6           at all given the number of persons that  
7           we are expecting.

8                        So that's a personal thing  
9           because of what we are anticipating in  
10          the year to come, but as far as this  
11          legislation and Section (g), I  
12          respectfully ask that you reconsider for  
13          the removal of that particular section,  
14          Mr. President and members of City  
15          Council, with all due regard and respect  
16          to the Chinese community, as this I  
17          believe will impact on them more than any  
18          other establishment in our city.

19                       Thank you for allowing me this  
20          privilege, and I'm looking forward to  
21          your reconsideration.

22                       (Applause.)

23                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24          Thank you for your testimony.

25                       CHIEF CLERK: Michelle Tran,

4 MS. TRAN: Excuse me. Sorry  
5 about that. I was going to the restroom.

6 My name is Michelle Tran. I'd  
7 like to talk about please, please we -- I  
8 was a victim of a robbery when I was ten  
9 years old, and I don't want that to  
10 happen again. Please, we agree with the  
11 seating and we agree with the bathroom  
12 and the foods. We will be willing to do  
13 everything in our power to have you  
14 enforce existing laws, but please allow  
15 us to keep the protection for ourselves  
16 and for our employees and for the  
17 community.

18 Thank you.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you for your testimony.

22 CHIEF CLERK: Bishop Peter  
23 Hwang.

24 (Applause.)

25 (Witness approached podium.)

2                   BISHOP HWANG: Good afternoon,

3 Mr. President and all the member of

4 Council. My name is Bishop Peter Hwang.

5 I'm the President of the Friends Council

6 of USA and also I'm a member of Religious

7 Leaders Council of Greater Philadelphia.

8 And also I'm a Chairperson for the past

9 President of Korean Council of Churches

10 in Philadelphia.

11                   I just flew from California and

12 I just arrived to testify at the Council.

13 And, first of all, I really appreciate to

14 the white American as well as black

15 African American. You sacrifice to build

16 up a beautiful country as the greatest

17 country in the world. And especially I

18 really appreciate to the black

19 communities, because they sacrifice their

20 human right struggles. Give the old

21 Asian or the Latino communities to build

22 up the strong communities in the nation.

23 And I've been working the Racial

24 Reconciliation Ministry about 30 years in

25 Philadelphia as well as USA. During the

2 1970s and '80s, there are so many victims  
3 among the Asian American and especially  
4 the Korean American merchants, and as a  
5 current member, I also wonder why these  
6 things happen to our beautiful country,  
7 and I found out there are a lot of  
8 misunderstanding between the two  
9 communities.

10 Number one, the language  
11 barrier is so great as well as the  
12 cultural barriers. The black African  
13 American, even though there are a lot of  
14 different background, but they are using  
15 the only one language. Latino  
16 communities, they are using the same  
17 language. But if we come to the Asian,  
18 there are so many different Asians who  
19 have totally different languages and  
20 totally different cultural differences.  
21 So among Asian, most of the American,  
22 they identify us as the Asian, but we are  
23 all different.

24 But what I'm trying to say is  
25 if you take down the safety glasses, I

2           really -- the owner try to looking for  
3           the dignity of those human lives, but the  
4           life is more important than the dignity.

5                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6           Thank you.

7                        BISHOP HWANG: So if you take  
8           down the safety glasses, most of the life  
9           will be in danger and then everybody will  
10          take carrying a gun and there will  
11          be violence.

12                       I'm so sorry. So most --

13                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: If  
14          you can just conclude.

15                       BISHOP HWANG: Yeah. So really  
16          ask you, humbly ask you, if you want to  
17          make a beautiful brotherly love and  
18          sister affection city in this for the  
19          City --

20                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21          Thank you.

22                       BISHOP HWANG: -- I think that  
23          you are bringing the culture on the  
24          issue.

25                       Thank you so much.

2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

3 Thank you.

4 (Applause.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Kay Thompson.

6 (No response.)

7 CHIEF CLERK: Kay Thompson.

8 (No response.)

9 CHIEF CLERK: William Swasey.

10 (Applause.)

11 (Witness approached podium.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
13 afternoon.

14 MR. SWASEY: Good afternoon,  
15 everyone. My name is William Swasey.

16 I've had the privilege of working around  
17 this country for 20 years and seeing

18 different situations. One such

19 particular situation was in Houston,

20 Texas where the establishment did have

21 bulletproof glass just on the outside,

22 not to protect the clerks or anybody, but

23 there was a shooting that took place.

24 Luckily the bullets that were flying

25 inside the building, they didn't go

2 outside and hit anybody in the head. No  
3 kids got hit. None of that.

4 I've been at two such instances  
5 where there was no glass. Now I've been  
6 in situations where someone did attempt  
7 to rob somebody where there was glass  
8 available and it deterred them. They  
9 went in, they tried. It was  
10 unsuccessful.

11 We have security measures  
12 everywhere we go, the airport, a bar,  
13 coming into this building. Everyone  
14 likes to work safe. I'm a welder by  
15 trade. I have measures that I take to  
16 make my job safe. So who are we to  
17 refuse these citizens their right to be  
18 safe? It not only protects them but it  
19 also protects the people, the patrons  
20 that are going there shopping at their  
21 establishments.

22 Everyone wants to shop safe.  
23 Everyone wants to work safe.

24 That's about all I got. We  
25 have no right to take away their safety.

2 That's just plain and simple.

3 Thank you.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you. Thank you for your testimony.

6 (Applause.)

7 CHIEF CLERK: Rich Kim,

8 commenting on 170963.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good

11 afternoon.

12 MR. KIM: Good afternoon. My  
13 name is Rich Kim and I own and operate a  
14 deli in North Philadelphia. I believe  
15 that everyone here has the same goal,  
16 which is to beautify our neighborhoods  
17 and better our community.

18 I have no objections to all the  
19 other provisions, including the 30  
20 seating, the bathroom, selling of food,  
21 et cetera. The only issue I have is the  
22 safety glass and safety glass only. The  
23 reason is plain and simple, which is  
24 safety for not only the people that work  
25 inside of it, but the general public as

2 well.

3 I also do realize that there  
4 are bad businesses that needs to be  
5 regulated, which I am all for as well.  
6 But please do not generalize that all  
7 delis are bad businesses. There are many  
8 businesses -- there are many delis that  
9 willingly and happily give back to the  
10 community and care what's going on in  
11 their community as well.

12 At this time I would like to  
13 share my personal experience.  
14 Twenty-some years ago right before my  
15 family took over this business, the son  
16 of a store owner was shot and killed for  
17 no reason, and at that time, there was no  
18 bulletproof glass. So when we bought the  
19 business, it was actually the  
20 neighborhood people that actually  
21 suggested that we put the glass up. So  
22 we did.

23 So a few years later my  
24 mother-in-law was cleaning tables in the  
25 dining area when a man pulled out a knife

2 and threatened to hurt her and rape her.

3 She had a chance to free herself and get

4 behind the safety glass and call the cop,

5 the police. If it wasn't for the glass,

6 God knows what could have happened. And

7 even two years ago, drug dealers came in

8 trying to shoot my workers because we

9 would not let them do work -- do their

10 business inside or outside of the store.

11 I did work with the police to put them

12 behind bars. I contacted -- we contacted

13 police numerous times without any

14 response. So we had been policing it

15 ourselves. And I do understand that the

16 police have more serious business as

17 well, but there's so much we can do and

18 when we try to chase these drug dealers

19 away, there's always tension, and without

20 the safety glass, our lives will be

21 threatened at all times.

22 I would love to bring the

23 safety glass down as well as long as

24 there is guaranteed safety measure in

25 place.

2 So please amend the bill to  
3 keep the safety glass up and keep the  
4 crime rate down and, more importantly,  
5 save lives.

6 Thank you.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you for your testimony.

10 CHIEF CLERK: Lili Liao.

11 (Applause.)

12 (Witness approached podium.)

13 MS. LIAO: My name is Lili  
14 Liao. I'm a Mandarin Chinese victim  
15 advocate with Center City Crime Victim  
16 Services. I have worked nearly eight  
17 years for the victims of violent crime in  
18 Philadelphia. I'm here today to testify  
19 against part of bill that authorize the  
20 Department of L&I to have until January  
21 1st, 2021 to create regulations on the  
22 use or removal of physical barriers for  
23 services and customers in large  
24 establishments.

25 By not allowing small business

2           owners to use protective glass, my fear  
3           is that the crime rate might increase in  
4           the high crime rate neighborhoods and  
5           that employees and the families of small  
6           businesses and their customers might be  
7           affected more by crimes as a result.

8                     I understand that the proposal  
9           bill only affects businesses under the  
10          largest establishment category. However,  
11          as far as the safety issue is concerned,  
12          I don't see a reason to treat businesses  
13          differently whether they are large or  
14          small establishment.

15                    In my years as a victim  
16          advocate, I have worked directly with  
17          individuals and families who own and  
18          operate small businesses.

19                    On January 20, 2012, the owner  
20          of Jin House Take-Out in Tacony was shot  
21          several times in the chest and died  
22          there. His wife was at the scene holding  
23          their infant child, fled the restaurant  
24          and screamed for help. A helpful  
25          neighbor called the police. Jin House

2 Restaurant was owned by a couple. The  
3 owner left behind three young children, a  
4 five-year-old boy, a three-year-old girl,  
5 and a newborn.

6 Jin House was without a  
7 physical barrier installed between the  
8 customers and the food services. If Jin  
9 House had installed the protective  
10 barrier, the homicide could have been  
11 avoided, in my belief.

12 No arrest has been made for Jin  
13 House homicide. No justice. No justice.  
14 No justice has been served for the Jin  
15 House family.

16 Two months ago on October 2nd,  
17 Judge Barbara McDermott of Philadelphia  
18 Municipal Court sentenced two criminals,  
19 one for city fight for 17 years and the  
20 other for 30 to 60 years. They tried to  
21 get over a dozen small business families  
22 in a violent home invasion robbery spree  
23 during 2016.

24 Two weeks ago, on December 1st,  
25 Judge Petrese Tucker of the United States

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2 East District Court of Pennsylvania gave  
3 a 37-year sentence to a criminal who had  
4 also targeted small business owners in a  
5 series of violent home invasion robberies  
6 in 2015.

7 Local and federal judge both  
8 have delivered a message to the public  
9 through severe sentences to ensure the  
10 safety of small businesses in the City.  
11 Why would City Council want to pass a  
12 bill --

13 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14 Ma'am.

15 MS. LIAO: -- (unintelligible)  
16 for their safety.

17 Thank you.

18 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19 Thank you.

20 (Applause.)

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just  
22 to remind everyone, you have three  
23 minutes to testify. Thank you.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Asteria Vives,  
25 commenting on 170963.

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2 (Applause.)

3 (Witness approached podium.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
5 afternoon.

6 MS. VIVES: It's afternoon  
7 already? Buenos dias. My name is  
8 Asteria Vives. Some of you know me; some  
9 of you don't. Community activist. I do  
10 a lot in our community. I'm not about  
11 the media, so I don't show off, but I do  
12 do a lot. That includes prayer and peace  
13 walks along visiting local stores,  
14 community members, because I'm also, for  
15 no less than 12 years, with the 25th  
16 Police District Advisory Council. Home  
17 Court is in Friends is the name of the  
18 organization.

19 I'm going to say what I have to  
20 say, not because someone asked me to, but  
21 because I live in the community. I am  
22 about the community. We are the  
23 community. I'm not going to place it in  
24 any type of order. All of it is  
25 important.

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2 Why take control of a store and  
3 not the items and substance we sell? If  
4 small businesses are selling products  
5 that encourage drugs or alcohol, then the  
6 City has failed. It is their  
7 responsibility to match those services  
8 with the licenses and the applications  
9 that took place.

10 The City doesn't follow up with  
11 the products sold. You say you are  
12 fighting for our constituents. Who?  
13 Because I haven't seen you around. You  
14 haven't asked me. You haven't asked my  
15 neighbors. You haven't asked.

16 When I hear the word "my," "my  
17 district," but yet you're making the  
18 decisions for all districts, that's  
19 pretty selfish. You should be ashamed of  
20 yourself.

21 (Applause.)

22 MS. VIVES: Unruly customers  
23 that come in, they're unruly before they  
24 come in because they are part of the  
25 streets. They're using drugs. They have

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2 no control of themselves. So let's help  
3 reduce the violence, like I have been  
4 doing for no less than 20 years.

5 Bulletproof versus guns, that's  
6 what I see now. Customer feelings versus  
7 violence, that's what I see. Know the  
8 high crime area and create a new zone  
9 code to allow bulletproof. Please at  
10 least do that. Control your licenses  
11 departments, not the lives of others.

12 Insurance rates reduce because  
13 of security. Now it will go up, and now  
14 many stores already talking about  
15 closing. Should they bring swords to the  
16 guns now? Should they allow now one  
17 customer at a time to reduce the  
18 violence?

19 We have no time for hate. We  
20 have no time for violence. We have no  
21 time for more deaths, because I have seen  
22 them.

23 (Applause.)

24 MS. VIVES: I know. I know  
25 that I will lose sleep. I know that I

2           will become a wanna-be police officer,  
3           because I know that the crime rate will  
4           increase.

5                        Thank you.

6                        (Applause.)

7                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Thank you for your testimony.

9                        CHIEF CLERK: Peter Lai,  
10          commenting on 170963.

11                       (Applause.)

12                       (Witness approached podium.)

13                       MR. LAI: Good afternoon.

14                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
15          afternoon.

16                       MR. LAI: I'm Peter Lai. I  
17          have my beer store, deli store at 1630  
18          West Lehigh. Ten years ago I were a  
19          robbery and shoot me six time in my store  
20          without bulletproof glass. I just have  
21          the last bullet moved out from my body  
22          last year. I was lucky to survivor last  
23          time.

24                       This time if you make me to  
25          take down the bulletproof glass, I will

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2 not be lucky next time. Please keep my  
3 bulletproof glass. I don't want to be  
4 dead.

5 (Applause.)

6 MR. LAI: I have a two -- I  
7 have my one and my two kid. Please help.

8 Thank you.

9 (Applause.)

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Was  
12 your name called? Your name has to be  
13 called.

14 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Adam Xu, you  
15 got him on the list?

16 No.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 You --

19 MR. XU: Please, I saw my name  
20 on the list.

21 (Applause.)

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Ten.

23 Ten/ten. We're at ten. We got your  
24 point. I mean, if you do 11, then they  
25 have 11. Then it will end up being

2           20/20. We get the point. Councilmembers  
3           are well aware of the various positions.  
4           But thank you. Thank you anyway.

5                   CHIEF CLERK: Chris Raab.

6                   (No response.)

7                   CHIEF CLERK: Chris Raab,  
8           commenting on 170963.

9                   (Witness approached podium.)

10                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
11           afternoon, Representative.

12                   REPRESENTATIVE RAAB: Good  
13           afternoon. Thank you. My name is Chris  
14           Raab. I'm the State Representative for  
15           the 200th Legislative District in  
16           Northwest Philadelphia representing Mount  
17           Airy, Chestnut Hill, and part of West Oak  
18           Lane.

19                   I'm glad to be here on this  
20           important issue. This is an important  
21           bill. It is also a very important issue,  
22           how we as Philadelphians deal with  
23           nuisance stop-and-go businesses that sell  
24           alcohol. This is both a crime and a  
25           quality of life issue.

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2 This summer I was pleased to  
3 co-sponsor a bill that is now state law.  
4 This new law states that if the  
5 Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board finds  
6 that a licensed establishment does not  
7 meet the seat, square footage, food or  
8 health requirements under the state  
9 liquor code, that the LCB can suspend the  
10 business liquor license immediately.

11 (Applause.)

12 REPRESENTATIVE RAAB: Why is  
13 this important? Well, frankly, these  
14 businesses make good money selling  
15 alcohol, and without a license to do so,  
16 one of their most profitable product  
17 lines is cut off until that suspension is  
18 lifted.

19 This is a real victory for  
20 consumer rights in the neighborhoods  
21 plagued with these types of nuisance  
22 businesses. The new law gives local  
23 governments, including the City of  
24 Philadelphia, the power to make  
25 recommendations to the LCB to investigate

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2 establishments that are believed to be  
3 failing to meet code requirements. If  
4 you're living up to the code, if you're  
5 compliant, this is a non-issue.

6 Now, Council is rightly focused  
7 on what can be done at the state level  
8 under this new law. My guiding principle  
9 is very simple. We need to invest in,  
10 protect, and help grow the proportion of  
11 businesses in our neighborhoods that are  
12 truly community centered.

13 (Applause.)

14 REPRESENTATIVE RAAB: And  
15 deeply socially responsible. We need to  
16 cultivate strong relationships between  
17 business owners and residents that are  
18 based on mutual respect and  
19 understanding, and the needs of  
20 transactional businesses operating for  
21 profit maximization must not take  
22 precedence over those businesses that are  
23 truly committed to help sustain local  
24 communities.

25 (Applause.)

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2 REPRESENTATIVE RAAB: I believe  
3 that Councilwoman Bass's bill is a  
4 substantive piece of legislation  
5 conceived in good faith.

6 I see that I'm out of time, but  
7 this is an imperfect process. This is  
8 what participatory democracy smells like.  
9 It's not always pretty, but look around  
10 the room and we see so many people from  
11 different stakeholding communities who  
12 care enough to show up, to raise their  
13 voices, to be a part of the solution.  
14 That's how we get anything done, and I'm  
15 glad I could lend my voice to it.

16 Thank you.

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you, Representative.

19 (Applause.)

20 CHIEF CLERK: Asa Khalif,  
21 commenting on 170963.

22 (Applause.)

23 (Witness approached podium.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
25 afternoon.

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2 MR. KHALIF: Good afternoon,  
3 Councilpeople. I have three minutes, so  
4 I'm going to be very swift and brief.  
5 First, justice to Brandon Tate-Brown.  
6 Second, justice for David Jones.

7 Asa Khalif, Black Lives Matter  
8 Pennsylvania.

9 Stop-and-go's have always been  
10 a thorn in the sides of black and brown  
11 communities. Nothing -- and I do mean  
12 nothing -- good has ever come out of  
13 their presence in our communities.

14 (Applause.)

15 MR. KHALIF: The sale of loose  
16 cigarettes to our underage children, the  
17 shots of alcohol to our children, the  
18 drugs sold in the store, in their stores  
19 with their permission and approval.  
20 Finally, black and brown people say  
21 enough is enough.

22 This bill is bigger than  
23 Plexiglas. This bill is about  
24 responsibility and accountability, two  
25 words stop-and-go owners never had to

2 live up to.

3 Black and brown people have  
4 every right to decide who operates in  
5 their -- a business in their communities,  
6 in our communities. We have every right  
7 to hold anyone, regardless of race,  
8 accountable when they continue to  
9 disrespect our neighborhoods with their  
10 illegal activities.

11 Again, this is bigger than  
12 Plexiglas. And speaking of Plexiglas,  
13 stop promoting fake news. The bill has a  
14 compromise. Protected glass removal will  
15 be the responsibility of L&I if the store  
16 is up to code and follows the rules. The  
17 Plexiglas may even remain. Again, stop  
18 with your smoke and your mirrors.

19 This bill is long overdue,  
20 black people, and I alone with the  
21 members of Black Lives Matter  
22 Pennsylvania support it 100 percent.

23 Thank you, Councilwoman Bass,  
24 for your courage, but this is nothing  
25 new. Black women have always been on the

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2 front lines for change. So, again, this  
3 is nothing new.

4 (Applause.)

5 MR. KHALIF: Finally, I'll end  
6 this quote from Sister Assata Shakur of  
7 the Black Panther Party, and this is  
8 dedicated to black and brown people who  
9 are listening and here today: It is our  
10 duty to fight for our freedom. It is our  
11 duty to win. We must love and support  
12 each other. We have nothing to lose but  
13 our chains.

14 Black lives matter and black  
15 power.

16 (Applause and boos.)

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18 Thank you for your testimony.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Emmanuel Bussie,  
20 commenting on 170963.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 MR. BUSSIE: Emmanuel Bussie,  
23 Professionals for Progress and I'm a  
24 different kind of democrat.

25 First, I want to start off by

2           saying I want to thank Councilman Curtis  
3           Jones, because this is bigger than a  
4           daggone bill, bigger than a daggone  
5           stop-and-go. Every time I come up here  
6           and every person that testifies here,  
7           what Curtis Jones does every single time,  
8           he spin his chair around and give us his  
9           undivided attention. He not texting. He  
10          not Tweeting. He give us his undivided  
11          attention and make us feel like we're  
12          welcomed up here in the City Council  
13          where we pay our taxes at.

14                        (Applause.)

15               MR. BUSSIE: Secondly, let's  
16               stop playing games. This is not about  
17               glass. This is about cash. Because if  
18               it really was about violence, you would  
19               be -- there's 300 murders in the City of  
20               Philadelphia. I want to see all of you  
21               guys -- see, you know what it is? You  
22               don't want to -- this is not about  
23               stopping violence for the Asian  
24               community. It's stopping the violence in  
25               your establishment. Because violence is

2           hitting our streets every day. It's 300  
3           murders. I never see you out in the  
4           street with me when I go walk the streets  
5           to try to do violence prevention. This  
6           place should be packed every time.

7                           (Applause.)

8                           MR. BUSSIE: I don't see you on  
9           the school bus. I don't see you on the  
10          gentrification bus. I don't see you on  
11          the housing bus. It's only when it  
12          affects your cash that you come down  
13          here.

14                          And I don't have anything  
15          against the Asian community, because when  
16          the discrimination bill was put forth, I  
17          supported the discrimination bill,  
18          because you shouldn't be discriminated  
19          against, but you should damn sure well  
20          should be fighting the same fight that we  
21          fight if you a serious Philadelphian.  
22          This can't be just about violence in your  
23          establishment. This should be about  
24          preventing violence in our city. And  
25          every single stop-and-go that whether you

2           break the laws, if your business model,  
3           if your business model is about selling  
4           products that get vulnerable,  
5           impoverished people high, it's a bad  
6           business model, whether you have glass or  
7           not.

8                           (Applause.)

9           MR. BUSSIE: What I want to do  
10          is see you out there fighting the good  
11          fight.

12                        I applaud Cindy Bass. I told  
13          you guys, this is a different day. This  
14          is a different day. Because I am being  
15          calm right now, because in '18 I'mma cut  
16          up. I'mma cut up. Because we need to  
17          support courageous behind people like  
18          Cindy Bass, like Maria Quinones-Sanchez,  
19          and like Curtis Jones.

20                        (Applause.)

21          MR. BUSSIE: The reason why you  
22          don't get more progressive bills, black  
23          people, is because we don't support the  
24          black legislators. And I can tell you  
25          this right now. All you legislators that

2 got the courage to stand up here and  
3 fight for us, we are going to -- this is  
4 a new day. We going to have your  
5 god-darn back.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you. Thank you.

9 (Audience member talking.)

10 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Sir,  
11 come on. Everybody gets a chance to have  
12 their say.

13 Thank you for your testimony.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Stephanie  
15 Ridgeway, commenting on 170963.

16 (Witness approached podium.)

17 MS. RIDGEWAY: Good afternoon.

18 My name is Stephanie Ridgeway. I've  
19 listened to what everyone else has said,  
20 and really I just want to make sure  
21 people understand. This bill is not  
22 about the Plexiglas. I live at 22nd and  
23 Ridge and we have a business, and I live  
24 above the business. And nightly I see  
25 what happens as the businesses close and

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2 people go home.

3 I ask the Asian community, how  
4 many of you live and work in the same  
5 area that you work? Because if you did,  
6 you would change your business practice.

7 We've spoken about coming  
8 together, but at any given point or time,  
9 none of the businesses that are on the  
10 22nd and Ridge area ever come out to a  
11 meeting, and we've had several of them.

12 So what I say is, yes, this  
13 bill is important. Cindy Bass has pushed  
14 forth a real issue, and it is about  
15 bringing a boundary of the City and the  
16 state together, because I have seen the  
17 state come and be feet away from the  
18 things that are happening in our  
19 community and they have not taken action.  
20 This is about someone living here and  
21 working here and understanding that this  
22 is a part of our lives.

23 My business is in just as much  
24 jeopardy as the people that have the  
25 Plexiglas, because you are serving

2           alcohol to people that are already  
3           inebriated. I see my taxes being used to  
4           pick up people that you have served on  
5           the street being in need of 911 services.  
6           And I understand that this is about  
7           money, but if it is about money, then you  
8           need to stand up and start to take an  
9           active role in stopping the things that  
10          are happening in our community.

11                        So I thank Cindy Bass for  
12          inviting me out, but I want to say this  
13          is not about the Plexiglas. This is  
14          about business being wrong from the very  
15          beginning. This is about people coming  
16          into our communities and setting up shop  
17          and taking the money home with them and  
18          leaving us there to suffer the  
19          consequences, because nightly I see  
20          urination, defecation, and other actions  
21          taking place where I live, because I live  
22          and work in that community.

23                        Thank you.

24                        (Applause.)

25                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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2 Thank you for your testimony.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Mike Daniels.

4 (No response.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Mike Daniels.

6 (No response.)

7 CHIEF CLERK: Ryan Boyer,

8 commenting on 170963.

9 (Applause.)

10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 MR. BOYER: Good afternoon,

12 Council President Clarke and

13 Councilpeople at-large. My name is Ryan

14 Boyer. I represent the Laborers District

15 Council, Philadelphia and Vicinity,

16 almost 6,000 members, about 77 percent of

17 which are residents of the City of

18 Philadelphia, which means we work, play,

19 and stay here in Philadelphia.

20 It is our opinion at the

21 Laborers District Council that we support

22 this bill by Cindy Bass, and we support

23 this bill because we are residents of the

24 City of Philadelphia, and for us it's

25 about a corporate social responsibility.

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2 Businesses have a social  
3 responsibility not to do things that's  
4 wrong. The best predictor of future  
5 behavior is past behavior, and if we  
6 judge them by the past, they've been bad  
7 actors.

8 Now we're just asking you to  
9 maybe remove a barrier so that we can  
10 build a bridge to the community. Maybe  
11 if we understood the community more, we  
12 wouldn't be in jeopardy.

13 My father operated a business  
14 at 10th and Green -- 11th and Green for  
15 15 years. We never had Plexiglas up. We  
16 was robbed once, but when you're doing  
17 business, sometimes you get it. And,  
18 listen, I have had the opportunity to  
19 partake of the Asian cuisine of the  
20 various countries in Chinatown in those  
21 restaurants. They stay open very late.  
22 I've never seen a Plexiglas wall in those  
23 restaurants in Chinatown.

24 So it's about equity for us.  
25 It's about equity for my guys that live

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2 in every zip code in Philadelphia. We  
3 have a member in at least every zip code  
4 in Philadelphia. Why can't their dining  
5 experience be the same as when they come  
6 to Chinatown? That's all we want, is  
7 fairness, a fundamental fairness. And  
8 I'm sure L&I will work to ensure the  
9 safety of all those establishments, but  
10 we need to play by the rules, and that  
11 has not happened and you have not been  
12 good members of the community. Good  
13 members of the community coach little  
14 league, you give donations to little  
15 league. I have never seen your flag fly  
16 in any of the places that we do business  
17 with little league, because my guys coach  
18 all types of stuff.

19 So we come together and use  
20 this moment as a moment to come together,  
21 I think that you'll find yourself safer  
22 as you engrain yourself in the community  
23 and not disassociate yourself from the  
24 community and take your cash deposits and  
25 go wherever you live.



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2 Thank you.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

5 Thank you for your testimony.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Rochelle Bilal,  
7 commenting on 170963.

8 (Witness approached podium.)

9 MS. BILAL: Good morning.

10 Rochelle Bilal.

11 First of all, I'm speaking on  
12 Bill 170963. This bill and a lot of  
13 these stores, especially the bad ones, is  
14 a scourge in our neighborhoods. The  
15 communities are the poorest is the ones  
16 that they predict (ph) on.

17 This is not about Plexiglas.  
18 This is about disrespect of anyone's  
19 culture -- this is not about disrespect  
20 of anyone's culture, because we all want  
21 to be safe in the City. This is not  
22 about the Plexiglas. This is about human  
23 decency, because these stop-and-go stores  
24 have been a menace in our communities for  
25 a long time.

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2 (Applause.)

3 MS. BILAL: I went to one, and  
4 this is how I found out that they were  
5 serving shots by the glass. I get out of  
6 my car, got some friends coming over.  
7 They drink coolers. I'mma stop at one,  
8 buy some coolers. I go into the store  
9 and I notice people are buying shots. I  
10 notice kids are coming in to get potato  
11 chips and pretzels. As I leave, I see a  
12 guy on the side urinating outside this  
13 establishment because there is no  
14 bathroom that they can use in these  
15 properties.

16 If you want a restaurant,  
17 follow the restaurant rules. If you want  
18 a bar, follow the bar rules.

19 (Applause.)

20 MS. BILAL: Bars are held  
21 accountable for drunk patrons. Bars are  
22 held accountable for drunk patrons.  
23 People that sell shots do not. Most  
24 of -- the one not too far from my house,  
25 people drive up, get shots, get drunk,

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2 drive away. Thank God I'm not in their  
3 way, and I hope you are not in their way  
4 when they leave that stop-and-go.

5 It's really problematic that  
6 certain persons spin this bill into a  
7 safety bill, and I've been a law  
8 enforcement officer for 27 years. It's  
9 not about Plexiglas. It's not about the  
10 safety issue. It's about do the right  
11 thing in the neighborhoods in which you  
12 do your business. That's all we asking.  
13 So whoever spin the fake news to you, you  
14 need to check them, because it's not  
15 about Plexiglas, and we are not here to  
16 kill you.

17 Thank you.

18 (Applause.)

19 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20 Thank you for your testimony.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Supreme Dow.

22 (Witness approached podium.)

23 MR. DOW: Good afternoon.

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
25 afternoon.

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2 MR. DOW: Thank you, Council  
3 President.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
5 You're welcome.

6 MR. DOW: And thank you to all  
7 the Councilmembers for your undivided  
8 attention regarding this matter, and  
9 thank everyone for coming out, both  
10 sides. Obviously this is an issue that's  
11 important to the community.

12 My name is Supreme Dow and I'm  
13 a lifelong resident of Philadelphia,  
14 Northwest Philadelphia, particularly  
15 Germantown, and damn proud of it.

16 Today I provide testimony from  
17 up an close and personal view. I have  
18 the opportunity to run a non-profit that  
19 is situated directly next door to a  
20 stop-and-go that we had to shut down  
21 because of continual and yearly  
22 violations of city codes, state codes,  
23 and rules and regulations.

24 I've heard people come through  
25 the park and say, What time does it open?

2 Because that was their gathering space at  
3 10 o'clock in the morning. Like we did  
4 the bars in the '70s when there was a bar  
5 on every corner in the black community  
6 and they were a nuisance to Philadelphia,  
7 we shut them down, and I'm here to say  
8 today that if you continue to be a  
9 nuisance in our community, we will shut  
10 you down.

11 (Applause.)

12 MR. DOW: I've had to conduct  
13 tours and welcome guests and host  
14 elementary and high school students next  
15 to a stop-and-go that served as a  
16 gathering place for unsavory characters  
17 and activity. Today I testify in support  
18 of Bill 170963. I'm old enough to  
19 remember the first wave of what many  
20 refer to as the stop-and-go businesses.  
21 A little over 30 years ago neighborhoods  
22 experienced a shocking invasion of malt  
23 liquor beer joints that operated under  
24 the guise of restaurants. It quickly  
25 became obvious to residents and community

2           leaders that these businesses didn't  
3           serve their best interest. Plexiglas was  
4           erected, tables were scarce, and public  
5           restrooms were somehow always out of  
6           order.

7                        As the crack epidemic began to  
8           grip African American and poor  
9           communities, these stop-and-go businesses  
10          began to proliferate. In my view, this  
11          is no coincidence. Not that there's been  
12          a conspiracy. There has just been a  
13          crude business strategy by these business  
14          owners to focus on areas of our city that  
15          have been vulnerable to drug activity.  
16          As a matter of fact, by way of even  
17          casual observance, it is clear that what  
18          all these establishments have in common  
19          is the open drug activity in and around  
20          the store.

21                       The discussion of stop-and-go  
22          establishments and the value of this bill  
23          points to some very important issues that  
24          should be considered. Are these  
25          establishments safe and clean? Do they

2           attract the kind of business and people  
3           that are needed to move a community  
4           upward into a thriving public and private  
5           partnership? Do these businesses operate  
6           with community care and consideration?  
7           And are all these businesses accountable?

8                         Basically the number one  
9           question that should be answered when  
10          considering a stop-and-go for any  
11          neighborhood is, does this business add  
12          value to the community, economically,  
13          culturally, and aesthetically? I suggest  
14          to you that this bill does.

15                        History is spelled out. The  
16          business model for stop-and-go stores,  
17          they erect Plexiglas all around the  
18          counters and registers, placing a barrier  
19          between the customer and goods provider.

20                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21          Thank you.

22                        MR. DOW: This barrier is a  
23          prime example of the disconnect --

24                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25          Thank you.

2 MR. DOW: -- between the people  
3 and the store owners.

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
5 Thank you for your testimony.

6 MR. DOW: Thank you very much  
7 for your courage, Councilwoman.

8 (Applause.)

9 CHIEF CLERK: Lillian Hertz.  
10 (Witness approached podium.)

11 MS. HENTZ: Correction to my  
12 name. It's Hentz. Hentz like henceforth  
13 and forevermore, but spelled different.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
15 record shall reflect that correction.

16 MS. HENTZ: I had no --

17 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Just  
18 say your name for the record.

19 MS. HENTZ: Oh, I'm sorry. My  
20 name is Lillian English Hentz.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
22 Thank you.

23 MS. HENTZ: I am the Vice Chair  
24 of the 49th Ward and I'm here today and  
25 I've listened to everyone's testimony

2 here today, and I didn't have a clue that  
3 I was going to come up here and speak to  
4 you all today, but let me speak to you as  
5 a 30-year resident of the Logan area.

6 Let me speak to you as a native  
7 Philadelphian. Let me speak to you as a  
8 law enforcement officer for 32 years.

9 Let me speak to you as someone who cries  
10 sometime at night.

11 I have four sons and a  
12 daughter. I'm lucky. I'm blessed that  
13 they're still alive. I want to say to  
14 you that I grew up in North Philadelphia  
15 where we didn't have a stop-and-go on the  
16 corner of every corner. I grew up. I  
17 was a child. I was able to be a child.  
18 But I work in an area in the 3500 and  
19 3600 blocks of Germantown Avenue where we  
20 had to close down the stop-and-go's.

21 If you listen to the testimony  
22 today, this definitely is not about  
23 protecting our community, because if it  
24 was about protecting our community, we  
25 wouldn't have everybody up here saying

2           don't take down my Plexiglas because it  
3           keeps me safe. Okay? We would have  
4           people up here saying let's make  
5           Plexiglas stores, period, if that's going  
6           to save the whole community.

7                        I say to you, Cindy Bass, I say  
8           to you, Cherelle Parker, I say to you,  
9           Councilman Jones, and I say to you, Ms.  
10          Quinones, and I say to you, Jannie  
11          Blackwell, I say to you as one of the new  
12          guys on the block, Derek Green, and I say  
13          to you, Kenyatta -- you don't know me,  
14          but I know you. Okay? I say to you  
15          thank you. I say to you -- I say to you  
16          thank you for bringing this, Cindy Bass.  
17          I thank you for being my Councilperson.  
18          I have not always had it like this, but I  
19          want to thank you and I want y'all to get  
20          the picture. We're tired of these  
21          stop-and-go's who don't do nothing but  
22          stop-and-go liquor and alcohol in our  
23          neighborhoods and our kids aren't safe.

24                        (Applause.)

25                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

1 12/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Melissa Robbins.

4 (Applause.)

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 MS. ROBBINS: Good afternoon,  
7 Council President, Councilmembers. Thank  
8 you, Cindy Bass, for taking leadership on  
9 this. This conversation is not about  
10 Plexiglas or savages who simply want to  
11 harm others, as some have stated on  
12 social media platforms. This is a  
13 conversation about quality of life,  
14 classism, and racism, a tough topic to  
15 tackle.

16 Let us not pretend that we  
17 don't know why the nation recognizes  
18 Philadelphia as the largest most  
19 poverty-stricken city in the nation, but  
20 let's be honest and acknowledge that this  
21 system was put in place that allows this  
22 well-oiled aging machine to operate and  
23 function just the way in which it was  
24 designed to, thus creating perpetual  
25 poverty.

2 Would you be okay with an  
3 establishment in your neighborhood that  
4 opens as early as 7:00 a.m. and sells  
5 beer, liquor, and shots to anyone? Let  
6 it be known that the same establishments  
7 typically close from 1:00 to 2:00 a.m. in  
8 the morning.

9 So let us ask ourselves, what  
10 takes place during the course of a  
11 19-hour period in one of those  
12 establishments all day? How does one  
13 with an establishment license contribute  
14 to the betterment of our neighborhood, or  
15 does it contribute to the decay of our  
16 neighborhoods? Oh, and by the way, I'm  
17 just really finding out that the City  
18 actually recognizes these establishments  
19 as restaurants. These restaurants break  
20 federal law by breaking the seal on packs  
21 of cigarettes and selling them  
22 individually as loosies.

23 (Applause.)

24 MS. ROBBINS: They sell fried  
25 foods containing high saturated fats and

2           MSG, sodium, and tons of sugar, foods  
3           with no nutritional value, and none of  
4           the healthy options that most people need  
5           to survive cannot be found. They do not  
6           exist in these establishments. You can,  
7           however, find chips, cookies, sugar, soda  
8           water, candy, liquor, malt liquor, shots,  
9           beer, and a plethora of other fried  
10          foods, rice, noodles, and gravy sauces.  
11          These restaurants have no heat, no  
12          restrooms, some have no doors, and the  
13          customer service is non-existent.  
14          Customers are regularly treated like the  
15          scum of the earth, and many of these  
16          restaurants do not have standard cash  
17          registers and only accept cash.

18                        Now, multiply that one  
19          restaurant. We have unlimited places of  
20          businesses just like this around the  
21          City, all over our city and, yes,  
22          primarily in neighborhoods of color.  
23          What if Center City, Manayunk or Society  
24          Hill had this issue? We all know the  
25          City wouldn't allow business models like

2 this in these neighborhoods. They would  
3 not be seen as an asset to their  
4 community. Therefore, you're not an  
5 asset to our community. They do not  
6 comply with the laws and ordinances.  
7 They do not employ our local residents.  
8 They do not create community  
9 partnerships, and they do not invest into  
10 our neighborhoods, and they only provide  
11 stable incomes for themselves. These are  
12 crime beds. These are eyesores. These  
13 are dysfunctional, unethical,  
14 non-compliant small businesses that have  
15 contributed to the decay of our  
16 communities of color.

17 These redlined communities of  
18 food deserts deserve the same quality of  
19 life that many of you enjoy in your  
20 neighborhoods each day. Many of these  
21 residents are underpaid. They're  
22 ill-educated, unemployed, and are not  
23 valued. They all deserve better.

24 If you ran a business that sold  
25 products that are known to harm the body

2           and impair good judgment from sun up to  
3           the wee hours of the morning -- I'm  
4           sorry. We're over time, but I say these  
5           restaurants need to be shut down. You do  
6           not contribute to the betterment of us.  
7           You need to go.

8                           (Applause.)

9                           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10          Thank you for your testimony.

11                          CHIEF CLERK: Tina Marie  
12          Russell.

13                          (No response.)

14                          CHIEF CLERK: Tina Marie  
15          Russell.

16                          (No response.)

17                          CHIEF CLERK: Greg Spearman.

18                          (Witness approached podium.)

19                          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20          Greg, she's here.

21                          MR. SPEARMAN: You made me get  
22          up for nothing?

23                          COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: No.

24          We had inserted her name.

25                          MR. SPEARMAN: She's late,

2 though.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: But  
4 she's here. Thank you.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 MS. RUSSELL: Good afternoon.

7 My name is Tina Marie Russell. I wrote a  
8 document for -- a letter for today, but I  
9 have, after listening to everyone here,  
10 I've decided to let that go, because it's  
11 already written. It's already in your  
12 records.

13 What I see here is a lack of  
14 communication. I've been in the hallways  
15 talking to a lot of different business  
16 owners of the Asian culture, and they're  
17 scared. But they don't understand that  
18 we're scared too. We all want the same  
19 thing. We want peace, but what we need  
20 to do is sit down and talk more, maybe  
21 break out into -- here's some solutions  
22 for me. We break out into smaller  
23 organizations based on our community. We  
24 have conversations with each other. We  
25 figure out some solutions that's going to

2 work.

3 We look at each of our State  
4 Representatives and City Council for  
5 guidance, and then we can find an answer  
6 to this. Because at this point in time,  
7 we are in a crisis, and this crisis has  
8 been brought to the forefront by  
9 Councilwoman Bass's bill. But look  
10 around you. At no point in time have I  
11 ever -- and I've been advocating hard to  
12 try to get the small business  
13 associations to come and join -- have I  
14 seen so many Asians come together. I  
15 mean, look at you guys. You got to  
16 applaud yourselves. You're active  
17 finally, and that's all we want. We want  
18 you to be active in our communities,  
19 because you're Americans now, right? So  
20 we want you to come together and join up  
21 with us to find solutions, because you  
22 don't like to be victimized and we don't  
23 want to be victimized, correct?

24 So let's decide today that  
25 we're going to come together, we're going

2           to meet with each other, we're going to  
3           find solutions, because we want to get  
4           the crime out of our communities. And  
5           that's my testimony for today.

6                           (Applause.)

7                           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Thank you for your testimony.

9                           CHIEF CLERK: Charles Ellison,  
10          commenting on Bill No. 160111-A.

11                           (Witness approached podium.)

12                           MR. ELLISON: Good afternoon,  
13          Council President.

14                           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
15          afternoon.

16                           MR. ELLISON: Also members of  
17          the City Council gathered here today and  
18          also residents of the great, yet troubled  
19          City of Philadelphia. My name is Charles  
20          Ellison. For the record, I'm known as  
21          the Executive Producer and host of a  
22          daily public affairs program on WURD  
23          radio known as Reality Check. I'm also  
24          Washington correspondent for the  
25          Philadelphia Tribune. Also I'm a

2 contributing editor to the root.com and I  
3 write a weekly column for The  
4 Philadelphia Citizen.

5 I'm here representing myself  
6 today as a private and concerned citizen  
7 in support of Council Bill No. 160111-A,  
8 and that was recently introduced and  
9 recently revived by Councilwoman  
10 Blackwell. I know that this is a little  
11 off script from the bill that we've been  
12 debating here today, but I can assure you  
13 that it is just as important a quality of  
14 life issue as the bill regarding  
15 stop-and-go's.

16 I also present this testimony  
17 today as an individual who was raised in  
18 the Logan section of North Philadelphia.  
19 It's the matter of the Philadelphia  
20 Parking Authority, and it's the subject  
21 of enormous consequence to many people in  
22 this room and all the citizens of  
23 Philadelphia. And I deliver this  
24 testimony as someone who grew up in one  
25 of the City's larger working-class

2           sections where I watch residents and  
3           families struggle daily to make very  
4           simple ends meet, including in my own  
5           household. And I'm very concerned about  
6           the way the Philadelphia Parking  
7           Authority behaves, conducts its daily  
8           operations, and treats certain segments  
9           of the Philadelphia population, and it  
10          struck a somewhat deep and very personal  
11          chord with me.

12                        There are two big issues and  
13          problems with the Philadelphia Parking  
14          Authority right now that need addressing  
15          by this Council - race and income-based  
16          discrimination. There is data that I've  
17          personally researched that shows a  
18          pattern in which Parking Authority  
19          officers are routinely preying on and  
20          victimizing communities that are  
21          overwhelmingly black, brown, and fixed to  
22          low income in composition.

23                        Also there's an abuse and  
24          misdirection of funding streams where an  
25          analysis of Parking Authority financial

2           reports -- also we saw this with the PA  
3           Auditor General's recent audit of  
4           Authority finances -- show the Parking  
5           Authority directing very little of this  
6           revenue to the Philadelphia public school  
7           system.

8                         Combing through the City's  
9           datasets on this, I found that there are  
10          14 different zip codes that have issued  
11          100,000 or more parking tickets between  
12          2012 and 2016, yet nearly 80 percent, 80  
13          percent of those zip codes are places  
14          where the poverty rate is 20 percent or  
15          more and the neighborhoods are mostly  
16          black and of color.

17                        So in my zip code where I grew  
18          up in 19141, there were 179,000 tickets  
19          that were issued, but in whiter, more  
20          affluent zip codes, there are very few  
21          tickets and violations issued.

22                        Sorry. I'm hoping that with  
23          this issue on Councilwoman Jannie  
24          Blackwell's bill we can get swift and  
25          decisive City Council action on it and

2           also support from the City's Mayor and  
3           also from the delegation of State  
4           Representatives and Senators that  
5           represent the City.

6                     Thank you for your time and  
7           your initiative on this issue.

8                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
9           Thank you.

10                    I would like the record to  
11           reflect Ms. Rochelle Bilal also wanted to  
12           testify on this, but her time ran out on  
13           her earlier testimony and the other  
14           issue, but for the record, she is in  
15           support of Bill No. 160111-A. So let the  
16           record reflect that.

17                    CHIEF CLERK: Miranda  
18           Alexander, commenting on 171086.

19                    (Witness approached podium.)

20                    MS. ALEXANDER: Good day,  
21           Council President, Councilmembers,  
22           members of the community, and my fellow  
23           African diaspora colleagues. Today I  
24           stand on the strong shoulders of many  
25           great men and women who were slave

2           abolitionists, freedom fighters, and  
3           leaders of the Civil Rights Movement here  
4           in America, the Caribbean, and in Africa.

5                       As a member of Amnesty  
6           International, Philadelphia Chapter, the  
7           Mayor's Commission on African and  
8           Caribbean Immigrant Affairs, a person who  
9           regularly engages the African diaspora  
10          community with my own supporting program  
11          such as Also Our Rites of Passage, camps,  
12          meldorn (ph), diaspora tours to North and  
13          South Broad Philly, West and Southwest  
14          Philly, Heman (ph) for Black Advocates  
15          through my organization, You Are From  
16          Philadelphia, grassroots program, Voices  
17          in the Community, and Caribbean community  
18          in Philadelphia.

19                      So I have an invested interest  
20          in the way my African people are treated  
21          in Libya among the African Arabs, slave  
22          traders at slave markets tying nooses  
23          around necks of African black buddies.  
24          Good day. My name is Miranda Alexander  
25          and I'm originally from Trinidad and

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1           12/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           Tobago with Indoe and Afro-Caribbean  
3           heritage. I am Caribbean and I am  
4           Philadelphian, making Philadelphia my  
5           home for the last 18 years.

6                     My colleagues and I -- I think  
7           some of them have left already -- are  
8           here today to support our Councilwoman,  
9           Councilwoman Blackwell, in this  
10          resolution saying no to the horrific  
11          slave action treatment of our African  
12          brothers and sisters forced to endure at  
13          the hands of Libyans. To see these  
14          horrific pictures and not do something is  
15          a crime against my conscience. It's a  
16          crime against my charge as a christian.  
17          It's a crime against my skin color, and  
18          it's a crime against the children of our  
19          generation and the generations that  
20          follow. More importantly, it's a crime  
21          against humanity.

22                    I speak out today for the  
23          voices who wanted to say something, but  
24          are restricted. I speak out for our  
25          immigrant community and I speak out on

2           behalf of Africans who wanted to be here  
3           to say something. I am appalled that my  
4           Philadelphia community never led an  
5           immediate citywide demonstration. I  
6           attempted one on behalf of my local  
7           amnesty to do so, but got cancelled  
8           because of the lack of voices.

9                        So I am here saying that my  
10          Philadelphia is a major metropolitan city  
11          with 42 million visitors, and so I expect  
12          us to honor, respect, and hold in high  
13          esteem and dignity the God-given  
14          potential and purpose of black human  
15          souls, demanding Africans and all people  
16          of African descent freedom of choice and  
17          voice.

18                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

19          Ma'am, thank you.

20                       MS. ALEXANDER: So we speak  
21          as --

22                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Can  
23          you wrap up.

24                       MS. ALEXANDER: -- an African  
25          community -- yes, I am -- and denounce

2           and oppose this inhumane treatment of our  
3           Africans in Libya.

4                       Thank you so much.

5                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6           Thank you for your testimony.

7                       (Applause.)

8                       CHIEF CLERK: Jean Marie

9           Kouassi, commenting on 171086.

10                      (Witness approached podium.)

11                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
12           afternoon.

13                      MR. KOUASSI: Council  
14           President, members of the Council,  
15           friends, I'm Jean Marie Kouassi,  
16           President and Founder of Palms Solution,  
17           the African Francophone Global Initiative  
18           based here in Philadelphia and actively  
19           involved in the well-being of the social  
20           and economic development of our  
21           constituents here and abroad.

22                      My presence before you come as  
23           a result of the horrifying display of  
24           human servitude in the manner of slavery  
25           that we've been witnessing in Libya for

1           12/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           the last weeks. It is devastating that  
3           such practices could be still alive on  
4           the African soil in this 21st century.

5                         Since Libya fell into chaos  
6           after the ouster and killing of Muhammad  
7           Gaddafi in 2011, hundred of thousand of  
8           migrant from the country that I represent  
9           are believed to be in lawless Libya, and  
10          many of them are being held by smuggler  
11          under lock and key in the country  
12          consumed by fractional violence.

13                        As we speak, 155 Ivorian  
14          refugee, including 89 women and underage  
15          migrant, were returned from Libya to the  
16          Ivory Coast, the country where I'm  
17          originally from, a spot of the  
18          reintegration initiative launched by the  
19          European union and the diplomacy  
20          initiative that we've launched here in  
21          New York.

22                        We want this effort to continue  
23          and to get even better results. That is  
24          why I'm standing before you in support of  
25          the resolution introduced by our Council

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1           12/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           Jannie Blackwell, which I hope will  
3           contribute a great deal to the solution  
4           of this horrifying and degrading problem  
5           on the ground in Libya.

6                     I would like to thank you for  
7           your interest on the matter and thank in  
8           particular Council Jannie Blackwell for  
9           introducing the resolution on our behalf.

10                    Thank you.

11                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12           Thank you for your testimony.

13                    (Applause.)

14                    CHIEF CLERK: Voffee Jabateh.

15                    (No response.)

16                    CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,  
17           commenting on 171087, 171092, 171095,  
18           171100, and 160720.

19                    (Witness approached podium.)

20                    MR. DANIHEL: My name is Joseph  
21           Danihel. This is an official decree of  
22           the people in writ of mandamus quo  
23           warranto and, as such, requires immediate  
24           action and remedy.

25                    Every week this Council, Mayor,

2 and others transfer private property to  
3 government, probably illegally.

4 In this representative form of  
5 government, officers having a fiduciary  
6 duty to people have colluded to steal my  
7 home and others. Officials have covered  
8 the tracks of these other oath-bound  
9 officials, allowing clear violations to  
10 go unprosecuted. It is illegal, immoral.  
11 RICO statutes clearly are required to  
12 round up groups of oath-violating  
13 officials who collude to steal taxpayer  
14 money and violate oath, Constitution, and  
15 law.

16 42 USC 1992, every person  
17 having knowledge of any of the wrongs  
18 conspired to be done or about to be  
19 committed, having the power to prevent  
20 and aid in preventing in the commission  
21 of the same, neglects or refuse to do so,  
22 if such wrongful act shall be committed,  
23 shall be liable to the party injured, or  
24 his legal representatives, for damages  
25 caused for such a wrongful act.

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2 There is at least 54 counts of  
3 oath, Constitution, and law violating  
4 known by this Council and they are  
5 avoiding a known duty or task at least 54  
6 times. Why is there no enforcement of  
7 oath, Constitution, and law violations?

8 Did Graham Spanier in Penn  
9 State think he was above the law  
10 requiring accountability? The  
11 Constitution and laws require immediate  
12 remedy for this breach of law, breach of  
13 close, breach of fiduciary duty. Your  
14 oath of office requires you to act or  
15 face prison.

16 42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
17 1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA  
18 Constitution, Article I, Sections 1  
19 through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 712,  
20 713, 716, and other laws listed in SCOTUS  
21 8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear violated.

22 I call for the federal and  
23 Commonwealth governments to perform their  
24 constitutional obligations to investigate  
25 and prosecute all involved in the theft

1           12/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           and illegal deed transfer of my home,  
3           1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The denial of  
4           God-given 42 USC 1982 property rights for  
5           23 years is egregious, extraordinary,  
6           oath-violating, and requires immediate  
7           remedy.

8                         A just government must obey the  
9           rule of law. This color of law  
10          government must have its Charter to  
11          govern revoked until a constitutionally  
12          compliant government is installed.

13                        Public servants cannot refuse  
14          their sworn duty to act any more than a  
15          fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
16          sovereign people require the Constitution  
17          and laws be enforced. Jail is required  
18          for all who violate oath, Constitution or  
19          laws.

20                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
21          Thank you.

22                        MR. DANIHEL: It takes a lot of  
23          cooperation to create and allow  
24          monumental corruption.

25                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

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1 12/14/17 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT

2 Thank you for your testimony, sir.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Mohamed Camara,  
4 commenting on 171086.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 MR. CAMARA: Good afternoon,  
7 Honorable. My name is Mohamed Camara. I  
8 would first like to thank the  
9 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell for  
10 introducing this bill on the situation on  
11 Libya.

12 We all live in the United  
13 States. If we not immigrant ourself, our  
14 parents were immigrants at some point.  
15 Many Sub-Saharan Africans are leaving  
16 their home because of economic situations  
17 to travel to Europe and they were to  
18 transition in Libya, and during that  
19 transition, these people are stopped,  
20 imprisoned, and then auctioned to the  
21 highest bidder. This situation is  
22 intolerable. This situation cannot be  
23 allowed in a 21st century humanity.

24 This is a plea for all humanity  
25 to stand up and to basically stop this

2 type of behavior anywhere on this planet.  
3 Human beings are not to be sold as cattle  
4 or as property. This is not acceptable.  
5 Slavery is not acceptable here. Slavery  
6 is not acceptable anywhere. And as  
7 people of African descent, we have  
8 experienced it many times during history  
9 and, quite frankly, enough is enough. We  
10 need to come together and ask the  
11 government of Libya, the government of  
12 Europe that are (unintelligible) in Libya  
13 to stop this practice. This is not  
14 acceptable.

15 Thank you.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you for your testimony.

18 (Applause.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: There are no  
20 other speakers on the public comment  
21 list, Mr. President.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

23 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

24 That concludes our public  
25 comment session. We will now consider

13                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14           Those opposed?

15                        (No response.)

16                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
17           ayes have it. 171098 is adopted.

18                        Mr. Decker, 171100.

19                        CHIEF CLERK: A resolution  
20           approving the redevelopment contract of  
21           the Philadelphia Redevelopment Authority  
22           for the redevelopment and urban renewal  
23           of a portion of the New  
24           Kensington-Fishtown Urban Renewal Area,  
25           identified by house numbers and streets

1           12/14/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           addresses as 2046, 2048, 2050, and 2052  
3           East Hagert Street and 1823 through 29  
4           and 1833 through 39 East Oakdale Street.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6           Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

7                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,  
8           Mr. President. I move for the adoption  
9           of the resolution.

10                   (Duly seconded.)

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
12           been moved and properly seconded.

13                   All those in favor say aye.

14                   (Aye.)

15                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16           Those opposed?

17                   (No response.)

18                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
19           ayes have it. 171100 is adopted.

20                   Mr. Decker, please read the  
21           title of 160111-A.

22                   CHIEF CLERK: An ordinance  
23           amending Chapter 12-2800 of The  
24           Philadelphia Code, entitled  
25           "Administrative Adjudication of Parking

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1           12/14/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           Violations," to establish an amnesty  
3           program for fines, fees and penalties on  
4           parking violations.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
6           Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

7                   COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
8           Mr. President. First, let me start off  
9           by saying how much respect, the  
10          tremendous amount of experience and  
11          wisdom that Councilwoman Blackwell has  
12          shown throughout her career here in this  
13          body and identifying such issues as  
14          offering a window of amnesty. So I  
15          wanted to start off with that. And I'm  
16          asking her, as she had committed to me  
17          and other members and the Administration,  
18          to continue to work towards some of the  
19          common goals and some identified  
20          outstanding issues that I and some of the  
21          folks in my district may have as we move  
22          forward.

23                   With that, I will be supporting  
24          this, but there are -- this is a large  
25          issue that is citywide. And, again, I

2           have nothing but the utmost respect in  
3           identifying the issues that have been  
4           ongoing with her and the people that she  
5           represents in the City of Philadelphia.

6                        So I'm just asking that we  
7           continue to have this dialogue and  
8           addressing some of these issues, not just  
9           with myself but any other members and the  
10          Administration so we can work towards the  
11          common goals that we all share.

12                       So thank you.

13                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14          Thank you, Councilman.

15                       The Chair recognizes Councilman  
16          Green.

17                       COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
18          Council President. I just have a point  
19          of information for the sponsor of the  
20          bill regarding legislation. I know  
21          there's been a lot of amendments  
22          regarding the bill, and I just want to  
23          get some information for the record.

24                       So under this legislation if a  
25          person had a traffic ticket, let's say,

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2 about a year ago, would they qualify for  
3 amnesty under the legislation?

4 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

5 Mr. President, this is a five-year  
6 amnesty bill. It goes from 2013, '14,  
7 '15, '16, and '17, and they would. And I  
8 wanted a moment -- to take a moment to  
9 address my colleagues about the need for  
10 this bill. I thank all who have been  
11 just contacted, and I tried to take our  
12 time, and I'm sorry that people were just  
13 contacted between last night and today.

14 In general, this bill creates a  
15 parking amnesty for parking tickets that  
16 are older than five years if someone  
17 makes an agreement to pay the balance of  
18 their parking tickets younger than the  
19 five years. I wanted to create a parking  
20 amnesty program because there are many  
21 people in this city that just need a  
22 break. I've heard complaints from my  
23 constituents about the overzealous  
24 enforcement of parking tickets by the  
25 Philadelphia Parking Authority. I've

2           heard reports of the Philadelphia Parking  
3           Authority targeting poor neighborhoods  
4           and booting and towing 15 cars on a  
5           single block, 50 cars in a single area in  
6           my district, especially since I put in  
7           this bill.

8                       I've heard people that have had  
9           their cars towed by the Philadelphia  
10          Parking Authority because of tickets they  
11          or a family member received over 20 years  
12          ago. One gentleman had tickets from  
13          1975.

14                      I'm outraged about how the  
15          Parking Authority has been treating our  
16          citizens. It's not right, and something  
17          has to be done.

18                      Many people depend on their  
19          vehicles to assist them in very central  
20          day-to-day activities, going to work,  
21          taking their children to school, going to  
22          the grocery store, something that basic.  
23          For some, having a vehicle means the  
24          difference between having food to feed  
25          their families or not and having jobs or

2 not.

3 The Philadelphia Parking  
4 Authority has been exploiting their power  
5 by taking people's cars in order to force  
6 them into unfavorable payment agreements  
7 and by selling their cars when they  
8 ultimately default on agreements they  
9 can't pay.

10 I cannot simply do nothing  
11 while so many people are being taken  
12 advantage of by a predatory institution.

13 Now the Philadelphia Parking  
14 Authority has been telling me that if we  
15 do this amnesty, the School District is  
16 going to lose \$21 million over the next  
17 five years. This assertion is based on  
18 several broad assumptions, not on facts  
19 but on what they, quote/unquote, predict  
20 will happen or what they predict people  
21 might do.

22 Philadelphia has never had an  
23 amnesty program based on parking tickets  
24 before. How can they make the  
25 assumptions on what will happen if we

2           have nothing to base it on?

3                     The Philadelphia Parking  
4           Authority is trying to scare us by saying  
5           we're going to take money away from the  
6           School District when it seems to me that  
7           the Parking Authority is the one who is  
8           taking money away from the School  
9           District.

10                    (Applause.)

11                    COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Last  
12           week it was made clear -- I still have  
13           those posters -- that the Philadelphia  
14           Parking Authority has been withholding  
15           money from the School District for years.  
16           The Auditor General's report stated that  
17           the Philadelphia Parking Authority owes  
18           the District at least \$77.9 million.

19                    When the state took over  
20           control of the Parking Authority in 2001,  
21           they promised that the School District  
22           would receive \$45 million a year. This  
23           promise has never been fulfilled. The  
24           District only receives about 10 million  
25           from the Parking Authority each year. In

2           fact, even before the consideration of  
3           this bill, the School District was  
4           already expecting to lose roughly \$7  
5           million from the Parking Authority for  
6           Fiscal Year '18.

7                         We cannot depend on the  
8           Philadelphia Parking Authority to fund  
9           the School District. They have not lived  
10          up to their promises in the past and,  
11          therefore, we should not expect them to  
12          live up to their promises in the future.  
13          The fact is, we of City Council are the  
14          ones with the record for taking care of  
15          the School District. We have never  
16          failed to do so. We do all that we can  
17          to support the School District and our  
18          children. Don't tell me I'm taking money  
19          away from the School District, Parking  
20          Authority, because we want to find a way  
21          to help people that are in need.

22                        I know our School District  
23          needs help, but there are other people  
24          out there that need help too. We cannot  
25          just ignore them.

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: I  
4 always say my passion is to help people  
5 in need, and as long as God gives me  
6 breath, we're going to continue to do  
7 what we can to help people who are in  
8 need.

9 I'm here to serve the people,  
10 and I ask that you support me by voting  
11 yes on this bill.

12 Thank you for listening, and I  
13 hope that you support this bill. Thank  
14 you again, and I move for the adoption.

15 (Applause.)

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

17 Thank you, Councilwoman.

18 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
19 Domb.

20 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,  
21 Council President. I echo the sentiments  
22 of Councilman Henon and also Councilwoman  
23 Blackwell. Your work on this has been  
24 extraordinary, and I applaud it.

25 I have maybe a difference of

2           opinion on this bill. From where I come  
3           from, usually it's the principal that is  
4           always paid back and it's the interest  
5           and penalties that can be compromised.  
6           And when you look at the actual numbers  
7           of what's owed, there's \$655 million in  
8           delinquent taxes to the Parking  
9           Authority. Only 243 million is actual  
10          principal, 313 is interest and penalties,  
11          99 million is booting fees, towing, and  
12          storage fees.

13                        So my suggestion here is to,  
14          number one, do not forego principal.  
15          It's not fair to those people who paid  
16          for the last 20 years. For those people  
17          who can't afford it or have a means test,  
18          exclude the interest and penalties. But  
19          for the person who is earning a good  
20          income who didn't pay us, they shouldn't  
21          get off scot-free. That's not right, and  
22          it sends the wrong message in collecting  
23          these fees.

24                        I'm totally in favor of waiving  
25          interest and penalties for those who

2           financially qualify. And I just wanted  
3           to share that with you. And I will be  
4           voting no on this, so I wanted to give  
5           you my reasons why. I'm in favor of  
6           helping people, but I think the principal  
7           has to stay intact.

8                     Thank you.

9                     (Applause.)

10                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11           Thank you, Councilman.

12                    The Chair recognizes Councilman  
13           Jones.

14                    COUNCILMAN JONES: We've talked  
15           about a lot of fairness issues today, and  
16           selective enforcement based on zip codes,  
17           based on people who are already under the  
18           gun, under the yolk of economic  
19           stressors, should not be unfairly  
20           targeted by enforcement agencies. I  
21           understand that we run a risk of possible  
22           revenue loss, but we also stand to gain  
23           through an amnesty if people come and  
24           start to pay for stranded parking fees  
25           that they would have otherwise not paid.

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2 Every time when it comes to the  
3 rules of the game, when it's tilted  
4 unfairly towards poor people, it's okay.  
5 It cannot be continued. It cannot go on.  
6 I support Councilwoman Blackwell on this,  
7 and you should not have enforcement by  
8 zip code.

9 Thank you.

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

12 Thank you, Councilman.

13 There are no other speeches on  
14 this. This bill has been heard on two  
15 separate days. The question is shall the  
16 bill pass finally.

17 Mr. Decker, call the roll.

18 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

19 Bass.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Aye.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

22 Blackwell.

23 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Aye.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Domb.

25 COUNCILMAN DOMB: Nay.

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2 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Green.

3 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Aye.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

5 Greenlee.

6 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Aye.

7 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman Gym.

8 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Aye.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Henon.

10 COUNCILMAN HENON: Aye.

11 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

12 Johnson.

13 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Aye.

14 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Jones.

15 COUNCILMAN JONES: Aye.

16 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

17 O'Neill.

18 COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: No.

19 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman Oh.

20 COUNCILMAN OH: Aye.

21 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

22 Parker.

23 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Aye.

24 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

25 Quinones-Sanchez.

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2 COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ: Aye.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Councilwoman

4 Reynolds Brown.

5 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Aye.

6 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

7 Squilla.

8 COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Aye.

9 CHIEF CLERK: Councilman

10 Taubenberger.

11 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: No.

12 CHIEF CLERK: Council President

13 Clarke.

14 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Aye.

15 The ayes are 14 and the nays  
16 are three. A majority of members present  
17 voting in the affirmative, the bill  
18 passes.

19 (Applause.)

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Okay. Mr. Decker, please read the title  
22 of 170963.

23 Thank you, Mr. Decker. The  
24 title has been read on 170 -- did you  
25 read the title yet?

2                   CHIEF CLERK: No.

3                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4           Mr. Decker, please read the title.

5                   CHIEF CLERK: Bill No. 170963,  
6           an ordinance amending Section 6-301 and  
7           6-503 of The Philadelphia Code, entitled,  
8           respectively, "Food Establishments" and  
9           "Licenses and Permits," to revise  
10          licensing requirements relating to food  
11          establishments, including requirements  
12          relating to restroom facilities, service  
13          and seating.

14                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15          Thank you, Mr. Decker.

16                  The Chair recognizes

17          Councilwoman Bass.

18                  COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Well, thank  
19          you, Mr. President. And I'd like to  
20          start by thanking everyone for coming  
21          down today on both sides of this issue,  
22          for those who support the bill to raise  
23          their voices and say we are so sick and  
24          tired of being sick and tired and for  
25          those who oppose it, so that I have an

2           opportunity to clarify misinformation  
3           that has been circulating for many  
4           different sources, but first on  
5           background.

6                        This bill is the culmination of  
7           the 25-plus years worth of work that  
8           Councilwoman Blackwell has put in to  
9           address the unacceptable business  
10          practices that have been going on for far  
11          too long, and I thank her.

12                       (Applause.)

13                      COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Our office  
14          has worked on this matter for several  
15          years now, desperately trying to work  
16          with stop-and-go owners in my district to  
17          change their business model, which was  
18          met with silence from these operators.  
19          And in October 2016, we arranged a tour  
20          with L&I Commissioner David Perri, Health  
21          Commissioner Tom Farley, former Fire  
22          Commissioner Derrick Sawyer,  
23          representatives from the Philadelphia  
24          Police Department, and staff from Liquor  
25          Control Enforcement. That tour left the

2 attendees flabbergasted.

3           We asked for help, and it was  
4 delivered in the form of this bill. I  
5 want to thank the tour attendees, and I  
6 want to thank Mayor Kenney for their  
7 unwavering support and encouragement as  
8 we prepare to take this most important  
9 vote.

10           There has been so much  
11 confusion on this bill, some a simple  
12 misunderstanding and some is the  
13 intentional spreading of inaccuracies,  
14 but I want to be clear as to who I'm  
15 addressing with this legislation: the  
16 owners of stop-and-go's. They're  
17 referring to themselves as beer delis  
18 now, which I think is laughable, because  
19 I've been a Philadelphian all my life and  
20 I know what a deli is, and this isn't  
21 that. You can't get a pastrami on rye in  
22 any of these places.

23           So let me be clear as to who  
24 this bill addresses. This bill is for  
25 establishments that sell beer and/or

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1           12/14/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           shots of liquor, cold medicine that can  
3           be converted into drugs to get high,  
4           crack pipes and other drug paraphernalia,  
5           fruit-flavored cigarillos, and candy and  
6           snacks for children. Sometimes they sell  
7           food. Mostly they don't.

8                     They only exist in vulnerable  
9           neighborhoods where self-medication  
10          happens frequently. They aren't delis.  
11          They're places to buy products to get  
12          high. They're the modern-day pusher, a  
13          legal storefront pro-addiction center, an  
14          indoor open-air drug market. It's the  
15          get-on place in the neighborhood,  
16          masquerading as restaurants. They sell  
17          almost everything you need to get high,  
18          and if they don't have it, often someone  
19          loitering inside or outside has the rest.

20                    You see the addicted clearly  
21          intoxicated, drinking a shot of liquor,  
22          standing in the small area allowed, while  
23          neighborhood children mingle and consume  
24          chips and candy. Who can defend this?  
25          How can anyone defend this? We don't



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2 allow children in bars for a reason, and  
3 yet we have a hybrid bar, liquor store,  
4 beer distributor operating right now in  
5 these very vulnerable communities. If  
6 they were selling hypodermic needles  
7 synonymous with using heroin, there would  
8 be an immediate call to shut these places  
9 down. But selling crack pipes and cheap  
10 alcohol, well, let's just admit it, that  
11 it's a different kind of addict, so they  
12 get a different kind of response.

13 As a member of Council, I  
14 believe my job is somewhat like a police  
15 officer, just without a badge, sworn to  
16 protect and serve all people. It's our  
17 responsibility to bring the community  
18 together, not to promote a war of what-if  
19 violence of any kind.

20 Our job is to bring forth  
21 solutions and peace in the communities we  
22 serve and not irresponsibly incite even  
23 the potential of violence and division.

24 What seems to be forgotten here  
25 is that these businesses have licenses to

2           operate as restaurants, and that is what  
3           this bill is requiring them to do.

4           That's not what they are right now. When  
5           was the last time you got a serving of  
6           NyQuil at a restaurant? But you can get  
7           it at these establishments.

8                        I've never heard so many people  
9           defending a group of businesses that were  
10          primarily focused on selling people  
11          things that would allow the continuance  
12          of an addiction, all under the guise of  
13          safety first. Well, let me be the first  
14          to tell that you've been had.

15                       Now, I have no doubt that  
16          safety is a real concern, a significant  
17          concern. When we talk to businesses and  
18          those concerned about the removal of  
19          bulletproof glass, we also talked about  
20          lighting, cameras, security guards with  
21          wands, individual assessments from  
22          security professionals, all to be told  
23          no, the only option is glass. Well, let  
24          me say this: I have an agreement that  
25          was signed by Mr. Xu and Mr. Murphy

1           12/14/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           representing the Asian American Licensed  
3           Beverage Association, or known as AALBA.  
4           It's an agreement dated December 16th,  
5           2004, nearly 13 years ago to the day, in  
6           which they agreed to hire security  
7           guards. It's signed by the very people  
8           who now say no to security guards.

9                         This document, which  
10          Councilwoman Blackwell worked on since  
11          1993, 25 years, this document states that  
12          they will stop selling drug  
13          paraphernalia. It reads, AALBA, through  
14          its members, shall no longer sell items  
15          that are associated with the use of  
16          illegal drugs. These items include, but  
17          are not limited to, rolling papers or  
18          cigar wraps that can commonly be used for  
19          rolling tobacco, any forms of glass stems  
20          that are used for pens, straight shooters  
21          or roses, and as it becomes apparent over  
22          time, any product that can be primarily  
23          used for drugs.

24                         What it doesn't say is that  
25          those papers are currently used for

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1           12/14/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           smoking marijuana and other substances,  
3           and what it doesn't say is that those  
4           forms of glass stems are used as crack  
5           pipes.

6                        It also states regarding  
7           education and training that AALBA shall  
8           assist its members to seek out and  
9           successfully complete responsible alcohol  
10          management training programs, which  
11          essentially means that you have to know  
12          when to cut people off. You can't serve  
13          people who are visibly intoxicated.

14                       Regarding safety and security,  
15          it reads, Members' locations that have  
16          experienced a high pattern -- a pattern  
17          of high levels of criminal activity, as  
18          determined mutually by the AALBA and the  
19          community groups, shall submit a security  
20          response plan to AALBA, including, but  
21          not limited to, the use of increased  
22          community town watch personnel on a  
23          volunteer basis, if available, and/or the  
24          deployment of private uniformed security  
25          personnel in the immediate vicinity of

2           the licensed premises on a regular and  
3           continuous basis if the need arises.

4                        That's in their document.

5                        The bylaws attached to this  
6           document further states that AALBA will,  
7           among other things, completely abolish  
8           the sale of loose cigarettes, completely  
9           abolish the sale of new and unused glass  
10          vials, which are frequently used as drug  
11          paraphernalia, specifically for the  
12          packaging of crack cocaine and PCP for  
13          illegal street sales.

14                       This is in their document.

15                       A security and surveillance  
16          video camera that shall be maintained to  
17          cover the interior area of the front  
18          entrance, seating area, and counter area  
19          of the premises.

20                       Bathroom use shall be limited  
21          to employees and paying customers only.  
22          The bathroom shall remain locked at all  
23          times in accordance with City health  
24          ordinances. A bathroom key shall be  
25          provided to a paying customer upon

2           request and upon the discretion of the  
3           store manager only.

4                     The licensee shall take all  
5           necessary and reasonable steps to enhance  
6           the percentage of food revenue on the  
7           premises, including the immediate  
8           advertising of food specials on the menu,  
9           the reasonable pricing of food items on  
10          the store menu, and the immediate price  
11          increase of take-out malt beverages,  
12          especially single 40 ounce containers of  
13          malt beverages for on and off premises  
14          consumption, and the continuing effort to  
15          ensure that minors neither purchase nor  
16          consume alcohol.

17                    The premises shall immediately  
18          acquire or maintain an identification  
19          verification machine in the front counter  
20          area and shall be utilized by all  
21          employees whenever a valid identification  
22          is requested and produced by the  
23          customer.

24                    All licensees and their alcohol  
25          serving staff shall immediately undergo

1           12/14/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           and successfully complete the  
3           Pennsylvania Liquor Control  
4           Board-sponsored Responsible Alcohol  
5           Management Program training. A valid  
6           certificate of completion shall be posted  
7           in a conspicuous location on the  
8           premises.

9                     Operating hours shall be  
10           curtailed. Licensee shall close for  
11           business on or before 1:00 a.m. from  
12           Sunday night through Thursday night and  
13           2:00 a.m. on Friday night and Saturday  
14           night.

15                     And so here we have this  
16           document signed by the leaders of AALBA  
17           acknowledging that their members sell  
18           drug paraphernalia, including blunt  
19           rappers and crack pipes; acknowledging  
20           that their members need better training  
21           and to be more responsible regarding  
22           serving alcohol; acknowledging that their  
23           members sell products, other products, to  
24           get you high, cold and allergy medicines,  
25           et cetera; acknowledging that their

2           members would hire security guards.

3                     My question to AALBA is, how

4           much of this have you done? Some of it?

5           Any of it? I think I have the answer.

6           None of it.

7                     You found out you didn't

8           legally have to do it, so you did

9           nothing, except staying the neighborhood  
10          get high spot in the area.

11                    Here is what you did: You came

12          to Council, Mr. Xu and Michelle, the

13          owners of Wayne Junction Deli, and you

14          brought with you someone that we met in

15          your establishment that admitted he sold

16          loosies in front of the Channel 6 News

17          crew that was with us. And you're the

18          owner of this establishment and the

19          leader of this organization. You created

20          a culture and climate of foolishness in

21          your business and in City neighborhoods.

22          You preyed upon addicts, people with a

23          habit, a dependency that forced them to

24          seek you out. This is not a willing

25          customer. How many lives were destroyed

2 by your encouraging hand?

3 Those who oppose the bill have  
4 told me, said to me that I could have  
5 blood on my hands. But you do have blood  
6 on your hands, the blood of the thousands  
7 that have and continue to fight their  
8 addiction every day and the blood of  
9 those --

10 (Applause.)

11 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: And the  
12 blood of those that we have lost. How  
13 many families have been destroyed by  
14 these operations that sell dollar beers  
15 to people already intoxicated? We'll  
16 never be able to count them, but we all  
17 know some of them.

18 By opposing this bill, you  
19 stand against the people and the  
20 community and you stand with the dealer,  
21 no matter what their hue or their  
22 ethnicity. A dealer is a dealer is a  
23 dealer. And you do all of this for  
24 years.

25 Your document acknowledges

2           conversation and work on this issue since  
3           1993.

4                     It took 11 years to get AALBA  
5           to the table with a document, and then  
6           AALBA walked away from this document as  
7           quickly as it could. That was 2004.  
8           This is 2017, almost '18. This is a  
9           25-plus year journey, and now stop-and-go  
10          owners still don't want to change. Do we  
11          have to wait another 25 years for change?  
12          Maybe 50 years? I think not. This  
13          business model is over. It's done.  
14          There's only one way for it to go, all of  
15          us to go, and that's forward. This bill  
16          will conform the City with state law,  
17          allowing for enforcement. And times up.  
18          We're going to say good-bye to the  
19          breakfast booze spots and the like,  
20          taking our communities back. You are  
21          invited to join us or you can make your  
22          decision not to. But what was is just  
23          sad. What was in past tense. There's no  
24          looking back and there's no going back.  
25          There is only going forward. This is a

2           forward march, and we're all going,  
3           black, white, brown, Asian. It doesn't  
4           matter. We're all going. We're all  
5           moving Philadelphia forward, all  
6           neighborhoods together. Some are going  
7           to walk, some are going to have to be  
8           pulled forward, but we're going to stop  
9           leaving Philadelphia neighborhoods  
10          behind, and it starts now.

11                   Thank you, Mr. President.

12                   (Standing ovation.)

13                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

14           Thank you, Councilwoman.

15                   The Chair recognizes

16           Councilwoman Gym.

17                   COUNCILWOMAN GYM: Thank you  
18           very much, Council President. Anyone who  
19           knows me knows how I've long felt about  
20           predatory practices that would seek to  
21           profit from vulnerable communities. From  
22           the establishment of predatory gambling  
23           halls that target Asian Americans,  
24           for-profit cyber and education management  
25           companies seeking to exploit a struggling

2           school system that serves black, brown,  
3           and immigrant children, or irresponsible  
4           businesses which profit from addiction to  
5           substances such as alcohol and nicotine,  
6           all are damaging to those who seek to  
7           build community with one another.

8                        To me, the ways in which  
9           communities, intentionally or not, can  
10          simultaneously exploit and be exploited  
11          is a moral issue as much as it is an  
12          economic and neighborhood one. In the  
13          matter at hand, let's not forget that  
14          this exploitation starts first and  
15          foremost with the multi-national  
16          cigarette and liquor companies who would  
17          exploit black communities and small  
18          business owners with one mission: to  
19          sell cheap and poisonous products to  
20          business owners who are struggling to  
21          make ends meet, to black communities who  
22          are also struggling to make ends meets.

23                        In a world where we can so  
24          often and easily be pitted against one  
25          another, we must find solidarity

2           together. There is significant pain on  
3           all sides of this issue, and that is why  
4           this model of business also must change.

5                       As Asian Americans, we have a  
6           responsibility and obligation to reflect  
7           on the legitimate community concerns that  
8           have been raised and take action. The  
9           denial and/or deflection of that only  
10          contributes to rising anger from our  
11          neighbors and colleagues.

12                      With the current amendment in  
13          place, this bill does not require the  
14          mandatory removal of protective barriers,  
15          and it creates a careful and deliberative  
16          process for making decisions that impact  
17          the safety of members of all our  
18          communities.

19                      I want to thank my colleagues  
20          and the sponsor of the bill for their  
21          work on this amendment. At its heart  
22          then, with the amendment in place, this  
23          bill is now asking us as a community to  
24          take responsibility for changing a  
25          business model that contributes to

2           damaging the health of the neighborhoods  
3           in which they sit. It is asking us to  
4           recognize and reject predatory practices  
5           that have hurt black and brown  
6           communities and neighborhoods. And our  
7           challenge now is to move forward  
8           together.

9                        While this bill only targets  
10          the small fraction of small businesses,  
11          however, many Asian Americans have  
12          rightly worried about racial innuendo  
13          being used to attack Asian small  
14          businesses as a whole, resulting in  
15          increased hostility and distrust and  
16          leaving Asian immigrant communities in  
17          particular feeling unjustly targeted and  
18          increasingly vulnerable and alone. We  
19          have a collective responsibility to  
20          reject any level of xenophobia and  
21          anti-Asian sentiments that would seek to  
22          do such. And I too have been deeply  
23          moved by the personal stories I have  
24          heard from all sides of this issue, from  
25          community members and business owners. I

2           myself have a relative whose family  
3           member was shot to death in his place of  
4           business.

5                        Scapegoating immigrants has  
6           become normalized in this national  
7           climate, and we have a responsibility as  
8           a city to continue to lead the nation in  
9           demonstrating how we will work towards  
10          unity and greater understanding and fight  
11          the ways in which Asian immigrants and  
12          other communities can be rendered silent,  
13          marginalized, and vulnerable.

14                      To the business owners and  
15          community members who have reached out  
16          with their appeals, I hear you, and I  
17          know many of my colleagues on Council do  
18          as well. Please know that I will work  
19          with you to ensure that any process  
20          moving forward will be inclusive and  
21          responsive to needs, that we will bring  
22          together multiple City agencies,  
23          including L&I, the Police Department,  
24          Human Relations, Commerce, and Immigrant  
25          Affairs to the table for support and

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2 resources to help both businesses and  
3 communities improve.

4 I will be voting yes on this  
5 bill and committing myself to the  
6 responsible execution and implementation.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILWOMAN GYM: I am firmly  
9 of the belief that diverse and integrated  
10 communities are key to Philadelphia's  
11 future and that that future must also be  
12 centered around sustainable business  
13 practices that see the safety and  
14 well-being from the perspective of all  
15 its members. It is, as the Councilwoman  
16 said, our path forward. It calls us to  
17 come to the table with one another and  
18 find our way through this, however  
19 challenging, together.

20 Thank you.

21 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

22 Thank you, Councilwoman.

23 (Applause and boos.)

24 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

25 Please.

2                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
3 Greenlee.

4                   COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
5 you, Mr. President. Quickly I just  
6 wanted to say as a member of the Health  
7 Committee chaired by Councilwoman Bass,  
8 we had a long hearing on this issue. I  
9 think everybody agreed on 90 percent of  
10 this bill right away. Clearly, as the  
11 Councilwoman has pointed out, there has  
12 been businesses, way too many businesses,  
13 that have been scourges on their  
14 communities, just spreading negative  
15 problems throughout the whole  
16 neighborhood, and I commend Councilwoman  
17 Bass for all the work she's done on this.  
18 I didn't actually know about the  
19 agreement that she pointed out today, but  
20 it was -- it also shows -- and some  
21 people may not like to hear this.  
22 Leadership of groups need to be leaders  
23 and not just let things happen, and I  
24 think it is hard to not see that the  
25 leadership of the business community has

2                   not done his job in making sure that the  
3                   businesses in their group have not been  
4                   negative to their communities.

5                   Now, let me just say  
6                   personally -- and I expressed this to the  
7                   Councilwoman at the time -- I would have  
8                   liked to have seen the whole issue of the  
9                   glass taken out of the bill. She  
10                  obviously felt differently. Other people  
11                  felt differently. So we came up with  
12                  changes in wording. That's what's called  
13                  compromises. Originally the bill called  
14                  for the taking out of the glass  
15                  immediately. What this amendment does,  
16                  as Councilwoman Gym alluded to, it gives  
17                  the Department of License and Inspection  
18                  three years, until 2021, to get  
19                  regulations together, provide -- and I'm  
20                  quoting -- for the use or removal of any  
21                  physical barrier.

22                  I would hope that everybody  
23                  concerned in this issue would be involved  
24                  in these discussions and work out  
25                  something that's amenable to everybody.

2 But, again, the vast majority of this  
3 bill takes care of a serious problem in  
4 our city, and I will be voting aye.

5 Thank you.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilman.

9 The Chair recognizes Councilman

10 Oh.

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
12 much, Council President. I appreciate  
13 the efforts of Councilwoman Bass and all  
14 of the members. I think many times  
15 people think we have an easy job until  
16 moments like this. We have to vote on  
17 some tough issues, and there's no hiding  
18 what you're going to do.

19 I do want to say that I felt  
20 very sorry that Councilwoman Bass has  
21 experienced some personal attacks. I  
22 think we all have, and we all understand  
23 what it is to be attacked personally for  
24 ideas that we believe in, things that we  
25 try to do for the good of our community,

2           but at the end of the day, it gets  
3           resolved right here with a vote that's  
4           out in the open.

5                        On my part, I understand all  
6           the issues that were raised. I  
7           understand that the issues run deeper  
8           than the bulletproof glass, and that is  
9           from heartfelt and frustrated citizens on  
10          both sides of this issue.

11                       The only issue, however, for me  
12          in this bill that I disagree with and  
13          feel that strongly about is the language  
14          that authorizes the L&I Commissioner to  
15          promulgate regulations for the use or  
16          removal of safety glass before January  
17          1st, 2021. That language to me, if that  
18          is not an important part of this bill, I  
19          would request be removed, but we have a  
20          difference of opinion.

21                       There are businesses that are  
22          nuisance businesses and they don't have  
23          Plexiglas and they continue to be  
24          nuisance businesses, and they should be  
25          closed. There are businesses that are

2           not nuisance businesses and they have  
3           Plexiglas, and they should continue not  
4           to deter from complying with the law.

5                        I support Councilwoman Bass's  
6           efforts. Therefore, although I was not  
7           sure about its implementation and I'm not  
8           still sure, but I voted for her nuisance  
9           business law, with the hope and desire  
10          that Councilwoman Bass and all of us  
11          could work to ensure that there was due  
12          process. That unprecedented bill gives  
13          the City the power it never had before  
14          and it is still unfolding right now.  
15          Three strikes and you are out. Three  
16          strikes. It could be loitering. It  
17          could be urination. It could be trash.  
18          Three strikes, with no effort to work  
19          with the police and the community, you  
20          lose your business license. It doesn't  
21          matter what kind of business you are.  
22          And I voted for Councilwoman Bass's bill,  
23          and there was no complaint from the  
24          community, this community. And then as  
25          State Representative Raab pointed to and

2           State Senator Sharif Street alluded to in  
3           testimony, the state promulgated a law,  
4           unprecedented, that the Governor signed  
5           just a few weeks ago with Mayor Kenney  
6           and Council President, many of the  
7           members here, almost every State Rep,  
8           State Senator, and Congressman Dwight  
9           Evans, perhaps others. And that again  
10          gave unprecedented power to the City  
11          indirectly to contact the state and  
12          suspend immediately a business that was  
13          licensed to sell alcohol that was in  
14          violation. And here a third bill is  
15          presented, and I don't -- I have not  
16          heard anyone speak against it, except for  
17          one portion and, that is, taking down  
18          safety glass.

19                    The people who have testified  
20                    have testified about their life and their  
21                    safety. If we pass this bill and L&I  
22                    does, maybe they won't, but so far at  
23                    least in sworn testimony or at least  
24                    testimony -- it's not sworn -- here in a  
25                    hearing, the L&I Commissioner said

1           12/14/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           unequivocally that any restaurant 30  
3           seats or more that sold alcohol that had  
4           Plexiglas or safety glass was in  
5           violation of the Zoning Code, he would  
6           require that they take it down.

7                        If we take down the safety  
8           glass, they're not changing their  
9           business model. They're not moving.  
10          What they will do is purchase firearms.  
11          I think that is a worse situation than  
12          what we have today. If they're in  
13          violation, if they're --

14                        (Applause.)

15                        COUNCILMAN OH: If they're in  
16          violation, if they're not in compliance,  
17          then they should be shut down, and they  
18          have supported these laws, but the reason  
19          they're here today is because they're  
20          concerned for their life, their loved  
21          ones, their customers, and their stores.

22                        I have no problems supporting  
23          anything that has to do with compliance,  
24          closing businesses. If there are 27  
25          stop-and-go's in Councilwoman Bass's

2           district that are in violation, then  
3           close them all. If they're not in  
4           violation, then we cannot close them, but  
5           what I would say is taking down a safety  
6           measure that is purely defensive to me  
7           would increase crime.

8                     I think about the fact that the  
9           store owners who don't have safety glass  
10          are typically armed in these types of  
11          businesses. They don't all have safety  
12          glass. The ones who have safety glass  
13          are not armed, but they are -- they've  
14          put their faith in the safety glass. If  
15          you take it down, they may be armed, and  
16          I think it's a dangerous thing to have a  
17          frightened person with a firearm.

18                    What I would consider in this  
19          situation is to what extent people are  
20          angry and frustrated, even rightfully so,  
21          but I would not expose anyone to harm of  
22          body or life even if they're a nuisance  
23          business. We need to be about shutting  
24          them down, getting them to compliance,  
25          closing them, but I would not expose them

2           or anyone else to the risk that they  
3           would be killed or someone who kills  
4           someone else.

5                     Thank you.

6                     (Applause.)

7                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Thank you, Councilman.

9                     The Chair recognizes Councilman  
10          Taubenberger.

11                    COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

12          Council President, thank you very much.

13          To my colleagues and to the folks that  
14          are here today on both sides of the  
15          issue, this is a gut-wrenching decision.

16          When it comes to personal safety, I'm  
17          very much for personal safety. We all  
18          need it. We want it. We desire it.

19          It's a human right. But to be very blunt  
20          about it, when you run a store where  
21          people are drunk already, that are not  
22          paying attention to rules and regulations  
23          that already exist and, in some cases,  
24          thumb their nose at the whole  
25          procedures, the fact that the Committee

2           on Health, Public Health, that I serve  
3           on, along with colleagues led by  
4           Councilwoman Bass, spent a considerable  
5           amount of time on this very issue. After  
6           reaching that agreement, the fact is it's  
7           a different bill.

8                        Scare tactics have been used  
9           and said the glass is coming out. Well,  
10          when you really look at the language,  
11          it's continued use or removal. So I  
12          think both sides of the issue can discuss  
13          this further.

14                       So after much deliberation,  
15          going out into the field itself, talking  
16          to store owners, talking to neighborhood  
17          representatives, I join Councilwoman Bass  
18          in voting aye for this bill.

19                       (Applause.)

20                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21          Thank you, Councilman.

22                       The Chair recognizes Councilman  
23          Domb.

24                       COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,  
25          Council President. I want to thank

2           Councilwoman Bass for bringing this issue  
3           to light, because it is a problem. And  
4           for those out there attempting to spin  
5           this issue to undermine Councilwoman Bass  
6           or make an attack on her character, it is  
7           wrong and unacceptable, and no one should  
8           tolerate that. I am sorry that that's  
9           happening.

10                   The word "deli" is an  
11           abbreviation from the word  
12           "delicatessen," and I should know that  
13           because I own a delicatessen called  
14           Schlesinger's, and we don't have any  
15           alcohol in this delicatessen or deli. We  
16           have food. We have corned beef, we have  
17           pastrami, we have turkey specials and  
18           latkes right now.

19                   But this week on Tuesday I took  
20           a tour of five of the stop-and-go's in  
21           this area, 2200 North Broad -- and  
22           they're all called delis, by the way --  
23           2856 North 22nd, 2708 West Allegheny,  
24           4523 Wayne, and 4900 Wayne, and I didn't  
25           see any delicatessen that I am familiar

2           with in those locations. What I did see  
3           was selling of alcohol and it's like  
4           liquor stores, and many of them are  
5           violating the laws. In fact, the last  
6           one I went to barely had a menu to order  
7           food from. I went into each one of them  
8           and asked for food.

9                   I'm in favor of this bill, but  
10          my issue is one paragraph and, that is,  
11          letter (g). But I am in favor of the  
12          bill, but not with Paragraph (g) in  
13          there.

14                   I wanted to share with you my  
15          thoughts on this, because I will be  
16          voting no, only because of Paragraph (g).  
17          Everything else I'm 100 percent in  
18          agreement with.

19                   (Applause.)

20                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21          Thank you, Councilman.

22                   Councilwoman, I'm going to call  
23          the other two members first.

24                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
25          Green.

2 COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
3 Council President. I want to thank  
4 Councilwoman Bass for her work on this  
5 legislation. I want to thank  
6 Councilwoman Blackwell for her years of  
7 work on this legislation.

8 As we were in the Public Health  
9 and Human Services Committee, there was a  
10 very rigorous and robust debate regarding  
11 the public safety issue contained in this  
12 legislation, and the compromise that we  
13 worked together on dealt with an  
14 opportunity to have a conversation going  
15 forward to address the public safety  
16 concerns that business owners have but,  
17 at the same point, use this new tool that  
18 was passed in the General Assembly to  
19 really address some of the nuisance  
20 businesses in our communities. And I  
21 think the unfortunate aspect of some  
22 aspects of this debate, that we're losing  
23 the opportunity to discuss and use the  
24 process of using the regulation as a way  
25 to address both sides.

2 One thing that has not been  
3 stated in this conversation as we were  
4 coming up with this compromise, we talked  
5 about other jurisdictions that have  
6 protective glass around a cash register  
7 or a cash area of the business, as well  
8 as having an open area where food is  
9 served. So I think there is an  
10 opportunity here to discuss this issue  
11 through the regulatory process of  
12 drafting regulations to come up with a  
13 process that addresses the public safety  
14 concerns, which are real concerns.  
15 However, the issues that Councilwoman  
16 Bass has raised and others in this body  
17 have raised and people in the communities  
18 throughout Philadelphia have raised over  
19 the years is also very important.

20 So although I've raised this  
21 issue and I know other members have  
22 raised this issue, I'll be supporting  
23 this legislation, but just because I'm  
24 supporting this legislation does not mean  
25 I'm not ignorant of the fact of the

2       public safety concerns, and I think all  
3       the members of this body as well as  
4       others -- I've had numerous conversations  
5       with the Administration on how we work  
6       together on the regulations to address  
7       the public safety concerns on this  
8       matter.

9                       Thank you.

10                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

11       Thank you, Councilman.

12                      (Applause.)

13                      COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   The  
14       Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds  
15       Brown.

16                      COUNCILWOMAN BROWN:   Thank you,  
17       Mr. President.  I too am compelled to  
18       speak out in favor of this bill and state  
19       clearly why.

20                      Councilwoman Bass very  
21       thoughtfully and cautiously and carefully  
22       gave us context.  This is not a  
23       five-year-old problem.  This is not a  
24       ten-year-old issue.  It's a 25-year-old  
25       community issue.  And we live in a world

2           where it's not a perfect world. This is  
3           not a perfect bill. She has stipulated  
4           that.

5                     The good news is that L&I will  
6           be the next arbiter, if you will, police  
7           officer, if you will, that will have an  
8           enormous responsibility to speak to the  
9           number one, number two, number three  
10          issue, the issue of safety.

11                    Councilwoman Bass laid out  
12          very, very carefully that the frequency  
13          and the high volume of these type of  
14          establishments in underserved,  
15          disenfranchised communities is  
16          unacceptable. This is a fix towards or a  
17          remedy towards that reality, but I am --  
18          I'm actually encouraged and lifted by the  
19          passion by which she has approached this  
20          issue.

21                    It's people who look like me  
22          and other poor residents of our  
23          communities who ultimately get the  
24          downside of what this bill signifies. So  
25          kudos to Councilwoman Bass, and thank you

3           stage for an issue that today needs to be  
4           dealt with head on.

5                     Thank you, Mr. President.

6                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7           Thank you, Councilwoman.

8                     (Applause.)

9                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:   The  
10          Chair recognizes Councilwoman  
11          Quinones-Sanchez.

12                    COUNCILWOMAN SANCHEZ:   Thank  
13          you, Mr. President.  I too feel compelled  
14          to add my voice to this, and I want to  
15          thank Councilwoman Bass in particular for  
16          her willingness to work along the  
17          different members of the Committee to get  
18          to a place where we could put forth an  
19          amendment that would help us establish a  
20          process.

21                    Let's talk about process,  
22          because it's hugely important.  Today's  
23          vote is not the end, but it should really  
24          be a continuation of a conversation about  
25          how the City of Philadelphia views our

2 small businesses, our ethnic small  
3 businesses, and how it addresses public  
4 safety and racial issues in our  
5 neighborhoods.

6 Let me say for the record that  
7 I think it is hugely important that the  
8 City and in particular the Department of  
9 Commerce and, as Chair of L&I, the  
10 Department of License and Inspections for  
11 us to move the conversation about what we  
12 don't want and to move the conversation  
13 about what we need.

14 We need an agenda for small  
15 businesses that is thoughtful,  
16 forthright, and helps businesses by  
17 providing them technical assistance as  
18 these business models that we're all  
19 against change and evolve with our  
20 communities. We need to be clear about  
21 incentives for businesses around public  
22 safety, physical location, signage, all  
23 of the things we debate in this Council  
24 floor all the time. And, more  
25 importantly, let us not waste this

2           opportunity to use our Human Relations  
3           Commission and others to have the  
4           deep-rooted conversations that have been  
5           amplified through this debate.

6                        So I want to thank Councilwoman  
7           Bass, Councilwoman Gym, and others who  
8           come forward and say this is not the end  
9           of a conversation, but a commitment for  
10          us to work forward in all neighborhoods  
11          about businesses and how we promote  
12          better relationships. I'm ready for that  
13          challenge, and I look forward to working  
14          with everyone on both sides of this issue  
15          to reach that goal.

16                       Thank you, Mr. President.

17                       COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18           Thank you, Councilwoman.

19                       The Chair recognizes Councilman  
20          Jones.

21                       COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
22          Mr. President. I really got a flashback  
23          when Councilwoman Bass read that  
24          agreement, because I kind of remember in  
25          another life being at the Philadelphia

2           Commercial Development Corporation with  
3           Wilson Goode on 60th Street talking about  
4           these issues when Councilwoman Blackwell  
5           brought it up.

6                   That is not the compelling  
7           reason why I will be supporting you  
8           today. I have other than Council duties,  
9           every now and then I get called on to be  
10          a pop-pop, and my job is to take my  
11          granddaughter from my district to  
12          Mathematics and Science on Broad Street,  
13          and in this particular time, one of my  
14          responsibilities was to get her lunch. I  
15          went in store after store, deli after  
16          deli and could not find a wholesome meal  
17          for my granddaughter. What I did see was  
18          hood wraps right next to the M&M's. What  
19          I did see was a dangerous environment  
20          where people who should have been on  
21          their way to work were on their way to  
22          get a drink.

23                   My granddaughter, everyone's  
24          granddaughter here deserves better than  
25          that, that we deserve what is a thing

2           called customer service. And that when  
3           you make a bet or a wager or a guess when  
4           you walk out of your door, what will you  
5           find first, a vegetable or fruit, a book  
6           or a gun, you're more than likely in many  
7           zip codes to find a gun.

8                         What we have to do is raise our  
9           standards and raise our standards because  
10          we deserve it, raise our standards also  
11          and keep those business partners safe.  
12          But you do that by not building walls.  
13          You do that by building bridges to the  
14          community. Whether you're at 60th and  
15          Market in my district or K&A, you see the  
16          same kind of things happening.

17                        Thank you, Councilwoman Bass,  
18          for forcing us to take a hard look at a  
19          business model.

20                        The final thing is what  
21          Councilwoman Sanchez says. Do not let  
22          this be a missed opportunity to come to  
23          the table to build a better model,  
24          because that's what should be the next  
25          step. We should not be on our way to the

2 gun store. We should be on our way to  
3 the negotiation tables to figure this  
4 thing out.

5 So I will be supporting  
6 Councilwoman Bass.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you, Councilman.

10 The Chair recognizes  
11 Councilwoman Bass.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
13 Mr. President. Number one, I wanted to  
14 thank all of my colleagues and I want to  
15 thank them for those who are supporting  
16 and not supporting the bill, for coming  
17 to my aid regarding any personal attacks,  
18 but I'm a North Philly girl, so I'm good.  
19 I'm not even -- I know who I am, so, you  
20 know, you could say what you want to say.

21 But I do want to say to my  
22 friend David Oh that you can't say that  
23 you're sorry for the attacks that I have  
24 and at the same time give misinformation.  
25 Because one of the things that was stated

2           today was that L&I Commissioner David  
3           Perri, who is an excellent Commissioner,  
4           said he'd remove Plexiglas, and we had  
5           this conversation yesterday. That  
6           statement was made before the compromise.  
7           So we have to put out the correct  
8           information at all times. When we know  
9           better, we have to do better, and we have  
10          a responsibility as members of Council  
11          for making sure that the information as  
12          presented is correct.

13                           (Applause.)

14                   COUNCILWOMAN BASS: So I just  
15           wanted to say that going forward, we need  
16           to stop quoting previous comments that  
17           were made before the compromise, before  
18           the bill was amended, because obviously  
19           what was said before has changed based on  
20           the new legislation.

21                           So thank you.

22                           (Applause.)

23                           COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

24           Thank you, Councilwoman.

25                           Councilman Oh.

2 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very

3 much. I appreciate that, Councilwoman

4 Bass, and let me say that I too have a

5 perspective, perhaps a different one.

6 When we had the hearing, almost 150

7 citizens were turned away, members of the

8 Asian American community. They could not

9 get in the door. They were left outside

10 in the cold, senior citizens and

11 children. They were told they could not

12 sign in. They were told the room was

13 full. They were told they couldn't come

14 up the steps. We didn't know what to do

15 with them. And so we prepared today.

16 When they were up in the

17 balconies, they were told you couldn't

18 show your signs. And when they were at

19 the hearing, they have limited English.

20 And there was an hour break, and this

21 group of business people was hoping for

22 an amendment. The amendment would be to

23 take out the language that would force

24 them to remove their safety glass.

25 (Applause.)

2 COUNCILMAN OH: And what  
3 happened was, the Council Committee came  
4 back and announced the amendment, and  
5 they all applauded. What they didn't  
6 know was that the Council Committee, the  
7 amendment changed the wording but kept  
8 the content. The content is the same,  
9 and whatever conversation the L&I  
10 Commissioner had with anyone, it  
11 certainly wasn't public. It wasn't  
12 recorded, and I didn't hear it.

13 What I do have is his  
14 transcript where he said very clearly  
15 that no restaurant with 30 seats or more  
16 should have safety glass and that he  
17 would take it out, and beyond that, it's  
18 a violation of the Zoning Code. So I'm  
19 pretty sure he intends to take it out.  
20 That may change. That may change. But  
21 what I would say is whether you say the  
22 number ten or you say five plus five,  
23 it's the same thing. And to me, what was  
24 done was language changed, content kept  
25 and it was pushed off on our L&I

2           Commissioner, and the people in this  
3           room, most of them who don't speak  
4           English very well, did not know what  
5           happened, and they left applauding and  
6           clapping.

7                        Now, that's my perspective.  
8           We're talking about working together.  
9           That's the only choice that there is  
10          left, and I hope it's a productive one,  
11          because at the end of the day, I do think  
12          that it is better for us to look forward  
13          how we can work together positively. We  
14          have some sharp differences, but we  
15          should try to come together for the good  
16          of the community.

17                        Thank you.

18                        (Applause.)

19                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

20          Thank you, Councilman.

21                        Councilman Greenlee.

22                        COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Yes.

23          Mr. President, thank you. Listen, I  
24          don't want to keep this debate going. I  
25          think we all know where we're going here,

1           12/14/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           but I have to say with all due respect to  
3           Councilman Oh, I take great disagreement  
4           to say that that amendment basically  
5           meant nothing. I think it was  
6           significant. Again, I'll repeat, if it  
7           was all up to me, I would have taken that  
8           whole section out. Other people had a  
9           difference of opinion.

10                        We did spend an hour  
11           meticulously going over that wording. We  
12           can all have a little -- we could change  
13           words all over the place, but I firmly  
14           believe that there's a huge difference  
15           between saying something is supposed to  
16           come out right away and saying that we're  
17           going to take as much as three years to  
18           try to promote regulations for the use or  
19           removal, use or removal. I think I'm  
20           smart enough to know that's a big  
21           difference between remove the glass. And  
22           I'm not trying to get upset up here, but  
23           I don't think we should miscast work that  
24           this Committee did to try to work this  
25           situation out. So I'll leave it at that.

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2 Thank you, Mr. President.

3 (Applause.)

4 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
5 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Parker.

6 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Thank  
7 you, Mr. President. I too want to lend  
8 my voice in hailing the historic work of  
9 Councilwoman Jannie Blackwell and  
10 Councilwoman Cindy Bass's efforts to move  
11 us forward on this issue.

12 I want to state, Mr. President,  
13 that when we just finished a debate last  
14 year relative to revenue generation in  
15 this city -- and during that time it was  
16 about the beverage tax -- we heard an  
17 argument about the overwhelming impact  
18 that this tax was going to have on  
19 low-income communities, and during that  
20 time, some may remember that I became  
21 visibly frustrated and angered, and I  
22 said every time we're talking about a  
23 low-income community or wherever people  
24 live where there's a lower socioeconomic  
25 status, we are talking about them as if

2 they are consumers. We are never talking  
3 about them from the perspective of why  
4 don't they own the neighborhood corner  
5 stores in the neighborhoods that they  
6 live in.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: With that  
9 being said, I too want to note for the  
10 record that if we allow the opportunity  
11 to re, sort of, encourage and reeducate  
12 people in our neighborhoods about the  
13 importance of accessing ownership and  
14 control of land and businesses in their  
15 community so that they can begin to do  
16 what was done when many of these  
17 neighborhoods were in much better shape  
18 than they are now years ago. It's my  
19 hope that we will look at existing City  
20 resources.

21 Councilwoman Quinones-Sanchez,  
22 I think you hit the nail on the head when  
23 you talked about Commerce, when you  
24 talked about PIDC. We need to make sure  
25 we're using the Community College of

2 Philadelphia's Power Up program that is  
3 free, and any resident in the City of  
4 Philadelphia who is interested in owning  
5 a business, if they have one, if they  
6 want to start one, they can get those  
7 services for free right now.

8 In addition to that, I want to  
9 close and just note that this is about  
10 the dignity of a consumer. Because I  
11 don't care what the socioeconomic status  
12 is in the neighborhoods where the people  
13 who live who patronize these stores are.  
14 Let me dare say this: We live in a  
15 capitalistic society and, listen, if it  
16 didn't make dollars, it wouldn't make  
17 good economic sense to be there for an  
18 individual to own a business or either a  
19 resident to patronize a business. So now  
20 let's hope that citizens in these very  
21 neighborhoods where there are high  
22 concentration of these types of stores,  
23 let's hope that we are directing  
24 resources and information to them so that  
25 they're beginning to think about how can

2 we who live here own the corner store in  
3 the neighborhood that we keep alive  
4 through our tax dollars.

5 Thank you, Mr. President.

6 (Applause.)

7 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8 Thank you, Councilwoman.

9 The Chair again recognizes  
10 Councilman Oh.

11 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
12 much, Council President. I will just say  
13 that, Councilman Greenlee, you and I will  
14 disagree. I respect your perspective,  
15 but I can read and I am an attorney and I  
16 do have my own opinion. So we'll just  
17 disagree on that fact.

18 I will also say that many of  
19 the store owners do live in the  
20 community, and if they are in fact  
21 running a business that is poorly managed  
22 or hurtful, then they should be closed,  
23 and that has been my point.

24 The vote we're going to take  
25 has to do with just the issue of whether

2           or not the safety glass will stay up or  
3           come down, and the Councilmembers have, I  
4           believe at this point in time, all come  
5           to a conclusion, but I do see, as was  
6           said by many people, particularly in  
7           support of Councilwoman Bass's bill, that  
8           there is misunderstanding.

9                   I would like to point out that  
10          many of the people who own businesses  
11          have no other employment opportunities.  
12          They don't have a retirement plan. And  
13          the businesses are oftentimes barely  
14          profitable, if profitable.

15                   (Audience member talking.)

16                   COUNCILMAN OH: So you can open  
17          one. Go ahead. You can open one, get  
18          your money together, go open one and work  
19          the hours.

20                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Yo,  
21          yo, yo, yo.

22                   COUNCILMAN OH: And you'll make  
23          all that money --

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
25          We're not having that.

2                   COUNCILMAN OH:  -- working  
3 those hours.

4                   So it's easy to look at others  
5 and imagine that their life is easier and  
6 better, and for that resentment that you  
7 have, you would like to take down --

8                   (Audience member talking.)

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
10 Excuse me, Councilman Oh.

11                   COUNCILMAN OH:  -- their  
12 protective measures.

13                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  Let  
14 people talk.

15                   COUNCILMAN OH:  So that's for  
16 you to find out.

17                   What I will say is that when I  
18 hear people say things that I believe is  
19 one of the basis for their frustration,  
20 that I would say that it is not correct;  
21 that the businesses that barely make any  
22 money, they generally have one or two  
23 people working the stores, usually a  
24 family member, and the businesses that  
25 can hire do hire.  And not every store

2           that is Asian owned has the name Garden  
3           Dragon or chains. There are many  
4           Asian-owned businesses that hire many  
5           people in the community. They don't have  
6           a name that you would recognize as Asian  
7           because they have -- they were born in  
8           America. They're successful. Those  
9           resources are put into the community.  
10          Those jobs are created. And in that  
11          process, I think it is important that we  
12          do get to know each other.

13                         Thank you.

14                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

15          Thank you, Councilman.

16                         (Applause.)

17                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

18          Councilman Taubenberger.

19                         COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank  
20          you very much. I just want to reiterate  
21          what Councilman Greenlee said. I was  
22          there as well. We worked very hard on a  
23          compromise, very, very, very, very hard,  
24          and continued use or removal, the word  
25          "continued use" was never in the original

1           12/14/17 - STATED - 2ND READING  
2           bill. It is now because the Committee  
3           worked together. And I'm going to have  
4           to be very blunt about this. Continued  
5           misinformation that Councilman Oh has  
6           given does neither side any good.

7                        I thank you very much.
