2 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
3 morning, everyone.

4 (Good morning.)

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
6 good to be back. School is in.

7 We've established a quorum.

8 I'd ask all the guests and visitors, if  
9 they can retire behind the rail. If the  
10 members will take their seats, we'll get  
11 started.

12 Before we start, because I see  
13 we have some new guests today, if you  
14 have a cell phone or any other type of  
15 electronic device, I will ask that you  
16 please turn it off or turn it on airplane  
17 mode. Bottom line is, please don't make  
18 any noise. Thank you so much for your  
19 cooperation.

20 To give our invocation this  
21 morning, the Chair recognizes Pastor  
22 Steven Avinger, Sr., of Greater St.  
23 Matthew Baptist Church. He is here today  
24 as the guest of Councilwoman Bass.

5                   PASTOR AVINGER:   Father God,  
6           creator of the universe and sustainer of  
7           everything in earth and heaven, we come  
8           this morning thanking you for your  
9           keeping power and both your grace and  
10          mercies that emanates from your throne.

11                   We ask your richest blessings  
12          upon this day and upon these proceedings.  
13          Bless these, your servants of the people,  
14          and as they deliberate over the people's

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9 Thank you again, Pastor.

10 The next order of business is  
11 the approval of the Journal of the  
12 meeting of Thursday, December 14, 2017.

13 The Chair recognizes Councilman  
14 Greenlee.

15 COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Thank  
16 you, Mr. President. I move that the  
17 Journal of the meeting of Thursday,

20 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

21 Thank you. It has been moved and  
22 properly seconded that the Journal of the

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

4 Those opposed?

5 (No response.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
7 ayes have it, and the Journal is

9 The next order of business is  
10 requests for leaves of absence, and the  
11 Chair recognizes Councilman Henon.

12 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,  
13 Mr. President. On behalf of the  
14 majority, there are no requests of leave  
15 of absence today.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17 Thank you.

18 I'm sorry. I seem to be having  
19 a little smoke going on up here at this  
20 light. I better turn this off.

21 Okay. Had a little technical  
22 difficulty.

23 Councilman Henon, I'm sorry.  
24 We got a little distracted by the smoke  
25 coming out of the light.

2                   COUNCILMAN HENON:

3           Mr. President, on behalf of the majority,  
4           there are no requests of leave of absence  
5           today.

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
7           Chair thanks the gentleman.

8                   And the Chair recognizes  
9           Councilman O'Neill.

10                  COUNCILMAN O'NEILL: Thank you,  
11           Mr. President. On behalf of the  
12           republicans, there are no requests for  
13           leave of absence.

14                  COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
15           Chair thanks the gentleman.

16                  At this time, I would like to  
17           dispense with the regular order of  
18           business and I would like to welcome and  
19           thank everyone who has taken time out of  
20           their busy day to come down to witness  
21           their government in action. We hope your  
22           stay here today is a knowledgeable one  
23           but, more importantly, a pleasurable one,  
24           so much so that you come back again. So  
25           thank you so much for being here today.

2                   At this time, the Chair  
3           recognizes Councilman Jones, who will  
4           present a resolution recognizing what I  
5           call is my hero as it relates to  
6           knowledge of sports, Ray Didinger. Would  
7           Mr. Didinger and those accompanying him  
8           please join the Councilman at the podium.

9                   (Councilmembers and guests  
10           approached podium.)

11                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
12           joining Councilman Jones, we have  
13           Councilman Greenlee, Councilman Green,  
14           Councilman Johnson, Councilwoman Reynolds  
15           Brown, and Councilman Taubenberger and  
16           Councilwoman Parker.

17                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Although we  
18           have certain presenters, could I ask all  
19           members of Council to join us up here  
20           even if you do not have a written part at  
21           this point, but come on up anyway,  
22           because we don't know the next time we  
23           may be on the precipice of winning the  
24           Super Bowl. So I want us to memorialize  
25           this with all members.

2 (Applause.)

3 COUNCILMAN JONES: Come on up.

4 So come on up, and I thank my colleagues  
5 for joining me.

6 So there are many things that  
7 qualify you as a Philadelphian. There's  
8 cheese steaks, there's water ice, there's  
9 soft pretzels, there's playing in the  
10 fire plugs during the summer, Piccadilly,  
11 but there's also Ray Didinger. And not  
12 to be confused with Big Ray, who is his  
13 grandfather, or Little Ray, his father,  
14 who was bigger than the grandfather, or  
15 Young Ray, who he was called growing up  
16 in a bar in Southwest Philadelphia, but  
17 we're talking about Ray, the  
18 Philadelphian, who has bled with us in  
19 our wins, cried with us in our losses,  
20 but managed never, ever, ever to lie to  
21 us about the level of proficiency of our  
22 sports teams.

23 So, therefore, it is truly an  
24 honor to recognize a Philadelphian today.  
25 He is an author. He's a sportsman. He

2           is a person who never lies. He doesn't  
3           lie. He won't tell you everything he may  
4           know about the running back situation or  
5           the cornerbacks, but he will never lie  
6           and, therefore, it brings us comfort. It  
7           brings us encouragement when we are about  
8           to win. It brings us comfort if we ever  
9           lose, and he is a consistent sports voice  
10          and Philadelphian.

11                        So, therefore, we are here to  
12          honor Ray Didinger for his -- recognizing  
13          and honoring Ray Didinger for being  
14          inducted into the Broadcast Pioneers Hall  
15          of Fame.

16                                (Appause.)

17                        COUNCILMAN GREENLEE: Whereas,  
18          Ray Didinger, a member of the Pro  
19          Football Hall of Fame, is a prominent  
20          sportswriter and commentator, and a  
21          resident of the East Falls Neighborhood  
22          of Philadelphia.

23                                Yeah, the Fourth Councilmanic  
24          District. Yes, that's right. Yeah,  
25          yeah, yeah.

2                   COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: And

3       whereas, Didinger is a 1968 graduate of

4       Temple University and a member of the

5       Temple University School of

6       Communications Hall of Fame. He wrote

7       for the Philadelphia Bulletin and the

8       Daily News for more than 30 years;

9                   COUNCILMAN DOMB: Whereas, Ray

10       Didinger was named "Pennsylvania

11       Sportswriter of the Year" five times by

12       the National Sportswriters and

13       Sportscasters Association. In 1995, he

14       won the Dick McCann Award for his long

15       and distinguished career of pro-football

16       and his name was added to the Writers

17       Honor Roll in the Pro Football Hall of

18       Fame in Canton, Ohio. Ray Didinger's

19       work also earned him six Emmy Awards as a

20       producer and writer with NFL Films; and

21                   COUNCILMAN GREEN: Whereas,

22       Didinger is the author of 11 books,

23       including three best-sellers: The New

24       Eagles Encyclopedia, One Last Read and

25       The Ultimate Book of Sports Movies. In

2 2016, Didinger wrote his first play:

3 Tommy and Me. The play was performed

4 locally by Theatre Exile; and

5 COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,

6 Didinger is the first print journalist

7 inducted into the Philadelphia Sports

8 Hall of Fame. He is a host on 94WIP All

9 Sports Radio in Philadelphia and he is a

10 football analyst on NBC Sports

11 Philadelphia Eagles Pre-Game Live and

12 Post-Game Live Shows; and

13 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER:

14 Whereas, in 2017, Ray Didinger's famed

15 career was further memorialized when he

16 was inducted into the Broadcast Pioneers

17 Hall of Fame -- and that was reported on

18 by WIP, Angelo Cataldi this morning --

19 and now, therefore, be it

20 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Resolved,

21 by the Council of the City of

22 Philadelphia, that it hereby recognizes

23 and honors Ray Didinger for being

24 inducted into the Broadcast Pioneers Hall

25 of Fame.

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2 Further resolved, that an  
3 engrossed copy of this resolution be  
4 presented to Ray Didinger as evidence of  
5 the sincere appreciation and admiration  
6 of this legislative body.

7 Congratulations.

8 (Applause.)

9 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
10 the Chair recognizes Mr. Didinger for  
11 remarks.

12 (Applause.)

13 (Councilman Jones and  
14 Councilman Johnson put on "underdog"  
15 masks.

16 MR. DIDINGER: You know, that's  
17 a good look for you. Councilman Jones, I  
18 like that.

19 Well, I think this kind of  
20 tells the story of what this season has  
21 been about and what yet remains to be  
22 done. I think you're going to see quite  
23 a few of these in Minneapolis in two  
24 weeks.

25 I've worked in the media for

2 almost half a century, and over the  
3 years, many of my colleagues have said,  
4 Wouldn't you rather be in news? I mean,  
5 all you do is just cover games, as if  
6 somehow that's not meaningful or  
7 important. Well, after seeing what we  
8 saw Sunday at Lincoln Financial Field and  
9 later in the streets of our fair city, I  
10 defy you to say what we're witnessing  
11 with the Eagles is just a game. Clearly,  
12 it's much more than that.

13 If all you see are numbers on a  
14 scoreboard, then you're missing the point  
15 and what is the true essence and beauty  
16 of sports; that is, its ability to lift  
17 us up and bring us together.

18 In a world where so many things  
19 divide us, where we are disconnected  
20 physically and emotionally, there's  
21 something magical in seeing thousands of  
22 Eagles fans, young and old, rich and  
23 poor, black and white, all with their  
24 faces painted green, standing arm in arm  
25 and singing Fly, Eagles Fly.

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2 The thing I've always loved  
3 about sports is the teamwork, and when  
4 that teamwork extends to an entire city  
5 or an entire region, as we're seeing now,  
6 it's a wondrous thing that allows us all  
7 to stand a little taller and closer  
8 together.

9 The Irish philosopher, Francis  
10 Hutcheson, once said, That action is  
11 best, which procures the greatest  
12 happiness for the greatest numbers. He  
13 said that centuries ago, but he might  
14 have said it Sunday night hanging from  
15 the top of a traffic light right out  
16 there on Broad Street.

17 I was still new to the  
18 newspaper business in 1974 when as a  
19 reporter for the Philadelphia Bulletin I  
20 covered the Flyers' first Stanley Cup  
21 parade. I rode in the parade sitting  
22 next to Joe Watson, Sr., the father of  
23 Joe and Jimmy Watson. He was a butcher  
24 from Smithers, British Columbia,  
25 population 300, and he came to

2 Philadelphia to see his sons win the  
3 Stanley Cup. As he rode through the  
4 streets gazing out at two million  
5 cheering fans, he said, I didn't know  
6 there were this many people in the world.

7 I'll always remember that  
8 moment, that emotion that made a humble  
9 butcher from British Columbia and the  
10 people of Philadelphia feel as one. To  
11 me, that's meaningful. To me, that is  
12 important, and that's why after all these  
13 years I still love my job covering games.

14 I want to thank you, Councilman  
15 Jones, for this wonderful honor. To  
16 stand here in this historic Chamber and  
17 accept this proclamation is something  
18 very special indeed.

19 Thank you all very much, and I  
20 hope to see you back here in two weeks  
21 for a Super Bowl parade.

22 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: All  
23 right.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Councilman Jones, did you get one for our  
14 good friend in the media with the Dallas  
15 Cowboy hat on?

16 I'm sorry. I couldn't help  
17 myself.

18 Thank you so much. Go Eagles.

19 At this time, the Chair  
20 recognizes Councilman Green, who will  
21 present a resolution recognizing the  
22 Philadelphia Alumni Chapter of Kappa  
23 Alpha Psi Fraternity. Would Daryl  
24 Stephens and those accompanying him  
25 please join the Councilman at the podium.

2                   (Councilmembers and guests  
3 approached podium.)

4                   COUNCILMAN GREEN: On January  
5 5th, 1911, ten astute young men on the  
6 campus of Indiana University founded an  
7 institution unparalleled in the history  
8 of collegiate life. I know my colleagues  
9 to my left will understand what I'm  
10 talking about.

11                   Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity was  
12 based on achievement in every field of  
13 human endeavor, as you listen to our  
14 opening sermon in front of Reverend  
15 Dr. Steven Avinger, a member of this  
16 august body, Reverend Dr. Leon Sullivan,  
17 in the political realm former Mayors  
18 Wilson Goode, John Street, State  
19 Representative Stephen Kinsey, State  
20 Senator Sharif Street, and a former  
21 member of this body, Councilman George  
22 Burrell, all members of Kappa Alpha Psi,  
23 Incorporated, as well as the men behind  
24 me who are about achievement in every  
25 field of human endeavor and also someone

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2 who is my mentor, my father, Walter  
3 Green.

4 So it brings me great pleasure  
5 to present this resolution this morning,  
6 and there's a close connection between  
7 the City of Philadelphia and Kappa Alpha  
8 Psi Fraternity, Incorporated. The  
9 Philadelphia Alumni Chapter was founded  
10 here May 25th, 1922 by one of our  
11 founders, John Milton Lee. And if you  
12 look up Broad Street, you will see our  
13 international headquarters, and we'll be  
14 coming back to you with our conclave in  
15 2019.

16 So it's with great pride to  
17 present this resolution recognizing the  
18 Philadelphia Alumni Chapter on the  
19 occasion of the 107th Annual Founders'  
20 Day of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity,  
21 Incorporated.

22 COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Whereas,  
23 on January the 5th, 1911, on the campus  
24 of Indiana University at Bloomington,  
25 Indiana, Elder Watson Diggs, John Milton

2           Lee, Byron K. Armstrong, Guy Levis Grant,  
3           Ezra D. Alexander, Henry T. Asher, Marcus  
4           P. Blakemore, Paul W. Caine, Edward G.

6           Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated;  
7           and

8                         Whereas, through their vision,  
9           these ten astute men founded a college  
10          fraternity now comprised of functioning  
11          Undergraduate and Alumni Chapters on  
12          campuses and in cities throughout this  
13          nation and the world and through that  
14          seed, a fraternal tree was grown whose  
15          fruit of membership is available to, and  
16          now enjoyed by, over 150,000 college men,  
17          regardless of race, religion, or national  
18          origin; and

19                        COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Whereas,  
20          from its origin through today, Kappa  
21          Alpha Psi Fraternity is a unique  
22          organization in that its members share a  
23          common purpose of achievement in every  
24          field of human endeavor and this unified  
25          purpose is exemplified every day by its

2           members in Congress, city halls,  
3           courtrooms, boardrooms, newsrooms,  
4           classrooms, concert halls, film and  
5           recording studios, physicians' offices,  
6           athletic fields, fields of combat,

8                         Whereas, in addition to the  
9           achievement of its members, Kappa Alpha  
10          Psi Fraternity is dedicated to training  
11          for both leadership through its various  
12          programs, including the A-Man Initiative,  
13          Achievement Academy, Guide Right, Kappa  
14          Kamp, and Kappa League has mentored  
15          hundreds of young men into the past,  
16          current, and future leaders of our  
17          country; and

18                        COUNCILWOMAN PARKER: Whereas,  
19          members of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity  
20          have a long commitment to serving the  
21          common person and, through this  
22          commitment, have provided substantial  
23          support to St. Jude Children's Research  
24          Hospital, United Negro College Fund,  
25          Habitat for Humanity, and several other

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2           nationwide and grassroots community  
3           service initiatives around the world; and

4                       Whereas, Kappa Alpha Psi  
5           Fraternity and the City of Philadelphia  
6           share a special bond in that the  
7           Fraternity's international headquarters  
8           is located in Philadelphia and,  
9           historically, the Greater Philadelphia  
10          Region has been home to hundreds of  
11          members in both the Undergraduate and  
12          Alumni Chapters; now, therefore, be it

13                      COUNCILMAN GREEN: Resolved, by  
14          the Council of the City of Philadelphia,  
15          that we hereby recognize the Philadelphia  
16          Alumni Chapter on the occasion of its  
17          107th Annual Founders' Day of Kappa Alpha  
18          Psi Fraternity, Incorporated.

19                      Further resolved, that an  
20          engrossed copy of this resolution be  
21          presented to Daryl Stephens, Polemarch of  
22          the Philadelphia Alumni Chapter of Kappa  
23          Alpha Psi Fraternity, Incorporated, as  
24          evidence of the sincere admiration and  
25          respect of this legislative body.

3 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: And  
4 the Chair recognizes Mr. Stephens for  
5 remarks.

6 MR. STEPHENS: To Council  
7 President Darrell Clarke and the members  
8 of City Council, thank you for your  
9 acknowledgment of the Philadelphia Alumni  
10 Chapter of Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity,  
11 Incorporated, with this resolution.

12 Since 1911, members of Kappa  
13 Alpha Psi have achieved in every field of  
14 human endeavor. While our motto is  
15 achievement, we realize how important it  
16 is that Kappas help others achieve as  
17 well. For example, the Philadelphia  
18 Alumni Chapter Achievement Academy  
19 mentors over 75 young men from middle to  
20 high school every year in Germantown at  
21 our Achievement Center as part of our  
22 national Guide Right Initiative.

23 Members of the Philadelphia  
24 Alumni Chapter have a long legacy of  
25 indelible achievement. Members include

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2 the first two African American Mayors of  
3 the City of Philadelphia in Brother  
4 Dr. Reverend W. Wilson Goode and Brother  
5 John Street, Esquire.

6 In addition, we can point to  
7 the accomplishments of the late Brother  
8 Dr. Reverend Leon Sullivan, founder of  
9 OIC and the author of the Sullivan  
10 Principles aimed at ending apartheid in  
11 South Africa.

12 We serve at the legislative  
13 level in City Hall currently with Brother  
14 Councilman Derek Green and in the past  
15 with the late Brother Cecil B. Moore, in  
16 Harrisburg with Brother State Senator  
17 Brother Sharif Street, Esquire, and State  
18 Representative Brother Stephen Kinsey.

19 In July of 2019, Kappa Alpha  
20 Psi will hold our national conclave here  
21 in the City of Brotherly Love. We expect  
22 that our members and their families will  
23 pump millions of dollars into the local  
24 economy. We anticipate that Kappas will  
25 paint the town in crimson and cream.

10          moving forward in addressing the issue of  
11          youth gun violence here in the City of  
12          Philadelphia. As Chair of the Special  
13          Committee on Gun Violence, I work closely  
14          with partners across the City of  
15          Philadelphia on better coordination and  
16          planning for gun violence prevention.  
17          This is not an easy task.

18                       A leading partner in the newly  
19          formed Office of Violence Prevention,  
20          which has been reexamining the City's  
21          violence prevention approach from the  
22          ground up, I have full faith in the  
23          office Director, Shondell Revell, but I  
24          have become convinced that they need  
25          additional capacity in order to succeed

3 I want to thank you, Council  
4 President, today for working to bring the  
5 \$200,000 to the Managing Director's

10 prioritizing how we address the issue of  
11 youth gun violence here in the City of  
12 Philadelphia. These funds will build on  
13 other important gun violence prevention  
14 steps the City has taken recently,  
15 including the Police Department new gun  
16 violence suppression unit. You know last  
17 year we had entered the year with over  
18 317 homicides here in the City of  
19 Philadelphia. So that should not go  
20 under the radar. There is a new task  
21 force to specifically go after guns. And  
22 also the Law Department's lawsuit to  
23 ensure timely reporting of the national  
24 database for gun background checks and  
25 the Health Department's anti-gun violence

3 This is one small step in our  
4 efforts to address the issue of youth gun

11 to thank you for your leadership and your  
12 partnership, and I also want to thank the  
13 Chairperson of the Committee on Public  
14 Safety, who is also working diligently  
15 and closely with me to address this

17 as we move closer to the budget process,  
18 then that's really where the rubber is  
19 going to hit the road as we advocate for

12 being no bills on the First Reading

13 Calendar today, the Chair recognizes

14 Councilman Henon for the purpose of

15 calling up bills and resolutions on the

16 Final Passage Calendar today.

17 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you,

18 Mr. President. The following resolutions

19 and bills are being called up for Second

20 Reading and Final Passage on today's

21 Calendars: Bill Nos. 171135, 171136,

22 171140, 170850-A, 170961, 170955, 170997.

23 All other resolutions and bills are being

24 held at this time.

25 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you, Councilman.

3 Before considering these  
4 resolutions and bills, we will have our  
5 public comment session. Our public  
6 comment session will go as follows:

7 If you have an interest in  
8 testifying on a bill or resolution on  
9 today's Final Passage Calendar, if you  
10 have not already done so, you may sign up  
11 at the table to my left.

12 When your name is called, you  
13 will go to the middle of the Council  
14 Chambers. There's a podium. There's a  
15 device on that podium. When the light  
16 turns green, it will be your time to  
17 speak. When the light turns yellow, you  
18 will have 30 seconds to conclude your  
19 remarks. When the light turns red, we  
20 would ask you to please adhere to our  
21 guidelines and conclude your remarks.  
22 You will have three minutes to testify.  
23 Thank you very much for your anticipated  
24 cooperation.

25 Mr. Decker, please call the

3 CHIEF CLERK: Aileen Callaghan.

4 (No response.)

5 CHIEF CLERK: Aileen Callaghan.

6 (No response.)

7 CHIEF CLERK: Jerome Dorsey,

8 commenting on 171138.

9 (Witness approached podium.)

10 MR. DORSEY: Good day,

11 everyone, Council President Clarke and

12 City Council members and everyone else in

13 attendance.

14 In October of last year, I was

15 arrested by the Philadelphia Police

16 Department, actually with no evidence. A

17 warrant was sent out from the District

18 Attorney's Office. No evidence. This is

19 in reference to Curtis Jones' resolution

20 to reform bail here in the City of

21 Philadelphia.

22 So that occurred. I didn't

23 think much of it. I said okay, all

24 right. I'll get an opportunity to prove

25 my innocence that had nothing to do with

2 anything. However, I was given an  
3 excessive bail.

4 You know, when you get locked  
5 up, I don't know if anybody -- how many  
6 people have been locked up. That was  
7 actually my first time. They take your  
8 cell phone. You can't remember a number.  
9 The only number I could remember was my  
10 mother's number. She called a friend of  
11 mine, and they got in touch with the  
12 Community Bail Fund. I mean, a \$30,000  
13 bail, that's a lot of money. And  
14 particularly I couldn't get in contact  
15 with anybody.

16 But I'd just like to read  
17 something, current initiatives to reform  
18 bail in Pennsylvania. In Pennsylvania,  
19 State Senator Daylin Leach, Minority  
20 Chair of the Senate Judiciary Committee,  
21 has announced his intention to introduce  
22 legislation to end pretrial detention for  
23 failure to pay bail. We are enclosing  
24 his co-sponsorship memos.

25 New Philadelphia Mayor Jim

2           Kenney has said that his committee to  
3           reform Philadelphia's bail system and  
4           holding fewer people for pretrial, the  
5           City of Philadelphia has recently awarded  
6           a \$3.5 million grant from the MacArthur  
7           Foundation to find ways to reduce the  
8           county jail population by 34 percent over  
9           the next three years, and ending cash  
10          bail will be essential in reaching and  
11          hopefully exceeding his goal.

12                         Thank you.

13                         COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you  
14          for your testimony.

15                         Clerk, would you please read  
16          our next person to testify today.

17                         CHIEF CLERK: Joshua Glenn,  
18          commenting on 171138.

19                         (Witness approached podium.)

20                         MR. GLENN: How y'all doing?  
21          My name is Joshua Glenn. I'm a member of  
22          the No215Jail Coalition. I'm also a  
23          member of the Coalition for a Just  
24          District Attorney, also the co-founder of  
25          the Youth Art and Self-Empowerment

2           Project, and I'm also a member of the  
3           Philadelphia Reentry Think Tank.

4                        I was signed up to speak on the  
5           Bill 171138, but I actually want to speak  
6           on the bill or the resolution that Curtis  
7           Jones is producing about ending cash bail  
8           in Philadelphia. And I also see ways  
9           that in the cash bail, it's kind of  
10          connected to the mental health stuff too.  
11          I believe that if people aren't held  
12          pretrial on cash bails, then they won't  
13          be in prison and they won't have to deal  
14          with their mental health issues in  
15          prison. Especially I don't think they  
16          should have to deal with them in there,  
17          because the prisons aren't really fit to  
18          deal with the mental health issues. I  
19          think they should be in mental health  
20          facilities.

21                       But to go into my story, at the  
22          age of 16, I was locked up and charged as  
23          an adult and I was held in adult prison  
24          pretrial for 18 months until my case was  
25          eventually dismissed due to lack of

2           evidence. When I got out, I mean, there  
3           were so many barriers in my way for me to  
4           get back on track. So when I got out,  
5           one, I couldn't get a job. Even though I  
6           wasn't convicted of the crime, I couldn't  
7           get a job, because every time I would try  
8           to go and try to apply for a job, it  
9           would come up that I was arrested and  
10          charged as an adult. So that would stop  
11          me from getting employment.

12                        Also the 18 months that I was  
13          locked up, my family split up. I ended  
14          up having to go into a foster home, and  
15          it was a really hard process for me. The  
16          only reason I'm here today and the only  
17          reason I'm here and representing all  
18          these organizations in doing such amazing  
19          work is because of the support that I  
20          had, and I think that we need to shift  
21          the culture of what punishment means. We  
22          need to create more programs that help  
23          people change their lives upon their  
24          release. We need to create more programs  
25          that support people during their

2 incarceration and after their  
3 incarceration so that they can change  
4 their lives.

5 One, we need to end cash bail.  
6 Cash bail has been used as a tool to hold  
7 people in jail for long periods of time  
8 and to get them to plea out. To tell the  
9 story about my situation again, I mean,  
10 on my trial date, my public defender came  
11 in and told me, he said, Look, you're  
12 going to lose this case. He said,  
13 They're giving you time served. You can  
14 get out today. I think you should take  
15 this deal.

16 I didn't take the deal, you  
17 know. I said, No. I didn't do it. I'm  
18 not taking the deal, and then I ended up  
19 beating the case. And standing right  
20 next to me, the same attorney that just  
21 lied to me and said I was going to lose,  
22 it's hard, and that happens to people  
23 every day because this cash bail system.

24 Also, it's not fair. You know,  
25 it doesn't have anything to do with

2           public safety. It doesn't make our  
3           public any more safer. If a person can  
4           afford to get out, they can get out and  
5           it doesn't make our community any more  
6           safe.

7                        And so we need to really end  
8           cash bail and we need to figure out a way  
9           to create programs that address the root  
10          causes of why people are committing  
11          crimes in the first place.

12                       Thank you. That's my time. I  
13          can still talk, but that's my time.

14                       COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.  
15                       (Applause.)

16                       COUNCILMAN HENON: Clerk, our  
17          next speaker, please.

18                       CHIEF CLERK: Cara Tratner,  
19          commenting on 171138.

20                       (Witness approached podium.)

21                       MS. TRATNER: Hi. Good  
22          morning, everyone. My name is Cara  
23          Tratner. I'm here to speak on the same  
24          bill and same issue as Josh Glenn and  
25          also Jerome Dorsey who started. I'm from

2           the No215Jail Coalition and the  
3           Philadelphia Community Bail Fund. I feel  
4           lucky to be one of the organizers of the  
5           Community Bail Fund because I'm one of  
6           the people who has the opportunity to go  
7           into the jails and speak with the folks  
8           who we're able to post bail for. So as  
9           the Community Bail Fund, we pay bail for  
10          people who can't afford bail because they  
11          and their families don't have the means  
12          to afford it. And in those  
13          conversations -- so I'm here to speak  
14          about the resolution that Councilman  
15          Jones is putting forward today as well  
16          about ending cash bail in Philadelphia.  
17          And I just wanted to share a little of my  
18          experience with the Bail Fund, because in  
19          those meetings when I go and meet with  
20          individuals, when we go to let them know  
21          the decision that we're able to post  
22          their bail, often what happens is I am  
23          holding someone's hand and they're crying  
24          with me and telling me, I never thought I  
25          was going to go home. I had no idea how

2 I was going to get home. My family  
3 didn't have the money to pay. And Jerome  
4 is an example, the first man who spoke  
5 today. He wouldn't be here today to  
6 speak with you all if we weren't able to  
7 post his bail, because he would still be  
8 in jail, because he's still awaiting  
9 trial.

10 So there's another individual  
11 who we posted bail for by the name of  
12 Carlette, who was sitting in jail for 14  
13 months, over a year, just waiting for  
14 court. Never met -- she never even saw  
15 her attorney's face in that entire 14  
16 months that she was sitting in jail  
17 because of an unaffordable bail until we  
18 posted her bail.

19 So these are just a couple  
20 examples. We've bailed out 30 people now  
21 in this way. But as proud as I am of the  
22 work we're doing, I'm also infuriated  
23 that we need to exist. It shouldn't be  
24 on the hands of volunteers like myself  
25 who are raising money from our own

2 communities and from communities in this  
3 city to pay unaffordable bail to give  
4 people their freedom. And right now bail  
5 is being used in a way that not only we  
6 know is unconstitutional and illegal,  
7 even by the rules of the own FJD and by  
8 the Supreme Court hearing, which says  
9 detention should be a carefully limited  
10 exception, and right now detention is the  
11 rule in this city. Detention is the  
12 default that's being used, and  
13 unaffordable bail is a strategy that's  
14 being used to keep people in jail and to  
15 detain them before trial.

16 So we're here to urge City  
17 Council to support the resolution, that  
18 we applaud Councilman Jones for putting  
19 forward this resolution, and we believe  
20 that Council has some power in this. We  
21 know that it's a statewide change that  
22 would need to be made to eliminate bail,  
23 but we also know that budget hearings are  
24 coming up and we know that there's ways  
25 that City Council can work with the FJD,

2           can put pressure on the First Judicial  
3           District and the DA's Office to make  
4           changes that would actually end the money  
5           bail system and, importantly to us, would  
6           stop holding people pretrial, not just on  
7           money but for no means, would actually  
8           make detention a last resort.

9                        So we thank you for your time.

10                       (Applause.)

11                       COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

12                       Clerk, our next speaker,

13           please.

14                       CHIEF CLERK: ArJun Malik,

15           commenting on 171138.

16                       (Witness approached podium.)

17                       MR. MALIK: I'm also here to

18           speak about the resolution that

19           Councilman Jones put forward. Thank you,

20           Councilman Jones, for your resolution on

21           ending cash bail. My name is ArJun

22           Malik. I'm speaking on behalf of the

23           Philadelphia Bail Fund, which has a

24           similar goal to the Community Bail Fund.

25           We post bail for people who cannot afford

2           it, and our goal is to vigorously  
3           advocate for the end of cash bail in  
4           Philadelphia.

5                        Bail funds can only do so much,  
6           but we need structural change in the  
7           City, and I have three points on that  
8           today. So the first is if Council is  
9           serious about ending money bail in the  
10          City, it needs to put pressure on the FJD  
11          and the Municipal Court. Oftentimes the  
12          discussion on bail reform focuses on the  
13          State Legislature, and that's great, but  
14          the Municipal Court in Philadelphia has  
15          great power, discretionary power, over  
16          setting people's bail.

17                       The state legislation, as it  
18          stands today, it provides multiple  
19          options for release on one's own  
20          recognizance, on non-monetary conditions,  
21          on unsecured money bail. So, in other  
22          words, it provides all of these options  
23          that do not require people to pay for  
24          their pretrial freedom. So it is  
25          completely up to the discretion of the

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1           1/25/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           Municipal Court to decide on what options  
3           will be selected in different cases. So  
4           if the majority of the Municipal Court  
5           judges and the President Judge of the  
6           Municipal Court committed to a set of  
7           guidelines that reduced or eliminated the  
8           use of cash bail, they would be  
9           implemented almost immediately. So  
10          Philadelphia does not need to wait for  
11          the Legislature to act on this issue.  
12          The City can do so itself through the  
13          Municipal Court.

14                    The second point I wanted to  
15                    make was on the early bail review  
16                    program, which many people have heard of,  
17                    which has been implemented through the  
18                    MacArthur program. The program is a step  
19                    in the right direction, but I want to  
20                    point out two major flaws that Council  
21                    should focus on. First, early bail  
22                    review hearings only happen five days  
23                    after someone is arraigned. Five days is  
24                    far too long. Five days in pretrial  
25                    detention, especially for people in

2 poverty, means the loss of employment,  
3 means the loss of housing, and even the  
4 loss of custody over children. And  
5 studies have found that just three days  
6 in pretrial detention cause high rates of  
7 recidivism and high rates of failure to  
8 appear.

9 Second, early bail review today  
10 only covers a small subset of the cases  
11 that come before the court. Council  
12 needs to work towards expanding EBR  
13 hearings and making sure they happen in a  
14 much more timely manner.

15 And, finally, I want to make  
16 the point that Philadelphia's -- well,  
17 I'm out of time, but Philadelphia's  
18 regime of pretrial detention violates  
19 some basic constitutional principles that  
20 we need to look to, including the right  
21 to have legal counsel.

22 Thank you.

23 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

24 (Applause.)

25 COUNCILMAN HENON: Clerk, could

2 you please read the name of our next  
3 speaker, please.

4 CHIEF CLERK: Wayne Jacobs,  
5 commenting on 171138.

6 (Witness approached podium.)

7 MR. JACOBS: Good morning,  
8 Council, and thank you for giving me this  
9 opportunity. I know Council is going to  
10 do the right thing in terms of passing  
11 this initiative, and I'd like for Council  
12 to look at this initiative as not so much  
13 as making money but saving money. You  
14 know, we can finally do something to save  
15 money and possibly put people back to  
16 work.

17 You know, when looking at the  
18 no bail thing, you have to also look at  
19 the fact that now we have people that is  
20 accused of crimes, that we can save \$135  
21 a day and still maintain public safety.  
22 You know, once that person is arrested,  
23 we can still maintain that public safety.  
24 Because why? We can now suggest to these  
25 individuals that they can go and

2 participate in different things that is  
3 available for them while they're waiting  
4 for court.

5 We can also look at ways of  
6 providing housing for folks who doesn't  
7 have addresses because of the fact that  
8 they've been arrested and doesn't have a  
9 place to live.

10 So I'm just -- I'm looking at  
11 this initiative as a way that the City of  
12 Philadelphia can save money and use that  
13 money in other areas.

14 Thank you.

15 COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

16 Clerk, our next speaker,  
17 please.

18 (Applause.)

19 CHIEF CLERK: Robert Burdge,  
20 commenting on 170678.

21 (Witness approached podium.)

22 MR. BURDGE: Yes. My name is  
23 Robert Burdge.

24 Mr. Curtis, how are you, sir?

25 I'm talking about this

2           mixed-income housing project that you  
3           guys have been avoiding, and it's really  
4           important because I've been on your --  
5           I'm trying to get housing right now.  
6           This is something very -- I've been on  
7           your list for six years now, gentlemen  
8           and ladies. This is really getting to be  
9           really tight.

10                    This is something that works in  
11           other cities. I've been -- I've not been  
12           a part of it, but I've been working for  
13           the contractor to have it. It works in  
14           other cities. Do not be afraid that  
15           people won't build houses here in  
16           Philadelphia. Just it works, and it  
17           works in other cities and it's just  
18           something that I think that we need  
19           affordable housing here in Philadelphia.

20                    I'm really stressed right now.  
21           I'm in a shelter that -- I've been in the  
22           shelter for nine months and I've been  
23           going to all my housing projects, and  
24           it's going to take me another year before  
25           I can get housing, and that's because

2           there's no affordable housing available.  
3           If we let the people that are building  
4           new projects take part of this -- how it  
5           works is that they will put 30 percent --  
6           well, that's what New York City does.  
7           Every building that -- because I worked  
8           for -- if you build a housing project in  
9           a city, they make you do 30 percent of it  
10          has to be for low-income people, and  
11          that's what it is. And if you want more  
12          information, you can get a hold of me.  
13          You know how to do that. You can get  
14          more information and I can tell you how  
15          it works in other cities.

16                        Thank you.

17                        COUNCILMAN HENON: Thank you.

18                        (Applause.)

19                        COUNCILMAN HENON: Clerk, our  
20          next speaker, please.

21                        CHIEF CLERK: Hiro Nishikawa,  
22          commenting on Fred Korematsu Day  
23          resolution introduced by Councilwoman Gym  
24          today.

25                        (Witness approached podium.)

2 MR. NISHIKAWA: Members of City  
3 Council, it is a great honor that I  
4 testify on behalf of the Philadelphia  
5 JACL, with the Japanese American Citizens  
6 League, to support the resolution to  
7 declare January 30, 2018 as Korematsu Day  
8 in our City of Brotherly and Sisterly  
9 Love.

10 Our Chapter was founded in  
11 1947, and it's part of the national civil  
12 rights organization established in 1929  
13 with headquarters now in San Fran and  
14 Washington, DC.

15 During and after World War II,  
16 Quakers based in Philadelphia helped  
17 rescue hundreds of Japanese Americans  
18 from the war relocation of 30 camps and  
19 brought them to this region for jobs and  
20 attending schools. Many of these folks  
21 later on were involved in the formation  
22 of the Philadelphia JACL. One Chapter  
23 member, William Marutani, was the first  
24 Asian American to present an amicus brief  
25 to the U.S. Supreme Court in 1967 to halt

1           1/25/18 - STATED - PUBLIC COMMENT  
2           state anti-discrimination laws in the  
3           case of Loving versus Virginia. This  
4           result finally struck down laws  
5           preventing mixed-race marriages  
6           throughout the United States.

7                       Marutani later became the first  
8           Asian American judge. Guess where?  
9           Common Pleas Court in Philadelphia in  
10          1975. This is a major city of east of  
11          the Mississippi. He was also a member of  
12          the Commission on Wartime Relocation and  
13          Internment of Civilians, a commission  
14          established by President Jimmy Carter in  
15          1978 to gather information on the  
16          Japanese American incarceration during  
17          World War II. A book, Personal Justice  
18          Denied, was the first final report which  
19          gave grounding to two major developments.  
20          The first was the Civil Liberties Act of  
21          1988 which provided redress to Japanese  
22          Americans for their loss of  
23          constitutional rights during World War  
24          II. This congressional campaign was led  
25          by Grace Uyehara, who is now deceased, a

2 founding member of the Philadelphia JACL.

3 This act was profound in that the United

4 States government admitted a wrong based

5 on racial prejudice, wartime hysteria,

6 and lack of political leadership.

7 The other result of this study

8 was the coram nobis cases in 1983 where

9 Fred Korematsu in California was finally

10 vindicated for his personal refusal to be

11 incarcerated in WRA camps during World

12 War II and then losing his civil rights

13 in a decision all the way up to the

14 Supreme Court in 1944. But with the

15 coram nobis cases, his name is being

16 cleared and Korematsu began to speak on

17 civil rights issues with renewed energy.

18 Following 9/11, he even filed

19 amicus briefs on behalf of prisoners in

20 Guantanamo being held indefinitely

21 without due process. He warned the

22 Supreme Court not to repeat the mistakes

23 foisted on Japanese Americans after new,

24 quote, enemy faces. He also urged others

25 to protest, but not with violence, and

2           don't be afraid to speak up. One person  
3           can make a difference, even if it takes  
4           40 years. His spirits continue to  
5           inspire us.

6                     Thank you.

7                     (Applause.)

8                     COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

9           Thank you for your testimony, sir.

10                    CHIEF CLERK: Catherine Blunt,  
11           commenting on 170954.

12                    (Witness approached podium.)

13                    MS. BLUNT: Good afternoon --

14                    COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
15           afternoon.

16                    MS. BLUNT: -- City Council. I  
17           applaud the intent and spirit of  
18           Ordinance 170954 regarding the  
19           Philadelphia School District's transition  
20           to local control as encouraged by that  
21           March 2015 vote in which the majority of  
22           voters in this city voted against the  
23           SRC.

24                    Abraham Lincoln called for a  
25           government of, by, and for the people.

2           This ordinance allows for a Philadelphia  
3           School Board that is more democratically  
4           appointed with the involvement of City  
5           Council in the process. I am here with  
6           Dr. Palmer, who is the Administrative  
7           Assistant of W. Curtis Thomas, and I am  
8           now going to read you some of his  
9           concerns.

10                    Three months have gone by in  
11           this race to take control of the School  
12           District, yet no school transition team  
13           study is in place. No comprehensive plan  
14           has been put before the public as of now.  
15           Under PA Right to Know law, the public  
16           has a right to know what the process was  
17           used to appoint 13 members to the  
18           nominating committee. Representative  
19           Thomas wants to know why the Black Clergy  
20           weren't involved, why was there not an  
21           African American organization involved,  
22           particularly since the overwhelming  
23           majority of students in the School  
24           District are African American.

25                    He says City Council should

2           also question why birth dates and other  
3           personal identifying information is  
4           required on forms to nominate School  
5           Board candidates. This blocked many  
6           submitting forms on behalf of candidates  
7           and so, therefore, an accurate number of  
8           candidates cannot be ascertained.

9                         Finally, what additional  
10           supports will there be for low-performing  
11           schools? Will this new School Board have  
12           independent fiscal authority? Will it be  
13           able to make final decisions about  
14           spending needs? Will teachers be able to  
15           teach in their areas of competency? Will  
16           the interior and exterior of school  
17           campuses be safe? And will the  
18           infrastructure, books, supplies, and  
19           technology materials, be available in  
20           safe and secure environments?

21                         These are why the City must  
22           create a comprehensive and  
23           well-documented, thought-out plan  
24           regarding the process of building a  
25           School Board. And he says he would like

2           it to be -- and he thinks you would too.  
3           He would like it to be a fair and  
4           equitable process for all students  
5           regardless of zip code. He says it is  
6           our duty.

7                         Thank you.

8                         (Applause.)

9                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10           Thank you for your testimony, ma'am.

11                         CHIEF CLERK: Ruth Birchett,  
12           commenting on 160007.

13                         (Witness approached podium.)

14                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
15           afternoon.

16                         MS. BIRCHETT: Thank you. Good  
17           morning, everyone. I would like to begin  
18           just very briefly by stating my  
19           appreciation to Councilwomen Brown and  
20           Gym for the bill of 170408. As an elder  
21           who has volunteered in an elementary  
22           school in my neighborhood, Frederick  
23           Douglass School, I have gotten to call  
24           many homes in reference to our children  
25           and their difficulties in school, and I

2 would tell you very clearly that our  
3 children are challenged by the impact of  
4 violence in our communities, and a lot of  
5 times their behaviors exhibited in school  
6 cause them to end up being suspended from  
7 school, and it compromises their  
8 education. I've seen it over and over  
9 again.

10 I am here, though, right now to  
11 speak to Bill 160007 and express my  
12 approval of this bill being repealed. I  
13 would tell you that this bill brings to  
14 mind what's happening right now with  
15 Temple University's efforts to build a  
16 stadium in our community and their desire  
17 to close North 15th Street, which is the  
18 only street west of Broad Street other  
19 than 20th Street and 22nd that goes  
20 all -- comes all the way to Center City.

21 I would tell you that I'm  
22 disappointed that neither Temple  
23 University nor our Councilman has thought  
24 enough of our community to have a  
25 community meeting so that you can hear

2           what the larger community -- how the  
3           larger community feels about this plan.  
4           It is disruptive.

5                         We're asking that over the next  
6           week, that Temple University as well as  
7           Council President Clarke, if you all  
8           would agree to have a community meeting  
9           at the High School for Engineering and  
10          Science, my former elementary school, so  
11          that we can discuss these plans -- the  
12          plans for them to do a special service  
13          district as well, which I believe is a  
14          neighborhood improvement district in  
15          disguise, as well as talk about the  
16          closure of North 15th Street as well.

17                        Please do not, this Council,  
18          please do not entertain any bill coming  
19          before this Council to close North 15th  
20          Street without our community having an  
21          opportunity to give our views. Please do  
22          not disrespect us in that way. It's  
23          simply not fair. It is not democratic.

24                        (Applause.)

25                        COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

2 Thank you for your testimony.

3 CHIEF CLERK: Fiona Cavanaugh,  
4 commenting on 171145.

5 (Witness approached podium.)

6 MS. CAVANAUGH: Hi. Good  
7 afternoon.

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: Good  
9 afternoon.

10 MS. CAVANAUGH: I hope y'all  
11 are doing well. I will be brief.

12 So in this bill, the  
13 neighborhood improvement district as  
14 outlined in this bill looks like it would  
15 benefit the community and help keep it  
16 clean, because it was planned in  
17 partnership with the community.  
18 Meanwhile it brings concern to mind for  
19 me Temple University has proposed  
20 somewhat similar development plans, but  
21 these plans have not been done openly,  
22 honestly or in partnership with  
23 community.

24 I want to be clear that we do  
25 not want this Council to entertain any

2           bill proposing a special services  
3           district or a neighborhood improvement  
4           district by Temple University. There has  
5           been no communication with the  
6           surrounding North Philadelphia community  
7           about such changes.

8                     Temple University is  
9           accelerating its efforts to build a  
10          football stadium in our North  
11          Philadelphia residential community.  
12          Council President Clarke and Temple  
13          University President Englert have ignored  
14          and even refused requests to meet with  
15          our community about the stadium.  
16          Therefore, as a former Temple University  
17          student and as a community resident and  
18          as a Stadium Stomper, we ask the City  
19          Council to reject consideration of any  
20          bill that proposes the permanent closure  
21          of the 1800 and 1900 blocks of North 15th  
22          Street. It is a major thoroughfare from  
23          North Philadelphia to Center City.  
24                     Council President Clarke,  
25          again, we request that you and Temple

2           University President Englert attend a  
3           public meeting at the GW Carver High  
4           School for Engineering and Science hosted  
5           by Stadium Stompers. We expect to be  
6           contacting about scheduling this meeting  
7           within one week.

8                         Thank you.

9                         COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10           Thank you for your testimony.

11                         CHIEF CLERK: Joe Danihel,  
12           commenting on 171135 and 171136.

13                         (Witness approached podium.)

14                         MR. DANIHEL: Again, taking  
15           property and not listening to the people.

16                         This is an official decree of  
17           the people in writ of mandamus quo  
18           warranto and, as such, requires immediate  
19           action and remedy. Every week Council,  
20           Mayor, and others transfer private  
21           property to the government, probably  
22           illegally.

23                         Do the people receive their  
24           rights from God? Are these rights  
25           plentoring (ph)? How can agents and

2 agencies deny and defy inalienable,

3 inviolable, God-given rights?

4 If government has deemed itself

5 more powerful than God, then why must

6 officials take an oath to God? How can

7 agents and agencies steal my home without

8 compensation, due process or Seventh

9 Amendment trial by jury? How can

10 government pay a contractor upwards of

11 100 million, mostly federal taxpayer

12 dollars, to build a mall on my stolen

13 home? How can officials defy oath,

14 Constitution, and laws without required

15 prosecution?

16 I quote Justice Marshall, The

17 very essence of civil liberties certainly

18 consists in the right of every individual

19 to claim protection of the laws, whenever

20 he receives an injury. One of the first

21 duties of government is to afford that

22 protection.

23 Could any of the officials

24 recently honoring Dr. King look Dr. King

25 in the eye knowing they stole my home?

2                   The Constitution and laws  
3           require immediate remedy of this breach  
4           of law, breach of close, breach of  
5           fiduciary duty. Your oath of office  
6           requires you to act or face prison.

7                   42 USC 1982, 1983, 1985, 1986,  
8           1987, 18 USC 241, 242, 2381, 2384, PA  
9           Constitution, Article I, Sections 1  
10          through 11, 26 PA CSA 703, 705, 708, 709,  
11          712, 713, 716 and other laws listed in  
12          SCOTUS 15-8965, 14-1330, 14-4056 appear  
13          violated.

14                   I call for the federal and  
15          Commonwealth governments to perform their  
16          constitutional obligations to investigate  
17          and prosecute all involved in the illegal  
18          theft and illegal deed transfer of my  
19          home, 1038 West Wyoming Avenue. The  
20          denial of God-given 42 USC 1982 property  
21          rights for 24 years is egregious,  
22          extraordinary, oath-violating, and  
23          requires immediate remedy.

24                   A just government must obey the  
25          rule of law. This color of law

2           government must have its Charter to  
3           govern revoked until a constitutionally  
4           compliant government is installed.

5                   Public servants cannot refuse  
6           their sworn duty to act any more than a  
7           fireman can refuse to fight a fire. The  
8           sovereign people require the Constitution  
9           and laws be enforced. Jail is required  
10          for all who violate oath, Constitution or  
11          law.

12                   I remind Council, it takes a  
13          lot of cooperation to create and allow  
14          monumental corruption.

15                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
16          Thank you for your testimony.

17                   CHIEF CLERK: There are no  
18          other speakers on the public comment  
19          list, Mr. President.

20                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
21          Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

22                   We will now consider the bills

10 All those in favor say aye.

11 (Aye.)

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
13 Those opposed?

14 (No response.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
16 ayes have it. That resolution is  
17 adopted.

18 CHIEF CLERK: And a resolution  
19 authorizing the Committee on Children and

24 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you. I

13 CHIEF CLERK: There are no  
14 other resolutions on the Final Passage  
15 Calendar, Mr. President.

16 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
17 Thank you very much, Mr. Decker.

18 That concludes our Calendar for  
19 today.

20 Are there any speeches on the  
21 part of the minority?

22 And the Chair recognizes  
23 Councilman Taubenberger.

24 COUNCILMAN TAUBENBERGER: Thank  
25 you, Council President. I just want to

2           call attention to an elected official  
3           that long ago gave great service to this  
4           city as District Attorney and as U.S.  
5           Senator. In 2008, Mr. Specter, a Senator  
6           from Pennsylvania -- and I'm quoting from  
7           the New York Times -- said that a former  
8           employee, Matt Walsh, described elaborate  
9           measures by the Patriots to conceal their  
10          filming of opponents' signals. Mr. Walsh  
11          also explained how the Patriots' coaching  
12          staff gleaned and gathered strategic  
13          information from members of the team's  
14          video crew who have watched the St. Louis  
15          Rams walk through their practice before  
16          the 2002 Super Bowl. He also identified  
17          more games of opponents that were filmed  
18          by the Patriots and detailed the  
19          advantages that the team gained in later  
20          games.

21                   Mr. Specter, a longtime  
22          Philadelphia Eagles fan, has battled with  
23          the NFL on several issues over the years.  
24          This time with his continued criticism of  
25          the League's investigation into the

2 Patriots, he is raising questions about  
3 the legitimacy of the Patriots'  
4 accomplishments, which includes three  
5 Super Bowl titles this decade, one  
6 against the Eagles and an 18 to nothing  
7 record last season before a loss to the  
8 New York Giants in the Super Bowl. Mr.  
9 Specter said the League should initiate  
10 an inquiry like the one commissioned by  
11 Major League Baseball to explore the use  
12 of performance-enhancing drugs in that  
13 sport. Mr. Specter is quoted as  
14 saying -- or Senator Specter, "They owe  
15 the public a lot more candor and a lot  
16 more credibility."

17 Well, this game will vindicate.  
18 This victory we will have in two weeks  
19 will give the victors all the more  
20 justice to overcome this awful situation  
21 that the Patriots have done over the  
22 years. So I say very loudly to all my  
23 colleagues and to the entire City, go  
24 Eagles for justice.

25 (Applause.)

3 Thank you, Councilman.

4 The Chair recognizes Councilman

5 Oh.

6 COUNCILMAN OH: Thank you very  
7 much, Council President. I just wanted  
8 to alert the public that the Office of  
9 Transportation Infrastructure Systems is  
10 having an open house this evening between  
11 the hours of 6:00 and 8:00, anyone who is  
12 interested in electric vehicle  
13 infrastructure. That report was  
14 completed by a task force. Councilman  
15 Squilla and myself were pleased to be a  
16 member of the task force, and everyone  
17 got together. There were people  
18 representing the EV owners, and a report  
19 and recommendations were completed.

20 So the public is invited to the  
21 Municipal Services Building, which is  
22 right across from City Hall on John F.  
23 Kennedy Boulevard and on the 16th  
24 floor -- or actually on Arch Street. I'm  
25 sorry -- okay. I'm sorry. The Municipal

4           recommendations, offer criticism and  
5           concerns.

6                   Thank you very much.

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

8           Thank you, Councilman.

9                   On behalf of the majority, the  
10          Chair recognizes Councilman Squilla.

11                   COUNCILMAN SQUILLA: Thank you,  
12          Mr. President. And I too want to go with  
13          our Councilman Taubenberger saying that,  
14          you know, this year, 2018 is the Year of  
15          the Dog for the Chinese. So we're going  
16          to rename it the Year of the Underdog for  
17          the Chinese New Year in honor of the  
18          Eagles.

19                   But I do want to welcome all  
20          the Councilmembers back, and tonight 5:00  
21          to 7:00 remind everybody down at the  
22          Winterfest down at Penn's Landing.  
23          You're all welcome to come down with  
24          staff and enjoy a couple hours of the  
25          great venue down there with maybe some

3           hopefully if people can make it down  
4           there, we'll see you down there. If you  
5           have any questions, call our office and  
6           we'll help to guide you to the right  
7           spot.

8                   Thank you.

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10           Thank you, Councilman. Thank you for  
11           that information.

12                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
13           Jones.

14                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Thank you,  
15           Mr. President. So keeping on the Eagles  
16           theme but on a serious note, the NFL  
17           Commissioner, unbeknownst to a lot of  
18           people, Roger Goodell, as well as our  
19           personal hero of public safety Who Wore  
20           It Best, Malcolm Jenkins, spent an  
21           afternoon, about an hour, down at our  
22           Pretrial Unit over in CJC, and what they  
23           saw through a cash bail system shocked  
24           them to their core, so much so that they  
25           committed to be a part of the criminal

2           justice reform. They saw firsthand how  
3           unfair, inequitable, and sometimes  
4           downright prejudice to poor people that  
5           system was.

6                   I want to thank you,  
7           Mr. President, for allowing me for the  
8           last two years to be a part of the  
9           Criminal Justice Reform Committee as one  
10          of the co-chairs, and we discussed and  
11          found out a great many things about  
12          criminogenic behavior, ranging from  
13          overcrowded jails, school-to-prison  
14          pipelines, constant reoccurrences of  
15          criminal acts, so much so that an article  
16          was released today about grandfathers  
17          serving with their sons and serving with  
18          their grandsons at the same jail, so much  
19          so that we have had books dedicated to  
20          the over-incarceration of the negro,  
21          calling it the new Jim Crow.

22                   So we here are -- and one of  
23          the things that I'm calling for  
24          personally because of your commitment to  
25          put us in a situation where we were

2           modernizing our systems, I'm calling for  
3           the end to a cash bail system in the City  
4           of Philadelphia and Commonwealth of  
5           Pennsylvania.

6                   (Applause.)

7                   COUNCILMAN JONES:

8           Mr. President, in our research we found  
9           out that a cash bail system comes from a  
10          thousand-year-old medieval system that  
11          was created to make sure that -- and they  
12          knew even then that jails were too  
13          costly, and so we should let the accused  
14          go if they were not a danger to  
15          themselves or society and that someone  
16          could assure that they would return to  
17          face trial. That's a thousand-year-old  
18          medieval system that hasn't changed much.

19                   The American bail system has  
20          become the central issue in fighting the  
21          effects of mass incarceration and  
22          disproportionate impact on minorities and  
23          poor people. Every day there are  
24          thousands of people that are not released  
25          from our jails, costing us, even my

2           conservative counterparts that might be  
3           more concerned about the budget impact,  
4           at \$130 a day for \$100 bail, meaning 10  
5           percent of the thousand dollars that they  
6           might be called for.

7                   We have the fourth largest jail  
8           population per capita of every large city  
9           in America, fourth largest. William Penn  
10          tried to reform the system in 1682 by  
11          creating the Clerk of Quarter Sessions  
12          Office to manage that system. We had  
13          hearings about that and some of the  
14          problems with it and eliminated it, but  
15          we did not eliminate the cash bail  
16          system. I would suggest to my colleagues  
17          that anything that's 100 years old might  
18          require a checkup, a tune-up, a fix-up  
19          and a change.

20                   (Applause.)

21                   COUNCILMAN JONES: Bail has two  
22          purposes: to make sure people come back  
23          and to protect the public. In  
24          Washington, DC they have not had a cash  
25          bail system in over 20 years. And just

2           like we're going to face, oh, the sky is  
3           falling and all hell is going to break  
4           loose, they did not -- that did not  
5           happen. In fact, Washington, DC's crime  
6           rates went down. And nobody goes away  
7           for free, scot-free. Nobody just opens  
8           the jail and lets people out. They let  
9           them out if they are not a danger to  
10          themselves or society with conditions.

11                    So me and -- where did he go,  
12          the cameraman that has the Dallas cap?  
13          We get in a bar fight on Friday because  
14          he's a Dallas fan. Now, we're friends,  
15          but I have a drinking problem, and this  
16          is a reoccurrence. Every Friday night I  
17          get my drink on and I go fight him. So  
18          the judge says, You know what, Mr. Jones,  
19          you probably don't need to be in jail.  
20          You probably need to be in a rehab.  
21          Would you go to rehab and by the time you  
22          get back here, maybe you've completed  
23          that course, maybe you've seen the light,  
24          maybe you've changed your behavior for  
25          the better, and if not, we'll take that

2           into account and rule accordingly. But  
3           you will be released with conditions.  
4           You will come back because you have an  
5           opportunity not to face prison time.

6                     Those should be the options as  
7           opposed to debtors' prison.

8                     Bail in Philadelphia has become  
9           a big business, and we know we're going  
10          to catch some flack about looking at  
11          things a little differently, but that's  
12          okay. So I'm calling for three things.  
13          One, I'm calling and asking that our  
14          counterparts in the Senate and in the  
15          House in Pennsylvania take a look at this  
16          for all of Pennsylvania. And if they  
17          can't do it for all of Pennsylvania,  
18          loosen up the regulations for cities of  
19          the first class like Philadelphia so we  
20          can manage our criminal justice system a  
21          little better.

22                    I'm going to also call upon the  
23          First District to take a look at our  
24          policies. As was said earlier, we have  
25          certain flexibility within our own rules

2                   and interpretation of the rules that we  
3                   should look at.

4                   And then I'm going to call for  
5                   Governor Wolf in Harrisburg to make this  
6                   happen from a legal way.

7                   Now, that does not mean that we  
8                   open the jails and let everybody out,  
9                   because we met with 20 inmates up on  
10                  State Road and we asked them the simple  
11                  question: Should some people be  
12                  incarcerated? And they looked around at  
13                  each other and said, Yup, some of us need  
14                  to be here. But the vast majority of us  
15                  that suffer because we're in jail because  
16                  they don't have money to get out, they  
17                  lose their jobs, they lose their  
18                  apartments and homes, they lose their  
19                  families and dignity and respect, and it  
20                  creates a catastrophic series of events  
21                  that they can't get out of. It increases  
22                  poverty when a kid goes and is pressured,  
23                  as it was said, because they're sitting  
24                  up there with the pressure of being in  
25                  jail and they plead guilty. They do not

2 know at the time they plead guilty just  
3 because they want that pressure of  
4 incarceration off of them that there are  
5 over 200 things they will never get to do  
6 or be in this country, ranging from  
7 living in public housing with your family  
8 to ever being a postman or receiving a  
9 federal loan to start a business.

10 We have to take a look. I am  
11 encouraged, Mr. President, and had a good  
12 conversation with the Public Defender and  
13 the new District Attorney, and they too  
14 are looking at what work we've done to  
15 begin to incorporate that in their  
16 various departments. But I want to tell  
17 my other colleagues that our work is on  
18 the budget side. It's okay to know how  
19 to do good, but we also have to know how  
20 much doing good costs.

21 So I'm going to say this in  
22 closing, that it's easier to help an  
23 at-risk kid than to try later to fix a  
24 broken man or woman.

25 So thank you, Mr. President,

4 Thank you, Councilman.

5 (Applause.)

6 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7 Thank you, Councilman, and thank you for

8 your continued good work on your

9 committee.

10 The Chair recognizes

11 Councilwoman Blackwell.

12 COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL: Thank

13 you, Mr. President. Yesterday was Lu's

14 15th anniversary, the day of his passing.

15 Time moves swiftly. But today I rise to

16 note the District Councilpeople have on

17 their desks flyers of these cute little

18 people, and it says Days Off School Meal

19 Program.

20 You all will remember that we

21 passed a bill here stating that if

22 schools are closed when City Hall and

23 government buildings are open, that we

24 should still make sure that children get

25 fed. And so this is a flyer -- and your

2           offices have them in case you want to  
3           duplicate them or change them -- that  
4           gives you the dates and locations in your  
5           districts for where children can get food  
6           on days when schools are closed and  
7           government buildings are open. Enjoy.

8                   Thank you, Mr. President.

9                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

10           Thank you, Councilwoman.

11                   COUNCILWOMAN BLACKWELL:

12           Thanks.

13                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
14           Chair recognizes Councilman Domb.

15                   COUNCILMAN DOMB: Thank you,  
16           Council President. I have three quick  
17           items. Today I co-introduced with my  
18           colleague Councilman Al Taubenberger a  
19           very important piece of legislation to  
20           increase the amount of money that may be  
21           awarded to family members of fallen  
22           firefighters, police officers,  
23           prosecution detectives killed in the  
24           course of performing heroic deeds. These  
25           fallen heroes, fellow citizens,

2           Philadelphians are performing the most  
3           selfless service to our city, putting  
4           their lives on the line day in and day  
5           out to protect each and every one of us.  
6           Previously my colleague Councilman  
7           Taubenberger increased the Hero Awards to  
8           50,000 as a way to express our gratitude  
9           for their selfless acts these heroic  
10          individuals perform in the line of duty.  
11          We feel it should be increased to  
12          \$100,000 in the future.

13                   While no amount of money can  
14          heal the grief of the families of these  
15          fallen heroes, it can hopefully make  
16          their daily life a little easier.

17                   I'd like to offer a moment of  
18          silence. We had a terrible tragedy in  
19          the City, a firefighter, Lieutenant  
20          Matthew LeTourneau, passed away fighting  
21          a fire two or three weeks ago. I'd like  
22          to have a moment of silence in his  
23          memory.

24                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:  
25          Thank you, Councilman.

2                   May we have a moment of silence  
3                   for our fallen hero firefighter. Please  
4                   have a moment.

5                   (Moment of silence.)

6                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

7                   Thank you.

8                   Councilman.

9                   COUNCILMAN DOMB: EITC Day is  
10                  tomorrow, and as you all know by now, I'm  
11                  a huge proponent of the Earned Income Tax  
12                  Credit and today introduced a resolution  
13                  recognizing January 26th as EITC  
14                  Awareness Day in Philadelphia. Today I'd  
15                  like to acknowledge Mary Arthur, the  
16                  Chief Executive Officer of Campaign for  
17                  Working Families, as well as several  
18                  employees of the IRS, including Doris  
19                  Greenwood, who was here before, Joseph  
20                  Solari, Victor Suarez and others who are  
21                  present here today. Maybe you could  
22                  please stand.

23                  (Applause.)

24                  COUNCILMAN DOMB: And I've said  
25                  before, the average refund is \$2,500 per

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1                   1/25/18 - STATED - SPEECHES  
2           return. Still \$100 million is being left  
3           on the table every year, could go to  
4           40,000 Philadelphians.

5                   This year the Campaign for  
6           Working Families has over 20 sites for  
7           free tax preparation throughout the City.  
8           Please visit one of their locations to  
9           file your free tax return to see if you  
10          qualify for EITC. You can also go to  
11          youearneditphilly.com for more  
12          information. And besides Campaign for  
13          Working Families, there's United Way and  
14          the Revenue Department do a good job in  
15          getting the money back.

16                   The last piece I want to  
17          mention is -- actually, two pieces.  
18          Appraisals. I introduced legislation  
19          today that requires an appraisal prior to  
20          Council approving acquisition of title in  
21          real estate. This does not apply to Land  
22          Bank, PRDA, Sheriff Sales or eminent  
23          domain. I'm talking about the big  
24          purchases, like a \$40 or \$50 million type  
25          property.

2                   This legislation will require  
3                   an appraisal prior to Council approving  
4                   the sale of real estate when the value of  
5                   such real estate is in excess of 200,000  
6                   as assigned by OPA.

7                   Last, but not least, I want to  
8                   stand with Councilman Jones on this bail  
9                   reform. December 28th I took a tour of  
10                  the prisons with Commissioner Carney for  
11                  six hours. I visited all six prisons and  
12                  saw what was going on, which is really  
13                  terrible. And whatever I can do to  
14                  support you with non-cash bail, I mean,  
15                  I'm 100 percent in. I see what's going  
16                  on, and it's a problem. Just two side  
17                  ventures, though. I visited juveniles  
18                  who are in prison. These are people  
19                  under the age of 18. And we're going to,  
20                  through Sylvester Mobley, I'm going to  
21                  pay for a course to teach them coding.  
22                  Sixteen or 17 of them signed up for a  
23                  course on coding in prison, so when they  
24                  come out, they'll have a career. We're  
25                  also doing that for some of the adults

2 there too. So hopefully we can get them  
3 back on track. Thank you.

4 Thank you.

5 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6 Thank you, Councilman.

7 (Applause.)

8 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: The  
9 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Bass.

10 COUNCILWOMAN BASS: Thank you,  
11 Mr. President. I just wanted to say also  
12 I want to echo Councilman Domb and thank  
13 Councilman Jones for his very important  
14 work that he's doing on bail reform as  
15 well and really all of my colleagues for  
16 the hard work and the work that's being  
17 done, and Councilwoman Blackwell with the  
18 Days Off School Meals Program, which I  
19 remember when we passed here in City  
20 Council and had hearings on it. We've  
21 done some really great work on that and  
22 other issues. So I just really wanted to  
23 recognize my colleagues on all the hard  
24 work they're doing.

25 But I also wanted to mention

2           just a couple of things. The first is  
3           that today I introduced a resolution for  
4           hearings with our train rail operators,  
5           which would include Amtrak, SEPTA, CSX,  
6           Conrail, and Norfolk Southern regarding  
7           the rail lines and the appearance of  
8           Philadelphia as you travel inside and  
9           outside. It's really quite disgraceful.  
10          And so what we're doing is hopefully  
11          having a hearing in which we can come to  
12          a compromise, a spirit of cooperation and  
13          work together, because we know that a lot  
14          of people come in and out and through  
15          Philadelphia, and the appearance matters.  
16          The first impression really does matter,  
17          and this is a first impression.

18                        So we look forward to having  
19          those conversations publicly and hearing  
20          what they have to offer in terms of  
21          cleanup and maintenance of their  
22          property, not City property, not private  
23          property but their property. So we look  
24          forward to having that conversation.

25                        And this is a nice segue into

2           the Eagles, because we know that people  
3           are going to be coming into Philadelphia  
4           because the Eagles are going to win the  
5           Super Bowl, but as they are coming in, we  
6           want to mention that on Super Bowl  
7           Sunday, we're going to be having a  
8           community block party, tailgate, Super  
9           Bowl party. It's going to be held at  
10          Lonnie Young Recreation Center on Super  
11          Bowl Sunday at 3 o'clock in the  
12          afternoon, the festivities will start.  
13          We're going to have Philadelphia's  
14          legendary DJ Gary O, along with the Urban  
15          Guerilla Orchestra. We're going to have  
16          all kinds of activities. Everything is  
17          free, free food. And we just want folks  
18          to come out and be safe and have a good  
19          time in the community. So, again, this  
20          is going to be at Lonnie Young Rec Center  
21          on Super Bowl Sunday, which is February  
22          4th, starting at 3 o'clock in the  
23          afternoon, and it's going to be, again, a  
24          community tailgate and Super Bowl watch  
25          party. So we just want to invite folks

2                   to feel free to come out from all over  
3                   the City.

4                   Thank you.

5                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

6                   Awesome. Thank you, Councilwoman.

7                   The Chair recognizes Councilman  
8                   Johnson.

9                   COUNCILMAN JOHNSON: Thank you,  
10                  Council President. It does feel good to  
11                  be back with this robust of hardworking  
12                  people here in City Council.

13                  Just a couple things I just  
14                  want to acknowledge. One, I want to also  
15                  acknowledge Councilman Curtis Jones,  
16                  particularly on the issue of ending cash  
17                  bail, because we all know that your  
18                  checkbook or your pocketbook shouldn't  
19                  determine your freedom. So I do want to  
20                  thank you for your leadership on this  
21                  particular issue.

22                  And also I remember, Councilman  
23                  Domb, over the holiday I also visited the  
24                  young people on State Road to take a look  
25                  at solitary confinement and had a chance

2           to talk to each of the young men to try  
3           to get an idea of their current  
4           experience while they were on State Road,  
5           and they talked about the coding program,  
6           they talked about the engineering  
7           technical program that they have there,  
8           but also the need for bringing more  
9           programs inside the prisons so they can  
10          also focus on making the transition when  
11          they do go back into society. And so we  
12          want to continue to make sure that we're  
13          being supportive of those. These are  
14          juveniles, basically children, that are  
15          in adult prisons -- that are in the adult  
16          prison system, and making sure they have  
17          all the support that they have. And I  
18          think the part that broke my heart was a  
19          young man who received a 40-year  
20          sentence. He's 17 years old. And I  
21          asked him about his experience while he  
22          was waiting on State Road to be  
23          sentenced, and he said it's difficult to  
24          be away from my parents, because I've  
25          never been away from my parents. This is

2                   my first time being arrested.

3                   So here's a kid, first time  
4                   being arrested, get a 40-year hit, like  
5                   right off the beginning, right? And so  
6                   it just reinforces the urgency that,  
7                   again, if we're going to be a great city,  
8                   we're going to bring Amazon here to the  
9                   City of Philadelphia, we need to continue  
10                  to make sure addressing the issue of  
11                  youth gun violence and keeping the guns  
12                  out of the hands of our young people is  
13                  our number one priority. If we can have  
14                  safe injection sites for those who want  
15                  to get high, surely we can find ways to  
16                  keep guns out of young people who want to  
17                  get involved in something that's  
18                  positive. And so on this budget process  
19                  coming up, I'm going to be very  
20                  aggressive, and that means calling folks  
21                  out that's not stepping up to make sure  
22                  we have the resources available to  
23                  support our young people.

24                  No young person this summer  
25                  should be looking for a summer job. Like

2                   that's the approach that we have to take  
3                   in order to take back the streets of the  
4                   City of Philadelphia for our young  
5                   people.

6                   But on another note, Council  
7                   President, I want to thank you for  
8                   stepping up to the plate to address this  
9                   issue of congestion when it comes to  
10                  traffic, the flow of traffic in the City  
11                  of Philadelphia. And so I had a recent  
12                  meeting with Michael Carroll to talk  
13                  about how we're going to look at  
14                  congestion.

15                  I live in Point Breeze, South  
16                  Philadelphia. I lived in South Philly  
17                  all my life. I used to walk to Center  
18                  City, right? Rittenhouse Square before  
19                  there was new residents, I used to hang  
20                  out there when I was a kid, right? You  
21                  could walk from Point Breeze to work ten  
22                  minutes, right? It took me a half an  
23                  hour to get to my team retreat on 17th  
24                  and Market from Point Breeze last Friday,  
25                  and this is consistent. And so we got to

2 figure out like the new traffic flow  
3 plan, because right now we're on the  
4 verge of becoming a New York, and if you  
5 go to New York, you know it don't make  
6 sense to get in the car to go anywhere  
7 because this gridlock.

8 So whatever we come up with,  
9 rather it's civilian patrol officers  
10 similar to New York, rather it's a toll  
11 on cars similar to New York, because you  
12 have Uber and you have Lyft drivers just  
13 riding around, riding around. And so we  
14 got to figure it out.

15 But it's getting ridiculous how  
16 long it takes to get from Point A to  
17 Point B even when we leave here to go  
18 home. I know to get to South Philly, I  
19 got to pick between Broad Street and 15th  
20 Street on going to get my son. I got to  
21 go all the way up to like 21st just to  
22 get back to 17th Street. That don't make  
23 any sense. So we got to figure out that  
24 traffic control piece, and thank you for  
25 at least providing one part of the

2           solution to try to look at how do we take  
3           back our city when it comes to just  
4           getting around.

5                   So thank you, Council  
6           President.

7                   COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: It's  
8           going to be a very interesting  
9           discussion. We got some really good  
10          people coming in to talk about it. Thank  
11          you, Councilman.

12                  The Chair recognizes Councilman  
13          Green.

14                  COUNCILMAN GREEN: Thank you,  
15          Council President. I'm going to join my  
16          colleagues in saluting Councilman Jones  
17          for his leadership on addressing the bail  
18          issue in our city and ending cash bail.  
19          I also commend him for reaching out at  
20          the state level. I know State  
21          Representative Jordan Harris has been  
22          working on this issue and calling on our  
23          state counterparts and our Governor to  
24          also take steps to address cash bail here  
25          in the City of Philadelphia. And I just

2 want to hone in on a point that he made  
3 and kind of illuminate that issue, that  
4 this is an issue of not only an equal  
5 justice issue but also an issue in  
6 reference to poverty. And when someone  
7 is not able to pay for bail and is in  
8 jail for a period of time and then they  
9 get released and the charges get  
10 dismissed, they come back to a broken  
11 home, they come back to not having a job,  
12 and it has a ripple effect in our entire  
13 City of Philadelphia. And when we talk  
14 about issues of having such a high amount  
15 of poverty, cash bail is one aspect that  
16 adds to the poverty in our city.

17 And I want to also remind  
18 members of this body that during the  
19 Goode Administration, the City helped  
20 support a bail fund. And so until we get  
21 rid of cash bail, we need to have support  
22 of organizations that are providing bail  
23 funds. Some of them have testified today  
24 in reference to helping people to get out  
25 of jail.

2                   So we had hearings last year  
3                   regarding can the City support a bail  
4                   fund. Councilman Johnson as well as  
5                   Councilman Jones talked about the budget  
6                   process, and so we'll be having some very  
7                   interesting and difficult conversations  
8                   with a number of parties about this  
9                   issue, but also with the First Judicial  
10                  District, as Councilman Jones said. So  
11                  when we have our budget hearings and the  
12                  First Judicial District comes to testify,  
13                  we need to ask them the hard question  
14                  about what happens when we charge someone  
15                  bail and where does that money go to.

16                  When we had the hearings  
17                  regarding the bail fund, they couldn't  
18                  give us a specific background or  
19                  information or reason on how they  
20                  articulate and to find that number. Is  
21                  that number to pay for the cost of  
22                  running certain things? We couldn't get  
23                  that number. It seemed very arbitrary.

24                  So I know I and I'm sure  
25                  Councilman Jones and others will be

2           reaching out to our First Judicial  
3           District to find out how did they come up  
4           with the fees and fines that we charge in  
5           reference to bail.

6                   And then also we also need to  
7           have a conversation with the First  
8           Judicial District regarding the oversight  
9           of our bail commissioners, because  
10          although our new District Attorney, our  
11          public defenders can ask the court to not  
12          provide bail, the bail commissioner can  
13          still set bail. And I can recall, being  
14          both a former ADA here in Philadelphia  
15          and also being an assistant deputy  
16          attorney general in Delaware, times where  
17          I did not believe a state trooper or a  
18          police officer and did not want to move  
19          forward with a case or did not want to  
20          have a certain bail amount. It's still  
21          up to that bail commissioner to make that  
22          decision.

23                   So we need to make sure we have  
24          the hard questions with the First  
25          Judicial District before they get here

2 for budget hearings to find out why and  
3 what amount they're setting on our bail  
4 funds and where that money is going to  
5 and, two, what's the oversight for our  
6 bail commissioners, so that way, we can  
7 take the steps, as Councilman Jones  
8 stated, to get rid of cash bail and also  
9 to support those organizations that are  
10 doing bail funds in that interim.

11 Thank you, Council President.

12 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE:

13 Thank you, Councilman.

14 (Applause.)

15 COUNCIL PRESIDENT CLARKE: That  
16 concludes our speeches on behalf of the  
17 minority and majority, and with that, the  
18 Chair recognizes Councilwoman Reynolds  
19 Brown for a motion to adjourn.

20 COUNCILWOMAN BROWN: Thank you,  
21 Mr. President. I move that Council stand  
22 adjourned until Thursday, February 1,  
23 2018 at 10:00 a.m.
